# **Minutes**

## **Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church**

### **1967**

- 1. The seventy-fifth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened August 15, 1967, in Newberg, Oregon.

The beginning of our seventy-fifth year finds us in a world of change and anxiety. There are wars, earthquakes, famines, and revolutions abroad. There are riots, lawlessness and increasing moral decay at home. World problems come closer to our doors than our predecessors seventy-four years ago would have believed possible. May we in this complex and difficult time fulfil our mission as the salt of the earth and the light of the world. "All hail the power of Jesus' name."

Clifton Ross offered the opening prayer. Sheldon Louthan led the congregation in singing "We Join to Worship Thee, O God."

- 2. Jack L. Willcuts, Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, brought the opening message as follows (excerpt—a copy of the complete address may be obtained from the superintendent's office.):

"Seventy-five years seems a long time in some ways. It is the normal lifetime of a man, yet only a dot in human history. Upon reaching this time marker in the progress of Oregon Yearly Meeting, it is well to look over our shoulders before plunging into the tomorrows. History is the raw material of the future, which may be part of the meaning of the psalmist as he prayed: 'So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.'"

"We have no way of knowing whether we are midway, just beginning or near the close of an era of church life that means so much to so many. But a review of the past is interesting and can be instructive. This seventy-fifth year of Oregon Yearly Meeting begins today, and certain observances of this milestone are planned throughout the year to culminate in a special commemorative occasion upon concluding this diamond anniversary at next Yearly Meeting in 1968. To launch this year, the 75th Anniversary Committee has prepared a pictorial booklet with narration written by Marie Haines and printed by Barclay Press.

"I am pleased to announce that Ralph Beebe of the Eugene Friends Meeting is completing a book-length history of Oregon Yearly Meeting, the first thorough effort of this type to be done in such detail. His book will be ready before next Yearly Meeting and every Friends family should have a copy.



"Spiritual progress and church life is not easily measured. Church buildings can be counted, even membership additions recorded, but the blessings, the emotions, the decisions and the intangibles of inner experience cannot be pictured or written. Oregon Yearly Meeting has both a memory and a hope, both of which are linked to the clear direction of the Holy Presence in our midst.

"While interyearly meeting and interdenominational contacts are necessary, my main concern is how things are going in your local meeting. And I am sure you are, too. It was a wonderful privilege for Geraldine and me to accompany Charles Ball on a visit to Bolivia and Peru, but as the thrilling growth and vision of Aymara Friends so newly brought to Christ stirred us, our hearts ached to see this same spontaneous, New Testament-type church atmosphere spread to Boise, Spokane, Seattle, Portland and every other place where Friends meet. How can problem-conscious, routine-ridden, discouraged Christians find renewal and revival? Revival is being experienced here and there, but what will it take to see Friends of the Northwest more effective in outreach, in numbers, spiritual depth and vision to match the challenge of this generation? We have never had a better, more capable, more concerned church than we have today. The quality of Christians gathered at the conference called for younger Friends last winter was a tremendous inspiration. There we grappled with serious, deep questions that we don't always take the time to explore. What is our future as a church? What are our distinctives as Friends today? How can we reach our neighborhood for Christ? Do our meetings, programs, methods need to be updated?

"There is a need for a greater emphasis in building up capital funds for church extension outreach. In a day when investment programs have become big business, even among Friends, more attention should be given to funding new church extension starts which now take more initial capital than ever before. The Church Extension Foundation is an effective beginning, but ways must be found to enlarge this if we are to reach into fast-growing community centers with new churches. This is not to minimize the need for men called and prepared to start new outposts; we simply must have both if we are to be ready for service 'lowly or great,' and we do need to take some great strides in church extension! 'Where there is no vision the people perish.' We must match men with proper methods and adequate means.

"Upon visiting with other Friends across the world, I am impressed anew with the compassion we ought to have, and have historically shown, for the suffering, the hungry, the imprisoned, the lost of the world. While we must not be content with substituting 'benevolence' for sharing the Gospel, neither should we become selfish and ingrown with a sterile orthodoxy. It is good to see more of our young men volunteering for alternate service overseas. A true Christian motivation for ministering to the social problems pressing in upon us from all sides will surely lead us into finding new ways of becoming involved as Christians.

"At this point, I speak with deep personal concern. The variety of emphases among those who prefer to speak of us as the Society of Friends is quite fascinating. TIME magazine calls Quakers an 'ecclesiastical curiosity.' Having just attended the Fourth Friends World Conference, I can see why TIME reporters selected this description.

"Quakers, like every other person, need God's salvation through Jesus Christ. Any attempt to bring together Friends of all types into a closer working relationship without first uniting at the foot of the cross is to be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. While distinctive ministries among Friends may be commendable, let us remember that

what we hold in common is not a peace testimony or certain novel ways of worship—these are merely by-products of a relationship with God made possible through Calvary. Our unity is in Christ. Whatever Quakerism may mean to some, we see ourselves as part of the Church of Christ. This does not imply a uniformity of outlook and concerns perhaps, but clear convictions on the sinfulness of man and the saving grace of the Gospel, and these must remain the doctrinal guidelines for increasing pressures upon our Yearly Meeting for closer ties with other Friends. We must not fail to love the lost, the needy and the suffering of the world any less than others, but our concern for these comes from a realization that all men are redeemable, and will be eternally lost without Christ, which is quite different than seeing them as only neglected children of God lacking care and compassion.

"A new, urgent crusade is being mounted in the Society of Friends to bring all of us together in a closer fellowship. Some attempting to effect this move in Quaker ecumenism may be sincere, dedicated men who somehow assume that distinctive theological positions can be homogenized into a new movement that will satisfy all of us. Possibly it is unfair, at least it is difficult, to try to select those who are right and those who are wrong. The appeal of this effort comes close to us simply because we, too, want to see the Friends Church growing and becoming a more effective witness in the world. A danger lies in this frustration, however, especially to evangelical Friends. While we do our best to see this growth come about, we must not try to force it by uncertain organizational alignments, and certainly not at the risk of doctrinal compromise.

"Lest we fall into an unfavorable posture of only reacting, I am suggesting positive steps we can continue, which, however slowly, still are moving us in the right direction. One of these is to strengthen the emerging Evangelical Friends Alliance bringing the four yearly meetings: Kansas, Ohio, Oregon and Rocky Mountain, closer together. A unified magazine, the new EVANGELICAL FRIEND coming out this week from the Barclay Press, edited by Dean Gregory, is a major move in this direction. Roscoe and Tina Knight leave next week to open the first Evangelical Friends Alliance-sponsored foreign mission work in Mexico. Omaha, Nebraska, Friends Outpost has taken strides forward this year as an Alliance project with property purchased and a resident pastor, Harry Dillon—Gerald Dillon's brother—moving on the field there this summer. Another Evangelical Friends Alliance Friends Youth leadership conference concluded last week, held in Iowa. All of these joint ventures provide a ministry of outreach and Christian nurture which would not be possible without such interyearly meeting cooperation. Another enlarged dimension of fellowship being considered is an Evangelical Friends Alliance conference, not only for the twenty-five or so members of the Coordinating Council, but for all Friends of the four yearly meetings. If this seems premature, then a joint pastors' conference might be developed.

"Another positive stand which helps define both to ourselves and others the nature of doctrinal distinctives held by evangelical Friends is simply to stress the term evangelical. Public announcements, church bulletins, news releases and official designations should list us as evangelical Friends. There is such a distorted public image of the term Quaker all the way from 'Quaker Oats' to draft card burning. Quietly emphasizing our evangelical faith may be better, however, than formal protests.

"Another positive way to meet the dangers of compromise is to concentrate on the doctrinal training of our youth. Doctrinal teaching in summer camps, Vacation Bible Schools, Friends Youth meetings, and a



deliberate, thoughtful Bible teaching ministry in our pulpits with specific long-range objectives may help us to answer a doubting generation.

"For the time remaining, I want to direct our thinking toward the undeveloped possibilities which I believe face our Yearly Meeting and the unappropriated spiritual power God is waiting and longing to give those who are ready.

"The past few days we have been involved in the job of being custodian of blanks! I am talking about all those multicolored report forms that flood the Yearly Meeting during the closing days of the church year. And, this exercise has not been altogether reassuring. To be sure, there are encouraging trends: an impressive increase in membership (net gain 147; total 6,202), and in morning worship attendance; 24,205 pastoral calls are reported; 29 churches show again in Sunday school; 26 churches show an increase in all departments and some quite spectacular. Our youth camps were well attended, with various novel programming additions such as wrangler camps, and I am impressed with the splendid planning and staffing which characterizes the camping efforts of our church. Family camps seem to be having a new appeal with increased interest and attendance. The six Schools for Elders held this year were not only helpful but the response of nearly 300 Ministry and Oversight members indicates a genuine concern to fulfil these responsibilities well.

"But can we be content with growth by inches? There are times when just holding our own is sinful when burgeoning population increases, busy shopping centers, new yet over-crowded schools, high-rise apartments, and the streets, the parks, the freeways, the entertainment spots and amusement centers are crowded with people with time on their hands searching for the ageless answers to be found only in Christ. And, instead of penetrating the restless world with the message of salvation, too often the world has penetrated the church until we are more preoccupied with our losses, our smallness and our dreary troubles than with our glorious destiny as born-again citizens in the kingdom of God. It is no wonder that the prophets of old shouted to the people to 'lift up your heads,' 'break up your fallow ground,' or that the gospel writers urge, 'when these things begin to come to pass then look up, lift up your heads, for your redemption draweth nigh.'

"Going from place, one is impressed that many seem no longer to regard their local church as successful or entirely satisfying or meeting the challenge of our times. If this attitude prevails among parents, it is no wonder few young people sense a call into the ministry or to the mission field. This does not mean they are unwilling to serve or sacrifice, but who can be challenged to what is taken to be a waning cause? There are many exciting exceptions to this generalization, but the pressures of our contemporary living are such that local meetings will not long survive a status quo or mere routine existence. There must be real revival, a spiritual vitality and vision that make the meeting a movement for God, or these churches will not last. For us all, it is growth or slow death. Perhaps one should say rapid death and slow burial.

"But it does little good to scold discouraged adults. Churches do not become more spiritual or grow numerically simply by brow beating. And Friends are not alone in this predicament of scattered decline. Read any Christian magazine and note the spate of books coming off religious presses. Our library shelves are filling with advice on what to do about this, ranging all the way from those insisting the church has had it, Christianity has failed, and a new system, a new social order is the only way out, to those who have strenuously and prayerfully struggled to find ways for spiritual renewal.

"While we shake our heads at the bewildering growth of cults, probably the day will come when we shall have a better understanding of the invisible forces at work under the 'Prince of the power of the air.' Nevertheless, since we are certain of our message and the urgency of the needs, surely there must be a weakness in our methods, in our morale, and yes, in our leadership, locally and everywhere. For what else can account for the growth of these cults other than methods, morale, leadership and the invisible forces of Satanic power? Looking at our situation as practically as possible, we have the promise that 'He who is for us is greater than he who is against us.' The invisible forces of God at work in the hearts of men, and the spiritual power of a meeting on fire with the Holy Ghost is enough to make us to be more than conquerors. Where do these beliefs and our outward influence connect? Suppose we set our goal in Oregon Yearly Meeting to double in membership next year, or the next five years, or the next ten? Twelve thousand members in a decade! Somehow this strikes me as Christian thinking, but we associate such a claim as Mormon thinking.

"Do you recall that Christ came finally to the point when he said, in effect, 'Now, everything is ready. Pray ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into the harvest field.' God does give the increase and the gains, and the crop, but it is required that someone plant, another water, another gather—and that we all labor together. The Latin American Mission, upon launching the Evangelism in Depth program which has been notably successful in so many countries, captured this idea by stating its objective: 'The growth of any movement is in direct proportion to its ability to mobilize its entire membership for continuous evangelistic action.' But somehow, beyond both the message and the method there has to be the motivation, the drive, the vision, the effervescence and confidence that come to one hearing good news. Trueblood speaks of the 'incendiary purpose.' To find this, surely we must go beyond the library shelves and Sunday school conventions. We have to go beyond Friends history and Billy Graham Crusades. We are given in the Book of Acts at least three descriptions of the church which tell us what it is to be like as well as what it is to do. One of these in the original, I am told, is *kerygma* which suggests the work of proclamation; the second is *diakonia*, or service, and the third is quite familiar to us, *koinonia*, or fellowship. Proclamation, service and fellowship—these three and only these three—are to constitute the basic function and purpose of the church. When there is a prophetic voice, outgoing love in action and a sense of spiritual belonging around the Holy Presence, the church is complete. To establish other goals, even of growth, using any of these functions merely as an opening wedge for the Gospel, will be disappointing. And to measure the success of a church only in terms of numerical growth is also a fallacy. If, through the faithful fulfillment of the three purposes of the church, the Lord gives souls, fine; but this, after all, should not be the chief end. The real goal is to glorify God in holy obedience.

"A year ago there was introduced the Program of Advance, and it was heralded with considerable enthusiasm. My view of this word 'advance' encompasses a total enlargement of our church in quality as well as quantity. Many churches and pastors have worked hard in following the suggestion for advance; it must be noted, however, that frequently the meetings and pastors seemed to pick and choose the parts of the Advance Program which appealed to them or in which they were already advancing. One of the objectives of the program, of course, is to provide a balanced effort, including the strengthening of weak points and obvious lacks. Now, I have to confess that one's critical powers can become amazingly sharp



when one begins to feel some primary responsibilities in leadership. It has taken a little adjustment this year to move from the category of what they are doing over in the Yearly Meeting office, to what they are doing over in that monthly meeting. But in making this somewhat lonely journey from one place to the other, a few things have been noted along the way.

