MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1984

■ 1. Richard Beebe, presiding clerk, read the opening minute: "Looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith" (Hebrews 12:2b), Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 92nd session July 30, 1984, on the George Fox College campus.

■ 2. Richard Beebe welcomed all to the sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

■ 3. Kenneth Royal, pastor of Peninsula Friends Church, Port Angeles, Washington, led the congregation in singing "To God Be the Glory" and the chorus "His Name Is Wonderful." Stanley Perisho, pastor of North Valley Friends Church, gave a brief testimony of God's love and grace in his life and sang "The Love of God."

A period of silent worship followed; several people expressed praise in prayer and spoken word.

■ 4. Richard Beebe quoted Isaiah 40:31 and stated: "This is a week of waiting on the Lord." He introduced General Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts for the keynote message.

Raise a Harvest of Righteousness

(James 3:18)

"Who is wise and understanding among you?" James asks in the middle of his writings. "Let him show it by his good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom . . . The wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. Peacemakers who sow in peace raise a harvest of righteousness."

James 3:13-18 NIV

If the priorities given by James are taken literally, what Christians do about their faith is as important as faith itself. So, the following report, evaluations, and recommendations are an important part of our deliberations. "Faith and practice" is a critical balance for Friends. Considering these matters now, as a Yearly Meeting in session is important. It is scriptural: Acts 21 tells of Paul and the rest of them going before the elders reporting in detail what God had

done through their ministry. The distinction between what *they* had done and what God had "through" them done is also important.

How ungrateful and inappropriate it would be for us not to acknowledge and thank the Lord for what He has done among us the past year. There are adversaries, visible and unseen, there are disappointments and problems, but all these seem quite insignificant when recognizing all that God is doing and promises for His church including its various departments, places, and ministries.

One of the frequently quoted testimonies of George Fox is the reference to his experience on Pendle Hill where he saw "a great people to be gathered." But it struck me recently in reviewing that historical event that we usually misquote it. It was William Penn who wrote the statement after Fox's death, for Penn was so impressed as a younger man with the vividness of it after listening often to Fox. The accurate quote of that vision given to George Fox is: "The Lord let me see in what places He had a great people to be gathered." While we are in a different generation, we have the same Lord who still lets us see in what places and ways we are to be involved.

It makes sense, the seeming contradiction in the book of James suggesting simultaneous faith and works. We are not offered a choice of faith or works, but something that requires *both* faith and works. This leads to the observation that what we are as a church means a great deal more than how big we are. We are important, not because we are so good, but because God is so gracious and Truth is so powerful! The discouragements we all sometimes experience can be matched by the welcome and warmth of the "Presence in the Midst" and in our hearts. Let us not be trying to make over our Christian faith and Quaker practice to conform to the religious culture around us or the comfort of our American way of life. Remember, "the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere." This brings together faith and works, convictions and conduct, beliefs and behavior, and a "harvest of righteousness".

The sequential order in this text is important. Heart purity precedes proper practice. Personal piety is, as always, a great imperative in our day. If there is to come "through" us the kind of cleansing force and change that our immediate world is to understand, there is needed an adequate theological base for a clean heart, a pure heart, a life under the dominant full control of the Spirit of the Lord Jesus. We must know, experience, and practice a relationship with God that will allow us to be all God intends us to be, then faithfully proclaim a theology that is accurate and demonstrated.

This is one reason for the writing and publishing this past year of the small book, *Why Friends Are Friends*. The infilling of the Holy Spirit through the grace and power of God is a vital part of day-to-day living. There is found again in this generation, as in previous ones, a genuine search for deeper truth and basic beliefs. It is superficiality, the following of religious celebrities, popular or trendy theology, or the blind following of denominationalism as an end in itself that is being rejected by thoughtful younger and newer Christians. And this is good. It provides a place and opportunity for positive, radiant witness to our faith. Unfortunately some Friends do not understand what we believe the Bible teaches about holiness and peace, and it is my earnest prayer that this recently released book can be useful in our church membership classes and discipling ministries. Faith and practice in any period should be examined and experienced in the light of the Gospel, centered in Jesus Christ, our Lord, as revealed in the Holy Scriptures and by the Holy Spirit. Our convictions, our faith and practice come from the work of the Holy Spirit in the baptism of hearts cleansed supernaturally, miraculously by the blood of Christ.

There is a continuing concern, as expressed here a year ago, about those who apparently regard their Quaker connections quite casually. It is not a new

problem, and it is a matter not only of shallow understanding of doctrine, but is also a problem of geography. In his biography of pioneer William Hobson, Myron Goldsmith wrote that Hobson set out on missionary journeys from Iowa to the Far West because of his concern for Friends being lost to Quakerism due "to their scattered status." This is yet a deep concern of our Yearly Meeting, thoughtfully considered by the Department of Evangelism. This is one reason it is encouraging to find new churches starting in places in the Northwest heretofore without a Friends church.

This department is to be commended, and supported, in their plan to develop an updated strategy for church planting. Rick Hunt of Boise Friends Church, relatively new to Friends, has been moved of the Lord to bring his training, experience, and abilities in long-range planning in the Hewlett-Packard Company to be adapted, as appropriate, to church planting. He is being encouraged in this concern and released for this ministry. Church-planting strategies will be studied and developed in the months ahead.

* * * * *

Some very special people must be mentioned today, as well as some special programs. This evening we will be honoring Beth Bagley, who has announced her retirement as administrative secretary of the Yearly Meeting. It is impossible to adequately express our appreciation for her service across the years, but we want her to know of our gratitude for her faithful and competent work, and to thank the Lord for her giftedness and dedication.

She is being replaced by Theresa (Terri) Bowen, who has already started in the detailed training so important in this responsibility. Terri's experience as the California Yearly Meeting office secretary for 10 years and recently as our Yearly Meeting recording clerk certainly commends her for this position.

Oscar Brown's work as financial secretary the past three years is also greatly appreciated. His ministry in this service has been a blessing to the Yearly Meeting not only in the stewardship promotion, but in his positive, mature spiritual encouragement in the office and among the churches. He feels led to concentrate his efforts in other areas of ministry next year, and we want Oscar, and Ruth also, to know of our gratitude as a Yearly Meeting for their many ministries as financial secretary, Ruth's services in Barclay Press, their missionary, pastoral, and evangelistic work across the years.

Our prayers and loving concern have been with Beatrice Goldsmith, especially in recent months as she struggles with health problems. The range of her responsibilities as Yearly Meeting treasurer with the ever-increasing load of work, has made her such a valuable person in the life of the church. How much the Yearly Meeting, all the boards, departments, pastors, and everyone depend upon her expertise and service! We trust the Lord to lift her up soon to complete healing and health. She especially, and all of us, appreciate the splendid assistance given by Ruth Haldy, who is a kind of behind-the-scenes helper to Beatrice and the Yearly Meeting office.

The creative, diligent, faithful leadership of Quentin Nordyke is particularly helpful to our church extension pastors and people, and our missionaries. His resourcefulness is of great benefit to the Yearly Meeting and certainly to the Yearly Meeting office.

Dan McCracken's work with the *Evangelical Friend*, in other publications for the Yearly Meeting, and at Barclay Press has made him a valuable servant of the Lord through our church. His quiet, thorough ministry must be mentioned and not taken for granted.

Frank Engle, Jr., has earned the love and respect of the Yearly Meeting the past two years as Friends Youth field secretary. His cheerful, enthusiastic leadership is reflected in the growing ministries and programs of the FY. He is

being replaced by Sandra Wilson, of Newberg Friends, who will be more adequately introduced later, but we are grateful that she has been led to this important position approved by the Education Board of the Yearly Meeting. She is already on the job and brings new skills and vision to this task. The fact that every youth camp and conference across the Yearly Meeting has grown year by year is an indication of excellent youth leadership. The first Idaho Midyear Convention was a significant success in both spiritual tone as well as wide participation.

It is a constant source of encouragement for me, and of great benefit to the Yearly Meeting, to have the kind of relationship enjoyed with our Presiding Clerk, Richard Beebe. His loyal support, wise counsel, his complete dedication to his church and the Yearly Meeting are an inspiration. His involvement in any number of behind-the-scenes efforts gives direction and stability to the Yearly Meeting. The guidance provided by the Yearly Meeting Advisory Committee, chaired by Richard Beebe, has been invaluable to me personally, and I want to publicly express this even though most of you did not know such a committee exists.

Reference has been made to the Friends Youth Midwinter Convention in Boise. Two other developments with our young people are impressive. The Thanksgiving weekend gathering of early teens at Camp Tilikum—the "School for Samuels"—planned and led by the George Fox College Religion Department under Arthur Roberts's direction was well attended with nearly 50 young people sent by their respective churches. It was a time for serious reflection as well as fun, with classes on God's callings and the meaning of Christian leadership. That this group was composed equally of girls and boys was encouraging, although not manipulatively planned that way.

Another really outstanding development coming from the vision and concern of Friends Youth themselves, under the leadership of FY Executive missionary chairman, Boyd Morris, a junior at George Fox College from Talent Friends Church, has been the summer missions expeditions. Thirteen teenagers went to Bolivia, Peru, and to Africa. Known as YCEW (Youth Consecrated to Evangelize the World), this ambitious program has caught the imagination of many young people and local churches, proven by the remarkable financial response making these journeys overseas possible.

It is noteworthy that year by year the evidence of God's guidance and wisdom is seen in the leadership of the FY executive committee and our Yearly Meeting Friends Youth organizational pattern. These college-age young Friends demonstrate responsible, dedicated, administrative abilities. They merit our full cooperation, our prayers, and our commendation.

This leads me to other aspects of our youth programs. One is the splendid ongoing Christian education program of Greenleaf Friends Academy in Idaho. Jess Kennison is commended for his good leadership the past year and determination to see some of the critical financial problems the academy faces successfully addressed.

In this year of administrative transition at George Fox College with the inauguration in March of President Ed Stevens and the resignation of the dean of the college, Dr. Bill Green after a 12-year tenure, it is an opportunity to express how much the Yearly Meeting is indebted to the college. Because of its continued influence in the Christian training and preparation of so many of our youth in their college years, we tend to take this too for granted. This does not just happen; it represents the dedication, the vision, and Christian faithfulness of many faculty, administrators, the board and donors. Since the college is owned and under the direction of the Yearly Meeting, each of us carries a clear responsibility in the college's success and future. The period set aside this year

of 40 days for prayer and fasting for the school was a good experience, with a number of prayer answers.

Specific ways in which we can all be helpfully involved in our college are

1. Encourage and enable our own young people to go there to school. While GFC enjoys the largest percent of Friends in the student body of any Quaker college in America, it is still a sad fact that that percentage ratio declines year by year. One of the mutually helpful ways we can assist both our young people and the college is to do our very best as pastors, parents, and Friends to send our youth there to college. If we take our *church* as well as our college and their future and beliefs seriously, this will become for us a Christian commitment. One of the most critical challenges facing the school presently is inadequate student enrollment. George Fox College represents one of the great opportunities our Yearly Meeting has for maintaining and building a growing church. Surely this concern should become a prayerful consideration of every Friends family of our Yearly Meeting.
2. A reexamination of the ratio priorities of the Great Commission Budget may be needed. For decades around 50 percent of our united giving has been designated for missionary work; none of the Great Commission Budget is designated for the training of our young people at George Fox College. Without the college, our missionary work and local church leadership preparation would be drastically affected. Of course, the college must depend on a variety of sources for both support and students, yet, as good stewards and as the controlling body of the college and the recipients of its good work, a serious review is needed of our financial commitments as a Yearly Meeting.

* * * * *

There were eight pastoral changes this year plus pastoral staff changes or additions in 12 congregations. Two churches, Twin Lakes and McCall, added pastoral leadership for the first time, with another new church starting in northern Idaho this spring. Two churches were laid down by the Department of Evangelism, Ontario and Emmett.

Hilltop Friends lost one of their pastors, Kathleen Nowak, a victim of cancer. She was recorded as a minister in the Yearly Meeting sessions last year. She is greatly missed by us all.

Eight "Seminars on Eldering" were held across the Yearly Meeting during the year with good attendance and response. A completely new organization was started in May called "Volunteers on Wheels" with the acronym VOW. This group of Friends with recreational vehicles hopes to use their skills and time in helping new or older churches in building programs. Great enthusiasm is already evident in this venture, with more than 50 couples potentially involved. They will be assisting not only in construction and remodeling work, but give spiritual leadership with Bible classes, children's work, and in other ways. This new ministry for retirees is an exciting new dimension of outreach for our camps and schools as well as church extension.

The Friends Women Missionary Fellowship has grown this year, with two well-attended and inspiring fall retreats. They raised nearly \$40,000 in their various projects for missions. Geraldine concludes her three-year term as FWMF president during these sessions and is being replaced by Beth Bagley.

The Friends Men conferences also continue to grow, with the largest one yet held in March at Twin Rocks. The coming year two conferences are planned, one at Twin Rocks and another at Quaker Hill. The fellowship and spiritual inspiration of these events make a real impact on not only the lives of women and men attending, but the churches from which they come as well.

The Young Adult Friends Fellowship also continues to grow in influence and ministry, with another gathering at Twin Rocks last spring. Their goals and

concerns will be shared during these sessions in workshops listed in the program schedule.

It sounds almost trite, like something one is supposed to say in this kind of report, but I must tell you that many of our churches are experiencing consistent growth, real revival, genuine harmony, and vision for expansion. Often this reflects effective pastoral leadership, consistent commitment on the part of local Friends who serve the Lord in love for Him and one another. While much time may be spent in attempting to help out in problem situations here and there, the Yearly Meeting is healthy. We have a wonderful fellowship of pastors and spouses who love the Lord and their calling, whose lives are being poured out in faithful service. In my 42 years in the Yearly Meeting, I have not seen a better overall picture of our church and its potential. Obviously, this is not to overlook some serious problems; several congregations are struggling through various difficulties and discouragements. But in the overview, this is always to be expected, for there are many adversaries. So, we must be praying for God's guidance, an outpouring of power and blessing, but we dishonor the Lord by engaging in self-flagellation, focusing on our failures, and not praising Him for blessings showered abundantly upon us.

It seems that in our humanity we tend to look always for simple answers, especially in theology or church matters. There is the constant search for a personal evangelism plan made easy, a religious formula to be taken in one gulp that will produce instant success. Social action is never effortless. As Friends we have believed and often courageously practiced the truth that knowing Jesus is not only a way to life, as held by evangelicals, but we also discover the Gospel is a way of life. This fact deeply influences our values, our life-style, our priorities, our attitudes. James, again, implied this in comparing faith and works. We as Quakers dare to exhibit a willingness to submit our cultural perspectives to critical reflection, and to change when necessary as the Holy Spirit leads us. We are convinced that Christians are to be different. The question is: Are we?

Our proper involvement in the world around us, in our new identity as Spirit-filled followers of Jesus, will make us not only missionary minded, drawn to every tribe, tongue, and nation with our prayers and resources and the giving of the best of our youth, but we also will be totally involved in opposition to such evil influences as evolution taught in our schools, the abortion-on-demand philosophy, racism and sexism, nuclear arms, the military buildup. Our blood-bought identity as "salt and light" gives direction to our place in society. If we belong to Jesus, we thereby belong to our brothers and sisters who live in the ghettos of Portland and Seattle, indeed in almost every town and city of the Northwest. We will reach out in love to the Hispanics with as much concern as we do to the terrors in Latin America and the Middle East. Because Christ demands our ultimate loyalties, we reject nationalism or any kind of patriotism that would lure us into denying our citizenship in the Kingdom of God. Our status as Holy Spirit filled, sanctified people makes it very hard for the world to control or even categorize us politically.

The awareness in our Yearly Meeting of social and public responsibility as a natural expression of the fruit of the Spirit is a witness that challenges our youth as well as our neighbors. This awareness, this sensitivity to Bible teaching and the Holy Spirit's touch upon our hearts brings the "renewing of the mind" in not conforming to the world's model; it brings us the challenge of a reasonable service that is at times both inspiring and dangerous. Friends, deep down within us we realize the trend and speed of world and religious events may be drawing us close to the final test of Christian obedience. Let us lift up our eyes to walk closely with the One who is the Way, the Life, and the Truth.

