MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1988

Monday, July 25, 10:45 a.m.

1. Presiding Clerk Richard Beebe read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 96th session on July 25, 1988, on the campus of George Fox College, under the theme "Kindle the Fire." He led in prayer.

2. The clerk asked Jack Willcuts to report on his time in England. Jack and Geraldine spent eight months at Woodbrooke College as Friends in Residence. Jack reported that they visited 20 different local meetings, and also participated in London Yearly Meeting. He made a trip to the Soviet Union with English Friends. The traveling minute that was granted to the Willcuts at the 1987 Yearly Meeting sessions was returned with numerous responses. Assistant Presiding Clerk Norman Winters read a few of these responses.

3. A communication from Friends World Committee for Consultation introducing Mary Etter was read. She brought personal greetings.

4. A communication from London Yearly Meeting was read.

5. Robin Johnston, president of Friends Bible College, Haviland, Kansas, brought greetings. His wife, Janet, was also introduced.

6. Don Ashley, director of the Friends Center, Azusa Pacific University, Azusa, California, brought greetings.

7. David Tappan from Orange Grove meeting of Pacific Yearly Meeting brought greetings as a fraternal delegate to our Yearly Meeting.

8. Cilde Grover of the Western Field Staff of Friends World Committee for Consultation announced the regional meeting to be held at Reedwood Friends Church, October 21-23, 1988.

9. 10. The presentation of the Board of Missions on Sunday afternoon was approved.

11. The presentation of the Board of Evangelism on Sunday evening was approved.

12. Harold Ankeny, clerk of the Board of Stewardship, presented the six-month treasurer's report prepared by Beatrice Goldsmith.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This has been a good year in the Yearly Meeting office, working with Howard Harmon, Retha McCutchen, Bruce Bishop, Terri Bowen, and Janelle Nordyke. Working closely with Terri and Janelle has been a daily joy. They are not only efficient, but pleasant, sensitive, and caring. As for Howard, Retha, and Bruce, they are top executives as far as I am concerned, and the Yearly Meeting can be grateful for their leadership.

Two reports are being presented today. The first report covers the period of the last six months of 1987. This is the year we change to the calendar year as our fiscal year. This report will appear in the Minutes. The other report covers the first six months of 1988. In summary, there was a shortfall of \$27,603 at the end of June. However, with churches bringing pledge payments up-to-date and the normal special fund appeals in the fall, this shortfall should be eliminated. We hope you will plan now to support your own work through Northwest Yearly Meeting.

In reviewing changes in the treasurer's job since I accepted the position under Jack Willcuts, I can see how your vision of the church has enlarged. We have seen the Great Commission Program (formerly Unified Budget and Fixed Expense) increase from \$161,269 to \$636,000 in 1988, a \$474,731 increase in 20 years. The church pledges in 1968-69 were \$101,755, compared to \$547,846 in 1988 - a \$446,091 increase in these 20 years. Besides the increases in Yearly Meeting finances, the Pension Fund and Retirement Benefit Fund were inherited by the YM office, with total assets of \$1,534,658 as of 3/31/88. (Reports from Shearson and Prudential-Bache did not arrive in time for me to prepare a June 30 report prior to my hospitalization.) Twenty-five retirees and beneficiaries are receiving monthly retirement benefits from the YM office.

I have spent many hours installing the YM accounting system on the computer - the general ledger, accounts payable, payroll, and with Dennis Headrick's expert knowledge of dBase, set up a cash receipts program especially for the Yearly Meeting office needs. Pension Fund worksheets for various computations needed were prepared under the expertise of Don Millage, member of the Pension Board.

A large item which does not appear in this report, except the YM portion churches directed through the office, is the miracle of the open door in Rwanda to start an African church. The amount of \$80,000 was suggested, but \$114,623 has been given to date by the four yearly meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. Northwest Yearly Meeting's offering from the churches was \$25,749. Praise the Lord for this new opportunity to spread the Gospel.

Personally, I am disappointed not to be presenting this, my last report, to the Yearly Meeting sessions. Because of my physical condition, it was necessary for me to discontinue employment effective May 5, 1988. Although not feeling well, I have continued to prepare reports for the Yearly Meeting sessions and will continue working through August 31, or until a replacement

is hired, and then will continue to train that employee and help in any way I can to make the transition as easy as possible.

I imagine you can tell by now that I have enjoyed my job at the Yearly Meeting office very much!

Since we are now on a calendar year, Harold explained that the deficits as shown on the report can be erased by year-end if we as churches respond as we should. He expressed appreciation for the work and expertise of Beatrice Goldsmith.

The treasurer's report was distributed. Approved. (The July-December 1987 report appears in the Appendix.)

It was announced that contributions may be made towards a home computer for Beatrice. A special time of prayer for Beatrice was held.

The assistant presiding clerk read a communication from the Board of Stewardship regarding the Workers Compensation Program. A recommendation regarding this will be brought later in the week.

13. The following report of the Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council submitted by Richard Beebe was read: Howard Harmon, president, convened the sessions on January 9 at Reedwood Friends Church in Portland and adjourned them January 13 at Twin Rocks Friends Camp.

A spirit of optimism prevailed as we meditated and prayed for consensus regarding our ministries through the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

Some significant actions were:

- * The appointment of a task force of Lon Fendall, Lucy Anderson, Don Jamison, and Maurice Roberts to study the feasibility of a merger of the Quaker Life and Evangelical Friend magazines.

- * The "Phones for You" It was reported that each yearly meeting is planning to use this tool for church planting or church growth in 1988. Assignments were given for a series of articles to appear in the Evangelical Friend during the year to present challenges and results of this technique.

- * Approved the concept of EFA membership for third world yearly meetings. It was an inspiring Coordinating Council. Other action will be reported throughout our own boards.

Richard introduced Earl Perisho, president of Evangelical Friends Mission who reported on EFM. He challenged us to remember that EFM is us. We need a world view.

Earl introduced Roscoe Knight, church representative for EFM. He read portions of a report prepared by James Morris, executive director, reporting on the work in Mexico City, the Philippines, Rwanda, and the Bolivian Christian University in Santa Cruz. Progress is reported in many areas; believers are responding to the Spirit, but there are also prayer concerns.

He reported that Rough Rock Friends Mission in Arizona, formerly under Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, is now being administered by EFM.

The reports of the EFA and EFM were approved.

14. Norman Winters closed the business meeting with prayer.

TUESDAY, 10:45 A.M.

15. Wayne Piersall, pastor of Woodland Friends Church, opened the business session with prayer.

16. The minutes of the Monday morning business session were read and approved as corrected.

17. The keynote message by General Superintendent Howard E. Harmon, Monday evening, follows:

Jesus kindled the fire. Now, let the fire burn! Fan the flame with all of your strength and might. Don't do anything that would quench the flame, but let it burn. Think with me this evening on ways we might fuel the fire of the Holy Spirit throughout the Northwest.

If the Northwest is to be won for the Lord, it will be because the fire of the Holy Spirit has been given the freedom to light up our communities through the church and His people.

The Scriptures portray the church as a living organism rather than a mere social organization. As a living body, the church is not static but ever changing. It must grow and reproduce itself. Mark 4 tells of the natural growth when a seed is planted in the ground. "This is what the Kingdom of God is like. A man scatters seed on the ground. Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how. All by itself the soil produces grain - first the stalk, then the head, then the full kernel in the head. As soon as the grain is ripe, he puts the sickle to it, because harvest has come." Seeds grow when planted in good soil because that is the nature of life within the seed. So with the church. It is the nature of the living church to grow.

We do not "make" growth, but we certainly influence it. And we can restrict it. A tiny goldfish in a small bowl is restricted to the size of the bowl, but give that goldfish freedom in a large pond, and it will grow to its full size. Small-container vision can restrict our capacity for growth. During the past church year Northwest Yearly Meeting added 64 members but 104 were taken off of the membership list for a net loss of 40. Since 1981, morning worship attendance has declined each year. This disturbs me like it does you and challenges me to seek the Lord and pledge Him my total allegiance. The Lord constituted the church for enlargement to carry a missionary vision for the whole world. The Jewish people of the Old Testament times were to be a group dedicated to God, His messengers throughout the world. But instead they turned inward and thought of Yahweh as only their God.

Sadly, Friends went through a period when they were more interested in preserving certain customs than they were in evangelizing the world. It was as though they did not have a message to proclaim. We are admonished in Scripture to quench not the Spirit. If a church is not nourished in the Word, it will become weak. Without a sense of purpose that comes directly from the Lord, it will shrivel and die. Lord, today let the fire of the Holy Spirit lead us into effective ways of carrying out the Great Commission.

