Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

1975

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its 83rd session July 21, 1975, at 1:30 p.m. on the campus of George Fox College in Newberg, Oregon. As we gather together for Northwest Yearly Meeting followed by the Evangelical Friends Alliance General Conference, may God give us the inspiration and courage to labor effectively while the fields are still white unto harvest.

SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

■ 2. The Spiritual Life Board presentation of the previous evening was approved. The mimeographed report of the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work, Walter P. Lee, chairman, is as follows:

This year of restructuring on the Yearly Meeting level has also been a year of reorganization in the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work due to changing personnel in the department.

With the other departments of the Spiritual Life Board, the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work participated in a very valuable retreat in November and had opportunity to think and plan toward the future.

During the year the department has continued support of two extension churches, one at Kent, Washington, and the other at Olympic View in Tacoma.

Kent has made solid gains this year both spiritually and numerically. There is an excellent spirit in the church and an able group of people who are assuming increasing responsibility for the development of the church. The congregation is composed of many new Christians. The church is assuming more financial responsibility for the work and is developing a plan to be completely self-supporting within a four- or five-year period.

Thus the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work is reducing its support of this new work in its 1975-76 budget.

The support of the work at Olympic View by this department has been highly productive. The church has grown spiritually, numerically, and financially. Beginning in 1969 the church developed a long-range plan, and the growth has met the projections. Attendance has been exceeding 100, and the business affairs of the church are being handled efficiently. In accordance with Olympic View's plan to be self-supporting by June 30, 1976, the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work has been reducing support to the church, and the 1975-76 year will conclude the support of this work.

During the year Piedmont Friends Church has received financial assistance from the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work in the amount of \$1,800. The church is in the midst of an interracial area and has elected to remain there and minister to the needs of the community. This ministry among children and young people is producing good results in conversions to Christ and a wider ministry in homes but can hardly be self-supporting in the present stage. The "Friends for Kids" program is active throughout the week with about 50 attending each session. This is a valuable ministry, and this department plans to continue financial support during the 1975-76 year.

Interest concerning work among Mexican-Americans led this department to set up a Mexican-American Committee and budget some funds that were supplied by the Women's Missionary Union during this year. Art Carranza, a student at George Fox College, received some of this support as he visited some churches in the Yearly Meeting, encouraging work among the Mexican-Americans and also contacting some of these people in the Cornelius, Oregon, area. He with the committee has prepared a brochure, "The Faces of My People," to be used as an introduction to the Friends Church and the Mexican-American Committee. This is available in both English and Spanish.

Concern for Friends and possible Friends churches in several areas has claimed attention during the year. It appears that an area surrounding Oregon City is the place to begin gathering Friends and other interested people into Bible study groups and exploring the possibilities for future church development. Floyd Penna, former pastor in Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, has completed his work at Western Evangelical Seminary and is now under appointment by the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work to work in this area. He will also be working with Clackamas Park Friends Church, and this work in the Oregon City area will be a joint project involving the pastor and other staff members at Clackamas Park. Seven thousand dollars has been budgeted for this project.

Other opportunities for Friends churches are a real concern, but budget limitations hinder the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work from entering these fields at present.

A High Calling Conference for college students interested in gospel ministry was held again this year under the sponsorship of this department. Because of the expanded responsibilities of the Department of Ministerial Training and Recording, a part of the Spiritual Life Board, future High Calling Conferences will be sponsored by that department.

Since the destruction by fire of the Meadows Valley Friends Church in December 1973, the small group has been using some rented facilities. Loss of members, some by removal to other areas, has prevented plans for

rebuilding. The remaining members feel they should discontinue services, sell the old church site and parsonage, and make the proceeds available to Quaker Hill Camp with the hope that a chapel and future services may develop there.

Because of the short reporting time this year, reports were received from only 27 churches in time to be included in this report. Among the methods used in leading people to a personal relationship with the Lord, the most used was public invitation in regular services and personal evangelism on an individual basis with home Bible classes a close second and series of evangelistic meetings third.

A majority of churches reporting held special meetings to deepen and strengthen believers. Twenty-four of the 27 provided Bible study groups with a total of 45 groups meeting, but only 10 used an organized study plan.

The greatest evidences that God is working in the churches seemed to be spiritual progress by members of the congregations, new conversions, and unity in the church. The greatest need in the churches concerns children and youth, and some expressed need for revival.

Let us pray for a mighty moving of the Holy Spirit in revival, for deeper commitments to Christ and the church, and for available resources sufficient to meet the new opportunities open to our Yearly Meeting.

■ 3. The keynote address by General Superintendent Norval Hadley was approved as follows:

KEYNOTE MESSAGE

It has been customary for me to give a state of the church report at the beginning of my keynote message each year. Because Yearly Meeting came early this year, there is a possibility that some of the information we have at this time may not be accurate, and we would like to reserve the right to change these figures if necessary before this keynote message is printed in the *Minutes*.

The reports we have to date indicate across Northwest Yearly Meeting we experienced a net gain in church membership of 240 last year. This was down from 312 net gain the year before. This brings the total membership of the Yearly Meeting to 7,838.

Giving to the Unified Budget last year was \$199,610. This was a decrease from the year before, when we gave \$211,815. At the present time pledging for the coming year toward what we are now calling the Great Commission Budget is \$190,000, up \$15,000 from last year's pledging, which was the highest in history. The budget for the coming year is \$290,000, up 26.5 percent, mostly because of added costs on the mission field and because we are sending two new couples to Bolivia and Peru. This means we will need nearly \$100,000 in gifts above what the churches have pledged.

Just in the last few weeks the churches at Pringle and South Salem have merged, and the church at New Meadows has voted to discontinue and give their assets to Quaker Hill Conference grounds in Idaho, where one day we hope there will be a chapel in a new lodge where they can worship. This reduces the number of churches in Northwest Yearly Meeting to 56.

I want you to turn now to Matthew 28:18-20. I'm reading from the American Standard Version, 1901.

"And Jesus came to them and spake unto them, saying, All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth. Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

This is the Great Commission. As a theme for my keynote message for Northwest Yearly Meeting 1975, I feel God has led me to speak on our mandate to help fulfill the Great Commission. I was a bit surprised at this. I wanted to develop another subject, but it seems to me God has led me clearly to this emphasis this year. I don't suppose this will be one of my more popular messages. I spoke on something like this in one of our churches, and a new Christian came to me about a year later and told me she had a terrible reaction to my message. She just felt it was the church father coming to do his thing. Maybe some of you will feel that way about this message.

I speak about the Great Commission not just because it is a favorite theme of mine but because I believe God has directed us to this emphasis this year. Perhaps it is partially because it is consistent with the Great Commission presentation in the new Yearly Meeting audiovisual slide series. Perhaps I am so directed because we move from this Yearly Meeting session into the second Evangelical Friends Alliance General Conference with the theme, "Game Plan for the Fourth Quarter," a worldwide strategy for Friends in the final 25 years of the 20th century. Perhaps we are led to this theme because we have had time now to assess the impact of the International Congress on World Evangelization held in Lausanne, Switzerland, in July 1974. Some of the results of that conference, I think, will have bearing on the life and work of our church during the coming year.

I believe God is at work in a marvelous and unprecedented way in 1975 and is urging His Church with renewed vigor to seek to reach the unreached.

Let me put it simply. I believe the Bible teaches that the Great Commission is what it's all about. That's why we are left on earth after we have been saved ourselves—because God wants us to do all we can to lead others to Christ before Jesus comes again. Once we are rightly related to God ourselves, I believe the thing God is more interested in than anything else is that His Church be involved in seeking to help fulfill the Great Commission. This is the reason for our existence. This is why Jesus died. The church that is not actively involved in an outreach that extends across the world is only partially Christian.

One of the convenors of the Lausanne Congress, Don Hoke, told the planning committee in Honolulu recently three major things had been accomplished at Lausanne. (From "Our Mandate From Lausanne '74," by Billy Graham, *Christianity Today*, July 4, 1975, p. 3)

I. "Lausanne '74 gave a new look at world need." Now the whole world understands our goal is to take the Gospel to the 2.7 billion people in the world who are unreached.

II. "Lausanne '74 gave a new look at world opportunity. It showed factually that new winds of spiritual awakening and evangelistic events are blowing in many parts of the world." (1) C. Peter Wagner says, "Today's spread of Christianity worldwide has no precedent in human history . . . Every week . . . more than 1,400 new Christian churches are being

established." (*Ibid.*, p. 8) (2) Billy Graham says, "I believe that the Holy Spirit is breaking into our nations and organizations in a new way around the world. For almost the first time in history, converts from non-Christian religions are beginning to be counted in the hundreds rather than one by one." (*Ibid.*, p. 3) (3) Graham points out further that we live in a time of unrest and change throughout the world. Old political orders are tottering. This is a time of revolution and change, and many world leaders admit in private that they believe the world stands at the very edge of Armageddon. During this time of radical change we need to seek creative means of evangelism. (4) The new young church is experiencing a marvelous awakening to its missionary responsibility. Attenders at Lausanne learned of more than 200 mission boards in churches of Africa, Asia, and Latin America. (5) Graham pointed out further that much of the Catholic world is a new challenge to evangelicals of our day. There is a great change of attitude among Catholics. A missionary from Colombia, South America, was preaching sometime ago when a nun came to him and asked what she should do now that she had come to Christ. He replied she should report her experience to her mother superior. She quietly answered, "I am the mother superior." (*Ibid.*, p. 4)

III. "Lausanne '74 gave a new look at Christian responsibility. We have seen that the whole church must be committed to reach the whole world. [This is why I am concerned that we have a world vision in NWYM.] Christian leaders have a clearer, more balanced perspective on evangelism and social responsibility."

