MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1987

Monday, July 27, 10:45 a.m.

■ 1. Presiding Clerk Richard Beebe read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 95th sessions on July 27, 1987, on the campus of George Fox College with the theme "New things I declare . . . says the Lord." (Isaiah 42:9) He led in prayer.

■ 2. The Board of Missions presentation on Sunday afternoon was approved.

■ 3. The presentation of the Board of Evangelism on Sunday evening was approved.

■ 4. The keynote message by General Superintendent Howard E. Harmon, Sunday evening, was approved as follows:

As Beth and I were both raised within Northwest Yearly Meeting, many of you know more about us than we would put in our resumé. But for those who are not acquainted, let me share a few words of background. Dean Gregory, while pastoring the Lents Church, united Beth and me in marriage in 1951. Upon graduation from George Fox College we moved to Seattle, Washington, to begin our pastoral ministry. Now these 35 years later you have called us to serve as your superintendent. The men who have served in this position during my memory have had a great impact upon my life, from Joe Reece to Jack Willcuts and each of those in between.

I daily thank the Lord for my wife, Beth; our three children, Marilyn, David, and Judy; Rosanne, our daughter-in-law; our three grandchildren; and the extended family God has given us. To you I say "thank you" for your encouragement and what you each have meant to my life.

Also I relish the friendships in our local church families that have developed over the years where we have had the good fortune to pastor, such as Holly Park, Springbrook, Netarts, Lynwood, and Clackamas Park. The whole family of Friends in the Northwest has provided my spiritual roots. I give the Lord praise for you who have nurtured me and set a solid example of what a dedicated life is.

ONWARD

The year was 1654. The Lord was moving mightily in the North country of England through His vessel, George Fox. With the Holy Spirit's powerful leading a group of dedicated believers joined Fox and went throughout England

and beyond preaching and teaching. This band of 54 men and 12 women became known as the Valiant Sixty. Salaries, housing, and retirement were not even considered—the only thought being that God had called them to speak forth His Word, and they obeyed. I am reminded of stories concerning the Christian Workers' League in the early 1930s. People like Denver Headrick, Chester Hadley, Charles Beals, Robert Morrill, Ed Harmon, Fred Baker, Milo Ross, and Oscar Brown preached across the Northwest, in tents, school buildings, or wherever they could find a place to hold meetings. In ten years the number of Friends churches grew from 22 to 35, over a 50 percent increase. With the new growth came a fresh emphasis on camps, youth work, George Fox College, and missions. As the church expanded, many areas of Northwest Yearly Meeting flourished. What a rich pattern for us to follow!

Elton Trueblood wrote in the book *People Called Quakers*, "The only way to be loyal to the heritage of the pioneers is to pioneer, rather than to go on standing where the pioneer once stood." With all my heart I praise the Lord for our heritage, but now I say let's move forward. The Holy Spirit has already been working. Many hearts are tender, just waiting for an invitation from us to meet our dearest Friend, the Lord Jesus.

I come with a concern for future pastoral and church leadership, both at home and overseas. Our youth have been challenged to serve the Lord on many fields, and rightly so. We need vibrant Christians in all occupations of life. But what about the pastoral ministry? The need is for God's choicest young people to dedicate themselves to answer the call to the unreached. While visiting England we stood at the summit of Pendle Hill where George Fox received a vision from the Lord of a great people to be gathered.

I asked our guide about the historic significance of Pendle Hill. As we looked over the countryside, which was dotted with small farms much like it was during George Fox's life, he told me the story of Fox standing in that very location. As he watched the smoke curling to the sky from the fires within the homes, the Lord revealed that there was a great people to be gathered. In questioning our guide about the meaning of George Fox's vision for us today he said, "Today we have great social programs. There is not the need that there was in the time of George Fox." I felt he only thought of George Fox's message as meeting the physical need. He had entirely missed the spiritual vision of Fox. Look out with me this evening over the Northwest. Do you see spiritually hungry people, searching for satisfaction, who will not find it unless they come to the Lord? What are you going to do about it?

This year we plan to have meetings with our young people who are open to ministry to challenge and encourage them to be a part of pastoral and missionary service. If you are here and interested in ministry, or know of someone who is, please write your name and address down and give it to me or mail it to the Yearly Meeting office.

This past year, church membership increased by 40 people. However, according to the reports that have come in, overall morning worship attendance decreased by 248. What explanation can we give? Isn't it time for all of us within Northwest Yearly Meeting to become excited in carrying out the Great Commission? A few years ago I was watching the Portland Trailblazers on television. They were playing in a lethargic way, dropping about 20 points behind in the score. Since I do not enjoy watching a basketball team that plays only halfheartedly, I was preparing to flip off the channel. Just then Portland made a slam dunk. Within a few seconds one of their players had stolen the ball, and they had another two points.

The momentum changed. Instead of being a team playing haphazardly, they scrambled for every loose ball, outlasted the opponents, and ended up winning the game by a wide margin. Do we compare at all to the Trailblazers? The momentum must change. I recall hearing that the early Christians outlived, outdied, and outloved the pagan world. Their enthusiasm to spread the Good

News of Jesus was a direct result of their relationship to the Lord and their total dedication to serve the Lord wherever they were. That included teaching from house to house, in distant lands, and even in prison. That is the momentum we need.

Onward in building the Kingdom—Onward in risk taking for the Lord. I dread the idea of holding the fort—just maintaining—when the Lord gives us the command to move out into the strongholds of Satan and conquer for the Lord.

UPWARD

At the same moment that we are pushing onward we must be turning upward with an ever-increasing relationship with the Lord. I'm so thankful for the prayer ministry that Rick Hunt and Oscar Brown have been encouraging this past year. The hunger for communion with our Lord is deepening. Let's continue to pray together that every aspect of the Friends Church may be saturated with the powerful presence of God.

Nicholas Herman lived in the 1600s. He says of himself that he was a great awkward person who broke everything. When he was 40 years of age he felt the call of the Lord to give himself completely to Him; thus he entered a monastery, where he became a worker in the kitchen. In one of his writings he said, "Were I a preacher, I should preach above all other things the practice of the presence of God; were I a teacher, I should advise all the world to it; so necessary do I think it is and so easy." It is no wonder we hang onto the words of this man we call Brother Lawrence. He teaches us to be constantly aware of the presence of God.

John 7:37 says, "... if you are thirsty come to the Living Water and drink." There is no need to spend your precious time and energy rushing here and there searching for wells that end up having no lasting water. Just come to the source, the Living Lord.

In Israel we visited Jacob's well where Jesus talked to the Samaritan woman. Standing there we reminisced about how confused she was when Jesus told her He would give her living water. She asked how Jesus could give Living Water when He had nothing with which to draw. He replied, "... whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water; welling up to eternal life." (John 4:14-15) With all of the activity coming during this Yearly Meeting we must sense the presence of the Lord and take time to wait upon Him, to drink deeply of this Living Water.

When the early church lost its deep inner spiritual relationship to Christ it lost its life and vision. As the inner life is restored so will the enthusiasm to share the Good News at every opportunity be restored. The development of this inner life is our upward journey.

OUTWARD

As we abide in the Vine and He abides in us, He will sustain us and His fruit will appear.

Love—one aspect of the fruit of the Spirit—will be an evidence, an automatic result of His indwelling. The language of true love is strange and unnatural to the person who does not abide in Him. But it is perfectly natural to the one who does.

Will you seek with me to allow the Lord to love through each of us this week and throughout the year? If you feel the nudge to express a word of thanks to another, do it. If some people have encouraged you through their lives, let them know.

Jackie Robinson was the first black baseball player to play in the big leagues. He was a brilliant ball player with the Brooklyn Dodgers. As he took the field his first year he was consistently met by boos, ugly names were screamed at him, and threats were made on his life. One day during a ball game, as he was

playing second base, he made an error. The stands erupted with shouts and boos. Jackie tells that he wanted to leave that park and all of those irate fans and never return. The next ball was again hit to Jackie, and this skillful ball player made another error. At that the stands exploded with shouts to take him out, send him home. The noise was deafening. PeeWee Reese, who was playing shortstop, walked over to Jackie, and as the crowds jeered he put his arm around him and embraced him. Jackie said that act by PeeWee Reese saved his career. He went on to be one of the best who ever played the game. Friends, the Lord has called us to be builders together, ones who strengthen each other. First Thessalonians 5:11 reads, "Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing." When Satan would destroy the church, he needs to find a solid defense of those who would give their lives for one another. One of my favorite statements tells us how the church was known: "Behold how they love one another."

Onward, Upward, and Outward. The warmth of a loving group of people breeds its own hazards, and one of these hazards is to become self-satisfied. We enjoy the companionship of those of like minds and taste. It is uncomfortable to have folks come into our midst who talk differently, act differently, and have vastly different standards from ours. How could Jesus go to the house of Zachaeus, or visit with the Samaritan woman and be at ease? His depth of love looked past the offensive outward behavior as He saw a hurting hungry person. Let's ask the Lord to shake us out of our ruts of complacency and thrust us into His great harvest field. Might those things that break the heart of the Lord break our hearts. Hurting people are all around us and we dare not be content to praise the Lord in our chapels while people are perishing just outside our doors.

