MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1981

■ 1. Richard Beebe, Yearly Meeting clerk, read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 89th session July 27, 1981, 10:00 a.m., on the George Fox College campus embracing the theme "There is . . . a great people to be gathered." (George Fox, Pendle Hill)

Joseph Gilmore led in congregational singing.

■ 2. Richard Beebe introduced our Yearly Meeting superintendent, Jack Willcuts. A time of silent meditation followed before the keynote address was given.

■ 3. Jack Willcuts gave the keynote address, which follows in condensed form:

KEYNOTE MESSAGE

The prayer and poetry of Psalm 146 express my feelings today.

Praise! Praise . . . for a loving, caring, growing, committed Christian community we call Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Praise . . . for the faithful pastors, elders, Sunday school teachers and Bible study leaders, for those who love and nurture our children in the Lord, who energetically encourage young people and newer Christians in the faith.

Praise . . . for those who plan for the comfort and fulfillment of the elderly.

Praise . . . for those who give themselves to provide Christian education and schooling in a Christian context.

Praise to the Lord for . . . those interested and gifted in raising money, instructing us all in stewardship so others who are called may be missionaries and Christian servants, care for the refugees, the disadvantaged minorities, the hungry, the imprisoned.

Praise the Lord for a vision of excellence in our many ministries in Christian camping, in publications, in pastoring and planning. Praise the Lord for a Spirit-led perspective on the specific teachings of Jesus about peace, power, and patient obedience when the world flounders and falls, for "greater is he that is in you"—the Presence in the Midst—"than he that is in the world."

Praise the Lord . . . for a vision from the Lord of "a great people to be gathered."

* * * * *

It is easier to get through an exercise like this one if some ground rules are set. We all respond better to speakers who agree with us. There is a plea for a prophetic message, but prophets in former days were not very popular. *Real* prophets are often persecuted in one way or another. We are also accustomed to switching channels if the program doesn't suit us. With this all at the back of my mind, I come cautiously to the presentation of what we call a "Keynote Address."

Quakers have borrowed many practices, perhaps more of them than we have loaned out to others—especially in recent years. But the "keynoter" role has been taken lock-stock-and-barrel (to use an unquakerly metaphor) from the political conventions. Out of curiosity I checked back in the Yearly Meeting *Minutes* to find out when we started using "keynote" openings, and it coincides with a presidential election year—for the Southern Baptist Convention and the National Association of Evangelicals! What is meant by keynote speaking? Musicians know the keynote is the lowest note on the scale—while Webster insists keynote *speakers* are expected to express "the basic idea or ruling principle" or "set forth the main line of policy" for an organization.

This implies that what should be said here, to a church denomination, ought to be mostly theological and philosophical. But keynote speeches are expected to be mostly rousing, also entertaining and whip up enthusiasm for "ruling principles" and "mainline policies." We would all probably deny that that is what we expect at a Friends Yearly Meeting since we aren't electing any candidates and our church doesn't even believe in bishops or in whip-cracking authorities. There sticks in my mind two confusing comments from my visits among the churches. "All he did was preach," one person was overheard to say, "we wanted to hear what's going on in the Yearly Meeting." At another church the reaction was "All he did was talk about the Yearly Meeting; we wanted to hear him preach." Today I will attempt a little of both, with the hope as well that something said may be prophetic, however unpopular.

Some of what was said here a year ago and later printed in the Yearly Meeting *Minutes* I want to refer to in a moment. It's a little hard to do a keynote series of sermons with only one message a year, but I am bold in using concerns given last year as a springboard for others this year. Truth, priorities, and directions do not change that much, or shouldn't.

"The heart of our theology is that God is and that He is like Jesus Christ," I said last year. I want to expand that a little more. You see, the Christlikeness of God makes all the difference. God could exist and not be like Christ. He could be vindictive, cruel, impersonal . . . and those who don't know about Jesus always assume God is terrible. The animistic Aymaras assume this. The Islamic kind of god is frightening. But Christ said, "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father." So our Christ-centeredness is not something drummed up, a dogged doctrine, or drab religion; it is the very heart of the whole Christian enterprise. Historically, Quakers have been among the most Christ-centered of all Christians. We don't depend on outward ordinances, creeds, hierarchical structures, or other visible props.

Returning to the basic but changeless ideas shaping our faith as Friends: We believe that Truth will prosper and therefore must be published. We believe we are called to do God's work. We have a vision of a Friends Church and all its members speaking the Truth and helping others to stand by the Truth, unafraid of the consequences.

A part of our vision now is a renewed prayerful, vigorous, wise conforming to the specific teaching of Jesus. We are living testimonies of belief and Christian behavior in the world. Our vision is of a Friends Church with all its members well-grounded in our history and in our practices, well-educated in the Bible, so that we can hold our leadings up to the light of Scripture. Our vision is of all our meetings for worship being meetings where God is powerfully present, where His Spirit brings us into unity, where through corporate worship and the ministry arising out of it we are strengthened in our convictions. We have a vision of a church that can attract and call a new generation of leaders to raise consistently the standard of righteousness.

These are keynote convictions. These remain the same "mainline policy" of our denomination. And they stand out in stark contrast to the melancholy description of American society given in a *Time* magazine feature a few weeks ago. It is a quote from Christopher Lasch in his book *The Culture of Narcissism*:

To live for the moment is the prevailing passion—to live for yourself, not for your predecessor or posterity. We are fast losing the sense of historical continuity, the sense of belonging to a succession of generations originating in the past and stretching into the future. It is the waning of the sense of historical time—in particular the erosion of any strong concern for the future—that distinguishes the spiritual crisis of today.

Christ is our Bishop as well as our High Priest; the Spirit is our guide in planning business, decision making, and as a Yearly Meeting. Our effectiveness as a church depends upon this total sensitivity and obedience to the Spirit. These are our core convictions regarding the Word of God, the meaning of ministry and worship, of stewardship and mission, sacramental living and peace, of outreach and membership. If we are rooted only in shallow spirituality and fellowship with little devotional depth or have undisciplined living, our convictions become indistinct and fuzzy. A fruitful sense of responsibility and usefulness springs from a right relationship with God and others, especially ourselves. This is not said judgmentally but is rather as a plea for conviction, commitment, and consistency.

This, then, Friends, is our "basic idea and ruling principle."

A Guided Tour into the Eighties

Let us be ready for action like the Christians in the book of Acts, but not leap too soon or haphazardly. We need a guided tour of the eighties, equipped with the compass, life jackets, and other paraphernalia listed by Paul for fighting the good fight of faith. But while there are many religious travel agents around with a plethora of colorful suggestions competing for our attention and giving, there are few really reliable prophets to point the right direction into the 1980s and beyond.

Each year the combined efforts of Northwest Yearly Meeting seem to be more intensified and diversified. It is worth the time to pull over for a moment in this hurried documentary, using this viewpoint turnout to gaze at some rather amazing ways the Lord is at work among us. We risk missing some extraordinary blessings sometimes overlooked or taken for granted.

The order in this listing is not prioritized at all but should start in acknowledging the splendid staff serving in the Yearly Meeting office: Quentin Nordyke, Beth Bagley, Beatrice Goldsmith and her assistant, Ruth Haldy, and Ralph Chapman.

Eldon Helm turned a half-time job into nearly a full-time one on a quarter-time salary as financial secretary. The 77-page book (manual) he prepared for the use of each local church stewardship committee will be a gold mine of helps

and ideas and continue to draw interest till the year 2000. We will greatly miss Eldon and Virginia, who move this month to Richmond, Indiana, where he will join the administrative staff of Friends United Meeting.

Jim Settle continued as Friends Youth secretary while serving as director of admissions at George Fox College. Working with him next year as a Friends Youth field secretary will be Gayle Beebe, a 1981 graduate of George Fox.

On a quiet day in the Yearly Meeting office one can hear The Barclay Press pouring out pages and pages of published truth. Dick Eichenberger as the manager and his staff complement our work in total congeniality.

A Report of the Past Year

In reviewing the past year, one is impressed that some things are exciting because they are new, others because they are not. How does one describe so many pleasant hours spent with individual pastors and ministerial students? A few noteworthy innovations begun during the year: Northwest Friends "Vision," a four-page two-color paper carrying news, announcements, some concerns, and other stories now also reaches the Northwest mailing list of the *Evangelical Friend*. It is designed to draw us closer together in the Northwest, providing information and news impossible to handle in the *Evangelical Friend*.

The big news is that the Great Commission Budget reached an unprecedented total of \$460,068, going \$68 over the top! Do you remember that last year at this time we had to report a shortage of more than \$30,000? This year's good report is really monumental news, and we thank the Lord for all who made this possible, especially the churches that more than met their pledge commitments. Of particular satisfaction is the belief that this increase resulted not from some fancy fund-raising scheme but from systematic giving and genuine concern and a sense of responsible stewardship on the part of so many.

Linked with this good news in giving is the launching of a new "fair share" plan introduced for the first time. You will be hearing more about it, and may remember the explanations made in each local church. The concept is simply setting aside an established proportion of the total nondesignated giving of each church. This becomes each congregation's commitment to the Great Commission Budget rather than a dollar pledge. This proportion of the local giving is sent in each month just as the pastor's salary and other obligations are paid. This is bound to place our missions and other ministries on a more consistent basis than before. Making this a church custom like individual storehouse tithing will result in great blessing as well as greater resources for outreach. Like ships large and small side by side in the ocean tides, each church, the Yearly Meeting and its departmental ministries will rise or recede together as the local giving fluctuates. So the statistic to pray about now is the Spirit-guided percentage of the income to be committed by each church to outreach through the Yearly Meeting. This will replace emotional appeals or impulsive giving. Rather than giving what is left over to missions, proportionate giving becomes the keynote principle in stewardship.

Some new records were set this year. The total attendance in Sunday morning worship across the Yearly Meeting increased from 6,414 to 6,770—a 5 percent gain—and total Yearly Meeting membership from 8,440 to 8,465; eight individual churches report more than a 25 percent gain, eight churches over 10 percent. As a matter of interest, a few of the pastors and clerks where significant gains were experienced this year were asked if it might have made any difference if a growth goal of 25 percent or 40 percent had been set, since these particular churches nearly reached these increases. In each case the response was that the growth came about not because of a church growth campaign but

through a number of combining factors under the Lord's blessing. One might wonder if goals had been set if the increase might have been even more—but the conclusion seems to be that neither Yearly Meeting nor local church exclusive numerical growth goals seem to provide a great deal of motivation or momentum. But careful attention to all the proven components or practices that build morale, harmony, evangelistic and discipling efforts, Bible preaching and teaching, strong enthusiastic fellowship groups, ministry to the family and all ages—when these are in balance, growth is inevitable. Balance, then, and attention to day-by-day faithfulness and a loving fellowship are the greatest attractions to Christ and the church. Pastors do not have to be super celebrities nor use personality-plus to be effective. The consistent pattern of growth actually happening in increased attendance, membership, and giving is not the only way to measure effectiveness, but when more than a dozen churches find multiple services necessary to handle increased attendance and 14 churches are in various stages of building expansion, it is encouraging.

Cascade Friends Church began at Bend, Oregon, and now has their first full-time pastor, Jim Leonard. Other "firsts" this year were the full-scale development of Sunny Ridge Manor in Nampa, Idaho; George Fox College's largest graduating class of 109 members; the largest Friends Men Conference registration (more than 200 at Twin Rocks), and two successful Women's Missionary Union fall retreats, at Twin Rocks and at Quaker Hill. They will unite again next September 17-20 for a conference at Walla Walla, Washington. While I haven't been asked about this, I have a suggestion for a fresh new name for the Women's Missionary Union that might appeal to those new to our Yearly Meeting and some older ones too—Friends Women International. Of course, a rose by any other name smells just as fragrant, so a name change is probably only a cosmetic recommendation.

A second Korean church began this year under Pastor Kim's leadership, meeting now in First Friends Church in Vancouver.

There were 10 pastoral changes during or at the end of this pastoral year. Two churches discontinued at the close of the year: Lents Friends in Portland and Parkview in Tacoma.

