# **Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church**

## **1963**

- 1. We are rejoicing that under divine guidance Oregon Yearly Meeting is permitted to meet in its seventy-first session on August 13, 1963, at Newberg, Oregon. Psalms 75:1 "Unto thee, O God, do we give thanks, unto thee do we give thanks: for that thy name is near thy wondrous works declare."

Harlow Ankeny led us in singing, "Saviour, Like a Shepherd Lead Us." The assistant clerk, Glen Rinard, led in prayer.

- 2. Dean Gregory, Yearly Meeting Superintendent, presented his report, part of which appears below:

I have preached or spoken in some capacity nearly 100 times and have attended at least 25 conferences and 44 board or committee meetings. I have attended 8 quarterly meeting sessions besides innumerable gatherings of Friends for counseling, pastoral meetings, etc. I have visited most of the meetings of our Yearly Meeting during this past year. Also this year I have served the Mission Board as their Business Manager as well as my usual responsibilities with the board.

It was my privilege to be the guest minister at Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting June 19-23, 1963, at the Quaker Ridge camp ground near Colorado Springs, Colorado. This was a time of great refreshing to my heart and I appreciated this opportunity for ministry.

This past year the Executive Council asked Clynton Crisman and me to prepare and present to the churches of the Yearly Meeting a graphic pictorial presentation of the services supported by the United Budget. This we have done and it has consumed a great deal of our time since February. Roger Smith, financial secretary, and Beth Hockett, office secretary, have also given assistance in presenting this film-tape presentation of our United Budget ministries. We feel this has been a fine thing and are happy to have had some part in this presentation.

- 3. A summary of the work of the assistant superintendent, Clynton Crisman, was presented and parts of it are:

My opportunities for ministry have been varied this year. I have had the privilege of preaching about 100 times and teaching some 25 classes in Sunday School work and Christian Endeavor methods. I have acted as



pastoral advisor for our Yearly Meeting Christian Endeavor, trying to attend all the Executive meetings and mid-winter convention and their two retreats. The Lord has given us some very choice young people with high standards and vision. It gives me great confidence for the future of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

For the Board of Evangelism I have administered the Share program and put out the Friends News Sheet each month. Also at their request I have served as director of the Teen Ambassador program. This year 12 Teen Ambassadors were accepted for assignment. One had to drop out in the middle of the summer because of serious illness in her family. This is a serious group of young people earnestly desiring to do God's will. They have faced some rather trying circumstances, especially in securing employment for the summer, but all have reported a state of victory and a confidence that the Lord is leading and directing.

● 4. Following this report Dean Gregory brought the keynote address of the Yearly Meeting sessions, reading John 12:23-25. Friends of the Pacific Northwest are completing 70 years of united service and progress in the Master's vineyard. From a small nucleus of 10 churches and 1363 members in 1893, Oregon Yearly Meeting has taken its place in the family of Friends Yearly Meetings. Our feet are planted in a glorious heritage of faith, for we are a part of this church of God which moves on to victory. But the victory will be lost if we do not awaken to the design of Satan against the church and also to the unprecedented opportunities that are ours. Opportunities are here in Oregon Yearly Meeting as increasing numbers come from other countries. We need to use this witness if they come as Christians. Those who aren't Christian need to hear His message. There are sections in our cities of minority groups. Perhaps we should arise and see that these groups hear of Jesus Christ. We have opportunities to be represented around the world and should be glad to share in this ministry. These individuals may not be under appointment of the mission board but they are in positions of importance in many countries, and we need to have a greater share in this work.

Worship is the natural inclination and desire of all men. A proper relationship with God in worship will drive us from our knees to a dedicated service. There are no easy ways to do the work of God. The cross was not easy, but it was necessary. The work of God takes a cross for each of us to bear daily, and we are not His true disciples unless we do take up His cross. God wants us for His fellowship. We need to get back to the simplicity of the Gospel. "Come to Jesus" is the concentrated message. The Christian church knows too little of the crucified life. Perhaps too much may be made of the death involved in the sanctified life and too little made of the resurrection life which is the whole object of the plan of salvation. Friends, God is calling us to be a people separate from the world, a people zealous of good works.

Following this message Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

● 5. The following visitors were welcomed to the sessions: Charles and Maxine Ball, pastors at East Whittier, California Yearly Meeting; Catherine Eichenberger, recently from Oskaloosa, Iowa; Randall Brown, Kansas Yearly Meeting, missionary from Burundi, Africa; John Astleford, missionary to Guatemala, California Yearly Meeting; William T. Mooney, Citrus Heights, California; Prescott Beals, missionary for forty years to India and British Honduras, under another denomination; Pastor Kim, Korea.

Pastors Clifford and Muriel Arndt, who are leaving the Yearly Meeting, were introduced.

New pastors in the Yearly Meeting were welcomed: Roy and Josephine Dunagan, Dale and DeLoris Field, Kenneth and Rosalie Pitts.

● 6. The following recommendation was read from the Discipline Revision Committee:

The Discipline Revision Committee presents for final consideration the amendment given preliminary approval last year, as recorded in minute 114. This would set up a business committee as a channel of reference to relieve the presiding clerk of much of the detail of form and order in the presentation of new business. The committee recommends that final approval be given to this amendment.

Approved.

● 7. The Executive Council nominates the following for Yearly Meeting business committee: Earl Barker, two years; Arthur Roberts, one year.

- 14. The session opened with prayer by Milo Ross.  
● 15. The minutes of the previous session were read, corrected and approved.  
● 16. The treasurer's report was read. This report appears in the appendix. Appreciation was expressed for our treasurers, Roger and Mildred Minthorne.

- 17. The reports of the state of the churches were read and approved. The following is a summary of these reports:

Spiritual growth was in evidence in the meetings, and testimony was given that many are experiencing a spirit of unity and progress under the leading of the Holy Spirit. Gratitude was expressed for blessings in this year's work.

Attendance at meetings was reported increased in some meetings and decreased in others. Some felt that Sunday evening and mid-week services should be better attended.

Many meetings mentioned recommending and encouraging the habit and blessings of family devotions. In at least one instance opportunity was given to share and explain how the family altar is maintained. The "Fruit of the Vine" devotional book is used in many homes.

Each meeting mentioned special appreciation for their pastor's ministry. The Word has been preached faithfully by consecrated pastors, and has been adapted to the spiritual needs of the church. Many special evangelistic services have been held with real blessing to the people. Some meetings report organized prayer groups aside from mid-week prayer services.

Care is taken, as a whole, to uphold doctrinal standards of Friends and to see that officers of the church and Sunday School are in full harmony with these standards. One meeting reported a lack in this area.

Members have been encouraged to exercise their spiritual gifts, especially among the young people. Some meetings have many children and young people in attendance and these are encouraged to seek the will of the Lord in their lives.

The need for encouragement and help for the smaller meetings was expressed. Another expression was that we as a people may be kept from the trends toward undue materialism so prevalent today.

- 18. The resignation of Charles Beals from the Board of Peace and Service was accepted, and the filling of the vacancy referred to the representatives.

- 19. The resignation of Waldo Hicks from the Board of Missions was accepted, and the filling of the vacancy referred to the representatives.

- 20. The resignation of Jack L. Willcuts from the Board of Evangelism was accepted, and the filling of the vacancy referred to the representatives.

## BOARD OF PUBLICATION

- 21. Joseph G. Reece, president of the board, presented the report which follows:

This has been a difficult and trying year in many respects. Let us briefly review some of the problems faced by the board during the year.

1. Arthur Roberts, who had been president of this board for the past few years, felt a concern to give more time to his teaching ministry in George Fox College and to develop several thoughts he has in the field of writing. We have missed his creative leadership.



2. Jack Willcuts has been very active on our printing staff since his return from Bolivia. This year he was called to be pastor of the church in Medford. He is still editor-in chief of the NORTHWEST FRIEND, but we do miss his active participation in the editorial and press rooms.

3. Ralph Chapman has been manager of the press since the passing of Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher. Ever since his return from Bolivia he has felt a burning desire to get more of the printed page down to our friends in Bolivia. The Board of Missions concurred with him in this, and today Ralph and Marie Chapman and family are in Bolivia. We trust that soon a stream of Gospel literature will be on its way to this needy field.

When three important cogs in the Board of Publication were taken out, we hardly knew which way to turn. But the Lord has been very good to us. Harlow Ankeny, a man with many gifts and talents, joined with us. He is now our manager and has been doing a wonderful job. Edward Dealy has greatly improved with the press work; in fact, he has been doing some extra fine printing. Arlene Fiscus—well, we couldn't get along without her; she works the composing machines and whatever else needs to be done. It took a bit of time for Ankeny, Dealy and Fiscus to learn where and how they fitted into the printing office. We have been thankful so many times that we have such a consecrated and devoted group of workers. Many times they have worked 10, 12, and 16 hours a day to get out the jobs on time. They have done excellent work and are deserving of your thanks.

In closing I wish to leave a heavy concern with you. We desperately need working capital. The printing equipment was bought and is being paid for, but during all this time we have not had funds on which to do business. We cannot take advantage of discounts or of special sales. Let me illustrate—When we print books, study materials and such articles that depend on being sold to bring in a profit and returns do not come in for weeks and sometimes for several months, we find ourselves in a financial bind. We have hundreds of dollars invested in a lot of printing that will, in time, bring in a return, but paper bills and salaries have to be met on certain dates. With so much money tied up in printing we are unable to pay bills on time. Now we need new equipment to keep up the pace. Your earnest prayers and dollars would surely help us to do a better job for you.

Harlow Ankeny, manager of Barclay Press, gave a summary of his year's work and goals for the new year.

The financial statement will appear in the appendix.

### **Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.**

Charles Ball, guest speaker for the yearly meeting sessions, spoke during this hour. The church was formed through the coming of Jesus Christ. The church had Old Testament literature, but a need for the New Testament became apparent, and the gospels were a new type of writing; nothing like them is found in the Old Testament. The gospels came under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and contained things of important value. There was a delay in the writing of them, a delay of a number of years. This was because the disciples were with Jesus so had no need to write them; also they expected His return so they didn't write and also at first there was no spread of the Gospel, but when that did come, then the need of writing them was apparent, and a record was needed. The disciples were not literary men. Matthew is a connect-

ing link between the Old and New Testaments, although Mark was written first.

The man Matthew was first called Levi in the gospels. Jesus said, "Follow me," and Matthew arose and followed, according to his own account. He may have known something of Jesus previously. Matthew is mentioned only two times, other than in the lists of disciples. Matthew was written from Joseph's point of view on the birth of Jesus, rather than Mary's. Many things are told only in Matthew. It is a teaching gospel to teach that Jesus is the Christ. It portrays Jesus as King, Messiah and Universal Saviour. It is the most important book in the world as far as showing who Jesus really was.

