Important Yearly Meeting Actions

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MINUTES
of
OREGON YEARLY MEETING
OF FRIENDS
1959

● 1. With the realization that our achievement is "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord," we convene in this sixty-seventh session of Oregon Yearly Meeting, held at Newberg, Oregon, August 13, 1959.

● 2. The presiding clerk, Dorwin Smith, asked Waldo Hicks, of Boise, Idaho, to bring the devotions. He read Luke 14:25-33, and reminded us that the work of our Yearly Meeting is both a building process and a warfare. Each process has a cost. Our loyalty to Christ requires an affection and loyalty which shuts out self. Loyalty also requires cross bearing. In this close circle we are shut in with Jesus Christ. If we pay the full price of discipleship, it will prevent us from being bungling builders, failing to complete that which is started. Also, if we cannot wage our war successfully, we become subjects of a dictated peace. Only as we are completely filled with the Holy Spirit can we fulfill our discipleship. He closed with prayer, that this may be a Yearly Meeting owned and blessed of God.

● 3. In the absence of the assistant clerk and announcing clerk, Wayne Piersall was named to act as assistant clerk until the return of Kenneth Williams; Herbert Sargent was named announcing clerk for the entire sessions of the Yearly Meeting. Approved.

● 4. It was suggested that a word of comfort and sympathy be sent to Eilene Nordyke and family in the recent tragic passing of Robert Nordyke.

● 5. A minute was read for Keith Sarver, superintendent of California Yearly Meeting, who is our Yearly Meeting speaker. He brought greetings from Eugene Coffin, Glen Rinard, and Harold Mickelson, former pastors of Oregon Yearly Meeting now serving in California.

Earland Hazel Butler of Russiaville Monthly Meeting, New London Quarterly Meeting, Western Yearly Meeting, were introduced. Also John Carr, formerly of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, now a teacher of Greenleaf Academy.

Glenn Armstrong, pastor at Chehalem Center, was introduced; also Clyde and Mary Thomas, Oregon Yearly Meeting members in service with the World Gospel Mission in Urundi, Africa, soon to return to their field.

● 6. A Committee on Returning Minutes was named as follows: Scott Clark, Kenneth Eichenberger, Mary Sutton. Approved.

● 7. The Memorial Committee was appointed: Grace Clark, Ward Haines, Evangeline Cook. Approved.

It was approved that Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting, Inland Quarterly Meeting and Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting representatives be allowed in case of absences, to fill their quotas from others present. Approved.

●11. The reports on the State of the Church were read and the summary appears below: Eight Quarterly Meetings reported on the State of the Church.

Attendance at meetings for worship is generally on the increase, but many report evening services and prayer meetings not so well attended.

Many report deepening of spirituality among members, due to faithful pastoral ministry and revival emphasis. Some especially appreciate the growth of youth groups and their spiritual interests.

Family worship is stressed in the various churches, and it is believed many avail themselves of this privilege and responsibility.

The doctrinal standards of Friends are upheld, and the work of the ministry is highly commended. Some have held classes in instruction especially for the youth.

Some report building programs under way.

While we are pleased to see the spiritual and numerical growth in our churches, and improvement in the physical plants, we feel there is a great need for outreach to those who are outside the fold of Christ, and it is the desire and purpose to bring these in.

●12. The following recommendation came from the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight for action:

The Ministry and Oversight recommends that consideration be given to a uniform membership application form which may be used

throughout the Yearly Meeting in dealing with church membership.

This was referred back to the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight for action. (See minute 79)

●13. The following recommendation was received:

The Ministry and Oversight recommends that consideration be given to the preparation of a training course in Friends Doctrines and procedures which could be presented to all new members.

This was approved and directed to be put in the hands of the Executive Council to act upon through any medium they deem advisable, and to proceed to be printed.

●14. The Custodian of Documents, Oliver Weesner, reported that documents are being kept in the vault of the Newberg Branch of the First National Bank of Oregon, and in the vault of the E. B. Stanley Realty Co. in Newberg. The vault in the church annex is now completed and ready for use. It is open for inspection during Yearly Meeting. Approved.

●15. The treasurer's report was presented in full in mimeographed form to the meeting. Totals were read by the reading clerk. Action on this report is deferred until a later session. This report appears in the appendix.

●16. The morning devotional hour was opened with the congregation singing "Revive us Again" led by Randall Emry.

Keith Sarver, Yearly Meeting speaker, spoke on prayer, planning to use "The Lord's Prayer" for our devotional considerations.

Jesus was speaking to God, who was His Father in a unique sense. We are God's children by adoption. This prayer is a model prayer, not to be repeated only as a ritual.

Christ has delivered us from darkness and transferred us to His kingdom.

All men are potential sons of God, but some are lost, in need of redemption. Paul the apostle had an agonizing concern for his lost brethren. We too should carry a burden for the lost sons of God.

The only way we can pray this prayer is by our acknowledging the sovereignty of God—"Our Father who art in heaven."

Keith Sarver closed the service by praying, "Lord, teach us to pray."

Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

●17. The afternoon period of devotion opened with the singing of the hymn, "My Jesus, I Love Thee," 1 Cor.13:13 was read and Marion Cook led in prayer.

●18. After discussion and explanation, the treasurer's report was approved.

●19. The official epistle from the National Church in Bolivia was read as follows:

Oregon Yearly Meeting:

Beloved Brethren in the faith:

We are rejoicing at receiving your letters, one from the Yearly Meeting, and another from the superintendent. They were presented on the floor of the business sessions carried on in the tabernacle in Alto La Paz.

On receiving your greetings, we are giving thanks to God, and glory to the Lord Jesus Christ. We, the group of representatives have the privilege of sending our greetings to all the brethren in the

North, with brotherly love in the name of our redeemer Christ Jesus.

We want to make it clear to our brother Dorwin, and all the brethren that send us money to support the construction, the primary schools, buy medicines, pay pastors, and pay the missionaries, that we give thanks to all for this help and sacrifice through these offerings. We repeat, thanks to God for His blessing over all of you.

We know that God has seen us, and we are gaining the salvation of our souls. Besides, we have confidence toward God that He will always bless more and more in gaining lost souls.

We are rejoicing spiritually because you remember us in prayer and counsel. With this strength we are passing through persecutions that have come, but the power of Jesus is with us.

The brethren ask your continued prayers. We have difficulty in advancing by ourselves. We have been proving the National Church for some time. It is good, but a difficult thing. We do not have enough active members with spiritual maturity and consecration, giving their tithes. We lack the second blessing. Very few know what real consecration is. For these reasons we cannot advance by ourselves. It is certain that God will help us get this victory and peace in our hearts.

The Mesa Directiva, and the representatives have thought much of the pastors that fail. It is because of a lack of material necessities. The salaries that they receive are very small, that is to say, twenty thousand to sixty thousand Bolivianos per month. (\$1.70 to \$5.00) For this reason that is presented, it is a problem for the pastors and workers. But some of us who are crucified with Christ, are able to press forward in the work of the Lord, come what may. We will always continue in the work of the Lord carrying His cross. There are many who are ignorant of what it means to carry the cross and suffer. Nevertheless, we will finally arrive at the perfect victory, for which we hope.

For these reasons, we beseech all the brethren that they remember us especially in their prayers, especially the leaders in the work.

Also, our brethren in Christ, we pray you in great love that you continue your help for pastors, church construction, education, and medicines, as God lays it upon your heart. We know, of course that we are dependents of the Oregon Yearly Meeting, and are making known in our own words the needs of the pastors. We are assured that the Lord is all powerful, and will lay it upon your hearts what is necessary for us, the National Church in Bolivia.

We would to God that all the members learn to give to God His part in the tithes, to consecrate all to God, to receive the second blessing, holiness of life, because then we can support the work by ourselves. But while we are arriving at this consecration, we beseech you to provide, and pray that at least a greater part of the members find the victory of sanctification, with the which we can sustain, and grow more and more in the work of the Lord.

With this spirit, the missionaries that help us, will be very grateful to God, and you, for your support, and can give a good report. For all of this we give thanks to our Lord Jesus Christ.

In every way, may the God of peace rule always in all of the brethren in the North, and in us, through the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ which will continually help us experience a sanctified life.

This is certain when we confide in Him with all our understanding, strength, and soul in faith. Thanks to God for His love.

We are expecting an answer of blessing over us in these days. We have received great blessing in the Bolivian Yearly Meeting. Thanks to the living God, and He will live with us always. How glorious it will be. May His name be Holy, and the name of our redeemer Jesus Christ, Who has helped you bring the light of life to Bolivia.

Truly may there be glory to His name.

Appreciation was expressed for their open mindedness and the frank analization of the work and problems of the Bolivian National Church.

● 20. The Board of Moral Action made their presentation, with president J. Russel Stands in charge. He urged that we instigate moral action on the Monthly Meeting level.

Gerald Dillon spoke for the division of Education. He stated that any Christian education should be the concern of every Christian individual. He stressed the importance of Christian schools on all levels, for the education of our children and young people.

The presentation of the Board of Moral Action was approved. Mimeographed reports of the work of the board for the past year were distributed. This appears in edited form below. This will be acted upon at another session.

Department of Education—Ludlow Corbin, superintendent.

What is the significance of this educational report? Today with so much emphasis on education many of us want to know what we are doing and where we are going. We can pretty well forecast where we will be 10 or 15 years from now by what we are doing educationally today.

In the light of these figures, which cover over 95% of the membership of 61 meetings, what seems to be significant?

1. We have very few children in Christian elementary schools.
2. However, over 18% of our high school membership attend Christian high schools and over 80% of these attend Greenleaf Academy. This is another reason for appreciating Greenleaf Academy.

3. It is also significant that we have 177 young people in college, universities and seminaries and that 108 of these are in Christian institutions.

4. Our influence through Friends teachers should not be overlooked. We have nearly four times as many Christian teachers as we have pastors in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

For what we are doing in the areas of education let us be thankful but not satisfied. There is much more that ought to be done.

Department of Literature—Kenneth L. Eichenberger, superintendent

In the midst of a world that is awakening to literacy in an unprecedented manner, it is disturbing to note the apparent indifference and unconcern evidenced among many American church members to the importance of good reading. If we may judge by reports from the 48 reporting meetings of our Yearly Meeting, our libraries list approximately 5000 volumes, possibly an average of one book for every member of the Yearly Meeting. And in far too many reports the indications are that our library resources are not being utilized as they should be.

As Christian men and women we need to cultivate the habit of reading for mental stimulus and spiritual strengthening. We need to provide our growing children with wholesome reading to create an appetite for the better types of literature. Publishers and Christian writers are striving together to produce more attractive and uplifting publications at all age levels.

Some of our church libraries are in need of assistance to make them more functional. For this purpose we would recommend "The Church Library Manual," by La Vose Wallin, which may be secured from your Christian bookseller. It is a complete how-to-do-it book for the libraries.

Emphasis during the past year was placed on Bible reading. Reports did not indicate much as to how generally this was promoted. The Caldwell, Idaho, meeting reported a splendid plan which might well be used more widely. Weekly home Bible readings are listed and the mid-week prayer meeting session devoted to a study and discussion of portions for that week. Variations of this plan would be helpful to many of our members.

There is good interest manifested in Bible study programs aside

from the usual Bible School lesson. Ten such groups were reported this year and 24 reported as interested in such a plan. This indicates an area of need to prepare or recommend to our constituency suitable outlines or helps for such personal or group study. Many helpful suggestions may be had by asking your local Christian bookstore to assist you. Pastors might well consider such a teaching ministry to better acquaint the membership with God's Word through a systematic program.

The work of our own Yearly Meeting Publication Board and Barclay Press in producing literature of denominational interest is noteworthy and deserves the wholehearted support of every church.

Friends rejoice in the steps being taken by the Post Office Department to eliminate mailing of obscene literature and should call to the attention of their postmaster any such instances of violation which come to their attention. Agitation and opposition must be continued to conserve the gains made.

Finally, let us not neglect to read God's Word regularly and meditate thereon. Let us read after those godly writers whose messages can bring help and blessing to us and pass on such to others around us. Share your blessings in this way.

Department of Public Morals—Virginia Helm, superintendent.

Reports from 45 meetings indicate that there have been 273 temperance presentations, skits, contests, programs, films, object lessons, sermons, talks or posters displayed this year. This is about 25% less than last year which may be due to less material sent out from the Yearly Meeting, the trend away from the International Sunday School lessons, or the ever-present problem of temperance Sunday falling on days when there is other special emphasis.

Lack of good new literature to send out as samples may have been the cause of the drop in tract distribution also, about 50%, 3000 pieces against 6000 last year. Increased literature costs, along with increased Sunday School attendance, may have been a factor in some meetings as well. It is observed that samples sent out from the superintendent are still being scattered, instead of being ordered in larger quantities as intended. Some of this literature was used for displays, for opening exercise lessons, and for Christian Endeavor lessons, however.

On the brighter side, more meetings have felt the concern to get election material before their members, to write and urge members to write about legislation and other matters of public interest and to present the sacredness of marriage to its young people through Christian Endeavor, Sunday School, books, camps, and from the pulpit and personal counselling.

Yearly Meeting-owned filmstrips were used 17 or more times, and flannelgraphs were loaned eight times as well.

Outstanding accomplishments in some of the meetings are temperance courses in the DVBS, a contest by adult classes for temperance presentations, collection of \$100 for temperance work in state, a member of one meeting was a state winner of the WCTU Intercollegiate Oratorical Contest and material was furnished for school health and science classes. Some members of the Yearly Meeting appeared before the hearing in Salem, Oregon, regarding the sale of cigarettes to minors under 16, and others actively protested the sale of "near beer" to minors attending the centennial.

Following last Yearly Meeting, copies of our public morals stand on issues were sent to all airlines servicing the Northwest and to all state and national organizations to which we belong or would be interested in Oregon Yearly Meeting's stand. Oregon senators and congressmen were also informed.

Capital punishment leaflets were distributed in the state of Oregon; leaflets about Ohio Yearly Meeting's Rescue Home were ordered for pastoral use, and a book display of public morals material was requested for Yearly Meeting.

Concerns of particular interest seem to be counselling about life companion, investigation of stores selling beer and cigarettes to minors, ways to protest selling of liquor at motorcycle races near one church, liquor on airplanes and unsuitable programs and radio and TV advertising of liquor and cigarettes. One meeting is studying ways its members can be helped in planning TV watching time. The biggest concern regarding reports is that committees meet early in the church year to plan their activities with the handbook and report and that a record notebook be kept for more specific report answers.

Department of Legislature—John Roberts, superintendent

The work of the legislature this year has consisted chiefly of testimony before legislature committees in Oregon on the issues of capital punishment and sale of tobacco to minors under 16 and in Idaho an effort to establish a connection for relaying urgent legislative news to the members. This latter did not work out as well as was hoped. The churches were alerted through local chairmen to protest the extension of open hours for taverns and to support an increase in the tax on beer.

