MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1976

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its eighty-fourth session July 28, 1976, at 9:15 a.m. on the George Fox College campus, Newberg, Oregon.

Our hearts join under the theme, "The Word of God—Growing and Multiplying," as we pray for the wisdom and guidance needed in these sessions to make this theme a reality in all areas that God has given us.

Richard Beebe, clerk, led in prayer.

Roy Clark led the congregation in singing, "To God Be the Glory" and the Scripture song, "Thou Art Worthy."

KEYNOTE MESSAGE

■ 2. The keynote address by Norval Hadley, general superintendent, was approved as follows:

As is customary I would like to give you a picture of what has happened in the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting during the 1975-76 year. Then I would like to share a message with you that the Lord has been developing in me since the National Conference on Pastoral Ministry in Dallas the end of April.

With the help of a transparency I would like to give you a statistical report. I well know that numbers are not everything. In fact, some of the best things that happen in the church will not show up in a statistical report. Nevertheless in the brief time we have this will help to give you a picture of progress in the church. We would like to reserve the right to change these figures before the printing of the *Minutes* if later information reveals these to be inaccurate.

First, let's look at membership: Total additions last year were 618, total losses 377, for a net gain in membership of 241. You will note the year before total additions were 667, total losses 430, for a net gain of 237. This makes our net gain last year four more than the year before. So

you see that the total membership now in Northwest Yearly Meeting is 8,076. It was 7,835 the year before.

Now look at attendance: Morning worship attendance last year was 6,013. The year before it was 5,834; the net gain in morning worship attendance was 189; the year before the average attendance was 152 below the previous year.

Average Sunday school attendance last year was 5,132; the year before it was 5,192, showing a net loss in Sunday school attendance of 60; the year before there was a decrease of 16.

Now look at the giving of the church: The Great Commission Budget last year was \$303,000, up 26.5 percent from the budget of the year before, which was \$229,321. Giving last year was a record-breaking \$274,781. The year before it was \$199,610. So while this year we came \$15,259 short of reaching our budget, our giving was \$75,171 more than the year before. In 1974-75 we actually gave \$12,205 less than the previous year in the Great Commission Budget.

Pledges for the coming year are \$203,947. Pledges the year before were \$190,000. The Great Commission Budget for the year ahead of us is \$343,000 against a budget of \$303,000 last year. This will mean an increase of 13.2 percent.

This last year Assistant Superintendent Quentin Nordyke has been specializing in *church growth* training, and I have been specializing in *leadership* training. We have each conducted seminars in several of our churches. It is a delight to visit our churches. There are encouraging signs of renewal. People are getting saved, lives are being changed, homes are being rescued. There is a strong sense of mission, and a new hope and a vision for what God wants to do in the future. Also, in each church there are evidences of the relentless struggle against sin and Satan. Satan's forces are most successful when he can lull Christians into complacency, into just doing nothing, into such a busy schedule in the affairs of this life that they cannot get involved in the life and activity of the church or in the needs of others. But Jesus has already defeated Satan at Calvary, and Friends of Northwest Yearly Meeting are marching triumphantly in the joy of that victory.

Now I have asked Quentin Nordyke to give us a picture of church growth in Northwest Yearly Meeting since 1960.

* * * *

For ease of comparison the churches of America have been classified in the categories of small, medium, medium-large, and large—small being 15-75, medium 75-200, medium-large 200-350, and large 350-2,000. These figures are based on average Sunday morning attendance. Churches larger than 2,000 are referred to as superchurches. The statistics concerning Protestant churches in America show that 50 percent of them have less than 75 average attendance on Sunday morning. Thirty percent are medium churches, 15 percent are medium-large, and 5 percent are in the large category.

Our Yearly Meeting in 1961, in comparison to the national average, we find had 57 percent in the small category. This was above the national average. Thirty-eight percent were in the medium category, also above the national average, and we had 5 percent in the medium-large category, and none in the large. When we compare that to the situation as it was in 1975, we had decreased the number of small churches to 36 percent and

increased the number of medium sized churches to 53 percent. We had increased the number of medium-large churches to 9 percent, and had 2 percent of our churches in the large category. This would seem to be good news.

I'm not saying that large churches are necessarily good just for large-ness' sake, but I think we all realize that there is a certain inherent goodness in larger churches, as they are more efficient and have better outreach. And as churches grow and become larger, we realize that this is a result of winning people to Christ and not just an end in itself. And so I think the fact that we have a smaller percentage of smaller churches and a larger percentage of the larger sizes is a good indication that the strength of our church is growing.

We have found that the best statistical work that we can do with our churches involves what we call a composite figure. To find a composite we take the average of Sunday morning worship, Sunday school attendance, and membership. This is more accurate because it eliminates the inequities that you might find between a new church that had a higher average attendance than it did membership compared to an older church that might have more people on its membership roll than it had in average attendance. And so I have figured the composite average for our Yearly Meeting from 1961 through 1975—the last 15 years.

The line on the graph continues almost straight for about the first 10 years, and then we had an increase for about a 3-year period, and then leveled off again over the last year of this 15-year period. Now even though that is a composite figure, you might be interested in just where it came from. We look first of all at morning worship, which follows fairly closely the composite line showing a pretty straight line for 10 years and then an increase for a 3-year period and then a decline from 1974 to 1975. The Sunday school line started out higher, and over the last 15 years Sunday school attendance has definitely been on the decline. The membership figure has been steadily increasing over the 15-year period with a sharper increase over the last 5 years.

I would draw your attention to the fact that 15 years ago the three figures were very closely bunched together, whereas now they are spread out with a difference of more than 2,500 between Sunday school attendance and church membership. The composite increase over the 15-year period has been 14 percent; Sunday school has a decrease of 12.5 percent; morning worship has seen an increase of 18.5 percent and membership an increase of 38.5 percent.

We have an average annual composite growth rate of .9 percent. This is not too striking a figure, and what it means is that for every 100 people in our churches we brought in less than one each year. That is, it took 100 people to bring in .9 of another person on an average year during this 15-year span. In the Sunday school for every 100 people we lost .8 of a person; in Sunday morning worship for every 100 people we gained 1.14 persons, and in membership for every 100 members we brought in 2.25 new members on an average through this 15-year period. By contrast the statistical growth for the three states of Idaho, Washington, and Oregon shows that Idaho grew at an average annual growth rate of 1.35 percent, Washington 1.5 percent, and Oregon 1.76 percent. As you can see, the increased growth rate of all three states was greater than our figures just given with the exception of membership, in which we did grow a little bit faster than the states are growing.

Not all of these figures encourage us, but they do show us what we are and are not doing, and help us see more clearly what we need to be accomplishing in our Yearly Meeting.

And now my message. At the beginning of the Pastors' Conference in Dallas, Texas, they encouraged us to ask the Lord for something specific during the conference. I asked for a sense of direction for the keynote message and for the church of Northwest Yearly Meeting for the coming year. I believe God answered that prayer. I want to talk to you about evangelism and church growth: specifically about how to fill the gap between what we do and what we know we should do, what we are and what we know we should be as it relates to witnessing, evangelism, and church growth activity.

Most of us have heard numerous messages ever since we first became Christians telling us we ought to witness and win people to Jesus Christ, and yet most of us don't do it. We know that in terms of eternal values, bringing someone else to Jesus is one of the most important things we could ever do, and yet most of us seldom do it. I've heard preachers say that if everyone would win one other person to Christ each year, in just 13 or 18 years the whole world would be won. Yet we can see from the church growth report Quentin Nordyke has shared with us that in Northwest Yearly Meeting it takes 100 of us a whole year to win 2½ persons to Christ and disciple them into church membership. This message is an effort to be realistic about the gap between what we do and what we know we should do. I don't want our people to feel guilty about a witnessing record that is normal, neither do I want us to feel complacent about conduct that is far below the New Testament normal just because no one else is doing much better.

What would it take to bring us from what we do to what we know we should do, from what we are to what we know we should be?

I. First of all we need desire. Mark 11:24 reads, "Therefore I say unto you, what things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them." The first essential in getting anything from God is desire. Success begins with desire. Research shows the first principle of church growth is your church can grow if the pastor wants it to and is willing to pay the price for growth. The second principle is your church can grow if the people want it to and are willing to pay the price for growth. At the Dallas Pastors' Conference Kenneth Chaffin, pastor of the South Main Baptist Church in Houston and dean for Billy Graham Schools of Evangelism, said, "I don't know of any church that is honestly trying to win people to Jesus Christ today that is not winning people to Jesus Christ."

Russell Baker is making a gift to the Yearly Meeting of 500 copies of a book by George Bowman titled *How to Succeed with Your Money*. We hope there will be a copy for every family that will promise to read the book and honestly try to apply its principles.

A. In it the author says there is a three-point formula for success that will work in any area of life:

1. Set a goal and *desire* it above everything else.
2. Be willing to set aside time needed to achieve your goal.
3. Fashion a plan to accomplish your desired goal.

Jesus placed the goal before us when He said in Mark 16:15, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

B. Somehow we must want to obey Jesus enough to overcome several hindrances to church growth:

1. We must overcome lethargy—the rut of doing nothing—and get up out of our chairs and get at the job.

2. We must overcome busyness—the tendency to let everything else crowd out what may be the most important activity of our lives.

3. We must overcome the fear of people, the fear of being turned down, and care more about what God cares about than what people think of us. Probably we will do this best by training.

4. We must break the barriers of our comfort zone, particularly as it relates to our reluctance to welcome new people into the Body. Someone says the church body rejects the transplant just as the physical body does. That cannot be pleasing to Jesus.

How do you intensify desire? One way is by praying. Another way is to concentrate on a goal, and this is often done through a seminar or some other form of study together.

II. If we are to narrow the gap between what we do and what we know we should do, we need to appreciate more the importance of the work of the church in dispersion—of the fact that all Christians are in ministry. It is good for the church to gather together. But we don't gather just for the sake of gathering. We gather in order to go. The measure of the effectiveness of the gathering is what happens in the going. The real test of the effectiveness of the pastor and the congregation is what happens between Sundays, when the church building is empty and the congregation is in dispersion. In the New Testament church, "the Lord kept adding to their number daily those who were being saved." (Acts 2:47) In explaining the parable of the good and bad seed Jesus said, "He that soweth the good seed is the Son of man; the field is the world; the good seed are the children of the kingdom." (Matthew 13:37-38) This is exciting. Jesus says we are good seed. Jesus has planted us in homes, in offices, in schools, on construction jobs, on farms, all through our society so we can grow and bear fruit. Pastors, your task is to equip your congregation so they can be effective seed.

