MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1982

■ 1. Richard Beebe, Yearly Meeting presiding clerk, read the opening minute: "Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 90th session, July 26, 1982, on the George Fox College campus with the theme 'Life Through the Spirit.'" (2 Corinthians 3:4-6)

■ 2. Richard Beebe expressed appreciation for the use of the college facilities, for the staff, and for all the work in preparation for these sessions.

■ 3. The Keynote Address given by Jack Willcuts, Yearly Meeting superintendent, in the Sunday evening service was approved, and follows in condensed form:

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." (Matthew 5:8)

Tonight, this week, and the coming year the pure in heart may see God! Since that is possible, let us reverently take a long, transforming look. Eternity is hard to see, so is tomorrow, but in this moment at hand, in the present we must see God. Not a God of convenience, but God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, the only wise God our Savior. Isaiah writes that he it is that sitteth upon the circle of the earth, who stretcheth out the heavens as a curtain and spreadeth them out as a tent to dwell in, who bringeth out his starry host by number and calleth them all by name through the greatness of his power, who seeth the works of man as vanity, who putteth no confidence in princes and asks no counsel of kings.

This is our only proper perspective; here is where we start—always. This is "Life Through the Spirit." Anything that blocks our view of God at any time is an impurity of heart to be removed at once. Then, we are ready for worship and the work of the Church. "Such confidence as this is ours through Christ before God. Not that we are competent to claim anything for ourselves, but our competence comes from God." (2 Corinthians 3:5 NIV) "... our sufficiency is of God." (KJV)

This is no secret, nor a cablegram from heaven just in. Nor is the Church some mystical abstraction. We Christians who follow Jesus are the Church, so whatever we do now is what the Church is doing. Don't take your eyes off of God! Now is not the time for some esoteric cryptogram, some occult-type twist or life-style; we don't look for some hidden law of the subconscious or for blind, bubbly optimism.

The secret is an open one that plain, ordinary, pure-hearted, wayfaring people just like us may read. To paraphrase Isaiah (35:8), "And a freeway will be there called the Way of Holiness. Only the completely clean may journey on it; wicked fools will not get past the entrance ramp on the holiness highway."

We have come to the 90th session of this Yearly Meeting as seekers to know God's approval and God's anointing, a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit in holiness and power. Some see God now through tears of discouragement, others wistfully in hope and trust; some come tonight with eyes sparkling in new joy and blessing.

Ninety years is not a long time in history, but long enough to have found God is faithful and that God may be working greater things than ever in our church, in our day, not by us, but *through* us in the Spirit. This view and reality is big enough for everyone, every church, every family, every life. Let the Holy Spirit flood our imagination more than ever before with ways of doing work and worship. It is surely proper to look behind at the footprints of God in our midst; then to look ahead even though "prediction is very difficult, especially about the future." (Niels Bohr, *Time*, April 26, 1982, p. 90) But for this single moment, let us take no thought for the morrow. Just look up, and see God.

The beatitude we have lifted out is but one of several, tied carefully together on the foundation of the Sermon on the Mount. They form a clear Christian strategy for action based on holy values and truth. This must mean strategy is necessary and a sense of purpose and direction quite important. They become helpful checkpoints in church life. Using the same process in trying to match our own Yearly Meeting progress over the immediate past three years, let's review the six major objectives put forward here then.

An effective church has—1. harmony among its members; 2. an education program that builds Christian character; 3. a continuing outreach in evangelism and social concern; 4. a stewardship commitment producing adequate leadership and funds; 5. a sense of loyalty, love, and belonging within the family of Friends based on clear convictions; and, 6. a ministry of pastors and people who are encouraged, who dream of greatness and are released to exercise God-given abilities.

If these have been forgotten, let's look at them again. If they are wrong, let us correct them. If they are right, let's keep moving ahead. It is better to move slowly in the right direction than by great leaps or impulsively in the wrong direction or in all directions. Strategy means taking the future seriously.

It is to be a "Life Through the Spirit" competency coming from our companionship with Christ. Holiness is more than a baptism with the Holy Spirit, more than a single act of sanctification; it brings us to a life of new beginnings, fresh infillings for serving. Addressing this year's graduating class at Princeton Seminary, Henri Nouwen offered counsel we all may find helpful: "Without a fervent, lively, and active love of Christ all the knowledge (and experience) you have gathered . . . is not only useless but also dangerous." Let me develop this definition a bit further tonight and urge that we get our eyes off our personal and church problems, and also look past the part of the world that is so crowded with noise and confusion, nuclear threats and the evening news, and under the leadings and openings of the Spirit literally reach out and touch someone—those with anxious hearts waiting to hear a word of comfort, trembling hands eager to be touched, and broken spirits with expectations to be healed. This will involve us all.

And this is ministry. In each of the past three years spontaneous gatherings have taken place in the Yearly Meeting out of concern from younger Friends. Some of these sense a call to pastoral ministry, others to various particular ministry with youth, to the elderly, in music ministries, or in local church or overseas work in some specific way to fulfill an inner leading of the Lord. While

we recognize and record the preaching gift, ministry cannot be narrowed in its prophetic character to words and teaching only. It was George Fox who testified, "The Lord God and his son, Jesus Christ, did send me forth into the world, to preach the everlasting gospel." (*Journal of George Fox*, pp. 34-35) Earlier Friends are remembered as powerful preachers. But there is a significant aspect of the recording process we consider important. I was brought up in the Friends Church to understand that it is not the person being recorded; rather, it is a gift in the ministry that has been bestowed by God's grace on an individual. The gift, then, not the minister, is recorded by the meeting.

With this in mind, we watch for the ways in which all of us may exercise the gifts bestowed. I want to encourage our young people to be faithful in their vision and concerns for ministry—whether recorded or recordable. How fine it will be when Friends of either younger age or in retirement search for ways to serve in the Yearly Meeting where they are most needed! Visiting among the churches one sees clearly the desperate need for additional workers. Just a few more in a small meeting would help so very much. Musicians helping at Highland, Sunday school teachers in Ontario, youth sponsors in Svensen, Christian workers at Quincy, Maplewood, Kent—how encouraging when the Holy Spirit leads us to move about from one place to another in search of ministry, rather than simply settling in a place to be ministered to!

How do Christians choose churches, or Friends select a church in which to serve? Hopefully, this is not done randomly or selfishly, or depending on the popularity of a pastor, or programs alone. We believe "there is a universal ministry of all Christians, and a special ministry of some" (Robert Barclay, Book No. 10, Article 26); not status but function distinguishes this concept. Carrying this idea even further, vocations and professions should be chosen and entered under the Lord's leading and then exercised as a means of support and service in places and ways most beneficial in building the church. The metaphor of tentmaking then would mean, "What sort of skills or abilities should I acquire to serve the Lord best?" And when credentialed as a teacher, a machinist, a physician, a farmer, we then prayerfully declare, "Here am I, send me." Perhaps job openings as well as church openings will follow in even today's employment situation with this New Testament priority put into practice. It should be noted that this very thing has happened often across the years in Northwest Yearly Meeting, and we are grateful. And Friends, this is an earnest plea for the practice to continue. This sort of service and dedication is as critical in developing strong, growing churches as anything we can do.

Of great encouragement is the newly designed "Young Friends" (18-35),—held this spring bringing at least 40 collegians and younger people into an indepth study of prayer and Christian service. They are organizing during these Yearly Meeting sessions and making further plans for implementation.

I am convinced that the most effective, strongest churches are those able to identify and release elders and others of the church for undershepherding ministries. One recent example here in Newberg was the program launched by the local Free Methodist Church when 10 laymen were trained by the pastor, commissioned by the church, and installed by their denominational bishop to serve in specific ministries. This is a pattern entirely compatible and often used by Friends in different ways. We are told that 80 percent of those coming to any church as new attenders come because they are brought by a neighbor, or a concerned member of the congregation. Furthermore, new Christians who grow into maturity are also nurtured most effectively by fellow Christians who bring them into their circle of concern and love. Rather than looking for some super pastor or sensational outreach method, we need to examine our present leadership capabilities under the Spirit's leadings. Our availability and obe-

dience may be far more important than some borrowed plan or denominational strategy. This is New Testament strategy.

The resignation of David LeShana as president of George Fox College and the tragic death of Professor Cyril Carr leave a genuine loss in both the campus and Yearly Meeting. A diligent search is being made to fill these two very important positions; this is a prayer concern for us all.

A year ago a Friends Youth field secretary was named to work with Jim Settle, and Gayle Beebe has served well in this position. He will be going on to seminary next year and is replaced with another graduating senior at George Fox, Frank Engle, Jr., of Melba, Idaho. Next year we will have a Yearly Meeting office in Idaho with Frank in charge. Also, a new group has been formed to serve as a Coordinating Council for Friends Youth composed of the growing number of youth pastors across the Yearly Meeting along with other Friends Youth Exec leaders. This will be most helpful in developing Yearly Meeting-wide youth programs and ministries, camping schedules, exchange of leaders, and other benefits that are bound to come from these creative people.

Another significant program initiated and supported by the Department of Evangelism is the "Focus Conference," held early in the fall, a self-improvement experience for pastors, church staff, and their spouses. These are consistently well attended and greatly appreciated by all who are able to participate. Themes have included Church Growth Principles, Expository Preaching, and last year the pastor's role in Church Administration. The next will be on the subject of Pastoral Counseling.

Increased attention is being given to strengthening the family life in positive, practical ways. A number of meetings have been held with Dr. Sheldon Louthan of the Friends Center for Family Living in Wichita, and leaders of the Evangelical Friends Alliance in developing plans for a more concentrated program of assistance to local churches and pastors concerned about the national problems fragmenting so many families, even within the church. Our denomination is cooperating with the National Association of Evangelicals in their thematic emphasis of the year, called "Save the Family." Targeting the month of October, packets of material on Christian family life will be made available for each congregation, with specific materials being written by Friends also on how to establish family worship. We are all grateful for the splendid devotional booklet *the Fruit of the Vine*, which is edited by Harlow Ankeny and published and distributed by Barclay Press. Every church is encouraged to make use of this devotional material.

To assist the local church and pastors in their work and ministries, three booklets have been prepared this year to serve as handbooks for church committees. When a church appoints and approves a committee for any task, specific, clear directions should be given. Sometimes committees flounder or become discouraged, not because of unwillingness to serve but because of inadequate instructions or because the expectations are not clear. Guidelines for each committee and suggestions to assist each pastor, clerk, and committee chairman are given in these booklets now available. Proper organization, conscientious consistent care in the conduct of business, membership promotion and records may be as important in maintaining morale and spiritual vision as any effort attempted. Careful attention to these matters is urgently requested.

Another open door before our Yearly Meeting is the inner-city, interracial ministry called Piedmont in Portland. This challenge is entrusted to us by the Lord and will be effective as a part of our life through the Spirit. God has put this into our hands and He has pointed the way for us. Will Northwest Yearly Meeting be found faithful in this great stewardship? It is not a ministry to be quickly completed; it is a mission to be assumed with no less commitment than

our efforts in Bolivia. It must become an integral part of our budgeting and prayers. Nothing less will allow it to succeed. It is barely begun, but many lives have already been touched.

Missionary ministries continue as a central concern of Northwest Yearly Meeting. We are accustomed to success stories coming from Bolivia and Peru, and the pattern of the work now is a sequence of seedtime and harvesting. An established church is the fruit of the faithful efforts of so many missionaries across the years, but those now on the field are still planting, cultivating, and joining with mature national Christians in partnership responsibilities—which is a fulfilling form of harvesting.

The evident interest in evangelism, the expertise in discipling, and growing sense of responsibility shown by Friends of Bolivia Yearly Meeting and the emerging churches in Peru is gratifying. The Lord continues to call out those of our Yearly Meeting at home to serve with Friends in Mexico and South America. The variety of abilities, the dedication to excellence and all that is involved in preparing and serving in today's uncertain world as cross-culture missionaries make "our" missionaries special servants of the Lord. We must hold them up in prayer, see that the work is not hindered through lack of funds, and be ready to send them out when the Spirit beckons them to go. Each year is one of transition, with the Morse and George families just returning, the Stansells on furlough, and with two new families, Dwaine and Becky Williams and Wayne and Beverly Chapman, now in Peru. Roscoe and Tina Knight, with their experience and giftedness, also returned to Peru once more to serve in a singularly significant role as church planters and consultants.

Our Yearly Meeting relationship with the Evangelical Friends Alliance and EFM (Evangelical Friends Mission) is one we consider very important. The benefits of these connections, which include the shared developments in Christian education, utilizing Dorothy Barratt's leadership and abilities, the *Evangelical Friend* magazine, the other departmental emphases coming from the EFA Commissions—these tie us as a church in mutually helpful relationships that strengthen our denominational thrust and broaden our vision.

The two areas that are always of interest and assumed to be important measurements of the state of the church are *giving* and *membership*. Consideration of our stewardship situation is both good news and bad.

Compared to previous giving records, the past year's Yearly Meeting budget giving was above average. Compared to the program needs and opportunities, it was too low. Compared to the stewardship potential of our church membership, it is far too low. If the Lord were to visit us as He did the Jerusalem Temple and choose to sit by the treasury, as He apparently did, He could again say of a few widows among Friends and others whose stewardship is so complete that they are giving more than us all.

Russell Baker of Friendsview Manor is one of those. His giving and consistent stewardship are matched only by his vision and concern of our Yearly Meeting potential. As a member of the Stewardship Board, he has done some spot surveys of our churches and has decided that less than 10 percent of us give 10 percent systematically.

Some say that we just aren't as committed as we used to be. Well, after 40 years in this Yearly Meeting, I can report that we never were as committed as we used to be. There is the dream that a unified budget will eliminate or at least sharply reduce all of those special offerings for specific causes. Then we hear from "stewardship specialists" that 70 percent of all religious offerings come from impulse giving, spur-of-the-moment, emotional appeals. Surely we are more responsible than that, and without doubt at least 30 percent of us are! But budget-planning realities always bring the Yearly Meeting Executive Council as

well as local church leaders to the fact that stewardship runs on two tracks; one is education, the other is commitment. Consistent tithing, pledging, and mature faith mean stewardship as a Christian life-style. To reach this goal means a radical, basic agenda in stewardship education. Then the budget system works. But then there come those inevitable special, extra, above-the-budget, often exciting needs. So we try to openly schedule some of these "as the Spirit leads." One expert calls this "right pocket" giving for consistent, every-week stewardship, and "left pocket" giving for those once-in-awhile appeals. Someone's home burns in the local congregation, or we buy a lake at Twin Rocks, a Share Call, a vehicle conks out in Peru. These things, while unexpected, are to be expected. So both the right and the left pockets are given to the Lord without blaming some distant Yearly Meeting office, the local pastor or treasurer.