Some quote Acts 1:8 as though Jesus were listing geographical priorities when He said we should be witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth. They say our responsibility begins at home. The American Standard Version puts it this way: "But ye shall receive power, when the Holy Spirit is come upon you: and ye shall be my witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Two little Greek words, *en te*, in this passage give the impression we are to do both side by side. It seems to me Jesus is saying that our witness is to be simultaneous both at home and abroad. Being a Christian is a worldwide thing.

Lausanne taught us that 87 percent of the world's unreached peoples cannot be adequately evangelized by their Christian near neighbors. Someone has to go to the uttermost parts. We have the thrill of ministering in the uttermost part of the earth among one of the most responsive groups of people in the world, the Aymara Indians of Bolivia and Peru. Ours is one of the most efficient and effective mission works conducted by any part of the Church. The cost of doing only what we are already committed to is increasing nearly one third this year, and we have the added challenge of at least three or four new places that should have missionary couples. This is why we say in Northwest Yearly Meeting that any church, no matter how small or how large—any Christian who is concerned only about his near neighbors is only fulfilling part of the Great Commission.

This is why, I must admit openly, I am in favor of some large churches in Northwest Yearly Meeting. I figured at one time that our Boise church gave as much to help fulfill the Great Commission beyond its own borders as did half of the churches in the Yearly Meeting—the small ones. If our churches face a continual struggle just paying the mortgages and the pastors' salaries, just helping themselves, who's going to help the 2.7 billion unreached people across the world?

Besides having some large churches, we will do a better job with our Great Commission mandate if we are more highly motivated. Apparently the most highly motivated denomination in America is the Seventh Day Adventist Church, whose giving is \$453 per member per year. The Free Methodists are second with \$375 per member. California Yearly Meeting comes in next with \$351. Then come the Evangelical Mennonites with \$319, the Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region with \$307. The Evangelical Church of North America is next with \$303, then come the Evangelical Covenant, the Nazarene, the Church of God—Anderson, the Baptist General Conference, and then Northwest Yearly Meeting. Our per member giving during the 1973-74 year, as best we can figure, was \$224.72 [1974-75 figures not available at presstime]. The Friends United Meeting was about 34th among the denominations listed. (Most of the statistics were gathered by the National Council of Churches, 1974, and listed in the *Los Angeles Times*, January 19, 1975.) Amazingly, the per member giving at the Granada Heights Friends Church in Southern California is over one and one-half times that of the Seventh Day Adventist Church at \$723 per member.

In Northwest Yearly Meeting, of the \$224 total giving per member in 1973-74 we gave \$35.12 to help fulfill the Great Commission beyond our own borders; or 15.6 percent. This includes giving to Greenleaf Friends Academy and George Fox College.

Money isn't everything and may not even be the most important part of fulfilling the Great Commission, but Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21) I pray that in Northwest Yearly Meeting our hearts will move up among those more highly motivated to fulfill the Great Commission. We have about \$20,000 for church planting in NWYM this coming year. California Yearly Meeting is seeking to budget \$150,000 for that purpose every year.

How can we as individual Christians and how can our churches more perfectly obey God in this most important commission? I'd like to list four characteristics of a healthy outreach emphasis.

I. First, the concern for the unreached is born and bathed in prayer. "Now there were at Antioch, in the church that was there, prophets and teachers . . . and as they ministered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Spirit said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them. Then, when they had fasted and prayed and laid their hands on them, they sent them away. So they, being sent forth by the Holy Spirit, went down to Seleucia." (Acts 13:1-4 ASV) The missionary thrust of the New Testament church emerged from prayer and fasting and obedience to the Holy Spirit. How many times in the history of the church have prayer bands turned into missionary societies! And it's happening again in 1975. Dr. Sam Kamaleson reports in the *Church Growth Bulletin* (March 1975) that the "Friends Missionary Prayer Band" in India is "sending out 65 missionary families from South India across one thousand miles and great linguistic and cultural barriers to North India. . . . It establishes churches and expects them to become in turn part of the missionary movement." Since denominational barriers and distinctions become vague, they call themselves "friends." Soon, the praying "friends" come under the compulsion of the missionary vision and are called of God to provide the means of commissioning and sending forth those of their number who are called of God to go and tell. Again the seed bed of a new missionary thrust is prayer.

II. The second characteristic of a healthy outreach emphasis is faith. To face the fathomless task of reaching 2.7 billion people in one generation with the message of the Gospel can cause the faithless heart to faint in frustration. To even have the courage to start, one must see that he has his hand in God's hand. Together we are doing what God wants most. Like the little boy who said, "My daddy and I can do anything." This is why many successful outreach emphases incorporate faith promise missionary giving. When you participate in a faith promise you're not giving what you have left after all the bills and the tithe are paid. You are putting your hand in God's. You are saying to Him, "Here am I, use me as a channel through which You can produce the funds You need from me to carry on the missionary program of our church for the coming year." God channels through you what He wants. It's you and God doing together what you could never do yourself. It's a thrilling adventure of faith. I don't suppose one fourth of the people in our churches have had the joy of a successful faith promise venture, but I believe it's thoroughly scriptural and that everyone who tries it with faith will be abundantly and spiritually rewarded.

Mary and I have a faith promise commitment to the Lord that we pay every month. This last year I kept books to see if I was outgiving God. And there was a little while when He let me get ahead of Him, but then toward the end of the year He came smashing through.

I was at the Young Friends Conference when John Wimber challenged the Young Friends in a message on stewardship. Incidentally, the faith promise commitment of those 130 young people at the end of that message was \$54,000. At that meeting I decided, in addition to my tithe and the faith promise I was already giving, I would believe God for an added \$100. I didn't know where it would come from but felt I should participate. The other day Milo Ross' secretary of the George Fox College Foundation came to see me and handed me a check for \$100. I had talked my parents into buying one of the condominiums in Friendsview Village, and I got \$100 for that. There was my faith promise.

Further, it takes faith to pray big prayers for the unreached of the world.

III. The third characteristic of a healthy outreach emphasis is commitment. That "Friends Missionary Prayer Band" in India I told you about earlier has a magazine entitled *Burn Out*. It calls on senders and sent ones to give themselves utterly to the missionary passion. Dr. Donald McGavran in the *March Church Growth Bulletin* listed the basics of effective missions anywhere and said, "First, the missionary society must create bands of Christians who burn with desire to tell others about Jesus. Unless groups of Christians, believing that it is God's unswerving purpose to save men through faith in Jesus Christ, begin to march under the Great Commission, no new missionary society is going to prosper." Such commitment is usually generated through rehearsal of the biblical mandate. Many Scriptures like those in Matthew 25 and in Romans 10 indicate that God may measure our spiritual commitment by our desire to reach the unreached both at home and abroad. Committed Christians catch the excitement of being a part of what God is doing in 1975 to prepare the world for Jesus' coming again.

IV. The fourth characteristic of a healthy outreach emphasis is authority. Let's go back to the verse with which we started. "And Jesus came to them and spake unto them, saying, All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth. Go ye therefore . . ." The back-

drop for our Great Commission is the authority of Christ. My dear friend Iola Steen started the wheels of my mind thinking about authority when she came to me at the Great Commission Dinner at the Reedwood church recently and said, "Pray for me. I'm trying to learn what God wants to teach us out of 2 Corinthians 5 about authority." "God was in Christ reconciling the world unto himself, not reckoning unto them their trespasses, and having committed unto us the word of reconciliation. We are ambassadors therefore on behalf of Christ" Isn't that beautiful!

As we go to the unreached we go not quivering in our boots for fear our message will not be received, but we go as ambassadors of Jesus Christ having received from him (1) authority, (2) our ministry, (3) the word of reconciliation, and (4) the anointing and baptism with the Holy Spirit so we can witness with power. Therefore we can go with boldness. In Christ we have authority over the evil one, the enemy of our souls and the opponent to the spread of the Gospel. Sin shall not have dominion over us. Iola Steen writes, "Does not the challenge of 2 Corinthians 5:20 demand the authority to proclaim this truth, but even more to demonstrate this truth? . . . Doesn't discipleship include authority over all devils? . . . And does He not grant us a measure of His authority over jealousy, pride, ambition, resentments and all this carnal brood, and can we not claim this over the power of Satan that we are called upon to encounter, sickness and disease? I believe," she continues, "(while many things we do not understand) He desires us to enter into His plans by definitely claiming and appropriating His promises." I believe the same thing.

Let me suggest that you preachers begin to do some research and preaching on authority. It's a thrilling subject. It's the failure to recognize authority—the authority of God, the authority of parents, then civil authority that is probably the root of many of the ills of our society. Yet people hunger for something that is authoritative. I've just been through one of life's trials. I spent about three weeks not knowing what was going to happen to me physically. Pastors, you probably have numbers of people in your congregations each Sunday who are facing some kind of trial. And people, all through the week we may encounter numbers of people who are facing one of life's trials. They won't tell us about it, but they are in anguish—fear, doubts, problems. People like that need a word with authority, need a message that can be supported.