Seed is useless as long as it is kept in the bin. If it stays there too long, in fact, it will spoil. In order for seed to be effective, it has to be scattered. As seed sinks into the soil, we need to be penetrating the social structure around us. We have been consuming ourselves with the program of the church when it is gathered. We need to give ourselves more to the work of the church when it is scattered. Everything that happens when we are gathered should make us more effective when we are scattered. This makes the pastor's job thrilling. He can only be one place at a time, but if he is doing his job through his congregation he can have influence all through his community all through the week. Verl Lindley in his message to the EFA General Conference last year said, "Ask a first-century Christian, 'Are you going to church,' and he'd say, 'Going to church? I am the church!'"

If we are going to encourage all Christians to have ministry, it will mean at least four things must happen:

1. Everyone in the church should seek to identify and develop his or her spiritual gifts. They are now saying that while everyone in the church should be continually witnessing for Christ, probably only about 10 percent have the gift of evangelism. This does not take the other 90 percent off the hook. It takes the 90 percent exercising their gifts to

conserve the results of the work of the 10 percent with the gift of evangelism. Every church ought to make work of identifying those with the gift of evangelism and then releasing them from the maintenance tasks of the church to outreach.

2. It will mean there must be more training opportunities in the church. I would like to suggest that each church have a training hour, perhaps on Sunday evening. I know that not everyone will come, but those who receive training for exercising their spiritual gifts will be much more effective seed, much more effective witnesses. When I asked Dr. Bob Schuller how he motivated people to work in the church he said, *The key to motivation is training*. I was trained to play basketball. I still like to play, only now when I shoot I usually miss the basket by about 25 years. The hardest thing in the world for me during a basketball game was to sit on the bench. Training gives confidence and helps people enjoy their ministry. Your church is seeking to develop training tools. We now have a handbook for youth workers titled, "Help, I'm a Youth Worker!" developed by Jim Settle and the EFA Youth Commission. We also have the book, *Toward Better Families*, by Dr. Sheldon Louthan and Dr. Grant Martin for helping you develop a family-life program in your church. Upcoming is a handbook on the development and exercise of spiritual gifts, one on our Quaker heritage, and one on the Quaker view of the work of the Holy Spirit. The book Russell Baker is giving us on *How to Succeed with Your Money* is an excellent training manual on stewardship.

3. If the people in the congregation are going to be involved in ministry, it will mean more and better discipling. Dr. Ted Engstrom says everyone should have his Timothy. What would happen in the church if every mature Christian were discipling someone else? One of the most encouraging characteristics of the modern church growth movement is that we are now not just seeking to make decisions, we are making disciples.

Some of you have heard me tell about the ministry of Jack Amat, Lutheran missionary in Brazil. He was an effective city-wide evangelist, but when he came back from his first furlough he couldn't find the church he had built. He discovered he had not been equipping the saints. He decided to become a spiritual pediatrician. He would no longer give an appeal for converts unless he knew there was someone there to take care of them. He spent his first weeks with eleven new converts. He disciplined them by studying the Scripture together with them. He said, "We helped each other learn to be salt, not in the can, but in the soup—not in the church, but in the bank." On his first term he had been trying to give himself to 96 people. He was teaching 23 classes. And then someone showed him that Jesus had 12 disciples. When we met him he was meeting with six men each week, each one alone and all six at once. Those 6 met with 22 others; those 22 met with more; and all together he was touching the lives of over 800 people, many of them Roman Catholics.

4. Finally, ministering in dispersion will mean more effective use of small groups. Time after time we find that when something vital is happening in the church, it is happening through a small group. A revival is currently sweeping across the church in America. It is not happening in large halls, tents, or church auditoriums, but in living rooms. Some of our people have been greatly helped by Snyder's new book, *The Problem of Wine Skins*. In it he says small groups are the answer. There are various kinds of small groups. My Thursday morning breakfast group meets for prayer and fellowship and is a great strength to me. Some meet for Bible

study and fellowship. More and more we need to encourage evangelism and discipling in our small groups.

III. To narrow the gap between what we do and what we know we should do, we need to *make* opportunities to witness. The church growth movement has helped us to recognize that one's effectiveness in evangelism diminishes with the length of time he has been in the church. I think it's helpful for us to admit this and then seek to do something about it. Many of us very seldom have close contacts with non-Christians.

I've been talking to people about this and have several suggestions:

1. Make friends with a new Christian and use him as a bridge builder to put you in touch with his unsaved friends. He can make appointments for you so that when you come they know you're there to present the Gospel.

2. Pray that people will see Jesus in you and that God will make you alert for opportunities to witness. Pray that God will bring people across your path who need help.

3. Live so the people will notice there is something different about you. Then "be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason concerning the hope that is in you, yet with meekness and fear." (1 Peter 3:15) Look for opportunities to do some act of loving service and with it give your witness. Sometimes when you bow before eating in a restaurant or share certain information about yourself, this leads to a question and starts a conversation about spiritual things. Some people wear a Christian emblem as a conversation starter.

Ask God to help you be sensitive to people's needs. Find ways to help them where they're hurting most. Such expressions of love and care lead nicely to a Christian witness.

4. Pastors can make assignments for evangelistic visitation. Develop accountability to the pastor or the Spiritual Life Committee and thus make occasions for doing the work of evangelism.

5. Participate in the "Here's Life America" crusade. It is coming this year to the Portland and Boise areas. It will give many occasions for us to share our faith.

IV. Finally, we need the spiritual dynamic to motivate us and make our work effective. That spiritual dynamic comes from being so filled and so possessed by the Holy Trinity that we are like a fountain of living water springing up unto everlasting life. Jesus said, "But ye shall receive power, when the Holy Spirit is come upon you: and ye shall be my witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea and Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." (Acts 1:8 ASV) This spiritual dynamic comes not just from the infilling of the Holy Spirit but also from "Christ in you, the hope of glory: whom," Paul says, "we proclaim, admonishing every man and teaching every man in all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ: whereunto I labor also, striving according to his working, which worketh in me mightily." (Colossians 1:27-29 ASV) Ray Stedman calls this the *new covenant*.

Ray Stedman says when people grasp the new covenant, watch out! It transforms their power in witnessing. He says it's like a man who bought a new car but didn't know there was an engine in it. He piled his family in and pushed it off the new car lot. It was a beautiful car. It had white sidewalls, a beautiful paint job, and his wife said the cushions were soft. It went very nicely downhill, but it was quite difficult pushing it uphill. He went to a seminar to learn how to push it better. The first

day they taught him how to push with his left side, the second day how to push with his right side. Then he learned how to get his back into it. Then they taught him to wear certain kinds of shoes so he could get better traction. The seminar ended with a commitment service, and he committed himself to push his car farther during the coming year than he had ever pushed it before. And then one day someone lifted up the hood and showed him the engine and taught him to turn the key and make the engine move the car. Stedman says that's like the new covenant—"Christ in you, the hope of glory."

Can we move more to what we know we should do and to what we know we should be? Let us pray that God will heighten our *desire*. Let us think of ourselves as good seed planted where we are, involved in the work of the church, everyone ministering, exercising spiritual gifts to help people to Christ. Let us *make* opportunities to witness. And let us allow the Holy Trinity to so possess us that we will have the spiritual dynamic—Christ in us, the hope of glory. It won't be easy. Ray Stedman says, "A real Christian is one who is continually cheerful, completely fearless, and constantly in trouble." It will be costly, but oh, how great are the rewards—the joy of seeing lives changed, homes rescued, seeing our churches grow, and that blessed assurance that comes from knowing we are obeying Jesus!

After a time of silent prayer following the message, Fred Baker led a prayer rally. Various vocal prayers were offered expressing concerns and praise to God for our Yearly Meeting.

■ 3. A communication was read bringing greetings from the Friends World Committee for Consultation and expressing appreciation for the presence of Norval Hadley at the Mission and Service Conference.

■ 4. A minute was read from the London Religious Society of Friends introducing Margaret Gibbons. She was welcomed to the Yearly Meeting and brought greetings and news of her work.

■ 5. A minute for Clifford and Anna Lydia Hadley from Western Yearly Meeting was read. They were introduced to the Yearly Meeting.

■ 6. Other visiting Friends introduced were John Retherford, former pastor of Arkansas Friends, Kansas; Margaret Jump, North Pacific Yearly Meeting.

■ 7. Dr. Everett Cattell, who has served as missionary to India, general superintendent of Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region, and president of Malone College, was introduced as Yearly Meeting speaker. Applause was given in welcome and in anticipation of his ministry.

■ 10. The Spiritual Life Board presentation was made under the leadership of Charlotte Macy, president. She spoke with optimism of the growth and potential in the Yearly Meeting churches, stressing the need for sound teaching of biblical doctrine.

Dennis Hagen, chairman of the Department of Fine Arts, reported that there were four music festivals throughout the Yearly Meeting this year. Plans have been made for Yearly Meeting art shows, a directory of musicians, artists, and dramatists, and a composition contest.

The 1976 songwriting contest winners include:

Hymn—"God's Majesty," by Larue Born and Pearl Redfern from Agnew; Gospel Chorus—"I Will Praise the Name of God with a Song," by Ruth Corbin of Reedwood;

Contemporary Folk Song (youth)—"Come On Over to the Lord," by Fred Stehl of Tacoma;

Contemporary Folk Song (adult)—"Live," by Carol Jo Scheleen and Keta Evans of Entiat;

Anthem—"Give Praise to God," by R. H. Coombs of Reedwood.

Walter Lee, chairman of the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work, presented the following written report:

During the past year the Department of Evangelism has been challenged with developments in church extension along with the continuation of programs previously adopted.

An active, expanding church group at Post Falls, Idaho, located between Hayden Lake, Idaho, and Spokane, Washington, has developed within the year. This has rapidly advanced to the stage of public worship with more than 50 people in attendance.

Charles Bloodgood, who had been serving as associate pastor at Hayden Lake, led in the development of this work and is now pastor of the group. While this was not anticipated in the budget of our department for last year, by some readjustment in allocation of funds we have been able to assist in the amount of \$200 per month since last November.

The purchase of property for a church plant is imminent, and the Department of Evangelism will assist in this from funds designated for this purpose. The new budget includes an amount of \$200 per month for assistance in this developing work.

Under the direction of our department Floyd Penna has been exploring the possibilities of developing a church in the Oregon City area, has formed Bible study groups, and envisions the possibility of beginning Sunday worship services before long. In conjunction with Clackamas Park Friends Church, we have been supporting Floyd financially, but for the coming year Floyd will be giving his time to this church extension project and will be supported by our department.

The work at Kent, Washington, has continued under our direction and partial support on a reducing scale annually. Kent has obtained a van that serves as a bus, sponsors a softball team making new contacts, and is encouraged by some renewed dedications in the church. Some of the initial people who came from some distance to be part of the congregation find it difficult to drive the distance and are attending churches closer to their homes. Home Bible study classes are planned for this year with renewed effort to win people to the Lord in the vicinity of the church.

