MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1978

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its eighty-sixth session July 26, 1978, at 9:15 a.m. on the George Fox College campus, Newberg, Oregon.

Rejoicing in the experience of Christ's presence, we expectantly pray for His promised wisdom and guidance in these sessions as we strive for an affirmative answer to this year's theme, "Will Friends Make a Difference?"

Richard Beebe, clerk, expressed appreciation to the George Fox College personnel for the privilege of having the Yearly Meeting sessions on the campus and urged us to be good stewards of the facilities.

Richard Cadd led the congregation in singing "Revive Us Again."

■ 2. Communications and greetings were read from the following:

■ 3. A letter of introduction was read for T. Vail Palmer, Jr., minister and editor of *Quaker Religious Thought*, visiting from the Arch Street Monthly Meeting of Friends of Philadelphia. He was welcomed to our meeting and brought words of greeting.

■ 4. Greetings from Friends Bible College, Haviland, Kansas, were brought by Dale Field.

■ 5. Herbert M. Hadley, executive secretary of Friends World Committee for Consultation, Section of the Americas, and his wife, Ruthanna, were introduced and welcomed. He also brought written greetings from North Pacific Yearly Meeting, which were read.

■ 6. Robert Scattergood, principal of Olney Friends Boarding School, Barnesville, Ohio, was introduced and brought greetings.

■ 9. Expressing his appreciation for the love and support of the Yearly Meeting during his seven years of service and feeling it God's will that he accept only one more year as Yearly Meeting superintendent, Norval Hadley gave the following keynote message:

KEYNOTE MESSAGE

David McKenna, president of Seattle Pacific University, told a story at the Portland Seminar for the Oregon State Association of Evangelicals that moved me deeply. It disturbed me. He told of the meeting of the Congress on Laity where a number of people from the media were present. They were talking about the evangelical awakening. James Reston, the *New York Times* columnist, said, "I am a humanist. But I recognize there is an evangelical awakening taking place in the United States. I also recognize that we live in a moral pigsty. My question is 'Will the evangelicals make a difference?'"

That question, which is probably being asked in many circles in many different ways, has inspired the theme for these sessions and for Northwest Yearly Meeting through the year 1978-79, "Will Friends Make a Difference?"

Time and *Newsweek* magazines wrote about the year of the evangelicals. Some of us wondered if we will be able to stand the publicity and prosperity. Almost too soon *Saturday Review* began to write about the backlash, and lump typed evangelicals as bigots infected by Jesus mania. Then commentators, savoring the delicious "I told you so," began to write about Billy Graham's multimillion-dollar secret fund and Oral Roberts's city of faith, Robert Schuller's stone-proof crystal cathedral, the theological debate on inerrancy of Scripture, and Larry Flint's "porn-again" experience. David McKenna, writing about this in the spring issue of *United Evangelical Action* magazine, suggests that the next script for "Laugh-in" might read "Knock, knock. Who's there? Born-again. Born-again who? See? Forgotten already." He suggests if *Time* magazine and *60-Minutes* stay true to form, one of them will do the investigative reporting on the subject "Whatever happened to the evangelical movement?" My guess is the answer will be "Not much, unless we can make a difference."

April 10 of this year the *Indianapolis News* published an article saying that social scientists, including James Davidson, are doing an increasing amount of research on religion, and some have been finding out things the churches don't want to hear. Davidson says researchers used to look at things like church attendance in order to measure how religious people were. Catholics then were the most religious, Protestants in the middle, and Jews least religious. Then they began to find that people who were religious in one dimension were not necessarily religious in other things. For instance, those who believed in the divinity of Christ, life after death, the existence of a personal God, did not necessarily believe it was necessary to love one's neighbor or to do good to others. One bombshell was the finding that people who placed much emphasis on spiritual salvation and their personal relationship to a supernatural God were least sympathetic to any kind of social change related to improving the status of the poor or liberating blacks from racism. They concluded "that there was a relationship between being more involved in personal piety and also being more prejudiced or more intolerant of efforts to create a better world for other people—a very selfish kind of faith." They're right; that is not the kind of thing the church likes to hear. To present the other side *Moody Monthly* published a column on "Who's Doing Social Work and Why?" It admits there is an element of truth in the charge that evangelicals have tended to neglect social responsibilities, but goes on to point out that by far "the greater part of works of compassion in this country and abroad is being carried on by representatives of the very segments of the church accused of neglecting the social work."

"Who is it that runs rescue missions with their free meals, beds, and fresh supply of clean clothing, if not the Christians whose primary concern is with the souls of the people they help? And who builds hospitals in primitive countries, operates clinics, leprosaria, and orphanages if not the same Christians? A poor man may be vermin-ridden and exasperating; a sick man may be smelly and even nauseating. The sentimental concern for mankind expressed by starry-eyed professors and their youthful charges seldom endures, it quickly evaporates in the mephitic atmosphere of a cancer ward full of living people."

I present these contrasting views to show that those who say evangelicals are doing some good are right, but those who say we aren't doing enough are also right. So in an effort to address ourselves to the need for faith that expresses itself in action the Lausanne Covenant, clause IV, reads "We affirm that God is both creator and judge of all men. We therefore should share His concern for justice and reconciliation through human society and for the liberation of men from every kind of oppression." The National Association of Evangelicals in its 1978 convention took its theme from Micah 6:8 "What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?"

Timothy Smith wrote also in the spring edition of the *United Evangelical Action*, "Virtue and piety, holiness and grace, never stand separately from each other. The Gospel is the power of God to set things right."

"A dawning awareness of the overwhelming dominance of this theme in Scripture made social reformers of 19th century evangelicals . . . prompted Lyman Beecher to support the cause of temperance, compelled Charles Finney and Theodore Dwight Weld to train young revival preachers that abolitionism must be their avocation, and impelled Methodists and Moravians to plead the cause of the Indians against white men in government who cheated and exploited them."

If I could pick anyone from history to address us today on this subject I think I would call on James. He, among all New Testament writers, seems to say most convincingly, "Yes, Bible-believing Christians *must* make a dif-

ference." First he sets a backdrop, and then he tells us at least five ways we can make a difference.

In James 1:2 he writes about their lives being full of difficulties and temptations and tells them to be happy when the way is rough. This qualifies him to address us today, for I've talked with many of you in the church this past year whose lives have been full of difficulties and temptations.

Then he tells us in verse 5 that if anyone lacks wisdom (to know what God wants us to do), let him ask of God and it will be given. Friends have always believed in the power of God to guide us to do what He wants now in life-changing, society-changing ways. Lewis Benson, noted authority on George Fox, says the basic difference between George Fox and the Protestants of his time was Fox's concept that Christ is alive *now* and He lives in us *now*, and He's able to show us *now* what He wants done. In verses 9 to 11 James leads us to realize that earthly riches are of minor importance and calls us to stewardship. Surely this will be essential if Friends are to make a difference. Every good and perfect gift comes from God and we are stewards of those gifts.

In verse 19 he seems to be telling us that if we are to exercise our influence to try to change society we must not do it with anger. We can be dissatisfied but not angry. In James 3:1 we are urged not to be too eager to tell others their faults. We're to be patient like God's prophets of old, he says in James 5:10 and 11.

In the first chapter, verses 12 to 15 and 21, and in 4:8, he tells us that our concern and our efforts to make a difference must proceed from a holy life. And he completes the backdrop by showing in verses 21 to 24 in the first chapter that our efforts must be Bible-based. We are to use the Bible as a mirror. We are to look into it daily to see whether the way we live and work and speak is an accurate reflection of the way the Bible says we are to live and work and speak.

Then James says this is what we must do if we are to make a difference:

A. We are to control our tongues, or that is, we are to allow the Holy Spirit to control our tongues, for James 3:8 says no man can tame the tongue.

When I first heard of James Reston's question, "Will evangelicals make a difference?" I had just come from several assignments in too many of our churches where I had been trying to help resolve church conflicts. My first reaction to Reston's question was "No, not in this church, or that church, or that church." Because in those churches Friends seemed to be so consumed in fussing with each other that they were making no difference in the communities to which they were called to be salt and light. That's a horrible thing to have to say. James tells us that kind of strife and envy and jealousy comes from the wisdom of this world. It's characterized in the last part of the third chapter as being unspiritual (animal), devilish, or demonic, and it produces envy, jealousy, contention, rivalry, selfishness, confusion, unrest, disharmony, rebellion, and all sorts of evil practices. On the other hand, the wisdom from above is pure and peaceable, gentle, courteous, willing to yield to reason, full of compassion and good fruits, wholehearted, straightforward, impartial, without hypocrisy, unwavering, and sincere. I wish, Friends, when we speak in the church and outside the church we would look into this mirror and see if what we say conforms to the heavenly list or the earthly one.

