MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1979

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its eighty-seventh session July 30, 1979, at 9:45 a.m. on the George Fox College campus, Newberg, Oregon.

Richard Beebe, Yearly Meeting clerk, read the opening minute: May we allow the call to be "Friends—A Spirit-Moved People" to become a central core of our lives in obedience to God as we reach out in the love of Christ during these days of unparalleled opportunity.

Joseph Gilmore led in the congregational singing.

Richard Beebe led in prayer.

■ 2. The following introductions were made:

Terri Bowen, the new recording clerk for our business sessions, and her husband, Harvey Bowen, pastor of Homedale Friends Church

Billy Britt, executive secretary of North Carolina Yearly Meeting, our Yearly Meeting speaker this year. He brought greetings and expressed appreciation for the opportunity to be with us.

■ 3. A letter of introduction was read for John and Bertha May Nicholson from Westtown Monthly Meeting of Philadelphia Yearly Meeting. John is a member of the Friends Council on Education. They brought greetings and expressed pleasure at being here and meeting their brothers and sisters in Christ in Northwest Yearly Meeting.

■ 4. A returning minute was read from the Interim Committee of the Friends World Committee for Consultation, held in London, October 1978, expressing appreciation for the visit and ministry of Arthur O. Roberts.

■ 5. Rebecca Coleman, president of the Evangelical Friends Alliance Women's Missionary Union, from Mt. Pleasant, Ohio, was introduced and brought greetings.

■ 6. Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Pope from League City, Texas, Mid-America Yearly Meeting, were introduced and brought greetings from League City Friends Church. He asked for prayer as the churches in Texas anticipate the formation of a new yearly meeting.

■ 7. It was brought to our attention that Olen Ellis, superintendent of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, was with us in the Sunday services.

■ 8. A letter was read from William Barton, general secretary of Friends World Committee for Consultation.

Richard Beebe introduced our incoming Yearly Meeting superintendent, Jack Willcuts, his wife Geraldine, and the team that will work with them: Quentin and Florene Nordyke—Quentin, executive secretary of the Yearly Meeting and Florene, regional editor of the *Evangelical Friend*; Vernon and Beth Bagley—Beth, administrative secretary; Myron and Beatrice Goldsmith—Beatrice, Yearly Meeting Treasurer; Ralph and Marie Chapman—Ralph is director of Friends Missionary Literature Service and business manager for the Department of Missions; Eldon and Virginia Helm—Eldon is financial secretary (half time); Jim and Judy Settle—Jim, youth secretary; Richard and Kathryn Eichenberger—Richard, new manager of Barclay Press, and Kathryn, Yearly Meeting sessions hostess and coordinator.

■ 15. Jack Willcuts gave the keynote address, entitled "Friends: A Spirit-Moved People" (1 Thessalonians 5:19). A condensation of his address follows:

KEYNOTE MESSAGE

The Apostle Paul one day arranged a called meeting of the elders in the church at Ephesus. It was a moment of transition in a church experiencing many changes. His instructions have become Bible for Christians to this day:

"Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." Acts 20:28

To the church at Thessalonica Paul spelled out their task and primary purpose in a single statement: "Do not put out the Spirit's fire." (1 Thessalonians 5:19 NIV) We are more familiar with the King James brief wording: "Quench not the Spirit."

Is it possible that we are approaching another burning bush today? If so, we do well to remove our shoes, reverently and quietly waiting in God's presence to find how the Spirit will move us. As we do find out, we may prefer the pressures and voices with which we are familiar. To be Spirit-filled is a happy privilege; to be Spirit-motivated is a stirring experience; but to be Spirit-moved, all together as a people, that is really impressive and frightening! To describe ourselves as Friends in the biblical definition is both humbling and audacious. Surely one implication of this theme to avoid is setting it apart, as a mere slogan, like some kind of religious commercial line. To be a Spirit-moved people brings us back to the very core of our faith, to the source of our being, to a purpose for life. Rooted in our deepest foundations of belief, it lifts us up on the wings of power and praise. Can we contemplate a more awesome possibility? "Do not put out the Spirit's fire"!

If we mean it, and experience it, being Spirit-moved will probably not be dull or boring. Nor will it be easy or fun. It may not even be as different as some may expect, or even successful by current religious measurements. But it will be effective, however costly. There will be giants in the land ahead, but someone has sized up spiritual giants comparatively. Some see Goliath like Saul's soldiers did, too big to tackle; others see him like David did, too big to miss!

The early church was Spirit-moved and eventually penetrated the mighty Roman empire and a pagan world. Early Quakers were Spirit-moved, not very well organized or trained, but our church gathered 50,000 adherents within a dozen years and a hundred thousand by the end of the century despite persecution, hardship, and political harassment. Being a Spirit-moved people is worth considering and praying about.

In his devotional remarks to the George Fox College Board of Trustees last spring, Walter Lee reminded us of the Scripture, "From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked." (Luke 12:48 NIV) "Friends," Walter suggested, "have been given much across the years." If this is true, it is a heritage bringing greater demands than some other churches may have. To be Spirit-led and moved is not a new thing for us; it is an expected experience not to be taken for granted, nor as an inherited trait. It is a sacred trust, this knowledge of the truth, and if God allows we may be privileged again to pick up the mantle of the Spirit's empowering if we are ready.

So, we look around at the turbulence of our times; we look inside ourselves and know down deep that all of us, everyone, every local church, wants to count for something and know God's approval and anointing. We want to be really needed, useful, joyful, and effective. Then we look up, wistfully perhaps, sometimes with tears or in frustration, and we ask, "Isn't God still able to move His people?" As we dare to expose our too often pretended satisfaction or the sense of incompleteness or shallow spirituality that engulfs us . . . if this describes some of our moods and feelings today, then something is missing. It is not a lack of motivation, or strategy, no lack of effort or desire, but a longing for the fresh outpourings of the Holy Spirit in holiness and power. These uneasy stirrings and acknowledged disquiet about our condition, with only sporadic or spotty evidences of God's moving among us, may be in themselves the first and best signs of the Spirit's movement in our midst! Emptiness precedes filling. Hollow hearts may become happy hearts. Business-as-usual

churchmanship can be transformed into dynamic living. Dissatisfaction and heart hunger for the Spirit is a convicting and hopeful condition. Our Yearly Meeting is not anywhere near the end of our opportunity, nor even the beginning of the end, to paraphrase a famous quote from Winston Churchill. Let us instead believe we are only at the end of our beginning.

There is no reason for Friends ever to be locked into dead center, between a great past and a great future. And yet, a review of the book of Acts reveals the first disciples were actually immobilized between the ascension of Christ and the day of Pentecost. What happened to them as they waited on the Lord is also our greatest need, and the big answer to our deepest longings. We too may actually be on the very edge of a great, fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Your life and mine, your church and Northwest Yearly Meeting are in a moment that can be a prelude to prayer, poised to continue onward as a Spirit-moved people.

Preparing for Pentecost. What Jesus did to get His disciples ready for Pentecost He surely longs to do for us again. Those confused, discouraged, scattered followers were changed when the Spirit came; they became a band of victorious, unstoppable Christians called the church. What must be found now, not for only a few of us but all of us, is the same Spirit taking charge of things and of us, so that God may be working greater things than ever in our day, not by us, but *through* us. This vision and possibility is big enough for all, bringing our lives, our church, our homes, our society under the control and guidance of God.

But we see right off, in the New Testament church, that the Spirit's movings come to those who wait for God, not just to those who work for God: those who allow God to work through them, not just fitting God's work into their own agendas, interests, or personal priorities. St. Luke put it another way when he described it: They were "clothed with power from on high"! (Luke 24:49 NIV) That is worth waiting for! That is a kind of expanding faith that makes an effective church inevitable. A baptism with the Holy Spirit, indwelt, empowered, engrossed, enlightened by the living God!

Our purpose the coming year as a Yearly Meeting is

1. To be a Spirit-moving people—each church, each department, each person.
2. To use the Yearly Meeting office and staff as a support ministry to the ongoing of the church and pastoral leadership as much as possible.
3. To urge each local meeting to be a more effective church. This will be done by visitation, special meetings, and encouraging the use of the following six major objectives:
 - a. An effective church has harmony among its members; b. has an education program that builds Quaker, Christian character; c. has a consistent outreach of evangelism and social concern; d. has a stewardship that produces adequate funds and leadership; e. has a sense of loyalty and unity within the family of Friends based on convictions; f. is a church where the pastors are encouraged and allowed to plan and dream for greatness, released to exercise God-given abilities.
4. To comprehend and relate to each generation of our day—youth, young adults, the family, the elderly.
5. To double our missionary giving and efforts in every church.
6. To support and maintain George Fox College as a continuing Quaker Christian institution of higher education as one of our most effective tools of church leadership development. As our school grows and becomes more interdenominational in its student body and faculty, this remains a constant goal.
7. To be guided by the Spirit, not squeezed into the molds of this present world, including the religious world about us.

I conclude my remarks today with a promise shared with me by an elder in the Reedwood Friends Church, where I have served. Upon learning of my plans to return to this task, Iola Steen gave me this word from Jeremiah 29:11, 12, and another elder in our meeting, at my request, put it into calligraphy as a wall hanging. It reads, in the New International Version:

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen . . ."

I would like to believe this promise encompasses us all.

