MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1986

Monday, July 28, 10:45 a.m.

■ 1. Presiding Clerk Richard Beebe read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 94th sessions July 28, 1986, on the campus of George Fox College with the theme 'Reaching Out with Joy' as stated in the Scripture: "You shall go out in joy and be led forth in peace." (Isaiah 55:12) He led in prayer.

■ 2. The Department of Missions presentation on Sunday afternoon was approved.

■ 3. The presentation of the Department of Evangelism on Sunday evening was approved.

■ 4. The keynote message by Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts, Sunday evening, was approved as follows:

Reaching Out with Joy

It is with profound gratitude that the balanced and dedicated work of our Yearly Meeting office staff is recognized. Beatrice Goldsmith, Terri Bowen, Janelle Nordyke, and her father-in-law Quentin Nordyke are all efficient servants of the Lord, with a vision and commitment to the many ministries of NWYM. It is always a joy as well to work with our Presiding Clerk, Richard Beebe, who gives more donated time and travel to his Yearly Meeting responsibilities than you know. The relationship enjoyed with all the YM boards and departments, Friends Youth leaders, the administrators and faculty at George Fox College, and working together with all the pastors, makes this position a special privilege. My reluctance in leaving this responsibility this year is genuine, and certainly not because of any relationship problems.

In looking back across the more than 40 years we have had the opportunity to serve the Lord in NWYM in various ways, Geraldine and I are humbled and grateful for the providences of God that have been given us through our church. It has been a splendid privilege, and we are indebted to Friends of the Northwest for providing us with every opportunity one could ever imagine. God has been gracious and we have great expectations for His continued blessing upon our church in the years ahead and His guidance in our own lives as we try to use the next 40 years in Christian obedience.

Rather than going through the usual checklist of things one could recall in an annual "state of the church" review, it may be better, and briefer, to simply appropriate the expressions of Psalm 150, which is also the final Psalm in that beautiful book.

"Praise the Lord.

Praise God in his sanctuary;
praise him in his mighty heavens.

Praise him for his acts of power;
praise him for his surpassing greatness.

Praise him with the sounding of the trumpet,
praise him with the harp and lyre,

Praise him with tambourine and dancing,
praise him with the strings and flute,

Praise him with the clash of cymbals,
praise him with resounding cymbals.

Let everything that has breath praise the Lord.

Praise the Lord."

Using the exuberant lift of this song of praise, perhaps this can be the "key" note for tonight and this Yearly Meeting time. Praise the Lord for a caring, committed Christian community we call Northwest Yearly Meeting! Praise God for faithful elders, pastors, teachers, Bible study leaders, for those who love and nurture our church children in the Lord, who encourage our youth, who cultivate discipleship contacts with newer Christians. Praise the Lord for a vision for evangelism in our many ministries in Christian camps, conferences, and publications. Praise the Lord for a Spirit-led perspective from the teachings of Jesus about peace, spiritual power, and patient, consistent obedience, and praise for the Presence in our midst making it all possible.

Friends, we are living witnesses to the world of our salvation, of our beliefs, and of our relationships with God and each other. May the spirit of praise draw us closer together in unity through worship that is alive with God's loving and convicting truth. May there be a witness of righteousness arising out of this fellowship to the lost about us, and calling out a new generation of leaders.

When one reads the story of how the church began in the book of Acts, a special word is used over and over. It is a tiny word with unlimited possibilities, yet sometimes it gets lost in the pressures of church work and theology. Here it is, in Acts 13:52: "The disciples were filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit."

Joy! Joy seems to connect every incident with the next one, as a continuing characteristic of the Christian faith, in the early church. It shows up in the most unlikely circumstances—in prisons, in beatings, in persecution of all kinds. In fact, one could pass over that small word *joy* almost without noticing it if we didn't see the incredible contrasting circumstances. Joy is the heartbeat of a healthy Christian, a happy family, a true church.

This contrast, almost a paradox to those who don't understand, is seen in this description about Jesus: Because of the joy that was set before Him, He endured the cross. How can joy and Christian crosses go together? We need to consider this. Joy in persecution? Joy in hardship? Joy in sacrifice? Joy in discipline? Joy in commitment? Seeing these connections exposes the meaning, the core of our faith.

There is a word game we sometimes play called "Association." The leader says a word and you are supposed to instantly respond with the first word that pops into your mind that is associated with the word just given you by the leader. If we were to play that game tonight, in the context of our own relationship with the Lord and in this setting of our Yearly Meeting gathered this week, how many times would your first response be the word *joy*? Let's try it:

I'll give you a word to see what pops into your mind. Christianity?—Joy! Church?—Joy! Worship?—Joy! Holiness?—Joy! Tithing?—Joy! Witnessing?—Joy! Committee meetings?—(ugh) Joy? Well, matching these up in the book of Acts, it sounds like the answer bouncing back would be joy every time.

"The disciples were filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit." What were the circumstances in Acts 13? Paul and Barnabas were over in Antioch on a preaching mission. Just as things were going well, on the Sabbath "almost the whole city gathered to hear the word of the Lord"—but some religious Jewish leaders "saw the crowds, [and] they were filled with jealousy." This was a bad sign. Then, more good news: "When the Gentiles heard, they were glad and honored the word of the Lord . . ." But, it goes on, ". . . some women of high standing and the leading men of the city . . . stirred up persecution, and expelled them [Paul and Barnabas] from the region. *And the disciples were filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit.*" (Italics mine.)

The popularity poll regarding Christians and the Christian cause is always swinging up and down. For Paul and Barnabas, it dropped from the whole city turning out to hear them to being chased out of the region! Now, why is the end of the story so startlingly strange? Were the disciples filled with joy because of the turn of events? No. Because things turned out okay after all? No. They had joy because they had learned the truth of the Gospel and had the Holy Spirit in their lives.

In this we begin to see what the first church was like and what ours should be like. We see how Christians feel about life, what their basic priorities were—and it all hinges on the joy of the Holy Spirit coming and controlling us.

Simply stated as it is in the Gospel story in Acts, joy is the basic and only consistent motivation for outreach; it is the main attraction to those whose lives are empty, those who are afraid or beaten down. Christians, we see, are joyful when they don't feel like it. In spite of everything, as followers of Jesus we move joyfully on, knowing we are loved, forgiven, chosen to serve—that God is with us, and that God is good, sovereign; we are now citizens of His Kingdom.

Joy of the Holy Spirit is not the same as happiness, nor gushiness. It is not a contrived smile, a clenched-teeth optimism. It is a constant flow of the Holy Spirit coming and going out through our lives. Joy is a fruit, a manifestation of the Holy Spirit.

Why then do so few Christians exhibit joy? Is it not because we measure our joy with our circumstances, on success, on feelings and factors really unrelated? Pure, free joy can be suffocated, missed, or forgotten, with minds preoccupied with religious work, social, physical, or economic problems, even church competition.

Joy is predicted and promised long before Jesus' coming. "Behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." The promise quoted, the theme of our Yearly Meeting, "For ye shall go out with joy, and be led forth in peace," comes from Isaiah as a timeless, contemporary truth.

If this becomes a reality in our hearts, the fountain of our faith, saturating our thinking with renewed minds, shaping our attitudes and actions, churches will be renewed, revival will come, our young people will be called and sent out, Christians will be united, churches will be planted, giving will become a privilege, and we will pour forth out of our plenty.

Compared to other motivations for these often-stated church objectives, the joy of the Holy Spirit's infilling towers over all. Threats, dismal predictions and unfavorable comparisons, analysis of our weaknesses, smallness, failures and problems will not produce spiritual or numerical growth.

Have we forgotten what it feels like to be forgiven? Our future is not tied to popularity, prosperity, or protection from persecution or problems, or being always pushed along. Joy is the great motivator to prayer, inner calmness of spirit and emotions. "These things I have spoken to you," Jesus said to His disciples then, and now, "that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might

be full [or *complete*, NIV]. This was said at the same time He was explaining, "I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you. You did not choose me, but I chose you . . . to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last . . . This is my command: Love each other." (John 15)

In the following chapter, John 16, Jesus told them that they would have sorrow, but no one will take away your joy. There is more: "Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you will receive . . ." And for what reason? ". . . and your joy will be complete."

This theme of joy is expressed again in Jesus' familiar prayer in John 17. "I am coming to you now," Jesus prays to the Father, "but I say these things while I am still in the world, so that they may have the full measure of my joy within them."

The clear implications of this concept is that difficulties, struggles, challenges will be expected. "In this world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world."

Another apparent reason joy is so important then and now is that they also found joy in their fellowship. Their bonding together in love, trust in the Holy Spirit and with one another was a precious relationship. The togetherness of Christians is a conduit of joy. Binding up each others' wounds, learning to care and share was the opposite of selfishness and independence. As Christians we have each other! As churches across the YM, we have each other. The fellowship enjoyed by our pastors is a precious privilege. The bonding of our missionary council in a common calling is a tremendous strength. Joy is enhanced in the oneness with others of like precious faith. We are more than just out there fighting a common enemy, we are joined in a common cause!

This may also be shown with reference to a well-known Gospel story Jesus told. It is the story of the lost coin.

"Suppose a woman has ten silver coins and loses one. Does she not light a lamp, sweep the house and search carefully until she finds it? And when she finds it, she calls her friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost coin.' In the same way, I tell you, there is rejoicing [joy] in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents." (Luke 15:8-10)

If there is joy in heaven over one lost soul finding the Savior, should that not also be our greatest joy? When this becomes the most looked-forward-to happening in each church, the most planned and prayed for event in all we do, when we rejoice more over even one lost neighbor, child, or friend finding the Savior, it will shape the character of our worship, our church work, our giving priorities.