B. James goes on to say that if we are to make a difference we must *help the needy, the widow, the orphan*. We are to love and help our neighbors as we care for ourselves (vv. 1:27 and 2:8). He says in chapter two, "Dear brothers, what's the use of saying that you have faith and are Christians if you aren't proving it by helping others? Will that kind of faith save anyone? If you have a friend who is in need of food and clothing, and you say to him, 'Well, good-bye and God bless you; stay warm and eat hearty,' and then don't give him clothes

or food, what good does that do? So you see, it isn't enough just to have faith. You must also do good to prove that you have it. Faith that doesn't show itself by good works is no faith at all—it is dead and useless." (*The Living Bible*)

Ralph Beebe wrote in the *Evangelical Friend* that the average American uses seven times his share of the world's resources. Some of us are wrestling with what that should say to us about our life-style as Christians and as Friends. Can we really say that we are denying ourselves and sharing our prosperity enough to make a difference? Bill Rourke urged us to miss one meal a week in order to give more to relief agencies; but so few of us did it. Perhaps we need more of the attitude expressed in James 5:1-6 that our riches if used selfishly only get us in trouble. Like Abraham who offered Isaac, we are to trust God so much that we will do what He asks us to do regardless of the cost (James 2:21-22).

C. Again James says if we will make a difference we *must not show favoritism*. We must not be respectors of persons. Especially we are not to honor the rich and despise the poor. And I'm sure he would say to Northwest Yearly Meeting in 1978 that we are not to favor the white over the black. John Perkins, who is our speaker this week, was beaten almost to death without cause by white policemen, and his brother was killed by a white sheriff. We have invited him here because we strongly want to be a part of his effort to make that kind of contemptible injustice completely unacceptable in our society. Most of us didn't even know these kinds of things were happening and we excuse our seeming lack of concern because of our ignorance. I trust that after this week we can no longer be so excused.

D. James says again that if we are to make a difference we must be *peacemakers*, "Those who are peacemakers will plant seeds of peace and reap a harvest of goodness." (James 3:18 LB) In the first part of chapter four he says to pray, not to fight. This is one of the clearest statements I've found in all the biblical study surrounding the New Call to Peacemaking in which we are given a scriptural alternative to war. That alternative is to *pray*. I'd like to suggest that the verses that follow in chapter four are a commentary on peacemaking. James says friendship with the world, like that of an unfaithful wife—illicit love of the world—is enmity against God (4:4). Perhaps without meaning to do so, Christendom by and large has identified with the world in its philosophy regarding militarism. Mark Hatfield says it has become idolatry. We have taken what belongs to God (trust in Him for protection) and committed it to militarism to such an unreasonable degree that Mennonite Dalton Franz figured that the average Mennonite is giving to all the programs of the church only two thirds as much money as he gives the government to buy the capacity to kill. Worldwide we are spending a billion dollars a day on military buildup, 20 times more than the industrialized nations spend to help all poor countries. There are 35 to 40 nations that could have their own nuclear arsenal in 10 years and 100 by the end of the century, including rebels and political gangs. When the nuclear weapon was developed Einstein said, "Now everything is changed except the way man thinks." How can nuclear weaponry make us feel secure as long as man's thoughts are full of greed and murder? Christians must exercise influence to help our society find a better way of resolving conflict. We must make a difference in 1978!

I believe it is also in this connection that James tells us to resist the devil and draw nigh to God. Our efforts towards peacemaking must be with clean hands and a pure heart. We are not to be double-minded, claiming to love our enemies while at the same time participating in preparations to destroy them (4:8). James says in 4:10 we are to humble ourselves; we're not to be proud. We need to be delivered from the king-on-the-hill complex. Christians must

demonstrate to the world that it is better to give than to receive—it is better to help the needy than to spend billions of dollars protecting what we own so they can't get at it.

Then also in this connection, I believe, James tells us in 4:12 and 5:9 to leave judgment to God. He will punish and avenge.

E. Finally, if we are to make a difference, James says we *must pray and praise* (5:13-17, 18). We are to pray for those who suffer. We are to pray for the sick, making confessions. And the prayer of faith shall save the sick. This was how Jesus made a difference when He walked this earth. And He said, "Greater works than these shall ye do." We are to pray for what we want instead of fighting for it. This is how prayer can be an effective agent of peacemaking (James 4:1-3). In fact, all that we do in an effort to have Christian influence must be bathed in prayer. We are to pray when in trouble, and when happy sing songs of praise. I'm so thankful for the presence of Armin Gesswein in our Yearly Meeting who is here to give us in-depth training in the power of corporate praying. Armin has been largely used in this kind of ministry in recent years. I appreciated what he wrote in a recent article, that the local congregation is the basic unit for all the manifold action of the Holy Spirit. Therefore it is to be the local congregation that prays together and generates the power for our witness in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the world. He cites an illustration of a congregation that decided to get involved in their "Jerusalem" in Hollywood. Prayer was the first step. Some members began to concentrate prayer on certain buildings, such as a store, supermarket, medical center, drug area, or a massage parlor. After some months crime dropped 6 percent, massage parlors dropped from 67 to 22. Street prostitution began to be reduced markedly. He writes: "Christians went to work on challenges from a kneeling position, and saw changes." I'd like to see Friends make a difference in TV programming by prayer-backed united effort.

Will Friends make a difference? If out of holy lives in obedience to the writings of James we can learn to control our tongues, to help the needy, not to show favoritism, to be peacemakers, and then if we back our entire effort with effectual fervent prayer, the answer will be "yes." Do you think Elijah made a difference? He prayed and it didn't rain for a space of three years and six months. Then he prayed again and the heavens gave rain and the earth brought forth her fruit. That's really making a difference! May God grant that Friends of Northwest Yearly Meeting, by mixing a combination of doing and praying, will indeed make a difference!

Richard Beebe expressed deep appreciation for our superintendent's message and asked the meeting to stand in prayer for God's direction and blessing on Norval and Mary Hadley. John Retherford led in prayer.

After Richard Cadd beautifully sang, "Jesus Is the Sweetest Name I Know," Armin Gesswein, founder and head of Revival Prayer Fellowship, led us in response to the keynote message by involving everyone in small groups for meaningful consideration and prayer.

- 10. The meeting adjourned to reconvene at 2:15 p.m.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

- 16. The report of the Department of Social Concerns was presented by Bruce Longstroth, chairman. The goal of the department is to provide balance to evangelism and social concerns by stressing that God's concern is for the total person, reconciling man to God and man to man. Social reform and welfare are aspects of spreading the Gospel. The department has channeled funds to the Friendsview Manor Charitable Assistance Fund, the national Black Evangelical Association, and the Piedmont Friends for Kids. Services to the local meetings have been provided by a special slide series depicting Friends' commitment to social concerns, and by making special speakers available.

The report was approved.

- 17. The Discipline Revision Committee requested permission to make minor changes of wording in amendments proposed and approved as first reading last year. This is to promote uniformity of style throughout the *Constitution and Discipline*.

Approved.

- 18. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final approval these changes wherever these titles appear: from Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Extension Work to Department of Evangelism; from Department of Ministerial Training and Recording to Department of Ministry.

Approved.

- 19. The chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee called attention to an apparent discrepancy between two statements in the *Constitution and Discipline* and suggested that it be remedied without being considered an amendment. On page 33, paragraph 3, only active members are qualified to hold offices or be committee chairmen. On page 61 it is stated that affiliate members may hold certain offices. The statement on page 33 should be reworded to conform by including affiliate members.

Approved.

- 20. At the request of Norval Hadley, general superintendent, the Discipline Revision Committee recommended that on page 58 the title, H—THE YEARLY MEETING UNIFIED BUDGET, be changed to H—THE GREAT COMMISSION BUDGET, and that similar changes be made in the text of paragraphs 1, 5, and 6, and also in lines 5 and 6 on page 55.

Approved.

- 21. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that on page 46, second line down, the phrase, Department of Peace, be changed to Department of Peace Testimony.

Approved.

- 22. In order to promote consistency in the *Constitution and Discipline* the Discipline Revision Committee recommended that on page 61 under D—AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIP the fourth sentence be changed to read: They may hold offices in the church, except those of minister, elder, presiding clerk, and trustee.

Action was deferred on this to a later business session for clarification.

■ 23. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that on page 56 of the *Constitution and Discipline*, first paragraph, the phrases relative to a Department of Service and a Department of Public Morals be deleted and in their place the following be inserted: Department of Social Concerns, whose special emphases are to channel funds to social concern programs and to provide service in this realm to local churches.

Approved.

■ 24. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final approval the additional sentence as indicated in Minute 105, 1977: Its officers and board members are active members of the Friends Church (Northwest Yearly Meeting), unless exceptions are approved by the Yearly Meeting or its Executive Council.

Approved.

■ 25. In response to the instruction of the Yearly Meeting as recorded in Minute 102, 1977, the Discipline Revision Committee submitted the following: These secretaries are chosen on the basis of a vital and knowledgeable interest in the realm of the board's responsibilities and of their willingness and ability to attend faithfully its announced meetings.

Approved.

■ 26. The following Friends Fund report was given by Walter Wilhite, executive director:

The Friends Fund is an incorporated, tax-exempt agency of the Yearly Meeting administered by a board of directors appointed by the Executive Council of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Its purpose is to promote and operate the planned giving program of Friends by becoming a receiving agency for deferred gifts and then to channel these gifts advantageously and according to the wishes of the donors in the total work of the Yearly Meeting through its various organizations.

