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MINUTES OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS 1957

● 1. Recognizing the blessing and leading of the Lord during the past year, we are looking unto Him who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life, as we convene in this sixty-fifth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting at Newberg, Oregon, the fifteenth day of August, 1957.

● 2. The presiding clerk, Dorwin Smith, welcomed all those in attendance. He stated his feeling that in the preliminary meetings the stage has been set for a Spirit-filled Yearly Meeting. He expressed the concern that Christ might have the pre-eminence throughout every session, and that we might be led in the business sessions as well as in our meetings for worship.

Our clerk reminded us that on August 15, 1914, the great Panama Canal was opened. He gave statistics emphasizing the tremendous cost of the undertaking. He then brought out the fact that we as Christians are enjoying a much greater accomplishment—our great salvation. This has come to us at a tremendous cost, the death of our Lord.

What is the return on the investment of Calvary? It is the church, our land, and our advantages. It was a tremendous investment, but the returns justify the cost. There is no better way than the way of salvation. We are meeting in these sessions of this Yearly Meeting because of this better way, and our decisions will determine the future of the church.

Earl Geil led in prayer for unity, and for the mind of the Spirit throughout these sessions.

- 9. The reports of the State of the Church were read from all the Quarterly Meetings, and the summary appears below:

All meetings expressed appreciation for the Spirit-filled messages of their pastors and feel they are speaking definitely to the needs of their congregations. Some are serving at personal sacrifice.

In general there has been an increase in morning services for worship, but many report a decline in attendance at evening services and the mid-week prayer meeting, feeling a lack of stewardship of time.

Some meetings have felt new life in the establishment of new outposts, and young people have felt calls to Christian service. These are encouraged in the Lord.

Friends are endeavoring to live in harmony with one another, and are striving to live above reproach before the world.

Churches report that the doctrine of Friends is being upheld, and care is being used in selecting their leadership.

Along with expressions of praise and blessing, there exists a vision and concern for those who are outside the fold for whom Christ died, believing Christ is the answer to all the world's needs.

- 10. A communication regarding elders and overseers, from Portland Quarterly Meeting:

The following proposal came to Portland Quarterly Meeting, in session seventh month 27, 1957, from Parkrose Monthly Meeting:

We propose to the Quarterly Meeting, for reference to the Yearly Meeting in its next sessions, that with the issuance of the new Constitution and Discipline which is in prospect, the title of designation of "elder" be discontinued, and that those now holding this office be renamed "overseers;" furthermore, that in the Constitution and Discipline provision be made for future election as overseers the same number of persons now known as elders and overseers.

The reasons for this move are as follows:

1. The distinction between the duties of elders and those of overseers has practically disappeared.
2. There is a very close relation between spiritual problems and moral or ethical problems. Either one usually involves the other.
3. It is artificial, if not impossible, to ask the elder to have no concern for moral matters, and the overseer to have none for spiritual needs.
4. So far as our knowledge goes, the local meeting on ministry and oversight usually acts as a body; the distinction of duties is not observed.

It might be noticed further that it would serve the same purpose to discontinue the title of overseer and let all be elders. In such a case, however, the phrase "ministry and oversight" would be less obvious as a title for ministers and elders, while with the change proposed it would still be most appropriate.

This proposition is not made with any desire to change the practices or modes of activity of Oregon Friends, but simply to fit the phraseology of our Constitution and Discipline more accurately to the situation as it now exists.

In the discussion which followed, the Quarterly Meeting seemed generally to favor the proposition, possibly preferring the term "elder" to that of "overseer." It was the desire of Portland Quarterly Meeting that the Yearly Meeting appoint a committee to study this proposal extensively and report back to a later session of Yearly Meeting.

Referred to the representatives. (See Minute 125)

- 11. A communication from Inland Quarterly Meeting:

Inland Quarterly Meeting recommends that the Yearly Meeting provide a fund in Yearly Meeting budgets for moving expenses of pastors within the limits of the Yearly Meeting.

Referred to the representatives. (See Minutes 29 and 126)

- 12. Inland Quarterly Meeting sends the following recommendation:

That the dates of Ministerial Conference be determined at Yearly Meeting time. By so doing the planning of spring revivals will not be so difficult for the local church.

Referred to the Ministerial Association. (See Minute 75)

- 13. A communication from Inland Quarterly Meeting:

Feeling a concern that more careful consideration be given to the setting of dates for board meetings during the year in regards to the layman's opportunity to attend and participate in the work of the boards, the following suggestions are made:

1. Times and places of meetings to be held through the year be scheduled during the sessions of Yearly Meeting.
2. That these times and places be adhered to as announced.
3. If an extreme emergency arises in the work of the board that this be handled by a committee designated at their organizational meeting at Yearly Meeting for this purpose.

Referred to the Executive Committee. (See Minutes 117 and 129)

- 14. A communication from Inland Quarterly Meeting:

We request that annual report blanks be sent to each Monthly Meeting early in the church year. This will enable the committees to govern their activities more accurately throughout the year.

Forwarded to the Executive Committee. (See Minute 130)

- 15. For the Discipline Revision Committee, Earl Barker announced a proposed revision of the Discipline has been prepared and sent out, two copies to each pastor. More copies are being distributed at this session. Members are asked to study these for action at a later date.

- 16. At the beginning of the inspiration hour the Harmonettes trio from George Fox College sang "Yes I Know."

Hubert Mardock of Caldwell, Idaho, was introduced as Yearly Meeting speaker, and brought the message for the inspirational hour.

He expressed his concern for a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit which will have a permanent effect on our Yearly Meeting. He read 1 Corinthians 13, taking as his text 1 Corinthians 12:31, "And yet show I unto you a more excellent way." This text culminates the 12th chapter and introduces the 13th chapter which stresses the "Gift of the Spirit." Other excerpts: There is a difference between receiving gifts bestowed by the Spirit, and the gift of the Spirit. Love is something that is shed abroad in the heart by the Holy Ghost.

Divine love is the enduring principle of Christianity. Love does away with the sting of sacrifice, destroys the spirit of selfishness and gives compassion for the fallen. The more excellent way is "Love Perfected."

Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

- 17. The devotional period opened with prayer by Grace Clark, and the congregation joined in singing "My Jesus I Love Thee."

- 18. A minute for Gerald Dillon for service in Ohio Yearly Meeting was presented. The meeting concurred in granting this.

In view of the fact that Earl and Adelaide Barker will also be in Ohio Yearly Meeting, the meeting favors issuing them a minute for service.

- 19. Wiltsie and Edith Hollingsworth of Hemlock Monthly Meeting, Kokomo Quarterly Meeting, Western Yearly Meeting, were introduced to the meeting.

- 20. Walter Lee, president of the Board of Missions, suggested that a letter of sympathy from the Yearly Meeting be sent to Everett L. and Catherine Cattell of India, in view of the recent accidental death of their son and daughter-in-law and grandchild. The meeting concurred.

- 21. The Board of Public Relations sent a communication expressing dissatisfaction with the statement on divorce, of the 1956 Yearly Meeting Minutes, and asking a restudy of the whole problem. This was referred to the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight. (See Minutes 32 and 60)

- 22. A recommendation from the Board of Public Relations:

We recommend that the following statement be approved by the Yearly Meeting for the use of our board, appropriate groups and individuals:

"We oppose the consumption of alcoholic beverages on commercial air lines and recommend that everything be done to eliminate this practice."

The meeting concurred.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

- 23. Charlotte Macy, president read Acts 11:27, and reported as follows: (Condensed report)

The Board of Peace and Service is happy to report that an active ministry in Christian service has been carried on throughout most of the meetings this past church year. Forty-seven submitted written reports. In these a great variety of Home Service projects was listed, accommodating local needs and emergencies in the name of Christ. The Medford meeting is to be especially commended for their ministry in service and for their very adequate report.

Concerning Foreign Relief: 17 CARE parcels and 3,812 pounds of clothing have been sent abroad. Also \$1,582.46 has been given for foreign relief.

This is the first year that the Peace Department has been a part of this board. Under the direction of Paul Mills, the little booklet "You and the Draft" has been distributed to each meeting, and reports indicate that many of the meetings have used this booklet for class instruction or have circulated it for reading among their young people. The reports also list the names and addresses of 340 young men in our meetings between the ages of 14 and 18. A copy of the booklet "Peace and War," written by Paul Mills, will be sent to each for his own study.

Richard Cossel presented the work of their Peace Department. He presented the booklet Peace and War which should be read in each meeting. He urged the church to support our young men who have taken the conscientious objector's stand as taught by our church.

"Does Holy Living Involve the Doctrine of Peace?" was the subject of a speech contest sponsored by the department. Phyllis George of Netarts church and Ralph Hofstetter of Scotts Mills presented their talks to the Yearly Meeting. Appreciation was expressed for these speeches.

Charles Beals reported progress on the Friends retirement home project, and publicity for Friendsview Manor is ready. Now it is their desire to find those interested, and someone who can spend time in promoting this project.

The meeting approved the report of the Board of Peace and Service.

- 24. The representatives nominated the following to the Board of Peace and Service for a term of three years: L. Merle Green, Vern Martin, Nathan Pierson.

Approved.

- 25. Oscar Brown led in closing prayer, and the meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 Friday morning.

- 26. After a time of silent prayer and meditation, Scott Clark led in prayer.

- 27. The minutes were read and corrected.

- 28. Two new pastors were introduced to the Yearly Meeting: Orville and Lois Winters, to take the pastorate at Tigard, Oregon. Kenneth L. and Geneva Eichenberger, to be the new pastors at Entiat.

- 29. Dean Gregory presented the new directional signs to be sold to the various churches for \$5.00 each. The meeting expressed approval and appreciation for the work of this committee.

- 30. The representatives recommend that Inland Quarterly Meeting's, request for a fund for moving expense of pastors be referred to the Board of Evangelism for further consideration.

Approved. (See Minutes 11 and 124)

● 31. A communication from the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight:

The meeting on Ministry and Oversight in session August 14, 1957, favored suggesting to the Yearly Meeting that the Board of Publication be asked to consider the booklet of Ohio Yearly Meeting for preparing material for a study course for associate members and other prospective members of the church, acquainting them with the history, doctrines, organization and management of the Friends Church.

Referred to the Board of Publication.

● 32. A communication from the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight:

The meeting on Ministry and Oversight in its session August 16, considered the matter referred to it by the Yearly Meeting as to the addition of a paragraph on the subject of divorce, makes the following report: It was felt by a majority present that the paragraph, submitted by this body last year, Minute 125, 1956 Yearly Meeting Minutes, should be added to the discipline. (See Minutes 21 and 60)

Referred to the Discipline Revision Committee.

● 33. Dean Gregory presented Kenneth Wesche, Dean of the Western Evangelical Seminary, who gave information regarding the school, its constituency and its progress.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

● 34. Lela Morrill, president, presented the program and the report.

Phyllis George presented the contestants in the speech and Scripture memorization contest.

The following were winners in the Scripture memorization contest, and spoke before the Yearly Meeting: Coral Helm, Virginia Fuller, Clark Adams and Sandra Ralphs. Lonnie Fendall and Bill Reed presented their winning talks in the Speech contest division.

The report of the board follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOL:

Reports from the Sunday schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting after one year of work toward the Standards of Excellence showed a total average attendance of 5174, a gain of 317 over the previous year. This gain, compared with a gain of only 37 a year ago, is one evidence of an increasing vitality in our Sunday schools. Thirty-six of our Sunday schools showed gains. Six showed gains of more than 30%. These were Ontario, with 38%; Maplewood with 37%; Quincy with 34%; Metolius with 33 1/2%; Hayden Lake with 33%; and Oak Park with 32%. Seven others showed gains of more than 20%. These were Sherwood, Cambridge, Woodland, Pringle, Rose Valley, Boise and Caldwell. We are also glad for the gain in our three new Sunday schools of Nehalem, Newport and Tigard.

But, though we are gratified to see these gains in attendance, we must recognize the fact that it takes more than growth to make a good Sunday school. And so the Standards of Excellence with their four-fold emphasis upon Evangelism, Enlargement, Education, and Efficiency give a truer picture of quality of our Sunday schools. Reports in the Standards of Excellence show that 13 Sunday schools achieved over 900 points giving them the classification of Gold Crown Sunday schools. These (listed alphabetically are: Chehalem Center, East Wenatchee, Entiat, First Friends Portland, Hayden Lake, Marion, McKinley Avenue, Oak Park, Ontario, Pringle, Scotts Mills, Sherwood and Woodland.

Six Sunday schools attained the rating of Silver Crown schools—Eugene, Hillsboro, Maplewood, Metolius, Piedmont, and Rose Valley. And twelve Sunday schools rated Blue Crowns—Boise, Caldwell, Everett, Holly Park, Medford, N.E. Tacoma, Parkrose, Quincy, South Salem, Sprague River, Springbrook and Star.

