MINUTES of OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS

- 1. With this confidence so fittingly expressed by the Psalmist, "For this God is our God for ever and ever; He will be our Guide," we enter into this sixty-eighth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting, held at Newberg, Oregon, August 17, 1960.
- 2. The Yearly Meeting Clerk, Dorwin Smith, led in prayer seeking the Lord's guidance in the work of the Church and the kingdom.
- 3. Dean Gregory, General Superintendent, delivered the keynote address as follows:

During my college days I sang in the school a capella choir. One of the young ladies in the choir had the unusual gift of perfect pitch; that is, she could give us exactly the proper tone for each song without mechanical assistance. Perfect pitch is a rare and wonderful gift. A song begun in the wrong key will never right itself. The beginning key is all-important.

A keynote address should be made in the proper key, and I am deeply conscious of the need for clear perception and keen discernment in this opening note.

If there has ever been a time when the Church needed to speak clearly, so that all the world could understand, it is now. A great many of the religious declarations being made leave the world confused and without guidance. Christ's Church has been commissioned to bear a message of hope and salvation to all the world, a message of the glorious good news. Shame on the Church if we are so pre-occupied that our dominant note of redemption is not heard above all other themes.

Christianity is a religion of optimism; not a frivolous, surface optimism in man, but an optimism in God and His plan for His Church. Jesus said, "I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." The Amplified Version reads: "... and the gates of Hades, (the powers of the infernal region) shall not overpower it. . . or hold out against it." The Church is not on the defensive, but is literally storming the gates of hell, as one of our pastors recently pointed out, and the Church of Jesus Christ is marked for victory.

This Scripture points up the essential nature of the Church. It outlines for us: 1. the author and architect of the Church, 2. the certainty of the building of the Church, 3. the final destiny of the Church.

The Church is a spiritual organism. It is the body of which Christ

Himself is the Head. As the apostle Paul puts it: "...let us grow up in every way and in all things into Him, who is the Head, (even) Christ, the Messiah, the Anointed one. For from Him the whole body (the church, in all its various parts closely) joined and firmly knit together by the joints and ligaments with which it is supplied, when each (with power adapted to its need) is working properly (in all its functions), grows to full maturity, building itself up in love." Amp. Vers. Eph. 4: 15, 16.

While the essential nature of the Church is spiritual, the operation or function of the Church is also very much concerned with the physical and material interests of men. And in order to achieve a spiritual ministry to all men, the Church must be vitally concerned in all the needs of human life. One of the great problems of the Church through the ages has been to keep its spiritual ministry in a proper balance and relation to the social and material implications of the gospel.

While we need to be alerted to the political, social and economic trends of our day, we must be wise enough to keep first things first, and remember that the secret of power in the Church rests in God, not in us. He will use the Church only to the degree that He possesses and fills the Church by His Spirit.

The spreading clouds of atheistic Communism are ominously and rapidly covering our world. Today, one-half of the land surface of the earth, and one-third of the world's people are under the awful, hellish hand of communist control. Another full third of the world's people are claimed by the pagan religions of Animism, Buddhism, Hinduism, and Mohammedanism. Roman Catholicism claims nearly 20% more, and all Protestantism combined claims most of the remaining 15%.

This would be a very discouraging picture if we considered the claims of paganism, Communism and Catholicism as valid. However, God has commissioned His Church to go into all the world and reclaim men from the devil's snares, regardless of the circumstances or connections.

Instead of the 85% of the world being a closed door, it is rather, in reality, an open door. Millions behind the iron curtain of Eastern Europe, and the bamboo curtain of Asia, and the purple curtain of Latin America, are waiting for the light. And there is an entrance to these countries where we may not send missionaries, even through short-wave radio and by the long arm of prayer.

There has been no revision of the great commission since the day our Lord gave it to His Church. Indeed it is still the imperative order of our King.

We stand today upon the threshold of a new decade of years, the 1960's. We appreciate the sunset glow of the old decade of time, the 1950's, just fading out over the western horizon, and it will do us good to tarry a moment in the warmth of that glow.

God has been good to us, the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting. We only regret that our love and service were not more fervent and extensive on behalf of His great kingdom.

Our membership during those ten years has increased consistently

each year for a 22% gain giving us a total membership now of 5537. The resident active membership has had a net gain of 410 for the decade. Our Sunday Schools have gained by 63% for a present attendance of 5839. The Sunday worship services and prayer meetings have enjoyed a similar increase in attendance.

The church's giving has been notably increased, with a 116% rise in the total United Budget giving, which is our missionary arm of the church, with a new high total this year of \$40,206.07. Yearly Meeting giving to George Fox College, reported in our minutes, shows a great increase through Yearly Meeting sources. The Fixed Expense budget, for Yearly Meeting administrative purposes, has increased 41%. The total giving of all the churches has increased from \$227,690.85 in 1950 to \$536,485.73 this year for a 135% gain. The average giving, per capita, this year, was \$99.89, and \$228.29 was the average contribution per resident active member in the Yearly Meeting.

I foresee no necessity for curtailing our vision or the expenditures of energies, intercessions, and finances during the new decade ahead. Missions, at home and abroad, is the very "survival kit" for our church.

The phenomenal growth of the church in Bolivia adds to the conviction that these are the golden days of unparalleled opportunity to promote the kingdom of God everywhere possible.

Christ is concerned for His Church. Statistics may indicate trends, but they can never measure the spiritual temperature of the Church. In the letter of our Lord, dictated and directed to the church at Laodicea, it appears that their annual reports must have looked pretty good. They were very well satisfied with themselves. They thought they had need of nothing. But Jesus laid a great and awful condemnation at their door—for they evidently had only a form of godliness, without the vital power. They were not "all out," either good or bad, but this very lukewarm, contented, self-centered spiritual nothingness brought the greatest condemnation, for God could not tolerate it then, nor does He condone it in our modern Church.

Recently, while in Bolivia with the missionary visitation team, we had the privilege of spending a day at the little Aymara Friends church of Parina Arriba, located away out in a very isolated area of our field. To get there, we had to travel for hours over extremely rough and sometimes almost indistinguishable trails across the barren Andean plains, and upon arrival, as though putting an exclamation point on the end of the journey, we were obliged to ford a river. On the other side we found a most warm and hearty reception from the members of this little church. There were far too many friends on the grounds to crowd into the little mud-floored, thatched-roofed Friends meeting house, or the adjacent adobe-walled school building, so we were entertained outside for most of the day.

Parina Arriba is probably one of the poorest of all our Bolivian churches, we were told. Indeed, all the churches of Bolivia are poverty-ridden, and it is difficult for a North American to understand differences of degree in such deep poverty. However, we were to soon discover that here we were actually "in" on the very heart beat and at the very center of the life of our Bolivian church.

The Parina Arriba church is a young church and zealous for the

work of the Lord. They wanted to support their pastor and school teacher, but there just wasn't enough money to do it. So, they decided that if it were scriptural to give a tithe of their money to the Lord's work, why wouldn't it be just as right to give God one row of potatoes out of every ten, and one sheep out of ten! And this was the big day when the Lord's potatoes were to be dug, and the Lord's sheep were to be brought and given to the church.

I have never before witnessed such complete happiness and satisfaction as was expressed on those dark-skinned faces that day. Here was the secret of the real stewardship—for they had discovered what the apostle Paul wrote of the church in Macedonia: "How that in a great trial of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality." Eph. 8: 2.

Parina Arriba has become a name synonymous, to us, with consecrated stewardship.

Yes, Christ is building His Church, and we are all concerned and anxious that the people who call themselves Friends in the family of God shall be a living part of that great Church.

Christ has a purpose for His Church in the world. He wants His Church to be holy, in order that He can have glory and enjoyment in the fellowship of that Church, and that the Church may be useful in bearing fruit. Further, He wants His Church to be a veritable center for the preaching and teaching of the Word, for the evangelization and conversion of sinners, for the sanctification and establishment of believers, and for loving Christian service to those who are in any need.

I believe there is some evidence among our churches that God's Spirit is at work. Witness one church where four or five young men have recently dedicated their lives to the ministry. Consider the fifteen young couples and three teenagers who submitted their names as willing prospects for mission work in Bolivia during the year. And have you heard about the most outstanding and continuing youth revival at Mid-winter Christian Endeavor Conference?

Our Lord's return seems to be imminent, according to the prophecies of the Scriptures. God grant that we shall all be ready, with that extra supply of oil, the fulness of the Spirit, when He shall require of us our stewardship.

At the close of this message, the congregation joined in singing "A Charge to Keep," and Frederick Baker led in prayer.

● 8. The absence of the Assistant Recording Clerk was referred to the representatives to fill the vacancy. Approved.

● 9. It was reported that Marion Cook, long-time resident of Oregon Yearly Meeting is very ill. Dean Gregory suggested the Yearly Meeting send him flowers. This was approved and Dean Gregory will care for this.

● 12. The reports on the State of the Church were read and the summary appears below:

There is generally a note of rejoicing throughout the Yearly Meeting over good attendance at Sunday morning meetings for worship. Most report smaller attendance in evening services and the mid-week service. In general, Sunday School attendance is on the increase.

Most members are endeavoring to live consistent Christian lives, although there is a deep concern for those who have let the cares of life crowd out a vital Christian experience. Many observe family worship in their homes.

Much appreciation is given for the faithful ministry of pastors and evangelists in speaking to the needs of the people, whether for reproof, for correction, or for instruction in righteousness. Doctrinal standards of Friends are being upheld by our leaders, and several churches have conducted classes in Friends' doctrine. Visitation programs have been conducted by a number of churches with good results.

One item noted throughout the reports was the faithfulness and spiritual growth of young people in our meetings, and churches are seeking to encourage the development of spiritual gifts. We feel that the Church will be victorious as the present adult generation and our young people together press forward in the work of Christ.

● 13. The following resignation was read from Walter P. Lee.

In view of my anticipated move from the limits of Oregon Yearly Meeting, I herewith offer my resignation as a member of the Board

of Missions.

This was accepted and referred to the representatives. Appreciation was expressed for the years of service Walter Lee has devoted to Oregon Yearly Meeting.

● 14. The following communication was received from Newberg Quarterly Meeting:

One who has traveled with a speaker in our area, under the auspices of the National Association of Evangelicals, has on numerous occasions condemned, without discrimination, those who work for peace and has done this in programs where he has mentioned this relationship with the NAE, which would seem to his hearers to imply NAE approval. Because of this, we feel it would be well for us to reaffirm our peace stand and make this known to the NAE.

It was suggested that we reaffirm our statement concerning our peace testimony to the National Association of Evangelicals. This was referred to the Board of Peace and Service for a suitable statement, to be brought back to these Yearly Meeting sessions. (See Minute 132)

● 15. The following communication was forwarded from Southwest Washington Quarterly Meeting:

The Yearly Meeting now maintains five summer camps in three states. Because no one of these is very large, our efforts are spread thinly with the result that, according to present-day standards, none of the camps is run on a completely proper and methodical basis, neither financially nor physically. Also there is an increasing need for a place which can care for large groups such as the WMU retreat, Ministers' Conference and the young people's mid-winter convention.

The suggestion is made that the Yearly Meeting sell these small camps and purchase a tract of land large enough to care for these groups in summer or winter, and centrally located so that it would be within easy reach of every church in the Yearly Meeting. We are interested in having such a possibility explored and the advantages and disadvantages of such a unified camp discussed.

This was referred to the Board of Christian Education for study and to be reported back to these sessions. (See Minute 67)

● 16. The recommendation came from Portland Quarterly Meeting:

That persons wishing to transfer their membership to another Monthly Meeting should make the request personally in writing or personally sign a letter of request which may be written by another person, rather than on the initiative of the meeting.

This was referred to the representatives. (See minute 80)

● 17. The following was received from the Ministerial Association:

The ministers and ministers wives of Oregon Yearly Meeting wish to express our appreciation for the generous gift of \$150.00 which you extended to us again this year to help with the expense of our annual conference held at Redmond, Oregon, April 18 to 22.

Without this help, and that of the individual meetings, such a conference would be an impossibility because few of our pastors would be able to stand the expense personally.

● 18. The following communication was received from the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight.

Feeling a need of guidance for Elders and Overseers, the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight has approved a study of available material

and preparation of a suggested booklet. The Meeting on Ministry and Oversight requests that funds be made available for preparation and mailing to each Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight suggested material for study during the coming year.

It was approved that this be cared for through the Yearly Meeting office.

● 19. The report of the Yearly Meeting treasurer was presented and appears in the appendix.

A standing vote of appreciation was given for the consecrated service of Roger and Mildred Minthorne in their efficient work in handling the records of our Yearly Meeting finances.

● 20. Oliver Weesner, chairman of the Auditing Committee reported that he has examined the treasurer's books and finds them in good order and accurate in so far as he has had opportunity to check them. The Yearly Meeting accepts the oral report of the Auditing Committee, granting them permission for further checking should they consider this advisable.

● 21. The morning inspirational hour opened with singing "The Church's One Foundation" led by John Carr.