"First, the leaders of our meetings and most of the people are willing to work hard for success. What is more, they enjoy doing it and have a lot of fun together most of the time. Furthermore, some of us are so caught up in the activities, even the services of the church, that we have confused them for the work of the Lord. So, the local meeting has become a sort of pleasant social affair taking all our free time, and some which we should not spare from family life. As long as things run smoothly, everyone is well pleased; it gives many a sense of doing something worthwhile. We move in small circles and find it hard to break out of them or get others into them. Maybe this picture is overdrawn as a conventional pattern, but the question arises as to how many really grasp the true nature of the Church. We all need to catch a new glimpse of what the Spirit-filled fellowship following Pentecost was like, rather than some idealistic, Americanized view of a smoothly operating community church. We catch this true insight from time to time in worship, in family devotions and elsewhere, I am sure, but somehow it has not become a motivating, spiritual dynamic dominating our whole lives. Do we feel ourselves to be really led of the Lord or merely carried along by a religious, middle-of-the-road kind of Christianity? Our youth, our neighbors, the world will listen only to the Lord's anointed, and we are all to be ministering servants.

"The church in Acts apparently did not worry as much as we about its own self-preservation. It worried about getting God's will done. Finding God's will in every specific way possible rather than just doing what is expected of us or being shaped by what others might say about us is so important. Christian individuality and holy initiative must characterize our faith.

"Secondly, we must move under a sense of God's power, as well as His leading. This begins with the assurance of the witness of the Spirit within our hearts. One weakness of modern soul-winning techniques is to accept a series of verses, arguments, even personal commitment, without the inner knowledge that God has come to us. You see, when God comes, nothing then is impossible. More miracles should be happening among us and those that are, should be recognized. We have a great God, greater than the 20th century, bigger than Expo '67 or the United Nations, larger than history, time or space. Seeing Him, surely we can break out of our tiny complexes and selfish interests to tackle the impossible, the personal and public problems all in the authority of the power of the Almighty! Amos did just this. The disciples did this—all in the power poured out upon the true Church at Pentecost. Remember the old song we used to sing, 'Pentecostal power is falling'? That power needs to fall again upon Oregon Yearly Meeting in such avalanche proportions that it will reach every hungry-hearted Christian in every local meeting.

"Third, to be a Christian means more than committee work. It means a right relationship with God. Let us describe it as full time Christian living, gearing our controllable time and energy for God and His kingdom on earth. This outlook will change our perspective. We will no longer be taking time out for church work and interests, we will be taking time out for our job and other interruptions. In this connection, someone has observed that were the Apostle Paul touring the country now, he would be introduced as a professional tent equipment manufacturer who makes

occasional missionary journeys, rather than an evangelist who occasionally makes tents to pay his way.

"Any great task is difficult, but it is especially difficult to know how to begin. We know that the world needs the Christian faith as a redemptive force; we know that this force is inoperative except through the Church; we know that the Church requires some reconstruction; but how is this to be done? 'There are two dangers to evangelism,' said an astute observer. 'One is to change the message; the other is to refuse to change the methods.' Clearly, we cannot begin everywhere at once; we need a usable handle with which to start the operation. What is it to be?

"In attempting to gear our Yearly Meeting for faster growth in Phase II of the Advance Program, a Year of Evangelism is now being introduced. The most careful planning of which we have been capable has been given to the proposals for evangelistic action by the local meetings this year. The Program of Advance Committee has worked diligently and with a keen sense of the seriousness of its task in preparing the second planning guide book to be distributed for the first time this week.

"To start well is so important. Therefore, during the months of September and October, all the pastors, elders, overseers, Sunday school teachers and other church leaders able to participate will meet together in regional, four-day seminars in order to give time, study and prayer to the issues raised today and other questions many of you have. This will not be easy to arrange. The pastors have been requested on two occasions to block out this time in the fall calendar of church activities as conscientiously as they would for a revival meeting, for this is precisely what we hope it will be. We will be gathering in these days, starting with public services on Saturday and Sunday, with classes, prayer meetings and discussion in depth running through Thursday in each area. Gerald Dillon has consented to assist in these meetings, and he and I will be joined by others in leading these Evangelism Seminars. I personally hope to engage in evangelism visitation work along with pastors in the afternoons, as time permits.

"We are pleading with Friends not to view these efforts as merely something novel, or done out of curiosity, or to be done competitively, but from a compelling sense of urgency to find God's will for us as individual Christians, as local meetings and as a Yearly Meeting. This does not imply that what is now being done is all wrong. But it is terribly wrong to be content with anything less than God's best for us. Evangelism is not the sole task of the church, of course; there is worship, nurture and fellowship. But worship and fellowship that do not lead to effective witness soon become empty. I again emphasize that if we are to be true to our heritage and equal to our present task, our strategy must be to place the burden of outreach upon every Christian. Where there is division or discontent, let us allow the Lord to create a right spirit within us, let love and a tender spirit rule in all our meetings, for we have a job to do. By catching this vision we can march together in one accord.

"Ring in my memory are two rejoinders from the past few months. One came from a precious Mormon family who found the Lord in Medford and joined the church there since we left. They have now moved to Boise, but they seized the hand of their pastor and exclaimed, 'Why haven't we heard of Friends before? Christ has saved our marriage as well as our souls. Why haven't we heard before?'

"The other memory is from an incident in our recent visit to Peru when Charles Ball and I were surrounded by a group of new Christians following a morning worship hour. 'We need a Bible school,' sixteen of these young pastors and elders were saying, 'You have waited so long to



bring us the Gospel that we have very little time left. We must have help, more understanding of the Bible, because you have waited so long. . .'

" 'Why haven't we heard before? Why have you waited so long?' Then there is the other question given accusingly in my office, 'How much longer do you think our Church can rock along before it dies?'

'No doubt, many of the most concerned, competent members of Oregon Yearly Meeting are in this room this morning. Certainly some of our finest young people are here. There are those here who have labored across the years and those who have tried and tried again to build, to reach out, to see greater results. All of us know what it is to be rebuffed, discouraged, frustrated and ready to quit. My prayer is that somehow we may, above all else, hear the Master's 'Well done,' which is the only true measure of success. And, at the same time feel again the surge of spiritual power and renewal which a gathering of Christians at Yearly Meeting ought to permit.

'One night, a heavy cargo boat sank in the harbor. At daybreak the word went out to prepare the heavy salvaging equipment, the cranes, the dry dock crew, for the harbor must be cleared. A young engineer approached the salvage crew foreman and quietly asked, 'May I try to lift that sunken boat? If so, I will need very little equipment—no cranes, no crews of men—and it will all be done by tomorrow.' The foreman was incredulous, a trifle irritated, but he reluctantly allowed the young engineer to try his plan. Whereupon, a small tugboat was taken at low tide and firmly chained to the sunken boat. Then they waited for the tide. Both boats were lifted together by the quiet strength of the ocean swells, and the little tugboat slowly cleared the harbor.

"The harbor of our environment is filled with sinking lives and our rescue equipment is small. But we can fasten with chains of love to the enormous needs about us and wait for the tides of God's power. God is still able!"

Following a time of silent and vocal prayer, Dorwin Smith expressed for all present deep appreciation for the inspiration of this message.

(The meeting gave the chairman the privilege of obtaining as many other caretakers as necessary to fill in where needed.)

The clerk mentioned that gratitude was due these who were willing to serve in order to release the junior high and high school young people to participate in the youth program.

● 4. The reports of the state of the churches are summarized as follows:

Common to all quarterly meetings was reaffirmation of faith in the Scriptures, the Church and the head of the Church, Christ Jesus. Attendance was reported generally increased for the Sunday morning worship services but some concern was expressed for evening and prayer meetings. Other concerns related to the need for greater unity in the work, to apparent materialism in some congregations which hinders spiritual growth, to the need for more liberty in participation in public prayer and testimony and to the lack of interest in the lost in communities around the churches.

The Program of Advance was mentioned by Boise, Greenleaf, Portland and Salem as a stimulant to growth and progress. An added evangelistic approach through Bible study in the home was reported by Boise, Greenleaf, Inland and Portland. Greenleaf and Puget Sound wrote that five young people felt the call to the ministry. Increased responsibility and

help in the work by young people were emphasized in reports from Boise, Portland and Newberg. Inland told of a special approach to children through illustrated sermons in one meeting. Newberg mentioned an increase in counseling ministry in one meeting. Portland reported enthusiasm for a sponsor program for preparatory members at First Friends. The work of the music and decorating committees was appreciated by another Portland meeting. Puget Sound told of a second service on Sunday morning now being held at Seattle Memorial. Everett Monthly Meeting has a new organ. Southwest Washington Quarter reported looking forward to the new year, hoping with the Lord's guidance to be more effective witnesses in their communities, bringing new people into the church. They felt some concern that there has been some decline in attendance. In all reports a spirit of praise for past blessings, faith in the power of God to help with the work, and a rededication to carry on more faithfully were apparent.

The Board of Evangelism, after discussion with the pastors at Ministers Conference, wishes to recommend to the Yearly Meeting that the pastoral year be changed to begin July 1 and end June 30 each year, this change to be effective July 1, 1968.

Approved for final action tomorrow.

● 21. The following recommendation from the Board of Christian Education was read:

Junior yearly meeting and nursery care during Yearly Meeting have grown tremendously. To care for the expenses of this important area of yearly meeting work, the Board of Christian Education recommends that a registration fee of \$1 per person be charged during the yearly meeting sessions. The registration fees from the junior high and high school young people would continue to go to the Friends Youth, and the adult registration fees would be used to subsidize the junior yearly meeting program. No fees would be charged for children below the junior high age.

Approved having needed funds made available by some other means. It was suggested the matter be referred to the Board of Finance. Approved.

### BOARD OF PUBLICATION

● 22. Harold Antrim, president, introduced the board. He underlined the sacrificial service of the dedicated staff of Barclay Press. He expressed appreciation for the work of the manager, Harlow Ankeny, and his wife Gertrude. Publishing is one of the biggest businesses in our country. The Yearly Meeting can be proud of Barclay Press, whose purpose is to serve and which is dedicated to publishing the Word as admonished in Psalm 68:11 and Isaiah 52:7.

Harlow Ankeny introduced the staff of Barclay Press and expressed appreciation for both salaried and volunteer service. He described several new items of equipment recently purchased, including a new Heidelberg press. The increase of business has made new methods necessary and indicates the leading of the Lord into greater usefulness.

This year Barclay Press has done 239 separate jobs. Among regular publications are NORTHWEST FRIEND, MISSIONARY VOICE, ACCENT, the ADULT FRIEND, the TEACHER'S FRIEND, FRUIT OF THE VINE, the catalog of George Fox College as well as one of the bulletins and the 75th anniversary brochure.

Among books published this year are Missionary Moments by Phyllis Cammack, Move Over, Elijah by Arthur O. Roberts, and a brochure celebrating the seventy-fifth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting by Marie Haines.

The largest future contract is for the EVANGELICAL FRIEND, new magazine of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. There will be 10,500 copies of the first issue to appear soon.

The financial statement of Barclay Press appears in the appendix.

Approved with expression of appreciation.

● 23. Norman Winters, principal of Greenleaf Academy, reported on the current situation and program of the academy. (A copy of this report and the financial statement may be obtained upon request from the academy.)

## BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

● 27. The president, L. Merle Green, underlined important emphases in the following report:

This is a day of riot and bloodshed. Men are destroying one another on battlefields. Some 470,000 Americans are now involved in the Viet Nam war, and the President continues to authorize more by the thousands each month to enter the conflict. Seventy billion dollars plus is going for defense. An appropriation bill for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year of 1968 is going before the Senate this month. This bill calls for an appropriation of \$298 million to start deployment of an anti-ballistic missile system (known as ABM or Nike-X). Letters should go to our Senators urging them to vote against entering this defensive weapons race.

We do hereby declare the words of our Lord Jesus Christ to be the precepts that we as Christians and members of Oregon Yearly Meeting should live by. As Friends we not only believe in the message of peace but we endeavor to promote peace and at the same time give our services for the well-being of the hungry and needy.

Our board is working to promote a five-point program:

1. Preaching and promotion of peace
2. Alternate Service
3. Foreign Relief
4. Foster Homes and Child Adoption
5. Disaster Program

In the area of Foster Homes and Child Adoption the Board of Peace and Service has maintained as an official program the encouragement of church members to consider foster care and adoptive programs as a means of providing desperately needed help to homeless and neglected children. All agencies licensed to certify foster or adoptive homes in Washington, Idaho and Oregon are in dire need of qualified families to make applications for these services. This does not, however, mean that a foster or adoptive child is placed with any family. A thorough study of a family's qualifications is completed before the family is considered for a child.

The Board of Peace and Service urges all families of Oregon Yearly Meeting to seriously consider this avenue of service. For information about such programs contact the local Public Welfare Department in your locality. They can provide information about their own as well as other authorized agencies in your area.

The major area of the board's work this year has been the Alternate Service program. Last year the board presented to the Yearly Meeting the challenge of taking as its Foreign Relief project the support of three young men doing their alternate service in Viet Nam. This is to be a two-year project of \$7,815.00. Friends have responded in a wonderful way, and as of July 15, 1967, \$6,245.65 has been received for the support of the Viet Nam Team. This support has come from the following sources: George Fox College students, families of the three young men, the young men themselves, pledges and gifts from members of Oregon Yearly Meeting and Board of Peace and Service. The board will continue to look to the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting for their prayers and support of this project for this second year.

The Alternate Service Committee was brought into being as a sub-committee under the Board of Peace and Service during the February 1966 midyear board meetings. The committee is to provide the legal and administrative structure to assist conscientious objectors of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends. Its responsibilities are to assist the CO with legal assistance, placement, financial advice on certain alternate service

assignments, and continuing encouragement while fulfilling the Selective Service requirements.

