Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

1962

- 1. The seventieth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convenes at Newberg, Oregon, August 14, 1962, with thanks to our Heavenly Father that we are again permitted to meet in His name, to worship Him and to do the business of our church, under His guidance. We pray for His presence with us during these sessions.

Randall Emry led us in singing "All Hail the Power."

The assistant clerk, Kenneth Williams, led in prayer.

- 2. Dean Gregory, Yearly Meeting Superintendent, presented the following report:

During the year the Lord has given us many opportunities. Once a month I have the opportunity to share burdens and concerns as I report to the pastors through my monthly Pastoral Letter which goes to all pastors and quarterly meeting superintendents. The following is a brief resume of my activities throughout the year:

Immediately following Yearly Meeting last year I was guest speaker at the Haviland, Kansas, camp meeting, at which time I brought 20 messages. I participated in the Sunday School retreat at Menucha in September. This conference is becoming a very fine occasion for the western part of the Yearly Meeting. It has been my privilege to work with the Christian Endeavor executive committee, led by Lonny Fendall, Yearly Meeting C. E. president and field secretary. Whenever possible I attend their retreats and meetings. Also I attended the Quaker Men's retreat at Pendleton last fall, and they are planning another one this fall. This is a most inspiring conference.

Board meetings and board retreats, particularly the Boards of Evangelism and Missions, have been a part of my itinerary. I attended the conference of Yearly Meeting superintendents in December at Richmond, Indiana. Here all the yearly meeting superintendents in America were in attendance, except one. I also had the privilege of conducting a five-day meeting at the Everett Friends Church. This was a time of real

blessing to my own heart. The mid-year board meetings take most of a week of time, and I appreciate the privilege of meeting with the church departments in these sessions.

Campus conference at George Fox College, in which I participated during one week in the spring, was a time of special blessing as I met with the young people and counselled with them. I attended the N. A. E. convention in Denver in April, where I served as your representative on the Board of Administration of that organization. The Ministers Conference in the spring of the year is one of the very highest points of inspiration for the pastors. I served on the program for this conference.

Immediately following that, the Board of Evangelism asked Wilbert Eichenberger, Clynton Crisman and myself to visit Alaska to make some surveys regarding possible expansion of our church extension work in Alaska. This was in cooperation with California Yearly Meeting. Then it was Clynton's and my privilege to accompany Keith Sarver on a trip up north of the Arctic Circle to the Kotzebue area. This visit to this mission field among our Eskimo Friends was a great blessing to our hearts as we sat with them in Christian worship and visited their villages.

Then following the Alaska trip the Teen Ambassador's conference was held in our conference room in our headquarters building. Early in June we moved to Newberg, selling our house in Portland and arranging for a place to live, as well as moving the headquarters office. The Yearly Meeting Executive Council asked me to attend the Evangelical Friends Conference this year at Malone College in Canton, Ohio. My wife Kathleen and I were privileged to attend. About 45 from our Yearly Meeting were in attendance.

It has been my privilege to visit most of the churches and quarterly meetings this year. One of the richest sources of blessing to my own heart is that of sitting down with the pastors, particularly the young pastors, and going over their spiritual problems and opportunities. We have a wonderful staff of pastors in Oregon Yearly Meeting and we want to maintain the strength we have. I have been asked to make several long trips this year, which have taken me over 37,000 miles.

● 3. Following this report Dean Gregory brought a challenging and searching message. He stated that we must plan for the future, spiritually, not planning only in things in which man is the center. In 21 civilizations, 19 have been destroyed by atheism, socialism, materialism and alcoholism. Socialism and materialism confront us as Christians. He read 2 Chronicles 7:14 and Acts 1:8. Best spiritual growth is made by the conviction that God's word calls for obedience. The purpose of the church is to honor and glorify God and to be in a place of united witness to Him. This involves worship. We need to be separated so the Lord can have fellowship with us, and we can have fellowship with Him. Evangelism is another purpose of the church. We need to stir ourselves to realize that a job needs to be done. We need a growth in our spiritual concern for people around the world. Oregon Yearly Meeting has an opportunity, if we want it, for world vision, by having workers around the world. We need to provide the spiritual attitude for young people to answer God's call. The mission field is calling, churches are calling. We need to increase our vision and stop being satisfied to take things as they come. We can do the job, if we do not want to do some other things worse. These should be years of challenge to the youth of our church. Do we know within our hearts that we can meet the challenge that is before us?

The congregation joined in singing "To the Work."
Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

- 10. Dr. Earl Barker was appointed to serve as clerk of the representatives until the return of the previously appointed clerk, Charles Beals.

Approved.

- 11. The meeting dismissed to meet at 9:15 a. m. Wednesday.

Wednesday, 9:15 a.m.

The session opened with prayer by Walter Cook.

- 12. The minutes were read and approved.
- 13. The reports of the state of the churches were read and summarized as follows:

Meetings for worship are regularly held and attendance has increased in some instances. However, there is noted a slackness in attendance at prayer meeting and on Sunday evening in some areas. There seems to be a burden for the lost and a concern for a full walk of obedience on the part of all. These needs are prayed for in regular and special prayer meetings.

There is expressed a feeling of love and unity among members, with themselves and with those about them, so that members are living in harmony and with a Christian attitude to the world about them.

A deep appreciation for the ministry of our pastors is expressed throughout. Messages are helpful and meet the needs of the people. In some instances souls have been saved through calling in the homes. Special meetings have been profitable and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Most families have devotions in the home, and devotional observances have increased in some cases through the "Read the Bible Through in '62" program. It is felt that many this year have grown and deepened spiritually.

All meetings give appreciation to the work of the young people in our meetings. Many are filling places of responsibility and leadership and they are encouraged to use talents and special gifts. Some are preparing for full-time Christian service.

Care is taken to uphold doctrinal teachings of Friends, and an earnest effort is made to see that all those selected as officers, teachers and leaders are in full harmony with the doctrinal standards of Friends as held by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Meetings expressed a desire that members will continue to grow spiritually and to live in more faith, dedicating themselves to a closer fellowship with Him, realizing as never before that His grace is sufficient for all our needs.

- 14. The meeting favored sending greetings from Oregon Yearly Meeting to Ohio Yearly Meeting now in its 150th session.

- 15. L. Esther White asked to be released as a Yearly Meeting representative as she is serving on the Committee on Ministry. Approved.

This was referred to the representatives to act on the resulting vacancy.

- 16. The following recommendation was read from the Executive Council:

The Executive Council meeting in mid-year session, February 16, 1962, approved making the following recommendation to the Yearly Meeting:

1. That a full-time office be created to be known as "Assistant General Superintendent."
2. That the Assistant Superintendent give major interest and emphasis to the work of Christian Education and of Church Extension and Evangelism. He will be under the direction of the General Superintendent in promoting and administering these departments and shall work in conjunction with the presidents of the respective boards. He shall engage also in other programs and duties assigned to him.
3. That the Executive Council make this nomination.

The Executive Council nominates Clynton Crisman to serve as Assistant Superintendent for the year 1962-63.

The Executive Council recommends a salary of \$4,000.00 plus \$1,100.00 for house allowance, \$400.00 for utilities, with \$1,000.00 for travel expense with automobile liability to be paid also. A two week's vacation is to be allowed annually.

The Executive Council recommends that the \$5,500.00 salary shall be drawn from the United Budget and \$1,000.00 travel fund from the Fixed Expense.

After some discussion this was tabled until a later session.

● 17. The resignation of Walter King from the Board of Moral Action was accepted and the filling of the vacancy was referred to the representatives.

● 18. The auditing committee report was read and approved.

● 19. The treasurer's report was read. This report appears in the appendix. Appreciation was expressed for the services of Roger and Mildred Minthorne as treasurers.

Report was approved.

● 20. The resignation of Glenn Armstrong from the Board of Peace and Service was accepted, and the filling of the vacancy was referred to the representatives.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

● 21. Arthur Roberts, president of the board, presented the report which follows:

This has been the first complete year in which Barclay Press has occupied new quarters in a wing of the headquarters building in Newberg. Although certain contracts diminished because of the move, we are gratified to note that receipts from sales were somewhat higher than the previous year. A reduced United Budget appropriation, increased cost for rent and utilities, and a certain loss of work during the process of moving into the new facilities—these have constituted heavy liabilities to be overcome. We appreciate the wonderful spirit of dedication which has characterized those on the staff, as well as the board members who met approximately every two months in order to discharge our responsibilities to the church.

During the past year our staff has been as follows: Ralph Chapman, manager; Arlene Fiscus, compositor; Jack Willcuts, editor, and LeRoy Benham, printer. They have sought each in accord with particular skills and as a team to serve the Lord in this ministry. We appreciate their work.