Each one of us can be fanners of the flame within our local churches and across the Yearly Meeting. Fanners of the flame are encouragers, trusting and believing in a great God. At the Lynwood church, when we were needing more space, the proposal came to build a fellowship hall and new classrooms. The budget was extremely tight as the work was only three years old. We were still making sizable payments on the first unit. After we had discussed the pros and cons for a time, Ethelyn Shattuck, a member of the church who was just at the retirement age of life, rose to speak. I still remember her words. She said, "Willard and I are soon to retire. Our income will be fixed. I don't know how we can give any extra, but this is the Lord's work and He is blessing. We dare not be stopped because of the lack of space. We must build. Willard and I will do all we can to assist the building program." Hallelujah for people like that! People with vision. The united

spirit flowed across the congregation and we did build. The money came in, the people were blessed, and the church grew. The flame was fanned. Retired senior in the congregation this evening - the church needs you. We need your wisdom, your prayers, and most of all we need you to recall the ways the Lord has blessed in past days. With faith in a big God, show the way to those younger that God is still on the throne. Become the strongest backers of your pastors. Do you know what it means to our pastors when you give them a hug on Sunday morning and tell them you are glad they are your pastors and you are praying for them? If a fresh idea is proposed, think how you can support it. Let others tell all the reasons it won't work; there are plenty of those people. People said you could not build an electric light, but after thousands of failures Thomas Edison found a way it could be done. It was thought impossible to send a voice across a wire or through the air. Now we not only have a voice but a picture sent across the air waves. Be the creative person of faith who is able to stimulate others to accomplish what they never thought possible.

The Lord's fire brings life and excitement where before was only lukewarmness. Wildfire may bring excitement, but it only destroys and is a counterfeit of the fire of the Lord. While visiting in Idaho last weekend, we observed fire sweeping out of control across the hills above Boise, a wildfire - potentially very dangerous. Pray the Lord of the harvest to bring His cleansing and purifying fire across our Yearly Meeting.

It was said that the early Friends kindled a fire wherever they went. This year, because of all of us joining together, fresh fires are going to be lit by Friends in Maplewood, Vancouver, and Kent. Let's fan those flames; support these pioneers! As our great grandfathers went by horseback telling of the Good News, churches were started across the West. My generation knocked on thousands of doors; people were saved and churches started. In this age, the telephone is an instrument that many are using to reach people by inviting them to church and introducing them to the Lord.

While visiting the Piedmont church a short time ago I picked up a paper, "Church Life," from their vestibule. It told of a church in Hudson, New Hampshire, that used the same plan that we will be using of inviting people by phone. Those making the calls asked two simple questions: Are you actively involved in a local church? If not, would you like to receive information about a new church starting near you? A Bible study group of thirteen people made 12,423 phone calls. On their opening Sunday 164 people came to worship. Let's pray for those who will be making the phone calls for our three designated places that the Spirit of the Lord will flow across those phone lines, causing people to sense a love and caring.

Yes, there are many ways to spread the Good News. Talking to co-workers, inviting others to your house for dinner, visitation, or home Bible studies. What method are you using? D. Elton Trueblood said, "The only way to be loyal to the heritage of the pioneers is to pioneer, rather than to go on standing where the pioneers once stood."

November 6 is Celebration Sunday for East Hill in Kent and Mountain View in Vancouver. Celebration Sunday is the day when all of the people who have been contacted by phone will come together to meet each other and worship. I challenge you to make that same day a Celebration Sunday in your church. Using any method you desire, make that day one of outreach. If each congregation within Northwest Yearly Meeting had only 15 new people, and the new congregations had 150 each, we would have over 1000 new worshippers visiting our churches. Pastors, representatives, and board members, let's join together and make November 6 a special day in every one of our churches.

I Thessalonians 5:16 reads, "Do not put out the Spirit's fire." The Holy Spirit is a burning presence in our lives. Allow Him to glow through each of us. "Be joyful." As visitors come into our services, they sense the

Lord's presence when His joy is evident. This is the Lord's work and He is in control. Hurt feelings of the past, unhealed, or negative thinking can only quench the flame. Allow your spirit to catch the grand vision of a new door opening to you, your church, and Northwest Yearly Meeting. Visualize with me what God is going to accomplish through each of us working together. Wipe out fear of failure and move ahead. Fear instead that we might miss out on a great opportunity of building the Lord's Kingdom by standing still. Dream of what God wants; then put action into your dreams. I still have special warm spots in my heart for those churches I have pastored, for we were part of groups dreaming of what God desired, and then working together to see it come to pass. Along with others we gave of our finances and time, pounded nails and swept floors, called in the neighborhood and united in prayer. What a thrill when people came in and lives were changed. We were a part.

Together this year across the Yearly Meeting we will make an impact for the Lord and His Kingdom. A missionary in China was quoted as praying, "Lord, use me" to which another prayed, "Lord, I am available." I appreciate the many who have been available this past year. Three groups of seven people met to share and pray with me this past year about phases of the ministry of the Yearly Meeting. Out of these gatherings and through prayer and counsel I share the following proposals for Northwest Yearly Meeting:

1) Up to the present time, Evangelical Friends Alliance has been composed of four yearly meetings within the United States. Recently requests came from two overseas yearly meetings desiring to become members. Following discussions and much prayer, a letter was sent to each of the mission yearly meetings affiliated with E.F.A. to see if they would be interested in being a part of Evangelical Friends International. E.F.I. Statement of Purpose is as follows:

"The International Friends Alliance shall serve to develop Christian ministries based upon biblical priorities, in order to most effectively fulfill the Great Commission. It shall prayerfully invest both personal and material resources. The organization shall continuously seek to distinguish both the call of God and the cries of humanity. Responding to these calls in diverse cultures, it will attempt to communicate the Christian message with understanding and compassion in specific areas of concern: 1) renewal, 2) evangelization, 3) fellowship, and 4) leadership."

If favorable communication is received from the yearly meetings, the idea will be shared at the next E.F.A. meeting in January 1989, and then be presented to Northwest Yearly Meeting during Yearly Meeting sessions 1989.

2) That this year we give emphasis to prayer across the Yearly Meeting with the focal point being that of revival and evangelism. The Good News of Jesus is too good to keep quiet about. During the coming year you will be hearing more about prayer gatherings in each Area of the Yearly Meeting.

3) That elders of each church be encouraged to identify those within their congregation who have the gift of pastoral ministry and that through the Superintendent and the Board of Ministerial Service these individuals be ministered to.

I propose that a small group of people be commissioned to research and propose a plan whereby college-age young people who sense a call to pastoral ministry could serve for one year in an internship of training and ministry. The committee would be chosen by the General Superintendent and the Clerk of the Board of Ministerial Service.

4) That under the care of the Council of Elders "Encouragement Teams" be appointed for each Area of the Yearly Meeting. The Encouragement Team would be available to minister and counsel pastors or churches where desired or needed. The Area Elder would be a member of the Encouragement Team along with two other members appointed by the General Superintendent and the Clerk of the Yearly Meeting Council of Elders.

5) And last, that through the Board of Stewardship in conjunction with the General Superintendent a task force be assigned to propose a major financial emphasis that would enable the Yearly Meeting to carry out a dynamic ministry in church planting and renewal, missions, youth, pastoral and leadership training.

Not failure, but low aim or no plan is too often our problem. I have heard that the biggest thing many people ask God for is to bless their food. Our Lord wants to do so much more than bless our food. He wants us to be involved in building His Kingdom, spreading His burning Spirit throughout the Northwest and around the world. Will you covenant with me and with the Lord this evening, joining hands with others across the Yearly Meeting, to be available for Him to use.

18. A letter from the Friends Bible Institute, Kenya, East Africa, was read expressing appreciation for the visit of the YCEW team composed of Shawn McConaughy, Warren Koch, Katrina Baker, Annette Osborn, Mintha (Nikki) Ellis, and Drew Holcombe.

19. Deann Thompson, co-clerk, presented the following report for the Board of Social Concerns.

BOARD OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

This has been a year of challenge for our board as we learn of new concerns and seek the Lord's leading in these areas.

We have been involved in the following:

1) Sponsorship of the Thanksgiving offering. A video was produced by Lifeline in Medford, Oregon, and distributed to all NWYM churches. Lifeline is a ministry to young pregnant women in need of housing, spiritual guidance, and resources. This year \$7,338 was received to assist in the purchase of a home in Medford now being used as the Lifeline facility.

2) We continue to support and encourage the Quaker Benevolent Society.

3) Dan Nolte has welcomed Dick Benham "on board" as a part of the Tacoma Police Chaplaincy program.

4) Our workshops are covering topics such as: Christian and Politics, Substance Abuse Education, Christians as Reconcilers, Friends for Families Shelter Home (formerly Selby House).

Deann further reported that 25 women, ranging in age from 12 to 39, have been served through the Lifeline program; 16 have accepted Christ.

The Thanksgiving offering in 1988 will go to Lifeline and to Friends for Families Shelter Home in Tillamook, Oregon.

The report was approved.