At the close of his address, Jack asked Joseph Gilmore to sing the theme song Joe wrote for our Yearly Meeting sessions.

Richard Beebe expressed appreciation for Jack's message.

■ 16. Aaron Hamlin, field secretary for the National Black Evangelical Association, was introduced.

■ 17. Myron Goldsmith closed in prayer as we adjourned to meet Tuesday at 9:15 a.m.

■ 18. Richard Beebe convened the meeting and asked Evert Tuning to lead in the opening prayer.

■ 19. The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

■ 20. Fredric Gregory, having been recommended for recording as a minister of the Gospel and having been under the Department of Ministry for care and training according to the provisions of the *Constitution and Discipline*, the Spiritual Life Board recommended to Northwest Yearly Meeting that he be recorded as a minister.

Approved.

■ 21. The Memorial Committee was named as follows: Julia Retherford, William Thomas, and Laura Trachsel.

■ 22. The committee to write Letters to Aged Friends was named as follows: Frederick Baker, Muriel Ostrin, and George Moore.

■ 23. The Committee on Returning Minutes was named as follows: Ruth Brown and Rosalie Sigler.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

■ 24. Kent Thornburg, chairman of the Department of Social Concerns, was introduced.

He asked Michael Allen to report on the plans the department has for assisting the elderly.

David and Catherine Sherman, who have studied this past year at Voice of Calvary Ministries in Jackson, Mississippi, shared their testimony. They will be working under Piedmont Friends Church.

Kent presented the department's concern for the Indo-Chinese people. A letter is being prepared along with information on how a church may sponsor one of these families.

Approved.

■ 25. The Friends Action Board report was given under the direction of William Rourke, president. The ministries of this board include the Minority Scholarship Fund at George Fox College; support of workers from Northwest

Yearly Meeting at Voice of Calvary in Jackson, Mississippi; Yamhill Corrections Commission, and National Black Evangelical Association.

Ernest Cathcart was introduced. He told of a new ministry "Give Us This Day" beginning here in Newberg. This nonprofit organization will provide a variety of services to lower income families.

Ralph Beebe and Aaron Hamlin reported on the work of the National Black Evangelical Association. They spoke of the value of the association between Northwest Yearly Meeting and NBEA.

It was brought to our attention that there have not been enough funds in Friends Action Board to pay Aaron Hamlin's entire salary since March. This board is not included in the Great Commission Budget. We need to prayerfully consider our obligation to these ministries and support them financially.

Approved.

■ 26. The following Friends Fund report was given by Walter Wilhite, executive director:

The Friends Fund is an incorporated, tax-exempt agency of the Yearly Meeting administered by a board of directors appointed by the Executive Council of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Its purpose is to promote and operate the planned giving program of Friends by becoming a receiving agency for deferred gifts and then to channel these gifts advantageously and according to the wishes of the donors in the total work of the Yearly Meeting through its various organizations.

A second perspective is the conviction that estate planning offers unique opportunities for the exercise of Christian stewardship. The Scriptures are replete with proclamations concerning our possessions and their responsible use. Sin often expresses itself as the distortion of the values and uses of wealth, and discipleship as well is evidenced by our attitude toward, and use of, all that God has given us.

This year I have been involved with the probate of two estates and the looking after, managing, or selling of properties deeded or given through income agreements or wills.

Donald Millage presented the treasurer's report for February 28, 1979. It showed total assets of \$1,108,414.15 with the assets exceeding \$1,000,000 for the first time. Other assets from trusts have matured since that report.

These amounts represent Christian stewardship practiced by individuals and families who desire to have their assets continue to do the Lord's work after they are called home.

The directors of Friends Fund believe this organization has an almost unlimited potential for assisting members of the Yearly Meeting in the planning of their personal finances to provide the highest level of stewardship in carrying out the work of Northwest Yearly Meeting. I want to express my appreciation for all those who have assisted in bringing this total up to date.

■ 27. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for the first reading the recommendation that on page 61 of the *Constitution and Discipline*, under D—AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIP, the fourth sentence, reading "They may hold offices in the church, except those of minister, elder, presiding clerk, and trustee," be stricken out and replaced with the following:

They are encouraged to accept various responsibilities in the local church. Only active members, however, may serve as officers, elders, ministers, trustees, chairmen of standing committees, and as representatives of the local church to the Yearly Meeting. Affiliate members are encouraged also to attend a membership class or to enjoy pastoral counseling, thus to prepare themselves for active membership.

The Committee recommended also that the last sentence of section D be deleted as redundant, and that the words "or affiliate" in paragraph 3, page 33, be deleted.

Approved.

■ 28. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the recommendation that on page 46, second line down, and also in line 2, paragraph (3) on the same page, the phrase, Department of peace, be changed to Department of Peace Testimony.

Approved.

■ 29. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following recommendation: That on page 56 of the *Constitution and Discipline* the first paragraph, the phrases relative to a Department of Service and a Department of Public Morals be deleted and in their place the following be inserted: Department of Social Concerns, whose special emphases are to channel funds to social concern programs and to provide service in this realm to local churches.

Approved.

■ 30. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the recommendation that on page 58 of the *Constitution and Discipline* the sixth sentence under G 1 be deleted and the following substituted in its place: Those thus approved are seated as the official Representative body, to serve in that capacity until the next Yearly Meeting sessions.

Approved.

■ 31. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following recommendation: that on page 58 the title, H—THE YEARLY MEETING UNIFIED BUDGET be changed to H—THE GREAT COMMISSION BUDGET, and that similar changes be made in the text of paragraphs 1, 5, and 6, and in lines 6 and 7 on page 55 as previously revised.

Approved.

■ 32. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the recommendation that the second paragraph under b. The Area Secretary, page 52, be revised to read as follows:

As area superintendent he is also to receive from the local and extension churches through their spiritual life committee chairmen their annual reports on

the state of the church, to summarize each of them, and from these summaries to compile and forward to the Yearly Meeting the annual area report.

Action delayed.

- 33. Richard Beebe closed in prayer as we adjourned to reconvene at 2:15 p.m.

- 35. The minutes were read and approved.

- 39. The resignation of Lloyd E. Pruitt from the Stewardship Board was accepted.

PUBLICATION BOARD

- 40. The Publication Board report was given by Ralph Beebe. Harry Hoskins had resigned from the board as chairman, and Barry Hubbell, new chairman, had to be out of town during the sessions.

Due to health reasons, Harlow Ankeny found it necessary during the year to resign his position as manager of Barclay Press. Richard Eichenberger has accepted this position.

Richard gave a brief description on "What Is Barclay Press" and introduced the staff. Recently they have reprinted in paperback *From Bamboo to Mango* and *The Will of My Father*. A book of poems by Bess Bulgin will be off the press this week.

Jack Willcuts expressed gratitude and appreciation to Harlow Ankeny on behalf of Barclay Press, the Publication Board, the Yearly Meeting, and the Evangelical Friends Alliance for his 17½ years of faithful service. A standing ovation was given to Harlow and his wife Gertrude, expressing our love and appreciation.

Ralph Beebe presented a gift of a magazine holder and a book *The Oregon Coast* to the Ankenys from the Board of Publication. Harlow has been appointed director of Twin Rocks Friends Camp. Ralph then led in prayer for the Ankenys and the Eichenbergers.

The report was approved.

- 41. The Women's Missionary Union report was given by Lela Morrill, president. There is an emphasis in WMU both on working and giving.

Alice Maurer, retreat chairman, told of plans to hold identical WMU retreat programs at Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks this year.

- 42. Keith Baker closed in prayer as we adjourned to meet Wednesday at 9:15 a.m.

- 49. The Department of Missions report was presented by Roger Knox, chairman, as follows:

Nine years ago a mission report came to the floor of this Yearly Meeting stating that if the present growth rate continued as it had been at 10 percent, we would double our mission work in another 10 years. At that time we had two mission families in Peru, two families in Bolivia, and two families on furlough—six families total with two on furlough to care for a work spread over an area in travel time twice the size of Northwest Yearly Meeting, with hazardous road conditions and cultural barriers. Our missionaries were not doing all the evangelism. The nationals were sharing Christ with their families and neighbors, but more missionaries were needed for teaching and training the brethren. Two priorities for the future of the work at that time were suggested: 1. A mission staff of at least nine families (we have 7 families now, 9 years later). 2. Major increase in missionary giving (which has about covered inflation plus expenses of the two families added).

The tragedy of an understaffed field shows itself in (1) overworked and frustrated missionaries, (2) failure to reap and properly care for the harvest of souls, (3) inability to answer many calls for the development of new outreach to communities, (4) inability to train a sufficient number of pastors to care for the congregations.

Ten percent growth of the church has not occurred on the Friends mission field this year nor in recent years. While there were new churches established in both Bolivia and Peru, there were also losses shown in some of the larger quarterly meetings. Statistics and spot checking show the Friends Church in South America growing in some areas, losing in others. What can we do?

PERSONNEL: Our missionaries in Bolivia consist of Harold and Nancy Thomas and family, James and Gail Roberts and family, Roscoe and Tina Knight. In Peru we have Gilbert and Louise George and family, Mark and Wilma Roberts. Missionaries on deputation in the United States this year were Ron and Carolyn Stansell and family, and Randy and Mary Morse and family. Ed and Marie Cammack and family were on deputation for one-half year.