The Mexican-American Committee working with Art Carranza has been involved in a helpful ministry. A Bible study group of Mexican-Americans has been meeting at Forest Grove, Oregon, with Art Carranza and Mike Moncayo involved. Art Carranza with Mike Moncayo and Mike Palacio visited Talent Friends Church and assisted the Friends in planning work among the Mexican-Americans in that area. Other contacts are being made from time to time. The Western Hemisphere Friends Conference to be held in Wichita, Kansas, in 1977 will have a simultaneous conference in Spanish, and Art Carranza is being involved in the planning. We are continuing some support of the Mexican-American Committee, which is under our direction.

Piedmont has continued to receive some support through the department with funds furnished by the Women's Missionary Union. The Board of Stewardship proposed that the Piedmont program might properly belong under the sponsorship of the Department of Social Concerns, so for the coming year this transfer is being made.

For the first time in nearly three years a Share Call was issued. It was for the purpose of assisting in needed building additions at Sprague River. The response was highly gratifying and was the greatest for any such call to date, with over \$5,200 being contributed. We are deeply grateful to God and to His people for this evidence of concern.

The Department of Evangelism is concerned for the strengthening of established churches as well as developing new ones. Considerable time was spent at both the fall retreat and the midyear meeting in developing long-range processes to accomplish this. The expressed needs of some of our churches are receiving attention from our department.

Reports from the churches indicate that some have experienced real growth in spiritual quality and in attendance. Others indicate vital concern relative to spiritual needs and attendance on Sunday evenings and at mid-week prayer meeting.

There seems to be a growing concern for a vital spiritual revival throughout Northwest Yearly Meeting. You are urged to implement this concern with prevailing prayer to God for an outpouring of His Holy Spirit.

Appreciation for the Share Call for Sprague River was expressed by Ralph Rickard.

Norval Hadley spoke about the "New Call to Peacemaking," a cooperative effort by Friends, Brethren, and Mennonite churches in a positive approach to peace. These three historic peace groups have made extensive plans for study programs and research, including a study book that Norval is editing. A national conference is being planned for October 5-9, 1978, when specific directions and guidelines for peacemaking will be formulated.

- 11. The clerk closed the meeting with prayer.

Thursday, 9:15 a.m.

- 12. As the Thursday morning session opened, Evert Tuning led in prayer.
- 13. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and accepted as corrected.
- 14. Dale Field, director of public affairs at Friends Bible College, reported on the school's progress, rejoicing that the college is fully accredited.

PUBLICATION BOARD

- 15. The Publication Board presentation was given under the leadership of Harry Hoskins, board president.

Charles Beals, Yearly Meeting archivist, expressed concern that church records of our Northwest not be lost through carelessness or indifference, but be preserved for historical purposes. He appealed to local churches to deposit in the Yearly Meeting archives in Newberg all noncurrent church documents.

Harlow Ankeny presented the following report of Barclay Press:

This is the 15th consecutive year I have stood before this Yearly Meeting as manager of The Barclay Press, completing 14 years as your servant in the publishing ministry of Northwest Yearly Meeting and beyond. This means, of course, that there are two "sabbatical leaves" due—"a year of rest, travel, and research," according to Webster's latest dictionary. And there must be some ancient Jewish law or even Quaker law that grants a special dispensation for those who are constantly confronted with publishing deadlines saying "sabbatical leaves are to be given to church publishing house managers twice as often in order for them to retain their sanity."

This has been a significant year of growth in several areas of the Board of Publication and The Barclay Press. In addition to natural growth commensurate with the church and its enterprises, The Barclay Press has published in 1975-76 several significant books: *A History of the Association of Evangelical Friends*, written by Arthur O. Roberts; *Game Plan for the Fourth Quarter* (messages of last summers EFA General Conference); *From Bamboo to Mango*, a beautiful full-length illustrated book by Catherine Cattell, which we have been bold enough to proclaim as "one of the great missionary autobiographies of this century"; *Wise and Otherwise*, a beautiful book of prose poems by Bess Bulgin; and *Toward Better Families*, a resource manual for comprehensive church planning written by our own Sheldon Louthan and Grant Martin. In addition to these one-time publications, there has been a complete redesigning of the *Evangelical Friend*; *The Adult Friend* and *Teacher's Friend* for George Fox Press have been enlarged, improved, and redesigned. The ministry of *Fruit of the Vine* has enlarged again this year. We cooperated with the Faith and Life Movement on a one-time basis as *Fruit of the Vine* became a vehicle for a cooperative Bible study issue among Quakers. Over 2,700 additional copies were printed for that quarter, and some 1,000 new year-round subscribers were added, broadening the ministry of this devotional booklet. In addition, significant quality publications were produced for EFA, George Fox College, Western Evangelical Seminary, Evangelical Church of North America, and other agencies inside and outside our denomination.

During the past year we have been deprived of the continual services of two people who have made significant contributions in time, service, and money to The Barclay Press. Kelsey Hinshaw passed away in August of last year and George Randle this past spring. In addition to those who have passed to eternal rewards, we are losing the services of David Hampton, a 1976 graduate of George Fox College who has served us so ably over the past three years on a part-time basis and who is now going to Bolivia to serve in the printing ministry for Wycliffe. In addition, Joseph Reece, because of deteriorating eyesight, was forced to relinquish his role as pressman for our small offset department. We thank these two for their excellent service. And we must recognize the continued dedication of our regular staff—Dick Eichenberger, Dan McCracken, Dennis Headrick, Gertrude Ankeny, Betty Ankeny, Eva Headrick, Rachel Hinshaw, Ruth Brown, and a host of other part-time people.

In these days of inflation, finances may not be a true measure of growth. However, we believe our figures exceed the inflation spiral. I am giving an oral financial report this year instead of distributing a printed report because of an inability to complete our inventory as of June 30. With the permission of this body, our board requests that the final financial report for the year July 1, 1975-June 30, 1976 be included in the Appendix of the *Minutes*. However, projecting the past six-month average to the end of June, it appears that gross income for the fiscal year will exceed \$200,000 for the first time, reaching around \$210,000. This represents a 23.6 percent increase over the previous fiscal year in gross income and was produced by a 19.2 percent increase in net payroll, 15 percent of which was across-the-board salary increases given beginning July 1975. While all this took place, there was *no* increase in labor and machine hourly rates charged to customers, and no increase in subscription or basic contractual arrangements with *Evangelical Friend*, *Adult Friend*, or *Teacher's Friend*. We consider this to be *real* growth and evidence of the dedication and skills of our staff. Over the past five years, Barclay Press has grown by 63.1 percent. The projected *net* gain for the current fiscal year will be around \$15,000. In addition, during the year we have paid out over \$7,500 in principal and interest on capital improvements and loans and over \$2,000 for new equipment—all from general operating funds.

I appreciate our Board of Publication and its president, Harry Hoskins. This has been a year of significant growth in our relationship as a staff with this board, highlighted by a retreat at the Anchorage in Rockaway on the Oregon coast attended by six of our full-time staff members and their spouses, and several representatives from our board and their spouses. The purpose of the weekend was for prayer, fellowship, sharing, and defining mission and goals under the able leadership of Grant Martin of Seattle. I would like to read to you the abbreviated mission statement that resulted from this weekend:

"Barclay Press exists as a nonprofit, self-supporting service vehicle for the Church (primarily Northwest Yearly Meeting and related Friends organizations and other evangelical churches and organizations) to be used in its ministry of spreading the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ by means of the creation, production, and distribution of creative, quality literature and other printed tools."

A primary recommendation coming from the retreat—and not an entirely new idea—was that we add two new staff members and possibly a third part time as soon as possible. Every effort is being made to follow up all leads for such additional personnel. At least six of our prime pros-

pects did not feel released to come to Barclay Press at this time. We must have such additional personnel to keep up with growth and to meet the challenge of new opportunities for printing and creative publicity materials for the church and a growing file of manuscripts. We are presently following up several leads. We solicit your prayers and guidance.

Finally, we do not plead for your financial help except to wholeheartedly support the Great Commission Budget. We ask for your concern for Barclay Press and its staff and for your understanding patience in what we are trying to do as the publishing arm for this Yearly Meeting and, as we grow, for Friends across America and on foreign fields. We plead for your prayer support and for the best of your own creative ideas to help us meet these great challenges in the Lord's work. Thank you all for your encouragement during these past 14 years.

- 16. Jack Willcuts was named to the Committee on Returning Minutes.

- 17. The Committee to Write Letters to Aged Friends was named as follows: Annie Tyckson, Lillian Frazier, Esther May Thomas.

- 18. The Yearly Meeting treasurer's report was presented by the treasurer, Beatrice Goldsmith.

Appreciation was expressed for her fine work.

The report appears in the Appendix.

- 19. The Evangelical Friends Alliance report was given by Norval Hadley. He mentioned that the Youth Commission has a booklet, "Help, I'm a Youth Worker," for use. The Social Concerns Commission is recommending that every family go without a meal each week, donating the money to relief. Norval expressed concern that the missions work be adequately funded, enabling the work in Mexico to go unhindered. The Church Extension Commission is recommending John Wimber for use throughout the yearly meetings as a church growth consultant.

- 20. The Friends Fund report was presented by Walter Wilhite as follows:

Friends Fund was incorporated in 1972, a tax-exempt agency of the Yearly Meeting, administered by a board of directors appointed by the Executive Council of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Its purpose is to promote and operate the planned giving program of Friends by becoming a receiving agency for deferred gifts and then channeling these gifts advantageously and according to the wishes of the donors in the total work of the Yearly Meeting through its various organizations.

I started as executive director of Friends Fund in December of 1973.

My work plan has been to hold Will and Estate Planning meetings in the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting, either during the Sunday school hour or in one of the regular services of the church.

I make a presentation, explaining the work of Friends Fund and its services, field questions, and then distribute a mail-back card that has a permit to those interested in additional information. These are either handed in at the close of the class or mailed in to Box 190, Newberg, Oregon. I then follow up, making appointments to see them in the privacy of their own home and discuss their estate with them.

From this method of working I have had phone calls, letters, and referrals asking certain help concerning estates.

My reports to the Friends Fund board have been made up for the period between board meetings; consequently the production records are recorded on that basis rather than by the month.

From December 1973 to July 1976, Friends Fund has generated potential receipts of approximately \$1,500,000. That figure includes the following:

These amounts represent Christian stewardship practiced by individuals and families who desire to have their assets continue to do the Lord's work after they are called home. They represent the beginning of a solid foundation for the total work of the Yearly Meeting. The directors of Friends Fund believe this organization has an almost unlimited potential for assisting members of the Yearly Meeting in the planning of their personal finances to provide the highest level of stewardship in carrying out the work of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

I hope to have visited all the churches of the Yearly Meeting by the end of the church year. My concern is that I take care of the estates with which I am working and do a thorough job and complete the work as nearly as possible before taking on more.