This year may we dream big, plan well, and put our efforts into action. In 1 Chronicles 29:5 the Scriptures record the words of David as he challenges the people with the great task of building the Temple. He asks, "Now, who is willing to consecrate himself today to the Lord?" Who? Will you step forward? "Who is willing?" The Lord does not use arm twisting nor does He put a guilt trip upon us. He calls by His Spirit, and we must volunteer. The call is for today. The church planting now taking place in Arequipa, Peru; La Paz, Bolivia; and here in the U.S. is as exciting as any ministry anywhere. John Wesley said, "The field is the world," and I wholeheartedly agree! Thank the Lord for one-week-old Forrest John Cammack's parents, Dan and Tami Cammack, who have answered the call to serve on the mission field, along with Ken and Tonya Comfort. They have spent years in preparation and soon will leave for language school. Isn't it great that we have a part in sending Tim and Kathy Fox to Mexico and the Thomases to Rwanda! Right here in the Northwest there are great gaps where there is no evangelical witness. I am so thankful that Retha McCutchen is now working with the Board of Evangelism in church planting, which is high priority in Northwest Yearly Meeting. During these years we must reach out in areas like Beaverton, Sandy, Seattle, and Fruitland. Who will go? Lord, broaden our vision to include all of Your world. Yes, the field is the world.

Let us build upon the great past that many have had a part in, giving of themselves sacrificially and completely. But may we not only revere the past but have vision for the future. Our history of obedience to the Lord, as exciting and colorful as it is, will not suffice for the 21st century. The Friends Church cannot coast into the future being propelled only by past blessings. The spontaneous expansion of the church occurs when people today are under control of the Holy Spirit and allow Him to guide their lives as He wills.

Onward—in risk-taking ventures to build the Lord's Kingdom. Upward—as we take time to commune with the Lord and seek His guidance. Outward—finding ways to encourage and build our brothers and sisters in the Lord, looking for opportunities to tell others of our Lord, to minister to the needs of

others, and put as top priority the Great Commission, both in the Northwest and around the world.

■ 5. A communication from Maurice Roberts, superintendent of Mid-America Yearly Meeting, commending Howard Harmon to us as our new superintendent, was read.

■ 6. A traveling minute for Earl and Janice Perisho was read. They attended the Triennial sessions of Friends United Meeting in June. A returning minute from FUM was also read, and Earl spoke briefly concerning their visit.

■ 7. Roy Clark introduced Glen Boring, president of the Oregon State Christian Holiness Association, who brought greetings for CHA and announced that the national convention will be held in Portland, Oregon, April 19-21, 1988.

■ 8. Max and Kathleen Huffman from Indiana were introduced and brought greetings. They have held Holy Life Conferences in several churches in Northwest Yearly Meeting, and announced their availability for other churches.

■ 9. A traveling minute from Friends General Conference for Bill Strachan was read. He brought personal greetings.

■ 10. Sandra Gey from Friends Committee on National Legislation is present at our sessions, and brought greetings.

■ 11. A communication from North Pacific Yearly Meeting regarding the attendance of Jean Roberts and Barbara Janoe was read, and they brought personal greetings.

■ 12. Dan McCracken introduced Rebecca Mays representing Quakers United in Publications. She brought personal greetings and spoke of the vision and scope of QUIP.

■ 13. John Porter of Friends World Committee on Consultation brought greetings. Cilde Grover, a member at Reedwood Friends in Portland and new Western Field Staff for FWCC, spoke briefly.

■ 14. A communication from Arthur O. Roberts, clerk of the Discipline Revision Committee, was read, and the following recommendations from that committee were presented as second reading:

- The Council of Elders to consist of 12 persons. Approved.
- Restatement of Trustee's signatory duties. Approved.
- Approve "What Friends Believe" (see Minutes 17 and 44 from 1986 Minutes). Approved.
- Rewording for affiliate membership (#45 and 46, 1986 Minutes). Approved.
- Deletion of a line in section "Bestowment of Gifts" (see #50, 1986 Minutes). Approved.

■ 15. The Discipline Revision Committee stated that the organizational chart of yearly meetings is being redrawn. They propose using a chart prepared by Paul Anderson for the newly revised edition of Williams's *Rich Heritage of Quakerism*. Approved.

■ 16. The Discipline Revision Committee reported: During the past year, at the urging of the Executive Council, we met with members of two boards concerned about maintaining departmental strength within prescribed numerical limits. The Committee felt they could maintain strength once appointments more closely correspond to board functions. The Committee urged patience in transition and a willingness to test procedures over time. The board members agreed.

■ 17. The Discipline Revision Committee presented the following edited descriptive material to read: "Northwest Yearly Meeting has continued to look to the Richmond Declaration of Faith (1887) as a basic document of Friends belief. It also continues to set forth interpretations of Christian faith for contemporary Friends. A significant statement of faith was adopted in 1902, and major revisions were made in 1945, 1970, and 1987. For the 1987 adoption see 'What Friends Believe,' pages 6-9. In the section below are the most recent interpretations adopted by the Yearly Meeting prior to 1987. The following 'Doctrines,' 'Testimonies,' and 'Fundamental Truths' (pp. 68-74) are from the 1979 *Constitution and Discipline*. They include the official changes and additions made between 1979 and 1987."

■ 18. It was recommended that the term "assistant superintendent" be employed instead of "executive secretary" as more appropriate to general usage and to the job description. Approved.

■ 19. It was recommended that the 1986 draft of *Faith and Practice*, a book of *Christian Discipline*, with the approved changes and corrections, be accepted. Approved.

■ 20. Vivian Thornburg, clerk of the Council of Elders, reported on the first year of this new council. She spoke of their concerns for our Yearly Meeting and local churches that we be careful stewards of our God-given responsibilities; that we have scriptural integrity and conduct our business as accountable unto God.

■ 21. A certificate of service for Jack and Geraldine Willcuts from Newberg Friends Church and Northwest Yearly Meeting was read. Several responses were also read.

■ 22. The business meeting adjourned with prayer by Norman Winters, assistant presiding clerk.

Tuesday, July 28, 10:45 a.m.

■ 23. Deann Thompson, a member of Friends Memorial Church in Seattle, opened the meeting with prayer.

■ 24. The minutes of the Monday morning session were read. Since there were several corrections to be made in the minutes regarding the Discipline Revision Committee report, the approval of these minutes was postponed until the afternoon session.

■ 25. The Council of Elders report presented at the Monday morning service was approved.

■ 26. Richard Benham, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 27. Virginia Helm brought greetings from Guatemala and Honduras yearly meetings, which she visited this past year. She also introduced Jotham Simiyu from the Elgon Religious Society of Friends in Kenya. An introductory letter from the World Ministries Commission of Friends United Meeting for Jotham was read. He also brought personal greetings.

■ 28. Deann Thompson for the Social Concerns Board gave the following report:

BOARD OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

This has been a year of transition for our board. We have worked hard breaking into the departments assigned to us by the new *Faith and Practice*. We are still working on defining the scope and direction of each department.

Some of the activities our board has been involved in during this year are:

- We sponsored with the Board of Missions the Thanksgiving Offering. There was a total of \$15,344 received, which was used for flood relief in Bolivia and Peru, and to complete last year's project in Zambia.
 - We assisted in the reorganization of the Quaker Benevolent Society.
 - The Department of Peace held a school for church peace committees in February at Reedwood Friends Church.
 - The Department of Moral Action worked hard developing resources for local churches.
 - The Department of Relief and Rehabilitation has worked in the area of prison and deaf ministries.
 - Our board is putting on several workshops during Yearly Meeting sessions this week.
 - We are currently also developing two scholarship programs.
- This report was approved.

■ 29. Carolyn Staples presented her concern that we all be better informed on a current social issue, AIDS, and recommended a book by Gene Antonio, *The Aids Cover-up*.

■ 30. Aaron Hamlin reported for the National Black Evangelical Association. He announced their 25th anniversary celebration to be held this year in Pasadena. He expressed appreciation to Northwest Yearly Meeting for our support through the years of both the NBEA and the work at Piedmont, and urged continued interest and prayer. He reported that 77 are involved in the Friends for Kids program at Piedmont, with 18 serving on the staff.

His report was approved.

■ 31. Earl Perisho presented the following report for the Evangelical Friends Alliance:

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS ALLIANCE

The 1987 Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council sessions were held January 10-14 at Friendswood, Texas, in Mid-America Yearly Meeting. Guests were housed in the homes of area Friends.

Highlights of the 1987 sessions included

- the naming of Howard Harmon, assistant superintendent of Mid-America Yearly Meeting, since named general superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting, as the new president of EFA.
- reports of the preparations for "Guatemala '87"—the International Friends Conference on Evangelism November 4-11 in Guatemala City, Guatemala, where Friends from around the world will gather to share with one another and to train to effectively reach the world for Christ.
- the presence for the first time of a representative from Alaska Yearly Meeting, now an associate member of Evangelical Friends Mission. Robert Sheldon, pastor at Noatak and more recently named general superintendent of Alaska Yearly Meeting, was their representative.
- the reorganization of a Youth Commission in the EFA.
- the presence and participation of EFM missionaries David and Joyce Byrne, who left immediately following the sessions for ministry in Mexico City, and George and Dorothy Thomas, pioneer missionaries to Rwanda. (At the

spring board meetings in May, Tim and Kathy Fox were also placed under appointment by the EFM Board.)

- the announcement by the Education Commission of "Friendship Day" on October 18 as an EFA-wide outreach for Friends churches. They reported successful Easter and VBS offerings in 1986 of over \$40,000 for mission projects. The 1987 offerings will support Guatemala '87 and Mexico ministries.

- hearing of the increased circulation and the redesign of the *Evangelical Friend*, which celebrates its 20th anniversary in September.

The 1988 sessions of the Coordinating Council will be hosted by Northwest Yearly Meeting January 9-13.

This report was approved.

- 32. The session closed with prayer by Norman Winters.

Tuesday, July 28, 2:15 p.m.

- 33. Norman Winters, assistant presiding clerk, opened the afternoon session with prayer.

- 34. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The corrections to the minutes of the Monday morning session were read and approved.

- 35. The Education Board presented a skit using the format of a formal hearing to present their programs for the coming year and to report on the past year. The following reports were distributed:

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES

LOUISE M. SARGENT, CLERK

The Department of Christian Testimonies completed three publications this year. These are now available through Barclay Press.