20. Earl Perisho, clerk, presented the following report for the Commission on Ethnic Ministries:

COMMISSION ON ETHNIC MINISTRIES

The Northwest Yearly Meeting Faith and Practice says "The Commission on Ethnic Ministries oversees the planting and nurturing of Friends churches among ethnic and minority groups, using methods and structures of organization appropriate to the needs of the various groups." This is the mandate of this relatively new commission. It is a simple statement, a great challenge, and at the same time a very large order.

At the present time we are only able to attempt to nurture and encourage ministries already in place in the Yearly Meeting, while at the same time

reminding Friends that the cultural mobility of our society and the thousands of people from various ethnic backgrounds in our midst present us with tremendous responsibilities to do all we can to reach them with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Reports to the commission demonstrate Friends' concern in this area.

PIEDMONT: The Piedmont work is partially supported by funds from Northwest Yearly Meeting. This ministry has had a good year in spite of inadequate funding. The involvement of Joshua and Virginia Phillips, Dan Harvey, and others has been a real help and encouragement to Aaron and Sharon Hamlin and the Piedmont congregation. The Friends for Kids summer program reports about 130 children enrolled and another 60 on a waiting list. The commission would challenge the Yearly Meeting to renewed commitment to the support of this cross-cultural ministry.

PORTLAND KOREAN FRIENDS CHURCH: The Portland Korean Church, started with assistance from Friends of NWYM, is in its 24th year of ministry to the Portland Korean community. This work has grown over the years and is largely self supporting today, but is in particular need of prayer support at this time that there might be unity, love, and a sense of God's direction for the future.

NEWBERG HISPANIC CONGREGATION: We appreciate the support Newberg Friends give to the Hispanic congregation. Gerardo Ibarra, a young Mexican pastor leads this congregation, and is having a good ministry.

HILLSBORO MIGRANT MINISTRY: The Hispanic ministry in the migrant camps of the Hillsboro-Scholls area has had its most successful summer during 1988. As many as 400 people have attended services and many have been assisted with food, clothing, legal assistance, and medical and dental help donated by Friends and other concerned Christians.

While the foregoing represents what are probably the most prominent ethnic ministries undertaken by Northwest Friends, a survey taken during last Yearly Meeting sessions indicate that a number of churches are engaged in ethnic ministries of some type, whether as a congregation or on an individual basis. The commission continues to seek means to assist and encourage Friends to be faithful to God's call to minister to those of other cultures in our communities.

Bob Gilmore was introduced. He enlarged on the Newberg Hispanic Ministries. Tony Jeffery reported on the Hispanic migrant ministry in the Hillsboro-Scholls area, and urged that ministries be started in other areas of our Yearly Meeting where migrant workers live.

Aaron Hamlin spoke on the Piedmont work, enlarging on the services provided in this needy area of Portland, and their plans and dreams for a growing ministry in that community.

The report was approved.

21. Aaron Hamlin gave the report for the National Black Evangelical Association, commenting on their 25th annual convention held this year at the Pasadena Hilton. He expressed the desire of the NBEA to bring both black and white together, and is trusting God for another 25 years of meeting people's needs.

Aaron expressed appreciation for the support of Northwest Yearly Meeting and urged continued prayer for the NBEA. He introduced Joshua Phillips who was also in attendance.

Clerk Richard Beebe expressed appreciation for the work of Aaron Hamlin.

22. Phil McLain, clerk of the Commission on Family Life, presented the following report:

COMMISSION ON FAMILY LIFE

Our main effort continues to be directed toward providing affordable and suitable resources our local churches can use to strengthen their families. Three new video series have been acquired during this past year: "Teammates," focuses on the marital relationship and features Dr. Howard Hendricks; "For Parents Only," by Dr. John Baucom and Dr. John White, concentrates on the parent-child relationship; and "Challenge of Christian Discipline," featuring Richard Foster and based on his book, Money, Sex & Power. These are now available for a nominal rental fee through the Yearly Meeting office.

In the area of pastoral renewal, we have had some success in compiling a list of low-cost rest and recreation sites which are available free or at discount rates to NWYM pastors and their families. Also, a professional counselor is available during Yearly Meeting to provide assistance upon request.

Sample bulletin inserts have been obtained from "Focus on the Family" and "Ministry Inserts" (a division of Christianity Today). These offer a way to reach people who would never take time to read a book or even a long magazine article.

Friends Ministries to Families was reorganized and relocated at Friends University, Wichita, Kansas, in June 1987. The anticipated benefits have not materialized although efforts continue toward making the organization effective. It was agreed that no further funding would be provided by any yearly meeting after the current fiscal year. A residual balance of about \$8,000 will fund activities for 1989. We will evaluate the effectiveness of those activities prior to consideration of any future financial commitment to Friends Ministries to Families.

Responses to the questionnaire sent to the local churches indicate we need to better communicate our goals and objectives.

An excerpt from the video, "Challenge of Christian Discipline" by Richard Foster on his book Money, Sex and Power was viewed. Phil also urged churches to purchase James Dobson's "Focus on the Family" series. Discounts can be obtained for small churches who cannot finance the total purchase.

The report was approved.

23. The meeting closed with prayer by Richard Beebe.

TUESDAY, 2:15 P.M.

24. Phil Morrill, pastor at Svensen Friends Church, opened the business meeting with prayer.

25. The minutes of the morning business session were read and approved as corrected.

26. Dr. J. Duane Beals, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, gave the following report:

WESTERN EVANGELICAL SEMINARY

The primary purpose of Western Evangelical Seminary is to prepare preachers and teachers of the Word who can effectively serve the churches of the supporting constituency as pastors, teachers, missionaries, and other areas of Christian service. So reads the purpose statement in the WES catalog.

WES continues to dedicate its resources to the fulfillment of that mission. Eight full-time teaching faculty, three administrators with teaching responsibilities, and sixteen part-time faculty served the WES student community this academic year. Two hundred forty-six students studied at WES for all or part of the year. They came from 34 states and eight foreign countries (16 students were from Canada).

The February 1-2, 1988 Board of Trustees meeting included the inauguration of the third president, Dr. J. Duane Beals. His inaugural address presented the pastor-as-shepherd as a proper biblical model for ministry. Dr. Beals has been well received by the entire WES family and community. The board also adopted the first one million dollar annual budget. Sixty percent of that budget is expected to be funded by outside sources cultivated through the seminary development program.

The board approved the establishment of the Western Evangelical Seminary Foundation to perform fund raising and public relations functions for the school, and approved the hiring of the Rev. William F. Brunk as Vice President for Advancement and Director of the WES Foundation. He has served Roberts Wesleyan College, Asbury Seminary, Oral Roberts University, Point Loma Nazarene College, and several private universities.

The seminary is short on office space, classroom space, and library space especially -- 50,000 volumes are now housed in a building designed for 30,000. A study proposal for expansion is underway which includes the possible relocation of the WES campus.

An examination team from the Association of Theological Schools has visited the campus to review the proposed Doctor of Ministries degree program. The ATS Commission on Accreditation will make its decision this summer. Inquiries about the program should be directed to the admissions department.

Western Evangelical Seminary is very careful to maintain its integrity in regard to the theology and ethos of the constituent denominations. We solicit your good word in promoting WES. We encourage your input and comments.

WES is your seminary.

After enlarging on some aspects of the report, he introduced Rev. William F. Brunk, new vice president for Advancement and Director of the WES Foundation, who spoke briefly.

The report was approved.

27. Members of the Education Board gave a skit highlighting the various areas of their work. The following printed report was distributed:

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

Steven Wood, Clerk

FRESH START '88 The major program of the Department of Church Education this past year utilized our EFA age-level Christian education specialists. Regional seminars were held at Boise, Olympic View, Medford, and South Salem Friends churches. One Hundred fifty-three Christian education workers attended these evening or Saturday seminars, choosing one of four age-level tracks or a leadership track.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION LUNCHEON Our department has been encouraging the Area Christian Education Secretaries to take a more active role in the work of the Department of Church Education this year. Esther Troyer has served to chair several gatherings of this group, which, under her leadership is meeting this week.

YOUTH The department continues to place a high priority on youth ministry in the Yearly Meeting and is happy that the Youth Superintendent position

has become fulltime during the course of the past year. As a department, we have been committed to giving youth ministry major support. Bruce Bishop has served well as Youth Superintendent and will continue in this capacity through the coming year.

ADULT AND CHILDREN In the future we hope to be able to do more for local churches in the areas of adult and children's ministries. Currently, the Yearly Meeting budget earmarks around \$800 a year for this. This is an investment of about 13 cents per average Sunday morning worship attendee per year. This allows us to do one major program a year to assist local leaders and workers. We have many ideas we would like to implement if we had the funds to do them.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS ALLIANCE (EFA) Our participation in the EFA Christian education program continues to provide us with excellent resource materials and personnel. We are grateful for the work of Dorothy Barratt and the Friends age-level specialists who work so diligently in helping produce the Aldersgate Sunday school curriculum. Dorothy's mailings to local churches and consultation services have been a positive benefit to our churches. Dorothy and the EFA team also made our FRESH START '88 seminars possible.

