- 1. The seventy-fourth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened August 16, 1966, in Greenleaf, Idaho.

As we approach this annual privilege and responsibility, may we join our ancestors' declaration of 1887 "We would with humble thanksgiving, bear an especial testimony to our Lord's perpetual dominion and power in His church. . . ; Through Him the redeemed in all generations have derived their light, their forgiveness, and their joy." May we declare in 1966 that ". . . God is not dead, nor doth He sleep. . ." and with reverent thankfulness expect His presence in our midst.

Kenneth Pitts, pastor of Greenleaf Monthly Meeting, welcomed the Yearly Meeting. Roy Clark led the congregation in singing "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Clynton Crisman led in prayer.

- 2. Dean Gregory, Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, brought the keynote address as follows:

"We are met together, on this 74th reunion of our Oregon Yearly Meeting, to recount the providences and mercies of the Lord over the past year and to once more seek God's way and plan for the future of our church here in the great Northwest country.

"The prophet Samuel, on the occasion of divine intervention in the conflict with the enemy troops of the Philistines, called the Israelites together at Mizpeh where God accepted the prayers and dedication of his chosen people and discomfited the enemies and put them to flight. Here Samuel took a stone and set it up as a memorial of God's miraculous dealings with Israel, and said, 'Hitherto hath the Lord helped us.' (I Samuel 7:12).

"With this confidence in God's past blessings, we cannot do other than advance into the future with great faith and with our best plans and efforts laid humbly at His feet. Without His presence we cannot go forward; but with His presence we must advance.

"These past fifteen years have been most precious and rewarding to my family and me as we have labored with you, and we join in one voice to thank you for your love and loyal support which you have given us. We could have asked for no greater cooperation than you have so generously extended to us.

"This marks the close of my 15th year of service with you as your General Superintendent, and each year of this term of service has had its own peculiar and special emphasis and color. Now, through what we

believe to be God's clear call, we are concluding our service in this office and returning to pastoral ministry at the Friends meeting in Star, Idaho.

"So very many of you have made a lasting and invaluable contribution to us. Our staff members at headquarters and Yearly Meeting officers and board personnel have been most cooperative and dedicated. The list of past and present employees of the Yearly Meeting is a long one, but every one of them has made a distinct and fine contribution to the work of our Yearly Meeting. Your churches throughout the Yearly Meeting and your homes have been open to our ministry. You were faithful to pray for me when sickness had laid me low. You came to our aid when we were overwhelmed by hospital and medical expenses. You have been our brothers and sisters in the Lord through happy times as well as adverse circumstances. For all these things we thank you, for you are all our people.

"The nomination of Jack L. Willcuts to the office of General Superintendent has been made with unanimous voice, both by our Executive Council and Friends throughout the Yearly Meeting, I am sure. I am most gratified by the fine spirit which has accompanied the transfer of responsibilities from my shoulders to his, and I would encourage Friends to uphold him and his family in much prayer and in faithful and loyal support. The Willcuts family has already won the high esteem and love of all of us, and we pray they may enjoy prosperity in all divine blessings in their new role in the ministry of the gospel.

"For most of my years in the ministry, I have been concerned and interested in the life and ministry of the church. This interest has kept me deeply involved in the work of the church and I feel it is important for us to review and restudy our concepts of the church from time to time.

"The Bible, and particularly the New Testament, speaks a great deal about the church. These references are both concerning the local congregation as well as the spiritual body of Christ, called the church.

"Paul, the apostle, declared by divine inspiration, '... Christ... loved the church, and gave himself for it; that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish.' (Ephesians 5:25-27)

"The nature of the church is both physical and spiritual. It is true that God is a spirit and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth. But it is also true that the church which is in evidence to the world is very much a part of society and its weaknesses and strengths are open to the world's gaze.

"Christ said He would build His church. Essentially, every Christian is a part of that building, and that building is not only a temple but a moving force against the gates of hell and wickedness in the world. We live in the confidence that this church, the true body of Christ, shall prevail and that in Christ's second coming the church, His bride, shall be caught up with Him into glory.

"Now, we are also concerned with the several congregations which purport to be a part of the church of Jesus Christ, and this brings us to our particular field of 62 local churches working together in Oregon Yearly Meeting. It is Christ's desire and prayer that spiritual unity and love, as well as compassionate service and mission should be the hallmark of every group of believers.

"Friends believe that the church is not an organization or a building, but essentially living men and women, youth and children, worshipping and working together in a congregation. The image or testimony of every church is the composite picture of each person in the congregation.

"The motive of the church must also be kept close to its original source. Why do we go to so much effort and expense to establish churches and send

our foreign missionaries? Is it to bolster the institution called the church? Or is it simply to honor the great Founder of the church by demonstrating our loyalty to His cause?

"No, the true motive of the church must be the same as Christ's motive in coming to the world to complete redemption's plan. Our motive must reflect His, as recorded in Philippians 2:7-8 (RSV):... 'but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant being born in the likeness of men and being found in human form he humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross.' The cross then becomes the pathway to victory, that we may, in Paul's words, 'present every man perfect in Christ Jesus.' (Colossians 1:28).

"This is the high purpose and calling of the church—to present every man as a product of the power of the gospel, redeemed and restored to his rightful place as a child of God.

"The church is called to mission. Evangelism, at home and abroad, is the lifeline, not only for lost souls, but also for the church itself. Evangelism is essential to the life and health of the church, and without it the church will cease to exist. Also, we must remember that stewardship is the vehicle upon which is carried the mission of the church to the ends of the world.

"The work and ministry of the church is often misinterpreted as being the organizational structure and preaching ministry of the church. While these are vital and important, it is easy for us to get off-center so that most of our energies may be used up in simply being run ragged with committee work and the general operation of the establishment.

"The real work of the church is not usually done at committee meetings, as essential as they are at times, but in the day by day witnessing of Christian people as they are 'sown out' into their various communities and particular associations. A few folk can run the organization, but it takes every member to carry on the real heart-center of the work of the church.

"In my first annual report to you fourteen years ago, I mentioned that we then had more ministers and missionaries than we had places to use them. This condition has now reversed itself and we are desperately short of laborers for these fields. How we need called and prepared young people in ever increasing numbers to man the posts of Christian ministry and leadership! Let us therefore covenant to 'pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers into His harvest.'

"We believe in and expectantly look for the second coming of the Lord. This event, toward which the whole world moves, is the real and blessed Christian hope.

"Our church must prepare itself and all under its ministry for that great day. We are often too engrossed in material pursuits and man-centered interests to dwell on the thoughts of the end of the age.

"The signs of the times are in fulfillment of the prophetic Word of God. How sad it will be for those who are not ready and for those who profess Him but have neglected the extra supply of oil in their lamps. The Holy Spirit is in the world and it is God's plan and design that He should sanctify, cleanse and prepare the church for that great day of the Lord.

"This coming year has been designated the year of Advance 1966-67 in our Yearly Meeting. This is not a new program, but rather a fresh effort to lay aside the 'busy work' of the church in order to permit all the members to concentrate on the 'essential work' of the church, which is prayer, Bible study, worship, visitation, witnessing and attending to the affairs of the Great Commission of our Lord. Advance 1966-67 is the spontaneous heart-cry of your pastors and leaders for revival and spiritual renewal. Friends, it is time for us to lay aside the weights and cut loose from the non-essentials in church operation and give ourselves fully to the

central task and purpose of the church. It is time for us to rediscover the inward peace in communion and the glory of daily living.

"My closing benediction can best be expressed in the words of Jude: 'Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Savior, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and forever, Amen' (Jude 24, 25)"

Dorwin Smith asked Roy Clark to lead in singing "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," which was followed by a time of silent prayer. He expressed appreciation for Dean Gregory's message and his years of service for us.

● 3. Paul P. Petticord, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, and Grace Petticord, his wife, were recognized and welcomed as visitors.

Dean Gregory introduced Leta Hickman who has been his secretary for several months and will continue as office secretary, and Eilene Nordyke who will serve Jack Willcuts as personal secretary. He spoke of new pastors in our Yearly Meeting and introduced Marvin Hall, pastor at Woodland, Idaho; Larry and Janet Houston, Nehalem Bay, Oregon; Roy Clark, Maplewood in Portland; Eugene and Norma McDonald, Holly Park in Seattle; Charles and Nancy Mylander, Ashland, Oregon.

● 4. In the absence of the Assistant Clerk, who serves as reading clerk, Ruth Brown was suggested from the floor to serve this session.

● 12. In the absence of Arthur Roberts as a member of the Business Committee, the Executive Council nominated Frederick Baker to assume this responsibility during these Yearly Meeting sessions.

● 13. The Executive Council informed the Yearly Meeting that a suitable person had not been found to serve as Yearly Meeting Business Manager. They will continue their efforts to secure such a person.

At the present time the General Superintendent has been authorized to hire an administrative secretary, and Eilene Nordyke has been secured for this position. Leta Hickman has been retained as office secretary for another year. Arlene Moore has been retained as assistant treasurer for another year.

● 14. The following letter was read:

The Clackamas Park Friends Outpost wishes to express a heart-felt thank you to our friends of the Yearly Meeting. It would be impossible to accurately evaluate the extra "thrust" you have given us this year through your support in prayer, finances, and interest. We trust that the "extra boost" given our meeting will pay off in abundant dividends for our Lord.

- 18. Roy Clark led the congregation in an opening song, "Revive Us Again." Randall Emry led in prayer.

Approved, with appreciation for the work of the treasurers expressed at the same time.
- 27. The report of the state of the church from Inland Quarterly Meeting was read. (See minute 145).
- 28. The representatives presented the name of Ralph Arensmeier to serve as Yearly Meeting Treasurer for the coming year.

- 29. The following report from the Executive Council was read:
By direction of the Discipline, "The Executive Council is to act on behalf of the Yearly Meeting in cases where the interest or reputation of Friends may render it necessary. All such proceedings shall be reported to the Yearly Meeting sessions."
We do not wish to duplicate the reporting of an action if it is to be presented by another authorized committee of the Yearly Meeting.
Three called meetings of the Executive Council have been held since we met last August. Much of the business transacted was of authorizing proper officials to sign deeds, easements, contracts and notes on behalf of the Yearly Meeting.
One such authorization was made when the Executive Council approved a resolution granting the officers of the Executive Council permission to execute and sign a sales contract to purchase property for the future location of the Northeast Tacoma Friends Church.
At a called meeting on December 3, 1965, your Executive Council authorized the Trustees to investigate the possibility of establishing a credit line with a loaning agency or bank to meet emergencies, mainly to bring our missionaries home if the need arises. (See minute 99)

Further business at this meeting was authorizing the Board of Finance to establish a suitable standing arrangement with the local bank for securing short term loans to meet operating expenses of the Yearly Meeting when funds fail to arrive on time.

By request of the Board of Missions, Everett Clarkson was authorized to be the legal representative of Oregon Yearly Meeting in establishing an incorporation of our mission in Peru.

Due to the extra amount of work necessary in getting all business affairs in proper order, the Executive Council authorized Dean Gregory to hire a half-time secretary from the first of July to the first of August. Her salary was to be paid from the portion of the Assistant Superintendent's salary which was unused due to the completion of his term of service.

Your Executive Council has authorized the preparation and printing of major Yearly Meeting actions and Discipline revisions to be inserted in the back of the 1966 Yearly Meeting Minutes.

The Board of Publication was instructed to study and set up guide lines for the future printing of a revised Discipline.

The question of granting individuals with "License for Ministers in Training" the privilege of performing marriages was brought to our attention. It was our studied judgment that it would not be proper to make such an authorization.

One further action was approving of a request from the Board of Missions to pay a \$600 stipend to the business manager of the Board of Missions for his travel and expenses of the office.

We continue to solicit your prayers on behalf of your Executive Council.

- 30. A notification was read from Newberg Quarterly Meeting that "... all steps outlined in the Discipline, Part II, Section II, Paragraph D-4 have been completed for the establishment of Tigard Preparative Meeting as Tigard Monthly Meeting."

- 31. Inland Quarterly Meeting recommended that "... the annual statistical report be studied for purposes of revision or clarification. The Quarterly Meeting believes that much of the present requested information is irrelevant to the organization and efficient operation of the Yearly Meeting."

They further recommended that "... all Outpost and Preparative Meetings submit their own statistical reports to the Quarterly and Yearly Meetings, even as is now done by the Monthly Meetings."

This was referred to the representatives.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

- 32. Jack L. Willcuts, president, presented the following report:

Not everyone in Oregon Yearly Meeting realizes that the Barclay Press is owned entirely by the Yearly Meeting and is operated under the Board of Publication. The major effort and time of the board is taken with affairs pertaining to the Barclay Press. The Barclay Press is not a private concern, but a "concern of Friends," and since it was purchased from Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher, Barclay Press has functioned under the direction of the Yearly Meeting through the Board of Publication. Policies, personnel selection, plant development, the volume and scope of the entire program of publishing is thus a stewardship of our Church in the same way as our foreign missions and church extension ministries.

The past year has seen a remarkable growth in total printing production with improved quality and enlarged circulation. The Northwest Friend has the largest circulation of any other Yearly Meeting magazine of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. The Fruit of the Vine devotional book has

doubled in circulation the past four years with 2,200 copies each quarter. The Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends, Accent on Youth, Reach and Teach, Concern magazine, and the Teacher's Friend are regular periodicals published, and the Adult Friend Sunday school quarterlies were printed and distributed by Barclay Press this year for the first time. Scores of individual jobs for the Yearly Meeting boards, for George Fox College and different churches were published including quantities of missionary literature such as the Missionary Calendar and various materials in Spanish.

Many indirect services of the Barclay Press and the Board of Publication have benefited the Friends Church such as the distribution center for the Sunday church bulletins, George Fox Press materials to mention a few.

