MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1985

■ 1. Richard Beebe, presiding clerk, read the opening minute "Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 93rd session, July 29, 1985, on the campus of George Fox College with the admonition contained in Hebrews 12:14 to follow peace and holiness without which no one will see the Lord." Richard Beebe led in prayer.

■ 2. John Bowman of the George Fox College music faculty led the congregation in singing.

■ 3. The presentation by the Department of Missions on Sunday afternoon was approved.

■ 4. The presentation by the Department of Evangelism on Sunday evening was approved.

■ 5. The keynote message by Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts Sunday evening was approved as follows:

Promise or Peril

John 14:5, 8, 15-17, 25-27

Acts 1:4, 6-8 NIV

Seeing and listening as we have this afternoon and this evening to the challenge for church planting and missions outreach, one is reminded of Alice in Wonderland who was conversing with a turtle. Her improbable ability to converse with animals found her somewhat critical of the turtle for his deliberate ways. He became irritated at this and exclaimed to Alice: "Well, I don't see how we can ever finish if we don't begin."

The same could be said of us now. Perhaps we have been too deliberate in our evangelism outreach and growth, but now it is time to begin! The challenges and strategies outlined for us by Rick Hunt and the Department of Evangelism of planting 45 churches the next five years is for us demanding. Some will respond, I suppose, like the cautious Friend did on one occasion saying, "But Jack, don't you know the Friends Church is supposed to be small!" This kind of twisted teaching and tradition sounds somewhat like the logic of

the frustrated math teacher who insisted, "If God had intended us to use the metric system, He would have chosen 10 rather than 12 disciples!"

Let's ask a question of ourselves as we respond to the challenges of today. Rather than asking, "What are 'they' going to do?" we must ask, "What does God want ME to do?" A more central question, too, is "Where is the spiritual power coming from for all this?" Not, "Where is the money coming from? Or the people, or the pastors, or the programs, but where will be found the holy, spiritual energy, so that the fire kindled here tonight in hopes and possibilities will burn, build, and brighten into a revival conflagration?"

We find ourselves placed now, perhaps providentially, between two possibilities: great promise or great peril. There is no plateau in between!

This type of choice and decision is not a new experience for the people of God. The Children of Israel faced it a number of times, and their frequent responses are not reassuring. The first disciples also on one memorable occasion felt themselves caught in a perilous situation. Jesus gave them a promise and, Friends, it is our promise too.

It is found in John, chapter 14. The Lord has just been reassuring them with the now familiar words, "Let not your heart be troubled . . ."

"Thomas said to him, 'Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?' Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life . . .'

"Philip said, 'Lord, show us the Father and that will be enough for us.' Jesus answered . . . 'If you love me, you will obey what I command. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counselor to be with you forever—the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you . . . the Counselor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.'"

This promise is more than a strategy or a set of rules. It is more than disciplines and guidelines. Our great need now is for the COUNSELOR, the Holy Spirit.

On another memorable occasion these followers were paralyzed with fear and uncertainty. The setting is Acts 1:

"On one occasion, while he was eating with them, he gave them this command: 'Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about . . . So when they met together, they asked him, 'Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom of Israel?' He said to them: 'It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses . . .'

The disciples were, after all they had seen and heard and experienced, still struggling with preconceived plans of what should happen next. They were still thinking politically. "Now! Are You going to restore the kingdom of Israel? Surely it must be about time for our problems and difficulties to be behind us. Power like that will surely make our lives more trouble free. Our calling to follow must be about ready for a turn upward."

How little did they understand their future and the ways of spiritual power at work, and the ways of the Holy Spirit!

Does this also describe us? It seems that at present the whole world is choosing up sides, shopping for values. Not just internationally, or in society, but also religiously. Including, we must report, many in our own churches. One of the greatest burdens I have, and you too no doubt, is how to handle dear Friends who can't get along with each other!

One terrible peril is the wasted energy and missed opportunities in time spent disagreeing instead of advancing in unity. As we start our 93rd Yearly Meeting sessions, we are only 15 fast years away from the year 2,000. How sad it will be if in 15 years (or in 5 years) we are stalled in trying to agree on how to be effective witnesses!

It isn't as though revival, mission, and church planting are not happening today. We hear of great growth of the Gospel in Latin America, and in certain other places, especially Korea. Are Korean Christians more clever or simply more committed?

We do need a vision, a plan, a strategy, but let us be sure our hearts are in focus too, that we are hungering and thirsting for righteousness, and not just on how to get somewhere else in the world in mission, or only to get bigger than we are. When the Holy Spirit is in control and the power of the Lord is over all, our defeats will not lead to despair, and our successes will not lead to pride.

"Denominations," it is said, "exist not for their own aggrandizement, and not to be superceded by a few great single churches, but to keep alive emphases that are needed." (Trueblood)

I really believe we are on the threshold of something that is going to be wonderful to behold, something more than merely enduring inconvenient consecration, or short-term enthusiasms. But like those first disciples, we must ask and expect the right answers. Neither they, nor we, are able to predict what the Holy Spirit will do as we obey Him. It is impossible to put limits on the possibilities of spiritual revival and renewal.

The disciples were not to abandon what they had learned and observed since they had known Jesus. They were simply to be enabled now to begin living and serving like the Sermon on the Mount said. The Holy Spirit will now make this possible. Fears will be replaced by faith; conflicts replaced with the peace of God; competition replaced with cooperation; pride and selfishness replaced with meekness and humility. AND THERE WERE ADDED TO THE CHURCH 3,000 IN A DAY! Growth follows holy, Spirit-filled living.

This means for us, I believe, that we will continue in our prayer emphases (waiting on the Lord), also the continued training of elders as disciplers, faithful preaching and teaching the Word, the learning of peacemaking ways. (For me personally, I want to be available for whatever ministry may open for weekend revivals—oh, they may be called something else—in local churches for preaching, teaching, and encouraging as invited, and as they can be scheduled. I hope God will raise up more Max Huffmans, Herschel Thornburgs, Oscar Browns to join hands with pastors and elders as evangelists. It is no accident we have invited as our Yearly Meeting speaker this year one who is a conference evangelist in his church.)

We all know there is a great deal of discouragement in small churches. This is not a Quaker problem alone; the average size of American churches today is less than 85. And among these small congregations are other competitive forces to be brought under the Holy Spirit's control. These struggles may be more noticeable in smaller churches than in larger ones . . . the almost unconscious spiritual value judgments being made on our use of time, both leisure and discretionary. Every church responsibility requires a volunteer, so quality performance of musicians, teachers, or pastors may not match the star TV. religious personalities. So our local worship and church programs, it is assumed, must be inferior. This sort of thinking saps our enthusiasm and self-confidence. Some go on a search for a place "to meet my need," for entertainment without involvement.

But scolding does not help us, it only adds to our frustration and guilt, and our feeling guilty about feeling guilty! The whole unraveling of family life, loss of traditional values, morals . . . and then the relentless daily news. What if America admits bankruptcy? What if our Social Security resources are diminished? War breaks out, more shortages come?

We cannot stand aloof from these things and just hope somehow if we keep busy enough everything will work out and the Lord will return to rescue us. "Will You not at this time restore a problem-free kingdom, Lord? That's what we see is needed, it's what we want, Lord. Isn't that next on your agenda, Lord?"

"He said to them: 'It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses . . .'" That word *witness* can be accurately translated *martyr*.

The Good News of the Gospel is that rather than dreading the future, fearing the unknown, weariness with weaknesses, we are to hunger and thirst after righteousness. Is this our greatest concern, our longing, down deep within? Not some new religious technique but the touch of God Himself, this is our need.

At our Ministers' Conference last spring we were reminded by Richard Foster "that God meets us where we are." This sounds rather trite, but it is the most profound and permanent truth we shall ever know. To experience God personally, to seek Him, obey Him, wait for Him, right where we are, is a most exciting possibility. Really, the only place God can bless us is where we are—in our homes, our families, our churches, among our friends, neighbors, and in doing that WE DISCOVER THAT GOD IS THERE!

What will happen if we, *everyone*, find a fresh infilling of the Holy Spirit? We are not at the moment talking about finding new inspiration, fine fellowship at Yearly Meeting, new ideas or opportunity to express some concerns. But rather, beginning now, tonight, find a new experience with God. This will bring about a whole new surge of confidence, hope, consecration, giving . . . It will give meaning to our reputation as Friends as being in the forefront of ethical concerns. God will lead us out into the great outreach possibilities in cross-cultural evangelism and church planting. The Samaritans of our environment may be the Hispanics, the inner-city, the prisoners, the deaf.

This is our calling, our high privilege, our promise, and one made at the high cost of Calvary, that we may have wholeness of life in the Spirit. We are to have lives that are complete, vigorous, attractive in attitude and personality. On a personal level that means prayer, study, good reading, simplicity, service, confession, guidance, worship, fellowship. Let us choose to place ourselves before God that He may work in us the transformation He longs to do, and that we so desperately need.

This will bring about a holiness of life, not just of a doctrine; our lives will shine as lights in a dark world. This light is not human genius, it is not Quaker-made or a birthright membership. It is genuine love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. When this kind of light is seen it eclipses the complaining, critical, self-centeredness so often associated with churchianity. It will honor the Lord, it will bring fulfillment rather than emptiness or frantic religious efforts.

It is not enough just to start out well at Family Camp, or a Billy Graham Crusade, or some special meeting; it is a consistent growth in gratitude, a personalized display of the fruit of the Spirit as seen in Jesus and taught in the Scriptures. This infilling, cleansing, baptism with the Holy Spirit changes us from the run-of-the-mill-church-as-usual people, who so often show too much greed, self-pity, jealousies, and aimless attendance. These things are replaced with healing, graciousness, and love one for another.

This is what is meant by being transformed by the power of God. We will love different things, hate different things, be drawn to different priorities. We will find our joy in His presence and service, and our disgust with sin in any form, seen or experienced. Our churches and everyone of us need to be closely connected with people with this kind of power, who can pray for us, and we can pray for them.

We need a whole bunch of new models of holiness, elders and maturing Christians who will show us how to live; holy men and women with warm hearts and cool heads rather than cold hearts and hot heads! These will be people, loving men and women, consistent, compassionate, people with a passion for purity, for peace, for the lost, the lonely.

These are nice words, high ideals, but they are to describe US, where we are from Medford to Boise, from Spokane to Seattle, Woodland to Camas, now in 1985 until the year 2,000. *Listen*, these are categorical imperatives. This is do or die, promise or peril!

To follow Jesus now is to stand in opposition to the prevailing mentality of our society, leaving luxuries to have a lifestyle that sets us apart from the world. We need a new baptism of Holy Spirit power! We are Quakers and we need to shake, and tremble, in the presence of the Lord. We need power so that when we pray people and circumstances are changed. When we come to worship, we go away changed. We need power so that when God speaks to us, WE ARE CHANGED! Signs and wonders may follow if God so leads, but more than the spectacular we need modest consistency of purity, humility, caring even when it is inconvenient. Barclay testified (of early Friends):

"When I came into the silent assemblies of God's people, I felt a secret power among them which touched my heart. And as I gave way to it, I found the evil in me weakening and the good lifted up. Thus it was that I was knit unto them and united with them, and I hungered more and more for the increase of this power to life until I could feel the Spirit's leadings."

My prayer is that we might somehow catch a new vision of the church, your church, of our Yearly Meeting. This will only come as we prepare our hearts and obediently wait. May we be able to see that together we are the church, and that we are the church together.

Searching for appropriate metaphors, Paul called us the Body of Christ, John saw us as the Bride of Christ, and Jesus told of a Building of Living Stones. Lay these definitions alongside your present attitude toward your church. This is healthy medicine for sick saints. May there come a powerful new urgency of mission. If we know this transforming power of the Holy Spirit, reaching every part of us, bringing purity, ethical concerns, love of the brethren, a reality of will, outreach evangelism will be unstoppable.

Do we have any idea how awful it is to be lost? Not just eternally but desperately lost now, hurting, lonely, afraid, confused? If we aren't experiencing any of these, we are surrounded by those who are.

What do we need? A new vision of the church, a great baptism of clean hearts, purity, and the promise of the power received. The alternative is peril.

John Wesley said, "Give me 100 preachers who fear nothing but sin, and desire nothing but God, and I care not a straw whether they be clergy or laity, they will shake the gates of hell and establish the Kingdom of heaven."

■ 6. The morning worship service was turned to Jack Willcuts, who introduced Ron Stansell. He introduced visitors from Bolivia, who came to also attend the World Gathering of Young Friends in Greensboro, North Carolina. They are Felix Huarina, Benjamin Huarina, Dionisio Aspi, Timoteo Choque, David Mamani, and Petrona Gutierrez.

Ron also presented Humberto Gutierrez, who gave greetings in English and the message in Spanish, interpreted by Ron Stansell.

■ 7. Lon Fendall read a returning minute from Alaska Yearly Meeting regarding the visit of Earl and Janice Perisho.

■ 8. Ron Stansell read a letter from Bolivia Yearly Meeting regarding Phyllis McCracken's visit.

■ 9. Greetings from Robin Johnston, new president of Friends Bible College, Haviland, Kansas, were read.

■ 10. Greetings were read from London Yearly Meeting.

■ 11. A letter from the American Friends Service Committee will be posted.

■ 12. Jack Willcuts introduced Dick and Barbara Simmons, who brought personal greetings.

■ 13. Jack Willcuts also officially welcomed James Morris and Reta Stuart of Evangelical Friends Mission to our Yearly Meeting session, and David and Joyce Byrne, EFM missionaries under appointment to Mexico City.

