# **Minutes**

## **Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church**

### **1969**

- 1. The seventy-seventh session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened August 12, 1969, at 10:15 a.m. in Newberg, Oregon.

In this epochal year when man has been able to conquer space and has first set foot on the moon, may we as Oregon Yearly Meeting also lift our eyes to far horizons of accomplishment as we go forward with Him who is the Creator of all things. May His special direction be ours during these sessions as we plan for a great forward thrust for Christ and His Church.

Donald Lamm, pastor of the Eugene Friends Church, led the congregation in singing, "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing." The meeting united with Myron Goldsmith as he led in prayer asking God's special guidance and direction on these sessions. The Young People's Yearly Meeting was present in the opening session.

- 2. Jack L. Willcuts, superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, presented the following keynote address: (Condensation—a copy of the message may be secured from the Yearly Meeting Office.)

"Let thy work appear unto thy servants, and thy glory unto their children. And let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us: and establish thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish thou it." (Psalm 90:16, 17)

"The works of the Lord and the glory of the Lord are beautiful. As we gather in the opening of a Yearly Meeting to consider the work of our hands and *for* our hands, let us pray that the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us.

"However we may regard the man or his cause, the late Robert Kennedy reiterated a statement that is unforgettable: 'Some men see things as they are and say, why? Others dream things that never were and say, why not?' Another unforgettable declaration comes from the late Martin Luther King as he stood at the base of the Lincoln Memorial shouting across the heads of black citizens to the nation looking on: 'I have a dream!'

"Surely there is nothing wrong in lifting these two oratorical gems

from the emotional setting in which they were given and placing them in a religious one that is to us precious and stirring. As we try to absorb the contradictions and inconsistencies of our generation, see and hear daily results of hate and hunger—watching these scenes, living in them, and feeling the tension of these times—we are in great danger of losing a sense of the beauty of God and the glory of His power. Some, preoccupied with our smallness and failures, who see things as they are and ask why, must this week look beyond the faces of fear and frustration and dream things that never were and say why not. Have we forgotten what it means to belong to One who controls history? I have a dream—a vision of God building upon us a part of His kingdom through Friends of the Northwest, of establishing the work of our hands in a world as trouble-filled and complex as it is.

"Visiting among the churches, one has a tendency to emphasize only the good reports and to try to encourage. The role of leadership, in the context of our day, is to be one who inspires and encourages, who implies in one way or another that while things may be difficult 'here,' they are just fine elsewhere. It has been interesting this year in visiting the growing churches of other denominations to find they, too, wonder at times if the grass might be greener in some other religious pasture.

"So, in reporting to you both the good and the bad, I realize the risks involved. The responses will vary according to what you have already decided is good and is bad.

"One of the really fine things to report is the good fellowship enjoyed with all in the Yearly Meeting, every pastor and family, our missionaries, the George Fox College staff and students, every congregation, committee, and department, the Executive Council, the team at Barclay Press, and of course those with whom I work at the Yearly Meeting Office. I know of no tensions or barriers marring these splendid relationships, fruits of the Spirit, which are appreciated in the lives of our yearly meeting ministers and leaders. This 'one accordness' among us provides a conduit of Christian grace and concern to the glory of God.

"This year, 15 churches showed gains in Sunday school, worship attendance, and membership. During the year, the Free Methodist Church in Klamath Falls turned their work over to Friends, since several in the congregation, including the pastor, Evert Tuning, were already Friends. They averaged 34 in attendance. A new church is nearing completion in Northeast Tacoma, now called Olympic View Friends Church. Equipped to serve during the week as a day care center, this facility will offer a new dimension for instant service in the community.

"Of interest, too, is what happened in two of the new church buildings mentioned in last year's report. Maplewood enjoyed a 10 percent increase in morning worship and 8 percent gain in Sunday school this year; Eugene shows a 39 percent gain in Sunday school and a 21 percent gain in morning worship. While the church growth study recommendations will cover this point, it is apparent that to build a lovely sanctuary is far from enough. We must plan equally well for the leadership, staff, and program over a period of at least the first five years in church extension efforts.

"The decline in Sunday school continued again this year, but there is a slight increase in morning worship and a somewhat larger increase in membership. The net membership gain for the year is 119. Total giving by the churches to the United Budget is at least \$5,000 more this year than last. However, individual gifts beyond church giving to the United Budget were considerably less. This means \$108,092 was received toward a

\$127,945 United Budget goal. The Fixed Expense allocation approved by the Yearly Meeting last year called for a 13 percent increase. The churches responded with an increase of about 2 percent, leaving a shortage of around \$4,000 in the Fixed Expense. This presents us again with the annual decision of whether to cut our budgets to match our giving or to challenge our people to match the budget. That church giving has increased is encouraging, although it may not correspond to inflation rises. So much of our outreach and evangelism pivots on the issue of Christian stewardship.

"Our mission fields continue to excite us with what God is doing. In his annual report on the Bolivian work, David Thomas says, 'New meetings continue to appear, both from new growth and from migration. We are trying to get more adequate statistics, but as yet cannot keep up with the increases.' He adds, '. . . a great door and effectual is opened . . . and there are many adversaries.'

"The Bible classes now being taught in the Peruvian field by Quentin Nordyke and Ron Stansell find 50 workers enrolled. This is one of the most significant developments since the opening of the Peruvian church. Bolivian Friends have marched forward under the leadership of a hundred national pastors trained in our Bible School; the same, under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, can happen again across the Peruvian border.

"The support and work of the OYM Women's Missionary Unions continue to be a major base of our missionary thrust at home.

"The wide open door of effective ministry before us in foreign missions outreach merits every sacrifice of our money and our youth. This bright spot of progress must not be eclipsed with any loss of interest or support or by our preoccupation with problems elsewhere in the world and at home. Any who regards foreign missions today as dull or dying only exposes his ignorance of what really is happening in South America. If young people want to give themselves where it really counts in life and eternity, Friends mission fields offer this opportunity.

"The Foreign Missions Conference held on the campus at George Fox College should be mentioned; initiated and planned largely by students themselves, it has brought some of the finest missionary speakers before our young people.

"This has been a year of change at George Fox College. As a Yearly Meeting, we appreciate the leadership Milo Ross has given the past 15 years as president. The progress made under his guidance is recognized, and I speak for all in expressing this commendation. Mention must be made, too, of the faithful work of Ivan Adams, who retired after 19 years as chairman of the George Fox College board.

"We wish the best for David Le Shana as he becomes the ninth president of the college. Let us pray for him, the faithful, dedicated faculty, and the school that the college may continue strong in the faith as a vital arm of the church in the development of Christian leadership.

"Three of our alternate service men returned from Vietnam this year, and two more will be going out in a few days. Dorlan Bales with his wife Eunice, and Robert Newell and wife Melinda will join Gary Black, already there—all under the World Relief Commission, the relief agency of the National Association of Evangelicals.

"I remind the Yearly Meeting that our alignment with other evangelical Friends is becoming more than a casual connection. 'The founding of the Evangelical Friends Alliance,' as Everett Cattell points out, 'grew out of some fundamental impulses. One was a weariness with isolationism as a Yearly Meeting and a reaching out for cooperation with those of like

faith. A second was a weariness with smallness, lack of growth and provincialism.' Many of us hope that this alliance of four independent yearly meetings will be a stepping-stone to a union on a national basis forming an Evangelical Friends Church. Another step to this end is confronting us. A general conference of the Friends of the four yearly meetings is requested for the summer of 1970 in the Midwest. So far, only the Coordinating Council members have gathered annually, about a dozen each year going from each yearly meeting or only about 48 people representing 22,000 Friends. The formation of five commissions on missions, evangelism, publications, Christian education, and Friends Youth serves to strengthen the church. But there exists an overlap of boards and administrative machinery along with considerable ignorance of what really is happening or being duplicated among us, so that the thrust of our church is blunted. Russell Myers, superintendent of Ohio Yearly Meeting, wrote a stirring editorial in the July issue of the *Evangelical Friend* magazine, which I hope all have read; it calls for union now. We have already declared our theological unity in no uncertain terms; it is now time we as a Yearly Meeting come to grips with the implications and opportunities for organizational unity. To simply organize a superstructure above our present four yearly meetings will be unwarranted expense and disappointing if it merely shepherds our present smallness and weaknesses. Some of us from Oregon Yearly Meeting will be meeting in Minneapolis next month during the U.S. Congress on Evangelism with other EFA men to plan both for future organizational development and the proposed general conference. Should such a conference be held, I hope that Friends with campers and dedication, or with dedication without campers, tents, and trailers, will arrange vacation times to make this journey.

"All around lie opportunities for the church. You are the church. Be proud of it, proud to be in the family of the church called Friends. All men may be my brothers, but one man in this room is my brother in particular because he and I were born of the same parents. So every Christian may be my brother in Christ, but I belong to the family of Friends. Let us make our part of the church what it ought to be. May God give us strength in the Holy Spirit to renew the church where we are and where we live and serve. This will not come about by naming a committee only, by edict, by proclamation, or a panel discussion by important people. It will be by concurrent action touching every church from Hayden Lake to Ashland, from Whitney to Netarts.

"This Yearly Meeting presents us with a choice—an epitaph over a Quaker tombstone, or God's marching orders. Shall it be '1893 to 1969, Age 76, Rest in Peace,' or 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel'?"

