MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1989

Monday, July 24, 10:45 a.m.

■ 1. Presiding Clerk Richard Beebe read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 97th session on July 24, 1989, on the campus of George Fox College under the theme "Blessing from the Lord." Psalm 24:5. Richard led in prayer and welcomed everyone.

■ 2. Walter Lee was introduced. He first attended Northwest (Oregon) Yearly Meeting in 1919. Others indicated by raised hands that they had first attended in the 1920s.

■ 3. The Board of Missions report that had been presented Sunday afternoon was approved.

■ 4. The art display sponsored by the Commission on Fine Arts was approved.

■ 5. The keynote message by General Superintendent Howard E. Harmon, Sunday evening, was approved as follows:

"LITTLE IS MUCH WHEN GOD IS IN IT"

Welcome to the feast! I have anticipated this moment when from across the Yearly Meeting people would gather to visit, sing, conduct business, and worship together. In biblical times Israelites came together often for special occasions and celebration. Sometimes for a week they ate together, wept together, and rejoiced together. In the same spirit we have come from across Idaho, Washington, and Oregon to be refreshed again this year by the Lord. Gatherings are vital in the ongoing relationships of any group. This week we come together, a family that is now over 300 years old. Our arms are open to you who are here for the first time, for this family is not a closed communion, but open to all. Psalm 55:14 reads, "We took sweet counsel together, and walked unto the house of God in company." To all, I am glad you are here and trust this will be a great time of spiritual nourishment and fellowship.

In a joyful family, love flows with caring, understanding, forgiveness, and allowances for each other's differences. John 13:34-35 states, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." An early Quaker, Wilbur Huberthorne, exemplified this love, which astounds the world. After hearing that George Fox, his beloved friend in Christ, had been

thrown into the despicable prison, he went to Oliver Cromwell, the Lord Protector of England, and asked that he might be allowed to take George Fox's place and be put into prison himself. "Behold how they love one another" became more than mere words. When one of the family members is hurting, we care.

A fairly popular song some years ago told the story of a boy trudging along, carrying his little brother on his back. When questioned about his heavy burden, he replied, "He's not heavy; he's my brother." Love had made the burden light. Out of love we respond—we carry our brother when needed.

During this past year some of you have reached out to carry your brother. Your response to a general plea that went out to help eliminate the \$135,000 Worker's Compensation debt that was incurred due to two tragic deaths and a serious injury has at this point come to over \$25,000. Thank you!

Across the Yearly Meeting you have shown your love by prayers and caring for our new church plants as they eagerly and wonderingly anticipated opening day. Excitement was high as many people participated in calling, giving, and helping on Celebration Sundays. Thank you for caring. This evening you will hear from some of our new family members.

The Bible records many fascinating and incredible facts . . . a prophet being fed by ravens, God noticing the fall of a sparrow. This evening let's look at one of these human interest stories. I see several parallels between what happened in this story and what is happening in our Yearly Meeting. John 6:5-9 tells of a boy and his lunch. "There is a lad here." Attention was drawn to a small boy—certainly not a likely prospect for solving this crisis, not very important in so great a crowd. But God loves to choose the weak, the insignificant, that He might receive the glory. Yes, he was easy to overlook, just a lad, but what potential he held in his hand if it were only available to the Master. "There is a lad here." How thankful I am for those Sunday school teachers, youth workers, and camp leaders who pay attention to the young people in our churches and believe in their potential as leaders in our churches! This year in the Yearly Meeting we have a great need for those who will sense God's hand upon their lives for pastoral and missionary service. The Lord's command is "Go and make disciples." Luke 10:2 is for all of us. "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

Will you covenant with me to pray for pastors for His harvest field? The Lord has asked us to pray specifically for workers. Let's do it! Is there someone in your church who you feel has the gift of ministry? Lift that person to the Lord in prayer. May our prayer always be open that the Lord can speak to us personally. Also, I am going to pray each Tuesday morning for this special need. Will you join me? Is there a young person here who is hearing the Lord call? Is there an older person here who is hearing this call? May your response be that of the lad with the fish. "Here Lord, whatever I have is yours." If you believe the Lord is calling you to full-time Christian service I would appreciate it if you would write your name, address, and phone number and give it to me at the close of the service. Share with your pastor that you believe the Lord is calling you into ministry. The elders of your church will encourage you; the leaders of the church will reach out to assist you. PRAY, OBEY, and the Lord will raise up His workers to do His tasks.

Have you thought what a ridiculous situation it was on the shores of the Sea of Galilee? Five thousand men plus women and children were hungry after a long day, and when they looked for food one small lunch was mentioned. If he had been carrying a gunny sack of bread and a wheelbarrow load of fish it would not have made a dent in the appetites of that crowd.

Have you not felt like the lad on many occasions? We see the great need of our world, and we have so little. We hear the cry of our brethren in Peru and Bolivia, and our budget is so tight. Hurting, spiritually hungry people live in the Eugene-Springfield area, along the Sunset Highway, Olympia, Seattle, and Boise. What can we do when the need is so great?

Jesus asks the lad not for a truckload of bread but only for what he had. He took it and blessed it and the Word of God said it fed the whole multitude with 12 baskets left over. As we give what we have to the Lord, He blesses it and miracles happen. Again we have seen this happen. The call went out across Evangelical Friends Alliance from the east to the west at Easter time this year to advance the work in Rwanda. Over \$94,000 has been received in the Easter offering. God is abundantly blessing that work. Already there are well over 1,500 people gathering in seven churches. The new church being built in Rwanda through your gifts will be dedicated October 15. The church will seat 700 people, packed in as the Africans do.

Is God able to bring in the funds for the purchase of a building in Arequipa to give us a center for Bible training and worship? A resounding YES swells from my heart. When we visited the Peruvian churches and asked them what was their greatest need, in each case they said we need trained pastors. In Bolivia we have had a Bible school for many years, but in Peru our only pastoral training has been the extension Bible classes held in the churches. A center in the large coastal city of Arequipa will provide a site to begin a Bible school as well as a central church much like the Max Paredes center in La Paz. Already \$22,000 of the \$85,000 needed to purchase the building has been given or pledged. God's blessings continue.

We say another YES. Yes, Northwest Yearly Meeting is able to send Roscoe and Tina Knight and Earl and Janice Perisho to minister while the door is open in Peru and Bolivia. Roscoe and Tina left July 4 on a short-term assignment as field administrators working with the missionary couples. Earl and Janice responded to a call from the Mission Board to serve in deputation and work with local mission committees through December. In January they will go to language school in preparation for ministering in South America.

Andrew, one of the disciples, went to the boy. The lad must have listened to the request and then responded. Sometimes it is difficult to catch our attention. We have so many responsibilities and involvements that it is hard for us to sit down and listen so the Lord can speak to us. This evening as together we think of the call upon the Friends Church in the Northwest to be obedient to the Lord, are we listening? Do we hear Him calling us? He calls us to draw aside, pray, and then step out in new and venturesome areas of ministry. Each of our boards and commissions is being asked to look ten years into the future and ask, What does the Lord want to do through Friends by the year 2000? Then after establishing that ten-year goal, to consider what should be accomplished within the next three years. In only three years, 1992, Northwest Yearly Meeting will be 100 years old. Will you join with me in stretching ahead these next three years to be a part of building the Kingdom? Might we move into this last decade of the nineties and into the 100th anniversary boldly and courageously for our Lord.

To accomplish what we believe is pleasing to the Lord will take the joint efforts of each of us in the family of Friends, joining hands to meet the great challenge. During the next three years, Northwest Yearly Meeting will be challenged to a financial commitment that would enable church planting, pastoral training, missions, and encouragement of local churches to be accomplished. We will call this the Centennial Challenge because it will climax in conjunction with our Yearly Meeting's centennial in 1992.

I am not aware of any other group that has the tremendous ministries provided through Northwest Yearly Meeting. Look at our camping program: Twin Rocks, Quaker Hill, Twin Lakes, and Tilikum. We have our own printing facility, Barclay Press. Youth ministries include Samuel School for middle school youth and Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview (YCEW) teams that have traveled to Chicago, Bolivia, Peru, and Kenya. Other ministries include George Fox College, Greenleaf Academy, other schools and day care centers, and one of the most exciting and fruitful missions anywhere in the world. These are all your ministries. The Lord has inspired, and unitedly Northwest Yearly

Meeting has accomplished great things. Because of your commitment and sacrificial giving, God's Kingdom is being built.

To only keep the status quo does not please anyone, neither God nor us. The worship attendance in our churches has been static too long. I was excited when I began reading the reports from our churches. East Hill—110, Post Falls, and Mountain View both up 50 in average attendance, Newberg with an increase of 47, McKinley Hill, Caldwell, Valley Friends, Eugene, Klamath Falls, Hayden Lake, Quincy, Newberg Hispanic, North Valley, Sherwood, Lynwood, West Hills, Piedmont, Rosemere, Camas, West Chehalem, Tigard—all with increased attendance. However, when we tallied all of the attendance figures of the Yearly Meeting, it showed a net loss in morning worship of 34. This slide cannot continue, and it will not if we seriously commit ourselves to outreach ministry. What can be done? Encouragement Teams are available for churches who desire outside assistance. They are available to help evaluate and to set goals and priorities.

November 5 is to be Celebration Sunday in evangelical Friends churches around the world. Every church is being encouraged to plan an outreach ministry during September and October that will culminate November 5. The goal is for each congregation to have 25 percent greater attendance than the group's past year's average. This will be one of the first cooperative ventures among what is to be called Evangelical Friends International.

Evangelical Friends International (EFI), a network of support for evangelical Friends, is being proposed in 18 yearly meetings or Friends groups including Bolivia, Peru, Taiwan, the Philippines, India, Honduras, Guatemala, and Burundi. Even before the Guatemala Conference on Evangelism, Evangelical Friends Alliance (EFA) received requests from yearly meetings in other countries who wanted to affiliate with EFA. At the time of these requests Evangelical Friends Alliance was strictly for USA yearly meetings with no provision for an international fellowship. A meeting was held in Houston, Texas, this past May with leaders of these 18 yearly meetings to determine God's leading in this matter. From this meeting a constitution was formed to be presented to each yearly meeting. The Evangelical Friends International constitution is included in the packets given to you when you registered. Evangelical Friends International will be a tremendous positive influence with yearly meetings overseas as it will provide a network of support for Friends who are evangelical.

I wonder if the boy in the Scriptures took very long to decide if he was going to give his lunch. While I am wavering about the degree of my commitment there is a hesitancy, a chance to draw back. But the moment I commit myself, energies begin to flow. God is able to work and He brings things to pass. Until the priest stepped out into the Red Sea it did not part. As we move forward under God's command, surely the Lord will bless.

The greatest days of our lives come when we are committed to a task and involved in ministry. With the greatest commitment comes the highest satisfaction. The days of noninvolvement are not the ones that satisfy.

Joan of Arc was burned at the stake at the age of 19. She was offered a chance to recant and go free; however, she chose the fire. Her words were: "Every man gives his life for what he believes, and every woman gives her life for what she believes. Sometimes people believe in little or nothing, and yet they give their lives to that little or nothing. One life is all we have: we live it and it's gone. But . . . to live without belief is more terrible than dying, even more terrible than dying young." With that she was set afire. Joan of Arc felt she had a purpose worth living for or dying for.

What is so precious that you would desire to commit yourself to it? We must have a vision that is bigger than life. We need to see that what we do today in sacrifice will affect future generations.

We need a power greater than our own. We have something to do that we cannot do with our greatest energies; to get the job done will take divine help.

To change the status quo and see each of our churches reaching out to those communities is God's purpose, it is God's vision and will certainly take God's power. It is His Spirit living within that makes the difference.

In the Scriptures we saw a miracle occur through the Lord blessing a boy's lunch. Will you believe with me that during these next three years we will see miracles happen as we each step into the place the Lord has for us. There comes a time to let go and let God do His miracle. Lord, here are the talents you have given me, here are my finances, my plans, my life.

God is not limited by circumstances but by the lack of totally consecrated disciples.

The lad could have kept his lunch and his own appetite would have been satisfied, but the multitude would have gone hungry. Jesus took his small offering and He will gladly take ours, bless it, and touch a world. *Little is much when God is in it.*

■ 6. The report by the Board of Evangelism presented Sunday evening was approved.

■ 7. Appreciation was expressed by the clerk for the workshop leaders and for the facilities provided by George Fox College.

■ 8. A traveling minute prepared for Arthur and Fern Roberts on their trip to Finland and Denmark was read along with several responses. Arthur Roberts spoke briefly of this trip including some time spent in the Soviet Union.

A traveling minute prepared for Jack and Geraldine Willcuts' trip to England and Ireland was read, including one of the six responses. Jack also reported orally on their trip. While in England, he served on the planning committee for the three Friends World Conferences to be held in the summer of 1991.

■ 9. Traveling minutes to our Yearly Meeting from the Society of Friends, Dorking Preparative Meeting for Stephen Hope, and one from Purley Preparative Meeting for Anthony and Ann Gimpel were read. A greeting from New Zealand Yearly Meeting introducing Susannah Gordon was also read. These four are in attendance as part of the Quaker Youth Pilgrimage. Cilde Grover introduced the group and each gave his or her name, some with a short greeting. They are participating with our own Friends Youth in the Youth Yearly Meeting.

■ 10. Jim Settle brought greetings from Southwest Yearly Meeting and especially from Friends Center at Azusa, California, a graduate school of theology.

■ 11. An introduction letter for Gloria Kershner was read from Pacific Yearly Meeting. She also brought personal greetings.

■ 12. A letter from Aline Autenrithe, associate development secretary of Friends Committee on National Legislation, was read. She brought personal greetings also.

■ 13. A traveling minute for Cecil and Marian Davies from Macclesfield Preparative Meeting in England was read. They have been visiting Roger and Mildred Minthorne.

■ 14. Howard Harmon, general superintendent, introduced Francisco and Juana Mamani from Bolivia Yearly Meeting, and David and Joyce Byrne from our Evangelical Friends Alliance mission in Mexico.