Of special interest to the Yearly Meeting is the announcement of the three Sunday schools who achieved the highest total number of points in the Standards of Excellence, thereby gaining the distinction of Blue Ribbon Sunday schools and earning expense-paid trips to the National Sunday School convention in Los Angeles. These three Sunday schools are: Oak Park, Camas, Wn.; Sherwood, Oregon; McKinley Avenue, Tacoma, Washington.

One purpose of the Standards is to reveal areas of weakness. Perhaps the greatest weakness revealed was in the area of church loyalty on the part of our Sunday school teachers. While 92% of our teachers remain for the morning worship service, just 72% are present in the evening service, and only 61% attend prayer meeting. This is a matter for some concern, especially because of its bearing upon the evangelistic emphasis of our Sunday schools.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH WORK:

There were 40 Vacation Bible Schools held with a total enrollment of 2635, and 328 conversions reported.

Christian Endeavor membership totals 502 in Senior C.E., 180 in Intermediate, and 250 in Junior.

Attendance at all of our youth camps and conferences this summer totaled over 1000, and through these conferences, many of our young people and children were won to the Lord or strengthened in their Christian life.

BOARD ACTIVITY:

The main activity of the board during the past year has been the promotion of the Standards of Excellence for Sunday schools. One book has been published, "I Have Called You Friends," by Virginia Helm. This excellently written book is a course of study for young Friends, a teachers manual to be used with "Lion-Hearted Quakers" by Marie Haines. The book sells for 75¢. The board has sent funds to assist in Vacation Bible Schools in six of our Outposts and one Preparative Meeting. We have again sponsored Junior Yearly Meeting.

THE FUTURE:

The coming year should be one of growth in our Sunday schools. This year we passed the five thousand mark in attendance. We would challenge you with a goal of "Onward to Six Thousand."

Perhaps one of our greatest needs is for training in leadership. Our board is working on plan for a Yearly Meeting Leadership Training Conference. Meanwhile we would urge our people to take advantage of every opportunity for such training.

As we look into the year ahead we want to encourage each Sunday school to increase vision and effort for real achievement in all the fields of Sunday School Excellence. May the failures or weaknesses of the past year serve only as a guide to better work in the future. "And whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men; knowing that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance: for ye serve the Lord Christ."

Gerald Dillon emphasized briefly the "Standards of Excellence" program for the Sunday schools. He urged us not to become complacent because of a substantial gain this year, but to strive for greater increase in the future.

● 35. The inspirational hour opened with the song "All the Way My Savior Leads Me," led by Harold Ankeny. The Harmonettes trio sang, "A Long Lonesome Road."

Hubert Mardock read Hebrews 8:1-13 and John 14:12-17 in introduction to his message for the inspirational hour. He used as his text verse 12 for his subject "The Holy Spirit and the Miraculous." He stated that the day of miracles is not past. "We believe in divine healing but we should not raise this one phase of Jesus' works above others. He performed many other works besides the healing of bodies. Bodily healing is temporal: eventually death ensues. Spiritual healing is eternal—everlasting. Such are the 'greater works' to which Christ calls us."

The meeting closed in singing the hymn, "The Great Physician," and Frederick Baker led in prayer.

● 36. The meeting stands adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

● 37. The devotional period opened with the Gospel song "Redeemed." Kenneth Eichenberger led in prayer.

● 39. A communication from Salem Quarterly Meeting:

Salem Quarterly Meeting recommends that a letter of commendation and encouragement be sent to our Oregon Secretary of State, Mark Hatfield, because of his attitude and influence against the liquor issue, and accepting a position on the board of directors of the Oregon Temperance League.

Approved: the clerks to send the letter.

● 40. The Board of Evangelism sent the following request:

The Board of Evangelism requests that, while changes are being made and the Constitution and Discipline shaped up for publication, consideration be given to the following proposed change: On page 40, in paragraph 3. PREPARATIVE MEETING, change the first sentence to begin as follows:

"After having secured the approval of the Board of Evangelism, an outpost may petition its parent meeting," etc., (without further change).

Since the board has general supervision over all outpost work, it is felt that a precaution of this sort would help to keep the progress of the work on an even keel.

Approved, and forwarded to the Committee of Discipline Revision

to be included in the new discipline.

- 41. The Committee on Discipline Revision requested permission to add a phrase to the proposed revision as follows:

On page 17 of the mimeographed draft, Part IV, 2, b, let the reading be:
b. Monthly and quarterly meeting officers: July 1 to June 30. Quarterly meeting superintendents newly elected shall attend all board meetings from the time of their appointment. Those retired from office shall attend until excused by their respective board presidents.

Approved and referred to the Discipline Revision Committee.

- 42. The representatives nominated the following to the Board of Evangelism for three years: Walter Wilhite, Frederick Baker, and Randall Emry.

Approved.

- 43. The Board of Evangelism named Ellwood Mylander to the Friends Church Extension Foundation to serve three years.

Approved.

- 44. The representatives nominate the following to the Board of Public Relations for three years: Ludlow Corbin, Kenneth Eichenberger, Rolly Hartley.

Approved.

- 45. Paul W. Barnett submitted his resignation from the Discipline Revision Committee since he will be moving from the limits of Oregon Yearly Meeting. This resignation, accepted with regrets, takes effect at the close of Yearly Meeting.

- 46. The Executive Committee nominated Robert Morrill to continue serving as financial secretary of Oregon Yearly Meeting for the coming year.

Approved.

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

- 47. Dean Gergory, General Superintendent, presented his annual report as follows:

(Condensed report)

Sixty-five years ago, the early Quaker pioneers in the new Oregon country, drew up the charter which was destined to guide the faith and practice of Northwest Quakers for generations to come. Who knows the dreams and aspirations of those stalwart men and women, who must have thought and planned ahead at least six and a half decades, to 1957, and beyond; for men who plot spiritual courses surely must envision the results upon future generations. Could they speak to us now, would our founding fathers be content with the results so far evident?

This question is unanswerable. The important question is, "Are we, who call ourselves Friends, content with the results we have seen in this our day?" We may well thank God for any advances we have seen, but a moderate degree of dissatisfaction should be ours.

During the year I have had at least 140 opportunities to present messages. I have ministered in most all of our meetings, and conducted week-end revival services at Pringle, Metolius and Tacoma meetings. I was the guest evangelist for the Mt. Airy camp meeting in Kansas this past spring. I have attended a number of our summer conferences, teaching classes and assisting as the way opened. I have represented the Yearly Meeting on the Board of Administration of the N. A. E. and serve on the Commission on Evangelism and Church Extension of that body. It has been a privilege to serve as ex-officio member on all the Yearly Meeting boards, participating in many special study groups or committees appointed by the boards. I have traveled over 21,000 miles in Yearly Meeting interests, of which 16,567 miles were by auto.

The Yearly Meeting office is caring for an ever increasing service to Friends. The office secretary, Beth Hockett, continues to give unselfishly of her talents and service to the operation of the office. We are now handling the ministers hospital Group Insurance program, collecting premiums and validating claims. This program has paid \$1622.05 in hospital and doctor bills since last November when the insurance became effective. The claims have ranged from \$7.50 to \$553.25 per individual. I would urge that meetings not now participating, should extend this service to their pastors. Some churches have assumed the cost of the pastor's family insurance as well as the pastor's premium. This fine service is available to all ministers, workers and missionaries employed by the Yearly Meeting.

Our thanks should be extended to various railroad lines that courteously give free passes to the superintendent annually or by the trip, thus greatly reducing travel costs. They are: Northern Pacific, Southern Pacific, S. P. & S., and Union Pacific railroad lines.

Words of appreciation are in order for Roger and Mildred Minthorne who are making an invaluable contribution to the church in the treasurer's office. Each year they are called upon to give more time and thought to this work. Theirs is truly a service of love.

Ray and Margaret Carter, with Ralph and Myrtle Fletcher, also give themselves tirelessly to their tasks in the field of publications. I doubt if most of us recognize the significant contribution which is being made to Quakerdom through the printed page coming from the little off-set press at Yearly Meeting headquarters. The Board of Publication has a number of contemplated projects in the field of Quaker literature. Their only hindrance is lack of funds. They have the manu-

scripts already in hand for a number of hoped for books and booklets which they feel would make a great contribution to the Christian testimony. A recent release by Missionary News Service states that every week one million more people learn to read. What they read will depend on who reaches their minds and hearts first with the printed appeal. What a challenge to the church to publish abroad the glad message of salvation! Will we catch this vision, along with other aspects of our program to tell the world?

A year ago it was reported a new Quarterly Meeting had been established in Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho. This year, it is also our privilege to report another new Quarterly Meeting, which has been named Southwest Washington Quarterly Meeting, in keeping with the location.

A year ago it was reported that no new meetings had been set up for the preceding year. This year we are all happy to hear reports that three brand new Friends outposts have been established, each now less than a year old. These new works are located at Tigard, Nehalem, and Newport, all three in the State of Oregon. At least one more new outpost will open soon after the close of these Yearly Meeting sessions at Silverton, Oregon, where already a new meeting house is taking shape. More than one-fourth of our churches are either in the midst of or planning to start soon, on constructing new church buildings or remodeling their present structures. The Newberg meeting is to be congratulated on its present project of constructing a fine Christian education unit, connected to the Yearly Meeting house.

Some time ago I began collecting data and statistics on population trends and figures, both in the United States and throughout the world. The subject of an exploding population is not some hypothetical theory that may interest some future generation with its knotty problems, but it is for our own generation to face, not 10 years from now, but now.

Recently, the "U.S. News and World Report" forecast that within the next 18 years there will be 18,000,000 people moving into the western states. It predicted that by 1975, Oregon's population would be increased by 66.8% and that Portland would then be the nation's 16th largest city with 1,396,000 inhabitants.

The problem of providing spiritual care for these new neighbors of ours is not 18 years distant; it is upon us today. All industry is girding itself for increased production and job opportunities. The educational planners are frantically building more schools and hiring more teachers. . . . Some Friends are giving to the church a long way beyond their means, while others are content to go the easy way. I would earnestly plead with Friends for a revival of spiritual life which would include the dedication of our material resources, as well as our hearts and minds. If the secular world is deeply troubled about caring for the material needs of these new citizens of ours, how much more should the church of Jesus Christ be troubled about the millions both in America and over the world who are without the knowledge of the gospel.

Will Quakers of Oregon Yearly Meeting accept the challenge to match the percentage of population increase with a like increase in church membership and attendance? This is not a competition with the new millions; it is a contest, rather, with our own selves. Get our slide rule, and sharpen your pencils, for if this goal should be reached, and shame on us if it isn't, we would then have 8,463 members by 1975 and our average Sunday school attendance would be 8,101.

Our own Quaker Hour radio program is our best medium through which we may contact the masses. We have now broadcast the program for four years, and the Quaker Hour continues to reach hundreds of thousands every month. The estimated listening audience over the 16 stations which have sent out the program this past year, has reached about 300,000 people every Sunday.

This year there are 17 pastoral changes. We are sorry to lose some of our ministers from the pastoral field, but we pray God's blessing upon them in their new labors. Paul Barnett has accepted the pastorate at Haviland, Kansas. Sheldon Newkirk will pastor the Fowler, Kansas, meeting. Harold Ankeny will teach in Greenleaf Academy, while former schooling beckons Paul Puckett, Howard Harmon, Charles Sellar, and Hal May. Wayne Piersall plans to enter full-time music evangelism. LeRoy White and Stephen Ross will enter pastoral work in Kansas Yearly Meeting.

We are happy to welcome the following men into pastoral service. They are: Floyd Dunlap, new pastor at the Spokane church; Paul Goins, the Seattle Memorial church; Max Zell, the Timber outpost; John McCracken at Cherry Grove; Charles Morgan at Marion; Kenneth L. Eichenberger at Entiat; Orville Winters at Tigard outpost; and Miller Porter at Scotts Mills. Three churches have not yet succeeded in securing pastoral leadership for the coming year.

Our foreign outreach is constantly calling us to new opportunities for missionary work in Bolivia. Our small staff of missionaries is doing valiantly in spite of a desperate lack of funds and personnel. The calls for expanding our work in Bolivia are insistent. We may not be able to do all that is needed in one year or ten, but we ought to have a studied program of future expansion, well publicized among Friends, which we could work at point by point, and year by year. We dare not stand still; we must advance. The recent visit to the field by Oscar and Ruth Brown has proved a great blessing to our missionaries and the national church. They have brought home much inspiration and challenge from the field. This is our day of favor and open doors in Bolivia; but it may not always be so.

One of my greatest concerns in all the work of the church is for more of our youth to answer God's call to special, full time Christian service. It is a sad commentary when a Yearly Meeting is not able to find enough workers to staff its churches with pastors, its foreign field with missionaries, and its schools with dedicated teachers. I would ask you to share this concern with me, and pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers into His whitened harvest fields.