Last Yearly Meeting we were urged to pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers. Now Leland and Iverna Hibbs have offered themselves to return for a two-year term, and will be leaving soon for Arequipa, Peru. Nine years ago when an appeal was made for a total of nine families, Paul Cammack helped to alleviate the shortage by returning for a short term.

We thank God for short-term help, but still desperately need more full-time missionaries on our fields in both Bolivia and Peru. When will we have a sufficient number of career missionaries, well-trained and able to teach and equip national leaders? This remains an urgent need.

EDUCATION: In Bolivia we offer a training and equipping opportunity to the nationals in pastoral ministry through (1) the Patmos Bible School. The *resident part* of this school functioned with 21 students, but no graduates this year. The *extension part* (TEE—Theological Education by Extension) of the school enrolled about 100 students, some of these being in their sixth year of study. This year there were 23 graduates. Seventeen of the 23 were Bolivian national church students. It is exciting to see these men being added to the 38 already serving as pastors in the national church. This ministry of education is good but needs to be expanded to reach more pastors and workers. Personnel is the key factor here. (2) The San Pablo Seminary offered continued study for 20 to 25 of our national church pastors. In Peru TEE has been frustrating, but necessary. It takes up much of the already limited missionary time, but is essential to the training of national pastors. This year we have tried to focus effort on this training. Training national pastors is a priority because without strong Bible-oriented leadership the churches fail to grow and many are drawn away by cult groups. We must teach the Word of God and demonstrate the power of God if we are to be effective in these days.

EVANGELISM: In Bolivia we are releasing the missionaries to give more time to evangelism and less to maintenance trips, church conferences, and quarterly meetings. We are encouraging the Mesa Directiva to do more of these ministries, releasing to them a vehicle for use in transporting them on these trips. Four one-year-old congregations were strengthened, and two new communities were entered from March to June of this year as a result of Harold Thomas's efforts in cooperation with the Villa San Antonio congregation in La Paz.

LITERATURE: A much-needed course for new believers was written by Nancy Thomas this year and is being taught by national leaders to their congregations. Also, the final course of the Extension Bible School curriculum, which has been a joint project of many missionaries for the past 10 years, was completed this year.

SOCIAL CONCERNS: In both Bolivia and Peru we are continually aware of the social needs of the people. Although our funds are limited we do offer some medical assistance for church workers. Preventive care is taught when possible to the people. A health clinic in La Paz on the Max Paredes property will soon be open.

YOUTH: A major concern is the young people of Bolivia and Peru. Fifty percent of Bolivia population is under 18 years of age, and 70 percent is 30 and under. The national church largely ignores the youth. Culture has fostered the idea that the youth are not to be listened to; however, these young people are now more literate and educated than their parents. The church is not providing for their needs or speaking to their inquiring minds. Some of the national leaders are aware of this problem. A missionary could spend full time just being involved in a ministry to youth. In just a few years these young people will be the older people. We must reach them now.

URBAN OPPORTUNITIES: Many opportunities for increased ministry to the urban areas are present, but here again the work is limited by lack of personnel.

HOUSING: Because of the continuing deterioration of the Villa Armonia home and the shifting hillside, we are having to move from this location. This will increase our rental expenses for two families who have been living on that

property. The Santa Cruz mission home is nearing completion and the Knights are now living in it.

VEHICLES: A new Toyota Land Cruiser pickup will be purchased for the Bolivian work. In Peru we have secured a 1974 Land Rover. It is in good condition, purchased with funds donated by a mission-minded benefactor. Another vehicle is on order for Peru at this time.

In Peru we have seen a strengthening of the Mesa Directiva (national leaders). They have planned revival meetings all over the yearly meeting and an extensive round of church visits for encouragement. Each church was visited by a national leader and a missionary several times this year. This has boosted morale and interest.

KOREAN CHURCH: This work continues to progress under the capable leadership of Pastor Jin and devoted members. By request of the Koreans, Oscar and Ruth Brown have been ministering to the English-speaking people of the congregation. The church facility purchased last year is proving a blessing for this fast-growing congregation.

The Department of Missions has cared for its work by meetings at (1) Yearly Meeting time, (2) fall retreat, and (3) midyear sessions. Also, the Administrative Committee meets monthly throughout the year for approximately six hours per meeting. Ralph Chapman, business manager, Jack Willcuts, secretary, and others, have given many extra hours, for which we express appreciation.

Quentin Nordyke, Robert Hess, and Roger Knox made a three-week field visit in December 1978, which was helpful in shaping future direction of the work in several areas. This was a blessed time of meeting with the full field council for a time of planning and worshiping together.

Although this was not a year of great growth, it was a year of strengthening in many areas. It was a year of seeing a vision for the future ministry in Bolivia and Peru, but also realizing what it will cost in dollars and personnel to see it come true.

There are great opportunities for outreach into new areas in the larger cities as well as the rural areas, and for starting a middle-class work. There is a desperate need for pastoral training in many of the rural areas where the brethren cannot leave their homes to come to a resident Bible school. Another opportunity is to reach the youth.

All this will cost Northwest Yearly Meeting, but isn't it our Lord who will provide through us? Didn't He say, "Whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, I will do it"? Have we failed to ask? Pray that God will give us vision and boldness as we serve Him this coming year. Pray for needed missionaries, new and experienced. Pray for a spirit of generous giving to fall upon us. We give thanks for the opportunity to serve God and His Church this past year. May the story be even brighter next year because of our obedience to Him.

It is our prayer that all should know the love of Christ, which passes knowledge, and that all might be filled with the fullness of God. "Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, unto him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages."

It will be our faith and obedience that will bring God glory in 1979-80.

BOLIVIAN FIELD REPORT

In the annual Bolivian field report for 1978-79, Harold Thomas (Bolivian Mission Council chairman) expressed the following concern that has been taken from his larger report:

The Bolivian Friends face several crisis points. Those who follow our mission effort closely need to be aware of these both for information and for responsible praying. In view of the faltering growth of the church in an exceedingly receptive part of the world, it seems appropriate to mention the following:

Youth: Bolivia is a young country. Fully one half its population is 18 years and under, 70 percent of its population is 30 years or less. In this context we see a church that is largely ignoring the youth. The INELA is not holding even the children of its own members.

These youth are the first nearly totally educated generation of the church. They are literate, and an increasing percentage are completing high school and entering advanced education, such as teachers' school and university. They are intelligent. They are questioning. They have come up under Marxist teaching in the government schools. They are jumping from an animist culture to a modern materialist society. They are confused. They are finding themselves pressed into the inferior social classes of that culture. And they are angry.

The INELA leaders function according to the traditional Aymara values of experienced older leadership and what are called "cargo" responsibilities. This means that ideas and demands coming from the youth are largely ignored or resisted. Yet these youth are far better educated to function in the modern world than their parents. Of course, education is not experience. The result is that church leaders feel threatened by their own kids. And while the kids maintain a deep cultural respect for their parents, they are often confused and hurt and feel unwanted. As long as they sit quietly and listen they are fine. At the moment they exert leadership and come up with new ideas they are squelched. Just last January the INELA president again pled with the representatives of the churches to allow the youth leaders to have another chance to carry on their planned activities of conferences during the coming year, and not to abolish the organization.

The situation is critical. Not only is the INELA not reaching adequately its own youth, it is not even beginning to penetrate the huge population with which it has no direct contact. We missionaries need God's direction to know how to turn this crisis into the tremendous opportunity it is.

PERUVIAN FIELD REPORT

In the annual Peruvian field report, Mark Roberts (Peruvian Mission Council Chairman) shares the following, which has been taken from his larger report.

The membership of the Mesa Directiva was basically unchanged with the election of a new treasurer being the only exception.

The attitude of the group has been progressively more cooperative than at the beginning of the year. Several of their immediate material goals were met, giving a sense of progress and achievement. There still seems to be considerable display of partisan political bickering though this also appears to be lessening and at least less destructive than at first.

The acquisition of the property for the new center has been a unifying factor and seems to be giving more purpose to the organization of the National Church. There also seems to be a gradually growing renewal of interest in evangelism.

Objectives expressed by the Mesa Directiva are to get the office complex under way and to revisit several of the places where the work seems to have faltered recently. They are anxious to see the Bible School program succeed in producing workers and pastors. There is a determined effort to reach all the existing churches with revival meetings and with frequent visits. They are welcoming and responding to requests to bring tent meetings into the new areas

nearby. More effort is being made to strengthen the relationship with the coast work than was evident at the first of the year.

There are 27 active groups at present. There was the merger of two groups in Juli, and three new places have been opened. One was lost.

The goals of the mission will probably remain much the same for the coming year. We will help the National Church with their headquarters, try to increase and improve the Bible School program, promote training of pastors and workers, and be active with the brethren in evangelism.

Aside from help promised on the new headquarters, we do not anticipate giving much other material help. This past year the mission helped the nationals secure a new light plant and loudspeaker system.

Jack Willcuts led in a prayer of dedication and commitment for Jean Clark as she leaves for Peru and for Everett and Alda Clarkson as they go to Mexico City.

The board report and also their Sunday afternoon presentation were approved.

■ 50. The Memorial Committee conducted a time of remembrance and thanksgiving for the lives of three ministers and 45 other members who passed away during the year. Roy "Pop" Knight sang a medley of "There'll Be No Dark Valley when Jesus Comes" and "Saved by Grace."