Since the committee's conception, the members have designed a complete screening procedure, developed assignment contacts for many places in the world, and placed six COs in overseas assignments and one in Oregon. Three of the overseas assignments have been to Viet Nam. The committee has assumed the major financial responsibility for this team of three in this critical area of service. The committee is in the process of designing a brochure which will tell the story of the services to COs of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The Board of Peace and Service met at Melody Mountain Camp, Meacham, Oregon, May 20-21, 1967, to clarify our understanding of these three questions: 1. The Biblical view of peace; 2. The Christian and the state, and 3. Positive peacemaking.

We find agreement with the disciplinary statements showing peace as an integral part of the holiness available to men through Jesus Christ our Lord. We seek to be true to the Biblical statements about peace and not be swayed by pragmatic considerations.



The life and teachings of Jesus support a peace stand. War cannot be justified by the sovereign act of authority involved when Jesus cleansed the temple of profiteers. Peace is part of the new covenant of Christ. We were reminded that government is the best form of nonviolent action yet devised by men. Without such nonviolent actions to which men give loyalty and obedience anarchy develops.

The Christian cannot force Christian principles upon the state. We feel Christians should work actively in political life. They must recognize the difference between police force and war; they must differentiate between them and the violence of war.

We urge churches to include more peace education in Sunday schools, to encourage youth and adults in actions of love and service in the face of an environment of violence. We seek to encourage and support our young men in their alternate service and help them be prepared spiritually for the consequences of their decisions.

We found this conference helpful and wish to encourage local meetings to undertake similar workshops.

Roland Hartley emphasized the great need for foster homes in the Northwest. The state does not expect you to care for other than your own children, but Christian service implies doing more than is expected.

Fred Newkirk, Peter Snow and Roland Hartley spoke of the responsibilities and program of the Alternate Service Committee, a subcommittee of this board.

Approved with expressions of appreciation.

● 28. The chairman of the Board of Finance, John Roberts, presented the following proposals for study and thought:

A. Objective

The objective of this proposal is to develop a budget plan which provides maximum visibility and accountability with equitable sharing of the financial responsibilities for each yearly meeting member. It is the overall intent of any budget plan to include only those items which collectively represent Oregon Yearly Meeting's share of presenting the Gospel.

B. Name

The name of the budget should be something pleasing and representing a challenge to us. There should be an identification possible with any area with which a person may wish to associate.

Proposal: The total budget will be called the Unified Budget.

C. Divisions

The following areas of work will be included in the Unified Budget:

Proposal: There will be four major divisions as follows: (1) Outreach—Missions, Church Extension, Evangelism, Quaker Men, Women's Missionary Union (2) Education—Christian Education, General Education (3) Home Ministry—Publication, Peace and Service, Moral Action, Stewardship, Church Music, Ecumenical Relations (4) Administrative Ministry—Superintendent, Office Expenses, Finance Board, Board of Trustees, Yearly Meeting Expenses, Travel by all Boards, Ministers Retirement, Pension Committee.

D. Budgeting Process

Each board or other group as defined above would submit their budget requirements to the Board of Finance for compilation and presentation to the Executive Council. Each board would develop its own budget requirements as at present. The Finance Board would continue to act as the

Finance Committee for the Yearly Meeting in addition to receiving the budget requirements of the other agencies. In the case of the Women's Missionary Union and the Quaker Men, their budgets would be generated as at present within their own groups and merely presented to the Board of Finance as a matter of information for estimating the expected income from these sources as it applies to yearly meeting work.

Proposal: All yearly meeting budget requests will be made through the Board of Finance for presentation to the Executive Council. Approval for all budgets would occur as at present by the Yearly Meeting.

E. Proportionate Sharing of Monthly Meetings

Each local meeting and each individual can share in the opportunities presented by the Yearly Meeting for extending themselves into more far-reaching areas of service. However, every local meeting should strengthen their own ability to support their pastor and supply adequate facilities conducive to growth. This will not only provide for improvement in their local outreach but by so doing will increase the base for extending yearly meeting objectives.

Proposal: The funds required to support the Yearly Meeting Unified Budget will be raised by the share of 30-40 per cent of the local meeting's total income minus the sum of the pastor's support and any required new construction or major facility improvement.

F. Promotion

The fact that a Unified Budget is being used should not in any way inhibit those individuals who have special concerns or interests in specific areas of the church work. If specially designated funds are received, these should be applied to the portion of the budget to which the designation applies. The total amount received in any one area should not be used in excess of the approved budget until all budget requests have been met. In any promotional activity the needs of such areas as missions should be presented with the same or even greater enthusiasm. However, any funds generated by this promotion would be funneled through the "central storehouses."

Proposal: All promotion activities will be carried on to bring the needs to the local meetings, but the expected proceeds would go to the Yearly Meeting Budget.

G. Adjustment of Board Askings

The total commitment of each individual to Christ and our portion of His Church must be accomplished in order to realize a completely successful campaign for extending the Gospel. However, it is unrealistic for anyone to assume there will not be honest differences of opinion about what should be done and where money should be expended for accomplishing the most for His kingdom. Promoting a better understanding of the total responsibilities of each local meeting and of each department within the Yearly Meeting to the established work will help these differences resolve themselves.

Proposal: The Executive Council should accept the plans for each department, combine them into an operating plan consistent with the overall objectives of the Yearly Meeting and take account of the financial requirements for this plan and the financial resources of the Yearly Meeting in resolving these differences.

● 36. The report of the Women's Missionary Union was given by Julia Pearson, president, as follows:

It was some 25 years ago when a little group of about ten women met in the basement of Newberg Friends Church to formulate the Women's Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Those early years were perilous for the little, weak organization, and many times it seemed it would not survive. But God had His hand on those courageous women until today, 25 years later, we can but exclaim, "What hath God wrought."

Our purpose was not just another "women's club" as some have thought, when women get together to talk and have some refreshments (a women's tea party). From the time it was conceived, its purpose has been to "enlist, encourage and unite the women of Oregon Yearly Meeting in the interest of missions both home and abroad." We have a five-point program which we have tried to keep before our women:

(1) Witnessing, (2) Praying, (3) Giving, (4) Studying, and (5) Working. Today there are 79 unions and a membership of over 1,000 women. There are one or more unions in every monthly meeting, preparative meeting and outpost in the Yearly Meeting with the exception of one outpost. One new union was organized during this year—a young married women's group in Parkrose.

We have a budget which amounts to about \$7 a year per paying member. Thirteen thousand dollars was handled by our treasurer, Agnes Tish; about \$11,000 of that amount was raised this year. We support one missionary couple on the field in Bolivia—the Comforts, give \$200 a month to our home work—\$100 to East Wenatchee, and \$100 to Clackamas Park. Also, during the year we gave the Yearly Meeting Board of Missions money for Calvert Courses for our missionary children, missionaries' vacations, interpreters for missionaries in Peru, Christmas gifts for missionaries in Bolivia and Peru, outfits for both the Nordykes and Pucketts and freight to ship them, Nepal and Mexico, and layette for Maurer's baby.

For home missions we gave Christmas gifts to our outpost pastors and families, gifts to Meridian, Quincy and Clackamas Park, literature for foreign missions, and books for church libraries. These were the most outstanding gifts, though our treasurer handled many small gifts of money for missionaries both home and foreign. We also pay all our own expenses for the yearly meeting banquet in August and the annual

retreat in October. So, we are serving the Lord and the Church not alone with our hands but helping to lift the financial burdens as well.

It was a joy and inspiration for the president to be able to visit many of the unions this year, to see the enthusiastic, dedicated groups of women working and fellowshiping in the Gospel, to hear their fervent prayers for one another and the prayer requests from both home and foreign fields and to counsel with them about their problems and rejoice with them in their victories. We travelled over 10,000 miles and found many new faces in our groups; mothers of Sunday school scholars, friends of our working women, and neighbors who have been drawn into the fellowship of Christian women as a result of witnessing for the Master.

A clever skit was presented showing the need to remember the work of missions when salaries are divided.

The financial statement appears in the appendix.

Approved with appreciation.

● 39. After a time of waiting before the Lord, Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

● 40. The minutes of the last business session were read and approved.

● 41. The recommendation of the Board of Evangelism was brought back to the floor. It was referred to the Discipline Revision Committee for proper wording. The matter of bringing the office of the General Superintendent in line with the proposed pastoral year was referred to the Executive Council. (See minute 20.)

● 42. Gerald Dillon presented the following report:

The Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance met at Denver, Colorado, January 24-26, 1967. Forty-seven members and three observers representing the four member yearly meetings were present. The council met for its sessions in the beautiful Denver Center Motel Lodge. Although the conference was brought hurriedly to an end by an unusually heavy snow storm, which stranded some of the delegates, the two and a half days were profitably used in furthering both the spirit of unity and areas of cooperation.

Our Yearly Meeting was represented by thirteen people, each of whom made an outstanding contribution to the conference. We are especially favored to have as editor of the new EVANGELICAL FRIEND a member of our own Yearly Meeting, Dean Gregory.

This meeting of the Coordinating Council marked the time when the constitution had been accepted by each member yearly meeting and became the official basis of our cooperation together. It is hoped that changes will be few and far between.

The Evangelical Friends Alliance is already showing strength in achieving its purpose of serving as a united voice and working for the mutual benefit of the member yearly meetings. It is our prayer that the Alliance will not only be a means by which our four yearly meetings can cooperate together but that we will become the vanguard of evangelical Friends everywhere. Other yearly meetings and many individuals are looking at our witness. Let us unitedly speak the same things, labor in the same spirit, and be more perfectly joined together in Him. In His strength and spirit let us keep the door of fellowship open for others who



may wish to share with us in an alliance for truth, righteousness and the Friends Church.

Approved.

● 43. The Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance recommended that the member yearly meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance be officially represented at the National Association of Evangelicals Board of Administration by one person appointed annually by the Coordinating Council of Evangelical Friends Alliance, and that the total financial contribution not necessarily exceed that which is paid by the member yearly meetings at present. We further recommend that the expense of this representative at the National Association of Evangelicals be paid on a pro rata basis by the four yearly meetings. (p. 3, Minutes of the Coordinating Council, E. F. A. January 25, 1967.)

● 44. Because of a wide range of terminology which relates to mutual areas of concern in each of our yearly meetings, the Evangelism Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance proposed that a committee be named to consider the adoption of uniform terminology in naming and defining boards and responsibilities.

Approved.

## BOARD OF EVANGELISM

● 45. The following is the report presented Wednesday evening by Charles Beals, president: (The financial statement of the Friends Church Extension Foundation appears in the appendix.)

The Board of Evangelism is pleased to present to the Yearly Meeting this summary of its activities for the year:

EMMETT. Under the topic of church building construction, this Board is glad to report that the Friends Outpost at Emmett, Idaho, under the pastoral leadership of Allen Cole, has completed construction of their sanctuary which was begun the year preceding. This has enabled the congregation to move from the pastor's residence to this new building for public services. The special yearly meeting offering a year ago toward the matching fund to Emmett brought in \$450 with several sizable pledges not yet paid.

MAPLEWOOD. This board has given special capital fund assistance to Maplewood Preparative Meeting in Portland toward construction of a much-needed sanctuary through the matching fund program, the special contribution from Portland First Friends Church, and the assurance of a Share Call. This has provided enough funds, along with a loan from a Savings and Loan Association, to begin construction immediately.

Maplewood is considered by our board to be a strategic situation for several reasons, among which are: clear title is held to the property; the present building is inadequate, being both obsolescent and overcrowded; there is good pastoral leadership in the persons of Roy and Harold Clark; the congregation is dedicated and energetic, paying into the church in excess of the tithe; and the location is strategically situated

in the middle of a natural parish community with no other church near and with many new residences under construction. Ground breaking is scheduled for Sunday, August 20.

EUGENE. With new homes and new schools burgeoning all around the Friends Church in Eugene, Oregon, it became evident to both the congregation and this board that a new sanctuary was the immediate need if the church was to serve adequately its community. Through past years services had been conducted in a unit architecturally designed for Sunday school rather than for church services. This board gave encouragement and guidance to the Eugene Friends in conducting a stewardship campaign, in acquiring architectural drawings, and in procuring a joint loan from a Savings and Loan Association and the Friends Church Extension Foundation. The new sanctuary is nearly completed.

In both the Maplewood and Eugene situations, this board encouraged the coming of Willard Kennon to carry on stewardship programs. The results in additional tithing commitments and faith pledges from their local congregations were highly gratifying. Without them, no building program for either church would be in progress today. These are examples expressing this board's philosophy that the best way to assist a church is to help it help itself.

ONTARIO. As stated in past reports the Board of Evangelism carries as a major concern the strengthening of existing meetings as well as establishing new ones. A year ago the Ontario Monthly Meeting faced some major problems which could have affected the continued existence of the meeting. Appeal was made to our board for assistance. As a consequence, we procured a pastor on a nearly full-time basis, granted some financial aid, and arranged for some added laymen leadership. The church building was refurbished, new windows installed, carpets laid, and new pews procured. The board is happy to report new life and vigor in that meeting today.

SHARE CALLS. There were three Share Calls for church building construction: one for Agnew, one for Tigard, and the third for Eugene. It is of interest to note that 19 Share Calls have been given since the inception of the program in 1958, an average of two per year, aggregating approximately \$56,200 in receipts.

YOUTH AMBASSADORS. The youth ambassador program was continued under the able administration of Jack L. Willcuts and Ronald Stansell. Our ambassadors this year are: Celesta Johnston to Agnew; John Baker to Tacoma First Friends; Howard Macy to Portland First Friends; Charlene Campbell to Ontario, and Anita Phillips to Medford and Fir Point.

CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS CAMPUS CONFERENCE. This board's part in the Christian Vocations Campus Conference of George Fox College was the scheduling of two addresses before the entire student body by two young, successful pastors, Orville Winters and Donald Lamm, on the subject, "Why I Am in the Pastoral Work." The wives made appropriate remarks concerning the challenge of their role.

STATUS CHANGE OF MEETINGS. In one year's time, Agnew church in Washington took two organizational steps—first from outpost to preparative meeting and then to monthly meeting status. Hayden Lake became a monthly meeting on February 5.

OUTPOST PASTORS. Meetings have developed so rapidly that we now have only four outposts. They, with their pastors for the coming year, are: Emmett—Allen Cole; Ashland—Charles Mylander; Clackamas Park—Howard Harmon, and Timber—Edward Baker.

NEWPORT PROPERTY SOLD. This board and the Highland Avenue Monthly Meeting were agreed that continued retention of the Newport



property was unfeasible. A sanctuary had never been built. Services were conducted in a remodeled private dwelling on property to which the Highland Church held title. The property was sold to a private individual, and the proceeds less the amount of a loan made by Highland were transmitted to this board's account, the amount being nearly \$13,000.

**BETHANY CHURCH SALE.** The Yearly Meeting Trustees executed a sale of the Bethany Church building in Seattle to The Prince of Peace Baptist Church. Net proceeds from the sale, amounting to \$10,677, have been credited to this board's capital fund account.

In accord with approval given the board by the Yearly Meeting last year, we have created a reserve capital fund dedicated to construction costs by new churches.

**EVANGELICAL FRIENDS ALLIANCE AND OMAHA.** Pursuant to yearly meeting authorization, we have paid out \$1,500 to the Evangelical Friends Alliance Commission on Evangelism and Church Extension to be applied on acquirement of property in Omaha, Nebraska, for church purposes.

**QUARTERLY MEETING STUDY.** One of this board's projects, for which many hours of time were given by a special committee, was the study of the quarterly meeting structure as directed by the Yearly Meeting.

**CHANGE OF TIME FOR THE PASTORAL YEAR.** Growing out of the concern by one of our pastoral members and following a poll taken of the pastors, a resolution has been drawn up to recommend a change of our pastoral year to begin July 1 and end June 30. This is in the hands of the Yearly Meeting.

**FRIENDS CHURCH EXTENSION FOUNDATION.** The Friends Church Extension Foundation, incorporated to procure money to lend for Friends church construction, currently has loans to Hillsboro, Ashland, Pringle, Hayden Lake, Rose Valley, Meridian, Holly Park, Eugene, Parkrose, Agnew, Nehalem Bay, and Tacoma, totaling, as of June 30, \$98,563.93. All churches are amortizing these loans on monthly payments including interest and principal. In addition, the Foundation has guaranteed loans granted by commercial lending institutions to Whitney, Silverton, and Tigard totaling, as of June 30, \$88,870.19. The balance sheet will appear in the printed minutes. The Foundation is now devising a Certificate Plan and an Investment for College Education Plan to procure more funds for church loans.

**KENT.** What of the future? To our board it is the fast-growing Kent district near Seattle. Three years ago, three and a half acres across the road from a new school were acquired by us through a sales contract, with monthly payments being met jointly by Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting and this board. This was done in anticipation of population movement to this area. We believe that the hour has come to act. Therefore, under board sponsorship, Roger Smith and family have moved into Meridian Junior High School District, where his children will attend this school just across the road from our property and where he will participate in the Parent Teachers Association and community life of the district.

It is our expectation that he will be the catalyst for Friends residency in that general vicinity. He will erect a sign and prepare the site. He will institute cottage Bible study groups, and promote this program through the Northwest Supplement of the EVANGELICAL FRIEND and through occasional personal visits to our churches. All of this is in the hope that a sanctuary can be erected in the summer of 1968. It is for this purpose that our board is holding the capital fund in reserve. It would be our intention, also, to give this work special emphasis on yearly meeting Sunday a year hence.

Our board is well aware that Satan will do all within his power to frustrate this attempt to win souls and build a church at Kent, Washington. Therefore, Roger Smith and all of us request your prayers for the success of this venture, which we keenly feel is in accord with God's will.

Approved with appreciation.

## BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

- 46. Virginia Helm, on behalf of the board, presented the following report: Department of Public Morals

Reports were received from 46 local churches or 74 per cent of all meetings. Presentations of films, object lessons, talks, sermons, and sermons with references to moral action problems doubled over last year with 99 sermons reported among the 311 moral action presentations. There were nine quarterly meeting presentations. Tract distribution did not seem so important, for only 3,000 were given out, about 33 per cent less than in 1966. However, 1,280 total abstinence pledges were distributed, nearly twice as many as before.

Commitment Day and Youth Temperance Education Week observances were presented, 38 in all, and some meetings observed both, with speakers, films, object lessons, poster displays and tract distribution. Some meetings used the Handbook and followed suggestions for cooperation with the Program of Advance.

The Poster and Essay Contests were well received and participation has made competition keen. There were 124 posters displayed, but not all of these were made for the contest; 66 entries were reported in the essay contests but only winners were sent to the quarterly and yearly meeting contests. While the yearly meeting first and second place winners will be announced this week, some of the posters and essays have been entered in the State WCTU contests and have won. In spite of excellent competition and fair judging, Oregon Friends posters won all eight of the State WCTU awards and four of the essays won also.

Forty-one meetings reported special interest in and letters written about legislation, as Idaho members urged the governor to veto undesirable bills, after first writing their legislators; Washington residents wrote letters and signed petitions regarding liquor sales on Sunday; Oregonians expressed their concern against liquor in Newberg, a state lottery, and other matters of moral concern before the state legislature. Questionnaires had been sent to all the Oregon legislators and many other officials, asking for their opinion on moral issues. Results of these polls were shared with members in the various areas before election. A mailing about liquor on airlines was sent to quarterly meeting chairmen and many responded. Thirty-two meetings reported special announcements about these issues, and 23 had gotten election material before their membership.

Churches of the Yearly Meeting are continuing in their concern for Christian attitudes toward sex education, and there were tapes purchased and used, panel and Friends Youth discussions, talks, sermons, counseling, books and pamphlets circulated. Obscene literature was turned over to post office authorities.

Other activities reported include regular temperance Sundays, monthly gifts for alcohol and narcotic education in the schools, cooperation with temperance organizations, reading and promotion of temperance publications and talks by law enforcement officers and businessmen. Several churches sponsor temperance clubs for youth.

The Board of Moral Action has sent out at least three mailings of sample material or about special concerns, has sent to officials copies of



the 1966 Moral Action Resolution, mailed Handbooks, planning calendars and local report sheets, and has purchased two new filmstrips with record, "Let Habit Help You" and "For Your Health's Sake."

#### Department of Literature.

Today when the Christian's values of right and wrong are being challenged and the pull is strong to relax our moral standards, we must find ways to concentrate on that which is true, honest, pure and of good report. Reading for information, inspiration, spiritual enrichment and enjoyment is one valuable means of maintaining a true sense of Christian values.

Realizing the importance of providing Christian reading material, 46 churches have libraries containing a total of 11,300 books, periodicals and tracts. Forty-one libraries added 822 new books last year, acquiring them through the church budgets, library banquets, or gifts. What are the more than 20 other churches in Oregon Yearly Meeting doing to provide current Christian literature for their people?

Thirty-six churches have made special efforts to encourage their people to read and to acquaint them with the material available in their libraries by means of posters, bulletin boards, book reports, church publications and book displays. One church has "book glimpses" in the Sunday evening service. Another displays missionary books on missionary Sunday.

Recent decisions by the courts make action against obscene literature difficult, but 15 churches have taken positive action. Besides expressing objections to those handling undesirable publications and writing to legislators, they are teaching their young people the harmful effects of "this filth" and how to evaluate materials for reading.

The 25 churches who encouraged Bible reading are to be commended. Believing that God's Word gives the most reliable foundation for establishing Christian principles, the Board of Moral Action would like to emphasize systematic Bible reading and Bible memorization during the coming year. The many new versions of the Bible in modern English make the Bible more readily understandable to our children, young people and newer converts. Recommended versions:

The Revised Standard Version, available from many publishing houses in various sizes and bindings.

The New Testament in Modern Speech, by Weymouth.

The New Testament in Modern English, by J. B. Phillips, (Transl.)

The New English Bible: New Testament, translated by British scholars. (Has occasional British usages that puzzle Americans, but it is a fine, idiomatic version.)

GOOD NEWS for Modern Man: The New Testament in Today's English Version. (Published by American Bible Society, 1966. Has clever line drawings throughout, which help illustrate the Biblical truths in a way fascinating to children, youth and adults. It can be had in paperback at a very reasonable price—almost a giveaway.)

The Paraphrased Bible, by Kenneth N. Taylor. (Published in parts as Living Letters, The Paraphrased Epistles.)

A pageant tracing the history of the temperance movement in the United States was presented.

● 47. The minute of service for Dean and Kathleen Gregory prepared by the Committee for Returning Minutes was read.

Approved.

● 48. The following report of the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations was presented by Arthur O. Roberts:

The Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations met twice last year, emphasizing these issues of interyearly meeting relationships: counsel to Oregon's members of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, consideration of fraternal delegates to other yearly meetings, and attendance at the Fourth Friends World Conference.

The Alliance will make its own report.

So far no plan for fraternal delegates has been effected.

Much thought and prayer was given to the World Conference. Although others had hoped to attend, only three actually participated in the Fourth Friends World Conference, held July 24-August 3, on the campus of Guilford College, Greensboro, North Carolina. Attenders were Jack L. Willcuts, Milo C. Ross and Arthur O. Roberts.

These men report a profitable experience in confrontation with 900 Friends from around the world. A diversity of belief and practice obtains. Nevertheless, a strong evangelical witness was given at this conference, and there is reason to feel that spiritual renewal is taking place among Friends wherever Jesus Christ is exalted and the Gospel effectively proclaimed.

Upon request, the three attenders reported on the World Conference to the Executive Council of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

We are grateful to Newberg Friends Church and Portland First Friends for financial assistance which made air travel possible.

● 51. The minutes of the last business session were read and approved as corrected.

● 52. The Superintendent, Jack L. Willcuts, was named as the representative of Oregon Yearly Meeting to the committee to consider the adoption of uniform terminology in naming and defining boards and responsibilities of members of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. (See minute 44.)

Approved.

● 53. The following was read:

The Board of Evangelism has given attention to the assignment given it by the Yearly Meeting last year to "evaluate the effectiveness of the present program of quarterly meetings and explore possible ways of improving the effectiveness in terms of today's needs." Serious consideration was given to this assignment. A special committee spent the equivalent of an entire day on the study, and the full board spent many hours.

Out of this study has evolved a proposal, the gist of which is contained in the mimeographed sheet titled, "Quarterly Meeting Reorganization Plan," which was given general distribution last evening. We now present it for Yearly Meeting action.



In order for this proposed plan to be understood better, we wish permission for it to be explained and questions answered by the members of the study committee present today—Oscar Brown and Earl Barker.

It is the consideration of the board that if the Yearly Meeting should approve the proposal it be referred to the Discipline Revision Committee to prepare a draft in Discipline style and format to be considered in Yearly Meeting sessions a year hence.

#### Quarterly Meeting Reorganization Plan

The Yearly Meeting in session in August 1966 honored a request from Portland Quarterly Meeting (see minutes 16 and 49) "that a committee at the Yearly Meeting level evaluate the effectiveness of the present program of quarterly meetings in their relationship to Oregon Yearly Meeting and explore possible ways of improving this effectiveness in terms of today's needs." On the recommendation of the representatives this problem was referred to the Board of Evangelism. A committee appointed by that board formulated a plan and submitted it at the midyear meeting.

This plan, as finally approved, would involve a number of important changes in the structure and procedures of the quarterly meeting. These are outlined herewith:

Instead of four quarterly sessions per year there would be three sessions, with the dates of all set up in each of three two-month periods on a no-conflict basis by the Board of Evangelism.

Since the term "quarterly" would no longer be appropriate, the groups of monthly meetings would be called "areas" instead of "quarterly meetings," and the sessions would be called "area conferences."

Yearly Meeting funds would be sent by the monthly meetings direct to the Yearly Meeting treasurer; the monthly meetings would appoint their own representatives to Yearly Meeting. Instead of having quarterly meeting committees, each area would appoint a member to each Yearly Meeting board. These would be called secretaries (secretary of evangelism, secretary of Christian education, etc.), with each one especially responsible for promoting the program of his board in the monthly meetings.

The secretary of finance would serve as treasurer of the area. The secretary of evangelism would retain the title of area superintendent, with the same duties now assigned to him, including the planning and supervising of the conferences.

There would be but one business meeting per year, in connection with the conference preceding Yearly Meeting. It would serve for the appointment of the secretaries as members of the several boards and a recording secretary, the hearing of a financial report and adoption of the annual budget. Secretaries would be nominated by a committee of which one member would be appointed by each monthly meeting. The superintendent would convene and instruct the committee and preside over the business session, with the recording secretary taking the minutes. The annual reports would be sent to the proper Yearly Meeting authorities as they are now, and be omitted in the area conference. It would still be in order for the monthly meetings to present matters of concern to be forwarded to the Yearly Meeting for consideration.

Yearly Meeting officials would be encouraged to plan church-wide projects in cooperation with the area superintendents and other secretaries, and to coordinate them with the scheduled conferences.

All procedures related to the approving and establishing of new monthly meetings would be carried on by the Board of Evangelism.

Due to lack of time this matter was deferred till tomorrow morning.

## BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

- 54. Kenneth Williams, president, presented the following report:

**STATISTICAL REPORT.** In a period when young people are searching for satisfaction in life but are searching in vain, Oregon Yearly Meeting is privileged to have as a part of its stewardship almost 1,200 youth of high school and junior high age. Seven hundred junior high young people and almost 500 high school youth are attending our churches and Sunday schools. One-fourth of the reported high school students have indicated they plan to attend George Fox College. In this current environment in which our youth are maturing, our responsibility is greater than ever before to help our youth commit their lives without reservation to Jesus Christ. Christian homes in which parents are concerned about the rearing in the home, the environment and teaching in the school, and the nurture of the church are the hope of our society.

There are an additional 200 students in the Yearly Meeting working toward baccalaureate degrees in college. One-half of these are studying at George Fox College. Thirty-two students are in schools for special training of various kinds. Another 56 of our members are working toward advance degrees. Thirty-seven youth are in preparation for full-time Christian service in some area of special ministry in relation to the church.

A number of churches are helping to provide Christian educational advantages by providing scholarships to George Fox College. Churches in two quarterly meetings contribute to their quarterly meeting scholarship funds. George Fox College has been presented 122 times in the churches. Greenleaf Friends Academy has been presented 38 times, particularly in churches in the Idaho area. One category that should be included in our questionnaire concerns our support of Western Evangelical Seminary.

**EDUCATION INSTITUTES.** The major emphasis of the board this year has been the presentation of the need for parents to realize the value and necessity of a solid philosophy of Christian education if their children are to be reared properly. This concern was presented through a number of Education Institutes held in various areas of the Yearly Meeting. Successful institutes were held in Puget Sound, Boise, and Greenleaf Quarterly Meetings. Medford, Talent, and Ashland area churches combined in an institute and the churches of the Portland area joined to sponsor an institute in their area. Springbrook, Silverton, and Eugene sponsored institutes in their local meetings. Personnel from the college, including faculty, administration and students were used in the presentations. Admission to the college, financing college education, and the opportunities of investing in the college were presented. Also, the work of the Board of General Education assumed the responsibility of paying transportation, publicity, and other incidental costs of the institutes. The sum of \$435 was spent in this work. Approximately 30 churches were reached with the message of the vital need for Christian parents to develop a truly Christian philosophy of education for their children. College administration and faculty expressed appreciation for the good work which was accomplished in the meetings, and members and pastors of churches serviced have expressed keen appreciation for the work of the students and faculty of the college in helping their people become aware of the value of Christian education and of George Fox College in particular.

**SAVINGS INVESTMENT PROGRAM.** An investment program for the education of youth was proposed by our board at last Yearly Meeting. This plan has been under consideration for the entire year and has been



approved by the College Board, by the Church Extension Foundation, and by the Board of General Education. The aim of the plan is to encourage parents and young people, particularly children, to begin investing funds when the children are small so they will have the necessary money to be able to attend a college such as George Fox. By investing their earnings and savings in the Church Extension Foundation to be saved for attendance at George Fox College, they will be assured of the kind of education Christian youth should receive.

In this investment program a child, parent, or relative will invest any amount of money in the Church Extension Foundation to be used for college expenses. This money is used in building churches while being held in trust for the prospective student by the Foundation. When he is ready for college the money will be paid to the college for his educational expenses.

A concern has been expressed that parents might develop the idea that because they are investing for a student's future education they are fulfilling their obligation to the college. Therefore, it is absolutely essential that such investments be beyond what individuals give to the work of the college in their regular plan of giving. The plan will be ready to put into operation as soon as a few legal technicalities are cared for.

**MINISTERIAL STUDENT FINANCIAL AID.** The board, working in conjunction with the Board of Evangelism, is administering a scholarship program for young people who are seriously preparing for pastoral or missionary service. The Yearly Meeting has allocated \$3,000 for this financial program. A joint committee from the two boards has prepared the policy statements and set the plan in operation. There will be students at George Fox College and Western Evangelical Seminary receiving financial support through this program during the coming academic year. Juniors and/or seniors at George Fox College and students in Western Evangelical Seminary or at the other two yearly meeting-approved seminaries may receive the funds. The fund is being administered as a condition grant, which means that students receiving funds agree that if they do not minister in Oregon Yearly Meeting for a prescribed time, they shall pay back the amount of money received on an established descending scale. This scale is based on the amount of time the minister serves in the Yearly Meeting after graduation from seminary. It is the hope of the two boards that this program will be used of the Lord to help students to be able to complete ministerial training in such a manner that they will become tremendously effective in their work in the kingdom of God.

**CHRISTIAN TEACHERS.** The board is sponsoring a breakfast for all teachers in the Yearly Meeting on Saturday morning. This is an effort to unite teachers in Christian fellowship and help them realize what a strategic role they play in the lives of students in their classes. Another purpose is to make teachers aware of the tremendous educational institution George Fox College has become. Public school counselors recognize that teachers play an important role in students' decisions as to what college they will attend. We desire every teacher to be sold on George Fox College so that he will be a real booster for the college in his school. A Christian teacher can be a great source of encouragement to Christian students in public schools. We hope to help our teachers become inspired to make their Christian stand known and respected in their schools.

**PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY.** In the coming year the board hopes to continue support of formal Christian training in a very realistic manner. If churches which were not reached by Education Institutes desire, additional institutes may be planned. The great need for increased faculty salaries is being considered as a project for the board also. The

chief emphasis of the board for the coming year shall be in the area of encouraging parents to give the rearing and education of their children major consideration. In the face of growing disrespect for authority and law in our land, in the tragic lowering of moral standards in society, and in the tremendous temptations which beset our youth in their environment, our board feels that parents must be made aware of the fact that it is possible to rear our children for Christ. The board is preparing materials to aid young parents in helping their children develop into committed Christians, for we believe that the days ahead will call for youth to be out and out for their Lord. Careful attention to the early rearing of the children, consistent attention to the philosophy and practices in the schools they attend, and prayerful concern for the spiritual nurturing of children in our churches is necessary if our youth are to be reared well for the days which lie before them.

Approved.

Milo C. Ross, president of George Fox College, presented his printed annual report, emphasizing certain points therein. (A copy of this report may be secured from the college.) Frank L. Cole, dean of administration, reported on the financial situation of the college. George H. Moore, dean of faculty, discussed the requirements of Christian professors and emphasized the need for higher salaries. He challenged the Yearly Meeting to support the college with the purpose of increased excellence in our program of higher education.

The Anthems Quartet—Ted Stucky, Mauri Macy, Bill Adams and Gary Albers—sang two numbers.

Milo Ross highlighted a mimeographed sheet reporting financial gifts to the college from meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting and from other yearly meetings. He reported that the Hill Foundation had expressed pleasure and satisfaction with the operation of the Associated Christian Colleges of Oregon, which he feels indicates continued support. Credit is due Lansing Bulgin, provost, for his leadership. The accreditation of the college has been extended to six years without further review. David LeShana will soon take his new position as vice-president, and acting president while Milo Ross takes a year off for travel and study.

● 55. Dr. Paul P. Petticord, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, spoke on behalf of the seminary. A college degree no longer terminates ministerial training. Today's pressures require seminary preparation, and the trend is to require attaining the doctoral level. For the past twenty years, WES has been committed to a position of Christian faith, both theologically and experientially. Men should go out from this institution to put legs under what they have learned. They must learn how to put their faith to work. Support of and cooperation with the seminary by Oregon Yearly Meeting is appreciated.

● 56. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday at 9:15 a. m.

● 59. The proposed plan for quarterly meeting reorganization prepared by the Board of Evangelism was reintroduced. After considerable discussion it was suggested that this proposal be referred to the Discipline Revision Committee to prepare a working plan, spelling out the details of the proposal, sending copies to all monthly meetings for study, and bring-



ing it back in final form for first reading at Yearly Meeting next year. (See minute 53.)

Approved.

- 60. The resignation of Gerald W. Dillon from the Board of Trustees of Western Evangelical Seminary because he has become a member of the staff was read.

Accepted and sent to the Executive Council.

- 61. The resignation of Frank L. Cole from the Board of Missions was read.

Accepted and sent to the representatives.

## BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

- 62. Marie Haines presented the following report of the President, Willard Kennon and emphasized certain points, especially the new essay project:

There were 48 meetings which sent annual reports from which we have compiled the following points of stewardship emphasis:

29 meetings reported observance of a special Stewardship Month emphasis.

13 meetings reported a total of 43 entries in the junior division of the Stewardship Poster Contest, 13 entries from junior high, and 10 in the adult division.

A total of 143 stewardship presentations of varying nature were reported; 16 meetings reported no stewardship presentation.

The methods for presenting this vital message included the minister's sermons most frequently and with greatest effectiveness. One church reported a panel discussion by outstanding individuals from other denominations on tithing, moderated by the president of the Board of Stewardship. Stewardship Seminars conducted by Willard Kennon, film strips, Sunday school lessons, personal testimony ranked high in effectiveness. One meeting reported an analysis of the total income of the church families and calculated the projected tithe, resulting in a self-measuring guide of compliance. Testimony of one who had tithed for over 50 years, outlining the needs of the local church and appeal to meet unpaid bills, the presentation of the Yearly Meeting proposed budget—all of these methods combined to present the many-faceted dimensions of stewardship.

Stewardship of the Family was the major emphasis of the poster contest; therefore, in reply to the question, "Was there a special emphasis in your meeting to promote the urgency of the family altar?" sixteen meetings reported a special emphasis by means of sermons, Sunday school lessons, and challenging services in several meetings with Ralph and Carol Arensmeier. A special session was conducted by Ralph and Carol in connection with the Stewardship Seminar in the Sherwood and Maplewood meetings.

The 48 reporting meetings accounted for 648 tithing families plus an additional number of individuals, which number is not known. Sixteen meetings reported a total of 36 new converts to the generally accepted concept of tithing. Parkrose Meeting reported the highest number of six who have entered into this new and wonderful experience. The motivating factors involved include an order of frequency as follows: Sermons, testimony of personal experience and blessing, conversion of individuals and heads of family, observation of lives of mature Christians, steward-

ship seminars, teaching of the love of God and His personal interest and providence in human affairs.

Thirty-two meetings reported a relaxed freedom in talking about and teaching the Biblical concept of tithing. Three reported inability to talk freely on the matter. Sixteen meetings reported missionary conferences with a total of \$19,506 in faith promises. The president of the Board held four stewardship seminars, resulting in a total of approximately \$28,000 being pledged by two meetings in their building and expansion programs. Two meetings concentrated their pledging to the support of the local budget. Six churches were visited by invitation to present the stewardship message.

This concludes the president's report.

Marie Haines announced the following poster contest winners:

Junior division, first prize, Kathy Hawkins, Chehalem Center; second prize, David Witt, Star. Junior high first prize, Roger Sargent, Parkrose; second prize, Bonnie Hawkins, Chehalem Center; honorable mention, Gary Voss, Entiat. High school first prize, (no name), Caldwell; second prize, Theresa Morse, Hayden Lake. Adult division, first prize, Jan Wilkins, Greenleaf; second prize, Lillian Harris, Greenleaf.

Ira Craven, incoming president, listed the audiovisual resources provided by the board and urged monthly meetings to take advantage of them. He announced a variety of emphases to be made this year—stewardship of talent, time, soil, and money.

Quincy Fodge witnessed to spiritual growth following a complete commitment to God's will in the matter of stewardship.

Kelsey Hinshaw shared a concern regarding the distribution of our energies. There should be more emphasis on the stewardship of all of life. If our young people are trained to know what faith, prayer and commitment are, there would be no worry about missions, Christian Education and other aspects of our work.

Approved.

## BOARD OF MISSIONS

- 63. The following report of the Board of Missions was presented Thursday evening by Charles Ball, president:

This has been an active year for the Board of Missions with good cooperation of all members. In addition to the scheduled meetings at Yearly Meeting and midyear, a retreat was held at Pendleton, Oregon, November 16-18, to study, to pray, and to program the work of the board. One called meeting was held in Newberg, June 8. The Administrative Committee held seven meetings during the year. The board has completed a revision of the Mission Manual, adopting a new policy of an initial appointment for seven years of service consisting of three years in language study and field work, a year's furlough and another three years on the field. Subsequent terms will normally be three years to conserve our missionaries' health.

A summary of the reports from 53 missionary committees of the Yearly Meeting is as follows:

### Bolivia

Three missionary families in Bolivia are giving fine service: Marshal and Catherine Cavit in LaPaz teaching in the Bible Institute and Seminary with Catherine also serving as mission treasurer; Gene and Betty Comfort located in Caranavi helping in the outreach in the new colonization areas of Caranavi and Alto Beni; and David and Florence Thomas in LaPaz, working with the Mesa Directiva, in conferences, quarterly meetings and responsible for most of the business in LaPaz. The missionaries report good health and lessened pressures due to the increased accord between the missionaries and the National Church.

The February meeting of representatives reported a membership of over 5,000 at 101 preaching points. The National Church sponsors 21 grade schools with an enrollment of nearly 700. The financial income of the National Church has increased tenfold in ten years. The National Church leadership has been carrying on their work in a very commendable way. The church at Collucachi, which experienced the violent destruction of their chapel last year and was suffering much persecution, has held steady and has seen the conversion of many of their enemies. A new church has been dedicated and they now have an attendance of about one hundred.

The representatives have voted to seek a peaceful settlement of the disputed tabernacle property and to seek a new location. The board agreed with this decision and has allocated \$2,085 from the Farm Fund to assist in the move to a new location on the altiplano.

### Peru

In Peru two families, the Clarksons and the Maurers, have been responsible for the mission, both living in Juli. Everett and Alda Clarkson have completed their second term and wish to retire from the work at least for a few years so their children can have the advantage of school in the U.S. The Maurers reached the field in September after eight months in language study in Costa Rica.