This concern, of course, goes deeper than a mere desire to see more workers in these specialized ministries. It is really an expressed burden for the spiritual life of the church. Homes, churches, and schools with a warm, fervent spiritual life, will produce the needed workers. George Fox College needs our prayers and support as never before. If we would all unite our efforts, we could—yes, we would—see the college succeed as it should. Greenleaf Academy is supported and maintained by the Greenleaf meeting, and is a place of wonderful opportunity for Friends to demonstrate an educational program on the high school level with Christ at the center. Our youth must have an atmosphere which will challenge them to Christian service, and a challenge in faith that will cause them to reach a point of decision. Our Christian Endeavor leaders are outstanding Christian youth. They are a vital part of the church of today and any meeting that doesn't have a strong youth program is missing the mark. This department of work needs more sympathetic and prayerful help from the adult members in many churches.

The power of prayer and faith in solving the problems of our day must be ever kept before us. Christian people are apt to succumb to the pressures of the worldly philosophy that we will believe only when we can see. No program can be a successful substitute for the prayer meeting, but our prayer meetings should send us forth to do things for God. I pray that there may be a deepening devotional life amongst us all. I pray that we may be a holy people, with lives which will honor the Holy Spirit. I could not ask for a better corps of pastors with which to work, and my concern for the spiritual life of the church is their's also.

There is no record in history of men who accomplished great things with little dedication. Every great movement has been marked by the dedication of its men. Every revival has its channel through yielded men. Every great spiritual movement has been the result of men who were more than mediocre Christians, men whose lives were totally consecrated to the love and service of Jesus Christ.

Friends, we need the strengthening fellowship of one another as never before. The Yearly Meeting exists solely as an avenue through which concerned churches and concerned individuals may implement their God-given desires for a widened outreach. Let us join hands in an all-out effort to extend this gospel outreach further than it has ever gone before. Let us join our prayers that God will make us strong in faith and steadfast in purpose, that we may occupy this great field until He comes.

This report was heartily approved.

Many expressed their personal appreciation for the work and friendship of General Superintendent Dean Gregory and his wife, Kathleen.

A unanimous standing vote of appreciation was given.

● 48. The Executive Committee unanimously recommended that Dean Gregory should continue to serve as General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting with his salary increased to \$325.00 per month, plus \$85.00 per month house allowance, and 7¢ per mile for travel.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

● 49. Clare Willcuts, president, reported:

With gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the privilege of being workers together with Him, we submit the following report:

The untiring efforts of our superintendent are sincerely appreciated. His clear vision, spiritual insight, and glowing enthusiasm have been an inspiration to us all, and much credit is due him for the accomplishments of our board the past year. The Friends Church Extension Foundation continues to be a great blessing to the work of this board, it brings us joy to note the increased interest in this agency for expansion. We are grateful to the Friends Brotherhood for their generous support to Holly Park's building program again this year; also, to the Women's Missionary Union for assisting with the financial support of the pastor at Holly Park. It is difficult to evaluate the far-reaching effects of the Quaker Hour. We are deeply indebted to Milo Ross and the consecrated staff for this fine radio ministry. We are especially thankful to Dr. Homer Hester, whose contribution to technical equipment and know-how is so vital to the production of the Quaker Hour. From the time of its inception this ministry has been signally blessed of the Lord.

Aside from the many sessions during Yearly Meeting, we have met three times during the past year—in November, at Greenleaf; twice in Portland, in January and again in April. We were happy to cooperate with George Fox College again last spring in the "Home Missions Institute." We feel this is a worthwhile association with our younger Christian workers who are in training.

During the past year your board has given financial assistance to seven pastors in outpost and preparative meetings at the following locations: Sprague River, the Indian work that has been under our supervision for many years; the aid to East Wenatchee is on a reducing scale since they are accepting more responsibility each year; Hayden Lake, in order that they might better support their building program; Ontario, this has been a great blessing in helping them make the move into town; Pringle, one of our fastest growing outposts; Maplewood, making it possible for them to have a resident pastor for the first time; and Tigard, our newest outpost. We were also able to give to Maplewood, Tigard and Ashland for the purchase and improvement of property. Most of this came from cash paid and pledged during the Yearly Meeting sessions last year.

We are happy to report the establishment of three new outposts since we met a year ago. Soon after Yearly Meeting Robert and Leila Ralphs moved to Newport, Oregon, where they were able to see a work begin. Highland Avenue is the parent meeting. About the same time several Friends families in the coastal town of Nehalem started worshipping in a residence which the group had purchased, this is an outpost of Netarts and Calvin Wilkins has furnished the pastoral leadership. Soon after the first of the year, the Newberg meeting was able to see services started in the Tigard area directed by Arthur Roberts and students from the college. The progress in all these meetings has been remarkable.

The new year looks promising for continued expansion. Work has already begun on the first unit of the church building at Silverton, Oregon, sponsored by Scotts Mills. Prayer meetings have been held there since January. The ministers are Charlotte Macy and Dorothy Barratt. East Portland has held our interest for some time as a fertile field for another Friends work. Quincy and Pringle are pressed with building needs because of the limitations of present facilities due to rapid growth; in fact Pringle is now completing a building program. Newport has recently purchased a sizeable plot of ground with a commodious house that can serve for awhile as a parsonage and a place for worship. We are encouraged by the interest evidenced in Sprague River under

the pastoral care of Gerald and Elaine Cronk. You are urged to remember this needy field in prayer. Our responsibility to the American Indian is serious.

Your prayers and gifts for the extension work have been a source of great joy. All this, plus the vast opportunities always open, gives us a sense of urgency. We believe that the intensity of our outreach should not be governed entirely by the need for more gospel witnessing in the growing Northwest, but we should be prompted and led by the Holy Spirit. Young people, who are sensitive to the call of God are much in demand if the expansion program goes forward. By the same token, we challenge every member of the Yearly Meeting to listen for the voice of Christ and be quick to respond; the faithful and diligent services of all are needed. Someone has said, "I believe it is my responsibility to be just as happy as God intended me to be." Is it not proper to believe that we should seek to build a church wherever God wants one built?

Many feel that the midnight hour is fast approaching; that the coming of the Lord draweth nigh. Then let us seriously remember the words of our Lord, "Occupy till I come."

The secretary of the Board of Evangelism presented a review of the Evangelism reports as follows:

In the review of these reports, we find that most of our meetings welcome and use the "Out-poster" news, some have had speakers from outposts, or reviewed and publicized letters from them. Several have had a great increase of interest by visiting outposts and witnessing the progress of these new churches. One outpost specifically has given the people news of other outposts and older meetings. Many are those who pray for this work in our department of evangelism.

Several meetings have workers who participate in conducting services in city missions, nursing homes, or labor camps. Certainly this is a commendable Christian service.

In response to the question pertaining to the promotion of interest in "The Quaker Hour," we may wonder whether its purpose is understood. Some answered that the pastor announced it or that the people of the church listened to the broadcast. We are glad that our own people can hear and enjoy this program, but the greater purpose of this ministry is that those outside the Friends Church shall hear it and become more interested in the message of Friends. Therefore the notices in bulletins sent to others, the message of posters, or newspaper notices are to be regarded as much more far-reaching.

The statistical report shows gains substantially made in attendance at meetings for worship by the following meetings: Boise, Cambridge, Nampa, Star, Whitney, Caldwell, Homedale, Ontario, Wenatchee, Hayden Lake, Quincy, Spokane, Chehalis Center, Quilcene, Marion, Medford, Pringle. It is encouraging to note a small increase generally in the number of those attending business meetings of the church, as compared to last year.

Dean Gregory conducted a question and answer period bringing out highlights regarding our new outposts, and the challenge of these areas.

Ward Haines, member of the Board of Evangelism, expressed his concern for the possibilities and outreach of the church through the board. Truly our opportunities are many, and the responsibilities are overwhelming. He challenged us that we pray God to open our eyes that we may see the vision of the possibilities before us.

Outposts, with their pastors, were named as follows: Sprague River, Gerald and Elaine Cronk; Newport, Robert and Leila Ralphs; Timber, Max Zell; Tigard, Orville and Lois Winters; Quincy, Harley and Amy Adams; Hayden Lake, Irwin and Zarilda Alger; Cambridge, Quincy and Eilene Fodge; Ashland, Edward and Lois Harmon; Silverton, Charlotte Macy and Dorothy Barratt; Pringle, Roger and Eulalia Smith; Nehalem, Calvin and Virginia Wilkins.

Alvin Roberts reported on the Friends Church Extension Foundation. This organization to assist in the building of new churches is most worthy, but is not growing to meet the increasing demands. More gifts to this foundation are urgently needed, as our work in this great Northwest expands.

The treasurer's report of this organization appears in the Appendix.

The report of the Board of Evangelism was approved.

● 50. The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 Saturday morning.

● 51. The meeting united in prayer as Arthur Roberts led, following which the Doxology was sung.

● 52. The minutes were read and approved.

● 53. Max Zell, from Western Yearly Meeting was introduced as the new pastor at Timber outpost.

● 54. The proposed Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting was presented by Earl Barker, chairman of the Revision Committee, who explained major additions and changes.

Disciplinary revision action accepted this year will also be incorporated.

This revised draft of the Discipline was accepted by the meeting, to be held over until next year.

Earl Barker asked that the committee have permission to make minor changes in wording where deemed proper. This was granted.

BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

● 55. The report was introduced by its president Harold Ankeny who read Galatians 5:19-26 and led in prayer.

Howard E. Harmon, chairman of their department of Public Morals gave a challenging talk, urging us as Christians to act positively, instructing our young people. Off first importance is our responsibility to lead them to Christ, that they may have a foundation on which to stand. He asked, "What are you doing for Christ along these lines?"

Ruthanna M. Hampton, chairman of the Literature division of the board challenged us to greater reading of good literature. "Through Gates of Splendor," by Elizabeth Elliott, a true story of missionary adventure in the jungles of South America was reviewed. The reading of devotional literature was urged.

Ludlow Corbin reported for the education department. He stressed the importance of our reading the pamphlet "A Case for Christian Education" sent out by the board. If we want Christian teachers, nurses, doctors, lawyers, scientists, who will serve with Christian concern and compassions, we must prepare them, Corbin declared.

Kelsey Hinshaw, spoke for the board's Legislative Committee. He urged that church members be faithful in registering by letters our stand on moral issues as they come before our law makers. Here commended the reading of the pamphlet "Capital Punishment" by Arthur Roberts.

The written report of the board appears below:

INTRODUCTION:

The Board of Public Relations, soon to be called the Board of Moral Action, presents a summary of its work the past year.

At our mid-year board meeting we initiated a new department. It is called the Legislative Department organized on the Yearly Meeting level only. Its purpose is to keep our own departments informed of current legislation which might effect their departments. In addition this committee is to keep other boards informed of matters which might effect their work.

Immorality, crime and sensuality is rampant in America today. There are more people going to church in these days and yet crime and loose living is on the increase. A reweaving of the moral fibre of our people is needed. This only is possible through regeneration by the blood of Christ. Pray for our board.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC MORALS, Howard E. Harmon, chairman

By far the majority of our meetings have some presentations concerning public morals, but the need is for a far greater concern. The day in which we are living is one of loose morals and parental, as well as juvenile delinquency, and we as one body must take our stand against moral slackness. This year instead of just suggesting where materials may be purchased, it was sent to all Quarterly Meeting chairmen to be passed out in their respective Quarters. A small part of the material was used. Four of the churches used the object lessons that were sent; five purchased tracts to be given to their young people; ten used material out of a magazine sent them; and two purchased blotters on temperance. However many churches expressed their desire to use the material in the future. In some of the churches additional skits, slides, or felt-o-grams were given. Posters were made and tracts were passed out. The main stress this past year on the sacredness of marriage has been given by the pastors in messages and counselling.

First Friends from Portland has an outstanding program on public morals. Some of their special duties include purchasing "The Cup of Fury" for the church library, outside temperance speakers, Christmas for Christ seals purchased and distributed, sent youth to the Youth Temperance Council camp at Jennings Lodge, arranged for the reprint of the temperance church bulletin cover

and selling about 3,000 of them to other groups. Temperance material was given to the Sunday school superintendent before Temperance Sunday. The committee chairman spoke in several churches giving Temperance lessons.

The plans for this coming year include a letter each month to the Public Relations chairman, pastor or Sunday school superintendent of each church helping them to know how best to present this work.

DEPARTMENT OF LITERATURE, Ruthanna M. Hampton, chairman

The Literature Department has been interested in your church libraries this year and how much they were used. Since most of us can not buy all the books we should or would like to read, and our local public libraries do not carry too many Christian emphasis books, we feel we have a responsibility in sharing the cost and reading experience of such books through a church library.

Through our reports from 80% of the meetings, 39 had libraries with a total of 4,897 volumes. However, only three-fifths of these libraries kept records to protect their investment and to indicate the use of the books. We were pleased at the variety and balance of types of books. Inventories showed 976 devotional and doctrinal books, 777 juvenile books, 552 missionary books, 722 Christian fiction, 250 secular, 302 "tool" and methods books. New books were added to many libraries including the new library of 30 volumes at our Pringle Outpost. Highland started its library with 448 books and also a Senior C.E. library. Newberg, which we used as an example of a reactivated library last year, is still expanding with 28 new books. Nampa is facing the questionable youth literature problem with a Junior Church library which loaned 200 books. They added 27 new books to this library.