"In biblical faithfulness, Quakers have something to say about Jesus Christ:

Jesus Christ is God's Word in the heart and in history;  
 Jesus Christ redeems men and impowers them really to follow Him;  
 Jesus Christ baptizes all believers, and guides them directly, by the Holy Spirit;  
 Jesus Christ gives us weapons of peace in a world of violence. Friends, take seriously the command, "Follow peace and holiness . . ."  
 (from Arthur Roberts lecture, 'My Appeal')

"To a certain segment of the Yearly Meeting just now, I am suspect as speaking only for the Establishment. I hope to reassure another segment of the Yearly Meeting who before these sessions are over, if indeed they do not already, may suspect me for identifying with a new generation calling

for change. Oregon Yearly Meeting, while yet a mini-denomination, already has its own 'underground church'—informal, ad hoc, gatherings that meet over coffee, on golf courses, in homes, and in certain uncontrolled Sunday school classes to consider our church and its future. These pockets of questioners and searchers are springing up spontaneously. That I have been accepted into some of these conversations and by these groups is gratifying. This fellowship is spiritually refreshing and challenging. Let me share a paragraph or two of one of several letters from different young Friends: 'We are interested in how we can become involved in a larger group where continuous interaction can take place with people of like mind. What we are saying is, that we want to get involved in the action, to see some constructive change *within* the church. This has to happen or we, as the church, are dead. We would like to have more information on what you have planned for Yearly Meeting.' This letter is signed by a group of young couples. Now some might suppose that these only need to get busy in their local church. The point is that they are—one is a youth sponsor; almost all of them teach Sunday school classes; one is an elder; another is a Sunday school superintendent; the rest fill committee assignments.

"This is from another letter: 'I have held on in the Friends Church because of emotional ties and a lack of alternatives, and yet I have really felt that the church which ought to be is dying, if not dead already. Lately, however, I have come to believe that it is possible for renewal to come to our church. I believe that the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the distinct message of Friends, are as attractive and essential as ever, if they can be stripped of the meaningless traditions. As I see some of the restructuring that is taking place, consider the new ideas in camping, the social concerns in Vietnam, Albina, and Holly Park—these give me hope.'

"If a generation gap in thinking exists, which may really be more of an evaluation of judgment gap than an age gap, then my position is middle-of-the-road, not because I am committed to neither side, but rather because I am committed to something greater than both—Christian unity as found in basic Christianity. I am not asking for compromise from anyone, but at the same time we cannot confuse compromise with consideration or even compassion. We cannot compromise beliefs, but we cannot ignore those who are searching to establish in their own tradition those very same beliefs. I believe we are encountering problems involving methods more than beliefs, points of doctrinal emphasis more than doctrinal differences. But these doctrines need to be aired and understood in terms that communicate the whole Gospel of God. Some new Friends about ready to 'chuck it all' because of the spirit and attitudes they interpret as demanding, rigid terminology, and religious practices need to examine daily their own commitment to Christ. Other Friends must be cautious of being tied to the past with more emotion and sentiment than love and understanding. All of us need each other; we need to trust each other. As the recommendations for church growth action are introduced, some will be certain before seeing them that 'we have gone too far,' others 'that we have not gone far enough.'

"Most ailing organizations,' says John Gardner, a former Cabinet member, 'have developed a functional blindness to their own defects.' While the church is more than an organization, current research in church growth patterns suggests they also have their cycles of increase, decline, stagnation, and revival. One of the first rules in the cycle of renewal is that every organization must have an effective program for the recruitment and development of new talent. Friends flinch at the crassness of the word *recruitment*, but we are deeply concerned for the need of more men called of God

to be trained and released for service. There have been 43 pastoral changes in 62 churches the past two years. Over the past ten years, 70 have left pastoral service in Oregon Yearly Meeting. Forty-one of these have taken other Christian vocations in the mission field, other yearly meetings, teaching, or related duties. Nine are deceased. But the fact remains that 50 percent of our pastors will be replaced in the next five years if present trends continue. Several, of course, are approaching retirement age. One of the sections in the Church Growth Study is on the subject of leadership development. This might be reviewed prayerfully by elders, pastors, and all Christians. While only God can call a man or woman into Christian vocations, He often uses the voice and influences of the church as with discernment hands are laid on those evidencing a gift of ministry.

"A shortage of able, spiritually deep, highly trained, highly motivated men seems to be a general feature of society and the church at large. We dare not let our youth get sidetracked, boxed in, or go to seed in lesser vocations than that of the high callings of God. Too few students are graduating as religion majors. Students are interested in vocations where things are happening. The church, especially if it is small, may appear to them to compare unfavorably with the achievements of a technological age. Yet, while today's students belong to the 'now' generation, they still have a love for the church and respond to warm, real worship and contemporary preaching. They are attracted to models of success, and I believe the local church and pastor does this better than anyone else. Youth admire leaders who are sincere, earnest, in obvious contact with God, well-read and intelligent, honest, fearless, and open to them.

"Another rule regarding church growth is that it must be hospitable to the individual and his needs, and not just building an institution. Quakers who have lost their individualism, who no longer expect to find and fulfill the gifts of their own ministry, will become just cogs in the machinery and will therefore act like cogs in the machinery. They will not be creative in new concerns, ideas, or compassion. Our one main protection against a total loss of Quakerism in true Christian individual initiative is to create an atmosphere of mutual trust, in which anyone with an idea and concern can speak up. We must protect these who do. I believe Oregon Yearly Meeting has people who want to say and do something, but they feel too vulnerable, too exposed, or too misunderstood. After one's expressed concerns, two or three times in a row, fall with a thud in a passive, immobile monthly meeting or committee, he becomes either one of the silent people himself or slips away discouraged. The fire of new Christians must be fanned and channeled, not stamped out.

"Another objective must be to seek continuous renewal through a fluidity of internal structure. We are in danger of becoming prisoners of our own procedures. There is a saying, 'The rule book grows fatter as the ideas grow fewer.' It is in our nature, it seems, to develop an affection for customary ways of doing things. In certain situations this is proper. But a church that is capable of continuous renewal finds a means of combating the vested interests that grow up in every human institution. Every change threatens someone's privileges, someone's authority, someone's status. If we are wise, we will see that, in the long run, our overriding interest is in the continuing validity and building of the church, winning others to Christ, and glorifying God.

"Another concern for the church capable of continuous renewal and growth is an alertness to seize every opportunity for ministry. We must offer our helping hand at every point of human need, the material and

physical, the psychological and social. In fact, the spiritual need is often not even felt or confessed until some pressing earthly need is met. Let us learn from Bolivia: many hard, trying years of patient work among the Aymaras preceded the surge of acceptance of the Gospel. These were years of caring when we were rejected, years of sacrifice and serving with little immediate response. These were the years when we were advised by the mission experts to go elsewhere—the Indians were unreachable. It was this very depth of need that drove Helen Cammack and others of that era over the mountain passes on mule-back and across the stormy lake carrying medicine, literacy materials, and just plain, loving Christian interest.

"This has to happen again with the depths of need, not 6,000 miles away, but around the corner. We find in Seattle and Portland burdened communities of lonely, purposeless, angry, hungry, failure-ridden segments of society. The social needs provide the avenue by which the spiritual need can be met. Compassion is the key, as Christ demonstrated time and again. These people need friends, and are we not the people called Friends? These children and troubled adults are victims of all sorts of problems, from disappearing husbands and fathers to rat-infested sleeping rooms, the barriers of color, illiteracy, and social stigmas. Evangelical Friends, and Oregon Yearly Meeting in particular must, I strongly feel, get involved. We cannot walk by on the other side of the Jericho road too busy in our own religious pursuits. The Good Samaritan was not a specialist in relief work or a career missionary. He just cared enough to get involved. In recent months, a new committee known as the Friends Action Board has been formed. Fred Gregory has worked this summer in Seattle directly relating to these problems and studying ways we may better minister to these kinds of needs. This is not a social gospel, but the Gospel at work in social needs. This board is now organizing and preparing for task assignments using both our tithes and funds of various governmental agencies, local and federal, if possible, to minister to these needs in a specific manner. This is all going to cost us something, not just money; but to share another's burden you have to carry some of the weight yourself. We must learn to love the black power people, the hippie, the migrant family, alcoholics, the angry generation—not just tolerate, ignore, or withdraw in a safe place to pray for them, but go out to them in the love of Jesus. One feature of the Church Growth Study discusses these issues.

"As we approach the decade of the 1970s, the sociological and economic indicators continue to point toward booming growth. Forecasters are anticipating an era they call 'The Soaring '70s.' What will happen to the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting during this expansive decade? Will we continue a pattern of only a few growing churches, while other congregations level off and decline in spite of beautiful new church buildings set amidst burgeoning population centers?

"The serious possibility of such a prospect has prompted the Church Growth Study and the resulting report. A task of such proportions has been difficult in the one year allotted for the study, and we sense the limitations in our findings. Nevertheless, it has become necessary to proceed, and we have conducted the study, examining as thoroughly as possible the data from five sources:

1. A major Church Growth Questionnaire, which probed the thinking, concerns, and attitudes of our own pastors and people.
2. Examination of our own statistics reflecting the past and present growth patterns of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

3. Conferences with church growth specialists in leading seminaries and at special gatherings of others concerned for church growth.

