CHERICE BOCK is in her third year of studies at Princeton Theological Seminary. A graduate of George Fox University, Cherice has served as the Peace Education Coordinator for Northwest Yearly Meeting and as a ministry intern at North Valley Friends Church, where she is a member. She is editor of several books including *The Historical Dictionary of the Friends (Quakers)*; *Walk Worthy of Your Calling: Quakers and the Traveling Ministry*; and *A Certain Kind of Perfection: An Anthology of Evangelical and Liberal Quaker Writers*. JIM LE SHANA is the senior pastor at Rose Drive Friends Church in Yorba Linda, California and an adjunct professor at the Haggard Graduate School of Theology at Azusa Pacific University.