The 1988 EFA Easter Sunday School Offering gave us an opportunity to support the new Friends field in Rwanda, Africa. We, along with other EFA yearly meetings, are rejoicing in the miraculous accomplishment of this year's offering. The \$80,000 goal was more than double what had ever been attained before. Our people responded with enthusiasm and generosity and more than \$114,000 to date has been raised to the glory of God. Forty-four NWYM churches gave a total of \$25,669. This is an increase in participation of nine churches over last year.

The EFA Christian Education Commission is pleased to release, again this year, another missionary biography for children. This new release, Mud On Their Wheels, is the story of Vern and Lois Ellis and the mission work on the Rough Rock Indian Reservation in Arizona. Betty Hockett is the author of this book and the others that have been written in the "A Life-Story from Missions" series.

Early in 1989, the EFA C.E. Commission will release Becoming Friends, a course for juniors on Friends history and beliefs.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES

Louise Sargent, Clerk

The Department of Christian Testimonies continued working on several publishing projects including a study guide for Everett Cattell's Spirit of Holiness and a series of lessons on family life. Due to the popularity of the Queries printed on adhesive-backed paper, 2000 additional copies of these were printed by Barclay Press.

The department reached international fame this year! Arthur Roberts' pamphlet On Becoming A Christian was translated into Spanish and published in Bolivia for use by our missionaries. Special thanks to Nancy Thomas for her work in translation. A Matter of Stewardship was reprinted for the Episcopal Church of Canada. We thank God that He is using these publications for His greater glory.

The department also is involved in the support and promotion of libraries. We have, over the years, contributed regularly to the library at Western Evangelical Seminary, making sure that books by and about Quakers are available to our pastoral students there. Seventeen new books were added this year, bringing the total in the Quaker collection to more than 400 volumes. In addition, the department provides annual subscriptions of Quaker periodicals to the WES library. These include New Foundation Papers, Quaker Religious Thought, Friends Journal, and the Evangelical Friend. These are

bound for permanence. (Quaker Life is provided to the WES library through another beneficiary.)

Most of the volumes purchased for the library at WES are "scholarly" in nature. In order to fill out the collection, we would like to include some of the "lighter" works by and about Quakers. Anyone desiring to donate books of poetry, essays, fiction, etc. to this collection (for instance, by Daisy Newman or Catherine Cattell), please contact Lois Tish.

The department is attempting to complete the files of the older periodicals entitled Concern and Missionary Voice. If you have any of these in your attic or basement, contact Lois Tish for the specific issues still needed.

A bibliography of all the volumes in the Quaker collection at WES is nearing completion. Special thanks are given to Gregg Lamm for the hours spent at his computer working on this project.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

Hector Munn, Clerk

The mission of the Department of General Education is to encourage all types of educational programs that occur in the Yearly Meeting apart from the church education program.

There are four meetings that have elementary school programs and two meetings that sponsor secondary school programs. In this past year \$2000 was provided to Greenleaf Friends Academy for a scholarship fund to match grants made by local meetings.

The NWYM - Church - College matching program is a similar project to assist Friends students at George Fox College. This program has grown from 55 students in 1986-87 to 66 students from 27 churches in 1987-88. It is anticipated that in 1988-89 there will be 84 students from 25 churches. The annual budget from NWYM is \$16,000 for this program.

In the fall semester of 1987 there were 114 Friends students at George Fox College, or 20% of the student body. This figure is up from 16.2% in the year prior to the start of the three-way matching program.

A Directory of Educators in Northwest Yearly Meeting is being revised and updated. Copies may be obtained through the Yearly Meeting Office later in the year.

Finally, the department assists with ministerial training with a semi-annual scholarship/loan program. In the coming year there will be eight students attending Western Evangelical Seminary and one student at Azusa Pacific Friends Center who are being assisted through this program. A new brochure is available describing the program.

The report was approved.

28. Donald Stump, superintendent of Greenleaf Friends Academy reported on that institution. The financial struggles of the academy have been the main focus for the past few years. His desire is to put the emphasis back on the education of young people. He named three goals: (1) the academy be thoroughly Christian, (2) provide excellent education, and (3) achieve financial stability. He asked for specific prayer for an increased enrollment for the coming academic year and continued prayer for their financial needs.

The report was approved. Steve Fine led in prayer for the academy.

29. Clerk Richard Beebe closed the meeting with prayer.

Wednesday, 10:45 a.m.

30. Lawrence Wright, pastor at Entiat Friends Church opened the business

session with prayer.

31. The minutes of the Tuesday afternoon meeting were read and approved.

32. Ruth Ann Tippin shared a prophetic message on John 6 which she had written under the inspiration of God. A time of prayer followed.

33. Harold Ankeny, clerk of the Board of Stewardship, presented the following report:

BOARD OF STEWARDS

The New Testament doesn't talk about percentage giving, but it does talk about "giving in proportion to our gain." I Corinthians 16:2. C.S. Lewis said "The only safe rule is to give more than we can spare. Our charities should pinch and hamper us." Are we giving away too little?

Stewardship Education in the Local Church Almost 70% of our churches report increased giving. That is reflected in a slight increase in giving to the Great Commission Program. It is the board's opinion that the local church needs to concentrate more on the education of its members in all areas of stewardship. That seems to be the theme reflected in the local church reports.

A new edition of the local church stewardship handbook is being prepared. Study it when it comes and also the responsibilities of the stewardship committee listed on page 43 of the new Faith and Practice.

A new Stewardship Newsletter is being sent periodically to the churches. Local stewardship clerks, pastors, and others should use these materials faithfully to promote stewardship and establish habits of generous giving.

Great Commission Program Emphasis Month October has been identified again as the month in which the GCP will be promoted. Stewardship education is a year-long responsibility, but we ask each church to plan to use the month of October to promote the wonderful opportunities to help carry out the Great Commission. Study carefully the plans and programs when they come to your church.

Churches and Support of the Great Commission Program The percent of the GCP budget supported by church pledges has risen from 59% in 1976-77 to 87% last year. We are indeed grateful for this increased level of support. However, there has been a decrease in actual dollars when adjusted for inflation. There are several reasons for this phenomena. More churches have added staff to care for the multitude of needs in today's world. The depressed economy in the early 1980's and demographic changes may have also contributed to the decline of support in "real dollars." We are optimistic to believe increased support will be forthcoming as we "tell the story" more effectively. We need help from pastors, representatives, clerks of boards, commissions, and councils if we are to be successful in promoting the Great Commission Program.

The Great Commission Program budget is allocated among boards and commissions. Percentage allocations for the two years are indicated below:

In 1988 eight churches made pledges exceeding their fair share by 50% or more. These churches are: Twin Lakes, West Chehalem, Newberg, Metolius, Netarts, Friends Memorial, Hillsboro, and Sherwood. We congratulate these churches and 15 others that exceeded their fair share, making it possible to increase the 1988 budget by about 3.2% over 1986-87.

Harold encouraged people to experience the joy of giving. The report was approved.

34. Vivian Thornburg, clerk of the Council of Elders, gave the following report:

COUNCIL OF ELDERS

A summary of reports from forty-nine of the sixty churches yields the following statistics:

- 95% report regular worship participation
- 90% appoint ushers and greeters
- 50% scheduled Friends membership classes regularly or as needed
- 40% had an approved plan for evangelism outreach
- 9% had care groups or one-on-one discipling
- 20% made phone calls or personal contact with non-resident members
- 33% sent newsletters or bulletins to non-resident members
- Five Meetings are mother churches
- Four churches sponsor Christian schools
- Six churches report special ministries to women in need
- Fifteen churches were involved in crisis ministries such as:
 - liver transplant, migrant workers, aid to plane crash victims,
 - drug rehabilitation, deaf ministry, and food banks.

From these statistics certain inferences can be drawn:

- 1) Churches give greater effort to maintenance than outreach and discipling activities. Priorities ought to be prayerfully re-examined.
- 2) Compassionate response to crisis is commendable but needs to be supplemented by policies and practices directed toward addressing regular and continuing community needs.
- 3) Worship holds a central place in our churches, with much attention to preparation, participation, and music, but more prayer emphasis is needed, and Spirit-guided purpose, inasmuch as the number of worshipers continues to decline. In some cases disunity hinders the work of the Spirit.
- 4) Some churches are lax in preparing persons for Friends membership. These meetings should take steps to revitalize their relationship to the family of Friends.
- 5) Although some churches take practical measures to contact non-resident members, others are negligent. Inasmuch as a fourth of our membership is classified non-resident, greater attention should be given to providing a caring network.

Vivian stated Arthur Roberts has offered to contact non-resident members. Church lists of non-resident members can be sent to him.