Ron Woodward spoke at Newberg Friends Church this morning on Habakkuk and really ministered to me. That was great preaching on a great subject. When you preach expository messages with authority—when you teach what the Bible teaches—then it is true to life. I had been through enough to know that it wouldn't have met my need for some preacher just to say, "Believe in Christ and everything will turn out all right." I knew it might not turn out all right. Habakkuk taught us that it doesn't always turn out all right but ultimately you can have faith in God. "The just shall live by faith."

Increasingly across the Yearly Meeting we are getting reports from our pastors of the new thrill of more expository preaching. This is a good sign in the Yearly Meeting.

Where does authority come from? Jesus came in the authority of God. In His high priestly prayer of John 17, He indicated that He was passing on His authority to His apostles. But they do not pass it on to us. They put it in writing. In the Bible God has told us all we need to know about faith and life in Jesus Christ. The Bible is our authority for life and ministry as it is applied under the anointing of the Holy Spirit.

So dear friends, let the vision for outreach be quickened in Northwest Yearly Meeting in 1975. This year your gifts to the Unified Budget (now called the Great Commission Budget) will be distributed differently. The new policy is outlined on the back page of a little booklet that will be distributed during outreach conferences. It's titled "The Great Commission Tree."

The main thrust of our effort to help fulfill the Great Commission is in the work of the Department of Missions and the Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work. All gifts designated for outreach will go 100 percent to these two departments without affecting any other giving or any other distribution. Undesignated giving will be distributed so that all the rest of the departments receive 1/12th of their budget each month. Sixty percent of our budget is sent by those two departments.

Now you may, if you wish, designate all your faith promise giving for should give 40 percent of its contribution to the Great Commission Budget outreach and it will go to those two departments. A church doing this in undesignated giving to pay the bills of the other boards and should give instructions to our Yearly Meeting treasurer in writing so she will be able to follow your wishes. Now individuals can make a large contribution for outreach ministry and make something happen. This policy has taken the lid off outreach giving. But it has done something else. It means that if we don't reach our budget, it will probably be these two important departments that will suffer. But we think the Yearly Meeting is interested enough in outreach so this will work.

So let this be the keynote for the work of our church in 1975-76: Let us come alive to our mandate to help fulfill the Great Commission—both at home and abroad. Let us bathe our outreach emphasis in prayer. Let us have faith to believe God will do more through us than we can do by ourselves. Let us respond to the commands of Scripture till our hearts burn with a passion to reach the lost. Then let us go forth with boldness in the authority given to us by Christ and His Word.

■ 4. Visiting Friends were introduced to the meeting as follows:

Ray Farmer, volunteer with Friends World Committee, was introduced.

A minute from Alaska Yearly Meeting of Friends Church was read for Samuel T. Williams, Sr., Alaska Yearly Meeting general superintendent, and Earl W. Perisho, administrative field secretary for the Friends Alaska Mission of California Yearly Meeting.

A minute for Shirlene Perisho was read from Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting.

Also introduced were Ralph Choate from Kansas Yearly Meeting and Jack Rea, associate pastor of Southeast Salem Friends in Ohio.

■ 5. Stuart Willcuts, representative of the World Relief Commission of the National Association of Evangelicals, presented their work. Many Vietnamese have been placed by this group throughout the Yearly Meeting. The Evangelical Friends Alliance has had a vital part in the work of NAE. Many of the field directors have been Friends and graduates of George Fox College. At present the WRC is doing relief work in Africa, Bangladesh, and Honduras.

The report was approved.

He spoke of the recent death of Dr. Paul Petticord, who was founder and has been president of the seminary for 30 years. Dr. Petticord was a man who opened doors for many in Christian service, showing much love and concern for young people.

Sally Warner, Hillsboro Friends, won first place in the elementary division with honorable mention going to Kathy Winters, Melba Friends, and Roseanna Hadley from Whitney Friends. Junior High first place winner was Robyn Johnson from Vancouver Friends. Honorable mention was given to Kathy Clark, Star Friends, and Terry Sinclair of Whitney Friends. Honorable mention in the adult division was given to Claudia Morse from Whitney Friends.

Charles Bloodgood challenged the Yearly Meeting to increase Sunday school attendance this next year.

The report was approved.

■ 29. The Greenleaf Friends Academy report was given by Kendall Smitherman, principal. A slide presentation showed the many activities of the school. The written report is as follows:

"In His Steps" was the theme of First Week 1974 as Paul Goins, pastor of Greenleaf Friends Church, led the spiritual emphasis portion of First Week this past fall.

Approximately 100 seventh through twelfth graders participated in First Week at Quaker Hill in McCall, Idaho.

With special academic emphasis in science, economics, drama, music, physical education, and business and career, the faculty of GFA led the students through these unique off-campus academic pursuits.

Pursuing the theme, "In His Steps," the pace of the entire school year's spiritual life was established. Several students made commitments to Christ, with their lives reflecting a genuine experience through their leadership throughout the year.

The faculty again participated in the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools Teachers' Conference at King's Garden, Seattle, Washington. Kendall Smitherman was elected president-elect for the 1974-75 term and will serve as president of the NFCS for 1975-76.

Our annual Christmas Dinner was held in December with Clare Willcuts as emcee. Both junior high and senior high choirs performed for the dinner.

Another highlight of the year was Greenleaf Friends Academy hosting the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools Regional Musicales with five Christian high schools from Oregon and Idaho participating for two days in March.

Musicales featured choirs, bands, ensembles, and soloists from the schools. Evening concerts both nights performed to a packed house in the GFA gym.

Other highlights of Musicales were the guest appearances of Dr. Jerry Friesen and the George Fox College Concert Choir, and Dr. Jerry Falwell of the Old Time Gospel Hour television program and the Lynchburg Bible College Choral.

The Academy choir and band went on tour in April to Spokane and North Idaho in a series of concert appearances.

We are pleased with the completion of our track and athletic field, which will be in prime condition for the 1975-76 school year.

In December, the Development Department secured for the Academy a \$7,000 grant from the Whittenberger Foundation for the establishment of a graphic arts center, which, in addition to providing for nearly all the printing needs of the Academy, is an addition to the curriculum and extension of the already existent Photography Department.

Twenty-two seniors were graduated in May at annual commencement exercises. Pastor Paul Goins brought the baccalaureate address. Dr. Gilbert Ford, academic vice-president at Northwest Nazarene College, brought the commencement address.

With a concern to further meet the needs of the Christian home, the board decided to introduce fifth and sixth grades to the Academy for the 1975-76 school year. These grades become a part of the middle school, with a restructuring program placing grades nine through 12 in high school and grades five through eight in the new middle school.

We believe that with this new structuring the middle school program will better provide a quality academic program, a stronger Bible curriculum and opportunity for spiritual growth, and a smoother transition for students moving from elementary grades into the high school grades.

It has been with a renewed sense of dedication and spiritual concern that throughout this year the faculty and administration have developed a stronger unity in spirit and mind about the lives of the young people entrusted to our care.

Our concern is that Friends Academy remain firm in the position on which it was founded. It is with ever-increasing concern that we evaluate our position in light of the world's ever-changing moral values. To be a bulwark in a society in flux is a genuine test of the spiritual fiber of Greenleaf Friends Academy and those to whom the day-by-day operation has been entrusted.

We pray for strength and wisdom as we plan the curriculum and the school life for the young people at GFA.

Will you pray too for this vital arm of the Friends Church in Northwest Yearly Meeting? Will you pray as we embark on our expansion program with the fifth and sixth grades for the 1975-76 school year?

We believe that Christian education is a most vital tool of Christendom as we urge Friends to pray for this arm that so vitally links youth to mature Christian responsibility.

- 30. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Earl Geil.

- 33. The Board of Publication report was presented by Harry Hoskins, president. Appreciation was expressed for the work of the board members and those of The Barclay Press.

Ralph Chapman told of the beginning missionary literature publications. The Friends Literature Service provides missionaries with materials unavailable from other sources. This ministry extends beyond our own fields to Guatemala and Mexico.

Harlow Ankeny, manager of The Barclay Press for 13 years, spoke of the future plans of the press. A manuscript of an autobiography of Catherine Cattell has been accepted for publication. During at least one quarter of 1976, *Fruit of the Vine* will feature a Bible study plan. That issue will go to Friends in wider circles as a part of the Faith and Life Movement's plan to encourage a common Bible study. A new church bulletin service and a new look in the *Evangelical Friend* are also being planned.

The Barclay Press financial statement was presented and approved. It appears in the appendix.

- 34. The Stewardship Board president, LeRoy Benham, presented the board's work.

Walter Wilhite spoke of the Friends Fund. He will be available to visit local churches to help in this area.

The chairman of the Department of Finance, Maurice Chandler, expressed great appreciation for Arlene Moore's work as past Yearly Meeting treasurer. A beautiful bouquet of red roses and a gift were presented to her.

LeRoy Benham explained the significance of the Great Commission Tree booklet that is being used to present the vision of stewardship. A slide presentation is also available to the churches.

- 36. A standing ovation for Oliver Weesner was given. He has served on the Trustees and given leadership in the Yearly Meeting for 60 years. His contribution has been greatly appreciated.