Since the library records were not complete, the reported use of the libraries was not very accurate. A few more books were reported read from the Women's Missionary Union libraries than from the church libraries, with a total read from all church organization libraries of 2,680 books, indicating a lot of available books were not read by anyone.

We always shall urge you to read your Bible first because you cannot grow without it. Then for added inspiration, teaching, and pleasure, use your church library. If you have very little time to read, consider your responsibility in providing reading material for others. May no one, especially our young people and new Christians, have to turn to unworthy literature because we failed in providing good reading for them.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, Ludlow Corbin, chairman

This year 51 meetings reported as compared to 47 meetings reporting last year. The following table compares the 1956 statistics with 1957:

Some interesting observations from the above table of facts:

The number of elementary school children are increasing rapidly. Of the church members, 96 more were reported this year than last, and of non-church members 72 more this year than last.

The elementary members attending Christian schools has nearly doubled, but high school members attending Christian high schools has dropped 11 students.

College students are slightly on the increase. However, those attending church related colleges decreased 13 below last year. Also the number attending George Fox College was 69 as compared with 85 a year ago. The 167 college students reported were attending 41 different college or professional schools.

The number of Friends choosing teaching as a profession is very encouraging. There were 19 more than last year. We now have the names and addresses of most of the 130 reported and one of the goals for the coming year is to try to organize them into a Christian Teachers Fellowship.

The number and kind of scholarships have increased at George Fox College, making it possible for many students to attend a Friends college who otherwise could not attend. These scholarships are listed in handbook for pastors, committees and workers.

This year the department planned an educational Sunday bulletin for May. Also we published a pamphlet on Christian education entitled "A Case for Christian Education" which was sent to all the meetings.

The report of the Board of Public Relations was approved.

● 56. The morning inspirational hour was opened by the Harmon-etts singing "Teach Me, Lord, to Wait."

Hubert Mardock opened his message reading Hebrews 13:8-17, using as his text "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, today, and for-

ever." He expounded upon three points: the orthodoxy, the experience and the expression of holiness.

The evangelist concluded: "It is not be our works, but by His Grace we are provided this great salvation. Social service will not save us, but if we are true Christians, we are going to remember those less fortunate than we. 'But to do good and to communicate, forget not.' This blessing of entire sanctification will put a compassion in our hearts for those about us."

● 57. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

● 58. Merrill Coffin led in prayer.

● 59. The representatives nominated the following to the Board of Stewardship for three years: Denver Headrick, Wayne Piersall, John Retherford.

● 60. The Discipline Revision Committee presented the following for consideration, being the follow-up of Minute 125, page 76 of the 1956 Yearly Meeting Minutes:

Persons who have been divorced, but have subsequently been converted and are living consistent Christian lives, should not be hindered from joining the church nor from working in the church. (See Minutes 21, 32)

Adopted by the meeting and will appear in the new Discipline.

● 61. The treasurer's report of the Women's Auxilliary to George Fox College was given and appears in the Appendix.

● 62. Earl Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee, presented a proposal for a clerk of representatives:

Intimations have come to the Committee on Discipline Revision to the effect that a difficult situation is sometimes experienced and an injustice done when some Friend is selected more or less hastily to serve as presiding clerk of the body of representatives. He must engage at once, without warning and often without previous experience, in a rather complicated procedure in the carrying out of the responsibilities delegated to that body.

The idea has been expressed that it would be both feasible and helpful for the Yearly Meeting to appoint a presiding officer each year to serve for the following year. He could be chosen as a representative by his home meeting for the year in which he serves, but would not need to be. He could carry on from year to year, within limitations, and learn how to expedite the affairs of the representatives with great saving of time. The Committee proposes the following changes to effect such a plan:

On page 46, change paragraphs 7 and 8 to 8 and 9. Introduce a new paragraph as follows:
7. CLERK OF REPRESENTATIVES. The Yearly Meeting shall appoint annually, on nomination by the representatives, a clerk to preside over the deliberations of the representative body for the following year. He shall be appointed soon after the opening of the annual sessions, so that if he lacks previous experience he may sit in the remaining meetings of the body to observe the procedure and to receive instruction from the clerk then in charge. He may be reappointed on expiration of his term. He should be a person well qualified to preside without prejudice or partiality and to expedite the handling of the business without neglect of proper hearing and deliberation. It shall be his duty to acquaint himself thoroughly with the functions of the representative body and the procedure necessary to their fulfillment, and also to secure all materials, such as lists of quarterly meeting appointments, which will be needed in the course of the sessions. He shall instruct and aid the recording clerk in the preparation of reports to the Yearly Meeting on matters referred to the representatives and acted upon by them, and on nominations made in accordance with the Yearly Meeting Constitution and Discipline.

On page 53, paragraph 1, COMPOSITION AND MEETINGS, after the first two sentences change the wording to read thus: "At their first meeting the duly appointed presiding clerk shall call the roll of the representatives. Those present shall be seated, and vacancies filled from the lists of alternates. No changes shall be made in the delegations thereafter, except as authorized by the Yearly Meeting. When the members of the body have been seated, they shall choose one of their number to serve as recording clerk. The Presiding Clerk and General Superintendent of the Yearly Meeting shall be admitted ex officio as advisory members."

Adopted by the meeting and referred to the Discipline Revision Committee to be held over for one year.

● 63. The report of the George Fox College Visiting Committee:

The Yearly Meeting appointed last year a committee of eight persons to visit George Fox College during the school term. Two members appointed did not find it possible to visit the college. A summary of the reports of the other members follows:

One member attended as a guest of a Faculty Seminar. She observed, gratefully, that the majority of the faculty members carried a real concern for the spiritual, moral and educational

interests of individual students.

Another member felt that the choir did not possess the spiritual impact that it had in former years. He also felt that there was too much familiarity between faculty and students as expressed in the use of first names and the use of the term "kids," referring to the students in a public meeting. He felt that progress was being made academically. He also felt that perhaps the college was too heavy with operating personnel. However, he was generous in his understanding of the problem involved in the teaching of the curriculum required in a liberal arts school.

A third stated that he was pleased with the relationship between faculty and students.

One who was able to visit two classes appreciated so much the prayer before classes and the individual attention each student received. She felt the chapel hour was very profitable and appreciation for the college was expressed.

One in conference with President Ross felt that this was the "best year" spiritually that the college has experienced in recent years. This member also observed that the attitudes were friendly and respectful. He was happy to see that the most active club in the student body was the Foreign Missionary Fellowship. He felt that the new associated student body constitution is a big improvement in faculty and student relationship. Rules and restrictions are self imposed by the students with faculty counsel. He had a concern for the ministerial students. He felt that they were not exerting the influence they should. He expressed a concern that the high calling of God to full-time ministry might be the constant challenge to all students.

As a whole we felt that the college is earnestly endeavoring to present a broad education with a Christ-centered emphasis. The major problems mentioned in our report are recognized by the administration and faculty and steps are being made to resolve these problems. We appreciate the efforts of President Ross, the faculty and staff and would express our concern that the Yearly Meeting remember the college daily in their prayers.

Report approved.

GREENLEAF ACADEMY

● 65. The report of Greenleaf Academy, read by Clair Smith, member of the board:

Greenleaf Academy began its 49th consecutive school year on September 10, 1956. Total enrollment reached 74 for the year, which was approximately a 7% increase over the previous year's average enrollment. Besides our full time day students, 26 were listed as special music pupils, many of them from elementary schools.

With consideration given to all aspects of the school, it was generally felt that the 1956-57 school year was among the best.

Of the 74 students attending, 53 were Friends, or representative of Friends churches, while 23 came from other denominations. Five were from out-of-state and the remaining 69 were residents of Boise Valley. Thirteen were boarding students in the Greenleaf community residing out of their own homes.

New staff members were Miss Joyce Hoover, Miss Leta Hockett, Mrs. Winona Selby and Mr. and Mrs. William T. Armstrong, Jr.

The course of study requires all graduates to meet the requirements set up by the State Department of Education plus earning one unit of Bible, and one extra unit each in mathematics, science and social studies. This prepares our graduates for entering at most any liberal arts college, and particularly our own church college which follows the standards prescribed by the Oregon System of Higher Education for college entrance. Greenleaf Academy remains on the approved list of secondary schools in the State of Idaho. Each of the students is carefully advised as to subjects he should take throughout his high school course.

In the field of electives, industrial arts for boys and homemaking courses for girls have received much interest. Unusual interest and accomplishment were realized in music during the past year with the choir and special groups representing the school in every Boise Valley Friends church, New Meadows and Cambridge to the north and a number of other denominations within the valley. Special progress was noted with a fine 23 piece band. Many more students availed themselves of the opportunity afforded by taking private lessons on the piano and organ. Four special music programs were given in the spring featuring the accomplishments of each student's work for the year.

In the field of athletics, a three sport program was carried out successfully. Due to lack of man-power, not only in the academy, but in competing schools as well, an eight-man football program was adopted. With the lighting, games were played at night on the academy field.

From the spiritual angle, real progress was made and many students received and walked in new light. The student body cooperated daily in the local church revival under the ministry of Ernest and Temple Lee. A week of special services in the spring with Rev. Trevelon White, pastor of the First Baptist church of Caldwell, proved a great blessing to the student body and faculty. Our daily chapel services, under faculty advisor Leta Hockett and student body president Bob Brown, were also a source of real inspiration. Oscar Brown brought a challenging message each Tuesday until leaving for Bolivia. During his absence we appreciated the interest and help of Merrill Coffin.

As a whole we feel that the moral and spiritual tone of the student body was good and we believe that all of the students were attending because of a personal desire to be in a Christian school.

Several pieces of valuable equipment were added throughout the year. Two new ranges were secured for the home economics department, also an overstuffed set and a new Singer electric sewing machine. Money for this machine was given by the Women's Missionary Union of the Yearly Meeting. The office secured a new adding machine. Through the generosity of Helen Willcuts, a piano was given. The physical education department purchased an archery set. In

January, a 32 passenger bus was purchased which has proven invaluable for transporting music and athletic groups.

Continued improvement is being made in the gymnasium and we are looking forward to its final completion in the near future. Its spaciousness has proven a great asset to the community, as well as the school. Making its use available to other athletic groups and the academy's annually sponsored Canyon County Rural Grade School Basketball Tournament has no doubt created a greater interest in the work of the academy.

A number of individuals have made cash donations to the school and these are greatly appreciated. Special mention should be made for the gift of 20 acres of land given by the late Mrs. Grace Scott of Caldwell, Idaho. Mr. Veri Hanson deeded a home in Caldwell to the school during the past year. While many have sacrificed, and we know many more will continue to do so, we feel somewhat proud, yet humble, in the accomplishments to date.

Following is a brief summary of the financial situation:

The operating budget for the 1956-57 school term (year), exclusive of all general fees, admissions and department operations, was \$20,975.00. Receipts to meet this budget are listed as follows: tuitions \$9,375.00, Greenleaf Monthly Meeting \$9,000.00, cash donations \$1000.00, miscellaneous income including rentals and books \$1600.00. It is anticipated that by the opening of the new school year this budget will have been met in full.

Outstanding indebtedness which is on the gymnasium now stands at \$9500. As a result of the annual sale and donations through the Monthly Meeting, \$4000 plus interest was paid during the past year toward retirement of the gymnasium indebtedness.

Teachers salaries were increased \$400 each for the 1956-57 school year making the classroom teachers' average salary \$2540. This is figured exclusive of administrative salary or any housing provisions. Some further concessions with regard to housing will bring the average classroom salary to a total value of approximately \$2700 for the coming school year.

As the school term drew to a close, 12 seniors graduated. Baccalaureate service was held on Sunday evening, May 26, with Harold Ankeny delivering the sermon. On Friday evening, May 31, Dean Kenneth Williams gave the commencement address to the graduating seniors. At latest report nearly all of these graduates were planning to enter college this fall, with a good percent looking toward George Fox College.

At this point we wish to express appreciation for the cooperation by the administrative staff of George Fox College toward Greenleaf Academy. We are looking forward to even greater cooperation in the future. It is our desire that Greenleaf Academy may be able to continue to send students to the college and that some of the students who graduate from the college to enter the teaching profession may look toward serving as faculty members in the academy.

As we look to the future it is with a sense of optimism. The teaching staff is practically complete. Harold Ankeny has accepted a position which was created by the resignation of Miss Joyce Hoover, who has served faithfully on the staff during the past year. Mr. Bob Hanson of Eureka, California, will have charge of the music, a vacancy created by the loss of Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong, who are continuing their training in other fields.