Howard also introduced the new pastors: Gordon and Colleene St. George—North Valley; Richard and Nadine Miller and new daughter, Bethany—South Salem; Oscar and Ruth Brown—Medford; Homer and Lois Smuck—Talent; and Dorwin and Joyce Smith—Woodland.

■ 15. Robert Sweat, pastor at Citrus Heights Friends, California, was introduced and welcomed to our sessions.

■ 16. Mark Ankeny, one of our representatives to the Evangelical Friends Alliance meetings in January at Estes Park, Colorado, reported on that meeting. Northwest Yearly Meeting was granted a 16 percent reduction in its apportionment to the various commissions. This action resulted in a 6 percent reduction in the overall EFA budget for 1989. He reported briefly on the work of the various EFA commissions: the Education Commission is considering new Sunday school materials following the demise of the Aldersgate curriculum; the Media Commission will be cooperating with Friends United Meeting on a joint publication of *Quaker Life* magazine and the *Evangelical Friend*. The July/August 1989 issue of both will carry the same four lead articles. The Mission Commission brought encouraging reports of the work in Rwanda. Tim and Kathy Fox were commissioned for the work in Mexico; and it was reported that Evangelical Friends Mission has now assumed responsibility for Rough Rock Friends Mission in Arizona. The greatest discussion centered on the proposed formation of Evangelical Friends International. Many friends groups from other nations have asked to be part of EFA. Representatives met at Houston, Texas, in May to consider the formation of EFI. A proposal will be brought to our Yearly Meeting sessions later in the week.

■ 17. Letters of greeting from London Yearly Meeting and the American Friends Service Committee were read.

■ 18. The morning session adjourned with prayer by Gordon St. George.

Tuesday, July 25, 1989 10:45 a.m.

■ 19. Dorwin Smith brought a prayer concern for Arden George of the Woodland, Idaho, Friends Church, who suffered a severe heart attack while on the way to Yearly Meeting. Dorwin led in prayer for Arden and for the morning business session.

■ 20. The minutes of the Monday morning session were read and approved.

■ 21. Chad Gates, director of development and public relations at Friends Bible College in Haviland, Kansas, was introduced and brought greetings.

■ 22. The report of George Fox College given Monday evening was approved.

■ 23. Phil Smith, clerk of the Board of Social Concerns, presented the following printed report, and highlighted parts of it:

BOARD OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

PHIL SMITH, COCLERK

According to the Apostle Paul, the Kingdom of God is not eating or drinking, but righteousness, peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit. This is the Kingdom, God's Kingdom of righteousness, peace, and joy, that Jesus proclaimed in His ministry on earth and that He told His disciples to preach in the course of trying to live out our citizenship in God's Kingdom. Friends in Northwest Yearly Meeting have been led by our Lord into many ministries to the wider community, for

Jesus wants to give us more than an internal peace or a personal righteousness only.

In many cases, a concern is taken up by an individual church or even a single family. As a board of the Yearly Meeting, we merely observe—and praise God for what He is doing! Post Falls gives spiritual and financial support to Dick Wild in his prison work; Linda Marchioro of Hayden Lake volunteers in the pro-life movement; Quincy Friends gave blankets to Navajo children; several women of Caldwell Friends volunteer for the Boise Valley "Lifeline" (not to be confused with the Lifeline ministry started by Friends in the Medford area); Patty Federighi runs the "Senior Supper," a weekly meal for senior citizens at Friends Memorial in Seattle; Annette Morasch of Camas volunteers in a community store for the needy; some men of Boise Friends are Prison Fellowship Volunteers; Woody Hesselbarth of McCall is active in environmental and nuclear issues—all these amount to just a tiny sampling of the ministries reported to our Board. If I could, I would like to encourage each one of you working under Jesus' leading in a social ministry. Perhaps you feel overwhelmed; the task is so big and you feel so small! But you are not alone, for we are servants together in God's Kingdom. No, we are not alone; Jesus calls us to concerns and goes with us as we minister.

The work of the Board proper focuses on projects or concerns in which many churches are involved. I would like to draw your attention to a few of our current emphases.

(1) Recently a newsletter called "Concern" was mailed to the churches. We hope by sharing information about resources and news of what is happening in various areas of concern, to encourage local Social Concerns committees and involved people. Perhaps by reading what other Friends are doing, our Lord will lead you into new areas of service. For budget reasons, though, we can only mail a handful of copies to each church. Help us, would you? Make extra copies of *CONCERN* and share them around your meeting.

(2) Last winter some Friends in Medford, Dan and Jill Johnson, organized "Oregon's Gift of Christmas." They asked people to fill ordinary shoeboxes with gifts for war-displaced and other poor children in Southern Honduras. With much community involvement—a savings and loan institution, other churches, a television station, and government transport arranged through the local congressman—more than 1,500 shoeboxes of gifts went from the Medford area to Honduras. This year, "Oregon's Gift of Christmas" is expanding to live up to its name. We need volunteers, especially in the Portland, Salem, and Eugene areas, to help coordinate this effort. If you are interested and want to know more, please contact Dan Johnson.

(3) Each year the Board selects a project for a Thanksgiving Offering and asks each church to participate. Our 1988 Thanksgiving Offering was used for Lifeline in Medford and Friends House in Tillamook. We were able to send \$3,000 to Lifeline, and \$4,265 to Friends House. In a bit of a departure from past projects, this year we want to ask you all for a Thanksgiving Offering for a familiar need: the Piedmont ministry of North Portland. Of course, you will be hearing more about this in coming months, but don't depend only on the written materials or pulpit announcements in November. Talk to others in your meeting about the work at Piedmont. Let's make this a really generous Thanksgiving Offering.

(4) Finally, please notice the workshops the Board is sponsoring this week. There are two peace education workshops, one for children's workers and one for youth workers. Mary-Constance will share about an issue on many hearts: how to minister to AIDS victims; and I will lead a panel discussion on taking in strangers: ministries like shelter homes, refugee settlement, foster care, etc.

More important than any of these things, we on the Board of Social Concerns would ask you to pray. Pray we will be sensitive to God's leading. We are called to be citizens of a kingdom marked by righteousness, peace, and joy. We

need to be enlightened, so we will see just what that citizenship calls for in this time and place. May God open our hearts to the whole Gospel, to discipleship, which involves all facets of life.

DEPARTMENT OF PEACE TESTIMONY

PEGGY HANSON, CLERK

This year the Department of Peace has concentrated on encouraging teaching in the area of Friends peace testimony. Reports from local churches show a marked increase in teaching on peace topics and interest in resource materials. Sermons and members classes are most often where peace issues are addressed. A summary of our activities is as follows:

(1) Contacted each church in the Yearly Meeting and encouraged them to include the peace testimony in their educational programs.

(2) Cooperated with the Board of Social Concerns to produce a newsletter, *CONCERN*.

(3) Currently working with the George Fox College Center for Peace Learning to make appropriate resource materials readily available to local churches. Selection of materials is underway.

(4) Support the suggestion that NWYM become affiliated with the Friends Committee on National Legislation.

Jack Willcuts introduced Bob McNeil, executive director of Oregon Council on Alcohol Problems. Mr. McNeil expressed appreciation for the work of Jack Willcuts as president of the OCAP board, and Mildred Minthorne as secretary. He spoke on the work of OCAP, especially as it pertains to the local church in providing (1) literature and other resources, (2) available speakers, (3) training seminars to help pastors and other workers deal with the problem of substance abuse, and (4) assist local churches in setting up support groups for recovering addicts. They are actively involved in the "Preparing for the Drug Free Years" program.

The report of the Board of Social Concerns was approved.

■ 24. The following recommendations from the Board of Ministerial Service were read:

Having concurred with the recommendation of the Board of Ministerial Service, it is with joy that the Council of Elders recommends Clyde Parker, Douglas Wedin, and Paul Neville be recorded as ministers of the Gospel in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

The recommendation for each of these was approved.

■ 25. The following is the written report from the Commission on Ethnic Ministries:

COMMISSION ON ETHNIC MINISTRIES

PREPARED BY HOWARD HARMON

Three major ministries in Northwest Yearly Meeting continue to reach out to people of different ethnic backgrounds.

(1) The Portland Korean Church called Pastor Sung Do Park (Eric Bach) as their senior minister. During the year there were many meetings with the Elders of the Korean Church as they worked through the pastoral search.

Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim was honored for his many years of ministry in the Korean Church. He has had six books published in the Korean language. These past months he has been extremely ill.

(2) The Piedmont Friends Church continues to minister in North Portland. Pastor Aaron Hamlin has been joined by Pastor Joshua Phillips on the church staff.

Friends for Kids summer program has 120 children participating. This youth ministry is a preventative program to help young people become involved in wholesome activities.

The Piedmont church continues to be involved in numerous programs in North Portland such as: Saturday School to provide help to students in their school work; One Church One Child, and Give Us This Day.

(3) The Hispanic population is growing in the Northwest. This past year Gerardo and Lolita Ibarra, pastors of the Newberg Friends Hispanic Church, were detained for five months while visiting Mexico as they could not receive permission to return to the United States. They are here now on a tourist visa while applying for a work permit status.

A vital ministry with Hispanic people continues to be carried out by Tony and Liz Jeffery in the Hillsboro area. They meet in the Hillsboro Friends Church.

Throughout the Northwest, Friends are encouraged to minister where the opportunities are available to all ethnic groups.

As part of the Ethnic Ministries report, Gerardo Ibarra, pastor of the Newberg Hispanic Church, reported on this ministry.

Pastor Eric Bach of the Portland Korean Church spoke briefly. He presented a plaque to Howard Harmon in appreciation for the 25 years of support Northwest Yearly Meeting has given to the church. Howard read a letter from Pastor Kim expressing regret that he was not physically able to be present. A collection of five books written by Pastor Kim has been given to Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Aaron Hamlin reported on Piedmont Friends Church and especially the Friends for Kids program. The summer theme is "Say NO to Drugs." Two sites are being used this summer because of the number of children involved. It is hoped there will be five sites next summer.

Aaron closed by expressing his personal concern: "Is Piedmont a nicety or a necessity to Northwest Yearly Meeting?"

The report was approved.

■ 26. Aaron Hamlin also reported briefly on the work of the National Black Evangelical Association. This report was approved.

■ 27. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Tom Stave of Eugene Friends Church.

Tuesday, July 25, 2:15 p.m.

■ 28. Geraldine Willcuts opened the afternoon session with prayer.

■ 29. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

■ 30. Jerry Baker expressed appreciation for a visit by Gerardo and Lolita Ibarra and a group from the Newberg Hispanic Church to Netarts Friends last year.

■ 31. Dr. Duane Beals, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, gave the following written report.

WESTERN EVANGELICAL SEMINARY

The Board of Trustees at their annual meeting on February 6-7, 1989, made some far-reaching decisions. They authorized the administration to proceed with the purchase of 34.4 acres of land (in southeast Portland) and 35 units of a condominium completed about four years ago. Eventually the condo units will be used for student housing. The property has a small creek running through it,

and an architect prepared a preliminary site development sketch, which utilized the natural land contours. The sketch was on hand for the Trustees to see.

The Board also authorized a Capital Fund Campaign for \$2,543,000 to be inaugurated this coming fall. The money will be used for site development, property purchase, enrichment of academic programs, and miscellaneous expenses connected with the campaign. William F. Brunk, Vice President of Seminary Advancement at WES, will coordinate the campaign.

In an administrative realignment, Mr. Ronald E. Waite was appointed to the new position of Vice President for Business Administration. Mr. Waite attended Cascade College and Pasadena College (now Point Loma Nazarene College) before beginning an extensive career in operations and management of financial institutions. He is a dedicated Christian layman who is active on several committees in his local church.

President J. Duane Beals reported that Dean William H. Vermillion has expressed a desire to return full time to the classroom. Dr. James A. Field has been appointed to the position of Academic Dean, effective July 1, 1989, the beginning of the new contract year. The Board also authorized the hiring of an additional professor in the area of Pastoral Ministries, and two new instructors in Biblical Studies and Pastoral Counseling.

It will be a couple of years before the initial buildings on a new campus are ready for occupancy, and during that time WES will continue its educational ministry at the present location. Classroom space is presently insufficient, and the Dean is negotiating with a nearby church and conference grounds for space to serve next year's students. One hundred seventy-four students registered for courses in the spring term.

The commitment has not changed. WES continues to send out graduates—armed with the Word and empowered by the Spirit—to serve Christ and His Church. We solicit your goodwill and positive spokespersonship for WES.

Brothers and sisters, pray for us.

The report was approved.

■ 32. Louise George, acting clerk, presented the written report for the Board of Missions.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION NORTHWEST

LOUISE GEORGE, ACTING CLERK

Friends of Northwest Yearly Meeting have the God-given privilege of participating in exciting missionary ministries that virtually circle the globe. We have the major responsibility for our fields in Bolivia and Peru. We share with all of Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM) in support and responsibility for mission ministries in Mexico City, Rwanda, the Philippines, the Bolivian University, and now in the Rough Rock, Arizona, work. In addition to these areas of direct involvement, our extended mission family includes the Mid-America work in Burundi and the fields in Taiwan, Hong Kong, and India served by Eastern Region Friends. With such a trust comes a stewardship for its faithful discharge.

EFM ADMINISTERED FIELDS:

James Morris, executive director for EFM, reports the appointment of Duane Comfort to the new position of executive assistant for EFM. Duane and his family will be moving to Denver to begin work September 1. James also reports progress on all EFM fields.

The work in the Philippines is reported to be growing. EFM would like to place a missionary couple in the Philippines to work alongside the pastors and the churches when workers and funds are available.

The administration of the Rough Rock Navajo Mission work came under the EFM office on April 1. The Friends Church Navajo Area has been established this year after careful development of a "Faith and Practice" in Navajo

and teaching about Friends Church polity by George and Dorothy Thomas, who served two short-term periods to make this step possible. Diana Hutson has submitted her resignation and there is critical need for new staff on that field.