The real motive for giving is that we enjoy it. Even the Lord enjoys a cheerful giver. Selfishness makes us miserable. Irresponsible stewardship makes us only partially miserable. So these steps are needed: (1) broaden the base of financial support in our membership, (2) deepen the sense of stewardship making it a spiritual truth like Jesus did, (3) develop a sense of unity and togetherness across the Yearly Meeting in program ownership, (4) be scrupulously honest and discerning in our budget making.

It is quite clear that we have underestimated the wealth of our own church in terms of time, education, and money. We need a new measure of stewardship.

Our denominational distinctives are important simply because we know they are true. Our identity as Quaker Christians must be rooted in scriptural, Spirit-led convictions, from which grow our individual and church outreach efforts. Concepts of worship, of ministry, sacraments, peacemaking, decision making are important. Only when we are rooted and grounded in our faith are we able to keep our footing and our vision in a world of economic disorder, the space race, the urban boom, nuclear threat. But eternal truth and salvation are not mere reactions to a threatening, unsettled environment. They have always been there, they always will be. We are not merely to try to survive, we have a mission, a cause, and that cause is Christ. Not a politicized Christ, not a utilitarian or militant Christ, but a seeable Savior making us alive unto God. Then follows a lifetime practice of throwing open our entire lives to the inflow of the Holy Spirit.

It is interesting to observe that during the past year the New Call to Peacemaking and the National Association of Evangelicals, both groups with whom we are involved, have published strong positions protesting the expanding arms race. From the NAE comes this statement: "It is a clear testimony of history that peace has never resulted from preparation for war. No nation has ever invented weapons it did not eventually use against an enemy. Military build-ups have usually led to military engagements . . . Atomic scientists agree that it is foolish to talk about winning a nuclear war. Nuclear holocausts produce only losers." (*United Evangelical Action*, Vol. 41, No. 2, p. 34)

So what can concerned Christians do? For one thing, the church can become vocal and visible in its opposition to the nuclear arms race. If every denomination speaks out, public policy can be influenced. Whether or not all do, we must surely do so for conscience' sake.

We are called to be agents of reconciliation, messengers of peace, "God . . . making his appeal through us." (2 *Corinthians* 5:18-20) I urge the following concerns be exercised in the interest of waging peace:

1. Pray for the policy makers. Prayer is our first and greatest spiritual weapon.

2. For groups in local churches to study issues, pray together, and share information about this concern for peace.
3. Write consistently to our President and congressional representatives, as well as to Russia's first secretary and foreign minister.
4. Obtain, study, and distribute copies of "The Abolitionist Covenant" in civic clubs, community centers, or wherever possible. (These may be secured from *Sojourners* magazine, Washington, D.C.)

Never in my life have I wanted more to be able to say something or be used of the Lord in some prophetic sense to speak God's message. In preparing for this moment I have read again Everett Cattell's book *The Spirit of Holiness*, A. W. Tozer's series, *The Knowledge of the Holy*, *The Pursuit of God*, *The Root of Righteousness*, and also Myron Augsburger's most recent book, *Practicing the Presence of the Spirit*. Feasting my own inner life on these and other devotional classics has been a precious experience. Our Yearly Meeting needs revival and I want it to start in me. "Life Through the Spirit" is more than a slogan, it is a way of living. Our competency, our sufficiency comes from God, only from Him.

A concern many of us share is how our Yearly Meeting while reaching out in effective evangelism can at the same time be drawn closer together in fellowship and trust, with a sense of belonging one to another. This can hardly come about only with urging, certainly not with scolding or coercion. It is a day when parochial interests, local church involvements seem to preoccupy our time and energies. Why do we need the denomination, a Yearly Meeting connection? Rather than repeating the usual answers to that, I suggest, in fact, implore us tonight, that we do two things: commit ourselves to pray for one another and to care for one another—as churches and as Christians. ¹ Pray often, consistently, fervently for those of your own church who are new or who are in need of prayer. ² Then, form a circle of concern for meeting one another's spiritual and other needs. In doing this we will be made strong, together. "Bear . . . one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ."

"We should never make prayer too complicated," Richard Foster encourages us in his writings on the Discipline of Prayer. Nor, he adds, should we wait until we *feel* like praying before we pray for others. Prayer is like any other work. (*Celebration of Discipline*, Harper & Rowe, p. 35) In his writings, Everett Cattell also insists, "Prayer is a discipline. There must be regularity of time and of place in order to guarantee that we get at it and get it done. Regular, definite prayer gets regular, definite answers . . ." (*The Spirit of Holiness*, Eerdmans, p. 66) This is not to imply the validity of praying depends upon striking or phenomenal results, nor does it assure the evidence of such visible manifestations. But specific praying with pure hearts permits God to give specific answers.

William Penn said of George Fox: "But above all he excelled in prayer. The most awful, living, reverent frame I ever felt or beheld, I must say, was his in prayer. And truly it was a testimony he knew, and lived nearer to the Lord than other men; for they that know him [God] most will see most reason to approach him with reverence and fear." (From the preface to George Fox's *Journal*, by William Penn)

"Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you. Quench not the Spirit. Despise not prophesyings. Prove all things; hold fast that which is good. Abstain from all appearance of evil. And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it. Brethren, pray for us." (1 *Thessalonians* 5:17-25)

We urge you to prayerfully consider the following as your part in "Life Through the Spirit":

A PERSONAL STRATEGY OF COMMITMENT

■ 21. The minutes of Monday's session were read and approved as corrected.

■ 22. Lon Fendall led in prayer as we opened our business sessions.

■ 23. The report of the Department of Social Concerns given in the Monday evening service was approved.

EDUCATION BOARD

■ 24. The Board of Education presented a skit depicting the importance of every aspect of Christian education. M. Gene Hockett, chairman, also highlighted their work during the past year.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION: The major role of the Department of General Education is the promotion of non-Sunday school education of members of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Churches in NWYM report an increasing involvement in private education. Twelve meetings are sponsoring day schools or elementary schools that use their church facilities during the week. Another 30 meetings report children attending church-sponsored private schools. Over 200 children and young people attend private schools.

The only education program that receives direct support from the United Budget is Greenleaf Friends Academy, which receives a portion of First Week activities expenses.

George Fox College Day was held across the Yearly Meeting on March 14. Every meeting hosted a representative of the college. Excellent reports have come from this united effort.

Monthly meetings report consistent efforts to promote GFA and GFC by hosting admissions representatives and music groups and by providing information by means of bulletin boards and bulletin inserts. Over 30 meetings give direct financial support to the college by means of scholarships to students and the Church/College Scholarship plans.

Fall 1981 enrollment at George Fox College reported 163 Friends students, or about 22 percent of the student body. Of this number about 140 come from NWYM and the rest from Rocky Mountain, California, Alaska, and Mid-America yearly meetings.

Public education is not neglected by the Yearly Meeting, as 14 members serve on school boards and seven meetings support Bible instruction in public schools through Oregon Released Time Law. Many members of Friends churches are public school teachers or administrators.

There are 38 Friends students now in seminaries. The Yearly Meeting through the General Education Department has provided scholarship/loan assistance to 13 students at Western Evangelical Seminary during the last year.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES: The Department of Christian Testimonies continues to seek ways of highlighting important Friends teachings. This year we distributed to each church free copies of a bookmark on salvation entitled "Quaker Keys" and a pamphlet encouraging the use of the Queries. It is exciting to note in our reading of monthly meeting reports that many churches are reading the Queries in their worship services and printing them in their bulletins. Work is almost complete on a series of seven bulletin inserts under the title "Meet the Friends" written by Paul Anderson.

A complete file of *Evangelical Friend* (1967-1981) has been bound and placed in the WES library. Subscriptions to the periodicals *Friends Journal*, *FCNL Washington Newsletter*, and *Quaker Religious Thought* have been ordered for the WES library.

It is encouraging to see that most of our churches have well-stocked, well-managed libraries. Of the 50 churches reporting, 47 indicated that they had libraries, the average size of which was 632 volumes. Library use was promoted in Sunday school openings and FWMF groups, as well as in bulletin announcements and newsletters.

Almost every church reported active promotion of systematic Bible reading. The most commonly used publications were *Fruit of the Vine* and *Daily Walk*.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH SCHOOLS: The Department of Church Schools helped underwrite the Sunday school material for the Cascade and Piedmont Friends churches for spring quarter. Assistance was also given to the Black Evangelical Christian Education Conference in Portland.

The department plans to provide one quarter's financial and advisory assistance for Sunday school materials to new meetings in the Yearly Meeting who are setting up Sunday school programs.

A team of curriculum specialists was sent to each area in the Yearly Meeting this year to present Christian education workshops. The results of the EFA team has been reported as excellent from many local meetings.

Yearly planning calendars were made available to the local churches this past year with a 16-month calendar planned for 1982-83.

Many Sunday schools reported growth this past year. Not all reports are in at this time, but we anticipate an overall increase in Sunday school attendance for the 1981-82 church year.

REPORT OF YOUTH ACTIVITIES FOR 1981-82: Youth Yearly Meeting began the youth program for the church year. Carey Hall was used as a youth dorm, and most of the activities were centered around that site. Ron Crecelius was the special speaker. Up to 125 youth participated during different parts of the week. Midwinter was held December 28-January 1. Jim Settle was the special speaker for the week. An emphasis on the growing Christian life was presented by Jim. The Volleyball Tournament proved to be another success with record attendance. While emphasis was placed on the volleyball games, equal emphasis was placed on fellowship, renewing friendships, and building unity among NWYM youth. Several youth groups participated in World Vision's Planned Famine, which was coordinated with the Friends Youth Exec to raise money for the Yearly Meeting Youth Missions Project. The goal of \$1,350 (for airfare for the Williamses and for textbooks for Extension Bible School) was raised. Groups involved with the Planned Famine gave 60 percent of their proceeds to NWYM and 40 percent to World Vision.

Gayle Beebe served a successful year as youth field secretary. His service to youth sponsors and youth pastors proved to be a very helpful and encouraging step for the overall youth work in NWYM. Gayle's term ended April 30, and the new youth field secretary, Frank Engle, began July 1, 1982. Frank served as Friends Youth Exec presiding clerk before taking the field secretary position.

Many groups were involved in camping programs during the summer. Several sponsored missions trips (Reedwood ministered in Haiti during June), and several established unique service opportunities in their communities and with other Friends Youth in neighboring communities.

The report was approved.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

■ 25. Ron Woodward, chairman of the Department of Missions, highlighted the report on the mission work this past year.

Ron introduced James Morris, executive director, Evangelical Friends Mission, who reported on the work of EFM. One area being developed now is a short-term missionary program through EFM to help with missions around the world.

God has placed Friends missions in the second largest city of the world—Mexico City; in Manila—one of the 10 largest cities of the world; and in La Paz.

James spoke of the effect that the work of Friends in Bundelkhand, India, has had on the entire continent of India.

He stated, "We need to have a vision for missions. A vision is what you see with your eyes closed and your heart open."

The report of the Department of Missions follows:

Missions is people—people among us who have given their lives to go out and serve on our behalf as missionaries, and the people to whom they go, described by our Lord Jesus as “sheep without a shepherd.” Even today as the Gospel is being preached by Friends in Latin America, people are responding, opening their hearts, experiencing His grace, and finding their lives changed.

Other people on our fields, for whom Christ died, remain outside the circle of Christ's redemption and struggle with the fear, superstition, the emptiness, and the hopelessness of a life without eternal meaning. But there are still other people in the missions picture—you and I, who comprise the support team, the sending agency, the prayer band. Missions is people. We're in it together! And the picture is much bigger than “Aymaraland” through our association with EFM and Friends outreach around the world!

PERSONNEL: During the 1981-82 year in Bolivia, Ron and Carolyn Stansell served at Santa Cruz, with Randy and Mary Morse and Hal and Nancy Thomas in La Paz. In Peru, Gil and Louise George were joined on the Altiplano by Dwaine and Becky Williams. Jean Clark continued living in Puno as our schoolteacher. Roscoe and Tina Knight came to Peru in November to take up residence in Arequipa and to spearhead “the new frontier” in that city. For the 1982-83 year the Georges returned to the States and have been replaced in Peru by Wayne and Beverly Chapman, our newest missionary couple. This coming year we will actually have *fewer missionaries in Bolivia than in Peru* since the Morses have terminated their missionary service and have not been replaced. James and Gail Roberts returned to Santa Cruz replacing the Stansells, on furlough, leaving Hal and Nancy Thomas as the only full-time couple in La Paz.

SHORT-TERM WORKERS: The shortage in missionary personnel has been somewhat alleviated, in the providence of God, by a number of persons who have gone to the field, largely at their own expense, for short-term service. In February Tim Ankeny and Randy Nordyke went to the field for six weeks, volunteering their time both in Bolivia and Peru for construction, maintenance, and routine physical tasks. Ed Cammack spent some three weeks on the field in April and May teaching the New Believers' Course in remote communities and encouraging the national church. Oscar Brown, Cecil Binford, and Ken Comfort went to Peru in June to make a house livable for Wayne and Beverly Chapman. Ken continues on the field for several months to do automotive work and be of other assistance. Schoolteachers, Gene and Betty Comfort, veteran missionaries of an earlier period, returned to Bolivia for two months this summer to assist the Thomases in La Paz and partially compensate for the shortage of missionary personnel in that city. We on the Department of Missions praise the Lord with full hearts for the availability and the enthusiasm of these “short-termers”!