The key verse is: "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Matt. 6:33.

### **BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE**

- 24. Merle Green, president of the board, presented the following report:

In this day of war and hunger 75 million people are working for the military force and \$14 million an hour is being spent for arms and armies. Let us as God's people endeavor to peer through the war clouds to see the other two-thirds of the world that is starving and hungry.

The Board of Peace and Service recognizes the ministry of "Peace" and "Service" to be a vital part of the Gospel. Our board has corresponded with monthly meeting chairmen and quarterly meeting superintendents in promoting our work.

The following is a summary of the 46 churches reporting:

#### Home Relief

- 3 reported sending clothing to Rough Rock Indian School
- 3 sent clothing to Montezuma School in Arizona
- 3 to city missions
- 3 to Mexican migrant work
- 2 to Greer Nursing Home
- 9 gave Thanksgiving and Christmas boxes

Several gave clothing to Goodwill and Salvation Army. Other channels of service have been to those who have had loss by fire, those destitute, and where death had come to families in the community. Approximately 2,235 pounds of clothing and food were given and \$97 expended.

#### Foreign Relief

- 3,129 pounds of clothing shipped through World Relief Commission, N. A. E. and Herschel Thornburg for Formosa. There was \$443.87 expended.

#### Peace

- Number of young men or women serving in the armed services. . . 41
- Number registered or serving as conscientious objectors. . . . 20
- Number of young men between ages 14 and 18 . . . . . 200

Several churches reported observing Peace Emphasis Week and promoting peace by messages from the pastors, study classes, C. E. discussions, and giving out peace literature.



Our board plans to work with the monthly meeting chairmen in making greater strides this coming year in this area of our yearly meeting program.

#### Friendsview Manor

Friendsview Manor has been in operation nearly two and one-half years. Every room is occupied, and there is a waiting list approximately two years in length. Fifty-five percent of the 163 residents are members of Friends churches. Through special rates and direct assistance from the Assistance Fund, it has been made possible for sixteen retired Friends ministers, missionaries, or their widows to become residents. The Manor Board has created a special assistance fund, created from direct personal gifts, contributions through the Yearly Meeting United Budget, and specially assigned funds. The Federal Bureau of Internal Revenue has declared the Manor income tax exempt. This means that all gifts to the Manor are tax deductible.

A. Clark Smith brought a message on the peace stand of Friends. Report approved.

- 25. Resignation of A. E. George from the Board of Trustees was read. Approved.

- 26. The business committee asked confirmation of the prior nominations in 1962 of M. Gene Hockett and Elletta Eichenberger to the Board of Christian Education.

Confirmed.

- 27. Arthold W. Latham was welcomed to the sessions. He will be principal of Greenleaf Academy this coming year.

- 28. The Discipline Revision committee presents for final action the amendment approved last year as recorded in minute 70, designed to set up a new Board of General Education. This measure has met with some question as increasing the complexity of organization and adding to the burden of expense as well as the difficulty of providing personnel. As it is given final consideration and action, the committee wishes to suggest some definite advantages. It would provide a real and practical bond between the Yearly Meeting and George Fox College which has existed before only in name. It would give genuine status to the college visiting committee. It seems highly desirable to the college administration. All other features of the measure are already included under the duties of the education section of the Board of Moral Action and felt by many to have inadequate emphasis in that arrangement. The committee recommends favorable action.

Approved in its final reading.

- 29. Since the visiting to George Fox College will be cared for through this Board of General Education, the meeting favored no longer having the former George Fox College visiting committee as named by the representative group.

- 30. The Discipline Revision committee presented for the second reading the following:

As directed by the Yearly Meeting in the sessions of 1962 (minute 121, page 36) the Discipline Revision committee presents herewith a series of amendments designed to provide for the new office created at that time of Assistant Superintendent. The committee recommends this title in place of the one approved last year—"Assistant General Superintendent."

First—in Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, subsection C, paragraph 4, page 54, make the following changes: Change the title to read "4. Administrators and Field Secretaries." Immediately after the title insert a new subparagraph to read thus: "The Yearly Meeting shall appoint annually, on nomination by the Executive Council with the advice and appro-

val of the General Superintendent, a person to serve as Assistant Superintendent. He shall be well qualified by maturity and experience to carry out his appointed responsibilities. He shall work under the supervision of the General Superintendent in any or all of the departments of work of the Yearly Meeting; he shall familiarize himself with the activities of all boards and committees and shall attend their meetings at their request or at the suggestion of the General Superintendent. He may be assigned special duties and responsibilities by the Executive Council with the consent of the General Superintendent."

Second—in Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, subsection D, paragraph 1, line 4, following the words, "the General Superintendent," insert the words "the Assistant Superintendent;"

Third—in Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, subsection D, paragraph 3, subparagraph g, insert after the words in line 2, "General Superintendent," the words "Assistant Superintendent" and at the end of subparagraph g add the words "and Assistant Superintendent."

Discussion followed, then this was tabled with the request that copies of the revision be mimeographed for further study.

Approved.

- 31. The Discipline Revision committee makes the following recommendation in the first reading.

The Committee on Discipline Revision wishes to make the following recommendation:

In Part II, Chapter III, Section I, subsection A, paragraph 8, pages 77 and 78, change the second sentence to read: "A personal interview with the person involved shall be secured or authorized by the committee."

This amendment, if adopted, would serve two purposes. It would, by removing the words, "if possible," make the personal interview mandatory. At the same time it would authorize the committee to appoint, in cases of emergency, some individual or individuals to conduct the interview under its authority. Such an emergency could arise, for instance, in case a missionary must depart for the field after having been recommended but before Yearly Meeting time. A senior missionary on the field could then be delegated by the committee to conduct the personal interview on its behalf.

Approved, and referred back to Discipline Revision committee to be held over one year.

- 32. The Discipline Revision committee makes the following recommendation:

In Part II, Chapter III, Section I, subsection A, paragraph 9, page 78, make these changes: Insert a new sentence four, to read: "When the action of the Yearly Meeting is favorable, the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight shall proceed to sponsor the public recognition of ministerial gifts in a service during the sessions of the Yearly Meeting." Let the present sentences four and five become sentences five and six, and let the present sixth and last sentence become a subparagraph.

This proposed amendment is designed to provide for an impressive culmination to the procedure for recording ministers, and also to encourage the young men or women who are recommended as candidates for recording to attend the Yearly Meeting and receive a share of its challenge.

Approved and referred back to Discipline Revision committee to be held over one year.

- 33. It was suggested that the Ministry and Oversight have charge of a recognition service for recording ministers in this year's Yearly Meeting sessions.

Approved.



- 34. Recommendation from the Friends Ecumenical Relations Committee was read as follows:

1. We recommend that the Coordinating Council take the leadership in areas of missions, youth, publications, etc., as spelled out in sections I, B, 1; and II, A of 1961 Minutes. (This contains the setting up of the four yearly meeting superintendents to act as a Coordinating Council to carry out cooperative efforts among the four yearly meetings—Ohio, Rocky Mountain, Kansas, and Oregon—as well as similar instructions to this Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations. We feel that some duplication of responsibility obtained and we wanted to clarify the delegation of authority.) Any further connection with these concerns by this committee would be by way of counsel and care that the actions accord with the provision of policy as specified I, A, and II, B (1962 Minutes, pp. 12-13) (which show the goal of a Friends Church, evangelical in nature and insure that cooperative efforts are open ended—not limited to the four yearly meetings wherein the Coordinating Council finds a place of beginning.)

2. We recommend that this committee, if continued, otherwise some other yearly meeting body, seek to encourage and coordinate the ministry of visitation at home and abroad.

3. We recommend that this committee, if continued, otherwise some other body of the Yearly Meeting, begin to lay the groundwork of ideas on church polity and discipline, in anticipation of the establishment of a Friends Church, (as per I B, 3, p. 13, 1962 Minutes. This includes co-operating with other committees from other yearly meetings in joint study.)

4. We recommend that this committee, if continued, have the privilege of naming one young Friend to serve as a member of the committee.

5. We recommend that the committee be granted an expense account of \$500 to carry on its work, including an anticipated meeting with committees from other yearly meetings.

In conclusion, may we suggest that our vision of a Friends Church evangelical in faith and world-wide in scope requires more than policy planning and doctrine conferences. It requires prayer and yearning for the leadership of the Holy Spirit among Quakers so that our message is not shattered upon the rocks of disbelief and disunity but enhanced by world-wide fellowship and greater efficiency in our organization. This vision requires of us patient searching out of our loyalties to the Church as we know it in our actual experience. It demands of concerned Friends the studied discipline to learn about other Friends, to feel after them as our brothers in Christ, and to acquaint our families with the denominational heritage which is ours.

A report from the representatives to the Coordinating Council was read as follows:

A year ago the Yearly Meeting authorized participation in a cooperative venture among other independent evangelical yearly meetings (1962 Minutes, page 13) by the appointment of the General Superintendent to a Coordinating Council representing Ohio, Kansas, Rocky Mountain, and Oregon Yearly Meetings. This council is made up of the general superintendents of these yearly meetings.

A meeting of the Coordinating Council was held on June 18, 1963, in Colorado Springs, Colorado, from which comes the following recommendations to be presented to each yearly meeting:

1. A workshop conference of departmental representatives was set up to meet September 11-13, 1963, at Haviland, Kansas. This conference is to be attended by one representative each from the departments of Missions, Church Extension, Youth, and Publications, as well as the

yearly meeting superintendents and assistants, and members of the Coordinating Council of the various yearly meetings.

The purpose of this conference is to provide a working basis and recommendations for further cooperation among the four yearly meetings.

2. That the Coordinating Council be enlarged to include one member from each of the yearly meetings, besides the general superintendent.

3. That an amount be budgeted by each yearly meeting for use of the Coordinating Council and its related work. (This is included in the request already presented by the committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations.)

4. That a significant united missionary project be selected as a means of inter-yearly meeting cooperation in the foreign missions department.

It is hoped that our Board of Missions will have a further report on the last recommendation (4) during this yearly meeting week.

These were laid on the table until a later session. (See minutes 38)

- 35. Meeting adjourned to meet Thursday, 9:15 a.m.

### BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

- 39. Myron Goldsmith, president of the board, gave a review of the book, *The Christian College in the Twentieth Century*, by Bernard Ramm.