Vivian further exhorted us to develop a spirit of unity and oneness of

spirit in our meetings, being founded upon Christ and thus build strong churches. We must go forth in the power of Christ to influence our communities.

The report was approved.

35. The Council of Elders recommends Gayle Beebe to be recorded as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Approved.

36. The Council of Elders recommends Kenneth VandenHoek to be recorded as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Approved.

38. The Council of Elders recommends Marlene Watson to be recorded as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Approved.

He explained that the salary for Bruce Bishop, youth superintendent, has been moved from the Board of Education to the Board of Stewardship (line 5 to line 6). Also, the salaries and benefits for Howard Harmon and Retha McCutchen appear on line 6.

The debt for Worker's Compensation appears in the 1989 budget.

Harold further reported that the Boards of Missions and Evangelism are authorized to raise funds outside the budget.

Several responded with comments, concerns, and questions.

The budget was approved.

40. Richard Beebe closed the session with prayer.

Wednesday, 2:15 p.m.

41. Richard Beebe opened the business meeting with prayer.

42. The minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved.

43. Virginia Helm, president of Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship, gave the following report:

FRIENDS WOMEN'S MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP REPORT

There were 34 Friends Women's Missionary Fellowships who stopped their other good works long enough to take pencil in hand and report. Following Jesus' example, they "grew in wisdom, in stature" and, hopefully, "in favor with God and man."

Eighty women completed the reading course of nine books in five categories. They and other readers read 3,683 books, increasing their understanding of the Bible, missions, social concerns, Christian fiction, biographies, church history, and devotions. Blanche Jones of Newberg's Elizabeth Fry Fellowship read 180 books. Josephine Philips of Melba read 100 and Bonnie Hollinshead of Newberg's Margaret Fell Fellowship almost tied with 98.

We grew in Christian stature by listening to 114 speakers at our meetings. Sally Rohr of Texas was our speaker at Fall Retreat in Pasco, Washington. Becky Williams and Marie Cammack shared at our banquet, telling us how Bolivian and Peruvian Friends are "pressing toward the mark." We consider prayer a very important contribution to our ministry worldwide.

Busy hands made craft articles to sell at Retreat which helped finance the printing of the children's missionary books by Betty Hockett. Quilting and comforter making has become an interest in at least ten groups and nearly twenty quilts or lap robes were given away. For some, quilting became a fund-raising project. Others had mystery dinners, bake sales, yard and rummage sales, and silent auctions. Cups, nuts, and cookbooks were sold for foreign and home projects. An amazing amount was earned by the women to finance the equipping and repairing in churches and parsonages. Sometimes gifts were given with appreciation to pastors and wives. Six baby layettes were given to worthy causes and flowers and gifts to nursing homes, the elderly and ill, and to the bereaved. Rescue homes and missions were given financial aid and service. Churches were cleaned and decorated. Refreshments and meals were prepared for various groups in church and community for holidays and special occasions and in times of serious illness and death. The total expenditures by Friends Women for these church and community projects came to \$10,313.

Thirty-three different foreign and home mission projects of the individual fellowships totaled \$20,918. The entire Yearly Meeting FWMF completed

the purchase of the van for Piedmont, paid on the support of the Chapman family in Peru, and for the salary of the Gilberts in Bend.

The Rwanda clinic is a dream about to be realized. An amount of \$2,950 was given, many churches being reminded of this need by women wearing \$5 bill corsages. Today's total across the EFA is \$24,115 and we "pressed past the mark." Training materials for nationals in Bolivia and Peru will be made available with the Spring Rally offerings of \$1,315. At this writing, \$2,799 has been contributed through the Yearly Meeting banquet offering toward the staffing and equipping of the new center in Arequipa, Peru.

Fellowship and mission news is published in Quaker Waggon which has a good circulation. This year, two retreats, one at Quaker Hill in Idaho and Twin Rocks in Oregon, will give an opportunity for many to have fellowship and challenges to greater service "for God and man", women and children.

Time does not allow me to tell of the offerings for literature and schooling, Sunday school materials, clothing, birthday and Christmas gifts for missionary children. Missionary families have received help for Spanish language study, retreats, and needed vacations. National pastors health and training materials have not been forgotten. It is exciting to report what our fellowships have accomplished. Thanks to all the Yearly Meeting for your cooperation and prayers.

Various points of her report were visually assisted by a skit.

44. The Friends Fund report was presented by J.D. Baker, executive director:

FRIENDS FUND

Friends Fund with the help and services of the GFC Video Center has produced the video presentation "The Christian View of Estate Planning." We plan to use this communication tool as we have opportunity to visit in your churches. It explains the importance of making a well thought-out plan of distribution of your possessions in the way you want it to happen after your death. This presentation uses a number of personalities whom you may know. We wish to express our thanks to each one and to Rawlen Smith and Warren Koch at the GFC Video Center for their help. We will be showing this video at our workshop.

I have conducted eight presentations and have worked with 110 family units helping them to understand the alternatives available as they make plans to care for their families and ministries after their death.

Phil Morrill sang "Face to Face." Lela Morrill, Edith Comfort, and Kenneth Williams read a number of prepared memorials to persons whose names appeared on the overhead. A list of four ministers - William Ellis, Edna Springer, Iola Steen, and Roy F. Knight, and 55 members were listed. Several spoke personal tribute to those who were deceased.

Lela Morrill closed the Memorial Service, and the afternoon session with prayer.

46. Clyde Parker, co-pastor at Eugene Friends Church, opened the session with prayer.

47. Four ministers recorded this year: Marlene Watson, Ronald Watson, Gayle Beebe, and Kenneth VandenHoek, gave their personal testimonies regarding their call to the ministry. Richard Beebe led in prayer for these ministers.

48. Dan McCracken, manager of Barclay Press, opened the Commission on Media report by giving an overview of Barclay Press and the publishing ministry. He introduced the staff of Barclay Press.

Margaret Lemmons, clerk of the Commission on Media, presented the following written report:

COMMISSION ON MEDIA

As the Commission on Media has focused on a deeper sense of purpose in the ministry of the press and other media, the Lord has blessed, planning has been more effective, and many projects completed.

The Barclay Press continues to serve the Yearly Meeting, George Fox College, the Evangelical Friends Alliance, and other Christian ministries by providing quality printing services. The Evangelical Friend magazine continues to be an important part of that work of the Press.

Barclay Press has also printed seven books since last year's Yearly Meeting sessions: Faith and Practice, On the Cutting Edge, the second printings of Why Friends are Friends and A Part of My Heart Left Here; Mud on Their Wheels (printed for George Fox Press), Eight of a Kind, and More Than Empty Dreams. Scheduled for release next June is a book by George Fox

College psychology professors Mark McMinn and James Foster titled Christians in the Crossfire. Also planned is a booklet titled Sparked by the Spirit, Kindled by Man written by Jim LeShana and Stan Leach about the revival movement among nineteenth century Friends.

Barclay Press is making plans for continued growth in its printing and publishing ministries; present income is 11% ahead of this time last year. It is our vision for the Press that it reach a wider audience. We have been encouraged by the transition from a "printing house" to a "publishing house." The Press is implementing new editorial policies and providing support services in the development of manuscripts. Growth of the Publishing Fund is critical to the accomplishment of this. The fund is an available means for supporting the publishing ministry by those concerned.

The present full-time staff members represent a total of 88 years of service at Barclay Press. Their talents and commitment represent a significant ministry within Northwest Yearly Meeting. The commission wishes to express its sincere appreciation for the leadership Dan McCracken has offered Barclay Press, the commitment and quality efforts of the Press staff, and the consistent support and vision of the Press Board of Directors.

The commission also encourages the use of other materials and methods to better share the message of Christ. Nearly 50 churches and individuals captured the spirit of last year's Yearly Meeting and took it home through videotape. Tapes are available again this year; \$14.00 includes the cost of shipping.

The commission sponsored the Second Annual Writer's Dinner on Tuesday evening. Grant Martin was the speaker for an interesting and inspirational evening. There were also four workshops at Yearly Meeting this year to promote successful communication through the use of a variety of media.

Margaret introduced Lon Fendall, editor of the Evangelical Friend magazine, who reported on ways people can be more supportive of the magazine: (1) be a thorough reader, (2) be a critical reader, (3) be a sharing reader, and (4) be a praying reader.

The report was approved.

49. Gil George, clerk of the Board of Evangelism, presented a written report:

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Jesus said, "You are my Friends, if you do what I command," and the Lord has given us His commandment to ". . . go and make disciples of all the nations;" to "preach the Gospel to every creature;" to be salt and light to the world; to turn them from darkness to the light; to be fishers of men.

We are committed to the mission of God to save the lost. Our God is not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance. He has promised us that we shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on us and we shall be His witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth. The truth is that we have done a better job reaching the ends of the earth than we have of reaching Jerusalem and Judea. Your Board of Evangelism is committed to be and to do whatever is necessary to bring about the evangelization of the Pacific Northwest. We encourage the use of many methods and models in our effort to be all things to all men that we might win some.