A second perspective that informs our concern is the conviction that the field of estate planning offers unique opportunities for the exercise of Christian stewardship. The Scriptures are replete with proclamations concerning our possessions and their responsible use. Sin often expresses itself as the distortion of the values and uses of wealth; discipleship as well is evidenced by our attitude toward, and use of, all that God has given us.

I believe that Stewardship Development ministry is something that God has prepared for the kingdom for such a time as this. So many people have expressed their desire to be able to place their possessions, or at least a percentage of them, into a position with their church and the many ministries of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church to produce continual income for long after they are gone. Every person has a built-in need to give, and we are putting people in the place of blessing and a sense of satisfaction when we can help them to arrive at a decision about their estates, remembering the Lord's work.

My report this year will not follow the pattern of reporting used in the last two years' reports.

The following are amounts designated to Friends Fund or for other agencies in wills, revocable trusts and notes, naming Friends Fund or other Yearly Meeting agencies as beneficiaries. (These amounts are not guaranteed, as the designated beneficiaries may be changed at any time prior to the death of the individuals):

■ 27. The following communication from the Spiritual Life Board was read:

This minute comes as a matter of information from the business session of the Spiritual Life Board held July 1977 and through an oversight was not reported at last Yearly Meeting, namely,

"The person of Freeman Conant is no longer recognized as a recorded minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church according to the provisions in the *Constitution and Discipline* of the Yearly Meeting."

■ 28. A traveling minute for William G. Kelley, Talent Monthly Meeting, was endorsed.

■ 29. The meeting closed with prayer by Walter Lee.

■ 30. David Anderson, missionary to Mexico with Evangelical Friends Alliance, led in prayer.

■ 31. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 32. The action of the Discipline Revision Committee (see minute 22) was approved after discussion and clarification.

PUBLICATION BOARD

■ 33. The Publication Board report was given by Harlow Ankeny, manager of Barclay Press, who highlighted the year's work mentioning particularly the technological transition to its new photocomposition system installed in January, 1978; and publication of Arthur Roberts's book, *Tomorrow Is Growing Old*, a history of the Friends mission work in Alaska.

Calling this the "Year of the Writer," Harlow recognized and voiced appreciation for more than 30 Friends writers who have contributed in books, periodicals, Sunday school literature, and many other Christian publications.

The report was approved with special applause for Harlow Ankeny's work.

Approval was given to have the Barclay Press financial report included in the Minutes.

■ 34. The Friends Action Board report was given under the direction of William Rourke, president. A slide presentation, an index for resource organizations, and a bulletin insert telling of the Minority Scholarship Fund have been provided by the board for the local churches.

Aaron Hamlin, National Black Evangelical Association field director, was introduced and welcomed to the Yearly Meeting. He mentioned that the association now has six new chapters throughout the country dealing with specific area concerns. He asked for prayer as the national headquarters are moved to Atlanta, Georgia.

Ralph Beebe, board member, presented John Perkins, with the Voice of Calvary ministries. The need for black trained, skilled leadership in the community was stressed.

Steve and Diane Eichenberger spoke of their ministry with the Voice of Calvary, which is being supported by gifts through the Friends Action Board.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

■ 35. The Department of Missions report was presented by Gerald Dillon, chairman, as follows:

The Apostle Paul, at the end of his first missionary journey (Acts 14:27) "reported all that God had done through them." In the same spirit it is a joy to report to Northwest Yearly Meeting of 1978 what God has done through the efforts of our missionaries. We unite with you in giving both thanks and praise to His name.

Paul encountered the opposition of the enemy who has also been busy in various ways opposing the Word of God and the work of the Gospel. Nevertheless, victories have been won and the work has grown and progressed. This has been accomplished by our missionaries, the national workers, and 57 congregations of the Northwest working together. Our work has been specifically directed to three geographical areas: Bolivia, Peru, and Mexico City. In all areas the work is growing and prospering.

PERSONNEL

Our missionary family included the following: In Bolivia—Ron and Carolyn Stansell, Harold and Nancy Thomas, Gil and Louise George; Roscoe and Tina Knight since January; Jim and Gail Roberts for the last two months of the church year after finishing language school in San Jose, Costa Rica; and Mark and Wilma Roberts home on furlough. In Peru—Ed and Marie Cammack, Randy and Mary Morse, and Duane and Sherrill Comfort on furlough. Dave and Kathy Anderson have labored in Mexico City in cooperation with the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

These missionaries have each given a ministry honored by the Lord and highly productive on the field. The staff has worked hard with an increasingly demanding work load and the need for additional help. The Peruvian field has been especially understaffed with only two families caring for the full load. Undoubtedly this has been a factor in some of the problems we have faced this year. The department solicits your prayers that this may be resolved. Our goal has been set for a minimum of four families per field for Bolivia and Peru.

Among the Koreans of Portland, Gue Wan Jin and Pastor Emeritus Kwan Kyu Kim have provided leadership.

CHURCH GROWTH

In Bolivia the church continues to grow. In Peru there has been some loss in both number of churches and members. The growth in Bolivia has been in building 15 new church buildings and the consequent growth normally associated with forward moves. Seven new congregations were planted in 1977. Peru, due to a serious leadership problem in the Mesa Directiva and an over-worked missionary staff, has experienced a serious spiritual problem and a loss of some congregations. We have a church of nearly 40 congregations and local meetings, the strongest being in the Tacna area. Our goal as a department is for spiritual revival of these congregations and renewal of some that are no longer meeting. Please pray with us for a moving of God's Spirit among the Aymaras in Peru.

The Korean Church of Portland purchased and moved into the old First Evangelical Church, located at S.W. 10th and Clay in downtown Portland. This move gives them much more room and better facilities for their growing congregation.

EDUCATION

The education work of our mission in South America is organized on three levels. First, the work of the national church in regular day schools with approximately 15 schools and 550 students. The mission gives only counsel and encouragement since this work is entirely indigenous. However, the significance of this ministry is worth noting with praise.

Second, the Bible Training schools, consisting of Patmos Bible Institute with about 25 students located in La Paz, and the Theological Education by Extension both in Bolivia and in Peru with more than 150 students enrolled. The TEE schools care for the educational needs of leaders in the church who currently are pastoring the churches. This work, since it includes traveling to centers in outlying districts, calls for a considerable outlay of time, energy, and money by the missionaries. It is a very rewarding phase of the work and is producing high quality leaders for the church of today and tomorrow.

Third, and a significant level, is the work of the San Pablo Theological Seminary, an interdenominational school in La Paz in which Friends have taken a leading role. Forty-five students were enrolled this past year, 26 from our Friends churches. This school experiences a constantly growing enrollment, curriculum, and constituency. At the present time four denominations cooperate in the school, and for the first time it is planned to use two national teachers.

These three levels are functioning in Bolivia.

In Peru there is a TEE program in which church people of all ages participate. This program has promoted much spiritual growth among the believers. However, there has been felt an acute need to establish an advanced training program with the purpose of preparing more pastors that are firmly based in Christ's teachings. The proposal is to have several two- to three-week short-term resident courses for lay leaders and pastors. These would be taught primarily by Bolivian teachers and seminary graduates. Much study needs to be done on the curriculum and the mechanics of implementation.

We thank the Lord for the educational ministry of the mission/church. However, increasing concern is expressed for the growing number of Aymara youth who attend the university. Here they meet philosophical issues that often confuse and sometimes destroy their Christian faith. We pray that these young people with alert minds may be guided by the mission/church in such a way that they may be preserved for the work of the Lord. This must be another level of our educational concern and work. Please join in prayer for this ministry.

SPIRITUAL MINISTRIES

While the mission itself does not pursue a major social program, we are nevertheless involved. Medical assistance to the pastors of Bolivia and believers of Peru; special classes for the Aymara women of both countries aimed to aid them in assuming new and significant roles in the social structure; and numerous other helps are a few of the areas of special concern and attention. The missionaries would like to do more and pray for wisdom about how they can be the greatest help to the people in their social relationships and responsibilities.

Medical assistance amounted to major help in a number of cases where believers have required medication and/or hospitalization, but were financially unable to secure it. In Bolivia, 46 different persons have received help with \$1,750 of aid given. In addition, World Vision, working in close cooperation with both the mission and the church, is funding the establishment of a small clinic on the grounds of the Max Paredes property. They are also assisting in a "feasibility study" of other possible programs among Aymaras. Mission personnel serve in an advisory capacity only in these projects. Although medical assistance for pastors and workers in Peru has been on a more limited scale than in Bolivia, some help has been provided. Out of this has come one case of the Lord's miraculous healing of a seriously ill TB patient.

Of special significance is the increasing maturity of the Bolivian Friends Yearly Meeting. This is evidenced in their aid to the Peruvian Friends Church and their increasing stability in administrative, educational, and evangelistic work at home. We anticipate a renewal of church growth and spiritual vitality in Peru under the leadership of Mark and Wilma Roberts, located in Juli, and Gil and Louise George, living in Puno.

The Department of Missions has cared for its work by meeting on three different occasions during the year: (1) Yearly Meeting time, (2) the Fall Retreat, and (3) Midyear sessions. The Administrative Committee of the department has met 10 different times this year. The work of Ralph Chapman, our business manager, Gladys Cook, secretary, and numerous others who have given literally hours of work is deeply appreciated.