To condense the financial picture, the gross income for the operation of Barclay Press this year jumped from \$34,594.82 the previous year to \$56,142.23 this year, a growth of more than 68 per cent. This increase of around \$22,000 worth of new income was produced without additional staff. Around \$2,350 worth of additional and improved equipment was added this year, but much of this production increase represents improved efficiency and streamlined organization. No personnel changes were necessary the past year and none are anticipated for the coming year. This excellent team includes Harlow Ankeny, Manager; Richard Eichenberger, Production Manager; LeRoy Benham, Graphic Arts; Dixie Glanzman, Composer; Betty Mills, Circulation and Secretary; Gertrude Ankeny, Bookkeeper and Secretary. Again appreciation is expressed for the great amount of volunteer work given by George Randle of Friendsview Manor. The salary scale of each of these persons compares with that of other Christian workers.

Even though Barclay Press has closed the year in the black and shows its best financial picture, its operation has been precarious with constantly rising costs of paper, film, equipment and the difficulties encountered in a small plant operation. The allocation from the United Budget of the Yearly Meeting lacked several hundred dollars of paying for the Northwest Friend alone even though the askings of the Board of Publication represented a figure expected to cover these costs. This means this year's Northwest Friend deficit was absorbed in the total operation of the Barclay Press and that all salaries, equipment purchases, rent to the Yearly Meeting for plant space—all this came from operation profits. Some Friends have been impatient when rising costs have required increases in pricing; others somehow assume the Yearly Meeting is subsidizing the press and thus "church work printing" should cost them less. But the Barclay Press management has conscientiously tried to keep the books balanced and yet help in every way possible to enlarge the use of the printed page in all phases of our Yearly Meeting program. When Friends bypass Barclay Press to have church printing done, because of the printing costs, they sometimes forget they are adding to the problem of the Yearly Meeting publication work, for it is upon volume printing to a large degree that the price break comes. If Barclay Press were forced to close and thus be removed from the scene, the total program of our church would suffer a real loss.

For the first time, the Barclay Press has submitted monthly financial accounting reports the past year to the Oregon Yearly Meeting Board of Finance, as the Board of Publication has concluded that an operation of this size merits the attention and counsel of the Board of Finance.

Lest an impression is given of complete independence, attention must be drawn to various problems. Other religious printing centers have encountered new tax problems. Prayer is requested that we may continue tax-free operation awhile longer, for otherwise it would be beyond our

current ability to survive. Additional equipment is needed, maintenance costs are rising and beyond all this, one of the most critical needs is for a capital fund large enough to permit us to print several new books. A number of manuscripts are now available, but several thousand dollars are required over a period of time to permit the publishing of books. Book sales are often slow so this capital investment takes time to replace. Yet in our day a church that penetrates the culture of this generation must provide written, attractive "reasons for the faith we hold."

Harlow Ankeny, manager of Barclay Press, commented on the year's work of the Press and on its financial statement. He also explained the recommendation of the Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance that Kansas, Ohio, Oregon and Rocky Mountain Yearly Meetings combine their magazines into one publication which this board approves. (See Minute 68, 83).

He announced two new books coming out in the fall—Move Over, Elijah by Arthur O. Roberts and Missionary Moments by Phyllis Cammack.

The financial statement of Barclay Press appears in the appendix.

Approved.

● 33. Paul P. Petticord, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, spoke on behalf of the seminary. Since a well-trained ministry contributes to the progress of the Church, W. E. S. is also in the mood for advance. Superintendents of constituent denominations and heads of Christian college departments of religion are being called together for evaluation of its program. More denominations are using and supporting the seminary. Last May the seminary was accepted as an associate member of the American Association of Theological Schools. This is the first step toward full accreditation.

● 34. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

● 35. Roy Clark opened the session with the congregation singing "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus." Scott Clark led in prayer.

● 36. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

● 37. Merle Green, president, presented the following report, after reading the section in the Constitution and Discipline expressing Friends' views concerning war and peace, also Query 6: One of the gracious fruits of the Spirit is PEACE. Can we do any less than to pursue, or seek after PEACE, without which no man shall see the Lord? In this day of strife and war let us with all our resources live peaceably with all men.

The board has made its personnel available to present the peace concern by ministry, teaching, and counseling. An Alternate Service Committee has been organized within the board to handle all matters concerning alternate service. Information has gone out to all meetings of our working relationship with the Mennonite Central Committee for Conscientious Objectors. Three of our young men, Fredric Gregory, Jonathan Newkirk, and Jerry Sandoz will begin their alternate service under the M. C. C. beginning August 30, 1966. The board has adopted as our Foreign Relief Project for the coming year the support of this Viet Nam team. We have endeavored to promote the doctrine of peace as held by Oregon Yearly Meeting by encouraging the preaching of peace from our pulpits, instruction in the Sunday school and discussion groups among our young people. Two panels on peace and the C. O. position were held at George Fox College.

Friends have long been known for their benevolence and labor of love. The ministry of SERVICE is performed with no thought of remuneration. It is a service in the name of Christ. Many hours of labor and gifts of charity have been given that are recorded only in heaven.

The one united project of our Yearly Meeting in the area of service has been our foreign relief program. To date \$2,641.50 has been sent to the National Association of Evangelicals World Relief Commission. This is the equivalent of almost 10 carloads of food. This past year our board has endeavored to promote a new field of service in child adoption and foster homes.

Stanley Perisho reported additional funds on hand for the foreign relief program, making the current total \$2,727.50. He emphasized the project chosen for the coming year.

Friendsview Manor reports a very successful year with residents continuing to enjoy and appreciate the fine Christian spirit which permeates the environment. The problem of property tax assessments is still unsettled. The Oregon State Supreme Court has the case at this time and has not yet rendered a decision.

A number of former ministers of Oregon Yearly Meeting or their widows enjoy life in the Manor. ● 38. Dean Gregory introduced visitors Marvin and Roberta Kistler from Anchorage, Alaska. Frank Cole introduced Lee Lane, professor of speech at George Fox College, who has also been working with the admissions office.

● 39. The statistical report prepared by Margaret Weesner, statistician, was read. It appears in the appendix.

● 40. The report of the Church Music Committee prepared by the chairman, Ruth Corbin, was read as follows:

In looking over the goals set up by the music committee six years ago, we are gratified to see that most of these have been attained and more besides. There has been a gradual increase in interest over the Yearly Meeting in raising the standards for the music in our churches, as evidenced by the consistent increase in the number of adult choirs, and the increase in the number of children's choirs and electric organs being added. This gives us real hope that the next generation will have many more enthusiastic choir participants because of the investment that is being made in the children's choirs now, and a better quality of instrumental music because of the investments in these lovely new electric organs.

"The Music Box" column has appeared periodically.

Nine or ten of the meetings reported observing March as Music Month. We would encourage more to give this emphasis during this time and reap the impetus that will result.

A Choir Conference was held at Cascade College, Portland, Oregon, in March for the choirs in that area, and a Church Music Forum was held in Nampa, Idaho, in August for the benefit of the church musicians in the Boise Valley. There was great enthusiasm for both conferences, and no effort was spared to make them as helpful as possible.

For several years the music committee has engaged the musicians for the Yearly Meeting sessions and arranged for the choirs. We appreciate the willing cooperation of the organists and pianists and song leaders that have helped so faithfully.

As a result of the song writing contest held the past three years, the committee is putting together a book which we hope to publish, containing many of the contest entries and also songs by other Quakers throughout the yearly meetings of America.

SUMMARY OF MUSIC QUESTIONNAIRE

There were 45 meetings reporting; six reported last year that did not report this year. In order to get as complete a picture as possible, I have used data from last year's report for these meetings. Thus, the report covers 51 meetings.

Regular choirs, 23, with over 300 singers

Seasonal choirs, 13, with 170 singers

This makes a total of 36 choirs, and approximately 470 singers.

There were 23 youth and children's choirs reported, with about 300 singers.

A total of 34 churches report now owning some kind of an electric organ, compared with 30 churches last year and 26 the year before.

Approved with expression of appreciation.

● 41. The report of the Trustees prepared by Oliver Weesner, president, was read as follows:

Proceedings by the City of Beaverton, Oregon, to widen certain streets adjacent to the property of Oregon Yearly Meeting in that city were signed by the president of the Trustees. The proceeds from these transactions received from the City of Beaverton amounted to \$1,880 and have been turned to the Yearly Meeting Treasurer for the account of the Board of Evangelism.

The president and secretary of the Trustees upon authorization by the Executive Council signed a warranty deed to Helpful Neighbors Club for a small parcel of land, a part of the Agnew outpost property, and a quit claim deed to Aaron A. Gebhardt and Lillie L. Gebhardt. A warranty deed from Helpful Neighbors Club to Oregon Yearly Meeting has been received. These documents were made to rectify certain inaccuracies

in the lines and descriptions of the Agnew property. The net proceeds from these transactions amounted to \$345.66, which amount has been received and transferred to the treasurer of the Agnew Outpost.

The Executive Council has authorized the Trustees to execute and sign a note and mortgage in favor of the First National Bank of Oregon in an amount of not to exceed \$100,000 upon the Newberg Friends Church property. Thus far it has not been necessary for the Trustees to execute such documents, and it is now expected that only a comparatively small portion, if any, of the amount will be needed. The contractor is now engaged in remodeling and in building additions to the building.

Regular payments on the Stowell purchase contract of the former Quaker Apartments building in Portland have been made during the past year. The balance of the principal as of August 10, 1966 is \$18,330.75.

Barclay Press has paid its rent account to April 1, 1966.

The following is the statement of the principal outstanding on notes issued at the time of construction of the headquarters building:

- 42. The Committee on Discipline Revision presented for final action the two matters given preliminary approval last year and referred to it for the year. The first of these, found in Minute 73, page 29, 1965 Minutes, refers to the incorporation of monthly meetings. As approved it reads as follows:

7. INCORPORATION. Monthly meetings are at liberty to incorporate provided they adopt Articles of Incorporation pursuant to the form approved by Oregon Yearly Meeting, which makes clear the position of the monthly meeting as a part of and subordinate to the Yearly Meeting, and as governed by the Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

The committee recommended that this final action be favorable.

The second matter, found in Minute 116, page 35, as approved reads as follows:

3. THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT. The Yearly Meeting shall appoint, on nomination by the Executive Council, a person to serve as General Superintendent. His initial appointment shall be for a term of two years. The following year and annually thereafter, as his services prove to be satisfactory and effective and as he senses a continuing concern for the work, the appointment shall be extended for an additional year, thus giving him with each extension a two-year period in prospect for longer range planning. (A period of one year for smoother transition is also thus provided when his service is to be terminated.)

The committee recommended final approval of this measure.
Approved.

- 43. The Executive Council recommended the following:
Pursuant to 1965 Yearly Meeting Minute 73, page 29, relating to the Incorporation of Monthly Meetings, we propose the following for Yearly Meeting consideration and adoption:

Since the Articles of Incorporation for churches must take various forms because of the differing corporation laws in the three states of Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, Oregon Yearly Meeting shall not propose the wording of the Articles in each instance other than to require the insertion of the following four statements:

First, that somewhere in the paragraph on Purpose or Objective there be included this clause: "to conduct a local church in accordance with the provisions as set forth in the Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, a non-profit corporation in the State of Oregon."

Second, under Dissolution, insert this paragraph: "Though intended to be perpetual, the corporation, in case of dissolution, provides that the assets shall become the property of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, or its successors."

Third, under Membership, that "Every person who has been admitted as a member of the _____ Friends Church in accordance with said Constitution and Discipline shall be a member of this corporation, and no other terms of admission into such corporation will be recognized or required."

Fourth, under Trustees, "The method of electing trustees and the duties of the trustees shall be in accord with said Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church."

If in the event that the exact wording as stated above is inconsistent with the Statute of the State under which the Monthly Meeting is seeking incorporation, differing wording will be allowed provided that it states in essence the concepts delineated above, and that the suggested change is approved by the Yearly Meeting Superintendent.

Approved.

- 44. Winona Selby and Geraldine Willcuts presented the report of the Women's Missionary Union by a dialogue which revealed the activities of the past year.

Approved.

- 45. The meeting adjourned to meet Thursday, 9:15 a. m.

- 46. Roy Clark opened the session leading the congregation in singing "He Leadeth Me." George Bales led in prayer.
- 47. The minutes of the last business session were read and approved.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 48. The following is the report of the Board of Evangelism presented Wednesday evening by Charles Beals, president: (The financial statement of the Friends Church Extension Foundation appears in the appendix.)

Although your board has concerned itself with discovering new fields, starting new churches, bringing new life to struggling older meetings, seeking to effect a more effectual pastoral ministry, and building church edifices, we have not forgotten that our prime motive is the salvation of souls. Unless sinners are brought to repentance, all our efforts are as chaff. We call to mind that the "Son of Man came to seek and to save that which was lost." Thus it is our expectation that through the starting of new meetings and building of churches souls are to be won.

In the starting of new churches, Meridian, and Emmett in Idaho, and Clackamas Park near Portland, are our delights. A little over a year ago the Meridian congregation, under the able leadership of Dorwin Smith, moved from a rented hall to a beautiful new sanctuary. During the year

they were transferred from Outpost to Preparative Meeting status. Their annual report reveals their average Sunday school attendance at 44, morning worship 48, and Sunday evening 40. They are self-supporting—receiving no financial assistance from the Yearly Meeting.

Clackamas Park is another exciting story. Their first public service was held last September 12, in a lovely new sanctuary on a five-acre site in a fast growing urban community, with Howard E. Harmon as pastor. Their report for the year shows an average Sunday school attendance of 60, morning worship 68, Sunday evening 46, and prayer meeting 27. They report ten conversions with new families becoming a vital part of their program. Their budget for next year is \$15,200 which includes heavy monthly payments on land and property. The Board of Evangelism is giving no financial subsidy this coming year, although the Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Union will be paying \$100 monthly towards salary.

We have an inspiring report on Emmett where Allen and Wilma Cole have been laboring with determination, courage, and faith—along with a handful of dedicated laity—to build a church and win souls for Christ. One-and-a-half acres of ground have been given them. A well was drilled without charge. The free use of heavy equipment has been promised, along with donated labor pledged. They held their ground breaking on July 3, and construction is underway. The Board of Evangelism has pledged a \$4,000 matching fund and the Yearly Meeting Quaker Men are attempting to raise enough to pay the pastor's salary so that he can give full time to church building work.

