■ 1. Under the theme, "Oneness of the Spirit in the Binding Power of Peace," (Ephesians 4:3 *Amplified Bible*), Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its eighty-second session August 14, 1974, at 9:15 a.m., on the campus of George Fox College in Newberg, Oregon.

Joseph Gilmore led the congregation in singing "Trust and Obey."

New clerk, Richard H. Beebe, expressed appreciation for the prayers and support for him in anticipation of this his first session as presiding clerk of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Dorwin Smith, former clerk, led in prayer for God's blessing and direction during this Yearly Meeting.

Debbie Field of the Regeneration musical group sang, "He Giveth More Grace."

■ 2. General Superintendent Norval Hadley presented his annual keynote address as follows:

KEYNOTE MESSAGE

To begin my message today, let me share with you some information gained from annual reports that came to my office.

Net gain in church membership reported last year was 312. The net gain the year before, which was the largest in our history, was 351. This year our churches added 383 to membership, 81 were lost from membership, so our net gain was 302. The three churches reporting the largest gain were Tacoma, Reedwood, and Vancouver with 137. This brings our total membership in the Yearly Meeting now to 7,591.

Total giving to the Unified Budget this year was \$211,815.89. This is an increase of \$22,469.60 over last year. We came within 5.8 percent of reaching our goal, which was \$225,067. Unified Budget pledging for the coming year is up to about \$175,000 which is about \$10,000 more than last year. The Unified Budget goal for the coming year is \$229,321, up

less than 2 percent over the goal of the year before. So this year we will continue to need gifts above pledges amounting to \$54,000.

During the past church year we had our midyear board meetings in Greenleaf, Idaho, and this seemed to be a very successful experiment. Also Mary and I lived in Idaho for two months, which afforded us a marvelous opportunity to get better acquainted with the churches and people there, and we felt by this means we were able to better serve the entire Yearly Meeting. We may do something similar this year, perhaps in another area.

Once more I believe that God has given me a message for you. It is an exciting experience, I suppose, for any pastor to get a message from God. It is a spiritual experience. Especially it is for me, because I pray so earnestly that this message will come from the Lord, for I feel that it really needs to be a keynote message—keynote not just for this week but for the coming year. And the sense I have that this message has come from God makes it a deep spiritual experience for me.

During the past months and years I have sought to lead the church in an emphasis on various themes as the Lord has laid messages and concerns on my heart. (1) I have stressed the fact that all of us are in the ministry. All receive spiritual gifts, and we all ought to be ministering to one another (as in my keynote message two years ago). (2) I have felt I cannot say enough about the importance of the *new commandment* that we love one another in the Body of Christ.

(3) I have been strongly impressed anew that unity in the Body of Christ is much more significant than some of us realized in the past. It is by this love in unity that the world knows Jesus is divine (John 17:21). In all the growing churches in our Yearly Meeting, outsiders are impressed that the Christian fellowship has something to offer they cannot find in any other segment of society. I have preached that by unity there is agreement that results in prayer power (Mark 11:24, 25). I firmly believe that nothing spiritual can happen in the church until we are one, until grudges are settled and the Body dwells in harmony and forgiveness (Matthew 5:23, 24; 6:15).

(4) I have urged Friends to stomp on negativism, encourage one another, put one another up, and especially find ways to brag about the pastor. We will not have boldness and confidence to share what we have with others until we like what we are and what we have. Proper self-respect is built amazingly as Christians learn to encourage one another.

(5) I have urged Friends to move out of the Christian fellowship into the world looking for opportunities to meet human need in the name and power of Christ and thus following the New Testament pattern of Luke 10 and Acts 3 to build the Church. And I believe this is working.

(6) Recently I have been impressed to call the church to prayer and intercession. I have sought to encourage a great concert of prayer, a wave of intercession. Many churches are using prayer chains and special intercessory ministries to invite the power of God upon the work in these strategic times.

All these things are so vital and so important and, I believe, so scripturally right if a church is to succeed and have the blessing of God that I dare not move away from any of them or take anything away from an emphasis on these things. But I believe recently God has been impressing me that one more theme is needed to complement all these others. There is another absolutely essential ingredient in the Christian system that some of us are in danger of neglecting. And that is obedience.

Today I want to call the church to a new discipline of obedience. I realize there is a great deal being said and written in these days about our "glorious freedom" in Christ. Anything that imposes guilt is not popular. There is the suggestion in some Christian literature that our actions past, present, and future are under the blood—that our salvation is God's doing and man's responsibility is being played down. But I am convinced in the final analysis it is obedience God wants. Why did God create man in the first place? That he might love, honor, serve, and obey God forever. Why did Jesus die on the cross? That man might be redeemed from sin and enabled to live in triumph and obedience to His honor and glory. God told us through Samuel (1 Samuel 15:22), through Isaiah (chapter 58), and other prophets that what He wants is not sacrifice or temple observances, but obedience.

We can be in ministry without obedience. We can be strong on love for one another without obedience. We can be positive and encourage one another without obedience. We can do a lot of good and meet human need without obedience. We can even pray without obedience, though our prayers will be ineffective. But we cannot have the blessing and the power of God on our lives, our witness, and on our church without obedience.

I. WHY SHOULD WE OBEY?

A. Obedience is absolutely essential if we would qualify for revival and God's blessing. "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in his holy place? He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart." (Psalm 24:3, 4) At the time of the dedication of the Temple the Lord told Solomon, "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and *turn from their wicked ways*; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14) Hezekiah later led the people in this kind of commitment, and the Bible says, "The priests and Levites stood and blessed the people, and the Lord heard their prayers from his holy temple in heaven." (2 Chronicles 30:27 LB) Later after the people had left the observance of the law and followed the wicked rule of Manasseh, young King Josiah again purged the Temple and led the people in a reign of righteousness.

One day Hilkiah, the high priest, found an old scroll in the Temple that turned out to be the laws of God as given to Moses. He gave the scroll to Shaphan, the king's secretary. "So he read it to the king. When the king heard what these laws required of God's people, he ripped his clothing in despair . . . 'Go to the Temple and plead with the Lord for me!' the king told them. 'Pray for all the remnant of Israel and Judah! For this scroll says that the reason the Lord's great anger has been poured out upon us is that our ancestors have not obeyed these laws that are written here.'" As a result through the prophetess Huldah, the Lord sent back this message to King Josiah. "Because you are sorry and have humbled yourself before God when you heard my words against this city and its people, and have ripped your clothing in despair and wept before me—I have heard you, says the Lord, and I will not send the promised evil upon this city and its people until after your death." (2 Chronicles 34 LB) Just as in the days of Josiah, we not only need a spiritual revival in our land but we need to stay the hand of the wrath of God. The wages of sin has been the death of the Nixon administration. Situation ethics is not the answer. The end does not justify the means—even if you are President of the United States.

B. The reason the blessing and favor of God cannot come unless there is obedience is because God will not hear the prayers of His people unless there is obedience. "Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save; neither his ear heavy, that it cannot hear; but your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid his face from you, that he will not hear." (Isaiah 59:1, 2) Faith and obedience go hand in hand. Without faith we will not obey. "In fact, only when we trust Jesus can we truly obey him." (Romans 3:31 LB) Without obedience there is no basis for faith.

John in his First Epistle says, "But if we have bad consciences and feel that we have done wrong, the Lord will surely feel it even more, for he knows everything we do. But, dearly loved friends, if our consciences are clear, we can come to the Lord with perfect assurance and trust, and get whatever we ask for because we are obeying him and doing the things that please him." (3:20, 21 LB) One cannot expect God to hear unless there is obedience, for instance in the area of forgiveness. "Listen to me! You can pray for *anything*, and *if you believe, you have it*; it's yours! But when you are praying, first forgive anyone you are holding a grudge against, so that your Father in heaven will forgive you your sins too." (Mark 11:24, 25 LB)

C. Another reason I feel led to stress obedience today is that I have noticed in Scripture whenever God's people were faced with a big task there was a return to emphasis on obedience. When Moses died and Joshua was given the task of leading the children of Israel into the promised land, God said to him, "Be strong and brave, for you will be a successful leader of my people; and they shall conquer all the land I promised to their ancestors. You need only to be strong and courageous *and to obey to the letter every law Moses gave you*, for if you are careful to obey every one of them you will be successful in everything you do. Constantly remind the people about these laws, and you yourself must think about them every day and every night so that you will be sure to obey all of them. For only then will you succeed." (Joshua 1:6-8 LB)

When Solomon was given the tremendous task of building the Temple, David said to him, "So now, my son, may the Lord be with you and prosper you as you do what he told you to do and build the Temple of the Lord. And may the Lord give you the good judgment to follow all his laws when he makes you king of Israel. For if you carefully obey the rules and regulations which he gave to Israel through Moses, you will prosper. Be strong and courageous, fearless and enthusiastic!" (1 Chronicles 22:11-13)

When Jesus was leaving His disciples with the tremendous task of building the Church on His foundation, He said to them, "The one who obeys me is the one who loves me; and because he loves me, my Father will love him; and I will too, and I will reveal myself to him. . . . I will only reveal myself to those who love me and obey me. The Father will love them too, and we will come to them and live with them." (John 14:21, 23 LB)

I believe the church once more is faced with a tremendous task in our time. I am among those who believe that if the great commission is to be fulfilled in one generation it should be our generation. I believe God is revealing to us by many evidences that now is the time He wants to move across the land in an unusual way to give men and women everywhere an opportunity to intelligently accept or reject Jesus Christ. My friend Dr. Richard Halverson, pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian Church,

Washington, D.C., and head of International Christian Leadership, agrees with me. He writes, "I am convinced that the explorations in evangelism today are not merely by the initiative of man. God is very active in the world right now. We must certainly view this period as *the* most significant since the early church."