Joy comes from exalting not a person, not an idea, not some tangent concern, not a denomination, but from exalting the Lord Jesus Christ. With the inner heartthrob of joy, Holy Spirit inspired and empowered—unassociated with circumstances, situations, or a problematic world—joy is the identifiable evidence of Christ living in us. A joy-filled life always demands an explanation, so we can witness to those God has made ready to listen while also bearing with one another in love and trust.

Joy is the mark of the new life. The 115th Psalm 12-18 gives us these words of confidence: "The Lord remembers us and will bless us . . . He will bless those who fear the Lord—small and great alike. May the Lord make you increase, both you and your children. May you be blessed by the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth . . . Praise the Lord."

■ 5. A letter of greeting was read from London Yearly Meeting.

■ 6. A letter of greeting from Friends World Committee for Consultation, Section of the Americas, was read.

■ 7. A traveling minute for Arthur and Fern Roberts, which had been prepared in May 1986, was read. Arthur and Fern visited Friends in Norway and Sweden during June. Three responses to their traveling minute were read.

■ 8. Jack Willcuts introduced Harry Mosher of Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region, who is representing the International Friends Conference on Evangelism, to be held in Guatemala in November 1987.

■ 9. Jack also introduced Clara Sinclair, Western Representative of Friends World Committee for Consultation.

■ 10. New pastors coming to Northwest Yearly Meeting from other yearly meetings were introduced by Jack Willcuts. They are Tim and Frieda Henley to Tigard Friends from Indiana Yearly Meeting; Clyde and Mavis Hartman to Rosedale Friends from Iowa Yearly Meeting; Don and Nancy Lamm to Greenleaf from Southwest Yearly Meeting (formerly California Yearly Meeting); and Keith and Priscilla Lamm to North Valley Friends, also from California. He also introduced Jon and Judi Fodge, who had gone to Peninsula Friends earlier in the year.

■ 11. Arthur Roberts commented briefly on their visit to Norway and Sweden in June, and reported they had been graciously received and had been able to minister to some with needs.

Reporting as clerk of the Discipline Revision Committee, Arthur said they had met and seriously considered suggestions made by individuals and churches after the publication of the revisions in November, 1985. He reviewed the process of revision as stated in Minutes 16, 105, and 106 of the 1985 Minutes. Suggested changes were summarized and cataloged, then circulated among members of the committee. The document to be considered by the Yearly Meeting was then produced. A limited number of copies of the draft of the *Faith and Practice* were distributed. The section on "What Friends Believe" was also distributed.

In reply to the question that was raised regarding area representation on the Commission on Media (p. 48 of prepared *Faith and Practice*), Arthur referred us to page 37 on "Structure and Responsibilities." He also called attention to the new section on page 6 "Friends Faith" and the use of subheads to differentiate "Faith Expressed as Doctrine" and "Faith Expressed Through Witness."

Number 4 under "Faith Expressed as Doctrine" regarding God's revelation in the Scriptures, which had been addressed in Minute 107 in 1985, and its rewording, was called to our attention.

The clerk expressed appreciation for the work of the Revision Committee and for those of our Yearly Meeting who responded with suggestions. The present draft of the new *Faith and Practice* will be considered at the afternoon business meeting.

Steve Fine questioned the need for the entire body to consider the changes and felt that the Representative Body should consider these and make recommendations to the floor of the Yearly Meeting.

■ 12. Norman Winters closed the session with prayer.

Monday, July 28, 2:15 p.m.

■ 13. Phil Morrill, pastor of Svensen Friends Church, opened the afternoon business session with prayer.

■ 14. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as corrected.

■ 15. The clerk asked for any expression on the section entitled "Friends Practice: The Form of Government" in the new *Faith and Practice*. There were

some questions and discussion regarding the fact that only two trustees are required to sign documents; the change of the Yearly Meeting fiscal year to coincide with the calendar year; and the formation of the Council of Elders. Members of the Discipline Revision Committee spoke to these. This section of the new *Faith and Practice* was approved as a second reading (except for the number on the Council of Elders changed from 9 to 12 members (see Minute 75), and section Q, Trustees, p. 48.)

■ 16. We were asked to consider the section of "Queries." Some minor revisions were suggested, and rewording of some were left to the discretion of the committee. This section of "Queries" was approved as second reading.

■ 17. The meeting was opened for discussion on the section "Friends Faith." Some concerns were expressed and some suggested revisions were to be made. It was approved to send this section to the Representatives for consideration, and then come back to the main body of the Yearly Meeting for a first reading.

■ 18. The meeting closed with prayer by Don Lamm, pastor of Greenleaf Friends Church.

Tuesday, July 29, 2:15 p.m.

■ 19. Ernest Ostrin of Friends Memorial, Seattle, opened the afternoon session with prayer.

■ 20. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

■ 21. Clara Sinclair was introduced and brought greetings from Friends World Committee for Consultation. She spoke of her recent visit to Alaska Yearly Meeting at Kotzebue, and urged greater interchange among all Friends.

■ 22. The Department of Ministry of the Spiritual Life Board recommended eight persons for recording for pastoral ministry in Northwest Yearly Meeting: Gary Getting, Marq Box, John Beck, Paul Bock, James Settle, Philip Smith, Retha McCutchen, and Richard Edmundson. These names were individually presented and approved.

■ 23. James Settle, pastor of West Chehalem Friends Church, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 24. John Beck, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 25. Paul Bock, youth pastor at Reedwood Friends Church and a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 26. John Beck, coclerk of the Department of Social Concerns, presented the following report:

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

JOHN BECK AND DEBORAH PORTIS-CATHERS, COCLERKS

"Exciting, challenging, demanding and spiritually stretching" are just a few words to describe the work our Department has done this year. There are, it seems, limitless needs that are crying out in the world around us. As a Department, probably the two hardest jobs we have are to decide how to apportion our small budget between the many concerns and to decide which concerns not to attempt. However, this year we have begun two new concerns!

The first is the establishing of Anne Newton in the Vancouver area to pilot a work among the deaf. Vancouver was chosen as the first site because of the Washington State School for the Deaf and the large deaf population there. We had hoped to have Anne devote full time to the deaf ministry this year but funds

have not materialized yet. We were, however, able to increase our Department's support.

The second was the establishing of a Sanctity of Life subcommittee. It is and will be working to inform churches in the Yearly Meeting of the facts and needs that center around right-to-life concerns (abortion, euthanasia, suicide, etc.).

We also published a newsletter this year and began coordinating with the "Friends for Families" organization. We have continued our support of Dan Nolte's police chaplaincy ministry and the work of Piedmont Urban Ministries.

There are many other concerns we have worked on, but probably prison ministries under the leadership of Bob Percy was the most active, working in several prisons across the Yearly Meeting.

It was exciting to see from the church reports how much God is doing on the local level in the Yearly Meeting. Over \$25,000 was raised locally for emergency aid. People are working against injustice, to give relief, and to be a support to the world around them!

As we look toward the new year, there are several prayer requests for the whole Yearly Meeting to share.

(1) Pray for Anne Newton's full-time support and for her outreach in the deaf community.

(2) Pray for guidance for Bob Percy as he works in prisons and trains others to do so. (Bob also feels the Lord's leading to full-time service in prisons.)

(3) Pray for the leadership of Piedmont Urban Ministries that the Lord will guide in all their work.

(4) Pray with us as a department in all that we do that we may have God's wisdom, supply, and encouragement. May all we do be an aid in demonstrating God's love to the world.

The report was approved.

■ 27. Aaron Hamlin was introduced to give the report of the National Black Evangelical Association. He expressed appreciation to Northwest Yearly Meeting for our support and the vision to continue the work of Piedmont Friends Church. He introduced Ralph Greenidge, who spoke of the blessing of the recent NBEA convention in Philadelphia and of the continued need for evangelism in the Black communities, and especially the inner cities. He requested prayer for the drug problems of the inner city of the Bronx, where he is ministering. Aaron also requested prayer for a joint meeting of the committees of the National Association of Evangelicals and the NBEA, and for a trip he will be taking to Africa in the fall with others of the NAE.

Jack Willcuts led in prayer for the work of the NBEA and these concerns.

The report was approved.

■ 28. J. D. Baker, executive director of Friends Fund, presented the following report:

FRIENDS FUND

J. D. BAKER, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This has been a year of changes in the Friends Fund administrative staff. Walter Wilhite has been Executive Director for Friends Fund since January of 1974. The Board of Directors and staff are very appreciative of the work he has accomplished over these past 12 years. I am grateful for the work he has pioneered and feel fortunate to step into a well-prepared pathway as Executive Director.

Walter has undergone serious surgery, and we miss his expertise and compassion in this work.

Ron Dingman, who has worked in the Friends Fund office for four years, has acquired other employment, and this position has been filled by two part-time people. Diane Eichenberger is doing our accounting work. Myron Goldsmith, after retiring from 25 years of service at George Fox College, now is taking care of all other office responsibilities.

From the starting date of Friends Fund, December 1, 1972, through June 30, 1986, the following totals of irrevocable and revocable agreements have been made:

All undesignated funds will be held by Friends Fund to be administered and distributed by the Policy Committee of our Board.

On behalf of the Friends Fund Board, staff, and myself, I want to express our appreciation to all of those who have taken part in the programs and services of this work. As we continue to serve more people, then in turn more gifts can eventually be used for the Lord's work.

This was approved.

■ 29. The Council of Representatives recommends that a letter of appreciation be sent to Walter Wilhite in recognition for his leadership with the Friends Fund. This was approved.

■ 30. Pat Evans, clerk of the Council of Representatives, reminded the boards that under the new structure in the *Faith and Practice*, each board names its own clerk. These names need to be given to the Council of Representatives for approval this week.

■ 31. The meeting closed with prayer by Anna Baker, recording clerk of the Council of Representatives.

Wednesday, July 30, 11:00 a.m.

■ 32. The meeting was opened with prayer by Ron Crecelius.

