1972

- 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its eightieth session August 15, 1972, at 10:15 a.m., George Fox College, Newberg, Oregon.

In an age that might be characterized by historians as the decade of dissent, drugs, and mysticism, we pray that these sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting may play a large part in making this an era of evangelism and of alleviating human ills in our world under the direction of the Holy Spirit.

Clerk Dorwin Smith led the congregation in prayer.

- 2. David C. Le Shana, president of George Fox College, welcomed the Yearly Meeting to its first sessions held on the campus of the college.

The Four Flats quartet, composed of Harlow Ankeny, Richard Cadd, Ronald Crecelius, and Norval Hadley, sang "No One Ever Cared for Me Like Jesus."

- 3. Milo C. Ross made the following presentation in observance of the three hundredth anniversary of George Fox's arrival on the American continent:

The year 1972 is 300 years after the original trip of George Fox, the founder of the Society of Friends, to the American continent, and is being observed in various ways by a number of the yearly meetings in session. He made a major journey to the West Indies and the length of the eastern seaboard of the English Colonies lasting almost two full years from August 1671 to the last of June 1673.

His *Journal* runs to narrative in the later parts and stops altogether in 1675. Thus, his letters, his epistles to American Friends, became more valuable, directed as they were to people whom he had met and learned to love in the Gospel. For the historical correctness of what I say, I am leaning heavily on Edwin Bronner of Philadelphia Yearly Meeting and Haverford College.

Why did George Fox make this long and arduous journey to the British West Indies, to the Chesapeake, to Long Island, up into Rhode Island, and back again to Virginia and Carolina?

One reason was the serious persecution after the restoration of the monarchy in 1660. A great many Friends were in prison. He, himself, was in prison three times in five years: In Lancaster Castle in 1660, Leicester in 1662, and Scarborough in 1664. When he came out of prison in 1666, he began to move from place to place to help his young society recover from its wounds and organize. He helped set up London Yearly Meeting in 1668. He also went to Ireland. But Friends had scattered to many places, not only because of the persecution but to witness to the Good News.

Friends were strongly entrenched in many places. Significant colonies of Children of the Light had formed in the Indies, especially Barbados; this island meant more to the crown (and perhaps to Friends) at that time than all of our 13 colonies!

Let us listen to his message to them in New Jersey, written later in 1676; "... let your lives and words and conversations be as becomes the Gospel, that you may adorn the Truth, and honour the Lord in all your undertakings. Let that only be in your eye, and then you will have the Lord's blessing and increase . . . So that you may answer the Light and the truth in all people . . . serving the Lord, and being valiant for his Truth, with a joyful heart; upon the earth, and the glorious Name in whom you have Salvation.

"And keep up your meetings for worship, and your men and women's meetings, for the affairs of truth, both monthly and quarterly: And after you are settled: you may join together, and build a meeting house. And do not strive about outward things, but dwell in the Love of God, for that will unite you together, and make you kind and gentle one towards another; and to seek one another's good and welfare . . . and let temperance and patience and kindness, and brotherly love be exercised among you, so that you may abound in virtue, and the true humility; living in peace, showing forth the nature of Christianity, that you may live as a family . . .

"And write over yearly, from your meetings, how you are settled, and how your affairs go in the truth, and how your men and women's meetings are settled . . . So that the Lord may crown all your actions with his glory. So with my Love to all."

About a dozen Quakers accompanied Fox to Barbados. Pursued by pirates, the captain was desperate and turned to Fox for guidance. Fox had complete confidence that God would direct them and protect them, and told the captain what to do. They escaped, but in a few days the captain changed his tune; instead of being thankful for divine protection and to Fox, he claimed never to have been in danger at all.

Fox was ill, but must have recovered shortly. While there, he wrote his famous letter to the Governor of Barbados, which is a straightforward, orthodox statement of Christian beliefs. We evangelicals have enshrined it along with the Richmond Declaration of Faith. There has been much controversy over it, though, with some regarding it as clear proof that Fox was an orthodox Protestant and nothing more. While we agree that he was sound in doctrine, he was much more than that. For, if he were only that, why did so many other Christians write against him?

It was while in the West Indies that Fox saw slavery. He was repelled but took the position of concern for Indians and Blacks held in slavery.

So in 1679 he wrote an epistle about the brotherhood of all mankind in God's sight: "To Friends in America, concerning their negroes and Indians: All Friends everywhere, that have Indians or blacks, you are to preach the Gospel to them, and other servants, if you be true Christians; for the gospel of salvation was to be preached to every creature under heaven . . . And also you must preach the grace of God to all blacks and Indians, which grace brings salvation, that hath appeared unto all men, to teach and instruct them to live Godly, righteously and soberly . . . And you must instruct and teach your Indians and negroes, and all others, how that Christ, by the grace of God, tasted death for every man, and gave himself a ransom for all men, to be testified in due time, and is the propitiation not for the sins of Christians only, but for the sins of the whole world: And how, that he doth enlighten every man that cometh into the world, with his true light, which is the life in Christ, by whom the world was made."

In January of 1672 the party went on to Jamaica. During this time the valiant woman minister, Elizabeth Hooten, died and was buried in Jamaica.

Then, in March, George Fox and his group actually got to Virginia and Maryland. In the Chesapeake area, he preached to Friends and non-Friends alike, sharing the Good News that he had been preaching for more than 20 years.

Then, they all headed north to Long Island and to New England. The sufferings there had been but a short 12 years earlier, and he must have referred to those conditions, for his epistle to them carried the message of comfort in persecution.

His *Journal* sets out the itinerary in return, back across Rhode Island, then the length of Long Island, down the west bank of the Delaware, reaching New Castle in mid-September. Next, he ministered to one and all along both shores of the Chesapeake. By November, the party saw more of Virginia and down into the Carolinas. They suffered unbelievable difficulties, especially on the Carolina border and further south. There were few people, and even fewer Quakers, in this region. By January they were back in the Chesapeake area and traveled among Friends in Virginia and Maryland until the 21st of May 1673.

They must have raced across the Atlantic, arriving in Bristol only four weeks after last sighting the Virginia Capes.

As one reads his *Journal* and the numerous epistles written some years later, one recognizes that Fox faced very human fears, both known and unknown. Yet, he also placed his faith in God, depended upon divine guidance and protection, and was willing to give God credit for whatever successes he had and to praise Him for His protecting providence.

Listen to him in his *Journal* (Nickalls, p. 661), "The great Lord God of heaven and earth and creator of all, who is over all, carried us by his high hand and mighty power and wisdom over all, and through many dangers and perils by sea and land. And perils of deceitful professors without possession, who were as the raging waves of the sea, but made a calm: and perils of wolves, bears, tigers, and lions, and perils of rattlesnakes and other venomous creatures of like poisonous nature, and perils through great swamps, and bogs, and the wilderness, and perils over great bays, creeks, and rivers, in open small boats and small canoes, and perils in great storms and tempests in the ocean, which many times were beyond words to utter; and great perils through the Indian countries in the woods, and great perils by night through the cold, rain, frosts, snow, in lying in the

woods and wilderness, and perils of robbers by land and pirates by sea, these troublesome times, where the sea abounds.

"The blessed Lord God . . . who by his power stretched over all these workers of death his line of life, the Lord God made all easy by his spirit and power, and gave his people dominion over all, and made his great power and glory in his Light and Truth known over all in the hearts of people, blessed be His name forever, Amen."

To us moderns, I wish to lift out a lesson or two for today: First, this trip established George Fox and his followers in the main line of Christian orthodoxy.

Second, it is interesting to note his breadth and tolerance in the use of women ministers and in his concern to preach salvation to one and all, Blacks and Indians as well as whites, in a day when many other Christians did not admit that women or heathen had souls!

And third, D. Elton Trueblood is to be credited with the insight that Friends broke with the general motivation to come to the new world. Whereas most Europeans came for political or religious freedom or to improve their lot economically, George Fox and his party, as well as numerous other Friends who had preceded him to the American colonies, came to preach and to minister. Rather than to escape persecution, they increased their chances of imprisonment and martyrdom by coming to Massachusetts, especially. So, when we hear so insistently today the call to mission, let us look with pride and thanksgiving to our forebears, who with dauntless courage and faith forsook their homes to undergo the dangers of men and nature to preach the love of Christ to every creature.

Joseph Gilmore led the congregation in singing "Rise Up, O Men of God."

■ 4. The Friends Youth Yearly Meeting was welcomed to the opening sessions, with the report of 123 registered on the first day of its sessions.

■ 5. General Superintendent Norval Hadley presented his keynote address as follows:

KEYNOTE ADDRESS

Last year in my keynote message I spoke to you about new things. I suggested that if we do not learn to change in a fast-changing society, the world is going to go by and leave the church behind.

Now I have spent a year visiting the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting. I don't know how to tell you how graphically you and the churches have illustrated the truth of last year's keynote message. Thirty-three of our churches showed some growth last year; the rest just held their own or lost. In nearly every growing church, the leadership has been willing to break from old, dead, and unscriptural patterns into which the church has become trapped. Where things are continuing pretty much in those old patterns, there is little sign of new life. John Taffin of the Boise church has done an outstanding statistical study for me. Population in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho since 1930 has increased 82 percent. Do you know how much our church membership has increased in that same time? 82 percent. We have just brought in enough new people to make up for our own children who were lost to the church. While church membership in the last ten years is up 10 percent, church attendance is down 1 percent from ten years ago.

During at least the past ten years, we have heard a great deal about problems and weaknesses in the church. Even great preachers have been much more able in describing the problems than in giving the answers. There has been serious talk that the church as we now know it is so irrelevant that God may be moving to entirely different patterns.

Now gradually I believe God is speaking through various church leaders in different situations, revealing answers and emphases so strikingly similar that we cannot help but conclude that God is moving.

We are now beginning to see more clearly the difference between the dying churches and the thriving, living churches. Through the years since Jesus founded the Church, it gradually turned away from the simple, original provision and patterns that made it powerful and compelling, and there came into the life of the church some terrible distortions from which we are suffering greatly today. I want to mention four important distortions, three now and one later.

The first: Popular thinking fastened upon a building as the identifying symbol of the church. In the beginning, working for the church meant the exercise of gifts to perform a ministry among people wherever they were, but gradually it came to mean doing some religious act within a building. If we wanted a friend to hear about Jesus, we were told to bring him to the building. Friends, it was never intended that the world should come to the church; but rather, the church is to go to the world.

Distortion number 2: There came a gradual transfer of responsibility from the people to what was termed the clergy. The scriptural concept that every believer is in the ministry—is a priest before God—was gradually lost, and the special body of super-Christians emerged who were looked to for practically everything. When the ministry was thus left to the professionals, there was nothing left for the people to do but to just come to church and listen. Soon Christianity became nothing but a spectator sport. It is much like a professional football game, which has been defined as 22 men down on a field desperately in need of rest and 20,000 people in the grandstand desperately in need of exercise.

This puts pastors under an unbearable burden. They have proven completely unequal to the task of evangelizing the world, counseling the distressed and brokenhearted, ministering to the poor and needy, relieving the oppressed and the afflicted, expounding the Scripture, and challenging the entrenched forces of evil in an increasingly darkened world. They were never meant to do it by themselves. To try leads only to frustration and exhaustion and emotional and nervous disaster.

Why is it that many of our churches in Northwest Yearly Meeting grow to about 75 and 100 and then level off? I think part of the answer lies in the fact that 75 to 100 is as many as one man can handle. And we have too many one-man churches. When we finally realize and face the problem of an overworked minister, usually our solution is to hire another person.

Distortion number 3: This pattern, whereby church life consists of spectators hearing the professionals, nearly eliminates the opportunity for koinonia—fellowship. The New Testament lays strong stress on the need for Christians to know each other closely and intimately enough to bear one another's burdens, confess faults to one another, rebuke, exhort, and admonish one another, and minister to one another through the Word, song, and prayer.

This kind of koinonia is much more possible when through small groups and less formal fellowship the church members hear each other,

not just the professional. Further, when a pagan steps into a fellowship meeting where there is genuine sharing, love, and concern for one another, he is left drooling with envy.

Incidentally, this kind of *koinonia* will never happen while we persist in our testimonies and reports to say everything is wonderful when everything is anything but wonderful. The body cannot help you bear the burden of problems at home if you hypocritically cover and deny that you have problems at home.

Look at the pattern of the original Church in Ephesians 4. Here is the picture of the true Church. This should be the description of your church.

Verses 15, 16—(1) "Speaking the truth in love"—the original language says, "truthing in love"—not just speaking, but being truthful in every area of life—we "may grow up into him in all things" (KJV) and (2) "become more and more in every way like Christ who is the Head of his body, the church." (3) "Under his direction the whole body is fitted together perfectly, and each part in its own special way helps the other parts, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love." (LB)

Look at verse 14. (4) "We may no longer be children, tossed [like ships] to and fro between chance gusts of teaching, and wavering with every changing wind of doctrine." And verses 12 and 13: (5) "His intention was the perfecting and full equipping of the saints . . . [that they should do] the work of ministering toward building up of Christ's body (the church), [That it might develop]" (6) "until we all obtain oneness in the faith and in the comprehension of the full and accurate knowledge of the Son of God; that [we might arrive] at really mature manhood—the completeness of personality which is nothing less than the standard height of Christ's own perfection—the measure of the stature of the fullness of the Christ, and the completeness found in Him." (Amplified) This is how the church is to be. We are to all believe alike until we arrive at a completeness or fullness, until we become full grown in the Lord to the point of being filled full of Christ. We are corporately as a body to manifest Christ to the world.