The national church is progressing nicely under the leadership of these families. There are now two areas with a total of 22 places where meetings are regularly held. The attendance is estimated at over 500. The national church is currently benefiting from the Evangelism-in-Depth Crusade for Peru.

Quentin and Florene Nordyke arrived in Juli for a second term on July 19 after nineteen months at home. At the conclusion of Paul and Martha Puckett's furlough, they and the Board of Missions concluded they would not return to missionary work at this time. We appreciate their deputation in the Yearly Meeting in which we experimented with the use of regional conferences. We were also glad that they could attend the Missionary Furlough Institute in Farmington, Michigan, in April and May. They are now making their home in Spokane where they are near Paul's mother who has been in poor health in recent months.

### Sprague River

Evert and Virena Tuning have completed 20 years of faithful service at Sprague River and are retiring from this work August 31. We appreciate their dedication to a difficult task and pray God's blessings to continue upon them as they move to Klamath Falls.

For the coming year James Rahenkamp with his wife, Heidi, will be assuming the pastorate at Sprague River. They are graduates of Cleveland Bible College and have served in North Carolina Yearly Meeting. Also the Board of Missions has felt that with the retirement of the

Tunings, the board would not attempt further salary support, but have budgeted \$1,200 next year to be sent to the church at Sprague River to assist in the work. James Rahenkamp will supplement any income from the church by teaching in a public school during the year.

### Korean Church

The Korean work seems to be progressing under the direction of Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim and his associates. Their average Sunday morning attendance for the year has been 50. They are ministering to Korean sailors as well as to nationals now resident in Portland.

### Literature

Ralph Chapman has worked faithfully in the production and mailing of literature to our fields in Bolivia and Peru. Some literature has been produced jointly with California Yearly Meeting for both Central and South America. We deem this literature service to be a valuable ministry for our missionary program.

### Mexico

The departure of Roscoe and Tina Knight for Mexico City has been delayed almost a year while support has been building up for this joint venture under the Missions Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. With our board acting as the sending agency, we felt we could not allow the Knights to go to Mexico until all EFA members supported the program in fact as well as in sentiment. This support now seems to be materializing, with Ohio pledging \$200 a month and Kansas gaining in interest. The Knights have been in deputation for the Evangelical Friends Mexican Mission since June 1, and now plan to leave for Mexico City August 28. The income for the work up to July 15, 1967, has been as follows:

Special recognition must be given to Caldwell Friends for their generous faith pledge to assist our Yearly Meeting in meeting our share of this budget.

### Appointments

In view of the fact that Marshal and Catherine Cavit will be retiring from our work in February 1968, the board has appointed Ronald and Carolyn Stansell for a term of service in Bolivia. They will leave Portland Airport August 25 for Costa Rica, where they will begin language study August 28. The board is thankful to our heavenly Father for laying the concern for missions on the hearts of this fine couple and for their willingness to be available for service under our board.

### Field Visit

In March, Jack and Geraldine Willcuts and board president, Charles Ball, visited the fields. This was deemed advisable from the standpoint of the board after several suggestions of a visit to the field from the missionaries. The staff feels that in this manner the board can better understand their problems and their progress, and the board feels that it can better administer the program with firsthand knowledge of the fields.

### Finances

We are grateful for the generous support of missions by Oregon Yearly Meeting. The board began the year with the general fund overdrawn \$274.19 and the travel fund overdrawn \$2,728.29. The balances in the calendar fund, literature fund, and foreign designated funds were suf-



ficient to offset these deficits and to have a cash balance of \$9,759.57. A full report of receipts and disbursements is found in the yearly meeting treasurer's report. A summary of the financial operation for the year is as follows:

An explanation of the excess of expenditures to receipts of approximately \$6,000 is as follows: Some expenditures, mostly of an emergency nature, were not budgeted and other budget items were not fully supported. These include the visitation to the field, \$2,410.96; the expense of Clarksons' return a year earlier than anticipated due to their electing a three-year term, \$1,410.08; payment and shipment of three new generators which will be largely or completely underwritten by the Women's Missionary Union and others, \$1,381.09; missionary improvement for Nordykes, Pucketts and Stansells, \$909.80; purchase of the new Land-rover for Peru, which is a current project of the Quaker Men; and, a remittance of \$2,085 to enable the Bolivian National Church to purchase 10,000 square meters of land for the relocation of the tabernacle (approximately half of this amount came from the General Fund, which will be credited as Farm Fund replacement). These and other smaller items exceed \$6,000. We assure you that a very serious attempt will be made to operate within the budget for the coming year.

The board is very appreciative of the support of the Quaker Men to the extent of \$1,588.82 for the Landrover in the 1966-67 income, and for the generous gifts of over \$3,800 by the Women's Missionary Union for underwriting several budget items. In addition, the WMU assisted in the outfitting of the Nordykes and in personal gifts and cash to help the Pucketts in the replacement of their goods lost in shipment homeward.

In conclusion, we thank God for the faithful and effective service of our missionaries, the interest, prayers and generous support of our constituency, and the blessing of God upon our united efforts to advance His kingdom in outreach and evangelism.

Upon authorization by the Executive Council, the Trustees have executed the following transactions—

A note and mortgage in favor of The First National Bank of Oregon in the amount of \$45,000 on the building and land of the Newberg Friends Meeting.

A note and mortgage in favor of the Eugene Federal Savings and Loan Association in the amount of \$35,000 on property of the Eugene Friends Church.

A warranty deed for the Bethany Church property in Seattle to the Bethany Prince of Peace Baptist Church.

We also submit the following information—

Balance as of July 10, 1967, on the Stowell contract for the purchase of the former Quaker Apartments building in Portland—\$17,785.43.

Balance of mortgage held by the U. S. National Bank of Oregon on headquarters building—\$15,455.66. Balance on other notes for headquarters building—\$8,449.65.

The headquarters building and contents, Barclay Press equipment and supplies, and the Newberg Friends Church building and contents have been insured by P. I. P. policy No. 35-01-13467, issued by the Church Mutual Insurance Company.

Approved.

● 73. The Executive Council presented the following report:

The Executive Council has endeavored to fulfill the obligation assigned to it both by special direction and as outlined in the Discipline. Items of interest to the Yearly Meeting would be:

1. Authorizing the Board of Christian Education to set up a workshop for better dispensing of information. Other boards were given the privilege of doing likewise.

2. Your Council gave proper release to our superintendent to make the trip to Bolivia and Peru in March and April.

3. We authorized the Trustees to sign certain documents to sell the Bethany Church property in Seattle to the Prince of Peace Baptist Church in Seattle.

4. Further authorization was given the Trustees to make application to the State Rating Bureau for approval of a plan for insuring the church

building and headquarters building under the P. I. P. plan, to name an Agent of Record, and to take any necessary steps jointly with the trustees of Newberg Monthly Meeting to put the plan into operation. The selection of a person to be Agent of Record was delegated to the Yearly Meeting and local church trustees.

5. The Executive Council, at midyear, gave the approval to the Board of Publication to borrow \$2,500 to be used as a capital fund for the publication of a history of Oregon Yearly Meeting, currently being written by Ralph Beebe of Eugene, Oregon.

6. The 75th Anniversary Committee was appointed, as authorized by the Yearly Meeting, and they are actively engaged in making necessary plans for the 75th anniversary observation at our 1968 Yearly Meeting sessions.

7. Study is being made by the Board of Publication to establish proper guidelines for the printing of a new Discipline sometime in the future.

8. Since the Yearly Meeting has no provision for the appointing of fraternal delegates to other yearly meetings, we went on record encouraging Friends to visit California Yearly Meeting for the purpose of fostering greater mutual understanding and fellowship. This suggestion came from the committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations.

9. The Council carried out their responsibility as stated in minute 13, 1966 Oregon Yearly Meeting Minutes by securing the services of Beatrice Goldsmith as Business Secretary.

10. As directed by Oregon Yearly Meeting (minute 104, 1966), the Executive Council appointed a committee of Myron Goldsmith and John C. Brougner to study the situation of an historian. The recommendation made at the midyear meeting was to the effect that the need could be better served by an archivist rather than an historian. The proper person and place were discussed. The Council accepted the report of the committee and authorized its continuation with the addition of Genevieve Cole. The committee was instructed to appoint an archivist, not necessarily from outside the committee membership.

11. Letters of service were issued to Jack L. Willcuts and Charles S. Ball for their trip to Bolivia and Peru last March and April.

12. The Council authorized the signing of an agreement to participate in the Ohio-Oregon Pension Plan.

13. The Council approved a recommendation from the Board of Evangelism authorizing the Trustees to execute a loan not to exceed \$60,000 for the new building of the Maplewood church.

14. A similar authorization was granted to the Trustees for the sale of the Northeast Tacoma property and further financial help to Eugene Friends Church. Details will no doubt be presented in the Board of Evangelism report.

Other items of routine nature or items which will not be presented in other reports or as matters of business were cared for to the best of our ability and for the best interest of the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

● 74. The revised recommendations of the Committee to Review Procedure for Recording of Ministers was reintroduced. The following recommendation was approved:

A committee to nominate the chairman and six members-at-large shall be appointed as follows:

a. The chairman of this nominating committee shall be the clerk of the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight.

b. The superintendent of the Yearly Meeting shall be a member of the committee.

c. Three members of the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight at



large shall be chosen annually by the Ministry and Oversight at Yearly Meeting.

- d. The term of office of this nominating committee shall be for one year. It shall be chosen each year.

After much discussion, the recommendations were approved in principle. It was suggested that the matter be referred to the Executive Council and the Discipline Revision Committee for redrafting, taking into consideration the suggestions made in the discussion. (See minute 67.)

Approved.

- 75. The representatives recommended the name of George Palmer on the Pension Committee for two years.

Approved.

- 76. The representatives recommended that the following be added to the Board of Evangelism for a three-year period: Charlotte Macy, Pheral Dodson.

Approved.

- 77. The representatives recommended the name of Floyd Watson as trustee for five years.

Approved.

- 78. The Board of Evangelism recommended that the Constitution and Discipline be amended as follows: Part IV, paragraph 2, subparagraph e, amend to read: e. Pastors: July 1 to June 30. (See minutes 20, 41.)

Approved. (This constitutes the first reading.)

It was suggested that the Discipline and Revision Committee send copies of this proposed change with explanation to the monthly meetings for their consideration.

- 79. The Meeting on Ministry and Oversight recommended that Marion Clarkson be recorded a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

Approved.

- 80. The meeting on Ministry and Oversight recommended that the Committee on Ministry be granted \$50 for office expense for the coming year.

Approved, with the suggestion that the matter be referred to the Board of Finance.

- 81. The Board of Evangelism nominated Clynton Crisman to serve another three-year term on the board of directors of the Friends Church Extension Foundation.

Approved.

- 82. The Friends Church Extension Foundation nominated Warren Moor to serve another three-year term as a director of the Foundation.

Approved.

- 83. The representatives recommended to the Board of Peace and Service the following: For three-year terms—Roland Hartley, Walter Lee; for a one-year term—Stanley Perisho.

Approved.

- 84. The representatives recommended to the Board of Finance the following: For a three-year term—Floyd Watson; for a one-year term—Clyde Miller.

Approved.

- 85. The representatives recommended to the Board of Moral Action the following for three-year terms: Margaret Lemmons, Paul Baker.

Approved.

- 86. The representatives recommended the following for the auditing committee: Alfred Neal, Wayne Antrim, Floyd Watson.

Approved.

- 87. The representatives recommended the following to the Board of

Stewardship for three-year terms: Paul Puckett, Keith Baker.

Approved.

- 88. The representatives recommended the name of Beatrice Goldsmith as treasurer.

Approved.

- 89. The representatives recommended to the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations the following: Paul Mills for three years; Gerald Dillon for one year.

Approved.

- 90. The following nominations to the Board of Trustees of George Fox College were read:

From the Alumni Association, for three-year terms—Homer Hester, Olive Shambaugh.

From the George Fox College Board, for three-year terms—Frank Colcord, Dean Gregory, J. Arnold Owen, M. Lowell Edwards, Verl Lindley, Donald McNichols.

- 91. Herman Macy opened the memorial hour reading 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18. He read the list of 31 members deceased during the year. (The list appears in the appendix.) Appreciation for the influence of many of these was expressed from the floor.

Accepted and sent to the representatives.

## BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- 97. The following report, presented Friday evening by Howard E. Harmon, president, was approved:

The Board of Christian Education is very thankful for every Sunday school teacher, Friends Youth sponsor, children's church worker, camp leader and all other interested individuals who have given hours of service in the Lord's work this past year.

The areas under the direction of the Board of Christian Education are many. A summary of the activities for this past year is as follows—

### SUNDAY SCHOOL, Dorothy Barratt, chairman—

A. Reach and Teach, a Christian education paper, has continued to be published for all of the Christian education workers of the Yearly Meeting. Every other issue is under the direction of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. The publication shares news and ideas in the field of Christian education. (EFA cooperation.)



B. The Evangelical Friends Alliance Christian Education Commission is sponsoring a five-week Sunday school crusade, September 10 - October 8. We would encourage every church to share in this first such cooperative effort. There are four divisions for competition, and points are based on numerical gain. (EFA cooperation.)

C. New achievement goals are in effect this church year. These goals are enlarged to include all areas of Christian education rather than just the Sunday school. (EFA cooperation.)

D. Sunday school attendance shows a decline of 72 this past year. The following Sunday schools showed an increase:

#### YOUTH COMMITTEE; Gene Hockett, chairman—

A. Ron Stansell is completing two years as field secretary and Jon Bishop as Friends Youth president. These two young men have given outstanding leadership to the youth program of the Yearly Meeting.