■ 14. New pastors and those making pastoral changes were introduced by Jack Willcuts. They are Roger and Sue Watson to Whitney Friends, Boise, Idaho; Gayle Beebe, Sherwood, Oregon; Earl and Mary Geil, Cherry Grove Friends, Battle Ground, Washington; and Dale and Launi Rogers, Hilltop Friends, Oregon City, Oregon. Associate pastors are Marq and Kathy Box, Vancouver, Washington; T. O. and Beverly Kelley, South Salem, Oregon; Dan and Pam Wilms, Lynwood Friends, Portland; and Smith and Marilyn Williams, Piedmont, Portland, Oregon.

Those present stood for recognition.

■ 15. The following report of actions taken by the Yearly Meeting Executive Council and its Administrative Committee since the 1984 Yearly Meeting was read and approved.

1. Approved the replacement of Beth Bagley's name on Yearly Meeting Bank account records with the name of Theresa (Terri) Bowen.

2. Approved the establishment of a discount plan for those attending Yearly Meeting from a distance.

3. Approved report from Trustees re: the closure of the Highland Avenue, Ontario, and Emmett churches.

4. Approved recommending to the Yearly Meeting that Jack Willcuts's call to serve as General Superintendent be extended to June 30, 1987.

5. Approved recommending to the Yearly Meeting that Quentin Nordyke's call to serve as Executive Secretary of the Yearly Meeting be extended to June 30, 1987.

6. Approved a request from the Department of Evangelism that a church-planting coordinator be hired for two years with salary to be paid with Department of Evangelism funds.

7. Approved that a feasibility study be made for changing the fiscal year for the Yearly Meeting from July 1 to June 30 to January 1 to December 31.

Approved changing date of Yearly Meeting in order to accommodate George Fox College in their quest for other summer conferences.

8. Approved a corporate resolution to borrow up to \$60,000 from the Newberg State Bank for Barclay Press.

9. Heard the report from a committee appointed to study biblical basis for conflict resolution to avoid church members bringing litigation against each other.

10. Named a special panel to review the *Constitution and Discipline* statements regarding women in the ministry. A meeting of this panel was held November 3, 1984. Subsequent to that meeting a Proposed Policy statement was approved by the Executive Council.

The Department of Social Concerns, including the Subcommittee on Women and the Executive Council, were invited to a meeting of the

Administrative Committee held in Newberg on June 29. The purpose was to deal with some misunderstandings. Although there wasn't consensus in all areas of concern, the meeting was profitable.

■ 16. The Discipline Revision Committee with Arthur Roberts as chairman presented the following report:

On behalf of the Discipline Revision Committee I am pleased to report on our assignment (YM minute 1984-90). Our task has been to:

- a. update the historical statement
- b. incorporate changes since 1979
- c. combine and clarify doctrinal statements
- d. recommend changes clarifying statements of belief or procedure
- e. reduce gender bias
- f. update the Queries
- g. edit for readability

We have met in four extended sessions and have spent many hours individually on this task, finding substantial unity and agreement. Various suggestions from boards of the Yearly Meeting have been considered, in particular drafts of the Queries by the Department of Christian Testimonies. A progress report was submitted to the Executive Council at midyear, and suggestions incorporated or considered.

We have now completed this first draft and submit it to the Yearly Meeting for review. A most obvious change is the name: to *Faith and Practice*, which we feel to be an apt and appropriate substitute for the older term. More substantive changes include the following:

1. Preparation of a terse doctrinal summary. This summary, entitled "What Friends Believe" is drawn from the Richmond Declaration of Faith, the Letter to the Governor of the Barbados, and the doctrinal interpretations approved from time to time by the Yearly Meeting (in the present *Discipline* entitled "Fundamental Truths" and "Doctrines and Testimonies"). Because these are historic documents we feel they should be retained, the Declaration and Barbados letter as foundational documents appearing with "What Friends Believe," the others as interpretive documents appearing in the Appendix.

2. We have prepared a major restatement of the Queries, working closely with the Department of Christian Testimonies. We feel that serious restudy of the Queries will result in their renewed usefulness.

3. Revision of the structures of government. At the local level the most important change is from Spiritual Life Committee to Elders. At the Yearly Meeting level, structures are organized into councils, boards, commissions, and committees.

4. We have sought to remove gender bias, format clutter, and obsolete material. We have edited for clarity, readability, and uniformity of style and expression.

The draft for first reading has been given to the Representatives. A limited number are available for others and can be checked out at the Yearly Meeting Office.

Much work has gone into this, and it will be presented to the entire Yearly Meeting for a first reading this Yearly Meeting. People are urged to respond.

The meeting was opened for discussion. Gerald Dillon presented his concerns regarding the lengthening of the Queries and the change of Spiritual Life Committee to Elders. Members of the committee spoke to some of these concerns giving their rationale.

Several others spoke of their concerns regarding the presented revision. All will be taken under consideration by the committee.

- 17. A summary of the Statistical Report was read by Lon Fendall.
Approved. (See appendix.)

- 18. The meeting adjourned, with prayer by Lon Fendall, to meet at 10:45 a.m., Tuesday, July 30.

- 19. The business meeting opened with prayer by Earl Geil, pastor of the Cherry Grove Friends Church, Battle Ground, Washington.

- 20. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

- 21. Paul Anderson, who attended the recent World Gathering of Young Friends in Greensboro, North Carolina, representing the Evangelical Friends Alliance, reported on that conference.

Much prayer went into the planning of the conference over the past three years, with the belief that God could use such a meeting to draw diverse groups of Friends together. Letters were sent to all Friends yearly meetings of the world and delegates invited. Funds were raised to help those coming from other nations. Some \$80,000 was raised in the United States alone. The conference was free of all institutional advertising.

Paul's desire as a representative of the EFA was that a Christ-centered witness be given. He felt that the Gospel was most effectively proclaimed by Friends from Latin America and Africa. He then read an epistle, which was drafted by the more than 300 Young Friends from 34 countries, 57 yearly meetings, and 8 monthly meetings and was sent to all yearly meetings.

- 22. The Education Board with Ken VandenHoek as chairman presented their report.

Greg Lamm reported on the Easter offering taken to help the Byrnes' expenses to prepare to go to Mexico City. A short skit was presented by members of the board to announce the grand total of \$29,751.62 that has been given.

Dorothy Barratt used further visual aids to show that only 26 churches of the 53 in Northwest Yearly Meeting had participated in this offering—only 50 percent—and urged 100 percent participation in the coming year.

Steve Wood introduced the two missionary books for children written by Betty Hockett, and announced that a third one is in process on the lives of Roscoe and Tina Knight.

A puppet show of "Curriculum Trivia Pursuit" was given to test our knowledge of the Aldersgate Graded Curriculum.

Written reports from the Education Board and the Friends Youth Field Secretary were distributed.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

STEVEN WOOD, CLERK

During the past year the Department of Church Education has focused upon providing services to increase the joy and effectiveness of C.E. workers in our local churches. In addition to responding to specific requests for help, we conducted two Christian Education training events. In March a weekend C.E. Camp was held at Twin Rocks and a day-long C.E. Conference was held at Boise Friends. Leadership for these events was provided by both NWYM people and the EFA team of age level specialists. Approximately two hundred people participated. These conferences were part of the first year of a six-year C.E. workers' training plan. In the coming year we will be focusing upon equipping people who provide leadership and oversight of local C.E. programs.

The Department has been pleased with the ministry of Sandra Wilson as Friends Youth Field Secretary this past year. Sandra has just returned from

accompanying a NWYM YCEW (Youth Consecrated to Evangelize the World) team to Alaska. Sandra has worked effectively with the Youth Leadership Seminars, midwinter conferences, and volleyball tournament as well as serving as a resource person and encourager to local leaders. The department continues to look forward to the day we can employ a full-time youth superintendent in our Yearly Meeting and affirms our previous recommendation to pursue this as a goal. We believe the full-time position to be critical to the sound development of new youth groups in churches the Yearly Meeting hopes to plant in the coming years as well as essential to the maintenance of our excellent youth program.

The Long Range Planning Committee recommended that the Department set standards of excellence for our Sunday schools. In response to their recommendation we are in the process of promoting the ICL manual, *Sunday School Standards: A Guide for Measuring and Achieving Sunday School Success*. We are also creating a supplementary chapter to the standards to help Friends churches sort through the various theological perspectives found in resources available for use in our C.E. programs. The *Sunday School Standards* book, along with our addendum, will combine to provide real help for churches as they set standards of excellence in each of the following areas: theological interpretation, Bible study, teaching plans, Sunday school, organization, relationships, recruitment, training and planning, facilities, and growth. The EFA quarterly publication, *AWARE*, has also been expanded in response to our concern to provide tools to help churches achieve excellence in these areas.

The Department of Church Education continues to support and endorse the work of our EFA Christian Education Commission, Dorothy Barratt, our EFA C.E. Consultant, and Aldersgate Graded Curriculum. As a result of our support of and participation in EFA, Betty Hockett was commissioned to write and we now have available our second children's missionary biography on the lives of Ralph and Esther Choate, *What Will Tomorrow Bring?* A third missionary biography will be available in January on the lives of Roscoe and Tina Knight. These are available from Dorothy Barratt's office and The Barclay Press. The EFA-CE Commission is also continuing to produce children's video tape series in conjunction with the George Fox College Video Communications Center. A new *Living Peacefully* series is in production.

Our department is pleased with the participation of 26 NWYM churches in our annual EFA Easter Sunday School Offering. NWYM contributed nearly \$3,600 of the almost \$30,000 raised across EFA.

GENERAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

HECTOR J. MUNN, CLERK

Under the guidance of the Lord, the Department of General Education has carried out the duties assigned by action of the Yearly Meeting. The major budgetary duty has been the distribution of \$15,182 in the assistance of nine students attending seminary through the Ministerial Aid Scholarship/Loan Program. Of the six students who completed their program this year, three have received calls to pastor churches in NWYM, one is continuing in graduate school, one received a call to pastor in Iowa Yearly Meeting, and one is seeking God's call to service. In the coming year, there will be eight students in seminary programs, six of whom will be at Western Evangelical Seminary, one at Azusa Pacific School of Theology-Friends Center, and one will be beginning a study program through Glasgow University.

Yearly Meeting churches report continued support for George Fox College, with 37 churches assisting 73 students under the Church/College Scholarship Program. For fall term 1984 there were 124 Friends students at George Fox, or 20 percent of the student body. Of this, 109 students were from Northwest Yearly Meeting, 10 from California Yearly Meeting, 2 from Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, and one each from Alaska and East Africa yearly meetings and

Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region. The churches report over 80 students attend other colleges; 16 of these attended other Christian colleges, 24 attended local community colleges, and over 40 attended state universities.

Yearly Meeting churches report continued involvement with private Christian schools. The largest number of schools and student enrollment is in the preschool programs. There are over 400 children in day schools and seven churches sponsor preschools for their communities. Greenleaf, Hayden Lake, and Silverton churches sponsor Christian high schools. In addition there are over 25 young people attending Christian schools sponsored by other denominations.

The Department of General Education has much concern for the future of Greenleaf Friends Academy. Greenleaf Friends Church and other area churches continue to carry the major effort for this ministry. There is urgent need for prayer support for immediate financial and leadership needs. We urge that action by the Yearly Meeting be taken to affirm the purpose and mission of Greenleaf Friends Academy and assist in seeking ways for an immediate resolution of the crisis.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES

LOUISE SARGENT, CLERK

The Department of Christian Testimonies completed and began distribution through The Barclay Press of the study series "A Matter of Stewardship" in the fall of 1984. This has been received well and used by many of our churches. It has also been used by other yearly meetings.

The "Meet the Friends" series, originally published in 1982, used primarily as bulletin inserts and in membership classes, continues to be popular and helpful.

The department completed a series of "Quaker Keys" bookmarks, which briefly quote Scripture and Friends on various doctrines such as holiness, worship, simplicity, and love.

In response to a need expressed through the Yearly Meeting, the department has produced a pamphlet entitled "Holiness: A Way of Living," which can be used to clarify the Friends position on this doctrinal issue.

Much energy was put into the revision of the Queries, which appear in the proposed *Faith and Practice* in conjunction with the *Discipline* Revision Committee. Plans are underway to print these Queries, after final approval, as a separate pamphlet that can easily be carried in a Bible and used in private devotions.

Further publications currently in production at The Barclay Press are an evangelistic pamphlet by Arthur Roberts entitled "On Becoming A Christian" and a pamphlet by Mike Snow of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, entitled "Straight Talk on Wandering Words: A Quaker Commentary on Swearing," which speaks well to our contemporary society.

The Department of Christian Testimonies is proud of the quality of the work it has produced over the past years and intends to maintain such quality in the future. All our publications are intended for distribution to churches throughout the Yearly Meeting; there is no reason for us to publish if the material is not being used.

YOUTH FIELD SECRETARY REPORT

Youth Leadership Seminars

Last year, there were six Leadership Seminars held in the six different areas of the Yearly Meeting. Youth workers and youth from 28 churches took advantage of this opportunity to come together and share in a time of "training for discipleship," and fellowship. One of the most valuable parts of these seminars was the encouragement that took place as youth workers shared their concerns and ideas with each other. Next year there will be just one seminar that will bring all the youth workers in the Yearly Meeting together. The dates are October 11-13. We will be using material from InterVarsity on being a World Christian. The brochures will come out in August.

Visitation

One of the main things the Youth Field Secretary does is visit youth groups and youth workers. This is definitely a highlight of the job. It has been exciting to travel around the Yearly Meeting during the past year visiting almost all of the churches. I have been a part of Sunday school classes, youth group meetings, and several retreats. I have so much appreciation for those people who have committed themselves to working with youth. It takes more than youth pastors. It takes many individuals within each church to be concerned and willing to give their time to the youth. The youth groups in NW Yearly Meeting have great variation in size but one thing is the same, they are all made up of students who need to be encouraged and challenged in their walk with God.