Walter Lee, soon to leave Oregon Yearly Meeting to serve as Superintendent of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, will use I Timothy 6: 20 as his topic for these morning services.

"O Timothy, keep that which is committed to thy trust" taking as his topic today, "Serenity of the Spirit". He read Philipians 4:4-8.

We must have peace with God, but we must also have the peace of God.

Although facing antagonism, and being opposed by the throngs, still Jesus exemplified serenity of spirit, and inner peace.

Jesus was in all points tempted, like as we are, yet without sin. Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you."

Early Friends manifested this serenity of spirit.

Pentecost brought this peace to the early disciples.

The apostle Paul stated that Godliness with contentment is great gain. Walter Lee closed with Whittier's poem, "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind." The congregation joined in singing the chorus of "Peace, Peace, Wonderful Peace" as the closing benediction of the service.

Wednesday, 2:15 p.m.

● 22. The afternoon devotional period opened with Willard Kennon offering prayer.

● 23. The following resignation was presented from Pearl Reece: Due to circumstances beyond my control, I find it impossible to serve on the committee for memorials.

This was accepted. Kenneth Fendall was named to serve.

● 24. The representatives nominate Beth Hockett to fill the vacancy of the Assistant Recording Clerk for this Yearly Meeting session. Approved.

● 25. The Board of Peace and Service nominate the following as members of the Friendsview Manor Corporation: Claude Lewis—3 year term, Elmer Lewis—1 year (to fill the unexpired term of John Fankhauser). Approved.

● 26. The representatives present the following nominations to the

Board of Christian Education: Dorothy Barratt, Irwin Alger, Gordon St. George. Approved.

● 27. The treasurer's report from the Women's Auxiliary to George Fox College was read, and will appear in the appendix.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

● 28. Richard Cossel, president, presented the work of the Board of Peace and Service. He stated that we as a church should restate and re-emphasize our peace testimony, reading the statement from our Discipline regarding our stand.

The following report was mimeographed and handed out to the audience:

SERVICE

I. Home Relief:

Most of the churches reported activity in home relief projects during the past year including the following:

1. Food, money, clothing, furniture given to needy families in their communities.
2. Help in the time of bereavement, fire, sickness.
3. Gift baskets given to shut-ins and hospital patients.
4. Pound showers for pastors and others.
5. Cards sent at Easter time and Mother's Day and other occasions to the elderly people of the church community.
6. One church gave food plates consisting of fresh fruit, home-made candy and cookies at Christmas time, these being delivered by the young people of the church while Christmas caroling.
7. Some churches have started emergency food pantries.
8. Aid given to local missions, Salvation Army, and Goodwill Industry.

II. Foreign Relief:

The following were reported as foreign relief projects:

1. There were 2573 lbs. of clothing sent abroad.
2. \$368.16 was expended on foreign relief.
3. One church also reported its Christian Endeavor group gives \$10.00 per month for World Vision orphanage support.
4. Five CARE packages reported as sent.

This foreign relief was sent through the following agencies:

1. Oregon Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Union
2. National Association of Evangelicals
3. New Tribes Missions
4. Voice of China
5. Asia Orphanage
6. World Vision Orphanage
7. Chilean Relief

PEACE

1. There are 28 men from our churches reported as serving as combatants in the armed forces.
2. There are 3 men listed as serving as non-combatants.
3. Ten men are reported as serving their 2-years of alternate service.

The following were reported as different ways that the message of peace was promoted.

1. Sermons by pastors and other speakers
2. Lessons in Sunday School classes

3. Lessons in Christian Endeavor
4. Films
5. Classes in Greenleaf Academy
6. Studies in prayer meetings

Most of the churches reported that their pastors give counsel to the young men of the churches, especially at the time they are registering.

Projects promoted and sponsored by the board:

1. Sponsored the oratorical contest in cooperation with the Christian Endeavor committee. The contest theme this year stressed the field of service.
2. The board had printed a desk card of meditations on the peace testimony to be distributed to the young people of our churches.
3. Continued the responsibility of the monthly support of Leslie McHargue, who is serving his alternate service on the Oregon Yearly Meeting mission farm.

Charles Beals presented the work and progress of Friendsview Manor. They are expecting it to be ready for occupancy by April 1, 1961.

Peter Fertello presented a concern regarding a future school and home for boys and possibly girls, as the Lord may lead and open the way.

Several spoke encouragingly regarding such a project.

The report of the Board of Peace and Service was approved. It was also approved that Peter Fertello and Maurice Chandler, who also shares this concern regarding a home for young people, be encouraged to further pursue the study of such an undertaking.

● 29. The caretakers request the power to ask other people to help as the need arises. This is especially for the Christian Endeavor sessions, as most of the caretakers will be attending them. Approved.

● 30. The meeting adjourned, with prayer by Joseph Reece, to meet Thursday morning at 9:15.

Thursday, 9:15 a.m.

● 31. The morning business session opened with prayer by Joseph McCracken.

● 32. Visitors were introduced as follows: Paul Petticord of Western Evangelical Seminary, Jennings Lodge, Oregon; Twila Jones, missionary on furlough from Urundi, Africa.

● 33. New pastors were introduced to the meeting: Paul and Barbara Cammack, Woodland, Idaho; Albert and Phyllis Clark, Quilcene, Washington; Howard and Wilma Cole, Timber, Oregon, Glen and Mildred Rinard, Newberg, Oregon.

● 34. The minutes were read and approved.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

● 35. Gene Hockett introduced Marilyn Richey and Veva Tucker who have been traveling for George Fox College and the Board of Christian Education. They each gave their testimony and the challenge that has come to them as they worked in Bible schools and summer camps.

The following mimeographed report of the board was distributed:

The Board of Christian Education has made an effort the past year to strengthen many areas of the board work. This has been done by introducing new emphases in different areas.

The Highways and Byways Contest within the Yearly Meeting Sunday Schools was sponsored and we were gratified with the response. Several churches indicated that permanent calling programs were established. A week of Christian education emphasis was conducted at George Fox College under the sponsorship of the board. Guest speakers were used to present the challenge of the various fields of Christian education.

In cooperation with George Fox College two college young people, Veva Tucker and Marilyn Richey are spending the summer in field service and training. They have been used by a number of churches in vacation Bible schools, visitation, promotion and observation. They also helped in youth camps and at Yearly Meeting. This is proving to be a real avenue of training and we are hoping to expand this type of work in the future.

A thorough study has been made of boys and girls club materials. We are happy to announce that we are ready at this time to make introduction of new materials under the name Quaker Missionaires. An explanation of this material will be made following this report.

Other aspects of special study have been the summer camping programs. Recommended camp policies were sent to all camps and reports received on the camping program.

A continued emphasis on the Standard of Excellence has been made. The total average attendance was 5,875—235 above last year. Sixteen schools reported over 10% increase. They were as follows: Timber 80%, Lynwood 41%, Tigard 31%, South Salem 29%, Hayden Lake 26%, Seattle Memorial 25%, Hillsboro 25%, Ashland 25%, Newport 21%, Whitney 17%, Agnew 17%, Boise 14%, Star 12%, Cambridge 12%, Rose Valley 11%, Entiat 10%.

The Sunday Schools showed the following ratings in the standards: sixteen Gold Crown, five Silver crown and nine Blue Crown.

Other Christian education activities reported included 41 Bible schools with 3078 enrolled, senior Christian Endeavor members numbered 537 and intermediate C. E. numbered 175, junior C. E. 346. Over 900 attended summer camps. Twenty-seven churches conducted junior or primary churches and 15 carry on some type of a club program. Most of the churches reported conducting a teacher training program.

We look toward the future with anticipation of God's blessing upon our churches. We pray that the following future emphasis will be a means of bringing these blessings to fulfillment.

Both our Standards of Excellence and teacher-training emphasis for the coming year will be evangelism. We desire for every teacher to recognize the place of evangelism in our Sunday Schools. The new club materials will be promoted and put into operation. Another Highways and Byways contest is planned for the month of November. We will be working toward strengthening our summer camping programs.

We wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation of the churches this past year and are looking forward to the coming year with the confidence of your continued support.

Blue ribbons were presented to the following Sunday Schools for outstanding achievement: South Salem, Rose Valley and Ashland.

Willard Kennon presented the work of boys and girls clubs. He read the purpose of boys and girls clubs, as stated in the handbook. He enlarged on the influence of these clubs, The Missionaires, in the spiritual, mental and physical development of children.

Howard Harmon, outgoing president of Christian Endeavor, introduced the new presidential nominee, Lonnie Fendall.

The report of the Board of Christian Education was approved.

● 36. Dr. Paul Petticord, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, gave a report of that institution. Oregon Yearly Meeting has a definite connection with the seminary as we appoint two members to the board of trustees. A number of our young ministers are being trained in this school.

● 37. The following resignation was read from Donald Lamm: Because of my plan to attend Western Evangelical Seminary this coming fall, coupled with my responsibilities at First Friends Church in Portland, I do hereby submit my resignation from the Board of Missions. This was accepted and referred to the representatives.

● 38. The following request was presented. Representatives from Southwest Washington Quarterly Meeting request permission to seat additional representatives today to fill their quota. Approved.

● 39. The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting that the office of distributor of documents be discontinued and that the printer be directed to mail the Yearly Meeting minutes out to the meetings. Approved.

● 40. The Executive Council recommends that the representatives

nominate the Epistle Committee to be composed of six members, with one-third of the number to be appointed each year. Approved.

● 41. The Executive Council unanimously nominates Dean Gregory for General Superintendent for the year 1960-1961. It is recommended that his salary be \$335 per month, utilities \$40 per month house allowance \$85 per month, and travel expense 7 cents per mile.

A standing vote of appreciation was given for the fine leadership our Superintendent has given us during the years. Approved.

● 42. The Ministers Group Insurance financial report was read and appears in the appendix.

● 43. The financial statement from George Fox Press was read and appears in the appendix.

● 44. The statistical report was presented and appears in the appendix.

● 45. Word was received of the death of John Frazier, former pastor of Oregon Yearly Meeting. It was approved that the Yearly Meeting send a note of sympathy to his widow, Clara Frazier.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

● 46. The Board of Moral Action report was presented by president Russel Stands and was mimeographed. It follows.

Department of Public Morals—Virginia Helm, superintendent

Reports from 51 meetings indicate an increased activity in the public morals field within the Yearly Meeting. Over 377 temperance presentations were given, 100 more than last year, including 60 showings of films. Oregon Yearly Meeting now owns 11 filmstrips which were loaned at least 27 times. Nearly 6000 tracts were distributed and a few public morals books were added to libraries. About half the meetings reported election material provided or get-out-the-vote emphasis and a few more reported campaigns for writing letters to legislators and others of influence.

Proper boy-girl relationships were stressed through sermons and the usual channels of Christian education and one meeting held a series of panel discussions on the subject.

The present chairman offer excellent suggestions for projects for the coming year.

The department sent out 250 letters containing sample literature to all pastors and moral action chairmen and copies of our stand on moral issues were sent to many organizations, airlines, legislators and advertising agencies. Letters and a telegram were also written objecting to a liquor license application by the grocery near our Twin Rocks Conference grounds and the license was refused. We were also represented at the hearing regarding closing hours of taverns in Oregon.

Temperance programs were presented by the superintendent at several Quarterly Meeting sessions and at Youth Temperance Council Camp and speakers and literature provided for a CE rally. In several Quarterly Meetings, there is cooperation in youth temperance groups and related activities as well as work in adult temperance organizations with Christian motivation.

Friends in America were the first religious organization to crusade for temperance. Let us be vigilant!

Department of Education—Ludlow Corbin, superintendent

What is significant about this year's statistical report? Compared with last year's report we find a drop in several areas. The reasons for these may be the fact that reports from 12 meetings have not been received, committee chairmen change frequently and the sources for the information vary somewhat from year to year.

We see that there is an increase in the young people attending Christian high schools and Greenleaf Academy, even though most other figures are down from last year.

Though we are not doing all that we could be doing, we can however be encouraged by the number of teachers in public and Christian schools, the number of students attending institutions of higher learning and especially George Fox College and other Christian colleges.

During the year we have taken a survey of the teachers of Oregon Yearly Meeting to see if there might be sufficient interest in organizing a fellowship for teachers. The results of the survey show that of the 56 questionnaires returned, 46 teachers favor such an organization, nine were uncertain and only one said "no". In the coming months this interest shall be further pursued.

Let us all be alert to the emphasis put on federal aid to education in this session and succeeding sessions of Congress. May we let our approval or disapproval be known to our representatives in our respective areas.

Department of literature—Ruthanna Hampton, superintendent

We are favored in this area in that most of our people have had an opportunity to receive some education and very few are unable to read. A whole world of information and inspiration is before us through the medium of the printed page. There are newspapers, magazines and books in our homes, in our schools, and sold wherever there is room for them. Reading material is all around us.

