CONTRIBUTORS

PAUL ANDERSON serves as professor of biblical and Quaker studies at George Fox University, where he has taught since 1989. Paul is co-chair of the John, Jesus, and History Group (SBL) and is co-editor of its three volumes. He is author of *Meet the Friends* (revised 2004) and co-editor (with Howard Macy) of *Truth's Bright Embrace* (1996).

HUGH BARBOUR taught Quaker and church history, Bible, Asian religions, and peace studies at Earlham College and ESR from 1953 to 1991. His *Quakers in Puritan England* (1964) restored Quaker ideas of “the Lamb’s War,” and many of the writings on which it was based are published in *Early Quaker Writings* (co-edited with Arthur Roberts and reissued in 2004).

CHRISTINE DOWNING currently serves as professor of mythological studies at Pacifica Graduate Institute in Santa Barbara, CA after a long career of teaching in public universities. Her most recent publications include *The Luxury of Afterwards* (2004), *Preludes* (2005), and *Gleanings* (2006). She and her partner, River Malcolm, live on Orcas Island, WA, but maintain their membership in the La Jolla, CA Friends Meeting.

DOUGLAS GWYN serves as pastor of First Friends Meeting of Richmond, IN. Known as a leading interpreter of the message of early Friends and its implications for later generations, Doug’s books include *The Apocalypse of the Word* (1986), *The Covenant Crucified* (1995), and *Seekers Found* (2001).

T. CANBY JONES taught at Wilmington College from 1955 to 1987 and has served as professor emeritus since. His publications include *George Fox’s Attitude Toward War* (1984), *The Power of the Lord is Over All* (1989), and *Thomas Kelly as I Remember Him* (1989).

KATE NEWLIN is a member of Strawberry Creek Monthly Meeting in Berkeley, CA. She is currently working on an MA in Quaker Studies at ESR and is interested in the Young Adult Friends movement and in reviving traveling ministry as a core feature of the wider Friends community.

T. VAIL PALMER, Jr. is a recorded minister of Freedom Friends Church (unaffiliated), in Salem, OR. He was editor of *Quaker Religious Thought* from 1974 to 1978, and then co-editor (with Dean Freiday) from 1979 to 1982.

RUTH PITMAN is originally from Philadelphia but has lived and traveled among Friends of various sorts. She now lives in North Olmsted, OH, a suburb of Cleveland and attends the Friends Church there. Her article on Quaker symbolism appeared in *QRT* #50.

ARTHUR O. ROBERTS has served as professor at large at George Fox University for the last twenty years. Some of his leading Quaker publications include *Through Flaming Sword* (revised 2008), *Tomorrow is Growing Old: Stories of Quakers in Alaska* (1978), and *Early Quaker Writings* (co-edited with Hugh Barbour and reissued in 2004).