I attended the Network Northwest Conference, the National Youth Workers' Convention in the fall, served on the Surfside and Tween Camp committees, took part in the Education Board C.E. Conferences in Oregon and Idaho, and attended a Teen Missions Team Leader Training Seminar. I also participated in the Friends Youth Exec., being available to assist them as they planned things such as Midwinter, Volleyball Tournament, and YCEW.

Youthquake '85

You have been hearing about this conference for some time now! It is now less than a year away. Many youth groups have already become active raising money to be able to attend. Youthquake in Mexico will be a conference that will change the lives of all who attend. Dr. Tony Campolo will be the main speaker, and there will be seminars led by missionaries, pastors, and youth pastors. There are two slide shows available to be shown. Order from the Yearly Meeting office or from Ken VandenHoek in Boise, Idaho.

YCEW

I just returned from being in Alaska with this year's YCEW team with four other team members. These past two months were full of new experiences and challenges for us all. We prayed for each other Colossians 1:9-12. I think each one of us will be able to share many ways that God answered those prayers.

The purpose of YCEW is to give high school students the opportunity to be on a mission field for a short term. This team to Alaska was the second team. Plans are being made already to send a team out again next year.

All of these activities or programs are opportunities for the youth to come together for fellowship and teaching. Over and over again, I am reminded of James 5:16, "The effective prayer of a righteous man can accomplish much." It's not the planning that makes these programs successful (although that is important). It's the many prayers of each person in the Yearly Meeting. I hope that each person in the Yearly Meeting will pray daily that the Holy Spirit will be working in the lives of young people, that you will pray specifically for the young people in your own church, and that you will find some time to spend with them to encourage them and show them that you are interested in them. Each one of

us needs to be sharing what we have learned, sharing our lives with others so that they then will be able to do the same (2 Timothy 2:2)."

The report was approved.

■ 24. Ron Woodward reported for the Department of Missions. He expressed appreciation to World Gospel Mission and Gene Hockett for the use of the flags of many nations in the Sunday afternoon missions presentation.

Ron also announced that if any persons or churches wished to assist the Tabingos in their ministry in the Philippines, gifts can be sent to the Yearly Meeting Office.

Ron interviewed several people: Oscar Brown, Jaime Tabingo, David and Joyce Byrne, James Morris, and James Roberts on various aspects of missionary endeavors.

Prayer was requested for Willard and Doris Ferguson, who have been forced to leave Burundi and are now in Rwanda, both for Willard's health and concerning the possibility that they can do a necessary survey of Rwanda for EFM.

Ron Woodward led in prayer.

The written report was distributed, and approved.

ANNUAL REPORT— EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION, NORTHWEST

The Lord says through the prophet, Isaiah,

"The ransomed of the Lord will return, they will enter Zion with singing; everlasting joy will crown their heads. Gladness and joy will overtake them, and sorrow and sighing will flee away." (Isaiah 51:11)

In the Department of Missions, we labor for the fulfillment of this Scripture, rejoicing that "the ransomed of the Lord" are increasing in numbers throughout the world—partially through the labors of faithful men and women, boys and girls in our own Yearly Meeting!

MISSIONARY PERSONNEL

Our Bolivian field was staffed this past year by four families. James and Gail Roberts, Heidi and Amanda, lived in La Paz, where they taught in the Seminary, worked with extension courses, and served as the mission liaison with the INELA. Gail was mission treasurer. Hal and Nancy Thomas, David and Kristin, also served in La Paz, but were released from other duties for the new thrust in urban ministry—seeking to foster the growth of largely Spanish-speaking Friends churches. Ron and Carolyn Stansell, Sara, Anita and Debbie, served in Santa Cruz, where Ron worked with Pio Villca in the colonies, served as chairman of the Theology Department in the Christian University, and worked with the Santa Cruz church. Carolyn taught full time during the year at the Santa Cruz Christian Learning Center. Joining the team in December were Steve and Janelle Baron, Landon and Kelsey, coming to the field to work with the Greenhouse Project and other preventative programs designed to improve nutrition and living standards among our Aymara people.

In Peru, Wayne and Beverly Chapman, Amy, Nicholas and Michael, served in Ilave, living at the recently acquired national church headquarters. Ben and Gen Fitch, Trisia and Reid, welcomed the arrival of Tessa in October! The Fitches served in Juli; Ed and Marie Cammack returned to the field in October, providing a real boost to the missionary team. They lived in rented facilities in Juli. Denny and Sue Anderson, Aaron, Bryan, and Kristin, began the year in

Arequipa, but moved to Tacna in December. They oversee the work in Arequipa, and give encouragement to the churches in Ilo and Tacna.

Dwayne and Becky Williams, Marci and Jonathan, were on furlough for the 1984-85 year, living in Spokane and traveling to churches all across the Yearly Meeting. In June they returned to the field, taking up the work in Santa Cruz. Also on furlough were Roscoe and Tina Knight, living in Newberg and serving our churches well. Neither the Knights nor the Stansells will be returning to the field. Ron Stansell will be teaching 3/4 time at George Fox College this next year and will be working on a doctoral program in missiology at Trinity Seminary. Roscoe and Tina Knight's plans were not firm at this writing. The Chapmans and the Robertses will be on furlough during this coming year. Short-termers Shelly Shorten served helpfully in Peru during the fall of 1984, and Ken and Tonya Comfort are filling a gap this summer by their service on the altiplano of Peru.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM FIELD REPORTS

BOLIVIA

- Inflation continues to be rampant and is estimated to be the highest of any country since prewar Germany. Economic conditions are causing much of the middle class to merge into Bolivia's lower classes.
- Humberto Gutierrez, pastor of the Villa San Antonio Friends Church and a guest with us at these Yearly Meeting sessions, is the new president of the INELA. He comes from a younger generation, which represents a healthy transfer of leadership from "traditional church fathers" to younger people.
- San Pablo Seminary experienced an excellent year with more than 120 students.
- Theological Education by Extension (TEE) had perhaps the best year in the history of Bolivian Friends, with more than 360 students.
- The Bolivian Evangelical University continues to function without the necessary government-issued legal documents. This year 460 students were enrolled, with 123 part-time teachers and 15 administrative staff. The Department of Theology has increased to 34 students.
- Urban work, with Hal and Nancy Thomas, is off to a good beginning with a new church of 26 persons having been set apart recently from the Max Paredes Friends Church.
- Six congregations, varying in size from 10 to 60 persons, continue to show growth in the San Julian area, capably pastored by "national missionary" Pio Villca.
- Steve and Janelle Baron set a goal of completing seven greenhouses by the end of this year as part of their Social Development Project. Inflation and wildly fluctuating costs for roofing materials have made it difficult to put together funding proposals.

PERU

- For the first time in history, the Peruvian Mission Council consisted of four families!
- Ramon Mamani, new president of the Mesa Directiva, seems to have excellent administrative skills for this position.
- The new "Center" in Illave is a big asset and has become "home" for conferences, classes, and M.D. meetings, as well as a place for a missionary residence.
- Church growth on the Altiplano has been encouraging, with as many as 18 new congregations reported. Last year's report showed 49 churches on the Altiplano compared to 63 this year. Seven congregations are still in the coastal area.
- The new blue-and-white tent has been an encouragement to the work of evangelism and church planting.

During the Christmas holidays, James and Doris Morris visited our field, attending the missionary retreat at Cochabamba and spending nearly two weeks touring our work in both Bolivia and Peru. While at the retreat, James taught a seminar on crisis management designed especially for missionaries on the field and board members at home. During the year the Department of Missions rejoiced to see the filming, editing, and finally the completion of a 16mm film on the challenge of our new urban work around La Paz. The filming was done by Tri-Media, based in Boise.

We were also gratified that another YCEW team of yearly meeting youth was sent out for summer service, this time in the Kotzebue area of Alaska. Team leader was Sandra Wilson from Newberg. Team members were Thomas Armstrong and Derrie Watson (Lynwood), Stephanie Osborne (Woodland), and Nancy Perisho (Hillsboro).

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION AROUND THE WORLD

We are glad to have both James Morris and Reta Stuart with us in our Yearly Meeting sessions. Both labor faithfully in our Denver office to coordinate EFM and help us to expand our vision. We are gratified to see the production of a new EFM prayer directory, thanks to much work from Reta. We are also thrilled to have Jaime and Lydia Tabingo with us for Yearly Meeting, with Jaime speaking at our Sunday afternoon missions rally. Jaime oversees the work of five different Friends churches in the Philippines. He and Lydia will be traveling among the four EFA yearly meetings this summer.

Our decision a year ago to begin a new mission field in Rwanda has been followed by many delays and frustrations. So far, the Lord has shown us neither the right timing nor the right personnel to open the field. A nationwide Day of Prayer for Rwanda on June 30 was encouraging. We believe it will bear fruit!

In Mexico City we continue to appreciate the work of Mark and Wilma Roberts and the Routons. The latter are on furlough this summer in Iowa. An exciting event for us all during the year was the appointment of David and Joyce Byrne, Laura and Andrea, pastors at Urbana, Ohio, for missionary service with EFM in Mexico. Also exciting was the EFA Easter Offering for the Byrnes' support, which came to over \$29,000. David and Joyce are with us during Yearly Meeting, having just completed a month of work at Fuller Seminary in language-learning readiness. They will be visiting other yearly meetings, will be taking a course in urban evangelism in the fall, and will be starting language study in Costa Rica in January.

FINAL THOUGHTS

We welcome to Northwest Yearly Meeting this summer leaders from Bolivia Yearly Meeting: Humberto and Petrona Gutierrez, Dionicio Aspi, Felix Huarina, Benhamin Huarina, Timoteo Choque, and David Mamani. These Friends give us a firsthand glimpse of the fruit of missionary labors over the years, and testify to the beautiful oneness of the Body of Christ around the world. May we continue to labor for the day when ever knee shall bow and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father!

The report was approved.

■ 30. Phil Smith presented the report for the Department of Social Concerns. A printed report was distributed.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL CONCERNS REPORT

PHILIP SMITH, CLERK

The following areas of concern occupied most of the department's energies this year:

1. Prison Ministry. This growing concern is taking shape into organized ministry. Bob Percy, of East Boise Friends, has become our volunteer prison ministry coordinator. We hope to identify several churches with sufficient interest to hold prison/jail ministry-training seminars during the coming year.

2. The subcommittee on women has continued to receive much (indirect) criticism. After consultations with the executive council, the *Priscilla Papers* have ceased publication. Nevertheless, concern about women's issues remains strong and the department will seek ways to address them without harming unity among Friends.

3. Anne Newton, a Friends student at WES, approached the department with a concern for ministry to the deaf. We are impressed with the opportunity for new outreach this ministry offers. Anne Newton has been approved as the department's intern for this year. Some of her internship work will take place in the facilities of Vancouver Friends Church, the Washington State School for the Deaf being nearby.

4. The Piedmont work takes the bulk of this department's budget. This summer's Friends for Kids program, under the leading of Aaron Hamlin and Smith Williams, is much more aggressive than previous years, more than doubling the exposure children have to the program.

5. Several Friends had expressed concern that the Yearly Meeting or its churches ought to be more active in regard to abortion. The department asked me to write the churches for their thinking on this controversial subject. As a result of the many responses, the department is sponsoring several workshops on abortion at this Yearly Meeting. You are urged to attend.

Of course, local meetings are active in social issues apart from the activity of the Department of Social Concerns. Reports received before this Yearly Meeting indicate that more than \$30,000 has been given in emergency assistance by the churches, 26 refugees are sponsored by churches, and over half of our churches participated in the Thanksgiving offering, with more than \$9,000 given to World Relief Commission. But this is only a sampling of the varied ways local meetings have tried to express the love of God in social service and action.

Approved.

■ 31. The Executive Council recommended that the Department of Family Life be continued on a provisional basis, under Spiritual Life Board. Nine members shall be appointed to serve on this department named as follows; three members named by the Representatives, six members named by the Executive Council. Terms of appointments shall be for one year.

Approved.

■ 32. The Executive Council recommended that a Home Ministries Committee be formed on a provisional basis. Nine members shall be appointed to serve on this committee named as follows: Three members named by the Representatives, six members named by the Executive Council. Terms of appointments shall be for one year.

There was some discussion and questions regarding the need for this additional committee. It was explained that this committee would coordinate the ministries to minorities, such as the Korean churches and ministries among Hispanics.

The recommendation was approved.

- 33. Walter Wilhite, executive director of Friends Fund, presented a written report.

FRIENDS FUND ANNUAL REPORT, July 1985

This has been a very rewarding and outstanding year for the Friends Fund. I have completed a 15-page outline, providing a guide to administering the planned giving programs that are being offered through the services of the Friends Fund.

With the use of our computer we can service our accounts more rapidly and efficiently. Ron Dingman has been operating the computer and assisting with the work in the office.

J. D. Baker has moved to Newberg, Oregon, and is working full time as Associate Director.

Walter introduced J.D. Baker, who is working with him as associate director and will be replacing him this year as executive director.

- 34. The meeting was opened for further discussion of the *Discipline* revision. Mildred Minthorne expressed appreciation for the work of the committee—their time and dedication.

A concern regarding wording of section on "Affiliate Members" was expressed. Paul Cammack suggested the addition of a unifying statement of

goal for each committee of "exalting Christ and seeking to bring others to Him." He also suggested the section on God's revelation through Scripture be expanded and include the word *holy*.

Paul Meier expressed appreciation for the streamlining of committee appointments. He also felt that on the Board of Ministerial Services it should be stated that it should be made up of both recorded ministers and laity.

Gerald Dillon spoke again of his concern for Elders that their spiritual oversight of the church be clearly stated. Others concurred with this.