There is no report of activity in Washington.

There is a great need in this area of the board work that we as Christian citizens may be respectfully alerted to our responsibility in relation to state and federal government processes, that we may speak out on those issues having moral significance.

Let us also heed the admonition of the apostle Paul to Timothy that "supplications, prayers, intercessions, be made for all that are in authority."

●21. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday morning at 9:30.

●22. After a time of silent devotion and waiting upon the Lord, Jack Willcuts, Fred Baker and Grace Clark brought words of Scripture and admonition. Wayne Piersall led in prayer.

●23. The minutes were read and corrected.

●24. The report of the Board of Moral Action was approved.

●25. The following statement was received from the Board of Moral Action, to be sent to the airlines.

We agree with the Federal Aviation Agency that a person should not be allowed to take his own liquor aboard an airplane and that no intoxicated person should be served on any air carrier. Furthermore, in the interest of safety and moral responsibility, we re-emphasize our former statement that all sale, service and consumption of alcoholic beverages on commercial and military aircraft should be eliminated. We commend West Coast Airlines and Pacific Northern Airlines who have informed us that they do not sell or

serve intoxicating liquors in flight.

Approved.

● 26. Representatives presented the following nominations to the Board of Christian Education for a term of three years: Willard Kennon, M. Gene Hockett. Approved.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

● 27. The program of the Board of Christian Education was presented by president Lela Morrill.

Mimeographed reports were distributed to the meeting. This appears below:

We are glad to be able to announce that again this year the Sunday Schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting have shown a gain. The average attendance for the year was 5,623,—261 more than were reported a year ago. Thirty-four Sunday Schools showed a gain. Of these, four showed gains of over 50%. These were Hayden Lake, with a 53% increase; and Tigard, Silverton, and Sprague River each with 52%. Talent gained 41% and Ontario 36%. Six Sunday Schools gained over 20%. These were Meadows 29%, Nehalem 23%, Oak Park and Caldwell each 22%, Newport 21%, and Boise 20%. Eight Sunday Schools showed increases of 10% or more. There were West Chehalem 17%, Forest Home 16%, Nampa 15%, Ashland and Whitney each 14%, Rosedale and McKinley Avenue each 13%, and Greenleaf 10%. We should also mention our newest Sunday School, Lynwood which, though having no previous year on which to base percentage, ended their first year with an average attendance of 72.

However, though these gains were excellent and the total increase in attendance over the previous year was larger than the increase reported last year, yet there were fewer Sunday Schools showing a gain than there were last year. This is cause for concern. One can only imagine what the total impact upon our communities would be if every Sunday School in the Yearly Meeting would in this next year gain at least 10%.

But attendance is not the whole picture. Reports show that most of our Sunday Schools are sincerely attempting to carry on a well-rounded program of Sunday School work, as outlined in the Standards of Excellence. Twelve of our Sunday Schools achieved the high rating of Gold Crown Sunday Schools. Seven merited the Silver Crown, and ten the Blue Crown.

Children and Youth Work.

It is interesting to note that the total Senior C. E. membership this year is 560—over 100 above last year. Intermediate C. E. totaled only 129, but Junior C. E. showed a gain with a total membership of 302. There has been increasingly close and helpful cooperation between the board and the Christian Endeavor during this past year.

Vacation Bible Schools were held in 43 of our churches, the same number as last year, with a total enrollment of 2929. We sincerely hope that more of the churches of our Yearly Meeting may realize the great opportunity for outreach and evangelism which the Vacation Bible School offers.

There are 13 clubs for boys or girls with a total membership of 177. Here is a valuable field as yet scarcely touched by our churches. The board is hoping before too long to be able to provide

improved materials for club work, but the success of such work will still be dependent upon the vision and dedication of the leaders within the local church.

Board Activity

A revised edition of the Standards of Excellence has been published and blanks to assist in keeping records. Activity of the board has also included special emphasis on leadership training, through field visitation by board members and by the provision of four part-scholarships to The First Leadership Training Conference at Bellingham, Washington, beside the award trips given to the three Blue Ribbon Sunday Schools. It is of interest to note that 30 from Oregon Yearly Meeting were present at The First.

Filmstrips for Teacher training have been purchased and circulated.

Financial assistance totaling \$209.00 was given to eight outposts and preparative meetings to assist them in holding Vacation Bible School. A complete survey and analysis of available Vacation Bible School materials was sent to all meetings.

The Future

Plans for the future include continued emphasis upon teacher training, especially through the Evangelical Teacher Training Association courses, special emphasis upon the Standards of Excellence for Sunday Schools, the encouragement of leadership training among our youth, and the building of a well-rounded Christian Education program in the churches of our Yearly Meeting. Perhaps too long we have used our smallness as an excuse for inactivity. May we be challenged by a sense of mission within our local meetings that will bring us to a deeper sense of dedication to the work which God has given us to do, "Knowing that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance; for ye serve the Lord Christ."

Gordon St. George, who succeeds Gerald Dillon as board superintendent of Sunday School, spoke challenging us that as a Yearly Meeting we need a revolution in our Sunday Schools, for new vision and accomplishment. He announced a new Yearly Meeting "Highways and Byways" contest.

Recognition was given 29 Sunday Schools for having attained Gold Crown, Silver Crown and Blue Crown ratings.

Silverton, Oak Park, and Ontario were given blue ribbons, recognizing their having rated highest in achievement in Standards of Excellence. Seventy-five dollars was awarded each of these three Sunday Schools.

Howard E. Harmon presented the work of Christian Endeavor, stressing its importance, and urging us to pray for our young people.

Ron Stansell, C. E. superintendent of Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting spoke concerning the work and challenge of young people in that area.

Lonnie Fendall, C. E. superintendent of Newberg Quarterly Meeting, spoke of how young people can serve God in their local churches, urging loyalty to all its services, and assisting wherever opportunity affords.

Howard Harmon in closing challenged us with the purposes of C. E. as follows: to lead young people to Christ and consecration; to develop leadership; for training for church work, and for social fellowship.

Special appreciation was expressed for the work of Lela Morrill who is retiring as president of the Board of Christian Education this year.

The report of the board was approved.

●28. The morning devotional hour opened with singing, "I Know that My Redeemer Liveth."

Keith Sarver continued his consideration of the disciple's prayer, using the portion, "Thy Kingdom come," Matt.6:10. Jesus always approached the Father in deep reverence.

The only way we can clearly see other people is as we see them through the eyes of God in prayer.

What is the meaning of the kingdom?

Jesus prayed that God should rule in human hearts. In Matthew's Gospel, Christ spoke of the kingdom more than of any other subject. The kingdom of God is righteousness, peace and joy. The Beatitudes express the condition of those that are in the kingdom. If His kingdom comes within our own hearts it means that God will reign supremely with our unquestioning obedience. But it is more than an individual matter. While the kingdom is within us, the consummation of the kingdom is a climactic event, yet to come at the end of the age with the return of our Lord. May the day hasten when the righteousness of God shall "cover the earth as the waters cover the sea."

The meeting closed with the congregation singing "Draw Me Nearer."

Friday, 2:15 p.m.

●29. As we paused in the opening devotional sessions, our clerk admonished each one to be faithful to the leading of the Spirit as we wait before the Lord. Kenneth Eichenberger expressed his concern that we be more faithful in providing education for our children in Christian schools.

Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

●30. In compliance with a request, Ruth Brown is released from her duties as recording clerk Saturday afternoon in order that she may attend the Robert Nordyke funeral. She is to secure the recording clerk pro tem.

●31. Myron Goldsmith submitted his resignation from the Board of Publication due to his expected moving outside the limits of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Approved.

●32. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Moral Action for a term of three years: Virginia Helm, Ruth Anna Hampton, Mildred Minthorne. Approved.

●33. The Executive Council forwarded the following recommendation (See Yearly Meeting Minutes, 1958, minutes 13 and 599:

The Executive Council recommends the following definition of resident and non-resident members.

Resident members are those to whom the church is reasonably accessible by the ordinary means of travel and who give to it the major part of their attendance and support.

Members who, on account of distance, give attendance and support to another church may be listed as non-resident members.

Where two or more Friends churches are located in such proximity that relative distance is a negligible factor, a member who,

without asking for a certificate of transfer, begins attending and supporting another church and continues to do so for six months or more may be listed as non-resident at the time of the annual statistical reckoning. Approved.

It was suggested that the Yearly Meeting secretary forward a copy of this action to each Monthly Meeting statistician. This was approved.

●34. The Executive Council recommends that since the George Fox Press deals exclusively with Sunday School materials, the Board of Christian Education be given responsibility of nominating both members of the Board of Publication of Evangelical Friends. Approved.

●35. The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting that no board meetings be scheduled at Yearly Meeting time during the time scheduled for the Ministerial Association meeting. It was the mind of the meeting that this not be a definite rule, but that this policy be observed as far as is expedient.

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

●36. The following report was presented by our Yearly Meeting superintendent, Dean Gregory:

One hundred years ago, two Friends from London, England, Robert and Sarah Lindsey, were prompted by the Holy Spirit to make a missionary journey to the new Oregon country in America for the purpose of "preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ." Thus begins the humble story of a good century of Quaker ministry and service in the great Pacific Northwest country.

Now, just 100 years later, we review the panorama of historic events, and with bared heads and bowed hearts we stand to reverently review these saints who belong to the ages, for they have made possible the Oregon Quaker story. There they march across the years of history once more, as we slowly turn the pages; the Lindseys, Hobsons, Hadleys, Martins, Edwards, Hinshaws, Winslows, Kenworthys, Cooks, and many others.

We may well remind ourselves that "Other men labored and we have entered into their labors."

God's timing and His providences are often beyond our understanding. The homegoing of our beloved brother and co-laborer in Christ, Ray L. Carter, has left us with a keen sense of loss. Yet, all of us who were close to him during his last days on earth, had a clear feeling that God was calling him to a higher service and that God had, in a most wonderful way, permitted him to "finish his work." His ministry in the field of publication was a pioneer work. He will long be remembered as pastor, teacher, editor, and above all a warm-hearted friend to everyone whom he met.

The current issue of the Northwest Friend, outlines in graphic form the "life and times" of the Friends church in the Pacific Northwest. Edited, and largely written by Jack L. Willcuts, this copy of your church paper becomes a brief documented history and at the same time a clarion challenge for future conquest. Our Quaker heritage thus becomes our Christian challenge.

It is significant that the great conference of evangelical Friends was held this past July in our midst, and it has accentuated the historic relevance of a century of Friends progress. This fifth triennial conference may be evaluated to be the most significant gathering of

evangelical Friends in recent years. I would urge all Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting to become active members of the Association of Evangelical Friends.

The Yearly Meeting headquarters in Portland has been the center of an ever increasing volume of Friendly concern and action during this past year. The people who labor there are your representatives, carrying out the united concerns of more than 5,000 Friends in 63 local churches throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting. In reality our Yearly Meeting task is nothing more nor less than this united concern expressed by each congregation and carried out by your appointed representatives at home and abroad.

A short paragraph on the year's labors of the Yearly Meeting superintendent will be sufficient. I have sought to faithfully carry out my duties in this office and the days have been filled with a wide variety of ministries. My first calling is to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the door has been fully open to that.

My travels have taken me into every community in the Yearly Meeting as well as other places in the nation. I have met and counseled with scores of boards and committees, and have served as chairman of the Northwest Region of the National Association of Evangelicals. I have continued to chairman the Quaker Hour radio committee of the Yearly Meeting. My family and I appreciate deeply the opportunity which you have given us in serving Christ through the church as your representatives.

Those assisting in the work of the Yearly Meeting office have been Phyllis Uptegrove, Beth Hockett, and Darlene Stands. Each of these has been helping out on a part-time basis and I want to express appreciation for their most faithful and efficient service.

This year there are to be ten pastoral changes. The following pastoral arrangements have been made: Herman and Mabel Macy to Piedmont; Robert and Lela Morrill to East Wenatchee; Glen and Mildred Rinard to Newberg; George and Elenita Bales to Rose Valley; Howard and Bethlin Harmon to Lynwood; Robert and Arlene Fiscus to Maplewood; Quilcene, Woodland and Newport are yet unsupplied. Timber outpost will be supplied by a student pastor from our college or the seminary.

The Board of Publication on behalf of the Yearly Meeting has recently purchased the printing equipment and business formerly known as the Oregon Yearly Meeting Press and now bearing the name "Barclay Press."

This purchase has been made possible through a very generous gift by a Friends family in the Yearly Meeting along with many others who have added their gifts, thus making this project possible. These Friends are deeply concerned that Christian people awake to the challenge to provide Christ-centered literature to the millions who are learning to read each year. The communists are pouring millions of dollars into literature campaigns which aim at complete world domination and the destruction of Christ's Church. Every false religion is sowing down the earth with its Christless propaganda. Friends, this work of publication needs the enthusiastic support and confidence of us all!

Ralph Chapman is the new manager of the press, and is assisted by Jack Willcuts, editor of the Northwest Friend, Beth Hockett and Ralph Fletcher. The work of these Friends, in the field of publica-

tions, has proven invaluable and should prove increasingly so in the future days.

The most recent publication of note coming from the Barclay Press is a book called, "Through Flaming Sword," a spiritual biography of George Fox, written by Arthur O. Roberts, professor at George Fox College.

This year Jack Willcuts was named Publicity Director for the Yearly Meeting. He has been working through the superintendent's office and already has sent out over 100 news releases concerning matters of Friends interest.

I am happy to announce that another new Friends outpost has recently been added to our family of churches. This new group is located at Svenson, Oregon, near Astoria on the Columbia River, and has been meeting together for Sunday School and other services for several months under the leadership of Miss Enid Briggs, a high school teacher at nearby Nappa, Oregon. This new outpost is showing real signs of vitality and Eugene McDonald, a student at George Fox College, has accepted the challenge to provide pastoral leadership during the coming year on a part time basis. Piedmont Monthly Meeting in Portland is the sponsoring church. Pray for this our newest Friends church!

There are many places throughout our area where interest has been expressed in beginning new Friends work. The future expansion of our church on the home front depends largely on spiritual dedication. We encourage our capable pastors to go out into the places where God calls them to start new churches, but we have an equal need for concerned laymen to go also. Thank God for concerned Friends, who, when contemplating a change of location, are moving into communities where they can lend assistance in the work of the church.

I believe the development of Oregon Yearly Meeting would be greatly advanced if the Yearly Meeting could see fit to place a full time assistant or promotion secretary into the work, along with the Yearly Meeting superintendent. With the growth of the work in the Yearly Meeting, and increase in number of churches over the past several years, one person cannot possibly serve effectively in the general field, which includes every area of the concern of the church.