John McArthur spoke at a youth leaders' convention, and Ken VandenHoek let me hear a tape of his message. He expressed the concept that Jesus is Body one. The church is Body two. Just as Jesus' purpose in coming to earth in a human body was to manifest and reveal Himself to the world, so Body two, the church, is to manifest Christ to the world. This is our function. We are to reveal to the world a body working together with all its members complementing each other until the world sees in us the fullness of Christ. I doubt we could do that when the life of the church consists solely of a group of believers gathering together two or three times a week to hear a professional preach the Gospel.

How then does the church reveal Christ to the world?

By our unity. Ephesians 4:4 reads, "We are all parts of one body, we have the same Spirit, and have all been called to the same glorious future. For us there is only one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and we all have the same God and Father who is over us all and in us all, and living through every part of us." (LB) You who have heard me speak and read my writings this past year will know that the concept of the importance of unity in the body of Christ is consuming me. At our Ministers Conference we said that the goal is church growth. I am thoroughly convinced that growth results from health. If a church is not reproducing, it has a

health problem. And one of the outstanding evidences of good health is unity—a loving, sharing, caring community of believers. One of the greatest sicknesses in the church is our disunity.

I became greatly exercised on this subject as I saw the importance and the stress on unity in the Latin American pastors conferences last fall. Anyone who has had the privilege of knowing Christians in widespread places around the world knows that there exists a very marvelous and fundamental unity among believers. And where the church is weak, especially in its impact on the world, usually unity is weak. In John 13:35 Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." Love in the body of Christ is the badge of Christians. This is a love that accepts others as they are. It is tenderhearted and forgiving. It seeks to prevent misunderstandings and differences from dividing Christians from each other. It is concerned with maintaining unity.

In Jesus' high priestly prayer (John 17:20), He prayed that we might be one just as He and the Father are one. And then He said a very significant thing. By this unity shall "the world . . . know that thou hast sent me." The God-given pattern by which we are to impress the world of the divinity of Christ is through our unity. Some years ago Dr. Richard Halverson said, "The saddest fact in the church today is that the world is unimpressed with Christians." If the world is unimpressed with Christians and with the church, it is because of our lack of unity. I have seen churches and Christians divided from each other, and their witness has shriveled. Their impact on the world and the community around them is practically nil. On the other hand, we have seen churches where there was such evident love, such sharing and caring that the lost and frustrated and lonely just flocked to their meetings. Grace Baptist Church in California was one of those. My daughter and other young people drove through four towns to get in on that fellowship. Further, I have seen churches dying because of developing division, and I have seen them confront head-on, by a scriptural pattern, the effort of Satan to sow the seeds of disunity among them, and I have watched them recover.

This is one of the reasons I talked to the ministers about problem solving. Because problems in the church are usually people problems, we Quakers, with our traditional gentleness, let them go on year after year without dealing with them. Suppose you went to visit a friend and found him lying on the couch, sick and dying. You say, "I love you. I'm sorry you are sick and dying." But you don't take him to a doctor. You are afraid it might be cancer, and you know the surgery will hurt, so you don't take your friend. That's what we have done with Jesus. His body lies sick with division and disunity, but we won't go to God and to the divine prescription in His Word for healing, because we're afraid there may be some cutting and it will hurt.

Consequently, new people come into the church, look around until they find out what is really going on, and then they leave. This is not Christian. Further, it is not scriptural. In Matthew 18 and in many of Paul's writings, we are given specific instructions on how to deal with problem people. We are not to let them sow discord and disunity in the church. We are to deal with them, and if they do not respond, we are to have nothing to do with them. Our witness is our oneness.

If, then, our purpose is to manifest Christ to the world and our unity is the key to that witness, how specifically does Christ use the unity of the church to reveal Himself to the world? It is by the exercise of spiritual gifts. Look at Ephesians 4:7, "Christ has given each of us special abilities

—whatever he wants us to have out of his rich storehouse of gifts.” Nearly every time spiritual gifts are mentioned in the Bible there is some indication that these gifts are given to each of us.

Many believe that the Holy Spirit gives a plurality of gifts to many individuals. The gifts are given in clusters, each individual receiving a different cluster of gifts for his own specific ministry. Each of us exercising his gifts then complements the others in the work of the body of Christ, and in the beautiful matching, Christ is revealed to the world. Thus no one needs to feel the spirit of competition with anyone else in the body of Christ. The Holy Spirit has sovereignly distributed the gifts in order to accomplish His purposes. This means the supreme task of every Christian is to discover his gifts and get to work using them. If anyone does not do this, the whole body will suffer.

I can only touch lightly on the subject of spiritual gifts here today. But there is a great deal being said and written at this point in the history of the church about the gifts. I urge you pastors to preach on spiritual gifts and on the life of the body of Christ. I have been greatly helped by Ray Stedman's book, *Body Life*. You might enjoy the book, *The Circle Church*, telling the story of a Chicago church that has found the secret of exercising spiritual gifts.

1 Corinthians 12:4-6 says there are gifts, ministries, and workings. Gifts, or special abilities, come from the Holy Spirit. They are your capacity to function. The ministries are linked with the Lord Jesus. Your ministry is the sphere in which your gift is performed. Jesus assigns ministries. He has planted you where you are to bear fruit in your sphere. The workings or energizings come from the Father. This is the degree of the power by which your gift is manifest or ministered on certain occasions.

All together there are about 18 basic spiritual gifts mentioned in the Bible. Of course, Jesus had them all. I suppose that the ideal fellowship of believers would include a body in which all the spiritual gifts are manifest in one or another of the individuals. But we are on a dead-end street if we are waiting on the pastor to manifest all the spiritual gifts.

There are four gifts mentioned in Ephesians 4, which have been called the support gifts, contrasted with the service and sign gifts of 1 Corinthians 12 and Romans 12.

The first, the gift of *apostles*, is a foundation gift. While it is most apparent in the lives of the apostles themselves, some feel that people who start new works and missionaries who do pioneer work are exercising the gift of apostles.

The gift of *prophecy* is the ability to speak for God, to interpret the authoritative Word of God, and explain truth so that it becomes very clear and vital and compelling. The word *prophet* means “cause to shine” and is linked with the prefix *pro*, which means before. The prophet is one who stands before and causes the word of apostles to shine. Usually men who speak at conferences are using prophetic gifts. They differ from teachers in that a prophet tends to deal more with the great sweeping principles of Scripture, leaving the development of more specific areas to the teachers.

The third gift in Ephesians 4 is the gift of the *evangelists*. These are people who have special ability to communicate the Gospel in relevant terms to those who are not yet Christians. All of us are to witness, but not all will have the gift of evangelism. This gift can be exercised toward a single individual as well as in the presence of a large crowd.

Finally, in Ephesians 4 Paul has mentioned the gift of the *pastor-teachers*, or the shepherds of the flock. The pastor is sometimes called in

Scripture the elder or overseer or bishop. He is usually limited to one locality or one church. Those with the pastor-teacher gift are not always in full-time ministry. Certain elders in the Bible supported themselves in secular work. Others, usually called ruling elders, were supported by the church. Many of the successful churches today have a number of laymen they call shepherds who are to exercise this gift in the work of the church. You may exercise the gift of a pastor-teacher in a Sunday school class or home Bible class or as a young people's leader. Each of these support gifts has to do with the Word of God (verses 11, 12). These four support gifts are to equip the saints. *Equip* is the same word used when Peter, James, and John were *mending* their nets. The support gifts are to prepare the saints for action unto the work of the ministry and the building of the body of Christ.

Pastors, you are not to do the work of the ministry. You are to equip the saints to do the work of the ministry and thus build the body of Christ.

Now we are ready to talk about the fourth distortion that has crept into the life of the church. The pastors and teachers have not understood the importance of expository preaching and teaching, of handling the Scripture as it is, and of teaching what it teaches. This is the only way we can feed the people a balanced diet. The Bible does not deal entirely with morals in one section, with baptism in another. Rather, in each section truth is presented in delightful balance, and it is truth in balance that equips the saints.

Further, pastors, probably inspired by successful evangelists, have supposed too much that they should use the church services for evangelism. This is based, I presume, on the false assumption that we are to bring the world to the church. Thus, the flock hears the same fundamental gospel truths over and over; as a result, they get bored, dull, and weak, and division creeps in. It is not that evangelism in the church is wrong, especially if many in the church are unsaved, but evangelism is more appropriate out in the homes, in halls, at work, out where the lost are. The precious time in the church service is sorely needed for expository preaching—for equipping the saints to do the work of the ministry.

1 Corinthians 12 and Romans 12 mention about 14 more gifts. I want to just list them. First are the gifts of *wisdom* and *knowledge*. These often appear together in a single individual. The gift of knowledge is the ability to perceive and systematize the great facts that God has hidden in His Word. The gift of wisdom, on the other hand, is the ability to apply those insights to a specific situation, the ability to apply Scripture to life.

These gifts relate to the gift of *teaching*, which deals with communicating this knowledge and applying Scripture, to pass them on to others in learnable form. A man or woman who possesses these three gifts in a cluster is a valuable person to have in the church.

Then Paul mentions the gift of *faith*, or this could be called the gift of vision. God may be calling on us these days to exercise the gift of great faith.

Last spring I introduced my good friend, Larry Ward, to the people at Reedwood Friends. He founded Food for the Hungry. He explained that because so many bridges had been blown up in Bangladesh, so many trucks destroyed, and so many ferries sunk, unless we could mount a massive airlift, when the monsoons came some felt another half million people would die because of lack of food.

I saw Larry last week. The Foundation for Airborne Relief, of which I am vice-president, has been flying up to four payloads per day out to needy areas in huge C-130 freight planes, in cooperation with Southern Air Transport.

I asked, "Did we get the airlift going before the monsoons set in?"

He replied, "Haven't you heard? There aren't any! The monsoons are a month late. Everyone is talking about it. The President said the other day, 'This is the first time in 30 years the monsoons have been so late.'" Then Larry said, "You know why, don't you? When I finished speaking at your Reedwood church, a little white-haired lady came up to me and said, 'Dr. Ward, while you are working on the airlift, would it be all right if some of us would pray that God hold off the rains?'"

There is the gift of healing, and the Greek word is plural—*healings*. Probably this refers to healing at every level of human need, physical, emotional, and spiritual.

Then there is the gift of *miracles*. This is not manifest so often in the established church, although we hear of it more often where God is authenticating a new work by signs and wonders.

Again in 1 Corinthians 12 Paul mentions the gift of *discernment*, the ability to discern and distinguish between the utterances of true spirits and false ones. I think of the one with the gift of discernment as being the nose in the body of Christ, able to sniff out the true and the false. I think given a good fund of information that I can exercise certain judgments on matters, but I don't know that I have the gift of discernment, for I have seen that spiritual gift exercised in the ministry of Dr. Bob Pierce. Repeatedly I have witnessed as his judgment regarding whether or not a person would work out on the mission field proved to be exactly right. It took a great gift of discernment to be able to give vast sums of money to people living 6,000 miles away in another culture, who spoke another language, without spoiling those people.

Next, there is the gift of *tongues* and the ability to *interpret tongues*. These gifts were used publicly as a sign not for believers but for unbelievers, while privately Paul testified that he prayed in tongues. The gift of tongues is the easiest of the gifts to imitate, and there have been imitations in the church down through the centuries.

In 1 Corinthians 12:28 Paul concludes this section by listing other gifts. Among those not already mentioned is the gift of *helps*. This is probably the same gift mentioned in Romans 12 as the gift of serving others. Then he mentions the gift of *administration*—the ability to handle people. Romans 12 lists additionally the gift of *exhortation*. This is the one called alongside to encourage or to comfort another. It is the same word from which we get the word *paraclete*. Those who have this gift are counselors. They are able to inspire others to action, awaken renewed spiritual interest, or steady those who are buffeted. Then in Romans 12 Paul mentions the gift of *giving*. This is exercised both by wealthy and by poor Christians. It is the ability to earn and give money for the advancement of God's work and to do so with such wisdom and cheerfulness that recipients are immeasurably strengthened and blessed by the transaction. And then Paul mentions the gift of *giving aid*, which is most accurately translated perhaps in the *New English Bible*, "If you are a leader, exert yourself to lead." The Greek word indicates that this is literally the gift of the one who stands in front. This is the one who emcees the meeting or conducts the business meeting, or the panel. He does it in a way that helps others spiritually. The final gift mentioned in Romans 12 is the gift

of doing *acts of mercy*. This is giving unearned aid. Often it is exercised on behalf of those who revolt others—the deformed, the handicapped. It differs from the gift of helps in that it is directed to the needy regardless of their condition. Many by supporting orphan children are showing that they have the gift of mercy.