We give thanks to God for the privilege of serving Him and you as His Church. Let us covenant together to join in continued prayer and concern that the coming years may show even greater advance in this work through foreign missions.

Jack Willcuts led in a prayer of thankfulness for Gerald Dillon, asking God to strengthen him for his many responsibilities.

The board report was approved.

- 36. The session was dismissed in prayer by Richard Beebe, clerk, to meet at 2:15 p.m.

- 40. The Representatives nominated the following to the Education Board for three-year terms: Kenneth VandenHoek, Lois Tish, Harry Selby.

- 41. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended for second reading and final action the recommendations from the Representatives as recorded in Minute 40, 1977 (page 32 in the *Discipline*):

The church appoints annually one for each fifty resident active members or major fraction thereof as of the previous Yearly Meeting statistical report to serve on the Representative body of the Yearly Meeting.

On page 58, under i. COMPOSITION AND MEETINGS, following the sentence, "Vacancies are filled from the lists of alternates" insert this sentence: No changes are made in the delegations thereafter except as authorized by the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

- 42. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the amendment proposed by the Representatives and recorded in Minute 103, 1977, that an additional subparagraph be added to paragraph i. Vacancies, page 45, as follows:

If a board member fails to attend board sessions at Yearly Meeting time, at midyear, and at any other scheduled time for a period of one year, and also has failed to express either verbally or in writing a continuing interest in the work of the board by communicating with the board president, that member is contacted by the board through its president or his/her representative. If at the next scheduled board meeting this member fails to attend or to make contact, the board declares a vacancy and appoints a new member or has one appointed according to the procedure outlined above.

Approved.

- 43. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that the second paragraph under b. The Area Secretary, page 52, be revised to read as follows:

As area superintendent he is also to receive from the local and extension churches through their spiritual life committee chairmen their annual reports on the state of the church, to summarize each of them, and from these summaries to compile and forward to the Yearly Meeting the annual area report.

Approved. This is a first reading.

- 44. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that paragraph 2. b., page 73, be changed to read as follows: Representatives: Opening of one Yearly Meeting session to opening of the next.

Approved. This is a first reading.

- 45. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that on page 58 of the *Constitution and Discipline* the sixth sentence under G 1 be deleted and the following substituted in its place: Those thus approved are seated as the official Representative body, to serve in that capacity until the next Yearly Meeting sessions.

Approved. This is a first reading.

- 46. The Women's Missionary Union report was given by Mildred Brown, president, with a group of members who told of furnishing missionaries with sheets, bedspreads, quilts, literature, clothing, and funds for salaries.

Lela Morrill, the new president for the coming year, was introduced.

- 47. The Evangelical Friends Alliance report was given by Norval Hadley and commission members. Norval stated that the main thrust of the association at this time was the Evangelical Friends Mission program with two full-time people: Dr. Robert Hess, executive director, and Reta Stuart, administrative secretary.

Gerald Dillon, Mission Commission member, spoke of enlargement possibilities for missionary work. Dorothy Barratt spoke of the Christian Education Commission's main work in Sunday school curriculum and leadership training. Jack Willcuts reported that the *Evangelical Friend* has the largest circulation of any Friends magazine in the world at the present time. Donald Lamm spoke representing the Evangelism and Church Extension Commission.

■ 48. The Memorial Committee conducted a time of remembrance and thanksgiving for the lives of 4 ministers and 41 other members who passed away during the year. Memorials were read for Albert J. Leech and Dora Ogle. After Philip Morrill sang "Welcome Home, Christian," Roy Dunagan shared from the Scriptures concerning the hope of resurrection in Christ.

Many expressed gratitude for the contribution these lives have made for the Lord.

■ 49. The Quaker Benevolent Society report was given by Loren Mills. He mentioned that growth has been good in the society resulting in the largest membership in 30 years.

■ 50. Howard E. Harmon, pastor at Clackamas Park, led in prayer. The meeting was dismissed to meet Friday at 9:15 a.m.

■ 51. Fred Gregory, member of the pastoral team at Reedwood Friends, led in prayer.

■ 52. The minutes were read and approved.

SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

■ 53. Clare Willcuts, president, gave the Spiritual Life Board's report as follows:

The duties of the Spiritual Life Board as set forth in the *Constitution and Discipline* have been carefully discharged through the departments of Evangelism, Ministry, Fine Arts, and Peace. The Department of Evangelism has been busy planting new churches and giving encouragement and counsel to many of the older and established meetings.

The Department of Ministry has given careful and conscientious attention to those with spiritual gifts and calls for special ministries. Because of the faithfulness of the members of this department the Yearly Meeting is assured of a continued and strong evangelical ministry.

The Department of Fine Arts has given major attention this year to developing a procedure of Certification of Music Ministers. Another major work of this department has been the compilation of musicians, artists, and dramatists for a Yearly Meeting directory of our people involved in these areas. Two choir festivals were held this year. In March Medford, Klamath Falls, Talent, and Sprague River participated in a choir festival organized by Clark Smith. The Medford church was the host and Dennis Hagen served as guest conductor. In May Clackamas Park hosted a choir festival for the Portland Area. Participating with them were choirs from Vancouver, Reedwood, Sherwood, Tigard, and Newberg. Arlene Zeller was the coordinator and Ted Nichols, professor of church music at Western Baptist Seminary, was the guest conductor.

The Department of Peace has been unusually active this year with the New Call to Peacemaking project.

The reports from the local churches indicate that the preaching and pastoral leadership has, for the most part, been highly satisfactory; a good spirit

of unity prevails in the meetings in general. In the few instances where divisions and difficulties have appeared the Lord has manifested His presence and power toward remarkable victories.

Charlotte Macy, in her report for this board two years ago, spoke with optimism of the growth and potential in the Yearly Meeting churches, stressing the need for sound biblical doctrine. Today we endorse this concern so well expressed by her. The Spiritual Life Board is still concerned that all our churches hold fast to the doctrinal positions as clearly set forth in the *Constitution and Discipline*.

Thanks is expressed to Norval Hadley and Quentin Nordyke for their outstanding leadership through counseling and seminars and workshops. They have done much to equip and motivate the pastors and members for solid church growth; several meetings made favorable reference to this in their reports.

Department of Evangelism—The work of your Department of Evangelism has progressed from idea to plan over the past year. Twenty of our churches were planning to be involved in the "Focus" program which was designed to train the cooperating congregations in identifying the work of the church in carrying out the Great Commission.

The Department felt it was necessary to spend \$5,771.37 in promotion and financial support of this training. The concern has been within the department that as a Yearly Meeting we are not yet rising to the challenge of Willcuts and Goldsmith in the book, *Friends in the Soaring 70's: A Church Growth Era*. They stated in their introduction:

As we approach the decade of the 1970s, the sociological and economic indicators continue to point toward booming growth. Forecasters are anticipating an era that they call, "The Soaring '70s." What will happen to the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting during this expansive decade? Will we continue a pattern of only a few churches growing, while our other congregations level off and decline, often in spite of beautiful new church buildings set amidst burgeoning population centers?

Eight years into the decade, the statistics indicate that the trend of a few growing churches is still the pattern. Your department encourages those churches involved in the "Focus" training to continue planning and teaching with vision and persistence.

Reports show a total net gain in membership of 173 (4 churches not reporting).

MISSION POINTS

Federal Way: This new work has progressed through the past year from conception to birth. Gene McDonald has called in hundreds of homes and has gathered a nucleus for a new work. It is slow, arduous work to plant a crop of corn, but it is a more complex task to plant a church. The goal of your department in Federal Way is to plant in order to harvest according to Matthew 13:1-23.

Hilltop: This new work is situated in the heart of a rapidly expanding community. Friends have an opportunity to build a lasting monument to Christ through the gathering of new believers. There is a change of pastoral care for the next year. Harley Adams will provide pulpit leadership, and the local body is rallying to more personal involvement.

Post Falls: This work, now three years old, is bursting with promise. Under the leadership of Charles Bloodgood the church has progressed through the stages of a spinoff storefront meeting, now in a funeral chapel, and they are presently planning their first building. Their application for funds is in the hands of the Friends Church Extension Foundation, and the department is endorsing its plans. Pray for them in this important time.

CONCERNS

1. The lack of growing churches in Northwest Yearly Meeting.
2. The number of places in which we could begin new works but are limited by these factors:
 - A. Lack of leadership.
 - B. Lack of support from present churches to plan for spinoff churches.
 - C. Lack of commitment by local churches across the Yearly Meeting to pray, plan, and prepare for growth.
 - D. These then translate into lack of necessary funds to carry out the ministry we believe God is wishing us to achieve.