We know about some of the worthwhile books as shown in our re-

ports, although only 37 out of 48 reports indicated a church library. We appreciated the efforts of the committee chairmen in classifying their books for the reports so that we might know what our members consider important types of reading. It appears that all classes of books were used with the needs of various age groups and interests being considered. We wish to commend the Women's Missionary Union for their stimulation of Christian reading.

Is this enough though? We are wondering about the churches who report either no library or very few books for young people and children. How are they providing for their new readers who often are willing to read anything which is put into their hands? A big part of our campaign against unwholesome literature is providing people with something better, more interesting and readily available.

Perhaps a presentation of standards for a Christian's reading in Sunday School or church might be helpful to some who have not had the background for making good choices. We all could check ourselves to see that our choice of reading and balance of time spent is in keeping with God's will for our lives.

Facilities for holding and displaying the libraries still seems to be a problem to some. We again suggest a simple bookcase on casters as a possible solution. Oral announcements and bulletin board displays were used instead of church bulletins in some meetings.

We again are glad to see an active interest in a planned program of Bible study. Some have already tried such a program and we shall try to forward some of their suggestions. It would be difficult to recommend any one course that would fill every meeting's need so we suggest you contact your pastor regarding this. The study of God's Word is basic to all true knowledge and inspiration so that without it, all the other reading becomes only a passing interest and our minds and souls are not truly fed.

We challenge you to read, to provide reading, to promote reading, always with the emphasis on the Bible and then on literature suitable for a creature made in God's own image.

Ruthanna Hampton presented the following, stressing reading: First, Marie Haines, dressed in Quaker costume, gave a brief review of the devotional book, The Quiet in the Land.

Allen Hadley presented a book, The Ministry of Visitation, as a very important help to all Sunday School workers.

Genevieve Cole, representing the Women's Missionary Union, stressed how good books acquaint us with great people of the past, increase our personal devotion to Christ and our service to our fellowmen. She introduced the books, The Root of the Righteous and Pursuit of God.

Marilyn Winters, who was sent to Winona Lake as a member of a Y. F. C. Bible quiz team was introduced, and spoke of how the Bible is paramount to all other books in having the answers to all teen-age problems.

Meredith Beals told of how the Word of God has helped her in her daily life as a teacher and leader of youth.

Betty Hockett impressed the importance of daily devotions to the life of a housewife and mother of small children.

Charles Haworth, retired minister and teacher, told us that although physical growth stopped many years ago, there is a con-

tinuous spiritual growth as he daily feeds on the Word of God.

Virginia Helm stressed the continual need for organized effort against the evils of liquor in our land. She has on hand filmstrips and flannelgraph materials which are available for any who desire them.

The report of the Board of Moral Action was approved.

- 47. The morning inspirational hour opened with singing "How Firm a Foundation," led by John Carr.

Walter Lee, Yearly Meeting speaker, continued his series of messages with the subject, "The Sincerity and Simplicity of Life."

We must emphasize both faith and practice, doctrine and ethics. He read I Thess. 4: 9-12 and II Cor. 1: 12.

Most of the New Testament contains teaching regarding the way we should live.

Early Friends achieved reputation for sincerity in speech, "Let your yea be yea." The simplicity of their lives protected their sincerity.

The times in which we live demand sincerity and simplicity as much as in the seventeenth century.

We are not assured we will not suffer as Christians. The test is not how easy it is for us, but in our sincerity. Truth is still a virtue. Are we just in our observing the law, in our accounts, and such? "Recompense to no man evil for evil; provide things honest in the sight of all men."

"O Timothy, keep that which is committed to thy trust."

The meeting closed with prayer by Gerald Dillon.

Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

- 48. After a time of quiet waiting upon the Lord, Thelma Rose and Elizabeth Haldy led in prayer, invoking God's blessing upon these sessions. Dorwin Smith closed the devotional period with a prayer for divine guidance.

- 49. The minutes were read and accepted as corrected.

- 50. The following statements have been adopted by the Board of Moral Action, which seeks Yearly Meeting approval:

1. In the face of the current misuse of the word "temperance," the emphasis on moderation, and a widespread failure to recognize the true cause of alcoholism, we recommend to all people a life of total abstinence from alcohol, tobacco, and illegal narcotics. The direct cause of alcoholism and addiction is definitely known and may be avoided. No one has ever become a slave to narcotics unless he has taken the first drink, cigarette, or shot. Furthermore, Christ is able to deliver a repentant person from harmful habits and take away all desire for them.

2. The morality of the state and nation would be endangered by legalized gambling in a state of national lottery. Our concern includes the evil of pinball machines.

3. The Postmaster General should be supported in his fight against obscene literature. To study the problem, a commission of legislators is recommended.

4. Movie producers should consider the moral values of the world and refrain from portraying sin as socially acceptable. They should use self-censorship in their advertising.

5. We believe in juvenile decency, and commend our young people for their faith in God and their willingness to follow His calling.

6. We reaffirm our stand that legislation should be adopted to prohibit the sale, service, and consumption of alcoholic beverages on aircraft.

7. Chemical tests should be required of all drivers suspected of being intoxicated after involvement in a traffic accident or stopped for driving erratically.

8. We appeal to the radio and television industry to set higher standards of programming to curtail the portrayal of violence, crime, illicit sex, and other vices, and to refuse sponsorships by alcoholic beverage or tobacco interests.

This was approved.

- 51. The representatives present the name of Charles Beals as nomination for presiding clerk of representatives.

Approved.

- 52. The representatives present the following nominations to the Epistle Committee: for three years—Herman Macy and Adelaide Barker; for two years—Mildred Brown and Scott Clark; for one year—Ruthanna Hampton and Roger Smith.

Approved.

- 53. Ruthanna Hampton requests her name be dropped from the Epistle Committee. This was granted and the vacancy referred to the representatives.

- 54. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Moral Action for a term of three years: Ludlow Corbin, Ruth Baker and Walter King.

Approved.

- 55. The representatives present the following nominations for the Board of Peace and Service for a term of three years: L. Merle Green, Peter Fertello and Roland S. Hartley.

Approved.

- 56. The representatives present the following names to the Board of Stewardship for a term of three years: Marie Haines, Charles Morgan and Wayne Piersall.

Approved.

- 57. The following was received from Oliver Weesner, custodian of documents:

The documents of Oregon Yearly Meeting are being kept in the vault of the Newberg Branch of the First National Bank of Oregon and in the vault in the Newberg Friends Church.

Approved.

- 58. The following report was read from Greenleaf Academy:

Greenleaf Friends Academy completed its fifty-second school term with the graduation of 27 seniors on the evening of June 2, 1960.

Commencement exercises were held in the gymnasium-auditorium with Gerald Dillon of Portland First Friends delivering the address.

Not only was this the largest graduating class to receive diplomas but the total school enrollment for the year reached an all time high of 125 students. Of these, 83 were Friends or represented Friends churches. About 15 were listed as boarding students with the remaining number residing in their own homes and commuting by way

of school bus or automobile. Communities represented were Greenleaf, Caldwell, Star, Nampa, Emmett, Boise, Melba, and Homedale. Several attended from neighboring states.

The faculty consisted of eight members and the office secretary. There have been no specific changes in the faculty for the coming year.

The curriculum and course of study are being gradually broadened to meet the ever increasing demand for a well rounded college preparatory course, as well as to equip the graduate who may immediately enter the field of labor.

Graduation requirements for the seniors of 1960-61 will be increased from 18 to 19 units. Those graduating in the spring of 1962 will be expected to have earned a total of 20 units. There are also specific requirements such as a minimum of certain units in specified areas.

Continued accreditation by the Idaho State Department of Education has been granted.

The academy, during the past year became a member of the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools which represents approximately 24 elementary and secondary Christian day schools in the Pacific Northwest. Such an association provides both faculty and ual and professional benefit each year at the annual meeting of the board members with a challenging opportunity to receive both spirit-fellowship. Not only do the adults have a part in the organization, but each year the music departments of member schools have the privilege of meeting in what is known as the Spring Musicales. A part of their activity is the formation of a mass choir for public performance.

While the physical phase of the school has been improved by addition of needed equipment and added improvements, special mention is made of the fine work of the alumni association, special sponsorship of purchasing folding metal chairs for the academy. Their goal of 300 chairs has already been more than half accomplished.

Under the able direction of John Carr the school has been well represented by the work of the choir and other musical groups as they have ministered throughout Boise Valley. There is a growing demand in this field of service and we trust it may be expanded for the coming year.

With varied opportunities for participation in music, athletics, dramatics, publications and other activities, students do not lack for a very busy schedule. While we recognize these things are often a real problem for parents and they do require so much of the student's time, we also believe they are a contributing factor toward the less need of disciplinary action. Those students whose time is well occupied find little occasion for getting into difficulty.

The spiritual tone of the student body as a whole seemed good throughout the entire year. Many students were active in Christian work within their own churches. The Youth for Christ club was especially active within the academy and conducted a number of services for other Y. F. C. clubs in surrounding schools. The chapel services were a real inspiration. The school participated with the local meeting in the winter revival under the ministry of Hubert Mardock.

The estimated operating budget for the 1959-60 school term was set at approximately \$35,000. Of this amount, \$22,000 is expected from tuitions, \$2,000 from bus fares, \$7,000 from the Greenleaf meeting and the balance to be raised through rentals, gifts and the annual benefit sale. This year's sale netted in excess of \$3,300. We anticipate the needed amount will come in by the opening of the new school term.

Inasmuch as a great deal of repair work is needed on the buildings, the Greenleaf Sunday School classes have assumed responsibility for redecorating the rooms in which each of their respective classes meets. Also a complete roof repairing job is now underway. Funds for this project are being received through individual cash donations, the actual cost which will be about \$1200. Men of the local church are donating the labor.

In conclusion, we express gratitude to the student body, staff members, board of trustees, alumni, Greenleaf Monthly Meeting and friends throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting for their interest, prayers and material support of Greenleaf Academy during the past year.

Then, finally, to our pastors, Oscar and Ruth Brown, for their nine years of faithful service in the church, school and community we express our love and thanks as they continue their ministry elsewhere.

This report was approved.

●59. Milo Ross, president of George Fox College presented his annual report which appears below: (In condensed form)

Introductory Statement

Herewith is the sixth annual report it has been my duty and privilege to submit to the board of trustees of George Fox College and to our constituencies at large. As I have prepared an outline of items to be included, I have been struck with the gains which have been made and the note of optimism which can characterize last year's operation.

One highlight of the year was the coming of Dr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Jones, formerly of Earlham College, and now an administrative consultant with the Association of American Colleges. One emphasis of his is that of the "image" of the college. While some serious consideration of the idea has no doubt claimed the attention of all of our administrators at Pacific and George Fox, the tempo of interest and research has been quickened.

In summation, from an extended report to our board by Dr. Jones, he stated, "As an accredited, evangelical Quaker college, George Fox can now take its place as a contributing participant in the intellectual and spiritual development of the northwest."

New Procedures:

What have we done this last year which is novel or better or exciting? In the first place, the entire curriculum has been reviewed and challenged with the result that six courses were eliminated, 7 were regrouped, or changed in both title and content. We eliminated the major in art, which has been offered in cooperation with the Museum Art School in Portland. This does not affect our art courses on campus, but rather protects us from offering a degree in a major

field over which we have little control.

Home economics was dropped as a full major, and we no longer will assay to train professionally, or pre-professionally, in related fields. We still believe, however, that the service courses are valuable for young women as wives, mothers, and homemakers.

We will offer a full minor in Christian education within the framework of the division of religion. While we presented a strong front in religion itself, and the necessary courses are already listed in Bible, church history, philosophy, education, psychology, and related subjects, the formal minor in Christian education had not been so organized. We trust in this manner that the college can serve the church better.

As the work of higher education has evolved in complexity, we find that a number in our administration are working with "too many irons in the fire," both because of our plan to control overhead, and also now that functions are considered essential which several years ago were not undertaken at all. We have, therefore, set up the structure for three deanships—the dean of administration, the dean of the faculty, and the dean of students.

An adjustment came in our teacher training by our contract with the local union high school board No. 6 for a cadet teacher program. In our being non-standard previously, and many of our prospective teachers being forced to take their practice training and observation elsewhere, this firm arrangement has proved to be most satisfactory, both for us and the local schools. Dean Kenneth Williams, as associate professor of education, was assigned to the task of director of teacher training. His teacher load was lightened by our engaging additional personnel.

No "prestige" banquet had been held for many years, and the office of development made bold to initiate a commencement dinner at \$100 per couple, and held it on Friday, June 3. There were 88 people present.

We are evolving toward greater involvement of the board members in the concerned leadership of the college. This is attested in a number of ways: their reading of the current literature in the field; their willingness to give themselves in time and energy to travel at great distances, attend many meetings, represent the college in public life, give of their funds, and in their response to questionnaires and polls. Ivan Adams, chairman of the board, represented the college at the regional conference on "Colleges and Dollar Support" held at the Portland Sheraton Hotel and sponsored by the Council for the Financial Aid to Education.

