● 1. With the desire that in all things Christ may have the pre-eminence, we convene in this sixty-sixth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting, held at Greenleaf, Idaho, August 14th, 1958.

● 2. The presiding clerk, Dorwin Smith, called our attention to Psalms 147:11, "The Lord taketh pleasure in them that fear Him, in those that hope in His mercy." He reminded us that the purpose of the Yearly Meeting is to evaluate our works of the past, and to present a challenge for the future. The main task of Oregon Yearly Meeting is the evangelization of the world, at home and abroad. He admonished us to not become so busy doing things that we neglect our primary purpose for existence. Above all may we be sensitive to the leading of the Holy Spirit during these sessions.

Grace Clark led the congregation in singing, "A Charge to Keep," following a time of silent devotion. Hubert Mardock led in prayer.

● 9. The reports of the State of the Church were read and the summary appears below:

The reports of the State of the Church were read from seven Quarterly Meetings.

All report generally good attendance in the Sunday morning services of the church, but many lament the fact that the Sunday evening and mid-week services are not so well attended.

In Friends' relationship with one another, brotherly love is shown, thus giving witness to the world.

While the number maintaining family worship is hard to ascertain, it is known that many are faithful in this, and Friends are urged not to become absorbed in temporal affairs to the exclusion of the spiritual.

All express appreciation for and confidence in their faithful ministers. Several report gratitude for the increasing number of consecrated young people. Some pastors have held instructional classes in Bible study and Friends doctrine for their young people, thus helping them to become rooted and built up in the faith.

Growth is noted in many churches, with building programs underway and some new outposts started.

With the evidence of God's blessing upon them, the churches have a zeal to reach out into the communities around them to win the lost to Christ.

● 10. The Custodian of Documents, Oliver Weesner, reported:

The documents have been kept in the vault of the Newberg Branch of First National Bank of Oregon and in the vault in the office of the E. B. Stanley Realty Co. at First and College Streets in Newberg.

The vault in the addition to the church building is about complete except for shelving, and it will be ready for the storage of records in a short time.

This was approved.

● 11. The vacancy in office of Assistant Recording Clerk caused by the absence of Kenneth Eichenberger was referred to the representatives. (See minute 18)

● 12. Nathan Pierson submitted his resignation from the Board of Peace and Service because of Quarterly Meeting appointment on another board. This was referred to the representatives. (See minute 38)

● 13. A communication regarding the definition of non-resident members was forwarded from Portland Quarterly Meeting. This was referred to the representatives. (See minute 59)

● 14. The Yearly Meeting treasurer's report was read and approved, and appears in the appendix.

● 15. Oliver Weesner, auditor, reported having checked the receipts and expenditures and finds them correct and the treasurer's books in good order. It was requested by the meeting that a formal report of the auditing committee be written to be incorporated in the Minutes. Approved.

● 16. A concern was expressed regarding an earlier closure of the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books, to facilitate the work of the Auditing Committee. This was referred to the Board of Finance.

● 17. The morning devotional hour opened with Orville Winters leading the congregation in singing "Faith of Our Fathers."

Walter Williams, former missionary to China, and former Ohio Yearly Meeting superintendent, and now on the faculty of Malone College, was introduced.

He invited us to look into Ephesians at the "Alps" of the New Testament, mountain peaks of truth found therein.

The thesis of the book is to show the character and will of God that His true nature may be manifest. This is accomplished through the new Creation, His saints, the Church.

The book of Ephesians may be divided into four parts: Wealth, Workmanship, Walk and Warfare. Chapter 1, verse 3 shows the Giver, the wealth, and the recipient. We are to be holy and blameless in love. We are chosen, adopted, accepted, redeemed, instructed, possess an inheritance, and are sealed by the Holy Spirit.

"If ye abide in me, and I in you, then are ye my disciples indeed."

The meeting was dismissed with prayer.

Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

After a period of silent devotions, Lela Morrill and Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

● 18. The representatives presented the name of Wendell Woodward to fill the vacancy of Assistant Recording Clerk for this Yearly Meeting session. Approved.

● 19. The Yearly Meeting Trustees presented the following report:

The Trustees have executed a deed transferring the property at Netarts to Netarts Friends Church.

The two bonds owned by the Yearly Meeting have been sold and

the proceeds have been paid to the Yearly Meeting treasurer.

The insurance on the church building at Newberg has been increased from \$47,600.00 to approximately \$62,000.00. Newberg Monthly Meeting has paid half and the Yearly Meeting has paid half of the premium.

The mortgage on the Quaker Apartments in favor of the Equitable Trust Co. has been paid, and payments of \$100.00 per month are now being made on the \$4500.00 note in favor of the Newberg Friends Cemetery.

The following transactions were authorized by the Executive Committee:

A deed has been executed for the sale of a lot of the Metolius property.

The title to the property at Holly Park has been transferred to the Yearly Meeting, and an option for the sale of portion of the property has been executed.

A lease has been issued to Maplewood Preparative Meeting for property upon which the church building is located to enable them to secure a loan for the improvement of the property.

A note and mortgage for \$10,000.00 in favor of the Madras Branch of the United States National Bank of Portland has been executed upon the Metolius church property. The proceeds of this note was used to retire the balance due on the \$6000.00 executed last year and the remainder used in completing their church building.

A mortgage has been executed on some property at Quilcene to provide funds for the improvement of their church property.

A note and mortgage for \$7000.00 has been executed upon the Lynwood church property, the proceeds used in the purchase of the property.

The Executive Committee authorized the Trustees to sign a plan for the issue of bonds under the Broadway Plan for the construction of a church building on the Lynwood property. The Trustees thereupon passed a resolution authorizing Oliver Weesner, chairman of the Trustees, and Dean Gregory, superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, to sign bonds and papers required by the plan.

In confidence with this authorization Oliver Weesner and Dean Gregory have signed for Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church a resolution describing in detail the bond issue for \$15,000.00, have signed the bonds and have signed a resolution amending the original resolution to provide for the method of retiring any of the bonds that may be called for redemption before maturity.

Certified copies of these resolutions are on record in the Miscellaneous Records of Multnomah County, Oregon, and the Corporation Commissioner of Oregon has approved the issuance and sale of the bonds.

Approved.

● 20. The Trustees request that Oregon Yearly Meeting pass a minute ratifying the acts of the Executive Committee, the Trustees, Oliver Weesner, chairman of Trustees, and Dean Gregory, superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, as described above in providing for a church building bond issue under the Broadway Plan for the Lynwood Friends Church, Portland, Oregon.

Approved.

- 21. The Committee on Discipline Revision presented the Proposed Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

It was approved that we hold final adoption of this until a designated time be set for final action on this document. (See minute 58)

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

- 22. The following report of the Board of Peace and Service was presented by Richard Cossel, president:

Forty-three meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting submitted written reports from which the following report is compiled.

I. SERVICE:

Romans 15:1 "We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves."

Galatians 6:2 "Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

Hebrews 13:3 "Remember them that are in bonds, as bound with them; and them which suffer adversity, as being yourselves also in the body."

A. Home Relief:

Most of the meetings reporting listed various types of home relief projects which their meeting had engaged in such as: helping in time of bereavement; food, money and clothing given to needy families; aid to families who had suffered loss by fire; contributions to local missions and Salvation Army.

B. Foreign Relief:

11 CARE packages and 2745 pounds of clothing sent abroad, through the following agencies: Oregon Yearly Meeting Mission Board, National Association of Evangelicals, Friends Service Committee, and Hebrew Evangelistic Society.

II. PEACE:

Hebrews 12:14 "Follow peace with all men, and holiness without which no man shall see the Lord."

With war clouds gathering throughout the world we feel the urgency of proclaiming the message of peace and holiness.

A. Board Projects:

1. Copies of the pamphlet "What About War" written by Paul Mills were sent to all meetings for distribution.

2. A letter sent to the meetings appealing for contributions to help George Fox College pay the salary of Ralph Cammack who is serving his alternative service by working for George Fox College.

B. Reports:

1. The names and addresses of 203 young men in our meetings between ages of 14-18 years reported.

2. 39 men reported as serving in armed forces either as combatants or non-combatants.

3. Six men serving as conscientious objectors.

4. A number of meetings report special counseling for young men facing draft and classes and sermons to teach Christian doctrine of peace.

Winners in the oratorical contest were presented, speaking on the subject, "Should a Christian Participate in War?" Participants were Veva Tucker, Boise, and Philip Roberts, Greenleaf. Philip Roberts was declared winner, receiving a prize of \$20.00. Second

place, Veva Tucker, received \$10.00.

Charles Beals reported on the progress and prospect of Friendsview Manor, Incorporated, retirement home for Friends. He has been released by Newberg Church for a period of three months to promote this project, starting September 1, 1958.

The report of the Board of Peace and Service was approved.

The board recommended that Charles Beals, Herbert Hathaway, and John Fankhauser be named to the Friendsview Manor Corporation. Approved.

● 23. The clerks were directed to write a letter of appreciation to Roger and Mildred Minthorne for their excellent work on the treasurer's books.

The meeting adjourned to meet Friday at 9:30 a.m.

● 24. In the opening devotional period, Fred Harris and Leslie McHarque led in prayer.

● 25. Minutes were read and corrected.

● 26. The following communication came from Salem Quarterly Meeting:

Eugene Preparative Meeting was accepted as a regular Monthly Meeting with a total membership of 87.

Approved.

● 27. The letter of appreciation to Roger and Mildred Minthorne was read. Approved.

● 28. Frank and Lois Haskins of Inglewood, California, new pastors at Eugene, were introduced. Also Mahlon Macy, field director of the National Association of Evangelicals, from Wheaton, Illinois, and Evelyn Harriman, on furlough from World Gospel Mission in Bolivia.

● 29. Dean Gregory brought greetings from retired ministers Merrill and Anna Coffin and Cora Nordyke, who were unable to attend Yearly Meeting.

● 30. Three members of the Epistle Committee are absent. The filling of these vacancies was referred to the representatives. (See minute 36)

● 31. John Retherford submitted his resignation from the Board of Stewardship because of his acceptance of a pastorate in Indiana Yearly Meeting.

Also Richard Beebe resigned from the Board of Stewardship.

These vacancies were referred to the representatives.

● 32. A letter of greeting was read from Gervas A. Carey, a former clerk of Oregon Yearly Meeting and his wife Amy, residing in Honolulu, Hawaii. He expressed appreciation for their many friends in Oregon Yearly Meeting, and admonished us to "Set our minds on things that are above, not on things on the earth."

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

● 33. The Board of Christian Education was presented by president Lela Morrill.

SUNDAY SCHOOL:

The total average attendance of the Sunday Schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting for this past year was 5362, a gain of 188 over the

year before. Forty of our Sunday Schools showed gain, twenty showed a loss, and one remained the same. Four Sunday Schools showed gains of more than 30%. These were Cambridge, with a 63% increase, Hayden Lake with 43%, Hillsboro with 40%, and Newport with 33%. Twelve others showed gains of 10% or more. These were Sherwood 25%, Portland First 20%, Eugene 18%, Ashland, East Wenatchee and Maplewood each with 17%, Caldwell 14.4%, Rosemere 13.7%, Seattle Memorial 13%, Rosedale 12.8%, Everett 11%, and Nampa 10%.

We view these reports with mixed feelings. We are indeed glad for the splendid gains in attendance made by a number of our outposts and newer meetings. There is equal cause for rejoicing over the excellent gains shown by several of our older meetings. We are reminded that growth does not depend upon age or size, but upon vision and willingness to work. Cause for concern is seen in the twenty Sunday Schools with a loss in attendance, but we trust that these will take new courage and that next year's report will reveal a good gain in each Sunday School.

After two years of work toward the Standards of Excellence we are able to see some of the results of this emphasis on over-all excellence in the work of our Sunday Schools. A definite attempt to come up to the goals set by the Standards is evidenced by most of the Sunday Schools. It would seem that one of the greatest weaknesses is in the area of record-keeping. The board is planning to give assistance in this field. Cause for concern is still seen in the area of Evangelism by the fact that on the average only 93% of the Sunday School teachers attend morning worship, 72% evening worship, and 59% prayer meeting. Perhaps these figures account in part for the fact that we are not winning more of the members of our Sunday Schools for the Lord.

Reports show that during the past year eleven of our Sunday Schools achieved the excellent rating of Gold Crown Sunday Schools by the attainment of 900 or more points. Three, with 800 or more points, rated as Silver Crown Sunday Schools; and 10 schools, with 700 or more points, received Blue Crown rating. Thirty-seven schools with less than 700 points were rated as Cooperating Sunday Schools. Over half of the cooperating schools had gains, some of them large gains, in attendance, but did not achieve as many points in other areas of the Standards.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH WORK:

There were 43 Vacation Bible Schools held with a total enrollment of 3049, and 507 conversions reported, each of these figures being larger than in last year's report.

There are 16 clubs for boys or girls, with 212 members.

Christian Endeavor membership totals 453 for senior CE, 297 in intermediate, and 278 in junior. These figures show an increase in each age group.

Our summer camps and conferences again proved a means of spiritual blessing and wholesome fellowship for all who attended.

