## MINUTES

# Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1977

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends convened in its eighty-fifth session July 27, 1977, at 9:15 a.m. on the George Fox College campus, Newberg, Oregon.

As we accept the challenge of this year's theme, "Friend, Go Up Higher," let us acknowledge God's loving presence in each of our sessions, affirming His promise, "I will instruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with mine eye."

Richard Beebe, clerk, introduced Dennis Hagen, who led the congregation in singing "The Church's One Foundation."

Dr. David Le Shana, president of George Fox College, after welcoming the Yearly Meeting to the campus with its beautiful new accommodations, led in prayer.

■ 2. Dr. Robert and Esther Hess with their two children, Dan and Betsy, were welcomed. Dr. Hess, Yearly Meeting speaker for these sessions, is currently chairman of the Division of Religion and Philosophy at Malone College, Canton, Ohio.

### KEYNOTE MESSAGE

Each year as an introduction to my keynote message I share a statistical report reviewing the work of the Yearly Meeting over the past year. We have just come through a good year though it was not an easy one. But it is easy to look back and see God was helping us in a mighty way the entire time.

First, let's look at membership: Total additions last year were 373, total losses 217, for a net gain in membership of 156. You will note the year before total additions were 618, total losses 377, for a net gain of 241. This makes our net gain last year 85 less than the year before. So you see that the total membership now in Northwest Yearly Meeting is 8,232. It was 8,076 the year before.

Now look at attendance: Morning worship attendance last year was 6,134. The year before it was 6,013; the net gain in morning worship attendance was 121; the year before the average attendance was 189 above the previous year.

Average Sunday school attendance last year was 4,970; the year before it was 5,132, showing a net loss in Sunday school attendance of 162. The year before there was a decrease of 60.

Now look at the giving of the church: The Great Commission Budget last year was \$343,000, up 18 percent from the budget of the year before, which was \$290,321. Giving last year was the highest on record of \$316,176. The year before it was \$274,781. Though we came \$26,000 short of reaching our budget, boards, seeing that the money was not coming in, left some projects undone, so we were able to pay all the bills and finish the year in the black. Actually, if we had the \$22,000 given Yearly Meeting Sunday last year, all of which went for over budget projects, we would have ended the year just \$4,000 short.

Dear Friends, today I want to talk about something as old as the church and yet so new and so refreshing I can't think of anything more exciting to talk about. I want to talk about revival.

Over a year ago Billy Graham wrote in the *Decision* magazine, "I believe we are now possibly in a fourth great spiritual awakening" in the United States. He cited the fact that 85 million of our people went to church on an average Sunday. *Time* and *Newsweek* magazines called last year the "Year of the Evangelical." Graham said he felt ultimately the awakening now taking place will affect our country politically, as religious awakenings have in the past. That may be happening.

I don't know whether we're in the fourth great awakening or not, but if God wants to move in new power and vitality through the church across our land, I not only don't want the Friends to miss out, but also I believe we ought to take leadership. We ought to help make it happen.

I have characterized the past year in the life of our church as one with agonizing problems, great struggles and wrestlings but also one with tremendous spiritual blessings and victories. We are living in the last chapter of the book of Revelation, "All doing wrong will do it more and more; the vile will become more vile; good men will be better; those who are holy will continue on in greater holiness." (Revelation 22:11 LB) We are living in days of great spiritual warfare. I want our church to do all we can to strengthen the hand and power of God in this struggle.

We have had great lay witness missions. We have had good church growth conferences, leadership seminars, planning meetings, and outreach conferences. Quentin Nordyke and I have promoted these things, and they have all been good. But I long for a new sense of the presence and the purifying power of God. Our church is like a ship on the sea of life. In many of these conferences and seminars we have been talking about methods—ways to steer the ship along the right course. But all the methods, all the steering in the world, will be useless unless there is power to move the ship. This year I'd like to emphasize our need for that power.



I love the stories of revival. The first one is related in the second chapter of Acts. Peter preached with such power the *Amplified New Testament* says, people "were stung (cut) to the heart, and they said . . . Brethren, what shall we do?" Pastors, we need preaching like that today. Peter said, "Repent . . . and be baptized . . . and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." Three thousand people believed.

"They joined with the other believers in regular attendance at the apostles' teaching sessions and at the Communion services and prayer meetings. A deep sense of awe was on them all, and the apostles did many miracles.

"And all the believers met together constantly and shared everything with each other, selling their possessions and dividing with those in need. They worshiped together regularly in the Temple each day, met in small groups and homes for Communion, and shared their meals with great joy and thankfulness, praising God. The whole city was favorable to them, and each day God added to them all who were being saved." (Acts 2:42-47 LB) That's the model. When we talk about revival that's what we're looking for. Vance Havner said, "The church [today] is so sub-normal that if it got back to the New Testament normal it would seem to be abnormal!" But that kind of visitation from the Spirit of God is not isolated to the book of Acts. It has happened since.

In 1904 the spiritual temperature of Wales was at an all-time low. Church attendance was poor. Sin abounded on every side. The Welsh revival was born out of prayer. In fact, when it broke out Evan Roberts didn't even get to preach. All he said was one word in Welsh and three words in English, "Brethren, let us pray." Infidels, drunkards, thieves, and gamblers were saved. There was confession on every side. Old debts were paid. Theaters had to close for lack of patronage. David Lloyd George, the Prime Minister of Britain, said that on Saturday night in his hometown in Wales the total sales of booze was 9 pence—a visiting reporter in town to verify the news of the revival. They had meetings to discuss what to do with the police now that they were unemployed.

J. Edwin Orr reports that a policeman was standing outside a court where a trial was going on. He heard singing inside and went in to see what was happening. In the midst of the proceedings the defendant cried out, "Stop the trial, I'm a guilty man, pray for me." The judge banged down his gavel, dismissed the court, and spoke to the criminal not as a judge but as a Christian and led him to the Lord. The jury broke out in a great Welsh hymn and the policeman stayed and joined the praise service. Orr said he used to think it was a joke, but he has now verified that the language of the miners changed so drastically that the mules could no longer understand their commands. In five weeks 20,000 joined the churches, 100,000 altogether. When that revival moved to the United States in 1905, in Portland, Oregon, 240 stores closed from eleven to two for prayer.

Why do we need revival? Oh, I praise God for the many evidences of divine visitation across the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting. God is already answering our prayers in a marvelous way. But when most of us go year after year without ever having the joy of leading another person to Jesus Christ, don't we need revival? When we struggle in most of our churches just to have the rate of spiritual births keep up with the rate of physical births, don't we need revival? When reaching the budget is like pulling hens' teeth, don't we need revival?

Some kind of revival has come to our little Ontario church. Nothing much happened there for years, and even this year the attendance has not

increased much, but since Marlin Witt went there as pastor the church has bought a parsonage; they are beginning to look for land for building a new church; and they have nearly doubled their commitment to the Yearly Meeting budget.

When one after another of our city churches, in the centers where 70 percent of the population lives, remain small or move or dwindle and die, don't we need revival? We have a strong missions thrust in our Yearly Meeting, but I've seen some signs that the momentum that maintains our strong missionary emphasis may be slackening. Missions have always been borne on the wings of prayer and revival.

In his commencement address to the George Fox College students this year, Dr. Stan Mooneyham of World Vision said, "I challenge you to live globally, think globally, and pray globally. I am appalled at the neo-isolationism that makes missions a rejectable option. Get out of the evangelical ghetto, feel the world's hurts." When people keep saying to me, "I don't see why we should give so much to missions when there is so much yet to do here at home," doesn't our global concern need a transfusion?

If we in the church with consciences calloused by television complacently do nothing and say nothing while standards in our society drop, inhibitions disappear, the institution of the American home crumbles, and while such unthinkable things as pornography and homosexuality struggle for respectability and nearly succeed, don't we need revival?

We talked about this in staff devotions, and someone mentioned there seems to be too little difference between the Christian now and the man in the world. We are too inclined to meet the world halfway. There is too much compromise in observance of the Lord's day.

My friend Dr. Richard Halverson once said, "The saddest fact in the church is that the world is unimpressed with Christians."

The June 17 issue of *Christianity Today* printed a Chicago Call to Evangelicals. One of its segments was A Call to Spirituality. "We suffer from a neglect of authentic spirituality on the one hand, and an excess of undisciplined spirituality on the other hand. We have too often pursued a superhuman religiosity rather than the biblical model of a true humanity released from the bondage to sin and renewed by the Holy Spirit.

"Therefore we call for a spirituality which grasps by faith the full content of Christ's redemptive work: freedom from the guilt and power of sin, and newness of life through the indwelling and outpouring of his Spirit. . . . A true spirituality will call for identification with the suffering of the world as well as the cultivation of personal piety. . . . We call for an exploration of devotional practice in all traditions within the church in order to deepen our relationship both with Christ and with other Christians. Among these resources are such spiritual disciplines as prayer, meditation, silence, fasting, Bible study and spiritual diaries."

Another important element of that paper was A Call to Holistic Salvation. "We deplore the tendency," they wrote, "of evangelicals to understand salvation solely as an individual spiritual and otherworldly matter to the neglect of the corporate, physical and this-worldly implication of God's saving activity.

"Therefore we urge evangelicals to recapture a holistic view of salvation. . . . Wherever the church has been faithful to its calling, it has proclaimed personal salvation; it has been a channel of God's healing to those in physical and emotional need; it has sought justice for the oppressed and disinherited; and it has been a good steward of the natural world." We need revival not only because of our personal prayerlessness and



powerlessness but also because we live in a sinking society. An Eastern Friend said to me in Wichita, referring to a recent struggle in her church when homosexuals were demanding recognition and status, "I wish we had had a prophetic voice." Oh, how our society needs some prophetic voices today!

There is a new book by the Catholic Theological Society of America, *Human Sexuality. Christianity Today*, commenting on that book, said that its authors apparently assume that all principles of sexual behavior are situational. What they do not see is that "God created a moral universe governed by the principle that those who break the laws of God shall themselves be broken. Let there be no mistake about it: some matters of sexual conduct are forever forbidden in the Scripture, and all the contrary sociological findings in the world will never validate them. Fornication, adultery, and homosexuality are intrinsically contrary to the divine will. The prohibitions against them are neither culturally conditioned nor situationally founded, and whether people like or dislike them is immaterial. Human beings must accept the moral universe as it is, not as they wish it were. And this universe is so ordered that no one can break its laws without suffering consequences here and hereafter." Our society needs revived Christians who will keep saying these things loud and clear.