We admit to a major weakness in physical education, occasioned by limited personnel and equipment. We are very pleased to announce an adjustment upward in contracting James Kennison, of Eugene where he is a doctoral candidate, who joins our faculty as an instructor in men's physical education and assistant coach.

At the same time, we believe that we can do better counseling in the Christian faith by having a man who is a minister with years of experience as dean of men. We have engaged Everett Craven for this position. After 34 years in the Friends pastorate, he has prepared himself for counseling at Ball State Teachers College of Muncie, Indiana. His immediate experience is at Azusa College, and prior to that at Taylor University.

While the discussions with Cascade College concerning their proposal for a merger may not be "new procedures" in so many words, the extent and the seriousness of the discussions have loomed very large in our thinking and work during the last half of the year.

The School Year:

We enrolled a total of 164 students, which is the greatest daytime enrollment since World War II.

There is no doubt but that this was the best year in many years. There is a strong program in intensified studies for our superior students, and greater strength and increased membership in Pi Gamma Sigma, the honor society. The student body was under the capable leadership of Dan Nolte, both the Crescent and L'ami carried out their assignments with responsibility and professional seriousness. We enjoyed the active cooperation of Glen Rinard, our college pastor, in both the fall and spring religious emphases. Hubert Mardock, Friends evangelist of Caldwell, Idaho spoke in October, while Keith Kirk of Citrus Heights, California was the speaker in February.

This school year marked the first in which the prayer room was completely furnished, and its completion makes for a gracious and worshipful center.

Total accessions made in the library are now over 20,105, a gain of 978 for the year.

In athletics, football was better than for some years, with more men out for the sport and better scores. We have suffered under the inequality of the Metropolitan Basketball League for several years in its allowing graduate students to play. Our coach, Carl Carpenter, has led in the formation of the Willamette Christian College League and has initiated its tournament at the end of the season. We placed second in the Metropolitan League, first in the Willamette Christian, and put two men on the all-conference five.

Professor Edward Peacock in his first year with us has continued our fine traditions in speech and drama, and has added much to the enthusiasm of the area with his personal magnetism. We hosted the Oregon Collegiate After-Dinner meetings, and Mrs. Florence Angelelo placed second. A highly successful production of The Big Fisherman was appreciated by capacity crowds on two nights.

Two directions were taken in choral music. Mrs. Harriet Storaker directed the city-wide rendition of Handel's Messiah during the Christmas season, in which our music faculty and students had leading roles. She also directed the a cappella choir.

I was especially pleased with the calibre of the deputation program under the capable leadership of Professor Munn. A major project was to man, Sunday by Sunday, the new outpost at Sevenson, Oregon.

Paul Mills, professor of Bible and chairman of the Division of

Religion, gave the faculty lecture with the title, "Revelation, the Center of Learning."

Mrs. Mary Sandoz has been successful in raising the net circulation of our mailing pieces from 3,474 to 4,700.

Regional Accreditation:

After five full years of preparation, including a year of self-study, we were accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools on December 2, 1959. The status is for two years. The position itself is a recognition of the fine program of Christian liberal arts which we have maintained throughout our 69 years, and which is attested in many ways. At the same time, a number of challenges were put up to us in which certain qualitative standards should be attained in a reasonable time. No exact quantitative standards were placed against us.

Many benefits have resulted: professional status for our alumni, greater opportunity to candidate professors and recruit students, greater acceptance before foundations and corporations in fund raising, and a spirit of thanksgiving and morale which is pervading our entire academic community.

Friends of the college should be aware that accreditation is not "once in grace, always in grace," and that greater demands are placed upon our school now than ever before.

We were invited into membership with the Association of American Colleges, the American Council on Accrediting, and several other associations, and George Fox is listed appropriately in the major accredited catalogs and directories.

Finances and Construction:

While the gift structure was not as great as a year ago, due mainly to the fact that no major estates were settled in our favor, as had been the case two years ago, we did show a substantial in-

crease in giving from important constituencies. Alumni giving doubled to \$21,254.51. Church support gained \$5,000 to \$40,595.43. The members of the board of trustees increased their giving to \$10,849.90. Giving by corporations came up \$4,000 to \$11,177.80. And contributions by foundations more than doubled to \$8,788.35.

We were able to completely finance and reconstruct the remodeling of the science building to the evident satisfaction of all concerned.

The president's report was approved.

Certificates of honor were presented the following churches for having reached their goal for giving through the \$25 Club to George Fox College for the past year: Newport, Cambridge, Netarts, Newberg, Woodland.

President Ross displayed a number of charts showing increase in financial income from various sources during the past few years. He then spoke concerning negotiations between George Fox College and Cascade College regarding plans which may involve the future of those two schools. Questions from the meeting were presented and answered.

●60. Robert Morse dismissed with prayer, and the meeting stands adjourned to meet Friday at 9:15 a.m.

●61. After a period of silent devotion, Randall Emry led in prayer that we may be faithful to our stewardship.

●62. The minutes were read and accepted with addition.

●63. Howard and Wilma Cole were introduced as new pastors at Timber outpost.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

●64. Herbert Sargent, president of the board, presented the following report, which was placed in the hands of the meeting in mimeographed form:

When David went to buy a place to build an altar to offer sacrifices unto God, the owner, Ornan wanted to give it to him, but David would not accept it. He said he would not offer that which cost him nothing to the Lord. David knew the value of stewardship.

Glaring headlines in our paper read as follows: "Ministerial Profession is Failing to Attract." This was a report made by other denominations. But it is a condition that is very prevalent in our own group. It is a condition that should be of real concern to us. It is a matter of stewardship of life, stewardship of prayer, stewardship of opportunity, stewardship of the home, and stewardship of money.

It is encouraging to see that we the people of Oregon Yearly Meeting are improving in our stewardship. There have been some gains over last year. There also have been some losses.

Your Board of Stewardship is endeavoring to build a film library for your use. We would like to encourage you to use more widely the materials that are on hand.

The Board of Stewardship sponsored a poster contest last year and felt the results were very gratifying. This contest will be continued again this year and will be offered in two divisions. These divisions are as follows:

1. Ten years old through the eighth grade.
2. Ninth grade through high school.

There will be some changes in prize awards. The awards will be as follows: First prize for each division will be \$15, second prize will be \$10, and those prizes will only be for the winners at the Yearly Meeting. We do encourage the local meetings to do something on their own for the winners on their levels.

With the cooperation of Jack Willcuts and the Barclay Press each church last year received enough tracts for bulletin inserts. You will receive this same service again this year.

Your Board of Stewardship has a concern that our families and the future families of Oregon Yearly Meeting have family worship materials and encourage the use of said materials. These materials are published by the Nazarene Publishing House, Kansas City, Missouri. These materials are "Family Outreach Packet" and the devotional booklet, "Come Ye Apart". We urge the Ministry and Oversight to obtain copies of these materials, review them and urge the use of them in our churches.

The speech contest which in the past has been sponsored by the Board of Peace and Service will be sponsored by the Board of Stewardship this next year. We are indeed encouraged with our youth desiring to participate in this area.

Marie Haines, in charge of the Yearly Meeting poster contest presented the Quarterly Meeting winners as follows: Portland—Tommy Newell, Southwest Washington—Mike Hale, Boise Valley—George Gress, Greenleaf—Sharon Martin, Salem—Kent Blackmer, Newberg—Barbara Baker.

Yearly Meeting winner, Mike Hale, was presented \$10 first prize. Wayne Piersall presented a paramount need of our Friends homes—the family altar. As the family goes, so goes the church. As the church goes, so goes the nation. He presented the "Family Outreach Packet," to be used to encourage maintaining the family altar in each home; also the booklet "Come Ye Apart," a guide for family and private devotions.

John Carr stressed the need of people in our churches to give of themselves, and to give of their abilities, whether great or small.

This is our stewardship. The Lord demands stewardship of our abilities, our time, our possessions.

Herbert Sargent closed, stressing the need of stewardship being practiced in our homes before our children.

The report was approved.

● 65. The suggestion was made that a note of greeting be sent to Levi and Rebecca Pennington who are unable to attend these sessions because of ill health. This was approved, and the clerks will care for this.

● 66. The Board of Christian Education recommends that Adelaide Barker be named as representative to Evangelical Friends Board of Publication for two years. This was approved.

● 67. In relationship to the concern expressed by Southwest Washington Quarterly Meeting and referred to us by the Yearly Meeting, the Board of Christian Education makes the following recommendations: (See minute 15)

1. That a thorough study of camping programs and procedures of the Yearly Meeting be made.
2. That an evaluation of camping philosophy be made.
3. That the board bring a full report to the sessions of the Yearly Meeting next year.

4. The board also suggests that a meeting be called at Mid-Winter C. E. convention of those appointed to make this study and a representative from the governing board of each camp to evaluate the information gathered regarding the camping problems.

This report was approved.

● 68. The names of the Committee on Ministry were read and appear in the Appendix.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

● 69. The Women's Missionary Union, under the direction of outgoing president Beatrice Benham, presented a summary of the following report:

We of the Women's Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting have endeavored to emphasize that our work is evangelistic. One definition of the word evangelism is, "the showing forth of Jesus." In John 12:23 we read that certain Greeks desired of Philip to see Jesus. Philip went to a friend with the request and together they went to Jesus. Jesus' answer to the request was, "The hour is come, that the Son of man should be glorified."

We as a Women's Missionary Union want to show forth Jesus and do endeavor to glorify Him that He may be seen by other women.

We have grown in size again this year, having 68 local missionary unions, and a total membership of 932. This is an increase over last year of three unions and 59 members.

We are glad for the new and active unions.

The Las Ayudadoras Missionary Union makes the third one at Greenleaf.

An active union has been started at Ashland and also one at Tigard.

Fifty-two of these unions contributed to the home project program. Fifty-five contributed to the foreign project.

The Program and Devotional Book for the coming year was compiled by Ellen Martin and Esther Woodward.

A change in the by-laws was made.

The duties of historian have been added to the secretary's duties. The office of reporter was eliminated, and the office of auditor was left to be appointed annually by the president. The offices of membership chairman and publicity chairman were added to the executive committee with the hope of encouraging expansion of the Women's Missionary Union.

We have agreed to contribute to the pastoral support at Svenson \$100 a month to start the first of September this year; also \$25 a month to pastoral support at Cambridge, or some other place if it is not needed there.

We do not have a complete report of the reading, but we do know that most of the unions are reading many good books. We know that at least 2746 books have been read by the women of 45 unions reporting.

A tremendous amount of things have been made and collected to send to the mission field in Bolivia for use among the Aymaras.

There is a strong emphasis on prayer with a growing tendency to have a time set aside for prayer in the regular meeting rather than a special prayer unit time.

The retreat is an increasingly valuable part of the Women's Missionary Union activities.

I foresee even greater accomplishments in the future of the Women's Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Iverna Hibbs, returned missionary from Bolivia, spoke on what the Women's Missionary Union has meant to them in material provisions. Also, of greater importance has been the acquisition of prayer partners. She read a letter from the Copajira Women's Missionary Union of Bolivia to the W.M.U. of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Tina Knight, outgoing missionary to Bolivia, spoke of how much the prayers of the missionary unions have meant to her through the years. The women have also given of their time and their money. Also, a great contribution comes in the form of letters to the field. Last, a gift which has meant so much is that of new friends obtained through personal contacts and through letters.

Beatrice Benham introduced the new president, Frances Hicks, who challenged the missionary unions to enlarge their field of service in a way that will be pleasing to the Lord.

The report of the W.M.U. was approved.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

● 70. Clynton Crisman, president of the Board of Evangelism presented the following report:

As we review the work of the Board of Evangelism for the past year it is with real joy that we see God's evident blessing. We believe that He has enlarged the vision of many in our Yearly Meeting and it is our prayer that this enlarged vision may be shared by all; that our "young men shall see visions and our old men dream dreams," because the harvest is white and "the night cometh when no man worketh."

We have not seen as many new outposts this year as we would like, but are glad to welcome our newest one at Emmett, Idaho,

started June 19, 1960 under the sponsorship of Caldwell Friends. In addition, prayer groups have been started in several locations with the hope that these may develop into churches in the future.

Our main drive and concern the past year has been the strengthening of all the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The Share calls have gone to three of our newer Monthly Meetings who found it impossible to complete their new buildings without our help. These new buildings are a real credit to Friends. Our 50-50 plan with Quincy is making it possible for them to have a much-needed building in the near future. The underwriting of the payment of the purchase of property at Svensen by churches and members of Oregon Yearly Meeting has made it possible for Svensen to put all their energy toward a new building in that needy field.

The preparation of the recording and 35 mm pictures, "Friends of the Future," by Jack Willcuts has taken much time and energy. We believe that this will prove to be an inspiration and challenge both to our older and our newer churches.

The Outposter has been published every month and made available in sufficient numbers to be handed out to all members.

The board feels keenly the need to help those meetings still worshipping in basements and houses to get into adequate buildings. Experience has proved that the meetings with attractive buildings make the more rapid growth.