In accordance with our policy of a ministry of the printed page, especially among Friends, we are glad to note the addition of certain printing services this year, including a teachers quarterly for the George Fox Press. In addition to Yearly Meeting Minutes, various programs, brochures and booklets for the boards of our church, we have edited the devotional quarterly, FRUIT OF THE VINE, the NORTHWEST FRIEND, and published the MISSIONARY VOICE and CONCERN. A statement of materials printed is attached for your convenience. We invite you to visit the Barclay Press and see our literature and work rooms. Of special interest to many is the increased volume of missionary literature printed. We appreciate the concern of the Board of Missions for the widespread dissemination of gospel tracts and other literature in Bolivia and Peru and are grateful to share in this ministry. Our budget and personnel plans for 1962-63 envision an even larger ministry in missionary literature.

Our plans for next year are as follows: Harlow Ankeny, of California Yearly Meeting, is coming full time as publisher in charge of production, sales, personnel, plant, and accounting. Harlow has served recently with World Vision and as office manager for the Los Angeles area National Association of Evangelicals. Ralph Chapman will give a sizeable amount of his time to the creation and preparation of missionary literature in addition to regular production tasks in layout and photography. Arlene Fiscus will continue at composition and secretarial work. LeRoy Benham, who stepped into the breach a year and a half ago upon the death of Ralph Fletcher, will return to other work; and his place as printer will be taken by Edward Dealy. Edward Dealy has been studying in the graphic arts during the past three years, as well as working in print shops.

In addition to the four full-time persons, Jack Willcuts will continue as editor-in-chief of the NORTHWEST FRIEND.

We covet your prayers for these workers that the ministry of the Gospel by the printed page may redound to the glory of God.

A very interesting Publications Workshop of three sessions was held in connection with the Conference of Evangelical Friends at Canton, Ohio, July 18-22, 1962. The values of the church periodical were stressed, and proposals were made looking toward unified efforts on the part of at least four independent yearly meetings.

Ralph Smallwood, editor of the EVANGELICAL FRIEND, proposed in his paper that the four periodicals be standardized as to size and format, so that materials could be shared conveniently. He proposed further that an inter-board council be formed and authorized to do business for all.

By this method expensive services could be purchased by the council and utilized by all the papers.

Those present and participating in the workshop went a step further, to propose the merging of the four papers published by Oregon, Ohio, Kansas, and Rocky Mountain Yearly Meetings into one, this to contain articles of general interest contributed from the combined areas, and also items of particular interest to each of the four memberships.

The group proposed before closing the last session that a Publications Conference be called to meet during the coming winter, to give thorough consideration to all matters which would be involved in merging the four publications and formulate recommendations to be carried to the respective yearly meetings in their 1963 sessions. This conference will probably be held in connection with a similar one on missions which was authorized by the Association.

The financial statement will appear in the appendix.

● 22. Meeting adjourned to meet at 2:15 p. m.

Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

Myron Goldsmith spoke from Colossians 1:3-14. The letter of Paul to the Colossians was written to exalt Christ and to remind readers that they were "complete in Him." It opens with a record of Paul's praise and intercession for his readers at Colosse. These were discussed in terms of facts and ideals. A missionary enterprise had brought the truth of the Christian Gospel to Colosse, creating faith in the hearts of hearers and resulting in their rescue from the kingdom of darkness and establishment in the kingdom of God's beloved Son. The work of the Holy Spirit is to convince the hearts of men. We, as Christians, have been delivered from the power of darkness and are translated into His power. Paul's prayer was for their filling with the knowledge of God's will. "Fit to be partakers" is the qualification to share in His inheritance. We are

partaking of His inheritance at this time. It can be entered into now, not only in the future. We enter into a fellowship of love, an enjoyment of Christian fellowship.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

- 23. Merle Green, president of the board, presented the report which follows:

The Lord's blessing has been evident in the activity and program of our board this past year. We have endeavored to "enlarge the place of our tent" in the areas of peace and service.

Disquiet and unrest and suffering are prevalent throughout the world. The need for our ministry in peace and service is greater than ever.

The following is a summary of the 45 reports received from the churches of our Yearly Meeting.

SERVICE

Home Relief

- 10 churches gave money, food, clothing and labor to families who lost their homes by fire. (This represents service from four quarterly meetings.)
- 7 churches gave Christmas boxes to the needy.
- 4 churches gave Thanksgiving boxes.
- 3 churches provided food for families following funerals.
- 3 churches gave food and clothing to Union Gospel Mission.
- 1 meeting gave aid to a Christian school.
- 3 churches reported giving money, food and clothing to three Indian missions in the United States.
- 4 churches participated in donating blood.

Many other services have been rendered such as assisting the elderly to church, supplying wood and oil for those in need and giving aid to the sick and bereaved.

PEACE

- 1. Number in armed forces 27

trine, promoted attendance at CO Seminars and made presentations in their Sunday Schools and church prayer meetings.

To the quarterly meeting chairmen and monthly meeting chairmen who have served their Lord in the field of peace and service we say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servants."

Kelsey Hinshaw explained the counseling program that the board has made available for the meetings. This was clearly portrayed by a skit.

Charlotte Macy spoke in regard to Friendsview Manor and also concerning a boys' farm, establishment of which has been under consideration for some time.

- 24. Gerald Dillon, a member of the board of Western Evangelical Seminary, presented three ways as follows in which we, as a denomination, may be of help to the Seminary:

1. Encourage adequate training for our pastors.
2. Increase corporation members of the seminary.
3. Support financially the needs of the school.
4. Pray for Western Evangelical Seminary.

Dr. Paul Petticord, president of the seminary, spoke briefly on Oregon Yearly Meeting's investment in the seminary, as to faculty, board members, students and doctrinal contribution.

Report was approved.

- 25. The resignation of Myron Goldsmith from the Board of Evangelism was accepted, and the filling of the vacancy referred to the representatives.

- 26. The resignation of Alvin Roberts from the Board of Evangelism was accepted, and the filling of the vacancy referred to the representatives.

- 27. The report of the committee to study unity of Friends gave the following report:

In accordance with instructions from the Yearly Meeting, your committee has carried on an intensive program of study during the past year. We met ten times during the year as a full committee. In addition, members of the committee met with similar committees from other Yearly Meetings, both at Denver and during the sessions of the conference of evangelical Friends, at Malone College, Canton, Ohio.

We interviewed a number of leaders in American Quakerdom and corresponded with others. A few small items of clerical expense, not to exceed \$25, have been incurred, and we ask that approval of this report also include payment of these obligations.

Minute 88, 1961 setting up the committee, is as follows:

Because the two communications from Newberg Quarterly Meeting and through the Executive Council dealt with the like objective of seeking unity among evangelical Friends on a nation-wide level, the representatives have studied the two documents together and herewith bring a recommendation relating to the disposition of both as follows:

1. It was the united opinion that the ways and means for the accomplishing of these aims for unity as outlined in both communications should not be implemented until a year's study be made. Further, the representatives propose that the Yearly Meeting approve in principle the three steps which appear below, basically as forwarded to the Yearly Meeting from Newberg Quarterly Meeting, and that a committee be appointed to study ways to implement these steps, with liberty to confer with leaders in other Yearly Meetings. The steps are:

- a. Strengthen such bonds of unity as we now have.
- b. Define our doctrines.

- c. Work toward the establishment of a Friends church as a body through which the various yearly meetings may take actions of extension

and implement concerns which are coherent with evangelical beliefs.

Our recommendations are as follows:

I. A general recommendation:

A. We recommend that Oregon Yearly Meeting approve working toward the ultimate goal of a Friends Church which is evangelical in nature, to be called by that simple name and, as a doctrinal basis, adhering to Scriptural teachings as included in the 1887 Richmond Declaration of Faith, bound together by one common discipline, administration, work, faith and Spirit.

The objectives of the proposed union are defined as follows:

1. To aid in giving an image, both to the youth within our church and to the world at large, of Christian unity in faith, worship, and work.

2. To foster among our constituency a sense of belonging to the Friends Church, rather than to a mere segment.

3. To accomplish more efficiently our common endeavors in youth work, Christian education, publication, education, missions, and church extension. Our present divided state

causes much overlapping and duplication of work, such as several separate yearly meeting periodicals;

fails to challenge the best of our youth to a total, unified program of Christian endeavor;

discourages the wider vision and enrichment consequent upon interarea exchanges of ideas and leadership;

signally refuses to face the implications of Christian unity as taught in the Holy Scriptures.