Rather than stopping at this point, let me attempt to pinpoint some practical ways these things confront us as a Yearly Meeting. Those who become impatient or misunderstand the desperate challenge involved in an effective urban ministry such as at Piedmont and with ethnic minorities are urged to pray and participate more earnestly. The novelty of our probing into ways of trying to be helpful brings the discovery that the so-called "urban crisis," or "urban problems," have no easy solution. But seen through eyes of a loving Lord, they become "urban opportunities." Aaron Hamlin, along with many others, see it that way. It is sometimes called "vision." God has offered us a staggering opportunity, not only in Piedmont, but with the various immigrants we have come to know such as the Korean people and the Cambodians as well as the Hispanics. It is a task for which we have not been well-organized or experts. But we are learning, and we care, and that is surely the way to begin.

This is what is meant by practical Christianity, costly but relevant. It is James again who writes: "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."

Denominations who really care and have a vision for foreign and home missions, says Larry McSwain in his book *Conflict Ministry in the Churches*, need to establish a framework for what he calls "special purpose churches." Now, no one knows better than I, perhaps, how many boards, committees, task forces, and busy people there are in our Yearly Meeting. Why add another? Well, simply because we have to! God will provide the strength, the wisdom, the resources, the personnel to do what He lays on our hearts to attempt.

What I am recommending is a new Special Ministries Board. It may be a consolidation of existing committees, it may involve partial participation of other boards, including an International Studies program at George Fox College. But if the potential of our vital ministry at Piedmont, among the Koreans, the Hispanics, and other opportunities fails simply because of our fumbling organization or careless inattention, I believe we will be held accountable as a church. There is a tendency for us to agree with this concept and even try to influence making it happen—but there is a difference in having an influence and being personally responsible. In our Quaker system, we are all and equally responsible to God.

This year we are delighted in becoming more intimately acquainted with our Yearly Meeting involvement with the different missions of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. We will now be able to pray more intelligently and specifically, and follow the missionary news we receive with keener interest. What a blessing it has been to us all to have Francisco and Juana Mamani with us! Our commitments to missions will increase to match these opportunities.

Nearly 15 years ago in a study made by Myron Goldsmith and myself and published in a book about church growth, this recommendation was made: "... that a church growth secretary be sought . . . his assignment to be to implement and administrate particular programs encompassed in the church growth recommendations [listed in the book]. He would spend time with committees, in workshops, with small groups and pastors, in counseling and on-the-scene problem solving and encouragement of church extension efforts. While the general superintendent will continue his role of working with pastors, church visitation, supervision of all departments, it is recognized the ministry of one with other abilities and training is needed in equipping the local leadership for church growth."

I recall that when Norval Hadley became superintendent, he and I talked at length of this and agreed Quentin Nordyke, with his studies at the Institute for Church Growth at Fuller Seminary and his missionary experience and other abilities, would be a good choice. I believe it was and is a good choice. With

the reorganization of our mission department, additional responsibilities have been given to this position.

While the direction and priorities of that study 15 years ago still are well targeted, several significant changes have taken place in these years that affect our Yearly Meeting, indeed our societal environment and the cultural character of the local church. Some of these impact our approach to church growth and church planting.

What are some of these changes? Well, the finished product of a successful, normally functioning church is one. While it is hard for those my age and older to see it, or acknowledge it, the role of pastoring *and* church planting has changed. The formerly familiar four-services-a-week format as a measurement for local church is inadequate now—if it ever was. Competent pastors now spend far more time than we did 20 or 25 years ago in the long, demanding, often nearly hopeless task of family and marriage counseling. Rather than keeping a neat list of pastoral calls in homes of church and community families, hours and days are given by beleaguered pastors and elders able to be involved in dealing with broken or threatened marriages and family disintegration. This is misunderstood often by those who are older or those who enjoy relatively problem-free family living. Yet, established Christian families are suddenly invaded by these situations. All one has to do to prove this is reflect on our range of friends and loved ones. One older pastor with tears poured out this admission: "I used to think discussion of divorce or remarriage had no place in our church or my preaching . . . now my own two children are divorced." The problem is epidemic, it is frightening and heartbreaking. The ideal model for nice, well-run, comfortable churches with children all coming from happy homes . . . this is either unrealistic or hypocritical. This brings, you see, a new dimension to evangelism, discipling, Sunday school teaching for children and youth, some coming from second and third generations of divorced parents. It isn't as though the neighbors, or even our own adult children, just need to have a revival meeting and get right back to where they belong. They simply don't know what to do, where they belong. The standards, the life-style of today is so saturated with television "soaps" and hedonistic living that the model of church relationships along with proper family life requires new approaches in community penetration.

This is also a plea for understanding from all of us before we blame our pastors or church planters for not doing it like the good 'ol days, or because pastoral calls are not made like we want them to be for our blessing and enjoyment. This all does not mean that God is not able to save to the uttermost, or that the church is finished—not at all! It just means our tools and time must be adapted to be His instruments for meeting the darkening world about us.

Paul Cho, pastor of the largest church in the world in Seoul, Korea, writes that he believes revivals are now bursting forth in local churches rather than large campaigns, big meetings, or even in one-on-one efforts. And the key to local church revivals, he says, are these four emphases: prayer, the infilling of the Holy Spirit, the proclamation of a message of hope, and fourthly, good organization.

While this plan is valid today, it is also a historical pattern of all great revivals, including those experienced by Quakers. How much do we want revival, the outpouring of the Holy Spirit power convicting of sin and bringing a "harvest of righteousness"? What does God want to do and want us to be? How can we push beyond our own preconceived suppositions about ourselves, our local church, our Yearly Meeting?

Friends, this is a call to prayer! Let us plan to pray, then practice prayer. Read all we can about prayer. Set ourselves to the disciplines of prayer as persons and pray more together. Let me propose some ways that are directed pri-

marily to local churches rather than some big campaign or even Yearly Meeting program. What I am saying now will be given to each church and pastor in prayer letters.

This coming year we are invited to make a personal PRAYER COVENANT. This covenant will involve these disciplines: 1. Search out and study prayer instruction from God's Word, in prayer meetings, classes, or in preaching. 2. Covenant to give one day a month to prayer. This may be alone, as couples, in groups, or however. A concentrated focus on reading, waiting, reflection, confession, and in praying will be the focus of this one day of prayer each month. 3. Make the first Tuesday of each month a time for praying with others. Form a prayer breakfast time with men, a morning prayer gathering for women not employed outside the home, prayer luncheons for those who are. Hold cell prayer meetings on Tuesday evenings if the other prayer suggestions are impractical. 4. The fourth covenant is to commit a half hour to prayer each Saturday evening, and another 30 minutes early Sunday morning to prayer for revival in your own church.

If this PRAYER COVENANT is used in every church by everyone possible, what might God be able to do? It is my own plan to not only make this my personal covenant, but this year to do my best to schedule time in as many local churches as possible to encourage, to listen, to consider the potential and problems of your church in company with your pastor. These informal, week-night gatherings will be an attempt to communicate prayer needs as well as share prayer answers of the way God has opened doors of blessing among us all. But the objective is not some new Yearly Meeting program, but a sincere effort in each local meeting to pray for revival.

Just what God wishes to do among us I do not know. But I am convinced that all we are doing that is good will be made better by more prayer. What we are doing that is not good will be changed. Where there is disunity or discouragement, God will bring new love and hope. Our committees will function more effectively, our stewardship will improve, our pastors will sense a new anointing in their ministries, and God will be honored and those about us who are spiritually lost and confused will be drawn to the Lord. It is Pastor Paul Cho of Korea again who insists that we are fishing with a rod and reel when we ought to be using a net.

PRAYER COVENANTS will be available in local churches. These are not cards to be signed and sent to the Yearly Meeting or given to anyone; rather they are simply guidelines to use in your personal covenant to the Lord in the honesty and concern of your own heart.

"Who is wise . . . among you? Let him show it . . . by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom . . . [that] is . . . pure; then peace loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. Peacemakers who sow in peace RAISE A HARVEST OF RIGHTEOUSNESS."

Since taking over the Youth Field Secretary position in June, I have spent time becoming more familiar with the Yearly Meeting. Time spent with Frank Engle in May was very helpful in my orientation. I was able to attend Ministers Conference and several Friends Youth Exec gatherings. It has been exciting to get to know people and I have appreciated so much everyone's willingness to answer questions as they came up.

This summer has really flown by. I left Newberg June 9 and spent six weeks in Idaho. During this time, I attended two camps at Quaker Hill and one at Twin Lakes. I led seminars at all the camps I attended and assisted in leading recreation at one. The time that I wasn't at camp I spent visiting youth groups and youth workers. Later on this summer I will also be directing recreation at Surfside youth camp.

While in Idaho, I spent some time beginning to prepare for the Youth Leadership Seminars that will take place this fall. I am planning on five of these seminars. Last year seminars were in Spokane, Meridian, Vancouver, Talent, and Sherwood. This year's seminars will be held in the same areas but probably at different churches. The focus of this year's seminars will be training for discipleship. I hope to have the dates and places finalized by mid-August.

Other plans for this fall include Samuel School November 23-25. Again I will be working with Dr. Arthur Roberts and the George Fox College religion faculty in planning this conference for junior highers.

I would like to thank you all for your support of youth programs and of me as I have taken over this position. Jim Settle will be filling the position of my "advisor," but I will also continue to be in contact with Ken VandenHoek. I look forward to being in this position of youth field secretary. I am excited to work with the youth programs and to see where God will lead!

EDUCATION BOARD

■ 31. Richard Edmundson, for the Education Board, introduced Celia Mueller, who spoke on the importance of children's ministries and illustrated this by having all those who had ever taught children in Sunday school to stand, those who are now teaching children, and those who had attended Sunday school as a child.

The Education Board is trying to focus on needs of Sunday school. Many teachers of children feel isolated from the rest of the church. She asked people to share one creative idea with the person next to them on how individual church members could encourage teachers, also how the church could encour-

age teachers. A sheet was distributed with suggestions from the Education Board. Further suggestions will be published in *Aware*, an Evangelical Friends Alliance publication.

Members of the board presented a skit promoting the sale of Betty Hockett's new missionary book for children *From Here to There and Back Again* on the life of Charles De Vol. A second book on the lives of Ralph and Esther Choate and Burundi, Africa, is anticipated, as well as other missionary books in the future.

Dorothy Barratt pointed out that the Aldersgate Vacation Bible School material is second in sales in the nation. During the report this was illustrated by people carrying placards reading "#2."

Louise Sargent, for the Department of Christian Testimonies asked for submission of sermon manuscripts for publication in a new pamphlet series "Publication of Truth." The following written report was distributed and highlighted by Dick Edmundson:

INTRODUCTION: The Education Board has taken seriously their responsibilities. This report reflects the work accomplished by the three departments.

"As I conclude my years of leadership as president of the Board of Education, I express my thanks to the members of the Board and to the Yearly Meeting as a whole for the support of the education program of the Yearly Meeting. There are still many challenges and opportunities for the future and each of us needs to do our best for the Lord in His service."

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH SCHOOLS, Donna Prescott, chairman

A "Needs Assessment Survey" was analyzed and the information tabulated for use in meeting individual church needs. Workshops presented by the board, using the results of the survey, were held at Hilltop Friends Church, Boise and Greenleaf Area churches, and Southwest Washington Area churches. The format varied in each area with positive feedback from each. Plans are to continue the ministry of the Task Force in the remaining area/churches throughout the Yearly Meeting.

A Christian Education Camp is planned at Twin Rocks Camp for the spring of 1985. This will be a department-sponsored camp using leaders and resources from within the Yearly Meeting and EFA. Dates are Twin Rocks, March 1-3, 1985; also in the Southern Idaho area, March 9.

As a result of the Yearly Meeting Long-Range Planning Committee sessions recommendations, a department committee was organized to present criteria for a Sunday School of the Year, Sunday School Teachers of the Year, and for Standards of Excellence in Christian Education. This committee met and drew up a proposed alternative for presentation to the board. This will be finalized and presented at Yearly Meeting, for implementation in the fall of 1984.

Plans are being made to publish a Video Catalog/Pamphlet for use in the local church this coming year.

The new Children's Yearly Meeting organizational setup will be used this Yearly Meeting with Retha McCutchen acting as coordinator for the programs. We are experiencing an improved children's program this year during our Yearly Meeting sessions.

The youth had another exciting year, highlighted by Youth Tremor mid-winter conference in Boise, Idaho, December 1983. Three hundred young people attended this time of spiritual guidance and recreation. Frank Engle, Jr. and Ken VandenHoek are to be commended for their hard work and organization in this endeavor. We have a new youth secretary this year—Sandra Wilson is filling the position previously held by Frank Engle, Jr. We praise the Lord

for Frank's leadership the past two years. We will miss his dedication and enthusiasm. We are anticipating another good year.

A new video "Flowers, Oceans, Bunnies and Bears" was completed and made available to churches this fall. Use of media ministries is fast becoming a leading channel of information and instruction in Christian Education work. The second in this series will be produced this fall. The subject is "You Are Special" and the title will be "The Elephant on the Flying Trapeze."

The Department of Church Schools' job description will be revised this year as a continued updating of information for use by area secretaries.

Our board continues to be active in the Christian Education Commission of the EFA. Special emphasis has been to strengthen the offerings through Aldersgate Graded Curriculum, production of the *Adult* and *Teacher's Friend*, and special courses on Friends distinctives.

A new feature next year will be placing helps for Sunday school teachers in the *AWARE* paper published by the EFA Christian Education Commission. One page will be designed to cut out and file in a three-hole notebook.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Sunday schools participated in the EFA emphasis of 20,000 strong in September, 1983. This year's goal is 20,000 + in Sunday school on September 16, 1984.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION, Hector Munn, chairman

The Ministerial Financial Aid Program administered by this department assisted eight students at Western Evangelical Seminary; Gayle Beebe at Princeton Theological Seminary; Roger Watson at Fuller Seminary; and Paul Almquist at George Fox College. Participants of this group who have completed seminary are Gregg Lamm and Dale Rogers, who have been called into pastoral ministry for the coming year. Paul Almquist will be serving on the staff of Clackamas Park Friends. In all, there were 13 Friends students at Western Evangelical Seminary, or 7 percent of the enrollment.

There were 136 Friends students at George Fox College, or 21 percent of the enrollment. Of these, 120 students were from Northwest Yearly Meeting churches.

Private, precollege education is a growing commitment of Friends churches and families. High schools are a ministry of Greenleaf Friends and Hayden Lake Friends. Churches report over 78 Friends children attend private high schools. Greenleaf Friends and Silverton Friends have elementary schools as a part of their ministry. A total of 102 children attend these and other private elementary schools. Six churches sponsor Christian kindergartens.

Friends churches also assist Greenleaf Friends Academy and George Fox College with direct financial support. There were 33 church-sponsored students at George Fox College who were assisted through the Church/College Matching scholarship program.

Members of Northwest Yearly Meeting churches are active as teachers and administrators of both public and private schools. Information is being collected to prepare a directory of Friends educators. At this time, nearly 350 Friends have been identified as educators.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES, Paul Anderson, chairman

The Department of Christian Testimonies has been quite active again this year. We have met at least six times and face the challenge of our ministry with a good deal of excitement. Having become largely a "pamphleteering task-force," we have sought to discern specific issues that need to be addressed in keeping with the testimonies of the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. In

doing so, we have published a series of pamphlets and bookmarks that will soon be available from Barclay Press.

Each member of our committee has designed a *Quaker Key* bookmark that has a combination of Quaker quotations and Scripture verses on it. These topics include Peace, Worship, Holiness, Our Bodies as Temples of the Holy Spirit, Simplicity, Respect for Life.

We are also continuing our trifold "Know Your Friends" pamphlet series by adding the following essays: "A Fresh Look at Holiness" by Louise Sargent; "A Vocational Ministry" by Darius Salter; and "On Becoming a Christian" by Arthur Roberts.