I want to take this opportunity to thank each one of you who have assisted me in this work.

■ 22. It was noted that Laura Shook MacIntosh, formerly from Northwest Yearly Meeting, was visiting from England. We welcomed her to the sessions.

Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

■ 23. J. Harley Adams, pastor of Caldwell Friends, opened the afternoon business session with prayer.

■ 24. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

■ 25. The Women's Missionary Union presented a unique skit depicting the many areas of dedicated service by the women of the Yearly Meeting.

■ 26. After Frances Hicks read the beautiful Scripture from Revelation concerning heaven, the Memorial Committee presented the names of 44 Friends who have gone to be with the Lord. Memorials were read for Kelsey E. Hinshaw, Esther E. Smith, Kathryn H. Wilhite, and Morris E. Ankeny. Many loving expressions of gratitude for the Christian influence of these lives were given.

■ 27. Kenneth Eichenberger presented the work of the Quaker Benevolent Society, encouraging people to use this means of helping each other.

■ 28. Charles Beals led in a closing prayer. The meeting adjourned until 7:00 p.m.

Thursday, 7:00 p.m.

■ 29. Roy Clark led the congregation in worshipful singing to open our evening business session.

Don Lamm, pastor of Eugene Friends, led in prayer.

■ 30. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 31. Richard Beebe, clerk, brought the meeting up to date on the Evangelical Friends Alliance Worldwide Missions Umbrella proposal from last year. Communications from the Executive Council were made with the monthly meetings and Yearly Meeting leaders to obtain their feelings on what direction to take. The clerk expressed confidence that God would direct our hearts in this matter.

Norval Hadley, superintendent, presented the following amended proposal as printed and distributed to the four yearly meetings:

... At the fall retreat, the Department of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting, concerned that the concept of closer cooperation in EFA missions endeavor not be lost, drew up a counterproposal to be sent to the Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council. It said:

"1. We heartily endorse continued cooperation with the EFA Missions Commission and express our appreciation for all that is currently being done. 2. We encourage closer cooperation through the Missions Commission working toward such cooperative programs as deputation exchange, broadening and strengthening of prayer support through a more effective dissemination of prayer concerns using the WMU as channel, working toward a manual of Evangelical Friends Missionary Work in which common policies and procedures are agreed upon, becoming the means by which the EFA Commission becomes a more effective clearing house of missionary candidates giving counsel and direction to candidates for missionary service and developing other areas of common concern."

It proposed "that a missions coordinator be released to work among evangelical Friends to implement the spiritual concerns of evangelical Friends for foreign missions" but that this budget be reduced somewhat from that suggested in the original task force proposal. Since there is considerable concern in Northwest Yearly Meeting that moving the administration of mission works in Bolivia and Peru from the Northwest board to a national EFA missions office might not be an improvement, the adminis-

tration of the mission fields was not listed as one of the responsibilities of the missions coordinator.

At the Coordinating Council meeting in Oklahoma City in January, with the help of the Missions Commission, the Coordinating Council recommended the implementation of what was formerly Phase I—the hiring of an EFA executive secretary for missions, and drew up the following job description:

This person should feel a burden and sense of divine call to serve Christ in diligent promotion of foreign missions among evangelical Friends.

Ideally he/she should have pastoral and missionary experience, should be a good counselor, should be a gifted and proven promoter of missions, be creative and innovative, possess administrative skills, and have good rapport with co-workers.

—will cooperate closely with EFA Missions Commission in carrying out its wishes in missionary endeavors; will keep in close contact and be responsible to this group.

—should become thoroughly acquainted with the missionary work of each yearly meeting.

—be a consultant and resource person to various mission boards of member yearly meetings.

—promote and implement EFA cooperative programs, including deputation exchange, broadening and strengthening mission concerns and prayer support.

—be available for district and missionary rallies and conventions; advise missionary preparation and assignments with respective missionary boards.

—work toward editing and publishing a mission manual and keep current brochures and information before our people. Should also assist in flow of material to missionary editor.

—should be responsible for giving assistance in raising funds and challenging our people with financial opportunities of a worldwide missionary thrust.

—administer the work of the Mexican Evangelical Friends Mission and other work opened under the Missions Commission.

—represent the EFA Missions Commission in yearly meetings and at other strategic times such as rallies, planning sessions, etc.

—make visits to various missionary fields of member yearly meetings in cooperation with the Mission Board of the yearly meeting involved.

—be alert to recommend new areas for missionary endeavor.

—make quarterly reports of activities and concerns of this office to the Executive Committee of the Missions Commission, and prepare an annual written report for the Missions Commission.

—be cognizant of the flow of budgeted monies, promote fiscal responsibility, and seek to broaden the financial base as the work expands.

To the proposal of Northwest Yearly Meeting's Mission Department they added the following very significant statement: "The goal of this implementation is toward a combined administration of the mission work of each yearly meeting. Individual member groups will be permitted to administer their respective areas at their own expense and as long as they so desire." Thus the EFA executive secretary would serve as a consultant and resource person to all mission boards of member yearly meetings but would administer mission programs only if responsible mission boards asked him to.

Interest from outside the four EFA yearly meetings in evangelical Friends missions is increasing and is expected to increase further. The EFA executive could handle liaison with those interests, a function that is virtually impossible for existing EFA leadership, who all have other heavy responsibilities. When the job description talks about the executive secretary administering other work opened under the Missions Commission, it is thought much more likely that evangelical Friends can expand their missionary endeavors into some new, unreached area of the world through a cooperative effort under released leadership than would be possible under existing conditions. The job description speaks of his visiting various mission fields in cooperation with yearly meeting mission boards. It is considered that while all the yearly meetings will share proportionately in his salary, the yearly meeting that uses him most because he administers their mission work might provide a larger proportion of his expenses.

The EFA Coordinating Council approved the Missions Commission's proposed budget for the executive secretary at least for the first year as follows:

The Coordinating Council recommended that the executive secretary be hired to begin work July 1, 1977. Therefore budget for the missions umbrella would not begin until the 1977-78 year. . . .

While there may be some effort to seek funding from foundations or outside the four yearly meeting budgets, in considering the proposal each yearly meeting should understand that it may be expected to pay its proportionate share as follows: Eastern Region 34 percent, Northwest 30 percent, Kansas 30 percent, Rocky Mountain 6 percent.

Everett Cattell from Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region was invited to answer questions about the proposal along with Jack Willcuts and Norval Hadley.

After much discussion in which various viewpoints were expressed, along with several communications from monthly meetings, the clerk postponed action until the following day.

■ 32. George Fox College president, Dr. David Le Shana, presented the following report of the school's progress:

Beginnings are always important! Throughout the nation this year we have been recalling the birth of our country, the Bicentennial of the American Revolution. It was an important beginning. So was the beginning of higher education in America: it all started with Christian colleges. Just as beginnings are important, so is the continuance, the "going on," the continued growth of an ideal and purpose. During this national year of celebration and remembering, perhaps we ought to carefully consider again the role of the Christian and the task of higher education. At many colleges today (including some of those very first ones) Christ has become a stranger. But today, as in 1891 when George Fox College was founded, Christ is the very center and the purpose of its existence. The following is a look back into the past year and a witness to God's leadership and faithfulness to us.

ACADEMIC:

George Fox College opened its 85th year with an enrollment increase that led all Oregon colleges. Enrollment fall term reached 557, an all-time high, and a 16 percent increase over enrollment the year before. Registration increases were even higher winter term (18 percent) and spring term (21 percent) for an average increase of 18 percent over the year. For the incoming 274 new students, the increase was an amazing 30 percent. Despite the increases there was not a lowering of standards. On the contrary, the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores in both the verbal and math averages for incoming students were higher than the previous years and above the Oregon and national average. Statistically, students came from 20 states and 4 nations. And the college continues to have more Friends (Quaker) students on campus than at any other U.S. college. Forty percent are Friends students, but there are also 39 other denominations represented on campus.

The academic year started with a special miniterm in Washington, D.C. A planeload of 127 left the Newberg campus for the nation's capital for a week-long program, "The Continuing American Revolution." Faculty members and students listened to senators, congressmen, legislative and department heads, a White House television correspondent, an editor, and professors, in addition to visiting the capital's many important institutions and landmarks.

One of the most significant academic achievements was the complete reapproval for the college's teacher education programs by the Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission following a four-day campus visitation. All programs reviewed by the accreditation team were approved: health, language arts, speech, drama, pre-algebra and general mathematics, algebra and geometry, advanced mathematics, music, physical education, biology, integrated science and social studies. "The small size of George Fox College is conducive to good student-faculty-administration communication," the commission said, also calling attention to an "exceptionally high morale that was evident on campus."

During the year the college hosted several important conferences, including two through the Exposures to Creative Learning program. All programs were open to the public; in fact, most were specifically designed to serve the off-campus public as well as students. A creative writing conference utilized nationally recognized authors and poets as well as faculty members and alumni describing and reading their work.

A two-day career conference for women featured six women in a variety of professions, including medicine, law, education, business, ministry, and politics. The seminar series was the first under the college's new Women's Studies program. Started winter term, the program featured a course, "Christian Women Today," spring term and will provide continuing leadership in counseling women in academic matters, careers, and other concerns.

Adult children of retirement-age parents were the target of a five-session series of classes on retirement relationships and problems that was hosted by the college's Social Science Division in cooperation with a local senior citizens council.

The college's in-service mathematics course program for teachers throughout the Northwest continued to expand with a total of 150 participating during the year in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Alaska. And the college participated for its third year in the national Christian College Consortium, which brings together some of the nation's leading evangelical

Christian liberal arts colleges with the emphasis upon the integration of faith and learning and upon cooperative endeavors.

Academically, students continue to be taught by dedicated, concerned faculty members, nearly 60 percent with earned doctorates. The caliber of the GFC faculty was shown dramatically when Dr. David Myton, the college's director of teacher education, was picked to become the Coordinator of Teacher Education for the State of Oregon, leaving the college to take the position with the state's Teacher Standards and Practices Commission. Several professors wrote books and articles; many attended regional and national academic conferences; and several have assumed positions of regional and national leadership.

The academic year closed at the end of May with the graduation of 78 seniors in ceremonies featuring nationally known author-lecturer, Elisabeth Elliot Leitch.