- 37. The Representatives nominated the following people to three-year terms on the Stewardship Board: A. Bary White, LeRoy Benham, Donald Millage.

Jo Anne Magee was nominated to fill the vacancy on the Stewardship Board for a two-year term.

- 38. The Executive Council recommended that the following request from the Publication Board be approved:

Barclay Press' credit line at U.S. National Bank was approved in 1965 by the Yearly Meeting in session (as the bank requires) for a maximum of \$2,500—90-day repayment plan. At that time the gross income was approximately \$35,000 for the year. The Publication Board requests that the maximum credit line be extended to \$10,000 in view of our growth this year to a gross of approximately \$170,000. This will require signing new forms with the bank, with approval by the Yearly Meeting "in session."

- 39. Norval Hadley welcomed Olen Ellis, superintendent of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting. Olen Ellis expressed his pleasure in being able to attend.

- 40. Dale Field, pastor of South Salem Friends, led in prayer. The meeting adjourned to meet at 7 p.m.

- 41. After a slide presentation of the Bolivian and Peruvian mission fields by Donald Edmundson, Jack Willcuts, chairman of the Department of Missions, introduced the new missionaries: Randy and Mary Morse and their children, Susanna and Sarah, who will be going to Peru, and

Gilbert and Louise George, who with their children, Jeffery and Kevin, will be going to Bolivia.

Jack Willcuts stressed the necessity of meeting the Great Commission Budget in order for the outreach program to be successful.

The clerk expressed appreciation for the work of this department.

- 42. Joseph Gilmore led the congregation in a hymn.

- 43. The Evangelical Friends Alliance Task Force Mission Umbrella proposal was presented by Ralph Beebe, Norval Hadley, and Jack Willcuts as follows:

The 1975 Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council approved a proposal for a program of world outreach with a united thrust in missions. A 12-member Task Force was appointed to develop a specific plan for implementation.

The Task Force spent two days in prayer and deliberation and makes the following recommendation to the yearly meetings for consideration at their 1975 sessions:

1. First stage—Employment of an executive secretary for missions beginning July 1, 1976. His/her initial duties would be to become thoroughly acquainted with the mission work and the mission boards of all EFA yearly meetings.

2. Second stage—Beginning July 1977, the mission work and budgets of all yearly meetings to be administered out of the office of the executive secretary under the supervision of the EFA Missions Commission and executive committees of yearly meeting mission boards.

The organizational framework will be as shown on page 39.

Each yearly meeting will keep its mission board intact, and promotion of missionary vision in the yearly meeting will continue to be each board's main function. The executive committee of each board will counsel with the new executive secretary in matters relating to fields now supervised by that board, but the executive secretary will travel to them, not they to him. They will also cut travel costs by using telephone conference calls. A local executive committee might also administer other parts of the worldwide program, i.e., one might handle candidating, another promotion, etc. Two members of each executive committee will serve on the EFA Missions Commission, which will meet about twice a year or as needed.

The Task Force perceived that this program would:

1. Facilitate an improved exchange of mission personnel among yearly meetings.
2. Enable all yearly meetings to serve all the world.
3. Broaden the base of financial support.
4. Broaden the base of prayer support.
5. Improve administrative skills.
6. Provide a worldwide challenge to evangelicals outside the EFA, thereby providing a strong incentive to join in.
7. Provide a worldwide challenge in recruitment.
8. Offer wider short-term opportunities.
9. Draw the EFA together.
10. Reduce duplication.
11. Harness untapped human and financial resources among evangelicals.
12. Open new types of ministry.

13. Provide the freshness of new missionaries deputizing new audiences.

14. Help Friends to escape provincialism.

15. Release man-hours for development at home.

The Task Force carefully weighed these advantages against potential disadvantages. Among the latter were that such a reorganization might:

1. Be too big, too clumsy, too cumbersome, and result in insensitive administration.

2. Depreciate the effectiveness of deputation efforts.

3. Be too impersonal, with missionaries and constituents losing close contact.

4. Cause costs to increase.

5. Result in competition among yearly meetings and fields for attention and dollars.

6. Cause surfacing of minor differences in policy, administrative procedures, ordinances, etc.

7. Cause the loss of yearly meeting identification with missionary efforts.

Having agreed that the advantages of a united missionary umbrella far outweighed the disadvantages, the Task Force spent nearly one whole day seeking ways to minimize the disadvantages. They felt it was imperative that the relationships among nationals, missionaries on the fields, yearly meeting mission boards, the Missions Commission, and the executive secretary be as sensitive and involved as are relationships in the current missionary programs.

It was concluded that geographic distance and proliferation of concern need not result in too much depersonalizing or a relationship that is too remote. Churches may still focus on favorite projects. They will meet new missionaries, adding freshness to their vision. We will make use of "now" communication techniques to keep people informed, and local yearly meeting mission boards will still have a say in administration.

The Task Force estimated that total administrative costs would be about \$48,000 for each of the first two years (1976-77, 1977-78). The total budget for combined EFA mission works now is \$532,000; thus administrative costs will be under 10 percent. In addition to personnel and office expenses, the budget would cover travel costs for the executive secretary and the Missions Commission. It is anticipated that the program would attract resources from evangelical Friends currently outside the EFA and also reduce yearly meeting administrative costs enough to offset much of the administrative budget.

The Task Force established criteria for the executive secretary. Ideally, he/she should have pastoral and missionary experience, be a good counselor, be a gifted, proven promoter of missions, be creative and innovative, possess administrative skills and experience, and have a good rapport with all those who would be served. Russell Myers, Everett Cattell, and John Robinson were named on a search committee to find this missions executive and report back to the meeting of the EFA Coordinating Council in January.

Northwest Yearly Meeting's Executive Council gave the following proposal:

1. That Northwest Yearly Meeting endorse the First Stage recommendation of the EFA Task Force, with the proviso effort be made to underwrite as much as possible of the support for this office from resources

sought beyond the existing financial structures of the four supporting yearly meetings now composing the EFA.

During the first year of orientation, this full-time secretary would establish a relationship through travel with missionaries of all EFA Friends mission fields and through personal contact develop a similar understanding of the goals and functions of each of the mission boards of the four yearly meetings to accomplish the purposes outlined in the printed Task Force report, particularly the following items:

(2) "Enable all yearly meetings to serve all the world,"

(3) "Broaden the base of financial support,"

(4) "Broaden the base of prayer support,"

(5) with (10) "Improve administrative skills and reduce duplication,"

(6) "Provide a worldwide challenge to evangelicals outside the EFA, thereby providing a strong incentive to join in."

2. We further recommend that Stage Two of the Task Force report be delayed for further study and until sufficient time and experience with the plan have taken place to determine a proper and proven effective course of action.

After much discussion the clerk asked that action be postponed on the proposal until Wednesday business session at 2 p.m.

■ 44. President David Le Shana introduced the work of George Fox College during this past year. He reported that Jack Willcuts was given an honorary doctor's degree this year by the college for his outstanding contributions in Christian service.

The following report of the school's progress was given:

In a word, the last year has been "outstanding." But there is much more than just that: record enrollments, new achievements in development, top programs, an excellent spirit on campus, growth in the awareness of needs of faculty and students, and the very evident blessing of God in so many ways. Through it all, the goals of George Fox College remain the same: developing community, integrating faith and learning, leadership in society, and effective Christian higher education. The following report comes to you as a witness to God's leadership and faithfulness to us.

ACADEMIC:

The first full year as a member of the national Christian College Consortium marked the 84th academic year at George Fox. The consortium brings together some of the nation's leading evangelical Christian liberal arts colleges with the emphasis upon the integration of faith and learning and upon cooperative endeavors.

Continuing to counter the national trend, George Fox again enrolled a record number of students—481 fall term, a 4 percent jump, including a 12 percent climb in the number of new students. Of the Newberg campus students, 41 percent are members of the Friends Church—the highest percentage and greatest number of Friends students of any Quaker college in America. Altogether, 35 denominations were represented on campus, and students came from 20 states and eight foreign lands.

The last academic year also was the third for the college's extension campus in Kotzebue with a class registration of 67 recorded and 28 persons in three courses fall term. This innovative educational venture is the furthestmost northwest educational institution in the United States, with 85 percent of the students native Eskimos. The program was founded in

cooperation with Alaska and California Yearly Meetings of Friends Church.

A new guaranteed tuition plan was instituted in the fall through which students are assured of four years of education under costs at which they entered. The college is believed one of only a few in the nation with such a program. Students pay a flat fee for each term hour; each entering class pays at a different rate. Tuition rates are held as long as the consumer price index remains at an average level. The plan has the advantage of allowing students and parents to plan total education costs for receiving a degree.

Academically, students continue to be taught by dedicated, concerned individuals, more than half with earned doctorates, such as Dr. Elver Voth, awarded an NSF summer study grant with a northwest research firm; Dr. David Myton, appointed to the Oregon Teachers Standards and Practices Commission, which regulates licensing of teachers; and Dr. Arthur O. Roberts, on a federal study grant for research in Alaska.

George Fox opened the school year with a new feature, a special miniterm "Black Experience Week" featuring the Rev. William Bentley, president of the National Black Evangelical Association. During the year the college also established a new in-service course program in mathematics, offering teachers credit in nine courses with their classrooms becoming experience laboratories, and in spring term sponsored a three-day public conference, "The Pacific Northwest: Quality of Life." Funded by a Portland area foundation, the conference involved some 30 lectures and discussion sessions with 16 participants, including business and governmental leaders.