The annual report of the Board of Moral Action was given and appears as follows:

In summarizing the report of the Public Morals department, we note the growing problem of gambling in all three states comprising Oregon Yearly Meeting. In Idaho, Friends were active in opposing casino-type gambling before the general election which decided that issue. Meetings in the state of Washington circulated referendum petitions against the gambling law which had been passed. Oregon was represented at the racing commission hearing regarding the dog race track in Clackamas County. Many letters were sent on this issue, and others in regard to moral action concerns were addressed to appropriate commissions, state and national legislators, newspapers and responsible authorities. Commendations were sent to officials and well-known persons when their actions or writings justified praise.

Friends in Newberg were active in the campaign to keep Newberg dry, and the Board of Moral Action had a small part in supplying material and encouragement in that effort. One meeting in Oregon opposed the application for a liquor outlet near the church and was successful in defeating the application. A majority of the meetings took an active part in publicizing legislative issues and urging members to participate as Christian citizens.

Samples of moral action literature were sent to all meetings, resulting in tract distribution equal to that of last year and nearly 300 public morals presentations. We are pleased to report that about twice as many visual aids were used this year, as compared with the year previous.



There is a growing concern over the use of tobacco, and the board has answered all inquiries with helpful material, including "Power Pack," a box of Scriptures useful to those sincerely attempting to break the cigarette habit. The board is exploring every means which appears of possible value in helping those who wish to escape bondage to tobacco. Concern over the increase of alcoholism has led us to meet with other organizations which stress the abstinence stand. Youth have been encouraged in total abstinence by temperance clubs, at summer camps and conferences, speech contests and through local presentations in our meetings.

The board has excellent materials available for the use of ministers in strengthening their preaching on moral issues, and we are anxious to supply those who desire these. We feel that the signing of individual and family pledges to total abstinence from beverage alcohol and tobacco are helpful in resisting temptations, and are studying pledges and plans for a Commitment Day.

Turning to the Department of Literature, the 51 churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting which sent in report blanks list 48 libraries ranging in size from 15 to 850 books. From previous reports, we know that there are more libraries in the Yearly Meeting than this. Our libraries now include more than 7,790 volumes, an increase of nearly 1800 over last year. Thirty-five churches have regularly appointed librarians, and we would encourage the appointment of more librarians to insure protection of the investment which these books represent.

A good number of churches have promoted systematic Bible reading. We encourage the use of every means which proves helpful in promoting the daily use of the Scriptures in devotions and study.

While no organized effort against obscene literature was indicated on the report blanks, various individuals have been active in protesting filth sent through the mails, and that handily available on shelves of drug and grocery stores. Friends have cooperated with community efforts against the evil of obscene literature. The flood of obscenity in slick magazines and paper backs should alert us to the need of resisting this very real moral peril.

## BOARD OF EVANGELISM

● 40. Presentation of the Board of Evangelism which was given on Wednesday evening was approved. A summary follows:

It is a long stretch of time since William Hobson got off his horse at the banks of the Willamette River to start doing Friends Church Extension work in Oregon. Without benefit of advice and consent of our Board of Evangelism, or counsel from the Executive Council, he set about bringing Friends together from time to time for worship. The Lord blessed him in a remarkable way, for because of his efforts, we all got out of our cars this week not far from the same spot on the banks of the same river, for the same purpose, I trust—to start doing Friends church extension work by bringing Friends together from time to time for worship.

Somewhere along the line, the task of evangelism was delegated to committees, and then to Yearly Meeting boards, and finally, to handle this task efficiently, the boards began having retreats and meetings with carefully planned agendas for study and discussion. But one thing that has not changed during these shifts in methods is the concern which motivates evangelistic endeavors. William Hobson is gone, but his concern lives on. These agendas of our board are actually pinpoint reminders of bubbling opportunities for evangelistic outreach. They are not lifeless items of business, but live spiritual nerve centers which from time to time come alive with church growth and revival.

The Board of Evangelism this year has seriously attempted to exercise the stewardship represented by the responsibilities charged to us by the Yearly Meeting and the Discipline. Perhaps the best way to report these is to check out the agenda items given us by the Yearly Meeting for direction and development. These include Ashland, Svensen, Hayden Lake, Emmett, Newport, Nehalem, Quincy, Timber and Meridian outposts. At the sessions of last Yearly Meeting, announcement was made of Meridian, Idaho, as the newest church extension venture, and we are happy to report meetings began on February 24 with Dorwin and Marita Smith as pastors. This promises to be one of our finest openings of the Lord for evangelism. In the course of the year, the Newport outpost discontinued regular services, and a study is being made of future plans for this area. Quilcene Monthly Meeting was also laid down during the year.

Metolius has become a Monthly Meeting and Silverton is ready for transfer from Preparative to Monthly Meeting status this year.

Other agenda matters reaching Yearly Meeting interest include a Share Call for the Hayden Lake Preparative Friends Meeting. Results were gratifying: \$3,553.60 received. Also, the Church Extension Foundation, another group involved in outpost financing, increased to 28 members.

Hayden Lake Meeting is constructing a new sanctuary, and East Wenatchee dedicated a lovely new building early this church year. Surveys and visits have been made in various areas exploring possibilities for new outpost ventures, and each of these stem from the individual concerns of interested Friends with whom the Yearly Meeting is cooperating.

Oregon Yearly Meeting has benefitted from the work and service of Clynton Crisman who worked closely with the Board of Evangelism in his many activities. His leadership in the Teen Ambassador program, Campus Conference, visitation, promotion and counseling ministries has been very helpful. His experience and enthusiasm coupled with a deeply spiritual life were used of the Lord in many ways. Our general superintendent, Dean Gregory, also gave us every cooperation and was a bless-



ing to the churches, both new and older.

There are reasons to be disturbed as we review the attendance statistics for this year, however. For the first time in several years there was a decline in morning service, Sunday evening meetings, prayer meeting and Sunday School over the previous year. While 26 churches reported an increase in Sunday morning attendance, 33 found a loss while four churches remained the same as last year in attendance in morning worship. This seems to substantiate the statement made by Dean Gregory that we are passing the peak of interest in church life.

The need for more pastors is a matter of concern to the Board of Evangelism. Often the call is for more leadership, training of leaders and preparing church leaders, but we remind ourselves that Christ never called leaders; He called followers. If there can be found enough men and women of our church willing to be Spirit-filled followers, our leadership needs will be met with a consistent upsurge of evangelistic force.

As retiring president of the board, I can report a conscientious attempt has been made by this group to fulfill the functions given us by the Yearly Meeting. The faithfulness of each board member is appreciated. And even though this brief report would sound embarrassingly inadequate if read before the 120 in the upper room, we have earnestly sought the leading and empowering of the Lord.

- 41. The reports of the Board of Evangelism and the Friends Church Extension Foundation as presented on Wednesday evening were approved. The financial report appears in the appendix.

### Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

Charles Ball presented some of the highlights from the life and the gospel of Mark. The Holy Spirit superintended the writing without error. Mark presents Jesus Christ as a servant. Mark's own name does not appear in his gospel; he is not listed as a disciple of Jesus. He was a believer who followed Peter and was an interpreter of Peter, and probably was converted under Peter's ministry. Rapidity of action can be noted in this gospel. "Straightway" is the key word. It has been stated to portray "Jesus as a conquering servant carrying on a three-year campaign." It is a pictorial gospel with vividness of detail—detail as to places, numbers, time and individuals. It also is a picturesque gospel. It shows what Jesus did and not what he taught. It is abrupt, concise and forceful. The key verse is, "For even the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give His life a ransom for many." Mark 10:45

- 68. After discussion, the recommendation from the Discipline Revision committee as presented in a previous session (minute 63) was approved.

- 69. The following report from the Executive Council was read:

At the mid-year session of the Executive Council, the clerks of the Council were authorized to sign a resolution directing that the trustees of Oregon Yearly Meeting be authorized and empowered to execute and sign a supplementary agreement and all other necessary papers so that the East Wenatchee, Washington, Preparative Meeting of Friends may borrow an additional sum of money not to exceed \$1,369.72 from the Wenatchee Federal Savings and Loan Association. This is to be secured by the mortgage against this property, of which the description was included.

The Executive Council favored a recommendation from the Board of Evangelism that the Yearly Meeting trustees, in cooperation with the Board of Evangelism, be authorized to sell the Quilcene, Washington, property held by Oregon Yearly Meeting. The money from the sale would be used in church extension.

The payment of \$100 towards the October 12 storm damage of the Yearly Meeting house was authorized by the Executive Council.

Further action by the Executive Council favored our general superintendent making the trip to Bolivia in the interests of the missionary work.

Upon request for study, the Executive Council appointed a committee to work out problems and details pertaining to Yearly Meeting entertainment.

The trustees informed the Executive Council that the purchaser of the Quaker apartments in Portland had defaulted on their contract and the trustees have repossessed the property. In view of this information and other pertinent facts which will no doubt be reported by the trustees, the Executive Council approved authorizing the trustees to make a firm offer for the sale of the property.

The Council favored selling directional signs to the Five Years Meeting at \$5 each.

Since this year is Iowa Yearly Meeting's Centennial, the Yearly Meeting clerks and superintendent were authorized to make necessary arrangements for a representative from Oregon Yearly Meeting. It was later learned that Dr. and Mrs. Wayne Roberts planned to visit in Iowa during Iowa Yearly Meeting sessions. Therefore, they were furnished with appropriate documents making them our official representation to Iowa Yearly Meeting.

The Board of Publication was asked to initiate plans for the observance of our 75th anniversary in 1968.

The local pastor, Glen Rinard, was asked to convey to the pastors in the local Ministerial Association the information that our Yearly Meeting sessions are opened to visitors.

Clynton Crisman was authorized to invite suitable organizations to make displays at Yearly Meeting time.

It was also decided to designate one of our members on the Executive Committee of the Western Evangelical Seminary Board.

The printing committee was directed to work out advance instructions to all who must prepare reports to appear in the Minutes. It is the feeling that reports should be condensed and some longer ones omitted, with a note about where copies may be secured.

The printing committee was further instructed to have prepared copies of Discipline revisions and interpretations for insertion in the back of the Yearly Meeting Minutes or Discipline.

The matter of the diminishing supply of Disciplines was mentioned. This was referred to the Board of Publication with the recommendation



that Barclay Press be placed in full charge and they be allowed any profit.

Approval was given the trustees to borrow \$3000, if needed, due to the unexpected expenses made necessary to repossess the Quaker apartments.

## BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

● 70. Charles Morgan, president of the board, presented the report which follows:

The activities of the Board of Stewardship during the past year have been concerned primarily with the establishing of closer communication between the board and local committees. To implement this concern:

1. A bulletin was issued six times during the year for the purpose of encouraging, challenging, and giving guidance. Suggested skits, tracts, flannelgraphs, books, films, etc., were listed. Successful efforts of particular local committees were shared. Early planning and establishing of goals was stressed.