We are committed to prayer. The evangelization of the Northwest can only be accomplished by prayer. The front-line troops in our church extension efforts are the prayer warriors. We praise God for the 1100 plus who have committed themselves to pray for the salvation of the lost, the success of our church planting efforts, and for the workers needed for the harvest.

We applaud Retha's leadership in directing several prayer retreats in NWYM churches.

We are committed to planting new churches. Our goal is to plant several new churches every year. We praise God for the successful birth of Deschutes Friends Church in Bend, Oregon, this past year led by Kevin and Denise Gilbert. This year we are planting in Kent, Washington, with pastor Richard (Rick) and Judie Hayes. We are also helping Mountain View move up to extension church status with a full-time pastor. Steve and Donna Wood with their tent-making associates, Jeff and Deana VandenHoek will lead this church in a major outreach campaign this year.

We are committed to helping declining churches. We are determined to do all we can to stop closing churches. This year we are directing a church renewal effort at Maplewood with Michael and Erica Huber as full-time pastors.

We are committed to helping pastors to be effective and successful in leading their churches to growth. The Board of Evangelism cannot plant churches. We can only release and help pastors who can. To this end we are providing more training for church planters, more supervision and direction, more accountability to plans for outreach and discipleship.

This year we have supervised the work of 13 extension churches and two mission points. We are praising God that in spite of some setbacks and difficulties, most of these finished the year with new vitality and growth. We are especially grateful to Retha McCutchen for her excellent first-year effort in supervising the work of this board. Under her guidance we have instituted a new selection process for church planting and we are writing a complete policy and operations manual for the board.

Boise Friends received a Share Call this year to help furnish their new kitchen. Boise and Tigard Friends have been involved in building projects.

The board sponsored the annual Focus Conference, an in-service training for pastors. The speakers for the 1987 Focus Conference were John and Carol Williams and Norman Whan. Due to limitations within the Great Commission Program budget, Focus will not be held in 1988.

He expressed special thanks to all those who are participating as "Prayer Warriors", and encouraged special prayer for the extension work at Silver Valley and East Boise who are experiencing discouraging times.

Gil explained some of the sources of financing for the church-planting outreach of the Board of Evangelism, beyond the \$39,000 in the Great Commission Program budget.

The report was approved.

50. Alice Maurer closed the meeting with prayer.

54. A traveling minute for Jack and Geraldine Willcuts for their upcoming trip to Japan was read and approved. A traveling minute to North Pacific

Yearly Meeting for the Willcuts from Reedwood Friends Church was also read and approved.

55. The following resolution from the Department of Peace was read and approved:

DEPARTMENT OF PEACE

The Department of Peace calls on Friends of the Northwest Yearly Meeting to reaffirm our commitment as followers of Christ to His message of love and peace. With Christ as our example as reconciliator and peacemaker, we boldly proclaim the Gospel of His Kingdom and seek to resolve conflict in a spirit of forgiveness and understanding. "For He Himself is our peace, who has made the two one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility." Ephesians 2:14.

We desire for our Yearly Meeting an awareness of our Friends heritage of peace testimony as taught by George Fox, John Woolman, and as expressed here by Margret Fell in a letter in 1660, stating the peaceful intent of Friends:

"We are a people that follow after those things that make for peace, love and unity; it is our desire that others may walk in the same (way) and we do deny and bear our testimony against all strife, wars, and contention."

Our biblical and historical roots continue to be the present foundation of our beliefs as expressed in our Faith and Practice "Christian Witness to Peace and Justice: We believe the precepts of Christ our Lord and the whole spirit of His Gospel calls us to live at peace with all people. Therefore we consider war and all violence incompatible with the holiness we profess."

Finally, we resolve to embrace our peace testimony not only as a theological statement against the evils of war, but a statement against abuses against persons. We seek justice and mercy, not as a moral obligation, but in obedient response to the commands of God and a prerequisite to true worship.

We recognize our responsibility to participate in elections of national and local leaders, and to bring spiritual values to bear on public policy decisions. Therefore, members of Northwest Yearly Meeting are encouraged to make themselves aware of the views of the candidates concerning peace and justice issues. The information available from the Friends Committee on National Legislation, providing voting records of elected officials, is an excellent source of information.

Local peace committees are further encouraged to continue teaching and guiding members of all ages into an understanding of Friends practices and beliefs concerning the scriptural basis of peace testimony.

As followers of Christ and proclaimers of His love for all people, we welcome efforts on the part of the United States to seek a peaceful understanding with our brothers and sisters in the Soviet Union. We encourage renewed and serious efforts to reduce and eliminate the tragedy of nuclear weapons.

The injustices and human suffering which result from the ever increasing militarization of our national budget demand that we actively seek to end this imbalance. We call on the leaders of both nations to release the tensions of the "cold war" and to redirect our resources and energies into feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, and ministering to those in need.

The Department of Peace Testimony requests that copies of these resolutions be sent to the appropriate national and local officials.

56. Earl Perisho, reporting for the Board of Missions, projected a list

of praise and prayer notes on the overhead, and a time of prayer followed for these requests.

The following recommendation from the Board of Missions was read:

The Board of Missions has received a request from the Peruvian Friends Church Executive Council asking for recognition as an independent yearly meeting. The Board of Missions believes it is appropriate to immediately implement a process leading to the achievement of this goal. We request the Yearly Meeting to express its concurrence with the board to begin this process.

In answer to questions, Earl enlarged on the process involved in granting the requested recognition to Peru Yearly Meeting. Our relationship with Peru will not noticeably change, just as it did not with the establishment of Bolivia Yearly Meeting.

The recommendation was approved, and a time of special prayer for Peru followed.

A printed report from the Board of Missions was distributed:

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION NORTHWEST

This was the year that Evangelical Friends from all around the globe converged in Guatemala for a first-ever gathering of evangelical Friends. Representatives from Bolivia Yearly Meeting and the Peruvian National Church as well as those from other EFM yearly meetings met together in November for the purpose of being challenged to move ahead with evangelism. Delegates came away renewed with the sense of Christ's Great Commission, as well as a greater bonding as believers in Christ and identification as Friends.

Items for praise and concern for prayer have been expressed this year in the Philippines, in Mexico, with the Bolivian University of Santa Cruz, among stateside EFM ministries, and in the newest mission field, Rwanda. James Morris, Reta Stuart, and Roscoe Knight continue to give significant leadership to the work of Evangelical Friends Missions around the world.

The EFA Easter Offering for Rwanda to date is over \$115,075 from EFA churches. Churches in Northwest Yearly Meeting gave \$25,669 of that amount. Forty-four churches participated. This miracle of the Lord makes the possibility of a church building in Kilgali, Rwanda a soon-to-be-reality.

George and Dorothy Thomas and Willard and Doris Ferguson patiently laid the groundwork for beginning this work. After Thomases return to the states, Paul and Leona Thornburg arrived in Rwanda to give leadership to training programs for pastors and church leaders. Connie and Gary Young were appointed in May to guide the building of the new church and health care center on the recently purchased property in Kicukiro, suburb of Kilgali.

A new Agronomy Department was added to the Bolivian University in Santa Cruz with grant funds from U.S. AID.

EFM looks to the future with evangelism plans for Asia, Africa, Latin America, and North America.

Howard and Bethlin Harmon visited Bolivia and Peru in December giving encouragement to missionaries at the annual Christmas retreat. They were blessed by the opportunity to get acquainted with the field.

Ken and Tonya Comfort and Dan and Tami Cammack have been in language school in Costa Rica this past year in preparation for their ministry in Peru beginning in September of this year.

Dwaine and Becky Williams and children Marci, Jonathan, and Sara returned to the states for a period of time to allow their children to complete their education.

James and Gail Roberts and daughters Heidi and Amanda also retired from missionary service this year. Appreciation is expressed to both of these couples for their years of faithful service.

Ed and Marie Cammack returned to the states for a year of furlough,

after having served on the coast of Peru the last three years.

Hal and Nancy Thomas and children David and Kristin continue to minister among the urban church in La Paz, Bolivia.

Wayne and Bev Chapman and children Amy, Nicholas, and Michael have served in Juli, Peru, and are now moving to La Paz to complete this term.

Denny and Sue Anderson served effectively on furlough this year, inspiring and challenging us to become a part of the great work in Arequipa. They will be returning to Peru after their new baby joins brothers Aaron and Bryan and sister Kristin. [Editor's note: Kathryn Alyssa was born July 27, 1988.]

Howard Harmon stepped into a coordinating role in the Board of Missions replacing Quentin Nordyke. Ron Woodward turned over his clerk duties to Earl Perisho when he and his wife, Nancy, and two of their children assumed their mission duties in Kenya under FUM. Ron's leadership has been greatly appreciated and our prayers go with this family as they continue to serve the Lord.