4. To achieve such a Scriptural spirit of unity among Friends.

B. We recommend further that the Yearly Meeting appoint five members to constitute a Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations, authorized to meet as needful at Yearly Meeting expense, either as a committee or jointly with other similar committees; that this committee be charged with these functions:

1. To strengthen the present bonds of unity among Friends by:

a. Encouraging the enlargement of our present inter-yearly meeting youth activities by:

- 1) Adoption of a new name to replace "Christian Endeavor";
- 2) Sponsoring, in cooperation with other yearly meetings, an evangelical youth leadership camp every two or three years, with five to eight choice college-age youth or young adults from each yearly meeting in a two-week session;
- 3) Promoting more extensive inter-yearly meeting youth conference visitation;
- 4) Encouraging cooperation in a joint youth publication.

b. Working toward the establishment of a joint missionary council with other yearly meetings which now have or in the future might have missionary work for which they are independently responsible, for free exchange of information, common consideration of candidates, and joint allocation of offerings.

c. Inviting cooperation in the publication of a common Friends periodical, to contain significant news from each yearly meeting as well as other matters of general interest, thus to replace the various yearly meeting publications now in vogue.

2. To encourage and work toward defining our doctrines among Friends by:

a. Joining with other committees duly appointed by yearly meetings which share these evangelical objectives in issu-

ing a call for a formal conference on doctrine, in which carefully prepared papers on different doctrines would be presented by capable Friends. From this should come both a common statement of faith and materials for a convenient handbook on Friends doctrine.

b. Dissemination of our doctrinal position as thus set forth, through publications, ministers' conferences, and other available channels of communication.

3. To work toward the establishment of a Friends Church by:

a. Recognizing that these previous steps may be fruitful in preparing the way for a Friends Church which is wider in scope than might otherwise be possible.

b. Cooperating with other like committees in a Joint Council on Friends Ecumenical Relations to formulate the necessary procedures, plans, and discipline for a united church and to propose plans for a uniting conference.

II. We also joined in study with representatives from Ohio, Rocky Mountain and Kansas Yearly Meetings and concur in the recommendation which follows:

This committee recommends that we recognize a goal of establishing a Friends Church, evangelical in faith, and world-wide in scope. We are united in recommending that the Richmond Declaration of Faith be used as the foundational basis for our statement of faith.

A. Whereas, the achievement of this goal will necessarily be accomplished in successive stages, we recommend the following initial steps:

1. That the four yearly meeting superintendents act as an inter-yearly meeting coordinating council in providing leadership for unity, cooperation and action among our four yearly meetings.

2. That each of the four yearly meetings be represented in planning and carrying out joint action.

3. That initial joint action be taken in the following areas:

a. Publications

1) A top quality evangelical Friends magazine, called the Evangelical Friend, to include religious news, editorials, inspirational articles, doctrinal emphasis, information and promotion.

2) A top quality missionary paper. Continuation and enlargement of the MISSIONARY VOICE.

3) Other publications and promotion as feasible.

b. Missions

c. Youth

d. Pastoral exchange

e. Christian Education

f. Peace and Service

g. Church Extension

B. We recognize that this organization of the four yearly meetings is only a beginning, and we further recommend that this cooperation and fellowship be extended to other evangelical Friends as the way may open, both by the coordinating council and by individual yearly meetings.

III. The actions of the Association of Evangelical Friends appear to us as significant steps in working toward certain objectives which are set forth in our general recommendation.

In its meeting at Malone College July 18-22, 1962, the Association of Evangelical Friends agreed to convene a conference of evangelical boards and committees of various yearly meetings to deal with missionary prob-

lems facing evangelical Friends today, probably to meet in the Colorado area during the second week of January, 1963. It will also encourage the formation of a temporary missions council by the yearly meetings with independent mission works. Gerald Dillon and Everett Cattell are to serve as conveners of the conference.

The Administrative Board similarly approved convening a youth leadership conference during the ensuing year for a general discussion of cooperation among youth.

Thursday, 9:15 a.m.

The session opened with prayer by Evert Tuning.

- 29. The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 30. The meeting approved accepting the report of the Board of Evangelism as presented on Wednesday evening, by Clynton Crisman, president of the board. It appears as follows:

In presenting the work of the Board of Evangelism for the past year, we first of all want to give thanks to God for every blessing He has bestowed upon us. We are made to realize as never before that it is "not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, sayeth the Lord." . . . that the insidious attacks of the enemy are more subtle with each passing year. The need for real prayer warriors was never more apparent. The need for more well-qualified leaders rests heavily upon the board. Again we do not have the ministers we need to fill our pulpits. We would like to challenge every Friend to pray that the Lord of the harvest would send forth workers into His vineyard.

There is evidence that God is working. Last Yearly Meeting the Christian Endeavor, through its president, Lonny Fendall, presented to the board its concern to send out young people into the field to help in some of our smaller churches. This has resulted in the Teen Ambassadors' program in which we have ten dedicated young people giving themselves for the summer months to help in fields assigned to them: Daniel Roberts, Agnew; Alvin Wilkins, Whitney; Dan Stahlnecker and Anna Simonson, Scotts Mills; Alice Hampton, Lents; Keith Baker, East Wenatchee; Teryl Hibbs, Metolius; Nicolas Maurer and David Brown, Sherwood; Ron Stansell, Svensen. A three-day workshop was held to prepare these young people for their tasks. Also attending were the pastors from the churches where they were to serve. The Lord's presence and blessing were evidenced in a very unusual way. Our thanks to Kenneth Williams who accepted the responsibility of director.

Another successful "Campus Conference" at George Fox College was held and follow-up counselling with students preparing for Christian vocations was continued.

Two Share Calls have gone out this year, one for East Wenatchee and the \$3,548.81 will help them add the superstructure over their basement, the other for Lynwood, \$1,633.58 to date, to build their Christian Education wing. We are hopeful that the Share program will continue to grow until every member will have a part in helping with these new buildings.

We would like to mention the new building at Quincy which was built under the 50-50 plan. They moved into the new building for Easter services. These new buildings are not only a credit to Friends, but enable the church to do a better job of winning the community to the Lord.

Two members of the board, with the Yearly Meeting Superintendent, made a survey trip to Anchorage, Alaska. We were royally entertained by Richard and Gertrude Hendricks. The Hendricks, who have carried a real concern for a Friends work in Anchorage, are a real credit to Friends. While it does not seem feasible to start a work there at present, we wish to commend them for their work. Certainly there will be souls in heaven because of their faithful witness.

For several years there has been a concern by Friends in the Meridian, Idaho, area that a Friends Church should be established. The board has been praying that if we should have a meeting there that the group living there should be united in this concern, and second, that we have strong pastoral leadership. The Lord has given both. Dorwin and Marita Smith have felt a concern to accept this challenge, and there has been a wonderful response, not only in Meridian, but in the whole Quarterly Meeting.

We want to thank the Women's Missionary Union and the Quaker Men for their interest and help in the extension work of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The breadth of vision of our Yearly Meeting Superintendent continues to be an inspiration to us.

- 31. The following communication from West Chehalem Monthly Meeting, approved by Newberg Quarterly Meeting, was read:

West Chehalem Meeting on Ministry and Oversight held Third month, 5th, 1962, recommends a communication be forwarded to the Newberg Quarterly Meeting expressing a concern regarding the development of a course of study on the doctrines of the Christian faith as held by Friends. Such a course, if developed on a graded basis, would be available for youth camps from junior, through intermediate and high school levels, in order to permit young people attending summer camps to be more thoroughly indoctrinated in the beliefs and practices of the church. Such courses could also be used in Vacation Bible Schools, Sunday School, and other church teaching programs. The concern comes to the attention of the church with the hope that proper study might be made of this possibility by the Board of Christian Education or other agencies of the Yearly Meeting responsible for such materials.

This was referred to the Board of Christian Education.

- 32. The following communication from the committee on peace and service from Inland Quarterly Meeting and approved by the Yearly Meeting Board of Peace and Service was read:

In consideration of Oregon Yearly Meeting and its affiliation with the National Association of Evangelicals, it is our feeling that a peace section of that organization should be established. This would be consistent with the primary purpose of the organization. It is a fact that in some degree the other historic peace churches are also affiliated with the N. A. E. and many other denominations have established Peace Commissions. A peace section within the N. A. E. would extend an evangelical concern for a vital message for peace.

We propose that Oregon Yearly Meeting name a committee to negotiate

such action with the National Association of Evangelicals.

This was referred back to the Board of Peace and Service for further study and report.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

- 33. Denver Headrick, president of the board, presented the following report:

Tract distribution has more than doubled this year with 7,383 leaflets about public morals given out, even though less sample literature has been sent to committee chairmen. Since there are now some Friends pamphlets available on this subject, the statistics indicate that you like them and are using them.

Reports from 53 meetings show that there have been 216 temperance presentations, an 88 percent increase over last year's report. Several meetings have regular temperance emphasis each month. Many of our members are active members of Temperance Councils or other groups to help them meet the social problems of today. Some young people have given booklets about the harmful effects of alcohol and tobacco to their student body officers and athletes at their high schools. Several attended a total abstinence training camp.