Perhaps that's enough about the need for revival. Let me move on to the second part of my message. How does revival and spiritual renewal come? There is just one primary vehicle, and that is prayer. I want to cite three reasons we need to pray and the first is that revival comes by prayer. R. A. Torrey said, "There have been revivals without much preaching, but there has never been a mighty revival without mighty praying." He outlined a pattern that will always produce revival. 1. "Let a few people get thoroughly right with God themselves. 2. Let them pray till revival comes. 3. Let them put themselves at God's disposal to be used in any way He chooses to help bring revival." It's interesting to me that he says let a few people . . . I don't know how many it takes. Some of you have heard me say that Dr. Earl Lee of the Pasadena Nazarene Church feels that if 10 percent of the people of the church get involved in some type of special prayer activity God can bless that church. He's making that work in his church with a group called "the early Christians" that meets every Friday morning 6:00 to 7:00 a.m. I saw an altar service in his Sunday morning meeting that looked to me like the product of the early Christians. Since I've started talking about this we've had many kinds of special prayer activity in many of the churches across the Yearly Meeting. I'm very interested in a practice in our Mexico City church called a *velada*—a prayer watch—people setting aside three to four hours to do nothing but wait on the Lord and pray. This can't help but produce results and be meaningful. I hope to hear many of our churches are having *veladas*.

On September 23, 1857, Joseph Lamphier, a quiet but zealous businessman in New York City, began a noon-day Fuller Street prayer meeting. He waited 30 minutes before the first one came; finally 6 came. The following Wednesday there were 20, the third Wednesday 40. Within six months 10,000 businessmen were gathering daily in New York City for prayer, and within two years a million converts had been added to the American churches. It was the Fuller Street prayer meeting that moved God in the great awakening of 1857.

The second reason we need to pray is because prayer works. Dr. E. Stanley Jones wrote, "In prayer you align yourself to the purpose and

power of God and He is able to do things through you that He could not do otherwise." O. Hallespy says, "The work of praying is prerequisite to all the work in the kingdom of God, for the simple reason that it is by prayer that we couple the powers of heaven to our helplessness." Leonard Ravenhill writes, "One might estimate the weight of the world, tell the size of the celestial city, count the stars of heaven, measure the speed of lightning, and tell the time of the rising and the setting of the sun—but you cannot estimate prayer power. Prayer is as vast as God because He is behind it. Prayer is as mighty as God because He has committed Himself to answer it." The only limits to prayer are the limits of God. As far as God goes prayer goes. Prayer is like serving on the executive committee: it gives you influence where the resources of life are distributed.

For the last several months I have issued a call to our church to pray for the miracle of the \$30,000. While we didn't raise the entire budget that was planned a year ago, the last month we received \$8,273 more than the monthly budget and were able to pay all the bills and end the year in the black.

The third reason we need to pray is because prayer generates power to change lives. In the World Literature Crusade School of Prayer they taught us that the goal of prayer is to *know* God. Daniel 11:32 reads, "The people that do know their God shall be strong, and do exploits." The Hebrew word for know—*yada*—is to be understood in its full biblical sense. It means to know God intimately, to spend time with Him. This is the means by which spiritual children are produced. Thus Paul could write in Philippians 3:8-10, "I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord . . . That I may know him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death."

How many of us can say that we were brought to Christ because of the power of someone else's prayer?

Before he preached that great sermon, "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God," Jonathan Edwards spent three days in prayer. When he went into the pulpit some said it looked as if he had been gazing straight into the face of God. When he opened his lips to speak conviction fell with intensity seldom known. One man jumped to his feet and cried for mercy. Other men caught hold of the backs of pews lest they should slip into perdition. J. Wilbur Chapman wrote, "The power of that sermon is still felt in the United States today." I believe if the preachers and the people will give themselves more to effectual fervent prayer we can see more lives changed as a result of mighty preaching across Northwest Yearly Meeting.

David Hubbard of Fuller Seminary wrote, "We treat prayer as though it were the spice of life but the Bible prescribes it as a vital staple in our diet. We are content with a dash of praise, a pinch of petition, a drop of confession to bring a slight spiritual flavor to our secularity. We sprinkle a shake or two of the supernatural over our basic humanism and call the mixture religion, but God sees prayer as the breath of spiritual life."

Would you like to be able to give \$1,825 to God per year? If your time is worth \$5 an hour and you were to spend an hour with God every day you would be giving a gift to God worth \$1,825. What a wonderful thing if many in our Friends churches would give God an hour a day!

Now as we come to the final section of my message we must see that one other thing is needed besides prayer before revival will come: we must approach God with clean hands and a pure heart.



Before revival broke out in the New Hebrides, a little group of men and two women who lived in Barvas became tremendously burdened for revival and began to pray. The men prayed all night from 10:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. three nights a week for five months. Finally at two o'clock one morning one of the men rising from his knees began to read from the Scripture, Psalm 24:3-5, "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in his holy place? He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart; who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully. He shall receive the blessing from the Lord, and righteousness from the God of his salvation." They let God deal with them through that Scripture and revival came.

True, prayer is the vehicle of revival, but there is something else. We will have to deal first with the question of sin, for unless our lives are right in the sight of God, unless sin has been put away, we can pray till doomsday and revival will not come. Isaiah wrote, "Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save; neither his ear heavy, that it cannot hear: but your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid his face from you, that he will not hear." (Isaiah 59:1, 2) God says "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and *turn from their wicked ways*; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14)

We can pray for revival, we can pray for the world, we can pray for the salvation of our loved ones, but until we pray for forgiveness and cleansing not much will happen. The old evangelist, Daddy Graves, used to tell the story of the man who prayed, "Lord, put the frosting on my cake." Daddy Graves said he didn't need frosting on his cake, he needed his batter beat. Till God stirs us with a deep sense of sin and a strong desire for cleansing, we will be of little use to Him. I believe if God really begins to move in our midst we will begin to feel on our shoulders the weight and the guilt of the sins of our society. Then maybe we can cry out to God effectively for the relief of the oppressed, for the poor, and for more power to witness against senseless killing and preparations for war.

Notice that besides clean hands we are to have a pure heart. "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God." It wasn't John Wesley who first spoke of the importance of heart purity, it was the Bible, and Quakers discovered that scriptural teaching long before Wesley ever lived. Charles Beals wrote a beautiful article for *Concern* magazine in 1959 on "The Historical Roots of Evangelical Friends." In it he quotes George Whitehead, who after hearing George Fox preach several sermons said, "The Lord, by His light and grace of His Holy Spirit, fully persuaded me that without being converted as well as convinced, and without being regenerated, sanctified, and born again, I could not enter in His kingdom . . . and that without holiness none can see God." Another seeker, William Caton, met Fox and afterward wrote, "When I was seventeen years of age, the power of the Lord did work mightily and effectively in me to the cleansing, purging, and sanctifying of me."

Beals discovered that one of the three major doctrinal emphases of the "Valiant Sixty" was on power over sin in this life. One of those Quaker preachers, Stephen Crisp, said in one of his sermons, "Would you approve of it if I should tell you that God puts forth His power (to redeem us from sin) but the devil hinders Him? That it is impossible for God to do it because the devil does not like it? That it is impossible that anyone should be free from sin because the devil hath got such power in

them that God cannot cast him out? This is lamentable doctrine, yet hath not this been preached? . . . Is not man God's creature, and cannot He new-make him, and cast sin out of him? . . . We must throw away the Bible if we say that it is impossible for God to deliver man out of sin."

So you see we're not only being true to the Bible but true to our Quaker heritage when we emphasize the importance of heart purity and the power of God to deliver from sin in this life.

This is the kind of revival I seek and pray for. And when it comes, whether it be cause or effect, there will be strong conviction of sin, there will be a renewed sensitivity of seared consciences. There will be a fresh understanding that without holiness no man shall see the Lord. And there will be a new boldness to take a stand in our communities against satanic encroachment on our spiritual and even human dignities—a stand that what God says is wrong is wrong whether liberated men and women like it or not. And that kind of renewal and power will come when we humble ourselves, and pray, and seek His face, and turn from our wicked ways, when we come before God in persistent prayer with clean hands and a pure heart. O God, let it happen in Northwest Yearly Meeting, and if it would please You, let it happen this year.

O Breath of Life, come sweeping through us,  
Revive Thy Church with life and power;  
O Breath of Life, come, cleanse, renew us,  
And fit Thy Church to meet this hour.

O Wind of God, come bend us, break us,  
Till humbly we confess our need;  
Then in Thy tenderness remake us,  
Revive, restore, for this we plead.

O Breath of Love, come breathe within us,  
Renewing thought and will and heart;  
Come, Love of Christ, afresh to win us,  
Revive Thy Church in every part.

O Heart of Christ, once broken for us,  
'Tis there we find our strength and rest;  
Our broken contrite hearts now solace,  
And let Thy waiting Church be blest.

Revive us, Lord! Is zeal abating  
While harvest fields are vast and white?  
Revive us, Lord, the world is waiting,  
Equip Thy Church to spread the Light. —Bessie P. Head

- 17. The minutes were read and approved as corrected.
- 18. Friends welcomed to the Yearly Meeting were Nick Block, Friends Committee on National Legislation; Olen Ellis, superintendent of Rocky



Mountain Yearly Meeting, and Dale Field, Friends Bible College, Havi-land, Kansas.

■ 19. Greetings were expressed by Curt Regen, visiting Friend from New York Yearly Meeting, and William Barton, general secretary of the Friends World Committee for Consultation.

■ 20. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended for second reading and final consideration that paragraph a. Auditing Committee, under 7. COMMITTEES, page 57 of the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline*, be amended to read:

a. Auditing Committee. The Yearly Meeting appoints a standing auditing committee, which audits annually the books of the treasurer and presents its report for the prior fiscal year to the stewardship board at the midyear board meeting.

The committee further recommended that paragraph g. Treasurer's Report, under 2. THE CHURCH YEAR, page 73, be deleted.

This is the second reading for this amendment also.

Approved. (See minute 71, 1976 *Minutes*.)

■ 21. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended for second reading and final consideration that paragraph b under 5, TRUSTEES, page 56, Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline*, be amended to read:

b. Administration of Special Funds. When a church ceases to function as a Friends church of Northwest Yearly Meeting (see also Chapter II, Section I, subsection D, paragraph 6, p. 38), title to property held by that church is transferred to the Yearly Meeting trustees. The assets realized are administered by the Spiritual Life Board through its Department of Evangelism: provided, that any funds donated for a specific purpose are to be administered in accordance with the desires of the original donor.

Approved. (See minute 70, 1976 *Minutes*.)