Three of our outposts, Silverton, Tigard and Hayden Lake, became preparative meetings this past year. One of our preparative meetings doubled their pastor's salary from \$200 to \$400 per month. Many of our churches have felt the need to raise their pastor's salaries so that these called ones may give themselves more fully to prayer and ministry of the Word. Perhaps it is significant that one whose salary was doubled also made the most calls of any of our pastors. It is regrettable that some of our pastors reported no calls for the year.

The Quaker Men have accepted the Friends Church Extension Foundation as their project for the coming year. This should strengthen it so that it can be of greater service to those needing financial help.

The board believes it wise for us to plan for the future in fast growing areas by purchasing property while it can be bought at a more reasonable rate. We have purchased three acres in Beaverton, which is one of the faster growing cities in Oregon. The churches of Portland Quarterly Meeting have underwritten the payment for this. We would encourage other Quarterly Meetings or local churches or individuals to take similar action.

The "Quaker Hour" has continued to go out and is reaching thousands each Sunday. Our thanks is expressed to the staff and all who have given themselves to this ministry.

I want also to express our thanks to Jack Willcuts, field secretary of the board. Much that has been accomplished has been the result of his vision and effort. Added responsibility has been his due to the absence of Dean Gregory from the office part of the year.

Once again we of the Board of Evangelism wish to express our appreciation of our Yearly Meeting Superintendent. He is a continual source of blessing and help. His insight, kindness and fairness in dealing with the many problems, whether spiritual, physical

or financial, never cease to demand our respect and loyalty.

Thanks should be expressed to the many who have given of themselves and their means to make the outreach of Oregon Yearly Meeting what it is. Of these, I want to mention the Women's Missionary Union who have helped support the pastors at Silverton and Agnew, the Christian Endeavor Union, who supplied windows for the Holly Park church building, and the Quaker Men for help given to Tigard. We appreciate too, the pastors and their families of our outposts and preparative meetings.

The statistical report of the board will appear in the appendix.

Ward Haines spoke of the challenge of the one-year-old work at Svensen, and their great need for a new edifice in which to worship.

Richard Cossel told of the starting of services at Emmett, Idaho. This is under the direction of Caldwell church. The greatest need is for someone to feel the call of God to serve there as a full-time worker.

Harley Adams presented the work of Quincy outpost in Washington which he pastors. Plans are drawn up for a new building, and finances are being raised that this may become a reality, and encouraged with responses from their community.

This report was approved.

Dr. Alvin Roberts reported on the Friends Church Extension Foundation as appears below:

The Friends Church Extension Foundation has continued its operation during the past year. Its funds have increased by \$1700 through gifts and several hundred dollars through interest payments on the loans which are being repaid.

The foundation has outstanding loans of \$17,543.75. There is \$5,251.78 on hand. Its contingent liability is approximately \$23,000.

The multitude of needs which appear year by year require many times the amount reported in this letter. Indeed one good project could well absorb the entire resources of the foundation in its present situation.

Funds by gifts, bequests, and loans are needed in the building program of Oregon Yearly Meeting in the 1960's.

The treasurer's report of the foundation appears in the building

● 71. In the morning service John Carr led in the singing of "Lead On, Oh King Eternal."

Walter Lee continued in the third of his series of inspirational hour messages on the subject, "The Sensitivity to the Holy Spirit. Acts 10: 19-24, 30-33."

The Scripture teaches that the Holy Spirit exerts an influence on every individual in the world. But only true children of God are led by the Spirit. He brought out that the Holy Spirit gives direction, as in the case of Philip and the Ethiopian. Paul received direction to go into Macedonia. The church was sensitive to the leading of the Holy Spirit in the sending of Paul and Barnabas.

The Holy Spirit gives discernment as was exemplified in the lives of the early apostles. George Fox, and other early Friends possessed this discernment because of their sensitivity to the Holy Spirit. We need discernment as individuals. The church needs this same guidance.

The Holy Spirit promotes unity. This is not natural, but as we

have the Holy Spirit as the common denominator in our lives, a common unity may be obtained. We must rely on the Holy Spirit, not on individuals or methods.

This sensitivity must be cultivated by seeking, by waiting, and by obeying. "Grieve not the Holy Spirit." Let us keep tuned to the voice of the Spirit.

The congregation sang the prayer "Spirit of the Living God" in closing the service.

Friday, 2:15 p.m.

● 72. We were directed to the Lord in meditation in the opening devotional period as John Carr brought the strains of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" on the organ. The clerk led in prayer.

● 73. The minutes were read and corrected.

● 74. Ellis and Edna Pickett, members of First Friends, Pasadena, California, now residing in Olympia, were introduced to the meeting. Also present were Stuart and Marian Innerst, former pastors of Pasadena Friends Church.

● 75. The Memorial Hour opened with Grace Hadley reading the names of the 44 members deceased during the past year. These names appear in the appendix and an asterisk indicates those for whom memorials were prepared. Kenneth Fendall and Esther White read memorials.

Expression was made regarding the vacancy left by these departed ones. May others help to fill in the gap.

The Memorial Hour closed with John Carr singing a verse of the song, "Sunrise Tomorrow."

● 76. An expression of thanks is due Jerry Mannenbach, local funeral director, for the use of his organ during the Yearly Meeting sessions this year.

This was approved, and the clerks are instructed to send such an expression of appreciation.

● 77. Report of the special advisory committee on church music appointed by Oregon Yearly Meeting at the 1959 session.

Although the personnel of this committee was such that it was impossible to meet together for any discussion or planning, there was much done by correspondence, and most of the members contributed at least to some degree to the projects that were suggested.

The following is a summary of what was done this year in the area of music counseling:

1. Two articles were written for The Northwest Friend.
2. A letter was sent out to the pastors and chairmen of the local music committees acquainting them with the service available, and requesting suggestions.
3. The members of the committee have drawn up a preliminary draft setting forth a philosophy of music suitable for Friends worship.
4. Some members have contributed much toward setting up a criterion for choosing hymn books in the local churches.
5. A file of usable music, including hymn books, choir collections, chorus books, books of hymn stories, and sheet music has been collected and was put on display at the ministers' conference. It is now on display in the basement of the Yearly Meeting house.
6. A questionnaire was sent out to all the local meetings, and the

results are summarized below.

7. Specific requests have come for advice from local churches, such as recommendation for a new chorus book for Forest Home, help in a choir problem at Seattle Memorial, recommendation of a hymn book for Rose Valley and a youth hymnal for Sherwood, and sending material concerning organs to two churches who are contemplating the purchase of this instrument.

There were 28 responses to the questionnaire sent out. The small number of responses seems to indicate that in the great majority of Friends churches in Oregon Yearly Meeting there is not much thought or emphasis given to music in the church, nor much concern that the situation be improved. But of the 28 responses received we learned that:

1. Nineteen churches have adult choirs, at least for special seasons, involving about 260 singers.
 2. Nine churches have children's choirs at least for special occasions, with about 180 children and young people.
 3. Eleven churches use electric organs, others are interested.
 4. Ten different hymnals are in use, with Inspiring Hymns, Praise and Worship, and Broadman Hymnal being most used.
- These responses indicated that there are many who are cognizant of the musical needs of their churches and of the Yearly Meeting, and the following suggestions were expressed as to the kind of service the Yearly Meeting advisory committee could perform:
1. Maintain a lending library for the use of choirs.
 2. Provide some materials to help the young and amateur choir directors and song leaders.
 3. Recommend simple usable material for choirs, especially for Christmas and Easter.
 4. Make available a booklet setting forth a philosophy of music suitable for Friends in our worship, emphasizing the importance of the great hymns, or carefully planned song services, etc.
 5. Adopt a standard songbook, or publish an Oregon Yearly Meeting Hymnal.
 6. Publish a book containing favorite choruses.
 7. Provide suggestions on how to organize and carry on adult and children's choirs.
 8. Act as a clearing house for the exchange or lending of music between choirs of different churches.
 9. Provide information and advice to those in the market for organs.
 10. Encourage original hymn writing by initiating a Yearly Meeting contest.
 11. Hold workshops in each Quarterly Meeting for the benefit of pastors, choir directors, organists, pianists, and others who are interested in church music.

We quote from a letter from Kay Newell, of Whitney meeting: "I think that one of our greatest needs (Yearly Meeting-wide as well as local) is the education on church music in general, i. e., what type to use in worship service on Sunday morning; what type to use in the evening services, prayer meeting, C. E. meetings, etc. Many have not the slightest notion of basic differences between hymns, gospel songs, popular religious songs, etc. . . We seem to follow the more emotional groups in adopting the use of surface, emotional type of gospel songs, which have their place, but in some instances we have

used them to the exclusion of the deep hymns. Consequently our view of church music is tragically low and we miss the benefits of the great worship numbers and the deep theological truths they contain.

"Any educational process to raise the sights of our people must be slow and insistent. Perhaps a good place to start would be with the music committees and the choirs, with the hope that eventually the impressions made might be transmitted to the congregation as a whole. I appreciate this effort to ascertain the needs of our church. We will look forward to seeing some very helpful service developed."

Although the committee has worked under handicaps this year, we have explored the field enough to know there is a great need and much can and should be done to encourage the church musicians and help raise the musical tone of our meetings to a level that would better honor God.

This report was approved and expressions of appreciation for the work of this committee were voiced.

It was approved that the representatives nominate this committee with terms to expire on a rotating basis.

● 78. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Finance for three years: Harold Lund, Forrest Cammack.

● 79. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Missions: For one year—Gladys Cook, for two years—Glen Rinard, for three years—Robert Morrill, Frank Cole, Clare Willcuts.

Approved.

● 80. With reference to the communication from Portland Quarterly Meeting on membership transfer (see our Discipline, page 97, section 2) the representatives propose that the Monthly Meetings be advised that when a Monthly Meeting receives a request for transfer from any of its active membership, before the transfer is granted, due care be exercised to make sure that the request correctly represents the wishes of those members to be transferred. The Monthly Meeting should be advised further that a request for transfer of associate membership is normally made by the parents or guardian. (See minute 16)

Approved.

● 81. The representatives request a policy-making directive from the Yearly Meeting as to whether the active-resident membership report for the contemporary year or for the preceding year be used as a basis for the number of representatives to which each Quarterly Meeting is entitled. This year this body has used the figures as found in the 1959 minutes. Their reasoning is that the statistics for 1960 are not easily available to Quarterly Meetings at the time the representative appointments are made.

Approved.

● 82. Al Neal has been nominated by the foundation corporation to fill the vacancy resulting from his expiring term on the board of the Friends Church Extension Foundation for a term of three years.

Wilbert Eichenberger has been nominated by the Board of Evangelism for a three-year term on the board of the Friends Church Extension Foundation.

Approved.

● 83. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Evangelism: Paul Wesche, Randall Emry, Ward Haines. Approved.

● 84. The representatives present the name of Sarah McCracken as nomination to fill the vacancy on the Epistle Committee for a term of one year. Approved.

● 85. Wilmer Brown, Northwest Regional Director of the National Association of Evangelicals presented the work of that organization. He stated that we need to take a clean-cut stand for the Lord Jesus Christ. The man on the street is now interested in a way as never before. The Association is endeavoring to get accurate information into the hands of individuals regarding current events and trends. May we move forward in the cause of Christ.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 86. After a time of silent prayer for the mission work in Bolivia and the work on the Klamath Indian Reservation, Waldo Hicks, president, pro-tem, of the Board of Missions, led in prayer.

Walter Lee, outgoing president read his report as field secretary. The mimeographed report of the Board of Missions was distributed and appears below: (In condensed form)

"Offer unto God thanksgiving and pay thy vows unto the most High; and call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver thee, and thou shalt glorify me." These words of praise and promise characterize the attitude of the Board of Missions in presenting its annual report.

While this past year has not been without its problems concerning the mission work there is great cause for praise to the Lord for His faithfulness to His promises. The very problems which have arisen have formed the pathway over which definite advances have been made.

The unrest that has gripped the nations of the world has not over-looked the Aymara Indian and strong national aspirations have been evident among the leaders of the church. While this has been anticipated by our mission and preparation has been made for it in the establishment of the national church, there have been and will be many problems in the transition. Much prayer and reliance upon the Lord has been rewarded by a remarkable degree of unity in the church and a steadiness in critical situations. The church is assuming increasing responsibility and thus is giving evidence of advance toward maturity.

The visit of the executive team, composed of the Yearly Meeting superintendent, Dean Gregory, and Oscar Brown, vice-president of the Board of Missions, accompanied by Roscoe Knight, one of our missionaries on furlough, was honored of the Lord and was of great assistance in reorganizing the mission program at a crucial time.

During the year the missionary staff in Bolivia has been reduced to the smallest number in years. Marshall and Catherine Cavit concluded another term of service in Bolivia about the first of August last year and left for an evangelistic tour of missions in other parts of the world under the direction of the World Gospel Mission. The Cavits have been loaned to us by the World Gospel Mission for

several years, but may not return to our work because of responsibilities to the World Gospel Mission. Charles and Charlotte Scott were forced home in December because of health problems caused by the altitude and it does not appear that they will be able to return to the field. Leland and Iverna Hibbs returned home for furlough in May and will not now be returning to the field because of health problems and the educational needs of their children. It is well to remember that the altitude of over 12,000 feet, at which most of our work is carried on, is a continual health hazard. We thank the Lord for the fine service rendered by all these missionaries.