Now finally, if the most important task of life is to discover and use our gifts, how do we do this? Your gift may or may not be in line with your natural ability. Often, if one is especially endowed with natural ability, there is a tendency for him to take credit himself for the things he accomplishes with that ability, but a spiritual gift is given from the Holy Spirit, and the glory for all it accomplishes must go entirely to God. Thus some who are outstanding teachers in secular schools may not be the best Sunday school teachers; others may be. Natural talent alone cannot operate in a sphere that accomplishes God's work, but natural talent can be the vehicle for spiritual gifts.

You discover your spiritual gift much like you discover a natural talent. When you find that you like doing special service for the Lord, that you succeed in doing it, you may have a gift in that area. You will enjoy watching others who are good at it. Study the Bible list and see which of the gifts appeal to you. Pray, and ask God to show you your gifts. Some of us feel that this kind of prayer should be accompanied by fasting. Watch for improvement and development along certain lines. You will more and more find yourself seeking occasions or being sought for occasion to manifest your particular gift, always for the glory of God and for the sake of others, not for your own glory. Others may see your spiritual gift in you before you do. This is why it seems so vital to me that many of our churches are developing small group fellowships. One great Bible teacher said, "It is a great pity to see someone who thinks he has the gift of preaching but no one has the gift of listening." If you are in a live spiritual fellowship, it is unlikely that you will have a spiritual gift and be the only one to know it.

Pastors, I urge you to teach on the gifts and to help your people as a good shepherd to discover their spiritual gifts. Then give them opportunity to serve God in the exercise of those gifts. Do this through informal fellowship, sharing times, and Bible studies in small groups, or with the whole church. I asked for a statement from the pastor and a layman of five of our fastest growing churches on "What made your church grow?" Everyone mentioned the spirit of love, unity, and sharing with one another.

Remember that hardly anyone discovers all of his spiritual gifts at first. When you move into new situations and new circumstances, be alert for the possibility that God is revealing a new spiritual gift in you. Finally, you discover your spiritual gift by being completely submitted to the will of the Holy Spirit, who gives these gifts sovereignly. We will never be able to function in the unity of the body of Christ through the exercise of the spiritual gifts until we have completely submitted to the Holy Spirit.

Now to conclude it all, what is the key to the unity in the body of Christ and the exercise of spiritual gifts that manifest Christ convincingly to the world? It is in the 2nd and 3rd verses of Ephesians 4: "Be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. Try always to be led along together by the Holy Spirit, and so be at peace with one another." (LB)

A rising vote of appreciation was given for our superintendent's presentation and also for his work among us the past year.

■ 6. After his keynote address, the following statistics on church growth reported by Norval Hadley were presented for inclusion in the *Minutes*:

"I would like to report that once again last year, as during the year before, Northwest Yearly Meeting saw its largest numerical membership gain in history. This past year we gained 351 members for a total now of 6,977. Our gain was 240 the year before. The top three were Reedwood with 78, Clackamas Park with 55, and Vancouver with 43.

"Average Sunday morning worship attendance was up 427 from the previous year's average for a total of 5,292. Sunday school attendance saw a gain of only 33.

"Though the amount pledged to the Unified Budget last year was just \$129,000, the churches actually gave a little over \$198,500, and there may be some more coming in yet on last year's commitments.

"Pledging for the Unified Budget for the coming year has reached \$142,000 at this point with about three churches yet to report."

"New York Yearly Meeting has enjoyed the fellowship of Jack L. and Geraldine Willcuts as they have this week entered into the activities of our sessions at Silver Bay. "New York Friends are conscious of the spirit of God moving among us as we worship with the Willcuts, and we feel confident that His hand will lead us into a continuing and deepening dialogue and friendship with Friends in the Northwest.

"As Jack and Geraldine return to Oregon, we send with them our love and affection for Northwest Yearly Meeting and extend a cordial invitation to any of you to visit with us as the occasion may permit."

FRIENDS ACTION BOARD

■ 21. The report of the Friends Action Board given in the Tuesday evening service was approved, and a summary appears below:

Kent Thornburg, president of the board, introduced Aaron Hamlin, executive director of the National Negro Evangelical Association. He discussed some of the goals as they related to the Blacks across America in a witness for Christ.

Charles Morgan was presented as the new executive secretary of the Friends Action Board. He expressed his desire to be of service to the churches and minority groups in the Northwest.

Some of the activities of the board for the past year were related by Sheldon Newkirk, vice-president of the board. Aaron Hamlin receives more than half his salary from Friends Action Board, California Yearly Meeting providing the balance to continue to liberate him for a witness to the Northwest, California, and across America. We have found that love in action is a costly thing, as we serve in this way nationwide and then too in Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Friends Action Board, through its executive secretary and board members, assisted in the setting up of the Seattle Ministries, giving three months of direct service there.

The back pack trips in the mountains with Roy McConaughy as director have been most meaningful to the campers and leaders alike. Definite spiritual victories have been reported. Three trips were planned for this year.

Walter and Gladys Cook continue an exciting ministry with the nursing home residents. A handbook is to be printed to assist local churches in a similar ministry.

Piedmont, with its Friends for Kids program, has a most fruitful ministry with low income and varied minority groups.

Our concern is that people know we care and come to know Christ, who cares and cares through His children. We pray that people will know we believe in them by our service, at home and abroad.

The work of this board in meeting and alleviating human ills, especially in our metropolitan areas, is a vital part of our outreach.

■ 22. Word was received of the passing this week of Barbara Hays of Hillsboro Friends Church, who with her husband John has been active in our Yearly Meeting for a number of years.

It was approved that the Yearly Meeting send a note of sympathy and understanding to John Hays and the family.

■ 23. The reports on the State of the Church were presented from Salem, Newberg, Greenleaf, Boise, Southwest Washington, and Portland Areas, and from Olympic View Extension Church, Puget Sound Area.

Approved, and the summary appears below:

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, the past year has been one of productivity and excitement throughout Northwest Yearly Meeting churches.

In general there has been an increase in membership and attendance.

Several churches have conducted Lay Witness Missions, which have been a real spiritual help to their congregations. Some reported the increased use of the laity in home Bible study classes, outreach evangelism, and in services.

Social concerns have been an avenue of outreach as special care has been given in some meetings, especially in day-care centers, with youth, in minority groups, and in nursing homes, thus showing a genuine spirit of love through service.

Pastors have been careful to uphold the doctrines and have been faithful in their ministry. One mentioned the special appreciation for Friends testimonies by the outsiders.

Some churches have faced special problems the past year. But as one examines the story behind the scenes, he finds miracles in the making as day-to-day contacts are made to draw more people to Christ. A casual meeting on the street, a chance contact in a hospital ward, a friendly chat over the backyard fence—all these take on a deeper significance when the ingredient of the Holy Spirit is added. May we continue to be an encouragement in exemplifying Christ to the world around us.

Harlow gave his testimony of God's special help and assurance during the time of his illness last winter. He concluded by reading a passage from 1 Peter 1:3-7.

Two new books just off the press were presented by their authors—*Animistic Aymaras and Church Growth* by Quentin Nordyke and *Brave Rebels* by Marie Haines.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 30. Roger Smith, president of the Board of Evangelism, presented the work of that board. His report follows:

The Board of Evangelism has diligently worked this past year to fulfill its responsibilities of promoting church growth and evangelism and to establish new churches in new areas. We feel that we have contributed to some degree in making this past year the greatest year of growth in our Yearly Meeting's history. Membership increased by 351 to 6,977. Morning worship attendance increased by 427. We praise God for the lives of men, women, and children who have been transformed in order to make these figures.

There were some less exciting involvements of our board. Because of deteriorating membership and attendance, two meetings were discontinued. After a great deal of discussion and counsel with the members of Ashland and Timber churches, both of these meetings have been discontinued. In both cases, the members felt there was no other recourse.

We have been glad to help other established churches move forward. This has led us to help Friends Memorial Church and Holly Park Church amalgamate to form the Greater Seattle Friends Ministries. We supported the growing Sherwood congregation by issuing a Share Call for their building program, which netted \$1,882.83. We have advised North Valley Church in their planning and building. Their initial facility, now under construction, has been largely financed through the Friends Church Extension Foundation, a corporation set up by our board.

The church at Kent, Washington, continues to be one of our major programs. The first unit of their church plant is now ready to build. Footings will be poured this week. Eugene McDonald continues to successfully evangelize and build a congregation through evangelistic home Bible studies. However, they have neared the point of diminishing returns in rented facilities, so that we hope to have them in their own building within the year.

Last year our board introduced a 30-month program called *Breakthrough*, challenging churches to break through their traditional growth barriers. We asked churches to set their growth goals and to set about meeting them during the last six months of 1973. We provided two pastors' clinics for training in the "Evangelism Explosion" using the lay evangelism group at the Lynwood church. We provided training materials for evangelistic home Bible classes. We encouraged participation in the Board of Christian Education's Phase II five-month emphasis. Breakthrough will climax with our all-out participation in the Key '73 nationwide evangelism-in-depth thrust.

Forty-two churches made Breakthrough commitments. These churches gained 381 in attendance last year. Pastors from 26 of these churches participated in the evangelism clinics. Eighteen churches made no Breakthrough commitments. Three of these pastors attended the evangelism clinics. It would seem that goal setting and evangelism training have both been significant factors in this great year of growth.

From the evangelism reports we have discovered the most effective programs used last year in bringing men to Christ were:

1. Personal evangelism on an individual basis.
2. Public invitations in the regular services.
3. Organized personal evangelism programs.

Other effective means of evangelism were special meetings, home Bible classes, pastors' classes, Lay Witness Missions, vacation Bible school, camps and youth programs, community service programs, and small group retreats.

At least 25 churches are involved in organized lay evangelism programs with 250 participants. Thirty-six churches have at least 106 home Bible study groups.

Another important facet of our work is done by the Friends Church Extension Foundation. This corporation is established to make loan funds available for church financing. This last year, the FCEF has made a \$30,000 loan to Lynwood and a \$55,000 loan to North Valley. These loans are made at savings to the churches of many thousands of dollars. Most of the funds are derived from 6 percent investment certificates purchased by the fixed dollar savings of our constituency. With the need for loaned funds for the Kent Church and additional financing for North Valley, we need more Friends who will use their savings for God while preserving them and earning interest on them.

Evidences abound that we are in days of revival and renewal. Let us have the wisdom to use every possible means that the Holy Spirit will bless to reach men for Christ in our day.

- 31. Margaret Brown, mother of Nampa pastor Donald Brown, from Chivington Friends Church, Chivington, Colorado, was introduced and brought greetings from Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting.

- 32. The following report of the Church Music Committee was read:

Information from the 44 churches reporting indicates increased participation in special music activities in the churches and more churches giving attention to budgeting for music. Adult, youth, and children's choirs sing regularly in a number of the churches and on special occasions in others. Sacred concerts were given in a few of the churches.

Some interest is being shown in a Quaker hymnal.

Newberg hosted the Newberg-Portland area choir conference with four choirs in participation. Groups and ensembles presented a program as part of the conference.

The Music Committee shares the following concerns and recommendations:

1. That proper recognition be given to the importance of the music ministry in our churches through adequate budgeting for materials and equipment and remuneration for qualified and dedicated music leadership.
2. That all encouragement possible be given to the development of music talent in children and youth and that opportunities be provided for exercising these gifts in the service of the church.

3. That we recognize the validity of the revolutionary changes in music patterns and styles and that our churches maintain an open and receptive attitude to contemporary music forms and styling, as long as the message is spiritual and the motive is God-honoring.

4. That we move in the direction of ecclesiastical recognition of the ministry of music in the church with some form of certification or recording of qualified and dedicated ministers of music.

Approved.

■ 33. The Board of Peace and Service nominated Peter Snow to serve a three-year term on the Friendsview Manor board.

■ 34. The following recommendation regarding a constitutional change came from the Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance concerning individual commission appointments:

That two members of each commission be appointed biennially on an alternating basis.

■ 35. The representatives nominated the following persons for three-year terms on the Board of General Education: Kenneth M. Williams, Philip Fendall, Jack Hamilton.

■ 36. The representatives made the following nominations to the Board of Moral Action for terms of three years: Mildred Minthorne, Lois Tish, Fred H. Johnson.

Approved.

■ 37. The representatives made the following nominations to the Church Music Committee: for three-year terms—Richard Zeller, Harold S. Clark, Louise Sperling, Esther Hardinger, Leanne Fry; for one year—Marie Chapman to fill the unexpired term of John Carr.

Approved.

■ 38. Agnes Tish presented the following report of the work of the Women's Missionary Union:

The women of Northwest Yearly Meeting have made their everyday, commonplace activities honor the Lord and serve many needs around them. God's Word admonishes us to do it as unto the Lord, and our women have found ways to comply with these instructions. Their heartfelt concern and interest in the mission work of the Yearly Meeting is reflected by their financial support during this past year:

1. Furlough salary of J. David and Florence Thomas.
2. \$100 per month to the work at Kent, Washington.
3. \$100 per month to the work at Nehalem Bay.

Approximately \$15,000 has been channeled through the hands of our treasurer, Winifred Puckett. Included in this have been monies for missionary outfitting, EFA work in Mexico, improvement of campgrounds, assistance to the Friends Action Board, reading materials for our missionaries and their children, and many other projects.

The spring rallies held in each area netted nearly \$700 given to help establish a new work in Tacna, Peru. This week's offering taken at the Women's Yearly Meeting Banquet adds another \$1,000 to this project.