BOARD ACTIVITY:

Activity of the board during the past year has included continued work on the Sunday School Standards of Excellence with emphasis upon field visitation by members of the board, and publication of the Sunday School News. Three cars were sent to the Sunday School

Convention at Los Angeles, beside the award trips given to the three Blue Ribbon Sunday Schools. Attendance at Leadership Training Conferences has been encouraged.

Progress has been made toward a closer and more helpful relationship with the Yearly Meeting Christian Endeavor Union. Funds have been sent to assist in the holding of Vacation Bible Schools in seven outposts. The Navigator Scripture Memory course has been introduced into our conferences and camps to aid in the establishment and spiritual growth of young Christians. Plans have been made and are being carried out for Junior Yearly Meeting.

LOOKING AHEAD:

Plans for the year ahead include clarification of the Standards of Excellence and assistance in record-keeping, field work by members of the board and other qualified leaders, development of area leadership conferences, and encouragement of teacher training through the loan of new film strips.

Our goal of 6000 in Sunday School in Oregon Yearly Meeting has yet to be reached. May we catch the vision of the fields "white unto harvest." As we view our area of rapid population growth, may our eyes be opened to see the mission field at our doorstep.

Willard Kennon spoke on the importance of Boys and Girls Clubs.

Gerald Dillon spoke, challenging the Sunday Schools to greater achievement.

Names of Sunday Schools were read in their various ratings of achievements; as cooperating Sunday Schools, Blue Crown, Silver Crown, or Gold Crown Sunday Schools. Hayden Lake, Nampa, and Sherwood received highest ratings in the Yearly Meeting.

Chaplain Orval Stiles of the Idaho State Penitentiary spoke, representing the "Navigators," an organization for memorizing and reaching others with the Scriptures. He told us we must first realize our own responsibility in representing Jesus Christ. We must be soldiers. We must deny ourselves, take up our cross daily, and follow Him. Our Christian life is composed of faith, love, and purity. Our responsibility is to know, and teach others. ● 34. In the inspirational hour, Walter Williams brought greetings from his son in Florida. Walter Williams, Jr., was speaker in Oregon Yearly Meeting in 1949.

Continuing with Ephesians 1, the speaker stated that it is the purpose of God to raise up people for His glory, to exalt Christ, and to show God's mercy and grace through the church. Paul prayed that we might catch a glimpse of the glory to be revealed. Here we overcome through the Blood of the Lamb and the word of our testimony. There we shall praise Him who has redeemed us.

The meeting closed with a time of silent prayer, and the congregation singing "I Love Him." Calvin Choate dismissed with prayer.

- 35. In the opening devotional period, Fred Baker led in prayer.
- 36. The representatives nominated Scott T. Clark and Sarah McCracken to fill vacancies on the Epistle Committee. Approved.
- 37. The representatives nominated J. Russel Stands and Quincy Fodge to the Board of Public Relations for three years. Approved.
- 38. The representatives presented the names of Paul Puckett and Charlotte Macy to the Board of Peace and Service for three

years, and Claude Lewis for two years. Approved.

● 39. Gerald Dillon and Lela Morrill were nominated by the representatives to the Board of Christian Education for three years. Approved.

● 40. The Trustees introduced the following request:

It is requested by East Wenatchee Friends Church that the Yearly Meeting authorize its Trustees to execute a deed to the County of Douglas, State of Washington, a parcel of land situated in Douglas County Washington, described as follows: A strip of land 30 feet wide as surveyed along the east boundary of Tax 100, as described in Douglas County Assessor's records, in Lot 27, East Wenatchee Land Co's. Plat of Section 35 Township 23 North Range 20 East Willamette Meridian. Said strip of land being 77 feet long.

The strip of land described is to be used in opening a road.

The meeting authorized the Trustees to sign a deed transferring the property described to Douglas County, Washington.

● 41. Alden Pitts and wife Rolena, of North Wichita Monthly Meeting, Wichita Quarterly Meeting, Kansas Yearly Meeting, were introduced to the meeting, and he spoke briefly.

● 42. Forrest Cammack, recently returned from Bolivia, S.A., was introduced and brought greetings.

● 43. The Executive Committee unanimously recommended that Dean Gregory continue to serve as General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting. This was heartily approved. The matter of salary was referred to the Executive Committee.

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

● 44. Dean Gregory, General Superintendent, presented his annual report as follows:

Often times, the annual reports of the church are considered to be dry and uninteresting. If we could only gather up the actual day by day experiences of the church, and translate them into living pictures framed only with the limitations of language, where the moving scenes would blend and sometimes contrast, what an improvement we would find in just the telling of the story of the past year!

The setting for this story is found in 62 communities throughout the majestic and productive Northwest country, and annexing the highlands and deep valleys of Bolivia and Peru, as well as touching in other parts of the world such as Africa, India, Formosa, Japan, New Guinea, Mexico and its borders. Yes, it is true that from our big family of more than 5000 members, we have witnesses around the world. Of course, it is true also that God has marked out a clearly defined family responsibility for us in our three Northwest states, Bolivia and Peru, and here the main stream of our thought and activities revolve around our God-given field of special responsibility.

The participants in the drama of this real life story, are each assigned a special and important role. Yes, all 5000 of them, and each one is given a place where he may shine if he will! Here is the beauty of the plan, for there are no masses as such, but each person has his special and individual part to play. In all honesty, it must be said that sometimes people prefer to be just a part of the crowd, and forget their own lines, and just where they are to come in, and that always hinders success. How wonderful it would be if each one counted his task a real joy and privilege.

A number of folk ought to be mentioned as having made outstanding contributions to the life of the church, but where can such a thing stop, for there are hundreds who have joined hands in making the church move forward.

I cannot refrain from saying a word about four couples who have served the church in a long and successful ministry. Scott and Grace Clark, and Herman and Mabel Macy are retiring from the pastoral ministry this year. Words cannot be put together to adequately express the thanks we all feel in our hearts for these faithful Friends and their contribution to the cause of Christ.

Ray and Margaret Carter, and Ralph and Myrtle Fletcher are preparing to turn the work of printing and publishing over to new hands after a year of working together with the newly appointed editor and technician. While we regret the thoughts of the retirement of these Friends, we do welcome the coming of Jack Willcuts and Ralph Chapman families into the Yearly Meeting headquarters to assume the tasks being relinquished by the Carters and Fletchers. A most significant contribution has been made to the church by these Friends and we all want to say thank you for this service which has been as unto Christ.

Do you remember that last year this report mentioned that, "every week one million more people learn to read." Think of it! Since last Yearly Meeting 52 million more people have learned to read. And the question comes like a shock wave, what are they reading? Without doubt, the field of Christian literature is one of the most challenging areas of our witness in these last days. Friends, let's awaken to the great possibilities in evangelizing through the printed page. The false religions of the world are pouring millions of dollars into their literature programs, while much of the Christian church disregards the stirring challenge. This year the publication of Yearly Meeting literature has amounted to over one million pages besides a volume of other printing for Christian organizations.

This year there are to be 13 pastoral changes. We are glad to welcome the following new pastors into the Yearly Meeting: Glenn Armstrong at Chehalem Center, Jack Willcuts at West Chehalem, Frank Haskins at Eugene, Joseph Reece at Vancouver First church, George B. Palmer at Lynwood, May Wallace at Agnew, and Mark Roberts at Woodland. Other changes are: Wayne Piersall at McKinley Avenue in Tacoma, Herbert Sargent at Forest Home, Evert Tuning at Sprague River, Walter and Gladys Cook at Entiat, Peter Fertello at Parkrose. George Fox College has accepted the responsibility to provide pastoral leadership for the Timber outpost. Bethany and Springbrook meetings are yet unsupplied.

All of us appreciate something new. The two new churches begun this year at Silverton, Oregon, and Lynwood in the Portland suburbs have created a great deal of interest throughout the Yearly Meeting. Silverton is closing its first year of operation with its new two-unit building already dedicated, and an encouraging spiritual life being manifested. Lynwood Friends hope to be in their new building by September 7, at which time the regular services of the church will start.

The part time services of Frederick Baker as Field Secretary for the Board of Evangelism gave added emphasis and challenge to

the great field of church extension. I have had the privilege of doing initial survey work in three new communities where there has been some interest in starting new Friends meetings. Church extension is the life-line of the church; it is the heart throb of the missionary-minded church, for it is a part of our united mission for Christ. Indeed, it is missions, on the home front.

This past year has seen tremendous advances in opportunities on our foreign field. Last March marked our official entry into Peru, along the shores of Lake Titicaca. Our missionaries tell us that this is a field with the potential to double our missionary responsibility. Yet, at the same time our staff has been seriously short handed, and much of the initial work is yet to be done. If we are to meet a doubled responsibility we will have to have our vision sharpened and our faith strengthened. The new Yungas work, started just over three years ago, and manned by only one missionary family, has just reported an estimated number of 500 believers and 18 churches established! The recent visit to the field by Everett Heacock and his daughter Virginia Helm has been of great benefit and blessing to the mission and staff of missionaries, as well as to all of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The coming of Charles and Charlotte Scott to join our missionary staff has surely been ordered of the Lord, in this time of our need for more workers.

The Board of Missions, with its president and field secretary, Walter Lee, is continuing to make a most significant and valuable contribution to the cause of Christ through the church.

The Christian Education Board has done much toward the revitalization of our church life, especially through the Sunday School. The board is carrying out a long-range, well planned and rather extensive program which already has paid big dividends in the growth of Sunday School interest and attendance throughout our Yearly Meeting. The board's visitation program has succeeded where it has been conscientiously worked.

We have just concluded another successful schedule of youth camps throughout our Yearly Meeting. Well over 1000 have attended these summer camps. I would strongly urge every pastor and every adult in the church to promote and encourage the work of our young Friends, for herein lies, without doubt, the greatest potential factor for the future growth and well-being of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Happy is the church that has a live, growing youth program. There is an urgency in the matter of challenging our youth to full time Christian service. We will have young people dedicated to do God's service, when the church provides a warm, fervent atmosphere conducive to hearing and obeying God's call.

This has been a year of destiny for George Fox College. The debt liquidation drive, which has come so near to successful completion, the accreditation effort, for which we must still work and pray, the raising of standards in every area of college life, the spiritual life on the campus, all of these have worked toward increasing the confidence and support of the Yearly Meeting people. God has singularly used the leadership of Milo Ross and his staff at the college to bring the school to its present encouraging position.

Reports from Greenleaf Academy are heartening. Christian education for high-schoolers is just as vital as it is for college students.

There ought to be a renewed interest among Friends in the Christian education of our youth.

Several of our ministerial students are choosing Western Evangelical Seminary as their school for advanced studies in the field of theology and related subjects. We are represented officially in this seminary by Yearly Meeting appointment of two Friends to its board of trustees. Our long range look at future Quaker contribution to graduate academic training for our ministers and Christian leaders should at least include the establishment of a Friends Seminary Foundation with the endowment of a Friends chair on the teaching staff of a seminary where such a plan could be carried out with mutual satisfaction.

The concern of Friends for those in their later years is being expressed through the establishment of Friendsview Manor, Incorporated, and its Board of Directors. Charles Beals has been released from pastoral duties at the Newberg church for a period of three months to concentrate his efforts toward completing the number of signatures necessary to insure the possibility of erecting the Manor building. The Yearly Meeting has a big stake in this projected plan, and we should give our full support to the director and his board.

In spite of the serious financial recession throughout the country, the Yearly Meeting treasurer's report shows an increase in receipts for the year over that of a year ago. When Friends are informed of the needs, and challenged to meet them, I believe every need will be met. We should never feel we have reached the limit. High achievement only extends our horizons of vision, and spurs us on to higher goals.

This past year has ushered mankind into another new era, the space age. People are now thinking in terms of interplanetary travel, and trusting more and more in the false security of scientific development. The world has faced one breath-taking crisis after another, as the most powerful nations of the globe have sought co-existence on a humanitarian level. All the man-made organizations designed to bring order out of chaos have failed, and the church of Jesus Christ alone has the answer. It is this Gospel of redeeming love through an all-sufficient Savior that the church much preach, teach, and demonstrate, if any impact is to be made upon the Christless world of our day.

It is true that we stand in an awful need of spiritual revival. It is also true that God's people stand in serious need of an entire, and complete dedication to Christ and His cause. If the church is powerless, it is because we are not yielded fully to the source of power. If the church is cold it is because we have alienated ourselves from the warmth of an intimate acquaintance and personal, daily fellowship with God through the Spirit. If the church is dying, it is because the springing life of the Spirit is denied by those who refuse to give their wills over fully to God.

Friends, there is a price to pay if we want the church to move forward. It is nothing less than entire commitment and consecration to God which always will bring the life, and presence, and power of the Spirit of God.

Oregon Yearly Meeting was brought into being 66 years ago for the express purpose of providing a means by which the local Friends

meetings could join hearts and hands in a task bigger than anyone of their local churches. Today, the Yearly Meeting stands for exactly that same purpose. The Yearly Meeting is simply an extension of each of its local churches in the burdens and concerns which are there expressed. It is simply a means of closer cooperation and fellowship, for the purpose of doing together what we cannot do alone.

When I look for a place to invest my prayers, my interest, my dollars, and my time, for a spiritual outreach beyond my local meeting, and beyond my own reach as an individual, I find a complete satisfaction in knowing that the "united missions" program of Oregon Yearly Meeting is worthy of my investment.