The Nehalem Preparative Meeting on the coast near Twin Rocks has taken a forward step under the pastoral leadership of Larry Houston by entering into a purchase agreement for the Methodist church building at nearby Weeler, Oregon, where the Friends have now been holding services since last January with marked increase of attendance and community interest. The building was made available by the Methodists electing to consolidate two churches and hold services in Nehalem. This frame building just off of Highway 101 is attractive and in an excellent state of repair. It measures 30x42 feet with full basement and an auditorium to seat nearly 100. The purchase price is \$5,000 and figures out to two dollars per square foot. The Friends Church Extension Foundation is providing a \$4,400 loan to acquire the property. Currently the Nehalem Bay congregation (they have added the word Bay to their name) is financing its program without help from the Yearly Meeting.

One may ask, now that Meridian, Clackamas Park, and Emmett are on their way, what are the board's plans for the future? Frankly, it appears for the moment that no new church will be forthcoming during the ensuing year, although there is the slight possibility for some surprising developments.

The board has, however, some projections which may develop into a church or two in a couple of years providing the Yearly Meeting gives wholehearted support in interest and prayer as well as financially. These projections are based upon what we conceive to be essentials for launching new churches. To enumerate a few of them: It takes whole families including the men to make a thriving church. It cannot be built by women and children alone. To draw whole families into church and on to salvation, there needs to be an attractive and completed church building. With rare exceptions, no longer can churches be launched from basements, tabernacles, and private dwellings. Neither can a church be started in communities where the population is static. It is only where people are on the move, particularly into new housing developments, that we find response to new churches. In fact, ideally a completed church building with a spiritual full-time pastor should be in an area ahead of the housing development.

With these proven facts in mind, the board has in past years joined with Quarterly Meetings in acquiring two pieces of property which are being held for eventual church development. One is near Beaverton, close to Portland, where contributions from two Portland Quarterly Meeting churches plus the rental from a dwelling located on it are covering the monthly payments. Another is near Seattle, Washington, close to Kent, where Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting is making sizeable contributions to the purchase price, the board making up the difference. It is hoped that a new work can be started in a couple of years at this site—following somewhat the same procedure as that of Clackamas Park. It should be noted as a matter of information that Southwest Washington Quarterly Meeting a few years back entered into a sales contract for land west of Camas looking forward to a new church development.

One of the problems facing the Board of Evangelism is the need to accumulate a relatively large sum of money in order to give substantial assistance to an outpost towards the construction of a sanctuary. Our dilemma is that the amount allocated to the board through the United Budget in any one year is insufficient to accomplish this end. Therefore, it is our hope that the Yearly Meeting will see fit to permit us to set up a reserve fund so that accumulated sums over a two- or three-year period will be significant enough to put a building program across.

Although the work at Newport, Oregon, was laid down a couple of years ago, it was the consensus of opinion of the trustees of the sponsoring Highland meeting in Salem and your board that the dwelling at Newport where services were held should be retained for an indefinite time. Although the initial payments on the property were made by Highland and the Newport congregation, house rental income plus a private monthly donation are now enough to cover monthly payments on the sales contract.

In this day of urbanization, it has seemed advisable upon occasion for an older church to relocate. Such is the action of the Everett Meeting in Washington where Calvin Hull is pastor—although they have gone no further. Boise church, with Dale Field as pastor, has acquired land outside of the city in anticipation of building a new church plant sometime in the future. Your board has not assisted Boise, but this year we have helped the smaller Northeast Tacoma meeting where Frederick Baker is the pastor by making the down payment on a 4 1/2 acre property in a rapidly growing district a few miles from the present site. The church is carrying the monthly payments. The meeting reports conversions and membership acquisition and in every way evidences new life and vitality.

As a matter of reporting, some extensive enlargement programs have been consummated this year by churches without financial assistance from your board with the exception of one Share call. Adding to their educational units are Silverton at an approximate cost of \$36,000; Tigard of \$40,000; Talent of \$10,000; Marion of \$10,000. Newberg is both remodeling and adding a wing at a total approximate cost of \$135,000. Rosemere has built a parsonage; East Wenatchee is just now purchasing a parsonage.

We have an opportunity to be a participant in a challenging new work as far distant as Omaha, Nebraska, in connection with the Evangelical Friends Alliance of which Ohio, Kansas, Rocky Mountain, and Oregon Yearly Meetings are members. Your board has two members on the Church Extension and Evangelism Commission of E. F. A. This commission at its meeting in January voted to organize a new Friends Church at Omaha with Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting administering the program on behalf of the Alliance. The action of the commission was subject to the approval of the member yearly meetings. The Board of Evangelism concurs and is ready to appropriate some financial aid if our Yearly Meeting so approves. The Alliance will be reporting more fully on this during these Yearly Meeting sessions. (See minutes 68, 83)

Pastors have been appointed to Outposts as follows: Allen Cole to Emmett; Larry Houston to Nehalem Bay; Howard E. Harmon to Clackamas Park; Zenas Perisho to Timber; May Wallace to Agnew; and Charles Mylander to Ashland. Quincy and Svensen both have been transferred from Outpost to Preparative Meeting status.

Starting new outposts and building new churches are not the only concerns of your board. We are the proud sponsors of the Youth Ambassador volunteer church service program. This year it was administered for us by Lonny Fendall, assisted by Gene Hockett. Our ambassadors this year were Linda Jensen to Emmett, Janet Johnson to Seattle Friends Memorial, Keith Morse to Marion, Edith Payne to Rosemere, Howard Macy to Portland First Friends, Dorlan Bales to Meadows, Phyllis Brown to Netarts, Jean Thomas to Nehalem Bay, Kent Thornburg to Northeast Tacoma, Barbara Baker to the British Isles, and Mary Bel Cammack to Mexico.

Two Share calls were made this year—one for Clackamas Park and the other for Silverton.

We joined with other boards in conducting a week's Christian Vocations Campus Conference on the George Fox College campus. We also gave small financial assistance to implement the Pastors' Short Course sponsored by the Department of Religion of the college.

Although the Friends Church Extension Foundation is a separate corporation, it comes under the aegis of the Board of Evangelism in that the latter approves all candidates to the corporation membership and it nominates half the directors. The Foundation, chartered to make loans to Friends churches, currently has outstanding loans to Hillsboro, Ashland, Pringle, Hayden Lake, Rose Valley, Meridian, Parkrose, Holly Park, Eugene and Metolius, totaling approximately \$65,000. In addition, the Foundation has guaranteed loans granted by commercial lending institutions to Whitney, Silverton, and Tigard totaling \$92,589.66. The Foundation assets now stand at \$77,451.76.

Finally, it should be said that your board has attempted to administer the pastoral, evangelism and church extension programs within the policies as set forth by the Discipline and by the actions of the Yearly Meeting. Being subordinate to the Yearly Meeting, we stand ready to receive any directions which you may make.

Approved.

- 49. The representatives having considered the recommendation from Portland Quarterly Meeting concerning evaluating the effectiveness of our Quarterly Meetings in the light of present day needs, recommended that the matter should be turned to the Board of Evangelism for their consideration and study. (See minute 16)

- 50. The representatives agreed that there should be some revision or clarification of the statistical report as suggested in the communication from Inland Quarterly Meeting. They recommended that this matter be turned to the Executive Council for study and reported back to the Yearly Meeting. (See minute 31)

- 57. The representatives presented the following nominations to the Committee on Ecumenical Relations: for a three-year term—Arthur O. Roberts; as Friends Youth representative—Ronald Stansell; for a one-year term (replacing Kenneth Pitts)—Paul Mills.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

- 62. Myron Goldsmith, president, presented the reports of the two departments of the board with comments on the continuing responsibility of Christians to speak out against current social evils. Virginia Helm, chairman of the Public Morals department, highlighted the report of that department and introduced a handbook which coordinates moral action concerns with the Year of Advance. Winners of the poster and essay contests were announced as follows:

Posters—Junior first prize, Michael Pearson, Salem Quarter; Junior high first prize, Charloanne Finke, Portland Quarter; second prize, Janelle Fendall, Newberg Quarter. High school, second prize, Daniel Fendall, Newberg Quarter; adult, first prize, Sharon Longstroth, Salem Quarter; second prize, Roger Minthorne, Newberg Quarter.

Essays—Junior high, second prize, Mary Smith, Greenleaf Quarter; high school, first prize, Lynda Campbell, Boise Quarter; second prize, David Williams, Greenleaf Quarter.

PUBLIC MORALS DEPARTMENT

Written reports show a certain consistency, but not necessarily a growth in concern. Seventy-five per cent of the meetings manage to send in reports and fifty per cent have some kind of Commitment Day or Youth Temperance Education Week observance, as has been true the last several years. Those who signed total abstinence pledges this year numbered slightly under fifty per cent less than last, but, of course, many had already made their commitment and saw no need for renewal. There was an increased interest in the Idaho temperance camp, and emphasis upon moral problems was included in the summer youth camps.

On the brighter side of the report, there seemed to be better record-keeping on the part of the committees, with fewer "manys," "somes," "a fews" and question marks to add up. A local report sheet for church workers may have helped in this. There were a few more temperance presentations, nearly 400, averaging nine per meeting, five of them sermons. Nearly 9,000 tracts were given out, an increase of four times the amount distributed last year, although the figure may include the 5,200 Youth Temperance Education Week brochures which were sent to all meetings before Commitment Day. The new Yearly Meeting Moral Action poster and essay contests had a good beginning and provided material for displays and programs in local and quarterly meetings. There were more quarterly meeting presentations reported than formerly. Moral action books were added to church libraries.

The "New Morality" seemed to be the greatest concern emphasized through local classes, sermons, and panel discussions. The two Idaho Quarterly Meetings sponsored a seminar in Nampa which attracted at least 450 people, some from other denominations and some having public responsibility. Portland Quarterly Meeting also held a thought-provoking panel discussion.

Legislation continues to be a concern of many churches; some have quizzed candidates on their attitudes on moral issues, and election material has been provided. Due to general constituency interest, Youth Temperance Education Week will be nationally proclaimed in 1967.

The Public Morals department made at least three mailings of sample literature to Moral Action chairmen and pastors. Two new film strips were placed in the Moral Action Library in the Yearly Meeting headquarters, one on alcohol, another on the tobacco problem. The film list was completely revised and now includes sources for films on moral concern in the entire Pacific Northwest.

Since this was not the year to reprint the Handbook for Committees, the Moral Action Board has mimeographed its own, including a film list, and an outline for coordination with the program of the Yearly Meeting. Our prayer is that the Moral Action Program of the church will ADVANCE with the outreach of Friends in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

LITERATURE DEPARTMENT

Forty-three meetings reported activities to the Literature Department of the Board of Moral Action. Of these, 42 have church libraries and eight have additional libraries for special groups. During the past year 602 books have been added to the church libraries, although one quarterly meeting had not added any books and another only three. The meetings adding the most books were not necessarily the larger meetings. They seem to be those concerned enough to devise means of securing books. However, the presence of books is not sufficient to ensure their being read. Their availability must be made known and the reading of them must be encouraged. Thirty-two churches did this by book reviews given in Sunday school, Friends Youth, and Women's Missionary Union, encour-

agement of reading from the pulpit and in prayer meeting, choice of a book of the year, bulletins, posters, displays, bulletin boards, and a panel discussion of the kinds and values of reading for the Christian. Some meetings have relocated their libraries to make the books more easily accessible to prospective readers.

Systematic Bible reading was promoted by 17 churches. One local Moral Action Committee sponsored Bible memorization contests in which 13 juniors and five of the younger women participated.

Twenty-one churches have actively fought obscene literature in their communities by writing to congressmen, legislators, mayors and city commissioners asking for improved legislation and ordinances against it and commending them for their efforts in banning or controlling it. Individuals have been encouraged to speak to storekeepers who carry questionable magazines and books and to commend those who refrain from selling these. Instruction has been given in youth and adult groups, from the pulpit and through inserts in the bulletin. Posters and skits were also used. Concern was expressed that we exercise Christian judgment in the choice of TV and radio programs.

Mark A. Talney, regional distribution secretary of the American Bible Society, spoke of the 150th anniversary of the society. He expressed the deep sense of urgency under which the society finds itself because of many factors—the resurgence of ancient religions, the emergence of new religions, the secularism of today's society, the increase of literacy, the exploding population, the increase of the blind in America, the large number of people in prisons, in institutions for the mentally ill and those for the chronically ill, the increasing college population and the 15,000,000 Bible-less Americans.

The report of the Board of Moral Action was approved.

- 63. Clare Willcuts introduced Alfred Smith, visiting Friends minister, and wife Maude, from University Friends Church, Wichita, Kansas.
- 64. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

Thursday, 2:30 p.m.

- 65. Roy Clark opened the session leading the congregation in singing "He Leadeth Me." Walter Cook led in prayer.
- 66. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.
- 67. The report of the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations for the year 1965-66, prepared by Arthur O. Roberts, chairman, was read by Myron Goldsmith as follows:

The committee. . . met four times during the year to accomplish its objectives. These were set forth in a general way in 1961 when Oregon Yearly Meeting approved these principles: (1) to strengthen such bonds of Quaker unity as we now have; (2) to define our doctrines; (3) to work toward the establishment of a Friends Church worldwide in scope and evangelical in nature.

For this past year our objectives were as follows: (1) make a study of doctrines held by Friends, (2) discuss organizational needs of our church, (3) continue to advise our representatives to the Evangelical Friends Alliance, (4) consider ways to encourage and initiate inter-yearly meeting cooperative relationships, and (5) encourage inter-yearly meeting visitation.

Although we did devote some time for deliberation on polity and inter-yearly meeting cooperation and visitation, our major efforts were devoted to doctrinal study and counsel to the Alliance representatives.

A delegation of Oregon Yearly Meeting members was invited and participated in the Conference on Doctrine sponsored by the Association of

Evangelical Friends and held at Rockcleft, near Colorado Springs, Colorado, July 8-12, 1966. Two members of the committee, Arthur O. Roberts and Gerald Dillon, were the appointed conveners of the conference. Others invited from Oregon Yearly Meeting included Myron Goldsmith, Charles Beals, Paul Mills, Milo Ross, Dean Gregory, Charles Ball, and Jack Willcuts. Dean Gregory and Charles Ball were unable to make the trip, and Jack Willcuts could not get there because of the air strike.