Another project was to publish a poster containing 10 queries for the stewardship of facilities to be posted in the work areas of a church. The poster, entitled "This Concerns Thee, Friend!" is written in modern-day "Quakerese," complete with our own *Evangelical Friend* cartoon Quaker on it. We hope that it will energize the care and maintenance of facilities by all who use them, and that it will extend the effectiveness of all who are caretakers of the House of the Lord.

Perhaps the most extensive project we've completed is a two-year cooperative effort between the Stewardship Board and the Department of Christian Testimonies. Thanks to Arthur Pruitt's helpful encouragement, Mark Kelley and Paul Anderson have completed a 13-issue series entitled "A Matter of Stewardship." This series offers a comprehensive approach to stewardship based on the beliefs that God is the owner and giver of all, that we are responsible to cultivate and use God's entrustment for His glory, and that to the extent we have been faithful stewards, so will be our reward (see Matthew 25). The series is designed especially for a quarter of midweek meetings, Sunday evening services, or Sunday morning classes. The issues are individually packaged so they could be used as bulletin inserts or as handouts in a tract rack. Each issue includes "Queries for Consideration," written by Louise Sargent. An easy-to-use teacher's guide has also been written by Paul Anderson. The topics include The Meaning of Stewardship; The Stewardship of Our World; The Stewardship of Our Bodies; The Stewardship of Our Homes; The Stewardship of Our Possessions; The Stewardship of Our Finances; Stewardship and Giving; The Stewardship of Our Time; The Stewardship of Our Talents; The Stewardship of Our Vocations; The Stewardship of Our Hearts and Minds; The Stewardship of the Gospel; The Stewardship of Life.

These are now in the process of being published, and will be available from Barclay Press in August for this fall's quarter.

Lest it be presumed that this department is concerned with pamphleteering alone, we have taken a special interest in the Quaker selection of books, magazines and tapes available from the library of Western Evangelical Seminary, adding to it each year. We have also perused the back issues of the *Evangelical Friend* in search of articles to reprint.

A further task that is drawing a good deal of our attention currently is the rewriting of the queries as requested by the Long-Range Planning Committee. We have thus far dismantled the content, examined the wording, contrasted our queries with those of other yearly meetings, and are now engaged in restructuring a first draft.

Reports from churches indicate that Christian Testimonies have been highlighted from the pulpit, through teaching ministries, libraries, pamphlets, and films, and within membership classes. We anticipate next year to be a fruitful year as well. We will be starting a new series over the next five years entitled "Publishers of Truth." This series will solicit sermons that have been preached within the last two years (1,250 words in length) and essays that are Quaker responses to contemporary issues (1,000-1,500 words in length). One sermon

and one essay will be chosen each year for publication in this new series, and the one submitting it will receive a \$100 prize. We believe that this will encourage helpful stewardship of the spoken word *and* the written word within our Yearly Meeting.

As always, we welcome any input that will help us discern which needs ought to be addressed and how it might best be accomplished.

The report was approved.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

■ 33. Ron Woodward, for the Department of Missions, mentioned the two families that will be going to Bolivia and Peru soon: Ed and Marie Cammack and Steve and Janelle Baron. Steve and Janelle are going as "associate missionaries" to head up the "Greenhouse Project."

Ron introduced Dwaine Williams, who reported on the impact of the drought relief program in Bolivia and Peru. Participants in the relief program were required to participate in work projects in order to receive the food, but those too old or too young or ill to work also received the assistance. The food was purchased locally, which also benefited the economy. The Executive Council of the Bolivian Friends Church assisted in the distribution, and the church was strengthened through this trying time. Prayer and worship preceded the distribution. Funding for the program came from Northwest Yearly Meeting and World Vision.

Ron requested that the balance of the Department of Missions report be deferred to the afternoon session.

■ 34. The following communication from Richard Hendricks, clerk of Friends Memorial Church, was read:

With thanks to God for 80 years of ministry in the Seattle, Washington area, Friends Memorial Church will have a three-day Praise Celebration, July 5, 6, 7, 1985. We invite all Friends, former attenders and members, and the entire Yearly Meeting to rejoice with us at this special event.

■ 35. Walter Wilhite presented the Friends Fund report.

This has been a very rewarding year for Friends Fund in many ways. Wills that were signed and trusts negotiated within the past 10 years are now funding the assets of the Friends Fund.

J. D. Baker, a member of the Hayden Lake Friends Church, Hayden Lake, Idaho, has joined the staff of Friends Fund as an associate director, to assist with the estate planning and the deferred gift plans throughout the entire Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church meetings.

Ron Dingman works in the Development Office and is in charge of the accounting work. The Board of Directors has approved the purchase of a computer to help expedite this work.

The Investment Committee of Friends Fund has entered into a contract with an Investment Advisory Corporation, FJW, Portland, Oregon.

- 37. Leroy Neifert opened the afternoon business session with prayer.
- 38. The minutes were read and approved. The clerk read a correction in the Education printed report.
- 39. Vivian Thornburg, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave her testimony.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS (Continued)

- 40. The Department of Missions report was continued by Ron Woodward. He reported that the Evangelical Friends Mission is working on new plans for financing the mission programs of the EFM, which will begin in January of 1986.

He introduced James Morris, executive director of EFM, who reported on the challenge of a new EFM field in Rwanda, Central Africa. We hope to enter this field soon. Some \$100,000 is needed for the first two years' budget, plus a missionary couple. Prayer was urged for these needs.

Ron Woodward expressed appreciation for the work of James Morris and Reta Stuart in the EFM office.

The printed report follows:

In Acts 9:31, Luke reports that the church throughout all Judea and Galilee and Samaria had peace and was built up; and in walking in the fear of the Lord and the comfort of the Holy Spirit it was multiplied. Such a description would seem to fit our work in Bolivia and Peru this past year, with both fields reporting harmonious relationships between the mission and the national church and encouraging areas of growth as well. It has also been an exciting year—with a very positive drought relief program completed, with the Lord's provision of an

ideal piece of mission property in Ilave, Peru, with two couples finishing language school in Costa Rica (Andersons, Fitches), with two dedicated YCEW teams serving the Lord, and with two new couples volunteering for missionary service (Cammacks, Barons)! These are only a few of the developments that give us great cause for rejoicing during our Yearly Meeting sessions this summer.

MISSIONARY PERSONNEL

During the 1983-84 year, Bolivia was staffed with just two missionary families—Ron and Carolyn Stansell, Sara, Anita, and Debbie (Santa Cruz), and James and Gail Roberts, Heidi and Amanda (La Paz). Supplementing the efforts of these two families was a six-week trip by Roscoe and Tina Knight throughout the Yungas area. Carolyn Stansell taught full time during the year at the Santa Cruz Learning Center, the missionary children's school where Anita and Debbie studied. At midyear, Sara began attending the New Tribes Mission School in Tambo. A highlight for James Roberts was the opportunity to attend the International Prayer Assembly in Seoul, Korea, early in June.

In Peru, Wayne and Bev Chapman, Amy, Nicholas, and Michael lived in Juli for half of the year and then moved to our new property in Ilave. Dwaine and Becky Williams, Marci, and Jonathan were stationed in Juli, where both children were taught by Lois Harmon, who had graciously volunteered her time as a teacher for this one-year period. Lois lived in the *casita*, the small guest apartment adjacent to the Williams residence. Roscoe and Tina Knight continued to use Arequipa as a base for their ministry.

In San Jose, Costa Rica, Denny and Sue Anderson, Aaron, and Bryan welcomed Kristen, a healthy baby girl, into the family on December 6. Assisted by a tutor late in the year, the Andersons were able to leave language school in July in order to become situated in Tacna, Peru, prior to the departure of the Knights. Ben and Genevieve Fitch, Trisia, and Reid, are still in Costa Rica during these sessions, and anticipate locating in Juli, Peru, as soon as their summer language term concludes.

Hal and Nancy Thomas, David, and Kristin, were on "stateside assignment" this year, residing in Newberg and traveling throughout the Yearly Meeting on deputation. We were grateful for Hal's steady improvement during the year in recovery from tuberculosis. Nancy represented us on deputation in Eastern Region during October; Hal attended the EFM Commission meetings in Boise in January. During the spring, Nancy was extensively involved in the proofreading project on the Aymara Bible with Francisco and Juana Mamani, a project sponsored by the United Bible Society.

MISSIONARIES NEWLY APPOINTED

During these Yearly Meeting sessions, the Department of Missions rejoiced in the opportunity to once again place veteran missionaries, Ed and Marie Cammack, under a three-year appointment to the altiplano of Peru. The appointment is somewhat unique in that it provides for the Cammacks to return to the States at their own expense during the summer of 1985, and possibly again one year later, to terminate farming responsibilities to which they are currently committed. Ed and Marie will live in Juli and will assist us in church planting in that responsive area. The department also placed under appointment Steve and Janelle Baron and their children, Landon (6) and Kelsey (3), for service as "associate missionaries" in Bolivia and Peru. They will have a specialized assignment, working with the Greenhouse Project and other "preventative programs" designed to improve nutrition and to raise living standards among our Aymara people. Steve and Janelle Baron have been serving on the staff at Twin Rocks for the past three years; Steve has a degree in horticulture and is extreme-

ly resourceful in developing new programs. They will spend the fall in language school in Costa Rica and then take up residence in La Paz for the most of 1985. Initial funding for the Barons' support will come from a surplus in our account for drought relief—money given in the fall across the Yearly Meeting in response to the famine appeal. The department feels that it is providential that these funds may be used not only to meet a temporary hunger need but also to help prevent hunger and malnutrition in the future.

YCEW TEAM

Due to the creative vision of Boyd Morris and the Yearly Meeting Youth Executive, two short-term mission teams from the Yearly Meeting went abroad this summer. Holly Drahn, Shawn McConaughy, Correen Schmeltzer, Christie Silliman, Kelly Miller, Shelley Rourke, and GFC student-translator, Linda Canfield, spent six weeks in Bolivia and Peru working in evangelism and support ministries for our missionaries and the national church. Sara Stansell joined this capable crew on the field. Another team consisting of Becky Giles, Nancy Smelley, Hans Lobeck, Gary Colfax, Chrystal Schmeltzer, and Tammy Dawson became part of a Teen Missions youth team in Nakuru, Kenya, Africa.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM FIELD REPORTS

BOLIVIA—Members of the Mesa Directiva (M.D.) effectively administered a "mini-relief" program for victims of drought in the Pacajes and Fontera districts. The M.D. has also grown in maturity in many other areas, taking more responsibility for evangelism, training workshops, and encouragement to the work at quarterly and local meeting levels. San Pablo Seminary completed another successful year with more than 100 students and with James Roberts teaching two courses and Gail teaching sessions for the wives of seminarians. More than 300 students were in the extension Bible school program. The Villa Nueva Esperanza and Golgota Friends churches both qualified for the 80-20 matching funds program for the purchase of new property. The Villa San Antonio church building was destroyed by a sudden mud slide, but funds from the Northwest have enabled that church to begin reconstruction. Mike and Kay Ellison helpfully volunteered to work part time for the mission, July-December, 1983, with the Greenhouse Project. Bolivian inflation worked severe hardship on nationals but ironically enabled mission dollars to go further and to be used to maximum advantage. In Santa Cruz, the Bolivian Evangelical University began its third year with approximately 410 students. The San Julian Quarterly Meeting was officially established in March with four existing congregations in the "colonies." Pio Villca continues to have an excellent ministry in San Julian as a "national missionary." A Yamaha motorcycle was purchased for his use.

PERU—A "first" for Bolivian-Peruvian churches was an international pastors' conference held in June, attended by 97 pastors and workers from Peru, 90 from Bolivia. Initiated by the Bolivian M.D., it was a grand success and should be held every two to three years. The new Dodge one-ton pickup is now in use and is a great help. Due to the generous offer of a Friend from Eastern Region, a strategic piece of property was purchased in Ilave in the name of the national church. With a mission home and a national church center, missionaries are convinced that this property will contribute greatly to the advancement of the Kingdom. Food distribution during the drought went well, with beautiful cooperation from local church leaders; the net result seemed not only to meet physical need but to create a hunger to see spiritual needs met! Under the direction of Dwaine Williams, it is estimated that 3,000 families from 30 communities received food—a distribution of over 95 metric tons. Total cost of the program was \$41,290, with funds coming from Northwest Yearly Meeting, World Vision, and Friends in Taiwan and elsewhere. Fifty-six churches are

reported in Peru this year, 49 on the Altiplano, 7 on the coast. The annual joint-council retreat was held Christmas 1983 in Arequipa with visitors Quentin and Florene Nordyke and Clynton and Marjorie Crisman. Two hundred-fifty youth met in Ilave during the year for the largest annual youth conference ever. Approximately 300 participants were involved in extension Bible school during the most recent trimester.

EFM AROUND THE WORLD

Through the Denver office and the labors of James Morris and Reta Stuart, new frontiers are being explored! The biggest news is the firm decision to open a new mission field together in the Central African country of Rwanda. A goal of \$100,000 has been established to provide start-up funds for the opening of this new work. While personnel is not in place yet, Mid-America Yearly Meeting has promised to underwrite the expenses of one missionary couple and to take an offering this summer at their annual men's and women's banquets. Eastern Region has committed \$35,000 toward the goal! Our EFM staff has developed a "World Christian Workshop" to be presented in a local church (or group of churches), designed to educate and to instill vision for evangelizing the world in the latter part of the 20th century! A deferred-giving plan for missions has also been developed this year through the cooperation of specialists from several yearly meetings. Another frontier is a "wineskin" that will enable people from across EFA to find opportunities around the world to serve as "tentmaker missionaries." It is encouraging to us to know that Mark and Wilma Roberts are preparing for a term of service in Mexico City, replacing the Clarksons who have completed two terms in Mexico.

FINAL THOUGHTS

During our sessions together, we recognized with great appreciation 27 years of service by Gladys Cook to the Department of Missions! We were also blessed by the ministry of Francisco and Juana Mamani at Yearly Meeting and among our churches. Frank Wu and Howard and Mary Evelyn Moore from Taiwan, Vijay Prakash from India, and Walter and Ruth Outwater from Alaska Yearly Meeting have all been an inspiration to us. In the words of James Roberts, "What about the coming year? What is the Holy Spirit saying to us? I believe God is calling us to an adventure in prayer . . . [He] wants to impress upon us the importance of intercessory prayer. It should not be *part* of our mission work. Prayer must be the *heart* of our work. La Paz is ready to receive the Living Christ. If we intercede . . . God will change things that cannot be changed in any other way."

The report was approved.

■ 41. Minute 119 in 1983 recorded approval for first reading of changes relating to local meeting representatives but referred the matter of term of office back to the Discipline Revision Committee.

The Discipline Revision Committee presents for first reading:

On pages 35-36, Chapter II, Section 1, A., paragraph 7 (as approved by first reading, 1983 minute 119) to be added to the end of the paragraph:

"A representative should not be appointed to serve more than six consecutive years unless others are unavailable."

On page 69 (add to end of paragraph 3 *term of office* as approved by first reading, 1983 minute 119):

"A representative should not be appointed to serve more than six consecutive years unless others are unavailable."

This was approved as a first reading.

■ 42. Lon Fendall presented the report of the Long-Range Planning Committee. A chart of action of the committee was distributed. A visual aid showed 21 projects completed as proposed; 12 projects completed in another form; 22 in progress; and 6, no action yet. (See page A-1 1983 *Minutes*.)

Pat Evans, a member of the committee, reported on some specific activities they had encouraged.

Six additional objectives for the coming year were presented. (Text of additional objectives is included as final pages of this book.)

Harold Ankeny expressed appreciation to the committee and their work. The report was approved.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

■ 43. The Department of Social Concerns report was given by Phil Smith, chairman, and a printed report was distributed:

The Department of Social Concerns is organized, as its name suggests, around areas of concern. Subcommittees and individuals working under the department (often in cooperation with other Yearly Meeting boards or departments) are:

1. The Subcommittee on Women published the *Priscilla Papers* and is concerned to encourage ministry by women and to provide models and encouragement of equality between men and women.

2. The Wellness Committee, which publishes the *Journal of Creative Living*, is concerned to promote wholeness in Christian living, integrating physical, mental and emotional as well as spiritual health.

3. The Piedmont Committee gives structure and oversight to the work at Piedmont. The bulk of the department's budget goes to the Piedmont church through this subcommittee.