Let us band ourselves together as never before, to be united in Christ, and with one another, that we may fulfill His prayer that we be a holy people, and that we be witnesses unto all men everywhere.

● 45. Returning minutes were read for Ray K. and Lavell Fitch, and for Walter R. Williams. These were approved.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 46. Walter P. Lee introduced the program of the Board of Missions with the report of the Missionary Field Secretary.

The Board of Missions, with Walter Lee president, presented the following report:

FIELD REPORT

The past year has been one of change on the Bolivian field, but yet there has been liberty. Bolivia's political health is still quite critical but financial aid from the U.S. has the boliviano fairly well established at 8850 to one dollar. The government has been more than lenient in granting freedom of worship although enforcing it has been a trifle strained at times.

Seven missionary couples have staffed three stations: La Paz, Yungas and Copajira. Work has also been started on the Peruvian shore of Lake Titicaca but suffered somewhat of a set-back when David Thomas was confined to the hospital with infectious hepatitis.

This third year of the work in the Yungas has seen the greatest growth yet and opportunities are limitless. The new Yungas Quarterly Meeting was organized at the sessions of Junta Anual this year with twenty church groups, three of which are recognized as Monthly Meetings. The attendance reaches over 500. Pastoral help is limited, with the majority of preaching points being filled by workers from the local congregation or others sent from Yungas churches.

The Lord continues to place His stamp of approval on the Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School at Copajira. Every Quarterly Meeting of the field was represented in the student body. A change in school policy eliminated the third year students from attendance this year. Instead, they were placed in positions given them by the Mesa Directiva out over the field. Their return next year to the third year studies, depends upon the successful completion of this trial year. Eighteen young men were engaged in this

phase of the program while 26 were enrolled as first year students and 26 in the second year class. Seven enrolled for post graduate studies. Six graduates received diplomas and all eighteen of the practice students sent regular and satisfactory reports of their activities. Carmelo Aspi was selected as the first full-time national teacher and filled the place very acceptably.

A short term school was again conducted for girls, with a record attendance of 71. Three young women of the Wycliff Translators assisted the women of our own mission staff as teachers. Two of them also assisted in the school held for pastors' and workers' wives when 18 women, with their 14 children, attended classes for the first time.

The Day School, reflecting the growth in the national church, included ten new schools this year making a total of 25, with an enrollment of 644. The schools have been approximately 85% self supporting. For the first time all the teaching positions have been filled with our teachers, without taking the leftovers from other school systems. An educational committee under the national church has been set up with a representative from each Quarterly Meeting serving with the national church secretary of education. This development should work for more efficiency and begin the shift of responsibility for direction and implementation of the educational program to the nationals. To comply with recent government regulations, 15 teachers have recently enrolled in a Correspondence Course given by the ministry of education, as a requirement to teaching 5th and 6th grades.

Some form of medical aid is given in all parts of our field. At Copajira the past year, aid was given to both the Bible School students and outsiders, daily. Other help was given as possible when need arose. In the Yungas, thousands have been treated. This has been a direct means of winning many to the Lord, as along with the medicine, the Great Physician has been presented to those who know Him not.

With the nationals assuming responsibility in the construction program, this work has moved forward more rapidly without undue strain on missionary personnel. From seven to nine churches or buildings have been under construction continually. Six new rooms were added for more sleeping quarters at the yearly meeting grounds besides improvements on those built last year.

The blessing of the Lord has been very evident on the farm the past year. In spite of late rains at planting time, early frosts in the potatoes, and scattered hail, the harvest brought these returns: 3,670 bushels of beardless barley, 2,950 bushels of common barley, 165 bushels of oats, and 122 tons of potatoes. The gardens have been excellent, furnishing vegetables for 52 students.

The past eight years have seen steady progress toward our indigenous goal. God has lifted up just the type of national men to form a quality basis for gradual growth. The membership has reached 1,074 with a Sunday school attendance of 3,000 in 85 churches and preaching points. The national church has developed itself into committees for handling church construction, education, stewardship, literature and evangelism. The past year it was 76% self supporting.

MOODY MONTHLY is featuring our national church organization

in their fall issue as one of the outstandingly successful indigenous church programs on today's mission fields. This will later be incorporated into a book explaining modern indigenous church methods.

An increasing amount of a missionary workload is being assumed by the national church organization, which in itself, is powerless, yet serves as the instrument for guiding Spirit-filled Aymara men and women into opportune areas of evangelism and effective ministry in a pagan society. The day may soon arrive when it will be possible to set up a Bolivian Yearly Meeting of Friends. When that day comes, it will yet be possible for OYM to pour of her tithes and personnel into a vigorous outreach and leadership training effort of evangelism with the assurance (that few missions have), that the results will be held and nurtured in a proper, established church framework in the Quaker tradition. We are still at the threshold, not the pinnacle, of our opportunity.

Forrest and Orpha Cammack spoke briefly giving their testimonies. Jack and Geraldine Willcuts spoke of their confidence in the Lord and His providences as they return home to take up pastoral duties and other work. Ralph and Marie Chapman told of their definite leading in the matter of entering the field of Christian service in the printing field.

Marie Chapman and Gladys Cook demonstrated a unique use of the new missionary map.

Our missionaries under appointment, Charles and Charlotte Scott, were introduced.

A question and answer period was conducted with our new missionaries asking questions and the other missionaries giving the answers. Following this, Charles Scott spoke briefly concerning their call.

Our work among the American Indians at Sprague River, Oregon, has been transferred from the Board of Evangelism to the Board of Missions. Evert Tuning, who with his wife Virena is returning to minister there, spoke of the challenge of that work.

The report of the Board of Missions was approved.

● 47. The representatives nominated Walter P. Lee and Lawrence McCracken to the Board of Missions for a term of three years. Approved.

● 48. The meeting adjourned to meet Saturday at 9:30 a.m.

● 52. Kenneth Wesche, Dean of Western Evangelical Seminary, spoke regarding the seminary where several of our ministers have received their training.

BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

● 53. The Board of Public Relations, with J. Russel Stands, presented its report as follows:

The Board of Public Relations, soon to be known as the Board of Moral Action, presents its report by means of a challenge to the importance of this phase of the Lord's work in every church. We are reminded of the scripture in Zech. 4:6, "Not by might, nor by power but by my spirit saith the Lord."

The work of this board has been in the areas of Public Morals with Virginia Helm as chairman, Literature with Harold Ankeny as chairman, Education with Ludlow Corbin as chairman, and Legislative with John Roberts as chairman.

The work of evangelism in the church is not fully effective unless our people are informed and are doing something in these areas of work. Our children, young people and adults who come to know Christ as their Savior and Sanctifier need to be informed of the dangers in lowering moral standards and the harmful effects of tobacco, alcohol and drugs upon the human life. We need to be informed concerning good and bad literature. Education has become a primary factor in the realm of our society. We cannot make good Christian citizens unless we are properly informed concerning government proceedings. We must stand behind our government leaders and our convictions at all times.

It would be impossible for us to present all phases of this work in our allotted time, therefore our presentation this year will come under the department of Public Morals.

Department of Public Morals—Virginia Helm, superintendent

We feel that progress has been made in the field of public morals during the past year. There were 44 meetings which sent in reports. Missing were Caldwell, Homedale, Hayden Lake, Quincy, Nehalem, Sherwood, Tigard, Agnew, Highland Ave., Newport, Scotts Mills and Forest Home. The reports of some of the above which are outposts may have been included with that of the home meeting but this was not indicated.

The reports of the previous year were studied and suggestions or problems were given special consideration as material for the new year was chosen and sent out quarterly, emphasizing the special goals suggested for that three month period, along with letters with material which we hoped would be helpful. In spite of our efforts to see that every pastor and/or each Public Relations chairman received this material, two meetings (Rosedale and Vancouver) reported that the letters and pamphlets were not put into the hands of the public morals committee chairman or someone else responsible for this teaching. It was observed that activity in this field slackened, in most cases, when there had been a chairmanship of the committee. We suggest that the retiring chairman and the pastor brief a new worker on the responsibilities of the committee, pointing him to the handbook for committee chairmen which gives the purposes, goals and helpful suggestions for the work of the committee. This year a copy of the annual report questions are also included to make planning much easier.

According to the 1958 reports of the 44 meetings, the program of 13 meetings seems to have been improved by the material sent to them while 29 others used the material a little or found it of some

help. Many are still scattering the sample tracts out, instead of using them for committee study and possible reordering for greater distribution in the church, Sunday schools and youth groups.

There were 370 temperance presentations of films, object lessons, flannelgraphs, sermons, skits and C.E. lessons; 20 meetings showed a marked improvement in temperance emphasis. There are still those who, by the absence of a report, the emptiness or negative aspect of their report or by outright confession seem to believe that temperance teaching has little place in the work of the church, since these matters should be taken care of after a person is first won to Christ. To these we prayerfully recommend Goal 3 on page 20 of the handbook, that they may see that people can be won to both Christ and a better way of living simultaneously within the walls of the church. Where homes and school fail, the church must fill in with facts which will educate the ignorant (Goal 5) about the harmfulness of narcotics in "the temples of the Holy Spirit."

Nearly 6000 tracts were given out in our meetings, as well as many books circulated. There are as few as 116 volumes in our church libraries which are on public morals subjects, and few of these circulated save the 37 new additions this past year. We would do well to display and advertise our temperance literature better during the coming year.

There was an increased interest in legislation involving public morals, 34 meetings reporting active interest and 72 public or bulletin announcements about issues of action needed. Eight meetings showed a marked improvement in their work in this field. Both group and individual letters were sent to those with public responsibility.

The sacredness of marriage and morality before marriage which has been emphasized for the past two years, seems to have become a concern of many. Seventeen meetings reported material used in the Christian Endeavor societies, 14 had lessons in the Sunday school classes, 8 meetings circulated books, and others had discussions, sermons, and distributed tracts of help to young people. Twenty-six meetings showed an increased activity in this important education.

The five filmstrips owned by the Yearly Meeting were used more than 15 times by various meetings and one meeting purchased five filmstrips for its own use. Many members of our churches were active in Christ-centered temperance organizations and showed concern about the selling of liquor and cigarettes to minors, buying in groceries where beer is not sold, protesting obscene literature and undesirable radio and TV programs and advertising. Public morals committees led at least five prayer meetings, which seems to be an excellent suggestion for all of our meetings since prayer is our valuable weapon against the invisible foe of social evils.

Our goals for the coming year are listed in the handbook and suggested material will be sent to attempt to reach every person who needs temperance teaching in our churches and communities. This is a new approach but it has merit and we pray that each member of the Yearly Meeting will rally to make the world a better place in which to live.

Department of Literature—Harold Ankeny, superintendent

This department is responsible for the emphasizing of the use of good literature in our churches. It will be our plan next year to concentrate on the reading of the best book in the world—the Bible. The discouraging of the reading of poor literature will be left with the public morals department.

Out of the 45 churches reporting all indicated they had some kind of a library. Five indicated that their library was not functioning and many others thought that their library could stand improvement. In these libraries there are 4590 volumes. 365 volumes were added within the past year, to these libraries.

One important phase of church publicity is being neglected in the use of literature displays, such as the use of tracts, doctrinal pamphlets and denominational papers. Twenty-six churches indicated that they had no literature display. Others said that they had not room for any. May I say that a wall rack is better than none. These can be built or purchased cheaply. May I encourage all the churches to get one made, or in use. Also, in connection with this, very few churches subscribe to any magazine as a church. Of course most of the churches buy Sunday school literature, but as a church there are no current magazines available in the library. If your church library is in a room where the magazines can be kept, then may I encourage you to subscribe to several good Christian magazines.

The question on the type of magazine subscriptions was misleading so rather than report inaccurately, may I say that I believe the religious magazines and papers out-number the secular magazines.

May we be sure that our reading is of the very best.

Thirty-six churches have no definite Bible reading program. Six of the other nine churches did not answer the question and three stated that they were having some program. This is of major importance. To the question "How many people read the Bible through last year?" only 66 answered "yes." Twenty of this number were from one church and six from another. Let each church inaugurate a Bible reading program this year. Keep your minds and hearts pure with pure reading.

Department of Education—Ludlow Corbin, superintendent

This year 48 meetings reported, compared with 51 last year. The following table compares the 1957 statistics with 1958:

Since this year's report has three less meetings than last year's report, the 1958 facts above as compared with 1957 facts are not as significant as they might be. However, even with three less reports there is an increase of 51 in the pre-school children, an increase of nine in the number of teachers in Christian schools, and an increase of four in the George Fox College students.

The items of special interest to the Yearly Meeting from this report are: (1) the ever-increasing number of children who deserve the best in Christian education; (2) the large number (149) of our young people who are attending college, seminary and professional schools who need encouragement and counseling—counseling especially how they can best serve Christ and the church, since too often they are lost to the church during this period; (3) the growing number of Friends who are becoming teachers in public schools (129) and in Christian schools (49) is challenging. This area of Christian service can have a great impact upon the local community. We are still encouraging the organization of Christian Teachers' Fellowships wherever possible. Last spring we helped in the organization of such a teachers' fellowship in the Portland area. We should also be very glad to help any community in the Yearly Meeting to organize a chapter if they would write to us their concern.