Although a film on marriage problems was shown extensively, there were 40 percent less showings of general temperance films this past year than the previous one. The temperance filmstrips owned by the Board of Moral Action are now available from the Christian Education library at the Yearly Meeting office.

As we summarize the reports of the Department of Literature, we are pleased to note a larger percentage of meetings sending in their reports. With 12 more meetings reporting this year, the total report looks much better.

Fifty-one libraries ranging in size from 25 books to 500 books are serving their churches. One new library of 150 books was established at Tigard. Thirty-three libraries were increased by the addition of a total of 620 volumes. Notable gains were made by Parkrose, Oak Park, Medford, Caldwell, Nampa and Lynwood. One small meeting reported the purchase of 18 new books at a Church Library Dinner. Others increased by private donations, loans, class projects and similar activities.

It still seems to be difficult to find people who will serve as church librarians and keep the necessary records. There is a large investment in the almost 6,000 books reported, and it seems it should be protected by some type of systematic procedure. We urge you to continue looking for someone who will feel challenged to serve in this way.

May each day of this next year be enriched by daily Bible reading and careful choice of other reading material so that you may continue to grow stronger spiritually and mentally.

Ludlow Corbin reviewed the highlights in a report of the Executive Committee of the National Association of Evangelicals regarding the Supreme Court ruling concerning prayer in the New York schools.

L. B. Martin drew on his personal experiences as president of the Idaho Farm Bureau to show us the importance of our taking part in local and state politics. By doing this, he said, we can more fully discharge our duties as Christian citizens.

- 34. The meeting approved the resignation of Wayne Piersall from the Board of Stewardship. Filling this vacancy was referred to the representatives.

- 35. Meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

At the 10:45 hour Myron Goldsmith continued the study in Colossians. Paul wrote to the Colossians because there seemed to be a subtle heresy afoot in Colosse which Paul met by giving forth the truth. He makes several allusions to various heresies that may be troubling them. The Lord Jesus Christ was being deplored from His place as the head of the Church. Chapter 1:15-23 contains ideas as vast as the human mind can comprehend. This selection glows with its own luster. Paul puts forth a remedy for situations that existed then and that exist in this day. "That in all things he might have the preeminence." Paul recognizes Him as creator and sustainer of the universe. Preeminence belongs to God. If He is not preeminent we will find ourselves giving time to this and that. The Lord is the reconciler between God and man. God sent His Son to reconcile us. What response is there possible to man except to fall at His feet? We were urged to search for any possible thing that might keep Him from having preeminence in our lives.

Thursday, 2:30 p.m.

- 36. The meeting opened with prayer by Nathan Pierson.
- 37. The meeting approved accepting the resignation of John Roberts from the Yearly Meeting Music Committee. This was referred to the representatives.
- 38. Mrs. Esther Hobson Pickett from Welton, Arizona, was introduced to the meeting.
- 39. The recommendation presented under minute 16 was read again to the session. The clerk of the Executive Council gave a background for the action of the Executive Council as put forth in the minutes of previous years.

Discussion followed.

The meeting approved the first section of the recommendation that a full-time office be created known as "Assistant General Superintendent."

The meeting approved the nomination of Clynton Crisman to serve in this office.

The last section of the recommendation which concerns the salary connected with this office was referred to the representatives for study

and recommendation back to the Yearly Meeting body, this study taking precedent over the recommendation on unity among Friends.

● 40. President Milo Ross presented the annual report of George Fox College. This report was read to the session, and is available through George Fox College and friends may obtain a copy at that source.

This report was approved.

● 41. Robert Rumsey, member of Poughkeepsie Monthly Meeting, New York Yearly Meeting, and executive secretary of the American Friends Service Committee in Portland, was introduced to the meeting.

● 42. The session adjourned to meet 9:15 a. m. Friday.

Friday, 9:15 a.m.

Session opened with prayer by Scott Clark.

● 43. The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 44. The missionary report as presented on Thursday evening, by Waldo Hicks, president of the board, was approved. It appears as follows in condensed form:

How shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent? Due to the faithfulness of the church at home the messenger is bearing the message to the Aymara Indians of Bolivia and Peru. Your prayers and financial support during this past year are deeply appreciated. And, only as you continue to give and to pray will it be possible for the work to go forward.

Three of our mission families are now in the States. These are the Thomas, Clarkson and Cammack families. Two of these families do not expect to return to the field. David and Florence Thomas did not feel clear to return for a second term of service. In the light of this decision the board reluctantly terminated their relationship to the work in Bolivia. The Thomases arrived in the States May 1961, completed their deputation schedule January 1962, and David became a member of the Friendsview Manor staff on February 1, 1962. We sincerely appreciate the service David and Florence Thomas rendered to the work in Bolivia.

Paul and Phyllis Cammack, daughter Mary Bel, and son Joseph arrived in Miami, Florida, in May of this year. Their son Daniel graduated in June from the Christian High School at Mt. Carmel, Kentucky. The family is now living in the Newberg area. Age and health factors necessitate their retirement from active missionary service. During this final furlough year Paul and Phyllis plan to do deputation work and to reestablish themselves here in the homeland. Here again the board must face the loss incurred—a loss that embraces years of experience and of most acceptable service to the missionary program of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Everett and Alda Clarkson, daughter Cynthia, and sons Gregory and Douglas, have been in the States since November 1961. They were required to leave the field a short time before the regular scheduled furlough date due to Alda's health. This decision has resulted in a return to almost normal health for Alda. Everett has been doing deputation work throughout the Yearly Meeting. The board has granted them an extension of furlough time to assure Alda's return to normal health. Everett plans to teach school in the Newberg elementary system during this time of extended furlough.

At the present time our Bolivian-Peru field is being manned by four families. The Quentin Nordyke family will join the staff in September at the conclusion of this term of language study.

Oscar and Ruth Brown are living in the mission headquarters in La Paz. This has been their home and one area of service during most of

this year.

Mark and Wilma Roberts and their children are now in the Yungas overseeing the work there. Here again the program is that of tent meetings, Bible conferences, and pastors' classes. Wilma Roberts returned to the States on July 20 for major surgery. The operation on July 26 in Portland, Oregon, was successful. Wilma expects to return to the field within a few weeks.

No doubt Gene and Betty Comfort will remember this year as the "year of high water." The Comfort family had to evacuate the house at Amacari due to the flooding of their home by the rising waters of Lake Titicaca. At the present time Gene and Betty are living in a rented house in La Paz. Under Gene and Betty's direction the work on the Peninsula has shown signs of a forward move in spite of difficulties resulting from the flooding of the Amacari home.

The Knight family established residence in Juli, Peru, immediately following the 1962 Junta Anual. There are now four or five meetings in Peru. The challenge of this new field is great. This area of southern Peru has a far greater concentration of Aymara Indians than does the entire Bolivian field. The need is for more missionaries in order to meet this tremendous challenge.

A recent approach to evangelism in Bolivia is the use of a "camper." As you recall the camper is to serve as living quarters for the missionary while conducting conferences, classes, and preaching services. One of these units, mounted on a pickup truck, is now in use. The second unit is nearing completion and should be ready for use within a very short time.

Continuing interest from home base is most encouraging. Fifty-one churches reported. Two hundred thirty-six services featured missionary presentations representing the work in Bolivia and Peru and Sprague River, as well as other fields. Twenty young people have indicated interest in missionary service. Total giving to the calendar fund was \$4,267.07.

BOLIVIAN FIELD REPORT

The Mesa Directive (the Executive Council of the National Church) has in its list 93 churches or points where the gospel is proclaimed. Although this, no doubt, includes several very small groups, there is evidence of a continuous growth. Approximately 2600 believers were in attendance for Easter Sunday of Yearly Meeting in La Paz.

The Mesa Directiva is under new leadership and seems to be gaining in prestige. The new president, Timoteo Condori, has been pressing for development of the church in tithing, consistent Christian living, the doctrines of Friends, and the ministry of the Holy Spirit in the lives of believers. Nothing could be more pertinent to the present needs of the church, and we thank God for this concern. Some churches have had their fluctuations, but most encouraging has been the number of new groups springing up. There has also been an encouraging expression of several concerns for more active personal and public evangelism. Some seem to be glimpsing the significance of Jesus' command to go and preach. There is an evidence of renewed faith.

During the past year we have enjoyed the favor of Bolivian officials. Without fail they have willingly upheld and fulfilled the freedom of worship guaranteed by the Bolivian constitution. Most contacts have been cordial. Our work has been characterized by them as a highly beneficial public service.

THE OUTLOOK

Presently we recognize certain problems. Our missionary staff is

insufficient to adequately care for the present field. The field continues to expand and doors of opportunity stand open in each of the five quarterly meetings. We are striving to respond to these calls.