Dr. Bill Bright of Campus Crusade writes, "Today we are experiencing the greatest spiritual harvest in the history of man. More people are now hearing the Gospel, accepting Christ as their Savior, and receiving training to serve our Lord than ever before. If ever the great commission is to be fulfilled, now is the time." The "Church Growth Bulletin" says, "Never has there been a more responsive generation than this. . . . The time has come to surge forward in evangelism."

You know that in Lausanne, Switzerland, there has just concluded in July a great World Congress on Evangelism. Armin Gesswein has consented to come Saturday morning in the 11 o'clock hour and share with us about that Congress on Evangelism and to help move us out in implementing some of the things that were inspired by that congress.

Just as we believe there never has been a time so conducive to the fulfilling of the great commission, we also believe it is unreasonable to think it can be done more easily in the future. It took nearly 6,000 years, from Adam to 1850, for the earth's population to reach one billion. The fifth billion will be added to the earth's population in only 11 years. In the next 25 years more children will be born in our world than lived from Adam to 1960 (according to Wesley Duewel, president of Oriental Missionary Society). Because of the bigness of the task I believe now is the time to follow the scriptural pattern and call the church to obedience.

II. HOW SHOULD WE OBEY?

A layman friend advises me that when we talk about obedience we get in a trap because we are fuzzy on what to obey. Christians, like children, need the security of boundaries; we need to know the rules. The Bible gives the rules, but if you are not sure what the Bible teaches or how it is to be applied to our society I think it is safe to say you are to do what your conscience tells you is right, provided your conscience is continually being enlightened by the study of God's Word. In this message let us discuss the basic rules given us in the Ten Commandments.

A. We are to be obedient in heart. Jesus, interpreting the commandments, said the greatest is "Love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. . . . And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." (Matthew 22:37, 39) (1) Is there anything in your life that is more precious to you than your love for God? Is there anything that is inconsistent with love or contrary to the will of God? If so, give it up. Any love, any allegiance, any practice or habit that comes between you and God is your idol—your graven image. You have exalted that to a place in your life higher than the place of God. And God is a jealous God who says, "Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them." (Exodus 20:5)

(2) Is your heart right toward other people? Have you forgiven everyone? Is there any malice, spite, hatred, or enmity in your heart? Are you holding a grudge? Is there anyone with whom you have refused to be reconciled? Nothing spiritual can happen in your life or in the church as long as you are holding grudges. Is there any feeling of jealousy? Is there a spirit of bitterness toward others, especially when one is preferred before you or when one receives recognition and you don't?

(3) Is there a spirit of pride in your heart? Do you have self on a throne that Jesus should occupy? Is there an insatiable coveting for praise while at the same time you become extremely defensive when criticized? A part of obedience is to let self be buried with Christ by baptism into His death and be raised in the likeness of His resurrection to walk with Him in newness of life (Romans 6:4, 5).

B. We are to be obedient in speech. (1) "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain." (Exodus 20:7) The name of God is different and more holy than any other name. To use that name in any way that hurts its holiness, lowers its value, or casts any shadow upon it is to break the commandment and is forbidden by God in clear, strong language. The Bible says that one day at the name of Jesus every knee shall bow. Yet there is no other name among men that is more abused.

(2) The Bible says we should "stop lying to each other; tell the truth, for we are parts of each other and when we lie to each other we are hurting ourselves." (Ephesians 4:25 LB) Is there any way in which you have been dishonest? In business, at home, in word or deed? It is so easy to get caught in the trap of gossiping about another and so easy to exaggerate things we say. Evangelist Daddy Graves used to tell about a woman whose tongue was so long she could sit on her front porch and lick a neighbor ten miles down the road. Do you criticize unlovingly, harshly, severely? Do you sometimes convey false impressions when it is to your advantage? Situation ethics would have us believe there are certain circumstances when it is all right to lie. God has made no such allowance in His Word. The Bible says when you lie God is no longer your Father but the devil is. "He is a liar, and the father of it." (John 8:44) If your friends and business associates know that under certain circumstances you feel it appropriate to lie, how will they ever know when you are telling the truth? How can your wife and children have complete confidence in you? Business associates will soon learn to view your words with skepticism. The world expects Christians to tell the truth and to act with integrity because the world has standards with respect to truth. Further, when you lie to a man in order to manipulate and influence his decisions you are playing God in the life of that man, and this is serious business.

C. We are to be obedient in actions. (1) The Bible says we are to "remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy." (Exodus 20:8) While we no longer worship on the Old Testament seventh day, the New Testament does not release us from an obligation to keep one day for rest and worship. Christians have fallen more and more into the trap of disregarding the Sabbath commandment through laxness and by adopting patterns of the modern world. One of the laws of God is that man should work six days and set apart the seventh as a day of rest and worship. I knew a Christian servant who worked seven days a week 10 to 12 hours a day and didn't even take a vacation. He said, "My work is my play." As my former boss Dr. Ted Engstrom would say, "That's not commitment, that's crazy." In fact that's disobedience to the divine commandment. Incidentally, that man had an ethical and maybe moral collapse, was brought to trial and convicted.

There are many curses in the Bible connected with failure to observe the Sabbath and many blessings promised for the obedient. I believe God would honor us and honor the church if we would return to stricter observance of the Sabbath. I try to take a day off every week, and you

might as well all know it's Monday. You can call me on Monday, but I might be on the golf course. I think our pastors should do the same thing. And let me put in a plug here: It's very hard for the pastor to get a day off when he's in the parsonage and the phone is always ringing. I think it would be wonderful if you laymen who have recreation vehicles or cabins would offer those to your pastors and say, "If you want to get away one day a week, use my cabin, or my camper." For I think our ministers as well as all of us are disobeying the commandment when we work seven days a week. Christians who engage in activities that force other people to work on Sunday are hurting neighbors we are called upon to love. During the energy crisis we were almost forced back to the concept of a Sabbath day's journey. Is it really essential to fill the gas tank on Sunday? Isn't it possible to buy all the groceries we need before Sunday? True the Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath, but let us return to a day of rest and worship that honors God and fulfills His commandment. "The Lord blessed the sabbath day, and hallowed it." (Exodus 20:11)

(2) Are we really honoring father and mother? In modern society with its nursing homes, its medicare, welfare and insurance benefits, it is easy for children to relegate to government or to some other institution care, love, respect, and honor that should come only from them.

(3) Is there any way in which you have stolen from another? Do you take little things by the way you fill out your income tax or by the way you handle your books in business? Or big things? If you have taken anything, return it and make restitution. This is a part of obedience.

(4) Let us in the Friends Church hold a standard of purity, holiness, and obedience to God's law, and let us not be swayed by the disobedience of the so-called "new morality." The Bible says, "Thou shalt not commit adultery." (Exodus 20:14) Jesus said that one can commit adultery through lustful thoughts. Legally adultery is not a crime, but for the believer God's law is clear. In the Old Testament both partners were stoned to death. The Bible is not anti sex. God endorses sexual fulfillment. Within marriage it is legitimate and lovely, but God has limited sex to marriage and has clearly and definitely forbidden premarital and extramarital manifestations of it. These violate the sanctity of marriage and produce trauma and undesirable results that can never be fully known in advance. The laws of life are against promiscuous sex, as are the laws of eternal life. Whatever the new morality teaches, the Bible says, "They which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God." (Galatians 5:21)

In an age of "permissivism" and situation ethics, the world has decided that because of overpopulation, sociological and economic problems it is all right to kill an unborn child. Non-Christians have only the rules of the world to go by. But for the believer there is another law, the law of God, and that law says "Thou shalt not kill." To abort a fetus except under extraordinary circumstances is not an option for a Christian. There can be no abortion for convenience or simply on the demand of a mother. If the mother's life is genuinely imperiled, then of course there is sufficient cause for abortion, for if the mother dies then the fetus perishes as well. But obedience for a Christian involves a higher standard than the law of the world.

Coming back from a trip late at night I heard an interview on radio station KGW with a homosexual, a public service broadcast definitely aimed at giving respectability to homosexuality. The Christian cannot

regard homosexuals as just another social minority—an endangered species deprived of their rights and privileges by a cruel and heartless society. There is little likelihood that KGW would present a victim of intellectual disaster on their broadcast and try to convince the public that he was normal. But they had no qualms with a moral victim. Don't be deceived by standards of a misguided society.