Forty men from across America and from ten different yearly meetings were invited to the conference, and thirty-two of them were able to be present. The conference addressed itself to four basic issues: "The Nature of Christian Authority," "Worship in the Friends Church," "The Meaning of the Church," and "Holiness in our Doctrine of Salvation."

By panel discussion and in plenary session the participants reviewed Quaker and contemporary formulations of these issues and subjected them to Biblical exposition. In the lovely mountain setting of the camp, attendees found rich fellowship in the Holy Spirit. It was more than theologians wrestling with terms; rather it was men of God yearning to see the Church be more effective in proclamation of the Gospel.

It remains to be seen what effects this conference—the first such among Quakers in 70 years—will have among Friends. Hopefully the clarifications of doctrine among and within yearly meetings is a step toward that doctrinal consensus which is one condition for church unity and for church growth.

The activities of the Evangelical Friends Alliance demonstrate Oregon Yearly Meeting's concern for inter-yearly meeting cooperation. A separate report is attached.

The Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations has taken cognizance of the forthcoming Friends World Conference at Guilford College, North Carolina, in 1967. The Executive Council did not feel it advisable to appoint official representatives, but individuals may attend on another basis. We feel some direction should be given to those from Oregon who might attend.

The winds of change are blowing across the Friends Church, with clusters of consecrated individuals giving thought to organic and spiritual renewal. We hope to be faithful to Oregon Yearly Meeting and to the mind of the Spirit in interpreting these movements and in eliciting participation in them.

- 68. Gerald Dillon presented the following report:

The Evangelical Friends Alliance met at the Auditorium Hotel, Denver, Colorado, April 21-23, 1966. Official representatives totaling 42 members from Ohio, Kansas, Rocky Mountain and Oregon Yearly Meetings were present. Four visitors were also present. Walter P. Lee, Superintendent of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, served as chairman of the conference in the absence of Dean Gregory.

The Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends (George Fox Press) also met with us giving a full report of its work. Although this board is not a part of the Alliance, the organization anticipates the day when it will be fully absorbed into the Alliance. The following commissions met and made reports: Missions, Youth, Church Extension, Christian Education, and Publications. The Missions Commission under the leadership of Sherman Brantingham reported that Roscoe Knight was doing pioneer deputation work throughout the Alliance, the first of its kind. He reported on a survey trip to Mexico, explaining the possibility of a new mission field for the Alliance. The full Coordinating Council acted favorably upon this anticipated development in missionary work, and is asking each member Yearly Meeting to take action in this regard. (See minutes 85, 86).

The Youth Commission under the leadership of Lonny Fendall continues to take the lead, boldly venturing ahead into new uncharted areas of cooperation. Major projects include (1) the publication of the youth periodical Accent magazine, (2) a leadership conference in 1967 for Friends Youth, (3) publishing Teen Topics for Friends Youth, (4) a youth handbook, (5) cooperation with the National Association of Evangelicals Youth Commission, and other challenging projects.

The Church Extension Commission under the leadership of Leonard Borton of Ohio Yearly Meeting requested that consideration be given to an Alliance outpost in Omaha, Nebraska. An inspiring and challenging description of the possibilities in Omaha was given. The Coordinating Council approved this as a common project of the Alliance, and request for approval has been sent to each member Yearly Meeting. (See minutes 48, 84)

In addition, the Commission reports that a four-yearly-meeting pastors' conference is being considered for the future.

The Christian Education Commission under the leadership of Howard E. Harmon requested that the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends henceforth be given the privilege of giving their report to the Alliance during the Christian Education Committee report. This was granted, recognizing it as an initial step toward full incorporation of the board into the Alliance at some future time. A uniform standard for the Christian Education work of the Alliance is being prepared.

The Publication Commission under the leadership of Harlow Ankeny reported on the steps taken toward a joint publication of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. This publication is designed to incorporate magazines now being published by the member yearly meetings, and also the Missionary Voice. The target date for publication of the first issue is September, 1967. (See minutes 32, 83)

A major item of business was the approval of the recommended changes to the constitution requested by Kansas Yearly Meeting.

The Alliance organized with the following officers to serve the coming year:

The Alliance was challenged by the keynote address given by Walter Lee at the opening session, the rich fellowship of kindred minds and hearts, and above all the presence of Christ in our midst.

- 69. Gerald Dillon presented the following from the Kansas Section of the Evangelical Friends Alliance for consideration by Oregon Yearly Meeting:

Proposed revisions or amendments to the Constitution and Statement of Faith of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, approved by Kansas Yearly Meeting of Friends, October, 1965.

1. Article II—Add to the present stated purpose: "Active attempts shall be made to find areas and ways of united fellowship and organizational agreements with other bodies of the Society of Friends who are in agreement with the Statement of Faith."

2. Article IV, Section (3), last sentence—Change the word "review" to "approval."

3. Article IV, Section (5)—Change to read as follows: "Member yearly meetings shall be kept informed on financial needs in the operation of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, and may support the united program by whatever methods may be deemed advisable within each yearly meeting, whether by budgetary or freewill contributions. In cases where fixed expenses, such as . . . (to be spelled out in by-laws) are involved, the requests for finances should be met on a proportionate basis. The Coordinating Council shall be responsible for receiving and considering all financial needs and askings of the various commissions, and when approved it shall forward such appeals to the member yearly meetings, through proper channels."

4. Article VI, First Paragraph—After "Coordinating Council" change to read: "made up from each member yearly meeting as follows: the General Superintendent, two members of each commission appointed annually, plus one other member at large from each member yearly meeting."

5. Article VII, Second Paragraph—Change the word "chairman" to "president."

6. Article IX, First Paragraph, Sentence 2—Change "appointed by the president" to "named by the Coordinating Council."

7. Article IX, Third Paragraph—Change first sentence to begin: "As need may arise, and financing being made available, the Evangelical Friends Alliance may through its Coordinating Council. . ."

8. Article X—Add to the first paragraph: "A quorum shall consist of two thirds of its members with each member yearly meeting represented."

9. Article X—Change the end of the second paragraph from "if no objection has been registered by a member yearly meeting," to read "if approved by each member yearly meeting."

● 77. The representatives presented the name of Roger Minthorne for a two-year term on the Ohio-Oregon Pension Plan Committee.
Approved.

BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

● 78. Kenneth Williams, president, presented the following report: Oregon Yearly Meeting is responsible for influencing the education of at least 609 students of junior high school age, 450 senior high school students and 279 students studying at the college level, according to reports received from the monthly meetings. An additional 73 persons are working toward advanced degrees.

Of 240 students working toward baccalaureate degrees, 116 are attending George Fox College. According to reports submitted, 44 young people are preparing for fulltime Christian service.

Almost 300 of our members are in the teaching profession. Only 12 of these are members of the National Educators Fellowship.

Fourteen scholarships or grants-in-aid are provided by monthly or quarterly meetings for providing financial aid to students attending George Fox College.

The board has carried out its work through correspondence with the monthly and quarterly meeting chairmen of the Board of General Education. One fall meeting of the board was held in addition to the regular mid-year meeting. The board is striving to impress upon every member of the Yearly Meeting the tremendous need for a realistic, practical philosophy of Christian education which will cause parents to give careful consideration to the education of youth.

A college relations committee has worked closely with George Fox College encouraging full support of our church college within the Yearly Meeting.

The board is preparing several bulletin inserts featuring the cause of Christian education. Plans are approved for members from the board to join with George Fox College personnel to present to the churches the cause of Christian education.

Norman Winters, principal of Greenleaf Academy, reported on the activities, faculty and program of the academy. (A copy of this report may be obtained upon request from the academy.)

Richard Beebe, principal of Applegate Elementary School, Eugene, Oregon, introduced Ruth Morse and Dorothy Roberts, who outlined by an informal dialogue the advantages of a Christian education at George Fox College over local state institutions. Richard Beebe expressed his concern for leadership training for our youth under Christian guidance. The majority of sorely-needed Christian leaders will come from our Christian schools and colleges.

Kenneth Williams introduced Milo C. Ross, president of George Fox College, who presented his printed annual report, emphasizing certain points therein. (A copy of this report may be secured from the college.) A mimeographed sheet reporting financial gifts to the college from meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting and from other Yearly Meetings was explained and clarified. He made some announcements of particular significance to the college at this time. A new project is being planned to develop workshop programs which will be presented in various meetings throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting. Representatives of the college, churches, and the Board of General Education will lead discussions of

timely and significant aspects of education. George Fox College has rejoined the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges. The Calder Foundation paid the \$150,000 balance of its \$300,000 gift on July 11, two years ahead of schedule. The accreditation status of the college has been extended without the necessity of further review by the accrediting committee.

The report and presentation of this board was approved with several expressions of appreciation from the floor.

- 79. Dean Gregory introduced a new pastor to Oregon Yearly Meeting—Harold Clark, co-pastor of Maplewood Preparative Meeting in Portland, and his wife Sharon.
- 80. After singing together a verse of "Trust and Obey," the meeting adjourned to meet Friday at 9:15 a. m.

- 81. Roy Clark opened the session leading the congregation in singing "The Solid Rock". Russel Stands led in prayer.
- 82. The minutes of the last session were read and approved.
- 83. The representatives to the Evangelical Friends Alliance recommended the publication of a new magazine which will be called The Evangelical Friend and will replace The Northwest Friend (Oregon), The Rocky Mountain Friend (Rocky Mountain), The Southwest Friend (Kansas), The Evangelical Friend (Ohio), and The Missionary Voice. The magazine will be 8 1/2 x 11 inches trimmed size, at least 20 pages in length including a four-page insert about and for each yearly meeting, and will be published monthly with a target date for the first issue being September, 1967.

It is the hope that initially the magazine will cost no more than is now being spent by all four yearly meetings for each separate magazine and The Missionary Voice. A capital fund of at least \$2,500 is to be raised within the four yearly meetings (500 Charter Donors of five dollars each) to care for initial publishing costs.

Advertising of a selective nature and in keeping with editorial policies and established advertising principles will be accepted for the magazine to aid in its further enlargement and ministry.

Editorial positions and personnel were named as follows: Editor-in-chief and Editorial Board Chairman, Dean Gregory; Consulting Editors, Everett L. Cattell-Ohio, Charles S. Ball-Oregon, Verlin Hinshaw-Kansas, and Ira Berry-Rocky Mountain; Executive Editor, Jack L. Willcuts; Managing Editor, Harlow Ankeny.

Distribution of the magazine will be the responsibility of each yearly meeting—either mass distribution paid for by united budgets or on an individual subscription basis. The Barclay Press was approved as printers of the new magazine. (See minutes 32, 68)

Approved.

- 84. The Board of Evangelism presented the following background and proposal by the Church Extension and Evangelism Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance regarding a united church extension project and recommended its approval by Oregon Yearly Meeting:

Background—This Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance held its first meeting in 1963. Much of the study was directed toward getting acquainted with the various yearly meeting procedures in church extension and evaluating future purposes of the commission. In its 1964 meeting the commission gave considerable thought toward a united project. From that discussion, decision was made to move toward such action with the Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting area in mind. The 1965 meeting resulted in the proposal that each yearly meeting board set aside funds to

be held in reserve for a united project; accordingly the Oregon Yearly Meeting Board allocated \$1,000.

Proposal—In its meeting in Denver last April the commission approved the following recommendation: We propose that an E. F. A. united church extension project at Omaha, Nebraska, be both endorsed and supported under the following tentative arrangement:

1. That Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting continue their initiative in giving guidance to the meeting and, upon approval of a committee of this commission, place, counsel and assist the local church in support of a pastor there;
2. That approximately \$1,200 each be contributed this year by Oregon, Ohio, and Kansas Yearly Meetings toward the purchase of property;
3. That the approximate \$3,000 designated in 1965-66 by Oregon, Ohio, and Kansas Yearly Meetings be held in trust and made available upon call for such property purchase;
4. That information and promotion of this project be shared in local meetings throughout the E. F. A.

It should be specifically noted that all the moneys set aside in 1965-66 and in 1966-67 will not be expended, but held in reserve until it is clear that the work at Omaha shows evidence of valid worth and promise.

As a result of the above proposal, Clynton Crisman met with personnel from the other three yearly meetings at Omaha to make preliminary appraisal of the potential for a Friends meeting there. (See minutes 48, 68) Approved.

- 85. The Board of Missions presented the following recommendation: The Missions Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, in session April 22-24, 1966, approved challenging the member Yearly Meetings to enter into a cooperative project by placing Roscoe and Tina Knight in Mexico as soon as possible with Oregon Yearly Meeting as the sending agency. We recommend that the Yearly Meeting join in this effort and that \$2,500 be designated from our budget for the first year. We are not proposing that Oregon Yearly Meeting should proceed alone on this project. (See minutes 68, 86)

Approved.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

- 86. The following report of the Board of Missions was presented Thursday evening by Clare Willcuts, president.

In this report we are incorporating information from the field reports instead of the usual breakdown. Our present staff consists of 11 couples: David and Florence Thomas, Marshal and Catherine Cavit and Eugene and Betty Comfort in Bolivia; Everett and Alda Clarkson in Peru; Roscoe and Tina Knight, Quentin and Florene Nordyke and Paul and Martha Puckett on furlough; Ralph and Marie Chapman in Newberg where Ralph is employed by the board in the production of missionary literature; Evert and Virena Tuning, completing 19 years of service at Sprague River Indian Mission; Kwan Kyu and Jung Hyan Kim, directing the Korean Church in Portland, and Nicholas and Alice Maurer, who will finish language school and move into Peru about September 1.

We have maintained a missionary ministry in Bolivia for 36 years. Council chairman David Thomas sends the following statistics:

He further reports that the leadership of the National Church this past year has been strong and vigorous under the presidency of Antonio Mamani, with good cooperation between the Mission and the National Church. The Quarterly Meetings and conferences have been well attended, with many conversions. Some areas are experiencing new vision and concern for evangelization, asking for more visits by the missionaries and national leaders.