Seven of our churches are completing new buildings for worship this year, five are doing major remodeling or additions, and five more of our newer meetings are anticipating new building programs this coming year. Four meeting houses and one new parsonage have been dedicated this year.

The Newberg meeting is to be congratulated on the near completion of the beautiful new annex for Christian education use. Yearly Meeting groups, such as Junior Yearly Meeting and various boards, are making good use of this annex during Yearly Meeting days.

If we are to be mutually helpful to these new small churches we must faithfully pray for them and lend our spiritual and moral encouragement. We must push the work of the Friends Church Extension Foundation and the Share program for building new churches. "Share" has been almost universally accepted over the Yearly Meeting, but we need to double our number of participants this coming year.

Although the general financial picture is encouraging and this

year's report shows a fine increase in giving to Yearly Meeting work, we must not be content until all Friends have felt the joy of honoring the Lord with their tithes and offerings as God has prospered them. We must use care that each area of Yearly Meeting work be adequately and equitably supported.

This year the boards of Evangelism and Foreign Missions teamed up for an effective "United Missions" impact upon the Yearly Meeting. A team of six men, consisting of Frederick Baker, Orville Winters, Walter Lee, Ralph Chapman, Jack Willcuts and myself, covered most of the Yearly Meeting in week-end conferences, presenting the challenge of the witness program of the church. This was a heavy assignment for men who were already busy at their regular jobs but they carried their responsibilities cheerfully, and the conferences were successful in each case.

Especially significant were the two weeks at George Fox College. Most of one week was given over to a home missions institute, and the following week to a foreign missions institute. The team members were kept busy interviewing interested students as well as presenting messages, directing panel discussions, showing picture programs of the work, and entering into campus life as much as age and strength would permit!

It was my happy privilege to meet with Quaker student groups this year at several other schools, such as Greenleaf Academy, Asbury College and Seminary in Kentucky, Earlham College in Indiana, along with several other Yearly Meeting superintendents, and Western Evangelical Seminary at nearby Jennings Lodge, Oregon. Campus visitation is proving to be a most helpful and fruitful method of keeping in touch with our young Friends students scattered across America.

A majority of our ministerial candidates are going on beyond their college training for seminary study. This level of education is one place where Friends have been poorly prepared to meet the challenge and where we are slow to provide for our own students. I would seriously suggest that our Yearly Meeting study the possibility of establishing a Friends Foundation and professorship in a seminary where the theological climate would be suitable for such a venture. If we are to take seriously the tragic shortage of called prepared ministers, missionaries and Christian teachers, we ought to at least be willing to study the problem and seek a solution to the problem.

If we are to have a warm-hearted, Spirit-filled ministry, it will not come by accident—we must work and pray and plan for it! There is a danger, with the strong impact of interdenominational activity, as good as much of it is, and a great preponderance of books and magazines which carry no distinctive holiness emphasis that our theology and preaching may be watered down to a mongrel variety, with an ultimate loss of the distinctives that ought to characterize us as Christians and as Quakers. When I listen to a young preacher, I am not so much concerned with his eloquence, or lack of it, or with his pep and enthusiasm, as I am to discern whether he has been in touch with God and whether or not he has a fresh message from heaven for the people. How we ministers need a full preparation of both head and heart!

However, for us Friends, there should not be a total dependence

upon the minister for our spiritual worship and service. All of us stand equal with our fellows before God, and each of us is responsible before God to create about us a holy atmosphere wherein obedience to the Holy Spirit will be our prime objective.

Music has always played a prominent place in Christian worship and evangelism. Friends have not majored in the development of church music, though a considerable amount of excellent work has been done by individual Friends during the past few decades. We have borrowed our hymnody, along with its wide variety of theology and mood, and you may find a wide variation in the spiritual tone of song books used in our churches.

Many times a whole service may be dulled and deadened by the poor selection and rendition of the songs we use. On the other hand, a good choice of songs, sung by Spirit-filled people, can often make a service successful, even though other things may be lacking.

It would be most helpful if our Yearly Meeting would be concerned to commission a group of qualified, Spirit-filled Friends to act as music counsellors for meetings desiring help with purchases of hymn books, musical instruments, etc., and to be an active force in our church to promote a wholesome and lasting quality in our church music.

Oregon Friends have taken the initiative in the formulation and carrying out of the plan to provide an adequate residence facility for our people of retirement age. This plan which once was only a vision of possibility, is very near reality, with ground-breaking ceremonies being held for the Friendsview Manor during these Yearly Meeting sessions. The "faith and works" of Charles Beals, the manor director and his faithful co-workers on the manor board, have brought us to this time when the project seems so near to accomplishment.

For almost a full year I have had a concern to present to the Yearly Meeting a challenge on long-range planning. While it is true that we walk step by step, and follow the Light moment by moment, it is also true that Jesus taught the principle of "planning" in the Scriptures as the parable of the man who intended to build a tower and counted not the cost (Luke 14:28-30). Some of this report has suggested possible plans for such a program.

Probably none of us actually sees the total program and challenge of the church all at once; we usually see it in parts, department by department. I believe each Yearly Meeting board and committee, as well as each local church, should actually start planning to grow, and go, and glow for God. A pastor recently said, "Fruit is always born on new growth." We'll never grow either in numbers or in spiritual stature by mere happenstance, but real growth and fruit bearing will be the happy norm for a healthy church that really expects to grow and makes continuous provision for more and more development as that growth occurs.

Sincere words of gratitude were expressed for the work of our General Superintendent, and a standing vote of appreciation for his work and labor of love was given.

●37. The suggestion in our General Superintendent's report that a group of qualified, Spirit-filled Friends be commissioned to act

as music counsellors for meetings desiring help, was forwarded to the representatives. (See Minutes 116, 117)

●38. The suggestion from the Yearly Meeting Superintendent's report that our Yearly Meeting study the possibility of establishing a Friends Foundation and professorship in a seminary was referred to the Executive Council.

●39. The suggestion from the superintendent that the Yearly Meeting look into the possibility of placing a full time assistant or promotion secretary in the work, along with the Yearly Meeting superintendent, was referred to the Executive Council.

●40. The concern of our General Superintendent that the Yearly Meeting establish a program of long range planning was referred to the Executive Council.

●41. The Executive Council unanimously nominates Dean Gregory to the Yearly Meeting for General Superintendent for the year 1959-1960.

It is recommended that his salary be the same as last year—\$310.00 per month, utilities \$40.00 per month, house allowance \$85.00 per month, and travel 7 cents per mile. Approved.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

●42. The report of the Board of Evangelism was presented by president Clare Willcuts:

The preparation of my fourth annual report as president of your Board of Evangelism calls to mind the many hours spent in board meetings, traveling, writing letters, and counseling along with other routine duties. However, all of these things, when done in the name of the Lord, are times of inspiration. It has been my earnest prayer that this ministry shall be blessed of God, not mere professionalism. My heart has often been warmed in reading 2 Samuel 10:26, "And Saul also went to Gibeah; and there went with him a band of men whose hearts God had touched." This brief but glowing report follows the account of Saul's anointing to be king over his people. Surely in our day of unusual opportunities we must wait upon the Lord for His divine touch which was promised by the baptism with the Holy Spirit. I am indeed thankful for the other members of the board of whom it can be truly said, "a band of men whose hearts God hath touched." In fact, this anointing is something that every member of Oregon Yearly Meeting should experience and enjoy. With the touch of God upon our souls we can courageously do exploits in the name of our great Redeemer and coming King.

Between Yearly Meeting sessions our board met twice. In the fall we were privileged to view the work at Quincy and be entertained by the friendly people of this outpost. We were also afforded the opportunity to make short visits to East Wenatchee and Entiat. The second meeting, in January, was held at centrally located, Bend, Oregon.

Participation in the home missions institute at George Fox College was a time of pleasure and challenge again this year. Members of our board and several outpost pastors were chapel speakers for this occasion, where we shared our concerns and vision with the student body.

We are pleased to announce that a new outpost was launched this year at Svensen, Oregon. Enid Briggs, a graduate of George Fox College, while teaching in the area gathered together a fine group of

people for regular worship services and called upon us for support and leadership. Eugene McDonald, a ministerial student at our college, has been pastoring this meeting for the past several months. It is a joy to note the continued progress and signs of growth in many of our newer meetings. Ashland and Lynwood have both built lovely chapels while Tigard was able to finish two units of their building. Pringle was privileged to see a new sanctuary completed this summer. All these meetings are to be sincerely congratulated for these accomplishments.

Financial assistance in the amount of \$4,500 was supplied by your board to the following pastors: Irwin and Zarilda Alger at Hayden Lake, Roger and Eulalia Smith of Pringle, Clark and Elizabeth Smith of Talent, and Lloyd and Beverly Melhorn of Ontario. These gifts were invaluable to making it possible for these Friends to serve effectively. In addition to the above contributions the board gave \$7,100 to Ashland, Quincy, Caldwell, Lynwood, Pringle, Silverton and Nehalem to apply on building programs or the purchasing of property. Much of the Ashland gift was pledged at Yearly Meeting a year ago.

A new plan known as "Share" was introduced during the past year which has been of great value to two of our meetings. Members of our Yearly Meeting were challenged to invest in one or more shares, at \$2 per share to be paid upon call. Share calls were made for Ashland and Pringle this year. From these appeals they received a total of \$2,732.50 and \$2,516.50 respectively. We are happy with this new method of assistance for our smaller and newer meetings in their building programs, but it is imperative that more members of the Yearly Meeting participate by purchasing more shares.

Another new venture on the part of the board this year was the buying of a trailer house. This can be easily moved so as to furnish convenient living quarters for carpenters and other workers who have to leave their homes while helping build new churches. The trailer house has been in almost constant use this year, first at Ashland, and now at Entiat.

I will not burden you with the facts and figures contained in the statistical reports which the pastors have sent to the Board of Evangelism, but encourage you to read them carefully; they will appear in the appendix of the Yearly Meeting Minutes. However, it is refreshing to observe some gains in almost every department, particularly the attendance in all of the services for worship.

Reviewing the reports of the local committees on evangelism we learn that 53 churches reported, showing that 57 people were engaged in church extension work over the Yearly Meeting. Nine of these 53 churches indicated that they sponsor outposts. The "Outposter" is used regularly by 43 of the reporting churches. Also, 36 churches stated that they actively supported the Quaker Hour broadcast.

Finally, there are several people and organizations that have helped immeasurably in the function and ministry of this board. We say a heartfelt "thanks" to our superintendent, Dean Gregory, whose enthusiasm and sound spiritual judgment continues to be an inspiration to all of us. We are thankful to the Womens Missionary Union, who once again gave valuable financial aid to our pastors at Silverton; to the Friends Brotherhood for the boost they gave to the

Tigard work; to the Christian Endeavorers of Oregon Yearly Meeting, who assisted in buying the house trailer; to the Friends Church Extension Foundation which has again enabled various churches to secure loans for their building projects; to Milo Ross, John Fankhauser, Richard Perrin, and the faithful Quaker Hour choir for their deep spiritual ministry on the radio, which has been a labor of love; to Donald Edmundson and Donald Lindgren, whose architectural skill has been devoted to our Yearly Meeting. We are deeply grateful to all the members of the Yearly Meeting who have supported us so generously with your prayers and giving.

And above all we are thankful to our heavenly Father for His blessing upon us. It has been the desire of our hearts "that in all things He might have the preeminence." And as a final word I wish to pay tribute to Ray L. Carter, who passed away within recent weeks, while serving on this board as superintendent of Portland Quarterly Meeting. He was for many years president of the board and maintained an active interest in the work of extension. His cheery smile, words of encouragement and wise counsel will be missed by many.

Wayne Piersall presented the treasurer's report for the Friends Extension Foundation. This report was approved and will appear in the appendix with the inclusion of the total assets of the foundation.

Nathan Pierson and Randall Emry, board members, sang a duet, "Jesus, Wonderful Lord."

The annual report of the Friends Church Extension Foundation was presented in mimeographed form to the meeting as follows:

The Friends Church Extension Foundation has just closed its best year. It is hoped that this may become an annual announcement. The efforts of many people have helped to make it so.

Our attorney has been successful in securing for the corporation, both state and federal tax exemption. This has not been an easy task. It means that those who give money or property to the foundation will be able to report these gifts to the revenue service and receive tax exemption. We were informed of this decision by the federal government on July 31 of this year.

The funds of the foundation have increased during the past year. This money has come from:

1. Gifts from individuals.
2. Gifts from churches which have included the foundation in their missionary giving.
3. Interest on loans as they are repaid.
4. Income from sale of church property in Baker, Oregon.

During the year just ended, the foundation has loaned money to:

1. Ashland outpost.
2. Tigard outpost.
3. Talent meeting.

Loans had been previously made to: Spokane, Hillsboro, Eugene, Silverton, Medford (the loan to Medford was repaid during the last year).

In addition to making direct loans, the foundation has been able to assist certain borrowing churches by providing additional security by endorsing notes to lenders. This requires a certain amount of reserve funds on hand but has proven to be well worth while in our present situation. We have been able to give this sort of help to: Marion, Silverton, Ontario, and Whitney.

Our experience in this type of transaction has been excellent. We have not yet been asked to make a single payment on any of these notes.

It is noted that many other churches have been in building programs during the past four years—Caldwell, Lynwood, Metolius, Homedale, Newport, Pringle, Holly Park, Newberg—to mention only a few. These have been able to work out financing by their own resources; or at least through other channels.

Even now we desperately need building programs at East Wenatchee, Entiat, Quincy, Hayden Lake, Maplewood, Medford, Nehalem, Newport and many others (each may add his own church to the list!).

Some of these will be able to go to commercial lenders and meet with some success. Others will have to depend on some form of help from the Yearly Meeting or defer their building programs until such help can be made available.

Beyond the above mentioned locations, we must be looking forward to more Silvertons, more Ashlands, more Tigards, more Lynwoods,—new fields are about us in abundance.

The foundation may become an effective tool in the coming expansion of the Yearly Meeting. Your help is needed.

You may help by:

1. Praying that the Lord will use it to His glory.
2. Becoming a member of the corporation.
3. Encouraging your church to include the foundation in its budget.
4. Making sure that the substance the Lord has entrusted to you will continue to serve the Lord and the church as long as the present era shall last. (The foundation may be made the beneficiary of wills and/or life insurance).
5. Investing your money in the church's building program. It will bring an excellent return with the best of security—and on a confidential basis.

We thank God for the good year just past. It is our humble hope that this organization may be increasingly used in the outreach of our church here in the northwest.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

●50. The Board of Peace and Service made its presentation with president Richard Cossel in charge. The report appears below:

Forty-four meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting submitted written reports from which the following report is compiled:

I. SERVICE

Galatians 6:2, "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ."