■ 33. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

■ 34. Philip Smith, pastor of Maplewood Friends Church and a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 35. Clynton Crisman, clerk of the Stewardship Board, introduced Beatrice Goldsmith, Yearly Meeting treasurer, who gave the following report:

TREASURER'S REPORT

BEATRICE GOLDSMITH, TREASURER

Besides the information at the bottom of the first page indicating the Christmas offering and "Finish the Work" giving, you people gave \$17,668 to our young people who needed help for YCEW, Youthquake '86, and VBS summer ministries. The Thanksgiving offering for well drilling in Africa was \$8,270, and the EFM Easter offering for Rwanda from our Yearly Meeting was \$12,869. You gave \$8,736 for Piedmont above the budgeted funds for them. These are some of the things you have done *above* the Great Commission Budget ministries.

Your churches have given more and pledged more than ever before, for which you can be thankful. When you return home, continue to encourage tithing so that your church can pledge *more* to the Great Commission Budget ministries. Very few of our churches can by themselves support our mission work or fully support a new church-planting effort. But Together—TOGETHER we could do even more than we are doing. We could support more missionaries to unreached people, plant more churches, give greater support to our urban ministry, and on and on. What IS the Yearly Meeting Great Commission Budget, you are asking? It is 57 churches doing TOGETHER an outreach far beyond what one would think our membership could do. Do you know that in the past 28 years we have had 41 Share Calls, and you have given a total of \$175,237.77? The largest Share Call for a church was \$9,449. See how we can help each other? What we can do TOGETHER!

So take a good look at the items in the Financial Report and at the next year's budget when it is presented, and when you return home be sure to report on the outreach ministries represented by the Great Commission Budget. Then I think you will want to do even more, which we can do when the churches pledge more, because you are "sold" on the ministries through the Yearly Meeting.

I should report that since the books closed, nearly \$1,800 has been received for last year's budget, so we only need to replace \$10,000 borrowed from Restricted Funds to pay the bills for 1985-86.

So I submit the Financial Report for 1985-86 with the hope that you will study it and talk with the various boards and departments about their area of work in order to communicate this outreach with your churches. Thank you.

Special Note: Missions and Evangelism have approval for special appeals for needs as they arise.

Clynton further commented and illustrated with the overhead projector that the amount already received or pledged at Yearly Meeting time is \$22,275, which reduces the balance to be raised to \$60,217 in addition to church pledges. The amount pledged to the Great Commission Budget by the churches has increased from 59 percent to 87 percent in the last ten years.

The budget was approved.

■ 37. The report of the Department of Church Education prepared by Steve Wood was distributed.

Dorothy Barratt illustrated by means of balloons and "volunteers" from the audience the amount given to the EFA Easter project for Rwanda.

Ken VandenHoek spoke regarding the summer ministries team made up of George Fox College students. They have held vacation Bible schools in extension churches.

Dorothy Barratt, with the help of other members of the Education Board, reviewed the four missionary books written by Betty Hockett. The next book is planned to be the life of Joy Ridderhof, founder of Gospel Recordings.

Louise Sargent presented the report of the Department of Christian Testimonies.

Ken VandenHoek announced the names of the churches that have had both a numerical and percentage increase in Sunday school attendance during the past year: Scotts Mills, Marion, West Chehalem, North Valley, Medford, Metolius, South Salem, and Nampa.

The pastors and clerks of local Education committees were asked to stand. Charles Mylander led in prayer for these people.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

STEVEN WOOD, CLERK

The Department of Church Education has endeavored in the past year to identify areas it can address that will be of the most direct benefit to Christian education workers and programs in our local churches. In response to Quentin Nordyke and the Department of Evangelism's suggestion that our department

put together a team of college-age youth to do summer children's ministries in extension churches, four George Fox College students were recruited and sent out this summer. These students (Dave Maurer, Jean Taylor, Kelly Hanley, and Sandi Getting), working from the input of our department and under the guidance of Julie Hobbs of GFC, have conducted vacation Bible school programs at Kent, Peninsula, and Hilltop Friends. They are providing the evening program for our school-age children and serving as counselors at Tilikum during this week of Yearly Meeting. They will be holding VBS at East Boise and McCall in August.

We are particularly grateful for the work these young people are doing and for the enthusiasm with which they are approaching their ministry. We are also thankful for the investment Julie Hobbs and Clyde Thomas have made in helping equip and raise support for the team.

Sandra Wilson's work as Youth Field Secretary has been done with excellence and exemplary dedication. We appreciate both the ministry she rendered as a salaried employee and the hours of volunteer time she gave to youth ministry this year. Although a replacement has not yet been secured for Sandra for the coming year, we hope that a suitable person will be found in the near future.

The work of Dorothy Barratt and the EFA Christian Education Commission continue to receive the full support of our department. We are particularly enthused by the release of two more children's missionary biographies by Betty Hockett. *Down a Winding Road* details the lives of Roscoe and Tina Knight as missionaries in Bolivia, Peru, and Mexico City. *Happiness Under the Indian Trees*, the most recent release, tells the colorful and exciting story of the life of Catherine Cattell as a missionary in India.

We are glad to report that the EFA Easter Sunday school offering exceeded its \$30,000 goal, raising over \$36,700 for the new EFM mission field in Rwanda. NWYM contributed over \$9,400 to this special offering in support of the pioneer work of George and Dorothy Thomas (of our Yearly Meeting) and Willard and Doris Ferguson (of Mid-America Yearly Meeting) in Rwanda. Sixty-five percent of EFA churches and 73 percent of NWYM have contributed to the Easter offering this year. EFA churches have been encouraged to designate vacation Bible school offerings this summer for the purchase of furnishings for the David and Joyce Byrne home, EFM missionaries in Mexico City.

The department has worked to create a series of bulletin inserts celebrating the various age levels that are represented in our Sunday schools and churches. It was our desire to focus on the unique qualities and needs of people at various stages of life and enhance our sense of appreciation for one another in our churches. The series of inserts were adopted and used by the EFA Christian Education Commission in its "Hurrah for Sunday School" emphasis this past April. During these Yearly Meeting sessions, we will be considering other topics we may feature in future insert series.

Last Yearly Meeting we asked the representatives to create a new department under the Christian Education Board to care for planning, staffing, and oversight of the children's programs during our annual conference. The concept of the Department of Children's Yearly Meeting was met with approval but not implemented by the Representatives. We are hoping, in the coming year, to see this new department become functional, thereby releasing the Department of Church Education to give fuller attention to its primary responsibility, serving the ongoing ministries of our Yearly Meeting churches.

In the coming year we will be focusing our training efforts on the adult Sunday school program and the needs of people who work in adult ministries. Several members of our department will be doing workshops related to adults at the Willamette Valley Christian Education Conference in Salem, October 3 and 4. We will also be distributing a Sunday School Standards notebook to local churches and making available a video tape on discipline for children in the Sunday school.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES

LOUISE M. SARGENT, CLERK

The Department of Christian Testimonies has published new pamphlets this year: "On Becoming a Christian" by Arthur O. Roberts, "No Part-time Christians" by Darius Salter, "Straight Talk on Wandering Words" by Michael Snow, and "Equal but Equal" by Gregg Lamm.

Samples of copies of these have been mailed to all NWYM pastors and to other English-speaking Friends yearly meetings around the world. Negotiations are underway to translate into Spanish Dr. Roberts's pamphlet (On Becoming a Christian) for possible use by the Hal Thomases in their work in Bolivia.

These pamphlets are all available through Barclay Press.

Still in the development and planning stage are two new teaching series—one on family life and one (in conjunction with the Department of Social Concerns) on the sanctity of human life and its ramifications concerning abortion, war, capital punishment, and discrimination.

Pending final reading and approval, the Department has plans to print the new queries in both pamphlet (for personal devotions) and adhesive form (to be inserted inside hymnal covers as an aid to worship). Churches will be notified when these are available.

The Department continues its support of Western Evangelical Seminary by regularly purchasing books by and about Friends for the Seminary Library.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

HECTOR J. MUNN, CLERK

The meetings of Northwest Yearly Meeting continue to report strong interest in private education of their children. One new elementary program was started—the C. S. Lewis School, meeting in the Newberg Church facilities, serving families in the Newberg area. Greenleaf Friends Academy and North Idaho Christian School are the two secondary schools. There are 13 programs for preschool and/or elementary children held in our churches.

The coming academic year will be the first for a three-way NWYM/Church/College matching scholarship program for Friends students at George Fox College. There have been 82 students from 29 churches who received the Church/College Matching Scholarship in the fall of 1985. For fall 1985 quarter, George Fox College had 102 Friends students, or 17.5 percent of the enrollment.

The Ministerial Education Scholarship/Loan Program for the coming year will assist with the tuition of seven students at Western Evangelical Seminary and three students at Azusa Pacific University Friends Center. This is an increase from the seven scholarships provided in the last year.

The report of the Education Board was approved.

- 38. Gertrude Ankeny, recording clerk, led in closing prayer

Wednesday, July 30, 2:15 p.m.

- 39. Richard Edmundson, pastor of Camas Friends Church, opened the session with prayer.

- 40. The Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship gave their report by means of a skit, written by Louise George, depicting various scenes of "rescue" by the FWMF, and illustrating areas of giving by them: foreign missions, Piedmont, and a vehicle for use by missionaries on furlough. The total amount given to all projects is \$40,868.68. The report was approved.

- 41. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as corrected.

- 42. Marq Box, associate pastor of Vancouver Friends Church and a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

- 43. Richard Edmundson, pastor of Camas Friends Church and a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

- 44. The following recommendation from the Council of Representatives was presented and approved:

After prayerful consideration, the Council of Representatives recommended for approval for first reading "What Friends Believe" page 6-9. The Representatives are in unity that these statements, including the one on Scripture, satisfy the questions raised last year and during the year of study by the local churches.