The department is challenged by the opportunity to strengthen the local church. We are excited by the potential that we have to move in God's timing to capture the present for God's future. We believe that the expansion of the local church must be accelerated to match both the population growth and the spiritual need of our world. Our department solicits your prayer, emotional and financial support on a level yet unrealized. —Donald D. Lamm

Fred Gregory and Ralph Beebe reported about the activities of the New Call to Peacemaking. A commissioning service was held for the seven who will be attending the National Call to Peacemaking Conference in Green Lake, Wisconsin, October 5-8, 1978. Delegates are Ralph Beebe, Fred Gregory, Elenita Bales, Paul Mills, and Mickie Jarvill. Jack Willcuts will serve on the Findings Committee, and Norval Hadley serves on the Central Planning Committee. The following written report was submitted:

Department of Peace—The 1977-78 church year has seen greater activity by the Department of Peace and the Yearly Meeting than in recent years. We, along with the Mennonite and Brethren churches, have been cooperating in the New Call to Peacemaking initiated by our superintendent, Norval Hadley.

Ralph Beebe and Fred Gregory have served as Northwest Yearly Meeting's representatives to the Northwest Region Steering Committee of the NCP. We have helped plan and implement three major events related to NCP in the Northwest.

We have had two NCP conferences during the year. They were both held at Camp Collins near Portland. The fall conference specifically concentrated on the biblical basis of peacemaking. Our Yearly Meeting had 17 delegates in attendance. There was a total of 75 people in attendance. The spring conference concentrated on the issues of building institutions of peace. Jim Wallis, of the Sojourners Community, was the primary resource person during this weekend where attention was given to specific ideas and programs for promoting peace.

In April a public peace rally was held at George Fox College at the urging of many people who felt that there needed to be some public NCP activity. Howard Macy gave the primary address on the "Biblical Basis of Peacemaking." There was a variety of workshops, and the day ended with a drama production written and directed by Lauren Friesen, a Seattle Mennonite.

The national NCP conference in Green Lake, Wisconsin, will help focus attention on peacemaking nationally. The conference will be held October 5-8,

and Northwest Yearly Meeting will have five delegates plus two resource people attending.

For the coming year we hope to concentrate on peace education in the local church. One specific program will be in encouraging as many people in our churches as possible to prayerfully and carefully submit statements as to their belief in Christian peacemaking. Suggestions as to how this can be implemented will be sent to each meeting. For those who are draft age, this process will be very practical, as it seems likely that the draft will again be implemented. It will help us to be continually aware of the roots of our convictions if we can thoughtfully and prayerfully put in writing our convictions.

The board report was approved.

■ 54. The Yearly Meeting treasurer's report was presented by Beatrice Goldsmith, treasurer. Appreciation was expressed for Beatrice's fine work and the good financial year.

The report was approved and appears in the Appendix.

STEWARDSHIP BOARD

■ 55. The Stewardship Board report under the leadership of Kara Cole, president, was given.

Maurice Chandler, Department of Finance chairman, expressed thankfulness for the hearty response to last year's budget. He challenged the Yearly Meeting to exceed the budget this year. Emphasizing that the budget represents programs rather than dollars, a representative of each Yearly Meeting board briefly summarized the ministry of each board.

■ 56. The recommendation of the Executive Council, held over from last year, that Northwest Yearly Meeting become a member of the Friends World Committee for Consultation without budgetary consideration was presented to

the business session. Previous discussion on this recommendation had been heard this year in an open forum Thursday evening.

Dorwin Smith led in a time of prayer for the Lord's guidance, acknowledging our dependence upon the Holy Spirit.

Several friends expressed that they did not feel the Yearly Meeting was ready for this step, as there was not a oneness of mind, but wanted this action to be taken with love, desiring information from and communication with Friends throughout the world. Many spoke of their concern to keep Jesus Christ and His teachings the firm basis for being Friends.

In view of the concerns expressed formally and informally by individuals, some of the churches, the Representatives, and expressions during the business session, the clerk ruled that the Yearly Meeting was not in favor of joining at this time.

The action was approved.

- 57. The clerk closed the meeting with prayer, to meet at 2:15 p.m.

- 58. Gene Mulkey, member of Silverton Friends, opened the session with prayer.

- 59. The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

- 60. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the proposal from the Representatives as recorded in Minute 104, 1977. On page 42, paragraph 8, substitute the following reading:

8. CLERKS OF THE REPRESENTATIVES. The Yearly Meeting appoints annually, on nomination by the Representatives, a clerk to preside over the deliberations of the Representative body and a recording clerk to keep records and to assist the presiding clerk for the following year. They are appointed soon after the opening of the annual sessions, so that if they lack previous experience they may sit in the remaining sessions of the body to observe the procedure and to receive instruction from the clerks then in charge. They may be reappointed on expiration of their terms. The presiding clerk should be a person well-qualified to preside without prejudice or partiality, and to expedite the handling of the business without neglect of proper hearing and deliberation. (Balance of paragraph to remain as is with the following sentence added:) The clerks are not members of the representative body and they have no vote.

Approved.

- 61. The Discipline Revision Committee presented the following recommendation: That d. Other Committees on page 57 be changed to e. Other Committees, and that a new paragraph be inserted above it to read as follows:

d. Discipline Revision Committee. The Yearly Meeting appoints annually, on nomination by the Executive Council, a committee of five to handle all matters pertaining to revision of the *Constitution and Discipline*. One of the five is designated by the Council and appointed by the Yearly Meeting to chair the committee for the ensuing year. The committee itself or any officer or official body of the Yearly Meeting may initiate proposals for amendment. Any proposal originating elsewhere than in the committee is referred to it through its chairman before being presented on the floor of the Yearly Meeting; this is to insure consistency with the *Constitution and Discipline* as a whole and uniformity of style and expression. Proposals given approval as a first reading are referred to the committee for one year, to be submitted for second reading and final action in the subsequent session. (See page 59.)

- 62. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final approval the following amendment: On page 44 change paragraph 2. c. to read as follows:

c. Additional Members and Consultants.

1'. Additional Members. Each board is authorized, at its own discretion, to add other Friends to its membership. Such persons should have a broad, general interest in the total program of the board. They have the full rights of the appointed members, to enter into discussions and to participate in the decisions of the board.

2'. Consultants. Each board may also, when deemed expedient, secure qualified persons to serve as informants or consultants, on either a continuing or an *ad hoc* basis. Such persons should have expertise in some phase of the board's procedures or responsibilities, able to inform or to give expert advice. They may recommend action, but do not participate in reaching decisions.

In both cases such appointments are reported to the Executive Council or its administrative committee for approval.

EDUCATION BOARD

- 67. William Hopper, president of the Education Board, presented the board's activities.

Department of Christian Testimonies Chairman Steve LePell showed a literature display board that churches may purchase. Lois Tish presented resource materials by and about Quakers that were being given to the Western Evangelical Seminary library.

Kendall Smitherman, principal, gave an informative slide presentation and the following Greenleaf Academy report:

Greenleaf Friends Academy completed its 70th year of Christian education with the graduation of 24 seniors on May 28, 1978.

This was a year that introduced GFA as a total school system providing educational service via the early childhood education program, 30 months through 5 years; elementary, kindergarten through sixth grade; and the junior and senior high school, grades 7 through 12.

First Week spiritual emphasis began the year stressing a continuing and maturing relationship with Christ. Harold and Sharon Clark, pastors at Star, Idaho, led the spiritual emphasis portion of the week.

A new concept in stressing Christian character development was implemented this year through the use of a list of biblical character traits—each of which is introduced on a weekly basis with scriptural reference. The individual traits are introduced at all grade levels, K-12.

Every opportunity is taken to further build on these character traits through special writing assignments and various teaching techniques as opportunity lends itself in and out of the classroom.

The spring spiritual emphasis week was a rich time of spiritual renewal and growth as Rev. Rick Russell, a valley pastor, keynoted the messages dealing with self worth and God's plan for us. He and his wife followed up with counseling sessions with a large number of individual students.

The spiritual growth of every student is the primary concern of each faculty member. With the realization that the so-called "new morality" of these times brings new challenges to the Christian education systems of this country, GFA strives to not waver in a national mood of moral laxity.

A continual program of academic evaluation has brought about some curricular changes that will involve a stronger Bible program requiring twice the number of credits as in the past, at the junior and senior high level.

The addition of marriage and family classes, consumer economics, and Christian ethics classes have also been designed to further strengthen the Christian character development of each student.

Professional and spiritual enrichment for faculty members was enhanced by participation in the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools Teachers' Convention held at the Seattle Center last October.

Facility improvements included the new home economics center specially designed to provide a quality teaching station. The lower level will provide additional needed classroom space. The old home economics classroom has been remodeled into the library resource center with the former library also being converted into two much-needed classrooms.

Student enrollment totaled 285, with 15 preschoolers, 90 elementary, and 170 junior and senior high students.

The concert choir and band both earned "one" ratings at the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools' Spring Musicales in Portland. The choir has also produced a record album that will be released in late summer.

The financial base of the Academy made marked growth this year with the receipt of a parcel of real estate valued in excess of \$65,000, a long-range gift of \$50,000, and bequest of \$5,000. Numerous others continue to financially support the Academy through various giving programs.

It is with pleasure that we report the state of Greenleaf Friends Academy as excellent. The Lord has provided a faculty and staff of highest quality and dedication.

Both the elementary and secondary schools are accredited by the Idaho State Department of Education—a position that has not led to compromise but rather a position of educational leadership among the private schools in the state of Idaho.