A. Home Relief

Much of the emphasis this past year was upon service in the area of the local meeting. Most of the meetings reported some type of home relief project or service which they had engaged in such as the following: Thanksgiving and Christmas boxes of food and clothing given to needy families of the church and communities, meals served in time of bereavement and sickness, clothing given through Salvation Army and the Red Cross, letters written to shut-ins, flowers and plants and gift packages given to shut-ins, prompted "Blood Bank" program, contributed to church pantries, painting and shingling house of needy family, aid to seminary student, aid to outpost pastors.

B. Foreign Relief:

1. Four CARE packages, 797 lbs. of clothing, \$130.73 in cash, and quilts sent abroad through the following agencies: Oregon Yearly Meeting Mission Board, National Association of Evangelicals, World Gospel Mission, Bob Hammond, World Service.

2. One meeting reported arranging for a Jamaican girl, Victoria Mack to come to Portland to continue her education.

II. PEACE

Matthew 5:9 "Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God."

A. Reports:

1. The names and addresses of 175 boys between ages of 14-18 years reported.

2. Six men reported serving in alternate service.

3. Thirty-seven men reported as serving in the armed service (three of whom were reported as serving as non-combatants.)

4. Meetings reported promoting peace message by the following

methods: sermons, tracts, training classes, Sunday School lessons, Christian Endeavor lessons, promoting Oregon Yearly Meeting speech contest, film "Alternatives" shown, round table discussion, counseling of those facing draft.

III. PROJECTS Promoted and Sponsored by the board:

A. Booklet "Bible and War" mailed to each boy in the Yearly Meeting listed between the ages of 14-18 years old.

B. Sponsored the peace oratorical contest in cooperation with the Christian Endeavor Committee.

C. Accepted the responsibility of the monthly support of Leslie McHargue, who is serving his alternative service by serving on the Oregon Yearly Meeting mission farm.

D. Sent board member Paul Mills to the Church Peace Mission conference at Evanston, Indiana, where 26 different denominations were represented.

E. Encouraged use of film "Alternatives" in local meetings.

High school speech contestant, Alice Hampton presented her talk on, "The Sermon on the Mount in the Atomic Age." This was greatly appreciated.

Speech contest winners are: Alice Hampton, Newberg, Oregon and Gail Thompson, West Chehalem.

Charlotte Macy stressed our responsibility in service, especially emphasizing the need for blood donations.

Charles Beals representing Friendsview Manor, told of the progress of our Friends retirement home. Of the 123 living units. Ground breaking ceremony for the new structure was held the first day of this Yearly Meeting.

The report of the Board of Peace and Service was approved.

●51. The centennial observance of Quaker history in the Pacific Northwest was presented by Jack Willcuts.

One hundred years ago, in 1859, Robert and Sarah Lindsey, with a minute from London Yearly Meeting to do missionary work in Oregon, came with the concern "to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ." Many hardships were endured by this consecrated couple. Traveling by boat and stagecoach, services were held in the towns of Salem, Eugene, Oregon City, Portland, and Hillsboro, and they constantly witnessed along the way and distributed the Scriptures, books and tracts.

Following Lindseys' missionary venture, Mary Pinkham, Rebecca Clawson, and others visited and labored in Oregon, and helped to prepare the way for a later work.

In 1871 William Hobson, who may rightly be called the founder of Friends work in Oregon, carried a definite concern that Friends should establish a permanent work in the greater Pacific Northwest, and labored to that end.

In 1877, Oregon's first Friends Monthly Meeting was set up, in the Chehalem Valley near Newberg, and in 1880 the meetinghouse was sufficiently completed to accommodate the worshippers. Newberg Quarterly Meeting was set up in 1887. In 1892 the first sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting were held at Newberg, Oregon.

Seated on the platform at this centennial observance was Marie Haines, attired in a traditional early Quaker gray attire. Also

present was Marion Cook, retired minister who was a caretaker at the first sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting, which position he held for five years. In addition, Bernice Williams, Ruth Astleford, Myrtle Russell and Dr. A.E. George, who all attended the first Yearly Meeting, were in the service.

In looking back at this century of progress, we pray that we as Friends today may have that same spirit of dedication and zeal, to carry the "unsearchable riches of Christ" to others.

● 52. The inspirational hour opened with the congregation singing, "Footsteps of Jesus."

Keith Sarver, continuing with "The Disciples Prayer," used the portion, "Thy Will be done on earth as it is in heaven." He read from Matthew 26 concerning Jesus' prayer in the garden.

The thing that makes heaven is that God's will is perfectly done there. Isaiah tells us that there will be a time when God's will will be done perfectly on earth.

We are not forced to do God's will. But we can elect to do God's will in spite of our environment. We can pray "Thy will be done in and through me." Then we must give ourselves to the doing of God's will. Prayer is not for selfish acquisition, but it is that we may know His will for our lives. Jesus prayed, "Nevertheless, not my will but Thine be done."

The end of such a life of glad submission is a life of peace and joy, and heaven at last.

The service closed with prayer by Edwin Clarkson.

● 57. Dorwin Smith was nominated by the Executive Council to serve on the Board of Administration of National Association of Evangelicals. This was approved.

● 58. The following members to serve on the Board of Trustees of George Fox College for a period of three years were approved as follows:

Nominations from the Executive Council were: Ivan L. Adams, Wilbert Eichenberger, Clare Willcuts and Fred Jarvill.

Nominations from the alumni were: Wayne Antrim and Allen Hadley.

Nominations from the Board of Trustees: John Farner, Glen Koch, Glen Rinard, Forrest Holmes for three years, and to fill the vacancy resulting from the resignation of Horace Mott of Colorado, we nominate Governor Mark Hatfield. All of these nominees have given consent for their names to be presented.

GREENLEAF ACADEMY

● 61. The following report of Greenleaf Academy was read and approved:

The Greenleaf Academy completed another school term with commencement exercises held May 29th. Rev. Jack Willcuts addressed the graduating class of twenty three, largest senior class to date.

The school year was one which could be termed good in practically all aspects.

Throughout the year an all time high enrollment of 119 was reached, aside from a goodly number of elementary pupils taking private music from academy faculty. Of the 119 regular day students, at least 77 were Friends or representative of Friends churches. Altogether about eight denominations made up the student body. While the majority of students reside in Boise Valley and commute by car or school bus, approximately 15 were boarding students from more distant places, particularly Oregon and California.

Staff

The faculty consisted of nine members, three of these being on a part time basis. Mr. John Lyda and Mrs. Leona Gwynn have moved to other areas and Mr. Wendell Morse has been hired to teach science in the absence of Mr. Lyda. Mr. John Carr, one of the present members of the faculty will take over the music duties of Mrs. Gwynn and also have charge of the private music formerly under Mrs. Janet Lyda. Betty Ankeny will assume secretarial duties of the office.

A word of appreciation is here expressed to the entire staff and board for their sacrificial labor and Christian unity which they have shown in laboring together for the cause of Christian education.

Academic curriculum

No major changes were made in the course of study. Offerings and requirements meet and exceed those set up by the State Dept. of Education for a secondary school of its size and enrollment. Emphasis is made on requiring graduates to have completed a well rounded course preparatory to entering college. Continued accreditation has been granted by the state inspector of secondary education.

Extra and Co-curricular

A well rounded social program was carried on with a limited number of class and all-school social functions. While it is very difficult to plan a schedule that will not conflict or duplicate that of the churches, every possible effort is made to cooperate as we recognize this is a very important phase of the churches' work in holding the young people.

In athletics a three sport program gave every boy opportunity to participate in some form of athletic activity. Less opportunity is afforded in girls athletics but an active girls G and Pep club provides much room for supporting the athletic teams as well as a chance to earn letter awards. A pep band, under the enthusiastic direction of student leader Charles Smith, inspired real enthusiasm to our home games.

The athletic department sponsored the Skyline Basketball Tournament and won the second place trophy in the conference.

Two class plays, three music recitals and one all school music production were given during the year. Several honors were won by small music groups at the district music festival and at least one honor at the state regional festival. The spring choir concerts were presented in a number of Boise Valley churches and the choir made one trip northward presenting a morning concert at New Meadows and a community concert in the evening at Cascade, Idaho. They were also privileged to appear on K.B.O.I., T.V. Channel 2, Boise, Idaho.

Physical Improvement and Material Accomplishments

The science department was greatly improved with tripled laboratory space and a great deal of equipment. This expansion made the offering of chemistry possible and will also benefit in other science courses.

Library equipment and books are being added as funds provide.

Some new typewriters are being purchased for the commercial department.

A nine-passenger carry all was purchased in the fall and has aided greatly in transporting students from Boise, thus reducing the

number of miles placed on the regular school bus.

The hot lunch program under the National School Lunch Plan was inaugurated in November. Extra storage space was added for storage of U.S.D.A. commodities and a commercial range purchased for the dining hall. Mrs. Ruth Hull is to be commended for her fine work as school cook.

The senior class contributed a sizable donation to the Alumni Association to be used for the purchase of folding chairs. This is a much needed addition for the chapel room and a committee was appointed from the alumni to continue the project.

At least one day of labor was donated by boys of the athletic association to earn money for the purchase of new basketball suits. This was accomplished as well as the full payment of the athletic debt in June of this year.

Perhaps most significant of all material accomplishments this past year was the overwhelming success of the annual gymnasium benefit sale. Something over \$5700 was received, an amount sufficient to pay off the indebtedness on the gymnasium.

We are truly thankful for these material blessings and trust they will be used rightly in a Christian cause.

Financial

The annual operating budget for the 1958-59 school year exclusive of fees, lunch program or departmental funds was estimated at approximately \$30,000. This amount must be met primarily by tuitions and a stipulated amount each year from the local Monthly Meeting.

Due to the fact that a number of tuitions were unpaid at the close of the school term and some unexpected expenses were incurred during the year, we have been faced with some problems in closing the financial books in the clear. It is the present belief however, that with some temporary arrangements along with incoming tuition for the past year, current bills and salary payrolls will be met by the opening of the new school term.

The Board of Trustees feel that the benefit sale should not be discontinued, but that it become an auxiliary method by which the school's budget may be met and provide a somewhat voluntary way by which other meetings and individuals may assist in supporting the Greenleaf Academy.

There is also the need of further completion work on the interior of the gymnasium as building funds provide.

With continuing price increases and climbing living costs it seemed imperative that salaries be increased. To meet this demand a tuition increase will be effective this fall from the previous \$85.00 per semester to \$95.00 per semester.

Spiritual

The spiritual contribution made to or received by the students of Greenleaf Academy cannot be measured in the course of any single year. In fact only eternity will reveal the full value of such training. Our purpose, however, remains the same, that those who attend the school will not only receive a well rounded education in a Christian atmosphere, but that they may gain a real Christian experience and grow in that experience continually, thus enabling them to become established and stable Christians as they enter college or whatever may follow.

Through the chapel services, prayer meetings, Christian youth

organizations and revival meetings, every opportunity is afforded for this kind of spiritual growth and development. The faithful and regular ministry of the local pastor, Oscar Brown and other visiting ministers as well as Christian faculty provide students with help and counsel they so often need.

Christian leadership and example among student body officers is perhaps one of the greatest influences to be found within the school. The student body was privileged to have such a fine president as Daniel Roberts whose Christian testimony and daily life was a blessing and inspiration to all.

Conclusion

As we look to the future it is with both anticipation and concern. Few evangelical Friends academies now exist. We cannot advocate the reopening of those that have discontinued. Neither can we say that all Friends young people should attend a Friends academy or a Christian high-school. Every case presents its own particular problem and must be decided on the basis of need, what is possible, Christian wisdom and divine guidance.

The rapid growth of Christian high-schools both by other denominations and interdenominational support would suggest there must be a reason. Have Friends lost a vision they once had and forgotten the importance of Christian education even before entering college? It would then seem that as a church we should consider more universally supporting the few remaining Friends academies still in operation. It is natural to shift this responsibility, especially if we are not located close to such a school or if our own children are unable to attend, yet we must recognize these schools are still training those who will be among the leaders and Christian laymen in our churches and mission fields of tomorrow. They are also serving as a real feeder to our own Christian colleges with as high as 50 to 60% of the graduates continuing their education in Friends colleges. We do indeed feel a kindred tie to George Fox College and encourage our young people to further their education at that place.

A final concern and one we are sure speaks for the entire faculty and board is that our academy maintain as high scholastic, moral and spiritual standard as possible. With the general lowering of moral and spiritual standards all around us we must not excuse ourselves and permit our standards to slip in proportion, or accordingly.

Worldly amusements, undesirable habits, and pastime activities bordering on or connected with questionable forms of recreation should not only be frowned upon but considered as off the record. To accomplish this goal may mean closer screening of applicants, less toleration for those violating rules and possessing uncooperative attitudes toward the true purpose of the school. These are goals that can be reached only by the wholehearted cooperation of parents, students, faculty, board and all who support the school.

Pray that Greenleaf Academy not fail in the great responsibility that is theirs.

The buildings and grounds give evidence of much needed care. Edwards Hall is in need of much attention in the areas of adequate restroom facilities and general cleaning of the rooms.

We rejoice with the college in the advance of the accreditation program and are concerned that such a program should not overshadow the spiritual emphasis of the college.

It is recommended by the committee that attention be given to providing clean and adequate living quarters for single students, that the academic standards be held high, and that the development of a sound spiritual life be uppermost in the mind of the college leaders.

With continued prayer and support, we can be justly proud of our college.

This was approved with the suggestion that copies of the report be forwarded to the administration and president of the board.

●76. Milo Ross, president of George Fox College, presented an analysis of the Living Endowment for the fiscal year, 1958-1959. Cambridge, Star, Woodland, Netarts, Newberg, Medford, and Newport churches were cited as having reached over 80% of their set goals.

Kenneth Williams, dean, spoke of the spiritual phase of the college with this as a concern along with other advancement. He reported that Hubert Mardock has been secured as evangelist this year, and requests prayer.

Arthur O. Roberts spoke of how they are attempting to specially tailor the educational program to fit the young people who come to the college.

President Milo Ross presented his report as follows:

This is the fifth full report which it has been my pleasure and duty to prepare for the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees, and I assisted in the preparation of the one preceding. It may be significant to superimpose this thought at the outset, what with the average mortality rate of the college presidents being at five years, at least the pressure is off in our having passed the minimum!

One of the most challenging chapels was conducted under the auspices of Pi Gamma Sigma, scholastic honorary society, with the major address being given by Professor Paul Mills. His theme was "Working Together with God," and taken from the Scripture lesson, "We are workers together with God." His striking illustrations came from the field of nature. He pictured a wild rose, an artificial one made by the cleverness of man, and the modern, lovely hybrid developments. Again, he told of a wild, thorny apple tree and its small fruit, an artificial specimen for decorative purposes, and the present-day, highly-bred examples seen in the super-markets. The first situations of the rose and the apple illustrate the natural, creative work of God; the second artificial examples the activity of man without God; and the third wonderful developments of man's cooperation with God—for God and man together can accomplish more than God, or man alone. It appears to me that a philosophy of Christian education is contained in the terse summation of Professor Mills' remarks.