Highlights from Field Reports

Peru

The Peruvian Executive Council requested that Northwest Yearly Meeting cooperate in helping provide salaries of two families sent from Bolivia as missionaries to Peru. Leonardo Tola and his wife, Delia, are working in Arequipa, giving pastoral and teaching leadership to the churches there and on the coast. Benito Apaza and his wife and family are living in Ilave working with churches of the high plains. The leadership and spiritual maturity of these men is greatly appreciated.

Because flood waters around Lake Titicaca are receding in places, some groups are re-forming and making plans to rebuild.

The Peruvian National Church continues to flourish under the excellent leadership of Ramon Mamani.

Six pastors and two missionaries attended Guatemala '87 Conference on Evangelism. This was a first time to travel internationally for all of the Peruvian pastors. There were many good relationships built and many horizons broadened to the "world family" of Friends.

This was a year of progress toward developing a plan to evangelize the city of Arequipa. Plans are being made to build a central church in the city of Arequipa that will provide a gathering place for believers from around the city, as well as a training center.

At President Ramon Mamani's initiative, a coastal executive council was set up to facilitate the organization of programs for churches on the coast of Peru. A women's retreat was held in Arequipa, a Coastal Yearly Meeting session met in Ilo with 100 people attending. There was a leadership and pastors' retreat and another women's retreat in Tacna.

Bolivia

Three new urban congregations opened in La Paz and two in Santa Cruz.

The development of a series of three books for evangelism, discipleship, and membership is one of the most significant projects of the Bolivian Mission Council. The second of the series, Following Jesus, was published. The third book, Knowing God, is being readied for printing.

The Thomases and James Roberts continued their involvement in TEE classes and in the San Pablo Seminary in La Paz.

Francisco Mamani, in his second year, continues to give strong, positive leadership to the Bolivian Friends churches. Francisco has modeled yearly meeting sessions after those of Northwest Yearly Meeting, with a functioning general session and a representative body.

A church-wide year-long program of evangelism is now in effect in Bolivia, with frequent communications to churches to encourage evangelism to happen.

Two leading pastors and church leaders went to be with the Lord this year: Vicente Yujra had a stroke while on a preaching assignment at the Easter Conference, and Cipriano Copa died in a truck accident.

The mission has constructed a portable structure on a lot that is loaned to the national church in Santa Cruz. The plan is to develop a congregation with the use of the building, and then buy land for the construction of a permanent church. The portable structure could then be moved to another location and the process repeated.

A Bolivian national missionary continues to be located in San Julian, with plans for a second national missionary family to be located there this year.

For the coming year, at least, there will not be any North American missionary living in Santa Cruz. Williams have returned to the states and there is no family to replace them at this time. The mission house in Santa Cruz is being rented to World Gospel Mission.

Though this has been a year of transition on the Board of Missions, and a number of personnel changes have occurred on the field, we affirm with Hal Thomas who wrote, "God builds His church. And it is He who calls us to build with Him!"

Junior High Social Concerns Committee

During our committee discussion, we discovered a common concern for the homeless and the needy. Because of this concern we have decided to take action by forming P.L.O.T. (Providing for the Least of These). Matthew 25:35-37 explains our purpose or theme.

We remember I Timothy 4:12 when told to follow Christ's example. "Don't let anyone look down upon you because you are young but set an example for the believers in love, in life, in faith, in speech and in purity."

It is our goal to provide year-round support for the needy. However, we have designated the month of February as official "P.L.O.T. Month." During this month, our contributions will be highlighted throughout the Yearly Meeting.

Some of the projects that our committee has discussed as possibilities for the youth of the Yearly Meeting are:

- contributing time to shelters to work (serving food, painting, etc.)
- blanket drives
- door-to-door service
- food drives
- clothes drives
- fundraisers (such as . . . car wash, bake sale, egg sale, rent-a-kid)

It has also been suggested that each participating church set up a P.L.O.T. bank account. If it is in the best interest of the churches involved, it might be possible to set up a single account at the Yearly Meeting offices in Newberg.

We will be sending out letters to all of the churches in the NWYM explaining our goals and purposes for P.L.O.T. and encouraging participation. Your support is appreciated.

We encourage kids and adults to send in their ideas and questions about family life to the Youth Superintendent.

Concerns We are very concerned about some of the very needy countries with no existing Friends missions such as Haiti. Also, we would like to help support the missionaries already on the mission field.

Goals Our youth would like to have an actual cross-cultural experience so that we can be aware of what's really happening there.

Ideas of What We Can Do Together, the missions committee came up with many ideas of how we can help our missionaries and become more familiar with missions. We decided that it would be a good idea for each youth group in the Northwest to have one sponsored child. It would help many children that don't have enough food or money.

If the youth were able to go on mini-missions (in a nearby state), it would help us build a vision for serving others as missionaries do. Also, we would really like it if the Junior High would be allowed to go to Get-Away- Give-Away.

In addition to this, we came up with some fun ideas to help out missionaries. One idea is for each youth group to be assigned one missionary family. We would support our assigned family with money we've raised, presents, and encouragement.

We would like to start doing more fundraising for missions. Here are some of our fundraising ideas. It would be fun to have a big sale of crafts, used items, etc. A pancake breakfast or passing out flyers for businesses would bring in quite a bit of money, too. Newspaper and can drives help out a lot, along with doing the inventory for a department store. Two other fun things would be to have a fast-a-thon and get money from pledges, or a baby-sitting night so the parents could go out together.

These are some of the ways we've thought of to raise money for missions. We would like to help in as many ways as possible. Please let us know how we can help. We're available and also interested in missions.

To Friends Everywhere:

Greetings from the 96th session of Northwest Yearly Meeting gathered on the George Fox College campus July 23-28, in Newberg, Oregon. Our theme was "Kindle the Fire." D. Elton Trueblood's hymn, "Quench Not the Spirit," was sung in most of the meetings for worship. Our guest speaker, Dr. Ted Engstrom of World Vision International, stressed the importance of personal integrity, drawing comparisons between our moral condition in the United States today and that of ancient Rome shortly before its fall.

Our Yearly Meeting Superintendent, Howard Harmon, outlined as objectives for the year: an emphasis on prayer and revival; a plan for discipling Friends young people in preparation for future pastoring; and developing encouragement teams set up by the Yearly Meeting Council of Elders for ministry among local meetings. He reported that Evangelical Friends Alliance is responding to a concern for creating a plan for EFA international membership. Inspirational hour speakers included Assistant Superintendent Retha McCutchen, and pastors Keith Vincent, Marcile Leach, with Bob Schaefer bringing the Tuesday through Thursday evening messages. The Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship banquet was attended by approximately 300 on Saturday evening. Marie Cammack, furloughing missionary, gave updated information on the work in Arequipa, Peru, and Becky Williams, retiring missionary from Santa Cruz, Bolivia, reported progress among Friends in Bolivia.

Edwin Cammack spoke at the Men's Banquet with a report of the problems and victories in Arequipa.

Four Friends were recorded as ministers this year: Ron and Marlene Watson, Kenneth VandenHoek, and Gayle Beebe. All are serving as pastors.

Bruce Bishop, youth superintendent, shared his vision. "We must not try to entertain youth in competition with the lure of the world; we must be models and vulnerable listeners, allowing them to assume leadership positions as God raises them up."

Growth such as we seek and the power to stand against the burgeoning evils of our world with its mind-numbing contradictions is only possible through spiritual revival.

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray, and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land. Now my eyes will be open and my ears attentive to the prayers offered in this place." (II Chronicles 7:14,15).

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE REPORT

An article in The American Scholar on "The Contemporary College President" quotes a former president: "There is not much joy in being a college president today!"

Contrast that with the verses I have adopted as my 1987-88 theme: "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:4-7).

To be sure, there is not much joy in the job - if you are looking for limited travel, few problems, no pressure, complete unity of all constituent groups, an abundance of money, etc. But, as believers, we know that joy follows obedience. And, at least in my case, obedience is based on faith: God does give the supernatural peace - and the joy - regardless of the circumstances.

All of that is to say this - It's been a good year! We have made great progress on several fronts: student enrollment, new programs that extend our mission, new faculty members that strengthen and encourage a good returning faculty, construction of the M.J. Murdock Learning Resource Center, our mention in U.S. News & World Report as one of America's best colleges - and many other highlights.

Obviously, not everyone we asked for gifts and grants said yes (we take a lot of "no's" in this business). The asbestos discovered in the construction of the library was unsettling; and since I'm not a negative person I won't go any further with this line of reporting.

My reason for rejoicing is that I am in right relationship to God through Jesus, the Christ. George Fox College is a place and a work that remains solidly committed to the centrality of the Christ in our teaching, in our living, in our loving, in our leading. Join with us in that work - if the Spirit leads - and join with us in our rejoicing!

PROGRAM

NATIONAL RECOGNITION. George Fox College - one of America's best colleges!