4. The Intern Program. The concern for prison ministry is changing form! For the past few years, the department has given support to Dick and Sandi Wild as they worked in prisons in Oregon. The Lord has led the Wilds to pastoral work in Idaho, but at the same time has raised the concern for prison and jail ministries in a number of hearts around the Yearly Meeting. The kind of organization needed is not yet clear, but already it seems that a "fellowship of prison ministries" is forming. Pray for this concern!

5. The Legislative Newsletter provides information on matters of conscience and social importance. Dan Portis-Cathers edits it in cooperation with the Department of Peace Testimony.

6. Services to Local Meetings provide some financial help to meet local needs—unemployment, transients, etc.

A new concern has been raised among us—the role of television and its effect on family life. An "ad hoc" committee will present helpful literature for parents at Yearly Meeting sessions and will continue to do research in this area. It may be that this concern will grow and a new subcommittee will form around this issue.

The department's work is not all that is done in the area of social concern in the Yearly Meeting. Most of our churches have committees or individuals working on one or more concerns of social importance. Some examples: 30 churches report that they collect and distribute food; 5 report that they sponsor refugee families; 16 report that they have regular nursing home visitation—the list could be quite long. Over \$25,000 in emergency assistance was reported as being distributed by local meetings.

In response to an assignment from the Long-Range Planning Committee, the department appointed a "New Ministries Committee," which was active this year. The committee compiled information on existing social ministries all over

the northwestern states. This data is by no means exhaustive, but can be helpful to Friends who are looking for places to "plug in" for service. In addition, the committee has developed a packet of materials to provide guidance to those who would undertake a new ministry.

The loss of George Moore is a blow to the Wellness Subcommittee of this department, and prayer was requested for someone to assume this responsibility.

Literature on TV and its impact on the family is available in the foyer.

Jail ministry is in its formative stage and will be developed under the leadership of the Lord.

The question was raised from the floor regarding the Subcommittee on Women and its encouragement of women's ministries. Carrie Bishop spoke to this, relating activities that had been carried on specifically for women.

The report was approved.

■ 44. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for a second reading the following Discipline changes:

On page 51, E. Yearly Meeting Boards, 2. General Regulations, e. Board Structure. First sentence to be modified as follows (new wording italicized, deletions lined out):

Presidents of the ~~four main boards (trustees and publication excepted)~~ of *Spiritual Life, Education, Stewardship, Outreach, and Publication* are appointed annually by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the Representatives.

On page 66, #5 Trustees, a. Appointment and Responsibility

Add the following phrase to the end of the first sentence: ". . . who shall appoint their own clerk(s)."

On page 68, b. Memorial Committee

Eliminate this paragraph and renumber the remaining items.

On page 68, old e. Other Committees

After the first sentence insert the following:

The Presiding Clerk of the Yearly Meeting shall appoint the Memorial Committee, the Epistle Committee, the Committee on Returning Minutes, the Committee to Communicate with Aged Friends, and such other committees that may be assigned to his responsibility.

On page 68, a. Auditing Committee

After the first phrase (The Yearly Meeting appoints), insert the following phrase:

". . . on nomination of the Executive Council . . ."

There was some discussion of the inclusion of the term "president of Outreach Board" since this board has copresidents of the Department of Missions and Department of Social Concerns. Each of these chairmen meet with the Executive Council and were named for one-year terms in 1983.

The second reading was approved.

■ 45. The Discipline Revision Committee presented the following changes as a second reading:

On page 53 replace the title (1) Pastoral and Extension Work with (1) Department of Evangelism. In the paragraph that follows substitute the word *department* wherever the word *board* occurs. Also in this paragraph delete the sentence "it may appoint . . . help from the Yearly Meeting as desired," and substitute this: "It examines and helps determine the desirability of new locations and of plans for construction and remodeling of churches and parsonages."

On page 54 delete (4) Procedure for Recording and Liberating of Ministers and substitute (4) Department of Ministry.

On page 54, (4) (a), a "Recognizing the Gift" line 2, change "Gifts in the Ministry" to "The Bestowment of Gifts."

On page 55, part (b), line 1, change "Department of Ministry" to "Department Membership."

The second reading was approved.

■ 46. Jack Willcuts requested prayer for the families of two young people from the Korean Church who had lost their lives in a fire. Walter Lee led in prayer.

■ 47. The meeting adjourned to meet at 10:45 a.m. Wednesday.

Wednesday, 10:45 a.m., August 1

■ 48. Paul Meier, pastor of Medford Friends Church, led in prayer to open the session.

■ 49. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 50. The Youth Committee report presented on Tuesday evening was approved.

■ 51. William Ellis, associate minister at Silverton Friends Church, a candidate for recording, gave his testimony.

■ 52. Clynton Crisman for the Stewardship Board expressed appreciation for the work of Beatrice Goldsmith and Oscar Brown, and introduced Beatrice, who gave the following treasurer's report:

Before presenting the Financial Report, I would like to share a couple of matters. First, I am humbled and very, very grateful to each of you who prayed for me after hearing of my surgery and subsequent chemotherapy treatments, which I will be undergoing for another three months. With so many prayers from individuals, Bible study groups, Sunday school classes, and churches, I feel that healing is taking place. Praise the Lord. Please continue to pray with me for complete healing!

And now I would like Ruth Haldy to come to the platform. With all of the work that is the responsibility of my office to handle, and with my illness, I could not have had this report today except for the capable skills and hard work of Ruth, bookkeeper for these past five years. She will be completing her paid employment in August, but knowing Ruth, I expect we will see her usual volunteer spirit as we have before! I just want to recognize her at this time with a small gift certificate but a big THANK YOU.

Now to the Financial Report. At the top of the page is an accounting of all funds handled by our office. The next two sections refer only to the Great Commission Budget, which last year was \$560,000. We were short of meeting this budget by \$29,120 when the books closed, though \$945 came in later toward this deficit. The expense deficit of the Great Commission Budget was \$18,409, but with our contingency fund of \$5,000 and transfers from the Supplementary Fund and from boards and departments we were able to pay all of the bills and not end the year with a deficit. We begin this year with a zero balance, however, so it is important that we meet the 1984-85 budget. Under the section Summary of Great Commission Budget Contributions and Supplementary Fund, the churches contributed 88 percent of the \$530,880 income received. This represents about a 5 percent increase over church giving last year. Now to the section where the report indicates church pledges. Of the \$560,000 budget for 1983-84 the church pledges were 70½ percent of the budget, though they

paid more than they pledged. Churches gave \$22,110 over what they gave last year. The Thanksgiving offering for Bolivia and Peru drought relief was \$25,514, with another \$26,553 being given through the Department of Missions for drought relief, for a total of \$51,067 for this need.

Now to the other section of the Financial Report, here is where all of the accounting of all funds received and spent is shown. I would suggest that you look through each department and board report and if you have questions regarding their accountability of funds spent, ask a board member or your area secretary or the recipient of the funds. The *Minutes* of the Yearly Meeting show all of the members of the departments and boards and organizations. But if you have a question, be sure to ask.

What is the Great Commission Budget? It is the outreach of each NWYM church, participating in the fulfilling of the Great Commission to go into all the world and preach the Gospel. That is what the Yearly Meeting ministries through the Great Commission Budget is all about. Praise the Lord for what Friends have been able to do in Northwest Yearly Meeting!

The treasurer's report was approved. (The Financial Report appears in the Appendix.)

At this time 81 percent has been pledged with 19 percent yet to be raised; \$128,393 will have to be raised through special appeals. Oscar Brown is retiring as financial secretary after three years. The area representatives on the Stewardship Board will have to assume the responsibility he carried.

The budget was approved.

■ 54. Financial Secretary Oscar Brown reported he had been in contact with all the churches.

He used the illustration of the Children of Israel and God's promises for them. God led two million people for 40 years through the wilderness. He supplied their food, water, and clothing. He gave them the pattern for the building of the Tabernacle; the people brought their offerings, and they had more than enough—in fact, they had to be restrained! We are still linked to the miraculous hand of God!

We are His servants. It is in not only dollars but in spirit and commitment that we meet the budget. In the past year, 33 churches paid more than pledged, and two gave *double*: Netarts and Highland. Two churches doubled their pledge from the year before, and were able to give more.

Eleven churches have pledged up to their suggested share.

Financial needs should be presented to the churches as a ministry.

Oscar reported that he and Ruth will be devoting themselves to a ministry of prayer for the coming year and want to encourage this among the churches. Fifteen churches are already scheduled for prayer conferences.

It was noted that Oscar Brown has completed 51 continuous years of service to Northwest Yearly Meeting. Appreciation was expressed by applause.

■ 55. Arthur Pruitt of the Stewardship Board presented a joint program of the Education Board and the Stewardship Board to set up study courses for stewardship education. A sheet for ordering these courses was distributed.

Appreciation was expressed for the ongoing encouragement of Russell Baker for such courses, and for the writers of the series, Paul Anderson and Mark Kelley.

The Stewardship Board report was approved.

■ 56. The representatives nominated the following for three-year terms to the Stewardship Board: Richard Johnson, Barry White.

■ 57. The Representatives nominated the following to a three-year term on the Epistle Committee: Paul Anderson and Susan Lyon. Paul Anderson is nominated as clerk of the Epistle Committee.

■ 63. Kevin Thienes, pastor of Twin Lakes Friends Church, a new mission point in northern Idaho, and a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 64. Geraldine Willcuts, president of the Friends Women Missionary Fellowship, was introduced. A group of women from Southern Oregon area presented a skit illustrating the work of the FWMF, using a garden as the theme.

Geraldine gave the following report:

For Friends Women Missionary Fellowship, shortened to "FW," this has been a good year. We have three main events each year: fall retreats—Twin Rocks and Quaker Hill; Yearly Meeting banquet and meetings; spring rallies in each of 10 areas.

Each February the Executive Council of the FW meets to conduct business and plan events.

There are 59 Fellowships in Northwest Yearly Meeting; attendance averaged 684-plus; offerings for foreign and home missions totaled \$38,172.32.

We thank God for His blessings and help. Some of the interesting creative ways the Lord has helped raise money are wheat weaving, coupon refunding, silent auctions, wedding receptions, bazaars, food sales, and serving special dinners.

Geraldine introduced the new officers for the coming year.

The report was approved.

■ 65. Aaron Hamlin gave the report for the National Black Evangelical Association. He expressed appreciation for the support of Northwest Yearly Meeting, and spoke on the convention of the NBEA. The NBEA continues to exist as a unifying force and to promote Christian education, family development, and social concerns. The Black church is being challenged to reach out into the urban community.

In Portland Aaron has been in contact with the Portland school district and is attempting to assist in two needy areas: (1) released time Christian education, and (2) tutoring.

He announced the opening of North Portland Bible College "to provide Christian training relevant to the needs and ethnic cultures of the urban areas of Portland."

The NBEA will be moving its headquarters from Atlanta, Georgia, to Portland temporarily. Finances are always a continuing need.

The report was approved.

■ 66. Jess Kennison, acting superintendent at Greenleaf Friends Academy, presented their report. He announced the publication of a book of the history of the community of Greenleaf by Dilla Tucker Winslow entitled *From Sagebrush to Green Fields*. He spoke of their desire to retire their indebtedness through a program called Youth Share Program.

Ken Smitherman, superintendent of Greenleaf Friends Academy, has accepted a position at Kings Garden in Seattle. Jess has been named superintendent.

A written report was distributed as follows:

The 76th year at Greenleaf Friends Academy was a year to reaffirm the commitment to Christian education.

We opened the school year with "First Week '83." Ron Crecelius was our spiritual emphasis speaker. As Ron ministered to the students, there was a real sense of the presence of the Holy Spirit. It was a refreshing time of Christian growth.

The Lord used the ministry of Doug Emry to teach students of the evils of the rock music so many young people listen to today. He showed many examples of backward masking and record covers demonstrating the demon connotations. Many of the students were moved by Doug's presentation.

We praise God for the men sent to us this year to keynote our spiritual emphasis times. Their insight and discernment spoke so keenly to the spiritual needs of the students. We are grateful for God's all-knowing plan and leading in these special times at the academy.

We continue to be thankful for the many parents who sacrifice to send their children to the academy. We have, however, experienced a decline in student enrollment for the second consecutive year. Please pray that more families will find it possible to send their students this fall, and that parents will make Christian education a priority.

The athletic programs continue to represent us very well. This year the girls' volleyball team, under the coaching of Meredith Beals, won the district championship and took second-place honors in the state tournament. The boys' track and field team took second place in the district competition.

The Annual Benefit Auction was a tremendous success with gross receipts exceeding \$34,000, reflecting a 15 percent increase over previous years.

As we prepare to begin our 77th year, we are optimistic and expect the rich outpouring of God's blessing upon the ministry of the academy. We want to grow, not for growth's sake, but rather, that by growing Christian education will reach out and effectively touch more and more young people.

We are continually thankful for the prayers and financial support of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

The report was approved.

■ 67. The Discipline Revision Committee presented for second and final reading discipline revisions as approved as first reading as recorded by minute 119 of 1983 sessions. Keith Baker, of the Discipline Revision Committee, reported that the following sentences had been left out of the revision printed in the 1983 *Minutes*:

In Section G; 1. Composition, 6th line, following words "yearly meeting," "Those approved and seated are the official representative body. Officers will consist of a presiding clerk and a recording clerk both of whom are officers of the yearly meeting."

Also, under 4. Duties, c. Board Presidents—"In addition to core membership of the board . . ."

These omissions in the printed text will be inserted in the 1984 *Minutes*, as approved last year as a first reading.

Approved as a second reading this year.

Two sentences relative to "six year terms" will be considered first reading. See minute 41.

■ 68. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Clerk Richard Beebe, to meet at 10:45 a.m., Thursday, August 2.

■ 69. Jim Settle, pastor of the West Chehalem Friends Church, opened the meeting with prayer.

■ 70. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 71. Kurt Eshelman, pastor at East Boise Friends Church, candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 72. The clerk expressed appreciation for the work of Donald Edmundson as Yearly Meeting photographer.

SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

■ 73. Roy Clark, president of the Spiritual Life Board, expressed appreciation for the local church chairmen who had sent in reports. He feels these have been very positive, and reveal that 68 young people have indicated a call to full-time ministry of some type in the church.

The *Fine Arts Department* of the Spiritual Life Board distributed the following report:

The *Certification of Music Ministers* program has been completed by three candidates. The certification is designed to bring recognition to those who have felt called to use their God-given musical talent in the service of the church. Church music has been primarily the focus of either keyboard players of the piano and organ or choral directors of children, youth or adult choirs. Church members are encouraged to participate in this program should they feel the particular call to ministry through music.

The certification program is designed to encompass two years of training. The music component is comparable to courses taken in the first two years of college training as a church music major. The Friends doctrine component consists of readings from traditional texts used for the recording of ministers. The practical aspect requires one full year of internship in a Friends church where the candidate's music ministry is supervised by a pastoral team or senior pastor. The Fine Arts Department of the Yearly Meeting serves as coordinator of the certification procedure.

The first group to complete the program includes Sharon Bowman, John Bowman, and Dennis Hagen. Sharon is a vocal soloist, guitarist, and organist who has used each of these talents within the church ministry. She is also a teacher of piano and voice, currently serving on the adjunct faculty at George Fox College. Her current position is organist at Reedwood Friends Church.

John Bowman has served as chairman of music at John Wesley College and minister of music in various churches including the campus church at Seattle Pacific College. John is currently choir director of the touring George Fox College Chorale and a full-time faculty member. His current church music position is director of choirs and handbell ringers at Reedwood Friends Church.

Dennis Hagen has served as faculty member and chairman of Fine Arts for George Fox College in instrumental music and church music. His research has led him to produce the Oregon historical pageant *Champoeg* and the forthcoming Lewis and Clark pageant. He has served many churches as minister of music, including Newberg Friends. Currently, he is chairman of the Fine Arts Department of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

These three candidates will be formally recognized in the service designed for the recording of ministers on Thursday, August 2, 1984. Three other candidates are in process, anticipating certification at the next Yearly Meeting sessions. We are proud to see this program initiated in order to bring recognition to the many who serve faithfully in the role of the musical ministry in our churches.