William Thomas shared from the Scripture concerning the hope of resurrection in Christ. Memorials were read for Herman Macy, Pearl Reece, Wilbur Brandenburg, Marie Haines, and Oliver Weesner.

Many expressed appreciation for the contribution these people have made in their own lives and for the Lord.

■ 51. Richard Beebe closed in prayer as we adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

■ 54. The report of the Spiritual Life Board was given. Clare Willcuts, president, shared a Quaker concern using 2 Timothy 3:14 as his text: "But continue thou in the things which thou has learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them."

The *Department of Fine Arts* report was given by Dennis Hagen. They have just completed a directory of artists, dramatists, and musicians, and these are available to the churches. The program for recording music ministers is complete and ready to start October 1, 1979. Nine candidates are already signed up to begin the recording process. It is basically a two-year process. During this past year there was a choral festival for the Newberg Area held at the Sherwood church. David Howard has conducted a workshop on church music and keyboard skills during the Yearly Meeting sessions.

The report of the *Department of Peace Testimony* was given under the direction of Ralph Beebe, chairman. Elenita Bales and John Braun shared concerns regarding the Quakers' peace testimony:

The Department of Peace Testimony built its program around the New Call to Peacemaking (NCP) last year. This year an additional major emphasis will be on peace education in the local church.

Seven members of Northwest Yearly Meeting participated in the NCP conference at Green Lake, Wisconsin, October 5-8, 1978. Mickie Jarvill, Elenita

Bales, John Braun, Fred Gregory, and Ralph Beebe attended as delegates; Jack Willcuts and Norval Hadley participated as resource persons.

The highly successful conference brought together about 270 Friends, Mennonites, and Brethren from across the United States, along with several observers from other denominations and agencies, including some from African and Asian nations. A six-member findings committee (which included Jack Willcuts) drew together a statement of those areas on which the delegates found general agreements. The statement is available from the Department of Peace Testimony.

New Call to Peacemaking plans regional conferences throughout the United States for the coming year. The fall topic, military conscription, will be considered by subregional conferences at Greenleaf Academy, Western Mennonite High School, near Salem, and in the Seattle area. Ten students are to be selected from the host school; approximately half the total delegates will be ages 16 to 22. The topics of the spring conference will be war tax resistance and nuclear issues. All these issues will be discussed in the context of NCP priorities: the biblical basis for peacemaking and how Christians can speak the message of peacemaking to the church and the world.

The Department of Peace Testimony seeks to work with each church in Northwest Yearly Meeting during the next year, helping to assess its peace program, suggest curricular materials, and provide resource persons. A committee is currently working to develop materials that can be made available to churches and camps.

The report of the *Department of Evangelism* was given by Howard Harmon, chairman, with the assistance of Maurice Chandler, Quentin Nordyke, and Earl Perisho.

The Department of Evangelism has been active this past year in assisting churches throughout the Yearly Meeting in their planning and outreach programs. May we highlight a few of these churches:

Nampa—Cooperating with the people of the Nampa church, the department has assisted the congregation through many sessions in planning a renewal program for the church. Quentin Nordyke has given leadership during these evaluating meetings, and an exciting fresh ministry has been planned. Homer and Lois Smuck have sensed the Lord's leading, coming from Mid-America Yearly Meeting, to pastor the congregation. Upon hearing of the renewal program a family has moved to Nampa to assist in the ministry.

Post Falls—The building has been completed, attendance has climbed to over 100, and as a result the congregation is fast becoming a strong church. The Hayden Lake church continues to lend support to this work.

Hilltop—J. Harley Adams was greatly used by the Lord this past year in pastoring the congregation. Bob and Carol Mardock have been called as pastors. New outreach ministries are being planned for the coming years.

North Shore and South Shore—New ministries are being planned for the North Shore area of Seattle, Washington, and the South Shore area of Boise, Idaho.

A pastoral training session is planned for September 1979 called "Focus on the 80's" that will feature Charles Mylander, Jack Willcuts, and Quentin Nordyke as leaders.

Cooperating with Evangelical Friends Alliance, a prayer emphasis is being planned beginning in September. Throughout EFA we will be encouraged to pray together for God's blessing and direction.

Share Calls were sent out for Post Falls and Cherry Grove. The willing support of so many within the Yearly Meeting has made this a real help to these congregations.

The department has counseled with churches that have requested our assistance, and along with our general superintendent, Norval Hadley, met with congregations and pastors where needed.

With anticipation of fresh growth and opportunities, we look forward to the eighties.

The report of the Spiritual Life Board and the presentation given on Sunday evening were approved.

■ 55. The resignation of M. Gene Hockett from his remaining year as an elected member of the Board of Education, due to his having been appointed to serve as president of the board, was read.

■ 65. The meeting closed with prayer as we adjourned to meet Thursday at 9:15 a.m.

■ 66. Robert Morrill led in prayer as the meeting convened.

■ 67. The minutes of the Wednesday morning and afternoon sessions were read and approved.

■ 68. Karen Smitherman gave the report of the Greenleaf Friends Academy in the absence of Kendall Smitherman, principal, who was attending a conference at Winona Lake, Indiana.

The 71st year at Greenleaf Friends Academy was a year to reaffirm the commitment to Christian education.

We opened the school with "First Week '78" and the theme Christian Vocations. Believing in the need to help our students in vocational and career planning, the concept of Christian vocations was used to help students strengthen their own Christian commitment and at the same time nurture the possible involvement to full-time Christian service.

We involved Yearly Meeting personnel, including Quentin Nordyke and Ronald Stansell.

Following First Week, the 1978-79 school year began on campus with preschool through grade 12.

Plans for the new junior high complex and gymnasium renovation were unveiled at the Oregon and Idaho Christmas dinners. The total project is moving through the proposed schedule with the capital campaign currently underway as foundation grants are presently being sought.

A new Early Childhood Education center is being constructed that will house the preschool and day care. This phase of the academy ministry has grown rapidly, serving approximately 65 children at the close of this school year.

The new facility is designed to accommodate twice the number of children served this past year.

The Early Childhood Education Program also has pioneered academy involvement in parent and family ministries, with a Bible study established for preschool mothers.

This program is being further enhanced with expansion of the school's counseling program, which is designed to greatly involve parents as we strive to make the Friends Academy experience a total family affair.

The music department participated in the Association of Christian Schools' International Musicales in Pasadena, California. The eight-day trip involving band and choir featured concerts in four California churches, two days of Musicales activities, and a day at Disneyland.

Athletically it also was a positive year: GFA won its division of the Western Idaho Conference in football, was second in basketball in the WIC, runner-up at the district tournament, and third at State.

Two special spiritual emphases, in addition to First Week, featured the Friendship Ministries in February, then a series of meetings with evangelist Jimmy Lentz in April. Both series resulted in positive growth and spiritual involvement for the students and faculty.

All faculty members participated in the Association of Christian School International Teachers Convention at the Seattle Center, with some 900 Christian school teachers in attendance.

Anna Mills and Orrin Hills were two of three Northwest teachers recognized for 25 or more years of Christian school service. Anna Mills was also recognized for completion of her 25th year at GFA during a special recognition ceremony at commencement.

Enrollment throughout the academy reached 65 in the Early Childhood program, 115 in K-6, 65 in 7-8, and 115 in 9-12.

We are thankful for God's blessing upon the academy. We continue to be thankful for the quality of faculty and their very deep concern and commitment to Christian education. The support of our families and involved churches also plays a great role in this ministry.

We are exuberant with the broadened ministry of the academy as a ministry that serves the entire family. We seek prayerful support for these expanded ministries and believe that a closer relationship with families will provide opportunity for greater spiritual and social growth and development of our students. Approved.

EDUCATION BOARD

■ 69. The Education Board presented a skit about the 200th birthday of Sunday school and the importance of being involved in Sunday school. They served birthday cake at the end of the skit.

The report of the board is as follows:

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH SCHOOLS: *Area Dinners*—Two pilot dinners were held to explain the program of the year to Christian education leaders in the fall of 1978. Additional dinners in other areas are planned for the fall of 1979.

Video Programs—Preliminary considerations and planning for the development of video cassettes for Christian education training to be developed in cooperation with George Fox College television center were started.

Youth Leadership—Assistance has been given to the Yearly Meeting Friends Youth in the development of youth leadership, sponsors' retreat, executive meetings, and travel. Distribution of the FY Handbook has been a part of this encouragement.

Camping—A newsletter was distributed to all churches in the Yearly Meeting giving news of all camps and encouraging involvement in the camping program. A film *Pressure Cooker* was purchased for camp use.

Christian Education Conference—The Education Board cosponsored a conference with George Fox College in February. A Christian education camp is planned at Twin Rocks March 28-30, 1980.

EFA CHRISTIAN EDUCATION NEWS: *Something new from Aldersgate Publications*—Totally new *Toddlers* (pre-two-year-old) Curriculum is now available to be used this fall quarter. The material includes a Teacher's Manual, 52 sessions full of teaching techniques appropriate for pre-two-year-olds. A Resource Packet has been designed with beautiful, full-color pictures and other aids. The Aldersgate Nursery Curriculum has been totally revised, available this fall. There is a new study "The Best Is Yet to Be" for adults preparing for retirement. The Christian Education Program for 1979-80 will be the 200th Birthday of the Sunday school. Materials have been sent to every church, encouraging every Sunday school to participate in the worldwide celebration.