- 45. The Council of Representatives recommended for approval first reading in the Rules of Discipline the section on affiliate membership (page 52) and the application forms (pages 60-62) with the change of the verb "honor" to "respect" on the affiliate membership application form (page 61). Approved.

- 46. The Council of Representatives recommended for approval for second reading the Rules of Discipline except for section on affiliate membership (page 52) and the suggested application form (pages 60-62). Approved.

- 47. The Council of Representatives recommended for approval as the second reading the Historical Statement, pages 1-5. Approved.

- 48. The clerk called our attention to #2 on page 38 of the proposed *Faith and Practice* under "Regulation Pertaining to Boards." It is proposed that in Item 1 under these Regulations, the phrase "nominating no more than one to each department" be deleted. There was discussion whether this change should be considered as first or second reading. It was recommended and approved as second reading.

- 49. Arthur Roberts for the Discipline Revision Committee presented the following rewording of Section Q: *Trustees* (page 48 of the proposed *Faith and Practice*): *Appointment and Responsibilities*: "The Trustees are authorized to execute legal instruments essential to normal procedure in fiscal affairs and ownership of property by the Yearly Meeting and the local churches. For convenience, the Trustees may designate any two of their number to sign legal documents on their behalf. These two may sign only if they do not have a vested interest in the transaction being handled and if the transaction is approved by the Trustees. All transactions are to be reported annually to the Yearly Meeting in session. The Trustees must exercise care to observe the requirements of the statutes of the states within which their transactions are made."

This was approved as first reading.

- 50. The clerk said that the Executive Council has received correspondence regarding the final sentence of paragraph 3, page 74, of the proposed *Faith and Practice*, under 5, The Bestowment of Gifts, and it is recommended that this sentence be deleted. This change was approved as first reading.

- 51. An epistle was read from Southwest Yearly Meeting.

- 52. Clerk Richard Beebe expressed praise to God for the evident working of the Holy Spirit in our Yearly Meeting sessions.

- 53. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Grant Thompson of Seattle Friends Memorial Church.

Thursday, July 31, 2:15 p.m.

- 54. The afternoon session opened with prayer by Earl Geil, pastor of Cherry Grove Friends Church.

■ 55. A letter of testimony from Gary Getting was read by Richard Henry. Gary is a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting. The Gettings are now pastors in Hutchinson, Kansas.

■ 56. Retha McCutchen, a member of the pastoral team at Boise Friends Church, and a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave her testimony.

■ 57. The Spiritual Life Board, Department of Ministry, recommended that Ron Friedrich be recorded to pastoral ministry in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Approved.

■ 58. Ron Friedrich gave his testimony.

■ 59. Dr. William Vermillion gave the report from Western Evangelical Seminary. He announced some upcoming seminars for pastors and distributed a brochure concerning Legal Issues and Church Ministry. He asked continued prayer for the presidential search committee. A candidate has been selected and will probably be approved this fall.

William Erickson of Gospel Ministry for the Deaf spoke of their work of training ministers for the deaf through a program at WES, and distributed a sheet showing their projected enrollment for each year beginning with 1982, and the actual figures, which have exceeded their expectations.

Anne Newton is ministering to the deaf through a program at Vancouver Friends Church, and Bruce Bibby of Eugene Friends is moving to the Oregon City area to become involved in this work. This report was approved.

■ 60. A written report for the Commission on Media was distributed.

COMMISSION ON MEDIA

BARRY HUBBELL, CLERK

The development of video as a communication tool and promotion of writing as foundational to communication are emerging as concerns of the Media Board this year. Significant changes and progress in the *Evangelical Friend*, Barclay Press, and Publication Fund also are noteworthy.

Video

The tremendous potential for the effective use of video in teaching, missions, church planting and basic communication leads us to continue the promotion of video in churches. The media board is investigating possible projects to better utilize this medium.

Writing

Writing is also a focus of the board. The ability to write well in video scripts, bulletins, newsletters, magazines, and personal letters is a basic, needed communication skill. In response to this need, the Media Board encourages individuals to develop their writing abilities.

EVANGELICAL FRIEND Magazine

The magazine continues to be one of the most significant means of communication among evangelical Friends nationally. In January 1985, the EFA Publications Commission regretfully accepted the resignation of the editor, Jack Willcuts, and appointed Lon Fendall to eventually replace him. The year of transition was completed this past January. Lon is ably assisted by Dan McCracken, Managing Editor; Harlow Ankeny, Administrative Editor; and Stan Putman, Art Director.

Some adjustments in article theme and content and a major redesign of the *Evangelical Friend* is being completed in response to an extensive evaluation this year by the Publication Commission. Utilizing a reader survey, a critique by the Evangelical Press Association, and an index of past articles and authors, the

commission identified as a major concern the need to increase the readership of the magazine, especially among younger people and people new to Friends. A number of the changes, beginning with the September issue, will seek to encourage these people to read the magazine. Specific changes will include a new masthead and new art and layout within the magazine. Also, type size in a number of sections will be enlarged.

The editor has suggested these ways the people in our Yearly Meeting might continue to do their part to make the magazine more effective:

(1) *Write*: Well-written articles on subjects of importance to evangelical Friends are always welcome. Also, letters to the editor commenting on and responding to issues raised in the magazine are not only welcome but also helpful in determining current thought or new direction.

(2) *Urge Others to Read*: Pastors, Sunday school teachers, and others can call attention to helpful articles and to others to read them.

(3) *Pray*: The editorial staff depends on the prayers of our people to ensure that the magazine is an effective ministry.

(4) *Give*: It's difficult to publish a magazine that meets our quality expectations on a limited budget. We continue to depend on gifts to supplement the funds provided by the Yearly Meeting.

Barclay Press

The past year has been one of adjustment and consolidation for Barclay Press. Bryan McClelland resigned and Dick Eichenberger resumed the role of General Manager. Most of the personnel are still in place and carrying on their normal duties. We are still seeking the Lord's will regarding the future for Barclay Press. The fulfillment of the press's potential depends on God's provision of leadership and funding. Pray with us that His leading will be clear and that we will have the wisdom and courage to respond. Many opportunities for ministry are open to us if we are prepared to accept the responsibility.

Publication Fund

The publication of *A Part of My Heart Left Here...* and of Jack Willcuts's *Why Friends Are Friends* (the first project), will replenish the fund for future publishing projects. We welcome additional gifts to the publication fund to enable us to finance more publications, expanding our ministry through the printed page.

Harold Antrim, assistant clerk of the Commission, introduced Lon Fendall, new editor of the *Evangelical Friend*, who shared the statement of purpose and objective for the magazine.

Appreciation was expressed for the work of Jack Willcuts as retiring editor, and an audiovisual tribute was shown.

■ 61. The Greenleaf Friends Academy report prepared by Orrin Hills was read by James Selby.

GREENLEAF FRIENDS ACADEMY

ORRIN E. HILLS, ADMINISTRATOR

Greenleaf Friends Academy survived the BIG SCARE of possibly not opening for the 1985-86 school year. It also survived a vicious episode of vandalism during the Christmas holidays.

In fact, the entire year has been successful spiritually. First Week, at Quaker Hill with Ron Crecelius, was excellent with seekers at the altar the first night and a real breakthrough on Thursday night. Stan Hoaglund, a spiritual leader, ex-coach, and presently a counselor at Meridian High School, was speaker for our spring Spiritual Emphasis Week. Again there was a good response from the students. We praise the Lord for these indications of spiritual growth. That is the reason for our existence—education in a Christian atmosphere.

The Academy graduated 16 seniors on June 1. Academically the year was fine, with a number of honor students. The students' attitudes and cooperation were all very much a part of that success. The athletic teams were excellent. The girls' volleyball and basketball teams returned to State tournaments, under the direction of Coaches Meredith Beals and Orrin Hills.

Because of the BIG SCARE and its financial problems, there was a decline in enrollment. Barbara Hockenberry has been hired to recruit students, hopefully to turn the trend. An excellent addition to the teaching staff for this fall is one of our own, Lois Smith. To function properly the Academy needs more money than is allowed through tuition and fees and more years in which to recuperate from the shock of indebtedness. Every effort is being made to live and operate within the parameters of scarce money. We solicit your continued support, whether through money or prayer, preferably both, that God will continue to do the "impossible" for us.

The Annual Benefit Auction again was a marvelous help, thanks to the many who participated and contributed. Other fund-raising ventures, including a huge yard sale and Fourth of July breakfast, were repeated this year.

We want to say THANK YOU to all who have given so sacrificially to the school this year. Your prayers and faithfulness have made the difference between going under with debts or continuing the battle.

As we look toward the 1986-87 school year in a few weeks, three items excite us:

- (1) Don Stump has been hired as Superintendent.
- (2) Christian education is high on the list of priorities of God's people.
- (3) God is not finished with Greenleaf Friends Academy YET!!

James Selby reported that the vandalism at the Academy had amounted to around \$20,000, most of which was covered by insurance. He further reported that \$350,000 had been raised against their \$750,000 indebtedness, with approximately \$300,000 yet to be raised. The report was approved.

■ 62. Opening the Memorial Service, Harlow Ankeny led in the singing of "All the Way My Savior Leads Me," a favorite of Dr. Alvin Roberts, and "Trust and Obey," a favorite of Joseph Reece. Kenneth Williams introduced Ronald Woodward, who gave a brief message. He read from John 16 and following the theme of this year's Yearly Meeting, "Reaching Out with Joy," spoke of the joy that can come, even out of grief—joy emerging, joy abiding.

Memorials to Joseph Reece and A. Clark Smith, ministers deceased this year, were read by Leroy Neifert and Kenneth Williams. Written memorials were also read for Gladys Knutson, Fannie Beebe, Eldon Helm, Alice Coulson, Irene Baker, Alvin Roberts, Dalton Cook, and Ivan Hadley.

The names of 33 members deceased were shown on the overhead projector, and many gave spoken tributes to these.

Philip Morrill sang "It Will Be Worth It All" in closing.