In going back over the editing of a number of my reports, there must of necessity be a kind of uniform skeleton, because of the nature of the subject matter and the functions of a Christian college. However, each year is different. The past academic year is no exception. I sincerely believe that herein is the best report that has been made

under my administration.

NEW PROCEDURES

Administratively, I turned more of the faculty leadership to Dean Kenneth Williams, and he in turn more to Dr. Arthur Roberts, who was appointed head of the curriculum committee. I accepted greater responsibility in city leadership, while at the same time spending more time with Denver Headrick, director of development, both with him in the field, and in direction and time in my office. We had operated without a curriculum committee as such for a number of years, but had depended upon the chairmen of divisions for curriculum building, scheduling, and the adding and omission of classes, and kindred considerations. The chairmen of divisions, under the leadership of Dean Williams, have done a monumental job in meeting weekly for the last three years. There has been great stability and constancy in the group, there being only two personnel changes in the last six years. But even so, a division of labor was considered to be to the total advantage, and especially in a balancing of policies and involvement on the part of more people.

Professor Harvey Campbell chaired a committee to revamp our faculty handbook. His service has been invaluable, both because of his experience and leadership in other institutions of higher learning, and because he is an alumnus. We, therefore, are functioning by committees with less duplication and with more efficiency. He is also chairman of the committee on faculty insurance.

As a corollary of the faculty re-organization, we agreed on a re-location of offices, with the Dean-Registrar, recorder, and public relations being contained in the southeast areas of Wood-Mar Hall; while the business manager, bursar, and director of development were shunted to the larger room north of the general office. It goes without saying that Wood-Mar Hall was not designed for business efficiency, and much is yet desired. The work stations are not yet correct, there is a great deal of noise and the attendant lack of privacy, and the flow of business traffic is not ideal. This latter problem is especially acute at times of enrollment.

The past year has been the first full one in the operation of the Student Union. Our policy of turning this operation almost completely to students has proved to be very wise and our faith in them is being confirmed. We now know that we need at least twenty-five more students to operate without cost to the administration. We now know, too, that the general style of construction, materials, heat, etc., are very efficient, and should give us direction in future building.

We have changed the tasks of Denver Headrick from a field man in the interests of finance to director of development. He has taken over the Living Endowment work, and has concentrated on foundations. Two major trips were taken to California, which are the first for many years, and with some success.

It goes without saying that the work of the self-study looking toward regional accreditation was new to us. No previous study worked against the new yardstick of criteria. The two major changes in our ordering of affairs came about through an analysis of our financial procedures, budgeting, budget controls, and kindred involvements. I shall comment upon these under the heading of finance. But the questions dealing with our aims and goals as a Christian and

Quaker institution, and our realization of them, posed situations which forced us to back up to 1939 and go about the serious task of creating a completely new "Who's Who" of our alumni and former students. Outside of a simple questionnaire circulated by our public relations office in 1954, no serious attempt had been made in the field. It has already taken nearly a year and the task is not finished, but some results are now known. Among them are that 81% of our alumni are church members and 80% are active in churches. Fifty-two per cent of grads have gone on to graduate work, which is known to be above the national average of state schools, and equal to the average of private schools. A high percentage have entered the sacrificial callings—the ministry, the missionary calling, and social service. Perhaps other significant results may yet emerge in the final tabulations, but great strength can be shown in all decades of our history. Dr. Arthur Roberts has charge of this task, assisted by the public relations office, and a number of consecrated workers of the local alumnae.

Credit should be given to Elizabeth Aebischer, president of the alumni association, and her able and sacrificing assistants. Other than the work on the "Who's Who," and the steady publication of the Alumni Newsletter, the alumni chapters assisted materially in the great work of the debt liquidation campaign, and in the organization of two new chapters, both in the state of Washington. A central Washington chapter, embracing the area near Wenatchee, is now being led by Walter C. Cook of Entiat; while the new southwest Washington chapter, with adherents from Kelso to Camas, is led by Dorothy Williams Tjostolvson.

In some ways the future may find that the greatest single development of this academic year is the inauguration of the "Intensified Studies" program for superior, or gifted youth. Suffice it to say, that after one full semester of its operation, we are highly pleased with the results. Dr. Arthur Roberts heads the committee in charge, while John Johnson, majoring under Professor Evan Rempel in mathematics and physics, and Gil Rinard under Professor John Beltz in the natural sciences, are the two sophomores who are piloting the program. We now anticipate the inclusion of the best freshmen of this year. We need adequate financial underwriting, both for the college, in the use of professors and equipment, and also to assist the students. These are the greatest needs financially, as regards educational programs.

I continue to find great joy in association with the Christian scholars who man our faculty. I believe that I appreciate people who know more than I, whose lives demonstrate the power of the Christian gospel, and whose service and leadership are directing the future of our youth. Some activities show greater strength than others. In this regard, I recall a news article concerning the labor problems in Australia during World War II, when thousands of workers were drafted into their armies to fend off the feared Japanese invasion, and how that millions of fleeces of Australian wool slipped and were not sheared. In a lesser way, the great work of preparation for the accreditation visit overshadowed all other tasks. However, the seminars were excellent this year, led by Professor Mackey Hill. An ideal time was found for the faculty prayer meetings, which were consistently largely attended. The faculty lecture, assigned to

Professor Paul Mills, could not be held because of illness in his family.

The studied policy of grooming our own youth for major educational roles, rather than taking professors in from the general market, or in the use of more elderly personnel who may be emeriti from other institutions, is beginning to be demonstrated. Such is a very complex situation, necessitating much expense, hours of interviews, matters of judgment in the potential of youth that they may develop spiritually, intellectually, and in their formal training and experience. As I explained to the ministers of Oregon Yearly Meeting in the annual session at Redmond last April, Friends may be at fault in allowing too low an intellectual ceiling over our leadership. The statement of Elbert Russell in his History of Quakerism is apropos: "After all allowance has been made for the difficulties under which early Friends worked, there remain two serious defects in their educational ideals and efforts. First, they did not attempt to provide for higher education of collegiate level. Shut out from the universities, they provided no institution to take their place. When the university-trained men of the first generation died, there were none to take up their mantles. Friends did not have means to found a great university, to be sure; and it would have seemed a daring thing to start even a small one. But in other lines, Friends were not afraid to attempt daringly original things. The second defect lay in the absence of provision for religious education beyond the very rudiments. The members of a religious democracy, such as the Society of Friends, needed more religious training, not less, than those of other bodies having a professional ministry and specialized leadership."

While greater success has been demonstrated in America in these regards, there are still great "blind spots" in our evangelical youth going to the top in music theory, the natural and physical sciences, arts, foreign languages, speech and drama, and no doubt other areas. Therefore, it is our aim to challenge our best youth to go to the top in all fields to the honor of our God and the success of our institutions.

Specific instances are these: Harvey Campbell, after twenty years of successful teaching and administration in high schools and other colleges has come back to his alma mater. This in the fields of history and also in freshman composition. Both Hector Munn and Floyd Weitzel in the natural sciences have been groomed for several years by the Beltzes, who were their former instructors. Their first year has been very satisfactory and they are actively pursuing their graduate work at Oregon State College and the University of Colorado, respectively. Dorothy Oppenlander, a former student, and with her master's degree in mathematics, returns to George Fox College after several years in high school work.

Dilla Tucker has elected not to stay with us because of her approaching marriage, and is being succeeded by Edward Peacock of the Garden Grove meeting in California, who is now finishing his master's program in speech and drama at UCLA.

Dorothy Barratt, an alumna and with a bachelor of divinity degree from Western Evangelical Seminary, will follow Wilma Magee in women's physical education, and take over the Christian education offerings. The latter development is in line with our policy of step-

ping up the Christian education to at least a minor offering, if not a major.

Lloyd Mallet in voice is being succeeded by William Utley of Salem, who has most of his work on a master's in music from Eastman Conservatory.

Helen Powell, after three fine years as Dean of Women, has accepted a position at Friends University, and is being followed by Alice Dixon of our city.

The graduate work of our faculty has been quite imposing. The Dean has finished his master's field study at the University of Oregon. Mackey Hill in history is taking his examinations on his doctorate. Alex and Joan Beltz, and Evan Rempel are all involved in doctoral studies at Oregon State College. Genette McNichols is pursuing a graduate degree in library science at the University of Portland. William Utley is studying under Fred Waring at the University of Oregon. Dorothy Barratt is finishing a state credential at Oregon College of Education. Harvey Campbell is being orientated on his doctoral program.

James Bishop in public relations was forced to resign. We have been well served in the interim by Mary Sandoz in the office, and three field men—Dorwin Smith, Robert Morrill, and Orville Winters, in student recruitment.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

We enrolled a total of 141 students.

All classes and courses met fully throughout the year. There was some serious disruption due to illness on the part of both faculty and student body. But from the very first, the year began to be characterized by a very serious purpose regarding spiritual ideals and study. There was a wholesome desire to excel. Such a spirit on the campus has both the favorable and negative sides, but from the viewpoint of the faculty, the favorable far outweigh the negative! Favorably, as high as one-third of the student body were on the honor roll at one time. Negatively, this was a very poor year in co-curricular activities. While the student body functioned nicely under the capable and cooperative leadership of Paul Morse, a number of other organizations almost fell by the way.

The two Christian Emphases weeks were times of great blessing, led by the Four Flats in the fall, and Herschel Thornburg this spring. There were many words of appreciation concerning the chapels, too, with a greater use of films and well-prepared musical groups. The two full weeks given over to the challenge of the home missions and the foreign mission fields were the best of the type we have had, I am told.

In many ways, the social life has been well ordered, with comparatively minor infractions, and with a general climate of cooperation and wholesome functions, good fun, and a nice variety of occasions. I am sure that the entire faculty agrees with me that the climate of student opinion is to the effect that the first business of college is to get an education, and that to excel is being socially acceptable.

The caliber of the library service continues to be of a high order. By agreement of the executive committee of the board, a larger allotment was made to library for an increase of books and magazines, to the effect a greater supply of equipment. I trust that the same

liberal attitude will continue, as the library is the center of college life. Total accessions are now just under 20,000, a gain of 1145 for the year. Comparative figures for circulation are as follows: 1954-55, 4,028; 1955-56, 4,181; 1956-57, 3,845; 1957-58, 5,594; and this 1958-59, 5,795. The major accessions this year came by direct gift from the estate of the Rev. E. R. Pritchard, whose estate is being settled with books to our library; and a recent allotment from the personal library of the Honorable Herbert Hoover.

The three main areas of co-curricular activity are found in athletics, drama and speech, and in music. The football season was very poor, but we did enjoy the cooperation of the local high school authorities in the use of their equipment. Basketball proved to be much more successful, with our coming out second in the Metropolitan League, first in the invitational tournament, and placing three men on the tournament all-star team. An emphasis on leisure sports is proving to be of greater significance on the campus, and we believe it to be of great worth in the future lives of our students.

A highly successful year can be chalked up in speech, with Lyla Bury of Johnstown, Pennsylvania, a student of Miss Tucker, placing first in the entire West in a tournament at Fresno State College, and Florence Angelelo placing second in the Oregon State Temperance competition. The very pretentious production of Shakespeare's Merchant of Venice highlighted the season, and met with great success.

The choral productions can be said to be the best for a number of years, what with Mrs. Storaker training the full oratorio choir, the a cappella, the choraliars, the senior ensemble, and other incidental groups. Mr. Mallett has assisted in an excellent manner in the training of special ensembles. The 4,000 mile Christmas tour was the greatest of our history, and no doubt made many friends for the college.

The contributions of both Mr. and Mrs. Hazelle in the fields of fine arts have proved to be most excellent and highly appreciated.

FINANCES

The greatest single accomplishment in finances was the successful completion of the funding of the debt liquidation campaign which went over the top on February 2. As of this report, it can be said that \$3,325 has been pledged over and above the basic \$144,000;

that \$75,312.69 has come in in cash; that the campaign has cost \$4,784.72, that \$62,971.50 in notes have been paid off, and that \$7,556.47 is now in savings pending settlement.

All segments of our constituency have come through in fine style. Especial credit should be given to the Newberg citizenry because this is the first time in many years such a show of concern for higher education in the community can be shown. The local drive made many friends for us, and as far as we know, no enemies.

The general fund has suffered in some areas, of course, due to the emphasis upon the debt. The accounting of the general fund reveals the following:

This is the first year for the operation under a gross budget. The business office and the executive committee of the board adopted a cash-flow budget following the counsel and leadership of Erwin K. French, the author of the Sixty College Studies and we found that our operation had much in common with the major colleges of the study. We had presumed that some costs might have been out of line because of the small size of the institution, but Mr. French's analysis has shown that costs will probably rise proportionately, if we were to grow substantially. However, his study has given us quite valuable yardsticks to work against.

Both in his analysis and that coming from the officers of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, we must admit the very, very low scale of salaries. Even after some material raises, the scale remains at about \$2000 under the Northwest average for private schools. The problem is not one of consecration and sacrifice so much as it is in the difficulty of financing graduate work, the omission of professional memberships and conventions, and of the neglect of travel and other cultural and enrichment opportunities.

We raised the tuition \$100 as of this year, and at the beginning of the second semester, the board went up another \$50. Some fees have been increased. While no immediate raise is anticipated, it can be shown that our low rates can be justified only by the fact that many in our constituency are not wealthy. At the same time, the faculty and staff are paying too great a load to educate our youth. We are endeavoring to offset the problems of student hardship and to attract the better students by a greater underwriting of the scholarship structure. We are happy to announce the continuation of the Crown-Zellerbach matching program, an increase in the Carnation Company Foundations' grant, the addition of a full tuition and fees scholarship by the S.S. Johnson Foundation, and a full tuition scholarship by Arthur K. Wilson, class of 1908.

But by far the greatest contribution percentage-wise came from the church itself. According to figures supplied my office by the Council for the Financial Aid to Education, the highest amount of denominational support per student was \$368.79 supplied by the Evangelical Free Church, and second at \$365.52 supplied by the Latter Day Saints. Oregon Yearly Meeting is third in the U.S. at \$304.25. Also, the support per church member provided by Oregon Yearly Meeting is \$8.76. The nearest to the above amount is \$3.33 given by the members of the Lutheran Free Church. Thus, our church is over twice the previous record established by any other group of Christians in our country. I may add, as an aside, that the

support proffered by Friends in the Five Years Meeting to the colleges under their control is pegged at 53 cents.