During the year the Lord placed a concern for the work on the hearts of a number of people and there were some definite applications for appointment. After much prayer and necessary investigations the board placed under appointment Mark and Wilma Roberts, who had served one term in Bolivia a few years ago, Eugene and Betty Comfort and Quentin and Florene Nordyke. The Roberts and Comfort families will leave for Spanish Language School in San Jose, Costa Rica immediately following Yearly Meeting. They will spend about four months in school before going on to Bolivia, where the Comforts will continue study under a tutor. (Note: Oscar and Ruth Brown were also placed under appointment by the Mission Board for service in Bolivia. This action was taken immediately following the close of the Yearly Meeting business sessions. The Browns were included in the group of missionaries which was commissioned for service at the Sunday missionary rally.)

Evert and Virena Tuning have continued the work at Sprague River on the Klamath Indian Reservation. There are many opportunities and problems which arise out of the changing status of the men and women on the reservation.

The field reports from both the Bolivian work and the Klamath Indian work will present a more detailed picture of the missionary work which is supported by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The reports indicate that 42 members of Oregon Yearly Meeting were engaged in some type of missionary activity during the year, with 14 of these serving under the Board of Missions of Oregon Yearly Meeting, 12 in Bolivia and two at Sprague River. The number of those who feel that the Lord has been dealing with them relative to a call to missionary service has increased from 20 in the last annual report to 43 in this report.

Fifteen hundred missionary calendars were distributed during the year and the total receipts from the calendar project were \$5,330.02.

The Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends has been published again this past year by the cooperative efforts of Oregon, Ohio, Kansas, and Rocky Mountain Yearly Meetings.

We are living in great and crucial days. Let us pray that God will increase our zeal to fulfil our mission while the doors are open to the gospel message.

BOLIVIAN FIELD REPORT

"When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee; when thou walkest through the fire thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee." Isaiah 43: 2.

The past year has been characterized by a number of crises. We

want to give thanks to God who through each has given grace and victory. The end of the 1959 Bible School year was crowned with a special time of conviction, confession, and melting of hearts in the special meetings held at Copajira with Harold Stanfield of the Nazarene Mission as guest speaker.

The pastors conference, held at Copajira the first of December brought another crisis with a long list of impossible demands and threats by the Mesa Directiva and the pastors. Many stayed on through the conference, but several left in the middle of it, including the president of the Mesa Directiva of the national church, who chartered a bus, and took as many as wanted to go, paying their fare with day school money given by the mission for day schools.

The visitation of the team officially representing Oregon Yearly Meeting composed of Dean Gregory, Oscar Brown and Roscoe Knight was a time of real blessing both to the missionaries and the brethren. This visit resulted in a clearer definition of the lines of responsibility and service of both the mission and the national church. Pastoral support from Oregon Yearly Meeting was cut off completely. Day school support also was dropped with the exception of a few materials amounting to \$100 a year or so. These actions together with the work of the committee in defining areas of cooperation have resulted in a great lessening of tensions, and better cooperation between the mission and the national church. The May Quarterly Meetings following the Yearly Meeting in April showed encouraging signs of renewed joy and vision in several areas, with a greater acceptance of responsibility on the part of the national church. There is still a great need for more consecrated, God called, Spirit-filled leaders in the national church, and a genuine revival.

The Junta Anual was probably the best attended in the history of the national church, with something over 1700 persons in attendance according to the unofficial count. The ministry of the "visitors from the North" was greatly used of the Lord in these meetings. Many of these reports reflect the decisions worked out jointly between the mission and the brethren during their visit.

Aside from three major operations, one minor operation, two severe cases of infectious hepatitis and one family forced home because of failure to adjust to the altitude, the health of the missionaries has been good.

Three families have left the field in the past year without replacements to date. The Marhsall Cavit family left for a world preaching tour among missions in August. Charles and Charlotte Scott were forced home in December because of ill health, and the Leland Hibbs family left for their furlough in May.

We appreciate the cooperation of Ellen Ross and the Wycliff Mission, who together with Ralph Chapman, have worked out tracts and other literature in Aymara. A new revised and enlarged edition of the Aymara Hymnal is now in the hands of the printers. Two of the Wycliff missionaries are at present engaged in teaching reading classes in Aymara among our brethren.

Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School

Partly due to the reduced missionary staff and changing conditions several readjustments were made in the Bible School program this past year.

The school year formerly consisting of seven months of Bible

courses with a mid-year vacation has been changed to two semesters of Bible School and following the last semester two semesters (eight weeks each) of upper grade school is offered for Bible School students.

Having grade school for these students who can spare the time to stay for it is an innovation. On finishing these courses the students can be accredited. This means much to the men planning to teach. Two nationals, Bible School men with teaching experience, taught the grade school.

The new plan has worked well. We had an average of 20 in the Bible School for the year and an average of ten in the elementary school.

By concentrating our Bible School subjects into two short semesters each year, and teaching four subjects to each class daily, we feel that the students absorbed more in less time than formerly.

Six young men will be graduated on July 29, the end of the Bible School year. One other will receive his diploma on finishing four weeks of study missed in the first semester. The students graduating will seek instruction from a master in a grade of their choice for one month so they will be able to help themselves earn a living when they go out into the Lord's harvest field. We intend to help them some in living costs only during this month of further preparation. It appears that "tent making" of some sort is necessary for most of our workers and pastors since our conditions and churches greatly resemble those of the early apostolic days.

Women's school was a time of great blessing to 46 women and senioritas who attended. These women and girls are influencing the growth of women's societies in the local churches, a growth that is becoming quite significant.

There will be no regular Bible School sessions at Copajira in the coming year, for lack of missionary personnel and other considerations. This will give an opportunity to carry Bible classes to the local churches with the limited staff available.

The net total cost of operating the Bible School for the year was \$1144.00 which is a per capita student cost of \$57.20 for an average of 20 students.

Farm Report

The year of 1959-60 has been a very unusual year, with three different administrators: Charles Scott, July to December 21; Leland Hibbs, December 21 to April 30; and Paul Cammack since April. Leslie McHargue has stayed by the stuff through the entire year. Daniel Cammack and Carol Hibbs helped greatly in the farm work. All were sorry that Charles and Charlotte Scott had to return to the United States last December because of illness.

After a long dry spell following the planting and an early killing frost the following were harvested: approximately 78 tons of beardless barley, 14 tons of common barley, 90 tons of potatoes and 100 tons of ensilage; the sheep produced 400 lambs. With short harvest the prices of farm produce have risen abruptly and a fair income may be expected.

With the payment of the \$1000 loan on the combine purchased last year and freight bills owed the Yearly Meeting the farm has paid all its debts. With the smaller student body in the Bible School this year it was felt the farm could loan \$500 to the mission funds to place the order for the new edition of song books.

Day Schools

The school year 1960 began as a co-project between the mission and the national church, with Antonio Mamani and Everett Clarkson as co-directors. There are now 20 schools with some 600 pupils. Oregon Yearly Meeting designated \$600 for the day school program.

During the visit of Dean Gregory, Oscar Brown and Roscoe Knight in March and April, it was decided to put the direction of the schools under the national church at which time the following points were decided upon:

After this year, the day schools will be completely under the direction of the national church.

The mission will help the new schools with such articles as chalk, patriotic pictures, flag, soccer ball and blackboard, as well as supply the established schools with soccer ball and chalk.

This plan was accepted and approved by the group of representatives at Junta Anual.

Treasurer's report for the Bolivian Friends Mission July 1, 1959-July 1, 1960

It is with gratitude and thanksgiving for the Lord's many blessings upon the work that we make this report. He has indeed been faithful and has, truly, never failed us. Our hearts are filled with gratitude also to those at home who make it possible, by their gifts and prayers, for the work to be carried on and to grow under the Lord's direction and blessing.

For the last year the Boliviano has remained, more or less, around 12,000 Bolivianos to the dollar. All surplus money has been kept in dollars to avoid any undue loss by inflation.

The treasurer's report will appear in the appendix.

We, the mission council, wish to express our deep and heartfelt appreciation to each and everyone of you who had a part in helping to advance the work here this past year. May the Lord richly bless you and reward you.

KLAMATH INDIAN FIELD REPORT

It will be 18 years in September of this year since Oregon Yearly Meeting took the responsibility of the mission in Sprague River the second time.

The past year has been one of putting down roots for the Christians in the mission. There has not been a spectacular growth in attend-

ance in the services of the mission.

The people raised \$2056.82 for the carrying on of the work with a per capita Sunday school giving of \$11.91 and \$54.22 per capita for the morning service attendance. The people are beginning to feel a financial responsibility to the mission.

A junior Christian Endeavor has been held through the year with an average attendance of about eight.

We have traveled approximately 10,000 miles on behalf of the church from July 1, 1959 to July 1, 1960. This travel has been to hospitals, funerals, Indian Councils, medical clinics for the sick, transporting people to services of the church, etc. We have made 491 pastoral calls.

A series of meetings with Denver Headrick as evangelist proved to be of great value to the Christian people.

The McIntyres have been a great help in the work. They have been limited in what they could do because of living 26 miles from the community. Both have taught Sunday School classes.

A saw mill has been set up in the community which will attract some to reside here.

The termination of federal controls over the Klamath Tribes will make quite a change in the Indian life. Whether it will be for the better or the worse will depend on how much interest Christian people will manifest in helping them to integrate into society. Already they are moving to centers of population such as Klamath Falls, Salem, Portland and are being sucked into the lower class of white people. The Friends Church has a definite responsibility to help these people to get under the right influences. Don't wait until they come to us for that will never be. We must go to them. I wish the churches in these areas would appoint some one or ones to seek out these people and do everything in their power to get them on the right track.

Outgoing missionaries were introduced. Wilma Roberts, who with her husband, Mark, has spent a term in Bolivia, gave her testimony. She expressed her deep concern, first that Christ may be seen in them, and then that they may have abundant faith as they live and work among the Aymara people. Mark was unable to be in the service because of the necessity of a trip to Seattle to see about securing their visas.

Betty and Gene Comfort, newly appointed missionaries, were introduced. Betty spoke, expressing confidence in walking in the Lord's will. She feels it a great privilege, not a sacrifice, to serve the Lord. While they cannot see the future now, they know they are investing in eternal things, and she closed with the words, "Turn your eyes upon Jesus, look full in His wonderful face, and the things of earth will grow strangely dim, in the light of His glory and grace."

Gene expressed his faith in God's leading, proven as the details of their planning have worked out step by step. He has made the hard places easy. He read the Scripture which gives him promise and assurance in I Thess. 5: 24, "Faithful is He that calleth you, who also will do it."

Quentin and Florene Nordyke, also under appointment to Bolivia, were unable to be present. They are to take pastoral work for one year before going to the field.

Tina Knight, outgoing missionary, entering her fourth term with her husband Roscoe, was presented. She gave Deut. 11:11, 12 as the verse which she has used other times in going to the field. God is fulfilling these promises in their work in the Yungas. She challenged us with the thought that we should attempt enough to need the Lord's help.

Roscoe Knight testified that God has proven His promises true. He counts it a high privilege to be an ambassador for Christ and a representative of Oregon Yearly Meeting to the Aymara people.

Evert and Virena Tuning, pastors of the Sprague River Indian Mission in southern Oregon, were introduced. Virena told of their encouragement in seeing God working in their midst.

Evert expressed appreciation for the prayers of Oregon Yearly Meeting, and he is happy to be serving the Lord among the American Indians.

Iverna Hibbs, recently returned from Bolivia, challenged us with the possibility of shortness of time in our missionary endeavor by asking, "What time is it by God's clock?"

Leland Hibbs challenged us with the thought that Jesus said, "I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

The report of the Board of Missions was approved.

● 87. The following communication from the Board of Missions was presented:

The faithful service of Walter Lee as president of the Board of Missions is much appreciated. He has evidenced unusual devotion to the task in his concern and vision for the field and his faithfulness in promoting the work at home. His prompt correspondence with the missionary staff has manifested a real love for them and their interest in all their problems. His aggressive leadership will be greatly missed.

This was heartily approved by the meeting and a standing vote of appreciation was given for the work of Walter Lee.

● 88. The meeting stands adjourned to meet at 9:15 a. m. Saturday

● 89. In the opening devotional period, Kenneth Williams led in prayer and Thomas Rule voiced his testimony.

● 90. The minutes were read and approved.

● 91. Paul Miller, with his wife Patsy, new pastors from California Yearly Meeting, soon to take the pastorate at Rosedale, was introduced to the meeting.

Greetings were read from former pastors, Myron and Beatrice Goldsmith, who are now in Massachusetts.

● 92. The following telegram was read:

Greenleaf Monthly Meeting of Friends, Greenleaf, Idaho, requests the honor of being host for the 1961 session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church. Acting on behalf of Greenleaf Monthly Meeting. Signed: Harold Ankeny.