KOREAN WORK: Some exciting developments took place this past year among our Korean Friends in the Portland-Vancouver area. Out of gratitude for the ministry and helpfulness of Oscar and Ruth Brown, Korean Friends raised funds to send Oscar and Ruth to Korea for 10 days in September-October so that they could experience a real baptism into Korean life and culture. The Portland Korean Church, under the ministry of Pastor Gye Wan Jin, has continued at about the same size, gaining some people through evangelistic efforts but losing others. Oscar Brown continues his preaching ministry there in English for those who prefer that language, while Ruth teaches Sunday school. The Vancouver Korean Church, meeting in the facilities of Vancouver Friends and now pastored by Pastor Kim's brother Sam has grown steadily and nears one hundred in attendance.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM BOLIVIAN REPORTS: The country of Bolivia has continued under military dictatorship, with the economic situation steadily declining. The Bolivian peso has deteriorated steadily in value compared to the U.S. dollar. The crisis in the South Atlantic has affected Bolivia, with the sentiment in the country almost unanimously pro-Argentina. There is some anti-American feeling.

In spite of discouragements, the Gospel has moved ahead. A new Christian University opened in April in Santa Cruz with over 200 students studying in six departments. Javier Quispe and Ron Stansell represented Friends, teaching classes during the first semester.

Church statistics, reported at the representatives meeting in January, showing an increase, with over 12,000 faithful believers. La Paz District showed the most increase, with over 6,000 believers. Caranavi and Peninsula districts also reported growth. Cordillera district showed a decrease, with the rest of the nine districts remaining about the same. Several new congregations were added to the INELA, making a total of 170 churches. The Patmos residency Bible School began with over 50 students, but closed the year with only 28, thirteen of whom were Friends. The Patmos extension Bible school functioned with seven centers in the Caranavi, Frontera, La Paz, and Pacajes districts. There were approximately 70 students and 8 national teachers. The San Pablo Seminary had a very good year, with 68 students, about half of whom were Friends. Hal Thomas and Randy Morse were both involved as teachers. Morale seemed very high.

The Mission Council in Bolivia worked this past year in the context of the following two priorities: (1) evangelism and church planting, and (2) leadership training. The council also feels the need to be more active in helping people in economic and social projects. There is much interest in World Concern's greenhouse project. In conclusion, Council Chairperson Nancy Thomas writes:

“The Friends Church in Bolivia is stable but currently plateaued in its numerical growth. The city of La Paz is the bright spot, and the Mission has rightly chosen to concentrate its efforts there next year as well as in the Santa Cruz area. Mission priorities of evangelism and leadership training remain strong, but with only one family in each area, we will have to accomplish our goals mainly through teaching. Also, the need for more involvement and help on an economic level is becoming increasingly obvious. Limited personnel will be a problem.”

HIGHLIGHTS FROM PERUVIAN FIELD REPORTS: Although record keeping is almost nonexistent in Peru and membership statistics are consequently unavailable, 30 churches meet regularly on the Altiplano, 4 on the coast, with 4 new churches, making a total of 38 congregations. The national church has had a peaceful year, with the *Mesa Directive* (Executive Council) functioning quite well. Maturing leadership is evidenced in all quarterly meetings. The Yearly Meeting youth organization held its second annual conference in March with over one hundred youth in attendance. Several Bolivian leaders came to this gathering to provide assistance. The Extension Bible School program (known as IBLA) has been a major focus of the mission during the year. The first term, using a reorganized curriculum, began in June 1981 with 65 students enrolled. Five different centers have been used, with 1982 statistics showing 66 students completing courses in January, 63 in February, and 64 in March. The objective during the past years was to train at least one national teacher to teach the first-level course, while missionaries taught levels two and three. The Peruvian Mission Council has worked hard during the year to give IBLA exposure to the churches and increase its stature in the minds of believers. Another major project for the council has been the revision of the

Constitution and Discipline for the national church, patterned in part after the one used in Bolivia.

In regard to geography, it was hoped that missionary housing could be secured in Ilave in order to move our "missionary presence" nearer to the heart of our work on the peninsula. This remains a goal for the future, but circumstances seemed to necessitate locating both the Williams and the Chapman families in Juli for at least this next year. Evangelistic outreach in Arequipa has been slow and difficult so far, but the coastal church at Tacna shows many encouraging signs, with believers from Tacna traveling to Arequipa to provide assistance.

PRAISE NOTE: Largely through the generosity of one family in the Yearly Meeting who, in answer to prayer, provided a cash gift of \$11,700 for missionary vehicles, we were able to purchase a new Toyota pickup for the work in Peru and to order a new vehicle for Bolivia. It should be noted that cost for both new vehicles amounted to about \$32,000, but with the sale of used vehicles and some budgeted funds on hand, the cash gift provided exactly the amount necessary to meet our immediate need! May the Lord be praised for His great faithfulness!

CONCLUSION: During the year the Department of Missions has worked hard to strengthen our missionary promotion at home and to develop a greater awareness of the great work to which we are called together. In a day when some are assuming that the age of American missionaries going abroad is drawing to a close, we see a critical need for increased personnel to meet specific objectives and move into vast new frontiers of evangelistic opportunity. We praise the Lord for the work of James Morris and Reta Stuart in the EFM office in Denver and value their practical assistance to our work. We also strive for a greater sensitivity to the work that we share together, not only in Mexico City, where our dear friends Everett and Alda Clarkson are laboring, but also in places like Rough Rock, Arizona, Hong Kong, Burundi, India, Taiwan, and the Philippines. In a time when economic pressures severely test our Christian resolve to fulfill the Great Commission, "let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works!"

Report approved.

- 26. The Department of Ministry unanimously recommended the recording of Steve Wood as a minister of the Gospel in Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

Steve Wood shared his testimony with us. He is presently serving on the pastoral team of Newberg Friends in the area of Christian education.

- 27. The Department of Ministry unanimously recommended the recording of Keith Vincent as a minister of the Gospel in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends.

Approved.

Keith Vincent shared his testimony with us. He is serving on the pastoral team of Newberg Friends as youth minister.

- 28. Earl Barker, who has faithfully served for many years on the Discipline Revision Committee, has requested to be released from further duties on this committee, effective July 27, 1982.

Resignation accepted with appreciation.

- 29. Walter Wilhite, executive director, presented the annual report of Friends Fund:

As I complete my ninth year as executive director of Friends Fund, I join in with Ephesians 5:20, "Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

A number of people have been blessed by peace of mind by being good stewards and setting their property in order in the form of wills, trusts, and other estate-planning work.

This has been a year of varied duties, probating estates, holding classes on wills, and explaining the services provided by the Friends Fund agency. The Friends Fund has been appointed as power of attorney for a number of people and is serving in that capacity for two now.

- 31. Willard Black, pastor at Caldwell, led in prayer as we opened our business sessions.

- 32. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

- 33. Harold Ankeny, clerk of the Representatives, standing with Earl Barker and Arthur Roberts, offered prayer as the chairmanship of the Discipline Revision Committee is passed from Dr. Barker to Dr. Roberts; also for the many years of faithful service by Adelaide Barker as she has resigned from the Epistle Committee.

■ 34. A returning minute for Gary and Jean Macy was read and approved.

■ 35. At the request of the Spiritual Life Board of the Yearly Meeting the Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action an additional paragraph for inclusion in the *Constitution and Discipline* on page 59, to follow (7) Voluntary Surrender of Position as a Minister, to read as follows: (8) Forfeiture of Recorded Status. When an individual has retired from the ministry, not by reason of age or physical disability (his own or that of his family) and has chosen not to enter any form of pastoral, evangelistic, teaching, or Christian service ministry, but has entered a secular occupation and has continued to pursue it for five years, the department will call into question his privilege to retain his status as a recorded minister. With approval of the Spiritual Life Board and the Yearly Meeting, the certificate of recording will not be renewed and status as a recorded minister is forfeited. In such a case certification of recording is reclaimed and his name is removed from all official lists of ministers. If at a later time the church finds that there is qualification for reinstatement, recording will occur in the regular way.

Approved.

■ 36. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second reading and final action the following replacement of the first paragraph and the addition of a paragraph to the section titled "Marriage and Family" under B—TESTIMONIES, #2, page 12, of the *Constitution and Discipline*:

Marriage is ordained of God for the ordering of the human family in love and discipline. It is no mere civil act. We feel it should be entered into reverently within the church. The body of believers has a responsibility to pray for and encourage couples who are in marital distress, believing that diligent care within the Body may avert the tragedy of divorce. Marriage is for life and ought not be broken by divorce except on scriptural grounds. In all cases serious attempts should be made for forgiveness and for reconciliation.

Where divorce has occurred, it is the responsibility of Friends to demonstrate the love of God so that the divorced person may live purposefully within the Christian fellowship. Whether the person remains single or remarries, the church is to show love. If a remarriage occurs, the church is to encourage the new marriage relationship to be centered in Christ's love. Persons who have been divorced but are living consistent Christian lives should not be hindered from joining the church or working in it. A central purpose of the church is to assure men and women that Christ brings a new beginning in life and its potential fulfillment. When there is forgiveness, there is no desire to remember the past. Just as Christ called and blessed those whom He forgave, so must we.

■ 37. The Discipline Revision Committee submitted for second reading and final action a new section to appear on page 13 between sections 3 and 4. We have edited to include their suggestions this final draft by the Representatives of a Discipline revision under B—TESTIMONIES, entitled "Human Sexuality."

The revision was read and tabled until Thursday. Pg 18-19

■ 38. Sheldon Newkirk, cochairman of the Department of Social Concerns, highlighted the work of the department this past year.

He introduced Dick Wild, who shared the concern the Lord has laid upon his heart—that of prison ministries, sharing 2 Corinthians 5:14-20 as the basis for that concern.

Dick and his wife, Sandy, are presently involved with four institutions: Oregon State Correctional Institution, Correction Division Release Center, the Women's Penitentiary, and Oregon Women's Correction Center. They not

only minister to the inmates while they are in prison but also as they come out and readjust to society. The Wilds would like to form a network of churches throughout the state that would be willing to help released prisoners who have accepted the Lord—taking them into the church, nurturing and discipling, helping to find housing, jobs, etc.

It is their desire to be released to work as full-time missionaries to the prisons.

The report was approved.

■ 39. Ken Smitherman, superintendent of Greenleaf Friends Academy, presented his report. He introduced members of the staff who were with him: Karen Smitherman, director, preschool program; Diana Kennison, preschool program; Jess Kennison, junior high and high school principal; David Smitherman, high school English teacher.

With the end of this 1981-82 school year, Greenleaf Friends Academy completed 74 years of providing Christian education.

Opening the high school level, our annual "First Week" at Quaker Hill in McCall, Idaho, provided a powerful program for grades 9-12 integrating the academic, social, physical, and spiritual. Charles Bloodgood, pastor at Post Falls Friends Church, was spiritual emphasis speaker. Special music was provided by his wife, Linda, and Vic and Sharri Peterson, also of Post Falls. The week was excellent with a positive spiritual growth among the entire student body.

Our spring Spiritual Emphasis Week was held in April. Ken VandenHoek, youth pastor at Boise Friends Church, ministered to junior and senior high students, while Harley Adams, pastor at Melba Friends Church, spoke to the elementary students. The morning chapels were followed by individual counseling sessions with students.

Student population increased 12 percent over the previous year in grades K-12. Enrollment at the various levels reflected approximately 100 in preschool; K-6, 149; 7-8, 64; and 9-12, 136.

The elementary and secondary faculty, preschool staff, and several trustees attended the Association of Christian Schools International Northwest Teachers Conference at the Seattle Center in October.

Athletically, 1982 was the year for GFA as a fired-up basketball team won the district championship and proceeded to win the state basketball title under the coaching of John Ehrlich.

We are enjoying the overwhelming positive support of our constituency, especially that of our school families. A strong parents' move to make the GFA building program a reality has resulted in a two-phase building project that includes phase one, a new classroom and office complex to the east of the present gym and shop, and phase two, which will be a new gymnasium planned for the west side of the present gym.

At this point nearly \$225,000 in gifts and pledges had been generated for the \$500,000 project.

The classroom-office complex is presently under construction, with plans to be completed by school opening this fall.

A slide presentation highlighting the ministry of the academy was shown. Report approved.

- 51. The Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship, with Geraldine Willcuts, president, presented their report.

The women had about 400 in attendance at their banquet Saturday night. The offering of \$2,000 plus will be used for the schooling of David and Kristin Thomas in La Paz.

The retreats this year will be held at Quaker Hill September 30 to October 3, and at Twin Rocks October 14-17. Marti Ensign from Seattle will be the speaker.

Spring rallies were held in each of the areas of the Yearly Meeting. The offering of \$2,355.30 will be used for air fares for our missionaries.

The FWMF puts out a newsletter, "Quaker Waggin's," bimonthly, with 750 women on the mailing list. Women in the Yearly Meeting have read a total of 4,233 books this year.

We continue to support the Piedmont work with \$250 monthly and Dwaine and Becky Williams in Juli, Peru, \$350 monthly. We also send books and give magazine subscriptions to the missionaries.

Women have many ways of raising funds to support our missionary work. Entiat women made 75 quilts.

The total giving of the FWMF for both home and foreign missions this year was \$28,758.48.

Report approved.

- 52. Richard Beebe and Earl Perisho gave a report on Evangelical Friends Alliance.

The EFA General Conference was held August 13-16, 1981, in Canton, Ohio. About 35 people from Northwest Yearly Meeting attended the conference, with a number of them leading workshops.

A new format for EFA Coordinating Council meetings is being planned. They will rotate each year to be held within the different yearly meetings belonging to the EFA. The evening services would then be open to the members of the yearly meeting.

The Evangelism Commission of EFA in cooperation with Friends United Meeting has prepared a 30-second video public service-type announcement emphasizing the centrality of Jesus Christ. It is available for purchase, and the last phrase can be personalized to your local area if desired.

Report approved.

■ 53. Aaron Hamlin presented the report of the National Black Evangelical Association. He expressed appreciation for the support of Northwest Yearly Meeting and asked for prayer for their work.

The NBEA has had a great influence in many white evangelical Christian institutions. It has also helped to build bridges among black evangelical Christian churches. The NBEA is trying to build a resource of black leadership so when they receive requests for help they can fulfill those requests.

Through the work at Piedmont Friends, they are trying to set up a model for other churches to follow in this same type of ministry.