The *Department of Ministry* reported that six persons are to be recorded as ministers this year. Twenty-six persons are in various steps of preparation for recording. Roy expressed appreciation to those serving on this committee, and their hours of involvement with the various candidates.

Stan Perisho reported for the new *Department of Family Life*. This department was suggested under the new Long-Range Planning Committee. He reported on the Evangelical Friends Alliance task force formed in 1982 to assist in areas of family need. Each yearly meeting of the EFA was asked to implement ways of dealing more effectively with families and family needs.

Lance and Sue Rosenau and Nancy Woodward have been named to head a planning committee for a Family Adventure Weekend in Newberg, and to offer suggestions to others interested in similar family encounter type activities. Family camps are asked to incorporate workshops or seminars into their future planning. Resource packets are being assembled, and lists of professional counselors in this area are being compiled for use by pastors. Marriage Encounter and the newer Engaged Encounter are encouraged to continue.

Ralph Beebe reported for the *Department of Peace Testimony*. He is especially concerned in the area of draft counseling and education of our young people in this nuclear age. They want to send information to some 350 young people about the options that are open to them. The following printed report was distributed:

This year the department put a major effort into preparing for biblical draft counseling. We are training counselors and organizing meetings with the hope that none of our young people will ever face the draft without having considered whether he/she is a conscientious objector to war, or face the "enemy" without having considered whether he/she could take the life of one for whom Christ died. We have sent helpful materials to all pastors and local peace contacts, and stand ready to be of assistance to local churches in this effort.

The department has endorsed a proposed Institute for Peace Studies, an interdisciplinary program under preliminary consideration at George Fox College. We feel that this would materially assist in the training of leaders in the peace testimony and would help us get this part of Christ's message to many outside our denomination. We, therefore, pledge our support in the study and possible implementation of this idea.

We continue to cooperate with the New Call to Peacemaking and to provide speakers and workshop leaders to churches within and outside Northwest Yearly Meeting. We also cooperate with the Department of Social Concerns in a "Political and Legislative Newsletter." Anyone wishing to be on the mailing list should contact Ralph Beebe.

Please pray with us that Friends might influence national governments to reduce their dependence on the carnal weapons of the world and that each of us might bring Christ's light to a dark and sinful world.

Quentin Nordyke for the *Department of Evangelism* presented a slide presentation on church planting. The Friends Church Extension Foundation is loaning East Boise \$80,000 to begin building. Other funds will be needed.

The Department of Evangelism serves Northwest Yearly Meeting and its local churches in a varied role, with responsibilities ranging from the planning and planting of new churches to assistance and care for churches with severe problems.

Probably the most exciting portion of the department's role is in the area of church planting. When we look back to the 1980 department report, we find that six areas of the Yearly Meeting were being considered potential sites for new churches. Of these six areas, three—East Boise, Bend, and Twin Lakes—now have well-established Friends meetings. A fourth, Mid-Willamette in Corvallis, continues to meet for worship and fellowship and we hope to see a Friends church develop there soon.

In addition to the area targeted in the 1980 report, two other new meetings have been started and pastoral leadership is now in place. They are the McCall meeting sponsored by Boise Friends and pastored by Homer Smuck, and the

work in the Silver Valley area of Northern Idaho sponsored by the Post Falls Church with Dick Wild as church planter. Thus, since 1980, five new works have progressed to the pastoral stage and another appears to be near that point. The Lord is at work through local churches and Northwest Yearly Meeting in a significant outreach ministry.

Looking individually at the churches under the direct care of the department's extension ministry, we find that during the 1983-84 church year:

—*Cascade*, Jim Leonard, pastor, has paved the parking area and remodeled the upper floor of the "meetinghouse" to provide for a more adequate sanctuary. Morning worship attendance averages 48.

—*Hilltop* Meeting, Bob Mardock, pastor, with an average attendance of 70, has purchased property and remodeled one of the buildings to provide a lovely sanctuary. While facing some financial difficulty, they continue to plan for the future development of the work there.

—Kurt Eshelman, pastor at *East Boise*, feels that with an attendance of 58 they have grown about as far as possible in their present "house church" situation. They are planning for the construction of a new, larger worship facility.

—It is exciting to watch the new work at *Twin Lakes* under the leadership of Kevin Thienes. This meeting, barely one year old, is reaching out effectively to unchurched people and leading them to Christ. The regular attenders currently number about 45 and Kevin reports that 80 percent of those involved were previously unchurched.

—*Kent* is showing signs of new stability and growth under the leadership of Jim Teeters. Its average attendance is 43.

—*Piedmont* Friends with an attendance of 45 continues to provide an important ministry to the inner city under Aaron Hamlin's ministry. This unique work merits our continuing prayer and financial support.

—*McKinley Hill* has an average attendance of 39 and has moved into a new worship center. John Retherford, pastor, looks with optimism toward the future of this work.

—Two Meetings—*Nampa*, Idaho, and *Rosemere* in Washington (pastors Ron Friedrich and Dick Henry, respectively)—have advanced from Extension to Local Church status. We congratulate them on their progress.

—Two Meetings—*Highland Avenue* and *East Wenatchee*—have become extension churches with the department providing assistance and counsel to help them return to a healthy condition. Richard Benham has been appointed to pastor the East Wenatchee Church and we are already seeing signs of renewed health. Glenn Leppert continues to provide gifted and innovative leadership at Highland Avenue. New people are being reached and the meeting has a renewed faith for the future.

■ 74. A concern was expressed from the floor concerning a statement of our stand on abortion. It was stated that this is being considered by the Social Concerns Department.

PUBLICATION BOARD

■ 75. Barry Hubbell for the Publication Board presented their printed report.

Publication of the *Evangelical Friend* magazine in cooperation with other yearly meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance (Rocky Mountain, Mid-America, and Eastern Region) continues to be the main concern of the Publication Board. The magazine has continued on the same format as in the past under the capable and praiseworthy leadership of editor-in-chief Jack Willcuts, managing editor Harlow Ankeny, and assistant editor Dan McCracken. As many know, Jack Willcuts has asked that this term (completed in 1985) be his

final one as editor. A search for a replacement is underway by the EFA Publication Board, which welcomes suggestions for leadership.

In its second year of existence, the Barclay Press Board of Directors has continued to examine its management role, establishing a basis for the future. At the same time it has given specific leadership and guidance to operations of The Barclay Press. A description has been developed for a new position of General Manager and the position opening announced with a search in progress to fill this role, which will provide a new thrust in the future for the Press. The board continues to be pleased with Dick Eichenberger's commitment and concern for the production requirements of the Press. He is to be commended, especially as he and the board consider the difficult problems of equipment, space, staffing, and budgeting.

Established a year ago through the reorganization and establishment of a Barclay Press Board of Directors, the Publication Fund already has proven its value! It has financed the first book, *Why Friends Are Friends*, written by NWYM Superintendent Jack Willcuts and published in 1984. The fund is to be used for such publishing needs as identified by the board. The fund is maintained through "dividends" from the operation of Barclay Press, from proceeds from the sale of previously published material, and from contributions from interested donors. Those interested in carrying out the spreading of the Gospel message in print and in promoting Friends distinctives are encouraged to consider their financial support of this fund.

Plans for a 1985 conference for those interested in writing, graphic design, photography, and illustration are underway. The location and time still are to be determined, but the conference will be designed for those interested in improving their abilities, and for those with specific concerns for Friends interest and distinctives through the various media. Churches will be provided with further information, or individuals may contact Publication Board members for details.

The Archives of the Northwest Yearly Meeting continue to be located in Sutton Hall at George Fox College, with Charles Beals giving countless hours in his position as archivist for both the college and NWYM. After 14 years in this position, he has asked to be replaced when someone can be found. Meantime, there is a need for volunteers who can assist on a consistent basis to handle the volume of the material now being received, and to prepare for the transition.

All churches and individuals are urged to send material (pictures, programs, correspondence, minutes) from their organizations to the archives for cataloging and preserving.

A report from the archivist, Charles Beals, was also distributed.

The position of archivist was established by this Yearly Meeting in 1968. Dr. Myron Goldsmith held this office for the first two years. I am completing my 14th year as his successor. Written into the *Constitution and Discipline* at that time were these words, "The Yearly Meeting appoints, on nomination by the Executive Council, a person to serve as Yearly Meeting archivist. The term of office is two years . . . It is his duty to gather, evaluate, and preserve documents of all sorts that record events of the past, and to make them conveniently available for any who wish to study or write on historical themes."

I am pleased to report that there has been a growing awareness throughout these past 16 years by our Yearly Meeting constituency as to the importance of preserving historical material, resulting in a steady flow from segments of our church of documents, such as minutes from Yearly Meeting boards, from areas, and from local churches, into our archives located in the concrete vault in the Newberg church and in a designated room on the George Fox College campus.

This inflow has not always been the case. There was a day when church records were left in private hands, such as monthly meeting clerks or other officials, and have been lost due to the ravages of house fires, or to the indifference of their heirs. More often they were stashed away in some obscure corner or cupboard of the meetinghouse and in later decades thrown away by some zealous Friend more concerned for neatness and order than for history.

How important is our history? The executive director of the Oregon Historical Society says, "Ignorance of the past makes us prisoners of our own times . . . Trying to solve today's problems without knowledge of the past is like steering a ship through iceberg-infested waters with nothing visible below the surface."

If Friends are to be a people of the future, we cannot live in ignorance of the past. That past now stretches over nearly three and a half centuries—a past filled with events in which Quakers interacted with various individuals, societies, officials, churches, and governments—zealous for the Truth and zealous to proclaim Christ Jesus who could speak to human conditions. Again and again, as we scan the pages of their journals, minute books, and letters that have been preserved, we realize that these people significantly influenced their generations and shaped the flow of history.

You, as members of this Yearly Meeting, have become aware that to the extent we lose contact with the past, we lack the perspective and understanding necessary to minister in the name of Friends to the needs of today and tomorrow. And we do lose this contact when we ignore our own history, or when we are careless about preserving the records upon which history depends. Past events vanish like smoke in the air unless some written record is kept. Within the passage of a generation or two, even the memory is no longer dependable. Much of our Yearly Meeting history has melted away in just this way, as everyone knows who has undertaken to write a segment of Friends history.

This report, as all good sermons, closes with an appeal.

1. Addressing every member here, whether you hold office or not, please check with your local church as to the whereabouts of all minutes and related correspondence that are noncurrent. (We consider anything five or more years old to be noncurrent and ready for deposit in the archives.)

2. The kinds of documents are those that relate to local churches and committees, area business meetings, Yearly Meeting boards, and Yearly Meeting auxiliary organizations such as Friends Fund, Friends Action Board, Friends Men, Women's Missionary Fellowship, Friends Youth, Friends Church Extension Foundation; Quaker Hili, Twin Rocks, and Tilikum camps; Friendsview Manor, Pension Board, Quaker Benevolent Society, Ministerial Association, and all others that I have omitted here.

3. Don't treat a miscellaneous pile of papers as "junk" or trash to be burned. Bring it in. Let me evaluate it and make my own judgment as to what part, if any, should be incinerated.

4. Finally, please bring, or have brought, these materials to Newberg, and leave at the Yearly Meeting Headquarters, or the George Fox College library, or at Friendsview Manor, where I live.

In cooperation with the Long-Range Planning Committee of the Yearly Meeting, the Publication Board has suggested a restructuring to keep pace with communications technology. It is suggested the Publication Board be renamed the "Media Board." This will allow for the supervision of communication through video/television. Two subcommittees (perhaps performing the duties of departments within other boards) will be organized—one for video, the other for publications. The board is prepared to circulate information to the

churches about suitable video equipment so there will be coordination throughout the Yearly Meeting. Purchase is recommended by September 1, 1985.

The report of the Publication Board was approved.

A skit featuring Dick Edmundson as "Mr. Quaker" from the pages of *Evangelical Friend* in an interview with Harlow Ankeny was presented.

■ 76. Harold "Scotty" Clark, pastor of the Eugene Friends Church closed the business session with prayer.

Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

■ 77. Lon Fendall, assistant clerk, opened the session with prayer.

■ 78. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 79. Dick Wild, pastor of the new mission point at Silver Valley in Northern Idaho, and a candidate for recording, gave his testimony.

■ 80. Glenn Armstrong introduced Dr. Albert Steifel of Western Evangelical Seminary to give a report. He reported a total of 252 students this past year, representing 27 different denominations, 84 colleges or universities, and 12 countries. The Friends Church ranks fourth in the number of students at the seminary. Northwest Yearly Meeting is one of eight active supporting denominations. Glenn Armstrong, pastor of our Lynwood Friends Church, received his Doctor of Ministry degree this year.

■ 81. Glenn Armstrong, chairman of the Memorial Committee, opened the memorial service with a quote from St. Augustine and the Scripture, Philippians 1:21, "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain."

Scotty Clark led the congregation in singing "How Great Thou Art."

The names of four ministers and 59 members who had passed away were listed on the overhead projector. Members of the Memorial Committee read short memorials for Jean Marie Lowery, Donald Trefren, Lee Duncan, Verlin Winslow, Harry Dillon, Paul Almquist, Ralph Meredith, Maude Price, Louella Crisman, Earl P. Barker, Amelia Kern, Harry Larson, Ida Doules, Elizabeth Ann Hagan, Paul Perry, J. Howard Pearson, Dillon W. Mills, Warren Moor, Alan Dejmaj, and Kathleen Gwynne Nowak.

Jeanne Leonard sang an original song written at the time of the death of Kathleen Nowak and sung at her memorial service.

Several people expressed appreciation for the lives of those who have preceded us.

Scotty Clark led in the singing of the chorus of "My Tribute," and closed with prayer.

■ 82. The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:00 a.m., Friday.

■ 83. Session opened with prayer by Richard Beebe, clerk.

■ 84. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 85. The Representatives nominated the following to three-year terms to the Spiritual Life Board: R'Dean Smith, Kenneth Magee, Steven Fine; to a two-year term: Kurt Eshelman, Marcile Leach.

Approved.

■ 86. The Representatives nominated the following for three-year terms to the Education Board: Gregg Lamm, Duane Roberts, Richard Edmundson; for a one-year term: Geraldine Sugden.

Approved.

■ 87. The Representatives nominated the following for three-year terms to the Publication Board: Margaret Lemmons, Edward Higgins.

Approved.

■ 88. The Representatives nominated the following for a five-year term as a Trustee: Gordon Crisman.

Approved.

■ 89. The Representatives nominated the following for three-year terms to the Outreach Board: Richard Bishop (Social Concerns), Ron Folwell (Missions), Jack Miller (Missions); for a one-year term: Gary Getting (Missions).

Approved.

■ 90. A proposal was presented from the Discipline Revision Committee to the Representatives and recommended by them:

1) That the *Constitution and Discipline* be edited for a first and second reading with a goal of publication in early 1987.

2) That proposed changes from any source be presented to the Discipline Revision Committee by April 1, 1985, providing for a first reading at Yearly Meeting 1985.

3) That there be a moratorium on further changes until 1991.

4) That the Yearly Meeting allocate \$500 this year for committee expenses.

5) That the Yearly Meeting begin to budget for a reserve fund for publication of the new *Constitution and Discipline* in 1987.

Approved.

■ 91. The following resolution was read from the Department of Peace Testimony: There has been a recent widespread, popular movement calling for a bilateral, verifiable nuclear weapons freeze, to be negotiated between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Northwest Yearly Meeting urges the U.S. administration to seriously undertake negotiations to secure such a freeze and calls upon its members to pray, write to government leaders, educate and encourage others in their understanding and support of a nuclear weapons freeze, and prayerfully consider together what further steps we could take to register opposition to the proliferation of nuclear weapons.

Approved.

■ 92. The following resolution was also read from the Department of Peace Testimony:

Our hearts are moved by the sufferings of our Christian brothers and sisters in Central America, the gross social and economic injustice, the slayings of missionaries and other Christians. We recognize that as members of the body of Christ, their suffering is our suffering, their pain is our pain. We ask God's forgiveness for our own complacency, and as a Yearly Meeting covenant ourselves to prayer and intercession for the church and all people in Central America. We will seek God's leading as to what our response as individuals and as churches should be to the victims of this war. We will implore our government to seek political and diplomatic rather than military solutions to the conflicts in Central America.