B. Three young people have served as youth ambassadors this year. Celesta Johnston spent three weeks at Agnew, Charlene Campbell is at Ontario, and John Baker at Tacoma First Friends for the summer.

C. The National Friends Youth leadership conference in Iowa was excellent. Thirty-four delegates from Oregon Yearly Meeting attended, plus five adults and the Anthems Quartet. Conference spirit was high, and we feel the goal of leadership training was well achieved. (EFA cooperation.)

D. Approximately 170 junior highers attended three jamborees in the spring. The locations were Twin Rocks, Greenleaf Academy, and Snow Bunny Lodge at Mt. Hood.

E. The young people have purchased a thirty-minute 16mm Spanish film to send to Bolivia. The sum of \$450 has also been raised to purchase a new projector.

#### CAMPING, Philip Harmon, chairman—

A. This past year has been full of vigorous activity for the camping program of Oregon Yearly Meeting, with nearly 2,300 campers participating. The real estate value of our yearly meeting camps now reaches over \$300,000.

B. Once again stamps for camp were used to help young people save towards camp fees.

C. Bible prayer markers were distributed, serving the dual role of date reminders and prayer reminders. Certainly the success of our camping program is to be attributed to the many people who have made camps a matter of prayer.

D. Eight people represented Oregon Yearly Meeting at the regional Christian Camp and Conference Association meeting at Monterey, California, last April.

E. The camping committee cooperated with George Fox College in the work-study program, with three young people working full time during the summer.

F. Two wrangler camps were held this year, one being held in Oregon's Three Sisters wilderness area and the other in Idaho's Stolley Meadows area.

G. Twenty trail pack sets were purchased to launch a new program of great interest. Local churches have been using the equipment with a low-cost rental fee to cover maintenance.

H. Due to the complex problems arising from legislation affecting our camping program and the fact that many of our camp grounds are inadequate for the camping demands of today, a long-range planning committee has been investigating possibilities for future developments.

#### Other areas—

A. The Board of Christian Education has continued to purchase new filmstrips for the Oregon Yearly Meeting lending library.

B. Junior Yearly Meeting has had an attendance of over one hundred. The children have had classes during the mornings and recreation in the afternoon. Nursery care has been provided during all of the sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

C. Children's church is becoming a new interest among our churches with almost half of them now having at least one. An article was published in the NORTHWEST FRIEND emphasizing children's church as a mission field with ten suggested steps for organizing one. Friends curriculum for the primary and junior ages is available, published by Ohio Yearly Meeting for the Evangelical Friends Alliance. (EFA cooperation.)

With our increased attendance in morning worship, we feel it is extremely important to take advantage of every learning opportunity so we would suggest that every church earnestly pray about having a children's church.

D. Outpost and preparative meetings that requested help received financial assistance again this year. Vacation Bible Schools continue to be one of the major contacts with new families. New times and schedules are giving VBS a new look and a greater potential than ever before.

E. The Program of Advance, 1966-67—In cooperation with the Board of Evangelism, we had an active part in planning and promoting the Year of Advance. We are thankful for the many areas of advancement during this past year and trust that this will be a year of outreach through Advance 1967-68.

● 102. The summary of epistles received from other yearly meetings was read as follows: (26 epistles were received.)

Kansas: "We are praying that the Person of the Holy Spirit shall be able to fan the fires of spiritual renewal among Friends everywhere and that we all may do our part to share the love of Christ with a sin-sick world."

Rocky Mountain: "This meeting has reflected a note of challenge as we look forward. A new meeting has been formed in Omaha, Nebraska, and a preparatory meeting is active in Fort Collins, Colorado. Interest is keen in the mission fields."

Central Yearly Meeting: "Our evangelist, Rev. H. Roff French, capably preached the message of salvation. The blessed truth found its way into the hearts, resulting in splendid altar services with earnest seekers and happy finders."

East Africa Yearly Meeting: "It is more than discussing the business of the Yearly Meeting. 'Come to a lovely place and rest,' Jesus said. A rest in the sense of giving Christ time to reveal to each of us what He wants us to be and to do."

Nebraska Yearly Meeting: "We are few in number and are widely scattered, and have been hampered by heavy flood waters; but have come together with a sense of warm fellowship and Christian unity."

Western Yearly Meeting: "We are challenged to greater effort to make our Christianity show, to be positive, active agents of Christ in a world torn by violence, natural and man-made."

Ohio Yearly Meeting: "Mahlon Macy of Oregon Yearly Meeting was our speaker for both our expository hour and evening Gospel hour. These were singularly blessed with the presence of God's Spirit. Many found definite spiritual help and a number of others came to know Christ as personal Saviour."

North Carolina Yearly Meeting: "As the world grows smaller, our family of Friends has real opportunities to become more closely knit following the example of the first Christians who loved one another deeply in the things that are eternal."

Ohio Yearly Meeting (Barnesville): "We have been reminded that we



must let God work in us, that we may be truly regenerated and changed by the new birth."

- 103. The following epistle to other yearly meetings was read:

Greetings from Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church in its seventy-fifth session, which convened at the historic Friends site in Newberg, Oregon, August 14-20, 1967.

Our opening minute expressed so well our feelings: "The beginning of our seventy-fifth year finds us in a world of change and anxiety. There are wars, famines, earthquakes, and revolutions abroad. There are riots, lawlessness and increasing moral decay at home. World problems come closer to our doors than our predecessors seventy-four years ago would have believed possible. May we in this complex and difficult time fulfill our mission as the salt of the earth and the light of the world."

During the opening session of Oregon Yearly Meeting our General Superintendent, Jack L. Willcuts, spoke very feelingly: "Upon reaching this time marker in the progress of Oregon Yearly Meeting, it is well to look over our shoulders before plunging into the tomorrows.

"Spiritual progress and church life is not easily measured. Church buildings can be counted, even membership additions recorded, but the blessings, the emotions, the decisions and the intangibles of inner experience cannot be pictured or written. Oregon Yearly Meeting has both a memory and a hope, both of which are linked to the clear direction of the holy Presence in our midst."

Continuing the words of our General Superintendent: "Upon visiting with other Friends across the world, I am impressed anew with the compassion we ought to have and have historically shown for the suffering, the hungry, the imprisoned, the lost of the world. While we must not be content with substituting 'benevolence' for sharing the Gospel, neither should we become selfish or ingrown with a sterile orthodoxy. It is good to see more of our young men volunteering for alternate work overseas and at home. A true Christian motivation for ministering to the social problems pressing in upon us from all sides will surely lead us into finding new ways of becoming involved as Christians.

"Our unity is in Christ. Whatever Quakerism may mean to some, we see ourselves as part of the Church of Christ. This does not imply a uniformity of outlook and concerns, perhaps, but clear convictions on the sinfulness of man and the saving grace of the Gospel, and these must remain the doctrinal guidelines for increasing pressures upon our Yearly Meeting for closer ties with other Friends."

He then outlined several positive steps which would aid the church immeasurably in maintaining a forward direction. He declared: "One of these is to strengthen the emerging Evangelical Friends Alliance bringing the four yearly meetings, Kansas, Ohio, Oregon and Rocky Mountain closer together. This is evidenced in a unified magazine, the EVANGELICAL FRIEND, to be published at the Barclay Press, Newberg, Oregon; a new Alliance mission in Mexico; and the Alliance extension church in Omaha, Nebraska.

"A second positive stand is simply to stress the term evangelical in our thinking and action. Another way is to concentrate on doctrinal training of our youth, made possible through our Friends Academy in Greenleaf, Idaho, and at George Fox College, our Christian liberal arts college at Newberg."

Oregon Yearly Meeting appreciates deeply the splendid leadership of President Milo C. Ross of George Fox College for thirteen years. He has been granted a well-earned leave of absence for the coming year. David LeShana has come to George Fox College as vice-president, and as acting president this year.

The General Superintendent announced the fall Seminars and other activities of the Program of Advance. He further stated, "I again emphasize that if we are to be true to our heritage and equal to our present task, our strategy must be to place the burden of outreach upon every Christian."

The School for Elders, held in six different areas, was helpful. The response of nearly 300 Ministry and Oversight members indicates a genuine concern to fulfill these responsibilities. Our youth camps were well attended—2,300 strong.

Our guest speaker, Raymond L. Cramer, a Friends minister and Christian psychologist, came to us from California Yearly Meeting. He spoke to overflow audiences, many hearing on a closed TV circuit. His messages revealed his keen insight into the lives of those possessed with unsolved emotional problems. He proclaimed the joys of a life utterly yielded to Christ.

Throughout the sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting, we were overshadowed with the Presence in our midst.

Approved with some changes and additions.

- 104. The Board of Publication felt that it would not be advisable to publish the paper, "Friends' Principles of Problem Solving," by Harold R. Thomas, which was referred to it by the Yearly Meeting. There would seem to be little demand, and the handling of the subject of individual infallibility is somewhat controversial.

It was suggested that the paper be placed in Shambaugh Library and people be made aware of its availability.

Approved.

- 105. The Discipline Revision Committee asked for the privilege of preparing a revised draft of the Discipline prior to 1969 printing. Extensive editing is needed to incorporate changes, clarify positions and policies taken, and to make a more readable book.

Approved.

- 106. The Executive Council was unanimous in recommending calling Jack L. Willcuts as General Superintendent for the two-year period September 1, 1967, through August 31, 1969.

Approved with a standing expression of the appreciation of the Yearly Meeting for his work.

- 107. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting the following salary arrangement for our General Superintendent for the year September 1, 1967 through August 31, 1968:

changes in the list of yearly meetings with which spiritual unity is felt. This would change only item three of minute 118, Yearly Meeting of 1960.

It should be pointed out that David Myton will not be an official member of the board until he actually becomes a member of this Yearly Meeting.

Cole, representing George Fox College; Lonny Fendall, representing Oregon Yearly Meeting Youth, and Edna Williams, representing Newberg Quarterly Meeting.

We are indebted to George Fox College for the fine accommodations made available for housing in Pennington Hall, Edwards Hall and Weesner Village, where 140 guests were housed at a minimum fee.

Five trailers were accommodated on the yearly meeting grounds near the church. We appreciate the numerous homes which were opened to yearly meeting guests by friends in Newberg Quarterly Meeting.

Flowers for the sessions were arranged by the Decorating Committee of Newberg Monthly Meeting.

Saga Food Service authorized Doug Goins to serve the Yearly Meeting on a cost basis. Approximately 2,740 meals were served at Heacock Commons on George Fox College campus by Doug Goins and his staff—Joey Soon, Edith Comfort and Sharon Hooker. Doug Goins and Joey Soon have worked twelve to fourteen hours a day for seven days in our behalf for a fixed salary. We recommend that the Yearly Meeting give \$60 to Doug Goins and \$40 to Joey Soon as an expression of appreciation for the many hours of overtime. We suggest that notes of appreciation be sent to Doug Goins and Saga Food Service for the excellent food service provided for our sessions.

We are pleased to report that the competence of Doug Goins and his staff has enabled us to be served without being subsidized by the Yearly Meeting. Sixty-nine pastors and members of their families and ten representatives from over 150 miles were entertained on half-priced meal tickets.

We request the privilege of entering actual figures in this report when they are known at the conclusion of yearly meeting sessions. (See p. 54)

Members were encouraged to write letters supporting these people and bills, including seeking peace in Viet Nam. The clerk was instructed to send letters to senators and representatives of the three states and the President expressing our concerns.

● 126. With gratitude to our Lord for His faithful presence in our midst and with a new determination that we of Oregon Yearly Meeting be known by the quality of our love for one another and for others, the 1967 Yearly Meeting adjourned to meet in Newberg, Oregon, August 13-18, 1968.

## Digest of Meetings of Ministry and Oversight Body

The Committee on Ministry made two recommendations to the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight and one request, all of which were approved. They recommended that the names of those receiving certificates of Ministers in Training be sent to the chairman of their committee and also that Marion Clarkson be recorded as a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting. The morning inspirational hour and evening messages were brought by Dr. Raymond L. Cramer, Friends minister and Christian psychologist of Southern California.

## Morning Inspirational Hour

WEDNESDAY: 1 Corinthians 13. We will take time with various words in this chapter, key to the problems of the world and of interpersonal relationships, emphasizing the significance of love—not the Hollywood, glamour kind, but the kind that constitutes what life is all about. This chapter is the finest examination and measure of our state of love.

The definition of God is in terms of love. Christ didn't come because we were lost sinners, but because He loved us. Salvation is a by-product of His love. He identified with us so closely that He took on our feelings. He knows what sorrow, rejection, being lied about mean. He became the sin offering in our place. Sin is so far reaching, He was for a moment completely cut off from God—He had never experienced this before. He is the greatest psychologist. He knows us and understands us. His counsel is unselfish, with unpossessive love. He gave Himself without expecting anything in return, which is one definition of love. How far will your love go? How far will you go to forgive?

If every child had enough love while growing up, there would be no emotional problems. The thing missing in the average home today is love. Hate is on the increase. Do you hate anybody? Be honest; be realistic—prejudice, jealousy, resentment, pride, hurt feelings are all based on hate.

The word love used here implies the preciousness of the object. We are valuable to God. Love is there when you accept Jesus and the Holy Spirit enters your heart. What a mess he inherits! As Paul wrote, "Let God remold your mind." "Love suffers long . . ." Are you making progress in handling anger which can destroy you and bring on disease? It is the most serious thing wrong with human personality. Love helps get the pressure off—removes the spirit from the boiling point. Love helps you become a mature Christian if you let the Holy Spirit change your life.

THURSDAY: 1 Corinthians 13. These characteristics of love will show in our interpersonal relations. We can't be the same persons after we accept Christ. Then love is a growing experience. We can evaluate here how we are growing.