2. Dozens of personal letters were written.

3. A series of four tracts was purchased for use by the local meetings.

4. The Arthur Davenport Stewardship Packet was sent to all pastors.

5. Participation in the poster contest was encouraged.

6. Use of the Yearly Meeting-owned stewardship films was encouraged.

7. Quarterly meeting chairmen have held quarterly meeting workshops, spoken in the meetings of their responsibility as opportunities have opened, and generally have made themselves available.

In evaluation, we observe that fortunately our concerns have not fallen on shallow soil. In a favorable percentage of the cases, the local chairmen have responded to the sharing of information and ideas. Committees are becoming more active. A number of committees made 6, 8, 12, and one made 20 presentations during the year.

The board has been heartened in that here and there throughout our Yearly Meeting there are those who especially through missionary and stewardship conferences are experiencing fresh blessing and realization of a new concept in giving, yet not really "new" for it is as old as the Scriptures. Through proper challenge, over the past two and three years now, many have found that they, through sacrifice and faith, have been able to greatly increase their giving.

For the coming year the board intends to use the following means to promote stewardship:

1. Continue the publishing of the stewardship bulletin,

2. continue the poster contest and include the adults,

3. purchase and distribute tracts,

4. encourage the use of quarterly reports by the local chairman to assist the local and quarterly meeting chairmen in the evaluation of their work,

5. formation of several stewardship teams to share their witness in, if possible, all of the meetings of our Yearly Meeting.

We are happy over the progress in many instances of the rising sense of stewardship in our Yearly Meeting. Yet we realize that there are so many who have never through faith touched "the windows of heaven" which wait to be opened to those who will dare to trust. As a board we believe that the Lord is more clearly showing us our task. We look forward ex-

pectantly to a more profitable year in all areas of stewardship.

Marie Haines presented the poster contest awards as follows:

Junior division—First prize, David Beck, Rosedale; second prize, Daniel Fendall, McKinley Avenue.

Senior Division—First prize, David Peck, Hillsboro; second prize, Beth Harris, Greenleaf.

Dale Darling, Oak Park; Isabell Shanks, Vancouver; David Fendall, McKinley Avenue, all gave testimony to the blessings in the leading of God in their own lives as they have participated in the stewardship program.

● 71. Professor Robert Bennett, head of the Christian Education Department of Western Evangelical Seminary, was introduced, and he spoke briefly to the session.

● 72. Meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

## Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

Charles Ball brought to our attention some of the interesting and inspiring facts of the Gospel of Luke and The Acts. Luke was a constant companion of the Apostle Paul and had attended medical school, he was an artist and a poet. Five of the earliest hymns of the church are recorded in Luke's gospel. It is the longest of the gospels and sets forth that salvation is for Gentiles as well as Jews. It is a gospel of childhood, of womanhood, of the poor, of the outcasts, and of the Holy Spirit. It is a portrait of Jesus as an ideal man, as the Son of Man, as courageous, constant in faith and Savior of the world. The key verse is, "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." Luke 19:10.

● 75. Report of the trustees was read.

A Supplementary Agreement for East Wenatchee, Washington, Preparative Meeting, to borrow not to exceed \$1369.72 from the Wenatchee Federal Savings and Loan Association has been signed by the Trustees, having been authorized by the Executive Council.

An option to sell to Multnomah County, Oregon, a small parcel of land, being a part of the Lynwood Friends Meeting property, for road purposes, has been signed.

Hillsboro Meeting is requesting the Yearly Meeting to deed a small parcel of land to Frederick B. Baker in exchange for a small parcel of land he is deeding to the Yearly Meeting in order to adjust the boundary lines of the Baker and church properties.

Quilcene Monthly Meeting has been discontinued, and the disposition of the property there is under consideration by the Trustees and officers of the Yearly Meeting.

The unpaid construction costs of the headquarters building and grounds at the time of the 1962 Yearly Meeting have been paid as follows:

Recently the parking lot of the headquarters building has been prepared for placing a rock base, and 35 yards of rock have been spread upon it. The cost of the rock and work already done was \$290. This is being paid by gifts and pledges. It is expected to place enough rock on the lot to form a base four inches thick. It is estimated that it will require about \$200 in addition to gifts and pledges already received to complete the base. The excavation and leveling of the lot is such that two-inch paved surface can be placed upon the four-inch base. It is not expected to lay the paved surface at present unless funds should become available for its payment.

Fires caused damage in one of the men's rest rooms and on the roof of the Yearly Meeting house. Claim for damage was made and has been paid by the insurance companies involved in the amount of \$155.28. Temporary repairs have been paid, and the balance on hand will be applied to the cost of repairs now being made.

The Trustees made the following report to the Executive Council during its mid-year meeting:

Asselstine defaulted on their contract for the purchase of the apartment building in Portland, on three-fourths of the 1962 taxes, on the insurance due in June 1962, and on the installment due July 1, 1962, and have made no further payments to January 14, 1963. During either June or July 1962, or near this time they offered to sell through a real estate broker the contract. The broker found no buyer. The Trustees decided to gain possession of the property. Possession of the property could be gained by securing an assignment of the contract to Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church and securing a quit claim deed from the Asselstines, or by foreclosure suit. The Trustees decided to try to secure possession by the first method. They first offered \$500 to the Asselstines. Mr. Asselstine refused the offer. After further consideration the Trustees offered \$1200. This offer was accepted. The Yearly Meeting treasurer issued a check for this amount to Asselstines. The assignment and quit claim deed were prepared by Attorney Bernhard Fedde. They are properly signed and recorded in Multnomah County. The Yearly Meeting received possession on January 14, 1963.

The Trustees have employed Herbert Sargent to manage the property. The Trustees are receiving the rentals and are paying by check all accounts incurred.

The Trustees request the Executive Council to approve and ratify the actions taken by the Trustees and Yearly Meeting treasurer.

The Trustees request that the Executive Council authorize and empower them to make a firm offer to sell the property.

The Executive Council approved the report and authorized the Trustees to make a firm offer to sell the property.

The Trustees found that in order to rent or sell the property it was necessary to make repairs to the property and refinish some of the apartments.

The Trustees were unable to find a cash sale of the property.

An offer to buy the property on contract was received from Edgar R. Stowell and Betty L. Stowell. After negotiations and investigations a contract was signed by Mr. and Mrs. Stowell and Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church for the sale of the apartment building property for \$23,000.00, with a down payment of \$3,000.00 and monthly payments of

\$140.00 on the 10th of each month beginning July 10, 1963. A real estate sale commission of 5 per cent of \$23,000.00 was paid to E. E. Bowen. Pacific Title Insurance Co. was the escrow agent to close the sale, and the following is their escrow statement:

Mr. Stowell has a business in Portland, owns other properties there, and recommendations and credit rating of him are good.

The Yearly Meeting treasurer was consulted when possession of the apartment building was secured last January, and he desired that the finances of the building be handled by the chairman of the Trustees. All funds received have been deposited on the account of Oregon Yearly Meeting with the Newberg Branch of the U. S. National Bank and all bills have been paid by check on this account.

Several members of the committee visited the campus this past year and all were very favorably impressed. It is felt that this has been a good year for the college. Visitors were especially pleased and impressed with the high spiritual tone on the campus.

The committee wishes to express appreciation and commendation for Hector Munn's excellent lecture, "The Question of Time in Creation or Evolution."

The committee felt that the new library has been a real asset in raising the academic standards by providing adequate means, place and atmosphere for study.

Appreciation for the excellent choir was expressed by many. However, it was felt that if some of the grand old hymns of the church could have been included in the program a wider appreciation would have been felt.

Concern was expressed that in the push of rising standards of education George Fox College not become just another city college, but that the distinctive spiritual standards of the school be kept high and no compromise be allowed.

Realizing the need of high academic standards and the pressure involved, we are concerned to note that the academic pressure is such that in some instances the students feel justified in spending the day Sunday in study rather than attending the services of worship.

The committee wishes to commend Dr. Ross, the faculty, and board of George Fox College for the excellent job they are doing and trust that each member of the Yearly Meeting will give their full support in prayer.

## BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- 98. The meeting approved the Board of Christian Education report as presented by Gene Hockett, president, on Friday evening. It follows:

The commission of Christ is extended to the church to carry the gospel message to the entire world. There is also the challenge to teach them to observe the commandments of God. It is this thrilling challenge of teaching and training through our churches that is the responsibility of the Board of Christian Education. During this past year we have endeavored to faithfully administer the duties that are ours in guiding the churches in this endeavor.

This year we have greatly appreciated the help of the assistant superintendent, Clynton Crisman, as he has worked with us. His time in planning and conducting area workshops, the promotional work through the office, the counsel and guidance given to the Christian Endeavor have all been invaluable contributions to our work. The evaluations of needs in



the field are expressed to the committees as he meets with them to aid in preparing future programs.

The Sunday School department has given considerable time during the year to the preparation for the Leadership Conferences planned for October 1963. This, we believe, will be a great opportunity to increase the effectiveness of the leadership of the Yearly Meeting.

In October 1962 the Sunday School contest was entered into by most of the churches in the Yearly Meeting with several schools commenting upon the new vision and enthusiasm they received through this venture. A new "Fall Round-Up" will be held also in the month of October, 1963.

During the year 157 filmstrips were used from the film library at the Yearly Meeting office. New strips have frequently been added to increase the selection, thus insuring ever expanding use.

We regret that through the year there has been a decline in the Sunday School attendances generally throughout the Yearly Meeting. We are thankful, however, for the 19 churches that showed an increase.

The annual reports reflected a decline in other areas of the Sunday School endeavor with only one Sunday School receiving the Gold Crown rating and only two receiving the Silver Crown. Eleven Sunday Schools received the Blue Crown rating. Tigard was the Gold Crown winner, while Hayden Lake and Oak Park were the two Silver Crown Sunday Schools.

May we call upon all Sunday Schools to accept these less encouraging facts as a challenge for the new year that is before us to evaluate our weaknesses and strengthen our efforts in having an effective Sunday School.

Vacation Bible Schools continue to serve as an effective means of presenting the gospel message to the boys and girls in the church communities. There were 51 churches which reported conducting V.B.S. and several of these carried on two or more schools with each being held for a different age group. We are thankful for the opportunity of assisting in the financial needs of conducting schools in the outpost and assisting in meetings. These churches send reports of victories in the lives of boys and girls and new families reached through this means.