The *QUERIES* from the new *Faith and Practice* have been printed on adhesive paper in a size that will fit inside the cover of a hymnal. Our purpose in this project is to make the *Queries* more accessible to the worshiper and to encourage their regular use in our churches. These are being distributed free of charge to all churches through the pastor.

A reprint of *The Gifts of the Holy Spirit* by Everett Cattell is available in pamphlet form. These are sized to fit into the tract racks this department distributed several years ago. Purchase copies for yourself and your church at the Barclay Press display table.

A pamphlet and poster of *QUERIES FOR CHILDREN* has also been produced by the department. These were written by Fern Roberts. They are designed to be used by parents and Sunday schools. Copies of these also are available at the Barclay Press display table for a small charge.

The teaching series *A Matter of Stewardship* continues to be used effectively by Friends across the United States and by other churches as well. Plans are underway to produce similar teaching materials on the sanctity of human life, home and family, and Everett Cattell's book, *The Spirit of Holiness*.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

STEVEN WOOD, CLERK

INTERDENOMINATIONAL CONFERENCES. The Department of Church Education has focused energy this past year on encouraging Christian education workers to participate in local and regional interdenominational Christian workers conferences. The department especially promoted participation in the Willamette Valley Christian Education Conference and the Spokane Christian Workers Conference. We sponsored Friends luncheons at both of these events

and provided several Friends workshop leaders. The department hopes local churches will make participation in these conferences and the Friends luncheons annual events.

The WVCE Conference is scheduled again for October 2 & 3. The Spokane Conference will be March 10-12, 1988.

FRESH START '88. In the coming year we will be preparing to do worker training/enrichment events across the Yearly Meeting. These will occur next spring and will use the theme *FRESH START '88 - A Pause That Refreshes*. The preliminary schedule is as follows:

Saturday, March 12 Newberg, Portland, Salem, Southwest Washington areas, Sunday, March 13 Puget Sound Area, Monday, March 14 Southern Oregon Area, Thursday, March 17 Inland, Northern Idaho, Saturday, March 19 Boise, Greenleaf areas. Our EFA age level specialists will be providing some of the expertise for this emphasis.

SUNDAY SCHOOL STANDARDS. Nearly half of our churches have been presented with notebooks that provide guidelines for organizing, conducting, and evaluating their Sunday school programs. The notebooks include a special section on teaching Friends beliefs and distinctives. The placement of this resource in our churches is a continuing ministry of the department.

RESOURCES. Two video tapes have been added to the resources available for loan to churches through the YM office.

"Discipline for Children" has two programs especially for Sunday school teachers of preschool and school age children. "Somebody Told" is a resource for use with Christian Education committees and workers on the subject of sexual abuse.

YOUTH SUPERINTENDENT. This position went unfilled this past year, but Bruce Bishop has been called to serve for the next two and one-half years in this capacity. Bruce will be working three-quarters time in this position providing encouragement and help to youth and youth workers in the Yearly Meeting, as well as caring for some administrative supervision of youth programming. A substantial portion of our department's budget has been allocated for the funding of this position. We consider the work of the Youth Superintendent one of the highest priorities of our board.

EFA FRIENDSHIP SUNDAY, OCTOBER 18, 1987. Our department continues to heartily support the work of the EFA Christian Education Commission, the Aldersgate Graded Sunday School Curriculum, and our EFA Christian Education Consultant, Dorothy Barratt. We encourage all NWYM churches to schedule a Friendship Sunday in the coming year, using and adapting the material being made available through EFA.

We are grateful for the participation of our churches in the annual EFA Easter Missions Offering this year. Over \$34,000 was raised, \$6,738 from 34 NWYM churches, for David and Joyce Byrne's ministry in Mexico City.

We are also happy to announce the release of another EFA-produced children's missionary biography, written by Betty Hockett. The book, *Catching Their Talk in a Box*, tells the story of Joy Ridderhof, a Quaker and the founder of Gospel Recordings.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

HECTOR J. MUNN, CLERK

Many NWYM church facilities are being utilized during the week for private educational programs serving the general community. Twelve churches are used for kindergartens, co-op preschools, or day-care centers. Elementary programs are part of the ministry of Greenleaf Friends, Hayden Lake Friends, Newberg Friends, and Silvertown Friends. Greenleaf Friends and Hayden Lake Friends (with support from nearby meetings) sponsor secondary schools.

An increasing number of home-school situations are being reported. Because of this, a workshop was held during the 1987 YM sessions to provide information and encouragement for parents who are involved in or are considering starting home schools.

Most churches who have students at George Fox College are cooperating with the NWYM—Church—George Fox College student grant program. There were 55 students at George Fox College receiving this assistance. In all there were 89 Friends students at GFC for the fall 1987 semester. This is 16.2 percent of the student enrollment.

A directory of school teachers, both public and private schools, is now available on request from the Department of General Education.

The Ministerial Education Scholarship/Loan Program will be assisting ten students at Western Evangelical Seminary and two students at Azusa Pacific University Friends Center during the 1987-88 academic year.

Finally, the Yearly Meeting has assisted Greenleaf Friends Academy through this department by providing part of the expense of "First Week" activities.

The reports were approved.

■ 36. The Alumni Board of George Fox College submitted the names of Marla Ludolph and Charles Mylander as members of the College Board of Trustees. Approved.

■ 37. The George Fox College Board of Trustees nominated William Bauman, Clarence Knoepfle, Fred Neumann, C. W. Perry, Kent Thornburg, and Jake Lautenback to the Board of Trustees to serve a three-year term. Approved.

■ 38. The Yearly Meeting nominated the following to the George Fox College Board of Trustees for three years: Dorothy Barratt, Aaron Hamlin, John Holton, Roger Martell, Jack Newell, Cilde Grover. Approved.

■ 39. Ron Woodward, clerk of the Board of Missions, introduced Steve and Janelle Baron. The Barons returned in February from a two-and-one-half year short-term missionary service in Bolivia and Peru, where they began the Greenhouse Project. Steve reported that the project is continuing under national leadership and seems to be doing well.

Ron also introduced and interviewed James Morris, executive director of Evangelical Friends Mission, regarding the progress of the work in Mexico City and the Philippines.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION NORTHWEST

"EFM Northwest"—that's us! We often think only of Bolivia and Peru, but our missionary involvement literally circles the globe as we "network" with information, finances, personnel, and prayer through the EFM office in Denver and Friends work around the world. Some of the most visible expressions of this networking are:

- the fine leadership given to EFM by James Morris, Reta Stuart, and Roscoe Knight out of the EFM office.
- the regular publication "EFM World," which comes into our homes.
- the recent appointment of Tim and Kathy Fox from Mid-America Yearly Meeting as future missionaries to Mexico City, a field where only 1 percent of the city's 19 million people are Protestant believers.
- the work of church planting done this past year by the Fergusons and Thomases in the Central African country of Rwanda. Regular services are now

being held on the outskirts of Kigali, with the immediate prospect of land purchase for future development.

- the prospect of the Rough Rock, Arizona, mission to Navajos being turned over to EFM by Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting for administrative leadership.

In our work in Bolivia and Peru, we look back on the '86-'87 year and see these events among others:

- strong preparations for "Guatemala '87," which include funding for the general expenses of the conference, the selection of national delegates, plans to send six missionaries, and the prayerful dream that the conference will ignite a new vision among Friends to evangelize unreached portions of the world.

- a much-appreciated ministry-trip by Oscar and Ruth Brown at Christmastime 1986, to visit the field and minister to our missionaries in their annual retreat.

- the unexpected "retirement" of Ben and Gen Fitch from missionary service after a year of deputation. (Ben and Gen felt a clear leading from God not to return to the field at this time; however, the board hopes that in future years the Lord may again provide for them an open door for missionary service.)

- the appointment of two well-qualified missionary couples, Ken and Tonya Comfort and Dan and Tami Cammack, who will be attending language school this next year in San Jose, Costa Rica, in preparation for service the following year in Bolivia and Peru.

- the service of "veteran missionaries" James and Gail Roberts and Hal and Nancy Thomas in La Paz, and Dwaine and Becky Williams in Santa Cruz, Bolivia.

- the labors of Denny and Sue Anderson in church planting in the city of Arequipa, Peru; Ed and Marie Cammack and Wayne and Bev Chapman on the Altiplano.

- the special contribution of Steve and Janelle Baron to the "Greenhouse Project" in both Peru and Bolivia.

- gratitude expressed to Quentin Nordyke as he leaves the Yearly Meeting office—for his dedicated and highly skilled leadership of our missionary program.

Highlights from Field Reports:

PERU:

- During the '86-'87 year the first woman, Valentina Maquera de Mamani, graduated from the IBLA (Bible extension) program!

- A prayer awakening took place in many churches on the Altiplano, with saints praying and engaging in spiritual warfare in early morning prayer meetings.

- It is estimated that approximately one-quarter of the Friends churches in Peru now contribute funds on a quota system toward the administrative expenses of the "yearly meeting."

- Seven quarterly meetings report a total of 31 active churches, 5 semiactive, 18 churches lost to the flooding from Lake Titicaca (7 of these seem to be regrouping), 10 churches "lost" or "laid down," 4 churches newly started.

- Ramon Mamani continues to provide effective leadership as president of the INELA.

- This past year resulted in good working agreements and relationships between the mission and the national church.

- While tithing is a difficult discipline for many believers to accept, there has been an increased emphasis on tithing and all monthly meetings and quarterly meetings are self-supporting.

- Missionary wives Bev Chapman, Sue Anderson, and Janelle Baron taught their own children through home schooling.