■ 22. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final consideration the following proposed amendments to the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline*:

On page 42, line 8, add this statement:

By virtue of his office the archivist is a member of the Yearly Meeting publication board and through it transmits his financial askings to the stewardship board and the Executive Council.

On page 57, paragraph 6. a., amend the last phrase of the first sentence to read:

by virtue of their offices the manager of the Barclay Press and the Yearly Meeting archivist serve as additional members.

At the end of the same paragraph add this statement:

The Yearly Meeting archivist, with full membership on the board, sits as a nonvoting member of the executive committee.

Approved. (See minute 69, 1976 *Minutes*.)

## SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

■ 23. Clare Willcuts, chairman of the Spiritual Life Board, presented the following challenge:

The Spiritual Life Board is made up of four departments, Fine Arts, Evangelism, Peace, and Ministry. The first three departments will report today, and the Department on Ministry will report in a later session.

The board met twice since last Yearly Meeting, the fall retreat and at midyear. Each department seeks to fulfill its assignment of upholding the

spiritual life of the Yearly Meeting in a manner that will please and glorify God, lead our people into spiritual depth, improve the evangelistic thrust and testimony of Friends in the Northwest.

The methods of carrying out our ministry rest heavily upon the departments while the board strives to provide incentives. A motivating scriptural passage that seems suitable at this time is 2 Timothy 4:1-5. For this presentation I am underlining these words in verse 5: "*Do the work of an evangelist.*"

Many believe Christ will return to earth soon. If that is true, then, according to the preceding chapter we are living in critical times. Paul wrote this letter with a sense of urgency, even as he begins the chapter: "I charge thee therefore before God." Billy Graham speaking at the World Congress on Evangelism two years ago observed that God is at work in a remarkable way; never have so many people been so open to the Gospel. In these days God is giving His people an opportunity for worldwide witness—perhaps a last chance.

I am sharing with you what I consider some essential elements for evangelism. The Apostle Paul sets the stage in verse 2, "*Preach the Word.*" It has been, and still is, the belief of the Friends Church that the Holy Scriptures were given by inspiration of God. In John 20:31 we read, "These are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name." Our authority, then, is the Word of God. It is my persuasion that the Scriptures are the only divinely authorized record of the doctrines that we are bound, as Christians, to accept, and the moral principles that are to regulate our lives. In that case, then, no one can be required to believe, as an article of faith, any doctrines that are not contained in them, including life after death.

Another essential element for evangelism is to recognize that *man is lost apart from Christ*. The Bible portrays man as originally created by God, formed after the image and likeness of God. In that state man was capable of fulfilling the divine law and of holding communion with his Maker. However, sin intervened in the Garden of Eden. Being free to obey or disobey, man fell into transgression, and so death passed upon him as the inevitable consequence of his sin (Romans 5:12). Man is now born alienated from God. Without Christ's saving grace he is lost and without hope in this world and the next. Note some terms Jesus used to describe the state of the lost: "a place of wailing," "of weeping," "of outer darkness," "of everlasting punishment," "a place prepared for the devil and his angels."

Third, *salvation is in Christ alone*. There is a narrowness to the Gospel that is unpopular with the world. The Apostle Peter said in Acts 4:12, "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." We are being told there are many ways to God and that ultimately no one will be lost. From Billy Graham again, "The permissiveness of our day insists 'Not Christ the only way according to God's revelation, but many ways according to man's culture and inclination.' To this, the evangelicals must return a resounding NO!"

A fourth element to be considered, *our witness must be by word and deed*. We cannot separate the two. "Faith without works is dead." (James 2:20) The source of salvation is grace; the ground of our salvation is the atonement; the means of our salvation is faith, and the evidence of our salvation is works. Friends have had a strong influence in the battle against slavery and in the quest for social justice. We are pleased with



this tradition, and we must continue to be sensitive to human need wherever it is found. The Scriptures remind us frequently to do what we can to alleviate human suffering and to correct injustice. On the other hand, our social concern must not be our all-consuming passion. Man is a spiritual being and cannot be satisfied or "fulfilled" until his soul is at peace with God.

I must also add that true evangelism must be *supported with prayer*. Before Pentecost the disciples prayed for ten days. It is foolish and vain to try to do God's work without God's power; God's power is secured through prayer. Successful evangelism, whatever methods may be used, is saturated with prayer. We urge you to heed the counsel of our general superintendent to give ourselves to much prayer.

We dare not overlook another essential element for evangelism, *be filled with the Holy Spirit*. Our Lord commanded His followers, "Tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high." (Luke 24:49) While the disciples were praying the Holy Spirit descended upon them. The power they needed is the power we need. There can be no adequate evangelism without the Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit who convicts of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment. It is the Holy Spirit who performs the work of regeneration. It is the Holy Spirit who cleanses and indwells the believers. It is the Holy Spirit who guides, teaches, and fills the children of God. In other words, the great communicator of the Gospel is the Holy Spirit. He uses ordinary people who are yielded to Him, but it is His work.

"Friend, Go Up Higher—Do the work of an evangelist." Bearing in mind—

- that we are to preach the Word;
- that man is lost without Christ;
- that salvation is in Him alone;
- that our witness is by word and deed;
- that prayer is the foundation, the core, and the perimeter for evangelism;
- and finally, that we are utterly dependent upon the Holy Spirit, who will cleanse our hearts and empower for victorious living and effective witnessing.

Dennis Hagen, chairman of the Department of Fine Arts, gave the following report:

#### A. Certification of Music Ministers

On January 18, 1977, the Department of Fine Arts received a directive from Clare Willcuts, president of the Spiritual Life Board, stating that the full board had concluded that certificates should be issued to those individuals serving our churches in capacities designed as special ministries or those other than the traditional pastoral role. This present report is designed to gather all communications regarding one of those special ministries, namely, the certification of music ministers.

During the fall of 1974, four members of the Spiritual Life Board were asked to become a Steering Committee concerning the certifying of Christian gifts different from preaching. Members of this committee were Roy Clark, Joseph Gilmore, Dick Martin, and Paul Mills, who served as chairman. They met at the Reedwood church on October 20 of that year.

Their report contained four recommendations. The first was the identification of possible ministries that could be certificated. They listed ten separate areas, including music, youth work, Christian education, mis-

sionary, social action, visitation, administration, drama, finance, and counseling.

The second recommendation was to form a committee for certifying persons desirous of certification. The committee would be composed of members from each Yearly Meeting board. They would establish criteria for certification, interview nominees, and recommend certification to the Spiritual Life Board.

The third recommendation was to suggest that certification be similar to recording. Recording procedures are well outlined, and certification should follow the same format, which begins with the local meeting.

The fourth recommendation was that a special certificate be issued for a stated length of time upon receiving recognition as being certified in a certain ministry.

The Yearly Meeting Fine Arts Committee took the recommendation of the Steering Committee for certification and began to think how the recommendations might be implemented. On January 29, 1977, committee members, Marilyn Antrim, Dennis Hagen, and Philip Morrill, met at Greenleaf, Idaho. They devised an initial five-point outline for the certification of a music minister. The five points dealt with a doctrinal study, certification procedure, demonstration of a musical gift, local church internship, and music orientation.

The DOCTRINAL STUDY was to include a careful review of the *Discipline* concerning the doctrines and testimonies. Once those had been studied, it was suggested that the individual then delve within his own thinking to see if this was the kind of theology with which he felt the Holy Spirit leading him. If it was, then a formal study of books taken from the reading list for ministerial candidates would begin. The list should be shortened slightly to allow the addition of books within the field of church music.

The CERTIFICATION PROCEDURE was suggested to be as identical as possible with the recording of ministers. The major difference would be that the Fine Arts Committee may need to come into the supervision aspect of the procedure in place of the Department of Ministry.

The DEMONSTRATION OF MUSICAL GIFT was carefully discussed. This would occur in the local congregation and manifest itself primarily as a music gift but also as potential for ministry through a humble spirit. In other words, the two must go hand in hand for the individual to be recommended to the church as a music minister.

The INTERNSHIP was suggested to be at least one year. Concern was stated that this may not be long enough to complete all the reading and still function effectively in an active ministry. Within the internship period, four activities were listed as primary: First, the music minister intern should direct a choir for an entire service, such as a children's or youth musical or an adult cantata. Second, the intern should give musical leadership in the directing of congregational singing on a regular basis. Third, he or she should direct a musical ensemble in at least 12 different services throughout the calendar year. Finally, the intern should participate with the pastor in planning music for various worship services.

The committee felt that the intern should have an in-depth knowledge of good church music through a MUSICAL ORIENTATION. Within this study would be the selection of music for choirs of all ages as well as music for worship services, Sunday school classes, and even instrumental ensembles.

At the conclusion of this meeting, Dennis Hagen reported that the Kellogg Foundation was interested in helping our college students make



contacts with future church music employers. He suggested the research concerning what those students would be required to demonstrate by proficiency could be carried forth as a part of a funded grant program the following summer. The committee suggested he pursue this possibility and produce a full draft of certification of minister of music, should the grant be awarded.

During the late spring months, the grant was forthcoming and an initial draft was prepared. The report was prepared by June 15 and sent to all ministers of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Each pastor was asked to respond to the content within the certification proposal and to respond between July 4 and 11.

Of the 50 plus mailing, four ministers responded with constructive suggestions, and many others responded positively to the proposal. The responses shall be briefly stated in this report. Milo Ross of the Reedwood church feels that there are many gifts of ministry and that the Spiritual Life Board is sound in its approach to consider certification. He does have doubts, however, as to whether the mechanics involved should be as complex as suggested. He does relay the feeling that it may be the problem of the recording procedure itself, which he feels may be too heavy on mechanics.

Ron Woodward of the Newberg church feels the option of choosing books from a given list may lead the reader to choose lightweight material and never elect deep reading. He feels the key concern of the issue is the discernment of spiritual effectiveness of the gift itself and that the local church leaders should be very careful regarding their recommendations. The point is to see if the music minister can communicate the Gospel effectively through the medium of music.

Glenn Armstrong of the Lynwood church is concerned that the music minister be aware of hymn arrangements and contemporary gospel music in his study, as this is what is really communicating the Gospel today. He also feels that the music minister should have more required reading. If they are to minister together, they must share the same theological, historical, educational, and biblical values.

Randall Emry of the Talent church had many responses to the proposal regarding procedure. His major concern was to express pleasure that the Spiritual Life Board is pursuing this area but to be careful to never ostracize the song leaders in small churches who may never undertake the certification route.

Responses are yet being sought from other pastors as well as theologians and musicians who are close to our fellowship as Friends but are not involved as full-time pastors in local churches. The Fine Arts Committee will review all material gathered to date and pursue the revision of this initial draft.