A Bible Short Course was conducted in LaPaz last September with 36 attending. November marked the end of the year of "Evangelism in Depth," reported to have been very successful. Our mission shared in the results of this cooperative effort. Likely the most notable accomplishment of the past year in Bolivia was the opening in March of the "Instituto Biblico Patmos." This was certainly the answer to the prayers of the missionaries, the members and pastors of the National Church, and the people of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Thirty-two students finished the first semester; a few did not return for the second term which will end shortly. In this enterprise we have a fine demonstration of the indigenous principle and the ability of the missionaries and national leaders to work together. The plan and general outline of the school was initiated by the "Mesa Directiva" in cooperation with the National Church. The director is Carmelo Aspi, a graduate of the former Helen Cammack Memorial Bible School at Copajira; some of the missionaries are on the faculty. The school is housed in the Max Paredes Church and the mission home. The curriculum was patterned after the Copajira school; the students, however, paid their own tuition and fees. It is coeducational.

Another important project for the training of the nationals is the general education program. Last year we reported that the National Church had started a boarding school for fifth and sixth grades at Batallas, some 30 miles northwest of LaPaz, known as "Jorge Fox." In their second year the enrollment was above 50, and the Batallas first to fourth grades used these facilities with a total enrollment of over 120. Besides this, the National Church is maintaining 24 grade schools with over 600 students. The director, Meliton Mollesaca, is just now introducing a standard Bible course for all of the Bolivian Friends schools.

Many of you will recall the earnest prayer requested when our church building in the community of Collucachi was destroyed in March after a violent hail storm. Final accord with the attackers had just been reached, requiring them to buy new roofing and half the roof framing for a new chapel, with a two-million-boliviano (\$166) individual fine for anyone attacking or molesting again. "This judgment, holding the people responsible for their acts of violence is a real legal victory for the brethren, even though they did not insist on total remuneration for the damages," writes David Thomas. Once again God has honored your prayers.

For several years, due to a limited staff and the nature of its duties, there has been very little evangelization on the lake shore. However, under the direction of Marshal Cavit and David Thomas, this has been revived, carried on mostly by the Bible School students. The launch has been repaired and is in service for gospel witnessing once again.

Marshal Cavit remained in Santa Cruz for a few months last winter after he had joined our staff to direct the second term of the Berea Theological Seminary (World Gospel Mission). He felt he was rendering a real service to Oregon Yearly Meeting in that four Aymara Friends leaders were among these students, preparing themselves for better service among their people.

Everett Clarkson, chairman of the Peruvian Friends Mission Council, writes, "The focal point this year has been upon the men who have become workers and 'overseers of the flock.' In December, three weeks were devoted to formal study by the group, followed by three months of practice

in which each had to prove himself capable of directing services and guiding the brethren before receiving a certificate of completion. Fifteen faithfully completed the requirements and are still serving well. As a direct result of this training, the number of congregations that hold regular services has increased from 17 to 22. We are most grateful to God as we note that these men have 'borne much fruit'."

Our missionaries in Peru have conducted annual classes for men and women. They have traveled regularly to the local churches holding three-day class sessions, making it possible for a greater number of people to hear and learn. More than 300 have benefited from this. For several months the national workers have met every two weeks in Ilave to study the Sunday school lessons together for the following two Sundays.

The mission is now recognized by the Peruvian Government, having received incorporation status in March. This will have many advantages, particularly in the shipment of goods.

Everett Clarkson was able to obtain an amateur "ham" radio permit in May, and within a few weeks radio contact was established between the Bolivian and Peruvian fields. "We praise God," writes Everett "for this miracle of electronics which has erased the toil and anxiety of the past four years when communication between the two fields was so slow and difficult." As soon as some new equipment can be repaired that was damaged in shipment, it is hoped that frequent contact will be made between Peru and Oregon.

Literacy classes conducted by two ladies from the Wycliffe Translators were most helpful to the believers in Peru again this year, especially in teaching the Aymara brethren to read God's Word. The Peruvian report closes on this victorious note, "We praise God that these Aymara people have accepted salvation and He has opened their eyes and has turned them from darkness to light and from the power of Satan unto God, and they have received forgiveness of sins and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith."

As we turn our attention closer home we share some comments from the report of Evert Tuning of Sprague River. He declares that "the Mission has stood as a witness to the people of the community of the power of the Gospel unto salvation to everyone that believeth." The Tunings have earnestly endeavored to acquaint the people of the danger of following the course of sin. Some have responded. Many contacts have been made in surrounding communities. The Ross McIntyres, who live in Chilquin, have been good witnesses in their community and the school system where he teaches, and are faithful in giving of their time, money and strength to carry on the Sprague River work. Also, Clinton and Pauline Childs have faithfully driven from the Bonanza community to help in the Mission, picking up children along the way for Sunday school. The evangelist for a two-week series of meetings held in June was Sarah Herbert, a Quechan Indian from Yuma, Arizona. The average attendance was not large, but many Indians, including some from as far away as Klamath Falls, came. Eight people received definite spiritual help during these meetings. Some had never been saved before. Ten young people and juniors attended camps at Fir Point. A successful Vacation Bible School was held with average attendance of 27.

The board continues to be delighted with the Korean work under the leadership of Kwan Kyu Kim. He has had many opportunities to visit and promote the work in the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting as well as in other denominations. The main thrust has been to minister to the seamen who frequent the ports of Portland. Regular Sunday services are held in their church in Portland. The average attendance has increased from 30 in last year's report to 46 for this year.

Roscoe Knight has had a fruitful year in missionary deputation among evangelical Friends Churches throughout America. The Knights made a survey trip to Mexico City in January. They reported that in this city of 6,000,000 people there are 200,000 university students. Approximate figures suggest there are 25 protestant church buildings and probably 200 small church groups. This means there is one evangelical group to from 15,000 to 20,000 people. There is a tremendous need and opportunity in Mexico, but it will not be easy. Government restrictions are very real but do not prohibit mission work. The Missions Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, in session last April, approved challenging the member Yearly Meetings to enter into a cooperative project by placing the Knights in Mexico as soon as possible with Oregon Yearly Meeting as the sending agency. Our board recommends to the Yearly Meeting that we join in this effort and that \$2,500 be designated from our budget for the first year. If this project is approved by the other Yearly Meetings in the E. F. A. then the full support will be assumed by that organization through the cooperating Yearly Meetings. We are not proposing that Oregon Yearly Meeting should proceed with this project on its own. (See minutes 68, 85)

In closing, I wish to make some general observations: October 16 is World Literature Sunday; our board will supply each meeting with appropriate material for its promotion, and it is hoped an offering will be received. The new format for the 1966 Missionary Prayer Calendar was intended to serve as your guide to special prayer concerns and financial needs each month. Whereas the custom in former years has been to contribute on the basis of 25 cents for each missionary birthday, the opportunity is given under this new plan for each family to contribute monthly toward the designated financial challenges which present budgeted needs for our missionary work. Contributions may be continued on the missionary birthday basis, if preferred, but of primary importance is the stewardship challenge to exceed former giving. The biographies of our missionaries which have been appearing in the Northwest Friend are prepared by Carolann Palmer, Idea Secretary for the board. We are happy to supply this information for you. Some years ago the board was the recipient of a gift home in Portland known as the Wiley Estate. It was the hope of the donor that this could serve as a furlough home for missionaries; this has not been practical, but it now serves for living quarters for Pastor and Jung Kim.

The delightful "Missionary Moments" which were written by Phyllis Cammack and have appeared regularly in the Northwest Friend are being compiled into a book and may be purchased for your meditation and inspiration. We did not sponsor a Youth Ambassador this summer, but Ronald Allen, a student at Friends Bible College, Haviland, Kansas, has just returned from Bolivia and Peru under the sponsorship of the Board of Missions and Friends Youth of Kansas Yearly Meeting. Friends Missionary Literature Service under Ralph Chapman's leadership has produced many pages of missionary literature. A new book, "Know the Doctrine," written by former missionary Phyllis Cammack is now in service on the field as a text book for the classes. The mission staff of both fields reported favorably on the visit of Forrest and Orpha Cammack last winter. As a member of the board Forrest was most helpful in his review of the work. For several years we have studied the possibilities offered by the Missionary Internship School of Farmington, Michigan. We sent Quentin and Florene Nordyke to this Furlough Institute last spring, and the benefits to them are gratifying. Because of God's leading, Oscar and Ruth Brown have accepted a call to pastor the Medford meeting; consequently, they are no longer under appointment by our board.

From the reports of 56 churches, it appears that all but one had at least one missionary speaker during the year for a total of 293—the work of Oregon Yearly Meeting missions was presented in 46 of our meetings by special speakers, 29 other boards were represented. There were 17 missionary conferences from one to eight days each; 11 churches used the faith promise plan. A total of 1,593 Prayer Calendars was distributed, with proceeds of \$4,659.92. Twenty-seven persons have indicated evidence of a call for missionary service.

I have travelled for the board over 14,000 miles, attended two meetings of the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association, the annual meeting of the National Association of Evangelicals, the meeting of Evangelical Friends Alliance, two board meetings aside from those at Yearly Meeting time and seven meetings with the Administrative Committee. Over 500 pieces of mail have been sent.

Our board and the mission staff will miss the wise counsel and intense missionary interest of Dean Gregory who has been so much a part of our work for the past 15 years. I wish to speak a personal word of sincere appreciation for the wonderful people who have served on the Board of Missions and for the choice missionaries with whom I have been so closely associated. We are thankful for the loyalty of so many to the missions program and know that we can count on this to continue. We do not believe God is dead, neither do we believe He is broke. There have been some heavy expenses the past year and the giving above the United Budget has been lower. This has made it necessary to operate in the red much of the time. We enter into this new year with full confidence that God's people will be faithful stewards in the missionary vision and support.

Approved.

● 87. The Board of Publication informed Oregon Yearly Meeting of their appointment of editorial personnel for The Northwest Friend for the coming year. Jack L. Willcuts will continue as editor, and Lonny Fendall has been appointed as assistant editor, with Harlow Ankeny continuing as managing editor. These three form a committee that will consult frequently in planning and making assignments.

- 92. The Board of Moral Action presented the following statement to the floor of the Yearly Meeting:

"We, Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, meeting in annual session at Greenleaf, Idaho, August 16-21, 1966, representing 6,000 members in the states of Idaho, Oregon and Washington, express our concern that the widespread use of beverage alcohol, tobacco, unprescribed narcotics and drugs of many kinds, including L. S. D., barbiturates, and 'pep pills,' has led to many serious crimes, accidents, diseases and death. We favor and urge international, federal, state and local legislation which is necessary to limit the use of these substances outside of authorized scientific and medical practices and to control the importation, transportation, and advertising of them.

"Furthermore, we protest advertising, both commercial and unsolicited 'public service' type, which portrays the drinking of alcoholic beverages and the use of tobacco or narcotics as the socially acceptable way of life or which disregards the sacredness of the human body and appeals to the prurient interest. We lend our support to those who are attempting counter advertising with Christian concern."

Approved.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

- 93. Willard Kennon, president, presented the following report:

There were 45 meetings which sent annual reports from which we note the following points of Stewardship emphasis:

- (1) Thirty-four meetings observed November as Stewardship Month in various ways.
- (2) Thirty-four meetings indicated their desire to retain November for the major thrust of stewardship in preference to other months of the year.
- (3) There were 230 major stewardship presentations on the monthly meeting level during the year. Pastoral sermons headed the list as the most effective means for promoting stewardship. Posters, skits, films and filmstrips received favorable responses.
- (4) One five-day Stewardship Seminar was conducted by the committee chairman at the Eugene Meeting in the month of January.
- (5) Sample materials were sent to each meeting for the promoting of reading materials and the recording of tithes, gifts and donations.
- (6) Twenty-seven meetings reported systematic use of tithing and offering envelopes.
- (7) Five meetings conducted an all-member canvass for building fund pledges.
Four meetings reported an all-member canvass for support of their general budget.
Two meetings indicated an all-member canvass for the United Budget pledge and support.
- (8) Nine meetings reported holding missionary conferences during which the constituency was challenged on the basis of faith pledges to missionary outreach.
- (9) One of the questions in the 1965 annual report referred to yearly

meeting sponsored stewardship seminars. Because of the very favorable response, the board proposes to initiate a series of three- to five-day seminars at the monthly meeting level in the teaching and promotion of practical and applied stewardship. The current 1966 annual reports from the 45 reporting meetings included 25 meetings which reported definite interest in the seminar. We recognize this is indicative of general concern and NOT an official request for a definite date.

(10) of the 45 meetings reporting, seven indicated need for help in the building fund, nine in the general budget, nine in the United Budget, fifteen on the family altar, sixteen on tithing, fifteen indicated desire for help in developing a general positive attitude on stewardship, and seventeen indicated the need for a more definite purpose for the committee.

(11) Our board is pleased to call attention to the increased pastoral support of several of our meetings in bringing the support level up to the recommended minimum salary of \$3,600.

- (12) Our emphasis for the coming year will be threefold:

- a. continuation of the stewardship poster contest.
- b. continuation of encouragement for adequate pastoral support.
- c. sponsorship of stewardship seminars on practical and applied stewardship.

(13) Briefly stated, the seminars, under the direction of Willard Kennon, will consist of three phases: (a) education, inspiration and challenge, (b) organization and training, (c) an all-member invitation to personal commitment on a person-to-person basis.

Marie Haines announced the winners of the poster contest as follows: Adult—first prize, Alvin Mendenhall; second prize, David Fountain. High school—first prize, Patricia Hull; second prize, Sharon Peterson. Junior high—first prize, Joseph Cammack; second prize, Glenn Fisher. Junior—first prize, Sharon Jones; second prize, Roger Sargent. The theme for next year's contest is "Stewardship in the Home—the family together, playing, working, worshipping."

Kelsey Hinshaw announced that Willard Kennon has such a deep concern for stewardship that he has not accepted a pastorate for the coming year in order to be available to visit meetings and conduct stewardship seminars. Richard Beebe and Gladys Cook of Eugene Friends Church told of the great value and blessing of such a seminar in their church. Willard Kennon told of his leading into this work.

The report of this board was approved.

