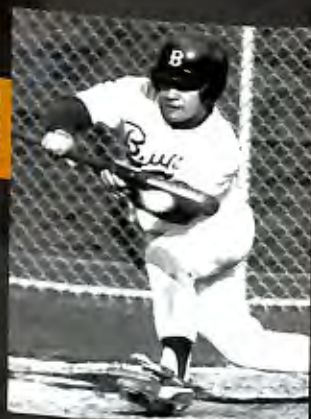

Outfielder Mike Thompson earned All-Northwest Conference honors. He was named Honorable Mention All-American in 1994



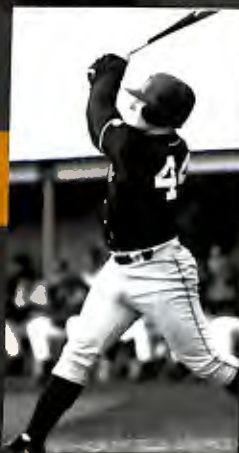

Pitcher **Scott Hyde**, 2004 NWC Player of the Year, was 14-1 with a 1.99 ERA and 191 strikeouts, leading the nation in wins and strikeouts, and was named First Team All-America, Co-National Pitcher of the Year, and the Most Outstanding Player in the Division III World Series.

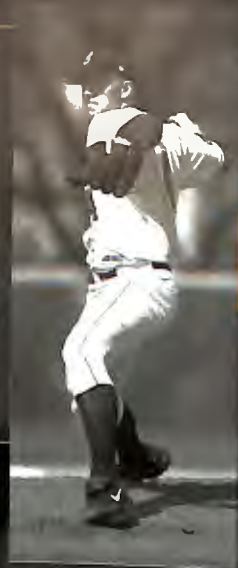

Pitcher **Ryan Alvis**, NCAA 2000 Div. III Third Team All-American, led the Northwest Conference in ERA (1.87). He set George Fox season records for wins (11), strikeouts (93), innings (91.1), and complete games (9)

Derrick Jones earned First Team All-America and First Team All-West Region honors as a utility player in 2005, then was Northwest Conference Player of the Year and signed with the Texas Rangers in 2006.

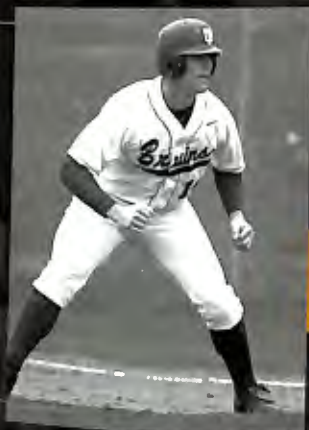
Since 1993, the Bruins have won five games against Div. I opponents (Univ. of Washington, Oregon State Univ., Portland State Univ., Univ. of Portland, twice)

The 1999 team hit 102 home runs and 118 doubles. Its .692 slugging percentage set a national NAIA record and is third best all-time at any collegiate level

George Fox has had three pitchers throw no-hitters: Dave Callahan in 1981, Troy Schrenk in 1997, and Scott Hyde in 2004

In 2002, second baseman **Ryan Dearing** set an NCAA Div. III national record by getting hit by 33 pitches

Eleven straight winning seasons ... and counting

Bruins again make postseason play with hard-hitting offense and smooth defense

Making their fifth appearance in the NCAA Division III National Tournament in seven seasons, the George Fox Bruins finished third in the West Regional in Orange, Calif., and ended the year 29-15, their 11th straight winning record. The Bruins reached the playoffs by winning their fifth straight Northwest Conference title with an 18-6 league mark and their eighth in 11 seasons under head coach Pat Bailey. The Bruins were ranked 23rd in the final Division III baseball poll.

As a team, George Fox was second nationally in fielding, with a .970 average and ranked sixth nationally with a .356 batting average, the second highest in team history. The Bruin bats also ranked 10th in home runs per game (0.91), 12th in runs per game (9.0) and slugging percentage (.507), and 21st in doubles per game (2.32).

Rookie shortstop Bo Thunell (Fr., Canyon City, Ore.) stepped in for graduated All-America shortstop David Peterson and was an immediate sensation, leading the NWC in RBI (48), setting a Bruin record for home runs by a freshman (7), and batting .417. He was named Third Team All-America and First Team All-West Region by the American Baseball Coaches Association.

Second Team All-Region honors went to pitcher-designated hitter Derrick Jones (Sr., Forest Grove,

Ore.) as a utility player, second baseman C.R. Braniff (Sr., Hills-boro, Ore.), and right fielder Dan Wentzell (Jr., Tualatin, Ore.), while first baseman Bryan Donohue (Jr., Gresham, Ore.) received Third Team All-Region recognition.