4. Visitation of a number of churches across the United States where significant growth is taking place.

5. Study of the published body of literature emerging in books, pamphlets, magazines concerning church growth.

"Attempt has been made to draw upon experiences in the mission field where the principles of church growth apply beyond the language, cultural, and social differences of human need and experience. The same Gospel, the same denominational beliefs and structures surely have greater similarity than the present comparative growth records of Bolivia and Oregon Yearly Meeting would indicate.

"We have picked the brains and experience of many men and combed the literature they have produced. It has been a great privilege and joy for me to work with Myron Goldsmith in this effort. His dedication, creativity, Christian concern, and personal friendship have made this a happy experience. His precise, scholarly approach has been an influence strategically needed in the completed manuscript.

"Making the selection of the eight recommendations in the final sections was done with considerable trepidation. Do they cover too wide a range of subjects? Are they really the right priorities? We prayerfully trust that they are suited to the varied conditions of our churches and that they will be reviewed by all with hearts and minds open to the direction of the Holy Spirit. In our work we did not neglect the reading of the Word, especially Paul's letters to the churches. Some of these we read aloud together, searching for answers to hard problems. Always, in the back of our minds, was not just a denomination, or a yearly meeting, but your local Friends church. How will this solution work at Marion, Spokane, Star, Medford, and Friends Memorial? Here are the eight divisions:

1. A growing church has growth goals.
2. A growing church makes all its meetings count.
3. A growing church has members committed to discipleship.
4. A growing church provides for small group action.
5. A growing church utilizes direct evangelism.
6. A growing church has multiple forms of ministry.
7. A growing church plans for leadership development.

"Each of these is developed for implementation. The 8th recommendation pertains to the administration of the church growth program itself.

"It is recognized not all of the proposed changes will take place quickly. Hopefully, however, a new sense of direction and specific goals will be realized. By moving in the right direction and spirit, what we may lack in native and trained abilities, or in the momentum of sheer size, will be more than made up in the power and baptism of the Holy Spirit.

"As Neil Armstrong stepped on the moon, I glanced out of my window to look at it again, trying to absorb the thought that man was really there. It looked so far away, so unreachable, and yet suddenly closer and attainable. A great goal had been reached, a dream of things that never were had been fulfilled.

"In the economy of divine values, the goal of reaching men with the Gospel of Christ in all this means, the goal of true discipleship in our own living—these eternal dreams are even greater than walking a few hours on a lifeless moon. May we gaze with new confidence through the windows of our worship to a world that has seemed so unreachable, to the great mission

of the Friends Church to be fulfilled. If God be for us, who can be against us? Let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us!"

A brief time of meditation and consideration followed the superintendent's message. Several spoke appreciation for the message.

Walter Lee led in a prayer of dedication of our Yearly Meeting that we may accept the challenge and vision presented by our superintendent. The meeting joined in spontaneous singing of the hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

■ 3. The resignation of David Fendall as announcing clerk was read. This was referred to the representatives.

■ 4. Caretakers were named from the Newberg area to serve these Yearly Meeting sessions, with permission granted to add names as needed. The complete list appears in the Appendix.

■ 5. The Memorial Committee was named as follows: Evangeline Raymond, Mildred Beals, Frank Haskins. Approved.

■ 6. The following were named to the Committee for Returning Minutes: May Wallace, Adelaide Barker, Everett Craven. Approved.

■ 10. The meeting adjourned to meet Wednesday morning at 9:15 a.m.

### Wednesday, 9:15 a.m.

■ 11. As the morning session opened, Grace Roberts, Edgar Pearson, and Presiding Clerk Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

■ 12. The minutes were read, and with an addition, approved.

■ 13. A resignation was read from Elizabeth Edwards from the Board of Christian Education. This was accepted and referred to the representatives.

■ 14. The representatives nominated Dan Nolta as announcing clerk of the Yearly Meeting. Approved.

■ 15. The Auditors' report was presented as follows:

In connection with our duties as Yearly Meeting Auditing Committee, we have examined the accounting records of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends for the fiscal year ended July 15, 1969. Although the yearly meeting fiscal year ends June 30, the *Minutes* call for the accounting year to end July 15. In connection with our review, we satisfied ourselves as to the correctness of the cash in checking and savings accounts as listed in the accounting records, which cash represents the entire assets listed. Yearly meeting buildings, equipment, notes, and contracts receivable are not listed on the permanent accounting records. It is the opinion of the auditing committee that all such items should be recorded in the permanent records. This has been discussed with Beatrice Goldsmith, yearly meeting treasurer.

In our opinion Mrs. Goldsmith is doing an excellent job with the accounting records and is constantly striving to improve the accounting system as needed. We received her full cooperation during our review of the accounts.

In view of the fact that time did not permit us to make a complete and detailed audit of the accounting records, we are not in a position to certify them as absolutely correct. We report, however, that the financial statements presented to us and prepared by Mrs. Goldsmith are in agreement with the records of account and, to our knowledge, there are no omissions or misstatements of material facts, except as noted above in relation to buildings, equipment, notes, and contracts receivable.

Approved.

■ 16. The treasurer's report was presented by Yearly Meeting Treasurer Beatrice Goldsmith and appears in the Appendix.

Appreciation was expressed for the work of our treasurer.

The treasurer's report was approved.

■ 17. A report came to the meeting regarding an automobile accident involving Quincy pastor, Richard Cossel, and son Donald. Richard is now in Wenatchee Hospital, listed as in satisfactory condition. Earl Geil led the congregation in prayer in their behalf.

■ 18. The following communication was read from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting:

The committee appointed three months ago to establish Meridian Meeting as a monthly meeting has carried out its obligation. On June 23 two members of the committee met with the Friends from Meridian and officially set up Meridian Monthly Meeting.

■ 19. The State of the Church reports were read, and the summary of these reports, prepared by the recording clerk as authorized by the Yearly Meeting, follows:

One of the churches of the Yearly Meeting remarked that "a truly objective report was impossible without an attempt to quiz every member of the meeting to determine their spiritual practices, and then for observers to watch the daily growth of our members." This is also true of the Yearly Meeting. However, unless we frequently examine ourselves, we shall sink deeper into the pit of self-satisfaction and thus lessen our opportunity to be faithful witnesses as churches in our communities.

Meetings in general expressed appreciation for the life and ministry of pastors. Many churches are feeling a new interest in their surrounding communities, both as to spiritual and physical needs, and are acting on these responsibilities.

Many meetings express concern that they have smaller attendance Sunday evening and midweek meetings. Several have inaugurated group prayer meetings and home Bible studies, which have been of great benefit. Also, special effort is being made to relate to the needs of our youth and to involve them in our church.

Churches are emphasizing the distinctive testimonies of Friends, and are endeavoring to relate them to the lives of their members.

We have great appreciation for our church, but there is so much yet to be accomplished. We trust that by analyzing our weaknesses, and opening our hearts and minds to the leading of the Holy Spirit, we shall be able to become a greater power for Christ in this troubled world.

■ 20. A communication was forwarded from Clackamas Park Church requesting that a study be made of our system of elders and overseers, since there is now so little distinction between the duties of these two groups.

This was referred to the representatives. (See minute 56.)

■ 21. The following communication was received from Inland Quarterly Meeting:

Inland Quarterly Meeting approved sending the following evaluation and recommendation in regard to the quarterly meeting program for this year to the Yearly Meeting sessions:

It is recommended that a Business Committee consisting of the secretaries of the committees of the Area Conference meet to take care of business and bring recommendations to the conference for action. This is to be done in order to expedite matters and make the business meetings shorter.

Also, the youth groups are to work with and through the Christian education secretary.

The Christian education secretary would work with the sponsors of the youth groups.

Earl P. Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee, stated that such action can be taken by any quarterly meeting without disciplinary

change. This explanation was approved.

- 22. The Executive Council unanimously recommended to the Yearly Meeting the calling of Jack L. Willcuts as general superintendent for the period July 1, 1970, through June 30, 1971.

Approved.

A standing expression of appreciation was given for the work of our general superintendent.

- 23. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting the following salary arrangements for our general superintendent for the 1969-70 year:

- 24. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting the appointment of Beatrice Goldsmith as business secretary and Marilyn Richey as administrative secretary of the Yearly Meeting Office, with salary arrangements as follows: Beatrice Goldsmith—\$4,800 for the year; Marilyn Richey—\$4,500 for the year; both for the year July 1, 1969 to June 30, 1970.

Approved.

- 25. Evaluations of the innovation of the *area rallies* from Salem and Greenleaf Quarterly Meetings were read. Both told of notably greater attendance in these efforts. Both expressed optimism, but some held reservations.

## BOARD OF PUBLICATION

- 26. Harold Antrim, chairman of the Board of Publication, presented the work of the board. A graph was presented showing the growth of the work of Barclay Press over the last ten-year period, from an income and expenditure of around \$21,000 in 1959 to nearly \$100,000 in 1969.

Special recognition was expressed for the fine leadership of Harold Antrim, who is retiring as president of the board.

Dorothy Barratt spoke of our involvement in George Fox Press, and the Aldersgate Sunday school curriculum, which is being used by the four yearly meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

Approved.

- 27. As the afternoon session opened, Alvin Roberts led in prayer.
- 28. The minutes of the morning were read, corrected, and approved.

## BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 29. Charlotte Macy, president of the Board of Evangelism, presented the following report:

The Board of Evangelism has dealt with several important facets of church extension and development this year. Realizing that one of the most crucial needs in the area of growth and expansion is leadership, the board sponsored a High Calling Conference this spring at Twin Rocks conference grounds, which was attended by 34 ministerial students and wives of college and seminary age. We trust that this is only the beginning of a more concentrated effort to contact and encourage the youth of our church who are preparing for Christian vocations.

The *Share Program* was revised and replugged this year, with a total of 561 shareholders contributing 852 shares, or a total of \$4,260 under the new program to Olympic View Church in Tacoma.

The merger of the Parkrose and Lynwood churches in Portland was successfully culminated and has enjoyed the pastoral leadership of Roger Smith this past year.

Our Yearly Meeting is continuing to support the development of a new Friends church in Omaha, Nebraska, in conjunction with the other yearly meetings who are members of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. The new building is being finished, and there is a fine nucleus of faithful people. Harry Dillon serves as their pastor.

While continuing his ministry at Holly Park Church in Seattle, Eugene McDonald has moved to the Kent area, where he has begun visitation and groundwork for a new Friends church in that region. The Board of Evangelism is working with the Holly Park congregation and the new Friends Action Board to determine the most effectual means of ministering in the Holly Park community. Fred Gregory has been serving there for the summer.

The Friends Church Extension Foundation has promoted the sale of investment certificates through general distribution of brochures to Yearly Meeting attenders a year ago and in recent months through a general mailing to 2,500 families on the *Evangelical Friend Northwest Supplement* mailing list. A total of \$19,850 in investment certificates was sold at the 5 percent rate and \$25,000 at 6 percent, a total of \$44,850. These funds are used for church loans to aid in expansion programs.

First Friends Church in Portland began construction in midsummer on a new church building. Boise Friends are expected to begin building in their new location within a month. Cherry Grove Meeting is purchasing property with anticipations to build a new building as soon as possible.

The major extension project of our board for this year has been the new Olympic View Church in Tacoma, formerly known as Northeast Tacoma Meeting. Under the pastoral leadership of Fred and Melva Baker for the past six years, this congregation purchased a new church site and asked for help and counsel from the Yearly Meeting in constructing a new building in a community with tremendous population potential.

This new plant includes a day care center, which will hold official open house August 23, 1969. The Day Care Program is being administered by Will and Jan Howell. It is hoped that this community ministry will open many doors in the area as well as helping to defray some of the financial burden of the building.

Dan and Judy Nolte have accepted the call to give pastoral leadership at Olympic View for this present church year.

Because of unreasonable and unexpected rise in building costs this past winter, there is still a need of approximately \$10,000 more than anticipated to complete this facility. The congregation has sold their old property, borrowed heavily, and given sacrificially. The Board of Evan-

gelism is asking the Yearly Meeting to give again this year to help lift this load. Offering and pledges will be received Sunday evening.

In light of the times in which we live, this board feels a deep sense of urgency to extend God's kingdom with every effectual means. One of our great needs of the hour is dedicated, trained leadership with faith and vision for our task. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest." The fields are white.

Alvin Roberts, retiring member of the Board of Evangelism, spoke of progress made in the area of that board's work during the 17 years that he has served in this capacity. He spoke of his appreciation for the improvement of physical plants during this time, but more appreciation is felt for the new emphasis being made on the building of the spiritual church, the true Church of Jesus Christ.

Clynton Crisman told of the progress of the new Friends church in Omaha during the past two and one-half years. We are cosponsoring this church with other yearly meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

An appeal was made by Board President Charlotte Macy that we as churches have concern and encourage young people to feel the challenge and heed God's call to the ministry and mission field.

Approved.

■ 30. The proposed changes in part I of the *Constitution and Discipline*, Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, "The Church and Its Doctrinal Standards," Chapters 1 and 2, were presented. This was tabled until a later session with permission granted to do any necessary editing in the meantime. (See minutes 48, 57, 94.)

■ 31. The report of the Women's Missionary Union was presented by Julia Pearson, president, as follows:

"To enlist, arouse interest, and unite the women of Oregon Yearly Meeting in missionary work both home and foreign . . ."—so reads the first objective of our Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Union. This we have strived to do this past year. As we give this report, we rejoice in spirit to see how the Lord has worked among the women. This year was designated as membership year, and truly the women worked, for we went over the 1,000 mark in paid-up memberships, and many more than that attended our monthly women's meetings. Several reported special prayer meetings beside the regular monthly meetings, and this we believe is the secret of added interest. Two new unions were organized, and in one place two unions split into three because they had grown so large. Statistics are always more or less dull, but no report is complete without them. Who can report, however, the new resolve to unite a home again because of renewed experience with the Lord as a result of meeting with Christian women? Or how can we measure a life given in full-time service to the Lord because of contact with a Christian group of women? We hope that in giving these statistics we can keep before us what Paul wrote in Philippians 2:13: "For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure."

Again, almost \$13,500 went through our treasurer's hands, and more was given direct to various home and foreign projects. The sum of \$1,093 was given to outfit the Comforts, \$525 to help in the furnishings for the new missionary home in Villa Armonia in Bolivia. We continued to support the Comforts until furlough time and then took on the support of the Thomases in Bolivia.

We printed 2,000 Handbooks for our women's unions of Oregon Yearly Meeting at a cost of \$425 as well as again printing 350 Program Books for the year 1969-70.

Two events of each year were held and financed by the women. Our Yearly Meeting Banquet was held at the high school for 425 women, at which time we raised \$882, which was divided between the missionary retreat in Bolivia and our Mexican work. Our yearly retreat at Pendleton was again divided, one for delegates and others, held from Tuesday until Thursday, and another for business women over the same weekend, October 1-6.

All areas held Spring Rallies; though our attendance at these was smaller this year than last, the blessing of the Lord was manifest each time, and there was renewed interest. We were impressed at the careful planning that went into each one of these rallies.

Many were the ways in which our women raised funds to support the program of the Yearly Meeting Union. Some of these were bake sales, catering banquets and weddings, rummage sales, silent auctions, janitor services, selling cookbooks, quilting and sewing.

Quite a few unions merely take a collection at each meeting to meet their monetary obligations. To support the program of the Yearly Meeting, we figure it takes \$7 per member per year. One dollar of this is for dues and six dollars for our outreach at home and abroad.

We support our home work by giving \$200 per month to two home projects. This year \$100 per month was given to Svenson and \$100 per month to Maplewood. Besides money, we note many helpful activities are being carried on by our women—making lap robes for nursing homes, cleaning and repainting and furnishing Sunday school rooms and providing conveniences for parsonages, helping the sick and those in need, serving meals for those who are ill or in sorrow, and sewing for veterans hospitals, to name a few.

One milestone we have passed is the organization of a union of all the women's missionary societies in the Evangelical Friends Alliance. Our new president for this year (1969-70), Beatrice Benham, went to Denver to meet with the delegates of the other three yearly meetings in the Alliance. There the new organization was formed with Beatrice Benham as president. Our program chairman, Cornelia Holmes, has the honor of writing the program material for this new venture, and we are supporting Karen Knight as our first project.

"To God be the glory, great things He hath done."

A skit showing the doors opened by our Women's Missionary Unions was presented, depicting the doors of Prayer, Christian Fellowship, Service at Home, Service Abroad, and Knowledge of Our Missionaries.

The Women's Missionary Union treasurer's report was presented and appears in the Appendix.

Approved.

■ 32. The Memorial Hour was presented by Evangeline Raymond, committee chairman.

Sheldon Louthan sang the solo, "Home of the Soul."

The names of the deceased were read and appear in the Appendix. Many expressions of appreciation were voiced for the influence of these individuals who now "rest from their labours."

■ 33. The meeting adjourned to meet Thursday morning at 9:15 a.m.

## Thursday, 9:15 a.m.

■ 34. As the morning session opened, George Bales and Lela Morrill led in prayer.

■ 35. The minutes were read and approved with correction.

■ 36. Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts spoke on the meeting of the Evangelical Friends Alliance held at Colorado Springs, Colorado, and told of the need for and progress being made by this group. Walter P. Lee spoke, urging our participation as individuals in EFA meetings.

■ 37. The following recommendation was received:

The Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council in its meeting in April 1969 approved the calling of a general conference of the Evangelical Friends Alliance July 8-12, 1970. This needs approval by the four yearly meetings involved before plans are made. Oregon Yearly Meeting's share of the \$1,800 cost would be \$468. The Executive Council recommends the approval of such a conference and allocating \$468 for Oregon Yearly Meeting's share of this conference.

Approved.

The matter of our financial responsibility was referred to the Board of Finance.

■ 38. The following communication was received from Tigard Monthly Meeting:

It is the concern of this meeting that George Fox College be included in the United Budget of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

We feel there would be some advantages gained to all concerned if George Fox College were included in the Yearly Meeting's United Budget. We speak of *our* college, and we are asked as individuals and as meetings to remember *her* needs in prayer and giving. There might be an increased base for a feeling of *belonging* and an increased awareness of our responsibility to George Fox College by including the college in the United Budget. Possibly more people would be made aware of their rightful role as logical *backers* of the college.

This was forwarded to the Board of General Education.