A record enrollment is anticipated for the 1978-79 school year with projected increases of 25 percent over the 1977-78 levels.

Our parent church, Greenleaf Friends, remains a true, loving parent supporting prayerfully and financially in an educational system that ministers daily to hundreds of young lives. Annual financial support has been increased to \$21,000 for the 1978-79 school year.

I believe Greenleaf Friends Academy has come of age in a time when Christian families are seeking the strength of Christian education for their homes. We ask that you pray daily for this vital ministry that it will not falter, but continue to teach and train the biblical precepts without compromise.

Appreciation was expressed for the Quaker testimony and biblical foundation the Academy upholds.

The board report was approved.

■ 68. John Sills, vice-president and director of development at Western Evangelical Seminary, reported that the seminary had the largest enrollment in its history, including nine Friends students. It is committed to developing pastors who are shepherds and scholarly rather than scholars unrelated to the world. The Yearly Meeting is benefiting in leadership from many graduates and students.

Ronald Stansell, a graduate, expressed appreciation for the contribution of the seminary.

Epistles received during the past year came from 28 yearly meetings in the United States and 12 from foreign countries.

Friends from Norway Yearly Meeting wrote: "We depart from Yearly Meeting feeling a personal obligation to translate into practical action something of the vision that being together has brought us."

Western Yearly Meeting wrote: "Jack Willcuts in his opening address pointed up the refreshing translation of J. B. Phillips: 'Don't let the world around you squeeze you into its own mold.' If we are truly to be transformed, we must reach out into the world. We are heartened by the fact that New Call to Peacemaking has captured the concern and interest of local meetings across the country."

From North Carolina Yearly Meeting we read: "North Carolina Friends seem to be making a real impact on the lives of those persons whom they are reaching with the message of Christ as interpreted and experienced by Friends."

Friends of Indiana Yearly Meeting wrote: "Elton Trueblood told us of Alfred North Whitehead's great concept that we have only two options in life: to advance or to decay; if we are not advancing, we are already decaying."

California Yearly Meeting wrote: "Our message bearer, David LeShana, president of George Fox College, brought powerful and thought-provoking messages concerning the Holy Spirit in the life of Christians today."

From a meeting of conservative Friends near Columbiana, Ohio, we read: "Jesus, there is something wonderful about that name. Today before we go home, let us place our burdens and problems at His feet and leave them there."

From Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region, we read: "A revised section of 'testimonies' was adopted into our *Discipline*. From this section we quote the following statements on some contemporary issues: From Speaking in tongues: 'Speaking in tongues should not be regarded as a necessary sign of the fullness or baptism with the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:8-10).' From Abortion: 'We hold that abortion on demand or for reasons of personal convenience, social adjustment, or economic advantage, is morally wrong.' From Homosexuality: 'Friends are firm in the conviction that the Scriptures make abundantly clear the sinfulness of all homosexual and deviant sexual acts (Romans 1; 1 Corinthians 6). We believe that homosexual tendencies may be overcome by the grace of God. We also believe that forgiveness for deviant acts may be obtained by sincere repentance and faith in Christ.'"

Again from the same source we read: "Dr. Everett L. Cattell in a message, 'Why I Am a Quaker,' reminded us that Quakerism arose as an effort to restore primitive Christianity and that Quakerism in its true ideal has been characterized by the traits of honesty, moderation, simplicity."

Greetings in Jesus' name!

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends convened in its eighty-sixth annual session July 26, 1978, on the George Fox College campus, Newberg, Oregon.

In the opening session our general superintendent, Norval Hadley, implored us to arise to the thrilling challenges of the present day. During this past year there has been an evangelical awakening. The question very soon came through the media, "Will the evangelicals make a difference?"

That question gives rise to this: "Will Friends Make a Difference?" It has become the theme of our 1978 Yearly Meeting. The superintendent declared,

"Bible-believing Christians must make a difference. We must look into the Bible daily to see whether we are giving an accurate reflection of its precepts."

The speaker in our evening meetings this year was John Perkins, who spoke to our hearts of how our theme, "Will Friends Make a Difference?" might be implemented. We must become a prophetic people and remember both our biblical roots and our heritage. Involvement in any social concern must proceed naturally from a living faith. "When we begin to see ourselves as being the replacement of Christ in a physical way in the community, we can make a difference."

Armin Gesswein, who is well-known to Friends for his fine ministry to us, led the prayer group in a study of the book of Acts. His inspirational messages included a description of the Norwegian lay evangelist Hans Nielsen Hauge, who had many similarities to George Fox.

Our missionary work in the countries of Bolivia and Peru is a continuing challenge. Special emphasis is placed on translating Scripture and Christian literature, and on extension Bible training courses. We cooperate with other denominations in a theological training school for pastors. There are approximately 150 churches in Bolivia Yearly Meeting and 50 in Peru under the care of Friends missionaries, the national council, and pastors.

Our fine group of dedicated young people with their capable advisers continue to be a real inspiration to all of us here and to many in the local churches. Well-planned sessions for the various age groups have been well attended.

Youth and adults have gained many vital personal experiences in camping in one of our fine campsites. A highlight of the year was the midwinter conference at lovely Twin Rocks on the Oregon coast.

Greenleaf Friends Academy, a fully accredited school in Greenleaf, Idaho, offers Christian training from kindergarten through high school.

We believe that many of our youth will go forth and have a great part in making contributions that will aid Friends immeasurably to make a difference.

George Fox College is said to be one of the Northwest's fastest growing independent colleges. President LeShana began his annual report, "The 1977-78 academic and fiscal year has been most significant in the history of George Fox College: record enrollments, the addition of four new buildings and the start of a fifth, continual fiscal growth and balanced budgets, outstanding educational and cultural programs, and spiritual advance. All have been exciting parts of an exciting year, one showing the faithfulness of God in the life of a Christian college."

A visitor on campus senses the atmosphere of vitality and change, but change anchored in the Gospel in an effort to meet the challenge of today's education while remaining true to essential commitments of Friends made long ago.

Will Friends make a difference? If out of our holy lives in obedience to biblical principles we can learn to control our tongues, to help the needy, to show no favoritism, to become peacemakers, and then to back our entire effort with effectual, fervent prayer we can expect to make a difference in the lives of many in this needy world.

Let us arise to meet the thrilling challenges of this day.

The 1977-78 academic and fiscal year has been most significant in the history of George Fox College: record enrollments, the addition of four new buildings and the start of construction of a fifth, continuing fiscal growth and balanced budgets, outstanding educational and cultural programs, and significant spiritual advance. All have been part of an exciting year, one showing the faithfulness of God in the life of a Christian college.

For many people the term "Christian college" is indeed strange. And yet, in the last few years, considerable attention is being drawn to the uniqueness of the Christian college and its viability. As chairman of the national Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges for the last two years, and as a participant in the leadership of the Christian College Consortium, I have become deeply convinced of the validity, priority, and the urgency of the mission of the evangelical Christian college such as George Fox.

This is a College with a purpose and a mission. It is one that depicts God's guidance. And it is a College with many successes and innovations—ideas, people and projects about which we think you should know. The following is a brief summary.

ACADEMIC

George Fox College continues to be one of the Northwest's fastest growing colleges. Fall term opened with a record enrollment of 708 to start the school's 87th year. The increase was 12 percent and boosted the College's enrollment over the last three years by 50 percent. The total included 313 men and 395 women.

Coming to the College were students from 20 states and seven foreign countries. Oregonians continue to predominate with 514 registered fall term, up 19 percent over the previous year, and they made up 72 percent of the student body, three-fourths of them coming from the Willamette Valley. More than 93 percent of the students studying at George Fox were from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California. Of the incoming freshman students, two-thirds had high school grades above a 3.00 average and 35 percent were above 3.50.

Although the College was founded and is still governed by the Friends Church (Northwest Yearly Meeting), more than 40 denominations were represented on campus. Quaker students composed 28 percent of the student body with 16 percent Baptist and 10 percent members of the Evangelical Church of North America. Those three denominations account for just over half (52 percent) of all students.

The 1977-78 academic year opened with a miniterm "How Should We Then Live," studying the thoughts of Christian philosopher Francis Schaeffer. Ninety-nine students participated.

The faculty opened its year with a fall conference of lectures, discussions, reports, campus visiting and presentations by administrative leaders. Dr. David McKenna, president of Seattle Pacific University, a member of the national Christian College Consortium along with George Fox, was guest speaker. Faculty members also spent a day visiting classes and sharing with faculty and administration at Willamette University, another private college in the Willamette Valley.

Although classes started October 4, the formal opening came October 17 with the traditional convocation, this year featuring Oregon Senator Mark Hatfield, a member of the George Fox board for 18 years. But the date also had special significance for it marked the official completion of four new buildings that added \$4.4 million in new facilities to the campus: the Coleman H. Wheeler Sports Center, the Herbert Hoover Academic Building, and two residence halls—the Charlotte Macy and Mary Sutton Halls. The day-long "Day of Dedication" program with addresses, workshops, entertainment, seminars and the formal ceremonies marking the occasion, was a significant development in the life of any college.