Approved.

■ 93. The Department of Peace Testimony presented the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends reaffirm its support of the "peace academy" legislation now being considered in Congress.

A great deal of money and effort are expended to train U.S. personnel in the techniques of defending our country militarily. Virtually nothing is being done with public funding to encourage creative thinking toward resolving international conflicts with nonviolent methods. Some universities and colleges have "peace studies" programs, but there is no federal institution parallel to the military academies.

This legislation has already passed the Senate and there is optimism that final passage might come this year. Friends in Northwest Yearly Meeting are encouraged to write their congresspersons on this matter.

Approved.

■ 94. The Department of Peace presented the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that Northwest Yearly Meeting reaffirm its support of legislation that would establish a "World Peace Tax Fund."

Bills have been introduced in both the U.S. House and Senate to allow conscientious objectors to designate a portion of their taxes for a "World Peace Tax Fund." These funds would correspond to the portion of federal income taxes used for military purposes. To qualify, one would be required to satisfy the criteria established in the law and in the courts for conscientious objector status.

This legislation has received growing support in Congress in recent years, but further progress may depend upon the extent to which congresspersons are encouraged by their constituents.

Approved.

■ 95. The following resolution was read from the Department of Peace Testimony:

Just as the children of Israel made idols of gold and silver, wood and stone, and bowed down to them, sacrificed to them, and prayed to them for prosperity and security, we recognize that our nation is in danger of being guilty of a similar idolatry in regard to nuclear weapons.

Recognizing that God is our true source of help and security, and affirming the mandate of Christ to be peacemakers, Northwest Yearly Meeting reaffirms its opposition to the arms race and calls upon its members to speak out against the production and deployment of both nuclear and conventional weapons.

Approved.

A period of worship followed. Kenneth Royal led in singing "He Lives," and a medley of choruses. Philip Morrill furnished special music. Time of silent worship followed. Wesley Hadley-Voth exhorted us to truly make Jesus Lord of our lives and reject the "golden calf" of nuclear armament. Geraldine Willcuts reminded us of the "Secret Society" of believers around the world—"The Bride of Christ."

■ 96. Dennis Hagen, who during this Yearly Meeting was certified as a minister of music, gave his testimony.

■ 97. Ralph Beebe spoke urging us to put Jesus first in our lives and rekindle fires of total commitment, whatever that may mean in our lives. He expressed appreciation for the message of Wes Hadley-Voth, and the ministry of Juan Carlos Ortiz.

■ 98. The actions of the Executive Council since Yearly Meeting 1983 were read. (Those not covered in board and department reports.) Arthur Roberts

expressed appreciation that the Executive Council is encouraging young adults from our Yearly Meeting to attend the Young Friends World Conference to be held at Guilford College, Greensboro, North Carolina, July 19-26, 1985. Paul Anderson from Northwest Yearly Meeting is one of the leaders in this conference. He suggested a minute be given him as our representative.

The dates for Yearly Meeting 1985 were announced as July 27-August 2.

There were some questions regarding the sale of church property where churches have been laid down. Earl Perisho spoke to this, reporting that all proceeds revert to the Department of Evangelism and are used for new church planting.

The question was raised from the floor as to which board or department should be contacted in regard to certain social issues such as abortion. Some new committees are being formed to deal with these issues, but at present they should be directed to the Department of Social Concerns.

■ 99. Earl Perisho, member-at-large to the Evangelical Friends Alliance, reported briefly on the sessions of the EFA Coordinating Council held at Boise, Idaho, in January 1984. Many of our board reports reflect actions taken by the EFA. The Department of Family Life is to continue under the leadership of Jack Rea of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, following the death of Sheldon Louthan, previous director. The four yearly meeting superintendents and Jack Kirk of Friends United Meeting form a steering committee. Many of our Yearly Meeting personnel are leaders in the various Commissions of the EFA. The Education Commission distributes the Aldersgate Sunday school and vacation Bible school materials, which are considered some of the leading materials among evangelical churches.

Earl announced the World Conference of Evangelical Friends to be held in 1987. Representatives of various mission fields around the world who are present with us this week will be attending a planning meeting for this conference in Wichita, Kansas, next week. Funding for the travel expenses involved in this planning meeting came from the Easter offerings.

By means of this letter we extend our cordial greetings to you. It is our only desire that the Lord's many blessings be upon all your activities in your church as well as in your work.

As you all may be aware, the reason for our visit to the United States is to be able to finish the project of translating the Bible into the Aymara language. With God's help, we are about to reach our goal. We do wish to express our sincere thanks to you all for your fervent prayers. We sense God's help during these days in which we are occupied in this work. At the same time, God is blessing us through His Word. I [Francisco] personally realize that years ago God placed this project before me. He has been leading me as I have been occupied in Bible translation. God has a plan for providing His Holy Word to the Aymara people in my country of Bolivia. It is on this mission field that missionaries have labored for many years. I am also a fruit of these labors. When this project is finished, the Aymara people will have God's Word in their own language, and from this very race of people we have been chosen to take part in God's plan.

It is a wonderful thing that this project is to be finished here in Newberg, center of the Friends mission. It is well to mention the various missionaries whom we knew in Bolivia who have been helping us here, taking us to various churches and interpreting for us. These families are Jack and Geraldine Willcuts, Quentin and Florene Nordyke, Hal and Nancy Thomas, Ralph and Marie Chapman, Paul and Phyllis Cammack, Victor and Marybel Duran, Gene and Betty Comfort, Randy and Mary Morse, David Strait, and others. May the Lord richly bless them.

During our visits to some of your churches, we had brief opportunities to answer your questions and to visit with you, but in other churches, time did not allow us to greet everyone. However, the love of the Lord unites us by His Spirit, and for this reason we have been blessed by our visits to your churches.

As the days are rapidly passing, we will soon be returning to our country. We are planning to attend a meeting of Evangelical Friends in Wichita, and will then go on to attend the Yearly Meeting of Eastern Region Friends in Ohio. We anticipate the Lord's blessings during the meetings in these two places and His journeying mercies as we return to our country.

It is with pleasure that we write this letter to send to you. Our greetings and thanks to all of you who have written to us.

■ 116. A communication was read from Cascade Friends Church thanking many in the Yearly Meeting who have assisted them, both individuals and churches, as well as the Share Call that netted \$9,000.

■ 117. Lon Fendall read highlights of the Statistical Report. Arthur Roberts encouraged churches to hold membership classes and otherwise encourage attenders to become members that we may show an increase rather than a decrease in our membership.

■ 118. The report of the Epistle Committee was presented. Communications were received from 37 yearly meetings around the world, and condensations from several were read.

■ 119. The Epistle Committee submitted the epistle from our Yearly Meeting to be sent to other yearly meetings as follows:

Grace and peace be unto you in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Our Yearly Meeting sessions this year have been filled with a special sense of worship and spiritual presence.

Using the text of Luke 17:7-10 our featured speaker, Juan Carlos Ortiz, spoke to us about servanthood. He asked if we had come to sit at the table, or to serve our Lord. We are saved in order to serve. The servant's greatest satisfaction is to see the Master satisfied. He then exhorted us to cross the line of full commitment and present ourselves as a living sacrifice to God according to Romans 12:1. There was a powerful moving of the Holy Spirit among us. Many committed themselves to go and *act* like servants of God in a world of darkness.

We were also challenged by Jack Willcuts's keynote address to "Raise a Harvest of Righteousness." James 3:13-18 (NIV) was the central text. Jack concluded his message with an invitation for us to commit ourselves to a *covenant of prayer*. This covenant would involve the following disciplines:

1. Search out and study prayer instructions from the Scriptures, in prayer meetings, classes, or in preaching.
2. Covenant to give one day to prayer each month, a time for reading, writing, reflection, confession, and praying—an important part of personal renewal.
3. Organize a meeting for praying with others that will meet at least once a month.
4. Commit a half hour to prayer each Saturday evening and 30 minutes early Sunday morning to pray for spiritual revival in your own meeting or church.

We invite other Friends around the world to join us in this covenant to make our lives as prayers unto the Lord. We believe that at the heart of peacemaking is the practice of abiding in the Prince of Peace. We believe that the source of all compassion and social concern stems from the One who *became* the love of God in human form. At the center of the spiritual life is a prayerful immersion of ourselves into the One who gave His life for us that we might have eternal life.

Our banquets for youth, women, and men were all inspirational as we heard respectively from "Cornerstone" (a young Friends singing ensemble from Mid-America Yearly Meeting), Francisco Mamani (a pastor and leader from Bolivia Yearly Meeting visiting in the Northwest along with his wife, Juana), and returned missionaries from Peru Lois Harmon and Becky Williams (on the theme: "Preparing God's People for Service").

Children, in the meanwhile, spent an exciting week of learning, playing, and singing together at Camp Tilikum and the college campus. Our Friends Youth (Young Friends) heard from Richard Beebe (our clerk) and Juan Carlos Ortiz (separate epistle enclosed).

A concern was expressed by our superintendent, Jack Willcuts. There is a need in our Yearly Meeting for people with vision for our congregations that have unique challenges because of the culture of their people. Anyone with an interest in serving our Korean, Hispanic, Black, Vietnamese, or Cambodian brothers and sisters are invited to make themselves available as a resource to these members of our church body. We also are continuing to revise our *Constitution and Discipline* radically.

Six were recorded as Ministers of the Gospel and three were certified as Ministers of Music.

As we conclude our 1984 Yearly Meeting sessions, we hold the worldwide body of Friends in the loving and healing light of Christ. We are mindful of the words of Neave Brayshaw, who said, the Society of Friends "exists not for itself, but for the world's healing." As we unite together in the parallel journeys of inward prayer and outward obedience, our hearts yearn with those of early Friends *that our lives might speak* to the condition of the world.

Also, the following epistle from the Friends Youth was read:

The Friends Youth of Northwest Yearly Meeting gathered in Sutton Hall at George Fox College for this year's conference. We were challenged by Tony Campolo's film series "You Can Make a Difference." The youth also responded well to the teachings of Juan Carlos Ortiz in the evening sessions. We are praying for growth in the lives of these 60 youth that attended.

We are also very excited to see what has happened in just one year of our new missions project. This summer we were able to send seven of our youth to Bolivia and Peru, and six to Africa through Teen Missions. "Youth Consecrated to Evangelize the World" (YCEW) is already providing much fruit from the return of the young people.

We praise God for His leading in this adventure and pray that it becomes a tool to ignite the youth of our Yearly Meeting into a fire that will burn long into the future.

The epistles were approved as corrected.

■ 123. The clerk expressed appreciation to the college for use of their facilities, and to the various people who carried out their responsibilities in various areas: Ed and Sharon Sullivan, refreshment table; Lloyd Melhorn and Beverly Friedrich, housing; Quentin Nordyke, Yearly Meeting schedule and workshops; Kathryn Eichenberger, Yearly Meeting coordinator; Robert Gilmore, sound system; Department of Fine Arts, and Mauri Macy, special music; Ralph Greenidge, prayer services; Betty Ankeny and Barbara Mitchell, flowers; Ruth Brown, assisted by Rachel Hinshaw, assistant recording clerk; Wendell and Donita Barnett, announcing clerks; Ken Royal, song leader; and for those who cared for the children. There was applause for all of them.

■ 124. Earl Perisho expressed the appreciation of all of us for the work of Clerk Richard Beebe.

I feel the Lord has been able to get His work done in spite of me. Those who know me even a little know I enjoy life and often try to be humorous, but No. 2 certainly is true. Of course, it's my first year as president of George Fox College—or any college—so No. 1 must be true!

We all should rejoice that God is not limited by us or limited to one's abilities and efforts. I also am pleased the Lord Jesus looks at the intent of our heart. He knows I want to be His person and that you and I want George Fox College to be His college. So, even if we do make a few mistakes in trying to be His person and to do His will—He gets His work done!

Early last year we faced what seemed (at least to me) to be "large" problems. Because I believe the Holy Spirit had persuaded us, we proceeded. The way wasn't always smooth, but many of the problems have become opportunities for God:

... The annual fund was up nearly 20 percent. Church persons are becoming aware that they must support Christian higher education—not leave it to the state or federal government.

... Our enrollment appears to be stabilizing, but don't stop encouraging young people to attend George Fox College. We still believe God wants our ministry to expand.

... We have had a great spirit in our faculty and staff in spite of some difficult years and some difficult decisions. I am really blessed to work with persons like this—people who have a solid commitment to Christ and to serve at George Fox College.

... The GFC Foundation has been laid to rest—at some cost to the College and some of our friends. It is my prayer that there will be reconciliation with and restoration to any who were hurt.

There are many other items for prayer and praise included in this report. As always, I'm glad to respond to your letters and your phone calls if you have questions and concerns about George Fox College.

LEADERSHIP

NEW BOARD CHAIRMAN. In its June session George Fox College Board of Trustees elected C. W. (Bill) Field, Jr., as chairman. A board member since 1972, he is business manager for National Gas Co., Sunnyside, Wash., and is a 1952 George Fox graduate. He has served as the board's vice president since 1973 and succeeds Robert G. Monroe, president of Smith, Monroe and Gray Engineers, Beaverton, who stepped down after serving five years, the maximum set by board policy. New vice president is Roger Minthorne, Portland, a board member since 1974 and a 1947 George Fox graduate.

ACADEMIC VICE PRESIDENT CHANGE. In May the College announced the selection of Lee Nash to become the new vice president for

academic affairs and dean of the College, replacing William D. Green. Selection followed a nationwide search that brought five finalists to the campus from as far as California and Indiana. In the end, GFC tapped one of its own. Nash joined the College faculty in 1975, and during the 1982-83 school year served as associate dean. Previously he was academic dean at Cascade College, Portland, from 1962 to 1967 and for eight years, until coming to GFC, was a history professor at Northwestern Arizona University. He has been chairman of the GFC Social Science Division. Dr. Green leaves the position after serving since 1972. He submitted his resignation in the fall, effective June 30, to allow adequate time for a national search. Dr. Green will remain on the faculty as a religion professor. In the 1982-83 school year he served as interim president of the College. This year he completed 30 years as a college administrator.

VICE PRESIDENTS NAMED. Four administrators, effective in December, were promoted to the new rank of vice president, a retitling approved by the College's Board of Trustees. The four administrators, with a total of 45 years at the College, all retained their current responsibilities. The title change came to recognize their contributions to the institution and to indicate their level of responsibility to the external publics. Academic Dean William D. Green became vice president for academic affairs and dean of the College. Development Director Maurice G. Chandler became vice president for development. Business Manager Donald J. Millage became vice president for financial affairs and treasurer, and Dean of Students Lee K. Gerig became vice president for student affairs and dean of students.

ACADEMIC

ELEMENTARY EDUCATION. Full and unanimous endorsement was given to George Fox College's new elementary education program by the Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission as it met on the campus in May. GFC was the first college approved under new TSPC guidelines. The College was approved for granting degrees and certification for elementary teachers for the first time, ending a 28-year program with Western Oregon State College. With that approval George Fox graduated 22 elementary teaching majors June 2. Approval of the program concluded an eight-year development project and is expected to have a positive impact on enrollment.

ELDERHOSTEL. The College offered its first fall Elderhostel program after joining the national program the year before. The topic, "American Literature By and About Quakers," was the first to feature a single theme. The Elderhostel series is designed for the older adult students and is a short-term residential, educational program offered at a modest cost to persons 60 years and older. All sessions are held at GFC's Tilikum Center, utilizing the talents of GFC faculty members for the special courses. Other topics during the year varied and ranged from "Life Around a Pond" to "Peace and War."

SUZUKI SCHOOL. A Suzuki Violin School was established fall term. The unusual program teaches violin to children as young as three and is based on a system that teaches music the way a language is learned. Instructor Jay Gilbertson, a Newberg schools music teacher, utilizes GFC music facilities after normal college hours, and up to 15 have been enrolled at one time.