■ 39. The following recommendations were received from the Executive Council:

For several years, the various programs of the Yearly Meeting have been administered largely by volunteer leaders with only the general superintendent full-time. In 1962 an assistant superintendent was named and served four years, giving particular attention to the church extension and Christian education departments. An administrative secretary was appointed three years ago (1966) to serve as personal secretary to the superintendent and as office manager. For the past two years, a business secretary has worked full time caring for the funds and payroll of all boards and departments, insurance, pension programs, property inventories, and related duties. Part-time personnel serves the Board of Missions with primary responsibilities in literature; Friends Youth have had at different times part-time personnel under salary; and the past year the Camping Committee of the Board of Christian Education and the Twin Rocks Conference Board have engaged the services of a camping director.

The Board of Christian Education, with its varied areas of work in

youth ministries, camping, vacation Bible schools, clubs, and Sunday schools, has believed a full-time director of this department of the Yearly Meeting is needed. With declining Sunday school attendance in recent years, this concern has deepened. Upon requesting such a person, the Board of Christian Education was asked by the Executive Council to postpone for at least one year their plan until a study of church growth could be made. Realizing the basic need is for greater growth among all the churches and that the limited budgets from the constituency make additional administrative salaries difficult, a careful study appeared to be essential to determine proper priorities.

The results of the year of church growth studies attempted by a special committee named by the Yearly Meeting are now available. Among the eight recommendations for improving different aspects of our OYM church life and program believed to affect growth and nongrowth (with others yet to be proposed), is the recommendation that a church growth secretary be sought to serve for a three-year term. While it is hoped he might have training and experience in Christian education in order to strengthen this area of the church, his assignment would be to give his energies to the implementation and administration of the particular programs encompassed in the church growth recommendations. To be effective, these must be introduced and understood by each local meeting. This will require time and creative, thorough effort. It is easy to make great plans without these reaching the local church. He would thus spend time with small groups, committees, in workshops, counseling, and on-the-scene problem solving and encouragement. While the general superintendent will continue his role of working with the pastors, church visitation, and supervision of all departments, it is recognized the ministry of one with other abilities and training is needed in equipping the local leadership for growth. A detailed job description would be developed by the Executive Council, the general superintendent, and the Church Growth Committee.

To find such a person may not be easy, but if God is leading in this concern, he will be found. It may be better to wait until the right individual is available, however, than to select one just to fill a job. By suggesting a term of three years, it is hoped a permanent position will not be assumed, but deliberate flexibility will be maintained in order to meet other needs or emphases, should they arise.

The Executive Council suggests the following job description for church growth secretary:

Work under superintendent, but not as assistant superintendent.

By personal contact, implement church growth on local level.

See that ideas are put into practice, help get churches started on the church growth program.

Meet with leaders, discuss growth goals, direct evangelism, small group development, etc.

Spend time necessary at each selected church to implement church growth, and follow through to produce results.

The Executive Committee further recommends that a new Church Growth Committee be named by the Executive Council, which would also serve as a personnel selection committee.

These recommendations were tabled until a later session. (See minutes 62, 100.)

## BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

■ 40. Walter P. Lee presented the report of the Board of Peace and Service as follows:

Friends could seldom find a more appropriate climate for their peace and service testimony than the present national and world conditions.

With an increasing national aversion to war as a method of settling international problems and with the irrational approaches to the problem of war and conscription by many confused young people, Friends have an unusual opportunity to present Christ's teaching on nonviolence and to exhibit Christ's love in positive alternatives to destructive conflict.

In a world of intense suffering, sorrow, distrust, hatred, starvation, and hopelessness, Friends have a variety of opportunities to reveal Christian love and concern in personal service and in financial support of relief and interracial projects.

We have a distinctive Christian peace message biblically associated with holiness of life that overshadows any philosophical, sociological, economic, or political dissent to war. Evangelicalism and a Christian conscience against participation in violent conflict are compatible, not antagonistic, and many with distorted views have seen new light through our testimony and self-denying alternate service.

In the midst of comparative affluence and the temptation to surround ourselves with selfish luxuries while millions die for want of the bare necessities of life, let us hear again and obey the voice of Christ, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself."

The Board of Peace and Service has endeavored to promote this phase of our church testimony in several ways this past year. In a retreat held by the board in late September, we came to grips with some of the great issues surrounding us and sensed the Lord's direction in reaching decisions and planning future action.

Three of our young men who had performed outstanding alternate service in Vietnam concluded their service in the later part of 1968. Jon Newkirk and Fred Gregory returned to the United States, while Jerry Sandoz agreed to continue work with World Relief Commission and was transferred to Korea to take directive responsibilities in the relief program. Jon Newkirk is engaged in interracial work, and Fred Gregory visited a number of churches to present the challenge of the work done in Vietnam through message and slides. On May 19, Fred assumed the directorship of a community action program in Seattle under the Yearly Meeting. David Strait

and Ron Palmer have also concluded very significant alternate service work in Bolivia under missionary organizations. David Strait has married and is remaining in Bolivia in aviation work for World Gospel Mission. Ron Palmer also remained to complete more work toward a doctorate and is returning to the United States to teach at Seattle Pacific College.

Gary Black went to Vietnam last September under the sponsorship of the board to perform alternate service with World Relief Commission. His work is highly commended by the World Relief Commission.

The board promoted World Relief Sunday in November, and the World Relief Commission reports receiving \$4,056.19 from the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The response was encouraging, but in terms of total membership averages about 66 cents per member. Let us aim for a greater response this year.

The board prepared a letter to Senator Hatfield and President Nixon expressing approval of the proposal to discontinue peacetime conscription in favor of a volunteer army. This was approved by the Executive Council and signed by the general superintendent and clerk of the Yearly Meeting. Copies of Senator Hatfield's proposal as it appeared in the *Oregonian* were obtained, and a quantity sent to each church with the hope that many Friends would write approval to Senator Hatfield and President Nixon.

Robert Newell, graduated by Harvard University in June, and Dorlan Bales, graduated by George Fox College in June, have been appointed by the board for alternate service in Vietnam under World Relief Commission and will begin this service in September. Both these young men are married, and World Relief Commission has agreed to accept responsibility for the support of the wives, who will accept service assignments. Our responsibility for the support of these young men is \$90 per month each, of which their personal allowance is only \$22.50. The bulk of the monthly support goes for travel to Vietnam, food, housing, insurance, medical care, etc. The financial support by many individuals across the Yearly Meeting is needed. These young men have been given some significant assignments. Because of his business preparation, Robert Newell will be manager of a 120-bed hospital recently turned to the WRC by Marines in Vietnam.

The board is planning area rallies in parts of the Yearly Meeting in cooperation with Dr. Wilmer Brown, regional director of the National Association of Evangelicals, in which Dr. Everett S. Graffam, executive vice-president of World Relief Commission, will report the service of our young men and present the unlimited challenge of the relief work in critical areas of the world.

The board is again promoting World Relief Sunday in all of our churches for November 23, the Sunday before Thanksgiving, with the prayer and expectation that the response will exceed that of last year.

A new printing of *The Bible and War* by Paul Mills has been finished.

This year the board received at least partial reports from 52 of the 61 meetings, which is greater than last year's response. However, only 45 churches reported the number of young men between the ages of 18 and 26 for a total of 295. Of these, 45 are serving in the armed forces, National Guard, or reserves, and three are serving as noncombatants. Of the 165 registrants reported, 84 have requested and received 1-O classification (subject to alternate service), and 14 were engaged in alternate service. It was reported that 22 young men completed alternate service. On the basis of the reports, which are incomplete, it appears that over 50 percent of those registered for conscription are registered as conscientious objectors to military service and willing to accept alternate service.

Our *peace* testimony was emphasized in 85 sermons by 27 churches, taught 39 times in Sunday school classes in 12 churches, presented 28 times in discussion groups in 17 churches, portrayed in films or filmstrips eight times in seven churches and given in special presentations 25 times in ten churches. This represents a substantial increase over last year's reports, but more meetings need to join in the emphasis.

In *service* work, the major emphasis this year was on foreign relief, and 30 churches reported giving money; 14 gave clothing, two food, and three CARE packages. In community service, Thanksgiving baskets were given by 12 churches, Christmas baskets by 18, food for missions by six, clothing for missions by 17, disaster aid by 14, aid to resettlement refugees by two, and other types of service by eight.

Concern has continued to grow in *child welfare*. Reports indicated that 21 churches had 36 foster homes caring for 82 children. This is a decided increase over reports for the previous year. There were also six new adoptions of unrelated children during the year. The board does not operate a service in this field but encourages Friends to become involved in meeting these needs. The activities of Friends are encouraging.

Approved.

Jack L. Willcuts spoke of the increasing feeling of responsibility among several of our meetings who are sensing a need and an opportunity in interracial and underprivileged areas.

As a result of this, the Yearly Meeting Executive Council has formed the Friends Action Board to minister in these needy areas.

Fred Gregory, who has been working in this type of ministry in the Seattle area this summer, told of his concern, using the story of the Good Samaritan, and wondered how many of our fine Christian people have a tendency to "pass by on the other side." He works with the Holly Park Area Community Council, with facilities in our own Holly Park Church for a day care center.

The inauguration of the Friends Action Board was approved, and the names of its members appear in the Appendix.

Wilmer N. Brown, northwest regional director of the National Association of Evangelicals, urged us to cooperation and haste in meeting the spiritual and social problems of the world.

Approved.

■ 41. Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts introduced the following new pastors: Lowell Kester, Tigard, Oregon; Gordon St. George, Greenleaf, Idaho.