CASC

The Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, and of which George Fox is a charter member and I am a director, has completed its third full year of service. I was asked to lead a workshop at Michigan State University on "Curriculum and Business Management." I also took part in the fall meeting of the board in New York City, and the annual convention in Kansas City in January.

At the Kansas City meeting, George Fox was given a citation for the outstanding fund-raising drive of the year; this in connection with the work of the Council for Financial Aid to Education. Also, what came to be known as "The Big Idea" of support for the smaller colleges developed at that time. We were listed among the top twelve for grants at that time. However, in a new listing presented at the April meeting in Detroit, we were eliminated. I understand that in the meantime, a number of foundations concerned with their giving to the smaller colleges changed their analysis to include only those which were growing at a fast rate and which had an enrollment of around 300 students. The fact that buildings were not required for possible accreditation was also against us. We now understand that incentive grants are being considered based on alumni participation and other measurements.

In this framework, it should be said that for the third year we have failed to get to the top of the United States Steel \$25,000 award. Here again, the lack of increase of enrollment was a determining factor. CASC, as a Council, is ahead of the national trend in enrollment growth.

ACCREDITATION

The self-study, looking toward regional accreditation, was completed on April 1, and submitted to the investigating committee and the members of the Higher Commission. Subjects included were: Institutional Objectives, Evidence of Stability, Finance, Plant, Materials and Equipment, the Library, Registrar's Records and Reports, The Curriculum, The Instructional Staff, Instruction, Administration, and Students. Dr. Roberts prepared the study, assisted by most of the full-time faculty and administration. The cutting of the stencils, the mimeographing, and the binding of the 55 copies, was all done in the college office, thus saving some costs of publishing. A contingent of the local alumnae volunteered help in the sorting and binding which was of great help.

The study itself was very accurate and complete. The committee investigated us on April 23 and 24. We shall not know the results of the investigation, nor the recommendations, until the annual convention of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. Thanks should go to the Portland members of the board and the local Chamber of Commerce for their assistance during the investigation itself. Also, to all those who responded to the special fund to defray the costs of accreditation, and among them the Tektronix Foundation for its incentive grants, our thanks and appreciation.

From our conversations with the officers of the Northwest Association and the committee, we think that the strong points in our favor are: clear-cut Christian liberal arts over all four years, dedication of the faculty, actual good teaching, plans and strategy

for the future in both buildings and personnel, the campus, our endowment, the realization of our goals in the lives of alumni, our testing and counseling, adaption of teaching to the needs of our students, and intensified studies for superior students. As negative factors, I list low faculty salaries, few doctors, high turnover in two areas, small constituency base, poor buildings, lack of growth, and deficit financing during a majority of annual operations.

THE FUTURE

As has been written, "A college is one of the most permanent institutions known to our civilization." Plans should never be abortively put into effect, nor should financing be done on a Fuller-brushman technique. A college seeks to distill the wisdom of the ages, but at the same time, it seeks to come to new insights applicable for its day, and especially in regards to modern methods, equipment and training.

As a college administrator, working in cooperation with a board, a "long-haul" position must be aimed at—in personnel, in buildings and equipment, in total financing, in philosophy of education. At the same time, the "short-term" problems are often acute, dictating certain limitations upon the procedures in regards to emergencies within the faculty and staff, finances, economical and social pressures affecting enrollment, and competition with state schools and other private schools.

I believe that my first report to the Oregon Yearly Meeting in 1954, the address delivered at my inauguration, subsequent annual reports, and the address which I made at the Evangelical Friends Conference in Denver in 1956, all give a candid and significant statement of our Christian educational aims, broadly spelled out. I believe that the 1958 statement was especially important here. There is no change of basic aim and goal. The record speaks for itself.

I am making an extended and far-reaching series of proposals to the board, much of which is confidential and in progress, which will delineate the overall needs between now and 1966, our strategy in candidating adequate replacements and the up-grading of our faculty, internal adjustments which need to be made, and ways and means of underwriting the major building and equipment demands to serve our growing constituency up to 400 students. As these are studied and developed, and/or others supplement them and improve them, public announcements will be made and the cooperation of all solicited.

Without going into detail or undue extravagances, I sincerely believe that our alumni and friends, and our supporting church, together with our friends in the western business world can share our optimism as we look toward the future. The success of a college may be envisioned in much the same way as a person comes to spiritual growth in faith in God—one step leads to another and one accomplishment suggests another and a greater. If our following has done the most for the college which can be shown in all its history, those accomplishments and victories in themselves presage subsequent successes. Our complementary situation also suggests a mutuality of interest and need—the church cannot succeed without the college, and the college cannot succeed without the church. Alumni cannot assume their rightful place and prerogative without the growth and vigor of their alma mater, and the college would be hamstrung in-

deed without the alumni. Our city would suffer an irreparable loss without the college, and the college depends heavily upon the city for support and goodwill. To all concerned, then, the development and growth of our George Fox College are areas of enlightened self-interest as well as the more objective and general advantages to American education and the cause of the church.

Even with incomplete estimates, we must raise our sights to a round figure of at least two millions of dollars to put our house in order, and even two million does not consider our endowment needs. Our needs are so great as to stagger all of us. And I should not suggest so overwhelming a consideration were it not that I believe anything less will not honor our God, nor serve the present age. Jesus said, "The children of this world are wiser in their generation than the children of light." It must be said of us. Nothing less than excellence will suffice.

PERSONAL

The tasks associated with my office have become more complex and demanding with the passing of time. My work day and the number of days per week are both greater than when I became president. I believe, however, that the internal organization, by and large, in regard to efficiency, dedication, and experience is the best in several years. I know that Dean Williams has taken more of the responsibility off my shoulders.

My report of memberships, conferences attended, and other obligations and privileges appears appended, and is much the same as a year ago. However, I should state my reason for resigning from the board of the Friends Committee on National Legislation, because of the misunderstanding which has arisen in the minds of other Friends. My only reason for resigning was the action of the committee in supporting the resolution of the commission of the National Council of Churches—which advocated the inclusion of Red China into the United Nations. I will not allow my name to be associated with such an evil recommendation. I have supported the committee's action in many other issues, and my action, therefore, was one of specific protest only.

I had the honor of being named "Newberg Man of the Year," which honor is a humbling tribute to the friendship and goodwill which obtains between the college and our city.

I trust that all of our friends will continue to have a greater sense of confidence, not in myself and even those associated with me in the cause of Christian education, but rather that "our cause is just" and merits the support of concerned people everywhere that we train our youth in an even better way to serve their God and their fellowmen.

The report was approved. It was also approved that the auditor's report be included in this report.

●77. Keith Sarver, in the inspirational hour, continued in the exposition of the "Disciples Prayer," with the portion "And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors."

This is the only part of the prayer which our Lord needed not to pray for Himself.

We are all hopelessly spiritually indebted to God.

We have a responsibility, not only for personal transgression, but also for sins of others.

God's forgiveness is conditional, "As we forgive our debtors." All sin is against God, but it is also against society. The door of Calvary is open to all, but only as we have total forgiveness for those who trespass against us. As we come into conflict with those who oppose us, we must do so in a spirit of love and forgiveness.

Forgiveness is more than forgetting. It is reconciliation of relationship. We may have enemies, but we must not have enmity.

Do we really forgive when we come to pray?

Keith Sarver closed with prayer, that we may forgive as we are forgiven. The congregation united in singing, "Draw me Nearer."

● 82. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Stewardship: Grace Clark, Lloyd Melhorn, Herbert Sargent for three years, and John Carr to fill the unexpired term of Harold Lund for two years.

● 83. In view of the fact that Dean Gregory and Walter and Carol Lee are anticipating a trip to Bolivia and other Latin American countries, the clerks are authorized to sign minutes for service for these Friends, according to disciplinary procedure.

● 84. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Publication for a term of three years: Arthur Roberts, Herman Macy. They present the name of Harvey Campbell to fill the unexpired term of Myron Goldsmith of two years. Approved.

● 85. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Missions for a term of three years: Paul Goins, Donald Lamm, Waldo Hicks. Approved.

● 86. Robert Morrill, Yearly Meeting financial secretary, presented his annual report. This was approved and will appear in the appendix.

● 87. Ralph and Stella Lemmons, of Prairievale Monthly Meeting, Haviland Quarterly Meeting, Kansas Yearly Meeting, were introduced as visiting Friends.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

● 91. The Women's Missionary Union, with Beatrice Benham as president, presented the following report:

"My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior." Luke 1:46,47. Dare we quote the words of the mother of Jesus and apply them to ourselves? Yes, for Jesus Himself said "Whosoever shall do the will of my Father which is in Heaven, the same is my brother, and sister and mother," Matt. 12:50. This report is of necessity made up of numbers of members and things accomplished, but these facts will show the desire of the women of Oregon Yearly Meeting to magnify the name of the Lord in all the ways they can and to do the will of our Father who sent His Son to be our Savior.

The total membership this year is 873 women. This is an increase of 96 over last year. We have 64 missionary unions, having gained four new ones and lost two which makes a total gain of two over last year. Portland Quarter has one new union at Lynwood. This group had 100% attendance at the banquet this year. Southwest Washington has a new union at Camas which makes a second union for Oak Park. Puget Sound has two new unions, one the Charlotte Scott union at Seattle Memorial, the other Bea Fritschle union at Holly Park, each a second union. A bird's eye view of the reports sent in tells us that the young unions and the young women are the ones with the most ambition for getting things done and the widest variety of ideas for activities. Perhaps the older groups are just reluctant to report.

The programs have included a wider variety of interest than some years. Studies have been made of many mission fields in the world, as well as studies of race problems, communism, migrant workers, and social works. The program books published by the Yearly Meeting WMU have been used in every union reporting. Some places used either the devotion or the programs, not both.

The program and devotional books this year have been compiled by Ellen Martin and Pearl Pearson. The programs are well balanced between home and foreign missionary interests. The devotions are written by women on the mission board or by wives of men on the board. The fruits of the Spirit is the subject.

The handwork has been done as usual. There is a large supply of aprons, baby clothes, toys, also things that can be used in Bible School such as clothing, school supplies, sewing supplies, etc., waiting for a shipment to go to the field.

At least 33 unions report having corresponded with the missionaries either in Bolivia or elsewhere. Many individuals have written. One union drew names of missionaries so that each woman had a particular one with whom to correspond and pray.

The salary of Tina and Roscoe Knight was paid by the WMU again this year. Money received for this purpose amounted to \$1858.70. This amount was contributed by 55 unions. Nine missionary unions

have still not caught the vision of missionary work to the extent that it reaches into our purses. Other money spent for Bolivian work includes \$500 for the building of churches in Bolivia, \$100 for married women's school, and smaller items such as freight, Christmas, literature and medicine. The total amount of money spent directly on our own Bolivian missionary work was \$2433.21. Money contributed toward missionary work other than our own is reported at \$176.

The pastoral support paid to Silverton amounted to \$1150.00. Other home missionary work includes, furnishing of the counseling room in the Yearly Meeting offices, books for traveling library, Christmas for outposts, to say nothing of the money that was spent directly from the local missionary unions and did not go through the treasurer's books. This in itself was a noticeable amount but no accurate account is available. Total home project money spent from Yearly Meeting money was \$1446.93. We are happy to report that the women have approved the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the WMU that we contribute \$60 to the pastoral support at Agnew and continue to contribute to the support at Silverton to the extent of \$60 per month. This will add up to more than we took in for that purpose this past year, but we are counting on the women to come through. Out of 64 unions there are still eleven that have not contributed toward this project.

More unions are catching the vision when it comes to prayer and report that they take special time for group prayer after having read the prayer bulletin sent out by the prayer unit chairman.

A great interest in reading is shown. Total number of books read by the women is 3431. Over 100 women have completed the reading program as outlined by the reading chairman. Three women read over 50 books each. We feel that any woman who reads a large amount of Christian literature cannot help but be helped by it and many have testified to help because of this project. One said it was the reading program that brought her back to a right relationship to the Lord, and one book in particular "didn't leave any room for anything but the Lord."

At least eight Quarterly Meeting rallies were held. This is a time of blessing, inspiration and fellowship within each Quarterly Meeting which should not be neglected. We wish there were time and space to report each one in detail.

The retreat and workshop at Redmond the past year exceeded all the others in blessing to all the women. A larger number of women attended than ever before. The speaker was Parolee Downs. Her simple heart-searching message was just what the women were looking for. Retreat for 1959 will be held in the same place. Marie Haines, the "mother" of the retreat, will be the inspirational speaker.

The annual banquet this year was held in the Newberg High School cafeteria. The Lutheran women of Newberg cooked and served the meal for 350 women. Geraldine Willcuts brought the message based on short biographies of pioneer Quaker women, inspiring us all to have more firm conviction in the salvation provided by our Lord. The offering amounted to \$395. This will go to pay tuition for a couple at language school as soon as there is a couple to go. A tape recording made by the missionary women on the field was a blessing to us all.

The reports show that there has been some increase in every area of the work. We are grateful for this, but let us remember the pioneer Quaker women that Geraldine told us about and this coming year try to match them in magnifying the Lord.

●94. The following auditor's report was presented:

I have made an audit of the record of receipts and disbursements as recorded by the Yearly Meeting treasurer and found them correct.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

●95. The Board of Stewardship made its presentation by president Denver Headrick as follows:

Response throughout the Yearly Meeting in the field of stewardship is very gratifying. Each one of you has helped to make it so. The Yearly Meeting treasurer's report reveals evidence of the blessings of God in your response to the financial challenge of our Yearly Meeting program. The treasurer's records of George Fox College also show an increase of Yearly Meeting support. We of the Board of Stewardship seek no glory or thanks but we do take courage and press on to greater victories.

Through the kindness of the author, we were able to put 1500 copies of "God's Call to Business," by Everett Heacock, into the homes of the Yearly Meeting.

It has been a joy to work with this stewardship board. They are workers, I do believe, "workers together with God."

The use of films is a definite part of our program and will be continued in the coming year.

The report was approved.

●96. The meeting adjourned to meet Tuesday morning, at 9:30.

●97. In the devotional period Charles Haworth and John Tish led in prayer. Levi T. Pennington spoke regarding Christ's crucifixion and sang, "Oh, it is wonderful, that He should care for me enough to die for me."

●98. Minutes were read and corrected.