- 94. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

- 95. The session opened with the singing of "Higher Ground" led by Roy Clark.
- 96. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.
- 97. - 98. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting the following salary arrangements for Yearly Meeting office personnel:

- 100. In accordance with the Constitution of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, the Board of Publication presented the following names in nomination as members of the Publication Commission of the Alliance:

For two years, Harlow Ankeny; for one year, to fill out the unexpired term of Jack L. Willcuts, Harold Antrim.

Approved.

- 101. The Board of Publication presented the name of Harold Antrim in nomination for a two-year term on the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends.

Approved.

- 102. The Board of Publication considered the matter referred to it in the communication from Southwest Washington Quarterly Meeting in which request was made for a series of articles on Friends history and doctrine to be used as paid advertisements by local meetings. The board requested authorization to explore the interest in such a project among the churches and then to develop the materials as it may seem practicable. (See minute 15.)

Approved.

- 103. The Board of Peace and Service presented the name of Stanley Perisho as a member of the Friendsview Manor Corporation for a three-year term.

Approved.

- 104. The following concern was presented by Dean Gregory:

In light of the increasing complexity of maintaining complete and comprehensible files of all Yearly Meeting-related materials which are of permanent historic value, it seems wise to consider the establishment of the office of Yearly Meeting Historian. At the present time the Yearly Meeting Superintendent has gathered and stored thousands of official letters relating to the foreign missionary work, local churches, church extension, and other related areas of Yearly Meeting work.

The responsibilities of this office should be outlined and determined by the Discipline Revision Committee or any other proper Yearly Meeting group. Further, of particular interest would be both the preservation of all historic material as well as supervision and development of future publications relating to the history of our Yearly Meeting.

I am suggesting that the Executive Council be made responsible to nominate annually a suitable person for this office.

The meeting approved the establishment of the office of Yearly Meeting Historian. The study of this matter was referred to the Executive Council.

- 105. The meeting adjourned to meet Saturday at 9:15 a. m.

- 106. Roy Clark opened the session leading the congregation in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have" and "Holy Ghost with Power Divine." Dorwin Smith gave his personal testimony of the blessing of God through the sessions of the week and in his life. He commented on the common concern expressed by many members that the Holy Spirit have His rightful place in the life of Oregon Yearly Meeting. He offered prayer to this end.

- 107. The minutes of the last session were read and approved.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- 108. The following report presented Friday evening by Howard E. Harmon, president, was approved:

JUNIOR YEARLY MEETING

Junior Yearly Meeting has been enthusiastically attended by over 100 boys and girls this year. The young people learned of Friends work in England during the days of early Friends, and also in Peru, Nepal, Palestine and the Northwest. Nursery care has been provided during all of the sessions of Yearly Meeting.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS

The Yearly Meeting again assisted financially Outpost and Preparative Meetings enabling them to have Vacation Bible Schools. Vacation Bible Schools continue to reach many children and young people for Christ. Our largest school was held in Medford with 433 pupils and 75 workers.

CLUBS

Seven churches had club programs. Brochures on clubs may be obtained from the Oregon Yearly Meeting headquarters.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Leadership Conferences: Two successful Leadership Conferences were held in the fall with around 300 total registration. These were held in Caldwell, Idaho, and Portland, Oregon.

Filmstrips: New filmstrips are added each year to the library and are available to our churches through the Yearly Meeting office.

Achievement Goals: The present Achievement Goals will be used until the Evangelical Friends Alliance Achievement Goals are printed sometime during the year.

Ribbon Award Program: The monthly ribbon award program ended in June of this year. For the past 21 months blue, red or white ribbons were awarded monthly to churches which reported gains over the corresponding month of the previous year. Marion meeting was the only church to earn 21 consecutive blue ribbons for over a 10 percent gain each month. Melba earned 14 blue ribbons, East Wenatchee earned 12, First Friends of Vancouver earned 11 and Hillsboro earned 10.

Advance: For the year 1966-67, the Sunday School committee is encouraging full cooperation with the Advance program of the Yearly Meeting.

YOUTH COMMITTEE

The Youth Committee has worked with the Friends Youth leaders in an effort to give guidance and counsel to their work throughout the year. One of the major efforts of this committee aside from the Friends Youth program was planning and distributing a packet of materials for each Quarterly Meeting to be used in conducting workshops for sponsors. These materials were well received and many sponsors have reported appreciation for this work. The packet included a skit, "The Other Side of the Wall," a paper on Friends Youth-church relationship, a paper including testimonials of the "Rewards of Youth Work," a selection of books to aid in preparation of the classes, sample materials from the Friends Youth and a "Call to Commitment" for sponsors. The Friends Youth has carried on a varied program.

Mid-Winter Convention was held at Cannon Beach, Oregon, with 240 full-time campers registered. There were many decisions made for Christ as the youth met in classes and sat under the inspiration of the evangelist, David LaShana of California Yearly Meeting.

Junior High Jamborees were held in four areas of the Yearly Meeting. Under the able leadership of Marilyn Binford, all of these were reported successful. These weekend or one-day retreats are proving to be a real blessing to the junior high youth.

Junior Friends Youth: An up-dated Junior Friends Youth handbook has been completed. The memorization contests have been directed by this department under the leadership of Jean Thomas.

College Friends Youth has received special attention this year with the naming of a college coordinator, Lonny Fendall, to work with this age group. New ventures have included a paper called "Insight" that has been sent to Friends collegians throughout the year in an attempt to keep them informed and inspired wherever they may be. A "Snow Seminar" was also held and a fellowship of "Summering Friends" has been established for collegians in the Portland area the past two summers.

Youth Ambassadors: Thirteen youth are participating this year. We are happy for each one who is giving his summer in this way, and good reports are being received. Again this year we were privileged to have foreign Youth Ambassadors—to the British Isles and Mexico. The work-study program with our camps has given summer opportunities for many of our key youth. Four of these are also serving as Youth Ambassadors in churches close to their camp assignments. Young men entering their alternate service are also finding opportunities for being Youth Ambassadors in Guatemala and Viet Nam.

The outreach of Friends Youth has continued in evangelistic efforts of the Youth Accent teams. The mission concerns were evident by the number of films purchased for use on the mission fields.

Jonathan Bishop has served as president of Friends Youth and Ronald Stansell as field secretary. We are thankful for the effective and dedicated leadership of these young men and of all youth who serve on the executive committee. Jonathan Bishop and Ronald Stansell have been nominated to continue in their offices.

A financial statement has been submitted to the Board of Christian Education.

CAMPING

Camp promotion was carried out this past year through the distribution of Bible prayer markers, Stamps for Camp, and printed brochures for each area.

We continued our memberships in the Christian Camp and Conference Association and the Camping Commission of the National Sunday School Association.

Fifteen representatives of Oregon Yearly Meeting attended the Western Regional CCA Convention in March held in Portland.

The second camp clinic was held at the time of mid-year board meetings with approximately 45 in attendance.

One of the new features of our Yearly Meeting program was the cooperation with George Fox College in the work-study program with eight students working full time in our summer camps. This opened an entirely new opportunity for training of our college youth as well as being a boost to our camping personnel.

The most exciting development this year was the Wrangler Camp in July where 18 young people and six staff members enjoyed a week of deep spiritual growth while camping high in the mountains of the Three Sisters area. Because of the enthusiastic reports of this type of camping, we are looking forward to Wrangler Camp again next year as well as a trail pack trip for high schoolers.

Our committee is continuing investigation into the possibility of obtaining a site suitable for our total Yearly Meeting camp program.

Each year shows an increase in the number of campers throughout the Yearly Meeting. Camp seems to provide the change of pace which intrigues the young people of today. We are looking forward to another year of advance through camping.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS ALLIANCE

We have cooperated with the Alliance by participating in producing Reach and Teach for Christian Education workers.

Achievement goals for Sunday Schools and other areas of Christian Education are being developed. Standards for the Christian Education areas of children's church, Friends Youth, clubs and Vacation Bible School as suggested by the Alliance are:

1. These should be organized under the Christian Education Committee, and suitable programs should be planned.
2. Adequate records should be kept.
3. The leaders of the youth activities should be encouraged to attend the regular church services.
4. The leaders should read books and attend conferences relating to their work.
5. Outreach and evangelism should be included in the goals.

Advance 1966-67 is the emphasis of the Board of Christian Education for the coming year.

Approved.

- 109. The representatives submitted the following nominations to the Board of Evangelism for a three-year term: Alvin Roberts M. D., Richard Cossel, Oscar Brown.

Approved.

- 110. The representatives submitted the following nominations to the Board of Stewardship for a three-year term: Marie Haines, Quincy Fodge, Duane Comfort.

- 111. The representatives submitted the following nominations to the Church Music Committee for a three-year term: Roy Clark, Ruth Corbin, Marie Chapman, John Carr, Quincy Fodge. They also recommended that Ruth Corbin served as convener to call the committee together for organization.

Approved.

- 112. The Ministerial Association nominated Orville Winters to serve for a two-year term on the Ohio-Oregon Pension Committee.

Approved.

- 113. The Friends Church Extension Foundation Corporation nominated

Wilbert Eichenberger to serve on the Board of Directors of the Foundation for a three-year term.

Approved.

- 114. The Board of Evangelism recommended the nomination of Roger Smith to serve on the Board of Directors of the Friends Church Extension Foundation Corporation for a period of three years.

Approved.

- 115. The Board of Finance is continuing the study of the minimum pension provision of the Ohio-Oregon pension plan (see Minute 103, page 33, of the 1965 Minutes) has obtained through the Pension Committee the following results:

Monthly Meetings rejecting. 7
Monthly Meetings not responding 10

The board therefore recommended on the basis of these results that the \$40 per month minimum pension provision be adopted by the Yearly Meeting as a part of the Pension Plan. (See minute 125)

It is further recommended the cost for this minimum pension be included in the United Budget under the Board of Finance allocation beginning 1967-68. (See minute 126)

This was held over until the afternoon session.

- 116. The Executive Council recommended that the report of the committee to review procedures for recording ministers be forwarded to the Yearly Meeting for consideration.

This report was held over until afternoon. (See minute 122)

- 117. Adelaide Barker opened the memorial hour reading Revelation 7:13 and Daniel 12:3. She read the list of 50 members deceased during the year. (The list appears in the appendix.) Appreciation for the influence of many of these was expressed from the floor.

- 118. A minute from the Friends World Committee for Consultation, European section, and a letter from the World Committee Affairs Committee, London Yearly Meeting regarding the visit of Barbara Baker in England were read, expressing appreciation for her visit and testimony.

- 119. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

Dissolve and crumble away;
I have a house not made with hands,

- 122. The recommendation of the Executive Council that the report of the committee to review procedure for recording ministers be forwarded to the Yearly Meeting was reintroduced. After considerable discussion the matter was referred back to the Executive Council. (See minute 116)

- 123. Dean Gregory introduced three young men who make up the Viet Nam team leaving next week to serve their alternate service as conscientious objectors under the Mennonite Central Committee—Fredric Gregory and Jerry Sandoz of Newberg Monthly Meeting, Jonathan Newkirk, First Friends, Portland, Monthly Meeting.

- 124. The following note from Dean and Kathleen Gregory was read:

We wish to thank the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting for the very generous gift presented to us as a farewell gift. The check was in the amount of \$1,796.50 and was presented to us by our Presiding Clerk at the Wednesday evening service of the Yearly Meeting for the purpose of securing a new car.

This gift came as a complete surprise to us, and we are unable to adequately express our thanks to you, but we do thank you from our hearts for this most unusual and lovely expression of your love to us.

- 125. The recommendation of the Board of Finance that the \$40 per month minimum pension provision be adopted by the Yearly Meeting as a part of the Pension Plan was reintroduced. (See minute 115)

Approved.

- 126. A second recommendation by the Board of Finance that the cost for the minimum pension be included in the United Budget under the Board of Finance allocation beginning 1967-68 was reintroduced. (See minute 115)
- Approved.

● 127. A returning minute to Tokyo Monthly Meeting of Friends, Tokyo, Japan on behalf of Akio and Nobuko Watanabe was read.

Approved.

● 128. It was found that the General Superintendent had a previous Pension plan of long standing. In view of the loss involved in the changing of plans at this time the Executive Council recommended that he be allowed the option of applying the allotted amount to his present plan.

Approved.

● 129. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting that the Yearly Meeting Superintendent and/or the president of the Trustees be authorized to receive securities for the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

● 130. The summary of epistles received from other yearly meetings was read as follows: (Epistles were received from 26 yearly meetings)

Kansas Yearly Meeting—A call toward spiritual evaluation was made by Merle Roe, the General Superintendent, in his tenth keynote address. He voiced concern about materialism. Augustine's words were alluded to: "God blessed the Romans, and they made gods of their blessings."

Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting—"We were challenged by the account of how God miraculously established the Central Africa Broadcasting Company to send out His word in the midst of great upheaval in that continent. That was in answer to prayer."

California Yearly Meeting—"Our attention was focused on the problems of Christian Social Concerns by the presence of three young men, recent graduates of George Fox College, who gave their personal testimonies as Christians and conscientious objectors."

Norway Yearly Meeting—"We must not lose Sunday. Our bodies need it, and our souls need it to rediscover the springs of life that we often lose contact with during the busy working week."

Baltimore Yearly Meeting—"Let us remember the words of George Fox in a letter to his parents in 1652: 'Ye have no time but this present time: therefore, prize your time for your soul's sake'."

Indiana Yearly Meeting—William A. Wagner, the General Superintendent, in his keynote address, brought them face to face with the needs and weaknesses of their lives. He voiced the prayer, "O God forgive us. . . for failing to teach our people to worship and adore Thee, for failing to teach stewardship, for failing to keep our sense of mission." T. Eugene Coffin, their devotional speaker, "challenged us to overhaul our image of the Church in terms of the Great Commission and the Sermon on the Mount."

East Africa Yearly Meeting—"We are convinced that we must have peace in our hearts before we go out to tell other people about God's Word."

Ohio Yearly Meeting—The Yearly Meeting arrived at decisions on several important matters. They approved the constitution of Evangelical Friends Alliance, and also took action whereby they became one of the four participating Yearly Meetings in the Alliance.

Central Yearly Meeting—"The spirit of conviction settled down in our evangelistic services with such power that occasionally before our evangelist had opportunity to bring the message, seekers would make their way to an altar of prayer, later rising with earnest, ringing testimonies to the saving grace of God."