Missionaries and nationals are keenly aware of the drastic need for a Bible training school. Plans are being laid for this in the near future and the teaching assistance by missionaries will be arranged as is possible.

We feel the urgency of our work. Pray that an expectant faith will be demonstrated by effective works.

PERU REPORT

The entrance of Oregon Yearly Meeting into the highlands of southern Peru for missionary work was the result of much prayer and study. This area in Peru is about 120 miles from La Paz, Bolivia. Because the passing between the two countries of Peru and Bolivia is difficult for both missionaries or nationals, it was evident that the Peruvian missionary work would necessarily have to be carried on separately. The Irish Baptists have a small widely-scattered work in this general area. There are no other evangelicals working among the more than 200,000 Aymara Indians living along the shores of Lake Titicaca.

On May 12, 1961, the Cammack family crossed to Juli, Peru, a small, centrally located town, which seemed the logical place to live. The only house in Juli for rent accessible by car was in great disrepair.

Trips were made out on the various nearby roads exploring the densely populated communities, giving out gospel tracts, and holding open air services for the Aymara Indians along the roads. From August to November, tent meetings were held in 13 communities where the gospel had never before entered. After the rainy season had passed, four more tent meetings were held in April through June.

The small gospel tent being used in Peru has a long history of being utilized both on the altiplano and in the yungas in Bolivia. It has proven much too small but will serve until a larger one currently being purchased in the U. S. A. arrives there. The practice of mass evangelism in tent meetings seemed the quickest method of getting the gospel to the most people in this beginning work. Friends and foes alike take more and more note of the Friends gospel tent. We have enjoyed freedom of worship and amicable relations with the government officials. The persecution of believers has come from religious sources. The Peruvian Indians clamor for printed material.

The past year has seen much sowing of the Word of God, and God has given a quick harvest in some places. Presently there are the following five new congregations meeting at Copacachi, Tiri, Asquicha, Choquejawa, and Moya Pampa. Isla Anapia makes the sixth Peruvian congregation, having been started some years ago by the Bolivian work on a Peruvian island in Lake Titicaca.

Paz Lopez, a Bolivian Bible school student, felt the call of God to assist in this evangelistic effort in Peru. He came for two different three-month periods. Pablo Escobar, a Peruvian from the meeting of Isla Anapia, left his family to also help in the tent meetings and church visitation.

Various conferences were held, one in November and one in February, when believers gathered in to the missionary home in Juli to study the Bible, learn more hymns, and to pray and testify. Recently a first conference has been held in the country at the Tiri meeting place with 60 in attendance. This is significant since this is the first church that has felt strong enough to invite the others to be their guests. Eight representatives of the Peruvian work were taken to visit the Bolivian Yearly Meeting for three days of the Easter week. This was an inspiration to them

and of great spiritual help.

On April 26, 1962, the Knight family arrived in Juli from the yungas in Bolivia to take charge of the work.

The work in Peru has been begun on the indigenous basis. No money is paid by the mission to churches or leaders of churches. So far the services are being held in rooms privately owned. The missionaries and nationals work together under the name "Iglesia Nacional Evangelica de los Amigos de Peru" (The National Evangelical Friends Church.)

One readily sees the tremendous need of training workers to feed the flock of God in each church. Those presently caring for the churches have only recently been saved and have known nothing of the Bible or the gospel before.

SPRAGUE RIVER MISSION REPORT

"For a great door, and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries." 1 Corinthians 16:9. Most certainly this is true everywhere, and this field is no exception. There are times when we are tempted to forget the "great door and effectual" and see only the "many adversaries." Only by the help of the Holy Spirit are we able to keep a right balance. Any lack of accomplishment may be attributed to human frailties and not the failure of God's promises.

In our report last year we indicated that we intended to stress evangelism by special meetings and visitation. This we have endeavored to do though we did not reach the degree which we intended. A group from our sponsoring meeting, Eugene, had charge of a Sunday's services in early spring, which was a real encouragement to the group. Visitation was carried on mainly by the pastors.

There are encouraging signs. The Christians are making definite spiritual growth. Because of the moving away of some of the faithful ones, it has been necessary to build an almost entirely new group. There has been a welding together process going on this past year. It is not a finished product but is headed in that direction. All praise to the Holy Spirit! We have averaged almost one day a week visiting people in Klamath Falls.

● 48. Report of the committee appointed by the Executive Council to study proposals concerning an advisory and planning group was read as follows:

I. The committee is agreed upon the need for securing a full time person to serve the Yearly Meeting in an executive capacity as an assistant to the General Superintendent. We are agreed in recommending that this be done as soon as possible.

II. The committee recommends to the Yearly Meeting:

A. That an advisory and planning group be established to serve as counsel for the General Superintendent.

B. That this group be composed of three members selected by the Executive Council, and that each member serve a three-year term arranged in such a manner that one member may be appointed each year.

C. The specific responsibilities of the group shall be to aid in de-

veloping a coordinated and unified program in the total future emphasis of the Yearly Meeting on all levels of operation, including a balance of financial appeals and projects for promotion, functional smoothness in departmental and board activities and in setting up a calendar of events for each church year, including Yearly Meeting sessions, summer conferences, board meetings, etc., to allow maximum participation without serious conflicts. Long range planning and the study of opportunities or problems referred to the group by the Executive Council or the General Superintendent are to be considered also as its task.

D. The group, being an advisory and planning committee, shall work only through the General Superintendent without separate powers of its own, unless specifically granted powers by the Executive Council.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

● 61. Charles Morgan, vice-president of the board, presented the report which appears as follows:

Reports directed to the Yearly Meeting Stewardship Board by local committee chairmen revealed several factors about the past year.

1. A number of the committees have been quite active in promoting stewardship in the several areas of church life—Sunday School, Junior Church, Christian Endeavor, worship services. Tracts and books have been purchased; posters have been displayed; object lessons have been presented; films and filmstrips have been shown; bulletin inserts have been used; stewardship campaigns have been held; skits have been presented; sermons have been preached. At least two churches commenced using the offering envelope system for the first time this year with marked results in their giving. The film, Mixed Marriage, has been widely used and well received in the seven quarterly meetings in which it has been circulated.

2. A number of local committees are asking for additional guidance that they might be more effective in fulfilling the responsibilities of their appointed tasks. A repeated request was made that there be more and closer contact between the Yearly Meeting board and local chairman. Many desired to have a more detailed list of films, filmstrips, slides, plays, skits, and books that are available and recommended.

We believe that the work of stewardship is basic to the life of our church, and that its faithful performance will determine our growth or our stagnation. We believe that prevailing trends indicate that the time is here when we must have a renewed emphasis on Biblical stewardship. With this in mind and in order that we might fully reap the values of the reports received, we have felt it wise to:

1. Appoint a member of our board to be in charge of issuing a monthly stewardship bulletin. It is planned that this bulletin will contain those ideas for the promotion of stewardship gained from various sources. Full cooperation on the local, quarterly, and yearly meeting levels will enable us to more nearly realize our potential as faithful stewards.

2. Continue the poster contest this coming church year. Growing interest and participation by our young people has caused our board to feel it imperative that we continue to cultivate this education in stewardship.

3. Continue to investigate the advisability of a uniform offering envelope for our yearly meeting in order that the faithful performance of the stewardship of our finances might be implemented.

Above all, we as a board realize, in measure at least, that, in the words of one of our local chairmen, we must "pray for a mighty baptism of the Holy Spirit upon us all throughout the yearly meeting, emphasizing the power of Acts 1:8. Then Christian stewardship will be a way of life lived and practiced from the heart."

Marie Haines presented the poster contest awards to the following: Junior Division—First prize, Diane Brown of Spokane; Second prize, Rita Collard of Emmett.

Senior Division—First prize, Sharon James of Lynwood; Second prize, Sharon Martin of Caldwell.

Lonny Fendall gave highlights of the work of the stewardship committee at West Chehalem. Lynwood Lundquist told how the West Chehalem meeting had been led to give to the United Budget through faith giving in a missionary conference. Quincy Fodge told of his own and his churches' faith giving also. Ira Craven gave his personal testimony on faith giving.

This report was approved.

- 62. Session was dismissed to meet at 2:30 p. m.

Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

Myron Goldsmith continued the study on Colossians, reading chapter 2:6-15. "So walk ye in him" was the basis for some thought regarding "walking." To walk in Him is to be built up in Him. The Colossians had learned of God's mighty acts and Paul recalls these to them. Colossians were living in a high state of Christian faith. Obedience to the Holy Spirit will result in continued fullness of life. To the Colossians the body of the flesh had been put away, they had had sins forgiven and been rid of the cause of sin but were in danger of getting back in bondage of it by getting their eyes off of the fact. In verse 12 Paul speaks of "buried with him in baptism," which the Colossians had experienced. If there are issues before us we know it, but the Holy Spirit brings this to us, and we can rapidly be changed. If we are in Him, we are not careless about our actions nor the will of God. Grace comes from Christ; we live in Him and we have the victory.