The open door for fruitful ministry through the Piedmont church is a great opportunity for the Yearly Meeting. The leadership of Aaron Hamlin and the team of concerned individuals committed to that work is one of our most exciting challenges. Rather than counting numbers in this situation, it is important to patiently, quietly, but with trust and love, reach out in this community with the Gospel of salvation and hope. The response of so many churches and individuals to the financial needs of this program is very encouraging. More changes will take place in the coming year as the Hamlins and staff, along with a carefully selected advisory committee, give their best efforts to building the foundations laid for a ministry in this inner-city situation.

The best way for us all to be a part of this mission is to pray faithfully, follow the regular reports of progress coming to you, and to be sensitive to the Spirit in financial support. With so few examples in the evangelical church of genuine interracial churches, new organizational patterns and leadership styles must be developed. We must be cautious in making human rather than Spirit-led expectations of what the future Piedmont Friends Church will be like—these factors all make this work a delicate and demanding challenge. But already more has been accomplished than many realize in the midst of overwhelming pressures and needs. We are humbled that God has entrusted to Friends this open door and has given a vision of the possibilities along with the very best leadership possible in its implementation. This is a sacred stewardship of responsibility.

Friends in South America

Other reports have and will be made of our mission work in South America. Our 21-day visit to these fields last February and March was profoundly encouraging. The Quaker character distinctives of the Bolivian church and many of its leaders, the maturity of seasoned judgment, the dedication to evangelism and church extension, the emergence of younger second-generation Christians with enlarged vision of the church, the evident quality of missionary efforts and the priorities they keep constantly before them—these are general impressions that confirm the worthwhileness of our missionary programs.

So much of our missionary emphasis in the U.S. now springs from emotional appeals or residual guilt felt by many Christians in America who are uncomfortable with affluence in a shallow society. There is much misinformation about what missions are accomplishing or are trying to do.

To have as a Yearly Meeting an established church, led and administered by trustworthy, proven national Christians with a vision for outreach provides us with an almost incomparable opportunity to join now in partnership with our own missionaries, where the best abilities of both can blend effectively. The growing edges for pioneer church planting in Peru and Bolivia, advanced education for growing Christians, well-designed discipling programs for new Christians—these can really happen and are taking place. Some of these activities and maturing church efforts differ from a one-dimension jungle penetration, a radio ministry, a Bible translation work, relief program, or other specialized missions promoted in media appeals or by missionaries requesting presentations in our churches. Almost all of these are worthwhile, too, and are being used of God today, but we need to know that many of these and other kinds of ministries are taking place with great success and effect where our own missionaries are working hand in hand with indigenous Christian leaders.

Let us be discerning in our support, faithful in our praying, loyal in our cooperation with our Yearly Meeting Department of Missions and our missionaries, who are doing so well. Please do not misunderstand, this is not to discourage or downgrade those of us who have children, friends, or loved ones serving with other mission agencies or boards . . . but rather to urge us to maintain a sense of primary responsibility to what God has given our Yearly Meeting in the incomparable opportunities in foreign missions today.

We always watch for numerical membership measurements too, of course, and we are encouraged that the one device used each year to determine growth—attendance at the Yearly Meetings (*Junta Anual*)—shows an increase. The largest attendance in recent years, perhaps ever, in the Peruvian *Junta Anual* and the division of annual sessions into different areas of Bolivia to better care for the crowds and reach more people are good indicators of a healthy, growing church. Wouldn't it be fine if we had a similar problem, requiring us to depend more and more on area gatherings if neither our facilities nor travel costs would warrant trying to get everyone who wants to to come here to Yearly Meeting?

Looking Ahead

Now I come to some concerns for the future. The time taken to update us on the past and present developments of the Yearly Meeting helps in giving perspective for what we do next.

It has been my privilege to have nearly 40 years of continuous service in this Yearly Meeting. I became a student pastor of a church in my junior year at George Fox (then Pacific) College in 1942. One of the extraordinary blessings of my life is that of the existence of those who believed in me and encouraged me. For many years I have been conscious of a redemptive fellowship of men and women, both older and younger, who have tried patiently to make practical

application of the ideas, ideals, and Quaker vision of the Gosepl truth as the main substance of our ministry. Our church has never been held together by a personality; we all see clearly that mere individual effort will never make the difference that is required. It is as we unify our scattered efforts, in trust, loyalty, and love for one another, with a sense of calling and destiny as a Friends denomination that measures itself not by itself or by others but in terms of our obedience to the Lord.

The crisis in our civilization is real. Mild religion is almost worthless. We must establish a set of convictions in the hope of influencing not only our own time for future generations as they have influenced us. My great concern is for the continuation of a special kind of spiritual leadership by Friends who care and who are informed, and which only the Holy Spirit can provide. Northwest Yearly Meeting has never blindly followed a set of sure-fire-for-success steps, a formula that apparently appeals to many groups larger than our own. We are to wait on the Lord until there comes the sense of harmony, trust, and submission to the Spirit and one another. This is not to say there is no diversity among us; actually this diversity of gifts and ability blended together in love and mutual submission is as colorful and varied as any Christian body known. Not uniformity, but unity, is the keynote. This brings freedom and proper channels for the power of God in and through us all.

The best way I can think of to outline this kind of direction for the next year and beyond is a series of statements with brief explanation of each. Hopefully, these can be taken by our Representatives, our boards, pastors, and each local meeting to be evaluated and implemented. These are not given with priority values nor alphabetically, but randomly, by design, to allow each person or group to pick up on them as led of the Lord.

Local Church Emphases

Rather than setting growth goals as a Yearly Meeting, a more desirable plan may be to encourage each local church to set its own. Design strategies to fit the unique opportunity each has. When possible, a time set aside for unhurried evaluation and planning by committees, clerks, and pastors is helpful. The Lord blesses these special efforts. Quentin Nordyke and I, separately or together, have participated in several of these and welcome the opportunity to do so.

In this regard, one of my continuing goals is to try to be an encouragement to pastors and ministerial students as Geraldine and I attempt to meet with each throughout the year. We want our visits to be uplifting and helpful, not threatening or burdensome—a time of sharing, listening and waiting together before the Lord.

Pastor Self-Improvement Opportunities

Another "Focus Conference" for pastors, pastoral staff, and spouses, will be held in September. The subject this year will be on pastoral care and administration. Last year it was on expository preaching. These self-improvement sessions are helpful in many ways, not only for the reading and subject matter examined, but the sharing of ideas, problems, and sense of camaraderie that develops.

The Department of Evangelism is to be commended for developing and underwriting these. Every church and pastor is urged to cooperate and benefit from this opportunity. Also, pastors are encouraged to enroll in other resource classes and conferences now available on many subjects, such as counseling, ministering to families, to singles, stewardship seminars, and others. We all learn from these continuing education experiences, which while not always

dramatic or crash courses provide new insights and confidence in a more competent ministry.

Internship Program

The first phase of a pilot program to train pastors as supervisors for ministerial students and those starting in the ministry is now ready. Dr. Bruce Hicks of Western Evangelical Seminary and a special planning committee have given excellent leadership in preparing this program. This is bound to improve the pastoral abilities of participants and to provide better prepared pastoral leadership. While the Gospel is the same and basic human needs remain the same, the demands, pressures, and expectation for pastoring seem to become more complex each year. By using this as a "pilot" program, it is hoped the intern plan can be expanded to include other kinds of Christian service as well as pastoral work.

Long-range Goals

Each Yearly Meeting board has found giving adequate time for planning and goal setting has been helpful. Last year the Stewardship Board, for the first time, did this with great benefit. In September the entire Executive Council anticipates such a gathering to evaluate our work as a Yearly Meeting and set new priorities in an attempt to keep in perspective the many opportunities before us. This has not been done for several years. Reference was made earlier to the diversity and intensity of many of the problems we encounter in making best use of limited leadership and financial resources. We need discernment and wisdom in this task.

George Fox College

One is impressed in visiting among the churches how great an influence our college is making in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Many of those taking leadership responsibilities in local churches as well as in Yearly Meeting work trace their loyalty to Friends beliefs and convictions to their college training and association with George Fox faculty and students. Could the church survive without this? This is as relevant a question as could the college survive without the church. Probably both could, but this cooperation and relationship is a precious value we should cherish and encourage.

Gene Hockett will be giving more time as a college church representative and will be available to local churches and pastors to strengthen these ties. Next March 14 is a Sunday designated as George Fox College Day across the Yearly Meeting. We want to cooperate in making this successful. A number of our Yearly Meeting departments and committees are chaired by college faculty or staff, not as a college assignment, but simply out of a concern and recognized capability. This is a wholesome arrangement mutually advantageous to the church and school.

A close, trusting, and supportive relationship with George Fox College is another keynote priority.

Peace Witness

Friends, along with many other Christians, are deeply concerned about international tensions and the armament race. But we have convictions that are to be more than handwringing or despair; we see the search for peacemaking as an integral part of Jesus' teaching.

We do well to remember that one of the most revealing passages of George Fox's *Journal* is in answer to being offered a commission by the government if he would "take up arms for the Commonwealth." He did not say that he believed war to be wrong or that in his opinion brute force never settled

anything; he went straight to the heart of the matter and said that he "lived in the virtue of that life and power that took away the occasion of all wars."

To uphold such a testimony involved a dedicated life. The Quaker peace testimony is more than a repudiation of war and more than a denial of the use of force; it is a way of life to which we must be faithful in small things as well as in great, in our human relationships, our business and social activities, and in the life and witness of our churches. It is a sacramental interpretation of the whole of life as "the outward sign of an inward and spiritual grace." This is an evidence of the infilling of the Holy Spirit, an outward and visible sign of a life lived wholly in obedience to the Spirit's promptings. Our peace witness is first personal, an integral part of our belief in holiness, in the gifts of the Spirit, in the sacraments, in who we are as Christians.

This leads to a very deep concern I share with caution. What are the non-negotiable truths we hold as Friends? The Friends testimonies, which we discussed at some length in last year's Yearly Meeting sessions, constitute the keynote principles holding us together. These beliefs are not to be casually sorted over from which to pick and choose only those that suit our background, our local congregation, or personal tastes. Our concept of Scripture, of ministry, of missions, of peace, of holiness, of service, or worship, and how these work out into daily living are crucial. An overemphasis on *doctrine* as compared with *practice* is one of the major weaknesses of many contemporary churches. This will not be overcome by contrived efforts to prod or scold church members into action. A more profound transformation at a deeper level resulting in the discipline of daily life in the lives of families, churches, and the Yearly Meeting is required. Nothing less than total conversion will do.

New attenders and new Christians are to be honestly instructed by those who are convinced Friends if we are to avoid becoming fragmented, drifting people. This is different from theological arm-twisting, arguing, or defensiveness. It is a clear, convincing explanation of who we are and why. Membership is critically meaningful and essential.

So is a right understanding of worship. The very best efforts of every Spiritual Life Committee and pastor should be in the preparation for authentic worship. We *learn* to worship, it is a choice as well as a miracle of God's coming. A measure of our effectiveness as a Yearly Meeting is the quality of worship more than the size of the gathering or the character of the program. This is not to glorify smallness nor excellent preaching, but it is wrong to mistake these for real worship.

Also, a right understanding of stewardship comes very close to the heart of the Gospel. Jesus taught this again and again. Every Christian in every church is obligated to answer to the Lord and to the Body regarding his stewardship of possessions and abilities. Until this happens we will be a weaker Yearly Meeting.

A Day of Prayer

We are announcing another "Day of Prayer" to be Sunday, November 22, just before Thanksgiving. Many churches are using creative worship for this special Thanksgiving emphasis, frequently with an offering for world relief. Let us include as well a special time of prayer early in the morning in our homes, then prayer concerns in the Sunday school, morning worship, youth and children's meetings, and throughout the afternoon and evening. Prayer materials and suggestions will be shared with all before that day with particular prayer requests pinpointed.

■ 4. Lon Fendall, assistant clerk, read a minute from the Religious Society of Friends, London, England, introducing Molly A. L. Sorell.

Molly greeted us. This is her first visit to America.