Department of Legislation—John M. Roberts, superintendent

The nature and purpose of this committee is such that our report must cover each of the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho separately, dealing with problems relative to legislation in each of the States as well as on a national level.

During the past year the principle activity of this committee has been the work of Kelsey Hinshaw relative to the Capital Punishment issue before the State of Oregon. A printing of 2000 copies was made of the pamphlet on Capital Punishment written by Dr. Arthur Roberts, and about 1500 of these have been distributed.

Looking forward to the General Election this fall and the sessions of legislatures that will follow, it is the desire of this committee to be able to work with the Quarterly Meeting superintendents of Public Relations and with the pastors to help keep our people alerted to those issues on which we as Christians and Quakers should be vocal and to encourage the active use of our own personal influence in favor of true morality, especially as we have opportunity to direct such influence toward those who represent us in government.

There is much to be done. We pray for understanding, that we may serve effectively.

Arthur Roberts read a paper he has prepared on Capital Punishment, which very clearly upholds the stand taken in our 1957 minutes against Capital Punishment.

Virginia Helm presented our responsibility for public morals education in our churches. She used a very impressive object

lesson illustrating this, and closed with a timely original poem.

The report of the Board of Public Relations was accepted.

● 54. The morning inspirational hour opened with singing, "Hallelujah, What a Savior."

Walter Williams continued with his study from Ephesians. We are God's workmanship. God is using His limitless power in the building of His body, the church. This is a continuous work. Chapter two shows the material with which He has to build—"We are all by nature the children of wrath." But His power is transforming. If God be in it, there is no impossibility. "By grace are ye saved through faith, not of works, lest any man should boast." Then comes the key verse of this section: "For we are His workmanship, created unto good works." He wants us to be good samples of His workmanship. With Jesus Christ as the chief Cornerstone, "we are all builded together for an habitation of God through the Spirit."

The meeting closed with singing, "I Know Whom I Have Believed." Marion Cook gave the benediction.

● 55. After a time of silent meditation, J. Russel Stands and our clerk Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

● 56. The Executive Committee presents the following named persons to serve on the Board of Trustees of Western Evangelical Seminary: for two years, Gerald Dillon; for one year, Myron Goldsmith.

● 57. The Yearly Meeting meeting on Ministry and Oversight submitted the following:

It is proposed that we submit to the Yearly Meeting for its approval and for inclusion in the new Constitution and Discipline the following:

Add to Part II, Chapter III, Section I, subsection A, paragraph 8, page 58, these additional sentences:

It may also, at its own discretion, hold over a name for a period of one year in order to satisfy itself more fully as to the general fitness of the person recommended. In such a case it shall, through a special committee appointed from among its members for the purpose, endeavor to instruct and encourage the one under consideration toward the complete satisfaction of all requirements.

This was approved to be included in the new Discipline, the rule of changes in Discipline to be held over for one year to be set aside for this occasion.

● 58. The new Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting, as proposed and presented at Yearly Meeting sessions in 1957, being held over one year and again presented in these sessions, was approved. (See minute 21)

● 59. The representatives recommend that the request from Portland Quarterly Meeting concerning a new definition or ruling regarding non-resident members, be referred to the Executive Committee for study during the coming year. Approved. (See minute 13)

● 60. The following nominations to the George Fox College Board of Trustees:

From the Board of Trustees—Arnold Owen, Dean Gregory,

GREENLEAF ACADEMY

● 70. The Greenleaf Academy program was presented by Principal Charleton Smitherman as he introduced a girls' trio who sang, "Precious Hiding Place."

The principal's report was read by Anna Mills, faculty member and school secretary, and appears below:

Greenleaf Friends Academy completed its 50th year with Commencement exercises held May 29, 1958.

While there were many outstanding achievements, perhaps of greatest significance was the fact that the highest enrollment was attained in the school's history. A total of 115 regular full time day students attended which was more than a 55% increase over the previous year. Aside from these approximately 25 elementary pupils received private music instruction. This unusual growth is attributed to a number of factors. Increases in school population, contact work, operation of a school bus, but perhaps of greatest importance was the growing concern of parents regarding moral standards in various home communities.

A break-down on the student body reveals about 65 who were Friends or representative of Friends churches. The remaining 50 students came from 10 separate denominations. Five students came from out of the state with the remaining 110 being residents

of Boise Valley or other sections of Idaho.

The number of boarding students was kept at a minimum partly as a result of the operation of a bus. A daily route by way of Boise, Nampa, and Caldwell provided regular transportation at a minimum of cost and thus enabled approximately 40 students to attend the academy and still reside in their own homes. Many of this number would have been unable to attend otherwise.

Staff

The teaching staff consisted of seven full time members. Of this group all plan to return as either full or part time instructors for the coming school year. New additions to the staff are John Lyda and John N. Carr. John Lyda is a former graduate of Greenleaf Academy and a recent graduate of George Fox College. His teaching duties will be largely in the field of science and mathematics.

John Carr, a Friends minister and teacher, comes from Penrose, Colorado. He will be head of the English department and assist with music. Mr. Carr is an accomplished musician and has taught for several years.

At this point we express appreciation to Mr. Guy Delamarter for his several years of faithful service as caretaker of the academy and church. Upon his recent retirement the position was filled by the hiring of Lynn Hockett of the local community.

Curriculum

No major changes were made in the course of study. Two new classes were offered in the field of industrial arts. These were woodworking and mechanical drawing. Plans for the coming year will result in a full time librarian and the addition of a course in chemistry.

Mr. Shown, Secondary School Inspector from the State Department of Education, visited the school in February and reported favorably on the work being done. Continued accreditation was granted.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Our choir was well received under the able direction of Mrs. Leona Gwynn. The spring concert schedule was arranged with the help of interested pastors of Boise Valley on an inter-denominational basis.

Several musical groups entered and earned honorable recognition at the District Music Festival held in April.

In the field of athletics a three-sport program was carried out. Emphasis was made on football and basketball as one member of the faculty assisted the regular coach in supervising these two sports. A successful season in both sports with wins as well as losses and good local support created a great deal of interest in the athletic program.

The academy was privileged to play host to the Skyline Basketball Tournament held in March and received the Sportsmanship Trophy as well as taking second place. It was also our privilege to again sponsor the Canyon County Rural Grade Tournament.

Physical Improvements

Continued progress in the building program has brought a number of beneficial changes. The newly constructed fireproof vault is a contribution made possible by the Boise and Greenleaf Quarterly Meetings. While the initial purpose was for storage of the

church records, it is also serving a long need of the academy, that of preserving student scholastic records and other valuable data.

The spacious new office was a result of the same general plan which included the vault but made possible by the initial donation of the late Grace A. Scott, whose request was for some permanent improvement to the school.

The gymnasium-auditorium reached a step nearer completion with all four dressing rooms, the stage and adjoining rooms being plastered and fixtures added.

Further improvement was made on the athletic field by filling and grading, thus solving a drainage problem and providing a more suitable baseball diamond.

The student body sponsored a fall festival and raised sufficient money to purchase beautiful new choir robes and stoles depicting the schools colors, cardinal and black.

Other pieces of equipment such as shop tools, maps and teaching aids were added.

Several hundred dollars have been designated in next years' budget for improvement of the science department and the library.

Spiritual Growth

From the spiritual point of view, it was a good year. Daily chapel services or student prayer meetings were held. Our local pastor, Oscar Brown, spoke once each week and was faithful in encouraging any who might have need. Other pastors and visiting speakers were present for a number of the chapel services.

Several of the chapel periods resulted in real spiritual victory for many as the students were faithful in rendering personal testimony. Faculty members were willing and ready to counsel and encourage any who might stand in need of spiritual help.

The spring revival with Roy Clark, held in cooperation with the local church, proved a blessing to practically every member of the student body.

An active Youth for Christ group carried on an inspiring program throughout the entire year. Many of the students assisted regularly in the Saturday evening deputation program visiting Caldwell nursing homes and the jail. This program is sponsored by the Greenleaf church with Harold Ankeny as leader of the group.

In general, we believe that the spiritual tone of the student body was high and serious disciplinary infractions were less than in previous years.

Financial

The operating budget for the 1957-58 school term was set at \$21,500 exclusive of all fees and departmental funds, of which \$14,000 is derived from tuitions and \$7500 from the Greenleaf Monthly Meeting budget. Of this total, \$18,000 is designated for salaries and the balance of \$3500 for other operating expenses. With payment of a few outstanding tuitions it is anticipated that the budget will have been met in full by the time the new school term opens.

Teacher salaries remain unchanged.

Tuitions have been increased by \$10.00 each semester making the semester cost \$85.00. This is effective for the coming year. General fees of \$10.00 per year remain the same as before.

The annual gymnasium benefit sale was held in March with pro-

ceeds totaling \$4282.04. Other contributions to that fund totaled \$635.02. The total indebtedness on the gymnasium now stands at \$5450.00 with all other bills paid to date.

Graduates

As the school year drew to a close, 17 seniors received diplomas. More than half of these plan to enter college this fall, with perhaps the majority choosing George Fox College.

An unusually large percentage of Greenleaf graduates continue their education each year and in general we feel that a good relationship exists between the academy and George Fox College.

Summary

Gratitude is expressed to the Board of Trustees for their faithful interest and labor. Also to the many friends, alumni and interested individuals for their prayers, words of encouragement and gifts, we hereby acknowledge.

Greenleaf Academy does, however, have its problems. Financing is limited and places a heavy burden on a comparative few. Salaries are inadequate in themselves to support a family. Securing and retaining qualified faculty members is a constant problem though much improved over some previous years. Locating homes for boarding students poses an annual problem. Winter work for students is scarce. Striving to maintain high spiritual and scholastic standards in the student body and determining fair disciplinary procedures all require a great amount of Christian wisdom of faculty members. For all of these and many other problems we need your interest and prayers.

Baccalaureate service was held Sunday evening, May 25, with Rev. Hubert Mardock bringing the sermon. Commencement exercises took place on May 29 with Rev. Charles Beals delivering the address to the graduates.

The new school term is scheduled to open on September 8 with anticipation of another good year both in enrollment and accomplishments to be made.

John Roberts, president of Alumni Association commemorating the 50th anniversary of Greenleaf Academy, read interesting excerpts from Monthly Meeting and academy board records, giving highlights of the half century of progress; appearing below:

It is with a sense of gratitude to God for His blessing and His leadership that we have this year observed the completion of 50 years of continuous operation of Greenleaf Academy. The theme of the alumni banquet this spring was "Our Golden Year." As you have just heard the principal's report for this last year I think you have noted that it has indeed been a golden year. If the course of the school through the years were plotted on a graph, I suppose there would be some up's and down's, not only in the lines indicating enrollment but also the spiritual tone of the school, but I am sure that while the enrollment line was reaching its highest point this year, the line indicating spiritual tone was also running high—perhaps as high as it has been, at least in recent years. This observation is not intended to reflect upon the record of past years but to point out that there has been growth, as there should be from

the experience of the past.

Luella Beals Brown once wrote in a review of the history of Greenleaf Academy that "History in the making is seldom interesting," but from this vantage point of 50 years, we can look back upon many interesting developments. In this view we are inclined to rather forget the extent of sacrifice and to overlook much of the spiritual concern that I am sure was an impelling or compelling factor in the beginning of Greenleaf Academy. There is not time in this session to rehearse in detail the early history of the institution, and the cold records very probably do not name all the individuals who were a part of that drama of pioneering development. Neither do they convey to the casual reader more than a glimpse of the sacrifice and dedication of purpose of those early settlers. I do not suppose that those early founders were so much interested in the fact that they were making Friends' history, as they were with the fact that there was a need to be met in providing educational opportunity with a Christian emphasis and in a Christian environment.

We want in this service to honor the memory of those who gave themselves and of their means to bring to reality this institution and to nourish it until it became a fruitful vine. I should like in the next few minutes to mention some of the highlights of the past fifty years and to recognize at least those who were present at the time of the beginning. In reading the records one finds that the story of the founding is almost inseparable from the history of the early days of Greenleaf Monthly Meeting, then known as Mountain View Monthly Meeting.

I understand that while Anson Cox, the first pastor of the meeting, was still in Texas, he became concerned for Friends education and upon visiting Boise Valley talked with J. Will Jones about the possibility of a school here. While riding along the bench one day, William Brown dismounted from his horse and knelt in the sage brush not far from this very spot and prayed to God that a church and school might be established here.

In 1908 Cora Beals made known her intention of teaching her own children and offered to take other students in the community. Perhaps this was the impetus needed to start the ball to actually rolling, for on September 29, 1908, a committee was appointed at prayer meeting to begin work on starting a Friends Academy.

The following excerpts from the early minutes of Mountain View Monthly Meeting and the minutes of the academy board will provide a documentary account of the early history of the school. From the minutes of Mountain View Monthly Meeting held 10-17-08:

"This meeting adopts the action taken at prayer meeting September 29, 1908, in regard to starting a Friends Academy and confirm the names of William Brown, Edwin McGrew, Isaac J. Beals and Benjamin Cary as a partial board of managers, and they are directed to propose to next meeting the names of five persons to complete the board of managers, also to propose a plan for the organization of said academy."