The 1963 camping season was the greatest year yet in camping for Oregon Yearly Meeting. There were 18 separate camps held with 1825 campers and workers being involved in the great camping experience. Reports received thus far indicate that some 42 per cent of those attending camps made a definite decision of some nature. Over 25 per cent of our Sunday School attendance is involved in the camping program. Steps have been taken to prepare Friends' doctrinal lessons for use in our future camping program.

The Board of Christian Education is thankful for the fine young people of our Yearly Meeting and for the dedicated leadership of the Christian Endeavor officers. The program for our youth is challenging and there are many who are willing to apply themselves to the cause of Christ.

Highlights in the youth program are the mid-winter C. E. conference and the activities at Yearly Meeting time. These are proving to be invaluable times of challenge and training for these young leaders of our church. Special recognition should be given to Lonny Fendall who concludes his leadership as C. E. president. He has done a magnificent job during the past three years.

This report shows to us the vast field of opportunity in the area of Christian education. There is a continuing challenge and need for each Sunday School teacher, youth leader, for Christian Education directors and committees, to prayerfully consider their part in the great commission of the church, and to apply themselves diligently to the task of winning souls and teaching them to keep the commandments of God.

● 99. A minute for Dean Gregory, who will soon visit our missions in Bolivia and Peru and also other Friends, was read.

The meeting approved this being signed by the Yearly Meeting clerks.

● 100. A minute for Clare Willcuts, who plans to visit our missions in Bolivia and Peru and to visit other Friends, was read.

The meeting approved this minute being signed by the Yearly Meeting clerks.

● 101. Paul Mills and Gordon St. George received signed minutes from Oregon Yearly Meeting before going on world tour.

Approved.

● 102. It was suggested that Oregon Yearly Meeting send warm greetings to Ohio Yearly Meeting by Milo Ross who will be speaking in their sessions in the very near future.

Approved.

● 103. The Yearly Meeting music committee reported as follows:

The music committee has carried on the following activities this year: We have supplied seven articles for the MUSIC BOX column in the NORTHWEST FRIEND.

We have held a hymn-writing contest again this year, with eight entries.

March was designated as "Music Month" and many of the churches throughout the Yearly Meeting observed it.

A film-strip was purchased on hymn appreciation for the purpose of lending out to the churches.

The chairman, Ruth Corbin, was sent to the annual Church Music Conference at Forest Home, near Redlands, California, for six days of concentrated briefing on all phases of church music.

The file of music materials has been added to and reorganized.

There were three music conferences held this year—in the Boise valley and in Eugene in connection with Herschel Thornburg's meetings, and one in Newberg.

Summary of the Music Committee Questionnaire sent out in 1963.

There were 45 meetings reporting.

Those reporting regular choirs 23, with a total of about 350 singers.

Those reporting seasonal choirs 6, with a total of about 78 singers.

Total choirs 29, with a total of about 428 singers. This shows a decrease in the number of choirs and the number of singers.

Twenty-two report having electric organs, compared to 19 last year.

There is a definite increase in the number of children's choirs, 17 churches reporting a total of about 234 singers compared to last year's 12 churches with 197 singers. This is quite a significant trend.

There were 16 churches who benefitted from church conferences this year as compared with 10 last year. More interest is being shown in this area.

Twelve continue to hold regular music committee meetings, and thirteen report having used the Church Musician's Handbook this year.

## BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 105. The report of the Board of Missions as given by Clare Willcuts on Thursday evening was approved. It follows:

"The mission of the Church is missions," declares Norman Lewis in the book, Triumphant Missionary Ministry in the Local Church. He then continues. "To make Christ known to all men is her task, for this she



has been left in the world; this is the task Christ commanded His Church to do." St. Paul expressed his burden for a missionary ministry in 2 Corinthians 10:16 (RSV) "But our hope is that as your faith increase, our field among you may be greatly enlarged, so that we may preach the gospel in the lands beyond."

Oregon Yearly Meeting has commendably accepted the challenge to "preach the gospel to the regions beyond." Generally speaking this has been a year of triumph and blessing. As president of the Board of Missions I have traveled approximately 5,000 miles, sent out 491 pieces of mail and assisted with the campus conference at George Fox College.

The board adopted a plan a year ago which has proved to be significantly helpful. An Administrative Committee was named from the board consisting of the executive committee, a member at large, and the general superintendent. This group met five times during the year, and the full board met twice.

The mission staff presently consists of Oscar and Ruth Brown and the Quentin Nordyke family in La Paz; the Mark Roberts family at Pichu in the Yungas; the Eugene Comfort family in the lower Yungas at Caranavi; Roscoe and Tina Knight and three children in Juli, Peru. The Clarksons had expected to return in June for a second term, to labor in Peru, but because of a continuing health problem it was determined that they should remain in the homeland for one more year. Paul and Martha Puckett have just completed two terms in the language school in Costa Rica. They, with their four children, are moving this month to La Paz. Cammack, along with their teaching duties at George Fox College, have visited every area of the Yearly Meeting. Paul and Phyllis has been terminated with a deep sense of gratitude for their service with the board excellent labors for many years.

A brief review of the past twelve months records several interesting highlights. First, I mention the purchase of the property in the Alto Beni region which has recently been opened for colonization. It is located in the Yungas but farther north than Pichu, and at a lower altitude. This is part of a government land settlement program and many of the Aymara who have lived in the altiplano are moving there. Several of these are members of the Friends church. A number of meetings have been started and plans are now being made to establish a quarterly meeting. The property was formerly owned by another missionary group and includes a suitable home and a small chapel. The Comforts moved there the first part of January and have made many weekend trips, visited homes of the workers and many believers. Bible classes were held during May for men and women.

In February word was received that Oscar Brown was seriously and mysteriously ill. An urgent call for prayer was issued and special medicine was mailed from his doctor in Caldwell, Idaho. These combined efforts resulted in a remarkable and rapid recovery.

The first of April the Lord allowed an accident to happen, and a national was fatally hit while Quentin Nordyke was driving the pick-up. Although it was not his fault, it was a most trying experience, and could have been a greater tragedy without the protection of the Lord. The Nordykes testify, "This was a crisis experience for both of us and we still do not understand why it was allowed, but we found peace and trust in Him who sent us here. We are grateful for the instant assurance of confidence and prayers by many individuals of the Yearly Meeting."

We have been keenly aware of the need for more missionaries in Peru. It is the united judgment of the Mission Council and the board members that the Nordykes should be transferred from Bolivia to Peru for the two remaining years of their first term. They are moving to Juli, Peru.

The National Church, the Mission Council and the Board of Missions have been earnestly seeking God's will for a Bible School to replace the one that was discontinued when the property at Copajira was lost. We are happy to report that Ralph and Marie Chapman, with two of their children, Margaret and Wayne, have already arrived in Bolivia. Their specific ministry during this two-year term will be to reactivate the Bible School and continue in the area of literature.

The Christian witness at Sprague River is continuing under the faithful leadership of Evert and Virena Tuning. Two revivals were conducted during the past year, and Everet has inaugurated a home Bible study with the aid of charts that has been acceptably received.

Active interest from the home base has been most encouraging. Fifty-nine churches reported. Three hundred thirteen services featured missionary presentation representing the work in Bolivia and Peru and Sprague River, as well as other fields. A new and growing aspect of missionary emphasis has been the missionary conferences in a number of the local meetings. Twenty-six young people have indicated interest in missionary service. Total giving to the calendar fund was \$3,709.98.

#### Bolivian Field Report

We thank the Lord for His presence and blessing this past year. There has been a multitude of problems, which have, in many cases, been complicated by the instability and corruptions of the society within which we work; but we are grateful that in nearly every instance the Lord has caused the desperateness of the situation to bring glory to His name and magnify His power.

We praise the Lord for the evidence of His care for the physical needs of the personnel, when four of the staff were hospitalized at various times in the past year.

All the missionary families have moved within the past year, with exception of the Roberts.

All the missionary families have been engaged in tent meetings, classes and visitation programs. The response of the Brethren to this kind of effort has been encouraging. The size of our field does not permit the missionaries to reach every point with such services within a one-year period, even with four families active.

Near the end of Junta Anual, the Bolivian Yearly Meeting, we were surprised by a move made to disband the Mesa Directiva as a functioning body. It was proposed that the churches once more become dependents of the mission. Although the official leadership of the National Church was suspended, neither the individual churches nor the quarterly meetings, as organized bodies, have ceased to function.

More and more the national brethren are demonstrating the ability to formulate solutions to the problems of the church independently of the leadership of the missionaries. It is encouraging to hear frequent expressions from the brethren themselves that they should sustain and perform the Lord's work among their own people. The staff has consistently endeavored to foster this spirit and encourages the Nationals to make practical application of their confidence in the Lord.

The Lord has begun to bless the faith and courage of brethren who have stood firm in hard times experienced by a number of churches in previous years. These churches are reviving to new strength and deeper understanding of the working of the Lord in their midst. He is building His church where it appeared that the prince of darkness was prevailing. Many times both the missionaries and the national brethren have wondered if all was lost. Then God shows us that He will prevail. The battle is the Lord's. —Submitted by Mark Roberts, Chairman of the Mission Council.



### Sprague River Mission Report

We give praise to our loving Heavenly Father for His continued mercies.

We have maintained regular services both morning and evening on the Lord's Day and a mid-week prayer service each week with few exceptions. There was an average attendance of thirty at Sunday School, twenty-two in the morning worship service, eighteen in the Sunday evening service, and eleven at prayer meeting. The attendance of those of Indian blood will average a little less than fifty per cent.

We have been having special Bible study in the homes of the unsaved since last March. One Indian family has started coming to the Sunday evening services as a result of these services.

We are closing with a very successful Vacation Bible School. There has been a total enrollment of 48.

We took two teen-age girls to Fir Point Camp. They were both at the altar.

We believe there is much work to be done among the Indians in this area. We appreciate the financial help of the Board of Missions and the many who have prayed.

### Peruvian Mission Field Report

The National Friends Church of Peru has truly become a church in its own right after less than two years of existence.

The work of the past year can be divided into two main divisions—evangelism and spiritual training. Many requests have come asking for the Gospel and have resulted in many conversions. However, it has been disappointing to have many come who seemed interested, only to have them lose all interest when they discovered that there would be no financial or material gain for them.

Spiritual training has been accomplished largely by continuous visits to all churches by the missionary and in special Bible classes and conferences. Although we definitely do not pastor any church, it is necessary to visit regularly in order to teach Bible truths, hymns, and practical Christian living, since we have no older believers or pastors to help teach these essentials. The first yearly meeting was held in April with over 120 attending.

At present, services are being held in nine communities, with a total number of some 140 believers. Most of these groups are quite small but show evidence of becoming established churches.