The Bible makes it clear that homosexuality is sin, whatever the new morality says. In fact Romans 1 shows that when man rejects God and takes a series of downward steps God delivers him over to be consumed by his own lust, and homosexuality is the result. Efforts to make this sin respectable in our society should be resisted by Friends. Let us not be fooled by the world's standard in any of these things. The Bible says we are to think about things that are pure and lovely and good (Philippians 4:8).

(5) Obedience in action for the Christian also means honoring God with our finances. Do we rob God? Have we stolen tithes that belong to Him and used them for our own benefit? Our Yearly Meeting is full of stories of the blessing of God when people have honored Him in the giving of tithes and faith promise offerings. Have we robbed Him of time and energy that we should give to Him?

(6) Have we committed the sin of prayerlessness? Are we neglecting God's Word? Do we openly and boldly confess Christ, or are we ashamed of Him in the presence of worldly people?

May God help us to be obedient to Him and to His laws in heart, in speech, and actions. Then we will qualify for His blessing. Then we will be equal to the tremendous task that is before us. Then we can expect God to move in answer to our effectual, fervent prayers and bring revival to the church and to our land. Ministers and teachers of Northwest Yearly Meeting, in our proclamation of the Gospel this year, along with every other emphasis that is scriptural, let us call the church to obedience.

A standing vote of appreciation and approval was given for the wonderful challenge of the superintendent's message.

■ 3. The Friends Youth Yearly Meeting group was introduced, and appreciation was expressed for their presence in this opening session. During a brief intermission, the youth were dismissed for their further activities of the day.

■ 4. Friends were introduced to the meeting as follows:

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

■ 13. The Board of Evangelism, Walter P. Lee, vice-president, presented the work of that board:

The responsibilities and activities of the Board of Evangelism are broad and varied, and it is possible to refer to only a few of them in a brief report.

The board continues financial assistance to the new church at Kent, Washington, and to Olympic View Friends Church in Northeast Tacoma on an annually reducing schedule. Olympic View reports encouraging advances with morning worship attendance reaching 109 for a 21 percent gain this year and a 15.7 percent increase in financial giving. There is an especially active junior high group with 18 attending Tween Camp at Twin Rocks. New Christian families comprise most of the congregation, and we are all encouraged to pray for their continued spiritual growth and maturity.

Kent, having built and dedicated a new church building a year ago, had its first full year of services in its own sanctuary with an average morning worship attendance of 70. Its ministry includes lay evangelism groups and home Bible studies. This has been a year of maturing and developing a stronger base for future ministry and growth.

The two-year financial program for Entiat Friends Church has accomplished its purpose well and was concluded at the end of this church year. The church has grown in numbers and resources and has assumed full support of the pastor, Gilbert George. This was a strategic program that proved its value.

As was announced at Yearly Meeting a year ago, the board entered into a program of cooperation with Friends Ministries for the development of fellowships in areas of sizable population where no Friends churches presently exist. It is hoped that out of these fellowships a number of Friends churches may develop. It is recognized that this method may not bring immediate and dramatic results and will depend upon patient cultivation where there are good prospects for a church. This has been a year of learning together, and the board plans a continuation of this cooperative program with a commitment of \$6,000 to Friends Ministries. Friends Ministries will be expected to assist our established churches in training and encouraging them for the development of fellowships in areas not presently served by the church. The Board of Evangelism and the Yearly Meeting Office will actively direct the follow-up and development of groups that show prospect for a church.

The promise of developing a group in McMinnville, Oregon, is encouraging.

At the present a most promising prospect appears in work among the Mexican Americans in areas where there is a concentration of these people.

The Board of Evangelism also sponsored a High-Calling Conference for young people who feel God's call to gospel ministry. This was held at Twin Rocks the early part of March and was a helpful time for a number of our young people. It is the plan of the board to hold such a conference again this coming year.

Some of our churches are experiencing changes in direction. Piedmont is in the center of an interracial area and senses the need to provide a variety of services in the name of Christ that will undoubtedly increase the receptivity to the Gospel. In view of these opportunities and the

need for greater resources, the Board of Evangelism will be assisting financially this year in the amount of \$1,800.

Since most of the Friends attending Nehalem Bay Friends Church were connected with Twin Rocks Conference and not residents of Wheeler, where the church building is located, it was the decision of the group to carry on the ministry of the church from Twin Rocks and to dispose of the property at Wheeler. This has been done, and Robert and Lela Morrill, the pastors, will continue the ministry at Twin Rocks and assist at the camp.

The Friends at Springbrook reached the decision that they should discontinue services there and attend other churches of the area. This was consummated at the close of the church year.

Many of our churches are experiencing a visitation of the Holy Spirit as is evident in conversions, increased fellowship, outreach through Sunday and weekday contacts, increased attendance, and new members. This seems to be a time of unusual receptivity in this Yearly Meeting as well as in the Church at large.

Of the churches reporting this year, seven showed an increase of more than 20 percent in Sunday morning worship attendance. The most consistent attendance gain was in the Newberg Area with one of these churches reporting a 52 percent increase. Thirty of the reporting churches conduct home Bible studies, and 10 are conducting lay evangelism programs.

This is a day of evangelism and opportunity, and there is a spirit of expectancy in the Lord in many of our congregations. Let us pray that all our churches may experience an unusual moving of the Holy Spirit and fresh vitality for the work of the Lord.

Frederick Baker spoke of the thrust of new meetings and his vision for greater enlargement in our Yearly Meeting.

Arthur Roberts spoke of what is happening in Northwest Yearly Meeting in the work among Mexican Americans.

The following concern was presented from Arthur Carranza, student at George Fox College from California who has been working among Mexican Americans in this area:

Knowing that this concern shall be read by busy men gathered for a purpose, I will try to be concise and informative in stating it.

Though it may sound quite new to some of you, actually it is not. Friends have been active with my people for some time. It was in 1872 that Samuel Purdie, a Friend from Ohio, began the first Friends mission in Matamoras, Tamaulipas, Mexico. Establishing a printing press, El Ramo de Olivo (the Olive Branch), the work soon grew to the establishment of six other missions and at least six outstations where services were held in homes. Up until the Mexican Revolution of 1910-17 the missions thrived; then with the passing of anticlerical laws and hostility to foreigners (especially missionaries), the missions began slowly diminishing.

Today of the missions established by Purdie, only three known ones survive. They are Piuslad Victoria Mission, Tamaulipas, Mexico, and Cedral Mission along with Matehuala in San Luis Potosi, Mexico.

In Mexico City we have two other Friends works—one established in 1947 under Pacific Yearly Meeting with 29 members, and the work sponsored by the Evangelical Friends Alliance with missionaries Roscoe and Tina Knight.

In addition to these, there are two missions in Mexicali, Baja, California, sponsored by California Yearly Meeting. Under the leadership of

Juan and Linda Palacio, both missions thrive and continue to grow with an active youth group.

In Mexico, that is the known extent of Friends work in a country of over 39,643,000 people.

California has two works among Mexican Americans—my own home church in Pico Rivera, whose roots can be traced back to the turn of the century, and the newly established, as of November 25, 1973, Mexican-American congregation at Lindsay Friends Church. Both churches are active in outreach and concerned about continued work among their own people.

This then leads me to my concern, i.e., that here in the Northwest a viable and visible ministry be launched among my people, the Chicanos. Thus far workers have been few, yet *there have been workers*, and it is our concern that more arise. Those of us who have been active have deeply felt the leading of the Spirit in finding openings of ministry and growth of concern among Friends in Northwest Yearly Meeting and California Yearly Meeting. We believe that now is the time to advance in this work.

Concept: It is our hope to begin a ministry of small group fellowships among Chicanos as ways open up, eventually leading to participation in the various Friends churches. It is not our desire to begin autonomous churches apart from those Friends churches already established, but to have churches where those of different cultures may worship together as one in Christ. If new churches should develop in other areas, fine and good; we should accept it as church growth and not intentional segregation.

In such areas as Seattle, Washington, where 8,000 Chicanos live; the Treasure Valley in Idaho, where there is also a large number of Chicanos; and the Willamette Valley with 55,000 Chicanos, we would hope to begin fellowships that would be in communication with the other Friends works in California and Mexico. It would be an attempt to establish a common identity of Mexican Friends and also make known to each work the existence of each other. It is hoped this project would be a joint effort of California and Northwest Yearly Meetings. Pico Rivera Friends Church has already agreed to help launch the project.

Arthur Roberts admonished us to be much in prayer for our outreach among these people and expressed appreciation for the delegation from Pico Rivera Friends Church to help us in our vision and responsibility for work among the Mexican Americans.