This past year many unions have encouraged and strengthened close family relationships through mother-daughter banquets and father-son activities.

The WMU Retreat held at Pendleton, Oregon, this last year has resulted in not only new enthusiasm and concern for missionary work but is also a means of renewed spiritual strength and vision in the personal lives of our women.

Cornelia Holmes spoke of the program study book about Friends work around the world developed through our cooperation with the women's division of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. A skit was presented with women portraying Friends women's work in India, Burundi, Latin America, the Orient, and the United States.

Approved.

■ 39. Adelaide Barker conducted a memorial period in loving memory of those of our membership who have gone to be with the Lord. Joseph Gilmore led the congregation in singing, "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." Robert and Joseph Gilmore sang "The Hills of Home." There were many expressions of appreciation for the influence of these lives in the fellowship of the church. The list of 48 names appears in the appendix.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

■ 42. The report of the Board of Peace and Service presented in the Wednesday evening service by Arthur O. Roberts, vice-president, was approved and appears below:

This board serves the Yearly Meeting by encouraging peace education and service activities of various sorts through which may be demonstrated the love of God and Christian compassion. Service projects are local, such as Tacoma's food bank through which they served a thousand families during an unemployment crisis. They are also international and ecumenical, such as our participation in the activities of the World Relief Commission of the National Association of Evangelicals. Our board president, Fredric Gregory (with his wife LaVonne) left in May to direct the World Relief Commission program in Bangladesh. This assignment followed the return of David Le Shana from a short tour of that stricken country as the Northwest's only member of a national fact-finding mission on behalf of various relief agencies.

Other members of Northwest Yearly Meeting are involved in similar projects: Gary Black, now in his fourth year of service, was joined in Vietnam last winter by Stuart and Kathie Willcuts; Jim and Garyanna Linhart returned from Chile upon completion of a two-year assignment and have been succeeded by Terry and Connie Dalke upon their graduation from George Fox College; Jerry Sandoz, who served in Vietnam 1966-68, has for the last four years directed the program in Korea. Dorlan and Eunice Bales are in seminary and pastoral work in Indiana Yearly Meeting this year following their two years in Vietnam.

Of this group Terry Dalke is the one man now under alternate service; the others have volunteered their services. The only other men doing their alternate service under the care of this board presently are Wayne Hoopes, now at Twin Rocks Friends Conference following a year and a half at Friends Special Schools in San Antonio, Texas, and Allen Johnson, who has been assigned with the Mennonite Teachers Abroad Program in Africa.

Reports from 41 churches representing about three-fourths of our membership show 115 young men ages 18 through 20. We estimate that 35 percent of our young men are registered as conscientious objectors to war and about 65 percent are not. With reduction in draft calls, the choice is not as immediate as it formerly was, and the statistics may be somewhat misleading. Fifty-five percent of the churches gave little or no peace emphasis during the year.

It would seem our churches and our youth are caught up in activities that aim at conversion and personal devotions that lay a groundwork for further discipleship but may be lax in ethical teaching.

During the past year the Board of Peace and Service has made certain efforts to increase sensitivity to peace as a part of holiness. Members of the board took their concerns to share at Pastors Conference. Under board direction Lon Fendall increased the scope of his college class in War and Peace to develop a programed study. The completed packet utilizes tapes, books, pamphlets, outlines, and suggested readings. This programed course is available through the Yearly Meeting office. We recommend that each church utilize it during the coming year.

Materials printed this year include a new edition of Paul Mills' *The Bible and War* and a tract giving Thomas Head's testimony, "A Firm Love Required." Other materials for the peace packet are in preparation.

The board cooperated with George Fox College to provide a peace emphasis during the spring Christian Heritage Week. Special speakers included Vail Palmer, Robert Hess, Landrum Bolling, Wayne Morse, and Thomas Head. We are pleased that the conference moved some students out of apathy and even antagonism and provided an opportunity for thoughtful reflection on the moral issues of war and peace for many within the college community.

Two major service activities of our Yearly Meeting are under the general direction of our board but report separately—the Friends Action Board, which expended some \$22,000 last year in projects connected with urban churches, and Friendsview Manor, for which our board budgeted \$3,300 in assistance to needy residents.

Time does not permit mentioning all the acts of Christian love reported, such as blankets to a distressed family, clothes to replenish a family wardrobe lost in a fire, Christmas toys to retarded children, music lessons given to needy children, help in finding local alternate service assignments. How can we measure the love reflected in the statistic showing 85 foster children brought into homes of our members or 387 foreign orphans supported last year? "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me," said Jesus.

Participation in the Thanksgiving offering for the world's hungry should be greater. Our part in the interdenominational Hour of Sharing was only \$1,930. Let's make it \$7 to \$10 thousand next fall.

The tragedy of our Asian war tends to numb us. We are sick of hearing about war. Let us guard against substituting increasingly costly "solemn assemblies" for the deeds of mercy and the claims of justice through which we show our allegiance to God and our participation in Christ's kingdom.

The psalmist reminds us to trust God, for "all over the world he puts an end to wars, he breaks the bow, he snaps the spear, he gives shields to the flames." (Psalm 46, *Jerusalem Bible*)

May God help us to have a sense of what is vital in the midst of the military madness sweeping the world, with bombers costing \$16 million apiece, and "smart bombs" that kill more effectively. May we not be caught up in culture religion with its tribal gods and national shrines but proclaim boldly that the nation whose God is the Lord will be exalted. Pray that our children and youth will refuse to conform to carnal violence and will dedicate themselves to using the weapons of the Spirit in the kingdom of Christ under the Prince of Peace.

■ 43. William Pruitt presented his resignation from the Church Music Committee.

Accepted.

■ 44. The Committee on Discipline Revision submits for final action the amendment approved a year ago, which is item 72 of the 1971 *Minutes*.

With reference to the Committee on Training and Recording of Ministers, on page 63, after the first sentence of paragraph d, insert this additional wording: "Terms of office of all members shall continue through the Yearly Meeting sessions. Newly appointed members may sit with the committee during these sessions; they shall assume office immediately at their close." The last sentence of the present reading would be eliminated.

Approved.

This constitutes the second reading; thus it will become a part of the *Constitution and Discipline* (see 1971 Yearly Meeting *Minutes*, p. 29, minute 72).

■ 45. Norval Hadley reported on the progress of the work of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. He stressed the importance of the EFA in coordinating and enlarging the work and outreach of evangelical Friends.

He stated that the Alliance has voted to give strong relief and support to Bangladesh and to back Key '73.

The Missions Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, realizing the great extent of our responsibilities and opportunities in Mexico, is asking the entire constituency of the EFA to pray in faith and expectation for a mighty moving of the Holy Spirit in our field within the next few months.

Specifically, pray for:

1. A miracle—a divine dynamic by June 30, 1973, that will attract people to Christ.
2. At least three people from the middle class group to accept the challenge to be spiritual reproducers in their own community.
3. The missionaries to be led by the Holy Spirit to receptive people.
4. God to reveal His choice of a Mexican who will assume responsibility for leadership among the middle class group.

Approved.

■ 46. The following communication was received from the Executive Council regarding the Friends Fund:

Last year at Yearly Meeting the Board of Stewardship expressed the concern of their board in the area of deferred giving. They pursued their concern and investigation to develop a service through which our people can be given assistance in investment and estate planning.

At the midyear meeting of the Executive Council, the Board of Stewardship presented Milo Ross, chairman of a Deferred Giving Study Committee, who presented a plan for securing and caring for funds and property for religious, charitable, and educational purposes. This is to be a nonprofit organization, and he presented the proposed Articles of Incorporation and proposed Bylaws.

The Board of Stewardship and the Board of Finance recommended that this fund be set up.

The Executive Council is to appoint the Board of Directors. It appointed the following as the original Board of Directors of the Friends Fund:

■ 48. The Executive Council unanimously recommended to the Yearly Meeting the calling of Norval Hadley as general superintendent for the period of July 1, 1973, through June 30, 1974.

Approved, and a standing vote of appreciation was given for the work of our superintendent the past year.

■ 49. The Executive Council recommended the following salary arrangement for the general superintendent:

■ 51. The following returning minute was read:

Northwest Yearly Meeting appreciates sincerely the presence of Frederick J. Flynn, Jr., and his gracious wife, Grace, in our 1972 sessions, held in Newberg, Oregon, August 14-20.

The Keynote Address at our opening session given by our general superintendent, Norval Hadley, stressed the need for a warm spirit of love for all men and for spiritual unity among Christian brethren under the ministry of the Holy Spirit. This emphasis corresponds to the concern of the Flynn's, and we pray God's continued blessing upon them as they travel among Friends everywhere expressing their concern for spiritual unity.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

■ 52. The report of the Board of Stewardship was presented by the president, David Brown, as follows:

A. Our board has been working in three areas this past year. Each of these is aimed toward long-term benefits to the individual and the church.

The first is the training of our young people to be good stewards of their lives. We are researching for materials and methods to use in this area.

Secondly, we are planning what we call Christian Life Management Seminars in the local churches. These one-day meetings are times when laymen can share their experiences and small group discussions can be held.

The third area has occupied our greatest concern and effort this past year. We reported last year we were going to study the possibility of setting up a deferred giving program for the Yearly Meeting. As you have heard, this is now a reality in the form of the Friends Fund. Milo Ross chaired the study committee of the board and is now the president of the Friends Fund. I have asked him to give you a report on this work, which will complete our board's presentation for today.

Approved.

B. Milo Ross spoke concerning the Friends Fund, emphasizing the importance of stewardship in deferred giving. This new board will have two major functions: 1. to give assistance to churches and church-related organizations; 2. to become a receptacle for funds and to distribute these funds advantageously in the total work of our Yearly Meeting.

Plans are underway to get literature and information out to individuals, alerting them as to how they can cooperate in this new enterprise.

Approved. (See minute 46, page 23.)

■ 53. The nominations of John G. Fankhauser to the Evangelical Friends Pension Committee for one year, and Herbert Sargent to the Ministers Retirement Fund for two years, as part of the organization for the Ministerial Association, were presented.

Approved.

■ 54. As the afternoon session convened, Ralph Greenidge led in prayer.

■ 55. The minutes were read and accepted.

■ 56. The Friends Action Board presented the following people for three-year term memberships: Roy McConaughy, Arnold Flath, Ronald Gregory.

Approved.

■ 57. The Board of Moral Action recommended that the following statement become a matter of record in the *Minutes* to encourage the writing of individual letters from our membership and to send to the officials of government and the businesses involved:

We urge all possible steps to eliminate the sale and service of alcoholic beverages on commercial airlines. This practice is a hazard to health and safety.

Approved, and the Board of Moral Action is asked to further study this problem, including the financial implications, and to report back as to

possible action we may take to help alleviate these problems. (See minute 104, page 46.)

■ 58. The Board of Moral Action recommended that the following statement become a matter of record in the *Minutes* to encourage the writing of individual letters from our membership and to send to the officials of government and the businesses involved:

We are concerned that alcoholic beverages should not be allowed in space flight. Now that it is proven that even small amounts of alcohol kill brain cells, which are never replaced, it seems essential that astronauts should not drink during or before flights.

Approved.

■ 59. The Board of Moral Action recommended that the following statement become a matter of record in the *Minutes* to encourage the writing of individual letters from our membership and to send to the officials of government and the businesses involved:

We oppose the adoption by the states of a lottery and other legalized forms of gambling as a means of raising revenue for the following principal reasons:

a. A lottery is a form of gambling, and gambling appeals to a moral weakness in man that government should not encourage.

b. Lotteries and other forms of gambling encourage crime and corruption.

c. Lotteries are inefficient as a means of raising money. Studies have shown that in the states that have lotteries only a minute share of state spending is paid for by lottery income and there has been no reduction in taxes. Only a small percentage of the money spent on the lottery is realized as revenue for the state.

d. Lotteries, in effect, are a regressive form of taxation that falls most heavily on people at the lower end of the income scale.

Approved.

■ 60. The Board of Moral Action recommended that the following statement become a matter of record in the *Minutes* to encourage the writing of individual letters from our membership and to send to the officials of government and the businesses involved:

We strongly oppose the lowering of the legal drinking age.

Approved.

■ 61. The Board of Moral Action recommended that the following statement become a matter of record in the *Minutes* to encourage the writing of individual letters from our membership and to send to the officials of government and the businesses involved:

We oppose the legalization of the sale and use of marijuana. The propaganda being circulated by the proponents of legalization notwithstanding, there is increasing evidence that marijuana is indeed harmful, and certainly it has been shown conclusively that most of those persons addicted to hard drugs started with marijuana. There is no way its use can strengthen our country, improve our social system, or glorify God.

Approved.

■ 62. The suggestion was made that these preceding concerns from the Board of Moral Action be made available to publicity director, Barry Hubbell, for his use.

Approved.

■ 63. Leo Thornton, a member of the Oregon state legislature, serving as a state representative, and executive vice-president of Western Evangelical Seminary, presented the work of that school.

He feels that the seminary should be a servant of the churches, preparing their young people for the ministry. They make a practice of listening to the students and striving to keep current with the present day. They also offer special in-service training for ministers.

Four Friends are on the faculty and staff of WES.