Reminder: Christian Education Camp at Twin Rocks, March 28-30, 1980. 1982—EFA Christian Ed Camp, September 9-12, Twin Rocks.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES: Our report covers three areas of concern: (1) "Know Your Friends" display centers. We want the centers to be the tool through which the local church proclaims the doctrinal distinctives of Quakers. Current topics are stressed offering guidance in stewardship, family worship, missions, peace. We hope the churches of the Yearly meeting will purchase and use these display centers creatively and effectively. Our department is the gleaner and gatherer of materials for the pamphlets used in the displays. Supplies may be purchased from Barclay Press. (2) The department also supplies Quaker books and microfilms to the Western Evangelical Seminary library. At least six microfilms and books were given in 1978.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION: Promotion of Friends Academy and George Fox College continues to be a major concern of the

Department of General Education. Funds to assist in a First Week retreat in the fall at Friends Academy and for the George Fox College general fund are provided by our budget. Meetings are encouraged to host traveling groups representing these schools, to set up bulletin boards, provide scholarships, and generally promote attendance at these schools.

The department assists with ministerial education scholarships. Billy Dragoo, Steven Fine, and Leonard Tandberg received tuition aid to attend George Fox College. Bruce Bray, Jim Leonard, Randy Morse, Roger Sargent, Wayne Chapman, Robert Mardock, and Clyde Parker have been assisted with tuition aid to attend Western Evangelical Seminary.

■ 74. John Sills, vice-president and director of development at Western Evangelical Seminary, gave his report entitled "Armed with the Word, Empowered by the Spirit." In May 45 students graduated from WES. (This class, along with last year's class of 45, are the largest to date.) They represented 17 denominations, 11 states, and 7 foreign countries. (Canada—4, West Indies—2, China—2, Philippines, Korea, Haiti, and India, each 1).

In 1978-79 there was a total of 244 students. The full-time average was about 180. The projection for 1979-80 is about the same.

D. Working diligently to *strengthen* our students in homiletical and preaching skills.

E. A growing awareness of the need for relational abilities, and the capacity to be sensitive to the realities of human need and man's daily struggle.

YOUR COMMITMENT TO WES

A. A realization that all tuition and scholarship funds cover only 50 percent of the cost of an education at WES.

B. A recognition that you, and the other supporting holiness denominations, are the only ones to whom we dare go for financial support. Thus you properly attach certain "theological strings" to your giving.

C. That there are several phases to your giving: 1. Individual gifts through the WESmen program, responses to mail appeals, and other individual appeals; 2. Church Budget Support; 3. Selection of concerned trustees to be on the board.

D. "Pray without ceasing" for: financial stability, student recruitment, educational relevance, spiritual revival.

The reason is simple. *We are on one team. Our Captain is Jesus Christ.* There is a lost world to save. We, together, as Paul said to the Corinthians, are "*God's fellow workers*," His collaborators, partners together in the Gospel.

Richard Beebe expressed appreciation for this report and for the relationship we have with the seminary.

Approved.

■ 75. Norma Beebe tendered her resignation as an appointee to the Outreach Board, as her schedule during 1979-80 will make it impossible for her to attend a number of the board meetings.

Approved.

■ 76. The Executive Council recommended that Dean Campbell be named to complete the term of Jack Willcuts on the George Fox College Board of Trustees. Jack Willcuts, as superintendent, is a member ex officio.

Approved.

■ 77. Returning minutes for John and Bertha May Nicholson and for Billy Britt were read and approved.

■ 78. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following recommendation: That on page 39 of the *Constitution and Discipline*, SECTION II, paragraph 3, line 6, after the words "Meeting boards," this statement be inserted: These secretaries are chosen on the basis of a vital and knowledgeable interest in the realm of the board's responsibilities and of their willingness and ability to attend faithfully its announced meetings.

Approved.

■ 79. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the recommendation that on page 57 of the *Constitution and Discipline* subparagraph d. Other Committees be changed to e. Other Committees and that a new paragraph be inserted above it to read as follows:

d. Discipline Revision Committee. The Yearly Meeting appoints annually, on nomination by the Executive Council, a committee of five to handle all matters pertaining to revision of the Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline*. One of the five is designated by the Council and appointed by the Yearly Meeting to chair the committee for the ensuing year. The committee itself or any officer or official body of the Yearly Meeting may initiate proposals for amendment. Any proposal originating elsewhere than in the committee is referred to it through its chairman before being presented on the floor of the Yearly Meeting; this is to insure consistency with the *Constitution and Discipline* as a whole and uniformity of style and expression. Proposals given approval as a first reading are referred to the committee for one year, to be submitted for second reading and final action in the subsequent sessions. (See paragraph 3, page 59.)

Approved.

■ 80. At the request of the Stewardship Board, the Discipline Revision Committee presented the following recommendation:

On pages 58 and 59 of the *Constitution and Discipline*, under III—THE GREAT COMMISSION BUDGET, paragraph 5 be replaced with the following:

5. PROPORTIONATE SHARING. A formula for the apportionment of requests to the individual churches is developed by the Stewardship Board, subject to the approval of the Executive Council.

The development of this formula may take into account the attendance, the income and expenditures, and the record of past giving or other pertinent data relative to the formulation of a "fair share" giving program

Tabled until the afternoon meeting.

■ 81. Richard Beebe referred to the Minutes of the 1978 sessions (Minutes 99 and 114) and gave background information as to the work of the committee for selecting a general superintendent.

They have made the following recommendation:

The Executive Council recommends that Jack Willcuts be given a two-year call as general superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting from July 1, 1979, to June 30, 1981.

On pages 54 and 55 of the *Constitution and Discipline* under 3. STEWARDSHIP BOARD replace the sentence that begins, "It determines the percentage" with the following: It determines the amount, as computed by a formula approved by the Executive Council (see pages 58 and 59) which would be recommended to the local and extension churches as their proportionate share of the contributions to the Yearly Meeting's Great Commission Budget.

■ 90. At the request of the presiding clerk, the Discipline Revision Committee presented the following recommendation:

On page 41 of the *Constitution and Discipline* change the first sentence of paragraph 5 to read:

5. TREASURER. The Yearly Meeting appoints annually, on nomination by the Executive Council, a person to serve as treasurer.

STEWARDSHIP BOARD

■ 91. The Stewardship Board report was given by Donald Millage. A concern of the board has been stewardship education and how this is being implemented. Eldon Helm, who has joined the Yearly Meeting staff as financial secretary, shared some of his dreams and ideas in this area of stewardship education.

Another area of responsibility is Ministers' Aid, which deals with health insurance, pension fund, and retirement fund. Beatrice Goldsmith shared about the setting up of a new pension fund this year. The participation of pastors in the pension plan has more than doubled with this new plan.

The treasurer's report was presented and approved with appreciation given to Beatrice Goldsmith for her fine work. The report appears in the Appendix.

Guidelines were given to the Representatives for carrying out the Great Commission of Northwest Yearly Meeting, as follows:			
1. Report back to your home churches, prepared to report on the activities of Yearly Meeting.			
2. Share the contents of the Great Commission Budget brochures with your pastor, Stewardship Board, and Administrative Committee.			
3. Request time, preferably during a Sunday morning service, to share the approved Yearly Meeting program with your church.			
4. Encourage your church to accept responsibility for contributing its designated "fair share" to enable us to continue the programs that we have agreed to do together, recognizing that these tasks are too large for any individual church.			
5. Be alert throughout the year to the activities of the Yearly Meeting and to the goals of your home church and serve as a continuing two-way channel of communication between these bodies.			
6. Encourage your home church to invite Yearly Meeting staff and members of Yearly Meeting boards and departments to the church, both to provide a service to the church and that your church may be better informed as to its relationship with the Yearly Meeting.			
7. Pray daily for the work of the Yearly Meeting.			
We believe the Representatives should be one of the major channels of communication between the Yearly Meeting and the local meeting and wish at this time to charge them with that responsibility and dedicate them to that purpose. They should constantly keep the Great Commission before the local meeting and encourage its full cooperation in fulfilling the Great Commission—"Doing Together What We Can't Do Separately."

■ 92. Richard Beebe received a communication from the Newberg church stating that they desire to purchase the Yearly Meeting offices for their use for expansion to the north of their existing structure. Donald Millage presented background information and reasons for this request.			

Frank Cole, president of the Board of Trustees, presented three suggestions for relocation—one would be a block from the college campus, one contiguous to the college on Villa Road, the other on property owned by North Valley Friends Church. Jack Willcuts also suggested possible uses for an enlarged office complex if relocation should occur.

Action on this proposal was delayed until the following day.

- 93. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday at 9:15 a.m.

- 94. Billy Britt led in prayer as the meeting convened.

- 95. The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

- 96. Jack Willcuts introduced Pastor Do Van Ngyen, who is working with Vietnamese refugees. He is assisting in the relocation of the "boat people." He expressed appreciation to Northwest Yearly Meeting for the sponsorship of his family and the people who came with him four years ago. With the help of the Lord and the "stepping stone" of Northwest Yearly Meeting, these refugees have made great strides in their rehabilitation.