Approved.

● 131. The epistle to other yearly meetings was read. It was referred back to the Epistle Committee for revision and correction with permission for the corrected version to be included in the minutes. The corrected version follows:

Greetings from the Oregon Yearly Meeting of the Friends Church in its seventy-fourth session convened at Greenleaf, Idaho, the home of Greenleaf Friends Academy, August 16-21, 1966.

The presence of the Holy Spirit in blessing and in power has been felt in a very marked way under the ministry of our own Gerald Dillon, pastor of First Friends Church in Portland, Oregon, and presently president of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. Roy Clark, professor of music at Cascade College, and co-pastor of the Maplewood Friends Church of Portland, Oregon, was in charge of the music.

Dean Gregory, who has served as General Superintendent for the past fifteen years, brought the keynote address at the opening session, stressing the 1966-67 Year of Advance and admonishing the meetings to have a forward look. He declared, "We are thrilled as we glimpse the possibilities of this yearly meeting-wide Advance—praying together, working together, moving together under the Lord's direction. Let us attempt great things for God and expect great things from God in the months ahead."

Dean Gregory felt led to resign as General Superintendent and is returning to pastoral work as the minister of the Star, Idaho, Friends Church. Jack L. Willcuts, who has served as pastor of a small church, a large church, and has been a foreign missionary and editor for several years, was unanimously chosen as the new General Superintendent.

We were delighted to have over 200 youth present. The juniors held their own Yearly Meeting during the morning hours, using the theme, "Young Friends Visit," visiting a different land each day.

The youth activities covered a wide range. They joined the main body of the Yearly Meeting during the morning devotional and inspirational hours and for the evening services.

It was with deep humility and thankfulness we reached our goal of over 6,000 in membership.

Three of our young men—Jerry Sandoz, Fredric Gregory, and Jonathan Newkirk, all graduates of George Fox College—will be leaving soon for twenty-seven months in Viet Nam, serving their alternate service as conscientious objectors.

God has remembered our educational institutions. Greenleaf Academy has had one of the best years in the history of the school both numerically and financially. George Fox College continues to grow. Two new buildings were dedicated—Heacock Commons, a combined dining room and auditorium, and Calder Center, a classroom building dedicated to the sciences. We are truly thankful for a consecrated, Spirit-filled faculty.

As in past summers, our youth camps have been times of real blessing to our children and young people, many of them finding the Lord in saving power. Around 2,000 workers, young people and children were in attendance at our six summer camp sites last year. The Mid-Winter Convention is another highlight among our Friends Youth activities.

On Wednesday night during Yearly Meeting we were thrilled when the first official contact was made with Everett Clarkson, our missionary in Peru, by means of a newly-acquired short wave radio, and telephone.

The Yearly Meeting continues to enjoy fellowship and cooperation with other yearly meetings in the Evangelical Friends Alliance. Several challenging projects for joint action are under serious consideration.

"Brethren, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit." (Galatians 6:18)

● 132. The Board of Finance submitted the following nominations:

To Ministers' Retirement Fund Committee for one year—Roger Minthorne. To Ohio-Oregon Pension Committee for two years—Clyde Miller. To Ohio-Oregon Pension Committee (for one year to replace John Hays)—Gerald Lemmons.

Approved.

133. The Board of Evangelism made the following recommendations: Appointment of Clynton Crisman to serve a two-year term as a representative on the Church Extension Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance; appointment of Roger Smith to complete a two-year term as a representative. (He was selected by the Board last October to serve in this capacity. His name had not been presented for approval to the Yearly Meeting.)

Approved.

● 134. The Executive Council recommended approval of the following proposal on "Friends Youth in Discipline," with the recommendation that it appear in the appendix of the Discipline:

Friends Youth is the youth organization for Friends Churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The Friends Youth Handbook includes the constitution and other detailed organizational guidelines.

The statement of purpose in the constitution of Oregon Yearly Meeting Friends Youth is as follows:

"The primary purpose of the Friends Youth is to lead young people to confess Christ as Savior and to consecrate their lives to Him and to His service.

"Secondary purposes are to give opportunity for expression of their personal relation to Christ, to train and instruct young people for service in the church, to provide Christian fellowship, and to promote loyalty to the church.

"As an arm of the church, the Friends Youth is under the jurisdiction of the youth committee of the Board of Christian Education and gives constant allegiance to the Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church in its aims, projects and policies in the different functions of the Yearly Meeting, Quarterly Meeting, and local Friends Youth activities. The Friends Youth shall further conform to the program of the church by making reports monthly, quarterly, or annually as requested."

The organization of the Friends Youth is under the direction of the eight basic officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Program Chairman, Outreach Chairman, Missionary Chairman, and Social Chairman. This list of officers is followed throughout the Friends Youth structure of local, Quarterly Meeting and Yearly Meeting executive committees. Offices may be combined or additional offices created as the need may arise in specific groups. (The duties of these officers and the election procedures are presented in the constitution and Friends Youth Handbook.)

While youth leadership and initiative are best developed as the youth assume responsibility for their own planning and activity as much as possible, capable and concerned adult leadership is essential at each level of Friends Youth. For the local groups, adult sponsors are selected by the Christian Education Committee of the church. These must be people who have sufficient time and interest to give active direction to the group, especially at the younger age levels.

At the Quarterly Meeting level, an advisor is elected annually to serve on the Friends Youth Executive committee. Also the chairman of the Quarterly Meeting Christian Education Committee is a member of the group.

The Yearly Meeting Friends Youth executive committee includes an elected advisor and three representatives of the youth committee of the Board of Christian Education. In addition, the General Superintendent of the Yearly Meeting is a member ex-officio.

Approved and referred to Discipline Revision Committee for editing.

● 135. The Board of Missions recommended the following people to serve on the Missions Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance: for two years, Charles Ball; for one year, Clare Willcuts.

Approved.

● 136. The Board of Christian Education submitted to the Yearly Meeting for approval the following names for representatives to the Evangelical Friends Alliance Christian Education Commission: Howard E. Harmon and Dorothy Barratt; and to the Evangelical Friends Alliance Youth Commission, Lonny Fendall. One other member is to be nominated by the Friends Youth to be on the E. F. A. Youth Commission. This has not yet been done and so permission was asked to send the nomination to the Executive Council for approval.

Approved.

● 137. The Executive Council recommended that the president of the Trustees be authorized to certify any gift security as a gift to the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

BOARD OF FINANCE

● 139. John Roberts, president of the Board of Finance, presented the following report of the board and the Fixed Expense Budget for 1966-67:

In reporting the work of the Board of Finance for 1965-66 there are both encouraging and discouraging facts to be recognized. One of our principal duties is to determine the Yearly Meeting Fixed Expense and its apportionment to the Quarterly Meetings. The treasurer's report for the past year was somewhat disappointing in this area with only two Quarterly Meetings out of eight reporting their ratios paid in full at the close of the year. From a budget figure of \$31,400 only \$29,677.81 was paid, leaving an unpaid balance of \$1,722.19 and an overdrawn Fixed Expense account. Some money has come in since the closing of the books.

On the brighter side, we wish to commend Tigard Preparative Meeting and Agnew Outpost for assuming a share of Fixed Expense, even though not assessed. We believe the attitude of voluntarily sharing in the raising of this budget indicates an informed church acting with maturity and responsibility.

We also commend the Board of stewardship on the appointment of their president to full-time stewardship ministry for the coming year. Though money is only one facet of our stewardship concept, we expect to see benefits in our area of concern as well as others.

The Ohio-Oregon Pension Committee has been active in preparing to put that plan into effect September 1, 1966. They have also canvassed the Monthly Meetings for opinions concerning minimum pensions, which is covered by a separate report and recommendation to the Yearly Meeting.

For the coming year, the Board of Finance is planning to give extra time to studies in depth of several aspects of Yearly Meeting finances. We

welcome your comments and observations relating to any phase of church finances, especially at Yearly Meeting level.

As we present for your approval the Fixed Expense Budget for 1966-67, we want you to know that it is a real concern of the Board of Finance to keep this budget as low as possible without hampering or restricting the work of the Yearly Meeting dependent upon it, and are therefore pleased to call to your attention a decrease over last year of \$726, or about two-and-one-third per cent.

The guests for the Yearly Meeting have been housed in various homes in Greenleaf and surrounding communities. Housing was provided for approximately 100 people. There were 18 campers and tents parked on the church grounds.

An estimated number of 4,450 meals were served in the Greenleaf Friends Academy Dining Hall during the six days. Meals have been prepared by Ruth Hull as head cook, assisted by Phyllis Roberts, Veva Smith and Opal Mardock. Faye Long and Carrie Winslow have served as dining hall hostesses and Anna Mills as cashier. Ladies of the Women's Missionary Unions from Greenleaf and Boise Quarterly Meetings have assisted with the preparation and serving of the meals, each WMU serving one meal.

● 144. Denver Headrick reminded the meeting that this is the 75th anniversary year of Oregon Yearly Meeting and suggested that the Executive Council appoint a committee to plan suitable observances next year.

Approved.

● 145. The reports of the state of the churches of seven Quarterly Meetings are summarized as follows: (See minutes 10, 27, 59.)

Although some expressed concern for problems in the work, all said, "the blessings of the year far outweighed the problems." The deepening of spiritual life among members, increase in attendance, better relationships between members, family worship observance, willingness of members to assume responsibility, and some visitation programs were mentioned, indicating progress and growth. Concern was expressed for some lack of unity, lack of full commitment, lack in reaching the local community, failure of parents to attend services, poor attendance at services other than on Sunday morning, and lack of interest in visitation.

Appreciation for instructive and edifying pastoral ministry was expressed by all meetings. Doctrinal standards of Friends are being upheld and care is taken in the selection of those placed in positions of leadership. One church noted marked improvement in fitting sermons to the needs of the congregation.

Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting reported Bible study groups and a team helping in the Boise Rescue Mission. Quincy Preparative Meeting cooperated with others of their community at a local festival, making a Christian witness at the closing program. Newberg Quarterly Meeting reported encouraging their young people to assume increasing leadership in the work of the church. Holly Park Monthly Meeting, without a full-time pastor last year, said their members discovered how many things a pastor does besides preach. Northeast Tacoma reported over 1,000 pastoral calls made and has purchased four-and-one-half acres of land for a new building. Everett saw significant growth in their youth group. Agnew reported increasing attendance.

Eugene Monthly Meeting mentioned the blessing of a Stewardship Seminar. Silverton Monthly Meeting noted a generous spirit of willingness by their members to give of their time and resources throughout a recent building program. Rosemere Monthly Meeting was pleased with a new parsonage.

● 146. The minutes of the afternoon session were read, corrected and approved.

● 147. With gratitude to our Lord for His presence in our midst and with a united purpose to keep our lives under the control of the Holy Spirit, the 1966 Yearly Meeting sessions adjourned to meet in Newberg, Oregon, August 15-20, 1967.

The morning inspirational hour and evening messages were brought by Gerald Dillon, pastor of First Friends Church of Portland, Oregon.

Morning Inspirational Hour

Wednesday Morning: "The Acts of the Holy Spirit" Acts of the Apostles

There are two approaches to a study of the Holy Spirit. One is a consideration of what God has said about the Holy Spirit. A second is to observe the works of the Holy Spirit, making conclusions from these observations. It is this latter approach we will use during these four mornings as we study together the Acts of the Apostles. This book is indeed the Acts of the Holy Spirit, for it is here we see the Holy Spirit moving in power in and through His church. Three observations should be made. First, God's work on the earth is carried on and administered by the Holy Spirit. Just as Jesus directed and administered His work while on earth, now the Holy Spirit is His officially appointed vicar—teaching, leading, directing and administering the work of God on earth. In Acts, the Holy Spirit acts as superintendent in charge of affairs. However, secondly we notice that the Holy Spirit works in and through human instrumentalities—Peter, Paul, Philip, Aquilla and Priscilla. God uses men, not to supplant the Spirit but to be channels, working under Him as witnesses and labourers. Some He uses in teaching, some in administration, and some to serve tables. But, He uses all who are filled. Therefore, we see thirdly that the normative Christian experience is to be filled with the Holy Spirit. The phrase "filled with the Spirit" is used repeatedly in this book. But what does it mean? Simply that all of one's life is brought under the full control of the Holy Spirit—body, mind, spirit, possessions, prejudices and plans. All are yielded to Him. He only can fill the one who is fully yielded. This is His church—dynamic with the presence of the Holy Spirit. Anything less is sub-Christian. Let our church, our lives be judged by this one New Testament norm.

Thursday Morning: "The Acts of the Holy Spirit" Acts of the Apostles

The Acts of the Apostles is a record of men filled with the power of the Holy Ghost. Even as Jesus said, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you," so the lives of these men are living proof of His promise. This power is observed in a variety of manifestations: a sound from heaven as a rushing mighty wind; cloven tongues like as of fire sitting upon each of them; the gift of tongues (languages); healing of the body in Paul's case; shaking of the building; and other observable signs. These manifestations signified both to the church and the world that (1) God was in this event of being filled with the Holy Spirit, (2) God was do-

ing a new thing in the "pouring out of His Spirit," (3) the gospel was for the whole world and not simply for the people of one language; and (4) the Spirit was to be Lord of all, even to the extent of the lowest member of the body. These credentials had indeed signified the introduction of a new era when the gospel was to be preached to every tongue as He became Lord of all. We should conclude from this record that the manifestations were (1) variable with no one gift common to all, (2) incidental to the receiving of the person of the Holy Spirit upon whom our attention should be focused and (3) indicative of how our whole life should be under His control and influence—hands, tongue, feet, life, money, talents, and time. Let us not shrink back because of fear of his manifestations, but be "filled with the Holy Spirit."