The phenomenal growth of the Rwanda work continues to amaze us all and we thank God for His miraculous work in that country. We now have seven meetings, and opportunities for service are available faster than we are able to respond. Dedication for the Kagarama church building and center is set for September 3. We need to pray for additional personnel for this field as well. So far over \$92,000 has been received in the Easter offering, exceeding the goal once again.

James has requested prayer for the Mexico City staff as the Chavarrias returned home after short-term ministry in order to prepare for full-time service there, and Byrnes have come home for a short furlough during the summer, leaving the Foxes as the only staff on the field at this time.

NORTHWEST YEARLY MEETING FIELDS:

We are grateful for the faithful ministry of our Bolivia and Peru mission staff. Even though shorthanded with only two couples on each field following the resignation of the Andersons, our missionaries have served admirably. Our mission staff of five couples, including Cammacks on deputation, is the smallest staff we have had in about 20 years, and the Board feels that further staff cut backs would seriously hamper effective ministry and staff morale.

BOLIVIA:

Harold and Nancy Thomas, David and Kristin, with Wayne and Beverly Chapman, Amy, Nicholas, and Michael served in Bolivia. The major emphasis of the Thomas' efforts has been in the areas of urban church planting in La Paz, and completion of the series of discipleship books. Hal and Nancy's dedication and experience have been invaluable to our work. In addition to the urban work, Hal has assisted with the Santa Cruz/San Julian work and served as the Bolivian Evangelical University representative. As the Thomases leave the mission work in Bolivia and return to the Northwest, the Board wishes to express gratitude to them on behalf of the entire Yearly Meeting for their years of dedicated ministry in Bolivia. We trust that God will guide and bless them in the ministry to which He calls them.

The Chapmans moved to La Paz from Juli, Peru, for the last year of their term of service. Bev served as mission treasurer and did some teaching in the Patmos Bible School in addition to her responsibilities as mother and homemaker. Wayne has been in charge of legal work for the mission and leadership training. He had the supervision of mission TEE (Theological Education by Extension) ministries and textbook production. He served on the ICTEE committee (Interdenominational Committee of Theological Education by Extension) and worked with national leaders dealing with leadership EFM Northwest training and Bible education for the national church. At the request of the Mesa Directiva, Wayne has directed and worked to revitalize and upgrade the program and facilities of the Patmos Bible Institute during the last few months of his term.

Ed and Marie Cammack spent the year on furlough and church visitation throughout the Yearly Meeting. Reports from the churches indicate that their presentations were well received. While in the Northwest, Ed and Marie also attended classes on missions at Western Evangelical Seminary and indicated this was helpful to them.

We appreciate Ed and Marie's willingness to respond to the challenge of Bolivia Yearly Meeting and the Board of Missions to move from Peru to Caranavi, Bolivia, for this next term of service. They will be involved in training and encouraging the Friends churches in the Caranavi area for church planting in new areas of the Bolivian lowlands. Bolivia Yearly Meeting has challenged each monthly meeting to plant a new church in the year ahead, and Ed and Marie's new assignment is a part of the strategy to accomplish this goal.

In addition to the staff listed above, Friends from Northwest Yearly Meeting, Bruce and Jan Allen, Elsa, and Eben, have gone to Bolivia to serve with CALA in the production of Christian Aymara literature. Bruce and Jan are associate missionaries with Northwest Yearly Meeting but raise their support independently and have primary responsibility to the CALA Board. They started approximately six months of Spanish language study in Cochabamba, Bolivia, in January and have now settled in La Paz for their work with CALA.

Bolivia Yearly Meeting has shown growth in the number of churches for the last couple of years and now has 199 congregations. In La Paz alone, 11 new congregations have been established since 1984. This latter growth is partly due to the urban church-planting ministry encouraged by the Thomases and partly due to the aggressive leadership of the INELA President, Francisco Mamani.

PERU:

Ken and Tonya Comfort, Denny and Sue Anderson, with Aaron, Bryan, Kristin, and Kathryn, along with Dan, Tami, and Forrest John Cammack were assigned to the Peruvian field for the 88/89 year. Soon after their arrival in August, the Andersons felt they should return to the States. Although very appreciative of the ministry and reluctant to see them leave, the Board accepted the Andersons' resignation and they left Peru in November. The Cammacks and Comforts, though first-year missionaries, carried the full responsibility of the work for the balance of the year.

Ken and Tonya have lived in Juli, Peru, and had primary responsibility for the churches of the Sierra. Major emphasis has been placed on working with the Mesa Directiva (Executive Council) of the National Church encouraging them to exercise responsible leadership and become less dependent on the mission. They have also been involved in pastoral encouragement through discipleship seminars, assistance in reconstruction of flooded churches, transportation of the tent for meetings, as well as preaching and teaching in various seminars and conferences. Of the 25 churches that were destroyed by the Lake Titicaca flooding of 1986, eight have been rebuilt or are in the process. Special offerings given for the flood relief have helped make this possible.

Benito Apaza, Bolivian national missionary to Peru, has worked closely with Ken and has provided invaluable assistance to the National Church and been a great support and encouragement to the Comforts. Benito has been teaching IBLA (Instituto Biblico de Los Amigos), discipleship seminars, and been involved in the leadership of other weekend conferences and seminars.

Dan and Tami have had primary responsibility for ministry in the coastal cities of Arequipa, Ilo, and Tacna. Major emphasis has been placed on the implementation of the Mission Board's Arequipa Strategy. This has included the location of a facility in Arequipa for a Friends Center and Bible Institute, and the development and implementation of a curriculum known as IBEC (Instituto Biblico Educacion Cristiana), an advanced form of the IBLA program that will lay the foundation for the residential Bible Institute program once the center is purchased and in operation. Currently this work is carried forward through a series of intensive teaching seminars held in each of the coastal cities. Dan also provides encouragement for the local churches, works with the Coastal Mesa Directiva, and participates in other activities of the coastal work.

The work on the coast has also been greatly enhanced through the ministry of Bolivian national missionary Leonardo Tola. Leonardo is the director of the coastal IBLA program and has worked with Dan in the development and teaching of the IBEC classes as well. In addition, he has served as interim pastor for two of the Arequipa churches. We believe the support we provide to make it possible for Leonardo and Benito to assist with the work in Peru has proven to be a good investment in the work of the Kingdom.

The National Church in Peru is currently composed of 73 churches, of which 10 are located in the coastal zone, while the remainder are located in the zones of the Sierra. Four new congregations have been established on the Sierra

during the last year while one new group has been started in Arequipa and another in Tacna, in the coastal zone.

NEW STAFF:

The Board, feeling there is a need for experienced missionary personnel who could give guidance to our work and provide encouragement and counsel to younger missionaries, was very pleased when Roscoe and Tina Knight offered to return to the field for a short-term assignment. The Knights have over 40 years of missionary service in Bolivia, Peru, Mexico, and as Church Representatives for EFM. Roscoe and Tina will be stationed in La Paz, Bolivia, for the coming year but are assigned to an "at-large" ministry in both fields. Roscoe will serve as mission administrator and will spend major periods of time in all our areas of work.

In December and January, Board clerk, Earl Perisho and his wife, Janice, were sent to Bolivia and Peru for an administrative field visit. The Perishos spent a month in South America, consulting and counseling with staff and church leaders, visiting various parts of the work, and participating in the annual staff retreat and Representative Sessions of both the Peruvian National Church and Bolivian Yearly Meeting. The Perishos' ministry was well received by both the staff and the National brethren. They returned to the Northwest challenged by what God has done in the past through our mission work, and more convinced than ever of the important ministry we and the National Church have to carry out together in Bolivia and Peru in the years ahead.

As the Perishos sought to discern the Lord's direction for their ministry following a year of interim pastoral ministry at South Salem, they felt it should involve a return to full-time missions involvement, a concern that has been growing for the last few years. After prayerful consideration by the Perishos and the Board of Missions, Earl and Janice were placed under missionary appointment, effective July 1.

Earl and Janice are both from Friends families and early sensed God's call to missions. The Perishos served in northwest Alaska for 15 years as Friends missionaries among the Eskimos. More recently they have pastored for 12 years in Oregon, and Earl has completed his Masters of Arts in Missions degree. Janice is a teacher and has secretarial and accounting experience.

During the remainder of 1989, Earl will serve in the area of missions administration for the Board and assist local churches with their mission emphasis. Earl and Janice will also visit as many churches as possible in deputation. They are planning to begin a year of Spanish language study in Costa Rica next January, followed by service in Peru and Bolivia. It is anticipated that major areas of ministry will include leadership training and discipleship of National Church leaders, as well as missionary staff encouragement.

Louise read a letter from Bolivia Yearly Meeting expressing appreciation for Hal and Nancy Thomas.

David Byrne reported on the Evangelical Friends Mission in Mexico City with a series of slides.

Earl Perisho requested prayer for staff to replace Paul and Leona Thornburg in Rwanda, who will be completing their service this year.

Clerk Richard Beebe expressed appreciation for Earl and Janice Perisho and their vision for missions. The report was approved.

- 33. The following printed report for the Board of Education was presented.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

FRANK ENGLE, JR., CLERK

The Department of Church Education has been involved in providing services to equip Christian education programs in the local church. This has been done in a variety of ways:

Focus on Sunday Schools

Because of the slow decline in our Sunday school as a Yearly Meeting, a subcommittee was formed to address ways of turning the trend. The subcommittee studied various reasons for the decline and focused on ways that other denominations have addressed the same problem. Several plans were developed.

Prayer for the Spiritual Climate of our Churches

For most of our churches, Sunday school provides the main source of "equipping the saints." We have been encouraging our Board to faithfully pray that the Lord would increase people's desire for knowledge of the Word of God and that it be applied within their congregation and community.

Accurate Reporting

Plans were made to encourage 100 percent response for our Department report from each church. With not all churches reporting, it has been difficult to clearly know how accurate our Sunday school statistics are. Our Department's report was redesigned to include attendance and information of other programs that are Christian education ministries of the local church.

Christian Education Clerk Breakfast Meetings

Forty-nine Christian education clerks (and other C.E. leaders) from 23 churches met this spring to review Christian Education Committee responsibilities in the local church. Several resources were distributed and focus was given to development and maintenance of strong Sunday school programming. The meetings were held at Nampa, East Hill, Medford, and Tigard. An additional meeting is tentatively scheduled for Inland Area this fall.

"Keeping in Touch . . ." is a short questionnaire that will be sent to C.E. clerks twice a year to review their involvement and progress in C.E. ministries within their church. The questionnaire provides the clerks an opportunity to ask for specific information.

Available Resources

A new video on Sunday school growth by Elmer Towns has been placed in NWYM's video library. Evangelical Friends Alliance's C.E. packets and Pastor's packets have been reordered and distributed to every church. ICL Sunday School Standards notebooks will be completely distributed by Yearly Meeting. The notebooks are enabling churches to develop and maintain a strong Sunday school program.

Yearly Meeting Christian Education Luncheon and Workshops

Robert Crandall, pastor of the Salem First Free Methodist Church, will speak on "Foundations for a Strong Sunday School" at our annual C.E. luncheon. In addition, a C.E. workshop "track" has been developed with the focus: "Keys to Effective C.E. in Your Church." Workshops include "Recruiting, Training, and Encouraging of Teachers and Leaders," "Developing Your Skills as a Teacher or Leader," and "The Pastor's Role."

Youth

Our Department continues to support the growing youth program in the Yearly Meeting. Although the Youth Superintendent position is now under the Executive Council, we continue to support and assist with the youth ministries of NWYM. The Department appreciates the diligent work of Bruce Bishop, YM Youth Superintendent, and the Friends Youth Exec.

Evangelical Friends Alliance (EFA)

Forty-three churches contributed a total of \$15,952 for the EFA Easter offering. Our Department has also worked closely with Dorothy Barratt with the curriculum change from Aldersgate Graded Curriculum to Word Action. The EFA Christian Education Commission has endorsed this new material and has age-related specialists on their curriculum boards. We anticipate a smooth transition for churches during this curriculum change. We have appreciated Dorothy Barratt's mailings and consultation services to our Yearly Meeting.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES

AARON O'NEILL, CLERK

The Department of Christian Testimonies continues to work on developing resources for churches. Currently tracts about business as worship and our Quaker heritage are in progress. Also a Sunday school guide on Quaker social concern is nearing completion. In addition, books and periodicals are being contributed to Western Evangelical Seminary Library. A complete bibliography of the books is almost finished.

The Department published two pamphlets this year. The tract *What Friends Believe*—a summary of the *Faith and Practice* sections on history, Friends beliefs, and the queries—was published in the spring. The tract "The Quaker Testimony of Integrity" is a reprint of an article that first appeared in *Quaker Life*.

Other work of the Department includes the completion of a publishing and distribution contract with Barclay Press, the sending of letters to pastors and clerks of education, and the donation of many books to the WES Library.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

RAWLEN SMITH, CLERK

The Department of General Education is commissioned to encourage all types of educational programs that occur in the Yearly Meeting outside the church education program.

The NWYM/Church/College matching scholarship program at George Fox College has been expanded so that now a church may put up as much as \$300 to be matched by \$300 from the Yearly Meeting and \$300 from the college in scholarship money for Friends students. Most of the \$16,000 given to the college during the past year has gone to pay the Yearly Meeting portion of these scholarships. In addition, the college offers a \$1,000 scholarship to any Friends student who meets minimum GPA requirements. These two items have precipitated increases in the number of Friends students on our college campus.

The Educators Directory is being continually updated as reports are received from the local churches.

The Department of General Education also oversees the Ministerial Educational Scholarship program of the Yearly Meeting. The primary purpose of this program is to prepare future pastors for NWYM churches and mission fields. Students completing five years of service to NWYM will have the amount of their scholarship "written off." Those who do not complete their service, either by moving to other yearly meetings or into other forms of ministry, are expected to repay the amount of their aid, which then becomes available to other students as scholarships.