■ 5. ■ 9. A minute from the Friends World Committee for Consultation, Section of the Americas, Mary Esther McWhirter, secretary, introducing Van Ernst was read. She brought greetings to us.

■ 12. A minute from Reedwood Friends Church for Eldon and Virginia Helm was read. Eldon is the new associate secretary for the Wider Ministries Commission of Friends United Meeting.

■ 13. A minute was read from Christopher B. Jennings, clerk, Meeting for Sufferings of the Religious Society of Friends, introducing Geoffrey Bowes, recording clerk of London Yearly Meeting. Geoffrey brought greetings to us.

■ 14. Richard Beebe introduced Ted Neff from the Friends Committee on National Legislation. He brought greetings to us and read a portion of the statement of priorities of the legislative program of the FCNL. (Copies are available for those who would like them.)

■ 15. Jack Willcuts introduced Lois Harmon, who is teaching missionary children in Cochabamba, Bolivia. She brought words of greetings to us.

■ 21. Richard Beebe closed in prayer as we adjourned to meet Tuesday morning at 10:00 a.m.

■ 22. Lon Fendall, assistant clerk, opened the business session, in the absence of the presiding clerk.

■ 23. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 24. Lon Fendall introduced Stanley Perisho, president of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, who gave a report of the Coordinating Council. He encouraged us to be especially in prayer for the EFA General Conference to be held August 13-16 in Canton, Ohio.

PUBLICATION BOARD

■ 25. Barry Hubbell, president of the Board of Publication, gave a report of the activities of the board.

Publications Coordinator. The major accomplishment during the 1980-81 year was the establishment—after two years of planning—of the new position of Publications Coordinator. This person will aid in the coordination of material for the *Evangelical Friend*; will promote published materials available for pastors, churches, and others; will act as a "quality control" agent for Yearly Meeting materials presented by other boards and organizations; and will work with other boards in the production and promotion of publications.

This position is supported by a one-fourth salary equivalent (\$4,187) from Northwest Yearly Meeting, and one fourth from the Evangelical Friends Alliance. The other half salary is paid for work at The Barclay Press. Dan McCracken has been hired to fill this position, having begun duties July 1, 1981. In this role he serves as assistant editor of the *Evangelical Friend*, working closely with Superintendent Jack Willcuts.

Yearly Meeting Office Remodeling Committee. A task force has been formed to study the future of The Barclay Press. As an outgrowth of a committee named to study the remodeling and expansion needs of the Yearly Meeting headquarters, that committee realized it must have more information about the plans of The Barclay Press. In its minutes it said: "It was determined that our united feeling now is that a feasibility study of The Barclay Press should be immediately attempted. A three-month target goal for this effort was approved with the responsibility to examine unexplored new kinds of management, ownership, operation, goals, and types of production." Roger Crabbs, George Fox College business professor, has been secured to head the study. Final recommendations will be made to the Yearly Meeting Executive Council and to

the Publication Board. The Publication Board endorses this study, especially noting the need for the "business and management expertise" to assist ongoing board members.

The Barclay Press. The Barclay Press, under the guidance of General Manager Richard Eichenberger, had a good year, finishing well in the black financially. It is current with its billing and payment of expenses, often within 30 days. Top quality production is being maintained.

Jack Willcuts's Publication. The Publication Board has "reaffirmed our encouragement" to Superintendent Jack Willcuts to consider writing a series of books he first suggested in 1978. He has been encouraged both personally and in writing, and the board recommends to the Executive Committee that he be given a "sabbatical" of three weeks to work on this task.

Board Organization. The Publication Board has reelected Barry Hubbell as president, Harold Antrim, vice-president, and Ruth Brown, secretary.

Archivist. Yearly Meeting Archivist Charles A. Beals continues to accumulate early minutes of churches and organizations of the Yearly Meeting to be preserved for posterity. He has made the archives readily accessible to whoever desires to visit and use them. During the year a transcriber to type from cassettes was purchased. A separate report has been provided.

Richard Eichenberger, manager of The Barclay Press, gave a report on the ministries of the press during the past year. He introduced the staff members who were present in the business session.

Dan McCracken shared words of testimony.

Charles A. Beals, Yearly Meeting archivist, shared with us the importance of keeping complete and accurate records of what is going on among our churches and turning them in to the Yearly Meeting archives so they can be preserved for future generations.

The report was approved.

■ 26. Ralph Chapman, business manager of the Department of Missions, presented through slides "NWYM Missions Via the Printed Page." There have been magazine articles, prayer support materials, promotion and education materials, books about missions, materials in cooperation with Evangelical Friends Mission, and Friends Missionary Literature Service.

Looking ahead, literature will be coming to us through the *Evangelical Friend*, *NWYM Vision*, and *Keeping Current with Missions* (replacing the *Aymaragram*).

■ 27. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following recommendation: That on page 12 of the *Constitution and Discipline* under B—TESTIMONIES the last sentence of 2. MARRIAGE AND THE FAMILY be deleted and a new paragraph 3, titled DIVORCE, be inserted, with following paragraphs renumbered accordingly, reading as follows:

3. DIVORCE. Based on the Old Testament teaching of Deuteronomy 24 and Jesus' teaching in Matthew 5 and 19, we understand that the act of adultery is the biblical reason for divorce. Once adultery (sexual sin of married people) has occurred and divorce follows, this fact dissolves the marriage. Since the primary meaning of the Old Testament and Jesus' use of the word *divorce* is to set free innocent parties, they should not be held in disgrace, or their children stigmatized by the divorce.

Where divorce has occurred and there is evidence of consistent Christian life, it is the responsibility of Friends to demonstrate forgiveness so that the divorced person may live purposefully within the Christian fellowship, and perhaps enter into a new marriage relationship centered in Christ's love. If a

remarriage has been consummated, the church is to accept and love the persons involved. A central purpose of the church is to assure men and women that Christ brings a new beginning in life and its potential fulfillment. When there is forgiveness, there is no desire to remember the past. Just as Christ called and blessed those whom He forgave, so must we."

Jack Willcuts recommended that this statement go back to the Representatives before coming to this body for approval. Correspondence has been received from some of the monthly meetings on this statement. A letter was read from Richard Bishop and Sheldon Newkirk concerning changes in the statement.

It was approved to send the statement back to the Representatives for further study and revision. It will then be presented to the business session as a first reading.

■ 28. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following suggested addition: On page 13 of the *Constitution and Discipline* between the present sections 3 and 4 insert a new section number 4 titled "Human Sexuality" reading as follows:

The divine intent of marriage is to fulfill the emotional, spiritual, and physical needs of mankind. Only within the bonds of marriage divinely ordained is there a beautiful sexual relationship for the purpose of reproduction and life enrichment.

The practice of sexual perversion in any form is sinful (Genesis 19:1-13; 1 Corinthians 6:9-11; Leviticus 18:20-22; Deuteronomy 22:5) and contrary to the God-ordained purpose of sexual relationships. The sin nature is capable of all manner of vile affections when mankind rejects the moral laws of God, Romans 1:24-28. Neither historically by the church, nor in the Scriptures, has homosexuality been regarded as consistent with righteous living.

Friends believe that the grace of God is adequate to cleanse and deliver from all sin (1 John 1:9; 2 Corinthians 5:17) and do not accept homosexuals as members, as ministers of the Gospel, nor do we permit using such persons in positions of leadership or as workers with children and youth. Nevertheless, Friends are tender and sensitive to all people, expressing kindness, love, and forgiveness. See Jude 7, 8; Colossians 3:5-7; Revelation 21:8, 27.

Correspondence has also been received with regard to this statement. It was approved to send the statement back to the Representatives for further study and refinement. It will then be presented to the business session later in the week as a first reading.

■ 29. The report of the Department of Evangelism, Howard Harmon, president, was handed out to those in attendance.

The opportunities for Friends in the Northwest continue the challenge to begin new mission points.

This year the Friends families in Bend, Oregon, have been meeting together and now have called Jim Leonard as pastor. The department is working with the Cascade Friends Church, the name this Bend group has chosen, and with their parent meeting, Metolius, in this new venture.

Hilltop, Post Falls, and Nampa have continued to receive aid as they became established, growing congregations.

The past year at Umatilla, Oregon, the department sponsored a training seminar for pastors on the topic of expository preaching, with excellent attendance and positive feedback from the pastors. This year the emphasis will be administration and Christian education.

The full support of the department is behind the Friends Church Extension Foundation with its renewed program in assisting churches who wish to borrow

funds for building programs. We strongly encourage individuals and churches to invest funds in the foundation, which will enable more of our churches to build needed facilities.

The area superintendents are interested in the churches and desirous of seeing each local meeting grow. They are available for counsel with any church desiring assistance.

A Share Call was issued this past year to assist in purchasing a mobile unit, which Post Falls is presently using for much-needed classroom space. The unit will be moved to a new location within two years, helping another new work. It could be a chapel as well as classrooms. If 1,000 within the Yearly meeting would respond to the Share Calls, \$10,000 would be available for assisting building programs.

At the present time the department is working with local congregations in beginning new churches in East Boise and Twin Lakes, Idaho, and East Vancouver, Washington. We covet your prayers during the new church year.

Quentin Nordyke presented "Focus . . . on Church Planting." In starting new churches we need to: 1. Pray—from the pulpit concerning the starting of new churches. 2. Plan. 3. Find helpers. 4. Survey—the area that your church might reach out to. 5. Win families. 6. Find a meeting place. 7. Select a leader. 8. Begin meetings.

Qualities desired in a "founding" pastor: 1. Proven leadership ability (achiever); 2. Self-starter, self-motivator; 3. Goal and deadline oriented; 4. Self-esteem, self-image; 5. A commitment to succeed; 6. Objectivity; 7. Evangelistic; 8. Commitment; 9. Personal management; 10. Ability to communicate; 11. Problem solvers; 12. Philosophy of ministry.

What's happening now: 1. Cascade Friends Church, Bend, Oregon—Jim and Jeanne Leonard, pastors. 2. East Boise Friends Church, founding Sunday set for September 29, 1981—Kurt Eshelman, pastor. 3. Purchase of property at Twin Lakes, Idaho—Hayden Lake interested in starting another church. 4. Vancouver Friends planning to start a new church in East Vancouver. 5. Newberg Friends beginning to study the possibility of another church in Newberg. 6. Post Falls talking about starting a new church in the near future.

Howard Harmon presented the Share Call Program, which began about 20 years ago. It is a program whereby money given by members of NWYM is used to help a church on the finishing projects of a new church or for large remodeling projects. "Friends working together to help Friends." Cards were passed out for individuals to sign up for three years on the Share Call Program. There are never more than three requests per year for money.

Friends Church Extension foundation, Phil Harmon, president, reported: The sole purpose of the foundation is to assist churches in expansion, remodeling, purchase of land for new buildings, parsonages, programming, and Yearly Meeting facilities. The FCEF formed in 1955 has assisted 68 percent of the churches of the Yearly Meeting.

We were challenged to consider what we can do individually to invest—in amounts of \$250 or more.

Report approved.

- 30. Lon Fendall closed in prayer as we adjourned to meet Wednesday at 10:00 a.m.

- 31. Richard Beebe, clerk, opened the business meeting in prayer.
- 32. The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

- 33. Richard Beebe introduced Kathleen Nowak, associate pastor at Hilltop Friends. Her name was overlooked Monday when the other pastors and assistants were introduced.

- 34. David Fendall, interim reading clerk, read the following communication from Glenn K. Armstrong:

Please accept my resignation as a member of the Western Evangelical Seminary Board of Trustees.

Approved.

- 35. The Representatives nominated the following to three-year terms on the Outreach Board: Wally McClung, Muriel Ostrin, Jack Miller.

Approved.

- 36. The Representatives nominated the following to three-year terms on the Stewardship Board: Ronald Bowden, Barry White.

Approved.

- 37. The Representatives nominated the following to three-year terms on the Education Board: Jess Kennison, Ernest Cathcart, Paul Anderson, and for a one-year term, Ken VandenHoek.

Approved.

- 38. The Department of Social Concerns presented the name of Esther Mae Hinshaw for a three-year appointment to the Friendsview Manor Board.