Pastor Do just spent 48 days visiting refugee camps around the world, and his main concern as he shared with the people is that they are "sheep without a shepherd." They are now establishing a base in Portland to teach and train Vietnamese young people to go out and help their people.

Pastor Do requested help with sponsorship in bringing more Vietnamese to the United States so they may be given a "stepping stone" to a new life.

Ronald Woodward and Ralph Beebe expressed appreciation for Pastor Do and asked that we affirm and support his ministry.

Pastor Do requested prayer for them as they begin their missionary vision. They plan to send a missionary couple to Hong Kong after their convention at Reedwood Friends Church in September.

- 97. The Executive Council approved the following communication sent them from the Department of Social Concerns and presented it to the Yearly Meeting:

As Christ had compassion on the hungry in breaking bread for the 5,000, the Department of Social Concerns would like to express to Northwest Yearly Meeting our deep Christian compassion and concern for the thousands of Indo-Chinese who are being driven from their homes and are being forced to risk their lives at sea. Since American-sponsored families are again sorely needed, we would like to request the Executive Council to share our concern by:

1. endorsing our request to each Northwest Yearly Meeting church to consider sponsoring a refugee family, and
2. sharing this concern further by preparing a minute on behalf of Northwest Yearly Meeting that would request the executive bodies of each of the other yearly meetings in the Evangelical Friends Alliance to urge their churches to participate in a sponsorship program also.

Several spoke of the blessings received from sponsoring Vietnamese families.

The Department of Social Concerns will be sending information on sponsorship to the churches.

Approved.

- 98. Jack Willcuts introduced his son Stuart, director of Relief and Development for World Vision International in Latin America. Stuart shared concerns about the problem situation in Nicaragua following the recent revolution. World Vision, World Concern, and World Relief Commission are working

together to help with relief. A Christian agency, CEPD, with 36 evangelical groups involved, has been formed to help with reconstruction—a plan “to help the people help themselves.”

■ 100. The proposed sale of the Yearly Meeting headquarters to Newberg Friends Church for their expansion and the building of new headquarters offices was presented for further discussion.

After discussion the following recommendation from the Executive Council was approved:

Approve the sale of the Yearly Meeting headquarters wing to the Newberg Friends Church at an agreed-upon price, and that the Trustees proceed to look for a new location and investigate the cost of building with a minimum of 3,500 square feet. The Trustees are to report to the Executive Council for its consideration and approval.

■ 101. The George Fox College report given in the Thursday evening service was approved as follows:

The 1978-79 academic and fiscal year at George Fox College was one of growth. The College grew in enrollment, in its campus facilities with two new buildings, and in finances with a balanced budget and continued fiscal expansion. But most important, there was evidence of spiritual and academic growth. Such evidence is seen in the lives of the people who are the essence of George Fox College.

While we continue to marvel at the outpouring of resources with which God has blessed George Fox College, the most important of those resources is the people He has led here. The new facilities, attractive grounds, and fiscal stability are assets that testify to God's faithfulness. Yet God has worked through people—people committed in their stewardship to share in this endeavor. We have a good college because we have good people. Administrators, staff members, faculty, and students are confident this is the place the Lord has prepared for them at this time and are committed to doing His will.

It is people who make a college such as George Fox, and this report, while dealing with facts and figures and tangible assessments of growth, is a statement of their efforts and faithfulness. It also is a testimony of praise to our wonderful Lord for His superintendency over the entire enterprise. To Him is due the honor and glory. George Fox College is His work, and He has again proved himself faithful.

This 1978-79 report touches only the highlights of all that transpired in an exciting year. It is a report about your college—a college with a mission and activities about which we think you should know.

ACADEMIC:

George Fox College opened its 88th academic year with a record enrollment of 715 students, as it continues to be one of the Northwest's fastest growing colleges.

Enrollment has grown by 50 percent in the last five years. Each term continued at a record level of registration with the fall term full-time equivalent enrollment (based on 15 credit hours) at 683. For the first time in the College's history, the student credit hours for fall term, including the miniterm, passed the 10,000 level at 10,243. A total of 28,834 credit hours were taken in the three terms of 1978-79.

Who's coming to George Fox to make it grow so rapidly? An analysis by the registrar's office shows that 72 percent of the incoming freshmen students have a “B” average or above, 27 percent above a 3.5 level. Students come from 23 states, ranging from Florida to Alaska and New York to Hawaii. Five foreign countries were represented. Together, the four western states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California contributed 93 percent of the students with 71 percent of the student body coming from Oregon.

Although the College was founded and is still governed by the Friends Church (Northwest Yearly Meeting), more than 35 denominations were represented on campus. Quaker students composed 26 percent of the student body with 16 percent of the students Baptist and 11 percent members of the Evangelical Church of North America. Those three denominations accounted for just over half (53.7 percent) of all students.

The 1978-79 academic year began in mid-September with the annual fall faculty conference with Ted Ward, professor of curriculum research at the Institute for International Studies for the College of Education at Michigan State University, as the primary speaker. The conference was at the White Branch Campground in the Cascades of Oregon. Discussions, reports, and presentations by administrative leaders highlighted the sessions, with special emphasis on informal conversations and free time for sharing in the process of building community.

The fall miniterm, “Biblical Views of Creation,” was the opening academic program of the year. Primary speaker for the week was Dr. Richard Bube of Stanford University, editor of the *Journal of the American Scientific Affiliation*. George Fox professors and other off-campus lecturers also participated in this time of continuing to emphasize the integration of faith and learning.

Although classes started Oct. 5, the formal opening came Oct. 20 with the traditional convocation, this year featuring Dr. James M. Houston, president of Regent College, Vancouver, B.C. But the date also had special significance, for it marked the official completion of the new Milo C. Ross Center, a total renovation of the former Hester Gym, in a “recycling” to become the new home for the music and religion divisions. Board chairman Eugene Coffin, chaplain of the Garden Grove (Calif.) Community Church, participated in dedication ceremonies, along with former President Ross and his wife Alice.

In the areas of special programs the College's Independent Study Courses program had a major breakthrough with the addition of eight new courses and with the development and approval of an additional course to be used toward meeting the new certification requirements for Oregon teachers. More than 214 teachers enrolled in one or more courses, with the College servicing teachers from Oregon and Washington. The College now offers home study for teachers in science and language arts as well as mathematics.

The Field Education program (Kellogg Project) for experiential education continues to grow in both student and faculty internships. The objective of the program, begun three years ago with a \$125,000 grant, is to translate the theory of the classroom into practice, to develop knowledge and skills in the working community, to integrate relevant examples with the instructional program and establish professional rapport with segments of the business community. During the year over 200 students were enrolled in field experience situations, and the College now has over 100 cooperating agencies with whom students may be placed. As part of the program, six faculty members during the summer spent 5 to 10

weeks in business and industry learning how they operate so as to better relate their needs to the students.

This year marked the 21st for the College's successful Intensified Studies program, which allows accelerated learning for gifted youth, and 21 were participating in special seminars and in progress with original research and study. The Women's Studies program sponsored the fourth annual Women's Awareness Conference in April with the theme "Outlook for Women in the Eighties." The College's Continuing Education program again drew senior citizens to regular courses on a tuition-free basis, and in cooperation with Northwest Yearly Meeting sponsored the second Christian Education Conference, held in February. Nearly 400 persons attended, including participants from 36 churches. Guest speaker was Dr. Vernon Grounds, president of the Conservative Baptist Seminary, Denver, Colo. The Conference featured 36 workshops.

For the sixth year the College participated with some of the nation's leading evangelical Christian colleges in the Christian College Consortium, with emphasis on the integration of faith, learning and living and upon cooperative endeavors. Six George Fox students attended a term on other campuses during the year, and the College hosted two students from other consortium schools. Two George Fox students enrolled in the Christian College Consortium's Washington, D.C., fall study term.

Dedicated Christian professors, of course, are the heart of the George Fox educational experience. The faculty this year included 35 full-time professors and 36 persons on a part-time basis. Sixty percent of the full-time faculty have earned doctorates. These committed, competent, and caring persons are involved in a wide range of professional activity in addition to their classroom teaching. They have participated in professional associations, written articles and reports, collected data in research, conducted workshops in their areas and won awards for their activities—all of this in addition to the George Fox emphasis on classroom teaching.

The average class size during the year was 24.8 and the faculty/student ratio was 1 to 16 with a goal of 1 to 20. It is important to keep in mind that our primary goal is for a college of quality and significance and the ratio goal is a secondary goal, reflecting stewardship and good management.

The 88th academic year closed June 2 with commencement ceremonies featuring former White House aide Jeb Stuart Magruder, now on leave from Young Life to study toward a divinity degree at Princeton Theological Seminary. Baccalaureate services featured Norval Hadley, superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting since 1971, who left the same day as his speech for his new post as Director of Church Relations for World Vision International. Magruder addressed the 122 graduates on the topic "The World in Crisis: A Christian Response," and Hadley spoke on "What in the World Is God Doing?"

The College's retreat and conference center, Tilikum, completed its fourth year as a special ministry of the College. During the school year nearly 300 George Fox students took part in 11 retreats ranging from minority students to engaged couples. Students also use the 75-acre center for quiet times and for classes in physical education and Christian camping. In May Tilikum was notified of its selection for one of the top honors available in Christian camping, the "Excelling" designation by Christian Camping International. Tilikum is the first West Coast and second center west of the Mississippi to receive the award.