A stronger statement on the right to life for *all* persons, not just the unborn child, was suggested. The meeting will be opened for further discussion later in subsequent business sessions.

All of the pension records since January 1, 1979, the date of the beginning of the NWYM Pension Plan, are tucked away in the computer's memory. Analyzing the software programs and adapting them to serve the YM needs and then programming in all of the information has taken many hours, but we feel the end result is satisfactory. What we are finding, though, is that with four people using one computer, we have to make appointments for its use. In preparation for the Yearly Meeting sessions we had to schedule work at nights or early mornings so that all of us could get our work done on the computer. We do need funds for another terminal or two.

Ruth Haldy and Beth Bagley both assisted in the business office this year. Upon their retirement, we were privileged to have Janelle Nordyke join the staff as bookkeeper three days a week and missions secretary two days a week. Janelle is very qualified for these positions, having been on the mission field in Africa with her family (the Dealys), and a bank teller prior to joining the YM staff.

Regarding the financial report, items on the first page reveal the following:

1. \$587,284 was received for the Great Commission Budget—\$56,404 (10.5%) more than last year's GC Budget income. (An additional \$6,721 was received after the closing of the books and prior to YM sessions.)
2. Churches contributed \$504,678 to the Great Commission Budget—\$37,774 (8%) more than last year.
3. Individuals, women's and men's groups, missions and evangelism YM offerings and others contributed \$82,606 to the Great Commission Budget—\$18,630 (29%) more than last year.

These are all encouraging. But even with the increased giving, we had a budget shortfall of \$31,109. While the expense deficit was not as great as the

budget shortfall, there were budgeted items that could not be met. THESE ITEMS COULD NOT BE TRANSFERRED TO RESERVE FUNDS DUE TO THE SHORTFALL:

3,906.50 for missionary literature
4,531.00 for new churches
109.48 for youth needs

The financial report reflects the revenue and expenditures of each board and department. As I repeat almost each year, if you have questions about any item, be sure to contact a board or department member concerning it. All expenditures our office makes are approved by some board or department.

These Yearly Meeting Great Commission ministries are surely going "into all the world." Your funds are supporting work in Bolivia, Peru, Mexico, Philippines, Navajo Indian work, inner city, Korean work, relief work through our own mission greenhouse project and through World Relief Commission, support for new churches in Idaho, Washington, and Oregon, youth work, ministerial education aid, publication work of George Fox Press, the *Evangelical Friend*, care of your pastors and Christian workers through assistance funds, pension, and insurances. Fifty-five different churches joining together through your Yearly Meeting to minister. May each of your churches be blessed as you continue this ministry.

■ 41. Clynton Crisman pointed out the shortfall of \$31,109, and those items that could not be transferred to Reserve Funds due to the shortfall.

■ 43. Arthur Pruitt, member of the Stewardship Board, presented the need to challenge people in our local churches to participate, as only a small percentage give the bulk of the giving in our churches. The Stewardship Board has available a series of tapes and videos for use in the local churches; these can be obtained from the yearly meeting office.

A joint project of the Department of Christian Testimonies and the Stewardship Board is a series of 13 lessons entitled "A Matter of Stewardship," prepared by Paul Anderson and Mark Kelley. These can be ordered from The Barclay Press.

Vernon Snyder from Greenleaf and Gene Mulkey of Silverton gave brief testimonials of how these educational tools were being used in their Sunday schools.

■ 44. The treasurer's report was approved. The Great Commission Budget was approved and the Stewardship Board presentation was approved.

■ 46. Assistant Clerk Lon Fendall read a paper prepared by Jack Willcuts, "A Friends Concept of Ministry—A Reaffirmation." Copies were distributed.

The Executive Council of Northwest Yearly Meeting has approved the following statement as a reaffirmation of our church on the importance of public ministry of Friends. This ministry may include men or women as stated in our *Constitution and Discipline* and further elaborated in this statement.

A FRIENDS CONCEPT OF MINISTRY—A REAFFIRMATION

It is hoped consideration will be given to this concern by each pastor and local church Spiritual Life Committee. It may be useful in membership and discipling classes.

From time to time Friends need to refocus on what we believe. This is one purpose of the Queries; it is also a reason for much of Paul's writing to the churches. Christian faith and practice in any period should be examined and experienced in the light of the Gospel, centered in Jesus Christ, our Lord, as revealed in the Holy Scriptures and by the Holy Spirit. How these convictions are expressed in relevant, practical ways, personally and corporately, merits conscientious, prayerful reflection connecting New Testament truth and our Quaker past with our present and the challenges of our future. Sometimes this examination pricks our conscience and exposes needed corrections; or, it brings affirmation and reassurance.

In doing this, it must be remembered that mere hunting for Quaker distinctives is hardly a worthwhile motive. There is no point in ferreting these out unless they grow out of the transforming experience of Christ and become clear, convincing biblical relevancies. A proper question to ask regarding our Christian, scriptural beliefs as Friends, including those relating to ministry and sexual equality, is whether they come from an authentic, obedient, growing relationship with God that is expressed redemptively in this present time. Leaning too heavily on a denominational heritage or emphasis can quickly become a lifeless echo, or some tangential direction. We must keep close to the specific, changeless teachings of Jesus.

Our basic reason for sharing this concern with each local congregation is the recognition that Northwest Yearly Meeting, and of course, each church, through the years and again in our generation is aware of various popular notions and cultural moods that equate Christian ministry with masculinity. It is a point of view, in varying modes of expression, that rests on the premise: God does not call, trust, use, or anoint women for public ministry. Once this concept is accepted, it soon restricts the eligibility for women's ministry of any sort in the church, home, and family. Once this notion becomes an issue of debate or uncertainty, or is indistinct among Friends, or in fact in any denomination, then Bible teaching becomes subject to human interpretations, often degenerating into a competitive exercise.

"The true call of God to ministry and the evidence of that call to any individual," Walter Lee has written defining Quaker belief, "should be recognized without regard to the sex of the person. In regard to mental capacities and abilities, one sex does not excel the other."

This brief admonition conforms to our Yearly Meeting *Constitution and Discipline* (pp. 24, 31), which states: "As it is the prerogative of the Great Head of the Church alone to select and call the ministers of His Gospel, so we believe that both the gift and the qualifications to exercise it must be derived immediately from Him, and that, as in the primitive church, so now also, He confers spiritual gifts upon women as well as men, agreeably to the prophecy recited by the Apostle Peter. 'It shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of my Spirit upon all flesh: and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy . . . ' (Acts 2:17)."

The next section of the Yearly Meeting *Discipline* continues: "Spiritual gifts, precious as they are . . . must be exercised in continual dependence upon

our Lord, and blessed is that ministry in which man is humbled, and Christ and His grace exalted. 'He that is greatest among you,' said our Lord and Master, 'let him be as the younger; and he that is chief, as he that doth serve . . . I am among you as he that serveth' (Luke 22:26, 27)."

This core emphasis within our church *Constitution and Discipline* is broadened by the following "doctrines and testimonies": "We believe that *all* Christians are called upon to witness by word and by deed within a sinful world, not returning evil for evil, but in Christlikeness demonstrating love, forgiveness, and the way of peace.

"We believe that in the fellowship of His body, the Holy Spirit gives to *every member* a gift to be exercised for the mutual advantage of every member in the body, and for the influence of the church upon those outside; that the ministry is such a gift given to certain ones whom God calls and ordains for a special service of leadership in His Church; that this service may be that of pastoring, teaching, evangelizing, or administration."

A Reaffirmation

Recognizing the interest shown by the youth of our Yearly Meeting, and those newer in the Christian faith whom we rejoice to find among us, it is surely important to reaffirm these clear Bible teachings as held by Friends.

To summarize the meaning and the implications of these testimonies just quoted, the following points are made for each local church and newer Christians to ponder:

1. We believe the Holy Spirit leads us in unity in these corporately held convictions. These are not impulsive, casually accepted ideas coming from the influence of some persuasive humanly developed theological polemic. Nor are they the result of a church majority vote.
2. To be a "convinced member" of the Friends Church is to recognize that God calls, uses, trusts, and anoints women or men equally to any ministry He chooses and gifts them to fulfill. To deny this as God's wise, loving plan for the church is to limit the Lord, frustrate fellow Christians, hamper the work and witness of the church. More serious, sex discrimination fails to bring glory and honor to God, who in His wisdom and love calls whom He will to the Christian ministry.
3. This position of Friends, held for more than three centuries and rooted in Spirit-led understanding of Scripture and the Gospel, is not to be ignored by any local church, elder, or pastor.

Holding Truth in Love

While Gospel truth is nonnegotiable and clear, it is to be expressed tenderly, lovingly, and with patience. No "work of grace" brings instant maturity. We are all to be adding goodness and knowledge to faith, in self-control and brotherly kindness (2 Peter 1:5-7). Christian convictions, while firmly held, are to be expressed positively, with patient affirmation, not abrasively or with hostility.

How spiritually refreshing it is to observe that God calls women and men of varying temperaments and training, demonstrating differing gifts and abilities into the ministry and pastorates! The beauty of God's creative power is that stereotypes are erased in His majestic power; women in the ministry are as different from *each other* as they are different from men, or men from men!

All this means caution, patience, trust, and love are needed as Friends from varying religious or geographic backgrounds, younger or older, find unity on this doctrine—as well as other core convictions held by Friends to be biblical.

Some men and some women will find a special leading to carry this truth ("all truth is God's truth") into other social structures around us, i.e., business, industry, government, economics, or wherever gender discrimination is perceived. When so led by God to such witness, they should be encouraged and held in our prayers that their Spirit-led efforts will be effective. As in any

involvement with the sins of the world, it is yet to be recognized that neither this concern nor any other societal problem is *the* Gospel, rather an implication of Jesus' teaching regarding Christian behavior and relationships.

Relevant Emphases

That the past decade has brought a new awareness of manifest inequalities in our society is surely recognized. This current trend coincides with a growing sensitivity toward the concerns and needs of women, many of which Friends have long recognized and tried to solve. Contemporary problems such as divorce, balancing job and family responsibilities, depression, alcohol and drug abuse, demonstrate the need for a greater concentration on women's ministries. Even denominations that do not ordain women are creating positions to meet the day-to-day needs of women.

Cannot Friends of Northwest Yearly Meeting, in our organizational structures, use our heritage and experience to confront today's world with the message of Christ that from the beginning has addressed these needs? Quakers are accustomed to "cutting across conventions"; can we not do so again if necessary?

Sexist Language

Unwittingly, we sometimes practice or drift into imprecise or even offensive discriminating use of language that dishonors God and those whom He has created to glorify and serve Him. Racist language is one. Friends long ago replaced the word "nigger" with "negro" and now "blacks." During World Wars I and II, Quakers refrained from derogatory references to "krauts" for Germans, and "japs" for Japanese.

While opposed to the radical contemporary plunges into rewriting all Bible references to God in the feminine or neuter gender, it is believed to be important to refrain from dehumanizing women with unnecessary or exclusive use of the masculine pronouns in our preaching, speaking, and writing. This is consistent with Friends insistence on "plainness of speech" and honesty.

Pastors and others are consequently encouraged to form the habit of non-sexist expression and to refrain from demeaning illustrations or references. The personhood and equal worth of each individual is important.

It is encouraging to know the present Discipline Revision Committee is already editing specific expressions and working to improve the accuracy.

Conclusion

The belief of Friends has been and continues to be that God calls those whom He chooses (John 15:16). Both Scripture and history, as well as the testimony of many among us now, clearly indicate He chooses men or women to the ministry and Christian leadership. We urge the Yearly Meeting and each local congregation, each board, the Friends Youth, George Fox College, and all of us to remain clear on this crucial truth.

We urge this conviction to be continued and taught as a normal expression of our understanding of the Gospel. It is not a cause of division, a strident crusade, nor a legalistic dogma. We encourage pastors and elders to conduct regular instruction in Friends beliefs in each church as recommended by the Long-Range Planning Committee.

Gender does not determine one's suitability for serving the Lord. "God does not show favoritism." (Acts 10:34 NIV)

■ 47. Paul Baker, associate pastor at Medford Friends Church, closed with prayer.

■ 48. The afternoon business session opened with prayer by clerk Richard Beebe.

■ 49. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as corrected.

■ 50. Paul Anderson, pastor of Clackamas Park Friends Church, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 51. The report of the Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship was given by president Beth Bagley, as follows:

Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship has had a good year. Our fall Retreat was held last September at the Red Lion Inn in Pasco, Washington. There were about 200 ladies who attended our 30th year anniversary with a theme of "Tea Cup Evangelism." Lucy Anderson from Eastern Region was our speaker. A craft sale at Retreat raised funds toward the production of children's missionary books written by Betty Hockett.

Our midyear Executive Committee meeting in February was a profitable time of making plans for the year's program.

Area Spring Rallies were held with the theme of "Standing in the Gap," and our offerings went to help support Ken and Tonya Comfort for their short-term mission service in Peru. A slide/tape presentation introduced the Comforts.

Through the year our 57 local Fellowships in Northwest Yearly Meeting contributed toward the support of the Ben Fitch family in Juli, Peru, and assistance for the Piedmont work in Portland. A total of \$32,932.38 was given for mission and home projects this year.

FWMF women read a total of 5,318 books this year. In addition several women read the Bible through.

It was a blessing to me to be privileged to attend all the Spring Rallies in the nine areas of the Yearly Meeting, as well as visiting several of the local fellowships.

We thank God for His continued help and blessings.

The women from Sprague River Friends gave a short skit depicting the use FWMF women make of so-called "trash" for craft projects.

Beth asked FWMF officers who were present to stand. The report was approved.