Approved.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

■ 64. The report of the Board of Moral Action, Mildred Minthorne, president, was presented as follows:

DEPARTMENT OF LITERATURE

Enthusiastic literature reports show increased Scripture reading especially when using the fresh approach of newer translations and paraphrases such as *Living Bible* and *Good News for Modern Man*. Many churches had copies available for purchase, some selling 50 or more. Churches encouraged Bible reading through reading "assignments" followed by sermons and discussions, reading schedules, home Bible studies, studies on prophecy, studies on evangelism, messages on books of the Bible using "100 Days of Love" and the "Read the Bible Through in 1972" program. Medford reported the Lay Witness Mission made everyone more aware of Bible reading.

Of the 41 churches reporting, 39 have church libraries, and 28 have other resource materials available; 29 have librarians. Libraries range in size from 41 to 1,739 volumes, with 23 churches having more than 200; 1,401 books were added this year, making a total of 12,118 volumes. Better locations and children's and youth libraries helped increase circulation in four churches.

Twenty-eight churches promoted reading by bulletin boards and posters, book reviews, announcements of new books, church bulletins, mid-week or monthly newsletters, WMU, Sunday school classes and openings, displays in foyer and church office, and a book table at the fellowship hour. Reedwood had a book fair to sell books and a special roster of speakers. Hillsboro had a banquet with William Loewen of George Fox College Book Store featuring books and with individuals buying 50 books for the church library. Olympic View obtained books on consignment to sell and designated each third Sunday as Library Sunday. Boise had a class on prophecy with books provided for purchase and circulation.

Some churches have devotional publications available. Several gave Bibles and books as awards or gifts. With a memorial fund Tigard bought *Living Bibles*, dedicating them to the primary and junior departments. Several reports stressed work in opposition to obscene literature and X-rated movies.

This board purchased 15 books and 13 dissertations on Quaker history and doctrine for the Western Evangelical Seminary library.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC MORALS

Forty-one churches reported 174 presentations on public morals issues, with a much greater emphasis on sermons and references in sermons. There were only two area presentations this year, and Commitment Sunday

and Youth Temperance Education week observances were negligible. Half the meetings reporting emphasized legislative matters, using bulletins and public announcements, and most of these made an effort toward voter registration.

Meetings reported cooperation with like-minded organizations. Candidates were contacted about moral issues. Letters and petitions were written against pornography, liquor on planes, and alcohol in candy.

More than twice as many tracts were distributed as last year, 3,345. Distribution of an article on tobacco was specifically mentioned. There were 71 posters displayed, 50 of these made by our people, and 45 essays written. There were 87 total abstinence pledges given out and 80 books on moral issues added to church libraries. The sacredness of sex and marriage was stressed in various ways, including counseling, sermons, Sunday school classes, and youth discussions, sometimes with tapes or records. Work was done with youth in deprived areas, some of whom had been part of the drug culture. A poster and essay contest was held.

DEPARTMENT OF LEGISLATION

Many letters were sent to Congress and the airlines about liquor sold and served in planes and to Congress concerning permitting 8 percent alcohol content in candy. (The latter issue has been defeated for the time being.) Letters and materials were sent to all pastors and local Moral Action chairmen regarding the state lottery issue.

In Idaho, where there was a legislative session this year, there was a serious fight over the Criminal Code. A new code went into effect in January 1972, but there was so much opposition that it was repealed this spring. Eighteen-year-olds were given full adult rights except for the age to purchase liquor. That age limit was set at 19 years. Liquor can now be served at ski resorts if there are more than 50 paying overnight guests. An abortion bill was defeated. Bills were introduced to keep X-rated movies off the outdoor movie screens and to prevent rock festivals if the attendance was more than 1,000, but these bills did not pass. A Dram Shop Act, which would have made the tavern owner responsible for the death of anyone consuming alcoholic beverages at his establishment and driving on the highways was introduced but died a quick death. Petitions were circulated in Canyon County to enable a vote by the people in the fall of 1972 on the issue of selling wine in grocery and drug stores.

Verne Hyde, juvenile counselor of Jefferson County, Oregon, and an alumnus of George Fox College, was presented. He spoke, stressing that individual care is needed to help our juveniles and that Christ is the real answer to our nation's moral problems. Christians *must* become involved in loving concern for others.

Appreciation was expressed for this presentation.

- 67. The minutes were read and approved.

- 68. The report of George Fox College, given by President David Le Shana in the Thursday evening service, was approved and appears below.

There is an old word that has come again to the forefront of the academic scene in the United States. It is the word *accountability*. It is a good word, especially for Christian colleges! At George Fox College we must consider our accountability to our constituencies to whom we make this annual report, to our students and faculty, to the wider academic community, and above all else to our God.

In the last few years when public attention has been focused upon the plight of private higher education, it is refreshing to hear an educator like Dr. Earl J. McGrath, former United States Commissioner of Education, underscore the fact that the Christian college, with a genuine religious commitment, will have its greatest opportunity to satisfy some of our pressing future needs in society.

What is true of Christian colleges in general is true of George Fox College in particular. As an evangelical Christian college we profess to offer an education with a difference—indeed, an education that makes a difference! Academically strong, spiritually sound—we make no apology for our Christ-centeredness. I am convinced that if we are as attractive in other aspects as our secular counterparts, our religious commitment will attract rather than repel students.

We are accountable to many constituencies. The Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, the California Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, and other supporting churches and denominations must be able to have confidence in the college and its product; alumni will want to know whether the college deserves their continued support; parents will want to be assured that they will receive full measure for their investment.

On campus, faculty and students have a right to expect accountability. Do the stated objectives of the college give direction and purpose? Is there in actuality a sense of Christian community and academic viability?

There is an important place in American higher education for the small Christian college. Indeed, I believe that George Fox College has a role to fill in society, a mission to accomplish, that can be done by no other. There are some things that will not be done if George Fox College will not do them.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

I cannot overemphasize the greatest asset of our college, a competent and committed faculty. These men and women are some of God's choicest servants and serve well in the cause of Christian higher education. The faculty has been open to curricular and instructional change. They are alert to the extracurricular opportunities that result in the enrichment of the lives of students. The Christian Heritage Series with its emphasis on the Christian peace, the drive to assist Bangladesh, and the discussion of the majority-minority problems and possibilities on campus with Aaron Hamlin, consultant for the Friends Action Board, are examples of this kind of involvement. Also there were innumerable occasions when faculty and students visited together on campus or in the Commons to share the ways of God in the life of man.

During the past four years, Dr. Arthur Roberts has given outstanding leadership as dean of faculty. The forward look in academics, the new curriculum, the strong faculty, the new concepts of credit-by-examination, field experience, and extension centers are the result of his creative leadership. I am pleased that he has accepted the new appointment for next year as the Charles Replogle Memorial Professor. Joining the new administration as dean of the college is Dr. William D. Green, a man in whom I have high confidence as an educator and academician as well as a Christian leader.

Extension programs took a great stride forward with development of an in-service training program for teachers in the Sherman County School District. In addition, the college, in cooperation with the California Yearly Meeting and the Alaska Yearly Meeting, has developed plans for a degree structure program in conjunction with the Friends Bible School in Kotzebue, Alaska. Extension programs will provide opportunity for short courses led by GFC professors and others and for programmed learning and credit-by-examination.

RELIGIOUS LIFE AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

The spiritual life on campus has been gratifying. The Witness Crusade in the fall, the winter Missions Conference with Dr. Hubert Mitchell, and the ministries of Dr. Robert Hess and Dr. Paul Rees in the spring made a substantial impact on the lives of faculty and students. As a result of the Missions Conference, students have paid faith promise pledges of \$4,300 and this summer eight students were sent literally around the world as summer missionaries to spread the Word of God.

We continue to require of our students the Christian morals, ethics, and standards that are proclaimed by the New Testament and held by the evangelical movement.

The residence halls have been different this year. There is a new sense of accountability on the part of the students as well. There have been few serious problems, and numbers of students have indicated their desire to "keep it clean at Fox." I appreciate this support.

The athletic program is growing in effectiveness and has contributed much to campus morale and public acceptance with a winning basketball team that won a place in the NAIA district playoffs and a winning baseball team this spring.

PROPERTY AND FINANCE

The campus was expanded during the year with the acquisition of a 4.2-acre tract north of the present main campus and another 6.7 acres, also north of the campus, perhaps to be used in the future for a new athletic complex. The college also acquired a residence on Meridian Street adjacent to the campus, which is now being used for student housing.

One of the more important decisions I have made at the college was to invite Don Millage to join the administration as business manager. It is hard to describe the impact his knowledge has already made upon the fiscal operations of the college.

Although we have enjoyed an increase in funds and property, the cash flow continues to be a problem. The greater majority of the larger gifts are restricted, thus not adding funds for the payment of current expenses, which annually run about \$1,500,000.

While our financial problems are far from solved, we look to the future with confidence. We believe the measures that have been taken and others that will be initiated in the future will place the college on a

sound financial basis. With the help of a dedicated faculty and staff, with the guidance of an enlightened and concerned board, and above all, with trust in God for wisdom and strength, George Fox College will continue to play a significant role in the education of young people for Christian service in every walk of life.

DEVELOPMENT

I am pleased to report that the fiscal year 1971-72 was a million dollar year with current and capital fund gifts of \$400,000, two trusts totaling \$595,000, and a Title III grant of \$50,000. The Lord is certainly honoring the college! The gift report shows growing support of the college by alumni and friends as well as foundations and corporations. We are so grateful for this. Income from the larger trust, incidentally, will be used to underwrite a scholarship program.

The Valiant 500 Program has been completed with the final outcome the elimination of almost \$400,000 in secured debts. This is truly an answer to prayer!

During the past few months we have opened a California field office at the California Yearly Meeting of Friends Church headquarters. Glen Rinard, a former trustee and an alumnus, is servicing the program for us on a part-time basis, assisting the college's development, public relations, alumni, and admissions departments.

Our program of reaching the public and the church continues to grow with new opportunities to present George Fox College almost every day, both through direct contacts and the mass media.

The Alumni Association is an ever important segment of the college, playing an increasing role of influence. Activities include area meetings, the annual fund drive, student recruitment, homecoming, and various special projects.

LONG-RANGE PLANNING

We have initiated a new program of long-range planning under the guidance of Frank Cole, who left the office of dean of administration to assume this new duty as my assistant. The planning program will be beneficial to us in a number of ways. It provides a framework in which the nature of the complex and interrelated facets of the college operation are revealed and thus aids decision making. It provides an orientation of inestimable value for new and future personnel, and it provides a clear statement of a variety of goals that form the basis for a vigorous development program.

FUTURE PLANS

What of the future? Careful attention must continue to be given to fiscal affairs. Budgets must be balanced and creditors paid. Faculty salaries must be raised to competitive levels. Adequate facilities must be provided, especially for fine arts and physical education. We must develop broader constituencies to support the college. Continued academic growth is essential. A major emphasis must be given to recruitment and student retention, for we must move rapidly to an initial student body enrollment of 600. And, above all, we must grow in effectiveness as an evangelical Christian college.

It is difficult to adequately summarize the past year. There have been moments of crisis, and many pressing problems still remain. But throughout the year the presence of Christ has been very real as we have witnessed great answers to prayer and many blessings on the college. God has been

faithful! As I conclude a half decade of service to the college, including three years as president, I marvel at the way in which God has led and blessed.

■ 70. Milo Ross presented the report of the Reorganization Committee as follows:

Reference is made to minute 73, page 30, and minute 107, page 45, *Minutes* of 1971, to the duties and personnel of the committee. Your committee is composed of Milo C. Ross, chairman; Jack L. Willcuts, Walter P. Lee, Gordon St. George, and Dan Nolta. With the concurrence of the Executive Council, Earl P. Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee, was added. We have enjoyed the invaluable services and counsel of our general superintendent, Norval Hadley.

A full resumé of the historical position, the reasons for the study, Yearly Meeting actions, and the recommendations of the Church Growth Study have been circulated earlier in the year and need not be repeated here. Also, all meetings have had the advantage of the recommendation of your committee on the reorganization of monthly meetings, which were approved by the Executive Council in February and circulated to all meetings later in the spring. At that same February meeting, the Executive Council authorized our further study and recommendations to embrace the reorganization of the major boards and committees at the Yearly Meeting level.

Your committee has considered all concerns, questions, letters of inquiry, and recommendations submitted to it by boards, meetings, and concerned Friends. We have conferred, as well, with Friends and officers of a number of other yearly meetings. The tempo of concern and suggestions has increased, especially in June and July, and has been in evidence in the study of the Executive Council even this week, so that it has been impossible to present to the Yearly Meeting in session a final, exact reading of every item, even though we did have an earlier 40-page booklet to give out to one and all.

In order to present a terse, but exact, outline of all proposals and changes, it is our recommendation to the Yearly Meeting, concurred in by the Executive Council and the representative body, that we come before you to read these:

First, beginning with the Yearly Meeting at large—

No changes were found necessary in the first 30 pages of the 1970 *Constitution and Discipline*, except in the Table of Contents and in the name of the Yearly Meeting—Oregon to Northwest. Changes begin with page 31.

Paragraph 1. A rewording of the geographical distribution of Friends to conform to present fact.

