Minutes

Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

1965

- 1. The seventy-third session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened August 17, 1965 in Newberg, Oregon, following the recent seventh triennial conference of the Association of Evangelical Friends. We are urged by that body to "work toward and pray for a more fully united Friends Church, evangelical in nature and world-wide in scope." As we conduct our business, and worship together, "May it all our powers engage, to do our Master's Will."

Herschel Thornburg led the congregation in singing "Come Thou Almighty King."

Charles Ball, pastor of Newberg Friends Church, offered prayer.

- 2. Clynton Crisman, Acting Superintendent, brought greetings from our General Superintendent, Dean Gregory, who is prevented by illness from attending Oregon Yearly Meeting this year. After summarizing his activities during the year, he brought the keynote address. A summary follows:

In Matthew 5:13-16 Jesus is speaking of our influence. We are to be the salt and light in the world. We are living in a dark hour, illustrated by the recent riots in Los Angeles, the new morality and the increase in crime. Perhaps in the past some social evils were the result of empty stomachs, but today it has been suggested that there are empty heads and, we know, empty hearts. Where is the light to lighten these darkened communities? Jesus said, "The city which is set upon a hill cannot be hid." The early church did not depend on clever publicity to win men to faith in Christ but let their lives shine as lights which drew men. Perhaps the early Friends had more publicity than they wished as many suffered persecution for their witness.

All men will not come to the light because, as the Bible says, some men "love darkness rather than light." But some will respond. Why is our growth so painfully slow? We have gained around sixty new members this year. It would appear that it takes a hundred Friends to win one. There was a hopeful desire for renewal from within expressed at the Haviland Conference. We may have tended to blame other groups of Friends for our shortcomings and hoped revival would begin with them. Are we hiding our light under a bushel?

Half the world's population is under twenty-five years of age. We need to challenge youth with the Gospel that is worth giving their lives for.

Many congregations in our country are without ministers. This is deplorable as it has been said that "if it doesn't happen in the local church, it doesn't happen." We need to organize to "take care of" growth, not just to stimulate it.

"That they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven" is the most important purpose for letting our light shine. There are many hungry hearts all about us. It is our task to reach them.

Dorwin Smith expressed the concern that we carry the theme of this message through Yearly Meeting and as we go back to our communities.

After a time of waiting in the presence of the Holy Spirit, Herschel Thornburg led in prayer.

● 13. The session opened with the singing of the gospel song, "Be Like Jesus." Frederick Baker led in prayer.

● 14. The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

Levi Pennington urged that those who speak in meeting raise their voices so all can hear.

● 15. The resignation of Richard Eichenberger from the Board of Publication because he is now an employee of Barclay Press was read.

● 16. A resignation from the Board of General Education was read from John M. Roberts.

Approved.

● 17. The resignation of Lawrence McCracken from the Board of Missions was read.

Approved.

● 18. The resignation of Clyde E. Miller from the Board of Stewardship was read.

Approved.

● 19. The Treasurer's report was read. This report appears in the appendix.

Approved.

● 20. Dorwin Smith reported that Roger and Mildred Minthorne had indicated that this was their last year as treasurers. They have served fourteen years. He suggested that we express our appreciation for their outstanding contribution in a letter from the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

● 21. The problem of filling the vacancy of treasurer was discussed. It was suggested that the representatives appoint a committee to study

this problem and then bring back recommendations to the Yearly Meeting.
Approved.

- 22. The Committee on Discipline Revision presents, with a recommendation for final favorable action, the matter given preliminary approval a year ago and recorded in minute 24, page 8, of the Yearly Meeting Minutes of 1964. It reads as follows:

For paragraph 5, page 110, Relation to George Fox College, substitute the following wording: "All trustees of the College are elected by the Yearly Meeting. Of the total of forty-two, not more than fourteen are elected each year for terms of three years. These are nominated as follows: Not more than six by Oregon Yearly Meeting; not more than six by the College board of trustees; not more than two by the College alumni association. Members to fill vacancies occurring otherwise than by expiration of term are nominated by the group entitled to representation by the original nomination."

- 23. The Committee on Discipline Revision, although not requested to take any action in this case, does take note of the matter recorded in minute 51, page 13, Minutes of 1964.

The committee recommends that the reference to Christian Endeavor found in the Historical Statement of the Constitution and Discipline on page 10 be altered to read: "Beginning with the Twin Rocks Conference in 1918 as a Yearly Meeting Christian Endeavor (now Friends Youth) project, the activity has expanded . . ."

The five instances on pages 64, 65, and 81 present no problem except that the word "Union" should be eliminated in line 13 on page 64. The committee notes that the phrase "quarterly meeting superintendent" in line 3, page 65, is now obsolete in view of the fact that the young people have felt that the word "president" is more appropriate. We recommend that this change be made as a simple typographical correction rather than as an amendment.

Approved.

- 24. The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting that an amendment be made to the Constitution and Discipline to be worded in essence as follows:

Incorporation: Monthly Meetings are at liberty to incorporate provided they adopt Articles of Incorporation pursuant to the form approved by Oregon Yearly Meeting, which makes clear the position of the Monthly Meeting as a part of and subordinate to the Yearly Meeting as governed by the Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

It was suggested that the matter be referred to the Committee on Discipline Revision. (See minute 73)

Approved.

- 25. The Ministry and Oversight compiled into one document the steps necessary for the recording of ministers. This has been approved by the Ministry and Oversight and directed to be sent to the Yearly Meeting for approval and mimeographing.

Approved.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

- 26. Jack Willcuts, president, indicated how the work of this board supplements many of our departments and extends the outreach of the Yearly Meeting. The newest publication is ACCENT on Friends Youth, official organ of the Youth Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alli-

ance. He introduced the staff of Barclay Press—as many as our missionaries on the field—several doing this work at considerable sacrifice.

Harlow Ankeny, manager of Barclay Press, reported on developments during the year. The purchase of a new offset press has increased the quality and variety of production. A vacuum frame has been added to the process camera, which makes it possible to produce better halftone pictures. Some remodeling has been done to increase efficiency. Another new publication is Reach and Teach, a bi-monthly idea booklet for Sunday School workers for the Christian Education Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. Some of our standard publications have been revived and reprinted in new format.

Jack Willcuts reported that The Adult Friend and a guest quarterly replacing Quaker Leaflets will now be printed by Barclay Press. We can look for wider service among evangelical Friends across the country.

- 27. Dr. Paul P. Petticord, president of Western Evangelical Seminary spoke on behalf of the institution. He emphasized the importance of passing on the Bible and its truths to the next generation. We need effective Sunday Schools, colleges, etc., but we also need seminary-trained ministers to go back into the churches to preach the Word of God.

This is the nineteenth year of W.E.S. Fifteen of her graduates are ministers of Oregon Yearly Meeting and other yearly meetings. Other Friends have attended some. There will be twelve Friends students this year, three staff members and four trustees. There will be a meeting next month of leaders of denominations using the Seminary with its board of trustees to evaluate and plan for the future.

- 28. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

- 29. The meeting opened with a brief musical devotional by Herschel Thornburg.

- 30. The minutes of the morning session were read, corrected and approved.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

- 31. Merle Green, president of the board, presented the following report:

The Board of Peace and Service is of a strong persuasion that the peace section of our Constitution and Discipline contains a vital and important doctrine of the Christian faith. We would encourage every member of Oregon Yearly Meeting to review the statement on peace as found in the Discipline. We quote only a part of the opening sentence. "We feel bound explicitly to avow our unshaken persuasion that all war is utterly incompatible with the plain precepts of our divine Lord and Lawgiver, and the whole spirit of the Gospel."

Our Christian duty and obligation is not fully discharged by only giving out the Gospel. We cannot say "go thou and be fed," and at the same time have no compassion. May the term "service" never become archaic or "dry morsel" on our table.

To promote these two areas of ministry:

Peace — 43 churches report the following:

For the cause of peace and their convictions—

57 young men have registered as C. O. 's, and

9 are now performing their civilian work.

51 sermons were preached emphasizing peace.

11 presentations on peace were made in our worship services.

13 presentations on peace were given in Sunday School. Several meetings had discussion groups and classes on peace.

14 meetings observed Peace Emphasis Week.

Service — Oregon Yearly Meeting ministered to the needs of both the home and foreign fields.

Home: While several churches did not keep any record of their services, 30 churches reported giving aid to families who had loss by flood, fire, tornado, death and sickness. More than \$1,200 was given to relieve the needs of our fellow men in America. Twenty-four meetings gave out a total of 60 Thanksgiving boxes, and 20 meetings presented 31 Christmas boxes. Fifteen churches reported giving help to city missions in cash and materials.

Foreign: Surely the Judge of nations can say of Oregon Yearly Meeting "well done, thou good and faithful" as we are judged for our benevolence to foreign nations. Our goal as a Yearly Meeting this past year was the shipping of four car loads of food overseas. The response was very good, and \$2,690.77 were given by 30 churches, the equivalent of the car loads of food. The amount of \$719.00 was given for other foreign relief. More than 800 pounds of clothing were shipped overseas.

"Let us therefore follow after the things which make for peace, and the things wherewith one may edify another." Romans 14:19

Merle Green urged all meetings to maintain a strong committee of Peace and Service.

Stanley Perisho underlined the fine response to the appeal for money to buy food for overseas relief. This program will be continued this year. The launching date for the appeal will be December 5. Money should be in by March 1.

Rolland Hartley spoke from his social work experience on the problem of foster home care. There are many children who are being deprived of the right to consideration for their dignity and worth. Homeless children need adequate and permanent homes. It is a great service to take in foster children or to adopt them.

Peter Snow discussed a potential relationship with the Mennonite Central Committee's PAX, Teachers Abroad Program, and voluntary service opportunities in this country, such as hospital, psychiatric ward and mental health work, for recommendation to our C. O. boys. We do not have a regular outlet for them. PAX places C. O. 's in places both abroad and in this country which are satisfactory with Selective Service and satisfying to us as Christians. TAP places single and married teachers abroad, mainly in Africa now.

The board has discussed what we should do as Christians in situations such as the current riots in Los Angeles. Beyond our reaffirmation of the Constitution and Discipline statement on race relations in last year's sessions, we need to think about what we would do should similar crises arise in our communities. We need to prepare ourselves to do something positive and not stand idly by.

Approved.

● 32. The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting that the Board of Peace and Service, acting on behalf of the Yearly Meeting, be authorized to cooperate with the Mennonite Central Committee to the extent of using PAX, TAP and possible other volunteer programs as an outlet for C. O. alternate service and as work for others who desire to serve in this way. This cooperation would also include using the M. C. C. promotional material and the screening of our candidates for service in their program.

Approved.

● 33. A resignation, because of illness, was read from Esther Cossel from the representative body. This was referred to the representatives. Approved.

● 34. Arthur O. Roberts presented the report of the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations as follows:

The Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations met six times during the year to accomplish its tasks. These tasks were set forth in a general way when in 1961 Oregon Yearly Meeting first approved these principles for the recovery of denominational vision:

1. To strengthen such bonds of unity as we now have.
2. To define our doctrines.
3. To work toward the establishment of a Friends Church worldwide in scope and evangelical in nature.

We gave attention to a study of the organizational problems of the Friends Church according to directions given at last Yearly Meeting. We hope to continue this study during the next year.

We were allotted \$500 through Fixed Expense by action of the Yearly Meeting. It has been expended in the following ways:

Specific activities of an ecumenical nature with which we have been related in one way or another, and which concern Oregon Yearly Meeting are as follows:

1. In response to an earlier concern of this committee and under the direction of the pastors of each yearly meeting, a joint Oregon-California Pastor's Conference was held in May. One hundred and twenty pastors and wives gathered from the two yearly meetings for the first such conference in our history. In the judgment of all concerned, this was a highly significant meeting in which the presence and leadership of the Holy Spirit were felt. This is one of the ways by which we have sought to strengthen the bonds of Christian fellowship in our denomination.

2. We gave encouragement and financial aid to Lonny Fendall, who spent some time travelling among Friends in Africa and the Orient in addition to having spent the year in Ghana on a Rotary fellowship.

3. We gave counsel to the Evangelical Friends Alliance representatives, Gerald Dillon and Dean Gregory, who met with us and shared their problems and concerns.