Also, members of Young Friends of North America present in our sessions were introduced as follows: Marelyn Thomas of Barnesville, Ohio; Susan Meyerding of Abington, Pennsylvania, Philadelphia Yearly Meeting; Robin Latimer of London Yearly Meeting, and Neil Stoddard of Providence Meeting, Philadelphia Yearly Meeting.

## Thursday, 2:30 p.m.

■ 42. The afternoon business session opened as Clifton Ross led in prayer.

■ 43. Richard H. Tusant, Jr., with Bible International, was introduced to the meeting and brought his greetings; also Douglas V. Steere and wife, Dorothy M. Steere, of Philadelphia Yearly Meeting, were introduced.

■ 44. Word came that John and Deva Tish, long-time members of Oregon

Yearly Meeting, are both critically ill in the Caldwell, Idaho, hospital. Also, further word came from Esther Cossel regarding the condition of her husband, Richard Cossel, pastor at Quincy, Washington, following his serious accident. These need our prayers.

■ 45. The representatives presented the following nominations to the Board of Christian Education: For three-year terms—Philip Harmon, Harold Antrim, Peggy Cadd; for a two-year term—Dorothy Barratt; for a one-year term—Charles Neifert, Kara Cole.

■ 46. The representatives made the following nominations for three-year terms to the Board of Missions: Donald Lamm, Paul Cammack, Richard Krupp.

■ 47. The following communication was received from Newberg Quarterly Meeting:

Newberg Quarterly Meeting discussed the proposed *Constitution and Discipline* changes as they affect the quarterly meeting organization and work at its regular business meeting and rally held August 2, 1969. Not many members were present, and there were some objections to adopting the changes. Expressions favoring the continuance of the area rally program and adopting the proposals made at Yearly Meeting last year seemed to predominate, and the clerk directed that this opinion be sent to the Yearly Meeting.

■ 48. The proposed changes in Part I of the *Constitution and Discipline*, Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, Chapter I, "The Church and Its Doctrinal Standards," was presented for further consideration.

After much discussion, the matter was tabled. (See minutes 30, 57, 94.)

## BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

■ 49. Richard Beebe, chairman of the Board of General Education, presented the following report:

Throughout the Bible, we have examples and admonitions to give attention to the education and training of our youth. Familiar to each of us is Proverbs 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it," and 2 Timothy 2:15, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

Historically, we as Friends have carried this concern and supported Christian and public schools.

It appears we as a nation have reached a zenith or at least a plateau of accomplishment in placing men on the moon. We are justly proud of an educational system that has contributed to the base of technology that makes the conquering of space almost routine. The question is, How do we as Christians concerned with education fit into this vast explosion of opportunity?

*Statistics.* From statistics reported on the blanks from the various monthly meetings, we observe that our churches have under their care approximately 1,200 junior and senior high school students. Currently, at least 215 persons are engaged in pursuit of a baccalaureate degree, with 119 of these at George Fox College this past year. Another 31 are receiving special

training in vocational schools. Thirty-five indicate they are in preparation for full-time Christian service. We have among us 291 adults engaged in some aspect of teaching or administration of public or private education. Fifteen of these have joined the National Educators Fellowship, an interdenominational organization of Christian teachers. Twelve scholarships or grants-in-aid were provided by churches to help students. These were in addition to quarterly meeting scholarships. There were 113 presentations regarding George Fox College and 19 presentations regarding Greenleaf Academy.

*Ministerial Financial Aid.* The development of adequate leadership has been of increasing concern. This year there were seven ministerial students receiving tuition support in the total amount of \$2,767. Three of these were at Western Evangelical Seminary, two at Asbury Seminary, and two at George Fox College. This is a great advance in the education program of the church. These funds are administered by a joint committee chosen from the Boards of Evangelism and General Education.

*Savings Investment Plan.* The legal details of the Savings Investment Plan are being worked out, and it is anticipated that this plan can become effective in the near future. (See *Minutes* 1967, page 27, minute 54.)

*The Christian Home.* During this era of apparent moral and spiritual decay, it is imperative that the Christian home be fortified to provide the best possible atmosphere for the nurture of our children and youth. The board has carried this concern, and former president, Kenneth Williams, has written a series of lessons on the Christian home. These are ready for final editing and should be available soon. We believe these can serve as a useful tool in focusing attention on some of the areas of need in many of our homes and giving opportunity to examine them in the light of Holy Scripture. These are adaptable to small discussion groups.

*Christian Education.* With the closing of Cascade College, we recognize anew the arduous task it is to be assured of a Christian college surviving in these times of inflationary and secular pressures. Through the leadership of Milo Ross and David Le Shana, each striving to operate under divine guidance, George Fox College has arrived at a new position of accreditation and strength. However, there has been continuing concern on the part of the college administration and laymen of the Yearly Meeting that the spiritual life of the students be strengthened and the highest standards of Christian morality be upheld. From this concern came the request to the Executive Council in session February 1969 to have included in the General Education budget \$4,000 to be used for one-half time support of the position of director of spiritual life and chaplain on campus. This is the position held this year by Ronald Crecelius. The job description includes counseling with individual students during the week and with their parents on the weekends. The board feels we need this direct spiritual tie with the college and need to support it financially to insure its ability to weather budget cuts or other realignment of staff priorities. It is hoped that this can soon be increased to full support. We are concerned that we as a Yearly Meeting continue to prayerfully and financially support our college and that we continue to send our youth to George Fox College for a Christ-centered, academically-sound education.

As we look to the future with its abundance of opportunities and with each opportunity a potential set of problems, let us pray earnestly that the Lord will continue to guide us in the education and training of our youth that they might develop into Christian leaders for this age.

Approved.

■ 50. Paul Petticord, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, brought a challenging report presenting statistics of that school, and also literature telling of their goals and accomplishments.

The report was accepted.

■ 51. The representatives submitted the following nominations for three-year terms to the Board of Publication: Ralph Beebe, Phyllis Cammack. Approved.

## BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

■ 52. Mildred Minthorne presented the report of the Board of Moral Action as follows:

The Board of Moral Action during the past church year has endeavored to be of assistance to all the churches in achieving its purposes, which encompass two broad fields included in the departments of public morals and literature. We believe it is of grave importance to us all that our churches persevere in a continuing program of alcohol education to reach all ages. Necessary also is warning and education about other habit-forming drugs, teaching the sacredness of sex and marriage, supporting legislation upholding moral issues, encouraging clean recreation and the like. We have sent encouraging letters to each meeting, suggested useful materials and methods for accomplishing these goals. We conducted a poster and essay contest also.

We have revised the list of films on these subjects, and it is included with those printed by the Board of Christian Education. They are available for all the churches. We hope our excellent filmstrip library will see wide use. Two more films have been obtained since the list was printed and are also available. One is called *Why Not Marijuana?* and the other *Goof Balls and Pep Pills*.

We have encouraged temperance education in our youth camps throughout the Yearly Meeting and can report that at least 303 young people were reached by such a class or emphasis this summer.

Forty-four meetings reported 160 specific presentations about public morals problems and 182 more sermons in which references were made. There were 103 posters displayed, 69 of which were made by our own people; 31 wrote essays; 211 total abstinence or commitment pledges were distributed, and 40 books added to libraries in this field of concern. It appears that there were fewer quarterly meeting presentations, since only five churches reported knowing of any.

The opportunity to use Youth Temperance Education Week or Commitment Sunday for emphasis was taken by only 14 meetings, and some of these may have emphasized both on the same Sunday. Therefore, it would seem that 30 or more meetings do not wish to have special days or weeks to publicize moral action concerns. Twelve young people attended a temperance camp, and two adults helped. Thirty-six churches presented some kind of legislative or election concerns, and 442 bulletin or public announcements were made. Presentations were made in the usual ways through visual aids, sermons, Sunday school opening assemblies, but we felt that three seminars or series of meetings on moral problems were outstanding, and several churches asked law enforcement officials to speak at these or other meetings.

It is evident that there is much moral action concern in the Yearly Meeting, but we are sorry that many churches report no work on their

reports and others do not bother to send in the blank. All of our members and attenders need to know the truth because no community is free of these problems.

Of 43 churches reporting to the Department of Literature, 40 have church libraries and 35 have additional materials such as phono-records, filmstrips, and Sunday school teaching materials. There were 866 books added this year, making a total of 12,253 volumes.

Bible reading was encouraged in 23 churches with the use of devotional books, *Fruit of the Vine*, midweek study, and National Bible Week book-marks. Reading of books was encouraged in 27 churches by book reviews, bulletin boards, and other means.

Prevalence of obscene literature is of increasing concern, and individuals contacted local merchants with protests, and commendations, wrote congressmen urging legislation, wrote letters of protest to authors, and presented the dangers of pornographic literature in Friends Youth groups, story hour, and Sunday school.

Many churches reported other activities. Boise appointed a librarian to improve an unorganized situation. Sherwood has new library shelving. Tigard has someone to read to small children during prayer meeting and Sunday evening service in the library room. Clackamas Park has a special library for teens, and Rose Valley opened a junior library in the junior department. Olympic View is providing library space in their new building. Greenleaf secured 519 signatures to a petition to allow astronauts to read the Bible in space, and 50 youth signatures to Word of Life petition to ban pornographic literature and to put prayer back in schools.