A new board, to be called SPIRITUAL LIFE, is to include the following areas:

1. The functions and prerogatives of the present Board of Evangelism.
2. The pastoral ministry.
3. The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Counsel, with all of the concerns in regard to the recording and liberating of ministers.
4. The Music Committee.
5. The activity functions of the Board of Moral Action (including literature) and the peace activity functions of the present Board of Peace and Service.

6. With regard to the relationship of para-Yearly Meeting organizations, we suggest that the Church Extension Foundation, Friendsview Manor, and Friends Action Board look to the Spiritual Life Board.

The second new board is to be called EDUCATION and is to include the following areas:

1. The functions and prerogatives of the present Board of Christian Education.
2. The functions and prerogatives of the present Board of General Education.
3. The educational functions of the Board of Moral Action (which include literature) and the peace educational functions of the present Board of Peace and Service.
4. The camp boards will relate through this board.

The third new board, to be called STEWARDSHIP, combines the functions and prerogatives of the present Board of Stewardship and the Board of Finance.

For legal reasons, we recommend that the Board of Trustees remain as is.

The fourth new board is to be called OUTREACH and is to combine the functions and prerogatives of the present Board of Missions and the service half of the Board of Peace and Service.

The Board of Publication is to remain as is.

Other committees, listed on page 50 of the *Constitution and Discipline*, remain as they are.

The same can be said for all other officers as named on pages 38, 39, and 40. The Executive Council of the Yearly Meeting, page 40, will be much the same except that there will be fewer boards to be represented.

Some significant differences are recommended in the composition and service of the representative body (cf. pages 33 and 51).

1. It shall continue to be made up of persons appointed by local churches, with every local church and extension church being entitled to at least one representative.

2. But, the representative(s) shall be chosen for a year in advance, beginning service at the conclusion of the Yearly Meeting in session and then serving to and including the following Yearly Meeting. Vacancies can be filled by the local church as any other vacancy if a person cannot attend, but the privilege of late alternates is being withdrawn.

3. At least one of these persons shall be a member of the Administrative Committee of the local church throughout the year previous to his attendance at Yearly Meeting.

4. The representative body may meet at times other than Yearly Meeting in session.

We, together with the Executive Council, have gone on record favoring a theological and philosophical statement to define purposes and functions to be composed and placed at the beginning of each section outlining the work of each board. (No such statement now appears.) This task has been turned to Earl Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee.

Chapter III, entitled "Meetings on Ministry and Counsel" and dealing with the recording procedures and the liberating of ministers and other workers, is being placed in correct order under SPIRITUAL LIFE. But significant editing has been done to define the use of the words *minister* and *pastor*. These changes necessitate a new section under SPIRITUAL

LIFE, entitled "The Recorded Ministry," and a section under Part II, Chapter II, entitled "Duties and Privileges of Pastors," now under Part II, Chapter III. There is no substantive change in any of this, with one exception: paragraph 6, entitled "Termination of Pastoral Relation," provides for the pastor to request a hearing in due process, if he so requests.

Going back to the new group of boards, perhaps the major change at this time stems from our division of the "activity" and "educational" function. First, we think it is the duty of EDUCATION to provide for instruction in the several biblical and Friends testimonies and therefore request that it organize itself to give leadership and curricula. In activity, we are thinking of community, legal, or legislative involvement.

Peace is under SPIRITUAL LIFE; the educational function is under EDUCATION. Activity may be in counseling youth before public authorities or by the public ministry. The activity function allows Service to be placed alongside Missions and is especially concerned with all types of Christian service in other lands.

In regard to the paragraphs in the *Discipline* dealing with the present Board of General Education, we have united in deleting the entire section providing for a visiting committee to the college (cf. pages 46-47). We have been asked by the Executive Council to strengthen the wording expressly naming George Fox College and Greenleaf Friends Academy.

The new Friends Fund is to relate itself to the Executive Council.

Although this matter is somewhat extraneous to our specific mandate, and may more properly be assigned to the Discipline Revision Committee, we note an inconsistency in that the Articles of Incorporation of the Friends Church Extension Foundation are included on pages 83 and 84. While we have no opposition to their being so placed, we wonder why they alone are included and not the charter of the Yearly Meeting itself, or that of George Fox College, Friends Action Board, or Friends Fund. We plead for consistency, and we ask for continued consideration of this matter.

At the local level, we continue to recommend the four major standing committees as in operation in many meetings now and in conformity to the Church Growth Study. They are: SPIRITUAL LIFE, which embraces the concerns and work of the present Ministry and Counsel, the former Evangelism Committee, all areas of worship, including music and ushering, and the activities of Moral Action and Peace. The nursery and/or children's church may be under SPIRITUAL LIFE or EDUCATION.

The second new committee is EDUCATION, embracing Christian education in all its facets, the present general education, the library, the educational functions in moral action, literature, and peace. The nursery and/or children's church may be under EDUCATION or SPIRITUAL LIFE.

The third new committee is called STEWARDSHIP but embraces the functions of the present Stewardship Committee, the Trustees, and the Finance Committee.

The fourth new committee is called OUTREACH and embraces missions (or foreign missions), service to the members and to the community, and new or service ministries.

The other standing committees are Administrative and Nominating, both functioning throughout the year.

Under Chapter II (present *Discipline*), entitled "Meetings for Business," Section II, we may consider several recommended changes:

1. A new paragraph outlines for the first time the functions of the business meeting, or the total community of Friends. The new reading is "The local church is the general policy making body. It has authority to call and contract pastoral services; to adopt the annual budget; to accept and dismiss members; to hold and administer real estate and other property for the use of the church; to consider, adopt, and carry out measures in the interest of the church and the community at large. We believe that such a statement is essential to maintain our concept of democracy and to protect the total church when the Administrative Committee is delegated areas of administration and implementation.

2. The term *monthly meeting* is now obsolete. New terms are *local church* and *business meeting*. The business meeting must meet at least every three months, or on call at any time, but not necessarily monthly.

3. The Administrative Committee is composed of the chairmen of the standing committees plus the pastor and the clerk of the local church and at least one representative to the Yearly Meeting and others the local church may include. Either the clerk or the pastor may be elected as chairman. It is the publicity committee.

In concurrence with the Executive Council and the representative body, your committee recommends the passage of this reorganization of the boards and committees of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

1. We further recommend that this basic outline of revision, and not the thematic additions, be considered as the first reading, with the possible final action one year hence.

2. We propose to prepare full copies and get them in sufficient numbers to the local churches for study, perhaps in two or three months.

3. We further recommend that either we, or a like committee, be continued to finish our task. We propose that the membership of the Discipline Revision Committee be added to our present committee, not only because we believe it is wise to correlate these two functions, but also Gordon St. George will not be able to serve.

After considerable discussion, the report of the Reorganization Committee was tabled until a later session. (See minutes 74, 92, pages 38, 42.)

■ 71. (A) Wilmer N. Brown, Pacific Region field director of the National Association of Evangelicals, told of the work of this great interdenominational organization. An important arm of NAE is their World Relief Commission. He stated that four out of five of their depots of relief overseas the past year have been manned by youth of Northwest Yearly Meeting. These have been Stuart and Kathie Willcuts and Gary Black in Vietnam, Fredric and LaVonne Gregory in Bangladesh, James and Garyanna Linhart in Chile, and Jerry Sandoz in Korea.

(B) Ralph Greenidge, pastor of our Holly Park church in Seattle representing the National Negro Evangelical Association, spoke concerning the mobilization of Blacks in becoming organized in feeling their responsibility in evangelistic outreach among their own people and in general.

Our Yearly Meeting is a member of the NNEA. He requested our prayers and invited individuals to join this organization. Whites as well as Blacks may become members.

(C) Jack Willcuts spoke on behalf of the Christian Holiness Association (formerly the National Holiness Association). They will be in national convention the last of April 1973 at the Hilton Hotel in Portland.

The three foregoing reports were approved.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

■ 72. President Gerald Dillon presented the work of the Board of Missions.

Nicholas Maurer, missionary on furlough, reported on the progress of the work of the National Friends Church in Peru. The nationals are developing and becoming more mature and efficient in their leadership, he stated.

Eugene Comfort, recently returned from Bolivia, brought greetings from the brethren there. He reminded us that one year ago, during our Yearly Meeting here, the missionaries were in great danger and uncertainty during the revolution in Bolivia. God brought them through this trying time in safety. The work there continues to grow.

Field reports were read from the mission councils in both Peru and Bolivia and are incorporated in the Board of Missions report, which follows:

The past year has been characterized by political revolution in Bolivia, doctrinal attacks against the church in Peru, and the general spiritual blight that often accompanies a growing materialistic culture. Yet, Christ has continued to build His Church among the Aymaras, and the gates of hell have not been able to prevail. Both here at home and abroad this has been a year of advance and growth in the work of foreign missions. For all that has been accomplished we thank God.

RESPONSE AT HOME

With the appointment of John Fankhauser as field coordinator a year ago, there has been a substantial growth in the board's ministry to the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Through this office 28 mission conferences have been arranged, numerous letters have been written, and personal conferences held with leaders. Missionaries David and Florence Thomas and Edwin and Marie Cammack, who have been on furlough, have been busy in deputation representing the work of Bolivia and Peru in most of our churches.

The result has been enlarged vision and spiritual dedication to the total work of Christ both at home and abroad. This is indicated in many ways, especially through increased praying and giving. For the first time in the history of our Yearly Meeting, giving has gone over the \$100,000 level for foreign missions. The board has given its full support to the Unified Budget through outreach conferences and rejoices at the higher level of giving for the total ministry of our Yearly Meeting.

FIELD REPORTS

Bolivia—Just one year ago while we were gathered in Yearly Meeting sessions, our missionaries in La Paz were surrounded by the gunfire and turbulence of political revolution. Although the mission home was invaded by guerillas carrying machine guns, no one was harmed and a very small amount of property was taken. We thank God for His protection and blessing.

The Eugene Comfort family, the Ronald Stansell family, and the Harold Thomas family have served on the field for this year. Although Ron and Carolyn were in Aymara language school for 2½ months and Harold and Nancy did not arrive until January, the missionaries have been a most effective team, giving counsel to the national church leaders, assisting them in transportation, writing and publishing textbooks, leading in evangelism and educational concern, and doing the chores missionary

life entails from day to day. By their relation with each other and with the national church, they have functioned as a true body of Christ. However, one more missionary family is desperately needed for the continued growth and development of the work.

Mary Bel Cammack has ably assisted in Bolivia for four months of the year in youth work, music education, and clerical work.

The church has not continued its previous rate of growth due to some internal disciplinary problems. However, the mature manner in which the church handled these is commendable. At the present time the *Mesa Directiva*, the pastors, and many of the believers are showing united concern for a new emphasis in evangelism, maturing of the believers, and the training of pastoral leadership. The future looks good for the Bolivian Friends Church, and we anticipate a great year of growth and advance.

One significant development has been the beginning of an interdenominational seminary with Ron Stansell as the director. Three denominations are cooperating in this endeavor, and under the capable leadership of Ron we anticipate a great future for the school.

Peru—Due to very determined efforts of some religious groups, we have lost some members in the Juli church and in the Tacna area. Some of this has been due to our failure to have missionary personnel in the Tacna area providing leadership and counsel and to insufficient material aid.

In spite of this, under the leadership of Nick and Alice Maurer, Duane and Sherrill Comfort, and Mary Bel Cammack the work has gone forward. The *Mesa Directiva* is a "good team with some outstanding men," capable of giving leadership to the church. Two new churches have been started; some are showing signs of renewed life and strength, while others stand in need of more maturity.

The major thrusts of our work continue to be evangelism, church planting, extension education, counseling the national church leaders, and assisting them in a more fully organized and functioning church. A great area of development has been in music under the leadership of Mary Bel Cammack. Besides these major areas are the many smaller tasks so much a part of missionary work. This may mean running an improvised ambulance service for sick and dying people, helping to bury a believer's baby who has died during an epidemic, or providing truck service for hauling adobes for building a new meeting place.

Mexico City—Koreans of Portland—Literature Service—In addition to these two fields of South America, the Yearly Meeting continues to cooperate with the Evangelical Friends Alliance in the work of Mexico City, assisting in the work among the Koreans of Portland under the leadership of Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim, and providing the Friends Missionary Literature Service headed by Ralph Chapman. The work of Mexico City can be described as a healthy beachhead established in a culture of materialism and religious formalism. Two small centers function as places for an assembly of believers. Roscoe and Tina Knight work with the people teaching, leading, and encouraging them. The past year while they have been home on furlough, Quentin and Florene Nordyke have been loaned to the Alliance for this work.

The Korean Church of Portland continues to grow with an average attendance of 71. We thank the Lord for Pastor Kim and the work of his people as they build His Church among the Koreans of greater Portland.

Ralph Chapman has given great assistance in the literature work of the board, writing textbooks for use in South America, supplying tracts

for the missionaries and nationals, and giving counsel to the board in concerns of literature and development.

BOARD ACTIVITIES

In addition to the three scheduled meetings of the board and the many meetings of the Administrative Committee, numerous telephone calls have been made, personal conferences held, and letters written. The work of the field coordinator has been most effective as literally hours of time have been given to tasks too numerous to mention.