4. Several of our committee attended the seventh triennial conference of Evangelical Friends, which met at Haviland, Kansas, in July. It should be reported that people were generally enthusiastic that these conferences be continued, feeling that the Association serves a unique function in lifting up the evangelical nature of the Friends Church and providing a way by which those within the Friends United Meeting (Five Years Meeting) and those in independent yearly meetings can share their vision of the renewal of the Friends Church. The administrative board is launching a full drive for increased membership and participation in the Association of Evangelical Friends. Gerald Dillon, a member of Oregon Yearly Meeting, after 12 years has stepped down as president of the Association. Harold Winn, of Ohio Yearly Meeting, is the new president. Charles Ball of Oregon is vice-president. The administrative board also approved a conference on doctrine and has placed the care for the calling of this

conference in the hands of two members of this Yearly Meeting, Gerald Dillon and Arthur Roberts. This calls for a small group of theologians and Bible students to meet together in Colorado sometime this next year.

5. We gave encouragement and financial assistance to those planning for and carrying out the Friends Youth Leadership Conference, which met in Colorado in July of this year. From all indications this was a most successful youth conference. They indicate that much of the responsibility for bringing about a fully united Friends Church is in the hands of our youth.

Approved.

- 35. The Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations recommended that Ronald Stansell be our Friends Youth representative on this committee.

Approved.

- 36. The Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations recommended that the Yearly Meeting give favorable consideration to the Evangelical Friends Alliance proposed constitution. Gerald Dillon gave a report of the E. F. A. conference held at Colorado Springs in January, when the constitution was compiled. He suggested that action on it be deferred until a business session on Friday. (See minute 71)

Approved.

- 37. Wilmer Brown, northwest field representative of the National Association of Evangelicals, spoke. As he represents Friends and other groups, he endeavors to follow these convictions as stated by A. W. Tozer: "We should be bold without becoming brazen; we should be frank without being rude; in a world of conflict we need to be careful not to become suspicious; in our efforts to be conscientious we must not become over-scrupulous; in this serious hour we must not become too somber." N. A. E. has produced a new film, Anything Can Happen, which will be available for showing in the fall. We must hold up and emphasize our evangelical distinctives.

- 38. The meeting adjourned to meet Thursday at 9:15 a. m.

- 40. The minutes of the last business session were read and approved with one correction.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 41. The Board of Evangelism report given Wednesday evening by Charles Beals, president, was commended. The report follows:

It is with excitement that our Board of Evangelism submits this year's report—and for several reasons. Last year, you heard us say that the Meridian, Idaho, congregation was worshipping in a rented hall. Tonight, we report that those dedicated people, under the able leadership of pastor Dorwin Smith, are now holding services in a beautiful new sanctuary.

Twelve months ago our annual report made reference to a "recent development which has promise for a thriving church" in what we vaguely termed the "Milwaukie-Oak Grove" area near Portland.

Today, a group of fifteen wage-earning families with pastor-elect Howard Harmon and organizational administrator George Palmer are inviting the residents of the fast-growing Clackamas Park community, located near Portland, to their first public worship service on Sunday,

September 12, to be held in their new, attractive, and completed church edifice on a five-acre site procured within the year.

Hopeful prospect for the growth of this church development was evidenced when Youth Ambassador Jonathan Bishop, in house-to-house visitation in that community this summer in preparation for the church opening, discovered twelve non-Friends families who are good prospects for joining the congregation.

To what do we, as a board, attribute the amazing success of the Meridian and Clackamas Park ventures? To the leading and enabling of the Spirit of God, to be sure; also, to local nuclei of dedicated, self-sacrificing men and women with a vision and faith.

Included, also, is the uniting of the entire Yearly Meeting with these dedicated congregations. And this is how: First, it is recorded in last year's Yearly Meeting Minutes that you gave approval to the stated policies of the Board of Evangelism, one of which reads as follows: "That in an ideal church extension work, it is better to carry on a crash program of major financial assistance from the Yearly Meeting to a mission church in order for it to get on its feet and become self-supporting in a relatively short time so that attention may be given to another."

This is what we, as your board, have tried to do in the case of these two new churches. With funds allocated to us from the United Budget, which is your tithe offerings entrusted to us, we gave each of these congregations \$6,000 to match respective \$6,000 sums contributed from among their own memberships. Also we provided from the same fund enough money to make a sizeable down payment on property and to cover the first thousand dollars for architect's fees. Besides this we featured these new outposts on Yearly Meeting Sundays, to which you individually made special contributions of approximately \$2,500 each. A Share Call was made for Meridian and another is forthcoming for Clackamas Park. As a further aid, Meridian received a loan from the Friends Church Extension Foundation of \$13,000 and Clackamas Park procured a loan from Portland First Federal Savings and Loan with the Portland First Friends Church signing the mortgage note, and the Board of Evangelism guaranteeing payments.

We observe that should anyone question our procedure on the grounds that it is not good for a church to have "everything handed out to them," we would remind you that not only have these congregations raised their \$6,000 matching fund—and Meridian much more—but it is in the plan for both of these meetings to amortize their indebtednesses without long time additional help from the Yearly Meeting.

This report is not complete without paying tribute to such men as Warren Moor, who donated weeks of time on construction at both places, and to others who worked for nominal wages out of devotion to God and the spreading of the Gospel.

While on the subject of a "crash program policy," we report another area of implementation. The board felt that if the pastor of the Tigard Preparative Meeting could be relieved from bus driving, etc., so that he could give full time to his pastoral duties, the church would benefit markedly. So, we allocated from our portion of the United Budget a rather large sum, shown in the treasurer's report, to that meeting in order that he could be on a full minimum salary basis. We are happy to report in this one year Tigard has been built up to the extent that they can continue their pastor on this salary scale without any financial assistance from our board for the coming year.

In working with Meridian, Clackamas Park, and Tigard, we have not neglected other newer meetings, for we have given pastoral salary subsidy to five others. We have also made outpost pastoral reappointments

as follows: Dorwin Smith to Meridian, Howard E. Harmon to Clackamas Park, Allen Cole to Emmett, Dan Nolta to Svensen, Donald Lamm to Quincy, Charles Mylander to Ashland, May Wallace to Agnew, and Zenas Perisho to Timber.

Nor have we failed to give attention to the needs of older established monthly meetings that are facing financial dilemmas. Our first consideration always is to work with them to discover ways and means whereby they may solve their own problems without direct financial assistance by our board. A case in point is that of a certain monthly meeting which appealed to us last year for financial help. We named a special committee who met with a very discouraged group—discouraged even to considering the closing of their doors. However, following encouragement to make special financial appeals to their congregation and with arrangements made for procuring a loan, within their ability to amortize, from the Friends Church Extension Foundation, they responded, took heart, their spirits rallied, their faith in the enabling power of God was revived, and with new dedication they paid off past debt obligations, repaired and remodelled their church building, all without subsidy from our board, and have entered with new optimism into a continued ministry to their community. We are reporting this to point up the fact that our board is not only interested in founding new churches but with keeping the established churches strong also.

Another facet of our report which gives us excitement is the part our Friends Youth are playing in their volunteer service program under the sponsorship of the Board of Evangelism. We have reported in the past on the foreign Youth Ambassador program and the summer Youth Ambassadors. In the foreign program, it was Charles Mylander to the Bolivian and Peruvian mission field last summer. Ronald Stansell has just returned from service there this summer. Lonny Fendall, who studied this year in the Institute of African Relations at the University of Ghana in Africa under the Rotary International Fellowship program, entered a Friends Youth Ambassador relationship by visiting Friends missions in Kenya and Burundi in Africa, Taiwan, and elsewhere, enroute home.

Our Youth Ambassadors in the homeland this summer are: In Washington, Barbara Baker to Rosemere Friends Church in Vancouver, Nancy Forsythe to Seattle Friends Memorial, James Libby to Agnew, and Jonathan Newkirk to Vancouver First Friends. To the Idaho churches, Marita Cammack at Nampa, Sharon Ehler to Boise, Rick Raml to Whitney, Kent Thornburg to Hayden Lake. And to Oregon churches, Jonathan Bishop to Clackamas Park, Daniel Cammack to Portland First Friends, Harold Clark to Silverton, Mary Gallaway to Springbrook, Howard Macy to Medford, Philip Morrill to Sherwood, Stanley Thornburg to Rosedale, Marlene West to Lynwood and David Sonntag to Piedmont.

Two from our board, Clynton Crisman and Charles Beals, attended the Commission on Evangelism of the Evangelical Friends Alliance at Colorado Springs. Three recommendations came from this commission—first, that the four member Yearly Meetings, through the Alliance, look towards a united church extension project; second, to scheduling and supporting an evangelist-at-large, and third to enter into a united program whereby local churches may be guided in self-study for the purpose of stimulating new life and growth in our older, established churches.

Two Share Calls were made this year, one for Meridian's new edifice, and the other for South Salem's new educational unit. We also reviewed our Share program and prepared a revised statement of policy, which was printed in the NORTHWEST FRIEND.

In essence, the purpose of the Share program is (1) to make money available for construction projects which otherwise would be impossible to complete, (2) to encourage sound planning of completely equipped plants. Priority in selecting beneficiaries of Share is to be in this order:

1. New church construction in new areas,
2. Completion of unfinished units,
3. Additional building facilities in a rapidly expanding work.

Share money is not to be used for purchasing land nor constructing parsonages.

Although the Friends Church Extension Foundation is a separate corporation, it comes under the aegis of the Board of Evangelism in that the latter approves all candidates to the corporation membership, and it nominates half of the directors.

In reporting for the Foundation, we have distributed to you their balance sheet, which will be printed in the Yearly Meeting Minutes. The Foundation entered into a long-term contract with the Ministers' Retirement Fund Committee whereby the latter has loaned to the Foundation, on a long-term basis, \$18,257.63 of their assets for management and reinvestment. This, as the balance sheet will show, along with gifts, loans, and earnings has increased the working capital from \$54,211.31 to \$76,601.32.

Finally, it should be said that your board has attempted to administer the pastoral, evangelism and church extension program within the policies as set forth by the Yearly Meeting. Being subordinate to the Yearly Meeting, we stand ready to receive any directions which you may make. To local Evangelism chairmen who have written suggestions in the spaces provided by us in the report forms, we report that we will give serious consideration to each one at our board retreat this coming October.

Approved.

- 42. The representatives presented the following nomination to the Executive Committee of the Evangelical Friends Alliance: Gerald Dillon.
Approved.

- 43. The representatives presented the following nomination to the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations for three years: Myron Goldsmith.

Approved.

- 44. The report and financial statement of George Fox Press were read. The financial report will appear in the appendix.

Approved.

- 45. The report of the Church Music Committee was read as follows:

Next to the ministry of the Word, we believe the ministry of music to be the most important part of a church service. Because of this, great care, thought and prayer should go into the music activities of any church, whether large or small. At least a tithe of the membership should be participating in some way in the music of the church. We are gratified to note from the reports that the number of choir singers exceeds the tithe of the total membership of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Add to this number those who do not have opportunity to participate in choir but are giving themselves unselfishly to song leading, accompanying and special music, and the number will far exceed one tenth of our membership.

Interest is picking up and more inquiries are coming to the committee than ever before for help in music problems. We are gratified to be able to help advise in the purchase of hymn books and organs and to recommend music and give whatever other suggestions we are able to give.

Your music committee has carried on the following activities this year:

"The Music Box" column has continued to appear periodically.

We seek to promote March as Music Month in order to bring to the attention of the people the importance of music and to deepen appreciation for the great hymns of the church. Twelve churches observed Music Month this year.

The film strip and record, "Great Hymns of the Church," has been loaned out several times and continues to be available to those who wish it.

A choir conference was held for the first time with nine churches represented in attendance. On March 6 the conference met at Vancouver First Friends Church for an afternoon and evening of clinic, workshops, panel discussions and festival program. Four choirs made up the mass choir, which sang three numbers under the direction of Ernest Lichti, professor of music at George Fox College.

There were 22 entries in the song writing contest this year. The committee is making plans to publish the best of three years' entries in a collection to be made available to the public.

There were 47 meetings reporting; seven of these had not reported last year. Five who reported last year did not report this year. In order to get as complete a picture as possible we have used data from last year's report for these five meetings. Thus, the report covers 52 meetings.