- Eric Witherspoon, a veterinarian from West Chehalem, spent five productive weeks in Peru holding clinics and promoting animal health.

- Steve and Janelle Baron spent six months in Peru during this past year, prior to the conclusion of their short-term social development project.

- Wayne and Bev Chapman spent three months of the year in Cochabamba, Bolivia, studying the Aymara and Spanish languages.

In evaluating the report, he indicates that Cordillera, Peninsula, Pacajes, Lago Norte, and possibly Santa Cruz quarterly meetings have plateaued in growth. The two Yungas districts have declined over 10 years, partially due to increasing government control over coca raising (from which comes cocaine), with the resulting migration of people to new land in the Caranavi-Alto Beni districts. The latter area shows consistent growth, especially from 1980 to 1986. A total of 144 congregations was reported in 1976; in 1986, 157.

Other observations and comments:

- Well over 200 Friends students and pastors are involved in the two seminaries in La Paz: San Pablo and Centro Biblico.

- In many ways the Bolivian Evangelical Church seems on the verge of a great visitation of God's Spirit, with increasing unity among believers of different denominations.

- The first of three urban discipleship books, *Conocer a Dios* (To Know God) has been published with funds provided in the Gladys Cook Memorial.

- Hal and Nancy Thomas are well on the way toward the three-year goal of planting six urban congregations in La Paz.

- Theological Education by Extension (TEE) continues to be a great strength with one pastor commenting, "We would not have pastors in the Caranavi District if there were no Bible Extension program."

- James Roberts has been working extensively in the Lago Norte District with appreciable response in increased evangelistic activity.

- Dwaine Williams, "a contractor for building, a teacher, a counselor, a medical advisor, school board member, song leader, etc." reports progress (one church—Simon Bolivar) toward the Santa Cruz goal of planting three new churches in the Santa Cruz area.

- All were saddened by the death May 26 of courageous Soñia Diaz Loza from cancer—a dear saint for whom many people had prayed.

- In November 1986, Hilarion Aranda, "national missionary" in the San Julian colonies, resigned. After a five-month period, Pascual Quispe, an experienced pastor, took up that work. A search is presently on for a second "missionary" to live in the community of El Cruce.

- A Friends scholarship fund currently supports three Friends students at the Bolivian Evangelical University.

- A new church was planted with 18 adults in the Argentine city of Buenos Aires—all as a result of four national pastors traveling to that city to attend a Paul Cho church growth conference.

SUMMARY:

As we meet during these Yearly Meeting sessions, two issues seem to rise above all others calling us to prayer and to a sense of God's leading regarding:

1. the request of the Peruvian INELA that we cover the costs for two Bolivian families to come to Peru, reside at Ilave, and work as "national missionaries" to aid in the administration and encouragement of local churches (the request was prompted by the fact that only one missionary family [Chapmans] will be working alongside the INELA this year on the Altiplano), and

2. the request of the Peruvian Council (missionaries) that we rethink our urban strategy and seriously consider funding the purchase or construction of a *cede central* (central meeting place and training center) in the city of Arequipa—a building large enough to house 200+ worshipers coming in on Sunday mornings from outlying house churches, and suitable during the week to hold training classes for leaders.

We request prayer and discernment from all in the Yearly Meeting concerning these important issues.

As board members we are thrilled by developments we see all around the world, which seem to be hastening the coming of our blessed Lord by the planting of the truth of His Gospel among people-groups who have never heard! As Friends, we yearn to do our part in the corner of the Kingdom where we serve! "We are asking God that you may see things, as it were, from His point of view . . . (Colossians 1:9-10 Phillips)

The reports were approved.

■ 40. J. D. Baker, executive director of Friends Fund, gave the following report:

FRIENDS FUND

This year has continued to be a time of changes, readjustments, and training.

Walter Wilhite, who had worked for Friends Fund for 14 years, passed away December 24, 1986. We miss his help and expertise in this work. I wish to express my appreciation to each one of you who participated in the Memorial Fund in Walter's behalf. These gifts went to the Pastors' Retirement Fund.

John Fankhauser has been employed on a quarter-time basis to assist me in some of the detail work that falls into the duties of the director.

Diane Eichenberger is continuing as our accountant and is doing an excellent job. Sharon Wolsten is our new secretary and prepares and mails all correspondence, documents, and works at keeping our file information up to date.

Many of our people have received correspondence regarding their current status in regard to documents. Others, as we proceed, will also be receiving inquiries about their current status.

In the 15-year effort of Friends Fund we have penetrated only approximately 25 percent of our Northwest Yearly Meeting people. The effort of Friends Fund is to aid our people in being more effective in carrying out our Christian ministry in the future.

- 42. Wayne Piersall, pastor at Woodland, Idaho, Friends Church opened the session with prayer.
- 43. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
- 44. Gregg Lamm, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.
- 45. Wendell Barnett, reporting for the new Commission on Ethnic Ministries, introduced Aaron Hamlin, who reported on the work of Piedmont Friends Church in Portland, specifically their Friends for Kids program.
- Oscar Brown reported on the Portland Korean Church and the spread of the Gospel to the Korean people in the 25 years since Pastor Kim felt the concern and began work among these people.
- Betty Comfort reported on the Hispanic work in Newberg and the growth and needs of this ministry.
- Naomi Brown spoke of the involvement of the people of Eugene Friends Church with the refugees who have come to our country from Southeast Asia.
- The following printed report was distributed:

COMMISSION ON ETHNIC MINISTRIES

This commission is launching into its fourth year on a path of service and encouragement to the various ethnic groups within the borders of NWYM. We desire to be of service and to give spiritual nurture to effective ethnic ministries already serving in NWYM, specifically the ministries at Piedmont, the work of the Korean Church, and the ministry of the Hispanic congregation at Newberg, and a variety of ethnic group ministries including Asian refugees. The three major ministries are represented by personnel on this commission and indicate the place of initial ministry of this commission.

- Survey. In this year, the commission will conduct a survey to determine:
- Ethnic groups near local meetings.
 - Ethnic groups with whom the local meeting has ministry.
 - Identify people in local meeting who have interest in ethnic peoples.
 - Identify countries in which local members have traveled.
 - Identify languages in which local members have fluency.

- Develop an inventory of resources for different language groups. (Bibles, tracts, curriculum, etc.)

We plan to work in the following areas this year:

Leadership Development. We encourage participation of ethnic leaders and involvement at the Yearly Meeting level.

Uniqueness. We are committed to encourage the uniqueness of each ethnic group and help them realize their full potential for Christ.

Church Visitation. We encourage visitation between churches of various ethnic composition to develop appreciation and further understanding for the uniqueness of each. During these exchanges we hope areas of cooperation and encouragement will be discovered and implemented.

Recommended Reading. *A World of Difference*, by Thom Hopler, Inter-Varsity Press.

The ethnic groups within your geographic area represent a mission field of diversity near your door. You can become a cross-cultural missionary right where you live.

- 46. Harold Ankeny, clerk of the Stewardship Board, expressed appreciation for the work of Treasurer Beatrice Goldsmith, and introduced her. She gave the following report:

TREASURER'S REPORT

Before presenting the financial report, I want to express appreciation to those I work closely with in the Yearly Meeting office—Terri Bowen and Janelle Nordyke. They are a delight to work with, and I can assure you that they are faithful and hard workers. Working with Jack Willcuts and Quentin Nordyke these past years has been some of the most delightful experiences of my career.

However, Northwest Yearly Meeting is experiencing changes this year—a new general superintendent, a new assistant superintendent, and a new youth superintendent. But changes are not new to me. I have survived two general superintendents, one assistant superintendent, and three youth superintendents! And I know already, after just these few weeks working with Howard Harmon, Retha McCutchen, and Bruce Bishop, that these will be rewarding years.

The change that is especially affecting treasurers, stewardship clerks, and those working with budgets is the change to a calendar year effective January 1, 1988. The pastoral and church year remains July through June.

So how do we accept these changes? Can we deal with the six months, July through December, as one unit, then in 1988 begin a calendar year budget experience? From a computer newsletter received recently, there was an article entitled: "Leaders in Changing Times." How appropriate, and I quote from Dr. John Laurin, Dynatran's president, who said, among other things, "Granted, change can be intimidating. It means letting go of the familiar and the comfortable. But for the leader, it also means opening the door to infinite possibilities." Let's look at this calendar year change from a leadership position, each of us; let's see the possibilities. And as leaders, we will see this change through, and soon we will have forgotten the trauma of the moment.

Now to the Financial Report, and we will look mainly at the Great Commission programs. These are supported mainly by each of your churches. We received \$602,881 for these programs, and your churches gave \$540,804 of this amount, or 89 percent of the giving. While we had a budget shortfall of \$13,490, meaning we set our budget sights a little higher than the anticipated giving, our actual expense deficit was only \$10,384, which we will recover either from the six-month period or in 1988. Following the Summary Sheet are the listings of the programs of each board and department and the costs. If you have

questions about any programs, be sure to contact the clerk of that board or department.

For the increases in giving mentioned above, which is the greatest giving yet for the Great Commission programs, and the greatest giving yet from the churches, we praise the Lord!

In the year ahead, let's look for that door of possibilities.

The treasurer's report was distributed. Approved. (The report appears in the appendix.)