Approved.

- 39. The Department of Social Concerns presented the following names for three-year appointments to the Friends Action Board: Curtis Ankeny, William Rourke, Ernest Cathcart.

Approved.

- 40. The Department of Social Concerns presented the name of Paul Bishop for a two-year appointment as representative on the EFA Social Concerns Commission.

Approved.

- 41. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action a recommended addition to B—TESTIMONIES, page 13 of the *Constitution and Discipline*, to read as follows:

8. CHRISTIAN LIVING. Because God entrusted man with the responsibility in the care and use of earth's natural resources, Christians ought to maintain a life-style that will help to conserve and replenish resources important for the life of future generations. As Quakers, who have a long tradition of adhering to scriptural injunctions for plain living, we should seek to transform the values of our culture rather than to conform to them in this important area (Matthew 6:24-34; Philippians 4:6; Romans 12:2; Genesis 1:28).

Approved.

- 42. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action a recommended statement to be added to 6. CAPITAL PUNISHMENT on page 13 of the *Constitution and Discipline*, with the title changed to 6. SACREDNESS OF LIFE. The present statement on capital punishment would be retained, followed by this:

Because we believe human life is sacred and created in God's image, we oppose induced abortion for personal convenience or population control. We believe induced abortion should be considered only in cases of rape, incest, or when the life of the mother is endangered. Such a decision should be made only

on the basis of competent medical, psychiatric, and spiritual counseling. (See minute 61.)

There was considerable discussion on the statement. It was referred back to the Discipline Revision Committee for some editing. If it comes back to the business session without major changes, it will be read again as a second and final reading.

■ 43. Beatrice Goldsmith, Yearly Meeting treasurer, presented the treasurer's report:

This financial report represents my accounting of the funds you have entrusted to Northwest Yearly Meeting. As we look to the Lord to provide the resources to help meet the challenges and opportunities of the Great Commission, the boards and departments are committed to making the best possible use of your contributions.

We have special praise to the Lord this year. It is the first time since I have been treasurer that we have met our approved budget! In fact, we had an excess of \$68. The Great Commission income was \$460,068, expenditures were \$448,758, and we begin 1981-82 with a balance in the supplementary fund of \$12,143. The churches contributed \$406,384 toward the budget, a 12.1 percent increase over their giving last year.

You will see that the Pension Plan has been included in the Yearly Meeting balance sheet this year. At first glance it appears to some that the liabilities exceed the assets. This is not the case, as the difference is in the cash portion of the assets.

In closing, I share Paul's words in 2 Corinthians 1:12, as paraphrased in *The Living Bible*: "We are so glad that we can say with utter honesty that in all our dealings we have been pure and sincere, quietly depending upon the Lord for His help, and not on our own skills. And that is even more true, if possible, about the way we have acted toward you."

Approved.

■ 44. The Representatives nominated the following to three-year terms on the Spiritual Life Board: Joseph Gilmore, R'Dean Smith, Kenneth Magee.

Approved.

■ 45. The Spiritual Life Board in session July 27, 1981, approved the recommendation of the Department of Ministry and requested the Yearly Meeting to take the final action according to the *Constitution and Discipline* and record Harvey Bowen as a minister of the Gospel in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

Approved.

■ 46. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action a new opening sentence for the present Query 7, page 84 of the *Constitution and Discipline* to read as follows: As a steward of God do you seek to glorify Him in the management of natural and financial resources? Is your life freed from excessive attachment to material things?

Approved.

■ 47. At the request of the Spiritual Life Board of the Yearly Meeting the Discipline Revision Committee presented an additional paragraph for inclusion in the *Constitution and Discipline* on page 59, to follow (7) Voluntary Surrender of Position as a Minister, to read as follows: (8) Forfeiture of Recorded Status. When an individual has retired from the ministry, not by reason of age or physical disability (his own or that of his family) and has chosen not to enter any form of pastoral, evangelistic, teaching, or Christian service ministry, but has chosen to enter a secular occupation and has continued to pursue it for five

years, the department will call into question his privilege to retain his status as a recorded minister. With approval of the Spiritual Life Board and the Yearly Meeting, the certificate of recording will not be renewed and status as a recorded minister is forfeited. If at a later time the church finds that there is qualification for reinstatement, recording will occur in the regular way. In such a case certification of recording is reclaimed and his name is removed from all official lists of ministers.

Decision was delayed. The matter was tabled.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

■ 48. Roger Knox, vice-chairman, Department of Missions introduced Quentin Nordyke, who presented "Focus . . . on Arequipa, Peru."

He gave a report on his visit in March to our mission field, using a slide presentation on Arequipa as a symbol of what God is doing in Peru, new frontiers in missions. The Aymara and Quechua Indians are traveling to Arequipa for hope of something better.

Our missionary work has gone through several stages: First Stage—we have NWYM, the sending church, and the Mission Field. Second Stage—NWYM the sending church, and the Mission Field, and National Church. And now the third stage—NWYM and Bolivia Yearly Meeting, the sending churches, and the Mission Field in Peru.

Our main thrust now: (1) We have new frontiers; (2) We have new models for Mission-National Church relationships joined in partnership with Bolivia Yearly Meeting; (3) We have a great core of missionaries on the field; (4) We have the greatest group of missionary recruits that we have had in years; (5) Roscoe and Tina Knight are returning to South America, coordinating new work in Bolivia and Peru.

Difficult questions the Mission Department is facing now: (1) Budget shrinking—value of the dollar decreasing in the last few years. Inflation of 60 percent in Peru last year; inflation of 40 percent in Bolivia last year. One solution to this situation is to have the Great Commission Budget completely underwritten by our churches, then excess money that comes in could be used for missions and other projects of the Yearly Meeting. (2) Nothing was in the budget last year nor is it in this year's budget for vehicles. (3) Nothing is budgeted for Aymara language study. (4) Nothing has been budgeted for Arequipa—a great opportunity. Hayden Lake brought a gift of nearly \$5,000 to Yearly Meeting this year for Arequipa.

Roger Knox commissioned the Chapmans and the Knights.

Bolivia

Overall Growth and Health: Annual statistical reports at the January representatives' meeting were conflicting; they didn't jibe with each other or with last year's reports. So we can only give estimates now, but I think these are more accurate than in past years. There were approximately 800 new converts in 1980, half of them being in the city of La Paz. This needs to be balanced against a figure of 350 losses, for a gain of approximately 450 people. Fifteen new congregations were organized, with four losses. We estimate overall growth rate to be around 5 percent, with the number of faithful believers somewhere between 8,000 and 10,000. There are somewhere between 160 and 170 churches. Cordillera remains the largest of the nine districts, with La Paz right behind it. Growth rate in the La Paz district (mostly in the city of La Paz) was a healthy 20 percent. The statistics for the city of Santa Cruz showed a 25 percent gain in the church. This shows us that, while the overall growth of the INELA is plateaued, the cities are very receptive. This is perhaps the most im-

portant point in this report. The *Mesa Directiva* officially recognized Santa Cruz as the ninth and newest church district. We note many signs of health and vitality, especially in areas of administration and social concern. Many individual congregations are thriving and obviously healthy spiritually. But we also note a certain sense of apathy and even discouragement in many other congregations. It's always appropriate to pray for revival and a fresh infilling of the Spirit.

Peru

This past church year has seen a great improvement over the previous year's shaky relationship problems. The leadership of the INELA has improved so that our joint endeavors have been carried out smoothly, for the most part. Growth, with tension, could perhaps characterize some of the various areas of cooperative work that the Mission and National Church share. We are both striving to seek our places in God's church here in Peru. Pray that change will come in His time and in His manner, and that we as His children—both mission and nationals—will act in obedience, sensing a rightness about our actions.

We as a Mission have endeavored to be involved and promote National Church leadership involvement in new evangelism efforts. We have been encouraged by the opportunities to open work in one large community, Culta, and foster additional prospects in another not-too-old a work in Ancaca. Growth is not flourishing as widely as we would like, yet we realize that much evangelistic vision needs to be encouraged among the current INELA leadership in order to nurture new groups and encourage greater evangelistic efforts. There is much cause for optimism about the future of the Friends Church here in Peru.

Korean Church

The Portland Korean Church continues to flourish as it ministers to families in the Greater Portland area under the capable leadership of pastor Wan Gye Jin. New attenders are constantly being added to the ranks, although with the setting off of the Vancouver Korean church a year ago under the leadership of Pastor Kim, attendance at the Portland church has not increased dramatically. In spite of the loss of a number of leading members in this venture, the church is keeping current in its financial obligations, and they continue to assist Pastor Kim with \$200 a month. As associate pastor, Oscar Brown each Sunday presents an English message for those who prefer the American service. For several months Oscar also held an English preservice Bible class at the request of the church. Ruth Brown teaches a Sunday school class also.

Conclusion: As part of Evangelical Friends Mission we cooperate with the Mexico City mission work. Everett and Alda Clarkson continue to serve, along with Rodney and Barbara Routen from Iowa. A notable achievement in this work has been the purchase of a lot for the Mexico City Friends Church and the construction of that building with its dedication scheduled for July 12, 1981. Roscoe and Tina Knight will represent Northwest Yearly Meeting at those dedication festivities. Our Department of Missions looks to the EFM executive director, James Morris, and administrative secretary, Reta Stuart, for valuable assistance and consultation. They have served us well in their areas of responsibility.

The Department of Missions asked Jack and Geraldine Willcuts and Quentin Nordyke to make an administrative visit to the field, which they did in February and March of 1981. They reported a delightful time with each missionary family and were able to give counsel and encouragement to both the Bolivian and Peruvian staffs. During this year of 50th anniversary celebration, the Department of Missions has looked not so much to the past as to the future. Out of this has come a deep concern that we expand our mission thrust into new

frontiers. One of these has been an increased concern for the fledgling work in Arequipa, Peru. The department has outlined basic objectives for Arequipa and some five-year goals.

As we conclude our celebration of 50 years in Aymaraland we praise God that He has given us new visions and new horizons. In fact we have renamed our department's publication entitled "Aymaragram," now calling it "*Keeping Current with Missions*." This reflects the fact that we are no longer working exclusively with Aymara-speaking people, but our new horizons have included Quechuas and the people whose upward mobility has made them exclusively of the Spanish language.

The report of the Department of Missions was approved.

Jack Willcuts closed in prayer as we adjourn to meet this afternoon at 2:15 p.m.

■ 49. Roy Clark opened the afternoon business session in prayer.

■ 50. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 51. Discussion was opened up again on Minute 47 with regard to the status of recorded ministers who are no longer in the ministry for reasons other than physical or being retired.

After considerable discussion, the statement was approved as a first reading.

■ 52. Lela Morrill, president, gave her 1980 report of the Women's Missionary Union.

She announced that at the afternoon session today the name of the Women's group was changed to "Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship."

The women's banquet this year had between 410 and 420 in attendance. An offering of over \$1,600 was received to be used for outfitting the Chapman family.

Lela reported that the women gave a total of \$23,329 last year.

The foreign missions project was the support of James and Gail Roberts last year. Gail spoke of how much they appreciated the support, gifts, letters and prayers of the ladies and the men, too. Especially, she appreciated the continual prayers of those at home.

The home missions project was the Piedmont work. Katrina Cathcart, director of the "Friends for Kids" program, spoke of her appreciation for the support of the women, indicating the various aspects of the work. This year they are planning the first Inner-city Camp at Twin Rocks.

Lela Morrill introduced Geraldine Willcuts, the incoming president of Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship. She stated that as the theme of our banquet this year was "Open Doors," we have many new and open doors before us this next year.

■ 53. Glenn Leppert, president, Friends Action Board, gave the following report: A strong *Department of Social Concerns* exists, yet FAB has a *vital role* to play within the Yearly Meeting. We take our *purpose* from Hebrews 10:24, "consider each other to provoke unto love and good deeds."

We wish to be a board that meets *concerns not considered elsewhere* in the Yearly Meeting and we want to provoke (stir up, encourage) the Yearly Meeting to good works.