During the 1977-78 academic year the College continued to expand its outreach to older adults in the community. Geared to senior citizen involvement in higher education, the program encourages older people to consider college and a significant number have responded, some sitting in on classes, others taking them for credit. Twenty-two were enrolled with another 16 persons in Continuing Education classes.

Another significant project during the current year, but begun the year before, is the experiential education program which operates under a three-year \$125,000 grant from the Kellogg Foundation. It allows students to participate with local and Northwest business and industry, giving students opportunity to apply their education to career options in their majors. The goal of the program is to relate liberal arts education directly to career preparation with on-the-job experience. During the year more than 50 students were involved with area business and organizations. As part of the program six faculty members during the summer spent from 5 to 10 weeks in business and industry learning how they operate so they can better relate needs to their students.

Several significant conferences and meetings were hosted by the College during the year: Spiritual Life Week in October featured Lanson Ross, head of a missionary and social support organization in Seattle; Quaker Heritage Week in early January brought together Northwest pastors, teachers and students under the theme "A New Call to Peacemaking"; the 12th annual Missions Conference in mid-January featured Marty Ensign; in April the Rev. Earl Lee, pastor of the Pasadena First Church of the Nazarene and author of *Recycled Living*, was speaker at the annual Deeper Life Conference, as the College's annual Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer for 1978. The largest conference of all—drawing some 300 off-campus guests—was the Christian Education Conference in February featuring author/speaker Ethel Barrett and 30 other speakers. Forty-eight churches in the Northwest sent representatives to campus.

Academically, the College's in-service course program for teachers continued to grow with registrants for the independent study courses from throughout Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Alaska and British Columbia. The college now offers home study for teachers in science and language arts as well as mathematics.

This year marked the 20th anniversary of the start of the College's successful Intensified Studies Program which allows accelerated learning for gifted youth, and 24 were participating in special seminars and in progress with original research and study.

The academic strength of the College was shown in January when George Fox became the first Western college to be admitted to Sigma Zeta, a national science honor society.

For the fifth year the College participated together with some of the nation's leading evangelical Christian colleges in the Christian College Consortium, with the emphasis on the integration of faith and learning and upon

cooperative endeavors. Eleven students participated in an exchange program with other campuses and two students participated in the consortium's Washington, D.C., American Studies Program.

Students continue to be taught by committed, competent and caring faculty members, who are involved in a wide variety of academic activity, ranging from presiding over professional associations to the publication of significant material in their fields. Credit hours taken by students rose 10.4 percent to near the 10,000 total at 9,997. The average class size was 23.4 and the faculty/student ratio was 1 to 16.5 with a goal of 1 to 20. It is important to keep in mind that our primary goal is for a college of quality and significance capable of producing achievers. A faculty-student ratio of 1 to 20 is a secondary goal reflecting stewardship and good management.

The 87th academic year closed May 27 with commencement ceremonies featuring Josh McDowell, author of *Evidence That Demands a Verdict* and *More Than a Carpenter*. Baccalaureate services featured Carl Lundquist, president of Bethel College and Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. McDowell addressed the 93 graduates on the topic "Is It Worth It All?" with "compassion" as the key word. Lundquist spoke on the topic "The Christian Mind," telling graduates to "relate everything in life to Christ."

STUDENT LIFE

Student Life at George Fox College is nearly as broad as life itself. It includes a variety of departments, concerns and activities that involve GFC students outside the classroom. It's career planning, financial aid, living situations, health care, religious life, athletics and the wide range of student activities. The integration of faith and learning *and* living is an essential component to the George Fox College experience.

On the administrative level, the Career Planning and Placement Center has more involved alumni in its services, primarily through the first "System for Identifying Motivated Abilities" workshop on campus for both alumni and current students, with 56 involved. Other seminars included those on graduate school application, job search tips and resume writing.

The financial aid program of the College continues to expand and for the first time aid distributed by the College from all sources topped the \$1 million level, totaling \$1,129,000.

Through the Chaplain's Office 75 students were involved in 10 discipleship groups; 17 Bible study, prayer and sharing groups were organized in the residence halls; and Action teams of five to eight members each participated in 45 services and programs this year in the deputation program. As a result of Missions Week, George Fox students raised some \$1,500 used to send seven students as summer missionaries around the world. The religious life of the campus must never be taken for granted. It is not an additive to the curriculum but must be, and is, thoroughly integrated, providing a perspective and a point of reference to the entire learning and living enterprise.

Students also showed their care and concern for their fellowman in many other ways. They gave 299 pints of blood during the year in three drawings on campus to push their total to 2,063 pints since collections began 10 years ago.

Nearly 50 were involved during the year in volunteering time to help elderly in Newberg care centers, reading to patients, participating in games, and accompanying a senior citizen friend for a walk. Students also volunteered to teach Sunday school classes, helped with tutoring of students in public schools and on an organized basis through their student government gave away to specific needs more than \$5,000, representing a 10 percent tithe of their total student government budget.

In music and drama students also were active, bringing inspiration and entertainment to others. Fall term performances included the annual community Christmas gift, "The Messiah," sung by a 160-voice oratorio choir. The stage production of "A Christmas Carol," titled "Scrooge," was presented in December. A musical version of John Bunyan's traditional "Pilgrim's Progress" was staged in January, and "The Miracle Worker," the celebrated life story of Helen Keller, came to life in March. The biggest undertaking of all was the May performances of the well-known "Sound of Music." All this was in addition to the regular performances by the 60-piece band and 52-voice choir.

Athletically, the George Fox Bruins gained prominence and provided spectators with quality collegiate sports. The men's cross-country team won the NAIA District 2 title. The track team was just four points out of first place in the district championships. And Rich Allen, who coaches both sports, was named the district's Coach of the Year in all sports. The basketball Bruins, for the seventh time in the last eight years, reached the district playoffs. Women fielded teams in field hockey, volleyball, softball, basketball, tennis and track.

New to the campus were two interest groups organized for the first time: a Veterans Organization with about 25 participating and a Married Students Association for the 66 couples on campus.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE

It is easy to depict the physical and fiscal growth at George Fox College: the new campus facilities are here and visible and the financial growth and strengthening can be illustrated through graphs and charts. It is not so easy to illustrate the growth in quality. But we believe the improvements in physical facilities merely mirror the improved quality of our faculty, the academic program, the student life program, the support staff, and all other aspects of the organization that is George Fox College.

The visible growth is in the four new structures completed and dedicated during the year. From throughout the nation major corporations, foundations and businesses contributed funds for four new buildings—the 51,000-square-foot Coleman Wheeler Sports and Physical Education Center, completed at a cost of \$2.4 million; the new \$850,000 Herbert Hoover Academic Building with its 20,000 square feet; and two new residence halls—the Mary Sutton and Charlotte Macy Halls—with 31,000 square feet in a combined \$1.2 million project. All were opened for use in October and impressively added to our space (now 287,564 square feet, an increase of 36 percent) and abilities this year.

But the new construction did not end there. In December the College broke ground for another new building: the Milo C. Ross Center. The former Hester Gym during the year was undergoing a "recycling" into a new 24,000-square-foot facility in a \$1.3 million project that is to be completed in time for the opening of school in 1978.

Yesterday's dreams are today's realities under God's direction and with the support of many. And more is still to be done. Fund raising will begin soon to complete the new Ross Center with a 1,100 seat Chapel/Auditorium as Phase II of the total project.

While the new building has been evident, it has not been at the expense of current (or general) fund operations. The College again, for the seventh consecutive year, operated soundly in the black. Assets of the College climbed by more than \$1.2 million to nearly \$14,700,000 during the fiscal year, with a fund balance of nearly \$11 million.

Gifts and financial support from a variety of sources continue to be the strength of George Fox financially. The support of alumni, churches, the community, friends, and individuals not only is necessary on a monetary basis, but

is a moral support and an indication to others of the overall and wide strength of the George Fox constituency. Student tuition pays only about two thirds of the total education costs; therefore, the College must raise annually the remaining one third necessary for total operation obligations. That's a process that involves so many others, and we hope you.

CHURCH/COLLEGE RELATIONSHIP

Through the years George Fox College has maintained a close relationship with the Northwest Yearly Meeting. I have now been at George Fox College for 10 years and many good things have occurred in that time to bring an even closer relationship between the church and its college: the Yearly Meeting Superintendent and the College president are now both ex officio members of the College board and the Church executive council, encouraging direct communication; the Yearly Meeting has for several years placed a \$10,000 contribution to the College as a line item in the budget; the College has sponsored pastors' short courses and this year a successful Christian Education Conference; joint efforts have been undertaken by the Church and the College in the identification and cultivation of potential pastors; special visitation programs have been conducted; recruitment of Friends students has the highest priority. This is just a small indication of some of the programs and policies that are being conducted to increase the visibility and viability of our church-relatedness. But there is more that can be done, and that should be our mutual goal.

PERSONAL

Let me add a personal word. This past year has been filled with many highlights for Becky and me, including the birth of our first grandchild and the entrance of our son, Jim, into college. It also has been a year of travel with Becky accompanying me on many of my trips.

In June I concluded my services as chairman of the board of the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, although I continue to remain on the executive committee for another two years as past-chairman. I also have completed two terms of service on the Christian College Consortium executive committee. While these responsibilities took their toll in time, I am grateful for the opportunity they provided for wider national leadership and recognition to George Fox College.