The Peruvian Friends Church is continuing on a strictly indigenous basis with no financial or material aid being given in any way. God is blessing His work, and has promised greater things for the future. For this we thank and trust Him.

We wish to inform you that in this first yearly meeting we have an attendance of more than 100 brethren and sisters.

"And now all of us thank you for having sent us the missionaries, so that they can teach us about the Gospel of God, because we were lost in sin and did not know about God but now we know the truth and are happy and joyful.

"We send our Christian love and sincerely ask you to help us with prayer so that we will remain faithful to the Lord and will grow more and more.

"We bid you good-bye in the love of the Lord. May God bless you!"

● 106. The report of the Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Union was read and appears as follows:

The Women's Missionary Union members now number over 1,000. There were 96 new members this year and 4 new unions were formed. The hearts as well as the hands of these women reached out this past year to accomplish many tasks in service to their Master. Appreciation is due the many family members of the women, without whose cooperation and encouragement these services could not have succeeded.

A total of \$8,305.75 was contributed to help in the support of varied projects. We support Roscoe and Tina Knight in Peru, and helped in two outposts at home. We gave \$100 per month to the Hayden Lake outpost and \$50 per month to the work at Emmett outpost, both in Idaho. The banquet offering of last Yearly Meeting amounting to \$914.67 was given for improved radio communication for our missionaries. A thank-offering of \$536.80 was designated for literature to be used on our field. The spring-rally project was the purchase of equipment (such as typewriter, record player, slide project, duplicator, visual aids) for use in the new Bible School which Ralph and Marie Chapman desire to establish in Bolivia. This amounted to over \$400.00.

We also purchased furniture for the guest room in the new Pennington Hall at George Fox College. Other projects included help on medical expense of one of our missionary women, aid for two of our pastors in time of accident and loss, also the purchase of two kerosene water heaters for Bolivia. The women also made several hundred garments for the use of our missionary families going to the field and for the Indian missions at Rough Rock and Cottonwood, Arizona. Their services were given in the improvement of church buildings and parsonages, and to families in need. The prayer units were active and faithful in upholding our missionaries and outpost pastors. They sought to increase their knowledge and outlook in the reading of books. The annual retreat continues to be a source of inspiration and instruction.

All of these things were accomplished because each woman was willing to do what she could. We rejoice that we are able to heed the admonition of 1 Kings 8:60, 61, "That all the people of the earth may know that the Lord is God, and that there is none else. Let your heart therefore be perfect with the Lord our God, to walk in His statutes and to keep His commandments."

Approved.

● 107. The following was forwarded from the Board of Missions:

Richard G. Saylor and Celia J. Saylor having defaulted on payments specified in that certain contract between Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, a corporation, and Richard G. Saylor and Celia J. Say-



lor for the purchase of the following described real property: Lots 29-30-31 block 18 Fairport in the city of Portland, County of Multnomah, State of Oregon, Otherwise known as 924 N. Farragut Street, Portland, Oregon.

Be it resolved by said Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church in a regular business session held on the 17th day of August 1963 at Newberg, Oregon that the Trustees of said Yearly Meeting and Everett L. Hackworth, a member of the Board of Missions of said Yearly Meeting be authorized and empowered to enter into negotiations with said Richard G. Saylor and Celia J. Saylor to secure possession of said real property by said Yearly Meeting and if a satisfactory agreement cannot be negotiated to file a foreclosure suit against said Richard G. Saylor and Celia J. Saylor in a court having jurisdiction therein.

Approved.

- 108. The Board of Christian Education recommends the name of Lela Morrill to serve on the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends for a two-year term.

Approved.

- 109. The Board of Christian Education recommends that in the light of cooperative efforts of the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Evangelical Friends be nominated by these two Boards on alternate years. The Board of Publication would nominate a representative next year.

Approved.

- 110. The Board of Christian Education reports that preparations for a series of lessons on Friends doctrines and beliefs to be used in summer camps are in process.

The subjects to be presented are as follows: The Bible—God's Word, The Trinity, Worship, Ordinances, Peace, and Salvation and Sanctification.

The following writers are preparing the various lessons: Edward and Lois Harmon, Phyllis Cammack, David Fendall, Allen Hadley, Howard Harmon, and Lela Morrill.

Approved.

- 111. The Board of Christian Education requests an extension of time to complete the lesson material on Friends doctrines and beliefs as requested by the Yearly Meeting last year.

Approved.

- 112. The Board of Peace and Service nominates Claude Lewis for a three-year term on the Friendsview Manor Corporation.

Approved.

- 113. There being an operational surplus of \$1700 in the United Budget funds of the past fiscal year, the Executive Council recommends that \$900 of this amount be transferred for use by the Board of Publication and that \$300 be transferred for use by the newly established Board of General Education.

Approved.

- 114. The committee named by Salem Quarterly Meeting to consider formation of a quarterly meeting in southern Oregon makes the following report:

We concur in recommending that a quarterly meeting not be organized at this time, since some of our churches are not quite ready.

Since Friends church members, as a whole, in southern Oregon are not able to participate actively throughout the year in Salem Quarterly Meeting affairs and to receive the benefits from these meetings, there has been a feeling that the churches of this area would be profited by

these union meetings once a quarter in lieu of quarterly meetings.

This committee formed a resolution that Ashland outpost, Medford and Talent Monthly Meetings, and Sprague River business meeting have union meetings once a quarter for the purpose of evangelism, of strengthening the departmental work of the church, and of having fellowship with other Christians.

We present this to the Yearly Meeting as a matter of information, as directed by Salem Quarterly Meeting.

- 115. Each year at this time it is the responsibility of the Executive Council to consider the responses of the churches to the proposed United Budget and to make proper apportionment to the various boards of the total amount pledged. Pledges this year amounted to 86 per cent of the proposed budget of \$65,810. The United Budget has been considered in the light of these pledges and is herewith presented to you in final form.

## BOARD OF FINANCE

- 116. The Board of Finance presented the following report:

Fixed Expense money is for the expenses and salaries that the Yearly Meeting feels it should pay if it continues as a live and operating organization. During the past two years there has been a considerable increase in the fixed expense budget due primarily to obligations incurred by the construction and maintenance of the headquarters building and by inclusion in the budget proposed for 1963-64 of \$9,850 that we included in the United Budget for 1962-63 and listed as Operation and Administration. Realizing that there would probably be a considerable increase in a fixed expense budget that would be proposed to the 1963 Yearly Meeting, a letter was sent to each Monthly Meeting notifying them of such a situation. A protest has been received from a monthly meeting regarding the increase and size of the fixed expense budget, and some concern has been expressed by others. The Board of Finance feels that the Yearly Meeting should carefully consider the proposed budget, and any further increase that may be proposed during the next few years. A communication was received from Newberg Monthly Meeting relative to expense incurred in making repairs on the church building in Newberg, and was considered by the board.

The following request to the Board of Finance from the Ministers' Retirement Fund was received by the board:

At a meeting of our complete committee in Portland it was determined we should take some steps to increase the number of participating ministers and up-date other provisions of our program. We hereby request that the Board of Finance authorize us to do the following:

1. Prepare a small explanatory leaflet or brochure which details our Ministers Retirement program fully. This leaflet would clarify the details and procedures of the program and be circularized to our missionaries and ministers for the purpose of increasing membership and participation.

2. Raise from 4 per cent to 6 per cent the interest rate charged to churches on all new loans made from Ministers' Retirement funds.

3. Increase the Yearly Meeting annual contribution from \$300 to \$400 to match the present level of contributions by ministers in conformity with the established policy of our Discipline.

The Board of Finance considered and approved the request.

Approved.

● 117. A reading of the epistles received from the yearly meetings with which we enjoy Christian fellowship reveals a common desire for greater effectiveness by the Church in witnessing to her Lord and Savior. This was expressed in the epistles from California and Indiana, the former acknowledging the significance of the message by the superintendent, "Winning Disciples for Christ and the Church," and the latter expressing what is a common concern among Friends—that more people be called out into the work of the ministry.

Iowa and Ohio honored the Quaker heritage by celebrations and religious pageantry, Iowa on the occasion of its centennial, and Ohio on the occasion of its 150th anniversary.

Kansas' "Program of Progress" included the building of three new meetinghouses in three cities. This serves as a reminder that the witness to Christ must be made where people are, and the church must seek ways to accommodate itself to real human needs and changes. A letter from Elgon Joint Quarterly Meeting of East Africa Yearly Meeting expressed appreciation for the very helpful visitation of Oregon Friends, Fred and Mardella Newkirk, and hope that other such evangelical visitation will help them overcome worldliness and renew their spiritual fervor.

Some epistles majored on social concerns such as integration and efforts for peace. California and Indiana report projects for the construction of homes for the aged.

In reading these epistles we are reminded that where the Holy Spirit is leading, the Church finds great power, great grace, and great unity.

Approved.

● 118. The epistle committee presented the following to be sent to other yearly meetings:

Dear Friends:

"Grace, mercy, and peace, from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord by whom we who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the blood of Christ according to the glorious gospel of the blessed God which was committed to our trust. Be not thou therefore ashamed of the testimony of our Lord."

Oregon Yearly Meeting in its seventy-first session met August 13-18, 1963, in Newberg, Oregon, with deep gratitude to God for His overshadowing presence. In its opening session, Dean Gregory, our General Superintendent, in great earnestness and fervency of spirit called attention to our glorious heritage of faith and to the unprecedented opportunities that are before us. He warned us of the ease with which we may become entangled with the affairs of this world. We should study person-to-person witnessing. Paul wrote to Timothy: "The things which thou has heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also."

The concern for witnessing, so ably stated by our superintendent, re-



ceived expression also in a forthright call for faithfulness to the peace testimony as an integral part of the Gospel, in a message by Clark Smith, clerk of the Ministry and Oversight. Charles Ball, guest speaker from East Whittier, California, renewed our vision for direct evangelism through his clear exposition of the lives of the early disciples.

Reports from Greenleaf Friends Academy and George Fox College indicate a sense of God's providential care and the consecrated stewardship of numbers of God's people.

Throughout the year, and in the sessions of the Yearly Meeting, we have sought ways for greater fellowship with other evangelical yearly meetings. Intervisitation by our young people at summer camps reflects this concern among this group. We praise the Lord for the large number of youth active in serving the Lord. In other ways, too, the church has sought to work more closely and cooperatively with other yearly meetings in missionary and publication programs.