During this past year, we assisted seven students in seminary at Western Evangelical Seminary and Azusa Friends Center. One of these will be assuming a pastorate in the Yearly Meeting this year and two others are currently serving Yearly Meeting churches.

The members of the Board presented a skit using a mock court scene with Board clerk Dick Edmundson as judge. They illustrated by six different "cases" the various aspects of the work of their board. The report was approved.

■ 39. The Board of Stewardship gave the following written report:

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

HAROLD ANKENY, CLERK

Personnel changes this past year marked the ministry of the Board of Stewardship. Beatrice Goldsmith, treasurer and business administrator for 15 years, resigned in August, 1988, because of illness. She provided the orderly transition from a manual bookkeeping system to the automated system the office now enjoys. The Board of Stewardship continues to seek her counsel occasionally. She ministered faithfully and effectively.

Hubert Mardock, with a degree in business administration, is now serving as director of financial services for the Yearly Meeting. He comes to the position with experience in business and is familiar with computer data systems.

At the time this report was prepared, 50 percent of the churches had reported on stewardship education. Sixteen of the 29 churches reporting indicated giving had increased over the previous year. These churches also reported strong evidence that the concept of stewardship was emphasized more often and more effectively. Special projects, such as debt retirement, cleanup and maintenance of the physical plants, and special programs motivated people to respond with gifts. There appears to be a direct correlation between the emphasis on the practice of sound scriptural stewardship and increased giving.

Less than 10 percent of the churches reported any use of the special materials the Board of Stewardship has made available to enhance stewardship education in the local church.

All but two churches operate with a church budget, but all the churches reported that accurate records are maintained.

The Board promoted the 1989 Great Commission Program budget during October 1988. Information and consultants were provided for each church, outlining the exciting ministry supported by the Great Commission Program. There were two significant changes in the 1989 budget. The Youth Superintendent was promoted to a full-time position. Bruce Bishop had superbly served as a part-time superintendent one year. The support from the Yearly Meeting for this change was unanimous.

Another change that occurred was in the worker's compensation program for the Oregon churches and the Yearly Meeting office. Liberty Northwest Insurance Company, the insurance underwriter since 1976, canceled the policy on June 30, 1988. Because of two deaths and several other significant injury claims, the Yearly Meeting was assessed payments of \$135,000. One loan at 9 percent and another for 10 percent were secured. Both loans, totaling \$109,000, are amortized over ten years and will be repaid through the Great Commission Program budget. The balance of \$26,000 was secured through a no-interest loan to care for the total assessment. There will be no further assessments from the company. The financial needs of the families of the two deceased men are being cared for significantly by current and future payments from Liberty Northwest.

Obviously, the ministry of the Great Commission Program will continue to be affected by the loan payments. Through the motivation of our general superintendent and approval of the Executive Council, a financial appeal was sent to the churches and to more than 900 households in May 1989. As a result

of this appeal, gifts and pledges total nearly \$25,337. The balance owed on the \$135,000 assessment as of July 15 is \$116,256.94. Gifts for this need continue to be accepted.

The 1989 Great Commission Program budget approved by the Yearly Meeting in July 1988 was adjusted by the Executive Council in February 1989. The following tables reflect the original budget and changes:

The Budget Review Committee met in January and made adjustments to expected income as a result of "less-than-expected" church-pledge support. Reductions in expenditures were also made to bring the budget into balance. Approved by the Executive Council was a 1989 budget of \$630,000. Income was set at \$550,000 from churches and \$80,000 from individuals.

The Board of Stewardship is dedicated to do all it can to promote the ministry of the Great Commission Program. Materials are available to encourage stewardship education at the local church level. The Board has produced a new loose-leaf manual for local stewardship committees. These manuals are available during the Yearly Meeting sessions. The success of the Board in stewardship education and promotion of the ministry of the Great Commission Program is dependent on the effectiveness of the local church stewardship committees and pastoral leadership. As we work together, the great ministry God has called us to fulfill will not suffer because of a lack of resources.

Harold Ankeny highlighted some areas of the report in his presentation. As treasurer, pro tem, he presented the 1988 treasurer's report and a report for the first six months of 1989. These reports appear in the Appendix. The report was approved.

The presiding clerk expressed appreciation for the work of the Board of Stewardship.

The proposed Great Commission Program budget for 1990 was presented:

1990 PROPOSED GREAT COMMISSION PROGRAM

God has called Northwest Yearly Meeting to a variety of outstanding ministries. There is no disagreement on that statement. We accept His assignment with the knowledge that He will continue to bless this ministry if we are faithful.

The Executive Council presents a proposed budget to finance the Great Commission Program for 1990. We have united around the goal of reducing the program budget to \$542,000 as recommended by the Board of Stewardship. An additional \$62,000 is included in the proposed budget to pay for the worker's compensation loans, an expected income shortfall of \$24,000, and \$2,000 for an audit reserve fund. The total of \$604,000 is \$148,000 below board/commission/council requests.

Income the past few years has been leveling off to an average of \$572,000 and a median of \$583,000. Churches have been pledging about \$545,000 and paying slightly more. Individual and organizational income has been down the past few years. We believe the income goal of \$604,000 in 1990 can be achieved by providing a more frequent update (perhaps monthly) on the status of the program. Each representative and board member and other members present at the session today are urged to share this information with their local church. In addition, each church should carefully monitor its 1989 church pledge payment schedule.

All who receive this report today must do more than communicate its contents. We must also take responsibility for preparing a plan of action in our local church if we are to be successful.

May God grant to us His Spirit as we consider this proposal.

COUNCIL OF ELDERS

STANLEY PERISHO, CLERK

The Council of Elders met in a fall retreat and at midyear time to consider the concerns of the Yearly Meeting. Each meeting has been preceded by an extended time of prayer for the churches and for the Yearly Meeting.

A major project for the past year has been the establishment of a Restoration Policy and Procedure for assisting churches and pastors in cases of moral failure. We have assisted our superintendent both in the writing of a policy and planning a follow-up procedure. Two Restoration Teams have been named to work with specific individuals toward returning to active pastoral ministry. They are composed of three individuals selected by the superintendent and the clerk of the Council of Elders. They have met regularly with the persons under their care and report to the Council.

We have also been working with the superintendent as requested in his key-note message last year to establish Encouragement Teams to assist him in working with churches who are in difficulty. As requested, "the team will be available to counsel pastors or churches where needed. . . the Encouragement Team would work in conjunction with the general superintendent and be responsible to him." A team has been selected for each area of the Yearly Meeting and will be activated as deemed advisable by the superintendent.

Feedback from the Elders Workshop at Yearly Meeting last year indicated there was interest in a more detailed workshop being held at the area level. These have been planned for this fall and will be a great help for every local elder. The schedule is as follows:

Saturday, October 7, 1989, at Tigard Friends Church for the Newberg, Portland, Puget Sound, Salem, Southern Oregon, and Southwest Washington

areas; Saturday, October 21, 1989, at Caldwell Friends Church for the Boise Valley and Greenleaf areas; Saturday, October 28, 1989, at Spokane Friends Church for the Inland Area.

Concern was expressed regarding the "pastoral burnout" in the Yearly Meeting, and we want to encourage local Elders to work with pastors to reduce this. Following are some ways we felt local meetings could help in this area:

- (1) Establish a consistent prayer support structure.
- (2) Establish a system for pastoral support and accountability.
- (3) Promote a "sense of team" between the pastor and congregation. Avoid a "we-they" mentality.
- (4) Set reasonable, mutually agreed, limits on the congregation's expectations of the pastor, and the pastor's expectations of the congregation and the Elders.

- (5) Assist the pastor in delegating responsibilities.

- (6) Give careful and consistent attention to the pastor's economic needs.

We have encouraged Arthur Roberts in the establishment of a Fellowship of Nonresident Friends. This has primarily taken shape as a newsletter with a mailing list of over 400 persons. Most of these are Friends now living in an area where there is not easy access to a Friends fellowship. If you know of persons who might benefit from this contact, please forward the name and address to Arthur.

We considered a request from Metolius Friends Community Church regarding membership criteria and met with four members of that church and also considered numerous other items referred to us by the Yearly Meeting.

The report was approved.

It was announced that Stan and Shirlene Perisho will be moving to Aurora, Colorado, next week. Roy Clark led in prayer for the Perishos.

- 41. Donald Stump, Greenleaf Academy superintendent, reported on the progress of the Academy. The theme for the new year is "I press toward the goal . . ." from Philippians 3:14. He expressed appreciation to God for the board, faculty, increased enrollment, and improved financial standing.

- 42. Gerald Dillon, pastor of Rose Valley, closed the session with prayer.

Wednesday, July 26, 2:15 p.m.

- 43. Lela Morrill opened the afternoon session with prayer.

- 44. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

- 45. Virginia Helm, president of Friends Women Missionary Fellowship, presented her report. She was assisted in a visual presentation by other FWMF officers. The oral report was read in rhyming form. The following written report was submitted and approved.

FRIENDS WOMEN MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP

VIRGINIA HELM, PRESIDENT

It is absolutely amazing to read the reports from 40 fellowships throughout Northwest Yearly Meeting and to see what has been accomplished through giving and sharing. One cannot begin to appreciate the good that has come from the corporate and individual prayers and service projects for foreign, home, and community outreach. This work represents 483 active members, only one-ninth of the active membership among the women of the churches of the Yearly Meeting. We were fortunate to have willing attenders through the community, some from other denominations. That is what the word "fellowship" is all about. Can you imagine the good that could be accomplished if we had fellowships in all

our churches, extensions, and mission points? We do understand that many would come if they could. It is a sign of the times we would like to overcome.

Interesting programs were presented on the theme "Expanding Horizons for Friends" by excellent speakers and the carefully written programs from the program book. There were 114 speakers and 24 of the groups reported using the program books for devotions and missionary information regularly or most of the time. Lessons were interestingly written about our fields in Bolivia and Peru, the Evangelical Friends Mission fields, and the other ministries where Friends are representing us.

The theme "Expanding Horizons" was also used for the eight area rallies in the spring where an offering was taken to send our college-age missionary, David Thomas, to a special seminar to help him adjust to life in North America. We were very happy with the response. Arrangements are made.

The same theme was used for the Yearly Meeting banquet, which was a cooperative effort of women from all the areas, and the offering will be used for supplemental help for the National missionaries from Bolivia serving in Peru in times of extreme inflation. Special guests with us this week are Juana Mamani from Bolivia and Joyce Byrne from Mexico City. We will also honor Janice Perisho, who is beginning to prepare for missionary outreach in South America. Our speakers are Nancy Thomas and Beverly Chapman, just returned from Bolivia.

Over \$8,000 was sent by the fellowships as "dues offering," most of which was used for paying off the remainder of the cost of the Piedmont van, toward support for the Wayne Chapman family in Bolivia, and for the Kevin Gilbert family at the Deschutes Friends Church in Bend, Oregon. This, however, represents less than one-third of the total given by the combined fellowships for foreign and home projects. Other funds were sent for missionary salaries, outfitting, rent, vacations, retreat, books, magazine subscriptions, education of missionary children, birthday gifts, calendars, and food and baby showers. National missionaries were encouraged with help for pastors' medical care and supplemental help needed due to inflation. Enthusiasm for the new work in Rwanda brought in good offerings; there was some also for Arequipa, and to encourage our youth in their travels for the service of young churches at home or abroad. Friends serving in other fields were supported through their organizations.

At home, contributions were made for church and parsonage improvement and equipment, not counting hours of labor spent in cleaning, serving, and calling on those who can no longer come to meeting. Gifts were sent to nursing homes, homes for the homeless, crisis pregnancy centers, to Piedmont, and for migrant and refugee families. Besides practical help, financial help was given. Quilts were made for missionaries, for needy families, and for the Greenleaf Academy sale. Financial help was also given the Academy, and to Twin Rocks for the renovation of Hadley Hall. Native American fields were encouraged in Southwest Indian School, Rough Rock, and two other fields where Friends are ministering. Some fellowships contributed to the chaplaincy programs of police or sheriff departments.

The most popular methods for fundraising were quilt making and receptions for weddings and anniversaries. No doubt, more were served as a loving gift. Silent auctions, bazaars, and other kinds of sales were popular. Some sold cookbooks, anniversary cups, pizza, baked goods, books, dolls, and crocheted doilies and handkerchief edgings. Recycling and refunding were used by some groups while others feel that an offering at each meeting is easy and effective. Some fellowships prepare meals for various groups. Mystery dinners serve for fundraising as well as fellowship in the meeting. Traveling Friendship Baskets were used.

The women also planned times of fellowship through Mother-Daughter affairs, Christmas and Thanksgiving dinners, cookie exchanges, potlucks with guests or families, baby and wedding showers. Sometimes they reward them-

selves with a dinner out. Of course, the women are right there to prepare funeral meals. One group sponsored a music evening with singing and sharing. Another group went on a trip together to see wildflowers.

Meetings were enhanced by the excellent program book material, by special speakers already mentioned, skits, book reports, and tapes. Cooking demonstrations and a style show were mentioned.

Our vision is to meet the needs of women of all ages in our churches and communities, while giving support and encouragement to the concerns of our Yearly Meeting at home and abroad.

■ 46. Dale Rogers, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 47. A traveling minute for Thomas and Nancy Taylor of Friends World Committee for Consultation, London office, was read by the clerk. Tom brought personal greetings.

■ 48. Ruth Ann Tippin, clerk of the Fine Arts Commission, expressed appreciation for the musicians, and to Jannelle Loewen who coordinated the International Art Show this year during Yearly Meeting. Ruth also read the list of awards that have been given.

■ 49. Bruce Bishop, Youth Superintendent, introduced the officers of the Junior High Yearly Meeting and the Senior High Yearly Meeting. Amy Mitchell, presiding clerk for 1989, introduced the officers for 1990 for the Junior High group: Abbie Cohen, presiding clerk; Daniel Livingston, assistant clerk; Chanda Walker, recording clerk; and Rachelle Rogers, conference coordinator. Chanda Walker read the epistle they had prepared:

Dear Friends everywhere,

This week at the 1989 sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting has been an exciting and wondrous event. We've met many new friends and delight in seeing lots of old friends again too.