A reorganized curriculum library was established in a new location on campus with the cooperation of and in combination with the Newberg School District through a program that will benefit George Fox students through an expanded library service for teacher candidates.

The academic year closed with the graduation of 80 students in ceremonies featuring nationally-known author Keith Miller.

RELIGIOUS LIFE AND STUDENT AFFAIRS:

Action and concern may be the words to describe George Fox students. Bolstered by a series of special inspiration weeks held each term, students put their love into action many times. Fall term featured Spiritual Emphasis Week; in the winter term a six-day missions conference featured talks, lectures, discussion sessions, and films involving some of the world's largest missions organizations. And the spring term featured Ray Ortlund, pastor of the 3,000-member Lake Avenue Congregational Church in Pasadena, as the Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer for a four-day series.

During the year, students sponsored a Christmas party for Newberg mentally retarded youth, "adopted" a family and shared food and gifts with them, aided senior citizens with special projects, and at the death, in a house fire, of an 11-year-old boy who lived near the campus they launched a campaign that raised more than \$1,000 for the boy's homeless mother. Students also showed their community concern by setting a new campus record in giving blood and passing the 1,000th pint level in five years of campus drawings. Students also raised more than \$2,000 to send five student summer missionaries literally around the world.

During the spring term and after nearly a year of planning students staged a government "overthrow." They changed from the traditional

senate and executive council form of government to a committee structure that involves the entire campus including faculty and administrators, who sit on the student committees with voting privileges. Students also established the first campus radio station, utilizing equipment from a gift of a commercial radio station and other purchases to launch the 10-watt station that provides music, news, and commentary during the afternoon and evening hours.

Musically, students were involved in the annual Christmas oratorio, *The Messiah*, staged a sold-out production on two weekends of *Man of La Mancha*, and produced Menotti's opera, *Help, Help, the Globolinks*. The choir made a 10-day four-state tour, and the band traveled four days with performances in Washington. Dramatically, the year was highlighted with the winter term production of George Orwell's *1984*.

Athletically, the Bruin basketball team, for their sixth straight year, was the top independent college team in the Northwest, finishing the season in the NAIA District 2 playoffs. And in track George Fox produced two national candidates—Mark Adamson in the marathon, the district's champion runner; and Eb Buck, who won the district title, then claimed second place in the nation and All-American honors in the decathlon.

"Forever Trusting," a seven-member musical group, represents the college this summer in the West. And two just-graduated seniors, Tim Bletscher and Roger House, will make a nine-month national tour for the college as duo pianists following their heralded successes through the last school year.

DEVELOPMENT/PROPERTY AND FINANCE:

As with enrollment, George Fox continues to counter the national trend for small colleges by operating soundly in the black. During the fiscal year just concluded, assets topped the \$8.5 million level, nearly \$1 million more than a year ago, with a fund balance of over \$5.5 million.

Major gifts continue to be a source of strong support, including \$200,000 in trusts and annuities and a \$200,000 gift for the start of a scholarship program. In addition, the college has acquired Camp Tilikum, a retreat and conference center seven miles northwest of Newberg, with its use expected as an excellent educational source while it continues to be operated as a church conference center.

A new campus master plan compiled by a professional firm with college input was completed in the fall and has served as the basis of some new land purchases northeast of the present campus for future growth.

One of the most exciting developments has been the launching of a capital fund drive, the first in more than 60 years—for the construction of a new \$2.2 million physical education/sports complex, and a new \$1.5 million fine arts/chapel center. Already \$1.3 million is on hand and construction will be started as funding allows, hopefully during this next year.

This, of course, is not a complete report of all campus changes and development, but I hope it will illustrate in some way the exciting happenings underway. We have had an outstanding year. This has been no mere accident—it has been God's doing and I praise Him for it. Yet I have the conviction that God has still much more for us. The writer of Proverbs puts it this way, "Commit your work to the Lord, then it will succeed." (Proverbs 16:3) I know of no other way to guarantee the success of our enterprise than to thoughtfully, prayerfully, and wholeheartedly commit the work of George Fox College to Him. The prayer and financial sup-

port of members of the Yearly Meeting are appreciated, and your continued support in this work of the Lord is encouraged.

Dr. Le Shana introduced the student body president, Jeffrey Rickey, who spoke of the contribution the school had made to his life.

T. Eugene Coffin, chairman of the George Fox College Board and pastor of East Whittier Friends Church in California, gave appreciation for President Le Shana's work and the college's progress. He stated that the board members seek to do business under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

OUTREACH BOARD

■ 50. The Outreach Board presentation was made under the direction of the president, Dale Field.

William Rourke, chairman of the Department of Social Concerns, expressed appreciation for the total World Relief offering and the role churches have played in meeting social needs. He encouraged remembrance in church budgets of Friendsview Manor and Friends Action Board.

Jack Willcuts, Department of Missions chairman, expressed appreciation for the many hours of service given by Quentin Nordyke, John Fankhauser, and Gladys Morgan, his personal secretary.

The following missionaries were introduced and spoke:

Jean Clark, who will be replacing Barbara Morse as teacher of missionary children, told of how God's plan was being fulfilled in her life.

Barbara Morse expressed gratefulness for the privilege of serving in Juli, Peru, as teacher.

Edwin and Marie Cammack told of answers to prayer in the changed lives of the Aymaras and how the Aymaras thanked the Yearly Meeting for sending missionaries. Edwin brought greetings from the believers, which were returned by the congregation standing and waving in official Bolivian and Peruvian style. Also mentioned was the great impact the Extension Bible School is having in the growth of the church.

Harold and Nancy Thomas told of the Extension Bible School program, the challenge of spreading the Gospel, and how the Bolivian church is supporting three missionary couples.

Jack Willcuts asked that the following written report be inserted in the minutes:

The Department of Missions has functioned the past year under the new organizational structure and has enjoyed the opportunity to work more closely with the Department of Social Concerns, both departments being part of the Outreach Board. We have appreciated the direction given by our Outreach Board chairman, Dale Field.

The Department of Missions has a primary priority of caring for the Friends work in Bolivia and Peru and sharing this responsibility with the Evangelical Friends Alliance in the ministry of Roscoe and Tina Knight in Mexico. We are also encouraging and directing to some extent the ministry of Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim in the Portland Korean Church.

In the development of our administrative efforts the past year, we are particularly appreciative of the assistance given by John Fankhauser, business manager of our department (who completes his 14th year as a member of the Board of Missions); of Quentin Nordyke, assistant general superintendent, who has given time to deputation, the arranging of deputation schedules, and editing the Aymaragram; and of Ralph Chapman, who continues his ministry with the Friends Missionary Literature Service. The FMLS assists in one of the most demanding tasks on the mission fields today, the preparation of materials and writing programmed texts in Spanish. Gladys Morgan has served as part-time secretary to the Department of Missions chairman the past year, and her work is greatly appreciated.

The condensed report following prepared by Mark Roberts gives some insight into the program and progress of the Friends Mission in Bolivia, which during the past year was officially recognized as an independent yearly meeting. Mark and Wilma Roberts returned to Bolivia after an absence of nine years. Harold and Nancy Thomas worked with them and returned to the U.S. for furlough July 1, being replaced by Ron and Carolyn Stansell, who spent the year in deputation at home. Ron also completed his work at Western Evangelical Seminary and was graduated in May.

Continued church planting and growth are experienced in both Bolivia and Peru. Edwin and Marie Cammack spearheaded these efforts on the Peruvian high Sierras, carrying on a vigorous ministry of evangelism and visitation along with administering the Extension Bible School programs, which reached several hundred new Christians. They were joined during the year by Duane and Sherrill Comfort, who returned from furlough. Both families were liberated to travel and work much more extensively because of the work of Barbara Morse, who served her third consecutive year as a teacher for the missionary children. Her ministry has been highly significant in not only this task but in other phases of the mission work. She left for furlough in June and will be replaced next year by Jean Clark from the Agnew Friends Meeting.

Everett and Alda Clarkson have assumed direction of a new ministry in the coastal area, headquartered at Tacna, Peru. Genuine progress is reported, but the work is still in the planting stages. Their gifts and skills as veteran missionaries matched with the enlarged numbers of Aymaras moving to the coastal regions make this a promising venture in mission outreach.

In the month of March, Donald Edmundson of Portland joined Jack Willcuts in a three-week visit to both fields that allowed them to visit the *Junta Anual* (yearly meeting sessions) of both Bolivia and Peru.

Donald's skill as a photographer resulted in an impressive new supply of colored slides and movies, which were immediately put to good use upon their return to the U.S. A 30-minute movie titled *Friends in Aymara-land* prepared by Donald Edmundson will continue to reflect the impressive work of Friends in the Andes. (This movie may be secured by writing the Yearly Meeting Office, P.O. Box 190, Newberg, Oregon 97132.)

The work in Mexico made significant new growth the past year with the acquisition of a large home rented by the local congregation with assistance from the Missions Commission of the EFA. The house in which pastor Manuel Guzman and family live is large enough to seat 100 with additional space for youth meetings and classes. This meets a need long felt in Mexico, where building a church is almost prohibitive due to both cost and national laws.