B. An initial draft of a proposed certification model has been submitted to the Spiritual Life Board.

#### C. Fine Arts Directory

Each church has been asked to specify the various musicians, artists, and dramatists with the local congregation for a Yearly Meeting directory. The purpose of the directory is to allow the churches the opportunity to know who the fine arts practitioners are within their geographic area. The Yearly Meeting Fine Arts Committee desires to assist each area in the producing of plays, art shows, and music festivals among churches of each area. The quarterly area rally would be an ideal time for cooperative ventures within each of these disciplines of the fine arts.

In the near future, it is hoped, an area fine arts chairman would be elected who would instigate such cooperative programs. With nine areas represented, the Yearly Meeting committee would have nine consultants in the field to assist in creating opportunity for ministry through the fine arts.

Ralph Beebe, chairman of the Department of Peace, stressed that Christ calls us to follow after peace with all men. Quakers have historically accepted this challenge. The New Call to Peacemaking comprises the major thrust of this department, as it provides a vehicle to speak out against things that create war while emphasizing positive alternatives. To those who seek peace and humanitarianism it is strongly enunciated that the biblical message of Christ is the only way to peace. As the message of Christ is accepted and proclaimed, it must include peace.

Fred Gregory, who has served as the Yearly Meeting representative to the regional New Call to Peacemaking planning group along with Ralph Beebe, explained the specifics of this cooperative effort by Friends, Mennonites, and Brethren churches. Future plans call for a regional conference to be held October 28-30 at Camp Collins near Portland and an October 1978 national conference in Greenlake, Wisconsin. The book, *New Call to Peacemaking*, edited by Norval Hadley, is now available.

Donald Lamm, chairman of the Department of Evangelism, presented the following report:

The department is charged by the *Discipline* of Northwest Yearly Meeting to respond in caring support of pastoral leadership, the evangelistic thrust, and establishing of new churches within our Yearly Meeting. The task is one of awesome potential, for upon this department rests the possible expansion of such areas as the foreign missions program, publication, and Christian education. Unless the Department of Evangelism can succeed in stimulating the Yearly Meeting to greater evangelistic awareness, the supporting base will become smaller in the face of ever-expanding needs in these other areas. It is, then, with a deep sense of urgency that this department calls upon NWYM to a greater commitment to reach lost people in Idaho, Oregon, and Washington with the healing message of the reconciling love of Christ as found within the written Word.

Over the past 12 months some very gratifying activities have taken place across our Yearly Meeting:

1. *Post Falls, Idaho.* One year ago we announced the birth of a new church in northern Idaho. Post Falls is located approximately halfway between Spokane, Washington, on the west, and Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, on the east. This small community is by official government study identified as a part of Idaho's fastest-growing county. The church property that you helped purchase by your pledge of \$5,000, of which \$4,500 has been received to date, is located in the very heart of this growth center. Charles and Linda Bloodgood are providing excellent leadership in this expansion church.

2. *Hilltop Friends* in the Oregon City area of Clackamas County is offering the community an opportunity to know Christ. Floyd and Merry Penna are providing gifted direction in pastoral leadership. Their ministry of puppets, home Bible studies, and community calling is promising to reap good results.

3. *Kent Friends* began eight years ago under the pioneer leadership of Eugene and Norma McDonald. The format of home Bible studies, reaching the unchurched, and building a stable fellowship was Eugene's goal. The work has grown, and now Eugene has resigned to pioneer a



new work. John Retherford has assumed the role of pastoral leadership in the Kent meeting.

4. *Federal Way, Washington*, represents the department's most recent thrust in church extension. Federal Way is located between Tacoma and Seattle of the Puget Sound Area. It represents one of the fastest-growing areas of the state of Washington. Your prayer support is vital for this new church-planting venture.

The department has also made some difficult decisions regarding the Holly Park Friends Meeting. Over the past few months we have concluded that it would be in the best interest of the kingdom to permit Holly Park to be formally identified with the Christian and Missionary Alliance (CMA). This decision was reached after much consideration and counsel. The property is being offered for sale to the CMA denomination in order to provide an ongoing ministry in that community.

These projects for the kingdom represent hours of prayer, planning, and planting time. Why does your department believe that those hours and the expenditure of \$47,188 is justified?

1. Because we believe the biblical mandate is to seek the lost sheep of our world just as the Good Shepherd did.

2. Because we see the tragic breakdown of the home as evidenced in Lane County, Oregon, of which Eugene is the county seat, where in 1976 for every 100 marriages 101 divorces were sought.

3. Because we believe Friends have something vital to say in providing healing for the deep spiritual hurts of our society.

4. Because we believe that the reconciling love of Christ does provide the solution for the disease of sin.

Thus the department has sought not only to provide direction in establishing new churches but also to assist the established churches to experience normal, healthy growth that can be identified as

1. Numerical growth
2. Emotional or psychological stability of church families.
3. Spiritual maturity (expressed by reproduction).

We would wish to express our appreciation for your support over the past year. We also request your support in prayer and humbly ask that you respond in the act of financial support to make the purpose of this board, "For every church to achieve normal, healthy growth," a reality over the next 12 months.

The inspiring work at Hayden Lake and Post Falls was presented by J. D. Baker, Jim Haley, Gary Emerson, clerk, and Pastor Robert Schneider. They told of many conversions and a true spirit of love, as the congregation followed the biblical pattern of Acts 2:42-47 mentioned in the keynote message.

Richard Beebe, clerk, expressed appreciation to J. D. and Leona Baker, who have served the Lord so faithfully for many years in the Yearly Meeting and particularly at Hayden Lake.

The board's presentation was approved.

■ 24. The Friends Fund report was presented by Walter Wilhite, executive director, as follows:

This past year has shown a substantial increase in both the interest and participation in trusts and wills to Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church through the planned giving program of Friends Fund by many Friends Church members as well as by other denominations.

The Friends Fund is managing a number of real estate transactions and acting as a receiving agency for some of the boards and churches.

We have been able to furnish money to other agencies, such as Friends Church Extension Foundation and George Fox College Foundation and to hold mortgages on real estate either by loan or purchase.

One bequest was received in December that was evaluated at approximately \$30,000. This was made up of some real estate, contracts, and some cash. Friends Fund is managing these properties.

From July 1976 to July 1977 Friends Fund has generated potential receipts of approximately \$2,379,177. Last year at this time we reported \$1,500,000.

The amounts designated to Friends Fund in wills and revocable trusts and notes naming Friends Fund as beneficiary (these amounts are not guaranteed, as the designated beneficiaries may be changed at any time prior to the death of the individuals):

## PUBLICATION BOARD

■ 32. The Publication Board's report was made with Harlow Ankeny presiding.

Dr. Arthur Roberts, author of a new book, *Tomorrow Is Growing Old*, told of his experiences in writing this history of Quakers in Alaska.

Earl Perisho, former missionary in Kotzebue, Alaska, told of the tremendous amount of research contained in Dr. Roberts's book, making it a significant and vital work about Friends' history.

Harlow Ankeny told of plans to print other book manuscripts. A new photocomposition system is being purchased by Barclay Press that will greatly facilitate the work.

Appreciation and applause were expressed to Dr. Earl Barker, who has served on the Publication Board since its inception, and for the fine work of Joseph Reece, who has retired from work at Barclay Press.

The Barclay Press treasurer's report was submitted and appears in the Appendix.

Charles Beals, Yearly Meeting archivist, presented a written record of all documents in the Yearly Meeting vault or in the church archives room of George Fox College library. Stressing that knowing the past is essential to shaping the future, he urged the Yearly Meeting to contribute church minutes, correspondence, diaries, and ministers' life stories, including early memories of meetings they served. Microfilming, photocopying, and cassette recording are being used to preserve this material.

The board's report was approved.

■ 33. The Outreach Board's Department of Foreign Missions report presented in the Wednesday evening service by Jack Willcuts was approved as follows:

Each year brings changes and new challenges in the Friends missionary efforts in Bolivia, Peru, and Mexico. Changing missionary personnel, new field developments, maturation, and unpredictable responses of both the people and the attitude of national governments require a constant dependence on the Spirit's guidance as our church attempts to fulfill its missionary outreach. Through all of these, however, can be seen significant progress in all our fields of endeavor. The greatest obstacles faced at present and yet to be conquered are the pressures of economic inflation, which means maintaining our work is more costly every week. Increased staffing and equipment are therefore more difficult than ever before, coming at a time when it appears the opportunities for expansion are also unprecedented. Careful administration and stewardship, along with great faith and sacrifice, are required by our Yearly Meeting in its foreign mission efforts. These can be met only in the power of the Lord.

Three new geographical areas are opening in Bolivia and Peru that in many respects constitute new mission fields. These are in the Santa Cruz and Alto Beni areas of Bolivia and the city of Arequipa in Peru. There are also the yet unpenetrated edges of evangelism in our Peruvian frontiers and in the capital city of La Paz itself. These opportunities come about

largely because of migration of national Friends, population growth, and missionary concerns, all representing greater potential than we have ever known. Santa Cruz, two days' distance from La Paz, is one of the fastest-growing cities in South America, with an international jet airport under construction to service several Latin American countries. At the same time, the Bolivian government is offering attractive land grants to indigenous citizens of the arid highlands in this lower altitude, the rich, agricultural region of Santa Cruz. Many Friends families are moving, and more will be, a fact that means new Friends meetings will be springing up in districts before closed to our denomination. A similar development is seen in Arequipa, Peru, a pleasant city of nearly a quarter million with a number of Aymara Friends families already worshipping together.

Beyond the church extension trends in evidence are other growing edges of mission endeavors. Extended education needs for new believers and church leaders, secondary schooling for second-generation Christians, vocational training, and other ministries are among the specific open doors before Friends in Bolivia, who work now with second and even third generation national Quakers as well as in continued evangelism among pagan peoples.

It is our great privilege to welcome to our Yearly Meeting sessions this year for the first time representatives from Bolivia Yearly Meeting of Friends: Francisco Tintaya, president of the National Friends Church of Bolivia, and Enrique Tito, who is currently director of the Patmos Bible School located in La Paz. Their ministry the past few weeks among our churches has been much appreciated and significantly instructive in acquainting all of us in a far more thorough way with the character and maturity of the Aymara Friends of the Andean mountains for whom we have prayed for so many years. This intervisitation exchange and the visit of a tour group from Northwest Yearly Meeting in April to Aymara-land are both certain to strengthen our ties of fellowship and vision of missionary efforts. Another tour is planned for the coming year. And our prayers will also be with our two Bolivian brethren as they return to share their experiences among us with their churches.