Regular choirs	18	with 260 singers
Seasonal choirs	13	with 218 singers

This makes a total of 31 choirs with approximately 478 singers.

This is six choirs and about 100 singers less than last year.

There were 18 youth and children's choirs with about 300 singers.

Thirty churches now have some kind of electric organ, as compared to 26 last year and 19 the year before.

There were 23 presentations of cantatas or oratorios.

Fifteen churches used the Church Musicians' Handbook.

Approved.

Levi Pennington commented that this report would have sounded strange 100 years ago. Appreciation was expressed for the work of this committee.

● 46. The report of the Trustees was read as follows:

The assessment for the Fourth Street pavement was \$1,760.40, and one-half was paid by Newberg Monthly Meeting and one-half by the Yearly Meeting treasurer.

Ten yards of rock were spread on the headquarters building parking lot. The outside wood finish of the headquarters building has been painted. The cost of these improvements has been paid by the Yearly Meeting treasurer.

Several pieces of glass in a door and windows of the headquarters building were damaged recently by air rifle shot. The guilty parties have been referred by the Newberg Police to the Juvenile Court.

Newberg Monthly Meeting is considering plans for the repair and improvement of the Newberg church building; however, the Meeting has not yet adopted any plan.

Barclay Press has paid rent to December 1, 1964. The manager has assured us that he expects to be able to pay the arrears in the near future.

The Trustees approved plans for certain changes and improvements in the interior of the part of the headquarters building occupied by the Barclay Press with the understanding that the Trustees had no funds available to pay for the materials and labor. The management of the Barclay Press has had the changes and improvements satisfactorily completed.

Payments have been made on the sale contract of the apartment building in Portland each month. The balance on the contract as of July 10, 1965, is \$18,937.60

The balance of the mortgage on the headquarters building in favor of

the United States National Bank of Oregon as of August 1, 1965, is \$21,562.51. Other notes outstanding for funds used in the construction of the headquarters building are as follows:

Application has been made to the City of Portland to bond the sewer assessment against the Maplewood church property.

The Bethany church property in Seattle has been leased for a period of five years to an independent church organization at Bethany.

The following documents authorized by the Executive Council have been signed:

A mortgage on the church property of South Salem Meeting for \$39,000 in favor of Portland Federal Savings and Loan Association.

A mortgage on the church property of the Talent Meeting for \$10,000 in favor of the Jackson County Federal Savings and Loan Association, Medford, Oregon.

A mortgage on the Quincy parsonage property for \$12,300 in favor of the Quincy Branch of National Bank of Commerce of Seattle.

A supplemental agreement between Oregon Yearly Meeting and the Wenatchee Federal Savings and Loan Association increasing the mortgage on the East Wenatchee church property to \$15,000.

A mortgage on the church property in Portland bought by the Mission Board for the Korean Church in the amount of \$5,500 due on September 1, 1965, in favor of Tabor Heights Evangelical United Brethren Church, Title and Trust Co. of Portland as trustee.

The Trustees declined to sign quit claim deeds to certain properties in Scotts Mills, Oregon, the deeds to which contain a provision that if ever intoxicating liquors were manufactured or sold on the properties that the then legal representatives of the Friends Church in Oregon could immediately take possession of the property involved. Our attorney held that it was extremely doubtful that Oregon Yearly Meeting could gain possession of a property under the terms of such a reversion clause to a third party who has no equity in the property. The Trustees were of the opinion that since application had already been made to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission for a license to sell liquor on one of the properties involved and since members of the Trustees have opposed the sale of intoxicating liquors and have opposed in local option elections and before the Liquor Control Commission the issuing of certain liquor licenses they could not consistently and with a clear conscience sign such a quit claim deed, and believed that a Court should render a decision as to the legality of said reversion provision.

A suit in equity was filed in the Marion County Circuit Court by the owners of certain properties in Scotts Mills naming Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, its Trustees, its legal representative, its General Superintendent, and all other parties concerned as defendants and praying that the Court declare the reversion provision in the deeds to be null and void and to quiet titles in favor of the plaintiffs. The Trustees filed no answer to the complaint, and have not been informed regarding any decision that the Court may have rendered.

Approved.

Commendation for the stand of the Trustees in declining to sign the quit claim deed was expressed from the floor.

● 47. The Executive Council presented the following recommendation to the Yearly Meeting:

Past experience of the Board of Evangelism and Trustees relative to

church organization and properties reveals the need for the Yearly Meeting office to have on file copies of certain legal documents. Therefore, the Executive Council recommends that the Yearly Meeting authorize the collection of copies, photostatic or otherwise, of all articles of incorporation, deeds, debentures, and other official documents relating to all church-owned property in the Yearly Meeting to be filed in the Yearly Meeting headquarters, with costs to be borne by the Board of Evangelism.

If this recommendation is approved, we further propose that the Board of Evangelism be assigned responsibility for implementing this action.

Approved.

- 48. Reports of the state of the churches from Inland and Newberg Quarterly Meetings were read.

Approved.

Gerald Dillon remarked that some of these reports are summaries and some are compilations. What is our purpose for having these reports? Does this method achieve the purpose? Perhaps a study needs to be made of this matter.

- 49. The Executive Council unitedly recommends to the Yearly Meeting the calling of Dean Gregory as general superintendent for the coming year on limited activity status, giving his attention to administration of the Yearly Meeting office. This action will be reviewed at mid-year Executive Council meeting to determine what degree of responsibility our superintendent is able to assume at that time.

The Executive Council further recommends the following salary arrangement:

Approved.

- 50. The Executive Council unitedly recommends to the Yearly Meeting the calling of Clynton Crisman as assistant superintendent for the period September 1, 1965 to June 15, 1966, to function in the capacity of acting superintendent. This action will be reviewed at mid-year Executive Council meeting.

We further recommend the following salary arrangement:

Approved.

The meeting gave a standing expression of appreciation for the good work of Clynton Crisman and his wife Marjorie.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

- 51. Myron Goldsmith, president, presented the report of the Board of Moral Action, which is summarized as follows:

Comparison of Moral Action work reported in the Yearly Meeting this year with previous years indicates that there has been a steadily rising concern about the moral problems which beset our members, and in general, in increase in efforts to make sure that our moral standards are in keeping with moral obligations laid down in Scripture. However, there remain pockets of seeming indifference and unconcern—indicated by occasional meetings which report nothing done about serious moral problems in their midst and some quarterly meetings which seem simply to have never quite got around to starting the promotion of moral action in their areas. Consequently our board has been concerned during these

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sessions to make sure that our moral action leadership is suited to the moral problems facing our churches. We are looking into the relation between spiritual life and moral action or inaction. We are pondering the means for arousing every local meeting into vigorous and aggressive action, for we know that every community confronts our members and especially youth with moral pitfalls.

Meanwhile, we are glad to report that in the Public Morals department, reports were received from 80 per cent of the meetings. Presentations of Public Morals problems totaled 378, an average of nearly eight per reporting meeting, including at least an average of two sermons on the subject and an average of more than three references in other sermons. We are glad for this evidence of alertness to moral issues upon the part of our pastors. One-half of the reporting churches and one-third of all meetings observed Commitment Day and Youth Temperance Education Week, giving out 1,583 abstinence pledges—nearly double the number of last year. Over 6,000 alcohol education brochures were financed and mailed to schools and churches in the Yearly Meeting. Tracts distributed about moral action issues totaled nearly 2,000.

There was an increased interest in having classes about morality taught in the summer camps, and nearly a dozen classes were reported as planned for this summer. Twenty-one young people and six adults attended temperance camps in one of the three states. Two young women won scholarships from the board for the best letters on "Why I Would Like to Go to a Temperance Camp." They are Dorothy Ball of Silverton, who became an outstanding camper at the Oregon camp and received a grade of 100 per cent on the final quiz, and Cathy Clites of Metolius Friends Church who was elected "Queen of Total Abstinence." The Idaho camp also elected one of our Friends girls as queen, Susan Bloomer of Whitney Friends. One-third of all the meetings in the Yearly Meeting showed special concern for the teaching of the sacredness of marriage by sermons reported on the subject, through counseling and lessons. In view of the pervasive sexual immorality which confronts our youth in high schools and higher public schools, we urge the other two-thirds of our meetings to action on this front.

One-half of our meetings report action in the legislative field in the form of letters written about moral issues, the supplying of election materials, bulletin information and the visiting of state legislatures. Idaho members worked hard, but were unsuccessful in repealing their pari-mutuel law. Oregon reports that a number of bad bills lost out in the legislature, and there were other victories for dry forces, particularly in the passing of a bill for implied consent to chemical tests for drinking drivers. The Moral Action Board purchased two new filmstrips with records about gambling and other vices. The NORTHWEST FRIEND was used to inform the membership regularly, and pastors and moral action chairmen received three mailings with samples of new literature and other important information.

Reports received in our Literature department indicate that many of our churches are concerned about providing the right kind of reading material for their members, and in educating them to choose worthwhile materials for reading.

However, reports indicate that our meetings need to be more diligent in speaking out against obscenity on the newsstand. Much could be accomplished by individuals protesting to the managers who display obscene literature and in commending those who refrain from carrying it or who remove it when it is called to their attention. Two meetings reported that undesirable material was removed from the shelves when such a protest was made. Young people of one meeting took part in a petition in the local

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high school where the students became concerned, resulting in 470 students signing a petition to do away with obscene material. Another church, after praying about this problem, organized a library especially for their young people, donating 50 books to begin it. Of the 51 meetings reporting, only 27 had added new books this year. Eight hundred and twenty books were added to the church libraries making a total of 9,034. We would encourage all churches to make provision for buying some new books each year. One church has an annual church library dinner during National Library Week, when members donate books or money. In general, our churches could and should do much more in the promotion of systematic Bible reading and study. Displays of Bibles, "Read the Bible Through" projects and lessons in Bible appreciation, Bible marking and memorization are needed. A reading people is an enlightened people.

A panel discussion led by Lois Tish, chairman of the Literature department, pointed up aspects of Friends history described in various books, emphasizing Friends distinctives in the past and their relevance today. A summary follows:

She recommended that we increase our reading and study of Friends history and doctrine. Some of the best sources are The Rich Heritage of Quakerism by Walter Williams, which interprets our heritage in the light of the present day; Remembering Our Heritage Studies in Friends Beliefs, by Charles Ball; The Valiant Sixty by Taylor; Barclay's Apology and George Fox's Journal. Bruce Hicks discussed distinctives in dress, speech and customs. Myron Goldsmith pointed out that the doctrinal distinctives of baptism, communion and war and peace are not just identification tags. These doctrines survived because Friends believed them true. We need to spend time thinking, studying, and reasoning about them until we are convinced personally of their truth. If they are true, they should be fearlessly taught and proclaimed. Dilla Winslow spoke of the moral integrity and social concern of early Friends who sometimes lost all they possessed because of their convictions and practice. We need to emulate their practice of waiting on the Lord for guidance and then going out to act.

Approved.

- 52. Morris Ankeny presented the report of Arthold Latham, principal of Greenleaf Friends Academy, describing the year's activity and progress. (A copy of this report may be obtained upon request from the Academy.)

Approved.

- 53. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

Thursday, 2:30 p.m.

- 54. The meeting opened with prayer by Clayton Brown. Herschel Thornburg played "My Jesus, I Love Thee" on his harp.
- 55. The minutes of the last session were read and approved.
- 56. The following written message from Dean Gregory, general superintendent, was read:

During the recent months of my illness God has been my very present Comforter and Healer. My testimony continues to be that through this experience of infirmity of body there has been constant peace of heart and mind, and there has never been a doubt but that this, too, is a part of God's plan for my life. I have no doubt but that "All things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose." Romans 8:28.

There have been many, many wonderful blessings coming to us through

the past two and one-half months. First, God's presence and His Word have been very evidently manifested. The Psalms have been my special delight. David must have gone through great testing of soul, for his writings indicate that he had often been driven to God for comfort, encouragement and preservation of life itself. Psalm 16:11 reads, "Thou wilt show me the path of life: in Thy presence is fullness of joy, at Thy right hand there are pleasures forever more." This verse is a great encouragement to me.

Then, my family and friends have gone all out to encourage me and I thank every one of you who has prayed for me, and those who have written encouraging letters and sent cards. Friends of our Yearly Meeting and our personal friends from all over America and in other countries have surely poured out their love to me and my family in this time of my weakness and need.