In the report of the committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations, we were reminded that the vision of a Friends Church evangelical in faith and world-wide in scope requires more than policy planning and doctrinal conferences. It requires prayer and yearning for the leadership of the Holy Spirit among Quakers so that our message is not shattered upon the rocks of disbelief and disunity but enhanced by world-wide fellowship and greater efficiency in our organization. This vision requires of us patient searching out of our loyalties to the church. It demands of concerned Friends the studied discipline to learn about other Friends, to feel with them as our brothers in Christ, and to acquaint our families with the denominational heritage which is ours.

We rejoice in the extension of our Bolivian missionary work into neighboring Peru. Some ten meetings have been established in that country and for the first time we received an epistle from the brethren meeting in annual session there.

Approved.

- 119. The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight that they appoint a standing Advisory Committee of Doctrinal Reference, to be composed of not less than three of its members who have full understanding of Friends distinctive doctrines as well as of the great fundamental teachings of evangelical Christianity, and who are in full harmony with the position of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends on these matters. This committee would pass on the doctrinal fidelity of any materials prepared for publication that any agency of the Yearly Meeting might submit to this committee for its approval or suggested revision.

Approved.

- 120. The Meeting on Ministry and Oversight approves the above and nominates the following committee: Glen Rinard, Charles Beals, Paul Mills.

Approved.

- 121. The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight approved the following names to be recorded as ministers of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting: Lloyd Melhorn, Quincy Fodge.

Approved.

- 122. Adjourned to meet 2:30 p. m.

### Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

Charles Ball brought to our attention highlights from the Gospel of John. It is a remarkable and a spiritual gospel. John states the purpose of writing "that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of

God." John is very selective in what he puts in the gospel. Miracles are called "signs" and they had been witnessed by the disciples. John tells the story of Jesus with a difference. John, the man, was probably the youngest disciple; later he became a leader of Jerusalem and a pillar of the church. He had deep spiritual insight. John omits a great many incidents of the life of Jesus, but many new features not found in other gospels are in this one. Facts are conveyed without error. Though it is the most profound of all gospels, it is presented in a simple, straightforward way. Many great claims of Jesus are made, but wonderful offers are made along with them. The gospel is summed up in: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16.

### Saturday, 2:30 p.m.

- 123. Minutes of the morning session were read, corrected and approved.

- 124. Report of Junior Yearly Meeting was read as follows:

Junior Yearly Meeting has been in session five days, 8th month, 13 through 17, 1963. June Kenworthy served as director again this year. Marie Haines had our evangelistic period using stories and hand puppets. We had interesting class periods of crafts, recreation and Bible stories. The class period, called "What Friends Do" had special speakers on missions and hobbies.

We had a record enrollment of 102 with an average attendance of 80 a day. One offering was taken for Spanish books to go to the mission field; \$2.35 was received.

Also new this year was a Junior C. E. class. They had speakers telling about C. E. work.

Business meetings were held four days in which we learned the Friends way of conducting business.

Approved.

- 125. Financial report of George Fox Press was read and will appear in the appendix.

- 126. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of General Education: For three-year term—John Roberts, Lyle Love, Ludlow Corbin; for two-year term—George Moore, Charlton Smitherman, David Beebe; for one-year term—Gertrude Hendricks, Elizabeth Bishop.

- 127. The representatives present the name of Frank Cole for a three-year term as Yearly Meeting Trustee.

Approved.

- 128. The Executive Council recommends approval of the resignation of Philip E. Harmon as a member of the Ministers' Group Insurance Committee.

Approved.

- 129. The Executive Council recommends that Sterling Tucker be appointed to fill the unexpired term of Philip Harmon on the Ministers' Group Insurance Committee.

Approved.

- 130. The Executive Council recommends that Claude Lewis be appointed to a one-year term on the Board of Trustees of Western Evangelical Seminary.

Approved.



● 131. The representatives present the following nominations to the Board of Publication for a three-year term: Harold Antrim, Phyllis Cammack.

Approved.

● 132. The representatives present the following nomination to the Board of Moral Action for a three-year term: Ruth Baker, Lorene Moon, Lois Tish.

Approved.

● 133. The representatives nominate Richard Beebe to the Board of Stewardship to fill the one-year unexpired term of Eugene McDonald.

Approved.

● 134. Greetings from Alden and Esther White were given orally to the meeting.

● 135. Alice Hampton, chairman of the caretakers, presented this report:

We, the caretakers, have endeavored to assist all those present at the 1963 sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends by doing all jobs that were requested of us.

We would like to thank the following people who assisted us: Elma McCracken, Jean Aitken, and Laura Shook.

Approved.

● 136. Oliver Weesner reported that all documents are in the vault at the Newberg Friends Church.

Approved.

● 137. The following report was read:

The representatives have given consideration to the recommendations from the Friends Ecumenical Relations Committee and our representative to the Inter-Yearly Meeting Coordinating Council, as referred to them by the Yearly Meeting, and after prayer and extended discussion bring forward the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that a continuing Friends Ecumenical Relations Committee be instituted, consisting of three members appointed on nomination from the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of one-third expiring each year.

2. We recommend that the Yearly Meeting's representation on the Four-Yearly Meeting Coordinating Council be enlarged to include one member besides our Yearly Meeting superintendent. The member shall be appointed by the Yearly Meeting from nomination by the representatives.

3. It is our proposal that the representatives to the Coordinating Council be designated ex-officio members of the Friends Ecumenical Relations Committee with full voting privilege.

4. We are in further agreement that both the Ecumenical Relations Committee and the Coordinating Council representatives be directly responsible to the Yearly Meeting for separate annual reports, but it is hoped that these reports will be presented to the Yearly Meeting at the same hour and in a coordinated manner.

5. We concur with the recommendation from this year's Friends Ecumenical Relations Committee that the Inter-Yearly Meeting Coordinating Council which currently consists of representatives from the four independent yearly meetings; namely, Ohio, Rocky Mountain, Kansas, and Oregon, concern itself in providing leadership for unity, cooperation, and action among the respective yearly meetings, as outlined in the 1962 Yearly Meeting Minutes, pages 12, 13.

6. We recommend that it be the province of the Friends Ecumenical Relations Committee to give attention to ecumenical relations among Friends in areas as delineated in the 1962 Yearly Meeting Minutes, p. 12,

and more specifically as stated in the committee's recommendations referred to us: namely,

(a) That it function in an advisory capacity to the Coordinating Council representatives,

(b) That this committee seek to encourage and coordinate the ministry of visitation to evangelical Friends bodies both in the United States and abroad.

(c) That this committee begin to lay the groundwork of ideas on church polity and discipline in anticipation of the eventual establishment of a "Friends Church" which is evangelical in faith and world-wide in scope.

(d) That this committee be given the privilege of naming annually one young Friend on a one-year-term basis to serve as a member of its committee.

7. The representatives concur with the recommendation as referred to them that an expense account of \$500 be provided to carry on the work of both this committee and the representatives to the Coordinating Council, with the ecumenical committee being made responsible for its accounting. The representatives have no recommendation as to the ways and means of providing this fund.

Approved.

● 138. The meeting favored correction of an error in the report of the fixed expense account for the 1963-64 budget. With this correction an amount of \$625 less is needed in the total of the fixed expense.

● 139. In view of the preceding minute, it was recommended that the expense account for the Friends Ecumenical Committee and the Coordinating Council, as given in minute 137, be in the fixed expense account.

Approved.

● 140. The United Budget as recorded in minute 115 was approved.

● 141. Approved that the auditors' report shall be added later to the minutes.

Alfred Neal reported for the auditing committee that an audit had been made of the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books.

● 142. The representatives present the following nominations to the church music committee: for a three-year term—Ruth Corbin, Carolann Palmer, Sylvia Littlefield, Quincy Fodge; for a two-year term—Gene Mulkey, Janet Lyda, Leta Hockett; for a one-year term—Phillip Morrill, Lois Jones.

Approved.

● 143. The representatives present the following nomination to the Inter-Yearly Meeting Coordinating Council for a one-year term: Gerald Dillon.

Approved.

● 144. The representatives present the following nominations to the committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations: three-year term—Arthur Roberts; two-year term—Myron Goldsmith; one-year term—Kenneth Pitts.

The representatives suggest that the first named, Arthur Roberts, convene the committee to organize.

Approved.

● 145. Dean Gregory, a member of the Coordinating Council of the four independent yearly meetings, reported to the Board of Missions concerning the United Missionary project. The recommendations are as follows:

1. That a significant united missionary project be selected which would be suitable for general promotion and support throughout the four yearly meetings.

2. That this project be under the direction and responsibility of one of the constituent yearly meetings.



3. That all funds solicited outside the sponsoring yearly meeting be completely voluntary and that these funds be sent through the various yearly meeting treasurers.

4. That the sponsoring yearly meeting be entirely responsible for all promotion and publicity for this project in the interested yearly meetings, and should pay the cost of same. Such publicity shall be freely distributed in any way suitable to the various yearly meetings. The degree and quality of promotion will determine the degree of financial success of the project.

5. That the length of term of support and the number of said projects will be at the discretion of the Inter-Yearly Meeting Coordinating Council.

6. That the Nepal project be adopted which is now being supported by the Ohio Yearly Meeting, with Dr. and Mrs. Ezra DeVol who are entering the Nepal field as medical missionaries. Dr. DeVol is heading up the entire hospital project of the United Mission to Nepal, which is a unified effort supported by a number of missionary organizations.

The Board of Missions agreed to recommend to the Yearly Meeting that these recommendations be approved, and that Oregon Yearly Meeting accept a share of the work in Nepal for one year as another missionary project. The board has designated \$1500 from its budget to implement this project, pending approval of the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

● 146. Financial report of Ministers' Group Insurance was read and appears in the appendix.

Approved.

● 147. The report of the hospitality committee was read as follows: The guests at Yearly Meeting have been cared for as follows: 90 in the four residence halls at George Fox College, and approximately 80 in 35 private homes. There were five trailer houses and three tents on the church grounds.

There were approximately 2,500 meals served during the sessions, and the fine meals are appreciated.

Thanks go to the cooks, the dining hall hostess, the cashier, the young people who served so efficiently, and the adults who so kindly served when the young people were attending their C. E. activities.

Special thanks go to those who provided and arranged the flowers for dining hall and church; to the college maintenance staff for their help in preparing accommodations; to the ladies of Newberg Quarterly Meeting for cleaning the residence halls; to those who opened their homes for guests; to the social committee of Newberg Friends for the daily coffee hours; to the many ladies who helped maintain the nursery during the sessions, and to the many others who have helped in any way in the entertainment of our guests.

Of those attending, 511 have signed the registration book and received identification cards.

Approved.

● 148. The suggestion came from the floor that consideration be given another year to hiring a baby sitter to relieve local women from that responsibility as well as to have the same person in charge every day.

Approved to be forwarded to the Executive Council.