Approved.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

■ 14. Arthur Roberts presented a concern that during this time of national transition following the resignation of our President that we be much in prayer for our national situation; that we might not follow situation ethics but that we as a church may be a leavening element in our society, stating the "principles of the kingdom," avoiding greed and selfishness. May we manifest a spirit of grace and forgiveness to those who fall and render judgment with mercy. Arthur Roberts led in prayer for former President Nixon and for our nation as a whole.

Daniel Smith of Reedwood church, student at George Fox College, spoke expressing his concern that we should not separate our social concerns and ministries from the spiritual concepts.

William Rourke, president of the Board of Peace and Service, told of his encouragement in the work being done by many of our churches in helping alleviate human suffering in their areas and in peace education among the youth.

Approved.

■ 15. The Representatives recommended that Brian Beals be named announcing clerk to replace Dan Nolte, who is absent.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

■ 26. The Board of Publication, Harry Hoskins, president, made their presentation:

Harlow Ankeny spoke briefly, then gave an audiovisual presentation that graphically showed the progress and work of Barclay Press. Some of their publications displayed on the screen were the *Evangelical Friend*, *Fruit of the Vine* devotional booklet, *Adult Friend* and *Teacher's Friend*—Sunday school quarterlies—George Fox College and church promotional materials, as well as publication of much material for our mission field. He gave special credit to the individuals of the Barclay Press staff and feels great efficiency is obtained because of the stability of these employees.

Barclay Press has as its goal the production of good, well-produced literature as reasonable as possible under the present inflationary price of materials.

Special appreciation was voiced for the work of the Board of Publication.

The Barclay Press financial sheet was presented and appears in the appendix.

■ 27. The Yearly Meeting treasurer's report was presented by Treasurer Arlene Moore and appears in the appendix.

This report represents a year of dedicated effort, and a standing vote of approval and appreciation was given our treasurer.

■ 28. The Evangelical Friends Alliance presentation was given. William Rourke of the Social Action Commission of EFA presented their concern for social work in adopting foreign orphans, assisting in camps, and relief work. Also he presented the work of the National Black Evangelical Association and our support of Aaron Hamlin, field director of the NBEA.

Dorothy Barratt, Christian education consultant of the EFA, told of the Aldersgate Graded Curriculum and George Fox Press and their importance in the work of the church and Sunday school.

Gerald Dillon of the Missions Commission told of the importance of our sharing of mutual yearly meeting concerns for missions in Taiwan, Burundi, Bolivia, Peru, Mexico, and Rough Rock Indian Mission through EFA.

Harlow Ankeny spoke of the importance of cooperation among evangelical Friends, in the various EFA commissions; that working together we are able to do what we haven't been able to do alone. The Publication Commission's main instrument, *Evangelical Friend*, has been and continues to be a cohesive factor within the EFA.

Norval Hadley spoke, mentioning the cooperative efforts in support of the Omaha Friends Church. The EFA General Conference scheduled for Newberg in the summer of 1974 was postponed for a year because of the energy crisis. A new definite date has not been set. All EFA yearly meetings have approved EFA membership for individual churches outside cooperating yearly meetings, except that Kansas Yearly Meeting recommends adding a phrase to the EFA Constitution as follows: "The EFA advises that such meetings first obtain approval from their yearly meeting (if the yearly meeting so requires) or otherwise inform their yearly meeting of their intention to join the Evangelical Friends Alliance."

The EFA report was approved.

■ 55. President David Le Shana introduced the work and progress of George Fox College during the past year. He introduced Dr. Eugene Habecker, new dean of student affairs of the college, who spoke to the meeting.

President Le Shana presented the following report:

God has abundantly blessed George Fox College in so many ways! There have been many successes during this last year, and the following report will tell you of a few of them. But it is not only a record of events and of a team of committed persons; it is also a testimony to God's leadership and faithfulness. I invite you to read the following in this perspective.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Acceptance into the national Christian College Consortium and institution of a full adult education program for area residents highlighted the 83rd academic year at George Fox. The college in January took an important step by becoming the 12th member of the Consortium, only the third West Coast college accepted. The organization brings together some of the nation's leading evangelical Christian liberal arts colleges with the emphasis upon the integration of faith and learning and upon cooperative endeavors. Membership is expected to enhance the future effectiveness of George Fox.

Countering the national trend, George Fox during the year continued to report increasing enrollments. Fall term enrollment was 463, a 7.5 percent jump over the previous year, and George Fox was one of just three Oregon colleges to report an enrollment increase. Of the Newberg campus students 41 percent are members of the Friends Church—the highest percentage of any Quaker college in America. Altogether, 30 denominations are represented on campus, and students come from 17 states and eight foreign countries.

The second year of the college's extension campus in Kotzebue, Alaska, was even more successful than the first. A total of 22 weeks of college classes was programed with 14 courses offering 30 term hours of credit during the year. Total class registration was 190, a 53 percent increase over the 124 enrolled the first year. About 83 percent are native students. This innovative educational venture of taking the college to the people was developed through a foundation grant and in cooperation with Alaska Yearly Meeting of Friends Church and California Yearly Meeting.

An initial offering of eight courses fall term launched the college's new Continuing Education Program of evening courses. Specific subjects are offered one night a week, Monday through Thursday, utilizing GFC professors and experts brought in for special courses. Special lower fees are established, and residents can bypass normal registration procedures, simply signing up for the course at the first class session. Courses are selected with the adult, part-time student in mind.

In March the college announced a new guaranteed tuition plan to start this fall. It will assure students of four years of education under costs at which they entered. The college is believed one of only a few in the nation with such a program. Students will pay a flat fee for each term hour, and each entering class at a different rate. Students will retain their entering rate for a maximum of four years as long as they complete at least 12 credit hours each regular term consecutively. The plan has the advantage of allowing students and parents to plan total education costs for receiving a degree. George Fox will continue to be in the lower 40 percent of all private colleges in the Northwest in total tuition charges.

After a careful study, the Oregon Teachers Standards and Practices Commission granted complete approval to the teacher education programs at the college. Approval enables GFC graduates from the 12 programs to teach in secondary schools. All programs requested were approved, and the college was one of the first to meet the new state standards.

Extensive travel and three weeks in the Holy Land were programed for the June 19 departure of the fourth annual George Fox summer tour. Open for those interested in college credit or those just sightseeing, the tour schedule included London, Rome, Athens, Tel Aviv, Zurich, Copenhagen, and three weeks in the Holy Land.

Eighty-two seniors received their degrees in ceremonies May 26 with eighth-generation Quaker philosopher and author, D. Elton Trueblood, delivering the baccalaureate address and David Allan Hubbard, president of Fuller Theological Seminary, the commencement speaker.

The heart of the academic area, of course, is the faculty, and George Fox students are taught by dedicated individuals, more than half with earned doctorates. Their individual and collective commitment to the concepts of Christian higher education has helped set a pace for Christian colleges.

RELIGIOUS LIFE AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

How do you describe a George Fox student? Perhaps a reporting of their activities and involvements more than anything else can accomplish that as well as demonstrating the nature of a Christ-centered college.

Students are committed and concerned and it shows: from community help projects to championship-caliber ball teams; from first-rate, sold-out musicals to summer missions tours; from overwhelming attendance at special religious services to friendliness, which invariably makes visitors comment.

During the year Norval Hadley, superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends, opened fall term with a series of morning and evening talks; a January Missions Conference featured more than a dozen missions agency representatives, and students in a concluding program pledged and later raised more than \$2,000 to send seven students as summer missionaries around the world. Spring term featured the Deeper Life Conference with Ken Overstreet, vice-president of Youth for Christ International, as speaker. A concluding service drew more than 315 students who shared together in a reactive dialogue and in small groups.

Musically, the music theater organization performed to packed houses, producing *Requiem for a Nobody* fall term, *Pagliacci* in the winter, and *Fiddler on the Roof* for four performances this spring. The concert band was invited to perform for the World's Fair in Spokane, and in early June the choir, with students raising their own money, toured in Europe to present sacred concerts to military bases, churches, and schools.

Students also are becoming known for their helping activity. During the year students contributed 241 pints of blood for area residents. They spontaneously helped "winterize" the home of a nearby elderly couple unable to do so; they participated in a program to teach music to grade schoolers; they counseled students at camps, held a Christmas party for mentally retarded students in local schools, and spent hundreds of hours on weekends traveling as deputation teams to churches and organizations throughout the Northwest.

Athletically, the Bruins continue their championship-caliber action in basketball, coming within one point of a second straight national championship tournament berth in NAIA action. In track long-distance runner, Curt Ankeny, earned All-American ranking with a third-place finish in the national NAIA marathon, and in baseball the Bruins produced one of their winningest seasons in years.

DEVELOPMENT/PROPERTY AND FINANCE

Exciting! is the word to describe the 1973-74 fiscal year as George Fox has continued to counter national trends by operating soundly in the black. Liabilities have been reduced by nearly \$125,000, and total assets of the college have gone up nearly \$400,000.