We do want to thank the Yearly Meeting for your generous spirit in extending to us a three-month sick leave with continuing salary. Your thoughtfulness in providing a love offering to help us with our heavy medical expenses is so much appreciated. There has come in \$505.05 which, after the tithe, amounts to almost exactly our doctor and hospital expenses, above insurance coverage. Thank you for all these things.

Clynton Crisman has been like a brother to me through the years we have worked together. During my illness he has taken over my work in addition to his own, and I have had no concern but that everything was being cared for in a fine way. We appreciate the willingness of the Crisman family to continue in the Yearly Meeting work through most of another year, thus delaying their moving to the pastorate at Friends Memorial Church in Seattle. This has also postponed Oscar and Ruth Brown's plans to leave for the mission field since they have agreed to stay on at Friends Memorial for most of this coming year. We thank them, too.

Clynton will continue as Acting Yearly Meeting superintendent, and I will plan to return to the Yearly Meeting office on September 1, caring mainly for the business affairs and office management.

Our pastor, Charles Ball, has also been of great help and encouragement, along with so many others. Carolyn Hampton has filled the secretarial position in a fine way.

The past 14 years in the General Superintendency have been the richest and most rewarding years of our ministry in many respects. My work with the pastors, missionaries, the church abroad, Friends Youth, the college and all departments of the church, has offered opportunities for Christian service sufficient to demand all my interests, ambitions, physical strength and dedication. I have endeavored to conscientiously fulfill my appointed duties under God and the church, and will endeavor to make the coming year a year of blessing.

With deep and genuine love for all of you in Christ.

It was proposed that the letter be read at an evening service and a special offering taken as a gift to the Gregorys on their 25th wedding anniversary, part of the money to be used to purchase a silver gift. It was also proposed that an official letter of appreciation and greeting be sent to Dean Gregory from these sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The clerks were suggested to carry out these proposals.

Approved.

- 57. Clynton Crisman suggested that a gift from the Yearly Meeting be sent Roger and Mildred Minthorne expressing our appreciation of their fourteen years of service as treasurers.

Approved. The clerks were instructed to take care of this matter.

- 58. The report of the state of the church of Portland Quarterly Meeting

was read and approved. The reports of the eight Quarterly Meetings are summarized as follows: (See minutes 11, 48)

All Quarterly Meetings reported that the spiritual life of congregations is generally good. The ministry as a whole has been helpful, instructive and inspiring. Attendance has increased, especially Sunday morning and evening services.

Boise Valley reported new interest in small prayer groups and greater help by the youth. Greenleaf mentioned revivals with Herschel Thornburg, Jack Willcuts, and Marlin Witt. Some deputation teams have served in jail and mission work. Inland reports that Spokane Monthly Meeting has made faith pledges amounting to \$1,300 as a result of a missionary conference. Quincy Outpost has made an effort to draw back into fellowship some estranged members. One who was engaged in alternative service enlisted in the army, which made the church feel rebuked for lack of support and encouragement. East Wenatchee Preparative Meeting reported new families attending as a result of D. V. B. S. Property on which to build a parsonage is being purchased adjacent to the church. Entiat Monthly Meeting expressed concern that only about half the membership is diligent in attendance and some former faithful members lack concern for the church, though some have a deeper spiritual experience. Hayden Lake Preparative Meeting has one of their members who feels called to preach and fills the pulpit when the pastor is absent.

Newberg reported that one meeting discovered areas of weakness, especially in regard to nurture of new Christians, as a result of a long-range evaluation committee. College students affect attendance records in several churches. Several young people have testified to a call to the mission field. One church noted a tendency to face squarely questions arising from consideration of Friends doctrine and practice. Portland reported that Piedmont church held a missionary conference emphasizing literature. They have a new organ. Metolius noted a decrease in Sunday School attendance because area work projects have been completed, but there was an increase in worship service attendance. First Friends, Portland, has been challenged with the responsibility of a large bequest from the Ong Estate.

Puget Sound has a ten-year program of advance, aiming to double their number of churches in a decade. It is hoped a church can be started in the Kent area by 1967. Agnew Outpost reported increased finances, growth in Christian Education projects and three D. V. B. Schools. Everett church closed the year with more than a score of new people. Holly Park and Northeast Tacoma churches have increased their pastors' salaries—reporting a 45 per cent increase in attendance at Northeast Tacoma and an agreement among Holly Park members to bring in 15 per cent of their income to the church treasury. McKinley Avenue church has lost four families who moved away but still reports growth. Friends Memorial reports a strong Christian Education emphasis.

Salem expressed concern for revival. Some meetings reported emphasis on Sunday School and the ministry among youth.

Southwest Washington reported that Rose Valley enjoys a greater feeling of unity. The building nears completion. Cherry Grove feels the pressure of increased attendance, which points up the need for more adequate facilities. Oak Park Friends feels the vital need of prayer warriors since some have "lost their first love" and few really intercede in prayer.

First Friends, Vancouver, reported that enthusiasm for God's program is indicated by little attendance drop during the summer. New families are attending. Rosemere church has gained ground as a result of two revival meetings. Effort has been made to improve their property. For-

est Home Friends have made improvements on their church and grounds and have installed a new organ.

● 59. The following report from the Executive Council was read:

By direction of the Discipline, the Executive Council is to act on behalf of the Yearly Meeting in cases where the interest or reputation of Friends may render it necessary. All such proceedings shall be reported to the Yearly Meeting in session.

The Executive Council has acted in a number of instances the past year where the proceedings will be reported by another authorized committee or board of the Yearly Meeting. Therefore, it is our intent not to duplicate and will report only those items which will not be brought to the floor of the Yearly Meeting in some other manner.

Your Executive Council has given considerable study to the Yearly Meeting office operation, the responsibilities of the General Superintendent and the relation of his office to the various boards and the Yearly Meeting. Part of our findings and recommendations have been referred to the Discipline Revision Committee for study and recommendations.

However, one section of the report of a committee appointed to study and report to the Executive Council expresses a concern that was endorsed, and we wish to quote:

"The Yearly Meeting expects the General Superintendent to be a true under-shepherd who 'takes heed to himself and to all the flock over which the Holy Ghost has made him overseer, to feed (shepherd) the church of God which He has purchased with His own blood.' It also expects pastor and people to hold the General Superintendent in honor and to esteem him very highly for his work's sake. The General Superintendent is in a position of authority, and it is expected that pastor and people shall, in their relation to him, comply cheerfully with the precepts of Scripture to 'obey them that have the rule over you, and submit yourselves.' At the same time the General Superintendent shall exercise his authority not as 'being a lord over God's heritage, but as being an example to the flock.'

"Every effort should be made by the Executive Council to convey this image and spirit by example and teaching to Oregon Yearly Meeting. While holding firmly to the democratic concepts of individual concerns and leadership of the Holy Spirit, the church must trust the superintending of the church to God's man and trust him, pray for him, use him, and help him."

We would remind the Yearly Meeting that the Diamond Jubilee of Oregon Yearly Meeting will be in 1968.

The Executive Council directed the Board of Finance to receive, at their discretion, financial statements from the various subsidiary organizations, such as the Friends Youth, W. M. U., Quaker Men, etc., after learning that Mr. Baldwin of the Portland office of Internal Revenue stated that such groups are tax-exempt, since they are within the framework of the church.

A recommendation from the Board of Peace and Service was received and approved as follows: That since Friendsview Manor is an integral part of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church the "balance sheet of assets, liabilities and capital" and the "statement of income and expenditures" be printed in the Yearly Meeting Minutes.

The Council approved that the officers of the Yearly Meeting be authorized to sign the necessary papers designating "power of attorney" for export purposes.

Your Council has endeavored to carry out its routine duties as outlined in the Discipline, which we will not take time to report. However, in all of these duties, we have been mindful of the necessity of prayer and the seeking of God's direction for the decisions which we are called upon to make.

Approved.

- 60. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting that the following recommendation from the Committee to Study Yearly Meeting Office Operation be referred to the Discipline Revision Committee for their study:

That the term of service for the General Superintendent be two years, but the call be renewed each year. This will allow a longer time for transition of personnel, also permit him to develop a long range program. (See minute 116)

Approved.

BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

- 61. Kenneth M. Williams, president of the board, presented the report of the Board of General Education. A summary follows:

During the past year the Board of General Education has defined and identified its purposes and aims into a program which will enable the board to be effective in performing those activities assigned to it by the Yearly Meeting.

The function of the board is to enable members of the church to realize their responsibility to the youth in the areas of formal education. The purpose of encouraging members of our church to become involved in formal education is to help parents to become aware of the great need for every family to have a God-centered philosophy of education for their youth. Christian parents must concern themselves with the establishment in the hearts and minds of their children, and in the minds of the youth of the church as a whole, of a basic Christian philosophy of life and eternity. To accomplish this parents must become involved to a great extent in the public school by letting school officials know that they are concerned in the care and desire the highest standards in the educational programs provided for their young people.

The teaching profession provides a vast field of service for those in the school room. Educators themselves are very concerned about the problems of society and are coming to realize that some spiritual basis for life must be found. The opportunity has never been greater perhaps than at the present for Christian teachers to wield their influence for Christian philosophy of life in the highly secularized schools of America.

In the interest of instilling a Christian philosophy of life in our young people's development it is essential that the constituency of Oregon Yearly Meeting become aware of our great privilege in having George Fox College as our church school. The board proposes to develop an effective program in making members of the church aware of the high caliber of Christian education which is provided at our college.

The board also hopes to encourage young people to establish high standards of achievement in their educational programs. It is hoped that this group can become a means of helping to educate our youth to realize that Christ expects excellence of Christians. It is desired that young people catch not only a vision for the ministry, Christian education, teaching parenthood, missionary service, and many other vocations which are common among our people, but that they realize that God needs men and women in the highest positions in their communities, state and nation who are completely committed to His Will in their lives.

According to the reports received from the local churches, Oregon Yearly Meeting has tremendous potential in all of these areas. The board feels that the task before it is a great and challenging opportunity as is manifest by the number of people who are involved in the process of education within our church membership.

There are 594 young people in junior high schools from our Yearly Meeting and 473 in senior high schools. These young people need your

support and interest and very definite involvement in the education they are receiving. Of 229 students working toward baccalaureate degrees, 129 are doing so at George Fox College. Seventy-three of our people are working toward advanced degrees beyond the baccalaureate degree and 78 others are continuing in schooling beyond their college degree—not necessarily working toward an advanced degree. Thirty-eight of our members are preparing for full-time Christian service. Two hundred and thirty-six of our people are in the teaching profession, from kindergarten to college level. Eighteen scholarships are provided by churches to help in the support of our youth in their college education. George Fox College has been presented over 100 times in the meetings during the past year. Almost every meeting indicates that there is consistent prayer support for the college.

What the church of Oregon Yearly Meeting will be in the future—whether we continue to be a missionary, evangelistic church with the influence we must have in our world—depends to a very great extent upon the formal education our youth receive in today's schools.

Approved.

- 62. Milo Ross, president of George Fox College, presented a mimeographed sheet reporting financial gifts to the college from meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting and other Friends Yearly Meetings. He also highlighted his annual report. (A copy of these may be obtained by writing to George Fox College).

Approved.

- 63. Dr. Mark A. Talney, regional distribution secretary of the American Bible Society, spoke, calling this organization a missionary arm of the church. Its purpose is to put the Bible with its power into the hands of all men. Scriptures are now being published in 1,265 tongues. Distribution is increasing in many parts of the world. Next year will be the 150th anniversary.

- 64. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday at 9:15 a. m.

- 65. The meeting opened with a congregational song, "Since I Have Been Redeemed" led by Herschel Thornburg. Prayer was offered by George Bales.

- 66. The minutes of the last session were read and approved.

- 67. Congratulations were extended to LeRoy and Paula Benham on the arrival of a new daughter last night.

- 68. Recognition was made of the 90th birthday of Levi Pennington on August 29. The session expressed appreciation for his many years of faithful and loyal service in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

- 69. The Executive Council recommends that the Acting Superintendent be allowed two weeks of vacation for the period from September 1, 1965 to June 15, 1966.

Approved.

- 70. The Executive Council asks permission of the Yearly Meeting that the report of the review of procedures for recording ministers be given at the 1966 sessions.