Ten Bruins received All-Conference recognition, with Jones being named NWC Player of the Year as well as First Team pitcher and designated hitter after batting .364 and going 6-3 with a 3.21 ERA on the mound. Other First Team Bruins were Braniff, Thunell, Wentzell, and relief pitcher Chris Albrecht (Jr., Woodinville, Ore.). Second Team All-NWC honors went to Donohue, center fielder Drew Johnson (Jr., New Plymouth, Idaho), and catcher Ryan Fobert (So., Dallas, Ore.). Pitcher Brandon Rupp (Sr., Beaverton, Ore.) and third baseman Marc Mason (Sr., Lake Oswego, Ore.) were honorable mention.

Bailey was NWC Coach of the Year for the eighth time in 11 years and fifth year in a row. His career record now stands at 323-147, a .687 winning percentage that ranks in the top 30 among active Division III coaches.

Braniff set a George Fox record and tied the Division III national record for the most hits in a game when he went 7-for-7 at Willamette

on March 26. He also finished fifth all-time in Division III history with 32 career sacrifice bunts.

Wentzell and Rupp were *ESPN The Magazine*/ CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII First Team selections.

The Northwest Conference and NCAA Division III experience

National Collegiate Athletic Association Division III

Colleges and universities in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III place their highest priority on the overall quality of the educational experience and on the successful completion of all students' academic programs. Division III institutions seek to establish and maintain an environment in which a student-athlete's athletic activities are conducted as an integral part of the student-athlete's educational experience.

Division III consists of more than 400 institutions, making it the largest division in the NCAA. All

Division III institutions award no athletically related financial aid to any students. Division III sponsors 13 national cham-

pionships in men's sports, 14 in women's, and eight national collegiate championships that are combined with other divisions.

George Fox University has been a member of the NCAA since 1995 when – along with the other institutions in the Northwest Conference – it elected to transfer its membership from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).



The Northwest Conference

The nine colleges and universities in the Northwest Conference are known for their academics and athletics.

The conference is building a reputation as one of the most competitive NCAA Division III alliances in the country. In the academic arena, every Northwest Conference institution has been ranked by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine as a top-tier school in its category.

Formed in 1926, the conference is one of the oldest athletic alliances in the western United States. Its nine members are all private colleges or universities located in Oregon or Washington.

George Fox left the Cascade Collegiate Conference to join the Northwest Conference in 1995, shortly before the Northwest



Conference shifted national affiliation from the NAIA to the NCAA. Leaving behind years of success at the NAIA level, the conference

embraced the move as one that would foster equity, sportsmanship, and genuine concern for the student-athlete in all endeavors of competition.

CURTIS AND MARGARET MORSE COMPLEX

George Fox University soccer, baseball, and softball teams play home games on the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Complex.

Located on the northeast section of the campus, the complex was renovated in 1989 using a major donation from Curtis and Margaret Morse, avid supporters of Bruin athletics. Four generations of the Morse family have attended George Fox.

All three Morse Fields are natural-grass surfaces. The soccer field, home to both the men's and women's soccer teams, has seating for 250 spectators.

The baseball field has seating for 250 spectators. Directly behind home plate is the concession stand and press box. After off-season renovations in 2004-05, the field dimensions now measure 330 feet down the lines, 365 in the left-center power alley, 370 to right-center, and 380 to straightaway center.

The softball field has an all-dirt infield and seating for 100 fans. The outfield fence is 205 feet down the left-field line, 200 down the right-field line, and 200 to straightaway center.

Fund-raising efforts are now under way for a new athletic field complex located on 24 acres of land donated to the university by Newberg business owners Ken and Joan Austin.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

are an important part of George Fox University, home to one of the Northwest's most successful small-college sports programs. Winning programs, of course, are accompanied by a proper balance between academics and athletics. At George Fox University, student-athletes compete for conference and national titles at a Christ-centered university where professors and coaches help them grow in mind, body, and spirit. Intercollegiate athletics competition provides for practical application of what is learned in the classroom and at practice.



THE UNIVERSITY fields teams in 14 varsity sports, eight for women (golf, volleyball, soccer, cross country, basketball, softball, tennis, and track and field) and six for men (soccer, cross country, basketball, baseball, tennis, and track and field). More than 15 percent of George Fox's traditional undergraduate students participate in these sports. Their records over the years serve as shining testimonies to the administration's conviction that an institution can play for the glory of God, follow the rules and ethics of its governing organizations, and be successful on the fields and courts of competition at the same time.

At George Fox, the values of athletics are integrated with the goals of Christian higher education in a process that includes:

- Teamwork
- Cooperation
- Graciousness in winning and losing

- George Fox has earned district or conference titles 18 times during the last decade.