## DISCIPLINE REVISIONS OR AMENDMENTS

(To be clipped and inserted in Discipline)

(See Minutes 1961, pages 47-48, Minute 80)

Part II, Chapter III, Section II, Subsection A, Paragraph 1, line 3, page 89: strike out the words, "the other ministers" and the commas preceding and following. The sentence so amended would then read, "The local meeting on ministry and oversight is composed of the pastor or pastors and the elders and overseers of the monthly meeting."

Part II, Chapter II, Section II, Subsection D, Paragraph 3, second paragraph, line 2, page 47: strike out the word "ministers" and the comma following; strike out also the comma after the word "elders." The sentence so amended would then read: "The pastoral committee of the preparative meeting shall consist of the pastor and the elders and overseers of the monthly meeting who are members of the local congregation."

Part IV, Paragraph 1, page 109, amend to read as follows:

1. THE YEARLY MEETING MINUTES. The responsibility for compiling and processing the annual volume of the Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting shall be as follows:

a. The Minutes Proper. The responsibility for their accurate reproduction is to be carried jointly by the presiding clerk, the recording clerk and the general superintendent. These three shall meet on the day following the close of the Yearly Meeting sessions in order to review the minutes together. In case of question concerning the actions taken or the proper wording of the records, the presiding clerk shall have final authority. The recording clerk shall be responsible for reading the proof after the minutes have been set up for printing.

b. The Appendix and the Directory. The appendix of the annual minutes shall contain a list of the officers of the Yearly Meeting; a list of the ministers; a list of the quarterly meetings with their clerks and times of meeting (with the monthly meetings and their times of meeting listed under each quarterly meeting); a list of the monthly meetings with the names of their pastors, officers and committee chairman; the statistical reports for the year; any other essential information. The directory shall contain the names and addresses of all officers and board members of the meetings and of others whose names appear in the minutes. The assistant recording clerk shall be responsible for receiving and compiling all information for both appendix and directory.



(See Minutes 1962, pages 24-25, Minute 69)

Part II, Chapter III, Section III, Subsection A, Paragraph 1, page 92, be amended to read as follows:

1. COMPOSITION. The quarterly meeting on ministry and oversight is composed of the members of the local meetings on ministry and oversight within its limits and other ministers in the membership of the quarterly meeting.

(Explanation: The amendment which excludes ministers other than the pastor or pastors from the local meeting on ministry and oversight has the effect of excluding them also from the quarterly and yearly meetings on ministry and oversight. This amendment restores them to the quarterly meeting on ministry and oversight without affecting the membership of the local meeting; and at the same time automatically accords them membership in the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight.)

(See Minutes 1962, pages 25-26, Minute 70)

(Explanation: To set up the new Board of General Education, the following changes are necessary in the Discipline.)

On page 71, change "h. PUBLICATION," to "i. PUBLICATION," and insert before it this new material:

h. GENERAL EDUCATION.

(1). The Yearly Meeting Board. The board shall include the chairmen of the various quarterly meeting general education committees, plus an equal number appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

The board shall organize by the appointment of a president, a vice-president, and a secretary. It may appoint other officers and such committees as are needed to carry on its affairs.

The board shall have as its primary function the fostering of education among members and attenders at all levels, from the primary grades through the graduate schools. Specific activities through which this function may be exercised are: (a) the compilation and maintenance of permanent records of the educational status and advancement of children, youth, and adults;

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(b) the promotion of the moral interests of those enrolled in both public and private schools, assisting them to maintain their Christian integrity under all circumstances; (c) the dispensing of information on the scholarship programs in effect in the Yearly Meeting; (d) the promotion of the establishment of new scholarships in Christian schools; (e) the encouraging of attendance at institutions of higher learning on the part of youth and young adults; (f) the maintenance of records of the professional educational activities of the membership and the encouragement of fellowship among them and with those of other established Christian institutions.

The board shall devise methods for promoting the financial and other interests of George Fox College among the monthly meetings. Each member shall endeavor to find opportunity for frequent visitation to the college, seeking on such occasions to sense the tone and atmosphere of the institution in terms of its faithfulness, while providing adequate instruction, in promulgating standards and exercising influences which tend toward well-balanced development of the student in the spiritual, the social, and the moral areas of his life. They shall take note, also, of the degree to which the training provided equips the student for usefulness in the church. In all of these matters they shall be careful to avoid trespass into the realm of responsibility of the college trustees. A report of the visitation and its results shall be prepared annually before the Yearly Meeting sessions, to be submitted to the college board, and, with modifications if necessary, to the Yearly Meeting. Those who have opportunity should include Greenleaf Academy in their visitation, taking note of similar features as evidenced in its program.

The board shall provide plans of action for the guidance of the corresponding committees in the subordinate meetings and such assistance as they may need.

(2). The Quarterly Meeting Committee. Each quarterly meeting shall appoint a general education committee, to be composed of the chairmen of the monthly meeting general education committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as quarterly meeting superintendent of general education and chairman of the committee. The committee shall work in cooperation with the Yearly Meeting board, of which its chairman shall be a member, by active participation in its program.

(3). The Monthly Meeting Committee. Each monthly meeting shall appoint a general education committee. It shall be responsible for the compilation and maintenance of permanent records of educational statistics of both students and teachers in the local membership,



and for cooperating with the quarterly meeting committee and the Yearly Meeting board in the fulfilling of all the various functions. Specifically, it shall promote the moral and educational interests of both young and old, considering each individual of school age its special and personal charge in relation to matters in this realm.

On page 67, beginning in line 12 with "(c) Education," and continuing through "and private schools," in line 19, delete this entire sentence. No further change is necessary.

(See Minutes 1962, page 33, Minute 114.)

Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, Subsection G, page 72, 73, change "3. VARIOUS COMMITTEES" to "4. VARIOUS COMMITTEES," and insert before it this paragraph:

3. BUSINESS COMMITTEE. A standing committee of two shall be appointed on nomination by the Executive Council to expedite the handling of all business during the sessions of Yearly Meeting. All matters of business, including reports, recommendations, proposals, and nominations, shall be referred to this committee in writing. It shall have authority to ask responsible bodies or individuals for prompt submission of essential matters. It shall see that all these are in regular form and determine the time and order of their presentation, forwarding them to the presiding clerk in proper sequence.

In Subsection J, page 75, insert at the close of Paragraph 2 the following sentence:

All matters of business shall be referred to the business committee (see p. 73), which shall then place them in the hands of the presiding clerk in their proper form and sequence.



## YEARLY MEETING ACTIONS

NOT PART OF THE DISCIPLINE

(To be clipped out and pasted in your copy of the Discipline for handy reference)

(See Minutes 1959, page 14, Minute 33) Resident and Non-Resident Members:

Resident members are those to whom the church is reasonably accessible by the ordinary means of travel and who give to it the major part of their attendance and support.

Members who, on account of distance, give attendance and support to another church may be listed as non-resident members.

Where two or more Friends churches are located in such proximity that relative distance is a negligible factor, a member who, without asking for a certificate of transfer, begins attending and supporting another church and continues to do so for six months or more may be listed as non-resident at the time of the annual statistical reckoning.

(See Minutes 1960, page 33, Minute 80) Membership Transfer:

The Monthly Meetings be advised that when a Monthly Meeting receives a request for transfer from any of its active membership, before the transfer is granted, due care be exercised to make sure that the request correctly represents the wishes of those members to be transferred. The Monthly Meeting should be advised further that a request for transfer of associate membership is normally made by the parents or guardian.

(See Minutes 1960, page 33, Minute 81) Membership Basis for Number of Representatives:

The active-resident membership report for the preceding year shall be used as a basis for the number of representatives to which each Quarterly Meeting is entitled.



(See Minutes 1961, page 11, Minute 24) Approval of Annual Reports:

The annual departmental reports should be approved by the Monthly Meeting before being sent to the Quarterly Meeting if possible; if not, they should be approved after Quarterly Meeting with necessary changes forwarded to the respective Quarterly Meeting chairmen.

(See Minutes 1961, pages 58-59, Minute 108) Complimentary Meal Tickets:

Complimentary meal tickets shall be provided for:

1. A. The guest evangelist and members of his family.  
B. All visiting recorded ministers and their spouses from other Yearly Meetings, with minutes.  
C. Visiting representatives from affiliated organizations, such as the National Association of Evangelicals, Western Evangelical Seminary, temperance organizations, etc.  
D. Director of Junior Yearly Meeting.
2. When boards invite workers to serve in a particular capacity, such as workers invited by the Board of Evangelism, etc., the boards involved shall be responsible for the cost of the meal tickets and should take the initiative to see that they are regularly provided.
3. It should be noted that the Discipline makes provision in this regard also. (Read items 3 and 4, page 110)
4. This program shall be administered by the Yearly Meeting recording clerk.

(A clarification of the Discipline in regard to the transfer of ministers as stated at the top of page 83 in the Discipline. This clarification made by the Ministry and Oversight, August 18, 1960)

Recorded ministers of another Yearly Meeting who wish to transfer both their membership and ministerial standing in non-pastoral relationship, to Oregon Yearly Meeting, may do so in the following manner:

1. The certificate of membership sent to the Monthly Meeting where the minister will be in membership must be accompanied by all necessary papers or certificate showing his/her ministerial standing.

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2. The Monthly Meeting clerk, immediately upon receipt of this transfer is directed to send this biographical information relating to his ministerial status, along with a recommendation from the local Ministry and Oversight, to the chairman of the Committee on Ministry of Oregon Yearly Meeting with a request for immediate action by the Yearly Meeting committee. This should be done prior to Monthly Meeting action.

3. The Yearly Meeting Committee on Ministry and the Yearly Meeting Superintendent should be notified immediately by the chairman regarding the request and the status of the minister. In normal cases, an immediate reply by mail will suffice to give the sense of the committee in regard to the question. In some cases, a special called meeting may be necessary. When the decision has been reached by the committee, the Monthly Meeting clerk should be notified immediately. It should be borne in mind that unnecessary delay in processing this matter may be an embarrassment and a hindrance to both the new minister and the church receiving his membership. Therefore, attention should be given promptly to this matter. However, it should be recognized by all that the Committee on Ministry has every right to be fully satisfied in the matter before making a decision.

4. The Monthly Meeting clerk, upon receipt of a letter from the Yearly Meeting Committee on Ministry, may then present to the Monthly Meeting both the transfer of membership and ministerial status with the above letter for official action by the Monthly Meeting. The minister in question is then officially recognized as a recorded minister of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Notification of this action should be sent to the meeting sending the transfer of membership and ministerial standing in order that the minister's name may be removed from its list.