The NBEA is still vital and necessary in building bridges between the black and white evangelical communities and to help keep us from going back to the racism of the 1960s.

Richard Beebe thanked Aaron Hamlin for his presentation and for the vision he has for the work of NBEA.

M. Gene Hockett spoke to the fact that when we know the need, we have responsibility. He admonished us to not go away from hearing this report without shouldering some of the responsibility.

A time of prayer followed.

Report approved.

■ 65. Richard Beebe called the meeting to order at 11:15 a.m. The minutes of Wednesday afternoon sessions will be read this afternoon.

■ 66. The Stewardship Board presented the remainder of their report. We need approximately 21 percent yet to meet the needs of the program of the Great Commission Ministries this year.

Jack Willcuts shared factors that have affected the giving to the Yearly Meeting and also how God has been faithful to supply when we've had emergency needs arise.

The budget of the Great Commission Ministries was read. Beatrice Goldsmith and Jack Willcuts pointed out that as we approve the \$511,000 budget we have committed ourselves through the Holy Spirit and our churches together to raise the other \$108,000 still needed to meet the unpledged part of our budget.

The budget was approved.

The Board of Stewardship has outlined a proposed strategy to complete our budget:

1. Conservative spending—10 percent reduction.
2. Major effort by boards and departments to fund an adequate budget October-December.
 - A. Steering committee (appointed by Yearly Meeting Executive Council)
 1. Coordinate and monitor.
 2. Devise alternative methods of fund raising.
 - B. Careful review and adjustment at midyear. (Stewardship Board and Executive Council)

3. Local church Yearly Meeting representatives, board and department members, and the pastor to be contact persons in each church; to be encouragers, educators, enthusiasts.
4. Pledge card for individual giving through local church.
5. Entire plan to continue through year. Reviewed and revised at year end by Stewardship Board and Yearly Meeting Executive Council.

The Board of Stewardship report was approved.

- 67. Dr. Leo M. Thornton, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, presented the report of the seminary:

WES, as a graduate school of theology and Christian ministries, has a unique and important role especially for the Pacific Northwest:

- founded in 1945 by members of the Evangelical United Brethren and Friends Church to perpetuate the faith into the coming generations;
- faithfully prepare an evangelical-holiness ministry for the future;
- preserve a place where today's practicing ministers can receive refresher courses and improve their ministry.

WES is moving forward to take advantage of these opportunities:

- enrollment: 1981 - 224; 1982 - 261; summer 1981 - 68; summer 1982 - 95;
- new professors for this year: Dr. Albert Stiefel, Ph.D., Counseling, Nazarene Theological Seminary, Boston Divinity School, Boston University.
- Rev. Mark Weinert, Ph.D. (candidate), Church History, Western Evangelical Seminary, University of Portland, Vanderbilt University;
- 1981-82 three professors received their academic doctorates;
- 10 years of full accreditation: Association of Theological Schools, Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges;
- Program for the Deaf—first in a protestant theological seminary;
- two computers (two) for the administration, and one for the library (ordered and paid for);
- 42 irrevocable trusts for the seminary and between 350-400 revocable trusts.

Friends Church participation at Western Evangelical Seminary: Trustees—Karl Alteneder, Dr. Hector Munn, Dwight Kimberly, Howard E. Harmon, Dorothy Barratt, M. Gene Hockett, Jack L. Willcuts. Students—1981-82, 21. A number of churches have contributed to WES between July 1, 1981, and June 30, 1982.

The seminary has some major needs: additional funding for the annual budget; WES Partners, presently 900, goal 1,000; new library to accommodate approximately 100,000 volumes and various specialized collections; a continued spirit of renewal to undergird the evangelical-holiness emphasis of the school.

I would like to pay special tribute to Dr. Gerald Dillon and Dr. Bruce Hicks, who have served faithfully at the seminary for many years. We are in urgent need of a representative of the Friends Church on the faculty of the school. Dr. Gerald Dillon and Donald Green will be teaching in an adjunct capacity at the seminary for the coming year.

The seminary appreciates the interest and support given to the school by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. It is a personal joy to meet the many graduates of our seminary who serve in this area and across the country in the Friends Church. We are partners together in the enterprise of spreading the Gospel and advancing the kingdom of God.

The report was approved.

- 68. Richard Beebe closed in prayer as we adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

- 69. Ron Watson, pastor at Marion, opened in prayer.

- 70. The minutes of the Wednesday afternoon session were read and approved.

- 71. The minutes of this morning's session were read and approved as clarified.

- 72. The Department of Ministry unanimously recommended Ron Rittenhouse to be recorded as a minister of the Gospel in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends.

Approved.

- 73. The report of the Spiritual Life Board was presented. Ralph Beebe, chairman, Department of Peace Testimony, presented their report:

The Department of Peace Testimony urges a peacemaking life-style because it is biblical. From the "shalom" of Old Testament Israel to Christ's instruction that we love our enemies, peace is central to the Christian message.

We recommend peacemaking because it is a part of the historic Friends testimony. "We feel that war and violence are not consistent with the Christian holiness to which we are summoned in Christ," the *Constitution and Discipline* of Northwest Yearly Meeting states.

We encourage peacemaking because the arms race is counterproductive to security. The deterrence theory—that nations can permanently scare other nations into not using their nuclear weapons—is highly risky, irrational, and productive of insecurity.

The Department of Peace Testimony this year has had two major goals: to enunciate Christ's message of love and reconciliation and to try to make sure no young person in Northwest Yearly Meeting ever has to face induction into military service without having seriously considered whether he/she is a conscientious objector to all war.

Department personnel have conducted workshops, taught classes, and given sermons in about 10 Friends churches, several other denominations, Warner Pacific College, Voice of Calvary Ministries in Jackson, Mississippi, and at the major interdenominational "Waging Peace" workshop in Portland. Among the highlights were one- and two-day workshops at Camas and Friends Memorial (Seattle) churches, where the local Friends hosted representatives of from 8 to 10 denominations. Seven members of Northwest Yearly Meeting attended the third National New Call to Peacemaking Conference at Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania, in June 1982. They included David Schmidt, Jeff and Jeannete Bineham, Marcia Hadley-Clinger, Jack Willcuts, Sharon Jones Hayden, and Ralph Beebe.

Among our goals for 1982-83 is the establishment of an information network across the Yearly Meeting that will enable us to communicate legislative concerns and provide biblical draft counseling to young people, parents, and church leaders. We continue to seek invitations to assist congregations in fulfilling this part of their responsibility.

The department encourages the membership of Northwest Yearly Meeting to commit themselves to a peace ministry in ways such as the following:

1. Study the biblical mandate of love for all, including our enemies.
2. See to it that no one of potential draft age fails to understand Christ's message of love and peace.
3. Examine our lives to see if the seeds of war are present in our attitudes, actions, and possessions.

4. Study *Waging Peace, The Bible and War*, and other materials that will help us reaffirm our devotion to Christ's calling.

5. Initiate a nuclear freeze drive in our local communities.

6. Communicate with our elected representatives on issues of peace and justice.

7. Study and actively respond to the "New Abolitionist Covenant."

8. Host workshops to which non-Friends are invited.

9. Feature peace issues in Sunday school series.

10. Work actively for justice on the local, national, and international levels.

Jack Willcuts reported on the National New Call to Peacemaking Conference.

Report approved.

■ 74. The Department of Peace Testimony submitted the following resolution:

In recent years the Selective Service System has continued to make extensive preparations for administration of the military draft. It is very possible that Congress will take up the issue of reinstatement of the draft within the next year.

Northwest Yearly Meeting reaffirms its complete opposition to military conscription and calls upon its members to express their convictions to their elected representatives in Congress.

Approved.

■ 75. The Department of Peace Testimony submitted the following resolution:

It has become apparent that the new regulations regarding alternative service for conscientious objectors currently being finalized by the Selective Service System raise serious difficulties. The regulations speak of conscientious objectors contributing to the war effort by working in areas of national priority. It is because of our faith in the Prince of Peace, Jesus our Lord, that Friends have respectfully declined military service in obedience to the commandment to love our enemies and do good to our persecutors. Friends have in the past willingly accepted alternative assignments of a serving, peaceful, and totally nonmilitary nature. However, if conscientious objectors in the future are requested to support our nation's military activity in any manner, we cannot in obedience to our Lord encourage cooperation.

Northwest Yearly Meeting therefore respectfully requests that in the event of a draft, conscientious objectors be allowed to perform their alternative service in assignments unrelated to the military that clearly meet human needs in keeping with the Gospel of Christ. We call upon our members to communicate these convictions to the President, Congress, and the Selective Service System.

Approved with clarification as to what we consider "nonmilitary assignment" to be.

It was requested that the clerk and individuals of the Yearly Meeting write to the President and congressmen.

■ 76. The Department of Peace Testimony submitted the following resolution:

President Reagan has requested a \$1.6 trillion military budget for the next five years. Members of Northwest Yearly Meeting believe this will contribute to an arms race that will be counterproductive of its intentions, producing fear and insecurity, and threatening nuclear holocaust and economic chaos.

Northwest Yearly Meeting reaffirms its opposition to the arms race and calls upon its members to speak out against the production and deployment of both nuclear and conventional weaponry.

Approved.

■ 77. The Department of Evangelism report was presented by Earl Perisho, chairman.

Scope for our work includes but is not exhaustive:

— monitoring of extension churches and pastors and offering programs and objectives.

— projection of new church-planting sites and interviewing candidates for church-planting pastors.

— custodian—"comptroller" care of nongrowing, unhealthy churches that may be moved to extension status—monitoring their progress and future projections.

— maintaining a sense of stewardship in real estate invested in nongrowing churches and how assets may be better used.

— monitoring Share Call programs.

— approving capital funds expenditures and/or loans for extension churches.

— advisors-counselors for land purchases, for new churches, and relocation sites for other churches.

— planning themes and speakers for Yearly Meeting.

— planning themes and resource persons for fall Focus conferences.

— exploring any and all ways to reach an exploding world—from innovations to borrowing "tried and tested" techniques from others, i.e. exploring multiuse of facilities in a day of soaring real estate costs, assessing and evaluating evangelistic programs for local churches and making them available, exploring and collecting tested principles of church planting and growth.

Now, if you are tired of this endless list of the scope of our concerns, so are we—but we are not discouraged! In fact, we are excited about the work of the Department of Evangelism and feel that we are working on the cutting edge of the Yearly Meeting's future.

Several churches continue to grow and expand under the direction of God's Spirit and under excellent leadership, and it excites us to be a part of that process—to have purchased a mobile unit so that it can be used at Post Falls to let them continue to grow beyond their physical plant's limitation is exciting . . . purchased property in the Twin Lakes area so Hayden Lake can plant another church . . . assisted Cascade Friends with specific goal-setting and budgeting so that they can steadily grow and gain community credibility . . . endorsed Sprague River's transition from mission point to local church status . . . observed and encouraged the planting of a new church by Boise First Friends in East Boise, which demonstrated some of the best planning and preparation we have seen.

All of these happenings are inspiring. However, time, money, and energies are soon expended, and we have not been able to give all the leadership we really would like.

Friends can greatly assist by supporting increasing concerns for penetration into as many as 15 church extension possibilities.

Those qualified could assist the Evangelism Department in appraising and evaluating real estate parcels for potential development; for "tentmakers" able to assist struggling churches lacking leadership and support.

Friends may not realize there is approximately \$100,000 in the Friends Church Extension Foundation available to be loaned immediately for church expansion.

We are grateful for the choice and response of resource people who have made these Yearly Meeting sessions a great blessing, and we praise God for our guest speaker Myron Augsburg's ministry.

We are convinced Friends must be committed to excellence in a time of great challenge. Therefore, we will:

- strive to plan more strategically and thoroughly in the search and selection of church planting locations;
- attempt to helpfully assist extension pastors more effectively in developing growth goals and resources in accomplishing these;
- encourage more consistent accountability from extension churches;
- attempt to provide someone to visit and encourage each church-planting work more frequently;
- expect more accountability from churches with evident nongrowth, helping them if possible to find better ways to utilize their resources;
- attempt to make at least one new church planting a reality this year.

Appreciation is expressed for the continued prayers and interest, the enthusiastic encouragement and support from so many. We give praise to God who will build His church among us.

A first gathered meeting of Friends in McCall, Idaho, was two weeks ago.

Twenty-five years ago Earl Geil and John Retherford had a vision for purchasing what was then an open nine-acre field on Fisher Road near Vancouver, Washington, for \$7,500. Today the property may be worth up to a quarter of a million dollars! The population has grown as well with new housing and potential for continued growth. It is a great opportunity.

Twin Lakes and Bayview—two new church extension development opportunities near Hayden Lake, Idaho—are beginning group Bible studies and Sunday evening services. Bayview has had 30-35 meeting for Sunday worship since the end of May.

Approval was given to the transition of Post Falls, Idaho, from extension to local church status, and Sprague River, Oregon, from mission point to a local church.

■ 78. Jim Leonard, who is being recorded as a Friends minister, shared his testimony. Jim is pastor at Cascade Friends in Bend.

■ 79. Ron Rittenhouse, also being recorded as a Friends minister, shared his testimony. Ron is pastor at Whitney Friends in Boise.

■ 80. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second and final reading the following (edited Minute 109) on Human Sexuality:

Friends believe that the divine intent of marriage is to fulfill the emotional, spiritual, and physical needs of humankind and that only within the bonds of marriage divinely ordained can there be a beautiful sexual relationship for the purposes of reproduction and life enrichment. Adultery and fornication are sinful because they distort the purposes of God for the right ordering of human sexuality.

Friends believe that the practice of sexual perversion in any form is sinful and contrary to the God-ordained purposes in sexual relationships. These perversions include sexual violence, homosexual acts, transvestism, incest, and sex acts with animals. The sin nature is capable of vile affections when humankind rejects the moral laws of God.

Scriptures relating to these distorted and perverse forms of sexuality include Genesis 19:1-13; Deuteronomy 22:5; Leviticus 18:20, 22, 23; Romans 1:24-28; 1 Corinthians 5:1, 2 and 6:9-20. Neither in the Scriptures nor in church history have these practices been regarded as consistent with righteous living.