The outlook for a larger enrollment seems exceptionally good. Our recent effort to cooperate with the Boulevard Christian Day School of Caldwell and Nampa is furnishing the academy with most of their eighth grade graduates entering as freshmen. Pastors of other denominations in the area are encouraging their young people to attend a Christian school. Plans are being made for the operation of a bus route in the Caldwell and perhaps other areas. We therefore believe, with this newly created interest in Christian education and larger elementary graduating classes, that our 1957-58 enrollment will be greatly increased.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

● 66. The report of George Fox College, by Milo C. Ross, president: (Condensed report)

This is the fourth annual report which I have had the privilege to present before the board of the college and to the Yearly Meeting in session. It helps us to evaluate our program and to analyze our strengths and weaknesses, our victories and defeats. It is, at the same time, a difficult procedure because in the field of education there are many variables and there are entire fields of study where one must search to discover subject matter which is not relative. We must be constantly challenged as administrators and faculty to bring "every thought into subjection to Christ." Every subject and field of study and research must be carried through in the light of holy Christian faith. Every decision, as it relates itself to truth, to personalities, to spiritual and moral concepts and standards, must be made in the framework of our evangelical tradition and with due regard to the discipline and teachings of the Friends church. There are many issues which are not either/or, nor hold black and white, and many for which few people have yet found the answers. Your college finds itself, at the end of this school year of 1956-57, in a period which educators would call an "academic ferment."

NEW PROCEDURES

New procedures in a college do not spring full bloom at one time, and then die out as abruptly. Their initiation may take years, involving board consideration on occasion, faculty consideration, student body cooperation, and always administrative action. This is our first full year of the full-division eligibility regulations. Dean Williams has worked for the entire year with the heads of divisions, the student council, and now more recently with the new curriculum committee, to hammer out an ever-stronger academic program and a completely new student body constitution.

The direction which is being followed in all these procedures is for stronger government by the administration and faculty, and yet with regard to student initiative and creativeness, and due democratic process. We have endeavored to change the climate from simple social and recreational acceptance to one in which, in the words of John Wesley: "True piety blooms in the garden of high scholarship." We humbly believe that progress has been made in these areas.

A change of music program was scheduled in that all students may enroll for oratorio choir, while the a cappella choir became co-curricular and by competition. The freshmen orientation program was extended over 12 weeks of the first semester. Grade periods were shifted from six weeks to nine weeks.

The senior comprehensive program, in vogue for several years, played its swan song in favor of the anticipated sophomore upper-division qualifying program. In the midst of this transition, The Fund for the Advancement of Education gave us a grant for our entire sophomore and senior testing, so this was put into effect in April.

THE BOARD

The Board of Trustees finds itself in a process of transition, having written for itself a new constitution and bylaws which has eliminated the old Corporation. It is now in the process of nominating up to 15 additional members. Meetings are for two full days a year, and not the traditional four evening meetings. The board is a most faithful and loyal group of men, giving unstintingly of their prayers, time and finances to carry on your college. Credit must be given to these good men for the initiation of the Debt Liquidation Campaign.

FACULTY AND STAFF

The faculty is the strength of George Fox College. They give themselves to their several disciplines with a high measure of devotion. Their salaries are the lowest of any college people in the Northwest. And of all the colleges now associated with the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, there are only three with smaller salaries than ours. In other words, we are near the bottom of the bottom pile! This is a most serious problem, and one which poses other implications, because too many of our people still mistakenly compare our teachers with preachers, as far as money is concerned.

The year began with a fine retreat at Menucha. Also, the faculty has met every Monday noon for prayer and counsel, and since December on Monday afternoons for prayer, too. The new edition of the Faculty Handbook was approved in December and has been in effect since the February contracting season.

Three full-time people do not plan to return. These three have been with us for two years: Ralph Beebe, head coach and director of men's athletics and Dean of Men; Caryl Jean Short, assistant professor of music, and head of our music department; and Ross Stover, assistant professor of voice and choir director. Beebe plans to teach in Eugene and work on his doctorate; Miss Short is continuing her graduate studies but will stay on in the field of advanced piano. Mrs. Mary Hazelle, who taught organ only this last year, will be promoted to full-time assistant professor of music with the addition of the theory classes. Mr. William Koenig, who has been on the staff for two years now in the capacity of training our incidental musicians, and is well known for his most excellent work on Quaker Hour, will conduct the college choirs. Carl B. Carpenter, of First Friends, Portland, has resigned as director of athletics at Cleveland High to become our head coach. Mrs. Helen Powell has been promoted to Dean of Women. The valuable contribution which these people have made to our college will long be remembered. We have engaged the valuable services of Lloyd Mallet, one of the leading voice instructors of the West Coast, as our voice teacher. A student of the Baroness Von Klenner, Frank La Forge, Reinald Werrenrath, and John St. John, he has prepared the famed repertoire in Teaching, now used by the National Association of Teachings of Singing. He specialized in preparing young students for well rounded careers and practical lives in music. All others are staying on faithfully and courageously as your missionaries in the field of Christian higher education.

All personnel are encouraged to participate in conventions and conferences in connection with their specialties. A good number do so, which is an excellent thermometer of a growing faculty. The most pretentious activity in graduate school was undertaken by Mackey Hill, who now boasts 36 hours of work at the University of Oregon beyond his master's degree. Evan Rempel is also working on his doctorate at Oregon State College. The full report of all the faculty is available upon request. A most significant area of advanced scholarship, however, should be noted in the work of Dr. Arthur O. Roberts, who has continued his preparation of a one-volume "Works of George Fox," and a spiritual biography of George Fox.

Endeavoring to look at our faculty situation objectively, and from the information I get from other schools, my studied judgment is that we have an ideal set of working conditions here. The faculty enjoys great encouragement in each field and their areas of responsibility are well-defined and conducive to mental growth.

Several seminars have been held by and for the faculty, mainly in the field of pedagogy, testing, and in the projection of the several departments into our future needs.

I was asked to give the third annual Faculty Lecture, which I did on the subject of "The Small College and Its Community."

THE SCHOOL YEAR

We enrolled a total of 140 students during the year. All departments functioned at full force. We were able to offer both organ and violin having to do without professional instruction for the previous year. Also, band was offered professionally for the first time in many years.

A deeply spiritual tone was evident in the faculty prayer meetings, student prayer meetings, and in the chapels. Many people have remarked relative to the fine chapels. Paul Shugart of Bell, California, was with us most acceptably for our fall Christian Emphasis, as was Owen Glassburn of Damascus, Ohio, for the second semester. Also, during Holy Week, Mahlon Macy, now of Wichita, was used for very excellent messages. The Missions Conference was not too well ordered, but the new Home Missions Institute was a valuable addition to our inspirational diet.

The a cappella choir was granted leave for a more extended trip, travelling on tour for 3,000 miles into California and representing the college in 27 concerts. The oratorio choir presented two local concerts.

Another signal claim to excellence comes out of the record of our basketball team in the Metropolitan League. We placed three men on the all-conference five and broke the conference record again, at 114 points.

Pi Gamma Sigma, our new scholastic honorary society, was inaugurated with five initiates and two associates. Dr. Cecilia Martin is advisor.

We have graduated the following this last commencement season: Lucile Edmundson, Art Major; Robert Fiscus, Music Major; Darwin Grimm, Religion Major; Marvin Hampton, Biology

Major; Joanne Hartley, Psychology-Education Major; Lowell Hurd, Religion Major; Hideo Kaneko, Social Science Major; Fred Newkirk, Music Major; Charlotte Passolt Cammack, Psychology-Education Major; Karen Hampton Pierson, Social Science Major; Stephen Ross, Psychology-Education Major; Donna Switzer, Psychology-Education Major; Charles Tuning, Social Science Major; Earl Tycksen, Religion Major; Floyd Weitzel, Biology Major.

There are several significances to this year's class. Hideo Kaneko is the first foreign student ever to graduate from George Fox. This year marks the first time that any students have received their degrees in connection with our joint-degree programs. Joanne Hartley from Southern Oregon College, Charlotte Cammack and Donna Switzer from Oregon College of Education, and Lyn Edmundson from the Museum Art School.

FINANCES

Tuitions were raised to \$350 per year, and some additions were made to various fees. May I thank all who have made possible the strengthening of our student aid program through scholarships, grants-in-aid, or through special gifts.

The Board of Administration have been battling for years to keep a balance between income and outgo, but we are constantly plagued with the servicing of our old debt. Therefore, the board has instituted a major program to wipe out the debt in four years. This great drive was born in prayer and deep concern, and is no doubt the greatest thing of its kind which we have undertaken in recent years. The plan is to raise \$144,000 between now and 1960. To date \$72,385.56 is pledged.

The other programs, such as the Living Endowment, special gifts and objects, the canvassing of corporations and educational trusts, and estate building have all gone on apace with the combined activities of the board, business office, and my office. These programs, taken all together, are the life-blood of the college. Without them we could not operate.

The alumni have pledged toward the women's dorm. Success has attended the efforts of Denver Headrick in the field in getting the college named in wills. However, now for the second year in a row, no estate has been settled in our favor. Several Oregon corporations have begun or increased their giving to us, even in spite of the fact that we are not accredited.

I am prepared to submit the financial report of the general funds; we received \$109,207.57 and spent \$120,944.89, showing a net loss from general operations of \$11,737.32. On the negative side, we must admit a decrease of \$8,616.98 in unrestricted gifts. As far as expenditures are concerned, our instructional and educational expenses went up \$6,872.52. Auxiliary income dropped. On the brighter side, we took in more money in tuitions, fees, and the endowment income was up slightly. We took in, in all totals, \$817.22 more than a year ago. The report also shows a more conservative and efficient operation as compared with a year ago. We cut down on the cost of the operation of the physical plant by \$7,118.84; and administrative salaries and office expenses were cut down by \$5,677.07. Total gifts, in all categories, amounted to \$34,943.95.

COUNCIL FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF SMALL COLLEGES

Your college is a charter member of the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, and I am a member of the original Board of Directors. We envision this as the greatest single boon which could have come to us in a financial way at this time. In the words of our own alumnus, as he gave them to us on our recent visit to him:

"I have long been convinced that the failure of our great foundations to develop and support adequately the some 50 odd small non-accredited colleges is the greatest gap in their otherwise great contributions to American education.

"These are colleges close to the people. They have served our people for long years through dedicated and self-denying teachers. Their intimate relations with the students enable them to do a better job in character building than our great institutions with their high attendance. Their students come from those unable to meet the costs of the larger institutions. They represent an already invested capital of \$65 million, and they are providing for about 25,000 students.

"We are short of higher educational facilities in every state, for enlargement of mind and professional training, and students are being turned away every autumn. To put these small colleges on their feet would probably cost less than \$75,000,000, which is probably not 10 per cent of the annual gifts to our larger institution." Herbert Hoover

We have profited with a share in the gifts from United States Steel Corporation, Union Carbon and Carbide Corporation, The Fund for the Advancement of Education, Shell Educational Fund, Time, Inc., and other lesser gifts. The self surveys and analyses requested by CASC have been a great stimulus to our entire college community, and the carrying out of these is a direct benefit to our accreditation program. All of these benefits have accrued to us in a little over a year.

ACCREDITATION

A great deal of work went into further self-evaluation of the institution following the visit of Dean Gilfillan to our campus on May 22, 1956. The Dean correlated his entire graduate program into the demands of the Higher Commission, with evident benefit to himself and the college. A supplementary report was submitted to the Higher Commission on December 3, 1957, in Portland. This report was accepted. Later, Dean Thomas A. Kerr, Executive Coordinator for the Higher Commission, initiated action from his office to officially place us in the cycle of investigation. This is to take place in April, 1959. The importance of these actions cannot be overestimated, because it stems from the fact that responsible officers of the Higher Commission have taken the initiative in inviting these reports and procedures. As far as we know now, the only serious impediment toward our accreditation is financial support. A program report at the end of the academic year was submitted to the officers of the Northwest Higher Commission, the officers of CASC, and by them to the philanthropic board of the U. S. Steel Corporation. The replies from the Higher Commission have been most favorable.

PERSONAL

With each passing year, a great many of my duties become the more routine. However, there is no cessation of responsibility at any time. The board most graciously arranged an extended vacation for us at the Oregon Coast which has meant a great deal personally and to the school.

Along with the regular college duties, I have participated in these additional activities: I have attended the open meetings of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools Convention, the American Association of Colleges Convention, the annual meeting of the Council

for the Advancement of Small Colleges, and the Oregon Ministerial Conference. I have served on the Board of Directors of the Christian Freedom Foundation, the Board of the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, the Oregon Temperance League, Community Television, Inc., and the Friends National Committee on Legislation. At the annual meeting of the Friends College Presidents at Swarthmore, Pennsylvania, I was elected to the chairmanship of that group for this year. Also, I have served as the minister of the Quaker Hour broadcast, and as the director of the production up until May of this year. The religious forces of our city of Newberg asked me to head their drive to keep the sale of liquor out of town. We enjoyed the most loyal and substantial support, resulting in a resounding victory for the "dry" forces. I have travelled some 60,000 miles in the interests of the college.