■ 52. Aaron Hamlin reported on the National Black Evangelical Association. He used the Scripture from Revelation 3:8, "Behold, I have set before you an open door . . ." and told of various doors that have opened to the NBEA since the founding. God is opening many doors to minister not only to the black community but to all the world.

He urged prayer for the leadership of NBEA.

■ 53. A written report for Greenleaf Friends Academy, prepared by Superintendent Jess Kennison, was distributed by Arthold Latham. He elaborated on the recent news of the huge deficit faced by the Academy and the response to the challenge to raise \$750,000 by July 4. This goal was not reached, but the board has decided to open school in the fall with a reduced faculty, and other efforts to cut expenses.

The Greenleaf Friends Academy 1984-1985 Annual Report follows:

Greenleaf Friends Academy has faced three major challenges this past school year, 1984-1985.

The first challenge was presented to the students by Ron Ferguson during "First Week" at Quaker Hill in McCall. Ron presented the thought on how we are influenced by so many people, ideas, and fads, and how easy it is to get caught up in the attitude of letting other people dictate so much to today's youth.

Ron challenged the students to let God, through His Word, give direction in making decisions and in forming attitudes about the life we are to live. "Be yourself, and be open to what God has in store for you" was the central theme.

The teachers were faced with another challenge. There are many attending the Academy because the parents want their children to be educated in the friendly surroundings of Christian education and be influenced by a Christian environment while the parents themselves have little time for Christianity. They expect the Academy to do it all with little help from home. The broken home situation is another reason we are receiving students. Because of our Christian influence and positive attitude, many parents feel we can help restore what has been lost in a broken-home situation. So there has been a challenge for teachers to meet the needs of so many students and some parents.

The parents, alumni, and friends of the Academy were all faced with a tremendous challenge at Graduation Day, on June 2. That challenge was to raise \$750,000 by July 4 of this year. Thirty-two days was a short time to raise that kind of money in this day and age. However, if we fell short it would be difficult to open school this fall. July 4 was rally day.

On July 4 we had received \$350,000, which was short of our goal. The Board of Directors had some hard decisions to make. Could Greenleaf Academy continue to operate even though the total debt was not paid?

After much prayer and discussion, the board went on record to operate the Academy, but not as usual.

A reorganization of the board is taking place, with a five-member finance board to oversee the financial operation. All monies spent must be approved by this board, which is dedicated to see that we live within our budget so we will not see a debt structure get out of control again. This finance board is made up of proven business people. I feel confident this new board will make the difference in operating in the black or not operating at all.

Some of the information available to the board when the decision was made to open for school this fall includes assets for which the cash has not reached the office: Shares in Hidden Paradise Ranch, a limited partnership in a company that plans to buy out the partners, and a professional firm committed to raise \$100,000 through corporate and foundation giving. Also, a recruitment director for increased enrollment is being sought.

How else could we react to the encouragement generated by people all over the U.S. who have come to our aid with gifts ranging from one dollar to thousands?

Please continue to remember the Academy in your prayers. Pray for our students and their families, our teachers and office staff, and the incoming students.

Thank you so much for the prayer and financial support you have given us this past year. We are expecting great things to happen this coming year at Greenleaf Friends Academy.

Prayer was urged for the board, students, volunteers, staff, and donors.

The report was approved.

- 54. The meeting was again opened for discussion and questions on the *Discipline* revision.

Harold Ankeny spoke of the need for assignment of responsibility to a person from each local church to submit names for the Memorial Service at Yearly Meeting.

He also felt that Items 9 and 10 on page 25 regarding New Areas and New Yearly Meetings should come under the section Organization of the Yearly Meeting (Page 27).

He suggested that other forms of media besides printing should be listed in the Media Commission.

Roger Sargent expressed a concern that pastors be permitted to review the new Faith and Practice as well as the Representatives, that they might have valuable input.

Gerald Dillon questioned some of the wording under Marriage Ceremonies, especially the words "Friends should not be in bondage to a priestly type of ceremony."

A stronger statement on the right to life for all people—unborn, young and old—was again urged.

- 55. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Alice Maurer.

- 56. Geraldine Willcuts opened the session with prayer.

- 57. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

- 58. Kenneth Royal, pastor of Peninsula Friends Church, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

- 59. The Spiritual Life Board with Roy Clark as clerk gave the following report:

In perusing the reports of the "state of the church" from the local Spiritual Life Committee chairmen, we are impressed with the general spirit of optimism that is evident. While we often get our attention on negative things such as declining membership, budget deficits, and financial problems, we forget that God is working in our churches and most are seeing spiritual growth.

The reports are read and studied prayerfully, and intercession made for the shared concerns from each meeting. We rejoice in the reports of victories won and answers to prayer in the churches. Especially noted are the many reports of outreach ministries at the local level: nursing home services, prison evangelism, food distribution, and social service ministries in the local communities.

One cause for rejoicing is the report of 86 young people in the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting who are expressing a call or leaning toward Christian service vocations: pastoral ministry, missions, youth ministry, music, or Christian teaching. This is evidence of the working of the Holy Spirit in our meetings. These will be listed and referred to the boards and departments for follow-up.

One of the most frequently mentioned prayer concerns in the reports was the need for deeper commitment of church members. The permissive philosophy of our age has crept into the church. Friends seem to be placing God and His work on the periphery of their lives. This is evident in spasmodic attendance, vacancies in serving positions in the church, and financial difficulties reflecting a lack of tithing and faithful stewardship. It reflects the great need for revival and spiritual renewal in the Yearly Meeting.

May we rejoice in what God is doing. And may we all join in a great spirit of prayer for spiritual revival during the coming year.

Linda Ostrin presented the following report for the *Fine Arts Department* of the Spiritual Life Board:

The Fine Arts Department met on July 29, 1985, with Dennis Hagen, John Bowman, and Linda Ostrin in attendance.

Appreciation was expressed to John Bowman for planning and coordination of the music during the Yearly Meeting sessions (including specials, song leaders, and accompanists). We also acknowledged his sensitivity to the time requirements needed for business matters.

Following contact made by Jim Teeters of Kent Friends Church department members met with Dan Vaisanen to introduce him to the certification process. In an effort to inform the local churches further about the certification process, we hope to have a paragraph about Certification of Music Ministers included in

the letter sent to local churches by the Department of Ministry detailing the Certification of Ministers process.

Budget for this year has been received in the amount of \$300. From this amount funds will be used for two projects: first, a series of 12 bulletin inserts on hymnody will be developed and tested for use throughout the Yearly Meeting. These will focus on informing/educating the local church on the rich heritage of hymns, both their scriptural and historical background.

Second, a seminar will be scheduled to coincide with the Midyear Board Meetings to involve a music representative from each local church and focus on enhancing the music program on the local level in the areas of worship and hymnody. Friday evening would be a fellowship time of singing, and Saturday would feature two workshops.

Dennis Hagen asked to be released from the position of clerk for this department due to involvements that may prevent his attendance at meetings. It was determined that Linda Ostrin and John Bowman will share the duties of clerk for the coming year.

Reporting for the *Department of Peace Testimonies*, Ralph Beebe distributed the following written report:

This year the Department made an attempt to contact every person in Northwest Yearly Meeting who is of immediate draft age with an offer to provide biblical counseling on issues having to do with military service and peace. We endeavored to follow Christ's clear principles as understood by Friends, and in so doing have had several contacts with young people. However, the percentage of response to the 350 mail contacts was very poor.

We also supplied materials to the pastor and at least one additional person in all NWYM churches, encouraging them to contact their young people with Christ's claims regarding this testimony. In addition, we offered to hold workshops or seminars, speak in morning worship or Sunday school classes, and do anything else that would be helpful in informing our members of Christ's teaching and assisting young conscientious objectors to have documented materials in the Yearly Meeting files in order to quickly establish their legal position in the event of a draft.

Our most exciting activity this year has been to assist in the implementation of the new George Fox College Center for Peace Learning. This center, under the full-time direction of Lon Fendall, will provide a significant boost in NWYM's attempts to educate people in our churches on issues of international and national importance. It will also provide an opportunity for our membership to develop conflict resolution skills that will be helpful in intrachurch conflicts relating to property, family problems, and personality conflicts.

The department is making available copies of the booklets *Waging Peace* and *The Bible and War* and many offset materials free of charge to anyone who will make good use of them in studying the biblical position on war. They are available at the Department of Peace Testimonies table or by contacting the Yearly Meeting office or Ralph Beebe at George Fox College.

Ralph introduced Lon Fendall, director of the new Center for Peace Learning. Lon reported that they are just in beginning stages of the center. He had a class at Tween Camp at Twin Rocks in July on Peace Learning, and also one for the youth here at Yearly Meeting. The establishment of the Center at GFC is not just to inform Quaker students, but those from other denominations as well, about what Christ taught about peacemaking.

Lon gave a slide presentation that included testimonials from people in various walks of life—school administrators, a county commissioner, a state representative, and college students as to the impact they believe the Center for Peace Learning can have.

Earl Perisho reported for the *Department of Evangelism* of the Spiritual Life Board.

Dreams are the "stuff" this world is made of and seldom are there significant things accomplished unless we dream great dreams.

Quaker Hill Conference Center in beautiful McCall, Idaho, became the setting for the Evangelism Department's Fall Retreat, where formal agendas were discarded and we were confronted with one all-encompassing question: "What do you think God has for us in growth as a Yearly Meeting?" Out of the laughter, tears, and prayer of those hours, we dared to believe God for one new church per area per year for the next five years. We knew that was ambitious dreaming . . .

We also knew that in order to do that we would need vision, people, strategy, time, and dollars. We considered the dream to be impossible unless we had specific help with the strategy and oversight and also real assistance in "birthing" the vision in our local churches.

Concurrently, we had become aware of Rick Hunt, a successful management consultant for Hewlett-Packard who had helped plan and strategize for East Boise Friends Extension Church and who was interested in helping the Yearly Meeting in the same areas of critical planning and strategy. On July 1, Rick Hunt came on board as our employee/consultant for two years.

Also a multimedia presentation was professionally done to take to our churches for showing a successful church-planting endeavor and inspiring vision. This past Sunday evening was the premiere showing of that presentation for the entire Yearly Meeting.

We sense a growing optimism and urgency that says we must grow or we shall die.

We hope and pray that all of our churches and constituents will see this media presentation and that each local church shall ask God about its own part in "reaping the harvest."

We praise God for other very specific encouraging signs of health this year, to name some:

- East Boise* launching and nearing completion of a large, new additional facility to house its growing church family and activities.

- Silver Valley's* dramatic life-changing conversions and present attendance of around 60.

- An inspired number of people in *Roseburg*, meeting under the shepherding of South Salem.

- Vancouver's* enthusiasm to cultivate the Fisher Road area for prospective nucleus families.

- A viable *Hispanic* ministry in Newberg and an interest in and the beginning of a *Hispanic* ministry in Hillsboro.

- Likewise, the lively activity of God's Spirit in places like *Twin Lakes*, where lives and bodies are being healed.

It is marvelous to become newly aware that God's Spirit is as viable and real today as He was in Century One!

However, not all of the Department's and Administrative Committee's agendas have been easy. Extension Church budgets seem to have a way of coming "unglued." Also, we had to close the East Wenatchee Church, which was a disappointment to many of us.

In closing, we feel that this shall be a year of setting strategy, developing leadership, and generating vision. Please pray and ask God to help you do your part to make Northwest Yearly Meeting more useful than ever as God's tool in evangelizing our world.

MEDIA BOARD

- 60. Barry Hubbell, clerk of the Media Board (formerly the Publication Board) presented a printed report.

The *Evangelical Friend* magazine, the publication that unites the Evangelical Friends Alliance with inspiration and information, continues but will soon have new leadership with the announcement of the naming of Lon Fendall as editor starting January 1. He currently is serving as associate editor with outgoing editor Jack Willcuts, who cannot be praised enough for his years of leadership and devotion to the success of the magazine. A readership survey is being completed and will be useful in setting future directions for the magazine.

Barclay Press, the Yearly Meeting's printing and publishing house, has a new general manager with the selection of Bryan McClelland. Formerly with Gospel Light Publications and the owner of his own design/graphics firm, he has taken strong leadership under guidance of the three-year-old Barclay Press Board, which continues to deal with the challenges of budgets, staffing, space and equipment requirements. After careful study, approval has been given for a limited remodeling of the present building to allow for greater efficiencies and better working situation. However, this is seen as only a short-range solution, with further study of long-range needs in progress.

Now two years old, this new fund has seen success with the publishing of the first book, *Why Friends Are Friends*, written by NWYM Superintendent Jack Willcuts. The fund continues to grow with another new book in preparation: *A Part of My Heart Left Here*, by Don Green, edited by his mother, Mary Green. The fund is maintained and grows through contributions of Barclay Press, from proceeds from the sale of previously published material, and from the gifts of persons interested in the sharing of the Gospel through publications. Those interested in promoting Friends distinctives and in sharing the "Good News" in print are encouraged to consider their financial support of this fund.

The Media Board, with the much-appreciated assistance of member Roy Gathercoal, has produced a new 17-page advisory on "The Church and Copyright." It is being given to the pastor and clerk of each church for circulation within that church. Although not a legal document it does give specific guidelines about copyright provisions.

Planning continues for a conference of those interested in writing. Tentative plans are for a winter (perhaps late January) conference in Idaho. Ed Higgins is heading a committee to develop further plans. Information/publicity will be circulated within the churches.

After 15 years of devoted service—and countless hours of his time—Charles Beals has retired from the position of NWYM Archivist. At this report his replacement has not been named. The Archives continue to be located in Sutton Hall on the George Fox College Campus.

This vital service and repository for the Yearly Meeting needs both volunteers (who can assist on a continuing basis) and contributions of items of historical nature—church documents, records, photographs, etc.