Harold Ankeny gave the following report of a stewardship survey taken in the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting: (43 of the 56 churches responded)

- Has your committee given consideration to all areas of stewardship responsibilities? Yes—30 (70%), No—10 (23%)
- Are you using the "Stewardship Committee" booklet prepared by the YM for local churches? Yes—18 (42%), No—25 (58%)
- Are you using the "Matter of Stewardship" lesson series? Yes—10 (23%), No—34 (79%)
- Have you used the video tapes "Your Money Matters"? Yes—5 (12%), No—37 (86%)
- Have steps been taken to determine your church's giving potential and its relation to your actual budget? Yes—27 (63%), No—14 (32%)
- Do you have a year-round stewardship emphasis that involves all departments of the church? Yes—23 (53%), No—15 (35%)
- Has a church budget been prepared? Yes—39 (91%), No—4 (9%)
- Have accurate records been kept of the finances, giving, and obligations of the church? Yes—43 (100%), No—0 (0%)
- Has giving increased the past year? Yes—25 (58%), No—16 (37%)

Harold Ankeny encouraged the use of "A Matter of Stewardship" pamphlet series as a study in a Sunday school class or other group.

The Stewardship report was approved.

■ 47. Don Stump, superintendent of Greenleaf Friends Academy, reported on that school. They have just completed their 79th year. He spoke of victories in athletic events, and in spiritual matters. Strides are being made in their financial problems. The temptation is to focus on financial needs, not on their reason for existence—to furnish Christian training for young people. He closed with reading of Isaiah 41:10.

■ 48. Don Lamm, pastor of Greenleaf Friends Church, closed with prayer.

- 49. The afternoon session was opened with prayer by Virginia Helm.
- 50. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
- 51. Mildred Minthorne introduced Rev. Bob McNeil, new executive director of Oregon Council on Alcohol Problems. He spoke briefly concerning his work.
- 52. Beth Bagley, president of the Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship, gave her report, using the year's theme "Hearts Attuned to God's."

FRIENDS WOMEN'S MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP REPORT

The Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship has been active again this year with the theme "Hearts Attuned to God's." Prayer is a vital part of our organization and each local WMF spends some time in their meetings praying for our

missionaries. As our hearts are attuned to God's in prayer, we can accompany and stand by all our missionaries in their daily activities and ministry. We can feel their joys and sorrows, share with them in their frustrations, and rejoice in their victories.

Giving is another vital part of FWMF. Reports were received from 46 fellowships, with a membership of 674. This year our fellowship gave a total of \$41,039.04 for foreign and home missions. Together we gave support to the Wayne Chapman family, made payments on the church van for Piedmont in Portland, pledged and gave toward missionary vacations, Christmas retreat, outfitting, children's schooling, national pastor support and medical assistance, plus much more.

Our ladies are very creative, energetic, and full of ideas to raise money for their projects. Some ideas include bazaars and craft sales, bake sales, pie and ice cream socials, silent auctions, plant sales, serving at wedding receptions, farm sales, midyear board meetings, a school teachers' luncheon, and other ways.

But it isn't all work that they do. Our women read 5,490 books in nine different categories. The women also helped in local church projects such as providing food for sick shut-ins, making cookies for college students and senior citizens, gave showers for brides, new mothers and babies, painted church basements and parsonages, held mother-daughter teas, helped provide items for nursing homes, to name a few activities.

Fellowship is also very important, and three times a year women across the Yearly Meeting gather for fellowship and inspiration. Fall retreats were held at Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks with the theme "Fragrance of the Christian Life." Carla Walker from Portland was our guest speaker. She and her husband, Dr. Dale Walker, were dental missionaries in Kenya and Zaire under Africa Inland Mission. Our nine Area Spring Rallies used the theme this year "Tea for Two" (T for T. & T.) to raise money to pay Travel for Tami and Tonya to Language School. The third time of the year for fellowship is our Yearly Meeting Banquet. This year our theme was "Fan the Flame" from 2 Timothy 1:6 "... fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you..." We received an offering of over \$2,500 to assist in sending some of our missionaries to Guatemala '87.

This report gives only a brief overview of the work of Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship this year. I am concluding my three-year term as president and I present the new president, Virginia Helm.

■ 55. A summary of the Statistical Report was read by the assistant clerk, showing a gain of 40 members overall in the Yearly Meeting. The full report appears in the Appendix.

■ 56. Anna Baker of South Salem Friends Church closed the session with prayer.

■ 58. Rob King, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 59. The report from the Commission on Media was opened by LeRoy Benham, chairman of the Barclay Press Board. He presented a plaque to Barry Hubbell in recognition of his 15 years of service on the Publication Board, now the Commission on Media. LeRoy then introduced Dan McCracken, new manager of Barclay Press, who reported on recent books published and urged participation in a program called "Partners in Publishing." Dan introduced Betty Hockett, who spoke briefly concerning her current writing projects including a children's book of Quaker biographies. A printed report, prepared by Margaret Lemmons, clerk of this commission, was distributed. Approved.

COMMISSION ON MEDIA

The Commission on Media is pleased with progress we have seen in our work for the past year: ideas are becoming reality, goals are being realized, projects are reaching completion. The transition from "board" to "commission," mandated by the new *Faith and Practice*, has been accomplished.

One major goal of previous years was to encourage the writers in our midst to share the insights and creative ideas God has given them. A workshop at last year's meetings has been followed by a Writer's Dinner this year. A sell-out crowd of 75 attended to hear Sally Stuart, a free-lance writer and speaker, Tuesday evening. We hope this gathering of writers will become an annual event.

The commission is also excited by the potential we see in the use of video to share the message of the church and various boards and organizations within the church. The video presentations seen at Yearly Meeting are samples of the kinds of jobs this medium does well. We hope the churches represented here will use the videos recorded this week to share "Yearly Meeting '87" with the folks back home. We also hope each church will work to make available VHS playback systems, and use every opportunity to spread the word through this medium.

The printed word is also a key focus of the commission. Our new Barclay Press manager is Dan McCracken. We wish to express our appreciation for the fine work he is doing at the Press, as well as express our gratitude for Dick Eichenberger's management of the Press over the past several years. New projects and past successes both keep the Press's ministry moving forward.

Barclay Press and the Commission on Media are also working closely with the new association, QUIP (Quakers Uniting in Publication). This will make available Quaker materials from all over the world. A free catalog has been printed and is available at the Barclay Press booktable.

The commission continues to work toward growth in the Publication Fund. This fund has been instrumental in the publication of titles such as *Why Friends Are Friends*, by Jack Willcuts, *A Part of My Heart Left Here*, edited by Mary Green, and *The Rich Heritage of Quakerism*, by Walter Williams, reprinted with an extensive epilogue added to bring it up to date. Accompanying the commission's report is a brochure titled "Partners in Publishing," which explains the Publication Fund and the part you may take in it.

Names have been changed; goals remain. Many of the workers who have helped carry on the tasks of the Commission on Media have changed. We appreciate the years of faithful leadership provided by Barry Hubbell as clerk of the commission. Frank Cole is the archivist for the Yearly Meeting, taking up the work of Charles Beals. Frank stresses the vital importance of saving tomorrow's history today. "Don't throw anything away—send it to us and let us do it!" Also thanks is due to Nancy Gill, who has served the Commission faithfully as secretary.

Approved.

■ 60. Gil George, clerk of the Board of Evangelism, presented their report. He spoke fervently concerning the planting of new churches and urged existing churches to reach out into their communities. Are we really committed to reaching the lost? A printed report was distributed.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

On behalf of the Board of Evangelism and the Extension Church pastors, I wish to express our gratitude to Quentin Nordyke for his ministry among us. With his love for the church, his expertise in church growth, and his considerable administrative skill, he has served the interests of this board in a remarkable way.

We also wish to express our gratitude to Rick Hunt, who has served us as a full-time consultant for the past two years. He has designed programs and systems to make church planting a "routine" operation of the church without having to "reinvent the wheel" on each new project. Rick has completed his task for now, but will be available on an hourly basis for a period of time to assist in the transition from analysis and planning to implementation.

Two years ago this board presented our vision to plant 45 new churches in five years. While we are behind on the timetable, we are far more ready to accomplish that goal now than we were two years ago. Allow me to list some of the reasons we believe the goal is now within the realm of possibility.

- Operation Prayer Warrior, the first of our programs implemented by Rick Hunt, is now in place with over 1,100 persons committed to pray for the lost and for the needs of church planters. How can we fail with such a volume of prayer about that which God cares about most!

- Howard Harmon, our new Yearly Meeting superintendent, is deeply concerned that church planting be the focus of our attention as a Yearly Meeting. He has directed Retha McCutchen to devote a major portion of her time to this effort. Without such a commitment, our goal is plainly unreachable.

- The plans of our board are now in various stages of implementation, and under Retha's able management will serve as the tools, or machinery, necessary to accomplish the goal of planting and maintaining healthy churches.

- We see clearly that the board cannot plant churches; we can only create pathways for persons whom God has called so they can plant churches. Thus, currently we are devoting our efforts toward recruitment and development of leadership. Forty-five churches will require 45 new pastors.

- We believe that the telemarketing techniques being used in Southwest Yearly Meeting (California) to plant churches is an exciting way to build an immediate pool of contacts in any area in which we plan to start a church. We intend to vigorously pursue the implementation of such technigrowth methods.

This year we approved the establishment of a mission point in McMinnville under the direction of David Gray, which we hope will be the beginning of a new church.

In April, it became necessary to lay down the Kent church as declining attendance had led to financial difficulties and, therefore, the resignation of their pastors, Jim and Becky Teeters. Please pray for healing and comfort for this family. It hurts to give your best without the desired results.

You responded beautifully to the Share Calls this year, providing much-needed help to remodel and furnish Silver Valley's newly purchased building, and to remodel and equip Roseburg's new rented facility. Thank you very much.

Focus Conference, an in-service training conference for all Yearly Meeting pastors, sponsored by this board, was again held in Umatilla. Frank Tillipau, speaker, challenged us to outreach ministries.

We sponsored a church planters' retreat in March that was a three-day experience of training and planning for our Extension Church pastors. It was

led by Tim and Valerie Tsohandaridis, with help from Quentin Nordyke and Rick Hunt.