While there is genuine concern about the inflationary costs of missionary work in all of its aspects, the Department of Missions has conscientiously attempted to prepare realistic budget requirements matching both our constituency and opportunities. That the missionary budget was not met this year in spite of the highest giving record for missions in our Yearly Meeting presents us with serious decisions to be made. We have tried to make prudent use of all gifts received, and we are indebted to the splendid work of our business manager, Ralph Chapman, and Yearly Meeting treasurer, Beatrice Goldsmith, for their often unpleasant assignments because of these budgetary pressures. Our field treasurers and other missionaries are to be commended, too, for their great efforts in keeping costs at a minimum even while faced with ever-growing inflation.

Missionaries on the field the past year in Bolivia include Ron and Carolyn Stansell, Mark and Wilma Roberts, Harold and Nancy Thomas, and Gilbert and Louise George. The Thomases arrived on the field during the year; the Robertses returned for furlough a few weeks ago. In Peru Ed and Marie Cammack returned to the station vacated by Everett and Alda Clarkson, who spent the year in furlough deputation. Randy and Mary Morse joined Jean Clark and Duane and Sherrill Comfort, who have just returned to the U.S. for furloughs. Roscoe and Tina Knight spent the year in furlough ministries across the Evangelical Friends Alliance, as Paul and Phyllis Cammack took their place in Mexico City for the year.



Dave and Kathy Anderson were in San Jose, Costa Rica, in language school, and at midyear it was decided they should go to Mexico City upon completing their studies. They will leave in a few days for this assignment under the support of the EFA, of which we have about a 30 percent share in support.

One new couple has been placed under appointment, James and Gayle Roberts, who will spend the coming months in language school before joining the Bolivian staff. It is now planned for Roscoe and Tina Knight to return around the first of the year to assist in Bolivia and Peru as needed.

For six weeks during the early winter, Gerald and Alice Dillon lived in the Friends guest house in La Paz while teaching in the seminary and counseling with national church leaders. Their visit concluded at Christmas time with a very helpful retreat in which several missionaries prepared papers on solving various field problems and projecting the direction of priority programs for the future and to enjoy the spiritual fellowship of worship and prayer together. The serious thinking and planning occurring in this meeting will undoubtedly have lasting benefits.

The Department of Missions also held an additional meeting in May to review and discuss the position papers prepared for the field retreat, and they believe this too was helpful. Again this year the Department of Missions has functioned with an Administrative Committee meeting almost monthly. One new operational policy has been in effect for the past two years encouraging missionaries on furlough to meet continuously with the department and Administrative Committee meetings as full participants in decision making and discussion. The rationale behind this policy views the missionaries and Department of Missions members as a team working together rather than as an employer-employee relationship. This has strengthened the depth of trust and understanding between the department and missionaries and has been helpful to both, building morale among the missionaries and being mutually beneficial in every way. This is believed to be not only sensible operational policy but consistent with Quaker business procedure, which erases status in favor of function, as each exercises his or her gifts. Missionaries absent themselves from board meetings only when personnel matters are under consideration in much the same manner a pastor does while his call or tenure is being considered by a local Spiritual Life Committee.

Coming from the long-range planning meetings of both the department and the mission staff the past year are two concerns (among others) that may merit mention in this report to the Yearly Meeting. Both will affect the priorities and direction of our foreign mission endeavors.

One fascinating new ministry to strengthen the lives of established Christians, and churches, would be the possibility of providing practical training in how to manage small businesses, agricultural improvement, and scholarship aids for whatever training might be done in these two fields and other potential enterprises related to wool, potatoes, barley, donkeys, chickens, cows, llamas, and adobe skills. Eldon Helm's ministry with "Partnership for Productivity" in Kenya and now in Botswana offers tremendous possibilities for Bolivia and Peru, particularly among the Aymara Christians. The church may be ready, the youth searching, the economic climate right for such a new, creative effort in ministering to the whole man. If this can be seen as a part of the Christian concern to bring health, healing, and wholeness to the Aymara people—not merely to be introducing something new but improving and encouraging, giving dig-

nity to something uniquely theirs as a God-given heritage—it would not only enormously strengthen the church but be a most effective evangelistic influence to the world around.

This might develop into some sort of agricultural program for training youth, on-the-spot experimentation in the *chacras* around the churches, building on the mutual trust of believers always found in the wake of the Gospel. Development of something like Friends Fund, Inc., could occur for capital investments, money management, and small business possibilities. These could become a model for the country as well as the church and meet needs heretofore neglected or relegated into a non-Christian category. Two thirds of Christ's teaching has to do with a Christian and his money or business affairs.

Obviously this cannot be a ministry added to the existing heavy responsibilities carried by present staff without either deliberate redirection or else searching for new candidates qualified for this kind of missionary work. But this might be seen as a new direction for the future, designed not merely as a "holding of our youth" in the church but of actually breaking new ground in as thorough a way as we have done in the Extension Bible School program and other theological training.

Another major consideration of all missionary families is the education of their children. Perhaps some rethinking needs to be done regarding the aims and goals in making missionary appointments and in candidating. The break anticipated in missionary on-the-field service for meeting the schooling (social) needs of missionary children should not be seen as an interruption of missionary service but an anticipated, normal aspect of mission service. Certain built-in, long-range planning should be made to allow the missionary parents to use those years for additional studies at home, in seminary, special training, pastoral service for orientation purposes as well as ministry, etc. Policy decisions might be made at the time a family comes under appointment so they and the board may better plan ahead. This will help avoid embarrassment, uncertainties, budget difficulties, and allow this entire situation to be lifted out of a negative thing to a positive part of a career in missions. Just having a school somewhere, distant or not-so-distant, to which missionary children are sent is not the answer. It never has been, although used by many missionaries. Unless an adequate answer can be found to this constant dilemma, it will continue to be an additional emotional and economic burden to the missionary family, a danger to the educational life of the children, an excessive pressure on mission budgets at home without long-range consideration given to travel, replacements, transitions, field programs, etc. It has been said that old age is the greatest surprise that life brings to anyone. The same seems to be true with the educational needs of missionary children—yet it should not be a surprise; it just requires planning and a proper perspective on the part of both parents and the board. This problem, once solved, will go a long way toward reducing missionary dropout as well as helping to protect missionary children from the onus of being "MKs."

In summary, the aims and goals of our work in Bolivia and Peru are attitudinal as well as explicit. To keep at the growing edge of church development means more than evangelistic outreach, as important as this is. The great commission has two important parts: to evangelize and to make disciples. Keeping these creatively in balance is the big aim before us always. Let us be careful not to leave anything undone in this undertaking.



Following are excerpts from the Annual Field Report prepared by Harold Thomas:

*The Churches.* Reporting growth statistics for the last five years has not been completely accurate nor carefully evaluated. Although this is probably inevitable in day-to-day reporting, we do have enough good records to document important trends. The statistical report for 1976-77 follows. It is as accurate as possible after careful study of the reports submitted by the seven quarterly meetings and the Missionary Society to the INELA. Estimates, where necessary, are conservative. There could be as many as 200 more persons enrolled on church lists.

Just two comments on the comparative statistics: From 1961-72 to 1976-77 the INELA grew about 16 percent per year, or 108 percent for the five-year period. La Paz, Peninsula, Yungas, and probably Caranavi grew slowly, and in some cases not at all during this period. Cordillera, which lacks only one year of statistics during these five years, shows consistent growth. The years from 1975-76 and 1976-77, or this last year, show an increase in growth in nearly every quarterly meeting district. Overall the INELA grew at least 20 percent and perhaps as much as 25 percent. Again, most outstanding was the Cordillera district, whose growth accelerated to at least 30 percent and accounts for nearly half (46%) of the total INELA.

■ 34. The Yearly Meeting treasurer's report was presented by the treasurer, Beatrice Goldsmith. Appreciation for Beatrice's work was expressed.

The report was approved and appears in the Appendix.

■ 35. The Evangelical Friends Alliance work was presented by Norval Hadley. A General Conference of EFA is planned for July 12-16, 1978, in Denver, Colorado.

The New Proposed Evangelical Friends Mission plan was presented as follows:

Members of the EFA Coordinating Council meeting in Oklahoma City January 1977 could not escape the strong conviction that God is still

leading evangelical Friends to some kind of united missions thrust. While Northwest Yearly Meeting in 1976 did not approve the missions umbrella proposal then presented, they did take minuted action to keep studying the matter. With that in mind it was introduced again at Oklahoma City, and in discussion it was observed: (1) The EFA missions project in Mexico City is growing, and the need for competent administration is increasing. (2) We still sense the need for a coordination of mission policies across yearly meeting lines. (3) There were several reports of conversations with evangelical Friends outside the EFA who are still watching to see if EFA will put together a combined missions program that might serve as an outlet for their missionary interests. (4) There was still a sense that much could be gained by better coordination of deputation and candidating across yearly meeting lines. (5) As mission programs grow and as circumstances surrounding missionary endeavor become increasingly complex, there was a sense of the need for more professional counsel for existing programs. (6) There was still a sense that we might be able to do more to help fulfill the great commission—open new mission fields, enter open doors—if we did it cooperatively. (7) Finally there was expressed a strong desire that the missionary world of our individual yearly meeting constituencies might be broader than just one or two countries.

With these things in mind the Coordinating Council and the Missions Commission discussed various ideas. At one point we conceded before the Lord that all our ideas and plans had fallen into the ground and died and that if there was to be a united missions thrust God would have to resurrect the seed in His own form. In the last meeting, though the missions thrust was not on the agenda, it was reintroduced from the floor and a suggestion was made by Gerald Teague that, with some modification, was approved enthusiastically and is now being passed on to the yearly meetings for their consideration. Quoting from the minutes, the proposal is as follows:

#### EFA AFFILIATION

a. "We agreed that whatever form the new Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM) takes, it should maintain its ties with the EFA." The Missions Commission will continue to be the agency for giving direction to cooperative missionary work of participating yearly meetings.

#### PERSONNEL

b. "The previously appointed Search Committee (Russell Myers, Everett Cattell, John Robinson, and the chairman of the Missions Commission) was instructed to find suitable personnel to staff the EFM and asked to contact first Robert Hess and Reta Stuart. If possible, they should report to the yearly meetings before the summer sessions." There was feeling that administrative direction for the EFM should be given by persons released to give themselves full time to the task. Dr. Robert Hess, head of the Department of Religion and Philosophy, Malone College, Canton, Ohio, former missionary and president of Eastern Region's Board of Missions, was recommended for this position. Reta Stuart, veteran missionary to Burundi, Africa, with Kansas Yearly Meeting and a specialist in journalism and writing, was suggested as office secretary. She could also handle other administrative responsibilities. Both Robert and Reta have agreed to accept these staff positions beginning January 1, 1978, if this plan is approved by the yearly meetings.