It is my hope that this report may give a satisfactory view of the work of your school. I appreciate all the help which has come from all the people who have given of time and interest and prayers.

The report of George Fox College was approved, and enthusiastic comments were voiced by a number for the fine work being done.

● 67. Herman Macy offered prayer in the closing of our business session, which stands adjourned to meet Monday at 9:30 a.m.

● 68. The devotional session was opened with prayer by Marlin Witt. The congregation joined in singing, "Blest Be the Tie," and the clerk closed with prayer.

● 69. The minutes were read and corrected.

● 70. Glen and Mildred Rinard, pastors of Citrus Heights church, California Yearly Meeting, were introduced.

● 71. The treasurer's report was given and appears in the Appendix.

This was approved and a standing vote of appreciation was given for the work of Roger and Mildred Minthorne.

The recording clerk was instructed to write a letter to the Minthornes, expressing appreciation for their many hours labor on the treasurer's books.

● 72. Oliver Weesner gave an oral auditor's report, stating that insofar as he had been able to examine the treasurer's books, he finds them to be accurate, and he believes them to be in good condition. He has some further work to do.

Approved.

● 73. The Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight on recommendation of the Committee on Ministry favored recording the following as ministers of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting:

Peter J. Fertello, Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting.
Clair E. Lund, Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting.
Everett L. Clarkson, Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting.

The meeting favored this action and invoked God's blessing on them as they continue in service for Him.

● 74. A communication from the Ministerial Association:

The Ministerial Association of the Yearly Meeting at Redmond, Oregon, nominated Dillon Mills to serve a two year term on the Committee to administer the Ministers' and Missionaries' Retirement Fund.

Approved.

● 75. The Ministerial Association sent the communication that the date for the Ministerial Conference will be April 7-11, 1958. (See Minute 12)

● 76. The Ministerial Association of Oregon Yearly Meeting requests that \$150.00 be included for the Association in the Fixed Expense.

Request granted.

● 77. The Alumni Association, the college board, and the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting presented nominations to serve on the college board. These were approved and appear in the Appendix.

● 78. The Committee to write Letters to Aged Friends reports that several letters were written and also several calls were made by the committee.

● 79. The Board of Public Relations requested approval of the following statement:

Recognizing the tremendous social and personal damage resulting from the use of alcoholic beverages, we urge that all interstate advertising by all alcoholic beverages be forbidden. We also urge that only truthful statements be allowed in all advertising.

Approved.

● 80. Wilmer Brown, Northwest Regional Director of the National Association of Evangelicals, presented the work of that organization of which Oregon Yearly Meeting is a member.

He urged that we oppose Senate Bill 2410, a Roman Catholic sponsored bill which would do away with the present immigration laws.

N.A.E. week will be October 20 to 27, and churches are urged to observe this time.

Churches were urged to get the pamphlets "Inter-national Communism," and "Basic Principles in Religious Broadcasting," which may be secured from the N. A. E. office in Portland.

BOARD OF FINANCE

● 81. Oliver Weesner, chairman of the Board of Finance, presented the proposed Fixed Expense budget for the coming year as follows, with explanation regarding the various items. Further discussion regarding this budget was held over for the afternoon session. (See Minute 87)

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

● 82. Grace Clark, president, reported:

Our Slogan: "Ye are not your own, for ye are bought with a price." 1 Cor. 6:19, 20.
A representative of the board has been over the area of the Yearly Meeting and visited six Quarterly Meetings and 24 local meetings. 2600 miles were traveled. Tracts were sent to every local meeting, also a copy of the book "Great Stewards of the Bible," was sent to each meeting. We have tried to make available books and material for programs; helps for Sunday schools, for youth meetings, and for general church work.

The united Handbook is available for every meeting. Several articles emphasizing the re-

sponsibility of the steward and the stewardship message have appeared in the Northwest Friend.

The month of October was designated as Stewardship Month, and every pastor was urged to cooperate with messages each Sunday from the pulpit; also stewardship teaching in Sunday school to our boys and girls, and instruction for our youth in Christian Endeavor. When October is over we must not feel that we are through with stewardship for the year. October is the month to center our attention on the value of stewardship, and to get new tithers, then to keep it before the people the rest of the year.

Our own pictures, "Meet the Hess Family," have gone to every Quarterly Meeting and every local meeting, and many words of appreciation have come to the board concerning the pictures. Fifty-four meetings have sent in reports.

Forty churches report that they have participated in the stewardship program of October. Three reported partial participation. Fourteen reported no participation.

Results of the participation:

One meeting reported that it was a definite increase in interest in stewardship, and it was educational.

Ten meetings reported definite increase in giving in October.

Two meetings said that renewed giving lasted all year.

One meeting said that new members became tithers in October.

One reported that giving increased through the year.

One said that they were deepened spiritually and also giving increased.

One said, "Giving has been good since October."

Stewardship was presented 61 times in Sunday school, 78 times in Christian Endeavor, and 122 times in sermons. Forty-one meetings reported that they have Stewardship Committees. The number of tithers reported for this year was 1474, which is 239 less than was reported last year. Some meetings failed to report the number of tithers in their meeting.

Remember that all of life is a stewardship, and we live out our stewardship, not only by giving money, but through all the channels of our life: the common duties within the circle, service in the church, association among our neighbors and friends, through our influence, our prayer life. These phases of our stewardship should overbalance by far the dollars and cents which we give. We are stewards of the gospel and must all render a strict account of our stewardship. Luke 16:2. Let us be faithful stewards.

The new president of the Board of Stewardship, John Retherford, was presented. He used Matthew 4:18 and Matthew 16:24-26 as a basis for the challenge of stewardship which he presented to the Yearly Meeting. He stated that stewardship is foundational to the other work of the church, and that the Bible emphasizes the stewardship of time and possessions, (Gen. 2) and that God is the owner and all belongs to Him.

The report of the board was approved.

● 83. The morning inspirational hour opened with singing, "Tell it to Jesus."

Hubert Mardock read Matthew 3:1-12 and spoke on "The way into this experience." The following are excerpts: The way of full salvation is not a cure-all for inconsistent living. The foundation is the glorious experience of regeneration. There is a difference in a birth and a baptism. One must be born again before he can be baptized with the Spirit. This requires definite seeking; then entire consecration. This involves more than consecration to a service; we must be consecrated to God. We must believe first that God wants to meet our need, that He can, that He will, and that He does.

● 84. Following a time of silent prayer, the session adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

Monday, 2:15 p.m.

● 85. After a time of silent prayer and meditation, Clifton Ross led in prayer, invoking God's blessing on us during these sessions. The congregation united in singing "My Jesus, I Love Thee."

● 86. The meeting concurred with the suggestion made by the clerk that representatives leaving before the Yearly Meeting sessions have ended, need not submit their resignation to the meeting, unless requesting a replacement.

● 87. The Fixed Expense budget submitted in the morning session was accepted as presented. (See Minute 81)

● 88. Financial secretary Robert Morrill presented his report, which appears in the back of the book.

Accepted, with permission granted to add information not yet received.

● 89. The representatives nominated the following to the Epistle Committee: Arthur O. Roberts, Herman Macy, Hazel Pierson, Adelaide Barker, and Mildred Brown.

Approved.

● 90. The representatives nominated the following to the Board of Missions for three years: Robert L. Morrill, Frank Cole, Oscar N. Brown.

Approved.

● 91. The representatives nominated the following to the Board of Publication for three years: James Bishop, Myron Goldsmith.

Approved.

● 92. The representatives nominated Harold Lund as a trustee for five years.

Approved.

● 93. The representatives nominated the following to the George Fox College Visiting Committee: John Retherford, Lesta Bates, R. Ethol George, Clara Macy, M. Ethel Cowgill, Mildred Brown, Eleanor Antrim, Frieda Blake.

Approved.

● 94. Report of the Epistle Committee:

The Epistle Committee has received 32 communications, coming from many parts of the world. A number expressed their deep interest in the real social needs and ills of the world, and the hope that all of us may do our utmost to help in this crucial hour.

One Yearly Meeting wished to reaffirm her faith in and devotion to her Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. The sincere desire of these Friends is to stand true to the great tenets of our faith as taught in the Bible and as preached by George Fox. A highlight in the sessions of that meeting was the presentation of six newly recorded ministers of the gospel.

Another Yearly Meeting wrote that Friends there are "seeking God's direction in their efforts to enter doors of opportunity and service, that in their labors they may present Jesus Christ and His baptism to a needy world as the perfect solution to all of men's problems."

Another Yearly Meeting expressed deep appreciation for their young people, many of whom have given their lives to the Lord and some of whom are preparing for the ministry, missionary work, and other Christian service.

A new Yearly Meeting has been set up by Nebraska Yearly Meeting, organized under the name of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting.

The tone of many of the epistles was deeply devout, and gave evidence of a Christ-like concern for the needs of the world and the work of the Kingdom.

Approved.

Oregon Yearly Meeting's epistle was presented and approved to be sent out from our Yearly Meeting.

● 95. Dong Jung, a Christian minister from Korea, who is here to receive training at George Fox College, was introduced to the meeting.

● 96. Word came of the serious illness of evangelist J. G. Bringdale, a long time friend of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The suggestion was approved that the meeting send him a letter of encouragement. Prayer was entered into on his behalf.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

● 97. Marie Haines, president, reported: (Condensed report)

Reporting time brings many happy surprises each year and this year is no exception. One of the fine things brought forth is the fact that 46 Unions out of 62 have prayer units meeting regularly to pray for the work both at home and abroad. We feel this is a vital part of our work.

The program and devotional books, compiled by Marjorie Crisman and Ruthanna Hampton, featured lessons written by our own home and foreign missionaries and devotions written by Friends women in Ohio, Nebraska, Kansas, California and Oregon. These are used by most of the Unions. In addition, outside speakers representing fields in Africa, Formosa, Mexico, Peru, India, Central America, Japan, The Philippines, Ecuador, New Guinea, Panama, China, Costa Rica, and Pakistan show a world-wide interest in foreign fields. On the home front, speakers from Cascade College, Wycliffe Translators, Cleveland Bible College, Women's Christian Temperance Union, King's Garden, Peniel Mission, American Indians, Jewish Missions, Kentucky Mountains, Bethany Children's Home, and our own outposts were presented.

Interest in our reading program increases each year. A choice of fields was given: Devotional,

Christian Education, Stewardship, Church History, Friends History, Christian fiction or Biography, Foreign or Home Missions, and Public Morals. Certificates were given to those reading nine books in seven fields. Over 2,000 books were read by our women last year. A junior reading program was also sponsored.

Paid membership this year was 757, an increase of 57 over last year. Several new Young Women's Unions were organized, a good hope for the future.

When a vice president tries to write a page on a few lines in the report blank and spills over into the margin, even using a second sheet, we know our women are working. Many and varied are these activities. Some are cleaning the church, making quilts, serving banquets, helping the pastors, giving rummage sales, making layettes for the mission field, also sewing kits and bags, making corsages and boutonnieres for Mother's Day and for hospitals, mending and shipping used clothing, calling, giving showers, luncheons and silver teas, holding Christmas parties for the missionaries, sending Christmas boxes to the outposts, etc., etc. May the Lord bless the work of our hands!

The Workshop-Retreat held at Redmond, Oregon, last fall was a time of inspiration and blessing. Mrs. Thyra Strand was the inspirational speaker. Each Yearly Meeting chairman laid out the work for the year.

386 women attended the annual banquet at Jennings Lodge last Wednesday evening. Ruth Brown gave a fine talk on her recent trip to Bolivia, closing a program both jovial and serious.

Again we contributed to the support of Roscoe and Tina Knight and gave some to Dillon Mills at Holly Park. A new challenge comes to us this next year as we undertake some support for Charlotte Macy and Dorothy Barratt in their new work at Silverton, Oregon. We will still continue to support Roscoe and Tina Knight.

Mention should be made of our spring Quarterly Meeting rallies. These were held in every Quarterly Meeting except Salem and were mid-year times of blessing and enthusiasm.

Blessed be the Lord, who daily loadeth us with benefits, even the God of our salvation. Amen.

Loved Brethren in Christ:

The Administrative Board of the National Friends Church sends their earnest greeting by means of this letter to you in the name of our loving Savior.

Following we give you some small reports on the National work in Bolivia and some notes on the Yearly Meeting in La Paz in 1957. We received a great blessing through the ministry of our preacher, Oscar Brown, from your Yearly Meeting. The smallest counted attendance was 1300. At the same time the missionary Marshal Cavit and the other missionaries here turned over to the National Church the tabernacle built with your collaboration and dedicated to the Lord.

Because of this great work your Bolivian Brothers owe gratitude to our Redeemer and to you. We believe that God will recompense you.

Thus the great work goes forward with the help of God and our missionaries and the National pastors. And now we wish to give you the statistical report of the work in general.