"Mountain View Monthly Meeting held 11-21-1908. The partial board of managers of Greenleaf Academy nominate the following persons to complete the board: Seth A. Mills, Grace Wilson, Erma Rinard, Thomas Perisho and Arthur Street. The nominations are 28

accepted."

From the minutes of the academy board October 21, 1908:

"Meeting opened with prayer. Upon motion it was unanimously decided to proceed with plans for opening a school for 9th and 10th grade pupils, to be held in the church building and to be opened if possible on first Monday in November."

"November 1, 1908. Benjamin Cary was authorized to look after lumber for tables, etc. Edwin McGrew and Arthur Street were appointed committee on printing. Edwin McGrew was authorized to write Perry Macy to come take charge of the school and to advise that compensation for same should be not less than \$40 per month. The printing committee was authorized to procure necessary text books. The committee decided to provide classes for 8th grade work this year."

"November 8, 1908. Upon motion William Brown was instructed to purchase a good record book and to place therein complete record of all matters pertaining to the work of the board. . . Upon motion Grace Wilson was elected treasurer of the board. Rates of tuition were based as follows: 1st term of two months \$6.00, 2nd term of three months \$10.00, 3rd term of three months \$10.00. Full year of eight months in advance, \$25.00. Thomas Perisho and Isaac Beals were, upon motion, appointed to look up question of providing shelter for horses of students."

(Official opening of school was November 10, 1908.)

"January 15, 1909. The committee appointed to draft a constitution presented their report and on motion of Grace Wilson is accepted. On motion of Cary the secretary read the proposed constitution and it was adopted."

Mountain View Monthly Meeting 1-16-1909.

"The academy board presented a constitution which was read and adopted with the exception of Article 2 which was referred back to them for additions."

Academy Board, June 19, 1909.

"Upon motion it was decided to recommend to the Monthly Meeting that we proceed to put up an academy building."

Greenleaf Monthly Meeting, 6-19-1909.

"The academy board laid the matter of putting up a building separate from the church building before us. The meeting endorses the action of the academy board, to go and solicit funds for the building of the same as early as possible."

Academy Board, October 4, 1909.

"... After some discussion it was decided by vote that the building be planned for 32x32x22 and an 8 ft. basement. Monday, October 11, was set to clear the brush and locate building site. Thomas Perisho was chosen to oversee the work of building."

"October 11, 1909. Board met at grounds and located building site."

"October 29, 1909. By consent it was agreed to have spread on the secretary's book the decision of location of academy building at the meeting of October 11. The seven members present agreed that the building should be 100 ft. west from the center of Main St. and ____ ft. north of the church lot."

We find in the record of August 2, 1910 a report from Thomas Perisho on subscriptions giving the academy at Oregon Yearly

Meeting. If time permitted the list of names would be quite interesting to many, I'm sure.

The records contain many entries which possess a great deal of human interest. One such item is found in the entry for September 7, 1912: "President reports purchase of 10 ton nut coal and two ton lump coal at \$7.50 per ton and hired Ray Moon to put same in basement at 25¢ per ton."

Many more interesting quotes could be made if there were time. I note that the name "Greenleaf" is first used in the records on June 19, 1909. In 1913 Frank Roberts was called as teacher and eventually gave some 18 years of his life to Greenleaf Academy.

The year 1917 was eventful, for at that time the size of the school building was doubled, the Alumni Association sponsored the purchase of the bell and the Greenleaf Seminary Corporation was set up with the name of the school being changed to Greenleaf Seminary. This arrangement existed until November of 1927 when the Seminary Corporation was dissolved and the school once again became Greenleaf Academy. At about this time the academy was included in the list of accredited high schools of Idaho, a matter which had been considered and deferred a number of times in the years previous. It has maintained its accredited status since that time.

Another notable advance was made with the building of the first gymnasium in 1929. The years following this saw a gradual growth and broadening of the curriculum and increase of extra-curricular activity.

In September of 1947 a new building committee was appointed and ground was broken for the new building in the summer of 1948. This building was completed and occupied debt free in the spring of 1951. The following year it was deemed necessary to replace the old frame gymnasium and the present building was built, being in-closed in time for the sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting that summer (1952). There remains at present an indebtedness of something over \$5000 on this building.

Greenleaf Academy has come a long way in the last fifty years. Although the present academy board would think it exceedingly easy to raise a budget such as that of 1908 or 1910, I have marveled in reading the records, at what must have been really sacrificial giving on the part of many in those early days. Greenleaf Academy passed through a number of years of quite steady but determined plodding, it seemed, but is now finding a greatly broadened field of opportunity and we trust that she will continue to serve under God to the eternal credit of those founders whom we honor today and for the increase of the kingdom of God on the earth.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

● 71. Milo Ross, president of George Fox College, presented his report as follows:

The piercing scrutiny of analysis is often difficult to come by when one is so intimately involved. One cannot see the orchard for the trees. There may be a proneness to over-estimate, or under-evaluate, or even to make extravagant claims, such as "This is the best year for the college," or "High school youth are not prepared to enter as freshmen," or "There is a better situation of serious

study than ever before." The fortunes of college life rise and fall as regards the climate of scholarship, of student opinion, of the thrust of faculty motivation, of the adequacy of the program; for a college community has so many variables and so many factors difficult of control.

Is our college keeping pace with the bounding strides in higher education? Are our spiritual and moral aims, as delineated in our catalog and through our tradition, being realized in the lives of our graduates? Is the Friends Church receiving value received on its investment of prayer, concern, and money? Will the school be able to preserve its heritage and yet minister increasingly to the community? Can a small constituency rise to the support so that we can be ready for the future demands? Can a devoted and sacrificial faculty be expected to pay a major share in the education of our youth without irreparably damaging themselves and the institution?

This year our direction has changed from that of internal adjustment, doing things over and over which should have been done years ago, with all of the attendant frustrations, until we have caught up with ourselves and are now looking to the future. The climate has changed. Particular statements will come in due course of the report.

New Procedures

This is the first year of the operation of the college under the new constitution and bylaws. Thirty men, nominated by the board itself, the Oregon Yearly Meeting, and the Alumni Association, and duly elected by Oregon Yearly Meeting, have functioned with great concern and loyalty. It is to you men that the administration, our church, and the entire constituency look for the dynamic leadership, vision, and support which are so greatly needed for the future success of the institution which we all love.

The student body has also functioned under a new constitution and bylaws. I must say that the broad features of the new plan were brilliantly conceived and executed by the students of last year under the direction of Dean Williams, and this one factor alone has changed the entire temper of student activities.

The greatest accomplishment building-wise was the construction of the Student Union. According to Dr. Coffin of Cornell, "father" of the student union movement in American colleges, ours is the smallest college with a full-fledged facility. Total cost to May 24, including the construction, furnishing, and operation since the first of the year total \$38,711.79. All construction bills are paid except \$50. A vote of thanks should go to the Herbert Mott Foundation for its generous gift, to the board and especially the building and grounds committee, to Mr. C. M. Curtis, general contractor, for the excellent and honest construction and his donations, to the many sub-contractors and building firms which gave special consideration, to E. M. Heacock and Wilbert Eichenberger, to the city engineer, Mr. Weller Pobasco, to the Portland General Electric Company, to the student body for voting their assessments, to the student council and its new student union board, and to the faculty-student decoration committee, to Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hazelle, and to Arthur Winters for his many hours of labor beyond the call of duty. The construction of the one building, setting a standard of

excellence for the future and providing for a finer social life, has done more than any one thing to raise morale, elicit community support, and produce a situation of satisfaction.

Faculty and Staff

The loyalty, concern, consecration, and service of our entire faculty and staff are amazing. Many could work in institutions where the salaries are greater, and many have. We presently have people on our payroll who left positions in larger institutions, and where the salary was anywhere from \$500 to \$3,000 more than George Fox College pays. It is a source of humbling joy to work with such people.

The faculty seminars, business meetings and conference were all well ordered. We believe that, compared to many institutions, there is a great deal accomplished by the faculty through committees and assignments. There is very little turnover. All full-time people have elected to stay on, with the exception of Miss Charlotte Macy, who will give her full time to the church at Silverton. Scott T. Clark, after a half century of able leadership in church and school, as a scholar, teacher, minister of the Word, and administrator, is retiring from active service. His present position has been that of Professor of Greek, but he has also taught a variety of subjects, including sociology, history, Biblical courses, and without parallel among living evangelical Friends. Our college honors him, and wishes him and his wife, Grace, a very beautiful and gracious number of years beyond this formal service.

I believe that each department is manned by capable and adequate people. I hope, however, that a number can be given the opportunity of added graduate work so that their future, and that of the college, will be stronger. Those having taken advanced work during the year are Dean Williams in concluding his Master's work at the University of Oregon, Professor Mackey Hill, who is now very far along on his doctorate at the University of Oregon, Professor Evan Rempel who is doing class work on his doctorate at Oregon State, Miss Caryl Jean Short who finishes her Master's degree in music at Lewis and Clark this weekend, and Miss Genette McNichols who is taking added work in library science at the University of Portland.

Those who have been able to attend professional conventions, institutes and workshops in their disciplines have been myself and Alice, Dean and Mrs. Williams, Professors Mills, Roberts, Beltz and Beltz, Sutton, Tucker, Tieleman, Martin, Willcuts; Mrs. Powell and Miss McNichols, and Mr. Winters.

Major changes in the work of the faculty include greater activity and reliance on the curriculum committee, a liaison committee of faculty and students, especially in regard to handbook regulations, the work of the faculty-student decorating committee, and the assignment by the administration of tasks for the accreditation procedures.

The Dean, Dr. Roberts and myself gave major consideration during the midwinter to developing a program entitled "The Intensified Studies Program," which is an approach to the needs of superior and gifted students.

Miss Mary Sutton has served as registrar ever since Chase

Conover resigned. She has turned her tasks to others on the staff, beginning at the second semester. After taking the advice of administrators in other schools, I have appointed the Dean as Dean-Registrar, and Edna Williams as recorder. She has already made great progress in revamping our system and building a new catalog of permanent records.

The School Year

All classes and courses met fully throughout the year. We were fortunate in enrolling a total of 152 students. The order in the dormitories and in other social relationships was of a high calibre, with few regulatory problems. From the very first, we realized a serious attitude for study which is demonstrated by a better showing in the national norms as established by the Graduate Record Examinations. The student functions, such as the Council meetings, the program of the several clubs and societies, the intramural activities, etc.—all were up-graded to a higher level. Special thanks should be given Dean Williams, the class and club sponsors, the student body led by Dick Mott, and the rank and file of students for their excellent spirit of cooperation.

The academic core of the college is its library and its librarian. Miss Genette McNichols is carrying on the fine work of her predecessors, as the records will clearly show. Total accessions this last year added to 886, with an excellent distribution to all departments, bringing the total active volumes up to nearly 19,000.

The use of the library proved to be one of the highest years in our history if not the highest, as shown by the comparative figures of circulation: 1953-54, 4,422; 1954-55, 4,028; 1955-56, 4,181; 1956-57, 3,845; and this year, 5,594. Credit must be given especially to Dr. Cecilia Martin and others on the faculty who taught their classes in such a manner that the use of the library was essential.

The value of the new audio equipment is being reflected in the increasing use of records in music, speech, foreign languages, and for enjoyment. Significant additions to the library were made from the estate of Cornelia Marvin Pierce, the Rev. Dr. J. D. McCormick, Mrs. Dorothy LeFevre, Dr. John Gearin, Scott Clark, Joan Beltz, Dilla Tucker, L. Earl Deane, myself, and various publishers.

For the first time, we turned our night school program to the General Extension Division of the State, which carried out its classes separate from ours. There is general satisfaction in this, but the record of enrollees is lost to us, of course.

We think that our orientation, testing and counselling programs are exceptional for a small college.

The spiritual life was fostered through chapels, prayer meetings, and several times of spiritual emphases. We profited by the fall and spring religious emphases, and an entire week given over to foreign missions. We sensed a growing concern for more people to do a better job in deputation. Mr. Beltz should be given credit for drilling instrumental groups. The system adopted last year of using the sanction of ineligibility for absences from chapel has worked very well.

Athletics, drama and speech, and music are the major co-curricular activities. There are always problems in the process of assimilation of new personnel, but we have been very gratified in the progress made by the faculty in these areas. Records were

broken in athletics, with greater emphasis upon track and the creation of an intramural program. Our speech people, led by Miss Tucker, placed the highest for a number of years. The choir, after some false starts, did a highly commendable job at the last of the season. For the first time for many years, we carried band through to completion with a full concert under a capable director.

Finances

The one major concern which has overshadowed all others is that of the Debt Liquidation Campaign which at this writing has risen to \$113,000. Of this amount, over \$7,000 is from the pastors of the Yearly Meeting; \$19,000 from members of the board; \$21,000 from alumni; and nearly \$18,000 from the city of Newberg.

The center of gravity has turned to the City of Newberg, with the official drive aimed at \$25,000. Solicitation began the week of June 17. We are working in a very favorable climate locally, with many people having changed their views about the college, and more friends having come to the aid of our school. The combination of \$113,000 for the greatest drive of the college in all its history, the support of the church, and the favorable attitude as expressed by the people of our community, all add up to a situation for which we should humbly thank our God. Especial credit should go to the members of the board and the alumni who live locally and who have not always been in a happy situation because of their allegiance to the school, but who now are being vindicated in the eyes of the public.