The excitement comes from the continued financial support of George Fox by its many friends. Last year the college received a gift of \$620,000—the largest in its history—and in March received another \$200,000 in a single gift. A portion of the first funds has been used for development of a new campus master plan compiled by a professional firm with input from students, faculty, administration, alumni, and board members. It outlines plans for the campus growth and improvement to handle an eventual student body of 800 to 1,000 students. The same gift also launched a drive for a new sports-physical education center, and noted

architect, Pietro Belluschi, renowned for his work in wood designs, was retained to prepare designs for the new complex.

The second gift has been designated for helping in the start of a second major structure, a Chapel-Fine Arts building, perhaps to be a recycling of the present gymnasium through its expansion and remodeling.

Also during the year a series of dinners—in Idaho, the Commencement Dinner in Newberg, and the Disneyland Dinner in Southern California—allowed for the plans and purposes of the college to be told directly to the college constituency. The support in all areas is tremendous and appreciated.

As you have read this brief summary, I hope you have been given an insight into our last year. It has been one of people, programs, and planning, all contributing to the successes. But in a far more specific way, I want to acknowledge the leadership of the Lord Jesus Christ; He has worked through people; He has manifested Himself in the programs; He has superintended the planning. I am so grateful for the faithfulness of our Lord as we have endeavored to serve Him. Jesus Christ is not the primary reason for the existence of George Fox College—He is the solitary reason!

The individual and organized support of the Yearly Meeting through financial and prayer support is appreciated greatly, and your continued support in this work of the Lord is encouraged.

■ 56. The Outreach Board proposed the following:

A. Youth oriented, half-hour pilot tapes be prepared for eventual airing on radio. These will be reviewed by the board at midyear meetings. The goal, after much planning yet to come, is to produce a Quaker half hour of top quality music and devotions to be aired, probably at no cost, by radio stations that must provide a certain amount of religious and civic programming.

Approved, to be worked out in cooperation with the Department of Fine Arts of the Spiritual Life Board.

B. Pilot tapes be prepared to be used as one-minute commercials on television, using the talents of professionals already available and willing to donate much of their time. At least one may be ready for the board to review at midyear meetings. Cost estimate is \$200. These funds are now available from the former Board of Peace and Service budget.

Approved, to be worked out in cooperation with the Department of Fine Arts of the Spiritual Life Board.

C. The board be allowed to form the "Friends Shirt Company," a pilot project of 25-30 shirts to be made by elderly volunteers within our constituency. These shirts would then be sold to high school and college youth at prices designed to make the company nonprofit but self-supporting. Money in the Board of Peace and Service budget is sufficient to fund this pilot project.

Approved.

■ 57. The Executive Council nominated the following persons to serve three-year terms on the Board of Directors of Friends Fund: E. Russell Baker, David C. Brown, Maurice Chandler, Donald Millage.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

■ 58. Dorothy Barratt gave a slide presentation of the goals and projects for the new Department of Church Schools for the coming year, emphasizing Promotion Day August 25 or September 1, EFA Enlargement Campaign in two phases, September 15-October 6 (four Sundays) and six months—September 15-March 30 (Easter Sunday), Christian Education Emphasis September 15-March 30, November—Christian Education Month, February—Leadership Training Month, March—Family Retreats, May—Family Month (Mother's Day, Kids' Day, Family Fun, Graduation), Summer Activities—camps and other events already in operation.

Kenneth VandenHoek spoke further of the work of the board and its goals for the coming year.

BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

■ 59. The work of the board was presented by Kendall Smitherman, showing on the screen varied activities of Greenleaf Friends Academy, stressing academic advancement and general Christian living.

Paul Morse presented some of the accomplishments of the board, emphasizing the scholarship fund available. He introduced Johnny Bullock, pastor of Rosedale church, who has benefited from such a scholarship and who told of his appreciation of this assistance.

The printed report appears below:

The Board of General Education was charged with the task and responsibility of encouraging and promoting Christian principles and ideals through the various channels that avail themselves in the ministry of the Friends Church.

Goals for the 1973-74 year were as follows:

- A. Administer the Ministerial Financial Aid Program
- B. Financially assist Friends Academy First Week program
- C. Financially assist the George Fox College Fall Workshop
- D. Encourage churches to participate in the George Fox College Matching Fund Scholarship program
- E. Encourage members of each church to become more involved in promoting high standards in public and private schools in their respective communities

The Board of General Education allocated financial support in the form of ministerial student aid to nine young men in Christian service training for a total of \$4,848.

Friends Academy's First Week was granted \$500 as an innovative and effective educational and spiritual emphasis program.

George Fox College was granted \$500 to assist in underwriting expenses for the fall workshop for faculty members.

Twenty-six churches reported offering grants-in-aid or scholarships to local students attending George Fox College.

Forty-three churches throughout the Yearly Meeting filed reports showing the following:

I. Churches have been actively encouraging students to attend George Fox College by promoting area banquets, use of the college band and choir concerts and drama groups, deputation teams from the college, taking students to college games and activities, taking students to the campus for visitation, and church use of local GFC students.

II. Throughout the Yearly Meeting there are 157 students attending Christian colleges, 94 students enrolled in secular colleges, and 24 students enrolled in vo-tech training. There are 34 students reported in training for full-time Christian service at George Fox College, 12 in other Christian colleges, and four in seminary.

III. Many churches are actively involved in aiding their members in education by means of the following:

A. Financial support is given to George Fox College and Friends Academy. Greenleaf Friends Church reports a monthly pledge of \$1,583 to the maintenance and operational budget of Friends Academy.

B. Church families support the Frank K. Roberts Memorial Scholarship, which is granted annually to a Friends Academy graduate.

C. Churches make known individual needs for personal contributions.

D. A student is given financial support by a local church as she serves as a Youth Ambassador in Alaska.

E. Parental support is highly encouraged.

IV. Friends Academy has been presented in various churches by choir concerts in local churches and area rallies, yearbook ads, involvement in the annual benefit auction, slide presentations by the academy, promotion and availability of GFA literature and presentation of special GFA bulletin boards, Friends Academy booth at a missions fair, and active involvement in GFA Women's Auxiliary.

V. Churches have been promoting quality education with a Christian emphasis by active distribution of Christian devotional materials; special speakers on Christian education; special emphasis from the pulpit, Sunday school classes, and youth groups; Christian school presentations; individual counseling; release time Bible lessons in local schools; promoting and encouraging involvement in school elections; direct financial support to George Fox College and Friends Academy; encouraging more effective use of church libraries; the purchase and distribution of *Living Bibles*, and encouraging young families to attend Young Friends Conference and Basic Youth Conflicts Seminars.

VI. Eighty-five attenders and members of our churches serve on school boards or as officers in PTA groups and similar school supportive associations.

A directory of educators throughout Northwest Yearly Meeting is currently being completed and will be available upon request shortly following Yearly Meeting sessions.

It is hoped that this information will be helpful to those charged with educational responsibilities in the various churches. We strongly believe that education is a most fundamental tool of the church and should be dealt with in an aggressive and forthright manner. Education has been a vital factor in our Quaker heritage, and we believe that it is no less important today.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

■ 60. Gerald Dillon, president, presented the work of the Board of Missions. He emphasized the acute problems inflation is causing among the indigenous people on our mission fields, as well as among our missionaries.

The following report was presented:

The Board of Missions throughout the past year has engaged in the following missionary work: Friends Missionary Literature Service (FMLS);

ministry among the Koreans of Portland, Oregon; missionary service among the Aymara Indians of South America, both in Bolivia and Peru; and cooperation with the Evangelical Friends Alliance in the mission work of Mexico City, Mexico.

Friends Missionary Literature Service under the direction of Ralph Chapman has assisted in the production and sending of over 170,000 pieces of literature to Bolivia and Peru. FMLS has a standing order to supply literature for 10,000 Spanish-speaking people of Australia, the "first effort to spread Christianity from the Quaker viewpoint amongst them." In addition programmed textbooks in the field of preaching and biblical studies have been completed in Spanish and sent to our mission in South America. It is impossible to estimate the value of this work in the accomplishment of the missionary task. This literature disseminated widely by both mission and national church becomes the instrument of evangelism and nurture in the hands of the Holy Spirit.

The Korean Church at Portland, Oregon, continues to develop under the effective leadership of Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim. With an average attendance of 81 for the year, slightly higher than a 10 percent gain, the work has shown an increasing sense of spiritual stability. The Koreans need a larger meeting place as they continue to minister to the visiting Korean sailors, the students, and resident Korean families.

Aymara Indians: With nearly 2,000,000 Indians spread across the altiplano of Bolivia and Peru and with hundreds spilling over the high Andes into the coastal area to the west and the jungle area to the east, the challenge of evangelism continues with us as a mandate from Christ. Dynamic church growth continues to take place. Over 150 congregations in Bolivia and more than 50 congregations in Peru are meeting regularly, representing a healthy growth rate of well over 20 percent. Peru has witnessed phenomenal church growth with some areas doubling in a year's time and the work of the Holy Spirit moving powerfully forward. Three quarterly meetings have now been organized. Extension education with 39 centers has suddenly grown to over 400 students, a most significant growth.