● 101. The following communication was received from Greenleaf Monthly Meeting, Greenleaf, Idaho:

This meeting favors instructing our representatives to Yearly Meeting to extend invitation that the Yearly Meeting sessions be held at Greenleaf, Idaho, in 1958.

This invitation was accepted by the meeting.

- 102. Scott Clark dismissed the meeting with prayer, and the sessions stand adjourned to meet Tuesday morning at 9:30.

Tuesday, 9:30 a.m.

- 103. We were reminded that "in quietness and confidence shall be your strength" as Charles Haworth and Merrill Coffin led in prayer in our devotional period. Our clerk prayed that we might have wisdom and unction from on high in this our last day of Yearly Meeting in 1957.
- 104. The minutes were read and corrected.

FRIENDS BROTHERHOOD

- 105. The Friends Brotherhood requested permission to incorporate their annual report in the minutes, which report is not at hand at the present.

This was granted, and it appears below:

There seems to be an up-turn in the general tone of the Brotherhood. Three banquets were held this last year—one at Yearly Meeting time, and two during the mid-year (one at Vancouver, Washington, and the other at Nampa, Idaho). John Retherford was the speaker for the Vancouver meeting and Mike Martin for the Nampa meeting. Oscar Brown did an outstanding job at the Yearly Meeting banquet.

The interest and enthusiasm at the banquets is very gratifying, but it lags some between times.

There was at least one conversion in one of our local Brotherhood meetings.

We have contributed \$5000.00 to the Holly Park church to date.

We feel that we have every reason to be encouraged.

The Yearly Meeting Brotherhood treasurer's report was presented and appears in the Appendix.

- 106. The Committee on Discipline Revision presented the following recommended statement regarding popular amusements:

Proper and wholesome recreation is essential to the mind and body, and an uplift to the soul. Care should be exercised diligently to insure that the forms that are chosen are such as to build up and strengthen, rather than to destroy.

It is well known that some amusements which are acclaimed by the world, and in certain quarters countenanced by branches of the church, lead the mind into dangerous channels and ultimately result in shipwreck of faith. Among these are the social dance, pictures which are lurid with crime and marital laxity, and games which involve a large element of chance.

It is well for the Christian to question himself, in case of uncertainty, as to whether participation in a certain activity adds to or decreases his spiritual desires and aspirations, whether it helps or hinders his prayer life, what effect it has upon his love for the Word of God and for the blessing of fellowship in the church. A heart and conscience sensitive to the illumination of the Holy Spirit will be kept free from involvement in that which would destroy the soul.

After discussion this statement was approved as the stand of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

- 107. The Arthur O. Roberts, president, reported:

This our 15th annual report. During the year the work of publication has included editing, printing and mailing out the 11 issues of the "Northwest Friend" to the families in the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Also printed were the Yearly Meeting minutes, the missionary endears, the financial challenge, the Handbook, the "Bolivio-gram" and the "Outposter," numerous pamphlets for the various boards (a detailed list of which is available in the Handbook), the Sunday bulletin covers, the "Missionary Voice," and miscellaneous pamphlets and letterheads. According to our arrangements with the Oregon Yearly Meeting Press, the printers, Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher, have secured private business to augment the half-time salaries of \$1200 each which the Yearly Meeting has provided for them. Some of these contracts relate to the Christian witness and thus in this capacity, too, they serve the church.

Our board has begun work on a series of informational pamphlets about our church—the work of its boards, radio ministry, and educational institutions. The second edition of the booklet, "The People Called Quakers" has been nearly sold out. Reprints of this and other booklets are anticipated.

Following the resignation of our publicity director, the board has not attempted to coordinate and direct publicity efforts across the Yearly Meeting beyond sending out a general letter to the Quarterly Meeting publicity superintendents. Limited newspaper coverage of the Yearly Meeting in session has been provided and we will follow up with releases to Friends periodicals and to other religious magazines.

Our board meets every two months throughout the year, with faithful, sacrificial attendance on the part of board members. During the year we have reviewed the work of our Oregon Yearly Meeting Press, read and considered manuscripts, and have given extensive and prayerful consideration to future plans.

Inasmuch as the Discipline Revision Committee has recommended and the Yearly Meeting has tentatively approved measures to relieve the Publication Board of its responsibility for direction of Yearly Meeting publicity, we hope to extend our primary and original task, the publication of Christian literature. This involves three things: (1) Continuation of the publication of the "Northwest Friend," (2) continuation of our work in printing literature for the boards and other agencies of the church, and (3) the publication of pamphlets and books of general interest and usefulness to the church. We have been most successful, we feel, in doing the first of these tasks, somewhat successful in the second, and noteminently successful on the third point. Our goal of a revolving fund which could be used for book publication has not been reached. We are committed to this phase of advance for our board for we believe it vital to the church. We covet your prayers that both writers and funds will avail for the printing, distribution, and promotion of doctrinal and devotional books, which will complement the literature which the various boards feel concerned to publish. In this manner we may spread the evangelical message of Friends throughout our Yearly Meeting and to the general public.

In answer to prayer, two men have risen to take the places which will be left vacant in 1958 by the retirement next August of Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher. These men are Jack Willcuts and Ralph Chapman. Before relating their concerns, we want to give praise to our faithful editor, Ray Carter and to our equally faithful printer, Ralph Fletcher, who will have completed ten years for us in this capacity at the time of their retirement. God is using their ministry richly. We pray that the new men, who come to us in the direct providence of the Lord and under a concern given of the Holy Spirit, will launch us onto a new decade with the same devotion which has characterized our present editors.

Approved.

Myron Goldsmith read the annual report of the George Fox Press submitted by Earl and Adelaide Barker:

The Lord's blessings continue to be evident as we consider this, the 12th year of Sunday school literature publication as a joint enterprise. During the past year we served at least 322 Friends Bible schools and 23 church schools in other denominations, besides numerous individuals whose church connection is not known. All five publications show increases in circulation over the preceding year, although both youth and junior quarterlies have decreased somewhat from last winter's peak. In spite of increased costs of mailing, the financial picture is somewhat brighter than it was a year ago. However, if it were not for the continued subsidies from the three Yearly Meetings we would be operating with a deficit, due to the relatively low circulation of the "Teacher's Friend" and the "Junior Friend."

Scott T. Clark, Adelaide Barker, Edith Salter, John Carr, and Frances Carr continue to serve faithfully as writers. New writers this year were Simeon O. Smith and Norval Smith for the "Teacher's Friend" and Mignon Pike for "Quaker Youth." Finding writers for these two quarterlies continues to be one of the chief problems for the editor.

An important change during the past year was the moving of headquarters to Haviland, Kansas, where Elaine Andrew, the editor, is now living and will be teaching part time at Friends Bible College and Academy. The move was made quite smoothly, without detriment to the publication work. The Wichita printer, who still prints the teachers', youth, and junior quarterlies, has taken over the wrapping and mailing of those, while the printer at Newton does the same for the "Adult Friend." The editor continues to keep all records, deal with the agents, type the labels for mailing, and send out late orders and requested samples.

Members of the board have been making careful study of graded materials from a number of publishers during the past year, and will at the next meeting endeavor to take some definite action in this regard.

For our present publications, the totals of circulation for the third quarter, 1957, were as follows: Teacher's Friend, 831; Adult Friend, 13,378; Quaker Youth, 3,881; Junior Friend, 2,097; Quaker Leaflets, 4,629; grand total, 24,816. Kansas, Ohio, Oregon, Central, and Rocky Mountain Yearly Meetings are the largest users, accounting for 68% of the Teachers'; 72% of the Adult, 67% of the Youth, 72% of the Junior, and 82% of the Leaflets. In these independent Yearly Meetings the numbers of schools not using our materials are: Kansas 6, Ohio 13, Oregon 5, Central 2, Rocky Mountain 1. During the year 19 churches began ordering for the first time, and three churches ceased ordering.

As your members on the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends, we wish to express our continuing interest in this work and our appreciation for the privilege of having a part in it. We are glad for its slow but steady growth, and the challenge to us for improvement and for meeting more fully the needs of Friends. We trust we have the prayerful interest of all of you as we carry constantly the concern for our children, youth, and adults and their proper spiritual nourishment and growth.

The financial statement of the George Fox Press was read and appears in the Appendix.

The financial statement for the publication of the Friends C.E. Manual appears in the appendix.

A most interesting and informative tape recorded conversation between Arthur Roberts, president of the Board of Publication, and Jack L. Willcuts and Ralph Chapman, now missionaries on the Bolivian Mission field was presented. These two latter men have been named to take the places which will be left vacant in 1958 by the retirement of Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher from the Yearly Meeting Press. They related their concerns in this new field. Ralph Chapman plans to devote full time to this undertaking, and Jack

Willcuts intends to continue in his call to the public ministry while also working in this new project.

Reports of the Board of Publication were approved.

- 108. The Board of Publication requests that Earl Barker be named to serve for two years on the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends.

Approved.

MEMORIAL HOUR

- 109. The report of the Memorial Committee:

The committee appointed to consider memoirs report that 49 deaths have been listed and nine memorials have been sent in; and will be filed with other Yearly Meeting documents.

A complete list of those deceased appears in the appendix and an asterisk indicates those for whom memorials were read.

Prayer was offered by Hubert Mardock that the example of those who have passed on might be an inspiration to us who are left to carry on for the Lord.

- 110. Hazel Pierson submitted her resignation as member of the Epistle Committee.

Referred to the representatives.

- 111. The morning inspirational hour opened with singing "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

The clerk expressed appreciation for the ministry of Hubert Mardock during these sessions of Yearly Meeting.

Our speaker opened his message expressing appreciation for the privilege of being in these sessions.

His subject for this service was "The More Excellent Way and the Great Commission," John 4:31-33.

"The primary call is called to be saints," he stated, "and the secondary call is called to serve. We are not called to this more excellent way just to enjoy ourselves, nor yet just to get to heaven. We are called to be co-partners with Christ. The husbandman that labors must first be partakers of the fruit. We are to be witnesses. We are to be used by Him. God designated the worker, and He designates the work. A spirit-filled life is always accompanied by divine power and presence." Hubert Mardock expressed his concern for Oregon Yearly Meeting that whatever our various callings, we tarry until we be endued with power from on high.

- 112. The hymn "Holy Spirit, Faithful Guide" and the chorus, "Fill Me Now," were sung in closing this session, and the clerk led in prayer. The meeting stands adjourned to meet in the afternoon session at 2:15.

- 113. In the opening of the afternoon business session, William Thomas and R. Ethol George led in prayer.

- 114. Dean Gregory, Paul Mills and Charles Beals were named as a committee to reword a statement regarding our relationship with Western Evangelical Seminary. (See Minute 127)

- 115. The representatives presented the following nomination to the Discipline Revision Committee to fill the vacancy left by Paul Barnett: Arthur O. Roberts.

- 116. The representatives nominated Merrill M. Coffin to the

Epistle Committee, to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Hazel Pierson.

Approved.

- 117. Mid-year board meeting dates were announced, February 14 to 21, 1958, Newberg, Oregon.

- 118. Report of the Custodian of Documents, Oliver Weesner:

Documents are being kept in a safe deposit box in the vault of the Newberg Branch of the First National Bank of Portland and in a vault in the office of Homer Chamberlain and others at the southwest corner of First and College Streets in Newberg. It is expected that documents will be placed in the vault in the addition, now being constructed, to the Yearly Meeting house, when the addition is completed.

Approved.

- 119. The report from Junior Yearly Meeting:

Junior Yearly Meeting was a blessing to all who attended, and we feel that God met with us in a very real way.

Our enrollment was 76, with an average attendance of 36. Each morning we began by singing favorite old and new choruses, followed by a time of prayer. The fifth day we had a period of testimony and consecration service.

Marguerite Hubbell and Vivian Thornburg conducted classes for the primaries and beginners. The juniors and intermediates were under the direction of Jean Foley.

We reviewed stories of heroic Quakers, studied Friends doctrine, learned timely scripture verses, and discussed ways of improving our Christian testimony. We also viewed film strips and listened to records.

Part of our handwork consisted of marking on maps the location of meetings in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

We wish to thank the Church of the Nazarene for the use of their basement.

The junior and intermediate session held a business meeting each morning.

- 120. The clerk was instructed to send a letter of thanks to the Church of the Nazarene for the use of their basement for Junior Yearly Meeting.

- 121. The list of available evangelists was submitted by the Board of Evangelism and appears in the appendix.

- 122. The Yearly Meeting statistical report was read and appears in the appendix.

- 123. The Friends Church Extension Foundation nominated Alfred Neal to serve on its board of directors for three years.

Approved.

- 124. The Executive Committee has considered the pledges to the United Budget and make the following recommendation:

In view of the fact that the proposed United Budget was only 75% pledged we suggest the following revised United Budget:

This leaves a budget of \$456.53 larger than the pledges. Several pledges came in with a notation that more would be paid if possible and the Executive Committee feels that in suggesting this slightly larger budget it is keeping the spirit of the Constitution and Discipline.