Approved.

- 71. The proposed constitution of the Evangelical Friends Alliance was re-introduced for action. Levi Pennington expressed doubt that this action would lead to greater unity among Friends. He said others share his doubt. There was a period of clarification and discussion. (Copies may be obtained at the Yearly Meeting office.) (See minute 36)

BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 72. The report of the Board of Missions was presented Thursday evening by Clare Willcuts, president, and other members of the board. The report follows:

"Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel" is so commonplace it has become almost threadbare; even so, it remains the key to missionary activity. In the "Great Commission" as recorded by Matthew and Mark we find authority, instruction and empowering for the task of the Church. Although methods may be altered from time to time, we must not waver from the direction of the Master to evangelize. With sincere thankfulness to our heavenly Father for His continued blessings we submit to you another annual report.

STAFF—The current Latin American staff is as follows: Ralph and Marie Chapman have returned home this summer after two years of service in Bolivia; David and Florence Thomas went to La Paz in May for another term; Gene and Betty Comfort arrived in Bolivia two weeks ago—they will be working again in Caranavi in the lower Yungas; Marshal and Catharine Cavit are scheduled to join the Bolivian staff in October after serving the World Gospel Mission in the lowlands; Paul and Martha Puckett, after two years in Bolivia, will be moving to Peru for the rest of their term; Everett and Alda Clarkson have completed one full year there, and Quentin and Florene Nordyke expect to leave Peru November 1 for their first furlough.

Two families are under appointment: Nicholas and Alice Maurer are our newest missionaries. We are hoping they can enter language school in January, 1966, and be ready for service in Peru by the following September. Oscar and Ruth Brown continue under appointment.

Roscoe and Tina Knight have completed their deputation in Oregon Yearly Meeting. The board has liberated Roscoe for some inter-yearly meeting missionary deputation for the coming year. They plan to make their home in Haviland, Kansas.

BOLIVA—The National Friends Church in Bolivia continues to grow in spiritual depth and outreach. The Mesa Directiva has given good leadership for an expanding program, and there has been a fine relationship between this body and the Mission. Education with a Christian emphasis has been one of our major objectives, but traditionally this has been confined to the first four grades. A significant development this past year was the establishment of "George Fox Friends School" with plans to provide training in the fifth and sixth grade level. The INELA (Iglesia Nacional Evangelica Los Amigos) leased the Mission facilities at Batallas; and when the school opened last April, there was an enrollment of 43 boys and girls ranging in the age from 13 to 17 years. Meliton Mollesaca, Director of the Schools of the Bolivian Friends Church, observed in a recent article in the NORTHWEST FRIEND, "We believe the religious education is the most important aspect of the work of the National Church because it is upon this that the future of the Friends Church in Bolivia depends as well as the stability of our nation and all humanity. . . . This school (George Fox) is recognized by the Bolivian government and with their approval it exists to offer religious education with specific training given in accord with the doctrines of our church as well as the regular normal courses. The purpose of the school as defined on the opening day is to educate boys and girls as Christian ladies and gentlemen; to give them balanced instruction in religion, morality, intellectual development; and to benefit the physical and social development of character, and whatever capacities they may have. This school is important to the future of the Friends Church which greatly needs men who are spiritual

and whose lives reflect Christ within."

Our missionaries have had open doors for witnessing through special classes, tent meetings, and Quarterly Meetings, as well as opportunities in local meetings. In spite of some tense moments we give thanks to God for His protection during the revolution and change of government, and that the doors are still open for the preaching of the Gospel. There was one casualty among the believers in this war. Tata Cirpa, one of the oldest of the brethren, and for many years a pastor, happened to be in the line of fire as he was making his way home from the store and was fatally shot. We are thankful for his radiant testimony of God's saving grace given to one of our missionaries shortly before the accident.

PERU—With only two missionary families in Peru substantial growth has continued. The missionaries have been very busy conducting classes, visiting the meetings and searching out new areas where churches have been established. A new approach to a teaching ministry was carried out successfully for a time. The missionary would leave Juli one day each week and pick up one man from each of the 12 churches. When the last one had joined the group, they would spend the rest of the day studying the lesson that they in turn were to teach in their churches on the following Sunday.

In one letter Quentin Nordyke wrote, "The work continues to look encouraging although we have avoided starting many new places due to lack of personnel to follow them up. Our potential here is limited by the vision of Oregon Yearly Meeting." Missionaries in Peru and Bolivia have expressed warm appreciation for the visit and ministry of Homer and May Nordyke. The board is thankful to the Women's Missionary Union for sending their president, May Nordyke, to minister to the Aymara women.

NEPAL—For the past two years we have assisted Ohio Yearly Meeting's missionaries, Dr. and Mrs. Ezra DeVol, in the United Missions to Nepal. We are not proposing that our support for this mission go to one of our own young men, Jamie Sandoz, who since July 1, has been working for the Board of Missions but will also be fulfilling his alternate service for Selective Service.

SPRAGUE RIVER—Everett and Virena Tuning, pastors at Sprague River, report two special series of meetings, one led by Roscoe Knight and the other by the Kingsmen Quartet from George Fox College. These men were greatly used of the Lord, and several people received spiritual help. Nine youth from Sprague River attended camps at Fir Point this summer. We sincerely appreciate the faithful families who are assisting the Tunings in this needy field.

KOREAN CHURCH—One of the most exciting developments this past year has been the Korean work in Portland under the direction of Kwan Kyu and Jung Kim. A church has been purchased for their use at N. E. Sumner and 23rd Avenue in Portland. The first service in the new location was on May 9. Pastor Kim reports that the building will be used as a headquarters for the Korean work, and for worship and fellowship of the Korean-American families. The Koreans respond much more readily here than when they were meeting in the American church.

Pastor Kim has been witnessing to seamen from the Far East who frequent the port in the Portland area. He also visits with Korean college students and families in the Northwest.

YOUTH AMBASSADOR—This program, which was inaugurated a year ago, was continued again this summer by sending Ronald Stansell to visit in Bolivia and Peru to follow up the youth work started last year by Charles Mylander. Ronald has just returned in time for Yearly Meeting with glowing accounts of his trip.

LITERATURE—The board plans to accelerate the publishing of missionary literature this year by keeping Ralph Chapman on our staff with this as his special assignment. We are hoping that this ministry will be shared by California Yearly Meeting as well as other Latin American Missions.

NEW FIELDS—Roscoe Knight has been asked to visit in Mexico soon after Christmas to explore the possibilities of starting a Friends work there. He has had this burden for some time. It has also been a concern of others within our Yearly Meeting.

PERSONAL—I attended the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association retreat at Winona Lake, Indiana, last September and the Evangelical Friends Alliance at Colorado Springs, Colorado, in January, presided at two board meetings aside from those at Yearly Meeting time and six administrative committee meetings. I mailed out approximately 475 pieces of mail; many of these represented several pages of mimeographing. I travelled more than 11,000 miles in the interest of the board.

From the 58 local meetings reporting I share with you the following observations: Every meeting had at least one missionary speaker, one as many as 11; the average was six; 36 missions were represented with Oregon Yearly Meeting heading the list. There were 11 missionary conferences from one to five days each; nine meetings reported using the faith promise method. A few meetings made no mention of calendars, but those reporting gave a total figure of 1,154 with cash receipts of \$4,061.53. Twenty-two names were submitted of persons indicating a call to missionary service.

BOLIVIAN FIELD REPORT - July 1, 1964—June 30, 1965

To report on the progress of the Bolivian Friends Church (INELA) during the past twelve months is to report on its growth in the midst of a struggle within the sphere of government and financial maintenance on an Aymara level.

INELA—The Mesa Directiva or Executive Committee, a group of ten brethren, has exercised its rights and privileges to oversee the total church program. Upon their shoulders has fallen the many problems as well as the task of organizing the church activities on Quarterly and especially Yearly Meeting levels. This committee has been under the leadership of Carmelo Aspi until their meeting on June 1, when Carmelo and Antonio Mamani, vice-president, exchanged positions.

The calendar of activities of the INELA has included the September, 1964, Short Term Bible Classes with 29 men completing the course; the February, 1964, Junta Anual or official business meeting of the church representatives, at which time pastoral and worker appointments are made; the annual Easter Conference at the tabernacle at El Alto, La Paz, with a fine attendance of 1,500 and the annual Pastors' and Teachers' Conference from June 15 to 20, 1965. Much activity has centered around the Quarterly Meetings in each of the five areas of the field as well as evangelistic services and campaigns in many of the local churches. The INELA churches have been cooperating with Evangelism in Depth, which has organized a program for the entire year of 1965. This includes visitation, local church campaigns and participation in regional and national conferences. A highlight for pastors and workers was the World Vision - sponsored Pastors' Retreat in Cochabamba, Bolivia, at which 78 pastors, workers and teachers time pastoral and worker appointments are made; the annual Easter Conference at the tabernacle at El Alto, La Paz, with a fine attendance of 1,500 and the annual Pastors' and Teachers' Conference from June 15 to 20, 1965. Much activity has centered around the Quarterly Meetings in each of the five areas of the field as well as evangelistic services and

campaigns in many of the local churches. The INELA churches have been cooperating with Evangelism in Depth, which has organized a program for the entire year of 1965. This includes visitation, local church campaigns and participation in regional and national conferences. A highlight for pastors and workers was the World Vision - sponsored Pastors' Retreat in Cochabamba, Bolivia, at which 78 pastors, workers and teachers of our group attended.

MISSION—Missionary activity in connection with the INELA program continues within the established Mission - INELA relationship agreement. This provides for missionary ministry principally along evangelistic, educational and medical lines. We are appreciative of the increasing opportunity to counsel with the National Church leaders, and for renewed freedom of missionary visitation within the INELA churches. Progress is slowly being made toward transfer to the INELA of church property titles now held by the Mission.

We again express appreciation to Oregon Yearly Meeting W. M. U. which sponsored the visit of its president, May Nordyke, who along with her husband, Homer, spent two months on our Bolivian and Peruvian fields. It is evident that she realized a constructive ministry among our Aymara women.

Our missionary family has experienced various exchanges of responsibilities during the year with Chapmans assisting in the World Gospel Missions Theological Seminary in Santa Cruz during December, 1964; Pucketts teaching in the February Pastors' and Mamas' Classes in Juli, Peru, and Clarksons devoting several months to Aymara language study in La Paz.

In our spiritual travail on behalf of the INELA—rejoicing with them in their victories and upholding them patiently in time of their adjustment—we do well to remember the words of Jahaziel: "Be not afraid nor dismayed by reason of this great multitude; for the battle is not yours, but God's."

PERUVIAN FIELD REPORT - July 1, 1964—June 30, 1965

The past year was one of rich blessings in the Peruvian work. The work was typified by quality rather than quantity. Many of the established churches witnessed an increase in attendance and interest. Some capable national leadership has manifested itself.

One of the most important developments was the arrival of Everett and Alda Clarkson and their three children. They have entered into the work with forceful vigor, and their evaluations and corresponding suggestions have proved invaluable. Everett's many abilities, including radio communications, are contributing to the advancement and modernization of our mission program.

One of the most important undertakings in our working schedule continues to be the short term Bible Classes. These were held for both men and women in August of 1964 with an attendance of over 85. Again in February of 1965 these classes were held with Paul and Martha Puckett coming over from Bolivia to help Clarksons in the absence of the Nordykes. The classes were well attended and in all more than 60 believers attended for the first time.

This last year saw several visiting the Peruvian Friends Mission, the first being Charles Mylander. His lively testimony and spirited enthusiasm for Christian living was felt mightily by the brethren as well as having been a blessing to the missionaries. In November of 1964 the Peruvian missionaries were privileged to entertain the Bolivian mission-

aries. Several days were spent in fellowship and very fruitful council meetings. The latter part of March and April saw May and Homer Nordyke visiting the Peruvian work. May Nordyke ministered to the women; Homer Nordyke held classes for the men during Yearly Meeting. He and May had the Sunday morning service. We have recently been privileged to have Ronald Stansell in our midst for three-day class sessions.

One of the most worthwhile developments during the past year was the commencement of literacy classes with the help of the Wycliffe missionaries who have made two visits, and the brethren are thrilled with the possibilities of reading God's Word in their own language. The help of these two missionaries has proved a real boost to our staff in helping us in an area where we are untrained and limited timewise.