ENROLLMENT. Anticipated to decrease by as much as 6 percent, enrollment fall term instead took an unexpected turnaround. It reached 675, within eight students and 1.2 percent of the registration the previous fall, despite the nationwide decrease in the number of college-age students for the next few years.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

INAUGURATION. Edward F. Stevens formally became George Fox College's tenth president in ceremonies March 31. United States Senator Mark Hatfield, a member of the College's Board of Trustees, delivered the inaugural address to the 1,000 persons in Bauman Auditorium. Thirty-eight delegates and representatives from Northwest and Christian colleges throughout the United States participated in the formal 90-minute program that was carried on local television. The formal investiture to office came from GFC Board Chairman Robert G. Monroe, who presented the inaugural medallion, and from Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts, who gave the official charge to the new president. Greetings came from students, faculty, alumni, city, state, business, and educational leaders. Inaugural events also included an evening candlelight worship service, a community prayer breakfast, an inaugural luncheon, and reception for the new president and his family. Inaugural activities were funded outside of the College's general fund through special gifts by members of the College Board of Trustees.

FORTY DAYS OF PRAYER. "What could God do for George Fox College and His people if they dedicated 40 days to Him to seek His direction?" That was the question asked as the College, from February 20 to March 30, participated in a "Forty Days: A Call to Prayer" program. The plan asked GFC alumni and friends, church members, parents, board members, students, faculty, and staff to unite in prayer for direction and support. The results? Student applications for next fall rose from a 7 percent deficit to a 1 percent increase, a letter was received indicating a \$250,000 gift is forthcoming, the College's elementary education program was positively reviewed and endorsed, a \$127,000 annuity was completed, two trusts matured at a value of \$90,000, a nationwide search for a new vice president was successfully completed, and the inauguration of President Edward Stevens was a success, drawing hundreds for worship and ceremonies.

In addition, there were changes in attitudes and feelings. For some it became a time of assurance or reassurance. Based on the biblical 40 days number recorded several times, the special time was not a financial campaign for the College, but the College openly shared its needs. Many were met, along with the other personal answers.

FALL CONVOCATION. Ernest Ettlich, dean of academic affairs at Southern Oregon State College, addressed students, faculty, staff, and guests attending the annual convocation program October 10. Ettlich previously was acting president and vice president and academic dean at Westmont College, one of 12 schools with George Fox in the national Christian College Consortium. The formal start of the school year also honored scholarship and grant recipients and the donors of those funds.

CHRISTIAN LIFE WEEK. John Cassis, director of special projects for World Relief, and David Wildermuth, pastor of the Edgewood Evangelical Church, Eugene, Ore., shared responsibilities as guest speakers for GFC's annual fall Christian Life Week in mid-October. Wildermuth, a 1972 GFC graduate, spoke the opening two days and Cassis, a former professional baseball player, the second two, with both morning and evening sessions scheduled throughout the week.

HOME ECONOMICS CAREER DAY. Home economists in business were the focus of the sixth George Fox College Home Economics Career Day October 28. Students from high schools and community colleges in Southwest Washington and Northwest Oregon were invited to participate in the day-long program. In addition to the speakers, there were times for individual advising and tours of the GFC home economics department.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION CONFERENCE. Youth workers, club leaders, camping personnel, lay persons, pastors, and Sunday school teachers from throughout the Northwest—more than 300 in all—attended the seventh annual GFC Christian Education Conference in early November. The conference featured nearly 50 workshops and 30 speakers. General sessions and workshops were accompanied by displays and exhibits. Guest speaker was Rev. H. B. London, senior pastor of Salem First Church of the Nazarene.

FACULTY LECTURES. "A Matter of Aging: Longevity, Quality and Spiritual Well-Being" was the topic of the fall term Faculty Lecture given by Michael Allen, associate professor of sociology. The spring term lecture, "Life Cycle: the Move from Middle Age to Old Age," was by James Foster, assistant professor of psychology. The lectureship program was founded in 1955, with this year's lectures being the 31st and 32nd in the series. Lecturers are chosen by vote of their faculty colleagues.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE. Oregon Senator Mark Hatfield headlined the speakers for the Western Regional Student Leadership Conference for Christian Colleges hosted by GFC Nov. 11-13 in cooperation with the American Association of Evangelical Students. Other speakers included Norval Hadley, director of Ministry Services for World Vision; Kenneth McCarthy, cofounder of Farrell's Ice Cream Parlour chain; and GFC President Edward Stevens.

PARENTS WEEKEND. The third Parents Weekend (Nov. 19-21) at George Fox College drew about 250 persons. They spent time in classes with their children during a Friday class day, then a special day Saturday with a variety of events, including sports, a fashion show, tours, panel discussion, a pops concert, and free time. A Sunday morning worship service concluded the weekend.

MISSIONS CONFERENCE. Nineteen missions organizations from across the nation participated in the 18th annual George Fox College Missions Awareness Week Jan. 15-19. Five guest speakers were heard in both morning and evening programs as the annual series departed from its usual format of a single main speaker. At the conclusion, 176 students made a public commitment to be obedient to God's calling to service.

HOMECOMING. Alumni returned to the campus for more than a dozen traditional Homecoming events Jan. 27-28. "As Time Goes By" was the theme for the weekend, which featured men's and women's basketball games, the queen's coronation, a drama performance, Alumni Chapel, bowling tournament, Alumni Perform program, and museum tours.

MINORITY EMPHASIS WEEK. Twenty-five events in four days were offered in the Feb. 6-9 Cultural Awareness and Minority Emphasis program. Sponsored by the Cultural Spectrum Organization, the series featured four speakers with emphasis on Russian Old World Believers, Spanish heritage, and Native American perspectives. Lectures, class discussions, and films were featured.

QUAKER HERITAGE SERIES. Charles Mylander, author of *Secrets for Growing Churches* and whose articles have appeared in national religious publications, headlined GFC's eighth annual Quaker Emphasis Week. A 1964 George Fox graduate, Mylander now is associate pastor of Rose Drive Friends Church in Yorba Linda, Calif. He spoke in chapel, in classes, and in special evening programs.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE SUNDAY. Fifty-seven churches in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho celebrated George Fox College Sunday, Feb. 19.

Traveling to the churches from the campus were faculty, students, and administrators. Alumni and board members also participated as speakers and resource persons in their local churches. Participation included brief talks, testimonies, sermons, vocal and instrumental music, and group performances.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL INVOLVEMENT DAY. "Hunger: Here and Everywhere" was the topic for the fifth annual Christian Social Involvement Day February 25. Sponsored by the GFC Sociology/Social Service program, it featured Michael Stoops, director of the Portland Burnside Community Council, and Catherine Mumaw, chairman of the home economics department at Goshen College, Indiana. Workshops and films highlighted the conference, which was established to acknowledge historic Quaker roots of significant social reform activities.

WOMEN'S AWARENESS CONFERENCE. Yamhill County women in government were featured in the ninth annual GFC Women's Awareness conference in late February. The event was planned in cooperation with the Newberg branch of the American Association of University Women and the Yamhill Family Community Leadership organization.

SPRING THEOLOGICAL CONFERENCE. Vernon C. Grounds, coauthor of *Is God Dead?* and for 24 years president of Conservative Baptist Seminary, Denver, Colo., spoke April 5 and 6 for the fourth Spring Theological Conference. Both morning and evening talks were scheduled in this event sponsored by the GFC Religion Department.

STALEY LECTURE SERIES. A worldwide spokesman on the subject of creationism, Dr. Donald E. Chittick, spoke on campus April 9-11 as the annual Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer. A former faculty member for 11 years before leaving GFC in 1979 to found his own synthetic fuel research firm, Chittick spoke both in chapel and evening sessions.

FESTIVAL OF THE ARTS. Eight events in seven days, all open to the public without charge, were featured in the 1984 Festival of the Arts program. Established 16 years ago, the festival included poetry, an art exhibit, dramatic readings, and music performances. It concluded with an Easter Day performance of Handel's *Messiah*, featuring a college/community chorus of 130 and a 35-piece orchestra.

HOOVER SYMPOSIUM. "Peacekeeping in Two Hemispheres" was the topic for the fourth biennial Herbert Hoover Symposium held April 21. The conference drew participants from as far as Ohio and New York. It featured three Hoover researchers brought to the campus to discuss the career of the 31st President of the United States, who attended Pacific Academy, the forerunner of George Fox College.

COMMENCEMENT. Robert P. Dugan, Jr., director of the Office of Public Affairs for the National Association of Evangelicals, spoke to nearly 2,000 persons in Wheeler Sports Center as George Fox College graduated 114 seniors in ceremonies June 2 to close the academic year. Dr. William D. Green, retiring vice president for academic affairs, was the baccalaureate speaker for services in Bauman Auditorium, and in the graduation ceremonies was awarded an honorary doctorate.

PERFORMING ARTS. The William and Mary Bauman Auditorium, in use for just the second year, was the performance site for a wide variety of musical events. Music Theater productions included *The Gondoliers* in February and *Kiss Me Kate* in May. Major music events also included choral and instrumental music group performances, the Chehalem Symphony Orchestra composed of GFC and community residents, a Sunday afternoon organ vesper series, a tri-college orchestra performance, and a music comedy night. In March the

band toured for 10 days with performances in Oregon, Idaho, and Washington. The GFC Chorale performed in a five-day tour in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho in February and was chosen for a performance at the American Choral Directors Northwest Division conference in March in Portland. The popular "Ye Olde Royal Feaste," featuring the Chamber Singers, was held in mid-December. This year's drama productions included a fall performance of *Our Town*, a winter staging of *The Taming of the Shrew*, and a spring presentation of *Romance*, four short comedies.

ATHLETICS. Individual accomplishments by GFC athletes highlighted the year in sports. Basketball star Randy Dunn was just that, winning the highest honors available in Northwest small college basketball, then drafted by the Portland Trail Blazers of the NBA. In women's track, Paula Wittenberg finished second in the nation in the discus in the NAIA. Two GFC baseball players, Dean Boening and Mike Villanueva, were selected by Athletes in Action for summer play in Sweden and Finland. Spring term the College announced soccer will be brought back to campus as a fall sport. At the same time Paul Berry was announced as the new soccer coach and head baseball coach.

FINANCES AND DEVELOPMENT

BALANCED BUDGET. For the 13th consecutive year the College operated in the black. Assets of the College remained at about \$22.5 million during the fiscal year, with a fund balance of more than 16 million.

Support of the annual fund, of primary importance to an independent college, set a new record as giving reached \$319,000, compared to \$273,000 the previous year. The annual fund maintains a total balanced budget by providing financial support for costs above that covered by tuition charges.

TUITION. There will be no increase in tuition for the 1984-85 school year for returning George Fox students, but entering students will have tuition rates 5 percent higher than a year ago under a plan adopted by the board spring term. The new annual tuition for new students will be \$5,280. Returning students will pay \$5,025. With the freeze on tuition for the 1983-84 school year, the increase represents a climb of just 2.5 percent a year. George Fox will remain in the bottom one fourth in comparable costs among 22 Northwest independent colleges.

CENTURY ONE PLAN. A plan to guide the College to its 100th birthday in 1991 and beyond was adopted by the Board of Trustees in its spring session. Developed over a two-year period by a Century One Planning Commission, the 82-page document summarizes the plans and hopes for the College. The new planning guide succeeds a 15-year campus master plan established in 1974 and completed ahead of schedule, with an emphasis on construction. The new plan emphasizes programs and personnel, with both board and specific goals.

A new edition of the *Constitution and Discipline* was published following the 1979 Yearly Meeting sessions. The 1979 edition contains all additions and revisions approved as second readings through the 1979 sessions. *Discipline* revisions approved as second readings in the 1980, 1981, and 1982 sessions were repeated at the back of each year's *Minutes* so that they might be clipped and used to update the 1979 edition of the *Constitution and Discipline*. There were no second readings of changes in 1983. The items listed below are those *Discipline* revisions approved as second readings at the 1984 sessions.

If you already have a 1979 edition of the *Discipline*, cut out the paragraphs and tape into the proper place as instructed, and this will bring your *Discipline* up-to-date, providing you have also done so for 1980, 1981, and 1982. If you *do not* have a 1979 *Discipline*, you may order copies from The Barclay Press and then insert the corrections as indicated above. On page 34, add paragraph 7. NOMENCLATURE (new paragraph—see 1984 minute 114).

7. NOMENCLATURE

The word *Clerk* is to be used uniformly to designate presiding officers of the Yearly Meeting, its boards, departments, and committees. The term *secretary*, especially for committees, may be an accepted alternative to the term *recording clerk*. Instead of the term *vice-chairman* the term *assistant clerk* shall be used. For descriptive use, the terms to *preside over* or *presiding clerk* are appropriate.

For related organizations, as described in Part IV or otherwise connected with Northwest Yearly Meeting, this procedure does not necessarily apply. Terms such as director or president may be appropriate alternatives to chairman.

On pages 35-36, replace paragraphs 7 and 8 with the following (wording change in paragraph 7—see 1984 minute 67):

7. REPRESENTATION IN THE YEARLY MEETING SESSIONS

The church appoints annually one person for each fifty resident active members or major fraction thereof as of the previous Yearly Meeting statistical report to serve on the Representative Body of the Yearly Meeting. Each local church is

(page 36)

entitled to at least two; each extension church is entitled to at least one. An additional representative may be appointed by a mission point at the discretion of the mother church or the Yearly Meeting. At least one of these representatives shall be appointed to membership on the administrative committee of the local church. Alternates to serve as representatives may be appointed at the discretion of the church (see page 69).

8. EXTENSION CHURCHES AND MISSION POINTS

A local church may be asked by the Yearly Meeting to sponsor an extension church in its geographical area (see p. 40). The extension church may appoint annually one member of the area nominating committee and one representative to the Yearly Meeting sessions. A mission point may be initiated by the local church or by the Yearly Meeting and placed under the care of the local church strategically located.

On page 39, replace paragraph 5. ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE with the following (additional wording in first sentence—see 1984 minute 67):

5. ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

The committee consists of the pastor, the presiding and recording *clerks of the* local or extension church, the clerks of the four main committees, and at least one of their Yearly Meeting representatives. Others may be included at the discretion of the church, maintaining a balance of all age groups.

The committee meets each month in the interims between the quarterly business sessions of the church at large. Additional sessions may be called by the presiding clerk and/or pastor, either of whom may be designated by the church to preside over all sessions.

The administrative committee is delegated to act in interim, taking any action needful in the interest of the church, and especially to chart and implement its major goals. It reports its actions to the church in business session. It also presents for consideration names of persons to serve on the nominating committee.

In the realm of publicity this committee is responsible for the distribution of church publications and for reporting church news to the *Evangelical Friend*. Moreover, it is responsible for communication of the activities of the committees to the church and community and for all public relations.

On page 50, replace entire page with the following (wording change in paragraph "g"—see 1984 minute 67):

mendations as to the salary and expense allowance of the General Superintendent and executive secretary.

- g.** To consider carefully any question of doctrine, organization, policy, or procedure that may be submitted to it by an officer, board of the Yearly Meeting, or Representative Body for consideration, and action.
- h.** To nominate annually to the Yearly Meeting six persons to serve as members of the George Fox College board of trustees.

On pages 51-52, replace paragraphs "e" and "f" with the following (wording change—see 1984 minutes 44 and 114):

e. **Board Structure.** Clerks of the boards of Spiritual Life, Education, Stewardship, Outreach, and Publication are appointed annually by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the Representatives. An assistant clerk and secretary are then appointed by each board from among its members. In cases where separate realms of activity or responsibility within a board are defined, each is classed as a department and is headed by a clerk appointed by those involved. Within a department there may be committees with special duties assigned. Other officers are appointed as functional needs may require.

(page 52)

f. **Board Executive Committees.** The executive committee of each board consists of its clerk, assistant clerk, secretary, and other officers, together with the General Superintendent of the Yearly Meeting ex officio. The committee acts in accordance with the instructions of the board.