Microfilm copies of dissertations by Quakers or on Quaker subjects are being ordered by this board for the Western Evangelical Seminary library in the amount of \$50.

There are other areas of concern to the board too numerous to name here. We do urge all of our people to be alert and diligent to what they can do to educate our children and young people and to wrestle with the many public morals problems that permeate our society today.

■ 53. Gene Hockett led in prayer as the Friday morning business session opened.

■ 54. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 55. The State of the Church report from Newberg Quarterly Meeting was read.

■ 56. The proposition from Clackamas Park Monthly Meeting, which was referred to the representatives by the Yearly Meeting, was read and considered. The representatives recommend that this change—making the offices of elder and overseer one—be approved and that this be referred to the Discipline Revision Committee with instruction to put it in proper disciplinary form and wording.

This was referred to the Discipline Revision Committee to word in conjunction with the committee from the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight. (See minute 20.)

■ 57. The proposed changes in Part I of the *Constitution and Discipline*, Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, "The Church and Its Doctrinal Standards," Chapter I—Historical Statement, and Chapter II—Doctrines and Testimonies, were adopted with minor editorial changes. (See minutes 30, 48, 94.)

■ 58. David Le Shana, new president of George Fox College, introduced the college report, bringing out facts and statistics, emphasizing where we have been, where we now are, and where we are going as a college. He requested our commitment to and our prayers for the future of George Fox College.

A formal printed report, prepared by outgoing president, Milo C. Ross, was distributed. Excerpts appear below. (The complete text may be secured from the George Fox College office.)

The following report is my last and concludes 15 years as president of the college. I have been released to assume the chancellorship of the Associated Christian Colleges of Oregon, and Dr. David Le Shana became the ninth president of George Fox College on July 1.

## THE ASSOCIATED CHRISTIAN COLLEGES OF OREGON

George Fox has been a founding member since the initiation of the venture, but a series of providential circumstances have occurred since the last annual report that have greatly changed our posture and connection. Dr. D. Elton Trueblood called a national conference in Chicago attended not only by our own community but by religious, foundation, and college leaders from several centers, and then assisted us in creating a national board of advisors composed of himself as honorary chairman, Dr. Ralph G. Turnbull, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Seattle as active chairman, and together with the Honorable Mark O. Hatfield, Dr. Paul S. Rees, vice-president of World Vision, Inc., and Dr. A. A. Heckman of the Louis W. and Maud Hill Family Foundation. His manifesto carries the challenge of his thought and vision:

"A New Academic Style" by Dr. D. Elton Trueblood, author of *The Idea of a College* and many other books.

Thoughtful people are deeply worried about their colleges and universities. They are not worried because of dissent; they are worried because of decay. The decay is evident in both the avowedly secular institutions and in what are called "church related colleges," though the causes for dissatisfaction are not always the same.

It is no accident that the institutions in which there has been most hatred and even violence tend to be the largest and the most impersonal. The reaction of angry students, though it cannot reasonably be condoned, can be understood. They feel that they are really being neglected. They are resentful of the fact that they are not involved in a truly educational enterprise.

The decay of the church-related college is somewhat different, but equally discouraging. In the majority the church connection has become merely nominal and the element of Christian commitment almost wholly lacking. The ex-Christian college is often more unresponsive to a vital Christian message than is the state university. This is partly because of rejection of an image of which many are really ashamed. In the majority of cases required attendance at chapel has been given up and, though voluntary chapel has been retained, it amounts to practically nothing. The boast of the Christian college that it was a genuine community is now, in the majority, a hollow one, and there is literally nothing which all do together. The outcome is that the post-Christian college makes many of the mistakes of the frankly secular university, but lacks its academic and financial strength. The result is truly pathetic.

What we sorely need is a new start.

Our greatest hope lies in the idea of a cluster. This is not a new idea, in that it has long been demonstrated at both Oxford and Cambridge. What has not been seriously tried and what is full of hope is the development of a cluster of colleges which combine academic ambitions with unapologetic dedication to the Christian way of life and thought.

The new kind of cluster involves great hope because it would combine two important features. Today some institutions have great academic strength, but without the unifying spirit which the Christian faith can provide. Others are loyal to the Christian faith, but are so isolated that much of the potential richness of academic experience is impossible. If we can bring into one cluster a number of truly Christian colleges we may be able to have both strength and spirit, and it is precisely this combination which our time requires.

The dream which now possesses us is that of four or five Christian colleges, of about the same size, with contiguous campus areas. Between them there could be friendly rivalry, such as has long been known between the ancient Oxford colleges. Each college would be truly autonomous maintaining its own identity in worship. In addition there should be property held in common by the contiguous colleges. In the common area there could be a jointly owned library, field house, auditorium and administrative facilities. This would accomplish a great financial saving, and make possible better facilities than any of the clustered colleges could provide singly. But perhaps what has often been neglected is the firm base of church support and loyalty lost in mergers or going public.

The cluster might well become a true university in that it would combine both individuality and unity.

The value of the new pattern must be proved in one place because it can be expected to spread. The good news is that there is now a concrete opportunity to make a start in one place, Oregon; George Fox College and Warner Pacific College are ready to begin the experiment; in fact, they already have a successful history of four years of cooperation.

Here is a big new idea whose time has come. The embodiment of the idea now awaits the kind of moral and financial support which will make such a bold venture possible. Those who may be expected to implement the idea are persons who are, on the one hand, truly committed Christians, and, on the other hand, persons sophisticated enough to know that something new is needed in the academic life of our beloved nation.

When one comes to the conclusion of a period, one is caught in a mix

of emotions.

If I have one prayer as a benediction, it is the one credited to Moses, and recorded at the end of the 90th Psalm: "Let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us; and establish thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish thou it."

At the close of the college presentation, Presiding Clerk Dorwin Smith asked that Yearly Meeting Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts lead us in a dedicatory prayer for our college, and for us as constituents.

The College treasurer's report was presented and appears in the Appendix.

The report of George Fox College was approved.

Ernest Fritschle has returned his certificate of recording as a minister. After correspondence with the local monthly meeting where he retains his membership, we recommend that his name be removed from the list of

recorded ministers of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Quincy Fodge has stated his desire to surrender his certificate of recording. We recommend that this action be taken and his name be removed from the list of recorded ministers of Oregon Yearly Meeting. In compliance with his request, full investigation has been made with the meeting in which he is a member.

## BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- 80. The report of the Board of Christian Education, which was presented in the Friday evening service, was approved. A summary, prepared by the board president, follows:

The Christian Education board has actively supported the church growth studies being made by our Superintendent Jack Willcuts and Dr. Myron Goldsmith.

*Sunday school committee report—Elizabeth Edwards, chairman*

The Sunday school committee has endeavored to work through the Christian education superintendents of each quarterly meeting as much as possible in encouraging stronger Sunday schools in each quarterly meeting. We have sent out seven mailings through the Yearly Meeting office with three copies to each church—the pastor, Sunday school superintendent and Christian education chairman. The mailings set forth the goals for the year and specific suggestions as to what might help to reach these goals.

In January we sent out reviews from three Sunday schools that were doing outstanding work—Camas, Rose Valley, and Eugene.

At retreat we decided to not ask the churches to complete the lengthy questionnaire as previously used following the achievement goals. Rather we decided to encourage the use of the goals, but the yearly report consisted of three simple questions regarding their goals. On this basis plus the factor of amount of Sunday school growth, four Sunday schools were chosen for special recognition at Yearly Meeting time—Eugene, Silverton, Hayden Lake, and Cherry Grove. The details and pictures available from these churches were presented in a Christian Education News Sheet given out at Yearly Meeting. The Sunday school attendance for the year was down from last year. A Sunday school contest from September 14 to October 5 was well announced before Yearly Meeting. This contest will be based entirely on increase of attendance with valuable visual aids as awards.

#### *Camping committee report—Philip Harmon, chairman*

Approximately 1,500 campers have participated in our camping program, and the Lord has richly blessed as decisions for Him have been made.

This past year saw the Yearly Meeting High School Camp enter into a new phase of diversified camping with Wrangler Camp, Mountain Camp, and Island Camp.

Many changes in our camping facilities are taking place with improvements at Twin Rocks, the sale of Wauna Mer by Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting and camps being held on a number of rental grounds.

Charlotte Macy has served as a camp coordinator on a part-time salaried basis and has contributed much to our overall camping program.

We continued our membership in the International Christian Camp Association.

Back packing has been used even more extensively this year across the Yearly Meeting, under the direction of Dale Lingenfelter who has been employed during the summer months to travel with the equipment and aid in the camps.

#### *Youth committee report—Charles Mylander, chairman*

Gary Macy and Bill Adams have led Friends Youth as president and visitation secretary. Their leadership and dedication have been an inspiration.

Nine young people have served as Youth Ambassadors this summer: John Beck at Olympic View; Cyril Carr at Albuquerque, New Mexico; Gale Field at Newberg; Randy Lowery at First Friends, Portland; Marilyn May and Marilyn Wilhite at Holly Park; Gwen McConnaughey at Svensen; Louise Strait at Rosedale; Lorraine Watson at Marion.

The Friends Youth have budgeted money for furnishings for the guest house in La Paz. The project for the coming year is to purchase books for the new library at the Bible Institute in Bolivia. The purchase of some audiovisual equipment is also anticipated.

Midwinter and Yearly Meeting activities continue to be two of the outstanding youth emphases. One hundred thirty-one young people registered for Yearly Meeting activities (1969).