Love is kind. Phillips expresses it, "Love looks for a way of being constructive." It is natural to be destructive. Kindness here is useful—someone else can benefit from it. It shows in tone of voice—the opposite of sharp and bitter—which is so important that a baby can suffer shock in its nervous system by having fighting and screaming around it. Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15:33 that evil communication corrupts good manners.

Kindness cannot be overemphasized. The effect of one's personality on others can be destructive or helpful. If you're disturbed, you will disturb others. Sick emotions can be caught. Jesus says in Matthew 11:28-30, "Come unto me. . . I will give you restoration." He heals you. To help another, you have to love him. Unless Jesus Christ becomes part of our personalities, we can never reach our best selves.



We are only free in Him. Kindness can be loaned to others—the supply is never exhausted. We can loan it without losing anything. If there was ever a time when kindness is needed, it is now.

FRIDAY: 1 Corinthians 13. Love affects our dispositions and gives us qualities that influence other people.

Love envieth not—is not possessive, not jealous, not contentious, feels no rivalry, does not boil or burn. There are two important factors in hostility—hate and guilt. God has taken care of both. Love is not jealous. Joseph's brothers hated him (it was not all their fault—their father hadn't been wise). Joseph's subsequent circumstances weren't his fault, but God was with him. God can make up to a child who hasn't had love enough which he deserves. Of 3,000 children I have counseled, all their problems were caused by lack of love and affection. When we don't give love, we impair the child. God can take our lives and recast them in a new mould. He has the equipment if we are willing to use it.

Love isn't possessive. There are three qualifications for a counselor that he can't learn in school but that must be inherent in the personality. First, he must love without possessing the person. Secondly, he must be able to establish empathy—must feel one with the persons he counsels, and thirdly, he must be genuine. Christians should have these qualities. Ministers have no right in the ministry without them. God will give them if we seek and ask. We must really care for people.

Love vaunteth not itself—is not anxious to impress, doesn't display itself, is not arrogant or insincere. Insecure people have to overdo in order to feel secure. A dogmatic person is insecure—he can't stand for anyone to question him. We can't get away with believing just because we feel we should. How much can you take in saying why you're a Christian? If you are disturbed by what I am saying, you can be infinitely more disturbed by the devil. Love conquers this. We don't have to feel in competition.

Love is not puffed up—does not cherish inflated ideas of its own importance. Innately we have a set of values that make us know right from wrong. Within love there is a set of values.

SATURDAY: 1 Corinthians 13. Love does not behave itself unseemly. It has good manners and is never rude. There is often a question about the good manners of Christians. How little love manifests itself in those professing the love of God. Good manners are part of the nature of love. Unseemly means deformed. Nothing about it is detrimental. That is one reason for not drinking, because it is not a good example and the Christian is concerned about other people, has a love for others. Love doesn't hurt you.

Love seeketh not her own—does not pursue selfish advantages. Love is complete—it doesn't have to seek anything. Science is learning that without love one cannot become a mature person. The Gospel is up-to-date. We should redeem the image of the church and become specialists in love.

Love is not easily provoked—is not sharp, hurtful, does not irritate, or scorn, or burn with anger. Anger burns you and exhausts you so that it hurts inside. Hebrews 10:24 says to provoke unto love and unto good works.

Love seeketh no evil—doesn't make a mental note of, doesn't keep score. People are inclined to keep track of negatives. If a score is kept, love is lacking. Love is not resentful. No marriages would fail if this kind of love were operating. This is what constitutes real ministry—love in evidence in our lives. Do we let love take over our lives?

Love thinketh no evil—will not pass malice or ill will to another person's account, will not use this as a debt against anyone. Most of us

are afraid to explore ourselves. Unless we get to the bottom of our inner drives, we will never know the love of God. Love rejoices in the truth—sincerity of mind, integrity. Love beareth all things—covers you. It bears up against any enemy. Love holds out against strain and stress. Friends who have tapped the resources of God's love should become the personification of love to other people.

## Evening Services

TUESDAY: The will to manage our lives. 2 Corinthians 8:12. We have to have willing minds. This is acceptable to God. It is not what we don't have or the capabilities we lack that matter to God. It is being willing recipients of His spirit and having a forwardness, promptitude and eagerness to do His will. We seem to emphasize everything else. We work hard making a living and trying to be successful, but we can't control our emotions. The Holy Spirit can't use us if we can't manage ourselves.

We are living under strain and stress unknown in history before to the present extent. We must learn how to handle our inner drives. Don't be afraid to look at yourself. How do you feel toward people? How much concern have you for those who disagree with you? We can't handle these drives without help.

We must know who we are and where we're going, and manage our lives so that we will influence people in positive ways. We are redeemed because God gives us power to become His children. Jesus said, "Heaven is . . . where? . . . within you." Our objective should be to be saturated with the love of God and be willing to give ourselves away, making the decision for time and eternity and letting everyone know where we're going.

WEDNESDAY: Matthew 16:24, 25. The will to manage our lives in a way to bring us personal satisfaction brings tremendous experiences. We must renounce every right to ourselves—then Jesus makes the rules and requirements. It is our privilege to accept His initiative in our lives. We can't understand ourselves till we give ourselves away to Him—give Him our total personality as a living sacrifice—this is intelligent worship. Paul wrote, "Don't let the world squeeze you into its mould" (Phillips) and "Let him remould your minds."

Young people today identify with their peer group because they don't think older people understand them. Many of them are not capable of handling the strains and stresses today which are greater than our generation ever knew. They are faced with increasing forces of evil such as organizations promoting the abolishment of all restraints on personal life, sexual and otherwise. What are we going to do about these? Many of these young people say they are seeking something new and that they seek closeness to God. Why haven't we been demonstrating closeness to God? How secure are we when we can't demonstrate the thrill and challenge of Christianity? We need to let the Holy Spirit do some ventilating of our minds. We all are touchable by these forces of darkness. We need each other—to be members one of another. We must be real—and break completely with evil so we can have genuine love and warm affection with one another. Keep the fires of the spirit burning. There must be action, warmth, inspirational impact, creative attitudes. We must still believe; even though growing is slow—keep believing.

THURSDAY: The will to manage our lives. 2 Timothy 1:7. If you have fear, it didn't come from God. We acquire fear from other persons. A baby is born with basic capacity for love. He learns to hate or love. Hate doesn't come from God. An individual is constituted by all that has



happened to him up to this time. No one can know everything that has made up a personality. Counseling comes in to help people who have gotten off the track. Each individual deserves our respect.

We should move into people's lives. He promises us power here. This means dynamic power. There is too much low voltage church work. God promises us pep, power—the ability to be alert and alive. God isn't fatigued.

He gives us the spirit of love. This is the day and age of hate, which is not compatible with love. Love increases the more you have it. He also promises us a sound mind. What more do we want—power, love and a sound mind! If we believe Christ is the answer to the human problem, we must radiate His presence and go out to influence people positively.

There are different kinds of environments in which children grow up. One is the amoral type which produces delinquents because the parents are sick. Our society tends to treat offenders rather than causes—we hide under things and aren't man enough to face ourselves. Children of sick parents have been beaten, given inconsistent discipline. They lack a feeling of belonging. They have no conscience. They hate society, themselves, authority. They are afraid of love. In another type of environment the child plays it safe. He figures if he plays the angles right, he'll get the parents' attention, so he does what they want. But a child must no more have to try to earn the love of his parents than we can earn the love of God. We have the privilege and responsibility of loving our children no matter what they've done. Every child has a right to be loved regardless of what he does. Another environment is the dogmatic one in which the child has to believe what the parents say because they say so. He mustn't ask questions or deviate from expected behavior. The law is laid down. And then there is the environment of loving concern in which parents spend time to let children ask questions and talk over basic matters together so the children can form their own beliefs. All hell cannot shake this kind of faith. Parents in this environment set the example of love and faith.

FRIDAY: Romans 7:15. The will to manage our lives. Forces within us discourage and defeat. "My twin is not a Christian and yet we are one child." Our twin natures are the carnal flesh and the natural man. They are separate—not identical.

Carnality is foreign to God and His will. It is not redeemable. It has to go. It overcomes the natural man, who can go either way through his free will. It is possible for the natural man to be changed through the power of Jesus Christ. No one can change if he doesn't want to—Christ's hands are tied without man's will; but man can't change himself—he can't get rid of carnality unless it is displaced by Christ's presence.

Natural man wants to do what is right but he can't. That is why Jesus said we must be born again. Then we grow as a baby grows. Do we expect a newborn to act like an adult? No—we encourage him every possible way to grow. Why don't we treat new Christians like that? We need to explain that after conversion he may feel worse because of remorse for the past, guilt, or fear he can't live up to the standards and be tempted to drop out. If we really believed there was a way out for all human need through Jesus Christ, we'd move heaven and earth to help people become free in Him.

Eventually the spirit of God will pervade our nature—it takes longer for some than others. We will be no longer twins—not even retain the natural man, but become partakers of God's nature. No longer two but one person. We can demonstrate to the world that it can be done. He wants all of you—just as you are.

SATURDAY: The will to manage our lives. John 1:1-13 (Phillips) There are three drivers in one seat (v. 13), "course of nature" (flesh), "impulse or plan of man" (will), and God's will. Unless the third driver becomes number one, we are out of focus. This comes through our willingness to let Him take over. The other two drivers move according to our own goals.

If you are going to work for Him, you can expect to be shot at (by the devil). Can you take it? Lots of things will happen that you didn't plan—that will disturb you. Every second has to be committed to God's hands. We must relax in His will. Life must be invested in Him. It is dangerous to move without knowing you are in His will. God knows your telephone number and address. Put your line in working order. Our problem is that the line hasn't been used enough. With Christ in control, we become more confident—become more the person we'd like to be. We become more flexible and less rigid and more adjustable to circumstances and conditions we have to face. We adopt more realistic goals for ourselves. We grow more and more certain of our redemption and become less able to fool ourselves.

God wants us to express our feelings—not cover them up. He can change our basic nature so that we become more mature and more acceptable to other people. We need to take another step forward and find His will in reaching out to other people. Teen-agers are pleading to be helped out of their moodiness and confusion so they can find stability. There are multitudes in need of help in this era of moral crisis. We must not be too busy to try. After years in Nazi prison camps, Dr. Frankel, psychiatrist, says, "I have changed my approach. If I lose one soul, it is the same as if I'd lost the whole world. If I save one soul, it is as if I had saved the whole world. If you accept a person as he is, you can't help him. If you accept him as if he had already arrived, you can help him. He will respond." This is familiar to us because Jesus treated people this way. Remember Peter when Christ found him and how Jesus' love changed him. You can release people and help them become free. When God is in the driver's seat, He can use us as we move toward maturity.

SUNDAY MORNING: Ephesians 3:16-20. When I watch the Sullivan show occasionally, I am amazed at the response the Beatles have on teen-agers. What turns them on? This is the tuned in, turned on generation. What really turns you on? What sets you free? Not built up or warmed up enthusiasm, but what automatically does this to you? We need to know this in order to be leaders in demonstrating to the world what is most important. Paul writes here of "power in the inner man." This gives us confidence. The spirit of the Lord should be what turns us on and tunes us in. Does this power get to where you really live? "That He may dwell in your heart," your feeling tones, your personality. This is not something put on but should be part of us. We should be able to say to the hippies—"Come on! We'll take you on a trip with Christ."

We must have a growing experience with Christ, an emotional experience. Does Christ feel uncomfortable in our thoughts and feelings? We must be solidly established so that it is impossible to uproot us and we cannot be disturbed at our foundations. Thermopane glass is built to take the strong wind—flexible. The Golden Gate bridge can swing as much as 12 feet out of line in a storm. God can give us a margin so we can swing with the storm and not break.

We can't place a limit on the love of God. It goes way beyond our comprehension. Can we comprehend what it is to love a person who is unlovable? We are promised here to be filled with all the fullness of God. This is staggering. Jesus turned people on—many came just to



be close to Him. He had something different and they wanted to be near Him. In our age we should be the tuned in, turned on ones. The thrill of the promises in this passage should go out to others from us. Love is the medicine for the sickness in the world; the greatest force and the most important. We should be the example and demonstration. We must believe that Jesus loves us as much as He said He did and then go out to love others. We should not try to change them—only God can change people. We need to create an atmosphere of love—to become channels Christ's love can flow through.

**SUNDAY EVENING:** The ministry of the Friends church. Revelation 2:1-5. One hundred years ago there was a change in Quakerdom—an evangelical revival. It spread from Walnut Ridge, Indiana, through areas of the Midwest and on to the West. It is time for the spirit of God to move again. Some isms have become "wasms." There is a greater concern across America for evangelism—which offers new frontiers and new opportunities. We have the chance to be in the vanguard of a spiritual awakening. There is a tendency to make the church another device, too concerned with details. Instead of changing culture, we're being changed. Our greatest enemy is within. It is not the woodpeckers but the termites we should fear. We are hidden behind closed doors when we need to be out scattering the good news. The church is on the defensive. There are four concerns we will point out.

First, we have lost a consciousness of God. Our sense of God seems absent when the church should be the agency that has the presence. "If this is the temple of God, where is the presence of God in His temple?" Secondly, we have lost some of our commitment to Christ. We portray a low grade of Christian living with little concern for discipleship. Christ demands more than any dictator and He has a right to. We should not live a life of detachment. Thirdly, we have lost our concept of the Church and forgotten its nature. The Church is not man-made but is the body of Christ, established by Him. We don't just join—we experience. We need to renew our concept of the mission of the church. There is too much emphasis on the trivial. We need revival of the ethical, the evangelical, the sacrificial. Fourthly, we have lost our compassion for the unsaved. We need to help lift spiritual poverty. Our altars are empty and no one seems disturbed about it. We are too prayerless, which results in barrenness. We need to pray with a saint in China, "Lord, revive Thy church, beginning with me."