- 64. The Executive Council presented the name of Gerald Dillon to serve on the Western Evangelical Seminary Board.
Approved.
- 65. The Executive Council presented the name of Dean Gregory as representative to the National Association of Evangelicals.
Approved.
- 66. The Executive Council presented these names for the Discipline Revision Committee: Earl P. Barker, Milo C. Ross, Frederick B. Baker, Charles A. Beals, Arthur O. Roberts.
Approved.
- 67. The Executive Council presented the name of Walter Wilhite to serve on the insurance committee for three years.
Approved.
- 68. The meeting approved the final reading of the Discipline Revision Committee to make the changes proposed on pages 47 and 48, minute 80, of the 1961 Yearly Meeting minutes.
They approved holding these provisions in abeyance for a year.
- 69. The Discipline Revision Committee proposed the following discipline revision:

At the request of the Executive Council, the Discipline Revision committee submits the following proposal as an amendment to the Yearly Meeting Constitution and Discipline:

That Part II, Chapter III, Section III, Subsection A, Paragraph 1, page 92, be amended to read as follows:

1. COMPOSITION. The quarterly meeting on ministry and oversight is composed of the members of the local meetings on ministry and oversight within its limits and other ministers in the membership of the quarterly meeting.

The adoption of the amendment which excludes ministers other than the pastor or pastors from the local meeting on ministry and oversight has the effect of excluding them also from the quarterly and yearly meetings on ministry and oversight. This proposed amendment now presented

restores them to the quarterly meeting on ministry and oversight without affecting the membership of the local meeting, and at the same time automatically accords them membership in the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight.

Approved and referred to the Discipline Revision committee, to be held over one year.

● 70. After approving a recommendation of the Board of Moral Action in the mid-year sessions, the Executive Council of the Yearly Meeting ordered it forwarded to the Discipline Revision committee to be studied and reported back at Yearly Meeting. The substance of the recommendation is that the education department be separated from the Board of Moral Action and organized as the Board of General Education. We present the following formulation for your consideration, to be included in the Yearly Meeting Constitution and Discipline if approved:

On page 71, change "h. PUBLICATION," to "I. PUBLICATION," and insert before it this new material:

h. GENERAL EDUCATION.

(1) The Yearly Meeting Board. The board shall include the chairmen of the various quarterly meeting general education committees, plus an equal number appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

The board shall organize by the appointment of a president, a vice-president, and a secretary. It may appoint other officers and such committees as are needed to carry on its affairs.

The board shall have as its primary function the fostering of education among members and attenders at all levels, from the primary grades through the graduate schools. Specific activities through which this function may be exercised are: (a) the compilation and maintenance of permanent records of the educational status and advancement of children, youth, and adults; (b) the promotion of the moral interests of those enrolled in both public and private schools, assisting them to maintain their Christian integrity under all circumstances; (c) the dispensing of information on the scholarship programs in effect in the Yearly Meeting; (d) the promotion of the establishment of new scholarships in Christian schools; (e) the encouraging of attendance at institutions of higher learning on the part of youth and young adults; (f) the maintenance of records of the professional educational activities of the membership and the encouragement of fellowship among them and with those of other established Christian institutions.

The board shall devise methods for promoting the financial and other interests of George Fox College among the monthly meetings. Each member shall endeavor to find opportunity for frequent visitation to the College, seeking on such occasions to sense the tone and atmosphere of the institution in terms of its faithfulness, while providing adequate instruction, in promulgating standards and exercising influences which tend toward well-balanced development of the student in the spiritual, the social, and the moral areas of his life. They shall take note, also, of the degree to which the training provided equips the student for usefulness in the church. In all of these matters they shall be careful to avoid trespass into the realm of responsibility of the College trustees.

A report of the visitation and its results shall be prepared annually before the Yearly Meeting sessions, to be submitted to the College board, and, with modifications if necessary, to the Yearly Meeting. Those who have opportunity should include Greenleaf Academy in their visitation, taking note of similar features as evidenced in its program.

The board shall provide plans of action for the guidance of the corres-

ponding committees in the subordinate meetings and such assistance as they may need.

(2) The Quarterly Meeting Committee. Each quarterly meeting shall appoint a general education committee, to be composed of the chairmen of the monthly meeting general education committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as quarterly meeting superintendent of general education and chairman of the committee. The committee shall work in cooperation with the Yearly Meeting board, of which its chairman shall be a member, by active participation in its program.

(3) The Monthly Meeting Committee. Each monthly meeting shall appoint a general education committee. It shall be responsible for the compilation and maintenance of permanent records of educational statistics of both students and teachers in the local membership, and for cooperating with the quarterly meeting committee and the Yearly Meeting board in the fulfilling of all the various functions. Specifically, it shall promote the moral and educational interests of both young and old, considering each individual of school age its special and personal charge in relation to matters in this realm.

In order to make a clean separation of the education department from the Board of Moral Action a change is necessary in the definition of the duties of that board. We present the following as an amendment to meet this need:

On page 67, beginning in line 12 with "(c) Education," and continuing through "and private schools," in line 19, delete this entire sentence. No further change is necessary.

Approved and referred to the Discipline Revision committee to be held over one year.

● 71. President Milo Ross introduced new George Fox College faculty members: Alton Du Rant, Dean of Administration; Dr. Henry Aarhus, assistant professor in social studies, and Wilma Magee, women's physical education.

● 72. Adelaide Barker opened the memorial hour by reading Psalm 116. Memorials were read for a number of Friends and a list read of the members deceased during the past year. This list appears in the appendix.

Approved.

● 73. In view of the fact that a new Board of General Education in the Yearly Meeting may be added next year, it was suggested that communication regarding this fact be sent to monthly and quarterly meetings so they would be organized if this revision is approved next year.

Approved.

● 74. Meeting adjourned to meet at 9:15 a. m. Saturday.

Saturday, 9:15 a.m.

The session opened with prayer.

● 75. Minutes were read, corrected and approved.

● 76. Greetings were read from Sophia Townsend.

The meeting approved asking the committee to write letters to aged Friends to send her a communication.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

● 77. The meeting approved the Board of Christian Education's report, as given by Gene Hockett, president, on Friday evening. It follows in condensed form:

A review of the annual reports shows increases in Sunday School attendance in only 28 churches, 10 of which were above 10 percent. The total average Sunday School attendance of 5919 is a decrease of last year's attendance.

The Standards of Excellence rating showed six Gold Crown, five Silver Crown, and five Blue Crown Sunday Schools. The Blue Ribbon Sunday Schools were Silverton, Sherwood and Lynwood.

Forty-six churches conducted Vacation Bible Schools, and nine of these were assisted financially by the board. Twenty-four churches reported some type of children's church.

The "White Unto Harvest" Sunday School contest with emphasis on reaching and holding new people for the Sunday School was held in October.

Representatives attended the conferences of the Christian Conference and Camping Association and the National Sunday School Association. These conferences served to give needed information and inspiration to strengthen the camping programs and Sunday School efforts.

Other areas of work included financial aid to one of the smaller camps; introduction of the new "Achievement Goals for Sunday Schools" (formerly Standards of Excellence); teacher training encouragement; operating a filmstrip library through the Barclay Press; assisting in area workshops and conventions for Sunday School teachers, Christian Education committee members, and C. E. sponsors.

The youth committee gave assistance to the Christian Endeavor leaders in the C. E. program and operation.

● 78. The following nomination from the Executive Council was read:

The Executive Council unanimously nominates Dean Gregory for General Superintendent for 1962-63. It is recommended that his compensation be \$500 per month as follows: Salary, \$3720.00; utilities, \$480.00; and house allowance, \$1,800.00. Travel expense is to be 7 cents per mile.

Approved.

● 79. The following recommendation from the representatives was read:

The representatives considered the two items relative to the Assistant to the Superintendent referred to them, namely, the amount of salary and whether the sum should be paid from the United Budget or from Fixed Expense.

First, there was concurrence that the discussion on the subject of the amount should be held in abeyance until the Yearly Meeting determines the salary of the General Superintendent.

Second, the representatives recommend that approval be given for this year only for the salary, house allowance and utilities to be drawn from the United Budget and the travel fund from the Fixed Expense.

Approved.

● 80. The representatives recommend that the Yearly Meeting give approval to the report of the committee to study unity among Friends as it appears in minute 27.

It was recommended from the floor that the same committee of five, with the Yearly Meeting Superintendent as an ex officio member, be appointed.

Approved.