STUDENT LIFE:

George Fox students are active, literally, around the world. The campus, of course, is the center of that action, but students have taken their concern and talents to thousands during the year. Musically, students took their sounds throughout the Northwest and California, and even to Europe with the 33-piece concert band spending 24 days sight-seeing and performing in eight nations in the first part of June. The 48-piece a cappella choir toured the West Coast on an 11-day tour during spring break. It also was featured twice on the statewide educational television network. In keeping with the bicentennial emphasis and beginnings, Music Theater students produced "The Way It Was," a full dramatic musical, winter term written by college music division faculty and students. Other major musical productions were the oratorio Christmas season presentation of *The Peaceable Kingdom*, and *The Music Man*. Dramatically, productions included *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown*, *Our Town*, *Alice in Wonderland*, and *Cinderella*.

Athletically, the GFC basketball Bruins again dominated Northwest small college basketball, the men producing a 19-8 record, the best in the district, and the basketball women a 6-2 record, the best in their league. In track, three Bruins represented the men in the NAIA national championships.

Spiritually, students openly showed their love with actions and travels to honor God and His working. Bolstered by on-campus special weeks, students could be found sponsoring a Christmas party for mentally retarded youth, painting in an armory to help a day-care center with many disadvantaged youth, fasting for a day to save money for relief work in earthquake-stricken Guatemala, and venturing to Arizona to help with a missionary Indian school. Community concern was shown by setting a new campus record for blood donations, receiving an award from American Red Cross officials for having the best record of any college in the Northwest.

Spiritual Experience Week fall term featured Bufe Karraker. The winter term Missions Conference featured eight missions organizations and was highlighted by former kidnapped missionary nurse, Debbie Dortzbach, and her husband Karl. Spring term the Deeper Life Conference featured Dr. Timothy L. Smith. As a result of the Missions Conference and "faith promise" giving, students pledged and raised \$2,000 to send five students this summer as short-term missionaries to such places as Taiwan, Belgium, and New Guinea.

During the year, students operated for the first time under a new campus community government system that abolished the traditional senate and executive council in favor of several committees that include faculty and administrators. The chapel program underwent a major change spring term with the addition of a third weekly program for "chapel with a choice." Students still must attend two each week as previously when just two programs were scheduled. Expanded funding and extra effort in scheduling is leading to renewed interest.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE:

We can only marvel at the way the Lord is providing for our needs in miraculous ways. George Fox College has made no little plans as we work on a campus master plan we believe is part of the *Master's plan* as we maintain a Christ-centered campus. It has been a year of amazement as God has honored. During the fiscal year the college again has operated soundly in the black. Assets of the college climbed more than \$2 million to top the \$10.5 million level, with a fund balance of nearly \$7.5 million.

A capital fund drive—the first in more than 60 years—has been a complete success with more than \$3.2 million raised for construction of two major new buildings. They are no longer dreams but are in the process of becoming reality. Ground breaking was held May 22 for the new \$2.2 million sports-physical education complex to be named after long-time Oregon lumberman, Coleman Wheeler. It will contain the Jim and Lila Miller Gymnasium. As fast as the present gymnasium is vacated, sometime next spring, it will be "recycled" into a new \$1.5 million fine arts/chapel building containing a 1,100-seat auditorium.

And Phase II of the master plan already is underway even as Phase I is continuing. Ground breaking was May 29 for a new \$850,000 academic center to be called the Herbert C. Hoover Academic Building and containing the Howard E. Kershner Center for Business and Economics. It is expected to be completed during winter term and will contain new classrooms and administrative offices.

Major gifts continue to be a source of strong support. Received in December was a single gift of \$1.5 million from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust—the largest gift ever made to the college. It was designated for the capital campaign. Several other large gifts included \$420,000 from an anonymous donor in Portland for the sports center, \$200,000 from alumnus and former board member, M. Lowell Edwards, for the academic building, and \$250,000 as a challenge grant from the J. Howard Pew Freedom Trust toward the Academic Center. In addition, the college was the recipient of \$140,000 through the will of a Seattle couple, with the fund designated for scholarships.

George Fox College dinners throughout the West—from Los Angeles to Seattle and including Portland, Boise, Newberg, Eugene, and Medford—continue to "take the college to the people." More than 3,400 persons attended the programs. And the Development Office also sponsored the highly successful national tour of duo-pianists Tim Bletscher and Roger House, both 1975 graduates, who traveled more than 50,000 miles and performed in over 200 concerts from coast to coast.

The preceding, of course, is not a complete report of all campus life during the last fiscal year. It's difficult to summarize an active, growing, vital campus, but perhaps these highlights will show the outpouring of God's blessing upon us and will allow you to share with us in the excitement that is George Fox College. Christ is the irreducible minimum purpose of the

college. He is that which gives meaning and direction. Eighty-five years ago our college was founded with this purpose. George Fox College had a good beginning! And the purpose has not been diminished; indeed our mission and vision have only been enlarged! I am convinced the hope of higher education in America rests with the small Christian college that is still anchored to the Rock. It is my prayer that George Fox College might always be that place of strength and hope for the days that lie ahead. The prayer and financial support of members of Northwest Yearly Meeting toward this goal are appreciated, and your continued support in this work is encouraged.

OUTREACH BOARD

■ 37. The Department of Social Concerns chairman, Bruce Longstroth, reported that during the past year funds were distributed to the Friends-view Manor Assistance Fund, the National Black Evangelical Association, World Relief Commission, and Guatemala relief. Reports from 37 churches indicated over \$18,000 used for Vietnamese assistance. Also reported were 24 foster homes for 49 children. Future plans include a packet of written material covering a broad range of social service projects.

Glenn Leppert spoke about the Piedmont work. Some of the activities he mentioned were the Friends for Kids program, a basketball-devotional time with 30 to 49 fellows, outings, and a discipling program for high-schoolers.

Everett and Alda Clarkson, Northwest Friends missionaries to Peru, were welcomed to the Yearly Meeting sessions. Everett spoke of the progress in the Peruvian work.

Jack Willcuts presented the following report to be included in the minutes:

The following overview of the Department of Missions for the year July 1, 1975, to June 30, 1976, is shared with the grateful acknowledgment of God's guidance and direction over this phase of the united efforts of the Yearly Meeting. It has become routine in reporting the progress of the Friends Church in Bolivia and Peru to recount growth, new churches, expansion and enlargement in almost all categories of mission endeavors. The past year is no exception.

The detailed reports of the Bolivian field prepared by Mark Roberts and of the work in Peru sent by Duane Comfort and Everett Clarkson should be read carefully—especially by local church missionary committees and missionary unions. Taking time to review the annual reports over the past decade or more is an impressive story of church planting that is almost unparalleled anywhere in the world today. God has opened to Friends a

great opportunity among a needy and responsive people—the Aymaras of the high Andes.

Personnel

Mark and Wilma Roberts have given leadership to the Friends Mission programs in La Paz, Bolivia, Mark serving as Council chairman and Wilma, a registered nurse and gifted missionary, carrying a significant ministry as well. Their total dedication and conscientious, consistent, faithful witness have been an inspiration to other staff members and an inspiration to the Bolivian Christians. Their maturity and experience make them valuable missionaries.

During the year their daughter Genevieve returned to the U.S. for college studies and was married at Christmas time; Joseph returned to Greenleaf, Idaho, upon finishing the year in the American School in La Paz, to enroll as a senior at Greenleaf Academy. Their other son James and wife Gail are training for missionary service. James is at Western Evangelical Seminary.

Giving much time to field travel, counseling with pastors, and teaching as well as caring for many responsibilities in mission business, the Robertses have been very busy. At the close of the year they made plans to move to Santa Cruz, Bolivia, a two-day drive from La Paz, to give leadership at the request of the national church directors to a new and growing development of Friends churches in the area. Their last year of this term will be spent there.

Ron and Carolyn Stansell returned to Bolivia early this church year and plunged immediately into heavy responsibilities. Carolyn has served as treasurer of the mission and Ron as a representative on the executive committee of the national church. Both have had teaching loads in the seminary and involvement in preparing and administering program texts for extension Bible schools.

Ron has also served as a member of a committee working on an improved Aymara language translation of the Scriptures. Before returning to the field, he completed his degree at Western Evangelical Seminary. Ron holds the confidence of national leaders and fellow missionaries and is regarded as an outstanding missionary.

Harold and Nancy Thomas spent the year on furlough deeply involved in deputation schedules across the Yearly Meeting. Their time at home will be remembered by many for their creative presentations and evident dedication and vision. Harold studied as time permitted at Western Evangelical Seminary, and Nancy used her writing skills to good advantage, working on a book of poetry that will be published in the near future. They returned to enroll in special classes for Aymara language studies in Cochabamba before returning to La Paz.

Duane and Sherrill Comfort are serving their second term in Peru, stationed alone in Juli with the heavy responsibilities of evangelism, counseling of national pastors, working in the extension Bible school programs, and other tasks related to these ministries. Jean Clark, a veteran school teacher from Agnew Friends Church, joined the Comforts a year ago to be in charge of the schooling of their children. Hers has been a most helpful ministry, not only in providing quality education for the youngsters but also in relieving the Comforts for their work.

Continued growth is reported again this year in the Peruvian highlands with increased dependability shown by national leaders.

Everett and Alda Clarkson served in Tacna, Peru, near the coast and report significant development of several congregations in this area. A

quarterly meeting was formed during the year composed of three established churches. Everett's ministry of evangelism and teaching and his clear vision of national church development have contributed to the maturation of the Peruvian Friends Church.

The Clarksons' son Douglas spent most of the past year in Quito, Ecuador, attending a school for missionary children, where he was a sophomore. This separation was a difficult experience for all three of the Clarksons. They will make their furlough home in Salem, Oregon, and be involved in deputation work.

Edwin and Marie Cammack replaced the Clarksons in Tacna at the end of the year after a very busy and fruitful year of deputation work across the Yearly Meeting. They had a ministry of encouragement to pastors and others as they shared their concerns, vision, experiences, and deep dedication to missions.

Barbara Morse was much involved in deputation work during the year, acquainting Friends with the importance of maintaining an adequate schooling program for our missionary families. Her dedication and faithfulness not only in this assignment but also in a variety of missionary ministries have been a great blessing to the Peruvian work. Her resignation was accepted with reluctance at the end of this year when she expressed her desire to begin training for future service with Wycliffe Translators. We are praying for others to serve as she and now Jean Clark have done so acceptably.

Two new couples were placed under appointment a year ago: Gilbert and Louise George, leaving a seven-year pastorate at Entiat Friends Church, and Randy and Mary Morse—both couples studying Spanish in Costa Rica for the year in preparation for missionary service. All have done exceptionally well in the language study programs, and we believe this exacting preparation will continue to be beneficial in the ongoing of the mission as well as allowing them a degree of competence essential to successful ministry.

The Morses spent the previous year as well in Missionary Intern Training in Farmington, Michigan. They will be moving in August to Peru if present plans prevail, and the Georges will be based in La Paz, Bolivia.