The week kicked off with a rousing barbecue, followed by a talent show put on by some of the youth. Other special activities included a mission rally, pre-service gatherings every evening, making s'mores, and swimming in the Willamette River. We've all learned a lot through the service projects, in which we visited with the elderly and collected food for the poor of the community.

We were also privileged to have the Quaker Youth Pilgrimage people here for a few days. There were youth from England, New Zealand, Ireland, Mexico, and other places around the world. We were glad we could meet them and talk to them at an ice cream social Sunday evening.

We attended the evening services every night and liked the inspiring speaker Francisco Mamani from Bolivia. Each morning after breakfast (and cartoons) we met in "family groups" to read the Bible, pray, and discuss the verses we read.

We also went to the beach overnight to close this wonderful week. Many of us have grown closer to Christ this week.

NWYM junior high youth are still raising money for her, but we still need your help and prayers. Tween Camp campers raised \$210 for Martha a couple of weeks ago. This was enough to feed and clothe her for a year. We are working toward paying for next year and maybe buying her a few presents for Christmas. We are also encouraging youth groups to write letters to her, to let her know we care. Thank you for your cooperation.

JUNIOR HIGH SOCIAL CONCERNS COMMITTEE

The Junior High Youth Social Concerns Committee met and read the minutes from last year's meeting. The minutes were approved. We also read Erik Edmundson's letter to our committee with suggestions for projects. Discussion followed. We really want to encourage the youth groups to participate in PLOT month (Providing for the Least of These) which is February. We decided to make a poster to give out to the churches and a letter to explain it all. The second day we gathered our ideas on paper and talked about the layout for our poster. The third day we took our ideas from paper and put them together to form our poster.

JUNIOR HIGH FAMILY LIFE COMMISSION

This year the Junior High Family Life Commission constructed a survey of Junior High age youth concerning parent-teen relationships. Overall it was a very successful survey. The teens answered very intelligently and maturely on personal issues. Some of the responses were:

On discipline: "Some of my friends' parents don't care about them. My parents care about me so they discipline me. Sometimes I wish my parents wouldn't discipline me but I know that in the future I'll be glad." (age 13)

On communication: "Good communication is when kids aren't afraid to talk to their parents about things, when parents are willing to listen at all times and vice-versa." (age 14)

Other topics on the survey included sharing feelings, curfews, dating, and other difficult topics to discuss. One major concern we had was how the church can and should help when a child is in an abusive situation. One response was, "We need to get help for the parents (counseling) and love the child and pray for them. Definitely get help and support from the church in the situation." (age 13)

We feel this survey will be helpful in making recommendations for family living.

HIGH SCHOOL MINUTES, YOUTH YEARLY MEETING

Deborah Harney, presiding clerk, called the meeting to order and opened in prayer asking for direction and unity. The epistle being sent to other yearly meetings was read and approved. Epistles from other yearly meetings were read by assistant clerk, Greg Woolsey.

Qualifications for next year's officers were reviewed and questions and nominations were discussed.

Youthquake 1992 was discussed and the issue of whether or not a Mid-winter in NWYM was desired in addition to the Youthquake program. Discussed travel funds and the option of area retreats instead.

Ryan Kendall, the 1989 representative from Mid-America Yearly Meeting was introduced. Discussion followed on Northwest Yearly Meeting's representative for the summer of 1990. Craig Austin, Hayden Lake Friends, will be visiting Eastern Region Yearly Meeting next week.

Tad Kershner of Pacific Yearly Meeting was introduced.

The possibility of a music/drama trip was brought up by Carleta Baker, Friends Youth Exec. member. Interest was expressed by several. Discussion followed.

Bruce Bishop's travel fund concern was raised and small groups were formed for brainstorming ideas for fundraisers, offerings, church matching, etc.

A letter was read from fellow NWYM high school Friends (Jeff Bell, Heidi Schneider, and Mary Kyle of Hayden Lake Friends) ministering in Philadelphia.

Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL) was defined, introduced, and a letter was read from the organization. The FCNL study committee report was read, pros and cons of affiliation were discussed. Small group discussions were held. General feelings included expense of support; what issues should be dominant; interaction with unprogrammed Quakers; support of direct contact with the government; concern over disagreements within the Yearly Meeting; concern of deciding on a true representative of all ideas; FCNL generally approved.

Sara Stansell shared the proposed visit of seven Bolivian students. Concern was expressed over the financial situation. Positive aspects of such a visit were shared. It was suggested a future meeting continue discussion on this.

Appreciation was expressed for the hard work of this year's officers: Debby Harney, Greg Woolsey, Anne-Marie Bowman, and Janey Townley.

These reports were approved.

■ 51. J. D. Baker, Executive Director, presented the Friends Fund report for July 1, 1988, to June 30, 1989. It was approved.

FRIENDS FUND

I have made presentations at six of our Friends churches this year. An approximate total of 195 people were in attendance. I have had 136 appointments with families or individuals for the purpose of estate planning.

We have sent 1,651 individual mailings from our office. Some of these contained estate planning brochures and others were general correspondence in follow-up work for those with whom we work.

This year we have received 28 signed wills and 11 signed trusts. Through these signed documents, we have accounted for an anticipated future gift income of \$469,430 and an irrevocable future gift income of \$143,470, for a total of \$612,900 in future gift arrangements.

We have had some revocable gifts withdrawn. The revoked documents that have been accounted for amount to \$25,000. This would leave a net gain of \$587,900 in planned gifts accumulated through our work this year.

At present, the total of our anticipated gift income for all ministries is \$6,065,953. Of this total, \$1,705,836 is through irrevocable agreements with \$4,360,116 anticipated through revocable agreements.

Our office dispersed \$80,165 to ministries. These amounts were from gifts having been previously planned by persons who recently passed away. Some of these gifts were distributed to the local church. It can help your church in the future if your people remember your church in their estate plan.

Some churches in our Yearly Meeting who have been receptive to periodic estate planning sessions have a fair amount of gifts planned for the benefit of their church. Our total amount planned for future distribution to churches is \$470,351.

Friends Fund performs a variety of services. Our most active service is assisting people with estate planning. We also manage a number of personal estates for people through a variety of trust agreements. These agreements most generally pay income to persons for their lifetime, and at their death Friends Fund distributes the estate as planned. At present, we do manage \$2,672,464 worth of property and other assets for individuals.

On special occasions we help some of the elderly people manage their daily financial affairs and help them in making decisions concerning their needs. We only offer this service if there are no children or close relatives to assist with such details.

Our most recent service, which will be available to everyone, is the Friends Ministries Revocable Insured Savings Trust. Our Friends Fund Board approved this new endeavor at our board meeting Saturday, July 22, 1989.

This Revocable Insured Savings Trust allows your deposit to become a subaccount of a larger deposit made by Friends Fund with a bank. Through this arrangement the sub-account receives a higher rate of interest than personal Certificates of Deposit or savings accounts. You will be allowed to make your choice as to the Friends ministry that may benefit from your Revocable Trust. More information will be available through our Friends Fund office.

Our continued goal is to serve everyone in the best possible way. Please feel at liberty to make use of our services.

I close with this thought: have you remembered the Lord's work in your estate plan?

COMMISSION ON MEDIA

MARGARET LEMMONS, CLERK

As part of its ministry to use the many varieties of media to share God's Word and work, to provide an outlet for personal vision and to develop efficient communication, the Yearly Meeting Commission on Media this week is offering workshops on writing and the use of the computer in the church.

Another popular offering of the Commission is the Writers' Dinner now in its third year as part of Yearly Meeting. These times have given ideas and

encouragement to many people who actively publish their writings or who only secretly hope to do so. One area writer's group has been started and plans are underway for at least one more to be organized this fall. Churches or areas interested in such a program are encouraged to contact any member of the Commission for further information on "how to."

The Commission encourages the ever-increasing use of prepared video cassettes and the creation of new material with individual or church-owned video cameras.

Barclay Press is the publishing arm of the Commission and of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Under the skilled leadership of Manager Dan McCracken, the Press experienced an 8 percent increase in total revenue during 1988 compared to the previous year. Special thanks goes to the dedicated staff as they serve the printing needs of the church. The Barclay Press Board of Directors, chaired by LeRoy Benham, has met regularly providing oversight of the Press's operations. A recent all-day meeting focused on long-range planning with anticipated growth in printing services and book publishing. A dinner in the fall is being planned to celebrate Barclay Press's 30th anniversary as a Yearly Meeting-owned enterprise. (See report below for additional information about Barclay Press.)

Also under the aegis of the Commission on Media are the Yearly Meeting archives. Yearly Meeting Archivist Frank Cole shares the following perspective on his work: "One of the blessings of being archivist is the privilege of getting to 'know' persons of our Yearly Meeting and college history. Reading correspondence, records, plans and visions, has made real the quote, 'Today's experiences are tomorrow's history.' " The much-improved facility in the Murdock Learning Resource Center on the college campus makes the archives more accessible and provides adequate space.

As part of our joint efforts with other yearly meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, we help in the important ministry of the *Evangelical Friend*. Magazine Editor Lon Fendall reports that the major challenge for the EFA Publications Commission during the past year has been to maintain the high quality of the magazine in spite of a substantial cut in the EFA budget. The Commission decided to temporarily reduce the magazine from ten to nine issues per year, while continuing its present size and quality. Members of the Commission hope that funding can be restored before too long to permit the resumption of the regular schedule.

The editors of *Evangelical Friend* and *Quaker Life* (published by Friends United Meeting) have been exchanging articles that might be suitable for use in both magazines. The July/August issue was a joint issue, with the feature articles jointly planned and the same major articles appearing in both magazines.

The continued funding from Northwest Yearly Meeting that makes it possible to send the magazine to all our members and attendees is very important to the continued quality and financial viability of the magazine.

REPORT OF THE BARCLAY PRESS

DAN MCCrackEN, GENERAL MANAGER

This year Barclay Press is celebrating its 30th anniversary. Excerpts from the report of Publication Board President Arthur Roberts in the Yearly Meeting Minutes 30 years ago read as follows:

During the first ten months our work was directed by our editor, Jack Willcuts, and Ralph Chapman working in conjunction and apprenticeship with Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher. During this time—as during the preceding decade—the Board operated its printing through the facilities of the press owned by Carter and Fletcher. On May 1, two months ahead of schedule, the Board assumed ownership and management of the physical plant. This action was hastened by the last illness of Ray Carter and was approved by the Executive Council. Oregon Yearly Meeting now operates a publishing house, The Barclay

Press, honoring the early Quaker theologian, Robert Barclay. Ralph Chapman is full-time manager of the press; Jack Willcuts, on half-time, continues to edit the *Northwest Friend* and to give editorial supervision to Board publications. Beth Hockett works full-time on composition, Ralph Fletcher continues on as pressman, as needed, Stanley Putman and Jane Laughlin have graciously donated their artistic talents on many occasions, and Donald Millage, Portland accountant, has freely assisted in setting up and maintaining the books of account. Occasional typists have been Alice Dillon and Darlene Stands . . .

Response to our appeals for funds to purchase the printing plant and other equipment has been gratifying. Of a total need of \$7,100, some \$4,850 has come in since June 1. We would like to have the whole amount subscribed before September 1, rather than to secure the remaining \$2,250 by loan. Through the generosity of Dr. and Mrs. J. C. Brougher, Vancouver, Washington, approximately \$4,100 was given toward this project (including the purchase of a Spanish-keyed electric typewriter). This gift reflects the interest of the donors in providing literature for the Aymara . . .

We wish to give tribute to Ray L. Carter, whose ministry on earth ended June 7, 1959; for it was he who sustained the publishing vision for us until more of us came to see it. Although Ray served largely in other forms of ministry—pastor and educator in California and Oregon—he never got the printer's ink off his hands nor its ministry out of his heart . . . In tribute to Ray Carter, Earl Barker has written, "As our editor and publisher he worked devotedly for our interests, both spiritual and material. It was he who had the vision of possibilities in publication, and who risked his own temporal interests to realize his great ideal on our behalf. We shall better comprehend as time goes on how much he has meant to us and how great a loss we have sustained."

The original assets have increased 20 times during the past 30 years, and the extent of the Press's ministry has multiplied through its service to the Yearly Meeting, George Fox College, Evangelical Friends Alliance, George Fox Press, and through books and other publications like *Fruit of the Vine*.

Barclay Press experienced an 8 percent increase in total revenue during 1988 compared to the previous year. Sales of books showed a 10 percent increase. Approximate number of copies sold of books published in recent history are as follows: *On the Cutting Edge*, 1,000; *NWYM Faith and Practice*, 800; *The Rich Heritage of Quakerism*, 700; and the set of Quaker stories (*Eight of a Kind* and *More Than Empty Dreams*), 450. The growth both in book sales and in printing services has been encouraging.

The major factor in the effective ministry of Barclay Press is the dedicated staff. Full-time employees are Dick Eichenberger, Dennis Headrick, Lance Calkins, Chris Eichorn, Eva Headrick, Alice Maurer, and Les Peterson. Alice and Chris are new to the staff this year. Alice came as bookkeeper/receptionist last September. Chris came in May to assist Jean Clark in typesetting as Jean has moved to part-time. Ruth Brown and Shirlene Perisho are two people who have given significant assistance through part-time work and will be greatly missed as they move from the Newberg area.

"Christians in the Crossfire" is the title of the next book scheduled for publication by Barclay Press. Written by George Fox College professors Mark McMinn and Jim Foster, this book has potential for an expanded market. This presents a marketing challenge for Barclay Press to extend its ministry to a wider Christian reading audience.

The Northwest Yearly Meeting Publishing Fund exists to help capitalize publishing projects. Gifts from concerned Friends help make it possible to take advantage of the opportunities we have to minister through the printed page. Currently this revolving fund for book publishing has a balance on hand of \$3,200. More is needed in order to reach our potential in book publishing.