● 81. It shall be understood that all actions by the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations shall be subordinate to the Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting and that this committee is not in any way to be construed as the "voice" of Oregon Yearly Meeting relating to commitments to other yearly meetings or other Friends organizations ex-

cept as specifically stated and authorized by the parent body. Of particular pertinence is the matter of formulating and defining our doctrines among Friends as outlined in objective number 2, a and b. All actions of the committee are subject to review by the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

- 82. The representatives nominate Joyce Lewis to fulfill the unexpired term of John Roberts on the Music Committee.

Approved.

- 83. The representatives nominate Charles Beck and John Roberts to the Board of Finance.

Approved.

- 84. The representatives nominate Willard Kennon, Ira Craven and Grace Clark to the Board of Stewardship. They also nominate Lloyd Melhorn to fill the unexpired term of Wayne Piersall.

Approved.

- 85. The Executive Council reports that it is continuing study of the recommendation to change the name of the Yearly Meeting (Minute # 54, report before next Yearly Meeting) and will not be able to make a

Approved.

- 86. A report from the Junior Yearly Meeting was read as follows: Junior Yearly Meeting has been in session four days, with 60 enrolled, under the direction of June Kenworthy. Marie Haines had our missionary time, with stories and hand puppets. We had three class periods—handcraft, Bible study, and recreation. We also had a class called "What Friends Do" with speakers telling of their occupations and how they can influence people. Another session was held about "Knowing God" with comparisons between Christians and Space Men. Our offerings have amounted to \$4.05 and will be used to buy tracts for South America, the concern for which was brought to us by Marie Chapman.

Approved.

- 87. The Board of Peace and Service recommended the following: Since our Yearly Meeting Superintendent represents us with the National Association of Evangelicals, we recommend that the Board of Peace and Service be authorized to work with him in contacting others of like mind with us in the N. A. E. as to the best way and time to work toward the implementation of the concern expressed in the communication from Inland Quarterly Meeting. (Minute 32)

Approved.

- 88. The report of the trustees, Oliver Weesner, president, was read as follows: The trustees have executed the following documents since last Yearly Meeting:

A mortgage and note in the amount of \$50,000.00 on the Lynwood Friends Church property, proceeds of which were used to retire the outstanding Broadway bonds and to provide building funds for an addition to their church building.

A Water Agreement for the East Wenatchee Friends Church.

A mortgage and note in the amount of not more than \$10,000.00 on the East Wenatchee Church property to provide building funds for their church building.

A mortgage and note in the amount of \$31,300.00 on the Yearly Meeting Headquarters Building property in Newberg in favor of the U. S. National Bank of Portland, for the building fund of the Headquarters Building.

An open note for \$2,500.00 in favor of the U. S. National Bank of Portland for the headquarters building fund, only \$1,000.00 of which had been drawn on August 1, 1962.

A note for \$3,000.00 in favor of Margaret J. Weesner for the headquarters building fund.

A note for \$1,000.00 in favor of Oliver and Pearl B. Weesner for the headquarters building fund.

Virgil D. Asselstine and wife are in default for the installments due on July 1 and August 1, 1962, on the contract for the purchase by them of the building in Portland and also are in default on the fire insurance and taxes of the property. In order to protect the Yearly Meeting, the trustees ordered the payment of the insurance premium, and one year's premium was paid on August 3, 1962. Negotiations are being conducted for the sale for the equity of Mr. and Mrs. Asselstine.

- 89. The suggestion was made that our obligation to Western Evangelical Seminary be cared for through the Board of Evangelism this year.

- 90. The Executive Council recommends that the reading course for Friends students at Western Evangelical Seminary be provided through the Department of Education of the Board of Moral Action.

Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

Myron Goldsmith continued the study in Colossians, reading chapter 4. Here are outlined responsibilities if we are to make a glorious success of the Christian life which God has planned for us. Moral decisions have to be made every day. In seeking, time is the essential thing to reach the goal. If we grieve God, don't wait for time to heal, turn immediately to Him. The closer we get to God the more we want of death of our own selves, so we may appear with Him in glory. Dangers confront us spiritually because we live in a physical body. There are doors by which carnality may invade our lives, and we need to keep from again being involved in that which God has cleansed. He wishes our characters should be like His character, we to be as He is. We can have as much of God as we wish; we can never enjoy all of the heavenly things which God has for us. "And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus."

- 106. Financial report of building fund was read and appears in the appendix.

- 107. Report of Greenleaf Friends Academy was read. A copy of this report may be obtained upon request from Greenleaf Academy.

The report was approved with appreciation.

It was suggested that the clerks send a letter of appreciation to Charlton and Lenore Smitherman for their years of teaching at the Academy.

- 108. The representatives propose that the salary for the Assistant Superintendent consist of the total sum of \$5,500.00 as recommended by the Executive Council, but that this sum be itemized as follows: Salary—\$3,220; house and utilities—\$2,280. The representatives also support the recommendation of the Executive Council for a \$1,000 travel fund allowance.

- 109. Each year at this time it is the responsibility of the Executive Council to consider the responses of the meetings to the proposed United Budget and to make proper apportionment to the various boards of the total amount pledged.

The pledging this year amounted to \$50,190.00 out of a proposed budget of \$68,130.00. The United Budget has been considered in the light of these pledges and is herewith presented to you in its final form.

- 111. The visiting committee to George Fox College made the following report:

The major action of this committee was to define the purpose of its function, as no definition was provided by the Discipline. The committee recommends the inclusion of the Visiting Committee's purpose and function under the operation of the proposed Board of General Education (first reading approved August 17) as follows:

"Each member (of the board) shall endeavor to find opportunity for frequent visitation to the College, seeking on such occasions to sense the tone and atmosphere of the institution in terms of its faithfulness, while

providing adequate instruction, in promulgating standards and exercising influences which tend toward well-balanced development of the student in the spiritual, the social, and the moral areas of his life. They shall take note, also, of the degree to which the training provided equips the student for usefulness in the church. In all of these matters they shall be careful to avoid trespass into the realm of responsibility of the College trustees. A report of the visitation and its results shall be prepared annually before the Yearly Meeting sessions, to be submitted to the College board, and, with modifications if necessary, to the Yearly Meeting."

The findings of the committee members in very limited visitation of the College include the following recommendations:

(1) Commendation for spiritual emphasis in the College program. With the increase of non-Christians and non-Friends in the student body, the burden of prayer and concern falls more heavily upon those of the students and faculty who have the Christian purpose of the College at heart. We must all share this burden with them.

(2) Concern for the College's ability to challenge Christian youth. The College, we feel, has an outstanding contribution to all youth preparing for every worthy goal. However, there are specific areas which are, of financial necessity, limited in depth. Any such area vital to the Kingdom would be a most urgent need.

One such area is the music department. The excellent services of the staff are a vital link with the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting, both in maintaining support for the College and in developing strong music leadership for local churches. For this reason, it was felt by the Visiting Committee that more scheduled time, staff, and depth of course offerings should be a goal of immediate concern.

Approved.

● 112. The Executive Council recommends that Harlow Ankeny be named as Publicity Director for the Yearly Meeting for the coming year with efforts directed particularly to news media releases.

Approved.

● 113. The Yearly Meeting Music Committee reported as follows:

The year 1961-62 has been quite fruitful, and there is noticeable increase in interest throughout the Yearly Meeting in what the Music Committee is trying to accomplish. The following is a summary of the activities of the year:

The month of March was again designated as Music Month, when special emphasis was given to music in the local churches. Many different methods were observed, such as using hymn stories, filmstrips on hymns, more special music, local adult and junior choirs, filmstrips chalk talks, bulletin inserts, new hymns, ensembles, musical quizzes, special guest choir, and holding singspirations, special music services, and combining in a community church concert. There were a total of 22 churches in the Yearly Meeting who reported that they observed March as Music Month.

Twenty of the reporting meetings indicated they are using the Church Musicians' Handbook and finding it helpful.

The committee has a file of recommended music of all kinds which is put on display at the music conferences, pastors' conferences and at Yearly Meeting and desires that the musicians avail themselves of the opportunity to look over the music and get new ideas of what they might be able to use in their own meeting. Ruth Corbin is available for conference with anyone who has problems or questions about their local situations.

The committee is concerned that eventually the Friends Church have

our own hymn book. For the first time the music committee launched a hymn writing contest this year and was very gratified with the results.

The NORTHWEST FRIEND is now printing a column called "The Music Box" which we sincerely hope will contain many helpful items.

● 114. At the request of the Executive Council the Discipline Revision Committee presents the following as proposed amendments:

Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, Subsection G, page 72, 73, change "3. VARIOUS COMMITTEES" to "4. VARIOUS COMMITTEES," and insert before it this paragraph:

3. BUSINESS COMMITTEE. A standing committee of two shall be appointed on nomination by the Executive Council to expedite the handling of all business during the sessions of the Yearly Meeting. All matters of business, including reports, recommendations, proposals, and nominations, shall be referred to this committee in writing. It shall have authority to ask responsible bodies or individuals for prompt submission of essential matters. It shall see that all these are in regular form and determine the time and order of their presentation, forwarding them to the presiding clerk in proper sequence.