Four areas: (1) *Cross-cultural awareness*: Piedmont; Voice of Calvary; NBEA; Minority Student Scholarship. (2) *Peace*—FCCP (Friends Coor-

minating Committee for Peace). (3) *Alienated People*—Prisoners, others. (4) *Family*.

A part of the concern of the department is expressed by the angel to Zechariah:

"Son . . . who will prepare a people." (Luke 1:17) We want to be involved in the "preparation" of NWYM.

Approved.

■ 54. Aaron Hamlin, president of the National Black Evangelical Association, gave a report on the activities of the association. Northwest Yearly Meeting is a paying member of NBEA. The work of NBEA is possible because of the continued support of NWYM and California Yearly Meeting. The association has been operating for 18 years on a budget of \$20,000 a year.

Aaron expressed appreciation for this support and asked that we continue to be involved.

Approved.

■ 55. Walter Wilhite, executive director, Friends Fund, presented the annual report as follows: This has been another very rewarding year for Friends Fund. A number of people have either phoned or have written for help with their estates. Friends Fund has been appointed as their executor in a number of wills and as trustee for many of the trusts that have been signed.

As stated in the Friends Fund by-laws, the purpose of the formation of this corporation is to receive, administer, and disburse funds and property of every description for such religious, charitable, and educational purposes as will, in the judgment of the directors of the Fund, further the charitable, educational, missionary, evangelistic, service, and other denominational objectives of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

■ 58. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 59. Kendall Smitherman, superintendent of Greenleaf Friends Academy, gave the report of the academy:

The 1980-81 school year at Greenleaf Friends Academy, marking the 73rd anniversary of the school, was a year reflecting a time of rich spiritual growth and a positive academic and extracurricular school experience. First Week '80 ministered to the high school student body as Jack Willcuts was the spiritual emphasis speaker. His sensitivity and leading of the Holy Spirit helped make this year's First Week a spiritual growth experience for the academy's high school student body. Ron Rittenhouse, pastor at Whitney Friends Church, Boise, was the keynote speaker for our spring spiritual emphasis week. Speaking twice daily he ministered to the elementary students, then to the junior and senior high students in May. We praise God for the men sent to us this year to keynote our special spiritual emphasis times. Their insight and discernment spoke so keenly to the spiritual needs of our students. We are grateful of God's all-knowing plan of leading in these special times at the academy.

We continue to be thankful for the student population growth that we experienced. Enrollment for the 1980-81 year exceeded 100 in the two preschools, the academy campus and the Meridian campus. Elementary enrollment reached 137 with 62 in grades seven and eight; and there were 134 in the senior high school. An increase of nine percent in K-12 enrollment over the previous year shows the positive trend of Christian education at the academy. Our first year with the satellite preschool at the Meridian Friends Church proved to be a very positive step as the program operated at near full capacity the entire year. In addition to providing a broadened area of ministry for both the academy and the Meridian Friends Church, a vital early childhood service was provided to the community, a rapidly growing suburb of Boise. This fall we will be opening our second satellite preschool with Boise Friends Church. We greatly anticipate these joint Christian education ventures with our member churches.

An exciting first for the athletic department was the academy's first district championship as the girls basketball team won the title and a berth in the state basketball tournament at Lewiston, where they took fourth place. The Annual Benefit Auction was a tremendous success as gross receipts exceeded \$25,000 reflecting a 16 percent increase over the previous year's sale.

As we prepare to begin our 74th year we are optimistic of the rich outpouring of God's blessing upon the ministry of the academy. We want to grow not for growth's sake but rather that in growing, Christian education will reach further and effectively touch more and more young people. We continue to be thankful for the prayer and financial support of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Jess Kennison, the high school principal, was introduced. He closed his report with a slide presentation of the academy.

■ 60. Jack Willcuts introduced Eugene and Jean Coffin, who are in attendance at our sessions. Eugene brought words of greeting to us.

■ 61. Proposed alteration of 1980 Minute 115 from Discipline Revision Committee—Because we believe human life is sacred and created in God's image, we oppose induced abortion for personal convenience or population control. Under no circumstances should abortion be considered without competent medical, psychiatric, and spiritual counseling.

Approved as second and final reading.

■ 62. The Representatives nominated the following to a one-year term as board presidents: Education—M. Gene Hockett; Outreach—Sheldon Newkirk; Spiritual Life—Roy P. Clark; Stewardship—Don Millage.
Approved.

■ 63. The Representatives nominated the following as Trustees of Northwest Yearly Meeting: Carl Sandoz—five years; Gordon Crisman—three years.
Approved.

■ 64. The annual report of the Quaker Benevolent Society was read. Cash Balance, July 1, 1980—\$574.05; Total Receipts—\$9,907.53; Total Receipts and Beginning Cash Balance—\$10,481.58. Total Disbursements—\$9,609.68; Cash Balance, June 30, 1981—\$871.90. (Agent's fees of \$19.70 not included in report.) Number of Death Claims—15; Number of New Members—17; Number of members discontinued—1; Number of QBS Members, June 30, 1981—643.

Report approved.

■ 65. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action this paragraph to be inserted in the *Constitution and Discipline*, page 12, under Section B, Testimonies, No. 2, "Marriage and the Family." Friends affirm the state of singleness (nonmarriage) as an appropriate life-style chosen by some (1 Corinthians 7:6-9) as well as a state in which one may unwillingly find oneself. Not all are expected to marry and some may find the state of singleness preferred. A single person is considered qualified equally with others in regard to spiritual gifts and abilities for use in the Lord's work.

Approved as second and final reading.

■ 66. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following recommendation: In Query 8, page 84, of the *Constitution and Discipline* replace the second question with this: Are you careful to exemplify and teach the Christian standards of human sexuality in accord with biblical truths?

Approved as second and final reading.

■ 67. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following recommendation: In number 3, page 12, of the *Constitution and Discipline* titled "Respect for the Body," delete the first paragraph and replace it with this: Believing that one's body is "the temple of the Holy Spirit," and that we should therefore "glorify God with your body" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20), we exhort all believers to "present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." (Romans 12:1) In view of this, we encourage members to give prayerful and conscientious consideration in regard to their reading matter, the amusements they attend, and the activities in which they participate. In contrast to any sensual obsession evidenced in the media, in style of dress, and in printed matter, Friends positively affirm the sacredness of the body and mind and urge Christians to deport themselves in a way that glorifies God.

Approved as second and final reading.

■ 68. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following recommendation: In number 3, page 12, of the *Constitution and Discipline* titled "Respect for the Body" replace the second paragraph (on page 13) with the following: Members are warned against the production, sale, and use of alcoholic beverages and other habit-forming and body-defiling drugs, including marijuana, tobacco, beer, and wine. We urge vigorous opposition to the persistent traffic by society in such products.

Approved as second and final reading.

■ 69. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action a restatement of Query 5, page 84, of the *Constitution and Discipline* as follows: Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? Do you seek to glorify Him in your body and mind by abstaining from the growth, manufacture, sale, or use of beverage alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, and other harmful drugs? Are you careful to abstain from amusements inconsistent with a Christian witness and character? Do you pursue temperance in all bodily appetites in order that you by your manner of life may present a positive example to others and may be pleasing to the Lord?

Approved as second and final reading.

■ 70. The report of George Fox College was presented by President David C. LeShana in the Wednesday evening service. A condensed report follows:

The 1980-81 school and fiscal year was a very good one at George Fox College in the following areas:

ACADEMIC: George Fox continues to be one of the Northwest's fastest-growing colleges with eight consecutive years of growth, reaching 745 fall term. The College continues to have more Friends students than any other U.S. college with 162 enrolled, as the College, founded by the Friends Church, continues its close tie with Northwest Yearly Meeting.

In the area of special programs, the program is in its seventh year. The *Field Education Program* (Kellogg Project) continues to receive high marks. More than 97 percent of the students in the program indicated their field experience was significant in both personal and professional development. Enrollment is the program now includes more than a third of the student body each year.

One of the most rapidly growing and most attention-getting programs on campus is the new *Small Business Institute*, under the direction of Business Professor Roger Crabbs. The *George Fox Television Center*, after nearly three years of preparation work, began offering its first videotape cassette classes to the public, and they can now be found from coast to coast. The 15th annual campus *Missions Conference* highlighted winter term. The College's retreat and conference center, *Tilikum*, completed its sixth year as a special ministry of the College.

The heart of the George Fox educational experience is the dedicated Christian professors. Overall a team of some 100 persons is involved in the academic program. The teaching faculty included 72 persons, 43 full-time with 33 having earned doctorates.

STUDENT LIFE: Of prime importance at George Fox College is the religious life. Students were involved in deputation teams, discipleship groups for prayer and sharing, and more than \$1,500 was raised to help send 17 students on summer missionary assignments around the world. Students showed their care and concern for their fellowman by contributing 378 pints of blood during the year.

Athletically, the Bruins fielded teams in 11 sports, with the women's track team finishing 18th in the nation. The men's track team finished third in the NAIA District 2 race, and for the ninth time in 11 years the men's basketball team entered the district playoffs.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE: Expansion and growth with fiscal responsibility continues to characterize George Fox College. The new building construction is evident, but it has not been at the expense of current (or general) fund operations or through tuition charges. The College again, for the 10th consecutive year, operated soundly in the black. In the fall the College opened the seventh new building in four years with the formal dedication of Carey

Residence Hall, a \$320,000 "Minidorm" project. As of the end of the fiscal year more than \$1.8 million had been received and building plans authorized for the construction of the new Chapel/Performing Arts Center.

College and community relations were strengthened as Newberg businessmen and residents contributed a record \$28,853 to project SHIP—Student Help Investment Program. All funds are used for student employment opportunities on campus and are matched on a four-to-one basis by the federal government.

I am grateful to God for His guidance, and am excited with what I know He is going to do for George Fox College in the future.

EDUCATION BOARD

- 72. M. Gene Hockett, president, Education Board, presented the report of the board. (See below). Members of the board did a skit entitled "Focus . . . on a New Vision for the Sunday School," which gave an overview of growth in our Sunday schools this past year. During the Yearly Meeting sessions, about 90 children, 1st through 6th grade, have been attending Camp Tilikum with programs for them. In the evening about 60 children in this age group have been in learning centers during the evening service. There has been child care for the smaller children and also programs for junior high and high school young people.

A portion of the new film *The Great Commission Sunday School* was shown. This film is available through the Yearly Meeting office for use in the local churches.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH SCHOOLS, Donna Prescott, chairman. The Department of Church Schools has three major areas of responsibilities: Sunday Schools, Camping, and Friends Youth. The department continued presenting area dinners this year, with a program in each area of the Yearly Meeting. These dinners have been the major vehicle used to familiarize the local churches with the work and responsibilities of this department. A video tape was made for use at the dinners featuring key people from each committee. The department purchased a new film *The Great Commission Sunday School*, a workshop kit for use with the film, and several books titled *Growth—A New Vision for the Sunday School*, for distribution to the local churches. The "how-to" of these items will be featured next year. Inserts were printed and placed in the pocket calendars that were printed by the Christian Education Committee of Evangelical Friends Alliance. We are hoping to give one to each Christian Education worker in the Yearly Meeting. The insert highlights all the important dates in the coming year (dinner dates, workshop dates, etc.). Printed fliers list the upcoming "Calendar of Events" and information regarding the film, kits, books, and calendars. We are again showing an overall Sunday school growth of 9 percent. Highlights in Friends Youth included; over 165 Northwest Yearly Meeting delegates at "Youthquake" in Southern California; over 200 participants in our third annual volleyball tournament; the expanded church visitation program of the executive committee; and the addition of Gayle Beebe, as the Friends Youth field representative. Gayle will be giving added visibility to the Yearly Meeting's commitment to the area of youth ministry and will be visiting camps, conferences, and local churches to encourage and support the youth and their leaders.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION, Hector Munn, Chairman. During the 1980-81 year the Department of General Education administered five full-time and three part-time ministerial scholarships to Western Evangelical Seminary, and one scholarship to George Fox College. The projection for the 1981-82 year is for eight full-time and four part-time WES scholarships and one GFC scholarship. Reports from 42 monthly meetings indicated continued support for George Fox College and Greenleaf Friends Academy. The George Fox College enrollment for fall term 1980 showed that 162 out of 746 total, or 22 percent, indicate affiliation with the Friends Church. Of the Friends students attending GFC, 143 (80 percent) indicate membership in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Nearly a quarter of the meetings report assisting their members with GFC Church/College Scholarships. Over 50 students from Friends meetings attended Greenleaf Friends Academy. Several meetings also assisted GFA by holding fund-raising activities, and by hosting musical groups. There is an increasing involvement of Friends families with private kindergartens, private elementary and secondary schools. Eleven meetings reported they sponsor educational programs that use the church facilities during the week. Last year the meetings reported that 89 children attended private kindergartens, 90 attended elementary, and 65 attended private secondary schools. This compared to the figures of 48, 106, and 50 for the previous year.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES: Mark Kelley, chairman. The Department of Christian Testimonies feels a keen responsibility to provide readily accessible literature on Friends testimonies to our churches and young people. Many of the questions that today's society is struggling with are questions for which Friends have found biblically based, practical answers. Our department is seeking ways of making these answers available. This year we have attempted to distribute teaching on morality and consistent Christian living by providing Friends books and periodicals to Western Evangelical Seminary and by publishing tracts. The books, *Quakers of the Northeast*, *Portrait of a Quaker*, *Team Ministry*, *Waging Peace* and *Bolivian Friends*, *From Mission to Yearly Meeting* have been donated to the seminary. We have published the cartoon "To Show God I Love Him" and reprinted Don Green's magazine article "Blessed are the Peacemakers." Summary: the efforts of the Board have been blessed and the Lord is evidenced in Sunday schools catching a "New Vision," ministerial students being trained, new exciting leadership by Friends Youth, and the Christian testimonies of the Church being clarified. We look to the future with anticipation of new achievements during 1981-82.

SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

- 76. Roy Clark, president, Spiritual Life Board, gave a brief report. Some of the departments have already given reports during the sessions.

NWYM Department of Peace Testimony Annual Report—The Constitution and Discipline of Northwest Yearly Meeting recognizes that the message of love—even for one's enemies—is central to Christ's teaching and instructions to His followers. The Department of Peace Testimony seeks to actively convey that life-changing insight as we share in evangelizing the Northwest, the United

States, Bolivia, and Peru, and the ends of the earth. We seek to confront everyone within the Yearly Meeting with the peace claims of Christ. To do this we have made ourselves available upon request to all churches, Sunday schools, and Friends Youth groups. Representatives of the peace committee have spoken in morning worship at three churches and in individual sessions or services at about ten Sunday schools. We have also assisted in workshops or spoken in morning worship in various Mennonite, Brethren, Presbyterian, and Congregational churches. *The Bible and War*, by Paul Mills, has been reprinted. *Waging Peace, a Study in Biblical Pacifism*, by John Lamoreau and Ralph Beebe, has sold out two limited printings in its first year, and is being reprinted in a slightly revised second edition. The department hopes that everyone within the Yearly Meeting will study these booklets. We suggest part two of *Waging Peace* as an excellent resource for individual devotional or group Bible study. The department has prepared a team of draft counselors well-versed in the Scriptures who are available upon request to meet with youth and their parents. These counselors will discuss the status of draft legislation, assist anyone interested in determining whether he/she is a conscientious objector to military service, and, if appropriate, assist in preparing a file of materials that will be beneficial in establishing C.O. status if and when the military draft again becomes a reality.

Four members of Northwest Yearly Meeting including Margaret May, Arthur Roberts, Bruce Allen, and David Schmidt participated in the second Green Lake Conference of the New Call to Peacemaking. Northwest Yearly Meeting continues to be active in the regional NCP program. Assistance from Friends Action Board made it possible for one NWYM member to attend the annual meeting of the Friends Coordinating Committee on Peace, and two members of NWYM were included in a Quaker-Southern Baptist dialogue on peacemaking.

Department of Fine Arts Annual Report—The past year has seen four candidates enrolled in the program of Certification of Music Ministers. There are still 20 potential candidates within the Yearly Meeting, but we as a Department must wait for the process to be initiated by the Spiritual Life Committee of the local monthly meeting before we can act. In reading through the annual reports there appear to be many meetings with little or no activity in music, art, and drama. A number of meetings have indicated lack of talent, interest, or a lack of organizational leadership. We believe that the use of music, art, and drama in the worship life of the church will enhance worship. Thus, we are focusing our objectives for the coming year to give help and encouragement in these areas to the local meetings. Fine Arts objectives for 1981-82 are: (1) The first "graduating" group in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Certified Ministers of Music (Yearly Meeting Sessions, 1982). (2) Area Rally "Festivals of Praise" to be held in these areas: Newberg/Portland, Salem/Southern Oregon, Southwest Washington/Puget Sound, Boise/Greenleaf, Inland. (3) Departmental visitation to at least six local meetings for the purpose of helping to evaluate and identify needs, problems, and potential in the areas of fine arts. (4) Workshops in church music in three areas to give encouragement and help in song leading, singing, the church pianist/organist, and assistance with children's, youth, and adult choirs. (5) Publication of a quarterly newsletter for church musicians to provide help and encouragement, and to serve as an idea exchange between the various meetings of the Yearly Meeting. Approved.

■ 77. The Executive Council recommends that Jack L. Willcuts be called as general superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting to serve July 1, 1982, to June 30, 1983.

■ 90. The Executive Council recommended the following persons to serve on the Western Evangelical Seminary Board of Trustees: for one year, Dwight Kimberly; for two years, Hector Munn; for three years, M. Gene Hockett and Dorothy Barratt.

■ 92. The Board of Trustees of George Fox College named the following persons to serve on the board for three-year terms: William H. Bauman, Mark O. Hatfield, Jack Meadows, C. W. Perry, George Millen, Ted Engstrom. For a one-year term (to fill the unexpired term of Ronald Willcuts), LeRoy Benham. Approved.

■ 93. The George Fox College Alumni Association presented the following names for three-year terms on the college Board of Trustees: T. Eugene Coffin and Wayne E. Roberts. Approved.

■ 94. Gerald Dillon, on the staff at Western Evangelical Seminary, gave a brief report in the absence of the president:

The most significant happening this year was the self-study by the faculty and review of the Accreditation Committee for a 10-year period. The seminary has a dual accreditation with the Northwest Association of Secondary Schools and the Association of Theological Schools.

The seminary will begin a new program next year—the doctor of ministry degree—under the direction of Dr. Bruce Hicks.

The report was approved.

■ 95. The Executive Council presented the following concern from the Department of Social Concerns:

Because of increased popular support of the death penalty as a deterrent to violent crime and as a mechanism to alleviate the public financial burden of housing men and women convicted of criminal acts, the Department of Social Concerns hereby recommends to Northwest Yearly Meeting a resolution stating opposition specifically to the restoration of capital punishment to the State of Oregon. A capital punishment measure will probably again appear on Oregon's ballots in 1982.

WHEREAS our *Constitution and Discipline* finds capital punishment "an unchristian preempting of the authority of God over human life,"

RESOLVED: Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church opposes capital punishment and does not support recent efforts to return the death penalty to law in the State of Oregon.

Approved.

■ 96. The Department of Peace Testimony presented the following:

As Northwest Yearly Meeting has been in session, Congress has made a significant cut in income taxes for the next three years. However, Congress has also recently made deep cuts into human services programs upon which many lower income Americans depend.

Be it resolved therefore that members of Northwest Yearly Meeting be encouraged to give their churches or Friends Action Board the amount personally saved by the tax cut.

Be it further resolved that each local church establish a special fund (if an appropriate fund does not already exist) for collection and distribution of these monies to those in need.

Approved.

■ 97. The following statement from the Department of Missions was read for information only:

Recommended Policy Statement regarding abduction or kidnapping. In order to most fully protect our missionaries from abduction, all missionaries will be advised that in the event that any missionary be abducted and that a ransom be demanded of the mission, the policy of the mission is not to accede to such demands. Experience has shown that yielding to the demands of kidnappers

pers or terrorists by providing ransom or meeting other demands only encourages further attacks and puts additional people at risk. The mission is prepared to use every legitimate means to secure the release of hostages, including widespread prayer for the release of someone so detained.

■ 98. The Epistle Committee submitted the following summary of epistles received:

There were 42 epistles received, 11 of which were from foreign countries.

Friends from *Japan Yearly Meeting* wrote: "This following is taken from the Preamble of our Constitution: 'We, the Japanese people, desire peace for all time . . . and we have determined to preserve our security and existence, trusting in the justice and faith of the peace-loving peoples of the world.'"

East Africa Yearly Meeting: East Africa Yearly Meeting started in 1902. The theme for 1980 was "Hold fast the profession of your faith without wavering."

London Yearly Meeting for Sufferings: In your 1980 epistle you wrote of renewal, of growth, of laying aside contention and seeking together the teachings of the Holy Spirit. For these encouraging messages we thank you and send our loving greetings for your gathering this year. May God's presence be felt amongst you and carry forward your concerns.

North Carolina Yearly Meeting gathered in the 283rd session sensed from the beginning the fulfillment of the theme, "His Presence in the Midst." Their two special guests with their gifts in the ministry helped immensely in the services. The presence of the Holy Spirit was real.

Wilmington Yearly Meeting wrote: "Our theme, 'The Recovery of Family Life,' was the keynote in the family worship each day."

Nebraska Yearly Meeting wrote: "We are led to a certainty that God looks to us to implement the right sharing of the world's resources. Our times for quiet meditation were frequent. History is often changed when we listen."

■ 99. The Epistle Committee submitted the epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings:

Dear Friends: As members of Northwest Yearly Meeting waited for the opening minute, Richard Beebe, our presiding clerk, stepped forth and read: "Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 89th session, 1981, on the George Fox College campus embracing the theme 'There is . . . a great people to be gathered. George Fox. Pendle Hill.'" The members had been gathered by the Holy Spirit in the days that were gone. Now many in hopeless situations in the world are still waiting to be gathered unto life eternal.

A mighty fortress is our God, A bulwark never failing,
Our helper He, Amid the flood of mortal ills prevailing;
Dost ask who that may be? Christ Jesus, it is He.

Our general superintendent, Jack Willcuts, in his keynote address, began by saying, "The heart of our theology is that God is and that He is like Jesus Christ." He spoke of the serious challenges facing our world. The crisis in our cities and in our country is real and mild religion will make no difference. In working together at the local and yearly meeting levels we must remember that unity, not uniformity, brings answers.

The newly named Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship continues to be a contributing arm of the Yearly Meeting. The annual banquet was attended by 400 women. The offering of \$1,874 will help make it possible for a new family to enter our Bolivian mission field. Lay people of all ages express growing desires to give of time, talents, and money to encourage the work of missions. Our executive secretary, Quentin Nordyke, gave an impassioned plea for the

nearly million hopeless people in Arequipa, Peru. Two veteran missionaries, Roscoe and Tina Knight, are ready to go.

The evening worship sessions were led this year by prominent Christian author and educator Richard Foster addressing our theme, "A Great People to Be Gathered." He used Acts 13:1-3 to describe the hidden preparation of those ministering to people. Elsewhere in Acts the stories of the sermons of Stephen and of Paul at Athens show the preparation of truth giving in the power of the Lord. The heart of our truth is that Jesus Christ is alive and here to teach His people himself.

"Buz" Bloodgood, pastor from Post Falls, Idaho, led the morning inspirational hour. Using 1 Peter, he spoke on faith, hope, and love. Suffering proves our faith; our hope is based on Jesus Christ only. Love is our expression of response.

Competent leaders led 16 workshops. The subjects of tentmaking ministry, peace as taught in Daniel and Isaiah, and practical ways to influence government met some of the needs of members. As an example, the leader indicated that even in politics love should be the first principle.