The total amount of cash and pledges from Newberg people is \$17,728.46, with \$6,938.00 coming in on the Chamber of Commerce drive. A sobering thought is that most of the gifts have gone into

the Debt Campaign, less from corporations and foundations. It is also significant that many people have pledged, but have not given—either to the Debt or to other claims of the college. Therefore, this was the most difficult year for several years. We found ourselves with strained credit and in a very serious condition with \$16,000 in outstanding bills, and no funds for the payroll as late as June 1. Added to this problem was the fact that we did not keep in the black a year ago, but hoped against hope to cover that involvement with this year's current expense. The considerations just now entered upon are the most difficult for an administrator to face, day after day, with no escape and no rest. We question if these problems honor God and do credit to the cause of Christ.

The general fund has handled more receipts arising from a combination of more students, higher fees, the processing of the Debt Liquidation through the General Fund, and sundry gifts and objects. At the same time, we fed more students in the dining hall, paid the teachers more through fees, paid out more for insurance and interest.

For the first time in a number of years, we can show that the general fund finished the year "in the black." Coming out of a serious situation late in the spring, the board, alumni, and church constituency rose to the challenge, prayer was made all over the Yearly Meeting, and hundreds of dollars began pouring in. Working against a budget which called for \$38,000 from tuitions, we took in \$44,346.12. Against fees to total \$7,500 we took in \$10,883.50. Against a gift budget to total \$28,000 we took in \$53,196.55. Auxiliary enterprises went over their budget by \$3,464.41. All in all, we received a total of \$137,624.84 for a budget of \$112,000. This is a source of great thanksgiving to us. We wish to give God all the glory, and thank each of you who has prayed and given.

Over and above the general fund account, we paid for the Student Union, and increased the physical assets and equipment in gifts in kind and special objects in the amount of more than \$17,000.

Credit is due a number of faithful and clever workers who have greatly assisted, either on our staff, or in donated time: I must mention the many hours given by members of the Alumni Association, the Executive Committee of the board, the Steering committee of the Drive, and now the Chamber of Commerce committee here in town. Denver Headrick is rendering a service which is not only valuable immediately, but which will continue to be the thing which will eventually put the college on a sound footing—making friends among dozens of businessmen and business houses, among our constituency, and in estate building.

CASC

The Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges has rendered invaluable aid to us and many other schools. The stimulation of personnel, the added finances to attend meetings, the rating given us through favorable publicity, the openings granted to foundations and corporations, and the general acceptance of us and other schools in the educational fraternity, all mean a great deal to us.

Dean Williams was able to attend and lead in two most important workshops dealing with testing, curriculum, the gifted student, and kindred programs. I was able to participate in meetings, conventions, and in fund raising in New York, Detroit, Miami, Los Angeles,

San Francisco, Portland, Tacoma, and Seattle.

The Million Dollar Drive for faculty salaries has not paid in up to now, but is showing some strength, which we hope may add to our funds by the end of the year. We are asked to develop and adopt a plan to secure an additional \$5,000 annually for the next three years over and above current moneys, in order to qualify for any of the CASC money.

In Portland and the Northwest CASC has given us opportunities in the press, over radio and TV, which we never would have gotten ourselves. I can also say that the change of program which has included us in the Crown-Zellbach scholarships is due to the influence of the Council. The current emphasis of CASC is for specific help tailored to the needs of each college looking toward accreditation and in business management. We are now thus involved.

Accreditation

Our supplementary report to the Higher Commission was accepted in Spokane last December, and by vote of the Northwest Association, George Fox was placed in the calendar of evaluation. Dean Thomas Kerr, Executive Coordinator, visited our campus on April 23 and laid out the procedures for the administration and faculty to pursue. A year's intensive study is now in progress, with all faculty members assigned to personal and committee work, beginning May 12. We are enjoying the help and counsel of other administrators, which suggest a most difficult period, with great belief that most of the labor can be handled by 12-month people, and by volunteer projects by others. We are using Dr. Roberts for an additional 60 days. We are hiring no extra girls for the office, but rather calling in Edna Williams as need arises.

The Faculty Pre-School Conference will be given over to the specific study of our own self-evaluation, as will be the CASC Action Workshop at Michigan State University.

In all seriousness, we must show a sizable faculty salary increase and a better city attitude and support. We were warned by Dr. Kerr to finish this fiscal year in the black. We have a fighting chance to become accredited after the investigation of the committee coming to the campus next April 24 and 25.

The Future

It is our aim and plan to get out of general fund debt by 1960. As one of our publicity pieces had it: "It is as though a set of dominoes were flicked, one at a time, until they all in turn fall over." An entire series of progressive events may come one after another—buildings, equipment, endowment, higher salaries; but so much is dependent upon the Debt Campaign.

The Board of Trustees in annual meeting on May 31 raised the tuition \$100 per year, or up to \$450—the highest in our history. Most of this increase is to be given to the faculty, with those holding Master's degrees being raised up to \$400 and doctor's degrees to \$600.

The upgrading of the faculty until most have doctor's degrees is a major problem. It involves religious and moral commitments, consecration, finance, and other policies. To make this gain possible, and to give satisfactory stimulus to those already in the

higher echelons is very important. By and large, we are very interested in putting the mantle on some of our own adequate people because we know them, we believe in their Christian belief and testimony, they know the school and its program and problems, and they have a greater possibility of staying on.

The consideration of the life and growth of the Friends Church in the Northwest and also around the world is another major issue. The increase of the church itself, the growth of the American population, the population in the Northwest and the type of an education which we offer should eventually play into our hand. On the other hand, the growth and success of the college in staying true to the faith can have a stellar role in the furtherance of the cause of Christ in the world. I have been told even this school year by a Friend who has travelled widely that George Fox is in the most ideal situation of any of the Friends colleges to lead in the evangelical cause. It is our stated policy to make the college a center for the evangelical and orthodox message so that we can be greatly used of God to train our Christian youth for the serious days which lie ahead.

How to serve our local community and western Oregon is constantly with us. What problems shall be faced as we make our facilities more available to the community? Shall the same rules apply to day students as boarding students? What about the future of the night school? Shall we adapt to a junior college program for the first two years? What should be our position if the area activated a tax-supported junior college? What help can we expect, if any, from other Christian denominations? Shall we involve ourselves with the Federal government and in what ways? How can we effect greater cooperation with other sections of American Quakerdom, especially the evangelical elements? How large should the institution grow?

More pertinently in regard to next year: Should a larger part of their education be borne by the students themselves? What should our policy be in housing, when all the housing is now taken up? How can we heat the gymnasium? What should be done about the maintenance of the Vet houses? Can the lighting of the library be brought up to standard? Should we change the boarding rates? Should students be granted more hourly wage for their work on campus?

These constitute a short recital of the problems which we need to seriously weigh and find their solutions, if at all possible. The challenge has been handed down to us by our Godly pioneers who founded Pacific College in 1891. It seems so incongruous to face the burgeoning possibilities of the future so handicapped, so hindered by every foe. As the ancient prophet told the children of Israel, "The battle is the Lord's." It is all His, for success or failure. It cannot be to our glory, nor our defeat. There is also the promise which comes from the Word: "There is nothing too hard for Thee."

Approved.

Quentin Nordyke and Orville Winters, graduates of George Fox College, spoke of the contribution George Fox College has made in their lives in preparation for the ministry.

The meeting adjourned to meet Monday morning at 9:30 a.m.

● 72. The meeting opened with Marie Haines, Grace Clark and our clerk leading in prayer for direction and divine guidance as we enter into this day's business and activities.

● 73. The minutes were read and corrected.

● 74. Because of the necessity for the Presiding Clerk to be absent in the afternoon sessions for a funeral, Arthur Roberts was nominated to serve as clerk for the afternoon session. Approved.

● 75. Since the Assistant Clerk, Earl Geil was called home because of a death, Arthur Roberts was nominated to act as Assistant Clerk for the remaining Yearly Meeting sessions, serving in both capacities this afternoon.

● 76. The Executive Committee recommends to the Yearly Meeting that each year the original copy of the minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting, and the original copy of the Executive Committee minutes be filed as the permanent record. Approved.

● 77. The Executive Committee recommends that the salary of the Yearly Meeting superintendent be increased for this year by \$25.00 making a total of \$310.00 per month, utilities \$40.00 per month, house allowance \$85.00 per month, and travel 7¢ per mile. Approved.

● 78. The Printing Committee recommends the following procedure for reports to Yearly Meeting:

That board chairmen and others reporting shall each prepare and submit an official report, approximately 1500 words or less, for inclusion in the minutes.

That material considered by the one reporting to be of supplemental value, may be given verbally, as the schedule allows, and/or presented in printed form. Approved.

● 79. The Board of Christian Education nominated Adelaide Barker to the Board of Publication of Evangelical Friends for two years. Approved.

● 80. The Executive Committee nominated Robert Morrill to serve as Financial Secretary for the Yearly Meeting for the coming year. Approved.

● 81. The representatives nominated Walter Cook and Alvin Roberts to serve on the Board of Evangelism for three years. Approved.

● 82. The Executive Committee nominated Dorwin Smith to serve this year on the Board of Administration of the National Association of Evangelicals. Approved.

● 83. The statistical report was read and appears in the appendix. Approved.

● 84. On the recommendation of the Committee on Ministry, the Yearly Meeting of Ministry and Oversight recommends to the Yearly Meeting that the following persons be recorded as ministers of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

He introduced Mahlon Macy, former member of Oregon Yearly Meeting, now Field Director for that organization. He stated that N.A.E. is preserving our freedoms, and preserving our opportunities in Christian evangelical work.

Since the Fixed Expense is based on the probable expenses of the year and since there is only a small balance in the fund, if the Quarterly Meetings fail to pay in full the amount assessed against them, the treasurer will not have sufficient funds to pay all accounts charged against Fixed Expense. For example the treasurer's accounts show that the Fixed Expense account was overdrawn at the close of each of 9 months of the past year in amounts varying from a few dollars at the close of one month up to \$963.69 for another month. It is requested that each Quarterly Meeting make an investigation of the amount due from them and make arrangements to pay the balance. If there appears to them to be a discrepancy between their accounts and the amounts given above, make an immediate attempt to reconcile the difference between their accounts and those of the Yearly Meeting.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

● 88. Denver Headrick gave the report of the Board of Stewardship as follows:

The Board of Stewardship entered into their program at the beginning of this church year with a great deal of enthusiasm, resulting from a sense of divine purpose and direction. This enthusiasm has continued throughout the year.

The board has strongly emphasized the need of strengthening the stewardship program in the Monthly Meetings, realizing that real growth in Christian stewardship will be evidenced in the Yearly Meeting only as it succeeds on the local and Monthly Meeting level. The Quarterly Meeting chairmen have been urged to visit each local meeting within the Quarterly Meeting, making a stewardship presentation and sharing their concerns. This program has been followed with very satisfactory results.

The annual report blanks were studied by the board. This resulted in the elimination of questions which seemed to confuse the Monthly Meeting chairmen. Other questions were added which were designed to give the Yearly Meeting some definite information, such as: per capita giving in Sunday school, based on actual attendance at Sunday school; and per capita giving of the church, based on actual attendance at Sunday morning meeting for worship. These questions seemed to be clear to those filling out the reports and the desired information has been given.

The reports indicate a definite increase in the number of tithers throughout the Yearly Meeting.

A set of four filmstrips, emphasizing the various aspects of Christian stewardship, has been sent to the Quarterly Meeting chairmen in each Quarterly Meeting. These are being used through the Sunday schools and Christian Endeavors.

The Board of Stewardship is primarily concerned with the spirituality of the members of the Yearly Meeting, rather than with the amount of money received. We believe that as we increase our giving, we increase our capacity to receive. This is pertinent to real spiritual growth.

Because of the moving from the Yearly Meeting of the president of our board, some of our report blanks have gone astray, causing our reports to cover only 35 meetings. Because of this, few facts and figures can be given.

Many sermons were preached on stewardship by pastors and board members.

Our board is paying its way and makes no request in United Budget for the coming year. We refer you to the handbook for our future plans and hopes.

A few meetings have adopted the plan of tithing their income into United Budget. We encourage that all meetings give at least 10% of their income to Yearly Meeting support.

Members of the board are ready to speak in your meetings on stewardship any time or place.

We feel to commend each one who has helped make the treasurer's report look so good for the past year.

This information was secured from the blanks of the 42 meetings that reported.

Jack Willcuts, reading Job 1:6-10, brought a challenge to stewardship. "Does Job serve God for naught?" We should consider, "Is our consecration to God and our stewardship for personal gain, and selfish purposes? Is our heart in it? We should be good stewards because of our love for God and a heart of gratitude to Him. Many of us are sympathetic toward our Yearly Meeting program, but are we consecrated to God and the program of our church? We are admonished, "Keep thy heart with all diligence for out of it are the issues of life."

● 89. The morning inspirational hour opened with singing "Am I a Soldier of the Cross" as the older group from Junior Yearly Meeting joined us in the service.

In concluding the third chapter of Ephesians, Walter Williams reminded us that Christ prays that we as Christians may be strengthened with His might, and that His love may be shed abroad in our hearts.