Barry introduced Bryan McClelland, general manager of Barclay Press, who gave a brief testimony of his conversion as a child, and his call to serve God in the field of Christian publishing.

He introduced the staff of The Barclay Press.

A plaque was presented to Dick Eichenberger commemorating his 20 years of service at The Barclay Press.

Bryan spoke of the progress of The Barclay Press and his hopes and dreams for increasing the publishing arm of the church. By means of visual aids, he introduced recent books published and those to be published soon.

Approved.

- 61. The report from Western Evangelical Seminary was given by Dr. William Vermillion, acting dean of the seminary. He announced the retirement of Dr. Leo Thornton as president effective June 30, 1986. A presidential search committee is now at work, with Friends represented by Dr. Lee Nash.

He reported that despite some financial problems, the seminary is looking forward to a good school year, with some 70 new students expected to enroll. They expect a total enrollment of around 175-180.

Western Evangelical Seminary is still concerned with the training of pastors, and 86 percent of its graduates still go into full-time Christian service.

- 62. The business session adjourned with prayer by Roy Clark.

Thursday, August 1, 2:15 p.m.

- 63. The afternoon business session opened with prayer by Raelene Fendall.

■ 64. Dale and Deloris Field of Friends Bible College were introduced, and Dale brought greetings from the college and the president, Robin Johnston. He also brought greetings from former pastor Glenn Leppert, who has joined their staff as registrar, and greetings from Bruce Hicks, academic dean of FBC.

- 65. Van Ernst of the Friends World Committee for Consultation, Section of the Americas, brought greetings.

- 66. The minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved.

- 67. The following resolutions from the Department of Peace Testimonies were read:

Recognizing the mandate of Christ to be peacemakers, not merely protesters, we in Northwest Yearly Meeting commit ourselves to seeking opportunities to be God's tools of peaceful reconciliation among persons, groups, and nations. We pledge to support the new George Fox College Center for Peace Learning as an educational vehicle in this mission.

We affirm the Friends belief that God is our defense and deplore the continuing buildup of armaments, especially by the Soviet Union and the United States, resulting in the proliferation of conventional and nuclear weapons throughout the world. We rejoice in God our true Lord and deliverer and reject these "gods of metal" that demand our loyalty and drain our resources.

Northwest Yearly Meeting gratefully acknowledges the efforts of those senators and representatives who led in the passage of legislation establishing a United States Peace Institute. However, the President failed to appoint the Institute's Board of Directors before the deadline of April 1, as written into the legislation. We urge the President to proceed with the naming of members to the Board of Directors, and thereby allow the institute to function as prescribed by law.

Resolved, that Northwest Yearly Meeting reaffirm its support of legislation that would establish a "Peace Tax Fund."

Bills have been introduced in both the House and Senate to allow conscientious objectors to designate a portion of their taxes for a "Peace Tax Fund." These funds would correspond to the portion of federal income taxes used for military purposes. To qualify, one would be required to satisfy the criteria established in the law and the courts for conscientious objector status.

This legislation has received growing support in Congress, but further progress may depend upon the extent to which congresspersons are encouraged by their constituents. Friends in Oregon are reminded that Senator Robert

Packwood is chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and in that capacity has a great deal of personal discretion in advancing or blocking this legislation.

Friends in Northwest Yearly Meeting are pleased that the National Association of Evangelicals, of which they are members, has in the last year established a new program dealing with peace and security issues.

We urge that its programs be carefully developed on the basis of thorough Christ-centered, biblical, and historical scholarship reflecting all Christian views on these issues, thereby providing a basis for peacemaking that will apply to evangelicals no matter what their church tradition. We recommend that such centers of research and teaching as the George Fox College Center for Peace Learning be called upon in the further development of this program.

In the last year the cycle of violence and suspicion has tightened in Central America, and there is mounting tension between the United States and the government of Nicaragua. Thousands have suffered and died in these conflicts. Northwest Yearly Meeting opposes the current emphasis on military rather than diplomatic solutions, and calls upon the United States government for a dramatic decrease in military involvement and increase in economic aid.

In minute 61-85 the Department of Evangelism took minuted action to approve the McCall, Idaho, mission point as an Extension Church of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

- 75. The following letter from the Department of Evangelism was read:

The Department of Evangelism wishes to take this opportunity to express its deep appreciation for the work of Earl Perisho as the chairman of the department for the past several years. Earl evidenced a very keen discernment of the work of the department and was most efficient in the handling of the business,

not only in regular sessions, but in the great amount of extra time required in Executive Committee meetings, and in working in a number of problem areas.

Earl's wisdom, patience, and kind directness in dealing with situations that arose have been greatly appreciated by the members of the department and by those with whom he has conferred in the various churches involved.

The members of the department wish him only the best in his continued work in the church.

Clerk Richard Beebe expressed appreciation for the work of Earl Perisho for the entire Yearly Meeting.

- 76. Walter Lee expressed appreciation to the Yearly Meeting for the discounts offered this year to those coming from a distance.

- 77. The Memorial Service began with the singing of the chorus of "Because He Lives" and "Great Is Thy Faithfulness" led by Scotty Clark.

Earl Geil read Revelation 22:1-7, and spoke briefly concerning his father-in-law, Joseph Reece, now in his 90s and his attitude toward life and death as he nears the end of his life. Earl used the illustration of homing pigeons and likened them to a Christian life.

Linda Nixon and Glenn Armstrong read a list of the names of two ministers, Gladys Cook and George Moore, and 47 other members who have passed away this past year.

Written memorials were read for Homer Hester, Irene Choate, Pheba Frazier, Gladys Cook, Elma Perisho, Lawrence Roberts, Florence Mueller, Florence Nelson, Gertrude Cook, Gertrude Perry, and George Moore.

Richard Edmundson brought special music.

Several expressed appreciation for the lives of those who have preceded us to heaven.

The Memorial Service closed with the singing of "It Is Well with My Soul." Glenn Armstrong led in prayer.

Friday, August 2, 8:30 a.m.

- 78. Martha Goldenstein led in prayer.

- 79. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

- 80. Earl Perisho, representative-at-large for Northwest Yearly Meeting to the Evangelical Friends Alliance, brought the report from EFA. The following printed report was distributed:

The Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council met in annual session, January 14-17, 1985, in Denver, Colorado. They gathered for a precious time of worship and consideration of concerns and programs.

The Executive Committee and each commission gave consideration to their areas of ministry and presented recommendations, which were then considered and acted on by the full Coordinating Council.

Following are some of the highlights from those sessions and subsequent developments.

Publications

Lon Fendall was appointed associate editor of the *Evangelical Friend* magazine effective July 1, 1985, and editor effective January 1, 1986. Jack Willcuts's retirement from the editorship of the magazine will become fully effective when Lon assumes full responsibility in January of next year. The Publications Commission stressed the need for continued broad support of the magazine if it is to remain an effective ministry across EFA.

Missions

David and Joyce Byrne, pastors of the Urbana, Ohio, Friends Church in Eastern Region, were placed under appointment as EFM missionaries to Mexico City effective July 1, 1985. Due to the timing of their appointment it was necessary to raise the first six months of their support outside the regular budget process. It was decided that the annual Easter Missions offering sponsored by the Education Commission would be used for this purpose. It is gratifying that many churches responded and \$29,751.62 was raised in this manner.

Support of the proposed new mission field in Rwanda, Africa, has been strong with over \$75,000 of the \$100,000 necessary committed by the time of the Coordinating Council sessions and the full amount committed at this time.

It was decided to intensify the search for qualified personnel to launch this work and at the present time, possible candidates have been located and we await permission to begin work in the country.

Education

A second book in the series of Friends missionary biographies written by Betty Hockett, entitled *What Will Tomorrow Bring?* and featuring the life and ministry of Ralph and Esther Choate is now available for purchase. A new educational children's video is also available.

Family Life

A broadly based ministry to families is being developed among Friends. Dr. Bob Medford has now been named director of Family Ministries for Friends.

Ministers Conference

The Third National Friends Ministers Conference was held May 2-6, 1985, in Chicago, Illinois, and proved to be an excellent and inspiring gathering.

Approved.

■ 81. A minute of service for Oscar and Ruth Brown was read. Oscar will be the morning inspirational speaker at the yearly meeting sessions of Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region.

■ 88. The Executive Council recommended that Quentin Nordyke be extended a call as executive secretary for July 1, 1985, to June 30, 1987.

■ 89. The Executive Council recommended that the salary and housing for the executive secretary for July 1, 1985, to June 30, 1986, be \$23,500, plus benefits.

Approved.

■ 90. The meeting was opened for discussion on the position paper read earlier in the sessions (see Minute 46) entitled "A Friends Concept of Ministry—A Reaffirmation." In response to a question regarding background and reasoning behind the preparation of this paper, the clerk reminded us that historically Quakers have encouraged women to take leadership roles in the church. In recent years there are those who believe that women have not been encouraged as much as previously to accept church leadership. Concerns began to emerge that more emphasis be placed on the role of women in the church. As a result the Task Force on Women developed. The executive committee in deliberation, after considering communications from various churches and individuals, decided to develop a statement concerning Women in the Ministry, and Jack Willcuts was assigned the task of writing a position paper.

Several expressed appreciation and satisfaction with the paper as presented.

Alice Maurer expressed a concern regarding the title, and felt it was not descriptive of the content. She felt it should be "Women in the Ministry." Others concurred with this.

The paper was approved and the change of title was approved.

■ 102. Richard Beebe, clerk, spoke of appreciation for all who use their gifts for the furtherance of the Gospel through Northwest Yearly Meeting. We all have a place of service. We have had heroes of the faith who are now gone. We praise God for our new ministers and others taking leadership roles, but we who are older still need to do our part and not expect them to carry the load alone. A time of open worship followed. Richard Beebe closed the worship time with prayer.

■ 103. Ralph Greenidge was introduced and expressed appreciation for the prayers of Northwest Yearly Meeting as he and his wife were on a mission to New York City.

■ 104. William Thomas brought greetings from the Friends Mission in Chiquimula, Guatemala.

■ 105. A communication from the Discipline Revision Committee read:

Dear Friends:

During the sessions of the Yearly Meeting the draft of the new *Faith and Practice* [distributed earlier to all Representatives and Executive Council Members] has been studied thoughtfully both by the Representatives and by other Friends, with opportunity for discussions in workshops and with committee members individually. We have done our best to listen sensitively to suggestions for change and to incorporate them when we thought it right and appropriate.

We are pleased that the Representatives have approved the draft, along with a number of changes helpfully proposed during these sessions. The Representatives came to unity with an evident sense of the power and blessing

of the Lord. We present to the Yearly Meeting for its consideration and approval as first reading, therefore, this *Faith and Practice* and its accompanying list of changes.

If the Yearly Meeting approves this new book of discipline for first reading, we ask for funds sufficient to make copies available to each local church for reproduction and dissemination among its members. We have a target date of November 1 for making the corrected copy available to the local churches. We request that responses to the committee be made in writing by April 1, 1986, and that these responses as much as possible reflect study by local churches and Yearly Meeting organizations. Consonant with the enabling action of the Yearly Meeting in 1984, we ask that sufficient funds be available for the printing and distribution of these master copies to the local churches and other organizations.

This study has pointed up a concern for the Areas, that they might function more effectively. We feel others than this committee must address the issue. It might well be assigned to the Council of Elders if the new structure is approved.

In many ways this revision study has enabled many of us to gain new understanding of who we are as a people of God, and how we work together. We think the whole process will lead to a new commitment for the spread of the Gospel, for the exaltation of Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, and for new confidence in our Quaker heritage.

■ 106. The following recommendations from the Representatives was read:

The 1985 Northwest Yearly Meeting Representatives, after prayerful consideration and careful examination, recommend the proposed *Faith and Practice*, with approved changes, to the Yearly Meeting for approval.

We recommend that the Discipline Revision Committee be allowed to continue to make editorial changes without changing the substance of the document and the document still be allowed to be presented for a second reading next year. Friends should endeavor to have all recommended changes made before the document is printed for distribution.

■ 107. Printed copies of proposed changes in the new *Faith and Practice* were distributed, and Arthur Roberts reviewed portions orally. The revised *Faith and Practice* to be sent to Representatives will include these proposed changes.

Paul Cammack spoke concerning page 7, #3, regarding "God's Revelation in the Scripture," and read his statement:

We believe the *Holy Scriptures* in their *entirety* were given by divine inspiration and are *infallible* and *authoritative in all matters addressed*. They are the divinely authorized *record of God's Word* and are therefore the outward test and final authority of faith and practice. The Holy Spirit is the true interpreter, both for the individual and the Church, and does not lead persons or groups contrary to the teaching of the Scriptures.

This was submitted as a possible alternative to the revised statement on page 7, "God's Revelation in the Scripture," which reads as follows:

3. GOD'S REVELATION IN THE SCRIPTURES.

We believe the Scriptures were given by inspiration of God and are the divinely authorized record of the covenant acts of God. They set forth essential Christian doctrines and those moral principles by which human life should be regulated. The Holy Spirit is the true interpreter, both for the individual and for the Church. The Scriptures are the outward test of faith and practice; the Spirit does not lead persons or groups contrary to their teachings. (pp. 11, 27)

There was considerable discussion regarding the choice between these two statements.

Arthur Roberts read a statement previously given to the Representatives regarding the rationale of the current wording of the section on "God's Revelation in the Scriptures." These are:

1. Our statements stay within the limits of what the Scriptures themselves say about their inspiration and about their function (see 2 Timothy 3:13-17).

2. Our statements are evangelical, that is, they point to the saving acts of God and affirm the unity of God's revelation. They point beyond themselves, to Christ, to redemption.