Perhaps the most important event of the whole year as far as the growth of the national church was concerned were the Yearly Meeting sessions held in April over Easter weekend with an attendance of about 150, which was remarkable in that for the first time no transportation was provided. The Holy Spirit blessed the business sessions as well as the classes and services. Plans were made to hold Quarterly Meeting sessions this year with the elders from each church acting as a planning and steering committee. The brethren also accepted wholeheartedly the idea of forming outposts during the year. Each established church is to start a new meeting in a new community.

Special classes were held in leadership training, giving practical experience in leading services, presenting lessons, keeping roll books and various other aspects of the church program. Evangelistic services with the tent were held from time to time, as well as the regular visitation to the churches to encourage and help them.

Four churches have discontinued to function due to lack of leadership or interest, two of these being new places that failed to develop according to expectations. However, three new places have been established with the help of national brethren, and many other opportunities were refused because of lack of missionary personnel. At the present time we find we have brethren located in 17 different communities carrying on some type of church program, some very elementary and others remarkably advanced.

Those of us working in Peru praise the Lord for His faithfulness in directing us in our work. We find very real the words of the Apostle Paul in I Corinthians where he says "For no one can ever lay any other real foundation than the one we already have—Jesus Christ. But there are various kinds of materials that can be used to build on that foundation." We pray that we might ever be directed to build correctly on the foundation of Jesus Christ.

SPRAGUE RIVER FIELD REPORT - July 1, 1964—June 30, 1965

"And He must needs go through Samaria." These words reveal Christ's compelling urge to go wherever there was a soul in need. This is the urge that is behind the effort being made in this area. We do not claim the success which Jesus had in His visit to Samaria, but we are endeavoring to be found faithful. In some ways the conditions in Samaria parallel the conditions here: the people of Samaria were looked down on by many of the Jews and just tolerated by others. But, here are souls in need and we "must needs" minister to them.

Our attendance in the Sunday night services nearly doubled. The reason for the increase is because it is a Bible study with an opportunity to discuss and ask questions.

We have been encouraged by the conversion of several teen-agers and two adults in the meetings held by Roscoe Knight in April and the Kingsmen Quartet from the college in May. Our V.B.S. has always drawn almost all the children of the community. We held weekly prayer meetings in Chiloquin this past year. They were discontinued the first of June because of summer activities. We plan to resume them after school starts.

We appreciate very much the interest and cooperation Forrest Cammack, chairman of the Sprague River Committee, has given to this work. He has an understanding of the problems that are being faced.

This was referred to the Committee on Discipline Revision to be held over one year. (See minute 24)

● 74. The Oregon Yearly Meeting Ministerial Association presented the name of Dillon Mills as its nomination to the governing committee of the Ministers' Retirement Fund for a term of two years.

● 88. The George Fox College Board of Trustees presented the following as nominations to membership on the board for terms of three years: Glen Koch, Ward Miller, Glen Rinard, John Farner.

In order to bring the number of trustees up to that prescribed by the new policy just adopted as an amendment to the Constitution and Discipline, the following nominations are submitted by the board: for three years—William E. BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

● 91. Charles B. Morgan, president of the Board of Stewardship, presented the following report:

The board of Stewardship was challenged during the past year by 1964 Yearly Meeting action when it was approved "that the base cash salary of the pastor of any meeting should be \$3600 per year, housing and utilities to be provided above this amount" and "that the local meetings are to be encouraged to cooperate with the Board of Stewardship in an intensive educational program to help implement this goal, . . ."

In a survey conducted by the board, on the basis of less than 100 per cent returns of the questionnaires, the following facts were discovered:

1. Approximately 25 of our 61 churches are meeting the minimum goal.
2. There appears to be a sincere effort on the part of nearly all churches to meet the minimum goal—if not immediately, at least in the near future.

3. At least seven churches—and possibly more—have raised their pastor's salary in order to at least meet the minimum in the past year.

4. Regional adverse economic conditions in Idaho have limited some churches in this regard.

5. Insofar as we have been able to determine, increase in the pastor's salary has not hindered giving toward United Budget. In several cases increases have been accompanied by or followed by a building program.

6. There appears to be a high degree of correlation between raising the pastor's salary and optimism in a meeting. In some cases it seems that the faith enabling the increase in the salary brought on a spirit of optimism enabling progress in other areas.

A commentary might be added that it does not appear that there is a large degree of physical suffering on the part of any pastor and his family. Where financial support is not adequate, the pastor supplements his income elsewhere, and his mental and physical energies are not given fully to what he believes is God's calling.

During the past year, many have expressed appreciation for the ministry of Earl and Esther Turner, members of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, who conducted workshops in all but three of our churches.

Many are using the poster contest to advantage, and we have noted greater participation and an increased excellence of quality. The contest is being continued next year with the theme suggested but not limited to "Christian Service." The board considered that such a theme might cause our young people and parents to more seriously consider God's call to the mission field, pastorate, etc.

The Board of Stewardship has planned that the next year be one of increased educational emphasis, closer contact with and assistance to local committees. We are seriously and prayerfully exploring the possibilities of a Yearly Meeting stewardship seminar at the earliest possible date.

Marie Haines presented the prizes for the poster contest as follows: Adult—first prize, Mae Brown, West Chehalem; second prize, Harry Price, Jr., Nampa. High School—first prize, Wanda Brown, West Chehalem; second prize, Sharon Martin, Caldwell. Junior High—first prize, Lois Harris, Greenleaf; second prize, Richard Moon, Whitney. Junior—first prize, Ron Moon, Whitney; second prize, Wanda Haines, Caldwell.

Two pastors in Oregon Yearly Meeting were asked to answer the question, why and how did their congregations raise their salaries this year? Dan Nolte told about Svensen Outpost, attributing the step forward to an optimistic spirit in this outpost, general faith in the work of the church and the pastor, and education and challenge of the Board of Stewardship.

Orville Winters reported on Tigard Preparative Meeting. In a static situation, the people began studying scripture references to stewardship. Faithful tithers increased their giving; non-tithers began to tithe. Income has about doubled without intensive campaigning.

Approved.

- 92. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

- 96. John Roberts, president of the Board of Finance, presented a proposed Ohio-Oregon Yearly Meeting pension plan. He answered questions and made clarifications. Action was deferred until Saturday morning. (See Minute 103)
- 97. The representatives have studied the problem created by the resignation of Roger Minthorne, Yearly Meeting treasurer. We recommend (1) that the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books be brought into the Yearly Meeting office and that the bookkeeping become a function of the office staff (this has been strongly recommended as a factor for more adequate budgetary control.)
(2) That the Finance Board be asked to include the amount of \$600 in fixed expense to be used, if necessary, to pay for this bookkeeping service.
(3) That the Executive Council discuss this matter and that if a Yearly Meeting treasurer cannot be found by the close of Yearly Meeting, they be empowered to secure one.

Approved.

- 98. Jack Willcuts asked permission to use the letter from Dean Gregory to the Yearly Meeting in the NORTHWEST FRIEND.

- 99. The meeting adjourned to meet Saturday at 9:15 a. m.

- 100. The meeting opened with a congregational song, "A Shelter in the Time of Storm," led by Herschel Thornburg. Joseph Reece led in prayer.
- 101. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved with one correction.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- 102. The Board of Christian Education report was given Friday evening by Howard Harmon, president of the board, and other board members. The report follows:

The Board of Christian Education is thrilled with the many open doors of evangelism in the fields of Sunday School, camping, Vacation Bible School and other youth programs.

The Sunday Schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting increased numerically by 142 to reach an all time high of 5,835. To assist our Sunday Schools the board has sent individuals trained in Christian Education work to meet with the local pastor, Sunday School staff, and Christian Education Committee for the purpose of evaluating the local program. The churches not contacted last year will be visited during the coming year. The board assisted in providing transportation to the National Sunday School convention, allowing many from all areas of the Yearly Meeting to attend.

Oregon Yearly Meeting's camping program is one of the finest in the Northwest. Over 1,550 campers and workers attended our camps this past summer with camps held in six locations. The board sponsors an annual camp clinic for the Yearly Meeting camp leaders, sharing ideas to improve our camping program. Ten delegates were sent to the Christian Camp and Conference Association meeting.

Our Friends Youth program has been active under the leadership of Charles Mylander and Ronald Stansell. The Mid-winter convention was attended by 250 young people. The youth program during Yearly Meeting has a full schedule. The Friends Youth of Oregon Yearly Meeting have taken an active part in the Evangelical Friends Alliance cooperating in the publishing of a youth magazine, Accent on Friends Youth. They also sponsored a leadership conference in Colorado Springs, Colorado, with 35 attending from Oregon Yearly Meeting. The Youth Ambassador program is growing each year for which we are thankful. The board also is in charge of Junior Yearly Meeting and the nursery care during the Yearly Meeting sessions.

The board is cooperating with the Evangelical Friends Alliance in its program. This year a bi-monthly paper Reach and Teach has been sent to each of the churches. We anticipate future help to our Yearly Meeting through sharing with other evangelical Friends.

The following material is available through the board: Club brochures, Stamps for Camp cards and stamps, decision cards for camp, Sunday School teacher's covenants, Sunday School teachers' and superintendents' evaluation sheets, Achievement Goals, booklet What Friends Believe.

A ribbon contest has been initiated that will extend throughout the coming year. Sunday Schools having a ten per cent or more growth over that of a year ago receive a blue ribbon each month. If they had from five per cent to 9.9 per cent a red ribbon is given and a white ribbon is awarded for any growth up to 4.9 per cent. The Achievement Goals have been revised and distributed to each church. If the suggestions given in the Achievement Goals are followed, each of our Sunday Schools will progress.

The board enlists your prayers during the year ahead as together we endeavor to evangelize and teach the Word through the effective doors open in the Christian Education field.

Approved.

- 103. The Board of Finance recommended that the proposed Ohio—Oregon Yearly Meeting pension plan be adopted without the minimum pension provision. This minimum provision feature will be studied, sent to each local meeting for evaluation, and reported back to the Board of Finance by mid-year meeting for further action. (See minute 96)

Approved.

(Copies of the plan may be obtained from the Yearly Meeting office.)

- 104. The Board of Finance recommended that a Pension Committee be appointed with power to act within the framework of the Ohio—Oregon pension proposal as presented; that the Pension Committee meet two or three times a year as necessary and that it be responsible to the Board of Finance. We suggest further that nominations to the Yearly Meeting for this committee be made as follows: two laymen from the Board of Finance, two ministers from the Ministerial Association, and two others named by the representatives—one appointee from each group to serve one year, the other for two years, with subsequent appointments for two-year terms.

Approved.

- 105. The report of the Auditing Committee was read, stating that the treasurer's books appear accurate and in good order and commending the excellence of the work of Roger and Mildred Minthorne.

Approved.

- 106. The Board of Finance recommended that the Yearly Meeting provide authorization to the Board of Publication for establishing a credit line at the United States National Bank of Oregon, Newberg branch, for emergency loans up to \$2,500 limit.

Approved.

- 107. The executive Council presented the following nominations for Western Evangelical Seminary Trustees: for a two-year term, Charles Beals; Paul Mills. For teacher of Friends Doctrine, Myron Goldsmith.

Approved.

- 108. The representatives submitted the following nominations to the Board of Stewardship: for two years (replacing Clyde Miller and Ruth Washburn), Keith Baker and Richard Hendricks, Sr.; for three years, Willard Kennon, Ira Craven, Lois Winters.

- 110. The summary of epistles received from other yearly meetings was read as follows:

During the past year epistles were received from 15 American Yearly Meetings and one from New Zealand. The following are excerpts of interest: Ohio Yearly Meeting reports that their 152nd annual session was one of spiritual refreshing under the ministry of Keith Sarver, General Superintendent of California Yearly Meeting. They feel that their missionary work in Taiwan has made a definite advance, at present there being 19 established meetings on the Island.

Kansas Yearly Meeting met in their 93rd session and sent greetings to Friends everywhere. They felt that the ministry of Milo Ross, President of George Fox College, during their sessions was a great blessing to them. They continue to praise God for the miraculous way He has blessed their missionary work in Africa.