The board asked the president and the field coordinator to visit the foreign fields during June and July. Conferences were held with the missionaries and national church leaders; encouragement and counsel were given where needed, and other help was given in many areas of work. These two were accompanied by their wives, Alice and Ione, who at their own expense chose to see the work with their husbands. Their presence was a real encouragement and blessing, not only to their husbands but to the women missionaries and women leaders of the national church.

With thankful hearts we give God all the praise for the accomplishments this past year and pray for a greater year ahead. Let us all join in prayer that the work of God may be manifest in accomplishment of His mission.

The missions report was approved.

Friday, 2:30 p.m.

■ 73. As the afternoon session opened, Frederick Baker led in prayer.

■ 74. Discussion was resumed on the report of the Reorganization Committee, with Milo Ross as moderator. (See minutes 70, 92, pages 32, 42.)

A number spoke favorably of this new plan on the local level but questioned it on the Yearly Meeting level. Milo Ross stated that he felt a whole new concept of group dynamics needed to be considered, that more effort may be given to the most essential responsibilities of the church—that of prayer groups, outreach, and fellowship—rather than spending so much of our effort on the mechanics of organization.

It was suggested that because of the time factor this discussion be continued Saturday morning. In the meantime, individuals with questions may contact members of the committee.

BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

■ 75. The work of the Board of General Education was presented by the president, Philip Fendall.

Ronald Crecelius, director of Christian life at George Fox College, reported on spiritual progress of students in transformed lives and concern for others. Christian Emphasis Week, Missions Week, chapel services, prayer meetings, and student deputation have been dynamic in the spiritual life of the college.

The report of the Board of General Education follows:

The goals of our board this past year were as follows:

a. Provide one-half of the support for the George Fox College director of Christian life.

b. Administer the Ministerial Scholarship Fund.

c. Encourage members of each church to become more involved in promoting high standards in public and private schools in their respective communities.

d. Urge churches and individuals to participate in scholarship programs to aid young people to attend George Fox College.

Our goal has been accomplished for the support of the George Fox College director of Christian life. Our board continues to feel strongly that Ronald Crecelius is very effective in this capacity.

Two young men received funds from the Ministerial Aid Fund during the past year. We have three applications in process for the coming year.

Since approximately 75 percent of the annual reports from the local churches have been received to date, the following statistics are not accurate for the entire Yearly Meeting.

Seventy-six people in our Yearly Meeting are actively involved in education by being members of school boards and officers of PTA. There is much room for more involvement in this area.

Twenty-one young people are in preparation for full-time church-supported vocations at George Fox College; 17 are taking similar preparation at other colleges, and 12 are attending seminaries. Each church should encourage young people to seek God's leading in vocational guidance.

The following activities have been effectively used by our churches to encourage 11th and 12th grade students to attend George Fox College: messages in our churches by Dr. Le Shana; presentations in our churches by other college staff members and student groups; concerts by George Fox College choir, band, and orchestra; Future Freshman Day, May Day, church banquets to promote GFC, personal contacts with youth, special youth meetings, and display tables in churches.

Fourteen churches are aiding youth in matching scholarships or grants-in-aid. A number of churches budget money for George Fox College and Greenleaf Friends Academy. Some churches aid college young people in finding summer jobs. A number of individuals contribute money to George Fox College and Greenleaf Academy.

Greenleaf Academy is being promoted in some churches in the following ways: ads in the annual, inserts in church bulletins, academy choir programs, Principal Kendall Smitherman scheduled for services, literature table, academy musical groups, annual Greenleaf Academy Sale, ice cream social at Greenleaf church, and personal contacts with youth.

Some churches have done much to promote quality education with a Christian emphasis. Some activities are: day care centers, financial support of released time programs in public schools, kindergarten programs, tuition paid for Sunday school workers to attend Sunday School Convention, National Education Fellowship seminars, observing Teacher Recognition Sunday, providing facilities for a Christian school by Springbrook Friends Church, Fine Arts Festival at Reedwood, participation in Portland Adult Tutoring System, and support of Salem Academy.

Our report forms show a total of 387 teachers from kindergarten through college, including those who are retired and nonresident teachers. This is a significant number and includes many outstanding educators. It was truly an honor for our Yearly Meeting to have one of its members selected as Oregon Teacher of the Year for 1971-72. Our congratulations are extended to Verne Martin, member of Sherwood Friends Church.

A number of churches requested that more information be given by our board to the local churches concerning what can be done at the local level to further quality education. Some would like more information about the National Education Fellowship. One report stated, "Send us some school teachers." Another report said, "Stir us up." The present

members of the Board of General Education do not have the time to accomplish the many things that could be helpful to Northwest Yearly Meeting. Now is the time for each church to take the following steps: establish meaningful goals, list ways to accomplish these goals, and work until the goals are achieved.

■ 76. As the Saturday morning session convened, Raymond Haworth led in prayer.

■ 77. The minutes were read, corrected, and approved.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

■ 78. The report of the Board of Christian Education, Lloyd A. Melhorn, president, presented in the Friday evening session was approved. A summary follows:

The Christian Education Resource File notebook was increased by 50 many pages that it became necessary to provide larger binders, three to church, at Yearly Meeting. One of the main emphases for this year is the encouragement for each Sunday school to participate in Key '73. Suggestions for implementation of this program are included in the Resource File.

This board will work more closely with the Friends Youth Executive Committee through the person of Kara Cole. She will be meeting with them on a regular basis.

Over 1,500 campers participated in one or more of the camping opportunities (area camps, trail camps, Surfside, Island-Hopping, motorcycle campout).

More than 3,000 pupils participated in vacation Bible schools.

This year the board on consultation with the general superintendent will be selecting two churches for "Pilot Programs" in Christian education. Rather than making so many short visits to churches throughout the year our EFA Christian education consultant, Dorothy Barratt, will be giving special attention to the two selected churches for more in-depth training. Dorothy will work with the local church in evaluating and building an effective Christian education program. One of the key factors in choosing a pilot church will be the readiness of the local Christian education staff.

Twenty-six Sunday schools showed a total gain of 251 in average attendance. However, this was nearly offset with the loss of 226 by 29 Sunday schools. Two Sunday schools remained the same. The total average attendance for the Yearly Meeting was 5,098.

A variety of programs and methods have been effective this past year. They include: collegiate rap meetings (Eugene); Hour of Biblical Studies, 90 minutes of Sunday school on Sunday evening (Friends Memorial of Seattle); day care (Reedwood, Clackamas Park, Tigard, Friends Memorial, and Olympic View); motorcycle campout (Boise); home Bible studies; youth choir performances (Clackamas Park, Reedwood, Newberg); day camps (Agnew, Reedwood, Boise); Car and Cycle Club (Hayden Lake); and wrangler pack trip (Medford).

Board personnel and other resource people are available to assist any church regarding any question they may have.

A printed news sheet covering the activities of the Board of Christian Education for the past year was distributed in the Friday evening service.

■ 79. A minute was read for John and Dorothy Sinton, Friends ministers and evangelists from Ireland. This was forwarded to the Committee on Returning Minutes. Their presence with us is appreciated.

■ 80. The following nominations were received to the George Fox College Board of Trustees:

■ 83. The representatives made the following nominations to the Board of Stewardship for three-year terms: Ruth Washburn, Roy F. Knight, Craig Hayes.

Approved.

■ 84. The representatives presented the following nominations to the Board of Christian Education for three-year terms: Lon Fendall, Patsy Perisho, Samuel E. Drinnon.

Approved.

■ 85. The representatives nominated Brian Beals for a two-year term on the Evangelical Friends Pension Committee.

Approved.

■ 86. The representatives nominated Arthur O. Roberts for a three-year term on the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations.

Approved.

■ 87. The Board of Peace and Service recommended the appointment of the following people to the Friends Action Board for three-year terms: Roland Hartley, Maurice Magee, Sheldon Newkirk.

Approved.

■ 88. The representatives made the following nominations to the Board of Evangelism for three-year terms: Leroy Powell, Oscar N. Brown, Ellouise Chandler.

Approved.

■ 89. A resignation was received from Roland Hartley from the Board of Peace and Service. This was accepted.

■ 90. The representatives presented the following nominations to the Board of Peace and Service: for three-year terms—Wayne Hoopes, Duane Noel, Elenita Bales; for a two-year term to fill out Fredric Gregory's unexpired term—Louise Yates; for a one-year term to fill the unexpired term of Walter P. Lee—Ronald McDougal, and for a one-year term to fill the unexpired term of Roland Hartley—Esther Mae Hinshaw.

■ 91. The representatives nominated the following to three-year terms on the Board of Publication: Phyllis Cammack, Barry Hubbell.

Approved.

■ 92. The report of the Reorganization Committee was presented for further discussion. (See minutes 70, 74, pages 32, 38.)

Milo Ross, chairman of this committee, summed up the sentiments of most of those who have voiced their opinions prior to this meeting as follows:

1. There has been general approval concerning reorganization at the local level.

2. Most concerns have to do with groupings of certain boards.

Milo Ross made the proposition that if there is substantial approval, the committee will make further study and adjustment and report back to the Executive Council at midyear.

After considerable discussion, the following recommendations by the Reorganization Committee were presented to the meeting.

1. It is recommended that this basic outline of revision, and not the thematic additions, be considered as the first reading, with the possible final action one year hence.

Approved.

2. It is proposed to prepare copies of the revision and get them in sufficient numbers to the local churches for study.

Approved.

3. It is further recommended that either this committee, or a like committee, be continued to finish the task. It is proposed that the membership of the Discipline Revision Committee be added to the present committee, not only because it is wise to correlate these two functions but also because Gordon St. George will not be able to serve.

It was approved that the present committee, together with the Discipline Revision Committee, be the Reorganization Committee for the coming year.

Appreciation was expressed for the work of the committee.

■ 93. Ken Smitherman, principal of Greenleaf Friends Academy, made the following annual report:

The year 1971-72 was a most challenging and spiritually uplifting year at Greenleaf Friends Academy. Spiritual life on the campus was at an all-time high, with many students developing a deeper and more meaningful Christian experience. This was evidenced by dynamic personal testimony and true changes in the lives of many students.

The faculty retreat at Quaker Hill offered a time of spiritual renewal together with sharing professionally and a time of relaxation prior to the opening of the fall term.

Willis Keithly was our guest during Spiritual Emphasis Week, presenting the Gospel through his interesting ministry of science and photography.

During the latter part of October, the faculty went to Seattle, Washington, where we were hosted by King's Garden at the annual teachers' conference of the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools.

At this same time two of our senior girls, Jana Binford and Sue Rinard, left Greenleaf to spend three weeks as exchange students with Abington Friends School in Philadelphia. They arrived home just prior to Thanksgiving after an experience that gave them opportunity to share their personal relationship with Christ and to tour numerous historical sights, including a visit to Congress in Washington, D.C.

During the latter part of January, Karen Hansen and Claire Crossman, senior girls at Abington Friends, came to spend three weeks at Greenleaf. This provided a tremendous opportunity for our students to host these guests and to share the fruits of their own spiritual experiences.

In the fall a special alumni telethon was conducted to encourage financial support from all alumni of Greenleaf Academy. This project was carried out by the gracious assistance of class representatives from each graduating class of the academy.

The alumni drive in conjunction with the first annual Christmas dinner, which was emceed by Dr. Charles Ball, Azusa Pacific College, proved to be genuine financial successes in procuring in excess of \$12,000 in cash and pledges for the year. The Christmas dinner gave opportunity for faculty and students to share in the various programs of the academy.

In March, the concert choir and band traveled to Seattle Pacific College for the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools' annual Musicale. Greenleaf Academy had the privilege of participating in the mass choir and band concert, which was held at the Seattle Opera House. The choir and band then toured and held concerts in several of the Seattle area Friends churches prior to returning home.

The second annual Christian Celebrity Concert in the spring featured British soloist, John Grant, and two local gospel groups, The Galileans and the King's Witnesses. About 800 guests were in attendance at the concert.

This past year saw the institution of our special guidance program under the direction of chaplain-counselor, Samuel Drinnon. In addition to personal and spiritual counseling, great emphasis was placed upon college and career placement services. The academy was honored by being named the private school with the most outstanding career orientation program in our area. A special program was conducted for students not involved in Musicale, in which a number of special guests were featured in seminars on subjects ranging from the FBI to health careers. Sam Drinnon received an outstanding counselor award for his efforts and achievements in this area.

Our new industrial arts program under the leadership of Bruce Ankeny made great headway in further developing the shop. Several large pieces of shop equipment were furnished through the gracious giving of interested persons. The advanced shop class was involved in several school projects, including curbing the parking area of the school.

As a member of the Treasure Valley League, Greenleaf Academy participated in football, cross-country, basketball, and track.

Commencement exercises on the campus lawn graduated 20 seniors with Harold Clark, pastor of Star Friends Church, bringing the commencement address. A standing ovation by the senior class was given to classmate David Harris, who was awarded an appointment to West Point Military Academy. Value of the scholarship has been estimated at \$50,000.

We are pleased with the high quality of our faculty. Of special interest in the academic area, five of the ten certificated faculty members on our staff hold masters degrees. Their interest and dedication to the vitality of the Christian school have been demonstrated over and over. Three new faculty members have been added: Bill Burns, social science; Kathy Burns, English and physical education; and Wesley Folsom, music and junior high. We regretted the resignation this year of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Pumphrey, Esther Hardinger, and Dianna Kennison.