Approximately 100 junior highers attended three jamborees during the spring.

#### *Junior Yearly Meeting committee—Peggy Cadd, chairman*

This year we had nursery care, preschool, primary, and junior Yearly Meeting. We also added evening meetings for the primary age children. On Friday night we even included those through junior age. Each day we cared for more than 200 children during morning, afternoon, and evening.

■ 81. The report of the Church Music Committee was presented by the chairman, Ruth Corbin, as follows:

Your musicians throughout the Yearly Meeting have been faithfully working this year, as indicated by the 36 yearly reports that were sent in.

Indications are that there are 47 churches with some kind of adult choir, most of which are active at least nine months of the year. At least 19 cantatas were presented.

Especially is it gratifying to note the youth and children's choirs that have been reported. Rose Valley reported 12 little singers performing regularly. East Wenatchee has a seasonal children's choir of 15, and Silverton reports a teen choir of 20 and a children's choir of 16, who sing regularly. Timber now has a children's choir of 15 voices that sing seasonally. Sherwood has a youth choir of 25 voices, and Talent a youth choir of eight and a children's choir of 11. Eugene reports a children's choir of 14. Emmett, besides a regular adult choir of 11, has a children's choir of 12. Meadows Valley has a seasonal children's choir, and Star is training a large children's choir of 25 voices, which is becoming well-known in the community. First Friends, Portland, had 47 youth and children singing during the year.

Two churches reported organs for the first time, bringing the total number of electric organs in use to 43.

Seven churches observed March as music month, and seven said they had used the *Church Musicians' Handbook* this year.

## BOARD OF MISSIONS

■ 82. The following report of the Board of Missions, which was presented in the Thursday evening meeting, was approved:

"The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad." (Psalm 126:3) We are pleased to report another exciting year in the missionary program of Oregon Yearly Meeting, both at home and abroad. The full board met twice during the year, at Redmond in November and at Newberg in February. The Administrative Committee met eight times since last Yearly Meeting.

*Missionary Committee Reports*—Reports were received from 55 local meetings. These are helpful to the board, although we cannot fully appreciate the work and prayers of many people by reviewing these reports. Below is a summary of the information submitted:

## BOLIVIA

You are encouraged to read the personal reports of our missionaries, which are mimeographed for your convenience.

B. The National Church remains strong under the able leadership of the Mesa Directiva. There is a good working relationship between the National Church and the missionaries. The Patmos Bible Institute, under national leaders, completed its fourth successful year in August, 1969.

The new tabernacle at its new location has not been completed, but the response of the National Churches in this project has been remarkable. The first Junta Anual was held there in April, even though the roof was not yet on the structure.

C. Missionary Home: The members of Oregon Yearly Meeting gave generously this past year for the construction of a new house designed to serve as a residence for a missionary family and headquarters for the mission. Having improved a small dwelling already on the property, the Thomases are now living there. The staff is working feverishly to get proper clearance from local authorities so they can proceed with building the house.

God is blessing our missionaries as they labor with the brethren in quarterly meetings and tent meetings, as well as teaching in the Bible Institute.

## PERU

### A. Missionary Personnel:

Quentin and Florene Nordyke (second term; furlough due July 1, 1970)

Nicholas and Alice Maurer (beginning furlough July 1, 1969)

Edwin and Marie Cammack (language school September, 1968; due in field September, 1969). The Cammacks will take a vacation after finishing their studies and plan to drive a new Landrover from Lima to Juli.

B. Aymara Language Study—Quentin Nordyke was liberated for four months to attend a school in Cochabamba, Bolivia, for the purpose of learning the Aymara language. This is the first opportunity our missionaries have had for such study. The board is planning for other missionaries to attend this school in the future.

C. Extension Bible Institute—One of the most promising adventures since we entered Peru is a project started last June known as an Extension Bible Institute. After considerable research and many contacts with missionaries in other fields where this plan is being used, our Peruvian Council recommended its adoption. For the present needs in Peru, this program has advantages over the residence-type Bible school. The school goes to the existing leaders rather than trying to uproot them from their homes and fields or work and combining them with or without their families in a resident-student body. The students are given their training in regional centers, coming together with the teacher once a week. "Programmed Aymara Texts" have been prepared by a committee named by the board, most of them former missionaries.

Because the Maurers started their furlough just as this project was

scheduled to get underway, the Stansells were loaned to Peru for the summer to assist the Nordykes.

D. Inter-mission Fields: A recent highlight in the National Church of Peru was a visiting delegation of more than 35 Bolivian brethren—Antonio Mamani, Arturo Tito, and the Max Paredes Church choir. They preached, sang, and had classes for the brethren at quarterly meeting. Ron Stansell writes that they were really appreciated.

## KOREAN CHURCH

The board is pleased with the able and consistent leadership of Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim. The church in Portland is maturing, and their ministry, primarily to seamen who frequent the ports of Portland, is noticeably stronger. Average attendance is 45, reaching an all-time high of 93 on Mother's Day.

## MEXICO

After three years the Evangelical Friends Mexican Mission, under the direction of Roscoe and Tina Knight, has reported encouraging results. Their witnessing has been almost exclusively in homes and to individuals on the streets. They now have at least five homes where regular services are held, with some 25 to 30 converts. The weekly meetings include as many as 50 or more people, and at Easter time at their first annual meeting 75 were in attendance.

## IN APPRECIATION

The board is grateful for the fine services of Ralph Chapman, director of the Friends Missionary Literature Service, and for his production of the monthly prayer bulletins and the missionary calendars.

Thanks goes also to the Women's Missionary Union for their continued support in many ways, including the salaries of the Thomases, and to the Friends Men, for their most generous contribution by purchasing another new Landrover for Peru.

The report was approved, and a number of expressions of appreciation were expressed for the work and influence of Greenleaf Academy.

■ 100. The Board of Finance presented the following regarding the recommendation for a church growth secretary:

The Board of Finance has given consideration to the financial aspect of the proposal and is willing to include in the Fixed Expense budget \$2,500 for this purpose, subject to the acceptance of the budget by the Yearly Meeting. Details of the proposal will be found in Fixed Expense as presented for later approval.

This was approved, together with the job description for the church growth secretary. (See minutes 39, 62.)

■ 101. The following recommendations were made from the floor:

We recommend that each church in Oregon Yearly Meeting give serious study to the report of the Church Growth Study Committee and that each church take aggressive steps to implement the suggestions proposed in the study.

It was further recommended that the area superintendent should also take steps to see that the Church Growth Study book be emphasized at each area rally. In addition, he should work closely with the area secretaries, helping them to work with the local churches in the implementation of the church growth objectives.

These recommendations were approved.

WHEREAS there appears to be little or nothing stated in our several Disciplines, dealing with some of these current social and moral problems, and what positions have been taken differ from yearly meeting to yearly meeting, so that the concerns of the church may not have kept pace with the issues facing our congregations, families, and youth;

BE IT RESOLVED that a conference be convened at George Fox College to prayerfully review our testimonies and traditions in the light of the Holy Scriptures and our historical practices, and that we endeavor, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to bring up-to-date these attitudes and practices from our spiritual heritage and also come to grips with new issues, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that an invitation be extended to these three Yearly Meetings in session to name a committee of leading Friends (including youth) of at least six persons, to give themselves to this task, in the prayerful hope that we shall be better able to serve our present age; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a steering committee of the George Fox College board of trustees, administration, and student body be authorized to suggest the time and place, to prepare the agenda and eventually convene the conference.

In response to the foregoing, the Executive Council recommended the following be nominated for the Current Issues Conference to be held this fall at George Fox College: Kenneth Williams, Jack Willcuts, Gerald Dillon, Harold Clark, Mildred Minthorne, Mahlon Macy, Fred Gregory, Kent Thornburg, Charlene Campbell.

We have received 20 communications from other yearly meetings, 14 of these from America and six from foreign countries. Some items of interest follow:

*Japan Yearly Meeting*—"We give thanks that Friends have been able to maintain our witness to the Spirit of Christ, despite the many changes which have taken place during the years."

*Western Yearly Meeting*—"In both retrospect and prospect, we see evidences of growth: an increase in the number of ministers recorded and in preparation for recording."

*Ohio Yearly Meeting*—"Foreign Missions continue to be a major challenge to us. On the Monday night of yearly meeting week two missionary banquets were held with 461 present at the Women's Banquet and 230 at the Men's Banquet."

*Kansas Yearly Meeting*—"We appreciated the fellowship afforded by the presence of 11 missionaries to Burundi, Africa. Three young men were recorded as ministers."

*Central Yearly Meeting*—"Communications from our foreign missionaries have brought very encouraging reports of their labors and victories on

the field as they teach and preach the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. They express great joy in doing the Lord's will."

*Iowa Yearly Meeting*—"Our inspirational speaker was Gerald Dillon, professor of Christian Ministry at Western Evangelical Seminary, Portland, Oregon. He spoke of the baptism with the Holy Spirit as witnessed at the church at Antioch. The Holy Spirit is the official representative of Christ on earth. He uses men and women to carry on His work."

*Nebraska Yearly Meeting*—"Nebraska Yearly Meeting has a duty in helping to close the gap between youth and the adults. This demands, on the part of both youth and adults, open minds and hearts, much tolerance and patience, a greater than human wisdom, and a vast amount of loving and praying."