As Western Yearly Meeting convened in its 107th session they sent greetings to Friends everywhere. They appreciated the daily devotional messages brought to them by Eugene Coffin based on the queries. Friends there expressed a desire to bring the message of the Gospel through the channels of daily life as well as in their public meetings.

Indiana Yearly Meeting reported their appreciation of the ministry of Everett L. Cattell during their annual sessions. They were sobered by the statistical reports which showed a small loss in membership during the past year. But with it came a concern that they might be better able to win people to Christ.

Central Yearly Meeting rejoices that doors are still open for their missionary work in Bolivia when in many parts of the world they are closed.

North Carolina Yearly Meeting met in their 267th annual session rejoicing in a spirit of growth that was reflected in a net growth of more than a hundred in total membership. Visiting among them, D. Elton Trueblood advised Friends to "penetrate" the world and its problems with the truth of the Gospel.

Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting reports that some problems have beset their mission work among the Navajo Indians, but encouraging reports from their churches reveal a growing desire for deepening in spiritual things.

Approved.

- 111. The epistle committee presented the epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings.

The meeting returned it to the committee for additions. (See minute 134)

- 112. The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight recommended that the following four persons be recorded as ministers in Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church: Kwan Kyu Kim, Edwin Cammack, David Liu, Dan Nolte.

Approved.

- 113. After considerable study, the Executive Council recommended that if a qualified person can be found, the Yearly Meeting secure the services of a person to serve in the capacity of a business manager in place of the Assistant Superintendent. This would make it possible for the General Superintendent to give major attention to pastoral and church supervision and departmental promotional work and otherwise superintend the field. (See minute 124)

Approved.

- 114. In view of the information received from our General Superintendent that he plans to retire from the superintendency as of August 31, 1966, the Executive Council has appointed a committee to interview men for the position of superintendent and business manager and report back to the Executive Council.

- 115. The executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting that a committee of Everett Craven, Gene Hockett and John Roberts be empowered to select a Yearly Meeting Financial Secretary.

Approved.

- 116. The Committee on Discipline Revision, in compliance with the request of the Executive Council, suggests the following amendment in relation to the term of office of the General Superintendent: (See minute 60)

On page 54, paragraph 3, THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT, replace the first sentence with the following:

3. THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT. The Yearly Meeting shall appoint, on nomination by the Executive Council, a person to serve as

General Superintendent. His initial appointment shall be for a term of two years. The following year and annually thereafter, as his services prove to be satisfactory and effective and he senses a continuing concern for the work, the appointment shall be extended for an additional year, thus giving him with each extension a two-year period in prospect for longer range planning. (A period of one year for smoother transition is also thus provided when his service is to be terminated.)

Approved.

Referred to Committee on Discipline Revision to hold for the second reading next year.

- 130. Recognition was made by Levi Pennington of the name of Herbert Hoover on the memorial list of those members deceased during the past year, and a tribute paid to him.

- 131. The following communication from the Board of Moral Action was read: Because of the publicity being given to the "new morality" in the press, popular magazines and books, the Board of Moral Action wishes to point out the significance of this threat to our moral standards. The new morality should be recognized as nothing more than an attempt to justify age-old sins in the name of religion.

The new morality is being advocated by certain clergymen and church leaders who have abandoned the doctrines of God and of man as set forth in the Bible. The Ten Commandments are dismissed as irrelevant, and after reducing Jesus to the status of a mere man, His teachings are distorted to support a morality based upon what is called "responsible love," and "respect for persons." Morality thus becomes relative, situational and permissive. As an example, engaged couples are left free to make their own decision about permarital relationships. As a further example, clergymen who advocate the new morality have defended perversions condemned by Scripture. Further, they have denied the sacred character of marriage bonds, and thus left individuals free to enjoy marital privileges without accepting marital responsibilities. Far from contributing to the happiness and welfare of persons, the new morality leads to inevitable guilt, sorrow and the breakdown of orderly society.

Because the commandments of Scripture insure the highest happiness and wellbeing not only of individual persons but of society, the Board of Moral Action recommends that all of our churches give renewed emphasis to the moral obligations outlined in Scripture. Wholesome books and study materials are readily available from Christian book and supply stores. The Board of Moral Action will have material suited for such use which may be ordered from the Yearly Meeting headquarters. We urge all of our meetings not to neglect this important teaching responsibility.

Many expressions of agreement were made from the floor. It was suggested that the publicity director place the statement in the hands of our pastors, publish it in the NORTHWEST FRIEND, with supplementary articles, and offer it to the Associated Press for wider publicity.

- 134. The corrected epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings was read as follows: (See minute 111)

Amid the confusion of civil strife, riots and war hysteria, Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting met on our peaceful Yearly Meeting grounds at Newberg on August 17, 1965. This is our 73rd session.

As we came together from the various meetings in Idaho, Washington and Oregon, we sensed the presence of the Holy Spirit who is faithful to bring peace to souls who are fully yielded to Him.

We missed the presence of our General Superintendent, Dean Gregory, who had been forced to take a complete rest because of a heart ailment. His assistant, Clynton Crisman, who has so ably carried on, was present and gave the keynote address. He reviewed the past year's work and urged us to find that strength of Divine power to evangelize and lead souls to Christ in these terrible days.

In arranging for Yearly Meeting leadership this year our Executive Council chose to use two of our local men rather than men from other yearly meetings. For the main speaker they enlisted the service of Milo Ross, president of our George Fox College. For one to have charge of the music they chose Herschel Thornburg, who has had wide and successful experience in evangelistic singing, instrumental music and preaching by which to win souls to Christ.

Milo Ross assumed this leadership with a two-fold burden—first to emphasize sound scriptural belief and doctrine and then to present and adapt this into practice best suited for the days in which we are living. His messages were greatly appreciated.

The Yearly Meeting accepted the proposed constitution of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. This is one of the ways by which we are seeking to strengthen our bonds of denominational unity.

Again we were delighted in having such a large number of young people present, and the consecrated leadership of young men and women, who directed their activities so ably. Our Friends Youth organization sponsored one young man, Ronald Stansell, for a visit to our mission fields in Bolivia and Peru. We also have a young man, Jamie Sandoz, who is assisting in a medical mission in Nepal. Another young man, Lonny Fendall, received a Rotary scholarship to attend the University of Ghana and on his return visited various mission fields.

We were delighted in having so many children take part in their Junior Yearly Meeting. Under capable leadership the seed of the Gospel was sown in their young lives.

Again, as in the past, our summer youth camps were a great blessing to our children and young people, many finding the Lord in saving power and the knowledge of the Bible increased.

We do not know how much longer God will let the world go on in disobedience and God-forgotfulness, but we want to be faithful in salvaging as many souls as possible out of the wreckage until our Lord comes.

- 136. The report of the Oregon Yearly Meeting Entertainment Committee was read as follows:

The guests of Yearly Meeting were cared for in Pennington Hall, Minthorn Hall and McGrew Hall at George Fox College. Five trailer houses were on the church grounds.

An estimated number of 2,500 meals were served at Renne Junior High School during the six days. Meals have been prepared by Edith Comfort, Pearl Pruitt, Lloyd Pruitt and Mary Jane Stewart. Elsie Hermanson served as dining hall hostess, as well as over-all manager, with the assistance of Arthur Winters. Meredith Beals served as cashier; Edna Williams was assisted by Linnea Stahlnecker and Shirlene Perisho with registration. Morning Inspirational Hour

The morning inspirational hour and evening messages were brought by Milo Ross.

Wednesday morning. During these days we will consider four methods God uses in His dealings with men. Today we will consider His laws. Isaiah 55:6-11. The work of the Spirit in creation includes an eternal purpose for the human family. He will not always strive with man but He does strive some of the time—beginning in the garden, "Adam, where art thou?" God invaded history. He is involved with men.

God is in all and over all natural law. Spirit and matter may not be too far apart. II Peter 3:3-7 shows that once, at least, in history He did overrule natural law to bring His will to pass. If the order of the natural realm is broken or changed by Providence, it is called a miracle.

In the spiritual realm the opposite is true. The super-human, supernatural, miraculous is the order of events, or should be. The Bible says that God reverses the course of nature to bring about our salvation. For God to stay a sinful man in his tracks and change his desires, direction, goals and disposition; to make him over; to recreate him; to put within him the divine nature; to make a good man out of one not so good is a miracle. To sustain him, give him grace for every trial, strength for every day, victory in every battle means one miracle after another. Miracle is natural in the spiritual world. It is the manner in which God normally works.

Thursday morning. The second method of God is the hiding of His power. The mighty life-giving work of His Spirit in the soul is quiet and unobservable, as the moving of invisible air currents mentioned by Jesus to Nicodemus. Through the centuries many important and permanent developments were unnoticed at the time. The birth of Jesus was not recorded. George Fox's experience in the fields outside Coventry was not news. The outpost preacher, the Christian teacher may not come to public notice. It is strange, but true, that God has hidden His power in the universe. Earthquakes and tornados are catastrophes, not revelations of God's power. The explosion of a gas tank is not evidence of the power of the gas company. "The heavens declare the glory of God. . ." To the casual observer the 1000 stars in their universes operate silently. The earth is suspended in space. We are not even aware of motion. While tons of water rise in the giant redwood trees, not a sound is heard.

This, then is God's plan: His glory, presence and power are declared and revealed, then hidden. What does this mean to men? To the thoughtless, unwary, ungrateful, unbelieving, disobedient it is tragedy. They will meet Him face to face at the great white throne, but it will be too late. What does this mean to His people? Invisibility and inaudibility do not mean absence. Such hidden power is overwhelmingly sufficient. ". . . in quietness and confidence shall be your strength." Don't call attention to men with their human weakness. Let His power shine forth. Rest in Him.

Friday morning. A third method of God is cooperation with human beings. II Corinthians 5:6:1 (New English Bible). The creation was not complete in one sense. The forests were uncut, diamonds were hidden in the earth, poems were not written, discoveries lay in the matrix of the mind, aluminum in the clay, rivers were unbridged, cities unbuilt. If left alone, nature deteriorates. If man works alone, he gets things out of balance and confused. God and men together can breed beautiful cattle, produce a hybrid rose, produce food in abundance and create beauty.

One of the wonders of divine grace is His invitation to us to assist Him. He limits Himself to what we will or will not do. He does not ask us to cooperate with Him without telling us what we are to do. He has given us a message to proclaim: "Be ye reconciled to God." The cooperation is not equal, but by the alchemy of divine grace it comes out a hundred percent. We may contribute only one percent, but He makes up the difference. He brings results that bring Him eternal glory and bring us satisfaction.

We are called to be ambassadors. This implies two governments. In our world system are the spiritual element and the powers of darkness. We are caught in this tension. We are sent from the spiritual realm to the realm of darkness. We must be loyal citizens of the government which sends us. The ambassador lives in a foreign land, but his embassy is a part of the mother country. He lives by the rule of the mother country. He bears the message from his country to the other and must not add or detract from it. The message is: Be ye reconciled to God. He has all the resources of the mother country behind him.

I Timothy 2 indicates that souls are not converted without prayer. The

initiation or extension of grace is through human instrumentality. The great problem today is that people lack awareness of their need of God. Many are trying to get rid of tensions but God's people need some tensions—those that come from Him to spur us to proclaim the message. We are to reconcile men to God.

Saturday morning. The fourth method of God is His use of minorities. Ezekiel 22:30, Judges 6:11, 12; 7:9-12; I Cor. 1:26-31. God is interested in men rather than methods. Kierkegaard wrote, "What time in history can it be proved that Christianity is correct by the results?" God is not concerned about this. He calls weak, frightened, lowly people. Gideon was afraid so he took a friend along to spy on the enemy. Moses asked that Aaron go with him. God chose the Israelites, people in slavery with no horses or chariots. Their future leader was found in the bulrushes. Jesus was born into a subject nation, belonged to an unpopular sect and was wounded to death. Early Christians worshipped hidden in catacombs. The Hussites, Mennonites, Quakers, were weak minority groups. We lift out great leaders but some of their movements were scarcely known at the time.

God doesn't need votes. The church is in bondage to a secular world because worldly, sinful movements attract more people. Toynbee warns against a secular culture "arising out of the bosom of the church." The world is no friend of grace. Jesus never tried to become a person of importance but came to do the will of the Father. Those who stand alone—missionaries, outpost workers, lone Christian teachers—those who are the only Christians where they work—are important. Majorities do not prove rightness. One with God is a majority. God is calling out a people who may be an increasing minority. He makes up for their ignorance, weakness, errors, frailties of all kinds, sustains them in their trials and eventually brings them out into a large place.