● 93. The following recommendation was received from the Executive Council:

Since February 1959 the Executive Council has studied the feasibility of relocating the Yearly Meeting headquarters. A year ago, the Council took action recommending that if there were to be a move to Newberg, the Yearly Meeting property be utilized. At this time, also, a committee was appointed to make further investigations. The report of this committee, headed by Harold Lund, was received during the present sessions and contained these observations:

1. that present facilities in Portland, although they have served well for the past 11 years, are becoming inadequate for offices and for the printing plant.
2. that zoning ordinances of the area make our stay at the present location precarious.
3. that the community faces problems of probable future deterioration.
4. that it might be necessary in the event of relocation to secure interim financing and construction of the new building before completing sale of the present property.

The committee showed preliminary sketches for a building and recommended additional study of building needs. The committee also secured appraisal figures for the Portland property and reported these to the Executive Council. After deliberation concerning advantages, the Executive Council approved the relocation in principle, and that steps be taken to sell the Portland headquarters building and relocate in a building constructed on the Newberg property. The Executive Council recommends this action to the Yearly Meeting and asks that the Yearly Meeting instruct and empower the trustees to act in this matter on its behalf.

This was tabled until the afternoon session. (See minute 117)

● 94. The Executive Council nominates Dorwin E. Smith as representative to the National Association of Evangelicals.

Approved.

● 95. The Executive Council nominates Dillon Mills to the Ministers Group Insurance Committee for a term of three years.

● 99. The concern of our General Superintendent that the Yearly Meeting establish a program of long-range planning was considered by the Executive Council. It is the recommendation of the Executive Council that this matter be held over for a year.

The matter referred to the Executive Council of looking into the possibility of placing a full-time assistant or promotion secretary in the work along with the Yearly Meeting superintendent was considered. The following report of the committee appointed by the Executive Council was approved and the report directed sent to the Yearly Meeting. (See minute 39, page 20, 1959)

Report of the committee appointed to study item 12 of the minutes of the Executive Council Meeting of February 1960.

The need for an assistant to the Yearly Meeting superintendent has been considered for a number of years. No definite action has been taken on the discussions at any time. Currently, the superintendent's office is in need of a full-time secretary as the present secretary is serving only half time, which throws a considerable extra burden on the Yearly Meeting superintendent. At its February meeting the Executive Council voted to authorize the superintendent to hire a full-time secretary. Such a secretary has not yet been secured.

The committee appointed to study this matter, in the light of the stated facts, makes the following recommendations to the Executive Council:

1. After a full-time secretary has been secured and has worked for a sufficient time to determine if the addition of an assistant to the superintendent is still required, the Executive Council should reconsider the matter.

2. If it is deemed advisable to add the office of an assistant to the superintendent, the Executive Council should take positive steps to secure the services of a person to fill this position.

3. The nature of the duties of an assistant to the Yearly Meeting superintendent indicates that this office should be designated as that of an assistant superintendent of the Yearly Meeting.

A. The person filling the office of assistant superintendent should be one who is capable of assuming the full responsibility of a number of the more minor duties now being performed by the superintendent, particularly in the administration of the Yearly Meeting office.

B. This person should be one who can represent the office of the superintendent on many occasions in the visitation of the churches where a representative other than the superintendent can fulfill the function of the head of the Yearly Meeting.

It has come to the attention of the board that there are some delinquencies in the payment of fixed expenses. At the direction of the board letters will be sent out to the Quarterly Meetings wherein such conditions exist, urging them to consider the matter and to take such action as appears to be necessary.

This report was approved.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

103. Arthur Roberts, president of the board, stressed the value of the printed page in forwarding the work of the Lord and of our Yearly Meeting. He presented the following report:

Members of the board met six times during the year, giving generously of their time and at their own expense, in order to effect the ministry of the printed page with which responsibility the board is charged. The accompanying tables will show the extent of the work accomplished under our publishing name, "The Barclay Press," and a financial accounting for the first full year of operation as a church-owned press. We have endeavored to provide quality printing at low cost to the various boards and institutions of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

We appreciate the good work of our regular staff, Ralph Chapman as manager of the press, Jack Willcuts, editorial supervision, Beth Hockett, composition, and Ralph Fletcher, pressman. We appreciate the arrangement whereby we may "share" Jack Willcuts' talents with West Chehalem Church and the Board of Evangelism. The staff has functioned nicely as a team, striving ever to increase the efficiency of their tasks and thus honor the stewardship which has been entrusted to them. The board has been made aware of problems in printing management and thus assisted in determining policies.

We appreciate, too, the help which has come from others, including Stanley Putman and Jane Laughlin in art work, Don Millage for assistance in accounting, Ed and Sandra Dealy for the gift of a used letter press and R'Dean Smith for donating type for this press, Warren Magee for helping set up the press, the administration at George Fox College for giving us room for the press, and for Dean Gregory and others at headquarters for their assistance in promotion and mailing.

A major part of our work consists of the publication of The Northwest Friend, the Quaker monthly serving Oregon Yearly Meeting families on United Budget subsidy, and others by subscription. The mailing list is now about 2,800, of which less than 100 are by subscription. Jack Willcuts continues to give excellent editorial leadership to the magazine. Some policy changes which he set in motion this year are: Allen Hadley's column on Sunday School problems, Phyllis Cammack's "Missionary Moments," making the "Soul Cry" a monthly feature, maintaining a 24 page spread for all 11 issues, the use of color in each issue, centering each issue about a theme, e.g. "worship," in July, and provision for a "concern column." We are gratified by the large number of persons who have given strong commendation for the magazine—especially for the challenging editorials.

Other regular printing assignments include the Yearly Meeting minutes and the distinctive bulletin covers featuring the departments of our church and inducing loyalty to the Friends church. We are glad to be able to assist the mission board by preparing tracts and pamphlets in both Spanish and Aymara. To a lesser extent we have prepared literature for other boards. It is gratifying to know that some of our literature is being used by Friends churches across America, e.g. The People Called Quakers, Lion-Hearted Quakers, Outreach, and The Bible and War.

A most significant project this year has been the preparation of a membership course. We were directed to do this by concern of the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight. Under the capable editorship of Jack Willcuts, that course is now prepared. Representatives and pastors from each meeting should take steps immediately to order a quantity of these books for use during the ensuing church year.

Friends should be aware, also, that a little catalog-order blank has been prepared and mailed to every meeting in America, listing publications available from Barclay Press. Literature chairmen should take note of this.

The board is keenly aware of certain problems which relate to increased effectiveness of its task to spread the gospel by the printed page. The fact that we had to house our letter press at George Fox

College accents the situation of space limitation which obtains in the basement of the apartment house headquarters building. Pursuant to this problem, the board has gone on record supporting the proposal that Yearly Meeting headquarters, along with publishing house and bookroom, be located in a building especially designed for these functions, on the Yearly Meeting grounds in Newberg. Our views on this matter have been voiced to the committee which the Executive Council appointed to look into the matter.

Another problem which looms before us is the promotion of our literature. We wish we could publish more books and pamphlets, and there are some manuscripts which we would like to use. So far, however, we have not been nearly as effective as we would like to be in promoting sale and use of our books and literature. And because we have no cushion fund to absorb slow returns on our financial investments, we have to move very slowly in the preparation of new literature. It has been a weakness that we have not worked more closely with the department of literature of the Board of Moral Action, for the promotion of Friends' literature. We hope to rectify this during the next year. And as we complete payment next year on our contract for the printing equipment purchased from Carters and Fletchers we ought to be able to venture more boldly into new publications.

Junior Yearly Meeting, under the direction of Ruth Corbin and her efficient staff of workers, held its 1960 sessions in the basement of the Newberg Friends Church. These sessions were held every morning of Yearly Meeting from 9 a. m. to 12 noon. We appreciated very much the use of the rooms as they were very cool, and the days hot. The attendance every day was about 70.

Some of our lessons were given by Marie Haines and others by June Kenworthy. Marie Haines had a little puppet and each day told us stories of some problems a little Quaker girl had. June Kenworthy told us about some of the different religions of the world. Some of these were Hinduism and Mohammedanism. We also saw films of Bolivia, home missions, and many of the summer camps. The intermediate classes are giving a play about Thomas Lurtin.

Among officers named for Junior Yearly Meeting were presiding clerk, recording clerk, reading clerk, trustees, finance committee, correspondent, statistician, missionary committee, evangelistic committee, and elders.

Our missionary offering went to buy some flannel graph stories for the boys and girls at Sprague River.

- 110. This communication was received from the Board of Public Morals:

Mr. and Mrs. Paxton have been granted a hearing before the Oregon Liquor Control Commission to discuss their application for a package license for Paxton's Grocery, Twin Rocks, Oregon. This informal hearing will be held September 12 at 2 p. m. This license has once been refused, largely due to the many protests received from constituents of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Members are urged to attend this hearing to voice their opinions.

This recommendation was approved, with the added direction that the Yearly Meeting send a letter of protest to be delivered in person by a member of the board at the coming hearing. (See minute 125)

- 111. The Quaker Men, under the leadership of president Ralph Chapman, presented the following report:

The Quaker Men of Oregon Yearly Meeting have adopted the following three-fold program for 1960-61.

1. Encourage organization of new Quaker Men groups and the enlargement of the activities of present Quaker Men groups functioning at the local and Quarterly Meeting levels. It is recognized that unlimited opportunity is afforded to men to assist in maintenance of church plants, and in seeking out means whereby a contribution can be made toward reaching the goal of the total outreach of the local church. It is also recognized that Quaker Men can contribute toward sponsoring or supporting worthy projects on the Quarterly Meeting level.

2. Facilitate means for a long-range planning and spiritual life emphasis among Quaker Men. It was observed that men of the Yearly Meeting need to be revived. Many of the minor details of organization and giving will be taken care of by a revival of spiritual

zeal and passion for lost souls. To implement this phase of our goal, the Quaker Men Spiritual Life Conference and Workshop is scheduled for October 1960. At this time consideration will be given for planning, organization, and spiritual advancement.

3. Adopt a project whereby men may place their support in the church extension program of the Yearly Meeting. This is to be done by the Quaker Men support of the Friends Church Extension Foundation. It is felt that by support of this organization already established within our Yearly Meeting, men are afforded a most satisfactory method to make substantial and lasting contribution to the vital ministry of church extension in the Pacific northwest.

Denver Headrick, coordinator, presented a challenge to the men's organization that they work toward spiritual revival, suggesting the possibility of churches holding men's revivals.

The report of organization and the treasurer's report of Quaker Men were read and will appear in the appendix.

The report of the Quaker Men was approved.

●112. The morning inspirational hour opened with the song, "O Worship the King."

In his closing inspirational message of this Yearly Meeting, Walter Lee expressed a sense of appreciation to Oregon Yearly Meeting for the many associations and blessings he has received through the years.

He introduced the fourth in a series of principles which Friends have held, with the subject, "The Solemnity of Responsibility," reading Ezekiel 22:30.

We have a responsibility toward those less fortunate. But we cannot relieve men from personal responsibility. He warned against legislation which thwarts this. We need to develop responsibility if we are to develop leaders. We are accountable to God for our acts. We are not victims of circumstances.

The early Friends felt that a man was responsible to God for the way he lived. May we have a revival of that attitude today.

When God has wanted to lead in a great move, He has called a man, not a corporation, but an individual with a concern.

Every member of Christ's Church has a responsibility.

"O Timothy, keep that which is committed to thy trust."

The congregation joined with Merrill Coffin as he led out in singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Herman Macy dismissed the meeting with prayer.

●113. In the afternoon devotional period, prayer was offered by Eugene McDonald.

●114. The minutes were read and corrected.

●115. Visiting Friends were introduced, Mr. and Mrs. Abe Voth from California, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Cole, also from California; Fred Newkirk, new pastor at Vancouver church.

●116. Terrell Repp spoke regarding the growth and development of the club work program, the "Missionaires," in our Yearly Meeting.

●117. Discussion was entered into regarding the moving of Yearly Meeting headquarters to Newberg, which was referred from minute 93.

It was approved that this matter be left to the trustees, under the direction and supervision of the Executive Council; the Executive Council will also appoint the building committee.

●118. The following recommendation was forwarded from the Executive Council:

The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting that the sending of the printed card with our epistles be discontinued. This was established by minute 73, Yearly Meeting Minutes of 1946.

This was approved and further communication follows:

Inasmuch as one of the ways by which bond of union is maintained by the several Yearly Meetings of Friends consists of annual correspondence (as appears in our discipline, p. 40), thus constituting Friends a denomination, we recommend that pursuant to Yearly Meeting action approving the discontinuance of sending the "acknowledgment-without-recognition" card, the following course be taken:

1. A list of Yearly Meetings with whom we are in spiritual unity be compiled and to these we shall send our annual epistle.
2. That this initial list be approved by the Executive Council; and that this first list, along with this procedure, be approved by the Yearly Meeting in session.
3. That the Epistle Committee recommend to the Executive Council for its approval such changes in the list as may be deemed advisable, from year to year.