God has blessed again the past year the work of Friends in all our fields of endeavor and has given us capable leaders in the missions staff and national church. Increased giving by the Yearly Meeting has made this possible also, but the opportunity for expansion makes even greater giving demands. Inflation has been a significant factor, making increased costs the past year, and the future is uncertain in this regard. But the Lord has given us a great stewardship opportunity. We must be faithful!

The Bolivian Field Report prepared by Mark Roberts appears below:

The 1974-75 year opened with the arrival of the Mark Roberts family on the field followed shortly by the departure of the Quentin Nordyke family and the Ronald Stansell family. The Harold Thomas family remained on the field, and Harold Thomas' sister Dorothy was in Bolivia in short-term service during her summer vacation from college.

During the year the mission sold a Land Rover and two GMC pickups. Two new 1974 GMC pickups were imported to replace those sold.

The work of the mission staff has included the following:

Transportation assistance to the Iglesia Nacional Evangelica Los Amigos. This has been both in the form of actual transport with the vehicles of the mission and also through use of funds made available to the nationals to use in public transportation. Many requests for transportation have been denied due to lack of availability of the mission vehicle or the missionary to drive it. Priority has been given to trips involving evangelistic campaigns and Extension Bible School promotion and service with numerous other trips to quarterly meetings and service trips for the Mesa Directiva. The funds available to the national church for public transportation have suffered from differences in interpretation as to how they can be used between the Mission Council and the Mesa Directiva.

Work with the Extension Bible School program. Attention has been given to writing of texts, production of texts, serving and advising the extension centers and the national director, who is selected by the Mesa Directiva. The staff has also worked in conjunction with the interdenominational Committee for Extension Production in producing texts and distributing them to the other missions cooperating. The Evangelical Church of North America, Church of God Holiness, and the Church of the Nazarene missions are cooperating with us in this effort.

Seminary training has been provided through cooperation with the above mentioned groups except the Church of the Nazarene. Harold

Thomas, Mark Roberts, and Mary Bel Cammack have participated by teaching classes.

Legal assistance has been provided to the national church in the past year in clearing and transferring titles to church properties that remained in the name of the mission. The mission has declined to be involved in any litigations or legal procedures not pertaining to transfers of property titles.

Medical assistance has been limited to the management of funds available to pastors and workers and their families and the presentation of three series of health classes for the women by Wilma Roberts. Wilma has also provided immunizations at Yearly Meeting for the children. She has been available to consult with individuals on health problems.

Preaching opportunities have been accepted by Harold Thomas and Mark Roberts in connection with the quarterly meeting programs, conferences, and evangelistic campaigns. There has been opportunity to counsel with individuals relating to personal spiritual problems as well.

The hymnal has been printed again in the same edition as the last printing with a great deal of effort made to correct errors in the previous printing; 15,000 are soon to be delivered.

Harold Thomas and Mark Roberts have served as advisors to the Mesa Directiva.

Dorothy Thomas and Genevieve Roberts gave assistance in typing of stencils for the production of extension texts. Genevieve was also actively involved in junior church activities at the Max Paredes church. Wilma also worked with this. This was done primarily to meet the needs of the children during worship services and to involve the young people of the church to provide it.

Genevieve Roberts acted as prayer meeting chairman during the year.

One of the important happenings of the year was the visit of Jack Willcuts to the field accompanied by Donald Edmundson. Jack's daughter Janelle also visited the field at the same time. During the visit a retreat for the missionaries of both Bolivia and Peru was held at Urmiri Hotel. This was at the expense of the board and provided relaxed fellowship for the members of both staffs except for Ed and Marie Cammack and their children, who were prevented from attending due to passport problems. Mary Bel Cammack also was not able to attend. A full schedule of meetings was maintained for two days in which the staffs enjoyed the inspiration of Jack's ministry to us and in which problems facing both fields in the areas of Extension Bible Schools and relationships with the national organizations were treated.

After returning from the retreat, Jack Willcuts, Harold Thomas, and Mark Roberts met two full days with the members of the Mesa Directiva of the Bolivian field. A long list of requests and problems was brought by the Bolivian brethren and discussed item by item, and an effort was made to reach a point of mutual understanding as to the ability of the mission to respond to them. In some cases Jack clarified the principles involved that made it impractical or unwise for the mission to respond. It was agreed that the mission should give higher priority to the need for help in transporting equipment to quarterly meetings and conferences. This seemed to be extremely important in the minds of the Bolivian nationals. It was further agreed that a love offering be raised by Friends in the U.S. to the extent of one third of the cost of some vehicle for the direct use and management of the national church when they are able to proceed with the other two thirds. It was agreed that the mission would give a love

offering of \$200 to help in the establishment of some type of assistance program for the elderly retired pastors of the national church.

Jack Willcuts was also the speaker for the Junta Anual until he left for a visit to the Peruvian field.

Other visitors to the field during the year were Orpha Cammack and Marie Cammack's sister, Mrs. Stanley.

The spiritual growth of the national church seems to continue, but the missionaries feel a need for the development of greater maturity in the national leadership in their handling of both material and spiritual problems.

In spite of the many problems and efforts of some to bring divisions in the national church, new converts continue to be brought into the kingdom and old ones renewed. Real need exists for more and better teaching in relation to the doctrine of Friends. Much confusion occurs when Bolivian Friends are confronted by accusations of nonscriptural beliefs relating to baptism and communion.

The preaching and effort of the national church continues to put strong emphasis on the personal knowledge of salvation, and there are strong and steady Christians in every group. Perhaps on the personal level our Aymara believers are fulfilling God's expectation of an Aymara Christian. May God help us to know His destiny for the Aymara church and be sensitive to the work of the Holy Spirit in their lives and ours. May He teach us to understand the spiritual needs of the Aymara church. Brethren, pray for us.

The board's report was approved.

■ 51. The Outreach Board recommended the following persons be named for three-year terms to Friends Action Board: Ronald Woodward, Sheldon Newkirk, William Hopper.

■ 54. The Outreach Board recommended that John Fankhauser be named as representative to the Missions Commission of the EFA for a term of two years.

■ 55. The Executive Council recommended that the members of the Evangelical Friends Pension Committee, the Ministers Retirement Fund, Ministers Aid Committee, and Group Insurance Committee and Agent of Record become members of the Stewardship Board Department of Ministers' Aid. They further recommended that these members organize themselves as a department with a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. All reports, recommendations, and communications are to be channeled as per reorganization plan through the Stewardship Board.

They further recommended that disciplinary changes be initiated to establish the Department of Ministers' Aid as the responsible agency for all these areas of concern; that the number of their membership be reduced by natural attrition until it reaches a proper number established

by *Discipline* revision; that members be appointed by the Ministerial Association, Executive Council, and Stewardship Board in an appropriate proportion to properly represent the interests of all involved.

This is to be referred to the Discipline Revision Committee.

■ 56. The Executive Council recommended that the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations be discontinued due to a lack of need. This lack of need has been caused by a strengthened position in the EFA.

■ 61. The Representatives nominated the following persons for three-year terms on the Epistle Committee: Elsie Hockett, Adelaide Barker.

Approved.

■ 62. After the singing of "It Is Well," the Memorial Committee presented the names of 45 Friends who have gone to be with the Lord during this last church year. Beautiful roses adorned the podium in their memory.

Memorials were read for Levi T. Pennington, Gladys Newkirk, Chester Roberts, Marita Smith, Clifford Smith, Josephine Phillips, and Cecil B. Gossard.

Expressions of appreciation will be postponed until the next business session.

■ 63. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Johnny Bullock, pastor of Rosedale Friends, to meet at 2 p.m.

■ 64. The meeting opened with prayer by Paul Baker, pastor of Tacoma Friends Church.

■ 65. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 66. Expressions of appreciation for members of our Friends churches who have gone to be with the Lord were given by many people. Special attention was called to the passing of Evangelist Hubert Mardock, Wichita, Kansas, former member of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

■ 67. The Women's Missionary Union report was presented by a skit that portrayed the many projects and accomplishments of the women. Two of the publications of the WMU are program books and "Quaker Waggin's." Seventeen thousand dollars has been received through the union.

Approved.

■ 68. The International Women's Year report was given by Kara Cole and Elenita Bales. The part women have played in influencing for good was stressed. Women, under Christ, need to fulfill the gifts the Lord has given them.

Appreciation was expressed by the clerk for this presentation.

■ 69. A concern by the Education Board that we issue a public statement regarding the role of women in the ministry was sent to the Spiritual Life Board. With their efforts directed through the Department of Ministerial Training and Recording, the following document was written. It has been approved by the Spiritual Life Board and the Education Board, with the reservation that if needed the document be condensed into a more concise version without loss of intent or purpose:

Each generation of Christians makes its own discovery of truth and teaching in the Gospel of Christ. To encourage and aid in this process, it is well to restate from time to time certain doctrines and practices of Friends, held and practiced from our beginning. In our day, the social and national preoccupation with the issues of equal rights, "women's liberation," and related social concerns brings into focus the specific views of our church on these matters. Rather than demanding the "rights" of women and others considered to be disadvantaged in our social and economic systems by calling attention to themselves, Friends call attention to the teaching of Jesus, the historic practice of the Society of Friends, which needs to be reaffirmed rather than taken for granted or even forgotten.