Evening Services

Tuesday evening. When the late Edward R. Murrow was on radio, he had a program called "This I Believe"—a series of interviews of the world's great who gave him their religious biographies. We heard some strange points of view—Christian, sub-Christian, newly-Christian, pseudo-Christian, anti-Christian, etc. It might be interesting to take paper and pen and put down what you hold to be most precious to you. Peter 3:15. Dr. Compton, eminent scientist, says the two greatest words in the English language are "I believe." He says that belief precedes knowledge, and is therefore more important than knowledge in itself.

Religion is the acceptance of beliefs. This is true of all religions—true or false. Our heritage is belief in the correct body of truth. Jesus said that men will be saved if they believe in Him and lost if they don't. Christian faith is not tolerant but very exclusive. "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." It is important whom we believe in.

What do you hold as most important? "Lord, I believe. Help Thou my unbelief." This is a growing experience. I believe in revelation and inspiration. Revelation is the communication of God to man. Inspiration is accepting the communication and doing something about it. We can show our appreciation for salvation as the Psalmist "I will take the cup of salvation. . . ." I believe in my country. I will give my life for her but I cannot take life. I believe in democracy so I will take my place as an active citizen of my community. R. L. Stevenson has one of his characters say, "There's someone out there poking holes in the darkness." I want to be that kind of person.

Wednesday evening. The terror of the Lord. II Corinthians 5:10-15. Thinking of the purpose of evangelism, what is our motivation? We may

try to keep up with other rapidly growing denominations, or with other major religions—Islam, communism. There is the pressure of the population growth and the shift to urban areas which are contemporary frontiers. We try to take care of our own who move more frequently. We have excuses for doing nothing or little: others are doing the job, we are too small, our resources are meager, we lack leadership, have no national program. Our real motivation should be a realization of the value of the human soul. God is involved in history with man from the motivation of love. Man should be involved with God to change men and society.

Terror comes from the eternal concept of the finality of heaven and hell. The mentality of this pagan, scientific age is altogether different. What kind of persons are we to go to? To the moral, decent American, the present-day pagan who is impersonal in his relationships and interested rather in bathrooms, bingo, beer, boats than attending church, the scientific and rational who accept the advances of modern science without question, knowing that science has no moral dimension but failing to add moral standards.

This is an age of youth—soon one-half will be under 25 years of age. Dr. Armand Nicholi lists the intense conflicts today's youth face: right versus wrong, emphasis on sex, Judeo-Christian heritage repudiated, materialism, alienation and frustration, mass media, confusion in the home, impending mass death, wrong heroes (the ultimate hero is Jesus Christ, but he doesn't know this), little idea of sin. We have also problems of poverty, lost sense of national mission, loneliness and rootlessness, racial prejudice, victims of war, alcoholism. The point is that God is going to judge modern man for putting God out of his mind, putting pleasure ahead of godliness, being self-sufficient, living in utter disregard of God's laws. These facts which put the fear of God into us should motive us to warn people. "Knowing therefore the terror of the Lord, we persuade men."

Thursday evening. The second coming of the Lord provides motivation for mission work. Matthew 24:3-14. The prophets could look ahead from their mountain peaks and see the vision of the future. The proofs of the promise of His return of the fulfilled prophecies of Jesus. "Upon this rock I will build my church." There is a church. "I will send my Spirit," was fulfilled on the Day of Pentecost. He also said, "I will come again." This is the hope of the Christian, the prize for our labors.

He came the first time in poverty to provide salvation—as a lamb led to the slaughter, judged by men and forced to wear a crown of thorns. He will come the second time in glory—regal, high and kingly, to be the judge of men. This will be personal and literal. "Every eye shall see Him." There is the element of uncertainty as to time. We are to watch and wait. He will come suddenly, "in the day when ye think not."

This is the glory for the church, but terror for the world at large. Judgments will be of a world-wide, national and social nature—of inequity, injustice, inhumanity, extravagance, war, drunkenness, lewdness, immorality. There will be judgments individuals face alone in their own souls; their memories, their children and loved ones. But Christians can sing, "My Lord, what a morning. . . ye'll hear the Christian shout!" We should be prepared as if He would come tomorrow but plan as if it would be a hundred years from now.

Friday evening. The life of the flesh. The world is no friend of grace. We like to look on the brighter side of faith—the results of salvation, the fruits of righteousness, away from the pit whence we were digged. But tonight let us get an over-view of the world without God; sensual and devilish. (New English Bible) Romans 1:18-32, Col. 3:5-10, I Thes. 4:3-5, I Thes. 5:4-9, II Tim. 2:22-3:7, Gal. 5:16-25, 6:7, 8, Rev. 22:14, 15,

Phil. 4:8. Christians, including the Friends Church, have spoken out against liquor, gambling, indecencies, immorality, narcotics, obscene literature, etc., for centuries. There is a conspiracy of evil greater in scope than ever before. An emanation of evil pervades our society down to the smallest hamlet. It is in nearly every medium of communication and avenue of instruction—salacious literature, whose influence enters through the eye-gate, feeds the imagination, breaks down the will to resist. It is in opposition to the Scriptures. It is an international problem. A paper which in the past would not publish questionable pictures, or marginal realism will now do it. Violence, mayhem, sex, and the gamut of base emotions are paraded before our youth with hardly any control. The Supreme Court takes the view of relative local morality.

To combat this we should watch what comes into the homes, watch what is on display in local supermarkets or drug stores—do not buy it, have nothing to do with this pernicious traffic—flee from it as from the plague. We need to also give people the "thus saith the Lord" truth of the Scriptures. This is the day of vanishing absolutes. Questionable practices carry into churches. We expect new Christians to eschew evil, but some are dragged back into sin by the pressures of this evil. We must protest the presence of salacious literature in our communities.

Saturday evening. Fire and Glory, I Kings 18:2—. When Elijah proposed the contest between His God, Jehovah, and Baal, the people answered not a word. After he described the trial, they ALL said, "it is well spoken." Why the change in such a short time? Basically we believe there is a light that lighteth every man that cometh into the world. How did the Almighty reveal His will to a man or tell a group what to do before there was language? There were no Bible, church, hymns, Sunday School on which we depend. Thousands of people found God without these things. Why did they accept God's revelation? The manner of instruction and confirmation was by fire. Gen. 15:17 tells of the confirmation of Abraham's covenant by fire which was the first time God confirmed His word this way. The record shows a consistent revelation from one patriarch to the next, one king, judge, prophet to the next. Ex. 3:1-8, 12, 14; 13:21-22, 14:19, 20, 24; 10:33-38. Moses did not doubt that God had spoken after he saw the burning bush. The people saw the fire and cloud on the tabernacle. Gideon had his vision confirmed by fire. So the people agreed to Elijah's contest because they were used to fire as a symbol of God's presence.

The fire showed God's presence in the midst, but God does not come to disobedient men or nations. I Sam. 4:10-22 "the glory has departed." No one saw the glory for a long time. Solomon wondered if the glory would come to the temple he built. It did "fill the temple." At the time of Elijah's test, no one there had ever seen God's glory. When the fire fell, God's presence had returned into the midst of His people. Ezekiel 1:4, 2:23, 8:2, 10:18, 11:19—Isaiah 60, 66:12.

The Messianic hope was that God would come to dwell in the hearts of His people. "God with us, Emanuel." They could see His presence in the fire and cloud before. Prophets said that everyone would know God's presence, "all will see My glory."

Ezekiel had a vision of the glory departing—10:18—over the Mount of Olives. He prophesied that He would come again and His feet would touch on that mount at His second coming. There was a dead period of over 400 years with no revelation from God. Then in Luke it says, "and the glory of the Lord showed round about them. . . ." Anna and Simeon recognized Him and said, "Mine eyes have seen thy salvation. . . and the glory of thy people Israel." This is a proof that Jesus is God who came to dwell among men. John 1:18, Matt. 3:11, John 1:25, 31, 32. John the Baptist baptized till he could introduce the Baptizer of Israel. "He will baptize with fire." Jesus promised the Comforter in John 14 and 16. In John 17

He said in His prayer, ". . . and the glory Thou gavest me I have given them." Peter and the other devout Jews gathered in Jerusalem at Pentecost, who may have been asking whether Jesus really was the consummation of Israel, saw "tongues as of fire." This confirmed their faith. It was the same consistent revelation that began with Abraham. "This is He." The lasting significance is that God through His grace and Providence dwells with us, purifying our hearts by faith. The roots of our teaching of the baptism of the Holy Spirit are back in the Old Testament. God will come to the waiting heart. God had a body in Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit has no body except as He dwells in our hearts. "Ye are the temples of the Holy Spirit." Because of this we have peace, protection, rest and purification of heart.

Sunday Services

Morning. The Army of the Lord. From the Song of Solomon ". . . terrible as an army with banners". From Acts 1:8 ". . . ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem. . . and away to the ends of the earth." Jesus used many figures of speech to illustrate penetration and permeation: salt, leaven, fire on the earth, keys of the kingdom. There was no concept of membership in the early church. "The tent of congregation" meant a group of people coming together. To us it means that we must be connected with a group and go where other believers are from time to time. Having our names on a roll is not as important as being where the services are. The beautiful figure of the church as the "bride of Christ" indicates a law of the universe which is self-giving love, vertically the love between man and God. Horizontally, we love our brethren. The figure "body of Christ" indicates many members with varying functions. Each is valuable because of the degree of dexterity. The members are dependent on each other. The body is hurt if any part fails. In the figure of "the army" we can gain insight into the life of the church. Four attributes of army life apply: discipline, leadership, order and a goal.

The New Testament says "goye". This was uttered in Jerusalem which is a long way from Newberg. We are "at the ends of the earth". Every one truly Christian should be an evangel. We should not be getting ready for Sunday during the week. Worship on Sunday should prepare us for service. The church is like a drill hall where we get equipment. We don't go to church to help the minister. He should help get us out into the field. We need to work in great cities, to work to reach adults. There is a need for religious emphasis speakers, for those who can work with college students, athletes, prisoners, young people, capital and labor, aging people. Who leads a person to become a communist? Another communist. Who leads a person to become a Christian? Another Christian.

Evening. The challenge of Christian Education. There have been astounding changes in one man's lifetime. We are in an exploding world of knowledge. Oppenheimer: "Of all the scientists who have ever lived, 90% are alive today." Von Braun: "Within ten years, two-thirds of the advertisements in magazines will be for goods and services not yet invented or on today's market." Personnel man from Boeing: "If a youth of 18 enters the job market today, he can expect to be 're-treaded' or 're-tooled' fourteen times in his working life-time." How shall we prepare our youth for a society the blue prints of which have not been drawn? They live in a world with ideologies diametrically opposed to Christianity. What is important to know? A second rate education will not do. Dr. George Moore, dean of faculty of George Fox College, advocates a Christian philosophy of education, the God-world view, the integration of all learn-

ing. All truth is God's truth.

There are two ways in which truth comes to the mind of man. First, by divine revelation. I Cor. 1:21. Man cannot find God by himself. The saying, "anything a man can imagine he can do" is easier to accept today than heretofore but there are limitations. Man cannot discover God. "As God ordained, the world failed to find Him by its own wisdom." We can pray our way to God, repent our way to Him, but we cannot think our way to Him. There is also revelation of creation. Hebrews 11:3. This is also God's truth. This is why George Fox and other church fathers said there should be "provided a school to teach all things under the creation . . . let their learning be liberal. . . ." Secondly, truth comes to mind by discovery. God thinks, reasons, plans, works, rests and so must I. Developing the talents and abilities of our youth is a God-given stewardship. The success of the church is based upon the success of its educational programs. The spiritual life of the church of tomorrow can be found in embryo form at George Fox College. The types of homes where our grandchildren will be reared are being formed on the campus. The business life and economic development, the leadership in community, school, nation and world are being forged in student body meetings, classes, clubs. Serious issues of life and death, right and wrong are being debated in bull sessions. If George Fox College is impoverished, the church of tomorrow will be impoverished. The miracle-working power of God will continue to work if we are obedient stewards of the grace of God.