On the basis of discipline statements and affiliations which give testimony to orthodox, historic Quaker position, the Executive Council recommends the following list of Yearly Meetings and recommends that the Yearly Meeting approve the procedure:

● 130. Report of Trustees: The trustees approved the construction of a room in the Newberg church to be used as a work room in connection with the pastor's study. The expense of its construction is being paid by Newberg Monthly Meeting.

No legal documents such as deeds, notes, contracts and mortgages have been signed for the Yearly Meeting during the year.

Approved.

● 131. The following report, approved by the Executive Council, is the result of the study of the possibility of establishing a Friends Foundation and professorship in a seminary. The suggestion came from the Yearly Meeting superintendent's report. (See minute 38, page 20 of Oregon Yearly Meeting Minutes for 1959) The report was directed sent to the Yearly Meeting.

The Executive Council approved a suggestion that for this year the education department of the Board of Moral Action be allowed to solicit funds in addition to their budget to pay the \$750.00 which is our Yearly Meeting's portion of the expense for the Friends Summer School at Rockcleft, Colorado.

The committee composed of Arthur Roberts, Dean Gregory, and Gerald Dillon submit the following report:

In consideration of the growing demands made upon the Friends pastor for positive aggressive leadership in various areas of church life and the urgent need for more thorough training in order to fill the offices adequately and to assume places of leadership in our denomination, we make the following recommendations:

That Asbury Theological Seminary, the Nazarene Theological Seminary, and the Western Evangelical Seminary be officially recognized as approved places of theological training for prospective Friends ministers. While there may be exceptional cases in which a young person may be clearly led elsewhere, nevertheless because the doctrinal position and spiritual emphasis of the above schools are so near to that of Friends we definitely encourage attendance at any one of these places by those wishing to enter the Friends ministry;

That Oregon Yearly Meeting recognize and encourage the founding of the Friends Summer School at Rockcleft, Colorado under the direction of the Association of Evangelical Friends. We would suggest that \$750 be given each year to the Association of Evangelical Friends for this purpose and that this amount come from the education department of the Board of Moral Action. This school, owned and operated by evangelical Friends, could be one of the most significant steps of our day in making for spiritual renewal within the Friends church. It is our prayer that Oregon Yearly Meeting will be able to give its support to this cause;

That closer cooperation be maintained with the supporting consti-

tudents of Western Evangelical Seminary at Jennings Lodge, Oregon. Since it is the official declaration of the school that they wish to operate on an interdenominational basis, and since their theological and spiritual emphasis are so very close to that of the Friends church, and since they have repeatedly invited us to cooperate in this seminary, and since we are in need of adequate seminary facilities in the Pacific Northwest for the training of our young pastors, we suggest the following goals be approved by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

1. Enlarge the number of Friends on the Western Evangelical Seminary Corporation, this to be done on an invitational basis from corporation members now serving.

2. Appointment by Oregon Yearly Meeting of our full quota of Western Evangelical Seminary board of trustee members as allowed by the corporation of the school.

3. The payment of full tuitional scholarships of all Friends students from Oregon Yearly Meeting who are planning for service in this church. This money to go towards the salary of a Friends professor at such a time as one may be secured.

4. Plan now for the placement of a Friends professor on the faculty of Western Evangelical Seminary, either part-time or full-time, the salary to be paid by Oregon Yearly Meeting through tuitional scholarships, donations made to the school by Friends, and specific commitments of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The salary to be paid on a scale commensurate with that of the faculty members of the school.

It is recognized that all constituent groups responsible for the Western Evangelical Seminary do not in turn reciprocate by supporting our own college, and that at times we have felt they have shown a rather patronizing spirit towards Friends. Be that as it may, let us not be guilty of a reprisal attitude or fail to go the second mile in a spirit of Christian charity and cooperation. In turn it would be our hope, prayer, and expectancy that the leadership of the Western Evangelical Seminary would give to George Fox College the same backing and recognition that it gives to any other similar institution; and that the seminary, through the teaching of its staff, would be to the mutual advantage of all concerned. It is our hope that prayerful consideration be given to this matter.

Approved.

● 132. The following was received from the Board of Peace and Service:

We of Oregon Yearly Meeting, met in annual session, feel the need to examine and reaffirm our belief in peace. We do this for our own benefit and as a testimony that others may know wherein we stand.

We believe in the peace with God that can be ours only by the grace of God and through the shed blood of Jesus Christ His Son.

We believe in the peace of God that can be our peace through the Holy Spirit.

We believe in the peace with men that is enjoined upon us by God through His Holy Word.

As stated by Quakers in 1660:

"We utterly deny all outward wars and strife, and fightings with outward weapons, for any end, or under any pretense whatsoever; and this is our testimony to the whole world. . . The Spirit of Christ by which we are guided is not changeable, so as once to command

us from a thing as evil, and again to move unto it; and we do certainly know and so testify to the world, that the Spirit of Christ, which leads us into all truth, will never move us to fight and war against any man with outward weapons, neither for the Kingdom of Christ nor for the kingdoms of this world. . . Therefore, we cannot learn war anymore.

"We feel bound explicitly to avow our unshaken persuasion that all war is utterly incompatible with the plain precepts of our divine Lord and law-giver, and the whole spirit of His Gospel, and that no plea of necessity or policy, however urgent or peculiar, can avail to release either individuals or nations from the paramount allegiance which they owe to Him who hath said, 'Love your enemies.' (Matt. 5: 44, Luke 6: 27) In enjoining this love, and the forgiveness of injuries, He who has bought us to Himself has not prescribed for man precepts which are incapable of being carried into practice, or of which the practice is to be postponed until all shall be persuaded to act upon them. We cannot doubt that they are incumbent now, and that we have in the prophetic Scriptures the distinct intimation of their direct application not only to individuals, but to nations also. (Isaiah 2: 4, Micah 4: 1) When nations conform their laws to this divine teaching, wars must necessarily cease.

We would, in humility, but in faithfulness to our Lord, express our firm persuasion that all the exigencies of civil government and social order may be met under the banner of the Prince of Peace, in strict conformity with His commands. (Taken from the Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, p. 32)

We believe we as Christians should be able to say with George Fox as he refused to take up arms for the Commonwealth against Charles Stuart, that we live in virtue of that life and power that takes away the occasion of all wars.

It was Jesus who said: "Blessed are the peacemakers . . . Love your enemies and pray for them which despitefully use you." It is He who tells us to turn the other cheek and go the second mile. In the epistles we are reminded of our responsibility to do our part that we might live at peace with all men and to seek after peace and holiness without which no man can see God.

From this it does appear that the foundation of our peace is neither philosophical nor sociological but the commandments of God given to us in the Bible and enlightened to our understanding by the Holy Spirit.

Approved.

● 133. The following was received from the Board of Peace and Service, referring to minute 14:

The Board of Peace and Service recommends that the following communication be sent to the Northwest Regional office of the National Association of Evangelicals.

To the Northwest Regional Office of the National Association of Evangelicals:

In recent months some of our meetings have been visited by a team or by individuals from the National Association of Evangelicals in a campaign against communism. We share the conviction that communism is based upon a materialistic and godless philosophy which is

incompatible with Christianity. We have, nevertheless, found some occasion for concern regarding the manner and method of this campaign, especially as conducted by Walter Huss.

We believe that his manner and method could prove more fruitful in developing fear of communism than in increasing faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

We believe that it is a garbled analysis of the present-day situation to represent it as a struggle between communism and the Christian Church to the death of one or the other. The distortion is increased by the apparent assumption that Christianity is synonymous with the American way of life. This would lead to the conclusion that if Russia should conquer America the church would be dead. But Jesus declared that even the gates of hell would not prevail against His Church.

We believe that our opposition to evil should be motivated by our love of right and hatred of sin and not by a desire to save our lives. We might even lose our lives in the opposition.

It has appeared to us that Mr. Huss has classed all pacifists in a group with the communist front organizations which masquerade under the pacifist name. We would remind the N. A. E. and others that, while we claim no fellowship with such unchristian pacifism, yet as evangelical Christians, it is still our persuasion that the Bible teaches us to live at peace with our fellowmen. We enclose a copy of the statement of this year's session of our Yearly Meeting on this question.

This was approved and a copy was directed sent to the northwest regional office and also the national office of the National Association of Evangelicals.

(Subsequent information reveals that Walter Huss has never been connected with the N. A. E.)

● 134. The following news release was accepted as follows:
Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church in its 68th annual session held at Newberg, Oregon, August 17-21, 1960

The more than 300 Quakers of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church in the Pacific northwest went on record today in the 68th annual Yearly Meeting sessions in authorizing a strong statement favoring the three-century-old stand of Quakers upholding the principle of separation of church and state.

Representatives from 64 Friends congregations comprising more than 5,500 members in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho were reminded in a letter sent to the floor of the formal business session by the Oregon Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight which includes the pastors, other recorded ministers, elders and overseers of the Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church that all Friends are encouraged to interest themselves in this national issue in this presidential election year.

This statement reads in part: "Our freedom was purchased at the price of great personal sacrifices in the early days of our church." Friends have known political subservience and religious slavery and are keenly aware of the issues of Christian responsibility and freedom which face us as a nation. Friends missionaries with first-hand experience in those Latin American countries where there is no division of church and state expressed apprehension of the present political trends in the United States administration.

A statement was authorized to be sent to all the Friends churches urging members to vote with caution and to prayerfully consider the possibilities of permitting any national leadership to power which might be a part of a religious system inconsistent with our national and religious liberties. "Every member should become fully aware of the issues at stake and sincerely seek the leading of the Holy Spirit in the exercise of his franchise (to vote) this fall," the statement declares, expressing the position of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

● 135. The report of the Entertainment Committee was read as follows:

The dormitories and vet houses were over crowded this year, housing approximately 130 people throughout the week. Over the weekend several young people slept on mattresses placed on the floors of the music hall and gym. Three trailers were parked on the church grounds, 65 people were placed in private homes, and many stayed with friends or relatives, to make this one of the largest Yearly Meetings in recent years.

The young people who helped in the dining hall during Yearly Meeting appreciated the fact that members of the Chehalem Center, West Chehalem and Springbrook meetings served Friday and Saturday evening making it possible for them to attend C. E. activities.

Sherwood, Tigard, Netarts, and Springbrook meetings, under the leadership of Lilah Newby, furnished flowers for the dining hall. These helped to lend a cheerful atmosphere.

Tasty and filling meals were prepared by our cooks Minnie Moore and Maereta Durham. Meredith Beals served as hostess and kept things moving smoothly in the dining hall.

A well earned vote of thanks goes to Joan Logan and the women of Newberg Quarterly Meeting who spent a day cleaning the various dormitories.

● 137. The Epistle Committee presented a summary of the epistles received from other Yearly Meetings.

The epistle to be sent to other Yearly Meetings was read as follows:

"Grace and peace be unto you and peace from Him which is, and

which was, and which is to come" even Jesus Christ who "loved us and washed us from our sins in his own blood." As we assembled from three states of our Northwest at Newberg, Oregon, August 17-21, we came with a real desire for a refreshing from the presence of the Lord. We were soon conscious that the promise of John 16: 14 was being fulfilled in which the Holy Spirit would glorify Jesus and show the things of Him unto His believing people.

Our General Superintendent, Dean Gregory, in his opening message, sought to give us a picture of what God is expecting from His Church in these days of unbelief, immorality, and mounting world tension. He emphasized the spiritual empowerment that is so vitally necessary if we are to press ahead in times like these.

For the inspirational and evangelistic meetings we were blessed by the ministry of Walter P. Lee, one of our pastors, who has spent his Christian life in some capacity of service in our Yearly Meeting. He is now leaving us to become superintendent of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting.

A spirit of harmony and Christian fellowship prevailed in all of our business sessions. As the various departments brought their annual reports, there appeared to have been substantial gains, for which we give all the praise to God. Evangelism and church extension at home and an expanding missionary work in Bolivia have been carried on by consecrated efforts, prayer support and sacrificial giving on the part of many of our members. Oregon Yearly Meeting reaffirmed its stand on peace. We have now over 60 meetings and over 5,500 members. We are succeeding in the establishment of a strong national church in Bolivia that will be able to carry on in the event our missionaries are forced to leave.

Our hearts are cheered by the many young people who are taking up the work that the aging ones have to lay down. We have a number of youth camps where wholesome recreation is combined with sound Bible teaching and evangelism. These were largely attended the last season and resulted in many finding the Lord in salvation and others being established in grace and called into special Christian service. We have several young couples who have expressed a readiness for missionary service when the door opens for such service.

We have two Christian schools which are greatly contributing to the moral, scholastic and spiritual lives of our youth. They are Greenleaf Academy at Greenleaf, Idaho, and George Fox College in Newberg, Oregon. Both are now fully accredited institutions of learning.

As we face the uncertainty of the coming days we expect to go on, confident in the surety of the Lord's promise, "Lo I am with you always even unto the end of the age."