Margaret Fell Fox, Elizabeth Hooten, Mary Fisher, Mary Dyer, Elizabeth Fry—these are but a few of the early Friends whose ministries were used of the Lord. Some of these are among the names of Quaker martyrs of the faith and were part of a tradition that has given equal place for Christian leadership for three centuries. Among the famous "Valiant Sixty," whose vision and evangelistic fervor stirred a continent for Christ were 12 women. While certain prominent churchmen through the years have caught this teaching of Scripture and observed the Lord's leading in a practice assumed by Friends, some have reluctantly and condescendingly acknowledged this truth. An example is cited in a recently published quote from Adam Clarke in *Christianity Today*: "... under the blessed spirit of Christianity they [women] have equal rights, equal privileges, and blessings, and, let me add, they are equally useful."

The *Constitution and Discipline* statements of our Yearly Meeting (page 46) make this position clear: "When a member, man or woman, has spoken as a minister so that the church is edified and spiritually helped thereby, the local spiritual life committee carefully considers whether he [or she] has received from the Head of the Church a gift of ministry."

This is not a mere denominational peculiarity; it is rooted in biblical facts formulated and put into practice from such passages as Genesis 1:27, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them." "There is neither Jew nor Greek,

neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female," Paul wrote the Galatians, "for ye are all one in Christ." (3:27, 28)

The contention, expressed so vigorously by some evangelical leaders again today, that there was significance in Christ's appointment of men only to be His apostles is impressing many, but it simply is inconsistent with the history and practice of both the early New Testament Church as well as the Society of Friends. Christ also, it might be noted, appointed only Jews to be the first disciples and leaders of the Church, which is hardly viewed as a racial distinction. The record is replete with examples of the place of women in the life of the New Testament Church as a normal and natural relationship: the risen Christ appeared to women (first), and they were commissioned to tell others, including the twelve; women were present on the day of Pentecost and apparently received exactly what others received as the Holy Spirit was poured out. Peter substantiates this assumption by quoting from Joel the prophetic aspect of this experience: "I will pour out my spirit on all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy." (Acts 2:17) A particular example of this is mentioned in Acts 2:9, "And . . . [Philip] had four daughters, virgins, which did prophesy [preach]."

Paul talks of Euodia and Syntyche of the Philippian church who "labored with me in the gospel" (Philippians 4:3); he greets Priscilla in Rome as a fellow worker (Romans 16:3); he commends Phoebe, the bearer of the Roman Epistle, as a helper of many whose business in the capital city warranted the support of all "the saints." (Romans 16:1) Lydia was apparently the first convert and possibly the first pastor of the church in Macedonia, with whom Paul worked closely in his church-planting efforts.

Each generation of Friends has found God calling significant numbers of women into the ministry, and these have been duly recorded, recognized, and supported in prayer and confidence by the church at large. Not only as preachers and church leaders, but as teachers, missionaries, songwriters, and evangelists, God continues to raise up those whom He will as spokesmen of the faith, both men and women. And, one might ask, how different and debilitated the church would be without the hymns of Fanny Crosby, or the familiar songs, "Saviour, Like a Shepherd Lead Us," "Just As I Am," and "Jesus Saves," to mention a few written by women! Catherine Booth of the Salvation Army and Frances Willard of the Women's Christian Temperance Union stand alongside our own Quaker leaders as women whom God has thrust into Christian ministry and leadership.

A. J. Gordon needs to be heard again, "It is both a relief and a surprise to discover how little authority there is in the Word for repressing the witness of women in the public assembly, or for forbidding her to herald the Gospel to the unsaved."

Friends reaffirm again today that opportunity and encouragement are given to all within our fellowship, without regard to sex or color, for the God-given exercise of spiritual gifts and ministries. That this emphasis happens to coincide with the social pressures of our time is merely coincidental, for this is a stated and demonstrated practice of the church from its beginning. Any departure from this scriptural and historic stance is, in the terminology of George Fox, only a human "notion."

The clerk suggested Kara Cole to take care of condensing the manuscript for a press release and forwarding to EFA.

■ 70. Friends Action Board work was presented by Ralph Beebe. Many people are not candidates for Christianity because they feel rejected by Christian people. One of the reasons the Aymara work has been successful is because our missionaries have been agents of love. FAB has tried to minister to the black community. The National Black Evangelical Association is supported.

Sheldon Newkirk spoke of Glenn Leppert's ministry at Piedmont, helping those with desperate needs, including the Friends for Kids program.

The magazine *Inquest* is being published under the general auspices of the Friends Action Board.

Vietnamese families have been placed throughout the Yearly Meeting.

Pastor Do spoke of the Vietnamese Immigration Program. Sixty people have been placed in the Yearly Meeting, for which he expressed appreciation. A group of Vietnamese youth sang a song in thankfulness for what has been done.

The clerk expressed appreciation for the service of this board.

■ 71. A certificate of appreciation was given to Oliver Weesner for 60 years of service to the Yearly Meeting as treasurer and on the Board of Trustees.

■ 72. The recommendation presented earlier by the Executive Council in regard to the EFA Task Force Mission Umbrella proposal was again read and discussed extensively.

After a time of prayer in which many participated asking God's guidance, the meeting decided to delay action at the present and allow the Administrative Committee of the Executive Council to decide on an appropriate way to gather the sense of the Yearly Meeting either by Representatives or Executive Council action.

■ 79. The Executive Council nominated Jack L. Willcuts as a member of the Executive Council.

Approved.

■ 80. The Education Board recommended that Donna Prescott be appointed to a two-year term on the EFA Christian Education Commission.

Approved.

■ 81. The Nominating Committee from the Spiritual Life Board and the general superintendent submitted the following nominees to serve on the Department of Ministerial Training and Recording: for three years—Ronald Crecelius, Paul Cammack, Claude Lewis; for two years (to fill the unexpired term of Glenn Armstrong)—Grace Roberts; for one year—J. Russel Stands.

Approved.

■ 82. The Executive Council recommended that Northwest Yearly Meeting convene next year from July 26 to August 1, 1976.

Approved.

■ 83. A report of action by the Executive Council during the past church year was presented as follows:

1. The Executive Council established the dates of Yearly Meeting to be July 19-23, 1975, just prior to the EFA General Conference.

2. The time for closing the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books was set for July 10 instead of July 15 in order to get a report ready for Yearly Meeting.

3. A task force was named representing each area of the Yearly Meeting to review fund-raising procedures and method of distribution of funds and to help present the new budget in the local churches. The

following were named to this task force: Floyd Watson (Salem), Donald Edmundson (Portland), Philip Harmon (Puget Sound), Larry Wilhite (Greenleaf), Walter Wilhite (Boise), W. A. Willett (Newberg), J. D. Baker (Inland), and Richard Johnson (Southwest Washington).

4. A minute of service was prepared for Jack Willcuts as he visited the mission fields in Bolivia and Peru, stopping in Mexico City.

Approved.

■ 84. The following written report was submitted by the Committee on Returning Minutes, Kelsey E Hinshaw, chairman:

Your Committee on Returning Minutes has performed the task assigned to it. Returning minutes have been written for the following persons: Samuel T. Williams, Sr., and Earl W. Perisho, both from Alaska, and Stanley and Shirlene Perisho from Denver.

Since the business sessions are ending early, there is the possibility someone may yet arrive with a minute addressed to Northwest Yearly Meeting. If this should happen, we suggest authorization be given to add such names to the above list and returning minutes be prepared for them.

The suggestion and report were approved.

■ 85. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that paragraph b. under 5. TRUSTEES, page 56, be amended to read as follows:

b. Administration of Special Funds. When a church ceases to function as a Friends church of Northwest Yearly Meeting (see also Chapter II, Section I, subsection D, paragraph 6, p. 38), title to property held by that church is transferred to the Yearly Meeting trustees. The assets realized are administered by the Spiritual Life Board through its Department of Pastoral, Evangelistic, and Church Extension Work: provided, that any funds donated for a specific purpose are to be administered in accordance with the desires of the original donor.

Approved. This is the first reading. The second reading will be given at next Yearly Meeting session.

■ 86. The Discipline Revision Committee recommended that the third subparagraph under 3. STEWARDSHIP BOARD, a. The Yearly Meeting Board, page 54, be amended to read as follows:

The board appoints each of its members to serve in one of its constituent departments: Department of Yearly Meeting Finance; Department of Stewardship Promotion; Department of Ministers' Aid. The Department of Yearly Meeting Finance receives the budget requests of the boards and other administrative bodies, analyzes them, and formulates recommendations for presentation to the Yearly Meeting Executive Council (see page 43). It determines the percentage, subject to annual review, of the residual income of the local and extension churches (see pages 58, 59) which would be recommended to them as their proportionate share of the contributions to the Yearly Meeting unified budget. The board is authorized to borrow money for the Yearly Meeting when in its judgment such procedure becomes necessary.

The Department of Ministers' Aid appoints one of its members as agent of record and includes the membership of the evangelical Friends pension committee. It supervises the ministers' retirement fund, aged ministers' aid, and group insurance.

Approved as the first reading with the second reading to follow next year.