The newest candidates placed under appointment are David and Kathy Anderson of West Chehalem Friends Church, who have spent the past year in Missionary Intern training and will be leaving immediately after the sessions of Yearly Meeting for language school in Costa Rica. They also have an impressive record of training, she as a nurse and he as a youth leader, in business, and in administration.

Roscoe and Tina Knight complete seven years as pioneer Friends missionaries in Mexico City this summer and will be returning in a few days. Their support and work is shared jointly by our Yearly Meeting Department of Missions with the Missions Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. In spite of some health problems the past term, the Knights have seen the most substantial growth of the Mexican Friends Church in their experience there. An established monthly meeting of nearly 100 is now pastored by a national, Manuel Guzman, and the constituency of this fellowship is enthusiastic and mature in their faith.

The Knights are commended for this impressive record and are praying for guidance in their future ministry as they conclude a year of deputation work. They have had a significant career of missionary work

beginning in 1946 in Bolivia, then Peru, and finally in Mexico, where they have demonstrated a special skill in frontier-type evangelistic efforts.

The Knights are replaced the coming year in Mexico by Paul and Phyllis Cammack, well-known veteran missionaries who chose to interrupt their retirement to take this assignment. They served many years in Bolivia, began the Friends mission in Peru, then taught at George Fox College several years. They are already a blessing to the Mexican ministry.

Department Work

The Mission Department has attempted to fulfill its mission in administration, promotion, and support of the foreign mission programs. We have met three times during the year in called sessions, and the administrative committee of the department meets monthly to care for matters arising in the development of the programs.

Special appreciation is expressed to John Fankhauser, whose efforts as business manager for this department have been of great help. His resignation was accepted with genuine reluctance. We are grateful to the Lord for His leading Ralph Chapman to accept these duties and look forward to his assistance.

The attention given to missions by our general superintendent, Norval Hadley, and by assistant general superintendent, Quentin Nordyke, who has arranged the deputation schedules for the missionaries on furlough and edited the "Aymaragram" each month, has been most helpful. Beatrice Goldsmith's assistance as treasurer in keeping detailed records of the financial condition of the department work is also tremendously appreciated.

Korean Church

After 12 years as the founder and pastor of the Portland Korean Church, Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim has submitted his resignation and will retire from full-time pastoral responsibilities. He has been named pastor emeritus by the local congregation, which has grown to more than 100 in regular attendance with a greater stability in local leadership than ever before. Pastor and Mrs. Kim have been a great inspiration to the entire Yearly Meeting, and we look forward to his continued ministry in evangelism, song, and encouragement. The Mission Department has made a Yearly Meeting owned home in Portland available to the Kims as long as they need it as an expression of our love and concern.

Rev. Gye Jin, recently of Korea and veteran pastor and Bible teacher, was installed as the new pastor August 1, 1976. The Portland Korean Church will continue to receive minimal support from our budget, and they express a desire to maintain close identity and relationship with the Friends Church.

REPORT FOR PERU by Duane Comfort and Everett Clarkson

Greetings in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. As we started the year 1975-76, our thoughts and hearts were directed to Ephesians 3:20: "Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think according to the power that worketh in us." This has been the verse that has kept us encouraged throughout this year.

Being alone here in the Juli area, Sherrill and I decided early that if we were going to have any sanity left by the end of the year, we would have to work hard not to overwork. We decided that probably more could be accomplished by spending time in prayer for certain areas than by

running hour after hour to try to visit each area. The allotted budget for vehicle, along with gasoline price increase, seemed to confirm this decision.

Considering the long-range goals of the mission, too, that of turning the Juli area over to the nationals and emphasizing outreach into new areas such as Arequipa, Huancane, and Juliaca and Acora, helped us determine where our emphasis should be.

Missionary emphasis this year:

1. Continuing to encourage nationals to take more responsibility in the Juli area.
2. Encouraging the new work in Arequipa.
3. Making at least two trips a month to the Huancane area.
4. Continuing to teach new courses in the *Instituto Biblico* to the teachers.
5. Encourage some emphasis on "revival" type meetings in old areas.

Results:

1. Because of the change in emphasis by the mission, there was a great deal of criticism and discouragement in the first few months of the year. A few of the leaders who had become accustomed to always going with the missionary quit going so much when it was left for them to go by themselves or with others on bicycles. By the end of the year, however, we are seeing some, mainly Alejandro Benito, going out on their own to evangelize new areas, visit churches, etc.

2. Arequipa—In December 1975, Duane and some of the Mesa Directiva members went to Arequipa to help Everett Clarkson with some Christians from Tacna try to establish a work there. Victor and Mary Bel Duran were the leaders and did a good job. The Durans' deciding they should move to the States, however, left Arequipa without anyone to direct the work. So at the present time there are no services being held in Arequipa. I do believe, though, that if a worker should be able to go, the work could continue where it left off. There are no hard feelings, just lack of leadership now.

3. Huancané: The work in Huancané was started and has been directed by Marcial Ocampo. It appears the people of Huancané have not learned to accept the leadership of the group. Instead they waited for Marcial to call them to church, etc. In May Marcial moved to Juliaca to be with his family. He plans to visit Huancané frequently to encourage them in the Lord. At the present time we are not sure if Huancané will pick up the responsibility or not. We will continue to visit until it is evident which way the group will go.

Marcial, meanwhile, has started holding meetings in his home in Juliaca. This will not be an Aymara group. Instead it will be made up of higher class Quechua Spanish people, it appears.

4. Tacna: There are now three groups in Tacna—San Martin, Piura, and La Esperanza; one group in Pueblo Joven Kennedy in Ilo, and one in Arequipa. Praise God that we can worship with more than 120 new believers in the "Coastal Quarterly Meeting!"

Two fellows from Juli taught in the Extension Bible Institute classes in Ilo. In November 1975 Fernando Duran taught two classes. In March Aurelio Zapana and his wife Celia went to Ilo for the same purpose. In Tacna classes were held in various settings: two in the San Martin meeting-house, three in our own home, and two in the Volkswagen bus with one to three students in each. Three of the fellows in Tacna will soon be eligible to teach in the extension program.

5. Bible School: Duane has taught four new courses to the teachers this past year. These include *Evangelismo*, *Educación Cristiana*, *Oración*, and *Vida Cristiana I*. All four courses were well received and are being passed on to other students this new term.

6. Revival meetings: This emphasis has not been received rapidly, but we are slowly seeing this develop. Upon return from vacation the end of May we found that two places, Jacha Huallata and Vilca Maquera, were scheduled. These two meetings proved to be a big encouragement to both areas, and I think we will see more of this during the next year.

Other Missionary Activities

1. Jean Clark did a very good job with the kids this year in school. She has also helped a great deal with typing and other necessary jobs.

2. Duane spent several days throughout the year hauling building material for new churches.

3. Everett Clarkson and Duane attended the annual CONEP meeting held in Chiclayo. We continue to feel this is very important.

4. A missionary retreat was held on the beach in Tacna in December. It was a very relaxing and encouraging time for us all.

5. Curt and Rosalie Regen from New York Yearly Meeting visited us for one week in February.

6. The Comforts made a trip to La Paz in March for dental, medical, and mechanical work. They were there one week.

7. Transportation was also given to new areas for evangelism for tent meetings and for some Bible school centers that are difficult to reach by other transportation.

Missionary Personnel

This year found Everett and Alda Clarkson working in Tacna; Duane and Sherrill Comfort and Jean Clark in Juli area, with Ed and Marie Cammack on furlough and Randy and Mary Morse in language school.

National Church Activity

1. Bible School: Two terms of Bible school were held this past year under the directorship of Eusebio Pilco (first term) and Fernando Duran (second term). The two terms show 21 centers of instruction with 233 students studying 294 courses taught by 9 teachers. Women's classes were also held including centers with 62 students taught by 5 teachers.

2. Tent Meetings: The tents were used for 12 quarterly meetings this year. They were also taken into three new areas and were used for two revival meetings. It seems likely that these meetings will pick up because now the nationals are learning to schedule them. Before, the missionary has taken the initiative; this year it was left up to the nationals to receive requests, set dates, etc.

3. Workers Conference was held this year in November. Everett Clarkson had the bulk of the teaching, which was well received by the believers. About 50 were registered. A few more attended some meetings.

4. Yearly Meeting was held in April at Conapi Sumariri. A record crowd was present from Friday through Sunday. Five men and women came from Bolivia and did an excellent job of teaching and preaching.

5. Women's Conference was held in September 1975. Alda Clarkson, Sherrill Comfort, and Mary Sloan, a nurse with the Irish Baptist Mission, were the main speakers and teachers. Several national women took part also.

6. Bicycles: One used bicycle and one new bicycle were given to the Mesa Directiva for their use in the Juli area. Money is also available for

two more new ones. Due to problems with jealousy (mainly) and greed over the first two, the Mesa Directiva has put off buying the other two new ones. Maybe with a little more time they will be able to overcome these problems among themselves.

Through the joint effort of the mission and the National Church we have seen three new churches added. All the inactive groups listed remain inactive. Only two of the interest groups have become active, and there are several different interest groups showing interest at this time. This refers to the list given in the Peruvian annual report of 1975-76.

ANNUAL FIELD REPORT, BOLIVIAN FRIENDS MISSION,
by Mark Roberts, chairman, Bolivian Friends Council

Personnel

In June of 1975 it was our privilege to welcome the Ronald Stansell family to renewed service in Bolivia. Early July the Harold Thomas family left for furlough leaving the Bolivian staff with only the Mark Roberts family and the Ronald Stansell family. It was comforting to know that plans were under way to place a larger staff on the field after this second year of having only two families present. The Thomases returned to the field and started a brief period of Aymara language study late in June of 1976. For the coming year an expanded service to the Iglesia Nacional Evangelica de Los Amigos is anticipated.

Property and Vehicles

The Villa Armonia property and the small alto property are the only properties actually remaining in the control of the mission. It was recently discovered that the Villa San Antonio church property title had been clouded by apparent maneuvers of someone in their group to gain personal control of the property. This has been rectified, but the title is still in the name of the mission. The transfer of this remaining property title is in process.

The Villa Armonia property continues to experience more than normal maintenance problems due to the land movement in the area. Measures are planned to control rainfall on the property and cope with the breaks occurring in the plumbing.

A rental in the Calacoto area has been maintained for the Roberts family. Other rentals in La Paz and Santa Cruz are anticipated for the coming year. Three rentals will certainly represent a major item in the budget.

The two 1974 GMC pickups have required continuous and extensive repair, which seems to be directly proportional to the mileage traveled. The condition of the roads makes it impossible to avoid this expense, and as a consequence it has been difficult and often impossible to stay within the travel budget. With the expanding transportation needs of the national church, limiting travel seems to be the only practical alternative to increasing the amount budgeted for travel.