Approved.

Arthur Roberts expressed his concern that Friends who are worshipping with other denominations would "come home" to join in our outreach ministry. Steve Fine also spoke of his concern that *all* Friends be involved in evangelism and not leave it to our extension pastors only.

■ 61. Harold Ankeny, clerk of the Board of Stewardship, presented the Great Commission Programs/Budget, illustrating it with several projected charts and graphs:

The people on the boards, departments, commissions, and councils have considered prayerfully what they feel God would have them do in 1988. These programs will cost \$758,000 in 1988.

But, it will take more than money to carry out these programs. The *successful* completion of these programs will require a tremendous commitment of time, talent, and financial resources. We are considering only the stewardship of the financial resources entrusted to us by God.

With the change in the fiscal year it is impossible to operate as we have in the past.

Duane Beals shared his testimony Tuesday evening of how he is living out his Christian life within the framework of the Missionary Church.

Let me share a personal testimony. We in our family had cause to reflect on how we became connected to the Friends Church. My dad died this year on June 1 at the age of 92. Some of you knew him. In the 1920s he was a successful farmer in northeast Nebraska. He lost all in the economic collapse of 1929, and he became a tenant farmer. We moved 11 miles to another community. Members of a rural Friends Church showed their love to us. As a six-year-old, I can still remember the big pot of stew a family named Puckett brought to us at the close of that cold spring day we moved our wagon over those muddy roads. We responded to this act of love, and that is where I first learned of Christ.

I'm glad God led us in this manner. I'm glad I'm connected to a church that is charged by God to play a part of His Great Commission. We have a tremendous challenge; and we can meet it!

What constitutes the nearly \$142,000 increase?

What has been our giving pattern? It is true we have increased our pledges from 59 percent of the budget in 1976-77 to 86 percent in 1986-87.

However, in "real" dollars when adjusted for inflation, we have actually declined in our commitment to the Great Commission—from \$343,000 in 1976-77 to \$320,000 in real dollars 1986-87. In other words, what cost \$1.00 in 1979 now costs \$2.00. What will the increase cost? If we just distribute the increase among the resident active members, the weekly increase would be 75 cents—only a Baskin-Robbins ice cream single-dip cone or a cup of coffee!

If you approve this budgeting process, you are approving a budget based on the amount pledged by the churches in response to the program challenge to the churches this fall. For you see, we construct the budget after the people have had a chance to say yes (or no). The budget will be based on the pledges plus 13 percent.

If pledges fall below \$660,000, then some of the programs will be reduced by the Board of Stewardship and the Executive Council. An example might look like this: Could it be that our people will be flooded with that same gift of grace from God the poverty-stricken Macedonian church experienced?

COMMISSION ON FAMILY LIFE

Our primary focus has been on selecting, purchasing, and promoting affordable resources suitable for use at the local church. We have acquired the following videotape series, which are available for rental through the Yearly Meeting office at \$5 per tape: "Focus on the Family," featuring Dr. James Dobson (6 tapes); "What Makes a Christian Family Christian?" featuring David and Karen Mains (2 tapes); and "Famous Fathers," featuring Paul Stookey, Bill Gaither, Rosey Grier, and others (2 tapes). Our newest acquisition is "After You Say 'I do'," featuring Norman Wright, Larry Burkett, and Tim and Beverly LeHaye, which is being used in our two workshops this week.

Our marriage enrichment and counseling resource, "Our Marriage Is You and Me," is in use in seven churches. This set of five audio tapes can be purchased directly from the commission for \$22.50.

Discounts are available—40 percent or more!—on materials published by Gospel Light (Regal), Thomas Nelson, and Zondervan, which are ordered through the commission.

In cooperation with the Department of Christian Testimonies, we are developing a series of 13 condensations of "Focus on the Family" brochures that can be used as bulletin inserts, Sunday school class topics, etc.

Packets giving full details about Family Adventure Weekend—a program that combines the best of the approaches used by Marriage Encounter and Lay Witnesses—are available from the commission. We believe this program has great potential.

About 60 percent of our 1986-87 budget was spent in support of Friends Ministries to Families—a national network of six yearly meetings—whose purpose is to coordinate and facilitate efforts to strengthen Friends families. This ministry has been reorganized and is now centered in Wichita, Kansas, with access to the staff and resources of the Center on Family Living at Friends University. Bill Allen, a colleague of the late Sheldon Louthan, is the new director. Among other activities, a quarterly "Family Notebook" newsletter, full of family building suggestions, will be mailed directly to each church in each of the participating yearly meetings. It will be produced in poster form so it can be placed directly on the church bulletin board without further processing.

Leadership is being sought for Family Adventure Weekend and for Marriage Encounter as well since Gary and Patti Lewis have moved from this area. Two Marriage Encounters were held in the Portland area this year.

Responses to our questionnaire indicate that most of our churches favor mutual submission/partnership as most appropriate in the marriage relationship. Selfishness/self-centeredness was most often mentioned as the primary cause of broken marriages. It was clear that churches want materials that help them help their families *avoid* problems through "preventive medicine." We intend to emphasize this need in our planning and activities.

The questionnaires also indicated that most churches seem to look to their pastor as the primary source for both prevention and treatment of marriage problems. This reinforces our desire to help pastoral couples strengthen their own relationship so they have a strong foundation on which to build their ministry to families. As a first step, we arranged for Dr. William Vermillion, dean and professor at W.E.S., to be available for consultation on counseling or personal problems during this Yearly Meeting.

Our greatest need is for a communication link with each church that puts us in touch with a lay person who has not only a concern for families but also

the desire and time to act on that concern. We will soon be in contact with your local Social Concerns Committee to ask their help in establishing this link.

COUNCIL OF ELDERS

We received reports from 53 churches. This report summarizes and highlights items from certain churches.

Worship and Christian Fellowship

The churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting evidence standard patterns, with obvious attention given to various forms of ministry and fellowship. Boise has home cell group worship Wednesday nights, and Woodland relates how openness and flexibility concerning structure has fostered Spirit-led participation in worship. Greenleaf uses printed material to help persons prepare for worship. Several churches have found silence and preservice meditation helpful. Peninsula church finds that periodic potlucks enhance their fellowship. Spokane offers two kinds of services, "quiet" and more structured, with instruction about worship. The worship team of Silver Valley meets weekly to pray about their ministry. Maplewood prints out the Scripture and provides time for people to read it weekly to pray about their ministry. Reedwood's post-worship time is more successful than its effort to get people into worship on time and centered down. Rosemere recently concluded a ten-week series of sermons on the subject of worship. At Friends Memorial, Seattle, the elders are active in planning worship as well as in personal ministry to individuals. Friends of Newberg Unprogrammed Meeting understand the joys as well as the burdens that come when all must listen to the Lord and discern His voice. Netarts finds positive value in a prelude of chorus singing. Eugene Friends plan by the month and try to blend traditional with contemporary music. Marion Friends have made volleyball a part of Sunday evening fellowship. Medford Friends have used a plan involving four or five families in worship sharing together.

Aspects of Church Leadership and Administration

Yearly Meeting churches have been generally responsible in arrangements for pastoral leadership, the appointment of ushers and greeters, and in offering instruction in Friends history and doctrine to their young people and to prospective members. Most churches try to follow up nonresident members, but the efforts haven't been as successful as they would like them to be.

Gifts in the Ministry

Over 50 persons are listed by the churches as evidencing gifts for various forms of ministry. Some of these are mature individuals, others children and youth. The Council of Elders will see that a record is kept. We encourage local elders to nurture them spiritually and for the monthly meetings to insure that none is hindered from securing needed education from lack of finances. We encourage churches to become partners with George Fox College and with seminaries in the education of those called into special ministry.

Programs of Outreach

There are several kinds of evangelism and discipleship programs sponsored by the churches. A few churches are involved in church planting; most are preoccupied with strengthening their own ministry. Outreach projects range from

participation in community fairs to food banks, from shelter houses to nursing homes.

Apparently our churches link proclamation and service together in fulfilling the Great Commission. Special ministries include prisons, camping, singles fellowships, rescue missions, day care for children and for elderly; caring for the mentally handicapped, the abused and dispossessed; senior centers, and youth ministries. It is fair to say most of our churches are actively engaged but not altogether satisfied with the Kingdom results of their outreach ministries. In respect to evangelistic outreach one can detect a kind of tacking between "praying down revival" and finding the ideal program. This should be a normal tension, but some reports show frustration. Perhaps faithfulness in witness, combined with deep inward commitment to Christ and not to results, can ease the anxieties attendant upon gospel ministry and service. The reports also, however, noted significant answers to prayer.

Special Concerns

Special concerns include general revival, greater community involvement by members, instruction of converts, support for our educational institutions, strengthening life in the Spirit, getting younger persons into the church, retaining attenders, better-educated ministry, incorporation of new members into the life of the church, financing special ministries, seeing more conversions, holding families together or healing broken ones, use of Quaker decision-making procedures, youth leaders, and a more unified sense of mission.

DEPARTMENT OF PEACE TESTIMONY

We affirm our continued support for the George Fox College Center for Peace Learning and commend their Christ-led efforts to increase understanding about nonviolent creative solutions to local and global conflict. The work and presence of the Peace Center brings us hope and challenges us as individuals and as a Yearly Meeting. We call upon individuals and each local meeting to support the Center prayerfully, actively, and financially if possible, to insure its continued vital work.

The present efforts toward diplomatic solutions to the widespread conflicts in Central America by President Arias of Costa Rica and past efforts by other leaders in Central America are an encouraging sign that hope still exists within these nations for peace through negotiation. We call upon those in our nation in policy-making positions to encourage these efforts toward peace rather than continuing support for military solutions. We call upon Friends to keep the suffering people of Central America in their prayers and to actively support peace initiatives. Our connectedness as sisters and brothers in Christ calls us to respond to their longing for peace.