On page 53, replace section (1) Pastoral and Extension Work with the following (change of title and wording—see 1984 minute 45):

(1) Department of Evangelism. In its relationship to the pastoral, evangelistic, and church extension work of the Yearly Meeting, the department gives special attention to the discovery of needy fields within or contiguous to the Yearly Meeting, and effort is made to meet the requirements of these by such gospel service as may, under the divine blessing, bring sinners to repentance and faith in Christ, strengthen believers, and advance the interests of God's kingdom. Special effort is put forth to gather the scattered membership and to establish new work wherever practicable. The department may be authorized by the Yearly Meeting Executive Council to secure funds by voluntary contributions for building new church buildings and for remodeling old ones. It examines and helps determine the desirability of new locations and of plans for construction and remodeling of churches and parsonages. It is authorized also to take prompt action in regulating any disorders or insubordinations that may arise in connection with its work, where local conditions make such action necessary. It determines the amounts paid to all local workers who receive support from Yearly Meeting funds.

Meetings for worship during the Yearly Meeting sessions are under its care.

On page 54, replace section (4) Procedure for Recording and Liberating of Ministers and paragraph a' Recognizing the Gift with the following (change of section title and wording—see 1984 minute 45):

(4) Department of Ministry.

(a) Recording of Ministers.

a' Recognizing the Gift. When a member, man or woman, has spoken as a minister (see The Bestowment of Gifts) so that the church is edified and spiritually helped thereby, the local spiritual life committee carefully considers whether he has received from the Head of the Church a gift in the ministry. Persons may occasionally speak, even fluently, to edification, or engage in exhortation, or give testimony to their experience, or offer vocal prayer with evidence of spiritual power without having received, necessarily, a gift in the ministry.

On page 55, replace section (b) Department of Ministry with the following (change of title—see 1984 minute 45):

(b) Department Membership. The department of ministry is charged with the handling of all matters implied in its title (see p. 54). Its members are appointed in accordance with the following procedure:

On page 66, replace entire page with the following (additional wording in paragraph "a"—see 1984 minute 44):

5. TRUSTEES (Yearly Meeting)

- a. **Appointment and Responsibilities.** The Yearly Meeting appoints, on nomination by the representatives, a board of five trustees who shall appoint their own clerk(s). One is appointed each year for a term of five years. They hold the titles to real estate owned by the Yearly Meeting and have the same duly recorded in official records of the state or county. They hold in trust, making investments when advisable, all funds and other personal property received by bequest or donation and administer the same according to the direction of the donors. They are authorized to execute such legal instruments as are essential to normal procedure in fiscal affairs and ownership of property by the Yearly Meeting and the local churches; such transactions are to be reported annually to the Yearly Meeting in session. They must exercise due care to observe the requirements of the statutes of the states within which their transactions are carried on.
- b. **Administration of Special Funds.** When a church ceases to function as a Friends church of Northwest Yearly Meeting (see also Chapter II, Section I, subsection D, paragraph 6, p. 41), title to property held by that church is transferred to the Yearly Meeting trustees. The assets realized are administered by the spiritual life board through its department of evangelism; provided that any funds donated for a specific purpose are to be administered in accordance with the desires of the original donor.
- c. The trustees appoint one of their number as a member of the Yearly Meeting stewardship board.
- d. The trustees appoint one of their number to represent them on the Yearly Meeting Executive Council.

On page 68, replace entire page with the following (changes are: additional wording in paragraphs a. Auditing Committee and e. Other Committees; delete paragraph b. Memorial Committee and reletter the remaining items— see 1984 minute 44):

7. COMMITTEES (Yearly Meeting)

- a. **Auditing Committee.** The Yearly Meeting appoints on nomination of the Executive Council a standing auditing committee, which audits annually the books of the treasurer and presents its report for the prior fiscal year to the stewardship board at the midyear board meeting.
- b. **Business Committee.** A standing committee of two is appointed on nomination by the Executive Council to expedite the handling of all business during the sessions of the Yearly Meeting. All matters of business, including reports, recommendations, proposals, and nominations are referred to this committee in writing. It has authority to ask responsible bodies and individuals for prompt submission of essential matters. It sees that all these are in regular form and determines the time and order of their presentation, forwarding them to the presiding clerk in proper sequence.
- c. **Discipline Revision Committee.** The Yearly Meeting appoints annually, on nomination by the Executive Council, a committee of five to handle all matters pertaining to revision of the *Constitution and Discipline*. One of the five is designated by the Council and appointed by the Yearly Meeting to preside over the committee for the ensuing year. The committee itself or any officer or official body of the Yearly Meeting may initiate proposals for amendment. Any proposal originating elsewhere than in the committee is referred to it through its clerk before being presented on the floor of the Yearly Meeting; this is to insure consistency with the *Constitution and Discipline* as a whole and uniformity of style and expression. Proposals given approval as a first reading are referred to the committee for one year, to be submitted for second reading and final action in the subsequent session. (See p. 71.)
- d. **Other Committees.** All such temporary and standing committees as may be deemed necessary for the realization of the purposes and objectives of the Yearly Meeting are appointed from time to time. The Presiding Clerk of the Yearly Meeting shall appoint the Memorial Committee, the Epistle Committee, the Committee on Returning Minutes, the Committee to Communicate with Aged Friends, and such other committees that may be assigned to his responsibility. These may include special committees, such as are prescribed for the business of setting up a new area. When the performance of a special committee requires travel, expense of transportation is provided by the Yearly Meeting.

On page 69, replace entire page with the following (see 1984 minute 67):

G—THE REPRESENTATIVE BODY (Yearly Meeting)

1. COMPOSITION

The Representative Body is composed of members of our local and extension churches who have prayerfully been chosen on the basis of spiritual maturity, respected judgment, and in harmony with Friends doctrine and procedures. At their first meeting roll call is to be taken and representatives seated. Alternates may be seated in place of delegates to fill allowable quotas. No additional seating may take place except as authorized by the Yearly Meeting. Those approved and seated are the official representative body. Officers will consist of a presiding clerk and a recording clerk, both of whom are officers of the Yearly Meeting. These officers are selected annually by recommendation of the representative nominating committee and approval of the Representative Body and the Yearly Meeting. (p. 47, Part II, Sec. III, C-8) The Yearly Meeting presiding clerk and superintendent are ex officio. The Representative Body meets in open sessions to encourage wider understanding of their business and responsibilities except that the presiding clerk with concurrence of the representatives may request that visitors absent themselves if a matter of serious sensitive nature should arise.

2. MEETINGS.

The Representative Body shall meet in conjunction with the annual sessions of the Yearly Meeting. They may be called to meet at times between the annual sessions with the concurrence of at least two of the following: Clerk of the Representatives, Yearly Meeting presiding clerk, or Yearly Meeting general superintendent.

3. TERM OF OFFICE

Representatives are appointed by their local church for a term of not less than two years commencing with the start of the calendar year. Terms should last either two or three years with a proportionate number being replaced each year.

4. DUTIES

The Representative Body attends to any business that it initiates or that the local church or the Yearly Meeting refers to it. The Representative Body is authorized to initiate action and present such for consideration to the Yearly Meeting in session. It is also responsible for the following nominating functions:

- a. Boards.** The representatives are responsible for the nomination of all members of Yearly Meeting boards, except those whose nomination is specifically designated to the areas and other bodies. From a broad view of the work of the Yearly Meeting and an understanding of the persons available qualified to fill its offices, they determine nominations to be submitted to the Yearly Meeting. The Representative Body may receive from the boards names of individuals they wish considered for appointment together with appropriate commentary as to the suitability of and information about said individuals.
- b. Yearly Meeting Officers.** The Representative Body submits to the Yearly Meeting nominations for the following Yearly Meeting officers annually: presiding clerk, assistant presiding clerk, recording clerk, assistant recording clerk, announcing clerk, clerk of Representative Body, recording clerk of Representative Body, statistician.
- c. Board Clerks.** In addition the the core membership of the board, the Representative Body will annually submit to the Yearly Meeting nominations for clerks of the following boards: Education, Outreach, Publication, Spiritual Life, Stewardship.

CHANGE/ADDENDUM
Report of the
LONG-RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

1984 Minute 104

On page A-7, (back of 1983 Minutes), Objective J, replace goal 5 with the following:

5. By fiscal year 1988-89 the Yearly Meeting shall devote 5 percent of the Great Commission Budget to the General Fund of George Fox College. This shall be achieved as follows:

Fiscal year 1984-85, \$5,000.00; 1985-86, 2% of Great Commission Budget; 1986-87, 3%; 1987-88, 4%; 1988-89, 5%.

- a. The YM Stewardship Board will assume responsibility for including the college in its proposed budget and develop a promotional strategy to achieve the goal. The YM Executive Council and financial secretary will work with the Stewardship Board.

1984 Minute 42

On page A-9, (back of 1983 Minutes), add the following after Objective O:

Objective P

To encourage a stronger public emphasis on conversions and statements of faith in Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Rationale: Because of a strong emphasis on discipleship and one-on-one evangelism, many decisions for Christ are made in a private setting. While altar calls and revival meetings allow new Christians to publicly proclaim their commitment to Christ, those who become Christians privately miss the opportunity to publicly declare their faith and to receive caring support from their local Friends congregation. A new commitment to Christ needs to be shared publicly to strengthen the new convert and to encourage and reinforce the other members of the congregation.

Goals:

1. The Department of Evangelism will continue to equip and train our pastors and leaders in effective evangelism methods by hosting seminars and conferences on topics of personal evangelism.
2. The general superintendent and executive secretary will make resources available to local churches on effective nurturing and shepherding programs by July 1985. These resources will enable strong, established Christians within the local church to encourage and equip new Christians in their spiritual pilgrimage. This focus will broaden the vision of evangelism in the local church by making older Christians aware and a part of the new [converts].
3. The general superintendent, executive secretary, and the Department of Evangelism will strongly encourage more public testimony sessions on the local, regional, and Yearly Meeting level to promote understanding and vision of evangelism and conversions to Christ within the Yearly Meeting.
4. The Department of Evangelism will prepare an article for the *Evangelical Friend* to inform Friends on effective ways of sharing private confessions of faith with other supportive Christians and the church body. This article will be prepared by January 1986.

Objective Q

To strengthen the church's witness to the equality of all people before God.

Rationale: Friends have traditionally emphasized the equality of all persons in the sight of God and have sought to apply that principle in human relationships. We believe it is important to reaffirm our understanding of Scripture at this point and to seek ways to promote equality between men and women and among racial and ethnic groups.

Goals:

1. The Discipline Revision Committee will review the wording of the Discipline to assure consistency with Part II, Chapter 1, Section A on page 33, and will correct wording that may be interpreted to imply distinction on the basis of sex, color, or race.* To be completed by July 1985.
2. The Education Board will study the need for educational resources designed for churches to foster understanding of the biblical basis for equality and the application of these principles in all areas of church life. Study to be completed by July 1985.
3. The Yearly Meeting general superintendent will provide written guidelines for the selection of pastors, which will include a Friends understanding of equality and its implications in the selection of pastors and other church leaders. Ready for distribution fall 1984.
4. The Yearly Meeting general superintendent will encourage churches to select pastors and other church leaders without bias due to sex, color, or race. Implementation fall 1984.
5. The Committee on "Encouragement of Gifts" will encourage women to consider a call to various types of ministry including the pastorate (note Objective D).
6. The Publication Board will publish biographical material on the lives of women Friends ministers.
7. The Publication Board will publish biographical materials featuring the ministry of minorities within the church.

Objective R

To develop a greater sense of value upon courtesy and hospitality in our worship services.

Rationale: It is clear that growth in our churches depends on the first impression formed by invited guests and other visitors. Good hospitality becomes a habit, both for out-of-town visitors and for local people who might be prospective attenders. Good hospitality includes gracious introductions from the platform, warm greetings at the door, and friendly follow-up contacts.

Goals:

1. The executive secretary will see that a workshop is organized for Yearly Meeting sessions in 1985, and for the Ministers' Conference in 1986, on basic protocol and procedures in welcoming visitors from the platform in services and while guests are arriving and leaving the church.
2. The Spiritual Life Board will select a standard reference work for ushers and greeters on making guests feel welcome by July 1985.
3. The Department of Evangelism will develop a follow-up plan for visitors, including steps for assimilating new attenders into the existing body of a church by July, 1985.

* "... There are no distinctives in the rights, privileges, or responsibilities of members because of sex, color, or race."

Objective S

To develop and teach a biblical (Friends) concept of leadership, "Followship," and of submission to authority.

Rationale: Because of our Friends position and strong heritage of believing that each person can hear directly from God, that no person is above another, and that we "doff the hat" to no one, there may be confusion regarding the biblical (Friends) view of authority and submission—leadership and "followship."

Perhaps the balance has become weighted on the side of rugged individualism, which can become a point of carnal pride and consequently hinder or retard the effectiveness of local churches, the Yearly Meeting, and beyond. It needs to be remembered that the Holy Spirit is able to direct our leaders, who in turn are able to provide Spirit-directed leadership for the church.

Goals:

1. Assign two or three Friends Bible scholars to prepare an in-depth paper on the subject of authority and submission. Translate into simple language with examples to illustrate the concepts. To be initiated by the Executive Council by July 1985. Have these papers presented to appropriate groups such as the Spiritual Life Board, the Yearly Meeting Executive Council.
2. Include presentations on this subject at a Focus Conference for pastors or at Ministers' Conference in 1986.
3. Include teaching on this concept in Friends membership courses.
4. Prepare a three- or four-session unit of study on the subject of leadership and "followship" to use with youth and adults. The Leader's Guide could have separate helps for youth and adults. This study should have a strong biblical base as well as references to Quaker sources. To be completed by the Education Board by July 1986.

Some things that might be included in this could be:

- a. Biblical view of leadership and power.
- b. Biblical view of respect for those in authority.
- c. Guidelines for distinguishing between "conviction" and "preference."
- d. How to deal with the clash of "conviction" against "conviction."
- e. How too much individualism may hinder the progress of the church.
- f. How we can encourage a spirit of cooperation with leadership and programs when differences are simply a matter of preference.
- g. Developing a wholesome Christian attitude of respect (courtesy) toward all people. Include practical suggestions for basic standards of courtesy (introductions, hospitality, etc.)
- h. Growing in trust of those who because of their gifts have been appointed to leadership positions in the church.

Objective T

To develop more leaders among the younger adults of the Yearly Meeting.

Rationale: Friends emphasize the involvement of all believers in worship and service, regardless of credentials or offices. Yet the vitality and growth of early Quakerism resulted from the efforts of Spirit-directed leaders: men and women who exercised their gifts in directing and motivating others. Today, the growth and even the survival of the Friends Church depends on people who will accept the challenge of being effective leaders.

Goals:

1. The Executive Council will organize a working conference on leadership development within the Yearly Meeting, to be held in 1984 or 1985. Those attending will represent a cross section of the Yearly Meeting. The conference will explore methods of recognizing and cultivating gifts of leadership.

2. The editor of the *Evangelical Friend* will be asked to institute a regular feature of effective early Quaker leaders.
3. The Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council will be asked to organize a conference of selected young leaders from member yearly meetings for mutual encouragement. The conference would be held in 1986. Interested individuals from other yearly meetings might be invited.
4. The executive secretary will consider including a workshop in yearly meeting sessions in 1986 on cultivating the gift of leadership.

Objective U

To develop a more uniform and effective procedure for preparing people for membership.

Rationale: Although the *Constitution and Discipline* of Northwest Yearly Meeting describes the procedures for active membership and many other well-defined guidelines are available for church use (including *Friends Church Membership Course* by Jack Willcuts, *Membership Training* by Stan Perisho, *Friends in the Soaring 70's*—section 4, chapter 3—the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting are presently using a variety of procedures to bring in new members and to hold them accountable once they have joined the local church. The Long-Range Planning Subcommittee on Membership recognizes this as an obstacle to growth and unity in our Yearly Meeting.

Goals: The Yearly Meeting Spiritual Life Board will undertake the following projects, to be completed by July 1986.

1. Redefine the main objectives of membership.
2. Affirm a common system for membership training that would include standard teachings to be covered and resources to be used.
3. Define the minimum basic beliefs (doctrines and testimonies) for membership in Northwest Yearly Meeting.
4. Develop a system of accountability of membership that would include renewal and covenants.
5. Consider the issue of transfer of membership—should it always be on profession of faith, and should the transferred member take a local membership course?
6. Review and edit the certificate of membership and encourage all churches to use it.