Now we are introduced to the part of this book, considering how we are living—"The walk of the Christian." The apostle gives five ways we ought to walk; first, we should walk worthy of the calling, chapter 4:1. Second, we should walk not as other Gentiles walk, 5:2. We should walk in love, 5:15; and we should walk circumspectly, chapters five and six. Finally, we should walk in submission, with lowliness, meekness, forbearance and long suffering.

In the book of Ephesians there are 41 positive directions for our Christian living, and 26 negative admonitions.

A chorus was sung as we concluded the inspirational hour.

FRIENDS BROTHERHOOD

- 93. The following report was submitted by the Friends Brotherhood:

There has been a good spirit among our men this last year. We kept Holly Park for our project again. During the period that we were helping them we gave \$6774.52 to their building project.

In the early spring we held an executive board meeting at Pendleton, where the major consideration was how to inject new life into our project giving.

The banquet this year was attended by 176 men, with Everett Heacock as the main speaker of the evening and the Greenleaf quartet and Don Lamm furnishing the music.

Tigard was accepted as our new project and the men gave an offering in cash and pledges of \$1220.00.

New officers were elected and we are looking forward to a bigger and better year than ever before, the Lord being our helper.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

- 95. The report of the Women's Missionary Union was presented as follows by president Beatrice Benham:

It is said of Tabitha "this woman was full of good works and alms deeds which she did." This would be said of each member of our missionary union it seems, when we see the amount of work accomplished through the year.

The reports from the local missionary unions are revealing and mostly a joy to read. You may be interested to know some of the things that have been accomplished by the 777 women who belong to 62 missionary unions. Our membership has been increased over last year by 20.

An average of 556 women have met in 62 unions once a month to hear programs and work with their hands. Several groups meet twice a month in order to get more work done.

Among the variety of works that have been represented by speakers in the meetings are the following: India, Japan, Africa, Bolivia, World Gospel Mission on the Mexican Border, New Guinea, Korea, a leper colony in Africa, China, American Indians in Arizona, Salvation Army, Bethany Children's Home in Kentucky, Kings Garden,

and the Holt orphan work. The wife of a converted Catholic priest told of problems a Christian faces in a Roman Catholic controlled country. Recordings of Marge Saint and a special recording of the Four Flats were used.

There were many interesting programs produced by the members themselves.

The work of our hands added up to 80 quilts made for the mission field and 15 for home mission work. 2,032 pounds of clothing were prepared and sent. Many scrapbooks, pictures and Christmas cards, school kits, bandages and layettes were prepared for the Bolivian field. Thirty-seven Christmas boxes were packed for outposts. Three Phillips translations of the Gospels were given to servicemen. One union "adopted" five members of a state mental hospital. Many other projects were undertaken, such as personal gifts of clothing, money, magazine subscriptions and food given to the missionaries.

Needy families of local communities were given food and clothing. Several unions reported purchasing materials for church and parsonage repair, and also furnishings for church and parsonage. Meals were served for bereaved families.

We have paid \$1680.00 for the salary of Roscoe and Tina Knight. Besides this \$625.27 was reported sent for use in the Bolivian mission. A total of \$302.23 was reported sent to missions other than Bolivia.

Nine hundred dollars was paid toward the support of Silverton. It is reported that \$1156.21 was spent for projects other than Silverton on the home field.

Fifty-one missionary unions contributed through the year to the support of the Knights. This is an increase of two over last year. The increase in amount given was \$414.33.

Forty-six unions contributed to the support of Silverton and this is an increase of seven over last year. Increase in amount was \$311.33. We will support Silverton another year with \$100 a month.

One area where we cannot report an increase is in the area of prayer. We have only 35 prayer units reported as against 46 a year ago. This is a sad indication of our concern with material things. May the women of Oregon Yearly Meeting remember that Jesus said of Mary, "she hath chosen that good part."

The reading has increased. One hundred women have read at least nine books from ten classifications: Christian Education, devotional, foreign and home missionary, church history, stewardship, Friends history, Christian fiction, biography and public morals. The woman reading the most books read 75. There were 2,591 books read by the women from whom reports were received.

Rallies were held in each of the Quarterly Meetings. These were times of inspiration for the women in several areas of the work we are trying to do.

The workshop and retreat at Redmond was another time of real inspiration. Julia Retherford brought messages that were a real help to us all.

The banquet this year was attended by 285 women. We were served by the women of First Christian Church in Caldwell. Virginia Helm gave a lay-woman's view of the missionary work in Bolivia.

The offering taken amounted to near \$380. This will be supplemented from the treasury to make \$500 to be given for the building of native churches in Bolivia.

Program and Devotional books have been prepared by Julia Retherford and Marie Haines. The programs touch on such subjects as Stewardship, Peace and Race Relations. Each of the twelve devotions are based on one of twelve queries from the Discipline. They are written by women of the Yearly Meeting.

As we look at the figures we see that out of 62 missionary unions only seven have a membership of 20 or more, while 24 unions have a membership of 10 or less.

We praise the Lord for the Tabithas who have done what was in them to do.

We trust that through our efforts and gifts souls may be won to the Lord.

This was approved. The treasurer's report was read and accepted, and appears in the appendix.

The officers of the Women's Missionary Union were presented, and our General Superintendent, Dean Gregory, conducted an installation service.

The meeting adjourned to meet Tuesday morning at 9:30.

● 96. Robert Ralphs led as the meeting united in prayer for God's guidance throughout this final day of our 1958 Yearly Meeting sessions. Adelaide Barker and Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

"Take Time to be Holy" was sung by the congregation.

Zarilda Alger expressed praise to God for His goodness, and her confidence in His promises.

● 97. The minutes were read and approved.

● 98. Milo Ross, president of George Fox College, reported in the absence of the George Fox College Visiting Committee, that several members of the committee visited the college individually, showing their interest and appreciation of our school. Approved.

● 99. The representatives recommended that the Entertainment Committee be supplied by the Quarterly Meeting where Yearly Meeting is to be held.

This was referred back to the representatives for further consideration.

● 100. The Epistle Committee presented the following digest of epistles:

This digest is taken from those epistles through which we sense evangelical fellowship.

As we read the epistles from other Yearly Meetings our hearts warmed to realize that Friends in other places had like precious faith. One meeting writes, "We have been deeply challenged to fulfill our destiny of obedience to Christ." And from abroad another writes, "In our meeting we have tried to find out what the Bible and Jesus Christ mean to us Friends."

Some groups express a desire to reach out to others and to share with them our Quaker convictions as they become keenly aware of moral and physical dangers of war preparation. Another group expresses concern for their youth, for their need of a real experience of saving grace and of a life wholly yielded in sanctify-

ing power. One meeting has gone on record recommending that members not own television sets. Another remarks, more positively, that when the disciples asked "What must we do to work the works of God?" Jesus replied that "This is the work of God, that ye believe in Him whom He hath sent."

The epistles show a sensitivity to the guidance of the Holy Spirit and a prayer to know Christ in the power of His resurrection, in order to meet the problems of crime, narcotics, and the threat of nuclear weapons. Another epistle reminds us that the Christian message is carried forward by individuals. "In Jesus' prayer," the letter continues, "He asked not that they be removed from the world but that they be kept from the evil. So with our Christian society we cannot keep ourselves in a sheltered spot where conditions are ideal. We must face the problems of the present time, not with fear, but with a God-given faith... seeking earnestly to find ways to establish peace in this world."

From another comes this challenge: We need not only right doctrine, but also Christ-filled lives which will draw others into a transforming experience with Jesus Christ.

As we have read epistles from all over the world this challenge has echoed in our own hearts that each meeting might have a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ in the person of the Holy Spirit.

Approved.

● 101. The outgoing epistle from Oregon Yearly Meeting was read as follows, and was approved:

Oregon Yearly Meeting held its 66th session at Greenleaf, Idaho, August 14-19, 1958, using the facilities of the Greenleaf church and academy. The most significant single action was the final reading and passage of the new Discipline. Although most of the changes were procedural, two important sections make explicit Friends' testimony against capital punishment and racial discrimination.

Reports show that the 62 churches in Oregon, Idaho, and Washington contain 5278 members. Two new meetinghouses were constructed during the year, providing places of worship for the new congregations: Silverton, Oregon, and Lynwood, in Portland, Oregon. The spirit of outreach is further manifested by the continued progress of other recently established "outposts," and by the aggressive planning of the Evangelistic Board for the establishment of additional churches in areas of increased population.

Our mission field, among the Aymara Indians of Bolivia and Peru, is operated on the Altiplano, in the Yungas, and among those on the shores of Lake Titicaca. The 85 churches and preaching points there represent over a thousand members, these with others swelling the Sunday school attendance to three thousand. We are thankful to God for the National Bolivian Friends Church, now legally established by charter, which is 76% self-supporting. The ratio of missionary personnel to native personnel is one to ten, in contrast with the average ratio in South America of one to three.

It is humbling to learn that Moody Monthly is featuring our national church organization in the fall issue as one of the outstandingly successful indigenous church programs on today's mission fields. This will later be incorporated into a book explaining modern indigenous church methods.

A great degree of unity blesses our church. The work of George

Fox College is gratifying for its combination of high scholarship and evangelical fervor. Our conferences ministered to a thousand of our youth during the past year. The Women's Missionary Union and the Friends Brotherhood are active organizations. Our departments promote their respective aspects of the Christian witness as we seek to follow after peace and holiness.

Guests at our sessions included Friends from California, Kansas, Iowa, and Ohio. From the latter state came our guest speaker, Walter R. Williams, former superintendent, veteran missionary, who encouraged us in many ways to be "in Christ" in holiness and in love. Through epistles from other Yearly Meetings we have gained insight into their concerns. Although we are saddened by a lack of Christ-centered ministry on the part of some, we are encouraged by the vital Christian fellowship evidenced by others. We pray that Friends, many of whom are seeking some new word from God, may find in Jesus Christ the One who alone gives transforming love to all human relations. Conscious of our shortcomings what we pray for others we pray for ourselves. We earnestly desire to spread the evangelical Christian message and to win souls to Jesus Christ.

● 102. The following statement was presented from the Board of Moral Action:

Alarmed by the profusion of obscene and salacious publications, we issue this declaration of our concern.

Obscenity in printed matter contributes to a general eroding of moral principles because it is readily obtainable, and because by its private nature it is not subject to the rigidity of censorship imposed upon radio and television, and other media of communication. This is reflected in the percipitous rise in criminal tendencies and overt acts, the degrading of the institution of marriage, the subversion of the home, the emphasis implicit or explicit upon sexual license, and all such. We further deplore the availability of pornographic matter to children of school age, by whatever media it may be distributed.

We support, within the injunctions of our discipline and our conscience, all federal, state and local legislation governing the sale and distribution of obscene publications. We encourage our constituency to express in a careful manner its disapproval to local merchants and all purveyors of such publications.

We deem it morally expedient that all distribution and sale of publications adjudged obscene and objectionable by responsible church, judicial, educational and social welfare agencies, be eliminated. This was approved.

● 103. The Board of Moral Action recommends that the following statement be approved by the Yearly Meeting:

Since liquor and tobacco contain poisons harmful to the human body, these should be subject to the same controls exercised upon other narcotics and should not be advertised in billboards, periodicals or over the air. Subliminal advertising on television is especially objectionable, since the viewer's subconscious mind is affected unwittingly.

The sale, service and consumption of alcoholic beverages on commercial and military aircraft is a morally degrading practice and a hazard to air safety.

This was approved.

It was further approved that the Board of Moral Action make a statement to airlines giving the stand of Oregon Yearly Meeting against the sale, service, and consumption of alcoholic beverages on commercial and military aircraft.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

● 104. The Publication Board chairman, Arthur O. Roberts, presented the following report:

During the 16th year of our board, publication has included the following material, as directed by the board:

Editing, printing, mailing, NORTHWEST FRIEND, to the families of the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting; circulation 2300; copies 25,300.

Preparation, printing, weekly bulletin covers, to an average of 34 churches, 3031 copies, each issue; total number 157,600.

Editing, printing, Yearly Meeting Minutes; (104pp.); copies 1600.

The Oregon Yearly Meeting Press has been used for printing jobs by the various boards of the church, as follows:

Commercially, the press secures contracts, many of which are related to worthwhile religious organizations or interests in Portland area, or other Yearly Meetings, or for individuals. The book by Gervas Carey, MY BIBLE AND I, was printed by the press.

A display of printed materials is present for your inspection.

As per direction of the board, a book review column appears as a feature of the NORTHWEST FRIEND.

Pending disciplinary changes, the board has given but limited publicity work, chiefly through releases at Yearly Meeting time and locally through the work of the publicity directors of the Quarterly Meeting.

The board met five times during the year. We have given consideration to matters of publication and to matters of policy, especially relating to the coming of Jack Willcuts and Ralph Chapman to work for the board beginning in September. Jack will serve as editor of the NORTHWEST FRIEND, prepare the bulletins, and give creative direction to preparation of other literature. He serves half-time, in connection with pastoral work. Ralph Chapman will give special attention to printing while completing his furlough year for the Mission Board. Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher, who have completed ten years of faithful ministry in this work, will assist during the year as the new men learn the technical work of publication. We praise the Lord for the effective service of our present printers and for the promise of effective work to continue through the labors of the new men. We pray that in this year of transition

we may arrive at policies and practices which will enhance our service to the church.