SUMMARY

This report provides just a brief record of the 1977-78 academic year, touching only the highlights of all that transpired. However, I hope it serves to show you the excitement that is George Fox College. We are grateful to the Lord for His blessings in a material way upon our campus. The new facilities, balanced budgets, superior faculty, growing student body, and outstanding academic and student life programs are all witness to God's grace.

There is, however, much more that still needs to be accomplished—and by His grace, will be done!

George Fox College has a singular purpose for existence: to honor and prepare workers for Jesus Christ and His kingdom. It is a commitment made generations ago, and one to which we hold strongly today. Through that commitment, God has honored, providing the people and the resources necessary for the task. May we count upon you to be one of those committed to the work and goals of George Fox College?

The annual reports are summarized with the hope that the Yearly Meeting may gain a better understanding of the function of the General Education Department and to share ideas or ways that the meetings are assisting the department in its objectives.

Support for George Fox College and Greenleaf Friends Academy is a major departmental concern. Included in the Great Commission expenditures are \$9,000 for the George Fox College annual fund, and \$550 for Greenleaf Academy "First Week."

Support of individual students in ministerial study is provided through the Great Commission budget at about \$5,500. Additional financial support to students is channeled through the George Fox College "Church/College Fellowship Award" program. Nearly 100 students from 28 meetings are assisted in this program. Three other scholarship funds including the Rice Fund are means of assisting students. Several churches nearer to George Fox College provide internships with stipends for students who assist with youth and Sunday school programs.

Local meetings regularly host college and academy speakers, musical groups, and representatives. Other means of encouragement of students are through campus visitation, bulletin board displays of literature and reports, prayer list of students, attendance at area banquets, and just "talking it up."

It is reported that there are 152 students attending Christian colleges, 78 attending other colleges, and 17 attending vocational schools. Of the students attending George Fox College, 55 are preparing for full-time church vocations, while 24 students are preparing for church vocations at other colleges and 7 students are in seminary training.

Meetings are reporting growing involvement with local Christian schools at the elementary and secondary levels. Three meetings support Released-time Bible Classes in the public schools. At least 60 members are involved with PTA, local school boards, or other public school activities in positions of leadership.

The Executive Council has approved that we not print a new *Discipline* until following Yearly Meeting in 1979. We have instead published on the following pages *Discipline* changes approved through the 1978 Yearly Meeting sessions. If you already have a *Discipline*, cut out the lines or paragraphs and tape into the proper place as instructed (or write in the minor changes as indicated), and this will bring your present *Discipline* up to date. If you *do not* have a *Discipline*, a limited number of copies of the 1975 edition are being reprinted. You may order such copies from The Barclay Press and then insert these corrections as indicated above. Thank you for your cooperation.

In Part II, Chapter II, Section I, subsection A, paragraph 7, page 32, change the first sentence to read as follows:

7. REPRESENTATION IN THE YEARLY MEETING SESSIONS.
The church appoints annually one for each fifty resident active members or major fraction thereof as of the previous Yearly Meeting statistical report to serve on the representative body of the Yearly Meeting; each . . .

In subsection B, paragraph 3, page 33, change as follows:

3. QUALIFICATIONS. All officers and committee chairmen are to be active or affiliate members of the church. (See p. 61.)

In Part II, Chapter II, Section II, paragraph 3, page 39, change department of ministerial training and recording to read department of ministry.

In Part II, Chapter II, Section III, subsection A, paragraph 1, page 40, add the following sentence at end of paragraph:

Its officers and board members are active members of the Friends Church (Northwest Yearly Meeting) unless exceptions are approved by the Yearly Meeting or its Executive Council.

In Section III, wherever the words unified budget appear, change to Great Commission budget (paragraph 6, page 41; paragraphs 3-c and 3-d, page 43).

In Section III, subsection C, paragraph 7, pages 41 and 42, add the following sentence to end of paragraph:

By virtue of his office the archivist is a member of the Yearly Meeting publication board and through it transmits his financial askings to the stewardship board and the Executive Council.

In Section III, subsection C, paragraph 8, page 42, change the first three sentences to read as follows:

8. **CLERKS OF THE REPRESENTATIVES.** The Yearly Meeting appoints annually, on nomination by the representatives, a clerk to preside over the deliberations of the representative body and a recording clerk to keep records and to assist the presiding clerk for the following year. They are appointed soon after the opening of the annual sessions, so that if they lack previous experience they may sit in the remaining sessions of the body to observe the procedure and to receive instruction from the clerks then in charge. They may be reappointed on expiration of their terms. The presiding clerk should be a person well-qualified to preside without prejudice or partiality, and to expedite the handling of the business without neglect of proper hearing and deliberation. It is . . .

and add the following sentence to the end of the paragraph:

The clerks are not members of the representative body and they have no vote.

In Section III, subsection E, paragraph 2, page 44, change c. to read as follows:

c. **Additional Members and Consultants.**

1'. **Additional Members.** Each board is authorized, at its own discretion, to add other Friends to its membership. Such persons should have a broad, general interest in the total program of the board. They have the full rights of the appointed members, to enter into discussions and to participate in the decisions of the board.

2'. **Consultants.** Each board may also, when deemed expedient, secure qualified persons to serve as informants or consultants, on either a continuing or an *ad hoc* basis. Such persons should have expertise in some phase of the board's procedures or responsibilities, able to inform or to give expert advice. They may recommend action, but do not participate in reaching decisions.

In both cases such appointments are reported to the Executive Council or its administrative committee for approval.

In Section III, subsection E, paragraph i., page 45, add the following additional paragraph:

If a board member fails to attend board sessions at Yearly Meeting time, at midyear, and at any other scheduled time for a period of one year, and also has failed to express either verbally or in writing a continuing interest in the work of the board by communicating with the board president, that member is contacted by the board through its president or his/her representative. If at the next scheduled board meeting this member fails to attend or to make contact, the board declares a vacancy and appoints a new member or has one appointed according to the procedure outlined above.

In Section III, subsection F, paragraph 1-a., bottom of page 45, change department of pastoral, evangelistic, and extension work to read department of evangelism.

In Section III, subsection F, paragraph 1-a., page 46, correct (2) Music and the Arts. to read (2) Fine Arts.

In Section III, subsection F, wherever department of ministerial training and recording appears, change to department of ministry [1-a., page 46; 1-a.(4)(a)

e', f', and g', page 47; i', page 48; (4)(b), page 48; (5), page 50; (6), page 51; (6)(b), (c), and (d), page 51]

In Section III, subsection F, paragraph 3.a., page 54, instead of the third paragraph beginning "The board appoints . . ." substitute the following paragraphs:

The board appoints each of its members to serve in one of its constituent departments: department of Yearly Meeting finance; department of stewardship promotion, department of ministers' aid. The department of Yearly Meeting finance receives the budget requests of the boards and other administrative bodies, analyzes them, and formulates recommendations for presentation to the Yearly Meeting Executive Council (see page 43). It determines the percentage, subject to annual review, of the residual income of the local and extension churches (see pages 58, 59) which would be recommended to them as their proportionate share of the contributions to the Yearly Meeting Great Commission budget. The board is authorized to borrow money for the Yearly Meeting when in its judgment such procedure becomes necessary.

The department of ministers' aid appoints an agent of record . . . It supervises the ministers' retirement fund, aged ministers' aid, and group insurance.

In Section III, subsection F, for paragraph 5.b., page 56, substitute the following paragraph:

b. **Administration of Special Funds.** When a church ceases to function as a Friends church of Northwest Yearly Meeting (see also Chapter II, Section I, subsection D, paragraph 6, p. 38), title to property held by that church is transferred to the Yearly Meeting trustees. The assets realized are administered by the spiritual life board through its department of evangelism; provided, that any funds donated for a specific purpose are to be administered in accordance with the desires of the original donor.

In Section III, subsection F, paragraph 6.a., page 57, for the last clause of the first paragraph beginning the manager . . . substitute the following:

by virtue of their offices the manager of The Barclay Press and the Yearly Meeting archivist serve as additional members.

At the end of this same paragraph add:

The Yearly Meeting archivist, with full membership on the board, sits as a nonvoting member of the executive committee.

In Section III, subsection F, paragraph 7.a., page 57, substitute the following paragraph:

a. **Auditing Committee.** The Yearly Meeting appoints a standing auditing committee, which audits annually the books of the treasurer and presents its report for the prior fiscal year to the stewardship board at the midyear board meeting.

In Section III, subsection G, paragraph 1, p. 58, after the sentence "Vacancies are filled from the lists of alternates," insert the following sentence:

No changes are made in the delegations thereafter except as authorized by the Yearly Meeting.

In Section III, subsection H, page 58, change the heading to read: THE GREAT COMMISSION BUDGET, and wherever the words unified budget occur, substitute Great Commission budget (paragraph 1, page 58; paragraphs 5, 6, page 59)

In Chapter III, subsection A, paragraph 3, page 65, change department of ministerial training and recording to department of ministry.

In Part V, paragraph 2.4., page 73, change unified budget to Great Commission budget and delete paragraph g entirely.