The Friends Youth have been active in their endeavor to serve Christ. The young people raised \$1,250 to help missionaries attend language school. The 1981 sessions of Yearly Meeting for youth were well-attended. Articles about Quaker distinctives were very informative. The Youth Exec Council visits the area groups and urges a closer walk with Christ in prayer and study of the Word of God. A new field secretary expects to visit and encourage the young people during the coming year. The Friends Youth of Northwest Yearly Meeting praise the Lord for His guiding hand and pray that more teenagers will come to know Christ in the year just ahead.

The Spirit of the Lord has crowned the past year of George Fox College with His goodness and mercy. Young people have responded to their own spiritual needs as well as those of the world. Twenty young people are busy as summer-term missionaries. The student body gave \$1,250 toward their support. The graduating class numbered 109 this year.

The highlight of this Yearly Meeting was the ground-breaking ceremony for the new 1,200-seat chapel building. Many, many prayers are being answered, for our need has been exceedingly great. The Yearly Meeting and the College have outgrown the available facilities. For a number of years the gymnasium has been our gathering place. To God be the glory, great things He hath done.

The epistle was approved with the recommendation that Jack Willcuts do some editing.

■ 100. The statistical report was read in summary and approved. (The report is printed in the Appendix.)

■ 101. Virginia Helm and Clark Smith reported for the Committee to Write Letters to the Aged that personal letters and cheerful greeting cards with personalized notes were written to 42 absent members who were no longer able to attend due to age or illness.

Approved.

■ 102. The Discipline Revision Committee submitted the following to replace section titled "Marriage and the Family" under B—TESTIMONIES, #2, page 12, of the *Constitution and Discipline*:

Marriage is ordained of God for the ordering of the human family in love and discipline. It is no mere civil act. We feel it should be entered into reverently within the church. (The body of believers has a responsibility to pray for and encourage couples who are in marital distress, believing that diligent

care within the Body may avert the tragedy of divorce.) Marriage is for life and ought not be broken by divorce except on scriptural grounds. (In all cases serious attempts should be made for forgiveness and for reconciliation.)

Where divorce has occurred, it is the responsibility of Friends to demonstrate the love of God so that the divorced person may live purposefully within the Christian fellowship. Whether the person remains single or remarries, the church is to show love. If a remarriage occurs, the church is to encourage the new marriage relationship to be centered in Christ's love. Persons who have been divorced and are living consistent Christian lives should not be hindered from joining the church or working in it. (A central purpose of the church is to assure men and women that Christ brings a new beginning in life and its potential fulfillment. When there is forgiveness, there is no desire to remember the past. Just as Christ called and blessed those whom He forgave, so must we.)

Approved as first reading.

■ 103. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for first reading the following statement on spiritual gifts:

The spiritual gifts are bestowed by the Holy Spirit for the propagation of the gospel, for the perfection of believers, and for the edifying of the church in faith and power. It is recognized that the Spirit gives different gifts to different members of the body of Christ (Romans 12). In seeking the baptism with the Holy Spirit, Friends have not so much sought a particular gift, but rather to be controlled by the Giver of the gifts. *The exercise of these gifts brings Christ's truth to personal consciousness in varied ways appropriate to need. Accordingly, sharp distinctions between different types of ministry should not be attempted. Persons may have multiple gifts, exercised at different times, both through ordinary abilities sanctified to divine use and through extraordinary sensitivities and actions.*

Gifts are for God's glory: enduement of power must be subordinate to purity. Friends believe the baptism with the Holy Spirit brings heart cleansing and conformity to the image of Christ (Acts 15:8). *We are exhorted to "make every effort to live in peace with all men and be holy: without holiness no one shall see the Lord."* (Hebrews 12:14 NIV) Friends are exhorted to look to the inner transformation and empowering which produces a condition of love with the fruit of the Spirit and Christian graces enabling one to live a life of victory over willful sin, as the evidence of the presence of the Holy Spirit.

Friends worship is characterized by simplicity and the freedom of the Holy Spirit to minister to the worshipers gathered. *Similarly, service and ministry are characterized by single devotion to God's will and obedience, as a channel for Truth. A local church in gospel order will foster the right use of the gifts, whether in worship or as witness in the world.*

There is a gift of speaking to the states and needs of individuals, congregations, and the orders of society. This prophetic ministry is characterized by its spiritual vision, its penetrating application of biblical truth, the self-evidence of its message, and its timeliness. *Such discerning ministry often arises out of open, silent worship, as Christ lays His message upon a ready messenger. Such ministry reaches to the understanding as well as to the emotions, for it bears the mark of divine unction whether spoken by a minister or by another. It should not be confused with praise or testimony, although these have their place in worship. Prophetic speaking or writing may occur also within ordinary channels of human activity, as Friends declare the word of the Lord. Such prophetic words may be intensely personal and private or pertinent to public life. As a movement Friends have aimed at faithfulness to Christ as Truth, without fear or*

Revelation 21:8, 27. Where there has been repentance there is no desire to remember the past. Just as Christ called and blessed those whom He forgave, so must we, not hindering such forgiven persons from membership and responsibility in the church. Friends churches should exercise concern for their members on such matters, disciplining offenders in love and truth (see chapter III, *The Discipline*).

Approved as first reading.

- 110. Appreciation was expressed for the work of the Yearly Meeting clerks.
- 111. An expression of appreciation was given to Betty Ankeny and the gardeners of Friendsview Manor for the beautiful flowers provided for the sessions.
- 112. Dr. Earl Barker received an expression of appreciation for his many years of service on the Business Committee.
- 113. Jack Willcuts shared some closing remarks asking for prayer for himself and for the Yearly Meeting staff.
- 114. The minutes were approved as corrected.
- 115. Virginia Helm closed in prayer as we adjourned to meet in 1982 at our Yearly Meeting sessions.

ADDENDUM

Sunday Morning Worship

Speaker—Richard Foster

Matthew 6:22-24

"Fasting Twentieth Century Style"

Why should we fast?

1. Because God calls us to it.
2. Fasting reveals the kinds of things that are inside of us—anger, pride, fear, anxiety, etc.
3. It gives us a sense of balance in life.

Fasting is the voluntary denial of an otherwise normal function for the sake of revealing a spiritual need and attitude.

Things we need to fast from occasionally:

1. From people,
2. From the media,
3. From the telephone,
4. From billboards and television commercials.
5. Times when we need to fast from our gluttony.

Sunday, 4:00 p.m., Missions Rally

The program took the form of a Mission Council meeting, with Jack Willcuts as moderator. Those participating were (1) James and Gail Roberts, home on furlough from their first term of service in Bolivia.

(2) Quentin Nordyke introduced Wayne and Beverly Chapman, missionary appointees leaving in two weeks for Language School in Guadalajara, Mexico. A tape was played from Dwaine and Becky Williams, giving directions from Newberg to Guadalajara and other information pertinent to their living and schooling. Wayne spoke of his call to missionary service and their period of preparation.

(3) Roscoe and Tina Knight shared about the beginning of the work in Santa Cruz and building a missionary home at the same time. There is a good strong body of believers in Santa Cruz. There are dozens of new communities starting up in the area, so they're on the "cutting edge" of many new congregations.

There's the possibility of a new evangelical college beginning in this area—"real miracles" need to take place to get it started, one of the main ones being the approval of the Bolivian government.

(4) Ralph and Marie Chapman told of their visit to Bolivia last December and spoke of changes they noticed that had taken place since they served on the field. The middle-class Aymara people living right in La Paz are, according to Roscoe Knight, a wide open door for missionary work at the present time. Also, the Yungas area, an area north of Santa Cruz, and the area north of Lake Titicaca. Tina Knight observed that the newer missionaries have the same job as the earlier ones, but it's easier now because they have the National Church to work with.

(5) Mark and Wilma Roberts have recently returned home from Arequipa—the second largest city in Peru. There is a tremendous population in Peru, therefore tremendous opportunities for missionary work.

Tina Knight spoke of the thrill of going to Mexico City for the dedication of the new church building. Fifteen "gringos" were in attendance, including Dwaine and Becky Williams. The National Church planned and had charge of

the dedication service and have taken on the responsibility of this church—a characteristic that has not been natural for the Mexican people.

Jack Willcuts spoke about our financial responsibility for our mission work. Inflation on the field is about 60 percent over the previous year. Our missionary offering and pledges will be for missionary travel costs for the coming year—an amount estimated to be \$11,500.

James Morris, director of Evangelical Friends Mission, closed the rally with prayer.

The offering and pledges received this afternoon amounted to almost \$13,000.

Department of Evangelism presentation—Howard Harmon, chairman:

Friends Church extension Foundation—a corporation formed to assist in building Friends churches. Phil Harmon, president of the foundation, gave a brief explanation of the opportunities of investing through their organization.

Cascade Friends Church, Bend, Oregon, the newest Friends church in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Margaret Drahm shared how God led her and her family to Bend. Jim Leonard, pastor, shared how God led him and his family to pastor the new group. About half of the Cascade congregation was present. They were introduced, and the "Covenant" that Cascade Friends have made with God was read.

The Department of Evangelism has pledged \$10,000 to help Cascade Church this next year. The offering of \$3,000 received will go toward this pledge.

"The Hidden Preparation Through Which God Puts His Ministers," Acts 12:1-3

In order for "a great people to be gathered" we must go through a time of preparation in our lives. There was a period of 14 years in the life of the apostle Paul during which God was preparing him for the ministry. George Fox went through probably 8 or 9 years of hidden preparation, and Moses spent 40 years in the desert.

If we want God, we're going to be willing and ready to obey. Christ will reveal to us what we must do in this time of preparation, but we should consider:

1. Do not neglect the ministry of small things—it is Christ we are serving.
2. Spend time, energy, and money to strengthen our families.
3. Set ourselves on a course of study that will prepare us for the day of Christ's visitation.
4. Be prepared for some barren days.
5. Learn the work of prayer.

Are we willing to go through what is necessary to be prepared for a great people to be gathered?

Kent Thornburg, chairman, introduced Aaron Hamlin, pastor of Piedmont Friends, who shared about the work at Piedmont and their goals for ministering to and meeting the needs of the community around them.

Katrina Catheart, director of the "Friends for Kids" program introduced her staff members—some of whom had grown up in the program. Many of the children in the "Friends for Kids" program were present; they sang "King Jesus Is All" for us.

Aaron concluded by asking us to continue to work with the Piedmont church in unity with them but not to stifle their culture.

Quentin Nordyke read Acts 6:1-7 in preparation for Richard Foster's message—"The Preparation of Wineskins That Will Allow for a Great People to be Gathered."

In our finite society we must have structures within which to live. The Christian community needs new wineskins in which to hold these structures.

What kinds of wineskins might open up the possibilities of a great people to be gathered?

1. Acts 6:1-7—using structures to liberate and heal.
2. Acts 15—breaking down of old wineskins. People can come to Christ without cultural changes.

One of the greatest impositions is the placing of cultural wineskins on those who come to Jesus. We too often view the "earthen vessel" as the treasure. Wineskins today:

1. The work of Quakers in Bolivia and Peru.
2. Tentmaking ministry of establishing churches.

More specific to us here today—our Yearly Meeting leaders have a tremendous responsibility as they work within the wineskin structure of Northwest Yearly Meeting. We need continually to uphold them with our love and prayers.

TUESDAY

Friends Youth presentation:

Jim Settle, youth secretary, introduced Frank Engle, the presiding clerk of the Friends Youth Exec Council. Frank introduced the other officers of the council.

Jim expressed his appreciation for the work of the FY Exec. Gayle Beebe will be working this next year with Jim and the Exec, visiting the churches and generating consciousness of Friends Youth among the churches. The main concern is assisting the local churches with their Friends Youth groups and the training of sponsors.

Jack Willcuts led in a prayer of dedication for the FY Exec and for the plans they have for the next year.

Quentin Nordyke read Acts 17:22-31 in preparation for Richard Foster's message—"The preparation of Truth giving"

A query used by early Quakers was "Is Truth prospering?"

Two accounts in the book of Acts about truth giving:

1. Acts 7—They had wisdom and the Spirit.
 - a. Wisdom without the Spirit is dry, dusty, dead stuff.
 - b. Spirit without wisdom can be devastating.

There are a lot of "holy" places built out of the will of God and contrary to the intentions of God.