●99. The following was received from the Board of Moral Action:

The Board of Moral Action presents the following statement for the approval of the Yearly Meeting and we propose that our board send copies to legislators from the Northwest, to radio and television stations, to those who manage advertising for periodicals or outdoor display, and to organizations who make policies for better business practices, fair advertising, and pure food and drug administration. Copies will also be sent to the press through our publicity director, and to local, state and national organizations who would be interested in the stand of Oregon Yearly Meeting on such moral issues:

For many years over the air waves, on billboards and on the printed page there have been frequent references to the use of tobacco and alcoholic beverages as a sociably acceptable practice, as illustrated by the "Beer Belongs" advertising campaign. Now we are alarmed by the increasing trend toward the false assumption by association that any such smoke or alcoholic drink could be "good for you." We express our concern to scriptwriters, to advertisers, to lawmakers and to those who administer justice regarding fair business practices and pure food and drug laws.

Approved.

●100. The Board of Evangelism nominates Alvin Roberts to the Friends Church Extension Foundation Board of Directors for a term of three years. Approved.

●101. The Executive Council nominates Harold Lund to serve on the Ministers' Group Insurance Committee for three years. Approved.

●102. The following communication was received from the Ministerial Association:

The Ministerial Association of Oregon Yearly Meeting nominates Dillon Mills to the Minister's Retirement Fund Committee for a term of two years. Approved.

For information, the dates of ministers' annual conference in 1960 will be April 18-22.

●103. The Junior Yearly Meeting, wearing Quaker hats and bonnets, were present in our morning business session. Vincent Corbin, Junior Yearly Meeting presiding clerk, presented the following report:

Junior Yearly Meeting held its 1959 sessions in the new educational unit of the Newberg Friends Church each morning from nine to twelve o'clock. We appreciated the use of these new and adequate accommodations. The average daily attendance was 45.

The general theme for this year was "I have called you Friends." Our sessions were held under the direction of Ruth Corbin. We feel that we have greatly profited from our classes on the history of Friends and their leaders, and Friends' business procedures and doctrines. We also studied present activity of Friends in their outposts, summer camps, and mission fields. Scripture memorization, handwork and recreation were also contained in our daily program.

We were privileged to have several special speakers. These were Ralph and Marie Chapman, Howard Harmon, Charlotte Macy, Clyde Thomas, Virena Tuning, Marie Haines and Virginia Helm. We were also glad for the provision of the prayer room. This was used nearly every day following the worship service.

We believe that we truly have a rich heritage and in you, the present church, we have worthy examples. We realize that we must face our problems of today and of our future with a faith in God that is ours personally and individually.

We appreciate the work of the devoted leaders of this fine group—our future church. Ruth Corbin was director of the Junior Yearly Meeting.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

●104. The Board of Publication, with Arthur Roberts, president, made their presentation.

Earl P. Barker presented the report of the George Fox Press as follows:

As we came to the end of the fiscal year, 1958-59, our general editor and treasurer, Elaine Andrew, reported a very good year with all publications showing an increase in circulation. Although some Sunday Schools using the literature have dropped their orders there has been an increase from various areas which more than offsets the loss. A total of about 400 schools and 43 individuals are now on the subscription lists. The number of helps sold for use during the quarter reaches a grand total of 26,350.

The most interesting development during the past year has arisen from a movement originating in connection with the National Holiness Association. A group of men connected with the publishing houses of the denominations affiliated with the association felt a common concern and conferred among themselves regarding the possibility

of some sort of cooperation. At their last meeting they formed a permanent organization called the "Holiness Denominational Publications Association." The thought was to decide in which area of Sunday School helps each publisher excelled, and then to let those publications be adapted to the use of all. Such joint publications, when adopted by at least three denominations, are to be labeled with the common imprint: "The Aldersgate Series." Mr. Paul Langdon, an accountant and for some time treasurer of Ohio Yearly Meeting, has taken a deep interest in this move, is secretary of the association, and has kept our board in touch with the steps of progress.

Friends have the distinction of being the first to implement this concern and give it a practical development. It seemed to be a common judgment that the Beacon Hill Press, of Kansas City, had the best graded lesson helps for the junior age. A year ago our board made contacts with the publishers, with the result that in April we were able to offer these junior lessons with our own imprint to the Sunday Schools of our three Yearly Meetings. Our general editor receives copies of the manuscripts in time to re-edit them and to substitute material wherever necessary. The publishers themselves have agreed to confine references to their own denominational emphases to certain units, so that these may be replaced wholly with our Quaker materials.

The possibility of a similar plan is being investigated with the Light and Life Press, Winona Lake, Indiana, for the use of their superior primary graded lessons. Helps for those who have nursery age classes are even now available from the Beacon Hill Press.

I might say that we have fervently wished that we could produce all of these materials ourselves. There are several obstacles in the way, such as scarcity of qualified writers, lack of sufficient demand among ourselves, and lack of funds. As you can see, the co-operative venture takes care of all these. With the privilege of re-editing, thus to replace any objectionable material with our own, we feel that we are keeping in line with the ideals upon which our board and its work were founded—to provide Sunday School literature which is sound in doctrine, true to the fundamentals of salvation and holiness, designed to foster fidelity to the views which are inseparable from the historic heritage of Friends.

The financial statement of the George Fox Press was read, and will appear in the appendix.

Arthur Roberts, president of the Board of Publication, presented the following report:

The board met eight times during the year concerning the matter of its responsibility, seeking to establish policy and effect means whereby the ministry of the printed page might issue from our concerns more effectively. We serve the Yearly Meeting by providing low-cost, quality printing to the boards and institutions of the church, and by giving direct spiritual ministry through the pages of the Northwest Friend and through the books and pamphlets published.

During the first ten months our work was directed by our editor, Jack Willcuts, and Ralph Chapman, working in conjunction and apprenticeship with Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher. During this time—as during the preceding decade—the board operated its print-

ing through the facilities of the press owned by Carter and Fletcher. On May 1, two months ahead of schedule, the board assumed ownership and management of the physical plant. This action was hastened by the last illness of Ray Carter and was approved by the Executive Council. Oregon Yearly Meeting now operates a publishing house, The Barclay Press, honoring the early Quaker theologian, Robert Barclay. Ralph Chapman is full-time manager of the press; Jack Willcuts, on half-time, continues to edit the Northwest Friend and to give editorial supervision to board publications. Beth Hockett works full-time on composition, Ralph Fletcher continues on as pressman, as needed, Stanley Putman and Jane Laughlin have graciously donated their artistic talents on many occasions, and Donald Millage, Portland accountant has freely assisted in setting up and maintaining the books of account. Occasional typists have been Alice Dillon and Darlene Stands. Under the direction of the board, these persons engage in a ministry of the printed page, seeking to enlarge the Gospel witness by tract, pamphlet, magazine, and book. The scope of this work may be seen by referring to the accompanying list of materials printed in 1959. (See appendix)

Response to our appeals for funds to purchase the printing plant and other equipment have been gratifying. Of a total need of \$7100.00, some \$4850.00 has come in since June 1. We would like to have the whole amount subscribed before September 1, rather than to secure the remaining \$2250.00 by loan. Through the generosity of Dr. and Mrs. J.C. Brougher, Vancouver, Washington, approximately \$4100.00 was given toward this project (including the purchase of a Spanish keyed electric typewriter). This gift reflects the interest of the donors in providing literature for the Aymara. The purchase of the press was felt by them to be a way of implementing their concern for more missionary and other Christian literature. The money was given as a memorial to the parents of Esther Brougher, Mr. and Mrs. George C. Bauman. We appreciate the gift and respect the memory of those persons whose name it honors. Other gifts have come in, including several hundred dollars pledged by Ed and Sandra Dealy, students at George Fox College, upon whom the Lord laid a burden for a letter press. A memorial fund in honor of Ray Carter was established for the funeral remembrance by Margaret Carter.

Finally, we wish to give tribute to Ray L. Carter, whose ministry on earth ended June 7, 1959; for it was he who sustained the publishing vision for us until more of us came to see it. Although Ray served largely in other forms of ministry—pastor and educator in California and Oregon (including the presidency of Huntington Park Training School and the pastorate at First Friends, Portland) he never got the printer's ink off his hands nor its ministry out of his heart. His early newspaper experiences in Texas provided him the basic skills in printing. These he developed and utilized in various ways until in 1947 he became editor of the Northwest Friend and printer serving the Yearly Meeting, in company with his brother-in-law, Ralph Fletcher. In tribute to Ray Carter, Earl Barker has written, "As our editor and publisher he worked devotedly for our interests, both spiritual and material. It was he who had the vision of possibilities in publication, and who risked his own temporal interests to realize his great ideal on our behalf. We shall better

comprehend as time goes on how much he has meant to us and how great a loss we have sustained."

At the memorial service held for him several Friends spoke lovingly of Ray's gift of encouragement, testifying to the efficacy of his strong arm and cheerful words. In the words of the minute of Portland First Friends, "his life was a tribute to the 'Amazing Grace' of which he sang so confidently." His Monthly Meeting would want us to recognize his powerful public ministry, both as pastor of that church and more recently as Quarterly Meeting Superintendent. His ministry in preaching and prayer are remembered among us as well as his written words in the Northwest Friend.

We conclude with the request that approval of the report include also acceptance of this tribute to Ray Carter as one of the memorials presented to Yearly Meeting. The brief program which follows shows our appreciation and shows the force of his life and ministry through the printed page.

The report was approved.

Arthur Roberts then spoke of the great influence of board member Ray Carter, who passed away June 7, then read a number of excerpts from editorials which Ray Carter had prepared for the Northwest Friend. These showed his deep insight into the truths of God as well of the needs of men.

Jack Willcuts spoke of the influence of Ray Carter on his life, referring to him as "an encourager of the brethren," and of his lasting influence on the publication of the Northwest Friend.

Many expressed words of appreciation for the life and work of Ray Carter.

MEMORIAL HOUR

●105. The Memorial Hour opened with the reading of the names of the 39 deceased during the past year, two of whom were ministers. These names appear in the appendix, and an asterisk indicates those for whom memorials were prepared.

Many expressions of appreciation were voiced for the influence of those who have now heard the words, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; enter into the joy of thy Lord."

Ruth Corbin sang, "Make Me a Channel of Blessing."

●106. The following resignation was read:

Due to the inability to attend the sessions of the Publication Board, James Bishop wishes to be released from that board. This was approved and referred to the representatives.

●107. Richard and Mildred Powell, former pastors of Oregon Yearly Meeting, were presented as pastors elect of the Emporia Friends Church, Emporia, Kansas.

●108. The morning inspirational hour opened with singing, "Face to Face."

Our clerk voiced the sentiment of the Yearly Meeting in appreciation for Keith Sarver's ministry among us at these Yearly Meeting sessions.

We now come to the final petition in the "Disciple's Prayer," "And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." It is necessary for us to pray this prayer. Any hardship or trial which comes into our lives may be temptation, or it may be enticement to evil. All sin is preceded by temptation, but temptation becomes sin only as it is yielded to. When it is overcome, it does give added strength.

But to invite temptation would be presumption. We are to put on the whole armor of God, that we may be able to withstand. We shall not be done with temptation until we finish this life.

It takes a lifetime to pray the "Disciples' Prayer." God must be central, and we secondary. Temptation need not be too much for us, as we can overcome through Him, "For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever." The congregation joined in singing, "All the Way my Savior Leads Me." Randall Emry dismissed in prayer.

Tuesday, 2:15 p.m.

●109. Clifton Ross led in prayer in the opening devotional period.

●110. Adelaide Barker, chairman of the Epistle Committee, read the epistle to be sent out to various Yearly Meetings as follows:

Oregon Yearly Meeting gathered in its 67th annual session at Newberg, Oregon, August 13-18. These days have been filled with blessing as we have met under the leadership and anointing of the Holy Spirit, not only in the worship services but also in the business sessions and board meetings. We have been greatly encouraged during these sessions of the Yearly Meeting by the messages of Keith Sarver, General Superintendent of California Yearly Meeting. The morning devotional hour on the different parts of the Lord's prayer brought rich blessing to the meeting. They caused us to think earnestly on what it means to say "Our Father" and the seriousness of saying lightly, "Thy will be done." Do we really mean that we want His will? The services in the evening have been heart searching and helpful. How wonderful to know by faith that God planned our redemption. It was not completed until Christ shed His blood on the cross. Now it is for us to believe that He has paid the price. He feeds us daily with the living bread. When we have Christ we need no outward symbol. The living Christ enables us to live victoriously. We need to share these wonderful truths with others. Let the Quaker church hold them fast and proclaim them to the world.

The Lord has blessed George Fox College financially, scholastically, and spiritually. Many young people are preparing for useful work in various fields of the church. Greenleaf Academy has had one of the best years of its history with a record enrollment. The Sunday schools of the Yearly Meeting have made good progress, showing a gain in total average attendance and improvements in training of teachers. The growth of our young people is evident and the great number who were in attendance in our five youth camps is very encouraging.

Our missionary work in Bolivia and Peru, South America, is challenging. The transition period from a missionary directed to an indigenous church has not been without difficulties. As we look at the work and growth of the national church we have much to be thankful for. There have been an unusual number of problems and difficulties, but not more than we might rightly expect when we think of the tremendous responsibility that has been thrust upon men who are so comparatively new in the way of the Lord and whose former lives were so completely empty of spiritual light and to the contrary completely enveloped in spiritual and even heathen darkness. The growth of the whole work has been tremendous. It has doubled in the last two or three years. Over twenty young people have indicated

that the Lord has been speaking to them about missionary work, and have declared their willingness to serve Him wherever He directs.

One of the points of high interest during the Yearly Meeting sessions was the "Centennial Hour." The history was reviewed of the early Friends who visited the Pacific Northwest in evangelistic efforts. They came for the purpose of encouraging Friends who had settled in this area to hold fast to Quaker truths and manner of worship. The journeys of these Friends, Robert and Sarah Lindsey of England, William Hobson, Mary Pinkham, minister from Ohio, Abel Bond from Cottonwood meeting in Kansas, Nathan and Elizabeth White, and Rebecca Clawson, a minister and mother of Elizabeth White, also from Kansas, over territory familiar to all of us, in the old, slow modes of travel was vividly described. Today we enjoy the blessings and challenge of the more than 60 Friends churches, George Fox College, and Greenleaf Academy where these Quaker pioneers once labored. May we as a Yearly Meeting ever be as faithful as these Friends.

Following is the report of the Epistle Committee:

The Epistle Committee wishes to acknowledge the receiving of approximately fifty communications from other Yearly Meetings, including epistles from nineteen places outside our own country. It is interesting to know of those activities near and far.

One Yearly Meeting reports appreciation of the spiritual messages of their guest speaker, taken from Christ's great prayer in John 17. They stand firmly upon their faith in God. They report good extension work, and a good Young Friends Camp, which was well attended and deeply spiritual. Their missionary work was encouraging.

One Yearly Meeting noted especially the presence of God in their sessions. Many of the churches had established prayer groups. Some young people were finding their places in the work of the church. Two new meetings had been established. Their summer camp stressed spiritual values. They report progress on their mission fields. The Quaker Men, the Friends Women, and the Christian Endeavor had plans for a good future. Their Yearly Meeting theme was, "A new vision for a great people to be gathered."