A Nissan jeep-type four-wheel drive vehicle has been purchased in anticipation of the transportation needs of an enlarged staff. This is a used vehicle. Another larger, or at least stronger, vehicle is needed as well. It is not anticipated that the Nissan will be used much as transport for the national church.

A decision was reached to sell the mission launch, *El Amigo*. This has been placed in repair, and at the close of the church year we are looking for a buyer. It is hoped this will bring in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

There has been a period of excellent rapport between the national church and the mission. The leadership of the national church has learned to work in fine harmony with the concept of a travel coordinator for the mission. Ron Stansell has kept these arrangements workable, and the INELA seems to be happy with our growing awareness of their needs in the area of transportation. Some travel costs have been covered from the National Transportation Fund. This fund was originally established as a cooperative program between the national church and mission but did not prove satisfactory as such. These expenditures are the result of a request for specific trips by the members of the Mesa Directiva or their representatives in situations in which the mission would normally respond but is unable to do so due to other commitments. These have been few in number, and this has worked well to meet the needs of the INELA.

As a result of a short period of service in May of 1975, Carmelo Aspi was invited to serve an extended term as a missionary to the Saraguro Indians of Ecuador. He felt led to accept this opportunity and presented the situation to the representative meeting in January of 1976. The group felt he should resign his position as president of the national church, and he did so with grace. He was placed under appointment with the Oriental Missionary Society and left shortly after with the blessing and approval of the INELA.

There were many comments from nationals relating to the fine spirit of harmony that was manifest in the January representative meeting. Several important positions changed personnel without the contention and bitterness that frequently accompanies such changes. Francisco Tintaya was elected to replace Carmelo Aspi as president of the national church.

Some momentous decisions were reached in the meeting. The new church growth in the Santa Cruz area was accepted as the responsibility of the INELA with a formal request to the mission to make a missionary family available to that area. The new growth that has occurred in the department of Cochabamba some 15 miles east of the city of Cochabamba was recognized. This has opened the door to a nationwide ministry. All previous work has been within the department of La Paz. Some of the leadership aspires to a vision directed toward every department of Bolivia. Within the department of La Paz, new growth is occurring in the area north and east of Lake Titicaca. A new field is being opened in the area east of Patacamaya with the assignment of a national missionary to that area. This portends a vast extension of the potential influence of the INELA and with it the dispersion of the efforts of the mission insofar as our services can be of assistance to the national church.

Another move toward self-direction was the formation of a committee on health services. This group now functions effectively to screen requests for the medical assistance provided by the mission. Their hope is that the national church will eventually participate in a financial way in this program and hopefully be able to amplify it to some extent in the future.

The fine attitude and little criticism evident in the Mesa Directiva meetings have been a source of inspiration and satisfaction to Ron and Mark, who have participated as counselors to them. It is also gratifying to note the extent to which the Mesa Directiva now accepts the extension Bible school as their program. They have now assumed responsibility for the salary of the director, placing them in a position of greater supervision than before.

The collapse of the center section of the large tabernacle roof was perhaps both a disaster and a blessing. It was a shocking blow to the whole constituency of the national church. There was a mixture of feelings of both despair and hope expressed, but hope has won out. There seems to be a strong feeling arising of the need to take more care that things are not done in a slipshod manner. It also brought to light the very serious possibility of the complete loss of the property due to the neglect of clearing up the titles and taking care of the taxes. This has been taken care of at the cost of great effort and much money under the able leadership of Francisco Tintaya. The growing sense of responsibility is perhaps the greatest blessing. Also it appears there is a unity of purpose spreading across the various districts as they rally together to repair the damage. We earnestly pray this will extend into other aspects of the church and especially into the spiritual unity and fellowship of the believers.

For a time there was doubt about the celebration of the annual Easter Junta, but some groups strengthened the hands of the leadership by insisting that it should go on. The crowd was much smaller, but there was a fine spirit, and the Lord provided blessedly dry, warm weather.

Some progress is notable in the areas of doctrinal teaching and concern for a better understanding of stewardship. These things have received emphasis in the various short courses held for three- or four-day periods in a number of areas with missionary participation.

Missionary Activities

Assistance in travel has been provided as far as possible on the same basis as last year by the two families. Due to Ron's responsibilities in La Paz, some more of the extended country trips have been taken by Mark.

The Extension Bible School program has prospered in many ways. The revision committee formed last year has functioned in the publication of three texts, and we feel this is a worthwhile effort in upgrading the quality of the texts. The student enrollment is considerably less than hoped for, but the quality of teaching seems to be rising, and we are quite sure that as soon as graduates begin to be produced there will be an upturn in enrollment. Some centers have passed the halfway point and are anxious to progress, keeping pressure on the mission for the production of the remaining texts to complete the curriculum. A grant from Bible Literature International has been used in the production and distribution of new material. There has been a continuing interest in our materials from outside the country. The inter-mission committee on production continues to function with Ron as chairman. The national director organized a highly beneficial workshop for extension teachers. It was well attended and also included classes in health and homemaking for their wives.

An activity of significance and time involvement has been Ron's role as consultant to the Bible Society translators of the Old Testament into Aymara. It would be hard to estimate the extent of this contribution to the Aymara nation in future generations, with this addition to Aymara literature.

Ron functioned as director of the Inter Mission Seminary last year, and both Ron and Mark taught classes.

Medical assistance has been limited to the management of the pastoral aid fund and classes held by Wilma Roberts for teachers' wives. Numerous personal consultations have taken place.

Numerous opportunities have been given by the nationals and taken by the missionaries to participate in conferences, pastoral short courses, and quarterly meetings by way of preaching and teaching. On such occa-

sions the missionaries are usually given great liberty to bring the message they feel led to present.

Personal

Visitors during the year have been Curt and Rosalie Regen visiting in behalf of Friends World Committee. Edith Comfort visited us in passing to Peru to be with the Duane Comforts. Other visitors have been our missionaries in Peru, the Everett Clarksons, Duane Comforts, and Jean Clark. Also a visiting Friend, Milton Whitaker, was here briefly during Easter Junta.

While Robertses attended the wedding of their daughter Genevieve in Idaho, the Stansells attended a mission retreat in Tacna, Peru, with the Peruvian staff.

State of the Church

The mission staff is optimistic at the close of this year. We are encouraged by signs of growing responsibility and willingness to confront the realities of the material problems of the church. We are most inspired and blessed by reports of spiritual revival and renewal that are taking place at the conferences and quarterly meeting sessions. We sense a growing demonstration of brotherly love among the leadership, which has shown forth at the individual level from the beginning but frequently has been wanting in the relationships of the leadership with one another and the constituency.

National church finances continue to pose an almost insurmountable obstacle. Though poor, the national church membership would have no trouble providing more than adequate financial reserves if they would faithfully practice tithing. This lack of commitment on the material level contributes to the material difficulties of the national church and, we are convinced, deprives the vast majority of believers of a spiritual blessing.

There is a fresh vision on the part of many for evangelism. Interest in the national missionary work is high, and this effort is a source of inspiration to the church as a whole. Friends from the new areas were presented at the Easter Junta, eliciting heartfelt expressions of praise and encouragement.

The relationship between the mission and the national church is good and improving as the mission moves purposefully from a paternal position to a fraternal position. As we respect and recognize the capabilities and integrity of the nationals in managing their own business, they tend to do so with more certainty and confidence.

We are sure that God is working in and through His people of the Aymara nation. For this we thank Him and give praise. Pray with us that we may continue to be sensitive to His purposes both for them and for us.

Donald Edmundson, financial secretary, explained what the residual income was and how it is used to determine the monthly meetings' share. Approved.

■ 46. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final consideration the following proposed amendment to the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline*: Amend the third subparagraph under 3. STEWARDSHIP BOARD, a. The Yearly Meeting Board, p. 54, to read as follows:

The board appoints each of its members to serve in one of its constituent departments: Department of Yearly Meeting Finance; Department of Stewardship Promotion; Department of Ministers' Aid. The Department of Yearly Meeting Finance receives the budget requests of the boards and other administrative bodies, analyzes them, and formulates recommendations for presentation to the Yearly Meeting Executive Council (see page 43). It determines the percentage, subject to annual review, of the residual income of the local and extension churches (see pages 58, 59) which would be recommended to them as their proportionate share of the contributions to the Yearly Meeting unified budget. The board is authorized to borrow money for the Yearly Meeting when in its judgment such procedure becomes necessary.

The Department of Ministers' Aid appoints an agent of record and includes the membership of the Evangelical Friends pension committee. It supervises the ministers' retirement fund, aged ministers' aid, and group insurance.

EDUCATION BOARD

■ 47. The Education Board report was given with Kenneth VandenHoek presiding:

Charles Bloodgood noted that the Sunday School Committee of the Department of Church Schools sponsored an education camp with over 200 attenders. Dr. Julia Hobbs was the inspirational speaker.

The Camping Committee provided scholarships to George Fox College students for the Christian Camping International Convention. Leadership training for existing and potential camp staff members was the emphasis for 1976. The committee also, in this report, would recommend to all churches the *Church Recreation Magazine* produced by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Youth Committee is working with the Friends Youth Executive Committee to revitalize the Friends Youth program. A Friends Youth Study Committee was commissioned to initiate preliminary evaluation work. These studies are to be used to compile an updated handbook and/or other guidelines for the program. In cooperation with the EFA Youth Commission, Jim Settle has also prepared a resource manual, "Help, I'm a Youth Worker," for youth leaders. This is now available through the Yearly Meeting office.

Jerry Baker, secretary of the Department of Christian Testimonies, reported that a Bible and Science multimedia presentation is being developed by Dr. Donald Chittick.

Results of the Poster and Essay Contest were announced.

The Greenleaf Friends Academy report was presented as follows:

Greenleaf Friends Academy began the 1975-76 school year with the introduction of the fifth and sixth grades. This combination classroom added 24 students to the total enrollment for a total of 158 students in grades 5-12.

Students in grades 7-12 opened the year with First Week and the theme, "Pressing Toward the Mark." In addition to the spiritual emphasis, students were involved in academic, physical, and social endeavors.

With a total student population increase in excess of 40 percent, a third bus route was pressed into service, thus making transportation available to the communities west of Greenleaf.

The football program this past fall took new interest as 24 boys participated. Although the win-loss record stood at 1-7, some excellent games were played; 32 returning GFA students have signed for the fall of 1976 football program with several more anticipated.

The academy and community lost a staunch supporter with the sudden passing of long-time trustee, Morris Ankeny. We are grateful for his many years of dedicated service to the academy.