## BUDGET

c. "Of the \$40,000 budget proposed by the Missions Commission, the yearly meetings should be prepared to pay their proportionate share of \$30,000 for the first year of operation." (Eastern Region's share is 34%, Northwest 30%, Kansas 30%, and Rocky Mountain 6%.) The additional \$10,000 is to be raised by the activities of the EFM office. The total budget will establish the office, care for administrative salaries, travel, housing, office expense, and pay for some meetings with mission boards and the Missions Commission. Since the staff will not begin till January 1, the budget for the year ending June 30, 1978, will be just half of the above amounts.

## REPRESENTATION ON GOVERNING BODY

d. "Representation on the Missions Commission shall be as stated in the EFA Constitution. Churches or yearly meetings outside the EFA who wish to participate in the EFM may be represented on the Missions Commission after the pattern of Iowa Yearly Meeting, or join the EFA."

## FLEXIBILITY OF YEARLY MEETING RELATIONSHIPS

e. "Yearly meetings may, upon approval of the yearly meeting and the Missions Commission, request the help of the EFM staff for consultation or administration as the said yearly meeting deems advisable. The purpose of this mission thrust is to coordinate our efforts to find the most effective means of mission outreach." In other words, each yearly meeting may use the EFM office to whatever extent they choose, from just as a professional missions consultant to complete administration of their mission program. As proposed last year, we would all share equally in the salaries, but if one yearly meeting chose to have the EFM office administer its work, it would probably assume the full load of the expenses of that administration, except for salaries. There is no longer any written or unwritten goal that all the mission works among evangelical Friends be put under the administration of one office.

## FLEXIBILITY IN FUND RAISING

f. "Budget for the EFM shall be supported by yearly meetings who assume a fair share and by other appropriate means, such as mailings to a constituency, deputation offerings, etc. The yearly meetings and local churches, if they wish, may make their mailing lists available to the EFM in order to assist in the raising of the additional \$10,000" (and whatever additional sums may be needed beyond yearly meeting giving in subsequent years).

Participants in the EFA Coordinating Council meeting felt so keenly the blessing and leading of the Lord and unity of minds regarding the above proposal that the meeting ended with the singing of the Doxology. Now it is for the yearly meetings to decide if they believe this is God's plan for our united Evangelical Friends Mission thrust.

Following is additional information on the EFA missions thrust resulting from the meeting of the Missions Commission in Wichita, Kansas, June 24-29:

If we approve the proposal, Robert Hess would begin serving as executive director part time (\$300 a month) January 1, 1978, through June 30, 1978, and begin full time July 1, 1978, though he would still teach some classes winter terms 1978 and 1979. Reta Stuart would begin

full time as secretary January 1, 1978, at \$600 a month. Both of these would be for three-year terms.

Therefore the budget for Northwest Yearly Meeting for the 1977-78 year would be cut in half to \$4,500. Yearly Meeting mission boards not otherwise affiliated with EFA wishing to cooperate with the Evangelical Foreign Missions will have one to two members as consultants on the Missions Commission without "voting" privileges.

Action concerning the new proposal was postponed until a later business session to give time for discussion and prayer.

(See minute 62.)

■ 36. The World Relief Commission report was given by Fred Gregory. The two purposes of this organization are to bring relief in disaster areas through an evangelical organization and to aid economically and socially the developing countries of the world as a Christian witness. One dollar per year per member is the participating goal.

Approved.

■ 37. The meeting adjourned with prayer.

## Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

■ 38. Gerald Lemmons, assistant clerk, opened the meeting with prayer.

■ 39. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 40. The Representatives recommended the following *Discipline* changes:

On page 32, under 7, REPRESENTATION IN THE YEARLY MEETING SESSIONS. in the first sentence after the words, "major fraction thereof," insert: as of the previous Yearly Meeting statistical report.

On page 58, under 1. COMPOSITION AND MEETINGS (middle of the paragraph) following the sentence, "Vacancies are filled from the lists of alternates," insert the following sentence: No change shall be made in the delegation thereafter except as authorized by the Yearly Meeting.

This is a first reading.

Approved.

■ 41. The Discipline Revision Committee presented recommendations from the Spiritual Life Board that the names of two of its departments (pages 45 and 46 of the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline*) be changed as follows:

Department of pastoral, evangelistic, and extension work—to department of evangelism.

Department of ministerial training and recording—to department of ministry.

The committee approved these changes and recommended their adoption.

This is a first reading.

Approved.

■ 42. The Women's Missionary Union report under the leadership of Mildred Brown, president, was given. Financial support of one missionary family and the Post Falls work, a medical aid fund for Bolivia and Peru,



a book-reading program, and "Quaker Waggin's" publication were some of the projects reported by this group.  
Approved.

■ 43. Reminding us that early Friends called the Memorial Service the "Service of Thanksgiving," the Memorial Committee presented the names of 55 Friends who are now with the Lord in heaven. Memorials were read for Gertrude Jones, and three ministers, Edward F. Harmon, Charlotte L. Macy, and Zenas E. Perisho. Philip Morrill sang, "I Shall See Him Face to Face." Many expressed deep thankfulness for the way these lives have brought blessing and inspiration. Roy Clark closed in prayer. (The names of the deceased appear in the Appendix.)

■ 44. Loren Mills presented the Quaker Benevolent Society's plan for providing helpful financial assistance at times of bereavement. The plan is open to new members.

■ 45. Donald Moore, pastor of Cherry Grove Friends, announced the church's new building program. Bonds are being issued to finance this project.

■ 46. Donald Lamm, pastor of Eugene Friends, closed the session in prayer.

### Friday, 9:15 a.m.

■ 47. Laurence Wright, pastor of Woodland Friends, led in prayer.

■ 48. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 49. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that paragraph c. Additional Members, page 44 of the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline*, be amended to read:

c. Additional Members and Consultants.

1'. Additional Members. Each board is authorized, at its own discretion, to add other Friends to its membership. Such persons should have a broad, general interest in the total program of the board. They have the full rights of the appointed members, to enter into discussions and to participate in the decisions of the board.

2'. Consultants. Each board may also, when deemed expedient, secure qualified persons to serve as informants or consultants, either on a continuing or an *ad hoc* basis. Such persons should have expertise in some phase of the board's procedures or responsibilities, able to inform or to give expert advice. They may recommend action, but do not participate in reaching decisions.

In both cases such appointments are reported to the Executive Council or its administrative committee for approval.

This is a first reading.

Approved.

■ 50. The Department of Social Concerns, a department of the Outreach Board, presented its work. Bruce Longstroth, chairman, expressed that the two focal points of this department are to channel funds to social concern programs and provide service to the local church in this area. His concern is that Northwest Yearly Meeting recognize that social concern is a vital ministry—a vital element of the great commission that our Lord gave us.

Nick Block told about the work of the Friends Committee on National Legislation with legislative policy-making bodies.

Charles Beals emphasized from the floor that pastors and missionaries and spouses who have served in our Yearly Meeting and are lacking in funds may receive assistance at Friendsview Manor through the Charitable Assistance Fund.

The department's report was approved.

■ 51. The Stewardship Board report was given. Kara Cole, president, stated that the churches gave more in support of the Yearly Meeting this year than ever before. However, there are still many new programs to launch as well as continuing the old.

Donald Edmundson spoke of his work visiting churches as financial secretary.

Maurice Chandler emphasized that the Great Commission Budget was a guideline enabling the accomplishment of God's work.

Philip Morrill spoke on behalf of the Department of Fine Arts that curtailment of budget means curtailment of areas of service.

■ 56. A returning minute to the Bolivian Friends Yearly Meeting for Francisco Tintaya and Enrique Tito was read expressing our deep appreciation for their attendance in our meetings.

■ 57. A traveling minute was read for Bennie and Winifred Puckett, who will be working under Morrison Academy in Taiwan.

Approved.

■ 58. The State of the Church reports from each area were read. A summary follows:

Many of the meetings reported a spirit of optimism, spiritual advance, and unity although some indicated a lack of commitment on the part of some individuals.

The character of the pastoral ministry has been scripturally and doctrinally sound, with some expressing a warm and healthy relationship between the pastors and the Spiritual Life Committee.

Areas of concern include church growth and the development of a stronger family life ministry.

The presence of the Holy Spirit has been felt, with members of the churches exercising the spiritual gifts in ministering to each other.

## EDUCATION BOARD

■ 59. The Education Board president, William Hopper, introduced the work of the board, which includes interest in church schools, involvement in the local public schools, and providing material in areas of Friends distinctives.

A unique puppet show by Richard Edmundson promoted the Aldersgate Curriculum and a display board for "Know Your Friends" materials.

A slide presentation of Greenleaf Friends Academy showed many activities of the school. The written report given by Kendall Smitherman, principal, follows:

Greenleaf Friends Academy began its 69th year with registration on August 26, 1976.

This 69th year saw Greenleaf Friends Academy as a school including grades one through twelve. Over 200 students were housed in the high school building as the new elementary building was being completed. It was a real thrill for both faculty and students when the building was completed and ready for occupancy in December.

For high school students the traditional "First Week" at Quaker Hill began the academic year. Pastor Harold Antrim keynoted the spiritual emphasis program. Theme for the week centered around Colossians 1:18, "... that in all things he might have the preeminence."

Due to the success and positive response of the annual GFA Christmas Dinner, we scheduled a Christmas Dinner in Portland, Oregon, in December. The story of Friends Academy, its growth, goals, and ambitions, was shared with our Oregon friends. Several faculty members and a student ensemble, Koinonia, shared in the banquet and program held at Reedwood Friends Church.

Highlights of the year were the successes of both the high school boys' and girls' basketball teams. Both teams were runners up in their respective district tournaments with the boys winning a berth in the state tournament, where they finished fourth.

The annual benefit auction was the biggest ever with gross receipts in excess of \$12,000—a commendable effort on the part of the committee and the hundreds of participants.

After consideration and prayer, a concern generating from the student council resulted in a special spring spiritual emphasis week with Paul "Tex" Yearout. During the week many students took the opportunity to make new commitments and new steps in their spiritual life. Mr. Yearout's messages and availability for individual counseling provided a week of real growth.

It is truly exciting to see the "long arm" of Christian education as it continues to grow and influence the lives of those families who choose to take advantage of it.