Friends do not accept as members those involved in these perverse practices; neither do they permit them to hold positions of responsibility or leadership in the church. However, Friends believe that the grace of God is adequate to cleanse and deliver from all sin (1 John 1:9; 2 Corinthians 5:17), and they desire to be tender and sensitive to all people, ready to express kindness, love, and forgiveness. See also Jude 7, 8; Colossians 3:5-7; and Revelation 21:8, 27. When the erring one has been repentant, the past should not be remembered. As Christ called and blessed those whom He forgave, so must His followers. Friends must not hinder the forgiven person from holding membership or having responsibility in the church.

Friends churches should exercise concern for their members on matters of sexuality and should discipline offenders in love and truth (see Chapter IH, *Discipline*).

Approved as second and final reading.

■ 81. A traveling minute was read for Harold and Marilyn Antrim of Boise. They will be studying in England and Israel. They plan to visit Friends in Israel, England, and Ireland.

Approved.

■ 82. A letter of appreciation to Adelaide Barker for her years of faithful service in the Yearly Meeting was read.

■ 83. The Memorial Committee conducted a time of remembrance and thanksgiving for the lives of three ministers and 47 other members who passed away during the year.

Mattie May read Psalm 116:12-15 and Glenn Leppert led in prayer. Philip Morrill sang "It Will Be Worth It All," "When We See Christ," and "My Savior First of All."

Written memorials were read for Denver B. Headrick, Edwin Clarkson, Paul W. Barnett, Gordon Miller, Howard S. Harmon, Sr., Margaret A. Main, Lester DeLapp, Anna Morgan, Mary Butler, and Cyril Carr.

■ 101. The annual report of the Quaker Benevolent Society was read: Cash balance July 1, 1981—\$871.90; Total receipts—\$6,878.75; Total receipts and beginning cash balance—\$7,766.08. Total disbursements—\$6,719.15; Cash balance, June 30, 1982—\$1,046.93. (Agent's fees of \$15.43 not included in report.) Number of death claims—11; new members—8; members discontinued—0; QBS members June 30, 1981—640.

■ 102. A time of worship followed. Gene Hockett led us in congregational singing. Lon Fendall read a short article concerning Friends and the conducting of business and worship together.

Jack Willcuts brought a devotional message, using Numbers 13:27-33 as his text.

In possible tensions and decisions regarding our work as Yearly Meeting—we need to work together under the Lord's leading to resolve these tensions and to make decisions. We need to pray for each other.

As we conclude our sessions, let us take these four words with us: Pray, trust, courage, and faith.

May it be said of us, "Behold how they love one another."

A time of silent worship and sharing followed. Lon Fendall concluded with prayer.

■ 103. Barry Hubbell, president, Board of Publication, presented the board report:

Highlighting the accomplishments of the Northwest Yearly Meeting Publication Board during the 1981-82 year has been the study and the establishment of a new governing structure for Barclay Press. Started in one man's basement, Barclay Press now has grown to a \$350,000-a-year business with 11 employees, serving the entire Yearly Meeting and other church-related organizations.

The growth has necessitated the increasing attention to business operations and management decisions by the Publication Board. The board and the Executive Council have shared the concern for more adequate business expertise and leadership. An independent Barclay Press Task Force, appointed by the Executive Council, after nearly a year of study reached several conclusions and recommended the creation of a board of directors to deal directly with Barclay Press concerns with more frequency than the twice annual meetings of the entire Publication Board.

With the approval of the Executive Council, the Publication Board has established a sub-board to be known as the Barclay Press Board of Directors. It will be composed of five members to meet at least monthly with the Barclay

Press manager and the Yearly Meeting superintendent. Of the five board members, two will be selected by the Publication Board (one its president and the other at-large), and three named by the Executive Council, which will give approval for all.

This new Barclay Press Board of Directors will have the direct responsibility for advising on policy and management and budget decisions. It, however, remains a sub-board of the Publication Board, and with the Publication Board members also serving, the emphasis will be retained that the Press is a church press above all, not just a commercial operation.

The primary emphasis for the new governing level has been to secure adequate business expertise. This is in no way to be seen as a reflection on current Barclay Press management or the Publication Board, but is the recognition of the need for additional knowledge and input to continue successful operations of the church's printing arm.

BARCLAY PRESS MANAGER'S REPORT. This has been a good year at Barclay Press. This is because we fulfilled our mission—printing and distributing *Evangelical Friend*, *Fruit of the Vine*, *The Adult Friend* and *The Teacher's Friend*, *Vision*, *EFM World*, *Keeping Current*, Sunday school materials, and many jobs for George Fox College, NWYM, and others. We are able to provide quality work in a reasonable time with competitive pricing. We have a good staff. In a time when many businesses are having serious problems, we have plenty of work. We have been able to pay off some indebtedness. We share a sense of ministry.

The fiscal year started with the installation of an air conditioner for the back room, then we installed a piece of equipment for shrink-wrapping books and other packages. Unfortunately it occupies floor space, which is in short supply. Most recently we have shared in the purchase of a new Canon copier in the Yearly Meeting office.

Marshall Sperling, our new bookkeeping-office manager, has been with us for 10 months and is doing a good job. It's a varied job: answering phones, payroll, accounts receivable and payable, customer relations, financial statements, and much more. Tad Cobb, who had been Dennis Headrick's assistant in pasteup and camera work, left recently to attend graduate school. We are expecting to fill that position in the near future. Jean Clark is doing well as our newest typesetter, replacing Bruce and Jan Allen.

Then there are the old-timers: Dennis and Eva Headrick, Les Peterson, myself, and part-timers Dan McCracken, Ruth Brown, Rachel Hinshaw, and Donna Wood.

We have not published a "book" this year except, of course, the college catalog, YM *Minutes*, FWMF booklet, and regular publications. Nancy Thomas's book of poetry is typeset, waiting to be finished, but it seems every day and every week has its top priority jobs that must be done.

We are in better financial condition now than either a year or two years ago. We have reduced notes payable over \$6,000 this past year and are current with other obligations. Much credit goes to Marshall's attention to keeping the books up to date. Several bookkeeping changes have been made this past year and some are noted on the current financial statement. We are very conscientious about what we charge customers, maybe to a fault. And the nature of our work is often nonremunerative and certainly never what could be called lucrative or profit-making. It doesn't seem the economy has had a negative effect on the Barclay Press, as this is the first time revenue has topped \$300,000.

I appreciate the cooperation and encouragement of the Publication Board in this important work the Lord has directed us into. Respectfully, Dick Eichenberger, Manager.

PUBLICATIONS COORDINATOR. The first year with the position of Publications Coordinator for Northwest Yearly Meeting has been completed successfully. This is a one-fourth-time commitment by the Yearly Meeting. Dan McCracken has more than adequately filled this role, also spending one-fourth time in work on the *Evangelical Friend* magazine (salaried by the Evangelical Friends Alliance) and one-half time with Barclay Press. In his publications coordinator position he serves as assistant magazine editor, working closely with Superintendent Jack Willcuts in various assignments. He also works closely with individuals and boards of the Yearly Meeting with their publication needs. With one year of experience under general guidelines of the Publication Board, a formal written job description is now to be prepared.

ARCHIVIST. The archives are now relocated into a new archives location on the George Fox College campus. Charles Beals continues to give volunteer service as Northwest Yearly Meeting archivist. This position allows the Yearly Meeting to preserve its history for posterity. But more than just a repository the archives also have become usable as a source of material for scholars, researchers, and those with special needs requiring information about the church and its background.

BOARD ORGANIZATION. The Publication Board has reelected Barry Hubbell president; Harold Antrim vice-president; and Ruth Brown secretary.

Barry Hubbell presented Florene Nordyke with flowers, thanking her for her contribution over the past several years for editing the Northwest section of the *Evangelical Friend*.

■ 104. Marcia Hadley-Clinger attended the National New Call to Peacemaking in June. She shared with us some of her experiences and feelings about the conference. Her report was approved as part of the report from the Department of Peace Testimony.

■ 105. Arthur Roberts gave some background information on the work of the Discipline Revision on "The Bestowment of Gifts," (edited Minute 103, 1981) The meeting was opened up for discussion on this revision. Rose Valley church sent a communication to the Yearly Meeting regarding this statement.

To appear under FUNDAMENTAL TRUTHS #5, page 28 of the *Discipline*.

Friends believe that spiritual gifts are bestowed by the Holy Spirit for the propagation of the gospel, for the perfection of believers, and for the edifying of the church in faith and power. In seeking the baptism with the Holy Spirit, Friends have sought not so much to receive a particular gift as to be controlled by the Giver of the gifts. Even so, it is recognized that the Spirit gives different gifts to different members of the body of Christ (Romans 12). The exercise of these gifts brings Christ's truth to personal consciousness in varied ways appropriate to need. Accordingly, sharp distinctions between different types of ministry should not be attempted. Persons may have multiple gifts, exercised at different times, both through ordinary abilities sanctified to divine use and through extraordinary sensitivities and actions.

Friends believe that gifts are for God's glory and that endowment of power must be subordinate to purity. Friends also believe that the baptism with the Holy Spirit brings heart cleansing and conformity to the image of Christ (Acts 15:8ff). In Hebrews 12:14 (NIV) we are asked to "make every effort to live in peace with all men and be holy: without holiness no one shall see the Lord." For evidence of the presence of the Holy Spirit Friends are exhorted to look to inner transformation. This transformation empowers the believer to live in victory over willful sin and produces a condition of love, shown outwardly by the fruit of the Spirit and Christian graces.

Friends worship is characterized by simplicity and the freedom of the Holy Spirit to minister to the worshipers gathered. Similarly, service and ministry, both channels for Truth, are characterized by obedience to God and single devotion to His will. A local church in gospel order will foster the right use of gifts, whether in worship or as witness in the world.

There is a gift of speaking to the states and needs of individuals, to congregations, and to the orders of society. This prophetic ministry is characterized by its spiritual vision, its penetrating application of biblical truth, the self-evidence of its message, and its timeliness. Such discerning ministry often arises out of open, silent worship, as Christ lays His message upon a ready messenger. Such ministry reaches to the understanding as well as to the emotions, for it bears the mark of divine unction whether spoken by a minister or by another. It should not be confused with praise or testimony, although these have their place in worship. Prophetic speaking or writing may occur also within ordinary channels of human activity, as Friends declare the word of the Lord. Such prophetic words may be intensely personal and private or pertinent to public life. As a movement Friends have aimed at faithfulness to Christ as Truth without fear or compromise. They have aimed at the high gift of prophetic ministry as admonished by Paul in 1 Corinthians 14:1.

There is a gift for the ministry of instruction and exposition: for teaching the truth. Those who possess this gift are enabled to contribute in different degrees toward establishing the membership and expanding the conception of divine things. This ministry of teaching requires a balanced, trained, and well-stored mind and the consecration of that mind to the service of Him who is the truth.

There is the gift of exhortation, which is an ability for making an appeal to the hearts of men, stirring them to a sense of God's love and His purposes for them; it is the power of moving and convincing souls. Those who possess this gift are peculiarly fitted for evangelistic work.

There is also the pastoral gift, which consists especially of ability to do personal work with individuals or with families. This gift enables the possessor to comfort those who mourn, to lead the members into a deeper religious life, to arouse in the young an interest in the things of the Spirit, and to impress others with a sense of the scope and reality of the spiritual life. It is the gift of shepherding and feeding the flock.

The church does not make or appoint ministers; it only recognizes gifts where they exist and properly provides for their exercise and development as a sacred bestowal of the Head of the Church.

In addition to those for the ministry of the Word, other gifts are set forth in the Scriptures. Friends should prayerfully await and receive the divine leading and should be open to the movings of the Spirit. The gift of tongues (languages) is not considered the evidence of the baptism with the Holy Spirit. This view is supported in 1 Corinthians 12:30, where the question "Do you all speak in tongues?" is answered with an implied "no." In his letter to the church at Corinth, Paul approaches the matter of speaking in tongues as if it had been a difficult problem.

According to the belief of Friends, Scripture teaches that any gift of the Holy Spirit is to be exercised in a setting and manner edifying to the Church (1 Corinthians 14:26-33). Any practice in worship or other Christian gathering is to be a spiritual help to the body of Christ and to the individuals involved.

Approved as second reading and final action.

■ 106. The Discipline Revision Committee proposed the following changes:

On page 53 replace the title (1) Pastoral and Extension Work with (1) Department of Evangelism. In the paragraph that follows substitute the word

"department" wherever the word "board" occurs. Also in this paragraph delete the sentence "It may appoint . . . help from the Yearly Meeting is desired." and substitute this: "It examines and helps determine the desirability of new locations and of plans for construction and remodeling of churches and parsonages."

On page 54 delete (4) Procedure for Recording and Liberating of Ministers and substitute (4) Department of Ministry.

On page 54, (4) (a), a' "Recognizing the Gift" line 2, change "Gifts in the Ministry" to "The Bestowment of Gifts."

On page 55, part (b), line 1, change "Department of Ministry" to "Department Membership."

After discussion it was referred back to the Department of Evangelism for further consideration on the wording of the sentence "It examines and helps determine the desirability of new locations and of plans for construction and remodeling of churches and parsonages."

■ 107. The Discipline Revision Committee proposed the following changes in the *Discipline* regarding the Spiritual Life Committee:

Pages 36 and 37, Part C, "Committees of the Local Church"

Under number 1, discontinue the heading "Spiritual Life Committee" and paragraph 1. Substitute the heading "Committee of Elders" and the following paragraph:

The committee is composed of three or more active members of the church appointed for terms of three years, with the terms of one third expiring each year. It is charged with responsibilities as follows (see also paragraph c, page 59):

Keep items *a* through *p*, but change the last sentence of *f*, page 37, as follows:

Omit "who may be called elders."

Change "is given" to "may be given."

Part 59, part *b*, "The Area Secretary"

Paragraph 1, line 12:

Omit "their spiritual life committee chairmen."

Substitute "the chairman of the Committee of Elders in the local meeting."

Paragraph 2, line 2:

Omit "through their spiritual life committee chairman."

Substitute "through their Committee of Elders chairman" and place commas around the phrase.