In Subsection J, page 75, insert at the close of Paragraph 2 the following sentence:

All matters of business shall be referred to the business committee (see p. 73), which shall then place them in the hands of the presiding clerk in their proper form and sequence.

Approved and returned to Discipline Revision Committee to be held over one year.

● 115. Report of Executive Council minutes for the past year was read and appears in condensed form as follows:

1. In February 1962, Minute No. 3., the Executive Council approved the recommendation of the Building Committee that a committee of three be appointed from the staff of the headquarters building as a policy committee for the management, care, and use of this building. This committee is to be appointed annually by the Superintendent's office.

2. A request received from Lynwood Friends Church, approved by the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Finance, that the Executive Council authorize the Trustees to sign a note and negotiate a mortgage not to exceed \$50,000 was approved. This is to cover clearing the present indebtedness on the building and property the building is on and provide funds to erect a new educational unit.

3. In the mid-winter meeting of the Executive Council, the now well known "Teen Ambassadors" program was approved.

4. The Executive Council authorized the Printing Committee to print copies of the special actions of the Yearly Meeting for suitable interpretative inserts in the Discipline.

5. Dean Gregory was asked to represent us in replying to the Christ for the World Committee regarding our participation in presenting "Sermons from Science" at the World's Fair. It was suggested that from the office fund \$25 be sent to Ulphin O. Davis, Executive Director, for this purpose.

6. At a legally called meeting of the Executive Council on April 23, 1962, a concern from the Board of Peace and Service regarding Friendsview Manor Assistance Fund was thoroughly discussed. Following is the action of the Council: They approved (1) that a sum of \$1,020.00 be added to the United Budget figure for next church year for the Board of Peace and Service. This figure is the annual cost per person for maintenance in the Friendsview Manor. This money would be used for assistance of retired missionaries, ministers or other worthy cases; (2) that the Board

of Peace and Service be authorized to solicit funds throughout the Yearly Meeting to apply toward the Friendsview Manor Charitable Assistance Fund.

7. Also approved was a request from East Wenatchee asking authorization of the Yearly Meeting Trustees to sign for a loan which they hope to negotiate in an amount not to exceed \$10,000.00. This money is to be used to supplement the funds already on hand for the erection of their new sanctuary and Sunday School rooms.

Approved.

● 116. Ministers Group Insurance annual report was read for information and appears in the appendix.

● 117. Digest of the epistles received by Oregon Yearly Meeting was read and appears as follows:

The epistles serve in some ways as gauges for determining the concerns of the several yearly meetings, and as means whereby these concerns may be communicated to others. Thus Wilmington is made aware of the opportunities which come with a shrinking world; Ohio rejoices in a vigorous youth movement which gives hope for advances in the future. Rocky Mountain has begun holding youth conferences concurrently with yearly meeting. North Carolina is cognizant of the need for more ministers—a need surely felt in many areas of Quakerdom. This accent on youth may be noted in East Africa, too, where a newly formed youth organization evidences a prayerful interest in the church. In reading the epistle of East Africa we are made aware of the need for inter-visitation in which true fellowship in the Gospel of Jesus Christ is shared with yearly meetings which have developed out of missionary efforts. We are pleased to note that Ohio has set up Bundelkhand Yearly Meeting in India.

Through the ministry of Paul Rees, Indiana Friends were brought to a more profound realization of the centrality of Christ. Similarly, California Yearly Meeting, through the ministry of C. N. Hostetter, gained clearer comprehension and conviction of the preeminence of Christ in social concerns. Central Yearly Meeting wrote of a strong missionary burden. And Kansas Yearly Meeting's epistle reminds us all that the Church is the anointed vessel of Christ, who loved the Church and gave Himself for it, that He might sanctify and cleanse it and that it should be holy and without blemish.

Approved.

● 118. Epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings was read as follows:
Dear Friends:

"Grace be to you, and peace, from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, who gave himself for our sins, that he might deliver us from this present evil world, according to the will of God and our Father." As we gathered from Idaho, Washington and Oregon at Newberg, Oregon, August 13-19, we were keenly aware of our utter dependence upon the Lord for His blessing and guidance during the sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

In the keynote address our General Superintendent, Dean Gregory, emphasized 2 Chronicles 7:14, "If my people which are called by my name, shall humble themselves and pray and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways: then will I hear from heaven and forgive their sin, and will heal their land." Best spiritual growth is made by the conviction that God's Word calls for obedience. We need to be separated unto the Lord and realize the magnitude of the work that needs to be done. In 21 civilizations, 19 have been destroyed by atheism, socialism, materialism, and alcoholism. Socialism and materialism confront us as Christians. We need to stir ourselves to an enlarged vision of our oppor-

tunities in the church, in the mission fields, and in the world. We can fulfill God's will for us if we refuse to take things as they are and desire His will more than anything else in the world.

The dedication of the new yearly meeting administration building was one of the highlights of the week's services. Joseph G. Reece, former Yearly Meeting General Superintendent brought us again face to face with our responsibility of carrying the gospel message to the world. This message rested upon George Fox in his day, and the same vital message is for us in this day. "Come unto me," "Tarry ye" and "go ye into all the world and preach the gospel" is still a commission for us.

For our engaged speakers we were blessed in having two of our ministers, Myron Goldsmith, Assistant Professor of Religion and Language Arts, George Fox College, and Mahlon L. Macy, Director of Development, National Association of Evangelicals. In a series of forenoon messages, based on the Epistle of Colossians, Myron Goldsmith led us into some of the rich truths of that New Testament book. The evening meetings were times of heart searching as Mahlon Macy was led of the Lord in presenting strong evangelistic messages.

The early morning meetings were times of prayer, testimony and messages by different ones of our pastors.

Zeal, enthusiasm and interest pervaded the sessions of the Junior Yearly Meeting as the children studied the Word of God and sang the hymns of the church.

Again, we have been exceedingly grateful for the opportunities given to our youth in the summer camps. Over 1300 youth have gathered in the summer camps over the Yearly Meeting. Christians were rooted and grounded in the Word of God; the lives of others were changed through seeking God in prayer, and in making life commitments. Forty-six churches held Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of 3,403.

"Separate unto me" was realized as one of our pastors, Clynton Crisman, was called to become assistant superintendent to work especially in new churches, youth work and Christian education. "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it."

Those attending Yearly Meeting have enjoyed touring the new Shambaugh library building and the Pennington Residence Hall on the campus of George Fox College.

During the year a serious study of unity among Friends by a committee of six was culminated during this Yearly Meeting by its approval of certain major steps toward cooperating with other yearly meetings. As a result a committee on Friends ecumenical relations was appointed and authorized to proceed along the lines of doctrine and united activity.

● 119. A report of the Women's Missionary Union was read by Frances Hicks, president.

The Women's Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting has 894 women in 73 unions. The Union of the Star Friends Church in Idaho led all others in the gaining of new members.

We have supported Roscoe and Tina Knight in Bolivia and more recently in Peru during this year.

Here at home we gave \$100 each month for the pastoral support of the Hayden Lake outpost and \$50 each month for pastoral support at Svensen outpost. The women tried to share their material blessings during the Christmas season by sending Christmas boxes to twelve Outpost pastor's families.

Our women also sought to be of service in their own communities through such organizations as the Salvation Army, hospitals, nursing

homes, and children's homes. Several families were aided in time of need.

We sought to improve our own hearts and minds in the use of our study program each month based on the theme, "Adventuring with God." Our devotions followed the theme of "I will—Oh Lord." The program and devotional book was prepared under the direction of two of our own, namely, Mary Sandoz and Esther Woodward.

We read a total of 3,443 books. Zarilda Alger of the Homedale Union received the award for having read the most books. We also sought to share our privilege of reading with our Aymara brethren in the giving of \$806.00 for the printing of literature in their own language.

Our annual retreat at Menucha in September proved a blessing and source of encouragement. There were approximately 100 women in attendance.

Our annual banquet this year was attended by 400 women. Alda Clarkson and Phyllis Cammack spoke to our very hearts as they voiced their burden and concern for the Aymara on the field where Christ has given us the responsibility and privilege of winning men to Himself. The project for our banquet this year was to provide an adequate communications system for our field. Our goal for this project was \$1,000.00. Our offering totaled \$906.80.

We greatly rejoice in the opportunities for service that have been ours as a Women's Missionary Union during this past year. May we strive for greater goals in our tomorrows. The Amplified New Testament states, John 15:14 as follows, "Ye are my friends, if you keep on doing the things which I command you to do." May we keep on keeping on being friends of our Saviour.