Realizing the vast responsibility and opportunity afforded us at Greenleaf Friends Academy, we continue to evaluate and upgrade the total program. A new requirement has been added to the curriculum for seniors. This course will involve one semester each of "Marriage and Family" and "Consumer Economics." The course, taught under the home economics department, is designed to provide a Christian perspective and responsibility to each area.

The art department has been expanded, and a faculty member with tremendous expertise, background, and experience has been added to further develop this area.

Out of a growing concern for a strengthened home economics program, an anonymous donor has provided a large portion of the funds needed to provide a new home ec classroom. This unit is a specially designed home that is prebuilt and placed on the campus providing a home-like setting for the home economics classes. We are anticipating completion by September 1. Course offerings in this department have also been expanded to provide a stronger program for our students.

In further concern that Greenleaf Friends Academy be a ministry to the total family, our preschool opened in April providing year-round day care with a Christian emphasis. Each day also includes instruction and learning activities.

The 1976-77 school year was a growing year and one in which the Lord richly blessed the academy's ministry. We are grateful to present this positive growth report and anticipate our 70th year, which we see as a time of additional expansion of the ministry of Christian education.

Please lift up Greenleaf Friends Academy prayerfully. Pray that young lives will continue to be influenced for the strongest Christian character.

After a period of open discussion when questions were answered and opinions shared, the following recommendation from the Representatives was read:



The Representatives having discussed, reviewed, and prayed about the "New Proposal on Evangelical Friends Missions" wish to go on record favoring the adoption of this proposal.

The proposal was approved. Friends joined in singing the Doxology. (See minute 35.)

- 63. The meeting was adjourned to meet at the Saturday business session.

- 64. The morning business session opened with prayer by Ron Woodward, pastor of Newberg Friends.

- 66. Under the leadership of William Rourke, president, the Friends Action Board presented a series of slides reviewing the Friends of the past who have aided suffering humanity and showing opportunities FAB has found today. The board plans to show these slides in churches of the Yearly Meeting.

Ralph Beebe spoke of the need to help in the work of the National Black Evangelical Association. The Friends Action Board pays one half of Aaron Hamlin's salary as executive director of the NBEA.

Steve and Diane Eichenberger feel called to work in the print shop of Voice of Calvary, Jackson, Mississippi, a ministry to blacks, led by John Perkins, a minister of the NBEA and author of *Let Justice Roll Down*. Approved.

- 67. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

- 68. The business session opened with prayer by Paul Goins, pastor of Greenleaf Friends.

- 70. The George Fox College written report, presented in the Friday evening service, was approved as follows:

A growing student body, strong academics, new buildings, fiscal management—these are all strong indications of success in the life of a college. But at George Fox it's even more. These all witness to God's faithfulness. They give evidence of His blessing. Therefore, we rejoice with you in what God has done for George Fox College over this last year. Surely He has been honoring the prayer and vision of all those involved with the college. As a community of scholars, workers, and supporters of George Fox we are called to accomplish a God-ordained mission. The following is a look back into that mission this past year as a witness to God's leadership and faithfulness to us:

#### **ACADEMIC**

Enrollment at George Fox College continued to set a pace for Oregon. Fall term opened with a record enrollment of 630 to start the school's 86th year. The increase was 13 percent, a rate that was maintained each following term. The enrollment increase has been 30 percent in two years and 44 percent in the last four. Nearly half of all students were new to the campus, as 300 new students enrolled. Standards have not been lowered to increase the student body. In fact, just the opposite has happened. Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores have climbed from

461 to 482 for incoming students, and the mathematics skill test measured 465, compared to the national average of 460. The Western states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and California contribute almost 92 percent of all students enrolled, but 20 states are represented on campus along with four nations. The college continues to have more Friends (Quaker) students than at any other U.S. college. Thirty-four percent are Friends students, but again, 39 other denominations are represented on campus.

The academic year opened with a miniterm "Futuristics," featuring a spacecraft developer, physical researcher, sociologist, college president, minister, and futurist. A maximum 180 students participated in the week-long program along with nearly two dozen professors and administrators. The formal opening of the year was the traditional convocation with Willamette University President Robert Lisensky, a former Methodist minister, delivering the address.

Faculty members started their year with a conference highlighted by the leadership of Arthur Holmes, author of *The Idea of a Christian College*.

During the year the college began an outreach to older adults in nearby counties under a federally funded program. Aimed at senior citizen involvement in higher education, the program encouraged older people to consider college through a series of seminars and the provision for help in improving reading skills. A significant increase in older persons attending classes was noted.

Another significant project started in the year was an experiential educational program begun with a three-year \$125,000 grant from the Kellogg Foundation. It will allow up to 45 students a year to participate with business and industry in the Portland-Newberg area, giving students opportunity to apply their education to career options in their majors. Up to five faculty members each summer also will enter nonacademic work fields related to their teaching. Goal of the program is to relate the liberal arts education directly to career preparation with on-the-job experience.

Several significant conferences and meetings were hosted by the college during the year. Quaker Heritage Week for three days in February brought Friends church leaders to campus for discussion. Featured were Keith Sarver, general superintendent of California Yearly Meeting; Everett Cattell, former Malone College president and a missionary to India, and our own Arthur O. Roberts, professor of religion and philosophy.

"Ministering to Youth," a two-day conference, brought youth ministers and workers from Oregon, Washington, California, and Idaho to the campus. They were guided in the sessions by Warren Benson of Dallas Theological Seminary. Sponsoring the program were the GFC Christian Ministries Department and the Admission Office. A "Women's Emphasis" for two days in April featured six women who discussed their professions with the participants.

George Fox has joined the Evangelical Teacher Training Association and now will offer ETТА diplomas, along with standard degrees, for Christian Education majors. The certificate indicates proficiency in Bible and Christian education and an ability to teach church lay leadership. Ten diplomas were awarded in graduation ceremonies. The college's in-service mathematics course program for teachers continued to expand with a 39 percent increase in registrants for the independent study courses. Students from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Alaska, and British Columbia are participating. And for the fourth year the college has participated, together with some of the nation's leading evangelical Christian colleges, in



the national Christian College Consortium with the emphasis on the integration of faith and learning and upon cooperative endeavors.

Students continue to be taught by committed, competent, and caring faculty members. Faculty members and administrators were involved in a wide variety of academic activities during the year, ranging from presiding over professional associations to the publication of significant material in their fields.

The academic year closed at the end of May with the graduation of 104 seniors in ceremonies featuring W. Stanley Mooneyham, president of World Vision International, who challenged the graduates about "Living in a High Risk World." Dr. Robert Bletscher, pastor of Lents Evangelical Church in Portland, brought the baccalaureate address.

## STUDENT LIFE

It would be nearly impossible to describe all the activities of students outside the classroom. Involvement ranges from spiritual victories to athletic victories. And in between are music, drama, conferences, and projects to help others.

The year opened with Spiritual Emphasis Week in early October with Kent Hughes, pastor of the Brea-Olinda Friends Church in Southern California, as the week's speaker. Missions Awareness Week in the winter term allowed students to participate with 10 missionary representatives and their displays of worldwide efforts. Theme for the week was "Your Future—His Plan," with Arthur Beals, executive director of World Concern Ministries and vice-president of King's Garden, Inc., Seattle, as guest speaker for this 11th annual event. In the spring term, Jay Kesler, national president of Youth For Christ, was speaker for the annual Deeper Life Conference with thought-provoking messages both at morning chapel and at evening services. As a result of the missions week conference six students this summer are literally around the world in missions work, sponsored by the \$2,000 raised by fellow students in faith-promise pledges. Seven other students this summer are participating with the Continental Singers in locations throughout the United States, Europe, and Central America.

Students' concern for their fellowman was openly displayed many times during the year. Students sponsored a Christmas party for area mentally retarded youth, volunteered to teach Sunday school classes, helped with tutoring, and on an organized basis through their student government gave away to specific needs more than \$4,700, representing a tithe of their total student government budget.

Musically, and in drama, students were active both on and off campus. The 52-piece concert band toured for 10 days on the West Coast, and the 54-member choir toured in Washington. Both participated in music festivals, including a choir festival sponsored by the college. Music and drama productions included *Requiem* by the Christmas oratorio choir, *Spoon River Anthology*, *Play of Daniel*, *Godspell*, *Story Theater*, *The Glass Menagerie*, and *Show Boat*.

Interest groups also gained prominence. The campus radio station, owned and operated by the students and featuring a contemporary Christian format, was expanded and moved to new headquarters in Brougner Hall. A couples organization was founded for married students, a Spanish Club was organized, and the GFC Film Society brought quality films to campus for the college community.

Athletically, the Bruins again gained prominence with the men's basketball team producing its winningest season ever with 20 wins and

participating in the NAIA District 2 playoffs with a game in Hawaii. Track men finished second in the district, and three men went to the NAIA national championships. Both the women's hockey and softball teams produced winning seasons, and in track one participant was sent to the AIAW nationals.

## DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE

Perhaps nowhere else does God's working show more visibly than in the new facilities on campus. He has provided—in miraculous ways—funding for four new buildings under construction during the year and to be opened for the first time this fall. The new \$2.2 million, 40,000-square-foot Coleman Wheeler physical education and sports complex is being used for the first time this summer as a center for church group conferences. The new \$850,000 Herbert C. Hoover Academic Building with 20,000 square feet is completed and offices occupied for the first time in June, and a new \$1.2 million, 31,000-square-foot, two-building residence hall complex for 120 more students opens this fall, with construction still in process.

But even more is underway. Renovation has started on the old Hester Gym, and it is to be recycled into the new Milo C. Ross Fine Arts Center with construction anticipated to begin this fall. And even another residence hall is needed for the fall of 1978, with planning in progress. What were only dreams—with God's direction—a year ago today are reality, and we are trusting Him to help us continue to put foundations under them. During the fiscal year the college again, for the sixth consecutive year, has operated soundly in the black. Assets of the college climbed by more than \$2 million to nearly the \$13.5 million level, with a fund balance of nearly \$10 million.

Gifts and financial support from a variety of sources continues to be the strength of the college financially. The support of alumni, churches, friends, and individuals not only is necessary on a monetary basis, but is a moral support and an indication to others of the overall and wide strength of the George Fox College constituency.

George Fox College continues to take its purposes and plans directly to the people with a series of dinners throughout the West. More than 3,500 persons attended dinners in Portland, Boise, Seattle, Newberg, Los Angeles, Eugene, Coos Bay, and Medford. The 10th anniversary of the first dinner was celebrated in March at the annual Southern California Dinner held at the Disneyland Hotel.