Ray Carter's vision for ministry through the printed page continues. What he initiated in the late 1940s and 1950s continues to bear fruit. Please remember

to pray for us and the continually growing publishing ministry of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Margaret Lemmons introduced Dan McCracken, manager of Barclay Press. Dan introduced Beth Bagley and Jack Willcuts, who reminisced about the early days of the Press in Portland when they were first involved. Dan also introduced three former managers of Barclay Press, after its move to Newberg: Ralph Chapman, Harlow Ankeny, and Dick Eichenberger, expressing appreciation to each for their contribution to the ongoing work of Barclay Press. Each was presented with a plaque. Retha McCutchen, a member of the Barclay Press Board, closed the report with prayer. The report was approved.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

GILBERT GEORGE, CLERK

Jesus said, "You are My friends, if you do what I command," and the Lord has given us His commandment to ". . . go and make disciples of all the nations"; to "preach the Gospel to every creature," to be salt and light in the world; to turn them from darkness to light; to be fishers of men.

We are committed to the mission of God to save the lost.

"God is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." He has invited us to be collaborators with Him in this work. We believe that the Good News of the Lord Jesus Christ as held by Friends is needful today and that Friends must proclaim Truth boldly and without apology. We urge each local church to make this a matter of highest priority for this coming year. We encourage the use of a variety of methods and programs available to us in our efforts "to be all things to all people that we might win some."

We are committed to prayer.

The winning of the lost can only be accomplished by prayer. We praise God for those who have dedicated themselves to pray for the salvation of the lost, the success of our church-planting efforts, and for the workers needed for the harvest. We are especially concerned with the several churches still without pastoral leadership for the year ahead and for the decline in numbers of young people in training for pastoral ministry. We urge Friends to "pray the Lord of the Harvest to send out workers into His harvest field."

We are committed to planting new churches and to helping revive declining churches.

We bless God for the growth given to Mountain View Friends Church in Vancouver, Washington, under the guidance of Steve and Donna Wood and their associates Jeff and Deana VandenHoek. They worked hard on their phone campaign. Celebration Sunday was November 6, 1988. At the time of this report they are averaging 68 in attendance.

We praise God for the successful birth of East Hill Friends Church in Kent, Washington, on December 11, 1988, under the leadership of Richard and Judie Hayes. This energetic congregation is now averaging 110 in worship attendance.

We give thanks to God for the revitalization of the Maplewood church, now known as West Hills Friends Church. Michael and Erica Huber are serving as pastors of this church, which had its celebration Sunday on March 5, 1989, and is now averaging 52 in attendance.

Each of these three churches is receiving support from Board of Evangelism funds on a three-year declining scale. Each of them is already sending support to the Yearly Meeting Great Commission Program budget.

Eugene and Norma McDonald have responded to God's call to plant a church this fall in Springfield, Oregon, with Eugene Friends serving as the sponsoring church. We ask for your prayers for this new venture. The phone campaign begins September 5, with Celebration Sunday November 5.

No other new plants or revitalization efforts will be undertaken this church year due to limited funds.

During the past year, two of our extension churches made the very difficult decision to discontinue services. Hilltop and East Boise had both experienced declining attendance in recent years, but more than anything else they both were being crushed by the weight of heavy mortgages that neither had been able to grow to sufficient size to support. We praise God for the faithful ministry that was accomplished and the lives that were touched.

The East Boise church building has been leased for enough to pay the mortgage and will be reopened as a new church plant as soon as funds are available and a planting pastor is found. The Hilltop property is listed for sale.

As a result of these experiences, the Board has established a policy not to subsidize property purchase or mortgage payments. We have also decided to discourage churches from incurring debt of more than \$1,000 per adult attendee. We are encouraging churches to rent facilities until they are large enough to support building projects and/or have raised a large portion of the needed funds.

We are committed to helping pastors be effective in leading their churches to growth.

The Board of Evangelism cannot plant or revitalize churches. We can only release and help pastors who can do it with God's help. We are committed to help provide the training these pastors need to succeed. This year we funded a three-day prayer retreat for the extension church pastors and for the pastors of monthly meetings with an average attendance of 50 or less. Several received a very definite spiritual turnaround in their ministry as a result of this retreat. Several of these smaller churches have had excellent growth this year. We also helped four church planters to attend the Charles E. Fuller Institute's "How to Plant a Church" seminar.

In the year ahead, we will again sponsor Focus—an in-service training conference for all NWYM pastors. The theme this year will be Conflict and Reconciliation in the Church, led by Ron Mock and Lon Fendall from George Fox College. We also hope to send several pastors to the Billy Graham School of Evangelism, which has proved to be so helpful to many of our pastors. Another aspect of leadership training plans include helping some monthly meeting pastors attend selected evangelism training seminars.

This past year our Board supervised the work of 14 extension churches/mission points. We are praising God that most of these are continuing to see growth and new ones being brought into the Kingdom. We especially thank Retha McCutchen, assistant superintendent, for her excellent leadership in supervising the work of this Board.

Share Calls were received this year for Whitney's desperately needed parking lot (\$7,300) and for Tigard's new facility (\$8,700). Since we had received no requests for the spring Share Call, we asked you to "Join The HARVEST," which is the name we are giving to all our efforts to raise funds for church planting beyond the \$16,400 that is included in the Great Commission Program budget.

Gil George reported their total budget for 1988 was about \$205,000, much of this above the Great Commission Program budget. They have received funds from the sale of church properties and from individual pledges and contributions. Gil encouraged participation in the Harvest Program, which will raise funds for the work of the Board, and solicited our prayers. The report was approved.

COMMISSION ON FAMILY LIFE

BETTY KING, CLERK

How can we help strengthen the Christian families represented by the Friends churches meeting here at Northwest Yearly Meeting? A great task assigned to us, yet with Christ as our Teacher and Guide, direction will be given. Strong opinions on the Commission on Family Life 1988 survey voiced a need to seek Christ first, and wholeheartedly remind us that is our goal.

How can we respond to the troubling statistics within our own churches regarding divorce, drug and alcohol abuse, child and wife abuse, materialism, dysfunctional relationships and violence, etc., as listed in the survey? We have tried to focus our energies to a few issues, realizing the central issue is modeling a lifestyle consistent with the example of Christ.

One direction we have taken again this year is to promote books, magazines, bulletin inserts, and videos at our display table. Various samplings from *Christianity Today*, *Focus on the Family*, and *Clubhouse* magazines are available to take or to read through, as well as promotionals on the various videos CFL has purchased over the years. All ten *Focus on the Family* video sets purchased last year have been sold to local churches with a "cost break" for smaller meetings.

We agreed to withdraw from Friends Ministries to Families as the cost outweighed the benefits since the transition of the organization in 1987.

We are again offering pastoral counseling from Dr. James Lundy during Yearly Meeting sessions and received positive reports of his follow-up from last year. Although the choice of workshops to be sponsored was difficult to narrow down, we are offering "Friendship in Marriage" led by Mark McMinn, and "Carefronting" led by Phil McLain. Responses from the survey indicate interest in presenting workshops at a local level.

We believe fervent prayer is needed in order for the Christian home to survive and that each of us needs to be actively involved in this effort.

The Positive Answer* (for youth); and *What Makes a Christian Family Christian*?

Cassette tapes available are: *The Christian Family* by Larry Christenson; *Dare to Discipline*, Dr. James Dobson; *Spirit-Controlled Temperament* by Dr. Tim LeHaye; and *Transformed Temperaments* by Dr. Tim LeHaye.

■ 94. The following recommendation from the Faith and Practice Revision Committee was read:

Upon concurrent recommendation by the Council of Elders and The Board of Ministerial Service, the Revision Committee presents the following changes for approval as first reading:

(1) To minimize possible confusion, the Council and the Board recommend consolidating the responsibility for discipline of ministers, and assigning that responsibility to the Board. This would necessitate the following changes to the Faith and Practice:

(a) on page 65, under "Forfeiture of Recorded Status," strike the phrase "The Council of Elders and" from the second sentence;

(b) on page 82, under "Initiation of Action," replace the phrase "Council of Elders, or the Council" with the phrase "Board of Ministerial Service, or the Board"; and

(c) on page 82, under "Investigation and Final Action," replace the phrase "Council of Elders" in the first sentence and the word "Council" in the second sentence with "Board of Ministerial Service" and "Board," respectively.

(2) To avoid possible misinterpretation, the Council and the Board recommend striking the phrase "but enters a secular occupation and continues with it for five years or more," from the first sentence of the section "Forfeiture of Recorded Status" on page 65.

(3) To clarify the grounds for forfeiture, the Council and the Board recommend adding the following language after the first sentence of the section "Forfeiture of Recorded Status" on page 65: "It is also understood that recorded status carries with it a commitment to serve among and be accountable to Friends. Thus, habitual and unreasonable neglect of Friends meetings for worship (not to be confused with short-term liberation for service, p. 60) or failure to submit annual reports (p. 64) may also cause the Board of Ministerial Service to call a minister's right of recording into question (see also 'Dealing with Offenders,' p. 82)."

Several raised questions and commented on the proposed changes. Others questioned the wisdom of beginning to make changes in the *Faith and Practice* so soon after approving it in 1987.

After considerable discussion, it was approved that we delay making a decision on this recommendation, to allow churches and Representatives time to study the proposal. This will be considered again next year.

■ 95. Clerk Richard Beebe reported that Executive Council recommends that Howard Harmon be given a call to serve as General Superintendent through June 30, 1991; that Retha McCutchen be given a call to serve as Assistant Superintendent through June 30, 1991; and that Bruce Bishop be given a call to serve as Youth Superintendent through June 30, 1991. The report was approved.

■ 97. The Executive Council submitted the following recommendation:

As a general policy the Council of Representatives, Executive Council, Areas, and any other Yearly Meeting group shall not nominate individuals to Yearly Meeting boards, commissions, and councils who are directly related to personnel employed by that board, commission, or council. As a matter of

definition "directly related" means father, mother, son, daughter, brother, and sister.

The inclusion of the word "spouse" was suggested and approved. The recommendation was approved.

■ 98. The following epistle from the children of Northwest Yearly Meeting was read:

Dear Young Friends everywhere,

Greetings from the children of Northwest Yearly Meeting! We really enjoyed children's Yearly Meeting this year! There were over a hundred of us from 53 local meetings who met together July 22-28 on the campus of George Fox College in Newberg, Oregon. During the days we went out to Tilikum, our local camp, and enjoyed a variety of activities such as hiking in the woods, swimming and boating on the lake, archery, tree climbing, and many games. The day camp theme was "In The Good Ol' Summertime," and our Bible lessons and study times focused on our families and on how to become a member of God's family, as well as on prayer and obedience. We had a great time singing our praises to God, and enjoying the beautiful world He created.

Each evening we met together at the college for singing, games, outdoor fun, and films.

It was good to be together this week and learn more about our best Friend, Jesus Christ. We hope that Jesus will make His love real to all of you and that young Friends everywhere will take Him as their Savior and Lord.

We received eight grade school epistles, eight junior high epistles, and eight senior high epistles. This is the largest number of epistles from younger Friends that has come in recent years. Praise God for their witness to us!

Complete packets of all epistles are available from the Epistle Committee through the NWYM office.

A recommendation is made that our epistle be sent to the 65 yearly meetings of Friends around the world, as listed in the Calendar of Yearly Meetings 1989 published by Friends World Committee for Consultation . . . if this is not already the practice.

■ 100. The epistle to other yearly meetings prepared by the Epistle Committee was read. Some minor corrections were suggested, and by suggestion, a paragraph concerning the Fine Arts Show was added. The revised Epistle is as follows:

To Friends Everywhere:

Greetings from the 97th session of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends gathered on the George Fox College campus July 22-28, 1989, in Newberg, Oregon. Our theme was "Blessing from the Lord," Psalm 24:5.

In his keynote message, our Yearly Meeting superintendent, Howard Harmon, asked our boards and commissions to prayerfully plan ten-year goals to be met by the year 2000, and short-term goals for our 100th anniversary in 1992, as we continue to be troubled by declining attendance and giving in many of the local churches. This results in difficult decisions for budget cuts at the Yearly Meeting level.

We feel challenged to live within our budget and still fulfill the Great Commission in our outreach at home and abroad. We approved the Evangelical

Friends International constitution which enlarges the Evangelical Friends Alliance to include Friends groups and yearly meetings around the world. We look forward to joining in revival, evangelism, fellowship, and leadership as members of this international organization of Friends.

We were privileged to have Francisco Mamani, President of Bolivia Yearly Meeting, bring us messages of growth and challenge. Dr. William Vermillion, professor of Biblical Literature and Counseling at Western Evangelical Seminary, Portland, Oregon, shared with us under the general theme of "Blessing One Another."

The men's banquet was marked by the enthusiasm of our missionaries Hal Thomas and Wayne Chapman for what God is doing in the countries to the south of us. The harvest is great in Bolivia compared to the relatively small number of workers there. Argentina and Guatemala have also experienced strong movements among their people.

"Expanding Horizons" was the theme for this year's Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship banquet. Approximately 300 ladies attended on Saturday evening. Beverly Chapman and Nancy Thomas, both recently returned from La Paz, Bolivia, spoke. Also bringing greetings were Joyce Byrne, Evangelical Friends missionary in Mexico City, and Juana Mamani, head of the women's organization in Bolivia. Janice Perisho, who with her husband, Earl, are our newest missionaries under appointment, shared her testimony. Money was raised for Bolivian national missionaries in Peru.

During the Yearly Meeting sessions four ministers were recorded: Paul Neville, Clyde Parker, Dale Rogers, and Douglas Wedin.

The Commission on Fine Arts organized an international art fair with contributions from several countries. It was held in the new M.J. Murdock Learning Resource Center on the George Fox College campus.