The continued diversion of a large part of our national budget to the military complex rather than health, education, and other human needs programs is a tragic imbalance. We implore our nation to revise its budgetary priorities to focus on funding for programs that are constructive and life-affirming.

We recognize that hate and suspicion have no place in the presence of the love of Christ and therefore support those people who are working to establish greater understanding between the people and government of the United States and the people and government of the Soviet Union. We encourage individuals and monthly meetings to practice sincerity in their peacemaking efforts. Therefore we exhort the Friends of Northwest Yearly Meeting to support and pray for those people who are pursuing creative and courageous steps to peace.

We urge Friends to pray for the peace of Jerusalem and for all the lands of the Bible. Pray that the children of Abraham will live together in peace. Pray that the desire for revenge will be replaced by the desire for forgiveness, that acts of terrorism will be replaced by striving for submission to the will of God. We urge our leaders to work for a just and lasting peace in the Middle East.

During the 1986-87 church year our focus was on the selection of a new superintendent and assistant superintendent. We are confident the Lord gave us guidance. The volume of prayer across the Yearly Meeting could be felt by those involved at each stage of the selection process. We feel that both Howard Harmon and Retha McCutchen are well qualified by virtue of education and experience to provide leadership.

In addition:

- Jack Willcuts was given the title of Minister-at-Large and was encouraged to participate in ministry whenever possible among Friends.

- We approved a resolution regarding the sale of the East Wenatchee Church. Other actions have been reported as part of board and commission reports.

- Dorothy Barratt was appointed to a three-year term on the Board of Western Evangelical Seminary.

Clerk Richard Beebe referred us to Minute 77 of the 1986 Minutes regarding the procedure that was approved for selection of the superintendent. Approved.

■ 94. A time of worship was held with singing and several testimonies, expressing praise to God for the blessings of the Yearly Meeting sessions, and for answered prayer.

■ 95. Superintendent Howard Harmon read a list of pastors in new positions in our Yearly Meeting this year: David Gray—mission work at McMinnville; Gene Cherrington—Silver Valley; Allen Cole—Hillsboro; Gary Routon—West Chehalem; Mark Burton—associate pastor at Clackamas Park; Paul Almquist—associate pastor at Silverton; Gerald Dillon—Lynwood. Talent has not secured a pastor yet.

■ 96. Virginia Helm for the Epistle Committee reported that epistles were received from 29 yearly meetings—20 yearly meetings within the United States, and 9 from abroad. In addition, there were eight epistles from youth yearly meetings, four from junior high groups, and seven from junior yearly meetings.

A four-page condensation of all the epistles was read to the assembled Yearly Meeting, and may be obtained from the Yearly Meeting office.

To Friends Everywhere:

Greetings from the 95th session of Northwest Yearly Meeting gathered on the George Fox College campus in Newberg, Oregon, July 25-31, 1987. Our theme was taken from Isaiah 42:9, "New things I declare . . . says the Lord." We indeed look forward to new things from the Lord as we welcome our new general superintendent, Howard Harmon, and assistant superintendent, Retha McCutchen. Howard Harmon is deeply concerned that church planting be the focus of our attention as a Yearly Meeting, and Retha McCutchen will be devoting a major portion of her time to this effort.

Howard Harmon's theme in his keynote message was "Onward, Upward, Outward." Onward—to consider our heritage honoring our Quaker pioneers, not by standing where they stood but by our own pioneering spirit. Upward—to strengthen our relationship with the Lord. Outward—as the thrust of God moves us into our areas by planting churches; throughout our continent by the support of missions in Mexico; and to our world as we minister in Bolivia, Peru, and Rwanda, Africa, striving to fulfill the Great Commission.

During the past year, 1,204 individuals have committed themselves to "Operation Prayer Warrior," which was introduced during last Yearly Meeting as the foundation for moving out into church-planting efforts. Prayer warriors agree to pray daily for revival in their local meetings and across the Yearly Meeting and for specific requests in the Prayer Warrior newsletter. Major concerns of this group include our extension churches and church-planting workers.

The concept of "Techni-growth," a telephone campaign pioneered by Friends Church Southwest Yearly Meeting, was introduced by the Board of Evangelism as an effective and timely approach to launch out into a community, producing a church with strong evangelistic emphasis. Our 1987-88 goal is to plant three new churches using this method.

The new president of Western Evangelical Seminary, Dr. Duane Beals, brought us messages in both morning and evening sessions. He challenged us to examine ourselves according to 1 John 1:6-10 in matters of obedience, love for the brethren, disdain for the things of the world, and our righteousness, which comes from the indwelling Christ—that we might have confidence before God. He urged us, in his evening messages, to "rebuild the walls," make a conscious commitment to God, throw off mediocrity, and to echo David's integrity, "I will not sacrifice to the Lord my God burnt offerings that cost me nothing." (2 Samuel 24:24) In the final message, Dr. Beals spoke of reformation being characterized by one man standing out against the prevailing opinions of his day as Elijah did in 1 Kings 18:1-39. God honored his stand by turning the hearts of Israel to the Lord. God will honor *our* stand as we hold out the message of the Gospel, committing to do God's will in the historic context of NWYM.

Our rewritten and updated *Faith and Practice*, which includes the Richmond Declaration of Faith, was approved and will be available soon.

This year we again enjoyed a wide variety of workshops, including family finances, prayer, drama and the arts in ministry, jail and prison ministries, foreign and local missions, home schooling, ministry among the deaf, and communication in the family.

"Fan the Flame" was the theme of the annual Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship banquet. There were 325 women in attendance, and \$2,500 was raised to assist in sending six of our missionaries to Guatemala '87. Sue Anderson, missionary on furlough from Peru, was the speaker.

The Men's Dinner raised approximately \$2,600 to be used for church planting. Steve Baron reported on the success of the greenhouse project in Bolivia and Peru, which he and his wife, Janelle, pioneered. Ed Cammack, Denny Anderson, and Ken Comfort also shared briefly about the work in Peru.

We were inspired by the report from the YCEW (Youth Consecrated to Evangelize the World) teams. One team did construction work in Mexico; the other team taught Vacation Bible School to the Navajo children on the Rough Rock Friends Mission in Arizona. Bruce Bishop, our new youth superintendent, shared his testimony and vision for youth.

Two new missionary couples, Dan and Tami Cammack and Ken and Tonya Comfort, were commissioned Sunday afternoon at the Missions Rally. James Morris from Evangelical Friends Mission brought news of the work in Rwanda, Africa. Tim Fox, newly appointed with his wife, Kathy, to serve in Mexico City, was introduced. Dennis and Sue Anderson, the main speakers, told of their work in Arequipa, Peru.

George Fox College reported a 52 percent increase in tuition deposits, and approximately 50 new Friends students are expected to attend in 1987-88. The Century II Campaign has passed the midway mark in raising their goal. We applaud the college for the 16th consecutive year of a balanced budget.

The Ethnic Ministries Commission reported on the Piedmont Church serving the needs of the Black community in Portland, Oregon; the Portland Korean Church; the Hispanic Church pastored by Gerardo Ibarra meeting in Friends Center in Newberg, Oregon; and a work with Laotian refugees in Eugene, Oregon.

We were pleased to approve five ministerial candidates for recording this session.

Our retiring general superintendent, Jack Willcuts, and his wife, Geraldine, plan to spend a year in England, where he will be Quaker in Residence at Woodbrooke School. A reception was held to express our appreciation to Quentin Nordyke and his wife, Florene, for their years as missionaries and their willing service to the Yearly Meeting. He has served 13 years as executive secretary. Their influence and example will always be a testimony to us.

"All these things" about which Jesus speaks are food, clothing, shelter . . . electrical bills, student financial aid, library books, etc., etc. He knows our needs—as persons and as a College. He will take care of them if we focus on carrying out our commitment to Him.

Yesterday, today and forever!

We have had a good 1986-87 school year! I hope you will pray for the College and its people. Pick a program, or a person, or a need and pray specifically one day at a time! Pray that we will continue to be dedicated to great achievement in the name of Christ! Join us in the search for His Kingdom and His Right Way of living.

PROGRAM

CHANGE TO SEMESTERS. George Fox College began its 96th year August 24, one month earlier than usual, the result of the first year on a semester plan after 21 years of operating with terms or a quarter system. The 4-4-1 or early semester system, with two 15-week semesters, was followed by a May Term of special courses. More than 10 percent of the student body stayed on campus for the classes that ranged from Computers in the Modern World to Contemporary Religious Life. The change to semesters brought practical efficiencies as well as a change of pace for a more thorough approach to scholarship. It also has resulted in a change of times for semiannual meetings of the Board of Trustees, which now will meet in September and January, rather than December and May. The College is out front in the change, with Oregon state universities and colleges making a change to semesters in 1989.

HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT DEGREE PROGRAM. The College's new degree completion program offering a bachelor of arts degree in Human Resource Management, which enrolled 105 students in eight classes, started during the year. The program for nontraditional students—working adults with two or more years of college credit already earned—now has students enrolled for the 15-month program in Portland, Salem, and Newberg. The response has been positive by students and faculty and clearly has met a need as the College expands its outreach.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE INSTITUTE. George Fox College has begun an English Language Institute to prepare international students for college studies in the United States. The program is an expression of a desire by a Pacific Rim college to begin closer ties to the Orient. The institute, which opened in July, emphasizes conversation, vocabulary, writing, and preparation for taking the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) of the Educational Testing Service, considered the nationwide standard for English ability. Summer and fall programs will be held.