■ 88. The Representative Body would remind the Yearly Meeting of Minute #99 from the 1974 session, which allots an honorarium to the presiding clerk, assistant clerk, recording clerk, and assistant recording clerk for their services to the Yearly Meeting: at least equal total hospitality—food and lodging—during the Yearly Meeting sessions and transportation costs incurred while fulfilling services required during interim sessions. Although the wording in the minute was not explicit, it was the intention of the Representative Body in 1974 and reaffirmed by the 1975 body that this be a continuing procedure.

Approved.

■ 89. The Department of Fine Arts of the Spiritual Life Board made the following report prepared by Joseph E. Gilmore, chairman:

Based on information received from 36 of our churches to date, there are 25 churches with adult choirs, 14 of which are singing on a regular basis. Twelve churches have youth choirs, and only seven report having children's choirs for this past year.

Fourteen churches used art in some form in their activities, varying from poster contests to art shows. One meeting framed several paintings and has hung them in permanent display in the church. We are excited to report that from the reporting meetings we have at least 75 artists.

Nineteen churches made use of drama this year, from skits to advertise church activities to full plays and musical dramas. There are a number of individuals in the churches either already active in drama or that indicate an interest in the area.

Departmentally sponsored activities this year included two choir festivals, one held at Newberg and one in Greenleaf. Both were well attended and were successful.

The Songwriting Contest had 23 entries in five categories. The winning entries are as follows:

An Art Show for the Yearly Meeting and EFA Conference is currently on exhibit in the Cap and Gown Room. It is wonderful to see that God-given talent shared for all to see and enjoy. It is, we hope, the first of many art exhibits within our Yearly Meeting.

We are sponsoring one of the EFA workshops on "The Use of the Fine Arts in Worship." Our panel of experts includes Dennis Hagen,

music; Peter Snow, art; Michael Graves, dramatics; Robert Gilmore, audiovisual; and Joseph Gilmore, Christian fine arts.

We had the privilege of sponsoring a Fine Arts Inspirational Worship Service this year at Yearly Meeting, and are looking forward to having additional opportunities to do this again in future Yearly Meeting sessions.

Our plans for the coming year are as follows:

1. Continue all current activities, expanding as needed to meet the needs of the churches.
2. Choir festivals to expand to include four areas: (a) Boise Valley-Greenleaf—Quincy and Eilene Fodge, cochairpersons; (b) Newberg-Portland—Dennis Hagen, chairperson; (c) Salem—Dianne Hopper, chairperson; (d) Puget Sound—Steve Hoerauf, chairperson.
3. Music Month to expand into Fine Arts Month, with encouragement to local churches to plan a month of activities making use of the arts.
4. The development of a quarterly Fine Arts Department Newsletter. Louise Sperling is named as editor.
5. A series of workshops in music, art, dramatics, and audiovisual techniques to be held at Yearly Meeting next year and, if possible, to be made available to local meetings and/or area rallies.
6. An expanded art show for Yearly Meeting and other Fine Arts Department Worship Service.
7. Seek to encourage the creativity of individuals within the Yearly Meeting in the areas of the fine arts and the sharing of the results of this creativity.

We believe that in Christ we become whole persons and that because of this there can be greater creativity in all areas of life, including the fine arts, and that in Christ we become more alive to and more aware of the beauty around us, both what is seen and that which is heard. We are pleased to see this Yearly Meeting come alive to this concept and even to be a leader among Friends in this area. We, as a department of the Spiritual Life Board, are blessed to be a small part of it.

Approved.

■ 90. The Epistle Committee presented a summary of epistles received during the past year from 56 yearly meetings as follows:

Friends in Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting wrote, "May we all be open to the Holy Spirit with renewed confidence that the miles and the words which sometimes divide us are less powerful than the things which unite us and that we can become one in Him."

Kansas Yearly Meeting stated that "research indicated that conversion growth is the largest component of church growth. Five new ministers were recorded and workshops were well attended."

The Yearly Meeting of the Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region declared, "The main event is world evangelism, the proclamation of the historical, biblical Christ as Savior and Lord, with the view to persuading people to come to Him personally and to be reconciled to God and integrated into His body of believers. The presence and attitude of the Friends youth in attendance was an inspiration to all. We noticed a trend among our youth of turning away from materialism and seeking instead the meaningful reality that can be found in a deeper spiritual experience."

East Africa Yearly Meeting's theme was "'You are the salt of the earth.' During the last session more than 4,000 Friends were in atten-

dance. We left feeling more aware of our responsibilities as salty Christians."

One of the newest yearly meetings, Alaska, wrote: "The dedication of the Gospel of John in our language was a highlight of our services."

New England Yearly Meeting: "In the year ahead we shall continue to strive to live joyfully in that spirit of loving service which belongs to the children of God."

In the epistle from Central America Yearly Meeting we read, "Friends of Central America testify that the living Christ is the center of our life. Jesus Christ is our Savior, the only way to God."

Approved.

■ 91. The Epistle Committee presented the epistle prepared to be sent to other yearly meetings as follows:

Dear Friends:

"My prayer for you is that you may have still more love—a love that is full of knowledge and every wise insight. I want you to be able always to recognise the highest and the best, and to live sincere and blameless lives . . . full of true goodness, produced by the power that Jesus Christ gives you to the praise and glory of God." (Philippians 1:9-11, Phillips)

Northwest Yearly Meeting opened its 83rd session on July 19, 1975. About a thousand people listened to our general superintendent as he unburdened to us in his keynote address. As he looked to God for guidance, he had been deeply impressed anew with the great commission. "All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth. Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." (ASV)

His church must be involved in seeking to fulfill this great commission. The mandate that came from Lausanne stated that the church must seek to take the Gospel to the unreached 2.7 billion people. The whole church must be committed to reach the whole world. As we go to the unreached we go as ambassadors of Jesus Christ, having received from Him authority, our ministry, the word of reconciliation, and the anointing and baptism with the Holy Spirit so that we can witness with power. We recognize, too, that the Bible is our authority for life and ministry.

We are thankful for the Lord's blessing on George Fox College this year in record enrollments and an excellent spirit on campus. Construction plans are made for a new gymnasium complex and a Fine Arts Center.

Most churches have active and growing Friends Youth groups. The conferences that are held each summer and winter have been very beneficial as children and young people commit themselves to God and as they are encouraged in Christian growth. The large group of high school youth spent the week of Yearly Meeting and the General Conference of the Evangelical Friends Alliance at Twin Rocks Surfside Camp. Junior high youth and children met in sessions on the campus and nearby Camp Tilikum.

Two new couples are being sent to language school in Costa Rica in preparation for work in our Bolivian and Peruvian mission fields among the Aymara Indians. The work is supportive, since both fields have active national organization and leadership. A replacement teacher also is being sent for the missionary children. The Bolivian Friends Church, now an

official yearly meeting, consists of approximately 150 meetings with perhaps 15,000 members. The Peruvian work among the Aymara Indians also has grown in its 14 years to some 50 meetings.

The Women's Missionary Union is an active and productive group in our Yearly Meeting, contributing to both home and foreign missions. Over 425 women were present at the annual banquet and contributed over \$1,000 to be used in the mission home in Peru, South America.

Throughout our Yearly Meeting sessions we were reminded often of the soon coming to us of Friends from across our whole country. Great joy filled our hearts in anticipation of greeting many filled with faith, hope, and love.

Approved with the suggestion that the following be inserted about the Vietnamese presentation:

The Friends Action Board presented a group of 25 Vietnamese refugees, children, and adults, to the Yearly Meeting in one of its sessions. Pastor Do, a minister in the group, spoke fervently in appreciation of the reception they had received in this country. Our hearts were filled as they sang to us so beautifully the beloved hymn, "He Hideth My Soul." Northwest Yearly Meeting is sponsoring 60 Vietnamese refugees through a number of individual churches.

The clerk expressed appreciation to Adelaide Barker for her work on the Epistle Committee.

■ 92. It was suggested a written communication be sent to the family of Dr. Paul Petticord expressing the concern and sympathy of the Yearly Meeting in the passing of Dr. Petticord.

Approved.

■ 93. Norval Hadley recommended that the area summaries of the State of the Church reports instead of being read on the floor be mailed to the local churches along with a covering letter stressing the importance of these reports and encouraging the churches to send these to the area superintendents each year.

Approved.

A written summary of the State of the Church reports follows:

Good spiritual growth is reported from all church areas. Several mention that discouraging times have led to increased spiritual gain and victory.

Many avenues of outreach in which members are encouraged to use their spiritual gifts have been cited such as Bible study groups, personal evangelism, area rallies, day cares, lay witness meetings, bus ministries, and recreational programs.

Many churches have shown numerical growth this year with one church reporting excellent growth among young adults and youth with the opening of a new gymnasium.

The helpfulness and relevancy of the pastoral messages were mentioned by several areas.

The reports expressed optimism, increased expectancy for future growth and concern, as one area stated, "for a real Holy Ghost revival."

■ 94. Appreciation was expressed for Bob Gilmore's work with the sound equipment.

■ 95. The caretakers' oral report was received with much appreciation for the organized contribution they have made.

■ 96. Appreciation for the hospitality of George Fox College and the Saga Food Service was expressed.

■ 97. Don Lamm, pastor of Eugene Friends, closed the sessions with a prayer of thanksgiving for God's presence and guidance.

■ 98. Northwest Yearly Meeting adjourned to meet July 26 to August 1, 1976, in Newberg, Oregon, or at the call of the Executive Council.