Earl Barker has served as a member of the Bible School Publication Board of George Fox Press. He will give separate report.

The report of the Board of Publication was approved.

Earl P. Barker gave the report of the George Fox Press as follows:

The first exploratory committee meeting, which led to the organization of the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends (The George Fox Press), was held in the summer of 1944. With actual publication beginning with January, 1946, the production of quarterlies for our Sunday schools is now in its 13th year.

During these years the founding aims of the board, to produce literature which is vitally spiritual and at the same time characterized by a scholarly simplicity, have been its guiding star.

The response of the three Yearly Meetings in the matter of patronage has been gratifying. At the present time only one Sunday school in Oregon Yearly Meeting is using none of our quarterlies. The percentage of nonuse in the other Yearly Meetings is quite small. More recently Central Yearly Meeting, in Indiana, and Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, in Colorado and Nebraska, and become increasingly larger users of these helps. The total number of units (quarterlies and lesson leaflets) published each quarter has gone well past the 25,000 mark. Including the five Yearly Meetings, other Friends meetings, and other denominations, there are 392 Sunday schools and 53 individuals that receive these supplies regularly. The operating budget for the past year was close to \$15,000.00.

The most popular publication is still the Adult Friend. With a steady increase in circulation averaging about 200 per quarter, it has now reached 14,300. Scott T. Clark is exercising a valuable ministry through writing the lesson discussions. The Quaker Youth Friend also shows increases, with a sale of more than 4,000. The Junior Friend seems to be on the decrease. Steps were taken at the Junior cent board meeting to substitute graded lessons at the re- with the expectation of beginning by the second quarter of 1959. We hope that this move will be acceptable.

Subscriptions to the Teachers' Friend are still increasing. The future of the whole program is being planned with the objective of constant improvement toward meeting the total need of Friends. Recent appointments have added youth and vigor to the board, with the promise of aggressive action without compromise of any sort.

The Friends C.E. Manual has been discontinued at the request of the Ohio and Oregon youth organizations. Strictly speaking, it was not one of the regular publications of the George Fox Press, but was published under our supervision as a courtesy to the young people. It has been a joy to help, and the press stands ready to give assistance again if desired. Special appreciation is due to Laura Shook for the faithful service she has given as lesson editor, often under severe handicap.

We do not hesitate to ask again for the support and assistance of our Oregon Yearly Meeting constituency. The more you help us, especially by using and recommending our publications, the better we will be able to serve your interests and needs.

In appreciation for the many hours of sacrificial service on the Friends C.E. Lesson Helps, by Laura Shook, a beautiful briefcase was presented her.

The Financial Statements of the Friends C.E. Manual and George Fox Press were presented and appear in the appendix.

Jack Willcuts was introduced as new editor of the NORTHWEST FRIEND, soon to take up his new duties.

Arthur Roberts conducted a round table discussion regarding our publications. Myron Goldsmith, Frederick Baker and Earl Barker spoke of the value of our church paper, the NORTHWEST FRIEND.

Much appreciation was expressed for the fine work of Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher for their work in editing and printing the NORTHWEST FRIEND. They will be continuing their work with us the coming year.

● 105. The report of the Memorial Committee was read. There were 57 deaths, two of which were ministers of the Gospel. A complete list of those deceased appears in the appendix, and an asterik indicates those for whom memorials were prepared.

Many expressions of appreciation were voiced for those who have gone on before, and their memory beckons us on to greater achievement for our Lord, that we too may hear the words, "Come up higher."

● 106. Walter Williams, in his last inspirational hour of this Yearly Meeting, expressed appreciation for the privilege of fellowship in these sessions.

As we have learned from the book of Ephesians of the wealth, workmanship, and walk, we finally come to the warfare of the Christian.

Our foes are powerful—too strong for us. But the complete armor of the Christian as given in Ephesians 6:13-18 is ample for our protection and victory as we face the enemy. Stand therefore; be steadfast when the battle is hard, confident of victory. We can be invincible against all the attacks of the foe.

The congregation united in singing "Revive us Again" and Grace Clark dismissed the meeting with prayer.

● 113. The following communication came from the Junior Yearly Meeting:

The average daily attendance of the Junior Yearly Meeting ses-

sions was 50.

Marguerite Braithwaite held classes for the beginners and Dianne Payne for the primaries, while Laura Shook directed the affairs of the juniors and intermediates.

The primary and junior and intermediate departments held a business session each morning.

Some days we had special speakers. They were, Virginia Helm, Beatrice Fritschle and her two daughters, Bernice Mardock and Charles Morgan.

We learned of the mission fields of other Yearly Meetings and of the work of some of the members of our Yearly Meeting who serve in other fields.

We felt that Junior Yearly Meeting was a help and blessing to all who attended.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 118. The Board of Evangelism with president Clare Willcuts presented the following report:

To start this report, I want you to know that I dug out all the evangelistic reports I could find from Ohio, Kansas, Iowa and in Oregon clear back to Clarkson Hinshaw at least, trying to find the most dramatic way to do this tedious job. I found none. So this is, I suppose, the 66th report to be made, and I also suppose just as dry as the previous 65.

What is our specific job as an Evangelistic Board? A new member of our board, at the close of his first year, declared, "This is not an Evangelistic Board, it should be called a 'headache' board."

The Discipline charges us "be responsible for all pastoral, evangelistic, and church extension work of the Yearly Meeting."

A panoramic view of this year's activities will allow us at least a few evaluations, or basic concerns from which to springboard the emphasis of the coming year. Our Sunday attendance for the year is slightly increased but the numbers reported at the altar for salvation or renewal is lower. Reflecting upon these facts, do we see ourselves working on attendance goals to the neglect of a definite spiritual impact? This leads to at least two more concerns: That we as a church carefully maintain as our motivation in evangelism the personal leadings of the Holy Spirit and not fall into man-made patterns, however attractive or appealing, unless they are divinely inspired; and, secondly, I share with our General Superintendent a concern which could someday assume alarming proportions if not soon met—Where are the young people responding to the call for full-time ministry?

Board Meetings Held

Three complete board reunions were held since last Yearly Meeting, two at Portland, one at Metolius with at least 43 hours spent in actual discussions. This is apart from the multitude of meetings held during Yearly Meeting sessions, and as all board members can testify, exclusive of the hours upon hours of travel spanning the Pacific Northwest.

New Meetings

Silverton and Lynwood. Although preliminary prayer meetings had been started at Silverton this time a year ago, actual services were not begun until September. This church building, which has won inter-national architectural fame among Friends, it was my high privilege to dedicate on May 4th. The rapidity of this remarkable development should be cause for rejoicing and the dedicated and capable lady pastors, Miss Charlotte Macy and Miss Dorothy Barratt, are to be commended. Let me call to your attention, inasmuch as the board in its church extension efforts has become "church unit conscious," that the Silverton project has become plan most successfully pointing up not only the validity of the idea but spearheading, I hope, a method to be borrowed by other groups.

Lynwood meeting, under George Palmer's leadership, was launched this year in an attractive and unchurched area of east Portland. Five families are committed to the church program with at least 20 more families potential if all Quakers involved respond cooperatively. The Broadway Church Finance Plan of bond issues is the financial program adopted and the first unit is progressing well. This new development plumbs well to become a strong, substantial meeting.

Aid Extended

Your giving to church extension this year channeled through the Board of Evangelism reached the following, assisting them in pastoral support: Gerald and Elaine Cronk of Sprague River; Irwin and Zarilda Alger of Hayden Lake; Clark and Elizabeth Smith, Talent; Roger and Eulalia Smith, Pringle; Preston and Nancy Mills, East Wenatchee; Lloyd and Beverly Melhorn, Ontario; and Ethel Cowgill of Bethany. The help extended these friends was not adequate in all cases at least, but enabled the board and interested friends to indicate our interest in their financial needs. A total of

\$7,900 was shared in this manner.

Inasmuch as the Yearly Meeting has shifted the Sprague River work to the Board of Missions, this item will not appear in our report again. We concur in this action but wish to express appreciation for the pleasant associations enjoyed during the years in this area of our responsibilities.

Special Gifts

Apart from the pastoral financial aid just mentioned, four outposts received direct gifts by action of the board helping them to meet certain local financial obligations contingent upon new church development needs. A total of \$3,500 was given to Silverton, Newport, Tigard and Ashland for their building programs.

Special Actions

Due to a longfelt need for more promotional emphasis especially in the field of church extension of the board, it was decided this year to name Frederick Baker, a member of the board, as promotional secretary. His support came from an interested Friend. His ministry in articles appearing in the Northwest Friend and visitation activities have been very beneficial.

In Appreciation

Last year I said three things about our General Superintendent, Dean Gregory, in appreciation for his help and direction to our board; his clear vision, his spiritual insight, his glowing enthusiasm. The year before we were impressed by his counsel, prayers and words of encouragement. This year I see no reason to eliminate these expressions but would like to underline them each in our growing respect for him as a superintendent and as a friend.

We express our appreciation to the Women's Missionary Union for their aid to the Silverton outpost; to the Friends Brotherhood for their continued support of the Holly Park project; to the Christian Endeavor of Oregon Yearly Meeting who gave financial assistance to the pastors of Tigard outpost.

The Quaker Hour continues under the sponsorship of the Board of Evangelism with the respected ministry of Milo Ross and the Quaker Hour staff. Oregon Yearly Meeting is really quite small but through the tremendous ministry of the Quaker Hour we reach 200,000 every week.

We are indebted to the Friends Church Extension Foundation which has again this year enabled various churches to secure loans for carrying on their building programs. This Foundation agency is, in the opinion of the board, of inestimable value to church extension efforts of the Yearly Meeting.

A direct word of profound thanks is due to you, those who attend the sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting who, although a small percentage of the membership at large, contribute so sacrificially and generously in pledges and gifts to the evangelistic program presented here. This not only helps in actual support but inspires those of us on this board to renew our consecration in this great effort. Evangelism must remain the heart of our ministry of Friends, let us not be sidetracked nor discouraged but move forward with that peculiar sense of spiritual direction above mentioned. The world now has electronic guided missiles, but the church still needs Holy Spirit guided members; there has never been a time when they were more needed! "The Lord of hosts is with us, the

God of Jacob is our Refuge" (Psalms 46).

Promotional Secretary Frederick Baker presented the itemized report of the Evangelistic Board, which will appear in the appendix, and also the following report:

The secretary of the Board of Evangelism presented a review of the evangelism reports as follows:

Fifty of the 62 churches reported, indicating that 75 people were engaged in Church Extension work over the Yearly Meeting with 11 of these 50 churches indicating they sponsored outposts.

The "Outposter" is used by 43 of the 50 reporting churches and 34 of the 50 churches reported they actively supported "The Quaker Hour" radio program.

We commend to all of our churches the plan of Greenleaf Friends church in mimeographing "The Outposter" and sending it out to its people.

The statistical report of the board is almost an exact duplication of a year ago indicating that few gains were made during the year.

Frederick B. Baker

Clynton Crisman presented the treasurer's report for the Friends Extension Foundation. This appears in the appendix.

The report of the Board of Evangelism was approved.

Charlotte Macy reported regarding the new Silvertown outpost, which she and Dorothy Barratt are pastoring. Their new building was dedicated in May.

Denver Headrick reported on the Tigard outpost, of which Orville Winters is pastor. He feels there is a great potential there.

Dean Gregory told us of the Lynwood outpost in east Portland. In their area are about 20 Friends families. George Palmer is pastor. They expect to be in their new building September 7.

Quincy Fodge was on the platform representing Cambridge outpost; Edward Harmon, pastor at Ashland outpost; and Robert Ralphs of Newport; and Irwin Alger of Hayden Lake.

Jack Willcuts spoke on Church Extension as it relates itself to our foreign mission work. The work of outposts have a direct bearing on foreign missions. The spirit of outreach in Bolivia is the same spirit as in the home land.

It demands the same consecration to start an outpost as a new mission point. It also demands equal support and correspondence.

The growth of our foreign work is contingent on the growth of our work at home.

The members of the Board of Evangelism were introduced and as they stood Walter Lee, president of the Board of Missions, prayed a dedicatory prayer for this group as they work through the coming year.

● 119. The Friends Church Extension Foundation wishes to nominate Warren Moor as one of its directors for a term of three years. Approved.

● 120. The list of recommended evangelists was read and appears in our appendix.

● 121. The meeting approved that the \$152.19 balance from the entertainment fund be used by that committee as they see fit.

● 122. Appreciation was expressed for the work of our publicity director, Jack Willcuts, in getting Yearly Meeting news in the papers.

DIGEST OF THE MEETINGS OF THE MINISTRY AND OVERSIGHT BODY

Summary of the Yearly Meeting sessions of the Ministry and Oversight, 1958:

At the beginning of the sessions the clerk, Edward Harmon, impressed the meeting anew that Christ is the Leader and Director of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

There were three meetings of the Ministry and Oversight during the sessions of Yearly Meeting.

It was the decision of the meeting that the Committee on Ministry may at its own discretion hold over a name for recording for a period of one year. In this case a special committee from the Ministry and Oversight should endeavor to instruct and encourage such a one.

The meeting felt that the Discipline p. 57, paragraph 4 is clear without the preparation of a format to assist young ministers in preparing their statement of faith.