In an October article "America's Best Colleges," U.S. News & World Report magazine ranked George Fox 12th out of 184 midwestern and western liberal arts colleges. The ranking placed GFC in the top seven percent of its category. The survey considered cohesiveness of curriculum, quality of teaching, and quality of relationships between faculty and staff.

The poll was particularly impressive in that it surveyed the nation's college presidents, asking them to evaluate their peer institutions.

ENROLLMENT. The decision to contract for admissions and marketing services with D.H. Dagley Associates of Atlanta, Georgia, has resulted in positive gains for the College's enrollment. Under the direction of Jeff Rickey, the Admissions Office posted a 28 percent increase in new students. Fall enrollment was 705.

Churches have played an important role in encouraging young people to attend George Fox College. Church giving to the church/yearly meeting/college matching scholarship program is up 50 percent.

Academic awards were increased to attract more top students, and entering SAT scores continue to increase.

The student body is continuing to become even more international with students from five continents and 12 countries.

ENGINEERING. George Fox enters the 1988-89 academic year with a new major: engineering. In conjunction with the University of Portland, the five-year program includes three years at GFC and two years in Portland. The major leads to two degrees - a bachelor's degree in applied science from George Fox and an engineering degree in one of five areas from the University of Portland's Multnomah School of Engineering.

CENTENNIAL PLANNING. During the year preparation for the College's 100th anniversary in 1991 began. A Centennial Planning Committee has been formed to make plans for the year-long celebration starting in September of 1990. Tentative and early plans are for an opening dinner and celebration, a series of lectures, programs and events throughout the school year, and a formal Centennial Convocation and party on the College's 100th birthday. A centennial book has been authorized and the Board of Trustees has granted history professor Ralph Beebe a leave of absence for the fall semester of 1988 for research and writing.

HUMAN RESOURCES MANAGEMENT PROGRAM. Fifty-one students completed GFC's new adult degree-completion program during the year, receiving their diplomas along with traditional students in ceremonies April 30. It pushed the number of GFC spring graduates to a record 160.

During the school year 259 students were participating in 19 Human Resources Management classes at sites in Newberg, Portland, and Salem.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE INSTITUTE. President Edward F. Stevens spent a week in Japan and Taiwan in October, helping establish relationships for George Fox's new English Language Institute program. Fourteen students, most of them from Japan, enrolled in the first course that has the goal of preparing international students for college studies in the U.S. Dr. Stevens is scheduled for a return trip in October, 1988 to both Japan and Korea.

JUNIORS ABROAD. Participating in GFC's Juniors Abroad program, 28 George Fox students spent the month of May on one of three tours in Europe, South America, or England and Scotland.

With the goal of exposing students to a Christian world view, the program provides transportation costs for students who maintain full-time enrollment through the spring of their junior year. Students pay only for room and board and their personal expenses. Next year's plans include tours in Israel, Mexico, and Russia.

CENTER FOR PEACE LEARNING. George Fox College's Center for Peace Learning hosted a series of "Peacemaking Suppers" during the year. Gatherings featured peacemakers such as Felicity McCartney of Ireland, and internationally-known scholar and writer Elise Boulding, professor-emeritus at Dartmouth.

In March, Peace Center Director Lon Fendall accompanied eight GFC students to the Philippines. In May he led seven persons on a tour of Northern Ireland for visits with peacemakers and political officials.

The center continues to need further financial support for it to remain successful.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCIAL

M.J. MURDOCK LEARNING RESOURCE CENTER. Construction started in October on the new \$2.5 million M.J. Murdock Learning Resource Center and continued throughout the year with an expected completion date in September, 1988. The previous 17,000-square-foot Shambaugh Library will become a 35,000-square-foot facility with space for more than 150,000 volumes. The building, in addition to containing the Shambaugh Library collection, will become the new home for instructional media services and the College archives, and will have expanded study and reading areas.

A financial and construction setback for the project occurred in March when asbestos was discovered in the existing building as workmen cut into walls. More than \$200,000 was required for cleaning of the area, for removal of the remaining asbestos, and for replacement ceilings. The cleanup project continued until middle June, with construction delayed about one month.

The M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust gave the College an \$85,000 challenge grant to help fund the costs for the asbestos cleanup. With savings on expected furniture costs, the matching of the grant will give the College the necessary additional funds for the unexpected project.

CENTURY II CAMPAIGN. By the end of the fiscal year more than \$5.9 million had been given or pledged to the College's Century II Campaign launched in January, 1986. The largest in the College's history, the campaign seeks funds to double the size of the present library, to add 40,000 volumes, to increase the College's endowment, and to provide \$1.5 million for student financial aid and scholarships.

Of the \$5.9 million committed to the campaign, more than \$5 million - 85 percent - had been received by the end of the fiscal year.

BALANCED BUDGET. Almost hidden in the background of the Century II Campaign, but of significant importance, was the completion of George Fox College's 17th year with a balanced budget. Support for the College's general fund has risen sharply, from \$274,000 in 1982-83 to the \$500,000 goal reached during the 1987-88 fiscal year. We are truly grateful.

Part of the success is due to the growth of the President's Council, designed to give unrestricted fund support to GFC. It grew from 197 members at the start of the year to 243 by end of the fiscal year - a 23 percent increase.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

FALL CONVOCATION. Guest speaker Henry Greenidge, pastor of Maranatha Church in Portland, opened GFC's 97th year September 7 at the annual Convocation program. Greenidge, a prominent leader in the black community, is a founder and director of Urban Coalition, a director of Young Life and president of several governmental commissions.

RELIGIOUS CONFERENCES. William Buehler, professor of New Testament at Gordon College in Wenham, Massachusetts, opened the year's Christian Life Week September 21. An international theme, "The Good News of Reconciliation," highlighted Quaker Emphasis Week in November. Guest speakers were Arturo Carranza, a 1977 George Fox graduate active in church work in Berkeley, California, and Felicity McCartney, a peacemaker from Northern Ireland. In January, Nigerian church leader Siman Ibrahim told students at GFC's annual missions conference that missionary work begins at home.

Oxford professor and English television celebrity E. David Cook discussed "Morality Matters" at a lecture in March, sponsored by the National Christian College Consortium. Founders of the Spiritual Counterfeits Project in Berkeley, California, Brooks Alexander and Robert Burrows, addressed the topic "Christian Response to the New Age Movement" at the 1988 Spring Theological Conference in March. Earl Palmer, minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Berkeley, California, was the 1988 Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer in April.

ACADEMIC CONFERENCES AND EVENTS. Four of 100 history scholars studying the life of Herbert Hoover attended the College's Herbert Hoover conference in October to make presentations. The sixth in a series of biennial programs, the day-long event was titled "Hoover Symposium VI: Possibilities for Peace."

Financial expert Darrell Reeck told students at the seventh annual Social Involvement Conference in February that successful businesses today

measure success on a social as well as financial basis.

GFC's Tilikum Retreat Center hosted three Elder-hostels spring semester: "Peacemaking in the Real World," "Peacemaking Begins at Home," and "Heroes of Peacemaking" in the first; "Sights and Sounds: A Sensory Experience of Spring in Oregon's Willamette Valley," then "The Life and Lure of a Small Farm Lake."

Paul Chamberlin, chairman of the Division of Natural Science, discussed "Does God Play Dice?: The Implications of Quantum Mechanics" at the fall Faculty Lecture program in November. Music professor Chris Lauinger presented "Integrating Technology into the Music Curriculum" at the spring Faculty Lecture in March.

MUSIC AND DRAMA. The fall semester opened with the contemporary comedy "The Foreigner" and spring semester featured the Broadway hit "Camelot." The drama "I Never Sang For My Father" was staged in March. The GFC Players, replacing the drama troupe "Inter-Mission," traveled to Willamette Valley schools and churches during the year. The Oregon Symphony with conductor James DePriest performed for a full house in Bauman Auditorium in February. The performance was a gift to the community and GFC by Kenneth and Joan Austin of Newberg.

ATHLETICS. The athletic year started in grand fashion as GFC's women's volleyball team won the National Christian College Athletic Association national title for the second time in four years. Men's soccer came close to duplicating the feat by finishing third in the NCCAA national soccer tournament in Texas, losing only to the eventual national champion. New cross-country and track coach Wes Cook fielded a full women's cross-country team for the first time. In men's basketball, the Bruins finished third in the NAIA District 2, playing with two all-district players, but with injuries hampering the team, to lead to a 17-16 season. A remarkable second-half of season - with eight straight wins after nine consecutive early-season losses - brought the Lady Basketball Bruins to the NAIA District semi-finals for the first time. The squad finished 16-13 for the year and third in the district tournament. Both the men's and women's track and field teams finished fifth in the district and in men's baseball GFC finished first in its division and qualified for the NAIA District 2 tournament for the first time, ending the year at 15-10 in NAIA action.