In April the College became the first in Oregon to receive approval by the Oregon Teachers Standards and Practices Commission.

STUDENT LIFE:

The integration of faith and learning and living is what a Christian higher education provides and, at George Fox College, while the learning comes under the

academic area for this report, the faith and living are considered in the student life area. It's a broad sweep of activities, ranging from career planning and financial aid to living situations and health care. It also concerns religious life, athletics, the wide scope of student activities and, in essence, anything outside of the classroom itself.

Participation may be the key word in describing the students. They are involved in music, drama, sports, publications, deputation, Bible study and in projects to help others.

More than 250 students during the year were involved in deputation teams throughout the Northwest, traveling in small groups, sometimes at their own expense, to minister to churches. Students work through the chaplain's office and are briefed first in proper protocol, timing, and programming and possible problems. Students ministered in local rest homes and to nearby elderly, taught Sunday school classes and tutored special students. Students also reached out through the music group "Dayspring," and the drama troupe, "Inter-Mission."

Students were involved in 12 discipleship groups on campus and in 17 Bible study, prayer and sharing groups organized in living units. As a result of Missions Week students raised more than \$1,000 to help send 10 students on summer missionary assignments around the world.

Although the entire intent is to help others and show Christ's love, the students also gained considerable attention for their giving away of more than \$5,000, representing a 10 percent tithe of their total student government budget. They helped a brain-damaged Newberg child who needed special treatment in Philadelphia, assisted a minority family in Portland that had undergone a series of unfortunate incidents, assisted the fund drive to improve the Newberg Community Hospital, gave to Voice of Calvary for its work in Jackson, Miss., to the Sports Ambassadors Program and to OMS International for help with a youth center in Spain.

Students also showed their care and concern for their fellowman in contributing 425 pints of blood during the year, a new campus record. Since donation drives started 11 years ago students now have contributed 2,488 pints of blood to the American Red Cross program.

Several significant conferences had a religious theme during the year. Spiritual Life Week in October featured Dr. Robert Hess, formerly of Malone College. These evangelistic sessions did much to set the spiritual tone for the school year. The Missions Conference in January featured Bud Schaeffer, associate director of Sports Ambassadors, and 18 missionary representatives. The Staley Lecture series featured Dr. William Pannell of Fuller Theological Seminary as the spring Deeper Life Week speaker.

The religious life of the campus must never be taken for granted. It is not an additive to the curriculum but must be, and is, thoroughly integrated, providing a perspective and a point of reference to the entire learning and living enterprise.

In music and drama students brought inspiration and entertainment through a series of major events and small recitals. Fall term the 160-voice oratorio choir sang Vivaldi's *Gloria* accompanied by a community orchestra. The fall music theater production was *My Fair Lady* and the spring production was *A Simple Gift*, an original work by alumnus Tim Minikel. Theater productions included a night of one-act plays, a children's theater production of *Alice in Wonderland* and a performance of *The Night Thoreau Spent in Jail*. All of this was in addition to the regular performances by the 70-piece band, 54-voice choir, and the 25-piece orchestra.

Athletically, the Bruins gained prominence as the men's track team became the first independent school squad in more than 25 years to win the NAIA District 2 title—by an overwhelming margin. And the track women won their conference

title. The men's basketball squad, for only the second time in nine years, failed to make the district playoffs, but the women improved on their previous season record.

On the administrative level, the Career Planning and Placement Center continues to counsel and work with current students and alumni and drew 40 to a "System for Identifying Motivated Abilities" (SIMA) workshop on campus. The financial aid program of the College continues to expand its base and during the year distributed, from all sources, more than \$1 million in financial aid.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE:

Yesterday's dreams are becoming today's realities under God's direction as George Fox College continues its rapid physical growth. During the 1978-79 fiscal year the College completed two new buildings and began work on two other projects. The campus changes have been markedly evident with the College beginning its eighth building project in three years. The total investment will have been more than \$6.5 million, with all projects (except revenue-producing residence halls), by college policy, paid for in advance through gifts and donations.

Opened in October was the Milo C. Ross Center, the new home for the music and religion divisions. This \$1.5 million project renovated the former Hester Gymnasium and its 1½ floors and 18,000 square feet to a new complex of 24,000 square feet on 2½ floors. The center contains faculty offices, classrooms, practice rooms, rehearsal halls, specialty labs and music libraries. It is the first phase of a two-phase project that also is to include a new \$2.5 million chapel/auditorium. Fund raising for this portion began in January with construction to start as soon as funds are obtained.

In January the College opened the new Television Center. The 1½-story building, funded through a grant from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust, contains 2,700 square feet and houses the College's new project to begin marketing nationwide educational videotape cassettes for playback on home television screens. The first project was completed in the fiscal year.

In October work started on a new athletic field complex to include a baseball field, hockey field, two softball diamonds and an archery range. The 10-acre site is located northeast of the main campus and required the removal and relocation of five homes. Work continued through the year, with first use of the complex expected in the 1979-80 school year.

In January construction started on an expansion of Heacock Commons. The project, costing \$520,000, adds 7,500 square feet to the building, including a larger main eating area, new student lounge, dining room, snack bar/coffee shop, and conversation areas. Seating capacity increases from 300 to 500 and the project reorients the building toward the new campus quad. First use of the expanded facility will be in the 1979-80 year.

Other changes in the campus included the removal of Fine Arts I and II structures, moved to the campus in 1948. That opened the way for the expansion of the dining commons and considerably improved the modern appearance of the central campus. The Alumni Lounge in Minthorn Hall was refurbished in a \$7,500 project through an alumni gift, and the west facade of the Herbert Hoover Building was decorated with the placement of a large bronze profile sculpture of the former President, designed by a student and sculpted by a professor.

The College during the year also was given a \$100,000 organ (with construction now underway for the new chapel by Milo and Alice Ross; an \$18,000 piano by a Newberg businessman, and received several major grants, including a \$110,000 grant from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust in Vancouver, Wash.

In January the Development Department launched the United Chapel Appeal, a campaign within Northwest Yearly Meeting to raise \$400,000 as the

start of the total \$2.5 million project for the new chapel/auditorium. The campaign is expected to continue into the 1980 year.

And the Newberg community set a record level of giving to its Student Help Investment Program (Project SHIP) as businesses and corporations gave \$27,960 to the drive. All funds are used for student employment opportunities on and off campus.

The physical growth at George Fox College is easy to depict and see. It's not as easy, however, to illustrate the growth in quality. But we believe the improvements in facilities merely mirror the improved quality of our academic program and the overall position of the College and its program.

While the new building has been evident, it has not been at the expense of current (or general) fund operations. The College again, for the eighth consecutive year, operated soundly in the black. Assets of the College climbed by more than \$4 million to nearly \$20 million during the fiscal year, with a fund balance of nearly \$14 million.

CHURCH/COLLEGE RELATIONSHIP:

Through the years George Fox College has maintained a close relationship with Northwest Yearly Meeting. I have now been at George Fox College for 12 years and many good things have occurred in that time to bring an even closer bond between the church and its college: the Yearly Meeting superintendent and the College president are now both ex officio members of the College board and the Yearly Meeting executive council, encouraging direct communication; the Yearly Meeting has for several years placed a \$10,000 contribution to the College as a line item in the budget; the College has sponsored pastors' short courses and during the last year, with the Yearly Meeting, sponsored the second successful Christian Education Conference. Mutual efforts also have been undertaken in the identification and cultivation of potential pastors; special visitation programs have been conducted and recruitment of Friends students has the highest priority.

And this year we took a new step together in the United Chapel Appeal as the Yearly Meeting churches and the College began cooperating in a broad plan to build a new chapel/auditorium on campus, one to serve the College and its church. It is a challenging goal, some \$400,000 to be raised, but a project we believe has benefits more than just a building—it brings the College and Northwest Yearly Meeting even closer together.

Still, there is always more that can be done together, and this should be our mutual goal.

SUMMARY:

There is much more, of course, that could be said about the 1978-79 year. As I share this report with you, I am convinced that George Fox College is indeed alive and well—it does more than merely exist. As we look now to the decade ahead, this institutional life can be maintained only if we take seriously the *Word* of God as our foundation, the *work* of God as our obligation, and the *will* of God as our direction.

I am constantly challenged by the task that has been set before me as president of our College. It is both exciting and frustrating. At times I feel like a small boy walking a picket fence, thrilled to death but in danger of being impaled at any moment! George Fox College is a commitment made generations ago by pioneers seeking Christian higher education for youth. It is still our commitment, and as we look to the future we count upon your continued commitment and support. Together we will experience the joy of serving our Lord.

- 102. The statistical report was approved and will appear in the Appendix.
- 103. The following resolutions were presented from the Department of Peace Testimony.

Resolved, that Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends reaffirm its support of the "peace academy" legislation now being considered in Congress.

A great deal of money and effort are expended to train U.S. personnel in the techniques of defending our country militarily. Virtually nothing is being done with public funding to encourage creative thinking toward resolving international conflicts with nonviolent methods. Some universities and colleges have "peace studies" programs, but there is no federal institution parallel to the military academies.

Last year Congress passed legislation authorizing a commission to study various proposals for a national institution to provide training and coordinate research in nonviolent conflict resolution. This week Congress appropriated funds for this study commission. For the concept to become reality, Congress must go ahead with the authorization and appropriations for the institution itself.