3. Our statements reflect historic and continuing Quaker insights about the relationship of the Holy Spirit in respect to the Scriptures, the Church, and the individual. Such insights are a significant part of the Quaker Awakening. We should cherish them as the Lutherans cherish an emphasis upon grace.

4. Our statements have been well-tested over more than three centuries, first by Ranterism, second by Unitarianism, and third by modernism. They have weathered the storm.

5. Our statements set forth the Scriptures themselves as authority in respect to faith and practice rather than the doctrinal interpretations drawn from them. We bring our systems of interpretation to the Scriptures, not the Scriptures to the systems.

6. Our statements are conducive to evangelical unity because we can bring our differing interpretations to a common test. We have a Gospel order which does not prejudge different interpretations of the Bible. (For example, the Song of Songs [Song of Solomon] was allegorized both by Jewish and Christian theologians because they "prejudged" its meaning either from cultural bias or to "protect" its spirituality. More recent evangelical scholarship has removed this culturally conditioned overlay.) The Scriptures are inspired but our illuminations are not; therefore we continually test our varying interpretations by the Scriptures.

7. Our statements trust the Holy Spirit, who gave forth the Scripture, to make the biblical word powerful and effective *in spite* of the human limits of understanding, *in spite of* improbable interpretations in vogue (e.g. dispensationalist interpretation of the parables).

8. This trust in the Holy Spirit enables us also to accept the variety of forms by which the Scriptures reveal truth. People can be so concerned to prove that the Bible teaches truth that they ignore *how* the Bible teaches truth. It is a principle of logic (evidenced in court experience) that variations in the details of testimony by witnesses *strengthen* their common and central testimony whereas unvarying interpretations *weaken* it (collusion is suspected). Overconcern to square up everything in the Bible leads to a weakened view of inspiration and a diminishment of biblical authority (a problem arising out of inerrancy discussions).

Walter King expressed a concern about the seeming lack of consensus regarding this section. He led us in prayer.

Many spoke on this issue.

The question of whether we can accept the full document as first reading was presented. It was pointed out that portions can be approved as first reading, and other portions held for modifications next year. Certain procedures in the new *Faith and Practice* are necessary for the operation of the Yearly Meeting.

Several spoke in favor of accepting this as first reading of the new *Faith and Practice*. The clerk asked for approval of this as first reading, with approved changes, and special attention to the section "God's Revelation in the Scriptures."

Approved.

■ 108. Report from the Epistle Committee on epistles received and the epistle prepared by this committee to be sent to other yearly meetings. A youth epistle was also read.

This year we received some 40 epistles from Friends yearly meetings and organizations around the world. It is encouraging to see that the Society of Friends at large continues to wrestle with the twin concerns of spiritual vitality and meaningful social outreach. The epistles are available for your perusal in the lobby, but the following are a few excerpts as a sample of "Friendly" epistles:

Friends from The Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region wrote about their sessions: Our hearts were uplifted from the beginning with the realization that we can and do have a 'Faith *for* the Future'—not just a 'Faith *in* the Future'.

From North Pacific Yearly Meeting: We bring to all of you the plea repeated throughout our gathering: To help end the tensions and terror that are enslaving and killing the people of Central America. We have hope that, holding both the oppressed and the oppressors in the Light of Love, this can happen.

From Ireland Yearly Meeting: In a world full of violence and terror, Quakers have a message of hope—that Christ has come to give the everlasting gospel to the people Himself. He is present and active in the hearts of individuals who gather in His name.

From New Zealand Yearly Meeting: The relation between the inward and the outward life is central. It is from our beliefs that our actions flow As we seek consensus on difficult issues, we are reminded of the words of Caroline Fox: "Live up to the Light thou hast, and more will be granted thee."

From Wilmington Yearly Meeting: Morning Bible meditations were given by Tom Mullen, Dean of the Earlham School of Religion, based upon the book of Mark, using the topics, "Jesus Confronts Us," "Jesus Calls Us," and "Jesus Challenges Us." He stressed the need for joy in our human relationships. He said to follow Jesus is to be singled out and that God gives us only tasks that we can do.

From the Friends United Meeting Triennial Sessions, held last August, we were reminded of the words of John Greenleaf Whittier:

To do Thy will is more than praise,
As words are less than deeds,
And simple trust can find Thy ways
We miss with chart of creeds.

Friends from North Carolina Yearly Meeting left us with a penetrating query: "Do we have the passionate burning fire within our souls to help others to meet Jesus Christ and to meet human needs all about us?"

And Friends from Central America reminded us of the need for peace as well as its true source in Jesus Christ: We believe firmly that everyone must be prepared for the "Day of the Lord," and until it comes we have the tremendous responsibility of presenting the message of salvation in Jesus Christ, Who came to earth and announced peace to those who receive Him. This peace is not a political peace, but rather a spiritual peace which must come first. The security that one is right with God is most important.

Northwest Yearly Meeting, Eighth month, 2, 1985, sent the following epistle:

To Friends everywhere,

We greet you with the love and peace of our common Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. John Woolman wrote in his journal: "Wherever men [and women] are true ministers of Jesus Christ, it is from the operation of the Spirit on their hearts, first purifying them and thus giving them a feeling sense for the conditions of others."

We have experienced this purifying and empowering work of the Spirit amongst us this week, and it is in this frame of mind that we remember and uplift our Quaker sisters and brothers around the world.

Our morning and evening worship sessions this year have been especially filled with a tender sense of God's presence. As Dennis Kinlaw, former president of Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky, spoke, our hearts were often melded

together in humble adoration to the One in whom we live, move, breathe, and have our being. There was hardly a session—morning or evening—in which there was not a number of seekers praying at the altar at the close of the meeting. This served both as a symbol of kneeling before the feet of God and as a statement to the rest of the gathering that one was serious about his or her pursuit of God. Especially precious was the Tuesday evening meeting in which Dr. Kinlaw spoke incisively about the servant role of Jesus and invited us to imitate our Lord by pouring out our lives in servanthood to God and neighbor. Many dozens came forward that evening as an indication that this was their earnest desire.

We were also blessed by Jack Willcuts's keynote message on Sunday evening in which he posed the searching questions: "What does God want ME to do? Where is the power coming from?" NOT "where is the money coming from? Or the people, or the pastors, or the programs? But the holy, spiritual energy so that the fire kindled here in hopes and possibilities will not go out quickly but will burn, build, and brighten into a revival conflagration . . . What do we need? A new vision of the church, a great new baptism of clean hearts, purity, the promise of power received."

Among the issues discussed this session, the most involving was the discussion of our *Constitution and Discipline*, to be termed *Faith and Practice, a book of Christian Discipline*. After many fruitful hours of deliberation and prayer, the Representative Body was brought to unity by the Spirit, and the document was submitted to the business meeting for approval as a first reading. We are greatly indebted to Arthur Roberts and his committee for their fine and dedicated work. We were also made aware of another value which may even outweigh the value of the printed page. As Arthur has reminded us, "It seems that as we have examined the *Discipline* . . . it has been examining us! Through this effort we strive to capture who we are as Friends and the value of our beliefs."

Another concern was the need for intercessory prayer. We were blessed to have Dick Simmons with us, who led a week-long workshop on revival prayer. Many committed themselves to a 5:00 a.m. prayer time and other meetings for prayer, which were endowed with a powerful anointing of the Spirit. Hearts were burdened for the sinful condition of our world and nation, and we were moved to make our lives living channels of intercession in the world.

We have also caught a great vision rising from our desire to minister to the needs of a rapidly growing population in the Pacific Northwest. We are believing God for one new church per area (a total of 9 new churches) each year for the next five years. We hope this vision will become a reality with the help of Rick Hunt, a Spirit-led management consultant who challenged us with this question: "Do you believe the mission of God and the commission He has given to the church?"

We received Paul Anderson's encouraging report concerning The World Gathering of Young Friends held in Greensboro, North Carolina, last week. As a result of that gathering, we were privileged to have with us several Friends from Bolivia Yearly Meeting (INELA). These include Humberto and Petrona Gutierrez, Felix Huarina, Benjamin Huarina, Dionisio Aspi, Timoteo Choque, and David Mamani. We enjoyed their sharing in music and testimony, and our lives were enriched in getting to know them personally.

We were blessed to have with us Jaime and Lydia Tabingo, who pastor the Friends Church in Manila, Philippines; and we enjoyed the fellowship of other visiting missionaries and Friends.

We are very excited about the new *Center for Peace Learning* that is being instituted at George Fox College, and administered by Lon Fendall, a Friend who has served for several years on the staff of U.S. Senator Mark Hatfield. We invite Friends around the world to join us in this venture towards peacemaking, which is Christ-centered in its foundation and radically practical in its application.

As our sessions come to an end, we are mindful that it is also a beginning: we are now called to be stewards on the plains of that which we have received on the mountaintop. We remember Friends elsewhere in our prayers, and we invite you to do the same for us.

There is a universal law that even God cannot exempt Himself from—John 12:23, 24—"lose life to find it." We must take our hands from our lives and give them to God just as He gave His for ours.

Jesus appeared to the disciples speaking “peace” and sending them forth. Many places in John Jesus speaks of being *sent* by the Father. We are all “sent ones” if we are Christians. What Christ is to us we should be to the world.

Our greatest enemy is not position or power, but self-interest.

In verse 22 He said, “Receive the Holy Spirit.” This is the enabling of the Christian life, which does not come naturally but is the life of the Spirit. Before Pentecost the disciples believed in Jesus, but they shut themselves off from the world. After Pentecost they went out into the world. The pattern is Jesus, the provision is the Holy Spirit. Verse 23: Offer forgiveness to people through Jesus Christ. People need deliverance from sin. This is a top priority.

Humberto gave his personal testimony and spiritual background. Coming out of a communist youth organization, he was searching for spiritual truth. However, with all this security robbers still break in, planes are hijacked, and assassinations take place. Our security is in God—our safety is in Him. He will never forsake us.

Abraham had lived for 24 years with the promise God had given him but he had not seen fulfillment. When the three men visited him he recognized one as the One who had visited him before. The Lord God came to Abraham, not Abraham to God. It is interesting to note that Abraham’s and Sarah’s desire for a son came together with God’s purpose at this time. God’s purpose was greater even than their desire for an heir. God takes our minimal desires and combines them with His larger purpose—the eventual Savior for the world.

Abraham was the first one to be called a Friend of God. Jesus said, “I have called you friends . . .” God is looking for persons with whom to share friendship.

God shared with Abraham His intentions for Sodom and Gomorrah. All purposes of God hinged on Abraham’s ability to keep the line open and to be faithful. God is waiting for our intercessory prayer. We are invited by God to enter in with Christ, who makes intercession for us. There are some things God will not do by His power without our help and intercession.

We wish we could recapture the experience of the disciples on this night following the darkest events of their lives—disillusion, sorrow, misunderstanding of Christ’s purposes. All hope had been destroyed. They came together on Sunday evening and began to share their experiences on the road to Emmaus and at the tomb. Suddenly Christ appeared and they knew it was He. Unbelievable joy, perhaps guilt (Peter). Christ does not load guilt on us. He looks to the future and offers forgiveness for the past and sends us out to offer forgiveness to the world.

The disciples began to understand the cross as Jesus showed them His hands and His side. Scars and death had to do with their sin and the world. Peter speaks of this in 1 Peter 1:19.

The heartcry of the Body of Christ is the wounds and blood of Christ. Innumerable hymns have been written on this subject. All heaven looks down in wonder that God loved us so much.

Christ gave the command “So send I you.” We can expect wounds and scars if we really follow Him. We must forfeit self-interest on a cross. Paul testified “I am crucified with Christ . . .” The cross is a symbol of death to self-interest.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE 1984-1985

How do you summarize the "sophomore year" of a new coach? Wins and losses! It's not as easy to evaluate the second year of a new president. The results are not always quantifiable and the perceptions around campus probably range from "great to lousy." I try to judge my life—and certainly it is the standard for George Fox College—with "how close am I to the center of God's will?"

This year has been evidence that Lee Nash was clearly God's person to be the new Dean of the College. Several new and exciting programs have developed: the Center for Peace Learning, Juniors Abroad, Semester Calendar, and a Degree Completion Program. There has been a renewed interest in "loving God with your whole mind." Bill Green was a great academic leader for George Fox College for twelve years, and in Christian higher education for over 30 years. When Bill decided it was time for a change of pace (he is teaching Bible part-time, and is a consultant to the president), God had a person—Lee Nash. Pray for Lee as he moves into his "sophomore season."

Another observation on desiring God's will for the College is the agreement by all that WE NEED REVIVAL!! (Renewal, transformation, new lives—attitudes, works, etc., if you don't like the word revival.) God has heard the prayers of His people and in the spring of 1985 we experienced the "fresh breeze" of His Holy Spirit. It may not have been "like a mighty wind," but it was revival, and it was refreshing, and it was led by the Spirit.

Students, in small groups across campus, began praying and seeking for God's will—for their lives—for this College. In February three students came to my office and said, "We believe God is going to bring revival to campus and is going to use ordinary students (not recognized or elected leaders) to bring it about." My response was, "Praise God!" They then asked for a student chapel (Friday) and were given April 26. Four young men shared independently the message they felt the Lord had given them and then invited others to speak. Curtis Kimbrough, an outstanding athlete from Indianapolis, Indiana, spoke first of his yearning to know the truth, but his fear of asking the wrong person. The chapel continued over 2½ hours and ended with more than 60 students kneeling together for prayer. Students went to Curtis that afternoon. He asked Jesus into his life. He found the truth that sets men free.

There are many other accounts of changed lives and attitudes. Students have now established 17 action groups so they can move out and put their faith and love into "action." Yes, revival has come. Pray with us that we will not "quench the Holy Spirit" with our self-centeredness and wrong desires, and that we will not "grieve the Holy Spirit" with wrong decisions—as individuals and as a college committed to Christ.