■ 75. The clerk gave some explanations of the portions of the new *Faith and Practice* that were approved as first reading, and those approved as second reading. First reading included "What Friends Believe," the increase of the Council of Elders from 9 to 12 (see Minute 15); changes in the affiliate membership and the membership form. Second reading includes all the rest of the *Faith and Practice*, including the section "Related Organizations," and part B, the statement of Faith of the EFA, part C, Statement of Faith of the NAE, and D and E which indicate charts to be updated showing nominations and the data concerning the establishment of yearly meetings; also, the "Procedures and Forms." Approved.

This completes the work of the Discipline Revision Committee.

■ 76. The clerk read a report of actions taken by the Yearly Meeting Executive Council and its Administrative Committee since Yearly Meeting 1985:

(1) Approved the recommendation of the task force committee appointed to study the change of the fiscal year as follows:

- a. To change the fiscal year to coincide with the calendar year.
- b. The change to a calendar year to become effective January 1, 1988.
- (2) Approved the recommendation of the Spiritual Life Board that the recording status of five recorded Friends ministers be discontinued. Reasons given: (a) not in the pastoral ministry for five years; (b) not attending a Friends Church; (c) no intention of returning to the pastoral ministry (all are working in secular jobs).
- (3) Approved the request from Friends United Meeting that we send 10 delegates (probably at their own expense) to their next triennial sessions (100 years following the first triennial) to be held June 12-19, 1987, in Greensboro, North Carolina.
- (4) Approved a minute of participation in the 1987 Guatemala Conference, and Guatemala Sunday, January 11, 1987.
- (5) Approved the format of the Superintendent Search Committee.

■ 77. Progress report from Superintendent Search Committee was given by Richard Beebe. Surveys were sent out to churches and boards, and 84 surveys were returned. From actual names suggested, the committee narrowed the list down to 11; then after contacting these, narrowed further to 8. These eight have been asked to submit resumes, and interviews will be conducted in September.

Richard Beebe read from the new *Faith and Practice* the section on General Superintendent (page 36). He urged continued prayer for the committee and prospective superintendent. After some explanation from the clerk, the meeting was opened for questions and several made comments and suggestions. It was approved that the person named by the Search Committee to the Executive Council, and approved by them, become superintendent effective July 1, 1987.

It was suggested that a list of the names of the Executive Council and the Search Committee be sent to each church and members of the Council of Representatives.

■ 78. The Board of Missions began their report with the showing of a 12-minute film on Guatemala '87. The following printed report was distributed:

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION, NORTHWEST

Personnel

The 1985-86 year was a strange one in terms of missionary placement—with three families on the field in Peru, only one family in Bolivia, and Steve and Janelle Baron, with children, Landon and Kelsey, doing social development work in both countries. This situation was partially created by Hal Thomas's illness, which required the Thomas family to spend the year in Newberg, Oregon, instead of La Paz. We praise the Lord, however, for Hal's return to robust health and for the family's return to the urban work in La Paz in June of this year. In Bolivia, we had no permanent missionary present in La Paz, but did appreciate greatly the time the Barons spent there. Dwaine and Becky Williams, Marci and Jonathan, lived in Santa Cruz, encouraging church work, teaching in the University and supervising the work in the colonies at San Julian.

In Peru, Denny and Sue Anderson, Aaron, Bryan, and Kristin, lived in Tacna during the first six months and then moved to Arequipa in January of 1986, ministering largely in the coastal area. Ed and Marie Cammack and Ben and Gen Fitch, with children, Trisia, Reid, and Tessa, lived in Juli. With the Chapmans on furlough, the Ilave house provided residence for short-termers Ken and Tonya Comfort during the months of July to September, 1985, and for the Barons during January to June, 1986.

Two families were on furlough during the 1985-86 year, with James and Gail Roberts, Heidi and Amanda living in Nampa, Idaho, and Wayne and Bev Chapman, Amy, Nicholas, and Michael living in Newberg.

Highlights from Fields

BOLIVIA:

At the time this report was prepared, we had not yet received the annual field report from Bolivia, but can report as follows:

First, in connection with our fall retreat and midyear board meetings, a number of specific *three-year goals* for our Bolivian work were proposed, including the following:

Mission/INELA Relationships

- Develop a communications system, a list of specific things we as a mission do regularly to communicate with the Mesa Directiva. (Examples: Attend all regular MD meetings, set up regular mission hours in the MD office; give MD a copy of relevant parts of our philosophy and working agreements statement; submit regular mission activity reports; submit written memos of all relevant mission council decisions, program with MD, and annual planning retreat, etc.).

- Work with the MD until we have joint ownership of goals and projects in as many areas as possible. (Examples: social development projects, literature projects, church-planting projects, etc.).

Evangelism and Church Planting

- Plant six Spanish-speaking churches in the city of La Paz and a yet-to-be-determined number of churches in the city of Santa Cruz and the colony area of San Julian.

- Write and implement an urban discipleship program with specific steps leading a new believer to church membership.

- Strongly advocate missionary vision to the INELA.

Leadership Training

- Continue mission participation in support of Interdenominational Committee on Theological Education by Extension (ICTEE), Theological Education by Extension (TEE), San Pablo, and the Evangelical University.

- Plan and implement a leadership-training program for urban Spanish-speaking churches, using as many of the above resources as possible.

- Advocate INELA participation on the ICTEE committee.

- Develop a support system of caring for the needs of national pastors and leaders with national leaders equipped to do this job.

- Educate leaders in Friends business procedures.

- Set goals for a specific number of INELA students in attendance at San Pablo Seminary and the Evangelical University.

- Visit all TEE districts at least once a year, recruiting teachers from each district for the teacher-training course and encouraging the national director to develop an adequate record-keeping system.

At year-end, it appeared likely that we might be able to add a second "national missionary" to our work in the San Julian colonies. The Evangelical University remains in a state of great financial difficulty, and some uncertainty, but has continued to remain open. Relief efforts are being mounted to help compensate for the loss of 18-20 Altiplano churches due to floodwaters (cf. more details below), and the shortages soon to be felt by Aymara families. We rejoice at Yearly Meeting time that our missionary force in Bolivia has increased to three families!

PERU:

Perhaps the biggest news from Peru in recent months has been the widespread flooding due to the unusually high water level in Lake Titicaca (some 8½ feet above normal). This has affected at least a million people in Bolivia and Peru, with Peru reporting a loss of 15 churches in four different quarterly meetings. In addition to this list, six house churches were flooded. The INELA decided not to mount a large scale food distribution program, but NWYM is involved with an 80-20% plan for land purchase for new churches as needed, and relief funds are being received and will be made available as needed and deemed most

appropriate. Even during this period of great difficulty, eight new churches were planted in Peru, one in Arequipa ("Los Angeles"), and seven on the Altiplano.

Some highlights from the field report are as follows:

- A festive and joyous spirit of celebration prevailing with the INELA as they celebrated their 25th anniversary this summer as a national church.
- Strong and effective leadership by Ramón Mamani, president of the Mesa Directiva, with missionaries sensing that the MD "is functioning the best in history."
- Francisco Mamani, from La Paz, spending three weeks ministering among coastal churches.
- A new quarterly meeting, "El Lago," added this year.
- The long anticipated graduation of the first five students to complete the IBLA (extension education) program (all five now involved in teaching and ministry).
- Most all IBLA classes being taught this past year by national leaders (well over 500 people have studied one or more courses since the beginning in 1969).
- Twenty-three different subjects were taught in the IBLA program, with 347 courses being completed.
- New churches being started as a result of personal evangelism efforts of Christians reaching out to extended family units and friends (often, once a group is gathered, missionaries or MD members will be asked to visit).
- INELA church leaders active in visiting among churches to give encouragement and counsel (mission staff also tries to visit each church once a year).

SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Mark Bounds, a veterinarian from Oregon, made a visit to Peru to help the national church with animal care. Seed potatoes were donated by the mission in what is hoped will be a self-help continuing potato seed program. The mission has assisted the Ilave Hospital with a school vaccination program for children out in the country, and also seeks to provide transportation to those seriously ill and in need of immediate medical care. In addition to these efforts, Steve Baron spent much time in the last half of the church year in getting his Manual on Greenhouses and Gardens completed and printed for distribution. This manual is a big help in holding classes for the people. Steve had hoped to complete his first demonstration greenhouse in Peru by the middle of July. Francisco Tintaya still operates a very effective greenhouse in Bolivia, which has elicited considerable interest.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION AROUND THE WORLD

This was the year EFM opened a new mission field—in the Central African country of Rwanda. George and Dorothy Thomas and Willard Ferguson went to the capital city of Kigali in February 1986, with Doris Ferguson and nine-year-old son, Sam, joining the missionary team on July 18. We are grateful to God for the sponsorship of the Free Methodist Church in Rwanda, enabling us to begin our work. We also praise the Lord for many specific answers to prayer, and for the generosity of Friends across EFA in providing \$36,545 for this work in our annual Easter offering. We continue to pray for specific guidance on crucial matters of strategy, especially as it pertains to the timing of seeking government recognition for EFM as an independent mission agency, out from under the umbrella of the Free Methodists.

In Mexico City, the Rod Routon family were forced to return to Iowa in the summer of 1986 due to Barbara's serious health problems. Mark and Wilma Roberts continue to serve faithfully in that great city with tremendous needs.

The Byrnes, now in language school in Costa Rica, will begin work in Mexico City in January 1987.

Bill and Esther May Thomas, from our own Yearly Meeting, spent several months in the Philippines this year volunteering time and labor toward the completion of the second story of the church building in Pasig, Manila.

EFM announced in January that Alaska Yearly Meeting was accepted as an associate member of Evangelical Friends Mission. This involves them in some financial support, in the sending of delegates to board meetings, and in a cooperative effort to extend the Gospel to the unreached native people of Alaska.