Principal Ken Smitherman represented Greenleaf Academy at the second annual National Institute of Christian School Administration held on the Grace College campus in Winona Lake, Indiana, this summer. The institute offered a program of workshops and in-service training in the philosophy and administration of elementary and secondary Christian schools. Twenty-nine states and three foreign countries were represented at the institute.

We are looking forward to a most interesting and dynamic program, which will open school this fall. FIRST WEEK '72 will involve the entire student body during the first week, August 28-September 1, which will be spent at Quaker Hill in McCall, Idaho. This special outdoor education program and spiritual emphasis will involve a special team from Campus Crusade for Christ headed by Clyde Elbrecht, who was high school coordinator for Explo '72. Dr. Russel Platz, head of the music education department of Wheaton College, will head our special music workshop for band and choir members. Other areas of interest will be art, science, physical education, industrial arts, language arts, drama, and various problem solving activities. We feel this unique and unusual experience will be an exciting and innovative approach to the opening of school.

Registration for the 1972-73 school term will be on Friday, August 25.

In July the Board of Directors of the academy extended their warm appreciation and thanks to Chairman Cecil Binford, who resigned as board chairman following years of faithful and unselfish service and leadership to the board. Marvin Jennings was elected chairman to succeed Cecil Binford.

As the beginning of this school year approaches, it is with real earnestness that we seek God's guidance for the ensuing year. We are thrilled with the opportunity of ministry that avails itself in our Friends Academy—the opportunity of nurturing and offering guidance to our students in a setting of totally dedicated Christian teachers and staff. With a Bible-centered curriculum, it is our desire that strong Christian leadership will continue to be developed within the lives of our student body.

We again ask your continued prayer support and interest as we embark on this venture of leading and directing in the lives of tomorrow's leaders. Will you join with us in this tremendous ministry of Friends through Christian education and PRAY WITHOUT CEASING?

We urge you to take all possible steps to eliminate the sale and service of alcoholic beverages on commercial airlines. This practice is a hazard to health and safety, and by increasing basic fare costs adds a disproportionate burden on the nondrinker. (See minute 57, page 25.)

■ 107. The Epistle Committee presented the following summary of epistles received from other yearly meetings:

Epistles received the past year came from 29 yearly meetings with 15 of these coming from foreign countries or areas, including Central America, East Africa, Ireland, London, Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Norway, Japan, Germany, Sweden, France, Denmark, and Switzerland.

Several of the communications included messages from their youth groups.

Friends in *Ireland* who gathered in April of this year for their Yearly Meeting in Dublin, spoke of appreciation for the understanding, aid, and visits from Friends in other parts of the world during this, Ireland's great time of trouble. From *Switzerland* comes mention of the effect on their meeting of a "revealing talk about John Woolman," in which the speaker quoted Woolman's admonition to "win the person, not the argument."

From *France* came a note of the great blessing received at their annual meeting from the reading of epistles from other yearly meetings. The epistle from *Central America* Yearly Meeting of Friends notes at the end of one year as an independent indigenous yearly meeting they have 100 monthly meetings belonging to 13 quarterly meetings within Guatemala, Honduras, and El Salvador. This new yearly meeting is supporting a missionary pastor in San Salvador.

California Yearly Meeting of Friends Church noted their 1971 Yearly Meeting for the first meeting on the campus of Azusa Pacific College enjoying the instruction of Dr. Donald Chittick of George Fox College.

Ohio Yearly Meeting, which in its 1971 sessions officially became the Evangelical Friends Church, Eastern Region, noted some growth and evidence of revival. They were challenged to greater involvement in urban areas.

Indiana Quakers completed celebration of a year-long sesquicentennial observance of the birth of Indiana Yearly Meeting. The year of celebration brought forth two publications and a play. The publications were *Our Special Heritage* (pictorial) and the other entitled *Called to Make History*. The play, historical in nature, is entitled *A Venture in Faith*.

Indiana Young Friends indicated a growth of unity between themselves and the adult Yearly Meeting. *Baltimore* reports more young Friends "in goodly numbers." *North Carolina* Friends tell of continued work among

monthly meetings aiding Negroes in training for better economic opportunities. The two Friends Schools in the Yearly Meeting have from their beginnings been integrated. Friends are working diligently to aid in the transition to integration in public schools.

■ 109. The Epistle Committee presented the following epistle to be sent out:

Greetings to all those throughout the world who call upon the name of the Savior, Jesus Christ.

Northwest Yearly Meeting opened its 80th session with the keynote message from our general superintendent, Norval Hadley. He had stated in his message a year ago that if we do not learn to change in this fast-moving society, the world is going to leave the church behind. As a response to this, 33 churches showed some growth; the others held their own or lost. In nearly every growing church the leadership has been willing to initiate new patterns of action.

We are now seeing more clearly the difference between dying churches and thriving, living churches. Through the years since Jesus founded the church, it has gradually turned from the simple, original provision that made it powerful and compelling. Several distortions came into the life of the church, from which we are suffering today.

One distortion is that of popular thinking fastening upon a building as the identifying symbol of the church. In the beginning, *working for the church* meant the exercise of gifts to perform a ministry among people wherever they were, but gradually it came to mean doing some religious act within a building. If we wanted a friend to hear about Jesus, we were told to bring him to the building. Our superintendent challenged us by saying that it was never intended that the world should come to the church, but rather, the church is to go to the world.

Another distortion came with a gradual transfer of responsibility from the people to what was termed *the clergy*. The scriptural concept that every believer is in the ministry, is a priest before God, was gradually lost. When the ministry was thus left to the professionals, nothing remained for the people to do but just come to church and listen.

This pattern whereby church life consists of spectators hearing the professionals nearly eliminates the opportunity for fellowship. The New Testament lays strong stress on the need for Christians to know each other well enough to bear one another's burdens, confess faults to one another, rebuke, exhort, and admonish one another through the Word, song, and prayer. Such fellowship and love create a heart hunger in the soul of a non-Christian.

Northwest Yearly Meeting feels keenly its responsibilities to God and the many spiritually hungry about us. With a sense of gratefulness and humility, we praise Him for the largest numerical gain in membership in our history. This year we gained 351 members. The churches gave a little over \$198,500 to the Yearly Meeting programs this year. The Sunday school had a slight gain. There were 1,076 registered at the summer camps. George Fox College reported an outstanding year with the blessing of the Lord on its student body and faculty. Especially evident was the Lord's help in the business and financial matters of the college.

Friends Youth, with at least 175 in attendance, carried on a vital program during the Yearly Meeting week, with Paul "Tex" Yearout as a special speaker. Children's Yearly Meeting for grades one through six had an enthusiastic group at the daytime activities held at nearby Camp Tilikum.

Besides human resources activities carried on by the college, Friends have opened a drop-in center for bewildered youth. For lonely senior citizens in nursing homes there are those who have dedicated themselves to that ministry. The Friends Action Board has been active in our home work as well as in foreign ministries. The Board of Missions reported blessing and growth in the church among the Aymara Indians in Bolivia and Peru as well as in other areas of their work.

During the sessions of our Yearly Meeting in business and in worship our hearts have been strangely warmed. Armin Gesswein has opened the Scriptures, showing us that the praying Christ is the supreme argument for prayer. The noted Christian scholar and author, Dr. Paul S. Rees, aroused us with this ringing imperative that we walk as children of light.

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." (1 Corinthians 15:58)

TUESDAY: "The Restlessness of Jesus"

Text: "Let us go on to the next towns." Mark 1:38

Jesus was strenuous as well as serene. He was passionate as well as peaceful. He was restless as well as restful.

First of all, his restlessness was not the restlessness of *conflict*, as it is with so many. Too many of us are victims of a deep, insistent, unresolved inner conflict. Not Jesus!

In the second place, the restlessness of Jesus was not the restlessness of *covetousness*. Greed sends many people out on the sweaty chase for the dollar. There was nothing of this graspingness about Jesus.

Thirdly, and positively, the restlessness of Jesus was the restlessness of *compassion*. This secret is given to us in the incident with which the first chapter of Mark concludes, the healing of the leper. We read that in healing him, Jesus was "moved with compassion." Compassion means at least two things: (1) that we get identified with those whom we want to serve, and (2) that we become involved in their needs, whether physical or spiritual.

WEDNESDAY: "Escalating Our Expectations"

Text: "And a certain man lame from his mother's womb . . . gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them." Acts 3:2, 5

- I. Dare to Be Expectant with Yourself
- II. Dare to Be Expectant of Others

Some people have an expectancy level of zero. They are the thorough-going pessimists and skeptics. Some people have an expectancy level of, let us say, fifty. They don't look for much. Not surprisingly, they get just about what they look for! Then there are the relatively few who have an expectancy level of one hundred, or something approximating it. At least, they are operating on a rising rather than a receding tide of faith.

THURSDAY: "On Guarding Against Idols"

Two Old Testament passages and two New Testament passages form the text:

"You shall have no other gods before me." Exodus 20:3

"O Lord our God, other lords besides thee have ruled over us." Isaiah 26:13

"You turned to God from idols, to serve a living and true God." 1 Thessalonians 1:9

"Little children, keep yourselves from idols," or, as Phillips has it, "Be on your guard . . . against every false god!" 1 John 5:21

The early Christians challenged the pagan gods that looked like idols—actual physical images. Today's Christians must challenge the idols of religion and culture that appear in more subtle forms. For example, the idol of *form*—"holding the form of religion but denying the power of it," as it is expressed by Paul in his letter to Timothy.

Or, again, there is the idol of *things*. In writing to the Philippians, totally as a God-breathed book does not mean that we commit ourselves to some idolatrous regard for a particular version of the Scriptures. The King James Bible, for example, is in English. As such, its words are no more to be idolized than the words of a Bible in German, or a Bible in Swedish, or a Bible in Japanese. The words are important, as words must be in serious communication, but it is the message that is all-important.

Or, again, there is the idol of *things*. In writing to the Philippians, Paul speaks about people "whose god is the belly . . . who mind earthly things."

Finally, there is the idol of *status*. *The Status Seekers*, about whom Vance Packard wrote in his book by that title, are not all to be found among the society ladies who live in suburbia or the corporation executives who belong to General Motors, or General Mills, or General Electric. The status seekers are too often found right in the church. It is one of the idols that needs to be challenged and against which we need to be on our guard.

FRIDAY: "It's Fire or Fire!"

Text: "Set on fire of hell" James 3:6

"I came to cast fire upon the earth; and would that it were already kindled." Luke 12:49

Here we have two kinds of fire: one demonic, the other divine. We have two tongues of flame: one of hell, the other of heaven.

Some years ago it was said: "In Poland it's a race between Christianity and Communism. Whichever makes its message a flame of fire will win."

T. S. Eliot has some lines that are appropriate here:

The only hope, or else despair
Lies in the choice of pyre or pyre—
To be redeemed from fire by fire.

* * *

We only live, only suspire,
Consumed by either fire or fire.

Both the New Testament and T. S. Eliot are telling us that in the realm of passion only a higher passion can meet and master an inferior passion.

Demonic fires are raging today in our society. Our natural instincts and appetites are capable of being set on fire of hell.

In the realm of amusements there are people who have turned recreation into "wreckreation." Sports in moderation are healthy. But sports as a mania are unhealthy.

Freedom too is something so much perverted that often it can be called demonic. It is license run wild rather than liberty under control.

Over against these false fires is the redemptive fire that Christ kindles. The fire of His purpose gives life its focus, and the fire of His passion gives life its fervor. The love that saves others will sacrifice self.

SATURDAY: "The Work of the Holy Spirit in Charisma and Character: A Contemporary Reflection"

(A study in 1 Corinthians 12, 13, 14)

Three important truths are advanced in the first seven verses of chapter 12: the authority of Christ, who is the Head of the Church, the ministry of the Spirit, who is the Administrator of the affairs of the Church, and the community of the Church, which must always be seen as a living organism and never as a disjointed organization.

In the relationship between chapter 12 and chapter 13 we see, in 12, the Church blessed in its community with the gifts of the Spirit and, in 13, the Church bearing in its character the fruit of the Spirit.

Love, which is the fruit of the Spirit, is both more basic and more permanent than the gifts, for the reason that character is more central than service.

Where the gifts are concerned, two things should be noted as belonging to Paul's teaching. The first is the sovereignty of the Holy Spirit, "Who apportions to each one individually as he wills." (v. 11) The second is the relativity of the gifts themselves, as indicated in verse 31, where we read, "But earnestly desire the higher gifts." In chapter 14, which is almost entirely concerned with the correction of abuses of the gift of tongues that had developed in the Corinthian congregation, the apostle makes it clear that prophecy—the straightforward declaration of gospel truth—is of greater value than tongues. At the same time tongues are not to be denied or dismissed. If present, they must be regulated.

The supreme value of chapter 13 is that it moves us from the realm of charisma to the realm of character. Here Paul discusses magnificently the indispensability, the beauty, and the permanency of love.

2. Cleansing—"Thy sin purged"—coal of fire, symbol of Holy Spirit

III. Breadth—Isaiah saw the task.

A vision without a task is merely visionary. A task without a vision is drudgery. A vision with a task is victory.