Page 59, part *c*, "The Church Committee," paragraph 1

Revise paragraph 1, as follows:

Each local and extension church appoints a committee of elders. It appoints as elder a man or woman (Galatians 3:26-29) who is discerned as a consistent Christian exemplifying the qualifications given in 1 Timothy 3, Titus 1:5-9, and elsewhere in the Scriptures. The elder is recognized (John 15:14-17), rather than chosen, by the church for qualities of character and for spiritual maturity and depth. Evidence of these qualities in the elder is as important as the ability to perform the responsibilities. Jesus says in Luke 22:26, "The greatest among you should be like the youngest, and the one who rules like the one who serves." (NIV)

The meeting was opened up for discussion.

It was approved to refer this back to the Spiritual Life Board for further consideration.

■ 108. The Representatives received similar concerns for a study of the long-term ministerial needs of the Yearly Meeting. These concerns came from the

Reedwood Friends Church and the Yearly Meeting Board of Spiritual Life. The concern reads as follows:

The Representatives recommend that an analysis of the long-term ministerial needs of Northwest Yearly Meeting be initiated. The study should determine Northwest Yearly Meeting pastoral needs (present and future) as seen by Yearly Meeting administration, pastors, and congregations. The study should determine ways in which these needs can be met including consideration of ministerial training, career enrichment, the recording process, and Yearly Meeting supervision. The study should investigate possible cooperative efforts with other yearly meetings, denominations, colleges, and seminaries.

A ministerial study committee consisting of lay persons and Yearly Meeting administrators should be named by the Representatives and submitted as suggestions to the Yearly Meeting Executive Council [for nomination]. The Yearly Meeting Executive Council will be requested to call the committee together and encourage its activity. The committee is requested to give a progress report to the Executive Council at midyear board meetings 1983, reporting back to Representatives next July.

Approved.

■ 109. The Representatives propose that any student who is a member of a church in Northwest Yearly Meeting and is recommended by his or her monthly meeting may be eligible to receive scholarship support to attend seminary.

The pastor, clerks, and others of the monthly meeting will provide guidance and counsel to the person contemplating seminary. The monthly meeting is urged to seek assistance from the Yearly Meeting in the evaluation of appropriate seminary training.

Communication and prayer support will be faithfully maintained during the seminary experience by the monthly meeting, the Yearly Meeting superintendent, the Department of Ministry, and the Department of Education.

The Department of General Education in consultation with the Department of Ministry shall continue to assume the responsibility for procedures and guidelines, including application forms, calendar deadlines, program suggestions, and distribution of scholarship funds.

Following discussion on this proposal it was approved.

■ 110. The Epistle Committee submitted the summary of epistles received from other yearly meetings:

There were 34 epistles received. Thirteen were from foreign countries. In addition, 10 came from Young Friends meetings and 4 from Junior Friends meetings.

London Yearly Meeting. "We have been challenged with relentless urgency to face the implications of living in that Spirit which takes away the occasion for all wars, in our personal lives, in our private finances, and in our work of reconciliation in the wider community. The spiritual resources in our meetings for worship are limitless."

Japan Yearly Meeting. "In another five years we will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of Friends work in this country. We made the following plans for projects to work on for the centennial year:

1. The translation of George Fox's *Journal* into Japanese.
2. Writing a centennial history of Friends in Japan.
3. Writing our own Queries.
4. Writing testimonies of our own belief."

Ireland Yearly Meeting. "To our own situation of conflict in Northern Ireland Quaker Peace and Service has responded through its Northern Ireland Committee with the establishment of a Quaker House in Belfast where William and Joan Sinton are to live and continue the task of reconciliation."

Baltimore Yearly Meeting. "Executive secretary Thom Jeavons' message spoke to our condition. He challenged us to become true disciples in complete obedience to God. We should begin to solve problems by turning to God and rejoice in God's works, not good works."

■ 111. The Epistle Committee submitted the epistle from our Yearly Meeting to be sent to other yearly meetings:

Dear Friends, The 90th session of Northwest Yearly Meeting convened July 24, 1982, at George Fox College, Newberg, Oregon, with the theme "Life Through the Spirit." In his keynote message, Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts quoted from Matthew 5:8 and exhorted us to purity of heart that "... in this moment at hand, in the present, one must see God. Our competency, our sufficiency comes from God We are called to be agents of reconciliation, messengers of peace, 'God making his appeal through us.'" (2 Corinthians 5:18-20)

Last year Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship (FWMF) replaced the name Women's Missionary Union (WMU) but their work has not changed. There are 62 fellowships in Northwest Yearly Meeting affiliated with Evangelical Friends Alliance. This year the fellowships contributed monthly gifts of \$250 to the work of Piedmont Friends and \$350 to the Dwaine Williams family in Peru. Retreats, reading, and group activities continue to unite our Friends women in fellowship and service.

"Missions is people" is the conviction of Missions Department chairman, Ron Woodward. Committed people answer the command, "Go ye." The challenge this year is to new frontiers in the jungles and in the great cities like Mexico City and La Paz. A number of Friends have gone to Bolivia and Peru for short terms partially at their own expense to help in automotive, construction, and teaching needs. Meanwhile, in the Portland-Vancouver area, the Korean church raised funds to send Friends Oscar and Ruth Brown to visit Korea as a gift in gratitude for their ministry and helpfulness.

Among the 28 workshops offered, six had to do with missions. Other subjects were prison ministries, inner-city ministries, an update on draft legislation, and a film *The Last Epidemic*, which alerted those involved to the extreme seriousness of the problems of our nuclear age.

The morning and evening worship sessions were addressed by Dr. Myron Augsburg, a prominent author and educator and moderator-elect of the General Conference of the Mennonite Church. Dr. Augsburg spoke with depth and feeling of the transforming nature of Christ in relation to the concept of the Kingdom, the relationship to the Spirit, the understanding of Scriptures, and the ability to love and to forgive. Friends were challenged to search the Scriptures and their own hearts.

This year marks the departure of Dr. David LeShana as president of George Fox College and the beginning of a careful search for a new president. Long-range planning for the future of the college is under way by the Century One Planning Commission. Dr. LeShana's fine work has given this commission a greatly improved campus on which to build a future.

Four men and one woman were recorded as Friends ministers. Twenty-two others are studying and are in process for recording. Friends youth have been ministering also in service projects in Idaho and in Haiti. A new calendar of youth activities for 1983 will be available in the fall. It is our young Friends who are maturing into full-time service. It is largely a renewal among younger Friends that has prompted the calling of a conference at midyear of Yearly Meeting representatives and others to study the implications of universal ministry.

Finally, Friends, we send our greetings and prayers and support for you in those concerns that we share. "May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all." (2 Corinthians 13:14)

Approved.

■ 112. The report of the Executive Council actions was read:

1. The Executive Council held a retreat September 11 and 12, 1981, for long-range planning.

2. At midyear meeting in February Roy Clark gave background on the recording process for ministers and mentioned some of the frustration involved in this process by some. A committee composed of the clerk, president of the Spiritual Life Board, and the superintendent was to name a committee to study possible *Discipline* revision for the recording process.

3. The dates were approved for the midyear boards to meet February 11, 12, 1983, and the Executive Council to meet February 25, 26, 1983.

4. It was approved for Yearly Meeting 1983 to be held July 23-29 at George Fox College.

5. A Long-range Planning Committee was named for the following purposes:

a. to establish for at least a five-year period specific objectives, goals, themes, and overall plans for Yearly Meeting direction;

b. that this become a standing committee that would meet quarterly or oftener as needed to fulfill these functions;

c. the committee includes Yearly Meeting assistant clerk as chairman, the Yearly Meeting executive secretary, presiding clerk of Representatives, presidents of Education Board and Stewardship Board, chairman of departments of Missions, Social Concerns, and Evangelism;

d. The general superintendent would be an ex officio member.

6. Harold Ankeny reported at midyear on a retreat held by some of the Representatives. They propose *Discipline* revisions relative to a minimum of two Representatives being named from each church on a rotating term basis; named a nominating committee to function all year; proposed a study of board tenure; study of Representatives themselves, who best to serve, etc.

7. A letter was received from Earl Barker stating his desire that a new chairman be appointed to the Discipline Revision Committee. The Administrative Committee named Arthur Roberts to fill this position.

Most people in America need a new God—for to them God is an absentee landlord.

In the Scripture in Acts 10, God gave Peter a command. Peter's reply was "Not so, Lord." If you say, "Not so," you cannot say, "Lord"; and if you say, "Lord," you cannot say, "No."

In the trance (vision) that Peter was in, God was opening up new dimensions beyond the Judaistic tradition. We tend to cut ourselves off from new things that are not in our "ethnic" (Quaker) background. The dogmatism that says "no" to God cuts off (prevents) our spiritual growth. Many times we offer things that we can *do* rather than coming to grips with our own inadequacy.

God may be preparing us today for something that we may have to do in the future. The deliberate "yes" to God is the only step to spiritual growth. It doesn't happen unconsciously.

Ron Woodward and Quentin Nordyke conducted interviews with the following:

Oscar Brown, recently returned from Bolivia and Peru, where he, *Ken Comfort*, and *Cecil Binford* spent several weeks working on the home for Wayne and Bev Chapman. His impressions of mission work being done today—19 years after he served on the field—are: 1. The maturity of the national church today. 2. There has never been a greater opportunity for the spread of the Gospel in Bolivia and Peru than today.

Tim Ankeny—Tim and *Randy Nordyke* were in Bolivia and Peru February 8-April 17, 1982. In Santa Cruz they were "bricklayers" for the new church. The potential for growth of the church in Santa Cruz was limited because of the size of their building. In Peru they worked on the mission houses, painting, cleanup, and many odd jobs.

James Morris—executive secretary for Evangelical Friends Mission, recently returned from a trip to India. Friends missionaries are right in the middle of the hardest area of India to work. They are impacting the people of India far beyond their own area.

In the Philippines, a new church has been started.

Mexico City—the missionaries are conducting a community-wide survey to determine the unchurched people in the area. They have the drawings for the permanent church building.

Ed Cammack returned from a recent trip to South America. He spent time in Bolivia teaching the New Believers' course in the new churches. In Peru he ministered to the believers through encouragement and counseling.

Jean Clark spent the last term on the field as teacher to missionary children.

Randy and Mary Morse returned to the States from Bolivia. Mary stated how the Aymara women had ministered to her and had been an important part in her spiritual growth. Randy worked with the seminary program in La Paz.

He sees the "new frontiers" there as special leadership training in new areas near the borders of Chile and Peru.

Roscoe Knight spoke through a taped conversation with Jack Willcuts. We have a strong, growing church in Peru. Our day of opportunity is great, but the time is short.

Ron and Carolyn Stansell. Carolyn stated that in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, she was able to become more involved in the local church and thus had a closer relationship with the people. Ron said that the "new frontiers" in Santa Cruz are cross-cultural and urban ministries. The young people are no longer "country" people. They have moved to the cities and are receiving college education. A new Christian university has been established in Santa Cruz, with Friends having an important part in leadership.

Gil and Louise George had returned to the States from Peru. Louise has been involved with the Extension Bible School—training the new believers.

Gil shared his thoughts with us on "the place of missions today." Many people are questioning the need of missions. However, just to question the necessity of missions today is to question our obedience to God. Missions is not for only "missionaries"—it is for all Christians.

Missions must become a personal commitment for each one of us. Only 10 percent of mission work is done in areas where people have not heard and there is not an established church.

The missionary offering and pledges of \$11,941 received in that service are invested in *people*!

The message of the Kingdom, Jesus said, is that it is "among you." It is not simply an outer structure. No church has captured the Kingdom, but God is doing different things through different churches. If we stay off to the side and do not affect society, we have failed the mission of Jesus Christ.

The Kingdom

1. Happens where Jesus is ruling.

Jesus saved us in the past but also He saves us today from what we might be without Him. He liberates us to become all that He intended us to be. Where Jesus rules, love abounds.

2. Creates dualism in society.

The constant witness of the Kingdom in society creates a dualism—gives another choice. Evangelism is anything that makes faith in Christ an option (a possibility) for a person.

3. Realm of the Spirit (Romans 14:17).

How do you measure things in the realm of the Spirit? The feeling of love and acceptance is one of the most important things. Discipleship is not a legalistic adherence to a code but rather the rule of the Spirit.

You cannot just talk about love, justice, peace, and the simple life; you have to talk about Jesus, His Kingdom, His Word. With all our talk about the Kingdom, we must be sure we personify the meaning.

To be an effective witness for Jesus, we need a cleansing so that the line between us and God is open.

It is important for us to outthink our age—to be at the cutting edge of what is happening. But more importantly, we need to “outlive” our age, which means to know the quality of life that is “the Jesus life.” This happens only by the power of the Spirit of Christ.

The baptism with the Spirit—simply the occasion when Jesus gives the Holy Spirit to dwell in the life of one who takes Him as Lord—may or may not have a particular manifestation. The important thing is the gift of the Spirit himself rather than a manifestation.

The filling of the Holy Spirit is an experience to be

1. Desired—to wait and long for the Holy Spirit in your life. God doesn't force His way in.

2. Definite—you are aware that you have done personal business with Him; to know the meaning of His presence in your life. The Holy Spirit doesn't come into our lives just so we can feel good. He is here to glorify Jesus—to lead us into *all* truth; to create change in our lives; to make us persons who reflect the image of Jesus Christ.

The power to live this life through the Spirit depends upon our openness and honesty with the Spirit.

The question as to how we read the Scripture is one of the important ones for every disciple. The true disciple comes to the Bible with his mind already made up to obey it.

How we interpret the Bible—people can expound on the full inspiration of Scripture yet have many different ways of interpreting the Bible. We bring our own theology to the Scripture as we interpret it.

The written Word:

1. *Unfolding revelation*—fully inspired from beginning to end; no contradiction in meaning in the Bible. Some of the attitudes of the Old Testament are at a sub-Christian level—they're not at the Jesus level yet.

We must read the Bible in its setting and content. In interpretation of Scripture, there is a relationship between the Old and New Testaments that needs to be understood—the unfolding revelation, old covenant to new, promise to fulfillment.

2. *Meaning of the passage*

We need to know the difference between taking the letter literally and the meaning literally. We need to find the basic intent (meaning) of the passage—the meaning of which the symbol is communicating—and then apply that meaning literally.