This year also marked the appointment of Roscoe Knight, of our Yearly Meeting, as EFM Church Representative. Roscoe will travel both within and outside the constituency of EFA, promoting the work of EFM in local churches, yearly meetings, Friends colleges, and wherever opportunities present themselves. Roscoe becomes the third full-time member of the EFM staff, joining James Morris, Executive Director, and Reta Stuart, Administrative Assistant.

We praise God for many answers to prayer during this past year and continue to sense a great open door for Friends around the world. The vision is being shared by people of all ages, including our youth. We praise the Lord once again for a dedicated YCEW (Youth Consecrated to Evangelize the World) team, which has returned from South America right before our Yearly Meeting sessions. We welcome with great interest their firsthand reports! "The harvest is plentiful . . ."

Appreciation was expressed to Beth Bagley, president of Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship, for the assistance the FWMF has given to the Board of Missions. Beth listed those from our Yearly Meeting who have assisted through the years in the work of the Evangelical Friends Mission, especially Mexico City. We greatly appreciate the six-week trip which our Executive Secretary, Quentin Nordyke, made to Bolivia and Peru in February and March to teach in the Seminary, assist mission councils in strategic planning, and provide a ministry of encouragement to missionary and nationals alike.

The report was approved.

■ 79. The Council of Representatives approved the board nominations for clerks for the following boards: Education, Richard Edmundson; Missions, Ron Woodward; Social Concerns, John Beck/DeAnn Thompson; Stewardship, Harold Ankeny; Evangelism, Gilbert George; Ministerial Service, Paul Meier. Approved.

■ 80. The Council of Representatives approved the nomination by the Executive Council for a one-year term on the Council of Elders. We recognize that there is not representation from all areas in this transition year. We submit the following names: Myron Goldsmith, David Schmidt, Clynton Crisman, Grant Thompson, Dan Nolte, Arthur Roberts, Gene Mulkey, Vivian Thornburg, Norma Beebe. Approved.

■ 81. The Council of Representatives nominated the following to a three-year term to the Commission on Family Life: Ruth Corbin, Keith Lamm, Marcile Leach. For a two-year term: Gene Brown, Marie Hayes, Philip McLain. For a one-year term: Norma Beebe, Linda Walker, Martha Beck. For clerk of the Commission on Family Life: Philip McLain. Approved.

■ 82. The Council of Representatives nominated the following to a five-year term as a Trustee: Ralph Arensmeier. As Clerk of Trustees: Ralph Arensmeier. Approved.

■ 83. The Council of Representatives nominated the following to a three-year term on the Board of Evangelism: Dan Nolte, Charles Bloodgood, Tim

Tsohantaris. To a two-year term: Eugene McDonald. To a one-year term: Roger Watson. Approved.

■ 84. The Council of Representatives nominated the following to a three-year term on the Board of Stewardship: Bertram Frazier, Gary Emerson, Ronald Watson. For a two-year term: Lloyd Fitzsimmons. For a one-year term: Arthur Pruitt. Approved.

■ 88. The 1986 Representatives of Northwest Yearly Meeting wish to recommend to the Yearly Meeting that we join together with the Friends Church: Southwest Yearly Meeting in the reaffirmation of the Richmond Declaration of Faith, which we have included in our new *Faith and Practice* as a part of our Friends faith. Approved.

■ 89. The Clerk reported that Quentin Nordyke had submitted his resignation to the Executive Council as Executive Secretary effective June 30, 1967. This will be added to the list of action taken by the Executive Council. A round of applause was given to show appreciation of the Yearly Meeting to Quentin Nordyke.

■ 90. Appreciation was also expressed for the work of Charles Beals as archivist. He is retiring this year, and Frank Cole is assuming this position. This was approved.

■ 91. Roy Clark presented the report of the Spiritual Life Board.

SPIRITUAL LIFE BOARD

ROY CLARK, CLERK

One of the duties of the Spiritual Life Board is to receive the reports from the churches and attempt to assess the state of the church. Forty churches responded, and we appreciate those who filled out the reports. Each item was read prayerfully, and each prayer request was the subject of a few moments of intercession.

While it is difficult to properly estimate the health of a church, every report began with a note of praise for good things happening and for victories won. There were listings of outreach ministries, souls reached, and service to the communities.

Concerns expressed centered on the need for revival, concern for deeper dedication on the part of church members, and greater commitment and faithfulness to Christ and the church.

Sixty-three young people were listed as having expressed a call to some type of Christian service. These are listed and given to the appropriate boards and departments to follow up and encourage.

Many types of ministry help to extend the influence of the church in the communities.

- 24 churches have home Bible studies, most of them, several.
- 18 churches have outreach club programs for children and youth.
- 9 churches conduct gospel services at Rescue Missions.
- 10 churches have ministry to nursing homes and care homes.
- 6 churches have regular prison ministries.
- 8 churches maintain a food bank to aid needy families.

Other ministries listed as service to the community were women's fellowship groups, men's prayer meetings, family counseling programs, van transportation for the elderly, visiting programs for shut-ins, and aerobics classes for young mothers.

While there are problems and concerns expressed, the general tone of the reports is that of optimism about the church, and praise to God for a sense of divine blessings. This gives us cause for rejoicing.

DEPARTMENT OF EVANGELISM

"World Changers" seems to be an appropriate word to describe the new mood of the Evangelism Board that is moving as a Yearly Meeting from maintenance, to growth, renewal, and church planting.

From the Fall Retreat in 1984, when God gave us a vision to plant 45 churches in five years, to this last Fall Retreat we have been aware that we are in spiritual battle recapturing from the enemy "Kingdoms for our Lord and for His Christ."

We want to emphasize our strongest conviction around which our vision and strategy have focused—*either we renew and plant churches or we die!*

This year, Rick Hunt, consultant, has designed strategy that we need to implement in order to accomplish our "tall task." Those strategies involve an army of prayer warriors, church-planting-pastor recruitment, tracking and following a church-planting project, networking organizational resources so each organization doesn't always have to "reinvent the wheel," and several other strategies that facilitate what we plan for.

Church-planting couples are being called out, cultivated, and nurtured by Yearly Meeting personnel and local churches. We are excited about the people God is raising up.

The closing of Cascade Friends caused us all grief. We are trying to learn valuable lessons in what seems to be apparent failure and to trust God to be redemptive in the lives of persons that have been touched.

We rejoice in the start-up and growth of the new Roseburg meeting with Dave and Diana Baker; likewise the commitment of Doug and Debbie Wedin to the planting of a church in the Mt. Vernon area.

We plead for shared vision for all the Yearly Meeting in order to place renewal and growth at the front of our focus and at the center of our creative energies. It is imperative that the new Yearly Meeting Superintendent share this focus.

Thanking you for the privilege of Kingdom Building with you in Northwest Friends, we solicit your regular prayer and fasting that we may be successful in bringing men and women to Jesus and molding them into Bodies of Believers that will impact our world—world changers! So be it, O God!

Ralph Beebe presented the following report for the *Department of Peace Testimony*:

DEPARTMENT OF PEACE TESTIMONY

RALPH BEEBE, CLERK

The Department of Peace Testimony is pleased that an increasing number of local meetings is asking for our assistance in spreading the message of Christ's unconditional love as understood by Friends. We are ready to answer any additional requests for materials, workshops, and speakers for Sunday school, worship, or youth groups. Among our goals are evangelism through compassionate peacemaking and the presentation of Northwest Yearly Meeting as an example of Christ's love in action. We fervently hope that no young person in our constituency will be drafted into military service without having prayerfully considered whether or not Jesus wants him/her to hate and kill our nation's enemies.

We strongly endorse and appreciate the work of George Fox College's new Center for Peace Learning and encourage support of its programs. The Center is developing a significant ministry in the teaching of conflict resolution at the family, local church, national, and international levels.

The Department has from time to time been asked to provide materials and advice to some who have long been conscientious objectors to military service, but who are now wondering about the conscientious implications of paying for war through their taxes. Because they currently have no legal recourse, many support the Peace Tax Fund bill in congress, which, when passed, will allow conscientious objectors to have their war taxes placed in a trust fund to be used for peaceful purposes. The Department is also pleased to announce that the Friends Committee on War Tax Concerns, a new organization formed by Friends World Committee for Consultation, is preparing a series of pamphlets on the subject. Four have been published to date, including a Friends history, statements by Friends groups, a bibliography of resources for study, and what the Bible teaches on this subject, the latter coauthored by Ralph Beebe of this department. They are available for \$1.50 each from the Yearly Meeting headquarters or from Friends Committee on War Tax Concerns, P. O. Box 6441, Washington, DC 20009.

The Department of Peace Testimony endorses the national "Peace with Justice Week," a special emphasis in response to Psalm 85:10: "Steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will [embrace] each other." We recommend participation by local churches in this emphasis on peace and justice in the home, the community, the nation, and the world. Further information can be obtained from the Yearly Meeting headquarters or from the Peace with Justice Week Office, 475 Riverside Drive, Room 712, New York, N. Y. 10115-0050. The emphasis, cosponsored by New Call to Peacemaking, will be October 16-24, 1986.

Ralph also gave a short report prepared by Lon Fendall on Conflict Resolution as part of the Center for Peace Learning at George Fox College. The following resolution from the Department of Peace Testimony was read:

Resolutions Presented by Department of Peace Testimony

Jesus identified and still identifies with the suffering of people who are victims of injustice and violence. We in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church recognize economic injustice as a major cause of human suffering, and encourage commitment to a lifestyle reflecting a compassionate Christian world view.

We therefore affirm the following resolutions and direct that, where appropriate, the President of the United States and all senators and representatives of Idaho, Washington, and Oregon be notified of our action.

1. Northwest Yearly Meeting commends the American government for recognizing the democratic aspirations of the Filipino people and cooperating with them in their nonviolent revolution. We urge the Administration to continue this policy and not sacrifice our shared democratic principles for short-or long-term military objectives.