The national churches of both Bolivia and Peru are sending out their own missionaries into new areas somewhat removed geographically from the center of our work. Three major areas in Bolivia include Santa Cruz, Berenguela, and Ambaná. Three new areas in Peru include Huancane, Tacna, and Yunquyo. It should be remembered these areas are evangelized by nationals without missionary assistance, with the one exception of Tacna in Peru.

The small missionary force of Ron and Carolyn Stansell, Quentin and Florene Nordyke, and Harold and Nancy Thomas in Bolivia; and Ed and Marie Cammack, Everett and Alda Clarkson, Barbara Morse, and Mary Bel Cammack in Peru have all continued to give great missionary leadership to the work. Churches at home have appreciated the ministry of Duane and Sherrill Comfort, who have been on furlough this year.

Three new families are candidating for missionary service. However, with the Nordyke family retiring from foreign service to assume roles of leadership at home, the need is acute for new missionary recruits. New areas await our coming; new ministries need further developing and servicing; and the present staff, greatly overworked, needs help. The prayers, gifts, and new missionaries from Northwest Yearly Meeting are desperately needed if growth and development are to continue.

Mexican Mission: As missionaries under the Evangelical Friends Alliance, Roscoe and Tina Knight continue to give leadership in Mexico City. New lay leadership is developing, growth is continuing, and new missionaries will soon be on the field. Iowa Yearly Meeting has asked to cooperate in this work and is sending Richard and Mary Ann Martens to begin language school in Guadalajara, Mexico, this fall. This represents an enlargement of the supporting base, with Iowa Yearly Meeting joining the Missions Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. They join with us in giving their support in personnel, prayer, and finances.

The board has conscientiously sought to administer this growing work and to wisely use the \$105,878 budgeted by the Yearly Meeting. Spiraling inflation in foreign countries as in ours has complicated the difficulty of budget control. Vehicles, so indispensable to our work, have all been replaced with new ones at a great cost. The mission needs one more vehicle in Peru for this current year. The assistance of John Fankhauser as the field coordinator and business manager has been a special help to the board. Each member of the board has served faithfully, accepting responsibility when asked.

Northwest Yearly Meeting is to be commended for her gracious sense of concern and giving spirit. Over \$112,000 has been given this past year, with prayers "without ceasing" being offered. God has thrown wide open the gates of faith to the Aymara Indians of South America, the Koreans of Portland, and Mexicans of Mexico City. Hundreds keep on coming into the kingdom. All praise to our heavenly Father for great things He is doing.

- 61. The meeting adjourned with prayer by the clerk, Richard Beebe, to reconvene at 2:15 in the afternoon.

- 64. Gerald Dillon presented the work of Western Evangelical Seminary, telling of the high caliber of the faculty there. He urged us to encourage our Friends students in the seminary, that they continue to feel an integral part of our church. Three Friends are presently serving on the faculty of WES.

We were informed that last May Azusa Pacific College awarded Gerald Dillon an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.

Approved.

- 65. Jack L. Willcuts spoke of the National Association of Evangelicals' World Relief Commission. He quoted the statement, "All needs are bearable if there is bread." This group endeavors to give the Bread of Life along with material assistance.

The aim of WRC is to give assistance to the direct needs of disaster victims and hospital patients and also to develop long-range self-help programs.

Stuart Willcuts is a field director in relief in South Vietnam. He with his wife Kathy are serving under WRC.

Fred Gregory and his wife LaVonne have just returned from a very successful term of service under World Relief Commission in Bangladesh. Approved.

- 66. A request for a minute of service was presented for Jack L. Willcuts, who will be ministering within the limits of Western Yearly Meeting, Guatemala and Bolivia Yearly Meetings, and Peru and Taiwan Friends mission fields during the coming year.

■ 72. Frederick Baker led in prayer as the Saturday morning business session opened.

■ 73. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 74. The work of Greenleaf Friends Academy was introduced by Principal Kendall Smitherman by means of a slide presentation introducing us to the faculty and activities of the school. The written report appears below:

The 1973-74 school year opened with the second annual First Week. First Week '73 held at Quaker Hill in McCall, Idaho, involved the entire student body in a program of spiritual emphasis with other special emphases in specific areas.

Dr. Jerry Friesen, George Fox College, Dr. Mickey Dean, Northwest Nazarene College, and Joanne Wallace, Salem, Oregon, all served as special consultants during First Week.

A heavy increase in enrollment (approximately 30 percent) required the addition of a second bus route. This required the purchase of a 1971 GMC bus in addition to the 1974 GMC that was on order. This increase was a real answer to prayer, thereby drawing enrollment levels ever nearer building and facility capacity.

Faculty members again participated in the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools' teachers conference at Warm Beach, Washington, in October. The 1974 conference will be in Seattle in November.

The annual Christmas Dinner this year was emceed by Dr. Milo Ross. A record attendance and response were recorded. Over \$16,000 in cash and pledges was received at the annual dinner. This activity has developed into a major financial support for the academy.

Students again involved themselves in predinner activities and pledged over \$1,400 to purchase new dining room tables. We are amazed and extremely pleased at this type of support and response from our student body. Assistance for the new furniture was also provided as a memorial to Dale Gossard, a long-time supporter of Friends Academy.

The concert choir and band participated in the NFCS Musicale at Portland. Musicale, which was to be hosted by GFA this year, was rescheduled to spring '75 because of conflicts in '74. We look forward to the opportunity of having a number of Christian schools in our area for this event.

Our athletic program was expanded even more this past year with the trial addition of girls' basketball, which becomes an official sport for the 1974-75 school year.

The Annual Benefit Auction was an outstanding success as gross receipts reached nearly \$10,000 for all sale day activities.

Sixteen seniors graduated in May with Miss Helen Wilson of Northwest Nazarene College bringing the commencement address. Several outstanding academic and athletic scholarships were granted to seniors

from Azusa Pacific College, College of Idaho, Friends Bible College, George Fox College, and Northwest Nazarene College.

Bill and Patricia Curtright resigned from their teaching positions to return to Oregon. Miss Gail Ford, math and science, and Mrs. Dianna Kennison, home economics and crafts, have joined the faculty for the 1974-75 year.

We have been overwhelmed with the outstanding response to our new development department under the direction of Larry Wilhite. In reviewing our records we note a very marked increase in individual support and giving over the past four years. Individual giving in fiscal years 1970-71 was \$5,453, 1971-72—\$9,306, 1972-73—\$16,280, and 1973-74—\$29,422.

We feel that these figures alone reflect increased support for the work of Friends Academy.

A quarterly newspaper, *Friends Academy News*, has also been a regular feature of the development department.

In addition to increased gifts, lifetime arrangements involving gifts of real estate have been given to the academy.

As the 1974-75 school year ensues we again realize this great task and responsibility that has been placed before us. Please support us prayerfully as we seek God's direction to assist parents in an extension of their own Christian home.

■ 75. Ralph Beebe, professor at George Fox College and president of Friends Action Board, presented Aaron Hamlin, executive director of the National Black Evangelical Association, who spoke of the work of this organization in forwarding the evangelical cause among their people.

Ralph Greenidge, pastor of our Holly Park church and member of the NBEA board, spoke of their recent convention and their goals and outreach.

Randy Winston spoke of the work of camping and the great influence it has had with underprivileged youth.

Paul Span from the board of NBEA spoke of the crucial situations facing their organization as they endeavor to meet critical human needs. Appreciation was expressed for the part Northwest Yearly Meeting is playing in helping in financial and moral support of the NBEA.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

■ 76. The work of the Board of Moral Action, Harold S. Clark, president, was introduced.

The winners of the Moral Action Poster Contest were announced by Mildred Minthorne as follows:

Juniors—first place, Tim Sinclair of Whitney Friends Church, "Weigh the Facts about Alcohol"; second place, Sharon Hull of Greenleaf Friends, "Don't Get Caught"

Junior High—first place, Terry Sinclair of Whitney Friends, "Speak Out Against Drugs"

Adult—first place, Claudia Morse of Whitney Friends, "No. 1 Cause"; second place, Donna Sinclair of Whitney Friends, "Read Good Literature"

A nonverbal, allegorical film entitled *Solo* was presented, effectively communicating the challenge before every growing Christian to face the public moral issues of our day with a firm commitment to the authority of God's Word. As we viewed this film we were urged to each evaluate our own commitments in the light of the apostle Paul's commitment expressed in Philippians 3:12.

The printed report of the Board of Moral Action appears below:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC MORALS

Thirty-one churches reported 150 presentations on public morals issues. There were 1,000 tracts distributed, 11 posters displayed, and 20 posters made by our own members. Fourteen books on public morals were added to church libraries.