- 125. A communication from the representatives:

After careful study and prayer of the proposal presented by Portland Quarterly Meeting, Minute 10, 1957 Yearly Meeting Minutes, we recommend that no change be made on the Discipline. We further suggest that each meeting be encouraged to study the duties of elders and overseers, and practice according to the Discipline. (See Minute 10)

Approved.

● 126. A communication from the Board of Evangelism:

The Board of Evangelism has discussed the proposition referred to them from Inland Quarterly Meeting relative to an expense fund for moving pastors. The board has given consideration to this matter and feels that this proposal would not be feasible at this time.

● 127. The following came as a report of special committee. (See Minute 114)

Inasmuch as the Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church has a trustee relationship with Western Evangelical Seminary, be it resolved, that we recognize Western Evangelical Seminary as an approved institution for the training of our ministerial students.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

● 128. Report from the Board of Trustees:

The repairs to the outside of the Quaker Apartments as authorized by the Yearly Meeting last year have been completed at a cost of \$1800.00.

The Yearly Meeting last year authorized the Trustees to borrow not to exceed \$7500.00 for improvements and to apply on debt of Quaker Apartments. We have borrowed from the Newberg Friends Cemetery of Newberg Monthly Meeting \$4500.00. This loan consisted of \$2500.00 in cash and \$2000.00 in bonds. The cash was paid to the treasurer of the Yearly Meeting and the bonds are in the safe deposit box rented by the Yearly Meeting in Newberg Branch of the First National Bank of Portland. These bonds can be cashed when needed and the funds placed in the Yearly Meeting treasury to apply on the overdrawn account of the Trustees in the report of the treasurer. The note bears interest at the rate of 5% payable annually and the principal is to be paid in monthly installments of \$100.00 each beginning in December, 1957.

The Trustees have sold to Carl C. Peterson property in Baker, Oregon, as authorized by the Yearly Meeting last year.

Upon authorization by the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting the Trustees have executed a note for \$6000.00 in favor of the United States National Bank of Portland secured by a mortgage on the property in Metolius, Oregon, upon which the church building is located. This loan was used to pay for part of the construction cost of the church building and is to be paid in monthly installments by the Metolius meeting.

Upon authorization by the Yearly Meeting a deed was signed by the Trustees transferring the title to the property of the Holly Park meeting in Seattle, Washington, to the Holly Park Monthly Meeting. Later it was found that the deed did not include a portion of a street that had been vacated by the City of Seattle and a correction deed was executed correcting this. Holly Park meeting negotiated a loan from the Prudential Mutual Savings Bank of Seattle for \$7000.00 to be used to pay part of the construction cost of their church building. However the bank required that the title to property be in the name of Oregon Yearly Meeting and that the note and mortgage be executed by the Yearly Meeting. Holly Park meeting has executed a deed to the property to the Yearly Meeting, and upon authorization by the Executive Committee the Trustees have executed a note and mortgage in favor of the Prudential Mutual Savings Bank of Seattle in the amount of \$7000.00.

The Yearly Meeting has held title to two parcels of property at Ontario Heights, one of which contained a reverting clause to Albert Cammack and wife. During the year Ontario meeting purchased property in Ontario. Upon authorization by the Executive Committee the Trustees executed a quit claim deed for all the property at Ontario Heights to Albert Cammack and wife, and the Cammacks have deeded to the Yearly Meeting the portion of this property upon which the building is located together with a small additional parcel of land. Upon authorization by the Executive Committee the Trustees have executed a consent to a Land Sale Contract by the Ontario Friends Church to William M. Conger and wife of this property, and has agreed that upon the completion of this contract Oregon Yearly Meeting will execute a deed to William M. Conger and Patricia B. Conger to the property.

Also upon authorization by the Executive Committee the Trustees have executed a note for \$8000.00 in favor of Truellen R. LeBaron secured by a mortgage upon the church property in Ontario, the proceeds of which was used in the purchase of the church property and the note is to be paid by monthly installments of \$88.82 by the Ontario meeting.

The Trustees during the year received from Newberg Monthly Meeting a request for permission to erect an addition to the church property in Newberg to be used as an educational unit for the Sunday school, youth organizations and other activities of the meeting. Plans for building, and the method of financing the construction were given, and the Trustees have approved the construction of this addition. This addition will contain a fire proof vault. The Trustees recommend that upon the completion of this vault that the Yearly Meeting authorize the Custodian of Documents of the Yearly Meeting, the Yearly Meeting superintendent and a member of the Trustees of Newberg Monthly Meeting be given the combination of the vault door.

Sherwood Monthly Meeting has requested that the Trustees be authorized to execute a deed transferring title to the property now used by Sherwood Monthly Meeting to the Sherwood Monthly Meeting.

The expenses involved in the above transactions have been paid by the Yearly Meeting treasurer.

This report and requests were approved, and the clerk was instructed to write a letter of appreciation for the tract of land donated to the Ontario Heights church property, by the Albert Cammack family.

● 129. Regarding the recommendation concerning board meetings (Minute 13) the Executive Committee recommended that this request be held in their committee for further study.

Approved.

● 130. Regarding the request from Inland Quarterly Meeting (Minute 14), the Executive Committee recommended that a copy of the report questions should be printed in the Handbooks. The Executive Committee also recommended that one extra report blank be sent for each committee.

Approved.

● 131. The epistle from our Yearly Meeting to our National Friends Church in Bolivia was read, and approved for sending.

● 132. The Executive Committee recommended that the Yearly Meeting Minutes be edited by the Printing Committee.

Approved.

● 133. The Executive Committee recommended that the following boards be granted permission to solicit funds over our Yearly Meeting throughout the church year: Missions, Evangelism, Peace and Service, and Christian Education.

Granted.

● 134. Upon the approved recommendation of the Group Hospital and Accident Insurance Committee, the Executive Committee nominates the following persons to serve on the Group Insurance Committee for these designated terms: Dillon Mills, 3 years, chairman; Harold Lund, 2 years; Russel Stands, 1 year.

Approved.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 135. Walter P. Lee, president, reported: (Condensed report)

With reverent thanksgiving to the Lord, our God, for His abundant blessings in the Bolivian missionary work, the Board of Missions employs the words of the Psalmist, "O sing unto the Lord a new song; for He hath done marvellous things: His right hand, and His holy arm, hath gotten Him the victory. The Lord hath made known His salvation; His righteousness hath He openly shewed in the sight of the heathen."

There have been a number of remarkable advances in the missionary enterprise this past year and there have been some great problems, but the problems have proved the power of God to care for His own work.

The field reports reveal the continued outreach of the gospel and the encouraging response as indicated by an ever growing church and Bible School.

To assist in the growth of the mission program and facilitate the evangelization of our field, the equipment on the field has been improved and enlarged as a result of the vision and faithfulness to God of our home constituency. The new Yearly Meeting center on Alto La Paz received approximately half of the funds for purchase and construction from funds in the hands of the Board of Missions. The Charles R. Cavit Memorial Tabernacle was financed by contributions received by Marshal Cavit from among his friends. We are deeply grateful to all of these friends. Oregon Yearly Meeting has matched this with the purchase of the property and erection of several auxiliary buildings necessary for satisfactory accommodations.

A new mission residence was built at the Bible-School farm from funds which were raised at the sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting in 1954 for that purpose. The increase in the number of staff members required in the Bible School-farm program made this a necessity.

The new farm truck which arrived in Bolivia just before the Junta Anual and has been such a help both at the farm and for other transportation needs, was purchased and shipped with funds received by concerned friends throughout our Yearly Meeting.

The much-needed tent for evangelism in the Yungas was purchased with funds received from the Christian Endeavorers of Oregon Yearly Meeting. This is now in use on the field.

In response to the appeal for funds to finance another printing of Aymara hymnals, over \$1200 was received. The Mission Council is endeavoring to sell these hymnals at a price which will maintain a revolving fund for further printing. The economic instability of Bolivia creates a

problem in this regard.

The sudden financial changes in an effort to stabilize the Bolivian currency imposed real hardship on the national pastors. To assist in this emergency the Board of Missions has drawn an extra \$30.00 per month for several months to be used as a temporary subsidy.

The Lord has blessed us in a financial way throughout the year and there have been sufficient funds to meet the budget and cover all pressing needs with one exception. The Transportation Fund is overdrawn approximately \$600 with other expenses in the amount of \$400 which must be paid at once. This deficit has occurred in spite of the fact that the missionaries have found less expensive modes of travel to and from the field. The very high freight costs and increasing number of missionaries traveling to the field are responsible for the rising transportation costs. The freight on the farm truck alone was in excess of \$800. The treasurer's report reveals that although \$3,727.57 was received for transportation, the amount spent was \$7,126.56. The Board of Missions has realized for some time that the amount received from birthday offerings is not nearly sufficient to meet the transportation needs. It is obvious that this must be supplemented by larger giving.

For the first time in our missionary history, the Board of Missions has experimented in sending missionaries under appointment to language school in preparation for service. David and Florence Thomas were sent to the well-known and much used Language School in San Jose, Costa Rica, for two terms before going on to Bolivia. Reports indicate this to be a highly profitable experiment and we are encouraged to make this a standard procedure.

Since there were no missionaries available for deputation among our churches this past year, the Board of Missions arranged with the missionaries on the field to prepare short tape recordings and short missionary plays to be used in our local churches. Two tapes were prepared and sufficient copies were made by Homer Hester to provide for a copy of each tape for each Quarterly Meeting. One missionary play was written by Catherine Cavit and sufficient copies were made in the office of the Field Secretary and mailed to each meeting to provide for the necessary caste in each church.

During this past year Everett and Alda Clarkson with their two children have been placed under appointment for Bolivia service and the Board of Missions plans to send them to the Language School in Costa Rica about the first of next January. Mark and Wilma Roberts have been on furlough during the year and Mark has been pursuing studies for further educational advancement. These friends plan to remain in the United States and pursue further study on their own initiative.

Fifty-three of the meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting reported on the year's activities. These reports indicate that 42 members of the Yearly Meeting were in some type of missionary service during the year. Only 16 of these served under the direction of the Yearly Meeting Board of Missions. Thus it appears that the influence of Oregon Yearly Meeting is reaching many areas throughout the world.

The reports reveal that 211 special missionary services were held in our churches of which approximately 59% represented our own missionary work. Thirteen hundred seventy-six missionary books were read which exceeded the report of a year ago by 189.

The number of missionary prayer meetings reported was 383. Some churches reported a large number and others none. Prayer is vital to the missionary program and should be encouraged in each church.

Approximately 1300 Missionary Calendars were reported in use. According to the report of the Yearly Meeting treasurer the receipts from this project reached a total of \$5,115.71. This exceeds any year to date and indicates an average per calendar of \$3.93. Some meetings have enthusiastically supported this project, while some have not yet felt the challenge. The Calendar Fund has not only been used for support of the National Church evangelism and pastoral assistance but has been indispensable in emergencies such as the Bolivian financial instability mentioned earlier in this report and explained more fully in the following field reports. This project is vital to the missionary program and all meetings are urged to participate whole-heartedly. If 25¢ per missionary birthday had been received from 1000 calendars, the receipts would have been \$9750. The increasing interest is encouraging. Let us keep striving to reach the goal.

In the publication of the "Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends" the Board of Missions has continued its active cooperation with Ohio and Kansas Yearly Meetings. This is an inspiring and challenging missionary magazine and should have a wider circulation in our Yearly Meeting.

All reports from Bolivia indicate we are in the midst of the greatest opportunity for gospel evangelism that we have ever experienced. The Lord has set before us an open door and beckons us to enter quickly. Let us follow Him in a spirit of complete consecration and beckons our mission "while it is yet day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

Edwin Cammack, who spent seven months in Bolivia with his parents, Forrest and Orpha Cammack, spoke regarding his short stay in Bolivia.

Mark Roberts, former missionary to Bolivia, and now in the homeland in medical school, told of his concern for this aspect of our mission work, and his desire to become qualified in this line that he may serve in this needy area.

Everett and Alda Clarkson, who with their two children are to leave in January for language school in Costa Rica, were presented to the meeting.

Alda spoke regarding her call, giving her testimony and reading Joshua 1:9 which had been an encouragement to her. "Be not afraid. . . for the Lord thy God is with thee."

Everett spoke regarding the definiteness of his call to Bolivia, and his complete trust in the Lord, and his confidence in the Board

of Missions of Oregon Yearly Meeting as he goes. He has a special concern for the educational phase of our mission work. He read Mark 16:15 "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" as his commission. They request our continued prayers in their behalf.

Clare Willcuts, president of the Board of Evangelism led us in a time of special prayer for this newest missionary family.

The report of the Board of Missions was approved.

● 136. The financial secretary, Robert Morrill, reported the offerings and pledges received during Yearly Meeting.

We wish to thank Julia Pearson who acted as hostess, our very able cooks, Pearl Pruitt, Harriet Walters and Mignon Pike, the many boys and girls from various meetings who helped with the serving, and last but not least the many adults who responded so willingly when a call for help was given.