2. We are moved by the suffering of Central Americans, those displaced in their own countries and those who seek refuge in other countries. We exhort our government to cease its reliance on military involvement and to seek diplomatic solutions to the conflicts.

3. We commend and support those in South Africa who are seeking non-violent methods of reconciling the problems of injustice created by the apartheid system.

4. In accordance with the teachings of Christ and our statement of *Faith and Practice*, we support an emphasis on the teaching of peace and conflict resolution skills as applied to the family, community, nation, and world. We therefore call upon each local meeting to form and support a peace committee for educating potential draftees and all the attenders to the implications of Christ's commandment that we love our enemies.

5. We call upon those in our membership who have long held to the pacifist position to study prayerfully the implications of the holocaust against the unborn, and we also call upon those who oppose abortion to study prayerfully the implications of our historic adherence to Christ's opposition to injustice and violence against those who have already been born.

The reports and the resolution were approved.

■ 92. The Executive Council nominates to the new Commission on Ethnic Ministries: Wendell Barnett for 3 years; Robert Gilmore, 2 years; and Aaron Hamlin, 1 year. Approved.

■ 93. Earl Perisho reporting for the Evangelical Friends Alliance, distributed the following report:

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS ALLIANCE

EARL W. PERISHO, REPRESENTATIVE

The 1986 Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council sessions were held January 11-16 in Canton, Ohio. The sessions opened with commission meetings on Saturday evening. On Sunday morning, guests were assigned to various Friends churches within driving distance of Canton and were given opportunity to minister in various ways, thus exposing people of the churches to EFA and to Friends from across America. On Sunday afternoon commissions again met, followed by a Sunday evening vesper service at Canton First Friends along with members of the congregation. Following the service, commissions met again to continue their deliberations.

Beginning Monday, the rest of the schedule included worship, commission and Executive Committee meetings, Coordinating Council, plenary sessions, meetings of special committees, and informal fellowship at meals, in the halls, homes and even ice cream shops.

At the risk of some repetition of information presented by others I will try to highlight some of the significant information and actions coming from the sessions.

Publications

The Commission honored Jack Willcuts, retiring editor, for his many years of service on the staff of the *Evangelical Friend*. Lon Fendall, Editor, and members of the commission shared their vision for the future of the magazine and their commitment to continuing and increasing the effectiveness of its ministry among Friends. Other members of the magazine staff include Dan McCracken,

Managing Editor, and Harlow Ankeny, Administrative Editor. It was announced that an Assistant Editor may be named later.

Education

In addition to the three Friends missionary biographies for children now in print, the commission announced two more in process featuring the lives of Catherine Cattell [now completed] and Joy Ridderhof.

Appreciation was expressed for the years of service Betty Hockett has given the commission as early childhood specialist.

This commission is sponsoring two EFA-wide offerings this year. The Easter offering, over \$36,500, is to be used to purchase a vehicle for George and Dorothy Thomas and equipment for use in the Rwanda work. The VBS offerings will be earmarked this year for household goods for the Byrne family as they begin their work in Mexico City.

Missions

With the approval of their application by the Missions Commission, Alaska Yearly Meeting became an associate member of the Evangelical Friends Mission. This relationship allows Alaska Yearly Meeting to participate with EFM in selected EFA mission ventures and makes possible the development of a cooperative outreach strategy for Alaska and possibly beyond. James and Doris Morris attended Alaska Yearly Meeting Mid-Year Conference in March to officially welcome Alaska Yearly Meeting into EFM. James Morris, Ron Woodward, and Earl Perisho made a trip to Alaska in early July to meet with AYM's Board of Administration to develop the relationship further.

The establishment of the newest EFM mission in Rwanda, Africa, is underway. Veteran African missionaries George and Dorothy Thomas and Willard Ferguson left the U.S. in February to launch the new work. After assisting Thomases with the initial contacts and ministry, Willard returned to the U.S. briefly and then he and Doris returned to Rwanda this summer to join the Thomases in the work there. The sponsorship of the Free Methodists makes it possible to begin work in the country to pave the way for official government recognition of our mission.

Youth

Each Yearly Meeting is asked to send a representative to next year's coordinating Council sessions to consider whether the reestablishment of a Youth Commission would be helpful.

Annual Meetings

It was decided that the Coordinating Council will continue to rotate the location of its annual sessions among the member yearly meetings. Efforts will be made to increase local awareness and participation in the host Yearly Meeting by including a weekend assignment to area churches Sunday morning, and a major area rally on Sunday evening with no Sunday commission sessions.

EFA Sunday will be held concurrently with the Coordinating Council sessions across EFA.

The next Coordinating Council sessions will be held in Mid-America Yearly Meeting beginning January 9, 1987.

Approved.

■ 94. A report from the Epistle Committee was read by the assistant clerk:

To Northwest Yearly Meeting:

We received epistles from 33 yearly meetings—22 from yearly meetings within the United States and 11 from abroad. In addition, six epistles came from junior yearly meetings and five from youth.

Several showed appreciation for the ministry of members from our Yearly Meeting and for those who have roots among us. These are Howard Harmon, Oscar Brown, Charles Mylander, Eugene Coffin, and Paul Anderson. One yearly meeting felt especially blessed by the attendance of missionaries, and Rocky Mountain mentioned Bob and Cheri Hampton. Two Bolivians were at Central; North Pacific was pleased to have Salvadorians in attendance.

It is interesting to note that other yearly meetings were revising their *Faith and Practice*; North Pacific hopes to have theirs ready for printing this year. Illinois says their handbook will support and nurture the deepening of the Spirit. Friends Church: Southwest Yearly Meeting (formerly California) reaffirms the Richmond Declaration of Faith.

Blessing was felt by many after the Young Friends Gathering in North Carolina. Pacific Yearly Meeting mentions that their young people found "they could respect the differences and develop a feeling of love for the individuals." Lake Erie Yearly Meeting said the Gathering "brought vividly home to us the spiritual richness and diversity in our own Quaker world community. As we return to our home communities, we shall endeavor to learn more about our own faith community and also become better acquainted with those from other strands of Quakerism through intervisitation." (Full text was read at Yearly Meeting.)

The epistle prepared to be sent from our yearly meeting to other yearly meetings was read.

To Friends Everywhere:

Greetings from the 94th session of Northwest Yearly Meeting held on the George Fox College campus in Newberg, Oregon, July 26-August 1, 1986.

General Superintendent Jack Willcuts gave his keynote address based on the theme of "Reaching Out with Joy," and Psalm 150. Joy is the heartbeat of a Christian, a family, and the church. Because of the joy set before Him, Christ endured the cross, the center of our faith. Why do so few Christians radiate joy? Joy is predicted in our theme, Isaiah 55:12, "For you shall go out in joy and be led forth in peace." "Be of good cheer; I have overcome the world," said Jesus. Praise the Lord!

Rick Hunt, church-planting consultant, ministered to us in the morning messages. He likened the Christian experience to a journey, with many Christians still in the waiting room. He spoke to each individual of the need for personal, radical obedience to prepare us for outreach to a world lost in sin. Sensitive to the leading of the Holy Spirit, the clerks laid aside the scheduled business on two occasions to allow for public confession and healing of relationships.

When it became apparent that our scheduled speaker for the evening sessions, Robert Hess, would be unable to attend because of a serious health problem, in the Lord's providence Charles Mylander, superintendent of California (now Southwest) Yearly Meeting was available. His timely messages were well received, with numbers at the altar. He stressed that we will never come to spiritual maturity until we begin to triumph in the areas of our greatest temptation. He followed this with admonitions first to fathers and then to parents and grandparents for personal witness by word and deed in the home, concluding with a message on forgiveness, especially the need to forgive ourselves.

"Have Car . . . Will Travel" was the theme of the annual Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship banquet. The offering helped purchase a vehicle to be used by missionary families on furlough. Gen Fitch shared her experiences from Peru. Geraldine Custer was a special guest; she had spent 36 years in Burundi.

The offering at the Men's Dinner will be used to keep Steve and Janelle Baron on our South American fields another year as they promote instruction in building greenhouses and other agricultural aid and also educating in animal husbandry.

We were blessed by the ministry of the Ben Fitch family, having recently come home on furlough from Peru, and Roscoe and Tina Knight, veteran missionaries from three of our fields and most recently returned from Jerusalem, where they shared a ministry at the Garden Tomb. Roscoe presented the new Evangelical Friends Mission field in Rwanda, Africa. The youth who had been to Bolivia and Peru on the YCEW team gave witness before the Yearly Meeting and the Friends Women that there are Youth Consecrated for the Evangelization of the World. Concerns regarding EFM fields were presented by Anna Nixon, who served 44 years in India.

Oscar Brown led workshops on prayer challenging us to ask God for a burdened heart for revival and to show us our part of the price. Concerns about peace, the prison ministry, women's opportunities, family life, ministry to the deaf, and our role in Central America were also presented in workshops.

President Stevens reported that George Fox College had launched a fund-raising campaign called Century II; one of its main goals is to enlarge the present library. A couple of firsts for the college are the new Human Resources Management program for working adults with two or more years of college credit, and Juniors Abroad, a program emphasizing the Christian world view and providing a three-week study tour for full-time students.

Our sessions have been centered around our heart cry to God for revival because we recognize the utter futility of human effort to accomplish God's purpose in the world. Coming to the end of ourselves as we seek a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit to bring us back to the power of our Quaker witness: To quake as the Holy Spirit moves in and through us making us channels of His Truth.

We commend you "To Him who is able to keep you from falling and to present you before His glorious presence without fault and with great joy . . . to the only God our Savior be glory, majesty, power and authority, through Jesus Christ our Lord, before all ages, now and forevermore! Amen."