Friday Morning: "The Acts of the Holy Spirit" Acts of the Apostles

Unusual power fills one's life when it is fully yielded to and controlled by the Holy Spirit. Here was a power that lifted common and ordinary men to an extraordinary level of life. This power is seen on the highest level in three areas of life. First, it is manifest through a transformed character. Here were lives formerly afflicted by the common tendencies of humanity changed into a remarkable degree of Christlikeness—so much so that they were called "Christians." This in the face of persecution and death. It was also seen by the way they transcended the circumstances of life. Facing bitter persecution, common frailties of man, and other afflictions they still exhibited a radiance and glory that was possible only through the presence of the Holy Spirit—a power dynamically with them. Finally, this power enabled them to transmit Christ to others. While it is true that the idols of our hearts become effervescent in our outward life, it is also true that these disciples invariably were transmitting Christ. Through the Holy Spirit, they found both the direction and the dynamic for communicating Christ to others—"Go join thyself to the chariot" is always the direction of the Spirit. The one solitary reason for this unusual power is not human personality or religious genius but the Holy Spirit. Here is our greatest single need in the church of today.

Saturday Morning: "The Acts of the Holy Spirit" Acts of the Apostles

The amazing fact that God wishes to fill our hearts, and give us His power in daily living is the message of Acts. But, how may one be so filled with His presence? This answer, too, is seen in this wonderful book.

Let us understand that God is Holy and that He will not occupy an unclean vessel. Sin defiles us before God, especially our sense of self-righteousness. Therefore, as Peter said to the multitude, we must repent of our sin. A broken and contrite spirit is the first step toward a Spirit-filled life. Secondly, there must be a genuine thirst and hunger for God's fulness. Those who are satisfied with less or are willing to stop short will never be filled. One must continue in prayer, fasting, knocking, and whatever else indicates a deep hunger, and in such a manner that will not be denied. Finally, one must be willing and ready to allow the Holy Spirit to have undisputed influence and authority over all of his life. Believers in the Acts of the Apostles gave their bodies, possessions, plans, prejudices, and life itself to the control of the Spirit. We can know God's fulness at no less level than this. It is in such a time of death to self that God begins His wonderful life in us and through us in a degree of fulness and power. Acts of the Apostles will then be continued in our day. Let us remember the promise is unto us and unto all that are afar off even as many as the Lord our God shall call.

Sunday Morning: "Called to be Witnesses" Acts 1:8

The believer is represented in scripture by various figures of speech—salt, light, branch, and many others. One of the most characteristic

names given by Christ is "witness". This is the vocation to which each believer in Christ is called. Christ called His disciples to be "witnesses" in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and in the uttermost parts of the earth. This means that through a Christ-imparted character, a Christ-ordered life, and a Christ-centered message, we are to be His witnesses wherever we may be. Just as in business, products are sold by the testimony of users, and in jurisprudence crucial cases are won even by one witness, so in the cause of the Kingdom, the witness is vital to the success of its growth and influence. Nothing is more urgent in this critical hour of history than that the witness who knows through experience stand up and declare that God lives, and that in the person of Christ He can and does produce a miracle in the lives of those who believe. Through the combined witness of His followers, a movement is started that all hell cannot quench. Seeing then that we are encompassed about with such a great "cloud" of faithful witnesses, let us join their ranks now and through faith claim a church for Christ.

Evening Services

Tuesday Evening: "By My Spirit" Zechariah 4:6

Zechariah, the prophet, faced a discouraged people. After 70 years of captivity in Babylon, Zerubbabel and a "mighty minority" had returned to build the temple of God. Discouraged by the opposition of the Samaritans, the work had come to a halt. It was to these people Zechariah declared that the temple of God would be built "not by might nor by power" but by the Spirit of the Living God. And so it was.

Here is a message pertinent to the day in which we live. God has given us a job to do. We have not been called to sit, but to serve; to be labourers together with Christ in the building of His church—the temple of God. This church, made up of the redeemed company, disciplined by the Holy Spirit, is to be the salt of the earth, the light of the world—the army of the Lord. As such she has a mission to fulfill, a battle to win, a God to glorify.

But God's work encounters opposition. Zerubbabel did. We will, whenever we do anything significant for God, especially building the church as a force for righteousness. This opposition, while obviously arising from outside forces such as communism, liberalism, or secularism, does not thwart the Almighty God in His purpose. It is the opposition from within—smugness, indifference, fear, lethargy of the people—that brings the work to a halt. But, let us know we are the people of God, we are to be His channels of power to fulfill His purpose.

Let us remember, it is not by might nor by power but by His Spirit we will build the church. Our tendency has been to resort to the weapons of carnal warfare—holy crusades, bitter words, harsh arguments. God's work can be carried on to fulfillment only as the Holy Spirit moves upon us, and works through us. Let us see that God uses men as His instruments. We may be the channels that fulfill His purpose or the hindrances that hold back His power. Let us then as God's people rally to the call of the Prophet. Let us build, knowing that the temple of God can be built and must be built in our day.

Wednesday Evening: "The Battle of Ai" Joshua 7

Much is made of the battle of Jericho, but little is said of the battle of Ai. After describing the triumph at Jericho, Joshua 7 begins with an ominous note—"but the children of Israel committed a trespass." Then follow three important pictures—the first, the defeat of Israel at Ai. With a sense of self-sufficiency, Israel sent but a small army before Ai, but she was defeated. This much we should learn from this picture: (1) God

expects uninterrupted victory in the life of His children, and (2) when defeat is suffered there is a reason. The second picture is the disobedience of Achan. Here was the reason for failure at Ai. The reason for defeat is not to be found in the circumstances before us, but within the heart and life of God's children. The "accursed" thing had not been destroyed, and the "devoted" thing had not been dedicated. God wants some things destroyed in our life and others are to be dedicated to the treasury of God, and when these desires are violated by any one of God's people, His blessing is withheld from the whole. The sin of one person brought defeat and dismay to the whole of Israel. "No individual Christian can sin without affecting the whole church. No child of God can grow cold in his spiritual life without lowering the temperature of everybody else around him. The victory of the whole community depends on the victorious life of every individual church member." (Redpath, Victorious Christian Living, p. 119) The final picture is the discipline of the Lord. Sin must be uncovered and judged if victory is to follow. There must be the discipline of confession, renunciation, and dedication in the church if God's blessing is to be ours. God teaches us "he that covereth his sins shall not prosper." But, we must be encouraged to know that victory is possible. We need not shrivel in defeat and dismay before our enemies. We can know God's blessing and God's power in uninterrupted victory.

Thursday Evening: "The Tragedy of the Unemployed" Matthew 20:1-7

Our concern tonight is the problem of unemployment in the kingdom of God. The work of the kingdom is not primarily what takes place within the "household" but what takes place in the "vineyard"—the world. It is here that the toil, labour, and sacrifice of the believer must be spent. Too much of our labour is within the church, because we view the work of the Lord as that which takes place within the four walls of the building. The real work of the Kingdom is "men invading the world for Him, quietly, continually, consistently infecting the world where they live with a contagious witness of the contemporary Christ and His relevance to life." The measure of what happens in the pew is what happens when we leave the pew. But, it is just here we see the tragedy of the unemployed. The facts are that far too few Christian people are committed to labour in the vineyard, and seem quite contented to be so. The tragedy is greatest when we consider Christ's consistent call—"Go into the vineyard." Christ is primarily interested in the harvest of the world, and He calls each of us, whether appointed on a committee or not, to carry the concerns of the householder into the world where the need is greatest. Let us hear the word of Christ, "why stand ye here all the day idle", and respond by saying, "Here am I Lord, send me."

Friday Evening: "Fruit Unto Holiness" Romans 6:22

Holiness is very nearly the least of desires in the church of the western world. Yet, Paul pictured it as the ultimate expression—"the fruit"—of the Christian life. In this section of scripture, Romans 5, 6, 7 and 8, Paul discusses three specific considerations. First, the presence of sin in the human life—the sickness. He is talking about something other than a volitional act. He is describing sin as a condition of human nature. He points out both its beginning through the sin of Adam (Romans 5:12) and its behaviour as essentially "enmity to God" (8:7), producing finally bondage to death. This he pictures as a universal condition. However, he also stresses the power of grace as revealed in Jesus Christ as the all-sufficient remedy. Where "sin abounded, grace did more abound—superbound" is Paul's announcement. This grace not only bestows the gift of life to the believing sinner, but destroys the dominion of sin in a believer's life

producing fruit unto holiness. "Sin shall not have dominion over you" but now ye shall have "fruit unto holiness." Finally, he writes of the process of victory in one's life. Fruit unto holiness does not come easily. It calls for the Spirit-led disciplined process of mortifying the deeds of the body (8:13) and yielding ourselves in complete dedication to Christ and righteousness (7:6). In the crucial issue, we are made "free from this law of sin and death" through the Spirit, producing fruit in a new relationship to the living Christ—fruit unto holiness.

Saturday Evening: "The Man With the Withered Hand" Luke 6:1-12

Here is a pitiful picture of physical need—a hand that had form and structure, but lifeless and useless. This is the spiritual picture of many professing Christians today. God has given us hands to use—the hand of prayer (1 Timothy 2:8); the hand of service (Deuteronomy 15:7; Acts 3:7; Nehemiah 2:18); and the hand of giving (Matthew 6:3). But alas, these hands are too often withered—form, but no life and power. The hand of prayer is often impotent with no answers and little real praying taking place. The hand of giving is often withered. Not only is the tithe withheld from God, but rarely is anything given beyond the tithe to demonstrate our love for Christ and others. The hand of service is likewise too often withered. We carry on life quite as usual—we do little or nothing for Christ, for others. These hands are withered, either because of wrong motivation in which we retain the form but are robbed of meaning and love in the act, inactivity in which we become too busy to use these hands, or simply sin. The result, form but no power. What can be done? There is hope for the withered hand. We must stretch forth these hands unto Jesus Christ, now, and life will come once more. Christ bids us "stretch forth thy hand" that it may be healed. Let our prayer be "O Lord, take my withered hand and heal it that I may be of service to thee."

Sunday Evening: "Times of Refreshing" Acts 3:19

The sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting are nearly over. These have been times of unusual blessing. But, two concerns lay heavily upon my heart. One is that these blessings may continue, uninterrupted in the life of each person, and that upon each congregation at home, each may experience this year a time of revival and refreshing from the Lord. Let me assure you that this is exactly what Peter under divine inspiration has promised can happen. Let us be assured that seasons of refreshing do come from the presence of the Lord. Just as in nature, in business, and in other areas of life we have our "seasons", so in the church we need seasons of "refreshing" from the presence of the Lord. History is filled with stories of such. The hundred and twenty in the upper room, the city of Samaria (Acts 8), the Protestant reformation, the Quaker beginning, the Evangelical Awakening in England, and many others. Even in our day, many congregations are experiencing great seasons of refreshing from the Lord. But these seasons do not come automatically. There must be a time of preparation. Peter asks us to repent "that seasons of refreshing may come." If we would experience these seasons of refreshing, there must be (1) a confession of and forsaking of all known sin, (2) diligent attention to the means of Grace—especially the Word of God, (3) a genuine desire and hunger for God's presence to be manifest, and (4) an attitude like that of the importunate widow who would not be denied. This is our most urgent need today as we talk about the "eclipse of Christianity" and as we see Peters who follow a great way off, and multitudes who forsake him, James and John, who seek for special privileges, and weary fearful disciples. Let our prayer be as expressed in the song: "Pass me not, O gentle Saviour, Hear my humble cry; While on others Thou art calling, Do not pass me by."

In Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, subsection C, paragraph 4, page 54, make the following changes: Change title to read:

4. ADMINISTRATORS AND FIELD SECRETARIES. The Yearly Meeting shall appoint annually, on nomination by the Executive Council with the advice and approval of the General Superintendent, a person to serve as Assistant Superintendent. He shall be well qualified by maturity and experience to carry out his appointed responsibilities. He shall work under the supervision of the General Superintendent in any or all of the departments of work of the Yearly Meeting; he shall familiarize himself with the activities of all boards and committees and shall attend their meetings at their request or at the suggestion of the General Superintendent. He may be assigned special duties and responsibilities by the Executive Council with the consent of the General Superintendent.

At such times as the interests. . . .

In Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, subsection D, paragraph 1, line 4, following the words, "the General Superintendent," insert the words "the Assistant Superintendent."

In Part II, Chapter II, Section IV, subsection D, paragraph 3, subparagraph g, insert after the words in line 2, "General Superintendent," the words "Assistant Superintendent" and at the end of subparagraph g add the words "and Assistant Superintendent."

In Part II, Chapter III, Section I, subsection A, paragraph 8, pages 77 and 78, change the second sentence to read: "A personal interview with the person involved shall be secured or authorized by the committee."

In Part II, Chapter III, Section I, subsection A, paragraph 9, page 78, make these changes: Insert a new sentence four to read: "When the action of the Yearly Meeting is favorable, the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight shall proceed to sponsor the public recognition of ministerial gifts in a service during the sessions of the Yearly Meeting." Let the present sentences four and five become sentences five and six, and let the present sixth and last sentence become a subparagraph.

For Part IV, paragraph 5, page 110, substitute the following wording: All trustees of the College are elected by the Yearly Meeting. Of the total of forty-two, not more than fourteen are elected each year for terms of three years. These are nominated as follows: Not more than six by Oregon Yearly Meeting; not more than six by the College board of trustees; not more than two by the College alumni association. Members to fill vacancies occurring otherwise than by expiration of term are nominated by the group entitled to representation by the original nomination.

The word "and" be added in a designated place, and that the paragraph be inserted between paragraphs 6 and 7 on page 44 of the Constitution and Discipline, with paragraphs 7 and 8 renumbered 8 and 9. It would then read as follows:

7. INCORPORATION. Monthly meetings are at liberty to incorporate provided they adopt Articles of Incorporation pursuant to the form approved by Oregon Yearly Meeting, which makes clear the position of the monthly meeting as a part of and subordinate to the Yearly Meeting, and as governed by the Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

On page 54, paragraph, THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT, replace the first sentence with the following:

3. THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT. The Yearly Meeting shall appoint, on nomination by the Executive Council, a person to serve as General Superintendent. His initial appointment shall be for a term of two years. The following year and annually thereafter, as his services prove to be satisfactory and effective and he senses a continuing concern for the work, the appointment shall be extended for an additional year, thus giving him with each extension a two-year period in prospect for longer range planning. (A period of one year for smoother transition is also thus provided when his service is to be terminated.)

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