The Sermon on the Mount, as E. Stanley Jones says, “is the Christian's working philosophy of life.”

3. *Discerning between prescriptive and descriptive passages*

It is important to learn this difference. Abraham took another wife—that's descriptive but not prescriptive, saying that we should do it.

We are not churches (Friends and Mennonites) who have a theology just like everybody else, only tacking a little peace concern on the edge. We have a theology that is consistent and systematic as any other, but with the understanding that we take the Scripture as having its fulfillment in Jesus—that it is not a flat book, but it unfolds toward Jesus, and that Jesus is the ultimate expression; then our peace concerns permeate the whole approach to theology.

The longer we walk with Jesus, the more we can see that everything centers in Jesus Christ. I am saved in relating to Jesus and I behave in relating to Jesus. Ethics is not separate from salvation.

If love was possible without the Gospel, we would need no Gospel. If love is not possible by the Gospel, then we have no Gospel. That love *is* possible by the Gospel is what Christian discipleship is all about.

What it means to take the love of Jesus seriously:

1. Love elevates others above self.

—Love is more than just a feeling, it's something you do. It means that one's life is intimately open to another.

—Turning the other cheek is not surrender, it's a strategy of operation. It gives a psychological advantage, causing the other person to wonder what makes you “tick.”

—Christian missions/evangelism—genuine love means we are there because we care about persons.

2. Love elevates persons above material.

—*People* are more important than *things*. Things (including money) are to be used for the church and for my brother in need.

—love cares about the intrinsic worth (the value) of another person, not measuring worth by the dollar sign, but by the individual.

3. Love elevates behavior above bargaining.

—the teaching of Jesus is costly but it's one way to close the gap between the “haves” and the “have nots.” It is costly because it is so demanding in terms of giving of ourselves. We need to have the goal of enhancing the cause of the kingdom of Christ; of believing that one is called to be a steward for the well-being of people. This love must build bridges. It must not depersonalize or manipulate people, but must move beyond the issue to the person.

This theme calls us to be involved in the world as those who make things happen—as servants. Jesus himself said, “I am among you as one who serves.” Decision between two wash basins—these are two philosophies of life:

Pilot’s wash basin is the *modus operandi* of the status seeker.

Jesus’ wash basin is the *modus operandi* of the servant of God.

We all have a philosophy of life that is very basic to what we do.

The expression of love means we must discover how to serve others, not by how we *want* to serve them, but as *they want* to be served. As long as we serve others the way we want to serve, then we are still in charge and are not truly serving.

John 18 is the setting for the two wash basins that represent a dualism in society. The decision we must make involves a total life-style.

Wash basin of Pilot:

- to dodge responsibility; wanting nothing to get in the way on his way up. Looking out for “number one.”
- the Jews were religious people on the climb and they couldn’t accept Jesus, who had become popular with the masses.
- what Pilot did in washing his hands was status seeking—he cared about himself, not truth.

The person totally committed to Jesus Christ won’t sell out at any price. When we compromise, we’re washing our hands in Pilot’s basin. Worldliness at its deepest level is having our own way rather than God’s way. Status seeking is one of the ultimate expressions of this.

Wash basin of Jesus:

Jesus said, if I have washed your feet, then you should be willing to do lowly, menial tasks for others.

Whether or not we practice the symbols—baptism, communion, foot-washing—we need to catch the meaning of these and to be true servants.

One of the worst sins is man’s tyranny to man, and the way to contrast that is Jesus’ answer, the way of loving service, the *modus operandi* of God.

Forgiveness is the most difficult thing in the world. It is hard because it is costly.

Refusal to forgive sin is a power play. You can hold it over the other person—remind them of what they did. To forgive means you release them.

Refusal to ask for or accept forgiveness is a matter of pride, our own arrogance—not wanting to be obligated to anyone else; not wanting to admit or face up to our need of being forgiven. It means that you continue to carry the burden of whatever you’ve done.

Forgiveness is an attitude of life—you just keep expressing forgiveness because if you love and care about people, you aren’t interested in refusing to forgive.

Calvary was the ultimate expression of God’s forgiveness. If Jesus had stopped short of death, He never would have answered the depth of forgiveness that was needed for mankind.

Forgiveness means the innocent one resolves his own indignation on the sin of the guilty one and lets the guilty one go free.

Consider:

1. Forgiveness is the only way estranged persons can get back together. Then in that forgiveness, accept one another again.

2. Forgiveness is costly because it means that the innocent one carries his or her own guilt or wrath upon the sin of the other person and lets that person go free. The innocent suffers for the guilty; resolves in love and lets the guilty go free.

3. This forgiveness when experienced results in a transforming freedom. When we fail to accept that forgiveness, we miss that freedom. When we fail to extend that forgiveness, we fail to express the freedom in our life; become bound up again; and the person we should have forgiven misses out on the witness of the meaning of forgiveness.

The only place we ever meet God honestly is at the foot of the cross. And the place that God meets us and deals justly with our sin and estrangement is at the cross.

The Word articulates the need, but the *deed* puts into practice the Word.

Ephesians 2:14-19 is the most remarkable theological statement about the social implication of the Gospel anywhere in the New Testament.

There is a difference between social work and social work in the name of Jesus. Evangelical faith and social concerns must be consistent with each other. Christian mission and education is social work. Education is the social dimension of the Gospel. It is preventive, rather than “mop-up” after lives are ruined.

Three crucial issues facing us today:

1. The greatest moral issue is the nuclear arms race.

A Christian needs to be a “nuclear pacifist.” No one will win in a nuclear war.

To be a pacifist does not mean that you stand by and watch a criminal commit a crime and do nothing, but that you actively do something to deter the criminal without killing him.

2. The greatest social issue is injustice to the poor.

Matthew 25:31-46—Jesus asks us to hear Him say that this judgment will be on the basis of the way we have expressed the meaning of our walk with Him.

3. The greatest spiritual issue is how to do missions in a world of 4.7 billion people where 2.7 billion people will never come to know Christ through Christian neighbors because they don’t have them.

Speaker—Myron Augsburger; "Jesus and Discipleship," Luke 9:57-62; 9:23-26

A disciple is one who both learns from and identifies with his master—the total of identifying life with Christ. Discipleship—the positive dimension of Christian faith.

Three words important in missions or evangelism—presence, service, and communication; and in that order. We earn the right to be heard. What one verbalizes is received depending upon what one already has demonstrated by example. Holiness is only communicated by example—expression of life.

What Ghandi of India said about other religions (as recorded in E. Stanley Jones's autobiography) gives us a neat outline of the philosophy of Christian mission:

1. Live your religion.
2. Be clear about what you believe so we can understand you.
3. Make love primary.
4. Be more understanding of other religions.

The tendency to be judgmental of other denominations causes us to lose out on "lifting up" Jesus.

To be an effective disciple:

1. *Make up your mind*—a decision. We are called to live by another kingdom, by another spirit. We are not a part of this world, this age; but that which makes us different is our commitment to Jesus.

2. *Give up your autonomy*. Self-centeredness is our real problem in life until we come to Jesus. The only answer is to know Jesus and accept Him. Surrender is to come under the lordship of Jesus Christ.

3. *Take up our identity*—take up our cross (identity) and follow Jesus. The identity that says, "Jesus is Lord and I am His servant"; to let people know by our word and example that we are servants of Jesus Christ.

A Christian has one *vocation* in life—he may have several occupations as long as they are consistent with the vocation of being a disciple of Jesus Christ.

1981-82 GEORGE FOX COLLEGE REPORT

(Condensed from printed report)

"Gloria in excelsis Deo."

Those words—Glory to God in the Highest!—were the ones I penned on the highest brick I could find when on top of our newest building this year, the William and Mary Bauman Auditorium.

But those words also have a broader meaning for the 1981-82 fiscal years. I want to exclaim again, "Glory to God in the Highest." I know of no better phrase to describe not only the construction of the long-planned chapel, but also this entire year. It is one way to acknowledge the leadership of God upon our campus and to ascribe all praise to Him! He has been good to us, and to Him belongs the glory.

It was a time of reflection and also a time of recommitment. The mission and purpose of George Fox College as a Christian institution must be kept within the context of unchanging values—values based upon the Word of God, upon our concern to serve mankind, upon openness to search for all truth as God's truth.

ACADEMIC:

For the ninth consecutive year on-campus enrollment increased with a fall term figure of 743, a 1.5 percent increase. That total represents a 75 percent enrollment climb over the nine-year span. There were 695 full-time students, with 314 new to campus, including 293 freshmen. Despite enrollment growth, the College continues to emphasize its small college advantages with a faculty-student ratio of one to 15.43 and an average class size of 22.8.

The Friends Church continues to supply the most students, with 163 enrolled, as the College, founded by the Friends Church, continues its close tie with the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. Friends students represent about 22 percent of the student body, with George Fox having more Friends students than any other U.S. College. More than 40 denominations were represented on campus, with 14 having ten or more students. There were 96 Baptist students and 61 members of the Evangelical Church of North America.

Kenneth S. Kantzer, editor of *Christianity Today* magazine, delivered the Convocation address October 12 as the College formally started its new year.

Perhaps the most noteworthy academic achievement of the year was the granting of accreditation by the National Association of Schools of Music. George Fox becomes the smallest in Oregon to receive the designation and one of the smallest in the nation.

The Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission approved the written programs for two new secondary-level teaching majors—home economics and physical education (5-12). Planning continues for the expansion of the elementary education program to four years to replace the three-year cooperative arrangement with Western Oregon State College. A major step in this direction was taken with the naming of Dr. Edythe Leupp to be Elementary Education Specialist.

The 1981-82 year marked several "firsts" for the George Fox Television Center. Videocassettes are now being used worldwide from the GFC Center. For the first time the studio produced regular programming for broadcast television, an initial series of thirteen 30-minute programs, *Image with Joanne Wallace*. Another first was the production of a 30-second public service announcement for Friends United Ministries. Also a first was the coproduction with The Creation Concern, Inc., of a 16-mm film, *Origins: A Creationist View*. The center also had its first production work for two local corporations, producing taped programs demonstrating products and services.

Tilikum, the College's retreat and conference center, completed its seventh year as a program of the College and also noted in October its tenth anniversary of founding. The 90-acre center provides a place for field studies, outdoor classes, recreation, and meetings around the 15-acre lake. Retreats are held year-round by a variety of off-campus groups, and during the summer ten weeks of Day Camps serve nearly 900 children. On June 26 an auction by "The Friends of Tilikum" raised nearly \$4,500 for budget support.

One of the objectives of George Fox College is to provide leadership within Quaker, Christian, and surrounding communities. That was accomplished as the College hosted 12 significant conferences, seminars, and special events during the year.

The 91st academic year concluded May 29 with commencement ceremonies featuring Charles W. Colson, special counsel to former President Richard Nixon, and author of *Born Again*, and the founder and president of Prison Fellowship. A record 2,400 persons attended the ceremonies. Baccalaureate speaker was Paul S. Rees, long-time vice-president of World Vision International and now editor-at-large of *World Vision* magazine.

There are, as may be noted, many activities and programs on a college campus. They all are a part of college life and a part of the process of teaching and learning. The heart of the College, however, is the faculty, those dedicated persons who are the "front line" with students, sharing knowledge in a Christian perspective. The teaching faculty this year included 41 full-time professors and 36 on a part-time basis. Overall a team of some 100 persons is involved in the academic program, including those teaching, in academic support services and academic administrators.

Despite the many successes and highlights, the academic year ended on a sad note with the death of religion professor Cyril F. Carr May 24 at the age of 32. His sudden passing shocked the campus but united it as more than 700 persons attended a "Victory Celebration" memorial service in his honor May 27.

STUDENT LIFE:

George Fox College is committed to a residential campus that provides a Christian education in the faith-learning-living concept. While the "learning" in the classroom is described in the academic section, for this report the faith and living portions are part of the overall experience that falls under the category of Student Life. Our commitment is to a wholesome environment in a community-in-Christ campus. Our prime concern is for the development of the student as a whole, not just in the classroom, but outside as well. Students (and their parents!) have entrusted their lives to George Fox College. It's an honor taken very seriously.

As they have for decades, scores of students during the year were involved in deputation teams traveling in small groups, sometimes at their own expense, to minister to churches throughout the Northwest. This year seven teams were organized, working through the Office of Church Relations. George Fox students also reached out through the music group "Dayspring" and the drama troupe "Inter-Mission."

Students put their faith into action at home and around the world. During the summer 18 students, not paid for their help, volunteered their services to work with missions organizations on short-term assignments in Canada, Taiwan, Honduras and Germany. This was the ninth year for the summer Faith Promise Program.

To show their interest and concern for hunger in the world, students (as well as many faculty and staff) staged a 24-hour fast February 22, with the funds raised contributed to the World Vision International Hunger Relief Fund. About 190 students and 60 faculty and staff participated.

In the nearby community, students founded a Community Involvement Service Program in which student desires to be of help and the wants of those in need are being matched through a resource bank of students with interests and skills they want to share. A "hotline" was established and about 40 students volunteered. And students also participated in an Adopt-A-Buddy program, with some 50 treating 70 Newberg area youth 6-14 to a basketball game and ice cream to start the program, which continues with individual GFC students and their younger friends getting together as much as possible to provide adult companionship for youth of the Newberg Boys and Girls Club and Chehalem House residents.

In a very personal way, students became involved by donating their own blood in a life-giving effort that collected 338 pints in three American Red Cross blood drives on campus. Students now have given 3,581 pints since blood collection drives started on campus 14 years ago.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE:

A new building, a balanced budget, and special events highlight the 1981-82 year in development and finance areas.

For the 11th consecutive year the College operated in the black. Assets of the College climbed by \$500,000 to exceed \$21,000,000 during the fiscal year, with a fund balance of \$15,000,000.

The most dramatic and visible achievement during the year was the construction of the new William and Mary Bauman Chapel/Auditorium. Started with ground-breaking ceremonies July 30, the new 23,500-square-foot facility actually got underway with start of construction September 14. The \$2.5 million project was made possible through a series of gifts—both small and large. It climaxed February 15 as George Fox College was successful in raising the final amount needed to receive a \$150,000 challenge grant from the Kresge Foundation.