2. Acts 17—Paul's sermon to the Athenians. Paul speaking to the Greeks does not lay Jewish culture on them.

a. He declares God is the Creator of all things.

b. God has made all ethnic groups out of the same "stuff."

Nonnegotiable truths:

Resurrection of Jesus Christ

Incarnation of truth giving for our day—Jesus is alive and here to teach His people himself. His message is not hard to understand, and His voice is not hard to hear if we will listen.

Four characteristics of truth giving that fit our culture:

1. That our truth giving be true—plainness (accuracy) of speech without exaggeration. Let your "yes" be "yes" and your "no" be "no."

2. We need truth giving that sets people free. It's not just the words we say, but the way we say them.

3. We need truth giving that will address the pressing issues of our day—for Quakers, Christian simplicity and our peace witness.

4. We need truth giving that is in the power of the Lord. It's not something that we can make happen. It's a matter of coming together and calling upon God to pour out whatever He may give.

WEDNESDAY

George Fox College presentation:

Bob Monroe, chairman of the Board of Trustees, shared words of appreciation for Northwest Yearly Meeting's support of the college.

David LeShana, president, presented the 1980-81 report of George Fox College. He introduced new faculty members and changes of positions within the faculty.

Thursday at 1:00 p.m. will be the ground breaking for the new chapel/auditorium. The contract to build the outer shell has been awarded to a firm in Salem. The bid was 28 percent below the expected cost. Brochures on "Buy-A-Seat" plan to raise \$500,000 were handed out. The seats are \$500 apiece.

Jack Willcuts, Yearly Meeting superintendent, announced "George Fox College Day" set for March 14, 1982, for our churches. It will be a Sunday set aside to recognize the importance of the college and take special offerings.

The college presentation was concluded with a duet by Joseph Gilmore and John Bowman.

"The Preparation of Reaching Out to Touch People at the Point of Their Need," Acts 10

We need to let go of religious convictions that we hold as honorable and good, that we might obey God.

Enter into the unconditional acceptance of the Lord. Anyone who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to God.

This story (in Acts 10) reveals the deep need people have for acceptance. Some people are all locked up inside and the only way they are going to get out is to have someone enter into their hurt with them.

Needs among people today:

1. In their families—hurts in marriages, failures in raising children, etc. We need to learn and believe that working together as a family is a God-given trust.

2. The need and cry of loneliness throughout America is "who will care, who will discover me?"

3. Application of the Christian faith—people are looking for the application of Christian faith to the needy areas of their lives.

Jack Willcuts gave the charge to the ministry using John 21:15-17.

Glenn Armstrong, chairman of the Department of Ministry, introduced Harvey Bowen and his wife, Terri. He presented Harvey with a Ryrie Study Bible, charging him to study it and "preach the Word." "The Preparation of Inward Confidence"

Isaiah 30:15—"In quietness and confidence shall be your strength."

Acts 13—Paul and Barnabas on missionary journey to Cyprus. Verse 10—Paul said, "Behold, the hand of the Lord is upon you." Paul never tried to "bully" anyone in his own strength. Paul was always confident because he had been through a process in his life that he learned that when he spoke, God spoke.

We need the confidence that will allow us to live with our children, husbands, wives; with our fears, desires, anxieties.

1 John 3:19-31

Three things the heart uses to condemn people:

1. There's condemnation of the heart for who we are. The fact that we are a man or a woman, or that we have a certain type of body. (This is the essential nature of the fallen world.)

2. Condemn ourselves because of where we are. Don't feel right and good about the job we have or where we live; ashamed of families; the type of education we had, or lack of it, etc.

3. Condemnation of what we do. Sin needs to be dealt with, but we have a tendency to condemn ourselves for mistakes that are made. This causes people to be completely without strength.

Verse 20—Sometimes our heart condemns us for things for which God does not condemn us. One of the great anxieties among many in the churches today is the failure in our families.

Condemnation does not save anyone; that is why Jesus said, "I am not come to condemn the world . . ."

1 Peter 1:1-12, Acts 5:41

How to suffer with joy and be fruitful and productive—

Two reasons why we suffer:

1. So that your faith may be proved genuine (v. 7)

a. The "proving" is for the benefit of the individual—not for God.

b. Evidence or proof that faith is genuine—after suffering, do you still love Jesus? If yes, that's the first evidence that the faith is genuine. Second, you still believe in Him.

Third, you're filled with inexpressible joy.

2. That it may result in praise, glory, and honor to Jesus at His appearing (v.7).

Faith is a shield to protect us from Satan.

In the same way as we prove our faith and love of God, we need to do this in our marriages. The statistics of divorce among Christian marriages is almost as high as those among non-Christians.

1 Timothy 1:16

Give God your failures so that even in these He can demonstrate His strength and power, love and patience with us.

TUESDAY

1 Peter 1:3, 13

Faith defies explanation. It's something spiritual. There's nothing we can do to develop it.

Peter states that "Hope is living."

- a. We have to be born into it.
- b. Living hope is based on the resurrection.

Errors Christians make with regard to hope:

- a. Do not set hope fully on the grace that God gives when Christ is revealed.
- b. Some of our hopes are too short-termed.
- c. We often have false hopes. God may want to be revealed through suffering in our lives.

The most tremendous expression of our holiness is our hope. We need to uncloud our lives of our own personal hopes so that we can see God and live wholly unto him.

1 Peter 1:13—2:9

Total Response to the love of God

Peter states that God has given us everything we need for life and for godliness.

Three gifts given by God:

- a) Learn to walk by faith
- b) Learn to set our hope
- c) Learn to love

We need the three gifts to correspond to the three parts of our nature—intellect, emotional, and physical.

The gift that God gives us that enables us to respond to Him is faith. Walking in faith is an exercise.

Suffering has a way of helping us know how to appropriate faith. Suffering helps us with the gift of hope, also—hope based on the resurrection of Jesus Christ. As we learn to appropriate hope during times of suffering, then there's nothing that can defeat us. (Faith is inexpressible; hope demands expression 1 Peter 3:15.)

The gift of love—so that we can respond physically. It's easy to hurt and have compassion when someone is suffering, but God wants us to respond physically and minister to that person.

THURSDAY

1 Peter 2:9-13

The Outward Response to the Love of God that Gives Us Victory—even in the midst of suffering

1. Love Him back

a. In the midst of our suffering, we need to learn to praise God. We need to turn our attention to what God is doing.

b. Do not be afraid to let people know when we are suffering (we work so hard to conceal our hurts). We need people who will challenge us to get ourselves off our suffering.

2. Submit yourselves to every authority.

a. Have a submissive spirit—the opposite is independence, a lawless spirit, which is a tool of Satan.

b. Live in harmony—be sympathetic, compassionate in loving the brethren.

c. Do not repay evil with evil or insult for insult.

We can go through life knowing the truth but missing the joy unless we can learn to respond to the love of God.

FRIDAY

1 Peter 4:1—5:11

We need to be a people that refuses to express the concern unless we have the hope and can express the hope. Otherwise it will turn out to be slander and gossip.

If you are not productive in the faith, then the Lord might as well take you home.

Let us not overlook the glorious things God is doing in our lives as He shapes us.

We have to learn to be able to cover over the sins with love so that those who have sinned will be able to admit it without feeling condemnation.

- a. It starts out with children in the home. If they do not feel the love of their parents when they admit to doing something wrong, they will continue through life unable to admit to their sins.

We have a built-in mechanism that tries to cover up—but there's no deceiving God.

Stand firm in the faith.

- a. Our sufferings will teach others around us.
- b. Our sufferings will also teach us.

Many times, in the name of righteous rebuke, we heap more suffering on those who are suffering.

We must go out from here and love our brethren.

The items listed below are those *Discipline* revisions that were approved as second readings at the 1981 sessions.

In Part I, Chapter II, B—TESTIMONIES, pages 12 and 13, replace Numbers 2 and 3 with the following:

2. **MARRIAGE AND THE FAMILY.** Marriage is ordained of God for the ordering of the human family in love and discipline. It is no mere civil act. We feel it should be entered into reverently within the church. Marriage is for life, and ought not to be broken by divorce except on Scriptural grounds. Persons who have been divorced, however, but have been converted and are now living consistent Christian lives should not be hindered from joining the church nor from working in it.

Friends affirm the state of singleness (nonmarriage) as an appropriate lifestyle chosen by some (1 Corinthians 7:6-9) as well as a state in which one may unwillingly find oneself. Not all are expected to marry and some may find the state of singleness preferred. A single person is considered qualified equally with others in regard to spiritual gifts and abilities for use in the Lord's work.

3. **RESPECT FOR THE BODY.** Believing that one's body is "the temple of the Holy Spirit," and that we should therefore "glorify God with your body" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20), we exhort all believers to "present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." (Romans 12:1) In view of this, we encourage members to give prayerful and conscientious consideration in regard to their reading matter, the amusements they attend, and the activities in which they participate. In contrast to any sensual obsession evidenced in the media, in style of dress, and in printed matter, Friends positively affirm the sacredness of the body and mind and urge Christians to deport themselves in a way that glorifies God.

Members are warned against the production, sale, and use of alcoholic beverages and other habit-forming and body-defiling drugs, including marijuana, tobacco, beer, and wine. We urge vigorous opposition to the persistent traffic by society in such products.

In Part I, Chapter II, B—TESTIMONIES, page 13, replace number 6. CAPITAL PUNISHMENT with the following:

6. SACREDNESS OF LIFE. Because we trust God as the righteous judge before whom men spend their lives in probation, we oppose capital punishment. We feel it is an unchristian preempting of the authority of God over human life. As a leaven in society, Christians ought to lift civil government to a closer approximation to God's laws for human affairs.

Because we believe human life is sacred and created in God's image, we oppose induced abortion for personal convenience or population control. Under no circumstances should abortion be considered without competent medical, psychiatric, and spiritual counseling.

In Part I, Chapter II, B—TESTIMONIES, page 13, add Number 8, CHRISTIAN LIVING, as follows:

8. CHRISTIAN LIVING. Because God entrusted man with the responsibility in the care and use of earth's natural resources, Christians ought to maintain a life-style that will help to conserve and replenish resources important for the life of future generations. As Quakers, who have a long tradition of adhering to scriptural injunctions for plain living, we should seek to transform the values of our culture rather than to conform to them in this important area (Matthew 6:24-34; Philippians 4:6; Romans 12:2; Genesis 1:28).

In Part III, Chapter V, B—**QUERIES**, page 84, replace queries 5 through 10 with the following (only 5, 7, and 8 have been changed):

QUERY 5

Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? Do you seek to glorify Him in your body and mind by abstaining from the growth, manufacture, sale, or use of beverage alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, and other harmful drugs? Are you careful to abstain from amusements inconsistent with a Christian witness and character? Do you pursue temperance in all bodily appetites in order that you by your manner of life may present a positive example to others and may be pleasing to the Lord?

QUERY 6

Do you maintain the Christian principle of peace and consistently refrain from bearing arms and from performing military service as incompatible with the spirit and precepts of the gospel? Do you refrain from taking and administering oaths and from defrauding the public revenue?

QUERY 7

As a steward of God do you seek to glorify Him in the management of natural and financial resources? Is your life freed from excessive attachment to material things? Do you frequently inspect your affairs and settle your accounts? Are you just in your dealings, punctual to your promises, prompt in the payment of your debts, and careful to live within your income and to avoid involving yourselves in business beyond your ability to manage?

QUERY 8

Do you provide for the suitable education of your children, and do you guard them against hurtful reading and evil associates? Are you careful to exemplify and teach the Christian standards of human sexuality in accord with biblical truths?

QUERY 9

Do you make diligent effort to acquaint yourselves and those under your care with the spiritual needs of the world, and do you support by prayer and systematic giving those who are laboring to extend Christ's kingdom?

QUERY 10

Are you careful to uphold the doctrinal standards of Friends as held by this Yearly Meeting? Are you careful in all appointments of officers, missionaries, and Sunday school teachers, in the calling of pastors and evangelists, and in the recording of ministers, to see that they are in full harmony with the fundamental principles of Friends as stated in this *Constitution and Discipline*?