George Fox College set an all-time record in enrollment of 820 students. This includes those in the new Human Resources Management adult degree-completion program. For the 18th consecutive year, George Fox College completed its fiscal year with a balanced budget. It was the only college in Oregon selected for listing in Templeton Foundation's Honor Roll for Character Building Colleges.

Both the junior high and high school youth met in their own Yearly Meeting sessions, bringing out of these sessions reports and epistles they read before the general meeting.

We look forward to the coming year! "Brothers, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 3:13-14)

■ 104. The clerk introduced the new presiding clerk, Mark Ankeny. He also introduced former clerk Dorwin Smith, who spoke a few words. After a brief time of silence, Dorwin led in closing prayer.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE REPORT 1988-1989

One of the elements of the College that is always difficult to report is the "spiritual atmosphere." Each time I speak in a church, meet a pastor or a George Fox College alumnus, I'm asked, "How is the spiritual atmosphere on campus?" I'm certain to be asked that question if the pastor of the church where I am speaking is a George Fox College graduate.

My answers have varied—from an honest "I don't know" to presenting a fictitious Snevets Drawde (Edward Stevens spelled backwards) chart/scale I developed. A number to rank "spirituality" was assigned (randomly) each school year. When I presented the chart at a pastors conference, we all laughed, and properly so. It's impossible to really know what God's Holy Spirit is doing on campus.

I was overjoyed during GFC's 1989 commencement weekend, and during an earlier senior chapel, when graduate after graduate told of a relationship with Christ. Some began that walk with Jesus here at GFC. Others saw that relationship strengthened, enlightened and encouraged. My response was often, "Praise God! It's working."

What I can honestly say in response to the question of spirituality on campus is that we are doing our best to have an atmosphere where the Holy Spirit can do His work. We hire faculty/staff/administrators who not only are competent, but are committed to the lordship of Christ. We try to have programs, curriculum and a lifestyle that encourage students to follow Christ. For example, I try to "Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances" . . . so that I "do not put out the Spirit's fire" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-19) in my own life.

So, when questions are asked about enrollment, endowment, number of Ph.D.s on the faculty, balanced budgets, national honors, buildings built, and even chapel attendance (yes, it's still required), I can answer with numbers or details. However, when you ask me about the campus spiritual atmosphere, maybe I should just develop a standard answer like, "We are doing our best and trusting the Lord to do the rest."

It has been a good year!

PROGRAM

NATIONAL RECOGNITION. George Fox College is one of 92 colleges and universities in the nation—the only one in Oregon—selected for listing in Templeton Foundation's new Honor Roll for Character Building Colleges. GFC was picked from more than 700 colleges nominated. The honor roll list was compiled from answers given in a poll of presidents of all four-year, accredited institutions of higher education in the nation.

ENROLLMENT. GFC enrollment set an all-time record fall semester, with 820 students. The figure tops the previous high of 741 set in 1981. Factors contributing to the increase include matching scholarships from churches, an increase in academic awards, and continuing efforts to "internationalize"—drawing students from four continents and nine countries.

CENTENNIAL PLANNING. In less than one year, George Fox College will begin celebrating its centennial! The celebration will begin in June 1990 and continue until the College's actual 100th birthday, September 9, 1991. The 15-month schedule was adopted to include three national summer conferences in 1990.

A historical pageant is being developed, and will be performed by students in February 1991 in place of the annual winter drama production. GFC Professor of History Ralph Beebe is writing a centennial book about the College, to be published in July 1990. A centennial logo and slogan will be printed on College correspondence and publications during the celebration period. Plans continue

for a series of lectures, programs and events throughout the school year, including a formal Centennial Convocation and celebration.

ACADEMICS

ADULT DEGREE-COMPLETION PROGRAM. GFC's "Human Resources Management" adult degree-completion program is growing in Oregon. In June, Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges' Commission on Colleges granted GFC permission to offer the HRM program in Eugene.

The HRM program had a total of 152 participating in 10 classes in the 1988-89 school year. Ninety-seven completed the program, receiving their diplomas at commencement April 29. Because of the increase in the number of persons completing degrees during the first semester, the College will hold a midyear graduation ceremony this year on December 16.

ENGINEERING. George Fox College's newest major has been a success. Eleven students enrolled in the program in the first year. The major leads to two degrees—a bachelor's degree in engineering in one of five areas from the University of Portland's Multnomah School of Engineering.

CENTER FOR PEACE LEARNING. George Fox College's Center for Peace Learning hosted a series of "Peacemaking Suppers" throughout the year. Peacemakers visiting the campus included Coordinator of Oregon Fellowship of Reconciliation Michael Sonleitner, and Director and Co-founder of the Center for Nonviolence in Jerusalem Mubarak Awad.

The Peace Center led a five-session training seminar in January for members of the newly formed Newberg-Area Community Conciliation Service, a volunteer organization available to assist disputing parties in solving their differences.

John Paul Lederach, a mediator of conflict in Nicaragua, was the College's 1989 Woolman Forum speaker in February. In its fourth year, the forum was created by GFC's Center for Peace Learning to inform students, faculty and the Newberg community about conflict resolution and peacemaking education.

The Center continues to need financial support to remain successful. It is seeking to raise \$75,000 through several activities this summer, including a "peace walk" and estate sale.

FACULTY AWARD. Professor of Sociology Mike Allen was the 1988-89 recipient of GFC's Burlington Northern Faculty Achievement Award. The \$2,000 unrestricted cash award program was created in 1984 to recognize teaching excellence.

TILIKUM. Volunteers in June completed restoration work on Tilikum's newest addition—Valley View School. The 1909 schoolhouse was donated to Tilikum in 1985 and a year later moved two miles north to Tilikum property. Now a "hands on" museum, Valley View will be used as a nature and storytelling center for the nearly 1,500 children who attend Tilikum's annual day camp programs. The school also will be available to community and school groups for meetings.

Tilikum Retreat Center continues to offer year-round retreat programs and summer youth-oriented programs, in addition to college courses in biology, physical education and camping. Due to popular demand, Tilikum's women's retreat was scheduled a second time this year. Other popular events were a "Family Get-Together," and mother/children and father/son fishing classes.

One of more than 1,000 institutions around the world that participates in the Elderhostel program, Tilikum hosted "Elderhostels" throughout the year, focusing on a wide variety of topics, including peacemaking, Indian legacy and modern religious thought. Elderhostel provides low-cost educational experiences for people 60 and older.

Tilikum, owned by the College but financially independent, in September raised \$32,000 through its 16th annual "Potlatch" Indian salmon bake.

INTERNATIONALIZING THE EXPERIENCE

ENGLISH LANGUAGE INSTITUTE. Six students, most from Japan, enrolled in GFC's English Language Institute program this year. Starting its third year, the program's goal is to prepare international students for college studies in the U.S. President Edward F. Stevens in October spoke at the Autumn Celebration of GFC's first sister college, Soai College in Osaka, Japan. He also visited Kang Nam College in Seoul, Korea, signing a working agreement.

JUNIORS ABROAD. Twenty-six GFC students visited the Soviet Union and Middle East this year through the College's Juniors Abroad program. With the goal of exposing students to a Christian "world view," the program pays transportation costs for students who maintain full-time enrollment through the spring of their junior year.

SUMMER VISITS. About 185 Japanese and Korean students will visit George Fox this summer, thanks to "home stay" arrangements organized by GFC's summer coordinator for international visitation. Students study English on campus, and visit Newberg-area points of interest, as well as Mt. Hood, Cove State Park, the Columbia River Gorge and the Oregon coast.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE

M. J. MURDOCK LEARNING RESOURCE CENTER. GFC's new \$2.5 million M. J. Murdock Learning Resource Center was formally dedicated in February. Ceremonies for the building, which opened its doors to students in September, involved Murdock Trust officials, city and College leaders.

In January, more than a month ahead of schedule, GFC had more than matched a challenge grant from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust, receiving \$85,000 to help in cleanup of asbestos discovered in construction.

MORSE ATHLETIC FIELDS. George Fox College's baseball, softball and soccer Bruins have a new home: The Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Fields. Dedicated February 25, the new 11.5-acre complex was named for a Newberg couple, both GFC alumni, who funded the \$40,000 project.

CENTURY II CAMPAIGN. More than \$6 million was given or pledged to the College's Century II Campaign, which ended October 1. Launched in January, 1986, the drive culminated with the opening of the M. J. Murdock Learning Resource Center in September. The campaign also raised funds to add library volumes, increase the College's endowment, and provide for student financial aid and scholarships.

BALANCED BUDGET. For the 18th consecutive year, George Fox College completed its fiscal year with a balanced budget. Support for the College's general fund has continued to rise sharply—from \$275,000 in 1982-1983 to \$537,000 in 1988-1989. We are grateful for the Lord's blessings through many "friends" of the College.

TUITION MAINTENANCE ORGANIZATION. George Fox College has taken steps to alleviate growing college costs for students and families with an innovative prepayment plan. Stepping into a financial forefront, George Fox and eight other colleges in the United States are offering a prepayment plan through the National Tuition Maintenance Organization (TMO), a nonprofit organization established in 1986 to help institutions meet future costs of education. Through TMO, parents have the opportunity to pay now for a four-year education at GFC. When their children enter college in the future, they pay nothing more for tuition and fees, despite rate increases.

GFC President Edward F. Stevens was appointed to the TMO board of advisors in November. He joins 15 other advisors, including Myron Augsburg, president of Christian College Coalition.

EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

FALL CONVOCATION. Duane Beals, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, opened GFC's 98th year September 7 at the annual Convocation program. Beals urged students to analyze worldly and Christian ideals and adopt ones that please God. "As you read, as you write, as you study . . . remember that everything must come together at the foot of the cross of Jesus Christ," he said.

RELIGIOUS CONFERENCES. GFC's Christian Life Week in September featured Michael Graves, who spoke on "Rekindling a Relationship with God." Graves is professor of communication at CBN University in Virginia. He was a professor of communication arts at GFC from 1972 to 1987.

"Some Quaker Core Convictions" was the theme for GFC's 14th annual Quaker Heritage Week in October. Speakers included Margaret Hope Bacon, an active Quaker lecturer and author; Jack Willcuts, former Northwest Yearly Meeting superintendent; and Petra Pruett, a GFC alumna and writer for Friends Committee on National Legislation.

At GFC's 22nd annual Missions Conference in January, Northwest Regional Director of Overseas Missionary Fellowship Alex Smith told students about "tent-making" missions. About 15 missions organizations were represented on campus. Christian Palestinian journalist Daoud Kuttub discussed "Toward Reconciliation in the Middle East" at GFC in February. His lecture was sponsored by the National Christian Consortium.

Actor Curt Cloninger, GFC's Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer, presented three comic and dramatic sketches to students in April.

ACADEMIC CONFERENCES AND EVENTS. The life of Lou Henry Hoover was the topic of the seventh biennial Herbert Hoover Symposium in March. The public symposium featured five professors and writers, and an actress, from throughout the United States.

Astronaut James Irwin, the eighth person in history to set foot on the moon, received a standing ovation when he spoke at GFC in October. Irwin presented GFC President Edward F. Stevens with a photograph bearing the words, "Jesus walking on the Earth is more important than man walking on the moon."

During Christian Social Involvement Day, sponsored by the Sociology/Social Work Department in February, students from a Social Work Methods class hosted a child abuse seminar. The class called on professionals in legal, health and social work fields to discuss reporting child abuse and recognizing its symptoms and effects.

GFC's Division of Religion this year underwent a name change, and began offering three instead of two majors. Now titled the Division of Religious Studies, the division offers majors in religion, educational ministries and biblical studies. Formerly, it offered majors in religion and Christian ministries.

Rodney Streiby, associate professor of accounting and business at GFC, discussed the future of liberal arts education at the fall Faculty Lecture program in November. Mark McMinn, associate professor of psychology at GFC, examined how dieting efforts affect weight loss at the spring Faculty Lecture in April.

MUSIC AND DRAMA. Fall semester's comedy *Charley's Aunt* was followed by the drama *Pack of Lies* in February and the hit musical *Godspell* in March.

Richard Zeller, 1983 GFC graduate, performed at his alma mater in March. A member of the Metropolitan Opera's three-year Young Artist Development Program, Zeller was in Portland to play the part of Masetto in Portland Opera's production of W. A. Mozart's *Don Giovanni*. GFC Music Department's various singing and instrumental groups performed throughout the year on and off campus.

James DePreist and the 85-member Oregon Symphony Orchestra performed at GFC's Bauman Auditorium in May. The performance at the College was the second concert sponsored by Ken and Joan Austin of Newberg.

ATHLETICS. To term George Fox College's 1988-89 athletic teams successful would be an understatement. The Bruins not only are competing at the national level, they are winning there. Fall semester the women's cross country team, paced by the second place finish of freshman Jill Jamison, was eighth in the nation in the NAIA championships in Wisconsin. The Lady Bruins, a week earlier in Ohio, won the National Christian College Athletic Association national title with Jamison as the champion.

In soccer, the Bruins won the NCCAA national title in championship competition in Texas. Sophomore Dan LaVeine was named Outstanding Offensive Player of the tourney. His brother Andy, a senior, was named NAIA District 2's soccer player of the year for 1988 as GFC finished higher than ever before, losing the district title in a 1-0 championship game in Portland.

The volleyball team finished higher than ever before in NAIA District 2 competition, placing third in season-ending playoffs and ending with an impressive 30-13 season.

In men's basketball, the Bruins, for the 15th time in 19 years of NAIA play, reached the playoffs, finishing third. The final 19-12 season (with 10 of those 12 losses to teams in the final four in the district) reflected the loss of a starting 6'11" center, who missed the season with a broken foot. The Lady Bruins finished their season at 13-13, seventh in the district.

In spring sports, the baseball Bruins, for the second time ever, reached the NAIA District 2 playoffs, finishing third. The 22-14 record was the most wins in a quarter century of NAIA play, with the .611 winning rate the best ever. In track, George Fox sent six athletes to the NAIA nationals in California, all finishing in the top 10 in their events. Jamison won the national title in the 10,000 meter race to become an All-American, along with discus thrower Nancy Katus, sixth in her event. The Lady Bruins were second in the NAIA District 2 championships, the men fourth.