ENGINEERING MAJOR. After study throughout the school year, approval has been given to establish a new engineering major, a five-year cooperative program with the University of Portland. Students in the major will spend three years on the George Fox campus, then two on the Portland campus, receiving a bachelor's degree in applied science from George Fox and an

engineering degree in one of five areas from the University of Portland. It is the 27th major at George Fox.

TEACHER EDUCATION APPROVAL. George Fox College's teacher education program during fall semester was given maximum approval by the Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission when it extended endorsement until August 1990 for all 12 areas requested by the College.

JUNIORS ABROAD. George Fox College sponsored its first Juniors Abroad tour in May with six students spending three weeks in China. With the goal of emphasizing the Christian world view, the new program provides all transportation costs to students who maintain full-time enrollment through the spring of their junior year. Students pay only for room and board at places economically arranged by the College. This year's planning selected three tours for 1988: Bolivia, England, and Scotland, and the European cities of Florence, Vienna, Amsterdam, and Madrid.

CENTER FOR PEACE LEARNING. Completing its second year, the George Fox Center for Peace Learning sponsored events and activities both on- and off-campus. In September, 10 persons participated in a fact-finding, educational tour of Northern Ireland. In March the Center sponsored a trip that had eight George Fox students spend their spring break helping in reforestation and building projects in Guatemala. Guest speakers hosted on campus included Jean Thomas, director of the Haiti Christian Development Fund, in October, and Timothy Smith, noted church historian, in March with the topic "Hostages to Hunger: The Economic Basis of Peacemaking." "Prospects for Peace in the Middle East" was the topic for a three-day conference in October.

The Center for Peace Learning continues to need further financial support if it is to remain successful.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCIAL

CENTURY II CAMPAIGN. By the end of the fiscal year more than \$5.4 million had been given or pledged to the College's Century II Campaign launched in January 1986. The largest in the College's history, the campaign has a challenge goal of \$8.3 million with the Phase I Goal of \$5.05 million surpassed during the year. Funds from the campaign will be used to double the size of the present library (from 17,500 to 35,000 square feet), to add 40,000 volumes, to double the College's endowment to \$6 million, and to provide \$1.5 million for student financial aid and scholarships. George Fox trustees have pledged \$950,000 with more than \$740,000 already paid. GFC faculty and staff completed their campaign with \$250,000 in gifts and pledges. Three members of the President's Council pledged \$630,000, and \$1,087,000 has now been pledged by Council members. The alumni portion of the campaign was launched in April. Major gifts have included \$1.35 million from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust to build the new facility, which will be started in October and named the M. J. Murdock Learning Resource Center; \$250,000 from the Burlington Northern Foundation for the purchase of library holdings; and \$250,000 from the Collins Foundation for the expansion and renovation of library facilities.

BALANCED BUDGET. Almost hidden in the background of the Century II Campaign, but of significant importance, was the completion of George Fox College's 16th year with a balanced budget. Support for the College general fund has risen sharply, from \$355,000 in 1984-85 to more than the \$460,000 goal during the 1986-87 fiscal year. We are grateful.

HUMANITIES GRANT. As a member of the national Christian College Consortium, George Fox and 12 other colleges are sharing a \$1.8 million grant from the J. Howard Pew Freedom Trust, Philadelphia. The College will receive about \$125,000 with the purpose of internationalizing the curriculum, enhancing communication through writing across the curriculum, and stressing ethical values in the curriculum. During the year the Ethics Across the Curriculum

portion provided for research projects, a coastal retreat for discussion, attendance at a Consortium meeting on ethics, and funding for travel. Fifteen faculty members participated in a Writing Across the Curriculum seminar in August. And the Juniors Abroad program received support funding.

ADMISSIONS. Under new Admissions Director Jeff Rickey and managing and marketing services of D. H. Dagley Associates of Atlanta, George Fox College's potential enrollment of new students has increased markedly. Tuition deposits are up 52 percent over the previous year, and at the same time SAT scores and high school grade point averages are up substantially for the entering class. Twenty-nine new students are recipients of the Friends Student Award, given to Quaker students with high academic achievement. Just one qualified the year before. About 50 new Friends students are expected to attend in 1987-88, from as far as Tennessee. The College improved and increased its academic scholarships. Athletic awards were increased as the result of a major gift from James and Lila Miller. The California Student Award for high academic achievement has resulted in an increase in students from that state. And, substantial funds to assist international students coming to George Fox have been provided by Esther Klages and Bill and Esther May Thomas.

LEADERSHIP. In March, President Edward F. Stevens was elected chairman of the national Christian College Consortium. He will head the organization for a one-year term. Founded in 1971, the consortium has national headquarters in St. Paul, Minnesota. Its purpose is to encourage the integration of faith and learning on the 13 member college campuses. During the school year he served as chairman of the Oregon Independent College Association, formed in 1960 with 15 members. It represents members at state and national levels regarding public policy decisions relating to the institutions and serves as a source of information about the members for the media, the public, and various agencies and organizations.

In September, Frank Cole, long associated with George Fox as a student, employee, trustee, and alumni leader, was named archivist. He simultaneously is archivist for Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church. He is the second to hold the position, following Charles Beals, who was named in 1978 when the position was created and who asked to step down.

Patricia Landis has been named Director of Teacher Education, after serving as acting director during the 1986-87 school year. She joined the GFC faculty in 1984 and replaces Glenn Moran, who resigned in the fall.

Deb Lacey, who was named Acting Dean of Students in April of 1986, became Dean of Students for the 1986-87 year.

Gary Fawver, Tilikum director, has been elected president of Christian Camping International USA, to serve a two-year term with this 900-member organization.

Jim Foster, associate professor of psychology and a faculty member since 1980, was named chairman of the Division of Social Science to begin fall semester 1987, replacing Ralph Beebe, who served for five years and will be on sabbatical fall semester.

In student leadership, for the first time in nearly two-thirds of a century, George Fox has a female student government president. Kristin Diefenbaugh, a sophomore from North Bend, Oregon, was elected in April to the post that had not had a woman since the 1922-23 school year. An elementary education major, she is just the third woman ever elected.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

FALL CONVOCATION. George Fox College formally opened its 96th year September 8 with a Fall Convocation program featuring Robin Johnston, president of Friends Bible College, as speaker. For the first time, the College awarded an honorary doctorate not as a part of graduation ceremonies. Johnston, a 1962 GFC graduate, received an honorary doctor of divinity degree, the fourth time

in 10 years—and the 19th time ever—the College has given an honorary doctorate.

RELIGIOUS CONFERENCES. Christian Life Week beginning September 22 featured Dave Smith, pastor of the Winona, Ohio, Evangelical Friends Church. "Women in the Ministry" was the topic for the four-day, 11th annual Quaker Emphasis Week in November. More than 30 speakers were involved in lectures, panels, and classroom presentations. The 21st annual Missions Conference in January featured a Philippines church leader as guest speaker. Rogelio Baldemor, minister-at-large and director for church development for the Conservative Baptist Association of The Philippines, spoke in morning services, along with Boyd Morris, a 1985 GFC graduate now studying at Western Evangelical Seminary, Portland. William Pannell, director of the theological studies program for black pastors at Fuller Theological Seminary, spoke in April as the 1987 Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer. The annual Spring Theological Conference in March featured Carl O. Bangs, an expert on Arminianism. He is professor of historical theology at St. Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, Missouri.

ACADEMIC CONFERENCES AND EVENTS. Through its Tilikum Retreat Center, George Fox College hosted three national Elderhostel programs. The international network of more than 750 educational institutions provides educational experiences for adults 60 and over at a modest cost. Sessions at Tilikum were offered September 14-19, February 1-6, March 29-April 3. This is the fourth year George Fox has offered the Elderhostel program.

The 36th and 37th lectures in the 32-year-old Faculty Lecture series featured Arthur Roberts, professor of religion and philosophy, in the fall, and Darlene Graves, assistant professor of communication arts and drama director, in the spring. His topic was "The Automobile as Icon: Some Autobiographical Reflections", her topic was "He Who Laughs, Lasts: The Healing Role of Humor."

Chinese scholar C. K. Zhang spoke March 9 as part of a national Christian College Consortium lecture tour. He is professor of English at Anhui Normal University in the People's Republic of China. Also visiting in March was Consortium president Carl H. Lundquist, who spoke for a three-day conference at Tilikum on the theme "The Christian Leader as Spiritual Guide."

The year concluded with a Commencement address by Richard Foster, author of three best-selling Christian books and associate professor of theology and writer in residence at Friends University. A 1964 George Fox graduate, he was presented an honorary doctorate, along with Kwan Kyu Kim, longtime pastor to the Korean community in Portland and a 1960 GFC graduate.

MUSIC AND DRAMA. The year's drama series opened in December with Archibald MacLeish's Pulitzer Prize-winning play *J.B.* Also *The Miracle Worker*, the famed drama of Helen Keller, was staged in January, with *Silhouettes*, a showcase of short dramas, featured in March. Music Theater productions were *Hooray 4 Hollywood*, a musical review fall semester, and *My Fair Lady* spring semester. "Ye Olde Royal Feaste" continued as a popular Christmas-time dinner event. *Messiah* was performed by a College-community Festival Chorus on Easter Sunday, climaxing the Festival of the Arts, established 19 years ago.

ATHLETICS. Two national tournament appearances highlighted Bruin sports. In the fall the men's soccer team competed in the National Christian College Athletic Association national tournament in Longview, Texas, losing only to the national champion. In men's basketball, the Bruins, led by NAIA and NCCAA All-American Kenny Stone, produced the College's best season ever with a 27-6 record, at one point winning 15 games in a row, and ranked 19th in the nation. They competed in the NCCAA national championships in Chattanooga, Tennessee. In men's track senior Adolphus Onua became an All-American with his third-place finish in the high hurdles in the NAIA nationals in Russellville, Arkansas.