The development department in January expanded its services to the George Fox constituency with the addition of an Oregon representative to help in estate planning, deferred giving, annuities, and trusts.

## PERSONAL

The past year, my 10th at the college, has been an extremely busy one. In addition to college responsibilities I served my first year as chairman of the board of the National Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges. This has given George Fox much visibility across the nation. I also serve as a member of the executive boards of the Christian College Consortium, the Christian College Coalition, and a member of the American Council on Education. Throughout the year Becky and I had a special concern to visit as many churches as possible, and we did that, ministering throughout the West. In April we visited missions work in Mexico and Costa Rica and ministered at the inter-mission retreat in Guatemala.



## SUMMARY

This report, of course, is not a complete summary of all that has transpired in the life of the college during a year. However, I hope the highlights will serve to give you a sense of excitement that is George Fox College as we are honored by God as we carry out His will.

I believe that George Fox College is on the cutting edge of higher education. Our singular commitment to Christian higher education is narrow, but this is not a naive parochialism about what constitutes true education. It simply indicates a commitment to the fact that all truth is God's truth and that Jesus Christ is the only valid starting point for all complete knowledge. Knowing Him and making Him known—that is the ultimate mission of George Fox College. God has abundantly blessed George Fox College during this past year. But past blessing will not suffice for the future. Only as we prayerfully and carefully seek God's will and are obedient to His leading as an institution, can we be assured of His blessing in the days ahead. And the future will demand resources in greater measure than we have ever received or thought of, or even prayed for! But, if our purpose and mission are intact, God will honor our labors together. May we count on your prayer and financial support toward this goal of honoring Him?

"And a concern which we pray you will share with us, our concern for the 'New Call to Peacemaking.'"

In the Kansas Yearly Meeting epistle we read: "Fifteen were present for recording this year, four of them are of Latin extraction, serving in Mexico."

Indiana Yearly Meeting wrote: "In explanation of Quaker precepts a year's study of 'A New Call to Peacemaking' is planned."

Western Yearly Meeting wrote: "Western Yearly Meeting has designated two representatives who will work in the development of a program of peacemaking."

From The Netherlands Yearly Meeting epistle we learn that their theme was "Make Me an Instrument of Peace."

Central America Meeting wrote: "We thank you for your greetings and expressions of love, especially relating to the sufferings of our people due to the earthquakes. In all of Guatemala, some 38,000 died, 80,000 were physically injured, and 250,000 houses were destroyed. Among Friends, only four persons died, 14 churches were completely destroyed, 15 others seriously damaged. We wish to express the deep gratitude that we feel to our sister yearly meetings of the world for their timely aid."

"But if on one hand the earthquakes cost lives and property, on the other hand they have brought about the salvation of many souls and great spiritual blessings, for many have accepted the Savior, and as a consequence there are new congregations and large active churches. We rejoice to hear the testimonies of the new believers, spiritual fruits of the earthquakes, giving thanks to the Lord for the earthquakes which brought them to Christ as their personal Savior."

Approved.



■ 108. The Epistle Committee submitted the following epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings as follows:

Greetings in Jesus' Name!

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends convened in its eighty-fifth annual session July 27, 1977, at 9:15 a.m. on the George Fox College campus, Newberg, Oregon.

The opening minute was read: "As we accept the challenge of this year's theme, 'Friend—Go Up Higher,' let us acknowledge God's loving presence in each of our sessions, trusting in His promise, 'I will instruct thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with mine eye.'"

The audience then joined in singing two great hymns of the church:

The church's one foundation Is Jesus Christ her Lord;  
She is His new creation, By water and the Word;  
From heaven He came and sought her, To be His holy bride;  
With His own blood He bought her, And for her life He died.

Amazing love! How can it be That Thou my God shouldst die for me?

Dr. Norval Hadley, our general superintendent, opened his keynote message with these words: "I want to talk about something as old as the church, and yet very new and refreshing. I want to talk about revival." The message was so pertinent to the needs of the church and of all of us as individuals that the Epistle Committee wishes to share it with you. (Enclosed in pamphlet form.)

Two highlights of our 1977 Yearly Meeting sessions will have an abiding, vital influence. Dr. Robert Hess, from Malone College, Canton, Ohio, spoke vibrantly each morning and evening. He appealed to both intellect and spirit for thorough Christian living. Two church leaders, Francisco Tintaya and Enrique Tito, from the Bolivian Friends Church, their own mission field, spoke several times through interpreters; they warmed our hearts with their humility, sincerity, and evident spiritual vision.

This past year in the life of the church there have been grave problems and great struggles, but there have been also tremendous spiritual blessings and victories. There has been a growing concern to spread the Gospel by modern means. We have been able to discern a sense of compassion for those who have prison records, problems with drugs, and so many whose homes are experiencing serious tensions. There is a marked increase in ministries to the elderly, and to those who live alone, regardless of age. Especially in the city-situated meetings we observe the presence and membership of people of differing nationalities and cultures. If we have been negligent in adapting our methods for a more adequate communication of the Gospel, it may be in our failing to utilize to any great degree the TV, the radio, and other current media.

Our many dedicated young people are a constant inspiration and encouragement to us. In the course of the year many fine area camps for different ages have been held, with record attendances and high interest. Little Friends had an enthusiastic gathering at Camp Tilikum. We would express our gratitude for God's presence over all.

George Fox College has had the highest enrollment since its beginning. The beautiful new gymnasium complex, the Wheeler Sports Center, has just been completed. It provided a lovely auditorium setting for our Yearly Meeting sessions. A second new structure, the Herbert Hoover Academic Building, has been completed and is now in service. A new student housing unit is nearing completion. To God be the glory!

The Women's Missionary Union is an active and productive arm of the Yearly Meeting, contributing to both home and foreign missions. More than 450 women attended the annual banquet, and a foreign mission need was met with a \$1,400 offering. Their offerings for the year amounted to more than \$20,000. One renewed phenomenon is the calling of women Friends to the public ministry. We welcome the exercising of their gifts.

Our hearts have been touched with the need of the hungry in many areas of the world. Through World Relief Commission and the Evangelical Friends Alliance more than \$7,000 has been given to relieve the suffering. How we wish it were more!

Let us grasp the daily opportunities to tell to heavy hearts of the redeeming love of Christ.

Approved with permission to make corrections and additions.

■ 109. The Epistle Committee recommended that a copy of the keynote message, "In Quest of Renewal," be enclosed with the epistle sent to the various yearly meetings.

Approved.

■ 110. The recommendation by Jack L. Willcuts that epistles from other yearly meetings be accessible for people to read during Yearly Meeting was approved.

■ 111. A communication from the Spiritual Life Board was read as follows:

The right of Lowell Kester to retain his standing as a recorded minister having been called into question, the Spiritual Life Board has investigated the matter. After laboring with Lowell in love and prayer according to the requirements of the *Constitution and Discipline*, page 65, Section A, it is our discernment that he has lost his usefulness in his station and no longer represents Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends in his ministry. Since he is unwilling to surrender his credentials voluntarily, we recommend that his present Certificate of Recording be allowed to expire on December 31, 1977, and that his name not be included in the list of recorded ministers.

Approved.

■ 112. The Representatives recommended the following Discipline change:

On page 73, paragraph 2, b., delete the following sentence: "Representatives: Close of one Yearly Meeting annual session to close of the next."

Approved. This is a first reading.

■ 113. The clerk read a poem from a copy of Rosalie Regen's book, *Forever in Joy*, which she presented to the Yearly Meeting.

■ 114. The Department of Peace Testimony of the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church recommended that the Yearly Meeting and its members support the World Peace Tax Fund Act, cosponsored in the United States Senate by Senator Mark Hatfield (R-Ore.). The act is a necessary extension of the First Amendment for freedom of religion to those conscientiously opposed to war. As followers of the Gospel of Peace of the Lord Jesus Christ, we are concerned over inordinate military expenditures. We urgently need this act as a way for Christians to witness to the government of its obligation for moral stewardship.



The World Peace Tax Fund Act would allow citizens to designate that the portion of their federal taxes now going to the military be used for nonmilitary purposes.

The Department of Peace Testimony also recommended that the Yearly Meeting and its members support the establishment of a United States peace academy. A bill establishing a commission to study this proposal has passed the U.S. Senate and is now in the House International Relations Committee. The bill would establish a peace academy with status similar to that of the U.S. military academies.

Approved with the instruction that the clerks send a copy of this to the United States Representatives and Senators from Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

■ 115. The Statistical Report was approved to appear in the Appendix.

■ 116. The Department of Evangelism recommended the following persons to the Friends Church Extension Foundation for three years: Oscar N. Brown, Gordon Crisman.

Approved.

■ 117. The Executive Council recommended that Northwest Yearly Meeting become a member of the Friends World Committee for Consultation without budgetary consideration this year.

After considerable discussion and prayer, the meeting approved delaying a decision for one year in order to give time for more discussion and consideration at the local church level.

■ 118. The Executive Council recommended the date for Yearly Meeting sessions be set for two years to help in planning calendars; the following dates were recommended: July 31-August 6, 1978; July 30-August 5, 1979.

It was decided to meet July 24-30, 1978, and ask the Executive Council to give further study to the 1979 dates.

■ 119. Norval Hadley expressed his joy for the spirit of unity during the Yearly Meeting sessions this year and suggested a time of quietness, having completed our agenda, to allow God to speak to us about further items that might be on His agenda. A brief quiet time followed.

■ 120. Appreciation was expressed for the work of the Yearly Meeting clerks, the caretakers, George Fox College's excellent accommodations, the SAGA Food Service, Gordon Martin with the sound equipment, Judy Moore and her team for platform decorations, and the youth and children's activities leaders.

■ 121. Appreciation was expressed for Frank and Genevieve Cole's ministry at the Wichita Conference of Friends in the Americas as resident staff for arrangements for a five-month period. The following people also attended this conference: David Anderson; Jeanne Baird; Ralph Beebe; Robert and Beatrice Benham; John Braun; Everett and Alda Clarkson; Kara Cole; Ludlow and Ruth Corbin; Thea Bales Cowley; Donald Edmundson; Robert, Maurine, Cindy, Sharon, David, and Dwight Gilmore; Norval Hadley; Portia and Sharon Jones; Roscoe Knight; David Le Shana; Howard, Margie, and Nathan Macy; Earl Perisho; Arthur Roberts; Milo and Alice Ross; Rosalie Sigler; John Sorensen; Agnes Tish.

■ 122. Praising God for His evident blessing upon us in these sessions, Northwest Yearly Meeting adjourned to meet July 24-30, 1978, in Newberg, Oregon.