Resolved, that Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends express its opposition to reactivating any form of the draft, registration, or Selective Service classification.

A strong effort has been made in Congress in recent months to restore conscription for military service. Friends have historically encouraged their members to abstain from participating in military service and have sought to provide a witness against war as a means of solving international problems. Conscription, especially in peacetime, is not necessary and involves needless expense. Since registration would only be undertaken in order to facilitate the draft, Friends should urge opposition to all such proposals.

Resolved, that Northwest Yearly Meeting reaffirm its support of legislation that would establish a "World Peace Tax Fund."

Bills have been introduced in both the U.S. House and Senate to allow conscientious objectors to designate a portion of their taxes for a "World Peace Tax Fund." These funds would correspond to the portion of federal income taxes used for military purposes. To qualify, one would be required to satisfy the criteria established in the law and in the courts for conscientious objector status. Presumably, this option would be available for women, even though they have not been required to identify themselves as C.O.'s to avoid military service. Since the legislation has not been given much support in Congress, Friends would do well to call it to the attention of their senators and representatives.

Approved.

- 104. The Discipline Revision Committee presented on behalf of the Stewardship Board the following addition to paragraph 3.a. on page 54 of the *Constitution and Discipline*. After "department of ministers' aid" insert this: The board appoints also one person, not necessarily a member, to serve for a two-year term on the Northwest Yearly Meeting Pension Board, and one of its members to the Ministers' Retirement Fund.

Approved as first reading.

- 105. The Epistle Committee submitted the following summary of epistles received:

There were 36 epistles received, 12 of which were from foreign countries.

Friends from *Germany Yearly Meeting* wrote: The fate of the early Friends, their unconditional submission to the guidance of God, confronted us with the question as to whether we are worthy of guarding and carrying forward such an inheritance in our time.

London Yearly Meeting: We have been aware of you all the while meeting here at Lancaster as a great family of well over a thousand Friends.

Swedish-Finnish Yearly Meeting: Some Friends have during the year given time, strength, and resources to work for Assyrian refugees, among whom a number are threatened with expulsion to Turkey, where they are subject to persecution.

New Zealand Yearly Meeting: We have been reminded that the journey outward commences with an inward one. We have turned again to the Bible; we must not hide our light under a bushel, but let light and warmth flow from us.

East Africa Yearly Meeting: East Africa Yearly Meeting was held at Lirhanda Monthly Meeting, one of the first five mission stations in Kenya where Friends work was started at the beginning of the century.

IN AMERICA:

Kansas Yearly Meeting: One of the concerns this year involved changing our name from "Kansas Yearly Meeting of Friends" to "Mid-America Yearly Meeting of Friends." The change was made since we have churches in Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, and Missouri, as well as Kansas.

California Yearly Meeting: Our guest speaker, Mark Lee, challenged us to increase our faith through a knowledge of Jesus Christ, to live the abundant Christian life through the setting of measurable goals. He enlightened us as to our role as yokefellows with our Lord and how, as Christians, we were not intended to live lives of mediocrity but supernatural lives.

Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting: Our Yearly Meeting speaker, Gerald Dillon, has clarified for us the role and responsibility of the church and has challenged us to concentrate on the mission that has been assigned by Jesus Christ to His believers.

Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region: Missionary executive, Robert Hess, in a message described three characteristics of early Quakers. They were sensitive to God's voice and to the needs of others about them . . . they were obedient in that they immediately went into missions . . . and their sharing was daring in quality.

Approved.

- 106. The Epistle Committee submitted the following epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings:

Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its eighty-seventh annual session July 27-August 3, 1979, on the George Fox College campus in Newberg, Oregon.

Richard Beebe, clerk, read the opening minute: May we allow the call to be "Friends—a Spirit-Moved People" to become a central core of our lives in obedience to God as we reach out in the love of Christ during these days of unparalleled opportunity.

In his keynote message our newly appointed general superintendent, Jack Willcuts, declared: Paul spelled out to the church at Thessalonica their primary purpose: "Do not put out the Spirit's fire." (1 Thessalonians 5:19 NIV) We are more familiar with the King James brief wording, "Quench not the Spirit."

Is it possible, he continued, that we are approaching another "burning bush" today? If so, we do well to remove our shoes, reverently and quietly waiting in God's presence to find out how the Spirit will move. To be Spirit-filled is a happy privilege; to be Spirit-motivated is a stirring experience; to be Spirit-moved, all together as a people, that is really impressive and frightening! To describe ourselves in the biblical definition is both humbling and audacious. Surely one inescapable implication of this theme is to set it apart from a mere

slogan like some kind of religious commercial line. To be a Spirit-moved people brings us back to the very core of our faith, to the source of our being, to our purpose for life. It is rooted in our deepest foundations of belief, and it then lifts us up on the wings of power and praise. Can we contemplate a more awesome possibility? "Do not put out the Spirit's fire"!

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends goes forward trusting in the promise of Jeremiah 29:11 (NIV):

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen."

Our guest speaker, Billy Britt, executive secretary of North Carolina Yearly Meeting, urged us to consecrate to God all that we know about ourselves and to become Christian Quakers on fire for the Lord. Inspiring messages firmly grounded in the Scriptures awakened us anew to exciting possibilities if our lives, our homes, and our meetings are filled with the empowering love of the Holy Spirit. We would become Friends—a Spirit-moved people. Walter P. Lee, former pastor among Friends, challenged his listeners at the eight o'clock morning devotions. His themes included the creation of man, his fall, his restoration through the death of the second Adam, Christ Jesus, and the Holy Spirit, who cleanses and fills the heart. There was a tender, blessed sense of love and burdens for others as prayer requests were shared.

This year our missionary work in Bolivia and Peru has been strengthened—in the lives of the nationals as they met together in worship and study. There were 21 who pursued their studies in the pastoral ministry through the Patmos Bible School; 100 students were enrolled in the Theological Education by Extension courses, and 23 completed the courses. This type of study is desperately needed, since in many rural areas the brethren cannot leave their homes to come to a resident Bible school.

The theme for the Women's Missionary Union banquet was "Faith Cometh by Hearing." Louise George, missionary who had just returned from Peru, brought greetings, telling of God's blessing on the work. Nancy Thomas, who had just arrived from Bolivia, gave nine suggestions that helped her in the study of the Aymara language.

There were 366 in attendance, and the offering was over \$1,400. This is to be used to pay for further study in the Aymara language. This group of WMU women had the privilege of raising over \$14,000 this year for the promulgation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. There were 210 at the men's dinner and their offering was \$800.08 given for Friends missionary literature.

High school and junior age groups met during Yearly Meeting. Swimming, skating, and enjoying a day at the beach filled some of the days. At the youth banquet vocalist, Pam Mark Hall, challenged the group to seek more than shallow pretensions of faith. In the various classes the young people wrestled with the difficult issues of Christian simplicity and servanthood. They searched the Scriptures to gain a better perspective of God's direction regarding their social lives, personal devotion, and worship.

George Fox College in Newberg, Oregon, is growing. The new buildings, both completed and under construction, the increasing number of students, the enlarged faculty and expanded curricula, and the academic standing in the Northwest attest to this fact. The growing vitality of Christian spiritual experience is evident. The Lord is giving a distinct ministry in Christian education to George Fox College.

To God be the glory, great things He hath done.

The department requests permission to fill either of these positions with other persons if the two named cannot serve, since they have not been contacted.

The heart of the early Friends movement was their spiritual depth. God's measure of an individual (or a church) is how obedient they are to the light they have been given.

TUESDAY

God created man in His image, giving him a spirit that distinguishes man from all other creation. God had a perfect plan for man, but man failed. Christ was the perfect man *again* (the second Adam), and He didn't fail the test.

A lack of real repentance (a *complete* change) is the cause for shallow Christians. Without the death of self on the cross, there is no resurrection. Early Quakers believed in the crucifixion of the old man. George Fox said, "Therefore keep in the daily cross the power of God by which ye may witness all to be crucified which is contrary to the will of God, and which will not come into His kingdom."

We must get past the respectable mediocrity if we are to have a deeper life with Christ.

THURSDAY

"A Hunger and a Thirst for God" Psalm 63:1-8

Early Quakers had the hunger and thirst for God spoken of in these verses. We take on the characteristics of the objects where we place our attention—our attention needs to be focused on God so we might be more like Him.

Ephesians 4:13 ". . . unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." This is God's desire for us. Seeking God and Him only is the key!

FRIDAY

"The Essential Evidence of the Spirit-filled Life" Romans 8:1-17

The experience relative to the infilling of the Holy Spirit cannot be used as evidence because there are many different experiences. Even Satan, the prince of the power of the air, performs miracles that are real.

Essential evidences necessary to the Spirit-filled life are (1) purity of heart; (2) increasing discernment; (3) unity of spirit (Ephesians 4:1-3); (4) an increasing love of God's Word and increasing knowledge of God; (5) resistance to conformity to the world—its philosophy and life-style; (6) witnessing by our life and our words; and (7) the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22).

These evidences were the things man lost in the fall and are needed for the restoration of man to his original state.

3. Working with the youth—over 70 percent of the Bolivian population is less than 30 years old.

Total cash and pledges received in the offering today—\$10,214.87.