Sunday school classes and junior high and senior high Friends Youth groups used tapes and organized lessons as vehicles for discussion on public morals. Pastoral counseling rated high. One layman served on his city council, and one pastor worked with the local juvenile authorities. The Talent church worked in their community against the legalization of gambling. The Medford church joined in a campaign to keep an "adult entertainment center" out of their town. The Melba church asked Margaret Winters to teach a six-week minicourse on such topics as marriage and divorce, Satan worship, satanic music, tobacco, venereal disease, alcohol, and drugs. The Eugene church wrote a letter to their city council expressing support for a biblical position on homosexuality. The city council had been pressured to give recognition to homosexuals as a normal life-style with regard to employment.

DEPARTMENT OF LEGISLATION

In Washington State, Pastor William Paris of Calvary Chapel in Longview has drawn up an initiative petition to require that both creation and evolution be taught in our public schools and given equal attention in textbooks and teaching time. Ward Ellsworth of Issaquaw, Washington, is the coordinator of this initiative drive (206/392-3640). To be on the ballot the petition needs 140,000 signatures by January 3, 1975. As of August only 18,000 have been collected, but many denominations will be organizing drives in the fall to get signatures. Copies of this petition are available to be signed by Washington State residents or to be perused by others who wish to consider this action for their own state.

DEPARTMENT OF LITERATURE

Thirty-seven churches reported having church libraries, and 28 also had other resources of reading materials. One church has begun a record library. Twenty-five reported methods by which they encourage reading. These churches reported adding 1,265 books during the year, making a total of 18,077 books in the 37 libraries. Twenty-five churches told how they promoted reading systematically through the Bible, while

22 reported activities to promote higher moral standards in their communities.

Many have emphasized Bible reading by daily schedules (some related to sermons), Bible studies, Scripture memorization, devotional literature (*Fruit of the Vine*, *Upper Room*, *Closet Diary*), and by giving Bibles as prizes or gifts. Pringle sent out cards for Home Bible Studies under Project Phillip. To encourage memorization of Scripture, Whitney included the whole church in a contest. Other churches gave points for camp or toward the earning of Bibles by juniors and young people. Greenleaf had a Scripture speech contest. Metolius gave little Scripture books instead of the usual attendance certificates.

Book reviews and displays helped to encourage reading. Also, some encouraged their people to share their reading experiences in testimony meetings. Celebrating their newly redecorated library, Hillsboro had a library potluck dinner to which a Christian bookstore brought books on consignment. The people were encouraged to browse and buy books to read and then donate to the library. In this way 30 books were added to the library, and a great deal of Christian education material was donated to the Sunday school. Hillsboro also had a story hour and a record library. Metolius had a "body life" series (adapted from Ray Stedman's book) during prayer meetings. Tigard had a book-reading rotation among four or five small groups interested in reading a book a month. One member at Lynwood is giving book parties. Holly Park gave books to all young people returning to college, and Whitney gave Bibles to graduates. Also, subscriptions to Christian magazines are encouraged.

Churches reported writing petitions and letters concerning moral problems to local agencies, government officials, and TV networks. Sherwood passed out copies of "Four Spiritual Laws" in the community following a Lay Institute for Evangelism. Bill Bright's "How to . . ." books were given out in Holly Park church. Several churches supplied tracts for distribution.

These reported activities may give ideas for other churches to try.

The following books were purchased for the library at Western Evangelical Seminary: *Catholic Quakerism*, *a Vision for All Men*, by Lewis Benson; *Then and Now* edited by Anna Cox Brinton; *Quakers and Slavery in America* by Thomas E. Drake; *The Quaker in Peace and War*, *an Account of Their Peace Principles and Practices*, by Margaret E. Hirst; and *Conscientious Objectors in the Civil War* by Edward Needles Wright.

■ 77. The reports of the State of the Church were read from four areas. The summary of these reports appears below:

As one area report stated, "The state of the church is much more difficult to evaluate than to report on the number on the rolls. While there are suggested questions to be used as guidelines, the responses to these may fall far short in revealing the spiritual condition of the congregation, the evidence of the power of God, the warmth of the Holy Spirit in our services, and the joy of participation in united worship."

The following are some outstanding emphases that were revealed in compiling these reports from the various areas:

Many meetings have seen growth in outreach, resulting in spiritual and numerical growth.

Several express a real sense of unity of spirit and purpose in the churches. One mentioned the appreciation of spiritual gifts of one another, resulting in a real harmonious fellowship in work and worship.

Family devotions have been stressed in some areas, with good response.

In one area, two churches have been destroyed by fire. One meeting reports that a great sense of unity, love, and spiritual growth has occurred as people have worked together to build a new sanctuary.

It is observed that in general more emphasis is being put on individual personal witness, as in the days of the early church, and less reliance on heavily structured programs.

While the reports generally emphasize a positive note, none indicated a satisfied complacency, and an expectancy was expressed for what God can, and will, do through the church.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

■ 82. Following is a summary of activities of the Board of Trustees for the church year 1973-74 submitted by Oliver Weesner, president:

Quaker Apartments—It has been necessary to continue to apply pressure on the purchaser of the apartments to pay property taxes to avoid foreclosure. This was done successfully, and the property is free from foreclosure by the Tax Department for the immediate future. Monthly payments on the contract are being met at the present time.

Group Property and Liability Insurance—During the year common specifications were prepared for insurance agents to offer premium charges on a competitive basis. An award was made to the best offer, represented by Reppert, Clark and Howard of Portland, Oregon. This firm completed appraisals and studies of most of our churches during the spring and summer and is making interviews with local church representatives during Yearly Meeting. Considerable savings are anticipated, and better service and protection will be provided.

Washington Property Tax Exemption—During a recent session of the Washington State Legislature, the responsibility was moved from the counties to the Department of Revenue to grant tax exemption to non-

profit organizations. This was implemented during the spring of 1974. The Board of Trustees took an active part in representing churches of Washington, particularly those whose buildings are deeded in the name of the Yearly Meeting. To the best of our knowledge, all churches were successful in completing the necessary papers and being confirmed for property tax exemption. The present annual fee is \$35, which must be paid each year as filing for tax exemption is to be done annually.

Springbrook Monthly Meeting Property—As the Springbrook church was discontinued effective June 30, 1974, the Trustees arranged for the deeding of the property, church, and parsonage to the Yearly Meeting. The deed is now recorded under the name of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church. The Trustees will administer the use or disposal of this property as directed by the Department of Evangelism.

Nehalem Bay—The Trustees played a role in the disposal of property at Wheeler when the Nehalem Bay church moved its center of operation to Twin Rocks.

Other—The paving costs for the headquarters building are proceeding under schedule of the Department of Finance. A personal note for \$2,500 was reissued to change the terms of repayment to those approved by the Department of Finance.

Approved.

■ 83. A communication was received from the Quaker Fellowship of George Fox College. These students and faculty members state that they have a renewed vision for Christian discipleship and are seeking to learn how to minister more effectively.

■ 84. The report of the Church Music Committee, Joseph E. Gilmore, chairman, was presented as follows:

Based on information received from 39 of our churches, there were again this year 25 churches with choirs, 17 of which were singing on a regular basis. Out of the churches reporting there are 17 youth choirs and 11 children's choirs.

The committee last year sponsored the choir festival at Reedwood with six churches participating. The Boise Valley Area churches, rather than holding their own festival this year, joined in the John Peterson Choir Clinic, becoming part of that clinic's 400-voice choir.

The Song Writing Contest had 13 entries in three of the six divisions. The winners are as follows:

Gospel Song—"Listening," Ruth Corbin, Reedwood, Portland

Gospel Chorus—"The Earth Breaks Out in Praise to God," Ruth Corbin, Reedwood, Portland

Anthem—"Psalm 36," Helen Rinard, Reedwood, Portland

Activities in the various churches included cantatas, musicals, sing-spirations, an instrumental evening service at Camas, a Christian fine arts series at Reedwood, and a youth guitar class at Boise.

The Music Committee has now become the Department of Fine Arts, which includes music, art, drama, and radio-television communications. In the light of this expansion of our responsibilities we have taken action for the coming year to do the following:

1. Produce a quarterly Department of Fine Arts newsletter to be sent out to all churches and individuals interested in the fine arts areas, the first issue to come out in October.

2. Encourage ensemble jubilees to be held in Boise Valley Area, Puget Sound Area, and Portland-Newberg-Salem Areas in early November. Other Areas of the Yearly Meeting may either have their own or join one of the three above-mentioned jubilees.

3. Sponsor choir festivals in the Boise Valley Area, Inland Area, Puget Sound Area, and Portland-Newberg-Salem Areas, these to be held sometime after the first of 1975.

4. Give great publicity and encouragement through the newsletter and other means to Music Month and the Song Writing Contest.

5. Plan for an art show to be held at Yearly Meeting in 1975, using and sharing the God-given talents from all across the Yearly Meeting. Also, encourage local churches to have their own art shows during the year.