We did not get any million dollar gifts this year. We did not see the enrollment trend reverse and start back up. We did lose some good people and some long-time friends of George Fox College. But, we did receive a fresh touch of God's Spirit. Isn't that what they call the "bottom line" in business?

ACADEMIC

New perspectives brought some exciting ideas as Lee Nash guided the George Fox College academic program in his first year as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the College.

In decisions that could be *landmarks* for the future of GFC, the College approved establishment of a Peace Learning Center, a change to a semester system of operation, a new Juniors Abroad program, and a Degree Completion Program.

Any one of the four programs by itself would be a major addition, but to develop that number of initiatives in one year is outstanding.

Center for Peace Learning. Officially started with dedication ceremonies June 1, the new Center for Peace Learning is designed as a program of learning experiences dealing with the settlement of potentially violent conflict by peaceful methods.

The primary focus will be international, but the Center will examine conflict resolution methods at other social levels in order to find effective models of reconciliation. The Center will draw significantly on the example and teaching of Christ, as emphasized by the historical peace churches and shared by many other Christians.

Change to Semesters. As a result of study throughout the year, George Fox College will change to a semester calendar operation in 1986. The change will follow 21 years of operating with a term or quarter system.

The school's calendar and curriculum will be converted to a 4-4-1 or early semester of two 15-week semesters followed by an optional May term of special courses and creative curriculum.

It is believed under a semester system the pace will be reduced for both students and faculty. This should bring more thorough scholarship with less time consumed in such matters as the beginning and ending of courses and registration. There also will be other "practical efficiencies" including less time in processing student accounts, with registration, in Bookstore orderings, and in housing, grading and advising tasks.

The semester task force recommended the change saying: "even if efficiencies do not result in actual dollars saved, they will result in less stress among personnel. Less stress translates into healthier people better able to give themselves to the task of being helpful to students."

Juniors Abroad. With the goal of enriching intercultural and international awareness of the campus community, George Fox College established a Juniors Abroad program. It will provide a three-week study tour to the Orient, Europe or Latin America to students who maintain full-time enrollment through the spring of their junior year. All air and ground transportation will be provided, with students paying for room and board at places economically arranged by the College. To be eligible for the volunteer study tour, students must intend to return to GFC to graduate. They will be allowed to coordinate other Christian mission projects while overseas. With the need for a Christian world view, this program can make a significant statement about what George Fox College values as well as be valuable to the individual students.

Degree Completion Program. With the assistance of the National College of Education in Evanston, Ill., George Fox College has tentatively approved a new degree completion program for nontraditional students—those 25 years or older with two or more years of college credit.

The program emphasizes communications, interpersonal relations and management. It includes credit for life experience, and packages the senior year in an attractive fashion for the full-time working adult. It is hoped the program will begin during the 1985-86 academic year.

With this entry into nontraditional education and external program (a Portland area classroom center will be required), it is hoped other majors might be developed and that significant portions of the program can be videotaped for distance learners.

Faculty Achievements. During the year George Fox College faculty not only fulfilled their teaching assignments in the classroom, but found time for research, writing, community and church participation, and in involvement in professional organizations and conferences.

Consider these examples: Mike Williams, assistant professor of literature and writing, was awarded a National Endowment for the Humanities grant, attending a six-week seminar; Marjorie Weesner, professor of physical education, authored an article on behavior modification ("How to Eat and Stay Thin During the Holiday Season"), published nationally in *Lady's Circle* magazine;

Arthur Roberts, professor of religion and philosophy, published a new book of poetry, *Sunrise and Shadow*; Glenn Moran, assistant professor of math education, is a member of the Newberg School Board; Mark McMinn, assistant professor of psychology, has published several papers in scholarly journals and has 400 worldwide requests for reprints for one; Edythe Leupp, professor of elementary education, was elected president of the Oregon Delta Kappa Gamma organization; Dennis Hagen, professor of music, has been active as a planner and consultant for several Oregon pageants; Tom Head, assistant professor of economics, chaired a session on economic development at the Western Economic Association convention in Los Angeles; Mike Allen, associate professor of sociology, organized and accompanied a group of 15 George Fox students on a spring break trip to Arizona where they participated in a cross-cultural experience with the Native American community.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE

Capital Campaign. Planning for a new Library/ Learning Resource Center advanced during the year with the selection of Cargill and Associates, a Fort Worth, Texas, firm, to begin a precampaign survey of the alumni and Friends of George Fox College. This is a necessary step toward deciding what should be developed and when, the costs, and resources available for this major effort.

As you may know, Shambaugh Library, constructed in 1962 and the first of our "modern-era" buildings, now is too small. To be decided is whether the present library, with 17,600 square feet, should be expanded, or completely replaced by a new building, perhaps with up to 40,000 square feet at an estimated cost of \$2.8 million. At the same time, steps must be taken to greatly expand library holdings—now just under 60,000—to an American Library Association recommendation of double that total, with a cost of up to \$1.25 million.

With a new Learning Resources Center, the present library could be re-modeled for use as a new science center, at an estimated cost of \$600,000 to \$1 million. All of these factors will be studied in the precampaign survey with the final decision made by the George Fox Board of Trustees.

Balanced Budget. For the 14th consecutive year, the College operated in the black. Assets of the College remained at about \$22.5 million during the fiscal year, with a fund balance of more than \$16 million.

Support of the annual fund, of primary importance to an independent college, set a new record as giving reached \$355,000, compared to \$319,000 the previous year. The annual fund maintains a total balanced budget by providing financial support for costs above that covered by tuition charge.

During the year the College received a \$155,000 grant from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust to assist in off-campus marketing and improvement of computerization on campus. Awarded over a two-year period, it provides about two thirds of the funds for administrative computers and software, and for a faculty loan fund for personal computers.

New Support Groups. Four new support organizations have been launched by George Fox College to channel individual interests into specific areas and programs. These new interest groups include the President's Council, the Bruin Club, Friends of the Fine Arts, and Involvement in Learning.

—President's Council. This group recognizes individuals who make a commitment to contribute annually to the current operating budget of the College. They support the President with counsel and the College with contributions, bringing their vocational and lifetime experience into the life of the College. Membership is at four levels: Associates—those who contribute a minimum of \$1,000 over a three-year period; Leadership Circle—those who contribute a minimum of \$1,000 annually; President's Roundtable—those who contribute a minimum of \$10,000 over a three-year period, and Founders—those who contribute a minimum of \$10,000 annually.

—Bruin Club. Organized to support and promote GFC intercollegiate athletics, the Bruin Club has the goal of improving GFC athletics by providing grants and scholarships, by providing funds for recruiting and special projects, and by procuring names of potential GFC student-athletes. Membership is at two levels, \$100 and \$500, with appropriate premiums and privileges for participation.

—Friends of the Fine Arts. This effort, still in its formative stages, will unite those with a common interest in the fine arts on campus—music, drama, and art. Support will come both through scholarships and promotion activities.

—Involvement in Learning. Much of this new group's efforts will come in the next few years with the anticipated capital campaign for a new or expanded Library/Learning Resources Center. The purchase of additional library holdings also is a primary goal.

Effort for Excellence. Civic, governmental, business and education leaders participated as George Fox College in March launched a new community campaign, Effort for Excellence. It replaces the previous SHIP campaigns in the city. Although fund raising for the College continues, there is renewed effort by the College "to be an integral part of building and developing Newberg." The kick-off luncheon offered attendees a talk on "How to Market a Small Business."

Tilikum Expansion. GFC's Tilikum Retreat Center improved its facilities with a \$48,000 addition to the Center's Illahee House. The expansion added new dining room space and a kitchen to the original structure, nearly doubling the seating capacity to 70 diners.

LEADERSHIP

Two persons with many ties and long-time relationships with our college constituency served their final year in their positions. Maurice Chandler, vice president for development and GFC's longest serving administrator, left the position after 19 years to take a position with a Portland-based fund-raising firm. He has been given a one-year sabbatical with the opportunity to return to the College as Assistant to the President for Planned Giving.

Ron Crecelius, perhaps one of the best-known public representatives of George Fox, left his position as chaplain, the first to hold the post. He will remain with the College in a part-time role as "Evangelist in Residence," speaking throughout the Northwest and assisting with student action groups. In recognition for his service, the College named him Chaplain Emeritus in graduation ceremonies.

Filled during the year was the position of Director of Admissions. Richard (Rick) Ulmer began duties June 1. He formerly was at Malone College as a representative of the Development Office. Previously he was at Geneva College, Pennsylvania, for five years, four as admissions counselor. He has 13 years of experience with the Young Life organization.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Fall Convocation. George Fox College formally began its 94th academic year with an October 8 convocation featuring Academic Vice President Lee Nash in his first major address after being named Dean of the College. He challenged the audience of students, faculty, staff and guests on "Loving God With Our Minds." And, he proclaimed a year-long, campus-wide theme for study meditation and discussion on the topic. "On this campus we affirm the compatibility of deep piety with serious scholarship; we believe this partnership deserves to be studied and practiced, and that to do so is to express our love for God with our minds . . ."

Christian Life Week. Veteran missionaries Norman and Mariel Cook, for 16 years in Taiwan with O.C. Ministries, and Jay Carty, former basketball player with the Los Angeles Lakers and now head of Yes Ministries, were the featured speakers for GFC's annual fall Christian Life week in October.

Parents Weekend. The fourth Parents Weekend, held in November, treated about 200 parents to special activities on Saturday following a day in the classroom Friday with their student. Special events included a College Bowl, tours, open house, and a student panel discussing "The Developing College Student."

Christian Education Conference. More than 50 workshops featuring 17 speakers were featured in the eighth annual Christian Education Conference in November. Featured speaker was Rodney G. Toews, vice president for ministry of Gospel Light Publications, from Redwood City, Calif.

Faculty Lectures. Edward Higgins, associate professor of English, gave the fall Faculty Lecture in November with the topic "Moby Dick and Quakerism: Some Speculations." The spring lecture in May featured Tom Head, assistant professor of economics. His topic was "Possibility and Actuality: The Economy of Chile Since 1970." These were the 33rd and 34th in the series started in 1955.

Missions Conference. Thirty missions representatives from 20 organizations were on campus for five days in January for the 19th annual GFC Missions Conference. Theme was "World Evangelization Crusade." The annual "Faith Promise" program as part of the conference raised funds to partially support 14 GFC students as summer missionaries around the world.

Homecoming. A College tradition is Homecoming, but this year traditions changed in the January event. The traditional Alumni Banquet, previously held for decades during graduation weekend in late May, moved to this weekend. And, it became an evening exclusively for alumni rather than those involved with graduation. For the first time, banquet attendees entered already knowing the College's 1985 Alumnus of the Year winner, announced earlier. Honored was Richard Beebe, a 1958 GFC grad, a member of the College's board of trustees since 1974, clerk of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, and the superintendent of the Crow-Applegate School District near Eugene, Ore.

Quaker Heritage Week. Doug Gwyn, clerk of the national Quaker Theological Discussion Group and pastor of the Berkeley, California, Friends Church, was speaker for the ninth Quaker Heritage series in mid-February. He spoke in chapel and in classes.

Cultural Awareness and Minority Emphasis Week. Fourteen events in four days were sponsored by the GFC Cultural Spectrum organization. Three speakers were highlighted in this mid-February event.

Staley Lecture Series. Walter Martin, radio's Bible Answer Man, and recognized authority on religions originating in the United States, was on campus in April as the Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer. His popularity both on and off campus drew nearly 500 to some evening sessions, moved to Bauman Auditorium.

Science Symposium. In cooperation with Newberg High School, George Fox College hosted the second annual Newberg Science Symposium in April with more than 200 students from the Northwest attending to present and hear research papers in the field of science and to be challenged by lectures and discussion.

Commencement. Ron Sider, president of the national Evangelicals for Social Action, and professor of theology at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, spoke for graduation ceremonies June 1. A record class of 145 received degrees. Baccalaureate speaker was Chaplain Ronald Crecelius.

Performing Arts. Music and drama brought entertainment and delight to the campus with events ranging from major musicals and theater productions to student recitals and off-campus performers. Dramatic presentations included the fall production of *The Singer, Pieces of Eight*, winter term; *The Good Doctor* in March, a Family Theater performance on the topic of generosity, then *Coyote Goes Upriver*, a national premiere, in May.

Music Theater productions drawing record audiences were the January production of *The Sound of Music* and the spring term production of *The Wizard of Oz*.

Other events included the December "Ye Olde Royal Feaste" featuring the GFC Chorale, the Spring Fine Arts Festival highlighted by an Easter evening oratorio presentation, and tours by various performing groups in the Northwest and Hawaii.

Athletics. What a year in Bruin sports! The 1984-85 year featured a national title in volleyball, the best-ever season in men's basketball with a third-place national finish, a first-ever district appearance in softball, national competitors and an All-American in cross country and track, and an Academic All-American in soccer. Add to that three Coaches of the Year in District 2 of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics—Steve Grant in volleyball, Mark Vernon in basketball, and Craig Taylor in Lady Bruin softball.

The Lady Bruins in volleyball went 30-10 on their way to winning the National Christian College Athletic Association title in Chicago. The GFC basketball men produced a 27-7 season, becoming Oregon's winningest college team at any level, the best record of any NAIA Oregon team, and finishing third in the NCCAA national playoffs in Chattanooga, Tenn.

In softball the Lady Bruins forged a 19-12 season (7-9 the year before) and reached the NAIA District 2 playoffs for the first time. In track, GFC produced an All-American as Paula Wittenberg finished second in the nation in the discus.

Soccer Bruin Joel Keith was the only player west of the Mississippi to win NAIA Academic All-American designation on a 22-member team. He had a 3.91 grade average in mathematics.