We may be called upon to "rappel over cliffs" in obedience to God—as Abraham—not knowing where we are going.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE 1985-1986

"Consider it pure joy whenever you face trials of many kinds . . . the testing of your faith develops perseverance . . . so that you may be mature and complete . . ." (James 1:2-4)

In many ways we have had a year of "pure joy!" (You can smile if you like. I am.) Seriously, we have had our trials! But, praise God, they have moved us toward maturity in Christ.

We started the year with 22 students below our budget projections—pure joy! With a great effort by all members of the body—faculty, staff, alumni, friends, et al—we *balanced* our budget for the 15th consecutive year. Much of the credit should go to Don Millage, our vice president for financial affairs. He is an outstanding financial manager.

We started the year with more than \$700,000 awarded in financial aid—nearly four times the amount given in 1979-80 when student numbers were greater. However, we have received more than \$500,000 in *new* endowment scholarship funds—all from the Lord's hands; we didn't ask for any of these gifts!

The Development Office had three of five people new to their positions, and yet we increased our annual fund giving by more than \$80,000 and successfully launched the Century II Campaign. We have more than \$2,500,000 of our \$8,300,000 goal committed. Pray with us, work with us over the next three years to see the needs met and the Lord glorified.

We rejoice when there are trials and challenges because we know it will help us individually and as a college to grow in faith. We do persevere with the faith that God's work in our students and through our graduates will go forward. That is *pure joy*!

PROGRAM

"Experience Excellence" is the theme for George Fox College as it contacts prospective students through the Admissions Office. It's a well-chosen theme, more than just "marketing" words. George Fox College does have excellence. Consider:

"We Experience an Excellent Faith in One who used reason, rhetoric, narrative arts, and consummate social graces in sharing His Good News with hurting people.

"We Experience an Excellent Heritage from Quaker pioneers who founded this school a century ago, and we see the relevance of biblical Friends teaching in the remarkable ministry of alumnus Richard Foster's books.

"We Experience an Excellent Community where 'there's more joy per capita,' as one professor puts it, 'than any other place I know!'

"We Experience an Excellent Freedom to explore our potential, to experiment with scholarship, to mature in mind and spirit.

"We Experience an Excellent World beyond our valley, in Washington, D.C., seminars, Juniors Abroad travel courses, and Center for Peace Learning excursions."

Those were the words of Academic Vice President Lee Nash. But George Fox also has confirmation from outside authorities.

During the year three accrediting agencies gave academic affirmation. The five-year interim visit by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges occurred October 15. The programs of George Fox College were commended and approved for another five years without the usual and expected "progress report" in three years.

In April the Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission examined GFC's teacher education program. It was approved and recommended for a full five-year extension.

And, GFC received an accrediting boost with the approval by the Northwest Association of the new Human Resources Management program for non-traditional students. This degree completion program for the working adult with two or more years of college credit already earned will begin this fall. It includes credit for life experience, and packages senior year requirements into once-a-week classes and Saturday workshops. Working with the National College of Education as contracted consultants, GFC has developed this program to expand its outreach into the Portland and Salem areas.

George Fox's excellence was shown in a public way in October with the release of statistics showing the College with the second highest passing rate of any college in Oregon for students taking the California Basic Education Skills Test (CBEST) exam.

GFC was in a near tie for first at 88.5, topping all public schools and in a near tie for first with Lewis & Clark at 88.8.

JUNIORS ABROAD. George Fox College's emphasis on the Christian World View took further steps with the selection of China and Israel as the destination for first participants in the new Juniors Abroad program. It will provide a three-week study tour to students who maintain full-time enrollment through the spring of their junior year and who plan to graduate from GFC. All air and ground transportation will be provided, with students paying only for room and board at places economically arranged by the College. The first trips will be in May 1987 as the College fulfills its goal of enriching intercultural and international awareness of the campus community.

CHANGE TO SEMESTERS. During the year final adjustments were made for the transition to a semester calendar operation for 1986-87. The change ends 21 years with a term or quarter system. The College's calendar and curriculum next year will operate on a 4-4-1 plan, or early semester system with two 15-week semesters followed by an optional May term of special courses. It is believed there will be practical efficiencies as well as a change of pace to bring more thorough scholarship.

CENTER FOR PEACE LEARNING. George Fox's newest program completed its first year, offering a variety of programs and courses both on and off campus. The year also included films, displays, seminars, forums, and drama. In March the delay of departure of students and tour members from the island nation of Haiti because of unrest in Port-au-Prince brought extraordinary news coverage in the Northwest and nationally.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCIAL

George Fox College's Century II Campaign was launched in January, the largest campaign in the College's history. This comprehensive campaign has the goal of doubling the size of the present library, adding 40,000 volumes, doubling the College's endowment, and providing \$1.5 million for student financial aid and scholarships. The total program has a goal of \$5 million in the first phase and \$3.3 million in the second. Funding is included for a \$2.25 million library expansion to 36,000 square feet to house 150,000 volumes. The purchase of additional volumes is budgeted at \$1.25 million. In the second phase, \$3 million is designated for the endowment, currently at \$2 million. The College's various constituencies—alumni, board of trustee members, faculty and staff, church supporters, and community—will be contacted in the campaign, which has March 31 as completion target.

BALANCED BUDGET. Although perhaps not quite as "glamorous" as the public "Century II Campaign," of significant importance is the completion of George Fox College's 15th year with a balanced budget. This is a remarkable record! It was all possible when faculty and staff members last fall took a voluntary salary reduction, budgets were trimmed, and financial support for the College rose significantly from \$355,000 in general fund giving in 1984-85 to

\$437,217 during the 1985-86 fiscal year. It was a new record, for which we are grateful.

HUMANITIES GRANT. George Fox College, as a member of the national Christian College Consortium, is one of 13 colleges sharing a \$1.8 million, three-year grant from the J. Howard Pew Freedom Trust, Philadelphia. GFC's share is approximately \$125,000. The purpose is to internationalize the curriculum, to stress ethical values in the curriculum, and to enhance communication through writing across the entire curriculum. Seminars and workshops are involved, as well as study trips, including one in which I participated (along with two faculty members) in traveling to the Mideast for two weeks in June.

LEADERSHIP

Harold W. (Buck) McCrone was named Vice President for Advancement and Administration October 1, assuming responsibility for the College's Development Office, Admissions Office, Tilikum Retreat Center, and Videocommunication Center. He came to George Fox from Linfield College, where he was vice president for college relations. He has a background of 20 years as a corporate attorney prior to sensing a call to Christian education. Within the Development Office, Dave Adrian was named to the position of Director of Development and K. Gene Christian was named Director of Alumni Relations.

In June, Jeffrey Rickey, president of GFC's Alumni Association, was named to the full-time position of Director of Admissions. He had been manager of Ingram and Associates, a Portland human service company. New associate director is Linda Corlett, a 1981 GFC graduate. New admissions counselors are Jodi Peters, a 1985 grad, and Kent McGowan, a member of the Class of 1986. The Admissions Office has contracted with a national admissions marketing firm, D. H. Dagley Associates, Atlanta, for management service.

In April, Lee Gerig concluded seven years as Vice President for Student Affairs, accepting a position as dean of admissions and marketing at Seattle University. Debra D. Lacey, associate dean of students, was named Acting Dean of Students at that time, to serve as Dean of Students for the 1986-87 year. Several other personnel changes were made in a reorganization of Student Life responsibilities.

Tim Tsohantaris, who served as Acting Director of Christian Life for the last year, has been named Director of Christian Life and also will be head soccer coach.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

FALL CONVOCATION. George Fox College formally opened its 95th year October 7 with a Convocation program featuring as guest speaker Daniel Smith, a 1977 GFC graduate who has completed doctoral study at Oxford University and now is a liaison in Israel for Quaker Peace Service of London Yearly Meeting.

RELIGIOUS CONFERENCES. Christian Life Week October 21-25 featured Darryl DelHousaye, senior pastor of the Scottsdale, Arizona, Bible Church. The 29th annual Missions Conference in January had 30 missionary representatives and special speakers Ralph Winter, founder and director of the U.S. Center for World Mission, and Robert Sjogren, recruitment director for Frontiers, an international missions agency. The Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecture for a series in April was John Perkins, founder of Voice of Calvary Ministries in Mississippi, now president of the John M. Perkins Foundation for Reconciliation and Development in Pasadena. The Spring Theological conference in April featured a major address by Ron Selleck of Haverford College.

ACADEMIC CONFERENCES AND EVENTS. The College sponsored its fifth biennial Herbert Hoover Symposium March 1 with the theme "Monitoring American-Soviet Relations," and papers by several national Hoover scholars.

Sociologist-author David Moberg, chairman of the department of social and cultural sciences at Marquette University, was speaker for the sixth annual Social Involvement Conference April 1-2. Theme was "Reaching Across Generations."

The College hosted two Elderhostel programs at the Tilikum Retreat Center, the fall session emphasizing peace and the spring featuring "Sights and Sounds: A Sensory Experience of Spring in Oregon's Willamette Valley." The national program offers special courses to adults 60 and over.

Faculty Lecture programs were presented twice. The fall presentation by William D. Green, professor of religion, was "The U.S. Role in the Restoration of Israel." The spring lecture by Robert Lauinger, associate professor of music, was "The Clarinet: Its History and Literature."

MUSIC AND DRAMA. Music Theater productions during the year were *Oklahoma* and *The Best of Broadway*. Drama performances were *Screw Tape* fall term, Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* winter term, and *Oh, It's Just War*, a premiere by GFC alumnus Ben Dobbeck, who wrote and directed the play, produced spring term. Mendelssohn's *Elijah* was performed April 6 by a 200-member Festival Chorus.

ATHLETICS. All-Americans led the way for GFC athletics with forward Kenny Stone named an NAIA All-American in basketball, one of just seven juniors selected. He won every regional small college basketball award available. In cross country, senior Scott Ball was named to the NAIA Academic All-American team. The Bruins continued to be competitive in 10 sports.