6. Encourage the use of drama in the local churches, more specific action to be taken later this year.

7. Hold a retreat for the planning of strategy in developing radio and television ministries for the Yearly Meeting.

8. Plan a Department of Fine Arts workshop for Yearly Meeting 1975 for church fine arts personnel.

This department is pleased to be a part of the Spiritual Life Board and is excited and challenged by the new responsibilities assigned. We are trusting the Lord for guidance and direction to be an effective ministry in the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

■ 85. The morning business session adjourned with prayer by David Whitcomb, to reconvene at 2:15 p.m.

■ 93. The Representatives nominated Arlene Moore as temporary treasurer of the Yearly Meeting and have delegated their responsibility to

the acting Administrative Committee of the Executive Council to find a replacement for her.

■ 94. The Representatives nominated the following for three-year terms on the Epistle Committee: Michael Graves, Louise Minthorne.

Approved.

■ 95. The Representatives nominated Ralph Beebe to serve a three-year term on the committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations.

Approved.

■ 96. Epistles received during the past year came from 40 yearly meetings, with 16 coming from foreign countries. Among these were Switzerland, Canada, Germany, Sweden, Australia, Japan, Central America, New Zealand, Near East, Ireland, Jamaica, Norway, Elgon Yearly Meeting of East Africa.

Friends in Central America wrote: "We thank the Lord for the desire of some 30 young people to dedicate themselves to the study of the Bible in the Berea Bible Institute in Chiquimula training to be pastors and leaders in our churches. There are more than a hundred others studying in their homes by means of the Extension Course of Berea."

From Ireland we read: "As William Penn said, God makes us so many allowances and we make so few for our fellowmen."

From Elgon Yearly Meeting of East Africa (set off from East Africa Yearly Meeting): "Our Inaugural Conference successfully took place in Lugulu. The conference was attended by about 10,000 people."

From East Africa Yearly Meeting we read: "The presence of some Friends from other yearly meetings, some government employees, and the epistles we have received have made us aware of belonging to one another and our responsibilities to share the Good News."

Kansas Yearly Meeting wrote: "We are so encouraged by the unity felt and the positive outlook seen as we look forward to growth as a Yearly Meeting."

From the California Yearly Meeting epistle we read: "We have seriously considered our relationships in Friends United Meeting and are sincerely troubled over the fact that the centrality of Jesus Christ to our historic faith and fellowship has been neglected and even disavowed by some members of meetings in Friends United Meeting. This information has been a source of deep pain and sorrow. . . . We affirm that isolation and insulation is not the way to take, but rather to lovingly call all member yearly meetings of Friends United Meeting to sincerely study the implications of the centrality of Jesus Christ in our historic Quaker faith and thus be drawn together by a common love and loyalty to the great Head of the Church."

Western Yearly Meeting wrote: "We share with you in mutual concern that we so live under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, holding fast to the eternal values that do not change, yet sensitive to the voice of God for change."

New York Yearly Meeting told us of "A taste of Ezekiel—a tornado invaded our third evening session. Families groped for each other in the sudden darkness as the wind tore at the auditorium where we were gathered. Then, throughout the hall people quietly began to sing Many trees of long acquaintance were down in an instant, but miraculously no one was severely injured. The humility inspired by the violence of the storm affected the rest of the sessions."

The Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region wrote: "By our general superintendent, Russell Myers, we were challenged to go out through God's open doors and translate the love of Jesus Christ to a world full of people. We affirm again our commitment to the centrality of the Lord Jesus Christ as the One worthy of full allegiance in both faith and behavior."

■ 97. Epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings was presented by our Epistle Committee as follows:

Dear Christian Friends:

"May God our Father shower you with blessings and fill you with great peace." (Colossians 1:2 LB)

Northwest Yearly Meeting opened its 82nd session with a song of praise on August 14, 1974. Very soon our general superintendent, Norval Hadley, brought to us the keynote message. He declared: "I have been strongly impressed anew that unity in the body of Christ is much more significant than some of us have realized in the past. It is by this love in unity that the world knows Jesus is divine (John 17:21). In all the growing churches in our Yearly Meeting, outsiders are impressed that the Christian fellowship has something to offer that they cannot find in any other segment of society. I have preached that by unity there is agreement that results in prayer power. I firmly believe that nothing spiritual can happen in the church until we are one, until grudges are settled and the Body dwells in harmony and forgiveness (Matthew 5:23-24; 6:15)."

Again he stated: "I want to call the church to a new discipline of obedience. I realize there is a great deal being said and written in these days about our 'glorious freedom' in Christ. Anything that imposes guilt is not popular. There is the suggestion in some Christian literature that our actions past, present, and future are under the blood—that our salvation is God's doing, and man's responsibility is being played down. But I am convinced in the final analysis it is *obedience* God wants. Why did God create man in the first place? That he might love, honor, serve, and obey God forever. Why did Jesus die on the cross? That man might be redeemed from sin and enabled to live in triumph and obedience to His honor and glory. God told us through Samuel (1 Samuel 15:22), through Isaiah (chapter 58), and other prophets that what He wants is not sacrifice or temple observances, but *obedience*."

As a theme of our worship together we used: "Oneness of the Spirit in the binding power of peace." (Ephesians 4:3 *Amplified*) In the morning inspirational hours and evening services, David Stuart Briscoe, now pastor of the Elmbrook Church of Brookfield, Wisconsin, and president of Telling the Truth, Inc., a radio and tape ministry, challenged us with a study of Ephesians. Combining expository preaching at its best with humor and deep spiritual challenge, he emphasized the characteristics of obedient Christians who live in oneness of the Spirit in the church and in the home. The two basic societal units (the religious operation of the church and the social operation of the family) are to be examples to a fragmenting world of the Christian unity of love. We were impressed with the urgent necessity of fulfilling our witnessing task in church and family to a world that is fast falling apart. Each one of us felt a touch of the powerful, unifying, loving Holy Spirit, and we know that our Yearly Meeting will have a more effective and healing witness to the world because of this ministry.

Quoting from the missionary report presented to the meeting: "Northwest Yearly Meeting is to be commended for her gracious sense of concern and giving spirit. Over \$112,000 has been given this past year, with prayers 'without ceasing' being offered. God has thrown wide open the gates of faith to the Aymara Indians of South America, the Koreans of Portland, and Mexicans of Mexico City."

Although 150 congregations in Bolivia and 50 in Peru are meeting, new areas still await our coming, with the nationals of both countries taking the initiative of evangelization of their outlying communities sometimes without missionary assistance. The great thrust of the work continues to be the extension Bible school movement, almost entirely taught by Christian nationals, with over 400 students in 39 different centers. Much energy at home and on the field has been expended in the writing and preparing of programed studies for the Bible school curriculum, written in both Spanish and Aymara.

The future presence of our missionaries in these two countries may be uncertain, but we feel that through the blessing of God the national church is being stabilized until its future is bright, with or without foreign missionaries, but while there is time we are still calling for missionary candidates.

God is still blessing the work of George Fox College, for which we truly thank Him. Allow us a few statistics as evidence of God's blessing: this year shows an increased enrollment over last year of 7.5 percent to a total of 463. GFC is one of just three Oregon colleges to show an increase. Financially, the college finished "in the black." Thirty denominations are represented; 41 percent being Friends. Students come from 17 states and eight foreign countries.

This is the second year of the college's extension campus in Kotzebue, Alaska, with a total enrollment of 190. Evening classes are offered in the Continuing Education Program, designed for adults. Our college was accepted into the national Christian College Consortium, becoming the 12th member of this group and only the third West Coast college to be so honored. Graduates are fully accredited to teach in any state secondary school.

All this indicates the high scholastic standards of George Fox College. Coupled with the strong evangelical emphasis, we feel our college is making a great contribution to the advancement of our Lord's kingdom.

We appreciated the presence of a fine group of Mexican-American Friends from California Yearly Meeting who fellowshiped with us in our sessions and ministered to us.

We find our greatest asset is in our wonderful youth—154 strong were registered for Yearly Meeting. It was so inspiring to have this group in some of our worship services. Their unbounded energy in the service of the Lord in group singing, in visitation, in rest homes, and in carrying the Gospel to the Indians in Rough Rock Friends Mission in Arizona encourages our hearts. The youth camps are in constant use for group meetings and retreats.

It is our deep concern that Friends throughout the world may find and enjoy the true peace that only Christ can bring.

Approved.

■ 98. The Representatives requested that in future sessions of Yearly Meeting the representative body meet in open sessions to encourage a wider understanding of the responsibilities of and the business conducted by this group. To accomplish this the Representatives should be assigned a

meeting place of sufficient size to allow for their seating with a section for alternates and visiting Friends.

Approved.

■ 99. The Representatives requested that the presiding clerk, the assistant clerk, the recording clerk, and the assistant recording clerk be presented an honorarium for their services to the Yearly Meeting at least equal to total hospitality—food and lodging—during the Yearly Meeting sessions and transportation costs incurred while fulfilling services required during interim sessions.

Furthermore, the Representatives requested that this honorarium be extended retroactively to those who served in the 1974 sessions.

Approved, and referred to the Executive Council for implementation.