Another Yearly Meeting reported as their theme, "Every meeting an outreaching meeting—informed, concerned, committed." Four young men were recorded and eight sent to the mission field. The W.M.U., the Quaker Men, and the young people were doing good work. The missionary day and the college day were outstanding sessions.

The theme of one Yearly Meeting was, "Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven." They were holding to the old-fashioned way. Many young people dedicated their lives to God. The guest speaker brought messages of full salvation. They had good reports from their mission field.

Another Yearly Meeting reported a good year of progress. Their college had gone forward, and had a bright future. The reports from their mission fields were encouraging. Junior camps and youth conferences had resulted in the salvation of lost souls, and development of Christian character. The future of the church was bright. The ministry of Yearly Meeting challenged them to holy lives and consecrated services, in view of the soon-coming of the Lord.

One Yearly Meeting though young, is endeavoring to grow into a true prophet of God, like Samuel. Junior camps and young people's conferences were excellent. Their missionary reports showed the fields white unto harvest. They felt that they must grow and develop both in procedure and in things of the Spirit. "Let us go on to perfection." Heb. 6:1 was their admonition.

This was approved.

●111. Raymond Targgart, former district superintendent of the American Sunday School Union, and now doing visitation work for the Lynwood church, was introduced and spoke to the meeting.

●112. The proposed United Budget was read as follows from the Executive Council:

Each year at the time of Yearly Meeting it is the responsibility of the Executive Council to consider the responses of the meetings to the proposed United Budget and to make proper apportionment to the various boards of the total amount pledged.

The pledging this year amounted to \$39,993.96 out of a proposed budget of \$64,014.60. There had been some changes in the proposed budgets of some boards since mid-year. Taking into consideration this, and the gifts and pledges made directly to the various boards and the balances on hand of July 15, we adjusted the United Budget for 1959-60 to the following final form and present it to you for approval:

In view of the fact of the heavy cuts from the proposed budgets of several boards permission to solicit funds within the Yearly Meeting during the year was granted to the boards of Evangelism, Missions, and Christian Education and to the boards of Peace and Service and Publication on a standby basis.

●113. The Board of Evangelism presented the approved list of evangelists which appears in the appendix.

●114. The financial secretary presented a statement of offerings received during Yearly Meeting which report appears in the appendix. This was approved.

●115. The Board of Christian Education presents the name of Gerald Dillon to serve on the Bible School Publication Board. Approved.

Appreciation was expressed for the years of service by Earl Barker on the Bible School Publication Board, and the clerk was instructed to write a letter stating our gratitude to Earl Barker for his many years of devoted service to this cause.

●116. Concerning the suggestion of our General Superintendent that a music council for meetings desiring help, which was referred

to the representatives, we recommend that a special advisory committee on church music be named for one year to give such aid as desired and to further consider Yearly Meeting approved policies and objectives for music counselling with the possibility of a standing advisory committee being named a year hence. Approved. (See minute 37).

●117. The representatives present the following nominations to the committee on church music: Ruth Corbin, chairman; Quincy Fodge, Marguerite Braithwaite, John Carr, Kenneth Fendall, Frank Haskins, Wayne Piersall, Dean Macy. Approved. (See minute 37)

●118. The representatives present the name of Frank Haskins to fill the unexpired term of James Bishop for one year on the Board of Publication. Approved.

●119. The Quaker Benevolent Society presented the treasurer's report, which appears in the appendix.

●120. The Executive Council recommends that the legal representatives of the Yearly Meeting in the three states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho be appointed annually on nomination of the Executive Council. Approved.

●121. The Executive Council makes the following nominations to serve as legal representatives of the Yearly Meeting for Oregon—Oliver Weesner, Washington—John Brougher, Idaho—Raymond Haworth. Approved.

●122. The Executive Council recommends that appointments to the Committee on Discipline Revision be on an annual basis on nomination by the Executive Council. Approved.

●123. The Executive Council makes the following nominations to serve on the Committee on Discipline Revision for one year: Earl Barker, chairman, Frederick Baker, Charles Beals, Milo Ross, Arthur Roberts. Approved.

Appreciation was expressed for the efficient work done by the Discipline Revision Committee.

●124. The Board of Peace and Service nominates the following to serve on the Friendsview Manor Corporation: Wendell Woodward, three years: Claude Lewis, one year. Approved.

Sixty one people were provided for in private homes, and many others stayed with friends or relatives. We wish to thank Olive Hester who was responsible for arranging for rooms.

The flowers at the church were provided by the local flower committee of which Mabel Frost is chairman. The flowers in the dining hall were from other meetings of the Newberg quarter. Rose Fendall arranged for these.

Credit is also due to our cooks, Minnie Moore and Violet Brown; Thelma Green who served as hostess; Arthur Winters, business manager of George Fox College and general trouble shooter; to the young people who cheerfully waited tables and cleaned up after the meals; and to the adults of the various local meetings who helped out when needed. All of these services were very much appreciated.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

●129. Walter Lee, president of the Board of Missions, presented his report as field secretary. The board report was as follows:

"The Lord hath made known His salvation: His righteousness hath He openly shewed in the sight of the heathen." These words of the Psalmist express the feeling of the Board of Missions as it submits its annual report.

There have been problems to face which serve to indicate the value and effectiveness of the work being done. Satan, the arch-enemy of Christ, does not waste his time on that which is no threat to his program. In some areas of the field there has been opposition and persecution resulting in the destruction of the large gospel tent. But without any campaign for funds, a number of Friends in Oregon Yearly Meeting are already expressing a concern for replacement of the tent by substantial contributions. There have also been internal problems within the national church, especially relating to the mission farm and Bible Training School. It is very probable that the nationalistic spirit sweeping across the world has been a factor in these problems. Then too, the relative spiritual immaturity of the majority of the national leaders, leads to misguided actions at times and calls for Christian sympathy and understanding by those of us who have for so long enjoyed the blazing light of the Gospel. Another cause of difficulty, which is present not only on the mission field, but in our home churches, is the occasional leader who is not wholly consecrated to the Lord.

But these problems have not prevented the work of the Lord and the doors of opportunity are still open. We thank the Lord for the evidence of hundreds of transformed lives year after year on the mission field. The opportunities in Peru are great and during this year two new families have arrived on the field to join forces with the missionary staff. Everett and Alda Clarkson and family and Charles and Charlotte Scott are valuable missionaries and add strength to the mission work. However, these new missionaries are replacements for those who have left the field rather than additions to the staff. Roscoe and Tina Knight left the field in May for a year's furlough and are traveling home by way of the Holy Land and mission fields in Africa. Forrest Cammack was also there for a number of months and gave most valuable help.

The work on the Klamath Indian Reservation at Sprague River, Oregon, which was transferred to the Board of Missions this year, has been quite encouraging and is showing a steady growth.

On the home front there is evidence of a continued vital concern for the missionary work. Fifty-four of the sixty-one meetings reported their missionary activities. It appears from the reports that at least forty-one members of Oregon Yearly Meeting are engaged in some type of missionary work. Of these fourteen are serving under the Board of Missions of Oregon Yearly Meeting, twelve in Bolivia and two at Sprague River. At least twenty of the young people of our Yearly Meeting have indicated that the Lord has been dealing with them relative to service on some mission field.

Approximately one thousand three hundred missionary calendars were distributed this year. The receipts from the calendar project reported by the Yearly Meeting treasurer amounted to \$5,284.25

for an average of \$4.36 per calendar.

The receipts for missions this year are the greatest in the records of Oregon Yearly Meeting as they reached a total of \$52,479.73. This appears to be the first time missionary receipts have exceeded \$50,000.00

The great opportunities on our Bolivian field call for at least another missionary family, but at present the board has no immediately available candidates.

Field Reports

As we look at the work and growth of the national church we have much for which to be thankful. There have been an unusual number of problems and difficulties, but not more than we might rightly expect when we think of the tremendous responsibility that has been thrust upon men who are so comparatively new in the way of the Lord and whose former lives were so completely empty of spiritual light. The growth of the whole work has been tremendous. It has doubled in the last two or three years. This of necessity means that half of our churches are choosing men who are really only three year old children in the Lord. Let us urge you to pray for those of our national leaders who may lack in their spiritual experience.

There are many phases of the work of our national church that have gone forward in a very fine way. It has been a little over a year now that the construction program has been entirely in the hands of our brethren. Quite a number of new churches have been built and others have been improved or finished to make them more appropriate for worship. Several pastors' houses have been built, but this is yet perhaps our greatest need in construction and in the advance of our work in this line. We praise the Lord for an excellent carpenter and his son who have worked faithfully in this important task. At Yearly Meeting time an unusual effort was put forth to put into effect a tithing program that we are hoping will soon place our national church on a much better financial basis.

Roscoe and Tina Knight have been very faithful in the Yungas area reaching out far and wide into new communities. Many tent meetings have been held, evangelistic meetings and classes were held at least twice, and nearly all the churches had at least one week of revival effort. Evangelistic work in the area of the farm continues and a goodly number of boys are out preaching in many points in the nearby farms and communities every week end.

The lake area is being cared for with the use of Bible school boys and the aluminum cruiser, "El Amigo." During the major part of the year David Thomas was working with the boys in this area and recently the Hibbses have taken over this work while the Thomases are replacing the Knights in the Yungas. Regular trips are being made each week-end and the Hibbs are working on a permanent permit for working the Peruvian side. This area also holds a tremendous challenge. There is an area on the eastern side of the top of the Andes that we carried a burden for during the years. We rejoice that this also seems to be opening and the harvest is at hand. One of our Bible School graduates is moving into the community and already a few families have been converted. Three other communities nearby have believers and doors are opening in still two more places.

There are yet communities within walking distance of La Paz that

are without the Gospel, and in the regions of the Altiplano near La Paz, it is doubtful if half of the farms and communities have any opportunity whatever to hear of salvation. An extra missionary family could profitably be occupied full time in evangelization just in the La Paz area alone.

Among the physical advances, a new inboard motor has been installed in the launch "El Amigo," and additional shelter added. The much needed boathouse in Guaqui has been built. A room and boat house has been started in Amacari.

The Yungas is no longer a "new" work but has become an established part of the entire field and the Yungas Quarterly Meeting is taking its place along with the others. In fact, it is the largest Quarterly Meeting of the five, both in numbers and in churches. It is amazing and gratifying to see the dependability and stability of the individual churches and their leaders.

The work of the Bible School this year included: (1) the Bible Training School for young men, (2) the short Bible Training School for young women, (3) the special women's classes. Besides these there was a conference for pastors and school teachers. Up until May the school functioned normally. At that time a movement led by the president of the student body and encouraged by the president of the national church came to light. The basic motive of the movement was to change the Bible School to a more secular type of school with credits granted by the State, as well as to take the control of school and school farm from the mission. A two-weeks-vacation, planned for a few weeks later, was immediately given. Plans for re-opening school without compromise on curriculum were made, and notices sent out to the students for the re-opening. Two thirds of the student body returned to finish the year's studies. They were, with very few exceptions, the young men most interested in spiritual values, and doing the will of God.

Week-end deputation and evangelism have been regularly carried on this year. The Lord blessed this ministry richly, although it meant long trips to get the students into these fields of service.

Fifty-seven girls sixteen years of age or older, and seven women chaperones attended their Bible School in November with great blessing. Many of the girls not only found the Lord but also learned to read the Scriptures in their Aymara tongue which is a tricky art even for the more educated. These girls going out from these short period Bible Schools are taking their places in kingdom work in their communities. The women's work in the Gospel is beginning to move ahead. For one week in December classes were held at the Bible School for forty-five women and sixteen children. Classes necessarily had to be simple but the marvelous report is that some of these women can teach others to read.

From the annual financial report it may be noted that we have purchased new machinery this year. Last year we bought the new tractor but had to wait till this year to buy a plow for it. A new self-propelled combine was purchased also for about half price through the Point 4 program. At harvest time a forage harvester was bought for the ensilage. All of these machines have been obtained at greatly reduced price because the gentlemen of the agricultural division of Point 4 have realized our contribution to this country of Bolivia. The grain harvest was smaller than last year's

because of hail when the grain was heading out. The 270 tons of potatoes were encouraging. This yield was due to the commercial fertilizer purchased through Point 4.

The Day Schools opened this year with a national as director. Twenty schools participated. The school situation in Bolivia is changing. The objective of the government is to put schools in every part of the country. So far, lack of funds, and lack of responsible teachers don't add up to a very strong school system, but it is improving.

Medical help to the Aymaras has been carried on in conjunction with evangelization. Extra money gifts have helped the regular \$40 a month allowance. Worthy of mention are the gifts of medicines sent by interested friends in the U.S. These have made modern medicine available, at least in part, to a backward and needy people.

Last year at this time the Boliviano was around 8850 to the dollar. The exchange has gradually risen and now remains, more or less, around 12,000 bolivianos to the dollar. All surplus money has been kept in dollars in order to avoid any undue loss by this inflation. A new Chevrolet pick-up truck was purchased this year for the work of evangelization. It has proved very useful.

God's blessing has been upon the work of the mission in Sprague River this past year. A larger percentage of people have been brought under the influence of the Gospel through the year than in any year since Oregon Yearly Meeting resumed its responsibility in this area. Eighteen children and adults received definite spiritual help. A Bible study was conducted by Scott and Grace Clark during the month of November. We want to express appreciation for the help and sacrifice of the McIntyres and Magees who have driven from Chiloquin, a round trip distance of 52 miles, from two to three times a week to help with the work. It is becoming increasingly evident that any work carried on there will of a necessity concern more and more white people. With the liquidation of the reservation more white people will be buying the land and making their homes here. However, there will be quite a number of Indian people to minister to for some time.

Everett Heacock and Gerald Dillon were presented to the meeting by superintendent Dean Gregory. Each gave his testimony of his call and plans for their tour of world mission fields. They covet an earnest interest in our prayers as they go forth in the interest of the Gospel.

Dean Gregory read Romans 10:13, 14, 15 in a service commissioning these two men as they go forth from us, and closed with a dedicatory prayer.

Oscar Brown, vice president of the board, spoke regarding the importance of periodic executive visits to mission fields to help in conservation of the rapid gains made there, in regard to the mission in general, the farm, and the Bible School, the counselling with missionaries and the encouragement of the national church. With this in view, the board is planning to send board president Walter Lee, and General Superintendent Dean Gregory to Bolivia.

A panel discussion was conducted with questions and answers regarding work on the mission fields in Bolivia and on our American Indian mission field on the Klamath Indian Reservation.

The report and presentation of the Board of Missions was approved.

●130. It was approved that the clerk send a note of appreciation to Gene Smith for the loan of the electric organ during Yearly Meeting. This was approved.