The entire faculty again attended the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools Annual Teachers' Conference at Salem, Oregon. Ken Smitherman, GFA principal, was installed as president of the fellowship of nearly 60 Christian schools throughout Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

The Alumni Association under the direction of Larry Wilhite, director of development, sponsored the annual telethon generating a record giving of over \$8,000.

The annual Christmas Dinner was so well attended that we had to move the event to the gymnasium, where guests heard parents, students, and faculty members share their stories about Greenleaf Friends Academy. The entire music department—both middle and upper school—participated. Clare Willcuts emceed the dinner and directed the pledges as approximately \$16,000 in pledges was received.

In conjunction with the Christmas Dinner, GFA students rallied to pledge funds for the purchase of a GMC 11-passenger van. The vehicle was attractively painted and officially presented to the academy for school use.

The 1975-76 basketball season saw a 7-0 winning streak before the first loss. The overall season record of 14-9 gave a boost to GFA athletic spirit as capacity crowds packed the home court for a thrilling basketball season.

In February, the Annual Benefit Auction drew a record large crowd as many bidders participated to generate approximately \$8,000 in total receipts for the days activities.

Choir and band students traveled to Salem, Oregon, in March as Salem Academy hosted the 1976 Regional Musicales. Students participated in workshops, adjudications, and two evening concert performances. The concert choir completed Musicales activities with a concert on Sunday morning at South Salem Friends Church. They also performed sacred concerts in nine valley churches, singing and sharing personal testimonies.

It was a privilege to have Phong Vo, a Vietnamese refugee sponsored by the area churches, as a student at GFA this year. In addition to the international flavor that Phong put into the school, a real opportunity was provided for GFA students to not only be helpful but to broaden their own learning experiences as they developed friendships with Phong.

Fifteen seniors graduated in commencement exercises May 25. Dan Berg, religion professor at Northwest Nazarene College, brought the commencement address. Pastor Paul Goins of the Greenleaf Friends Church brought the baccalaureate address on the preceding Sunday.

In summation of the 1975-76 school year, we are thankful to God for His abundant blessings. Among our blessings were a brightened fiscal picture, large enrollment increase, and the thrill of seeing the vision of the academy expanded with the addition of the elementary program.

The 1976-77 school year will see the addition of grades 1-4 to complete a 1-12 Christian education opportunity at Greenleaf Friends Academy. The Greenleaf Friends Church in approval of this expansion is currently in the process of deeding three acres to the academy as the building site for the new elementary building. This summer's activities include the erection of the new five-classroom unit immediately north of the gymnasium and industrial arts building.

It is with confidence that we can say that Greenleaf Friends Academy still stands on the principles and moral and spiritual convictions upon which it was founded. Although facilities, faculty, and administration have changed, we stand firmly committed to serving Jesus Christ.

Please pray for Greenleaf Friends Academy—pray that the academy's ministry will continue to serve Christian families in helping them to raise their children in the knowledge and nurture of Jesus Christ.

- 52. Dr. Leo Thornton, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, reported that the seminary was growing rapidly. Of the 197 students in 1975, nine were Friends. Presently 15 graduates of the seminary are serving in Northwest Yearly Meeting. He also announced that an honorary doctor's degree was given to Norval Hadley, Yearly Meeting superintendent, at commencement. Applause expressed hearty approval of that action.
- 53. The clerk, Richard Beebe, opened the continued discussion of the EFA Worldwide Missions Umbrella amended proposal by reading Psalm 46, "Be still and know that I am God."

After time was given to discussion, the clerk sensed that the meeting was not ready to accept the proposal with unanimity.

Three recommendations were therefore proposed:

1. that the Yearly Meeting not pass the proposal at this time,
2. that we support the action of the other three yearly meetings if they should decide to proceed in this without us,

3. that continued study and consideration be made regarding the proposal. (See minute 101.)

Work is being done to help the black students on the Christian college campus.

Winston Newton from Holly Park Friends spoke of the encouraging work there.

■ 68. Sheldon Newkirk presented the Friends Action Board report. The board contributes to the work of the National Black Evangelical Association, Vietnamese refugees, Piedmont, insurance for Walter and Gladys Cook, and scholarships to George Fox College.

Alvin Johnson from Piedmont Friends sang two special numbers.

Sheldon spoke on the importance of caring and letting every person know the love of God. We must try to correct society's attitudes that are wrong. All people stand on an equal footing with God.

■ 69. To facilitate a directive received a year ago, the Discipline Revision Committee recommended the amendments to the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline* as listed below:

On page 42, line 8, add this statement:

By virtue of his office the archivist is a member of the Yearly Meeting Publication Board and through it transmits his financial askings to the Stewardship Board and the Executive Council.

On page 57, paragraph 6. a., amend the last phrase of the first sentence to read:

by virtue of their offices the manager of The Barclay Press and the Yearly Meeting archivist serve as additional members.

At the end of the same paragraph add this statement:

The Yearly Meeting archivist, with full membership on the board, sits as a nonvoting member of the executive committee.

Approved. This is the first reading. The second reading will be given at next Yearly Meeting session.

■ 70. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that paragraph b under 5, TRUSTEES, page 56, be amended to read as follows:

b. Administration of Special Funds. When a church ceases to function as a Friends church of Northwest Yearly Meeting (see also Chapter II, Section I, subsection D, paragraph 6, p. 38), title to property held by that church is transferred to the Yearly Meeting trustees. The assets realized are administered by the Spiritual Life Board through its Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work: provided, that any funds donated for a specific purpose are to be administered in accordance with the desires of the original donor.

Approved.

■ 71. At the request of the Department of Finance, the Discipline Revision Committee recommended that paragraph a. Auditing Committee, under 7. COMMITTEES, page 57 of the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline* be amended to read:

a. Auditing Committee. The Yearly Meeting appoints a standing auditing committee, which audits annually the books of the treasurer and presents its report for the prior fiscal year to the stewardship board at the midyear board meeting.

The Committee further recommends that paragraph g. Treasurer's Report, under 2. THE CHURCH YEAR, page 73, be deleted.

Approved. This is the first reading. The second reading will be given at next Yearly Meeting session.

■ 72. The following summary of the State of the Church Reports was given:

It is difficult to give a composite picture of the spiritual life of the churches since the individual church reports are quite varied. They range from enthusiasm over definite growth to deep concern over evident spiritual needs.

The pastoral ministry has been acceptable both in preaching and pastoral care. In most instances the doctrines and standards of the church are being upheld. Bible study groups and prayer fellowships have been helpful in several churches.

In general, interest and attendance on Sunday morning are encouraging, but some anxiety was expressed that the other services each week are poorly attended.

Nearly all the churches indicated a good relationship between members with many families involved in family worship.

The Holly Park church is asking the Spiritual Life Board to grant them more liberty of conscience in observance of the ordinances and regarding a stronger role of the pastor in leadership because they believe this will make their ministry more effective in their community.

The report was accepted.

■ 92. A traveling minute was endorsed for Agnes Tish, visiting Kansas Yearly Meeting.

■ 93. The Epistle Committee presented a summary of epistles received during the past year as follows:

Epistles received during the past year came from 38 yearly meetings with 9 coming from foreign countries. Among these were Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Denmark, Norway, Ireland, London, France, and East Africa.

From France Yearly Meeting we read: "A report on the work being carried out near Ramallah, supported by the European group, showed that the important thing in such work is not to aspire to lofty ideals . . . but rather to witness our concern and love for the forgotten victims of conflicts, caring for young children and their mothers in a Palestinian refugee camp."

From New Zealand Yearly Meeting we read: "We are spurred to meet the challenge that has been set before us to be more faithful in following the leadings of the Spirit."

From Japan Yearly Meeting we read: "Remembering the many visitors from abroad that we have received, along with expressing our thanks for the encouragement these Friends have given us, we offer our fervent prayers for world peace."

From Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting we read: "We have found much encouragement and blessing as we read the many epistles from our friends around the world, helping us to know that we are not alone in the fight against sin and Satan."

From the Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region we read: "We are excited about faith-promise giving for outreach."

From Central Yearly Meeting we read: "A number of seekers at the altar have been happy finders as sins have been forgiven, hearts have been purified, and love has been rekindled."

From California Yearly Meeting we read: "Superintendent Keith Sarver admonished us as the body of Christ . . . let us act like Christians, working, loving, moving through new doors of opportunity which are open to us."

From Philadelphia Yearly Meeting we read: "Our yearly meeting extends an invitation to Friends generally—'come to Philadelphia and we will arrange lodging in homes of Friends, if at all possible.'"

From London Yearly Meeting we read: "Grace is the ease with which God moves when we allow Him. Again we have been asked, What canst thou say? By the Grace of God we shall find an answer."

From East Africa Yearly Meeting we read: "As we sang and worshipped together, we were mindful of the presence of the Creator of heaven and earth. The speakers whose messages were based on the theme 'A new heart I will give you and a new spirit I will put within you,' Ezekiel 36:26, were direct challenges to Friends in these days of strife. We need to re-examine our way of life to see those things which hinder spiritual growth. It is that new heart and new Spirit that enables us to speak boldly the good news to man."

■ 94. The Epistle Committee presented the epistle prepared to be sent to other yearly meetings as follows:

Dear Christian Friends:

Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its eighty-fourth session July 28, 1976, at the George Fox College campus, Newberg, Oregon. Our hearts joined in the theme, "The Word of God—Growing and Multiplying."

In the first session our general superintendent, Norval Hadley, brought us a most challenging message in the keynote address. He said, "I want to talk to you about evangelism and church growth: How to fill the gap between what we do, and what we know we should do. What we are, and what we know we should be as it relates to witnessing, evangelism, and church growth activity . . . We know that in terms of eternal values, bringing someone else to Jesus is one of the most important things we could ever do, and yet most of us seldom do it. I do not want us to feel complacent about conduct that is far below the New Testament normal." Norval Hadley admonished us to wait upon God that we may be empowered with the Holy Spirit coming upon us that we may be witnesses both in Jerusalem, in all Judea, and in Samaria and unto the uttermost parts of the

earth. Christ must be in us "the hope of glory." Thus he emphasized ways for growth and for multiplying in the kingdom.

The worship services were rich as Everett Cattell, noted missionary and college president, opened to us the Scripture in Acts. He stressed true conversion resulting in a changed life followed by an infilling of the Holy Spirit, which must be a crisis experience for all who would follow Christ.

God has opened to Northwest Friends a great opportunity among a needy and responsive people—the Aymaras of the high Andes. At the present there are 65 groups of Peruvians who are in Bible study and worship. The Bolivian churches are growing amid difficulties. Numbers study in the extension Bible school. Six proven couples as missionaries now are at work with various responsibilities. Two new couples have been in language study in Costa Rica but are in the process of reaching their appointments in Peru and Bolivia. It is encouraging to know that others have acknowledged a call to missionary work and are in preparation.