College and Community relations continued to be strong as Newberg residents, for the ninth time, conducted a community SHIP—Student Help Investment Program—drive to raise funds for student financial aid at the College.

Several major College events were coordinated by the Development Office. The second Spring Festival was held in the Portland Civic Auditorium, featuring more than 100 students in a musical evening "Come Together." A Community Dinner November 23 on campus featured Portland Trail Blazer Coach Jack Ramsay. The 22nd annual event also featured the awarding of Newberg Distinguished Service Award to Newberg Mayor Elvern Hall and School Board chairman V. G. (Andy) Anderson.

Parents' Weekend was hosted November 13. This new event drew 250 participants from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California and Montana for seminars, tours, entertainment and worship. It is part of a new Parents' Council organized to better serve GFC parents. Twenty-two persons have been named to the first Council, which has a new three-goal program: more communication among parents, student recruitment, and assisting the College with student financial aid and further financial support.

A boost to the long-range planning for the College occurred with the creation of the full-time position of Director of Research and Planning. Another significant long-range planning development was the establishment of a Century One Planning Commission. This 25-member body, representing various areas of the College constituency, started developing a master plan to guide the College to its 100th anniversary in 1991.

CHURCH/COLLEGE RELATIONSHIP:

Although for more than 90 years George Fox College and its founding and sponsoring Northwest Yearly Meeting have maintained a close relationship, those ties

were strengthened even further during the year with a George Fox College Sunday conducted March 14 in all 57 churches.

The College has continued to strive to provide the Yearly Meeting with leadership through the education of its future leaders. Mutual efforts have been undertaken in the identification and cultivation of potential pastors, and the College is working closely with the Yearly Meeting in its youth program. The bond of cooperation and leadership is strengthened with the Yearly Meeting superintendent and the College president, both ex-officio members of the College board and Yearly Meeting Executive Council, encouraging direct communication and leadership.

SUMMARY:

More, of course, could be reported about the 1981-82 year. However, we hope these highlights serve to indicate the full scope of our activities, accomplishments and events. The distinctive foundation of Christian higher education provided by George Fox College must remain clear and relevant. By the grace of God, we can demonstrate the integrity of our mission and the impact of our ministry in the church and in the world—not just today, but throughout the years to come.

Many may know I have come to the personal decision to submit my resignation after 15 years at George Fox College, the last 13 years as president. I have accepted the invitation of Seattle Pacific University to become its sixth president. This has been a most difficult decision, yet one in which I feel clear about the leading of the Lord to this new ministry.

George Fox College is strong; it has a great team of faculty and administrators, and an outstanding student body, a host of alumni and friends, and a church constituency faithful in support with prayers, talents and finances.

We pray for God's continued blessing on this institution. May we count upon your continued commitment and support of George Fox College?

The items listed below are those *Discipline* revisions that were approved as second readings at the 1982 sessions.

In Part I, Chapter II, pages 13 and 14, replace Section B—TESTIMONIES, with the following (1982 changes are: In item 2 the first paragraph is changed and a paragraph added to the 1981 change; new item 4 HUMAN SEXUALITY; and items 4 through 8 renumbered 5 through 9. Old item numbers 3, 6, and 8 were revised or added in 1981.):

B—TESTIMONIES

1. **INTEGRITY IN WORD AND DEED.** In allegiance to Christ and obedience to His clear commands, we refrain from swearing legal oaths and from profanity in speech. It is our conviction that openness toward others is not well served by Christians holding membership in secret societies. We seek to evidence Christian holiness by conducting our family, business, and civic responsibilities with honesty toward others and as good stewards before God.

2. **MARRIAGE AND THE FAMILY.** Marriage is ordained of God for the ordering of the human family in love and discipline. It is no mere civil act. We feel it should be entered into reverently within the church. The body of believers has a responsibility to pray for and encourage couples who are in marital distress, believing that diligent care within the Body may avert the tragedy of divorce. Marriage is for life and ought not be broken by divorce except on scriptural grounds. In all cases serious attempts should be made for forgiveness and for reconciliation.

Where divorce has occurred, it is the responsibility of Friends to demonstrate the love of God so that the divorced person may live purposefully within the Christian fellowship. Whether the person remains single or remarries, the church is to show love. If a remarriage occurs, the church is to encourage the new marriage relationship to be centered in Christ's love. Persons who have been divorced but are living consistent Christian lives should not be

hindered from joining the church or working in it. A central purpose of the church is to assure men and women that Christ brings a new beginning in life and its potential fulfillment. When there is forgiveness, there is no desire to remember the past. Just as Christ called and blessed those whom He forgave, so must we.

Friends affirm the state of singleness (nonmarriage) as an appropriate lifestyle chosen by some (1 Corinthians 7:6-9) as well as a state in which one may unwillingly find oneself. Not all are expected to marry and some may find the state of singleness preferred. A single person is considered qualified equally with others in regard to spiritual gifts and abilities for use in the Lord's work.

3. RESPECT FOR THE BODY. Believing that one's body is "the temple of the Holy Spirit," and that we should therefore "glorify God with your body" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20), we exhort all believers to "present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." (Romans 12:1) In view of this, we encourage members to give prayerful and conscientious consideration in regard to their reading matter, the amusements they attend, and the activities in which they participate. In contrast to any sensual obsession evidenced in the media, in style of dress, and in printed matter, Friends positively affirm the sacredness of the body and mind and urge Christians to deport themselves in a way that glorifies God.

Members are warned against the production, sale, and use of alcoholic beverages and other habit-forming and body-defiling drugs, including marijuana, tobacco, beer, and wine. We urge vigorous opposition to the persistent traffic by society in such products.

4. HUMAN SEXUALITY. Friends believe that the divine intent of marriage is to fulfill the emotional, spiritual, and physical needs of humankind and that only within the bonds of marriage divinely ordained can there be a beautiful sexual relationship for the purposes of reproduction and life enrichment. Adultery and fornication are sinful because they distort the purposes of God for the right ordering of human sexuality.

Friends believe that the practice of sexual perversion in any form is sinful and contrary to the God-ordained purposes in sexual relationships. These perversions include sexual violence, homosexual acts, transvestism, incest, and sex acts with animals. The sin nature is capable of vile affections when humankind rejects the moral laws of God.

Scriptures relating to these distorted and perverse forms of sexuality include Genesis 19:1-13; Deuteronomy 22:5; Leviticus 18:20, 22, 23; Romans 1:24-28; 1 Corinthians 5:1, 2 and 6:9-20. Neither in the Scriptures nor in church history have these practices been regarded as consistent with righteous living.

Friends do not accept as members those involved in these perverse practices; neither do they permit them to hold positions of responsibility or leadership in the church. However, Friends believe that the grace of God is adequate to cleanse and deliver from all sin (1 John 1:9; 2 Corinthians 5:17), and they desire to be tender and sensitive to all people, ready to express kindness, love, and forgiveness. See also Jude 7, 8; Colossians 3:5-7; and Revelation 21:8, 27. When the erring one has been repentant, the past should not be remembered. As Christ called and blessed those whom He forgave, so must His followers. Friends must not hinder the forgiven person from holding membership or having responsibility in the church.

Friends churches should exercise concern for their members on matters of sexuality and should discipline offenders in love and truth (see Chapter III).

5. **PEACE AND WAR.** The teachings of Jesus, the whole spirit of His gospel, and the provisions of His grace call us to live at peace with all men. We feel that war and violence are not consistent with the Christian holiness to which we are summoned in Christ. We encourage our members to find alternative ways in which to achieve civil justice and to work within civil society for the redress of wrongs.

6. **THE CHRISTIAN AND THE STATE.** All men stand accountable to God, whom they have the right to worship and serve freely without state control. We resist every effort of the State to usurp the prerogatives of God. We recognize, nonetheless, that civil government is an instrument of God to restrain evil and provide for the welfare of men. Out of Christian conviction, then, we respect and submit to the government within its proper function.

7. **SACREDNESS OF LIFE.** Because we trust God as the righteous judge before whom men spend their lives in probation, we oppose capital punishment. We feel it is an unchristian preempting of the authority of God over human life. As a leaven in society, Christians ought to lift civil government to a closer approximation to God's laws for human affairs.

Because we believe human life is sacred and created in God's image, we oppose induced abortion for personal convenience or population control. Under no circumstances should abortion be considered without competent medical, psychiatric, and spiritual counseling.

8. **RACE RELATIONS.** Although we recognize that social injustice arises in whatever situations men can gain selfish advantage of others, we believe the church ought firmly to bear public Christian witness to the justice due all mankind under God. We repudiate all efforts to discriminate among men on the basis of race, nationality, or caste. We seek to witness the dignity and worth of all men before God. We seek to bind up the hurts of those who suffer injuries. In the fellowship of the church we strive to break down the artificial barriers created by the prejudice of sinful man.

9. **CHRISTIAN LIVING.** Because God entrusted man with the responsibility in the care and use of earth's natural resources, Christians ought to maintain a life-style that will help to conserve and replenish resources important for the life of future generations. As Quakers, who have a long tradition of adhering to scriptural injunctions for plain living, we should seek to transform the values of our culture rather than to conform to them in this important area (Matthew 6:24-34; Philippians 4:6; Romans 12:2; Genesis 1:28).

In Part I, Chapter II, Fundamental Truths, p. 28, change the wording of item 5, BESTOWMENT OF GIFTS, to read as follows:

5. THE BESTOWMENT OF GIFTS. Friends believe that spiritual gifts are bestowed by the Holy Spirit for the propagation of the gospel, for the perfection of believers, and for the edifying of the church in faith and power. In seeking the baptism with the Holy Spirit, Friends have sought not so much to receive a particular gift as to be controlled by the Giver of the gifts. Even so, it is recognized that the Spirit gives different gifts to different members of the body of Christ (Romans 12). The exercise of these gifts brings Christ's truth to personal consciousness in varied ways appropriate to need. Accordingly, sharp distinctions between different types of ministry should not be attempted. Persons may have multiple gifts, exercised at different times, both through ordinary abilities sanctified to divine use and through extraordinary sensitivities and actions.

Friends believe that gifts are for God's glory and that endowment of power must be subordinate to purity. Friends also believe that the baptism with the Holy Spirit brings heart cleansing and conformity to the image of Christ (Acts 15:8ff). In Hebrews 12:14 (NIV) we are asked to "make every effort to live in peace with all men and be holy: without holiness no one shall see the Lord." For evidence of the presence of the Holy Spirit Friends are exhorted to look to inner transformation. This transformation empowers the believer to live in victory over willful sin and produces a condition of love, shown outwardly by the fruit of the Spirit and Christian graces.

Friends worship is characterized by simplicity and the freedom of the Holy Spirit to minister to the worshipers gathered. Similarly, service and ministry, both channels for Truth, are characterized by obedience to God and single devotion to His will. A local church in gospel order will foster the right use of gifts, whether in worship or as witness in the world.

There is a gift of speaking to the states and needs of individuals, to congregations, and to the orders of society. This prophetic ministry is characterized by its spiritual vision, its penetrating application of biblical truth, the self-evidence of its message, and its timeliness. Such discerning ministry often arises out of open, silent worship, as Christ lays His message upon a ready messenger. Such ministry reaches to the understanding as well as to the emotions, for it bears the mark of divine unction whether spoken by a minister or by another. It should not be confused with praise or testimony, although these have their place in worship. Prophetic speaking or writing may occur also within ordinary channels of human activity, as Friends declare the word of the Lord. Such prophetic words may be intensely personal and private or pertinent to public life. As a movement Friends have aimed at faithfulness to Christ as Truth without fear or compromise. They have aimed at the high gift of prophetic ministry as admonished by Paul in 1 Corinthians 14:1.

There is a gift for the ministry of instruction and exposition: for teaching the truth. Those who possess this gift are enabled to contribute in different degrees toward establishing the membership and expanding the conception of divine things. This ministry of teaching requires a balanced, trained, and well-stored mind and the consecration of that mind to the service of Him who is the truth.

There is the gift of exhortation, which is an ability for making an appeal to the hearts of men, stirring them to a sense of God's love and His purposes for them; it is the power of moving and convincing souls. Those who possess this gift are peculiarly fitted for evangelistic work.

There is also the pastoral gift, which consists especially of ability to do personal work with individuals or with families. This gift enables the possessor to comfort those who mourn, to lead the members into a deeper religious life, to arouse in the young an interest in the things of the Spirit, and to impress others with a sense of the scope and reality of the spiritual life. It is the gift of shepherding and feeding the flock.

The church does not make or appoint ministers; it only recognizes gifts where they exist and properly provides for their exercise and development as a sacred bestowal of the Head of the Church.

In addition to those for the ministry of the Word, other gifts are set forth in the Scriptures. Friends should prayerfully await and receive the divine leading and should be open to the movings of the Spirit. The gift of tongues (languages) is not considered the evidence of the baptism with the Holy Spirit. This view is supported in 1 Corinthians 12:30, where the question "Do you all speak in tongues?" is answered with an implied "no." In his letter to the church at Corinth, Paul approaches the matter of speaking in tongues as if it had been a difficult problem.

According to the belief of Friends, Scripture teaches that any gift of the Holy Spirit is to be exercised in a setting and manner edifying to the Church (1 Corinthians 14:26-33). Any practice in worship or other Christian gathering is to be a spiritual help to the body of Christ and to the individuals involved.

In Part II, Chapter II, Section III, F—MEMBERSHIP, ORGANIZATION, AND FUNCTIONS OF BOARDS AND COMMITTEES, on pages 58/59 following (7) Voluntary Surrender of Position as a Minister, add the following paragraph:

- (8) Forfeiture of Recorded Status. When an individual has retired from the ministry, not by reason of age or physical disability (his own or that of his family) and has chosen not to enter any form of pastoral, evangelistic, teaching, or Christian service ministry, but has entered a secular occupation and has continued to pursue it for five years, the department will call into question his privilege to retain his status as a recorded minister. With approval of the Spiritual Life Board and the Yearly Meeting, the certificate of recording will not be renewed and status as a recorded minister is forfeited. In such a case certification of recording is reclaimed and his name is removed from all official lists of ministers. If at a later time the church finds that there is qualification for reinstatement, recording will occur in the regular way.