GFC AND NORTHWEST YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS

Since its founding by Quakers in 1891, George Fox College has been under the leadership of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. Below are some figures that illustrate Friends involvement in the College:

- In 1988-1989, there were 132 Friends students enrolled at GFC. This figure increased 1 percent from 1987 to 1988.
- 28 Northwest Yearly Meeting Churches in 1988-89 were helping 75 students through GFC's Church/College Fellowship program.
- 49 GFC students in the year received "Friends Students" scholarships awards of \$780-\$1,000 each.
- Of NWYM's 88-member pastoral staff, 51 (or 58 %) are GFC alumni.
- Of NWYM's 18 missionaries, 12 (or 66%) are GFC alumni.
- Of NWYM's 7 officers, 6 (or 85%) are GFC alumni.

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PROPOSED

**CONSTITUTION
of
EVANGELICAL FRIENDS INTERNATIONAL**

PREAMBLE

Arising out of a God-given concern to participate fully as Friends in seeking the Kingdom of God and His righteousness through the Church, we herein set forth a constitution to serve as a guide for faith and action by Evangelical Friends International. In so doing, we declare our belief in the value of Christian unity for the spiritual welfare and for the advancement of the program of the Friends Church worldwide.

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this organization shall be: Evangelical Friends International.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The organization shall be an international alliance of Friends churches who officially accept and communicate the evangelical doctrines of the Christian faith as herein defined. This purpose of the alliance will be seen:

1. by working together under policies and arrangements herein stated,
2. by serving together in Christian ministries based upon biblical principles,
3. by prayerfully investing both personal and material resources in order to fulfill the Great Commission,
4. by seeking continuously to distinguish both the call of God and the clamour of humanity as it is expressed in diverse cultures and respond appropriately in a Christian manner.

ARTICLE III—OBJECTIVES

1. *Renewal.* To motivate a renewed sensitivity to God's voice through Scripture and contemporary needs by persistent waiting on the Lord and total availability to the Holy Spirit for living the life of Christ in and through us.
2. *Evangelism.* To share creative and effective methods of proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ throughout the world with those who have not received Him as Savior and Lord.
3. *Fellowship.* To stimulate genuine sharing of joys and burdens with one another in the family of Friends, locally, nationally, and internationally.
4. *Leadership.* To develop individuals whose God-given call, vision, spiritual gifts, and Christ-like lifestyles command respect as servant leaders among God's people.

ARTICLE IV—STATEMENT OF FAITH

The Holy Bible—We believe that the 66 books of the Holy Bible were given by the inspiration of God; that there can be no appeal from these Scriptures to any other authority whatsoever; that they are fully sufficient to make one wise unto salvation through faith that is in Jesus Christ; that the Holy Spirit who inspired the Scriptures must ever be its true interpreter as Christ works through the disciplined and dedicated minds of those within His Church; that any professed guidance that is contrary to these Scriptures must be counted as a delusion.

God—We believe in one God, revealed through the Holy Spirit in the person of Jesus Christ; that He is both the Creator and Preserver of all things visible and invisible; that He alone is worthy of worship—honor, glory, dominion, praise, and thanksgiving—both now and forevermore; and that in the unity of the Godhead, there exists three persons; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, inseparable in divinity, power, glory, and eternity.

Jesus Christ—We believe Jesus Christ to be the only begotten Son of God; that He was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary; that He is the express image of the invisible God; and that He combines within Himself both the nature of God and the nature of man in one perfect indivisible personality—the God-man.

We believe that He was crucified as a substitutionary atonement for us and for the sins of the whole world, making provision whereby each person may find the forgiveness of sins, the power for a new life, and be brought back into a perfect relationship with the Father.

We believe that He arose from the dead, ascended to the right hand of God, making intercession for us, and that He will come to earth again to receive His Church unto Himself and to judge the world in righteousness.

Holy Spirit—We believe the Holy Spirit to be the third person of the Trinity, proceeding from the Father and Son, but equal with them in authority, power, and glory; that He convicts the world of sin, imparts life to the penitent believer, sanctifies the child of God, empowers the disciple for service to others, and enables each one by His indwelling presence to love God supremely.

People—We believe that God created people as male and female in His own image; that they enjoyed unbroken fellowship with their Maker; and that their whole life centered in the person of God. We believe that people fell from this original state by an act of transgression; that in this fall they suffered the immediate loss of their perfect relationship to God, making self the center of their life; and that in this act they suffered immediate spiritual death. All people are born in this disposition to sin. We own no principle inherent naturally by which they may be saved, except by the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ as a provision for all people.

Salvation—We believe that by the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and by the direct and immediate agency of the Holy Spirit, people can be recovered from their fallen state through Divine enlightenment, forgiveness of sin, regeneration and sanctification of their affections, and the final glorification of their bodies; that in this life they can love God with all their heart, soul, mind, and strength; that they can live in victory over sin and enjoy unbroken fellowship with the Heavenly Father; and that once more their whole lives may center in and resolve around their Creator and Redeemer.

We believe that the experience of sanctification is the work of God's grace by which affections are purified and exalted to a supreme love to God and others, and the believer is empowered to witness of the living Christ. This is accomplished by the baptism with the Holy Spirit in the life of a dedicated and

believing child of God; that this is both an act in which the heart is cleansed from an imperfect relationship and state, and a process in which the life is continuously disciplined into paths of holiness. By submission and availability to Jesus Christ, people become channels for Christ to do His work in this present age.

The Church—We believe that all those persons who repent of their sins, believe in and receive Jesus Christ as their Savior, are born again into His Kingdom by the Holy Spirit, and that these constitute the Church of Jesus Christ. The Church we believe to be spiritual in nature, universal in scope, holy in character, and redemptive in her life and purpose.

We believe that wherever two or three are gathered together regularly and faithfully in the name of Christ, He is truly present in the person of the Holy Spirit and that such an assembly is a local church, the visible expression of His body, and the Church universal.

We believe that believers must relate themselves to the local and visible body of Christ being fitly framed together with others into a holy temple of the Lord and built together for an habitation of His Holy Spirit.

Christian Ministries—We believe that in the Church, the believer is committed to both the worship and the work of God; that this work involves not only personal righteousness as the fruit of a new life, but the ministry of evangelism and teaching; that in this commission of Christ every believer is involved in the stewardship of the Kingdom, and that is fulfilled only by faithful service in and through the fellowship of His church; and that this work is continuous until Christ comes again calling the Church unto Himself. We believe that all Christians are called upon to witness by word and by deed within a sinful world, not returning evil for evil, but in Christlikeness demonstrating love, forgiveness, and the way of peace.

We believe that in the fellowship of His body, the Holy Spirit gives to every member a gift to be exercised for the mutual advantage of every member in the body, and for the influence of the Church upon those outside; the ministry is a special calling given to certain ones whom God ordains for a service of leadership in His Church; that this service may be that of pastoring, teaching, evangelizing, administration, or other kinds of service to humanity.

Liberty—We believe in the doctrine of Christian liberty, and that this liberty is to be granted in all areas that are not essential to one's final salvation. While we recognize that among God's children there are minor differences of faith and practice, due in part to cultural differences, and due to our imperfection, we must look forward to the time when we shall all come into a greater unity of the faith. Until then we believe that in essentials there must be unity, that in nonessentials there must be liberty, but in all things there must be charity.

Spiritual Realities—We believe that both Christian baptism and communion are spiritual realities beyond the mere physical and outward ordinances; that baptism is an inward receiving of the Holy Spirit in which He becomes Lord over all—guiding, cleansing, empowering, and in general, representing God to us in immediate experience; that communion is the daily receiving and realization of Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord; that this communion is dependent not only upon the condition of the believer walking daily in the light of Christ but also in the historic act of Christ on Calvary as His body was broken and blood shed once and for all for us; that Christ thus becomes a daily personal spiritual reality known immediately in Christian experience; and that through Him and the baptism of the Holy Spirit, God and divine realities are known experientially and immediately.

Resurrection and Judgment—We believe in the second coming of Christ; that at His coming the dead shall be resurrected, some to everlasting glory and others to everlasting condemnation; that we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ to receive recompense for the things done in the body; that the judgment of the blessed shall be unto heaven, and the judgment of the lost unto hell; that the punishment of the wicked and the blessedness of the righteous shall be everlasting; that this judgment is in the hands of our compassionate Redeemer, Who does all things after the counsel of His wisdom, love, and holiness.

ARTICLE V—MEMBERSHIP

Any yearly meeting of Friends, or any organized Friends group of churches, may apply for membership in Evangelical Friends International, and will be accepted provided there is official agreement with the doctrines and policies of Evangelical Friends International and the Regional Coordinating Council of the respective region approves such application.

For a single international or regional event, a non-member yearly meeting or Friends group of churches who agrees with the Statement of Faith may participate on a temporary basis. Their financial support will be proportionate for this event. Planning and participation will last for this single event only.

ARTICLE VI—ORGANIZATION

Membership shall be under a two-level system.

Level I—Membership in Evangelical Friends International by geographical region, i.e. Africa, Asia, Latin America, North America. It shall be directed by an international council composed of the director of each region, plus an international director to be nominated by them and approved by each regional Coordinating Council.

Level II—Membership in respective regions as a yearly meeting or organized Friends group within any of the regions: It shall have a controlling body to be known as the coordinating council and is made up of representatives of member yearly meetings, as determined by each respective region.

There shall be, in addition, an Executive Committee of each Regional Coordinating Council composed of the general superintendents or their equivalent, and a member-at-large of each member yearly meeting, or organized Friends group of churches.

ARTICLE VII—COMMISSIONS

Commissions may be established in a respective region by the Regional Coordinating Council to give impetus and direction to the special areas of concern. Specifically, such commissions shall follow the general departmental concerns of the member churches. Each commission shall organize from its own members, with a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Also, it may appoint a treasurer.

All official minutes and actions of each commission shall be forwarded promptly to the direction of each Regional Coordinating Council for final disposition. There shall be a close cooperative working relationship between each commission and the Coordinating Council.

Any commission may also be open for participation by individuals with expertise from corresponding yearly meeting departments provided both the

commission and the Executive Committee shall approve such affiliation, but without membership in the Regional Coordinating Council.

Each commission shall draw up guidelines or a constitution for its own use in providing stability and continuity to its work and program.

ARTICLE VIII—OFFICERS

Level I—The International Council of Evangelical Friends International shall be composed of the Regional Directors and shall organize every three years by appointing the International Director. The other officers of Assistant International Director, Secretary, and Treasurer shall be appointed from among themselves. The officers shall be limited to not more than three years.

Level II—The Regional Coordinating Council shall organize annually by appointing the following officers: Regional Director, Assistant Regional Director, Secretary, and Treasurer, with the Regional Director as ex-officio member of each commission. These officers shall be nominated from the Executive Committee by a nominating committee of three named by the Regional Coordinating Council and shall also serve as the officers of the Executive Committee.

As need may arise, the Coordinating Council may appoint, as stipulated under Article IX, Level II, paragraph 1, such administrative personnel as may be deemed advisable. Such persons shall be well qualified by natural ability, experience, and Christian character, enabling them to act in the best interests for the entire cause of evangelical Friends.

ARTICLE IX—POLICIES

The following policies are accepted as guides for Evangelical Friends International.

Level I—

1. The International Council shall be empowered to appoint task force members to plan a specific event that is to be international in scope. Otherwise, all organized gatherings shall be on regional levels and shall be planned and directed by the respective Regional Coordinating Council.

2. Funding for international events shall be raised from the entire membership of Evangelical Friends International.

The following policies are accepted as guides for the future development of a respective Region.

Level II—

1. The Regional Coordinating Council shall be empowered to take actions in areas of Christian concern that are delegated to it by the member yearly meetings, with the exception that action involving the appointment of administrative personnel, major policy changes, budgets, and amendments are subject to the approval of member groups.

2. All decisions made by the Regional Coordinating Council shall be in accordance with the Friends policy of seeking, through prayer and discussion, the mind of the Lord, which shall be discerned as the sense of the meeting by the one in charge. Those who disagree, after extended discussion and prayer, may stand aside from the decision allowing the others to move ahead. If those who disagree with an action want their opposition on record, they may register their concerns in the official minute, which must be reported.

3. Member churches shall be kept informed on financial needs in the operation of the respective region and may support the united program by whatever methods may be deemed advisable, whether by budgetary or freewill contributions. In cases where fixed expenses are involved, the requests for finances should be met on a proportionate basis. The Regional Coordinating Council shall be responsible for receiving and considering all financial needs and askings of the various commissions, and when approved it shall forward such appeals to the member churches through proper channels.

ARTICLE X—BUDGET

Level I—All budgets which have been approved by Evangelical Friends International for specific international events shall be underwritten by each member yearly meeting and organized Friends group on a formula basis that takes into consideration applicable factors, including (a) the membership of each one, and (b) ability to pay based on per capita gross national product for each country represented. These apportionments shall be paid into the treasury of Evangelical Friends International.

Level II—Each region shall establish its own annual budget with approval by its Regional Coordinating Council which shall be underwritten by member yearly meetings and organized Friends groups in the region on a formula basis determined by yearly meeting memberships.

ARTICLE XI—RECORDS

Official minutes of all actions taken shall be carefully kept and preserved by the International Council, each Regional Coordinating Council, and the commissions. Careful records of receipts and expenditures of the Councils or commissions shall be kept by their respective treasurers, and the books audited annually. Audit reports shall be forwarded to each member church.

ARTICLE XII—AMENDMENTS

The power to amend the constitution may be initiated by the Coordinating Council of any region at its regularly held meeting.

Amendments, upon approval by the recommending Regional Coordinating Council, shall then be presented to all other Regional Coordinating Councils for similar action.

Upon approval by each Regional Coordinating Council, amendments to this constitution shall become final upon approval by the International Coordinating Council.

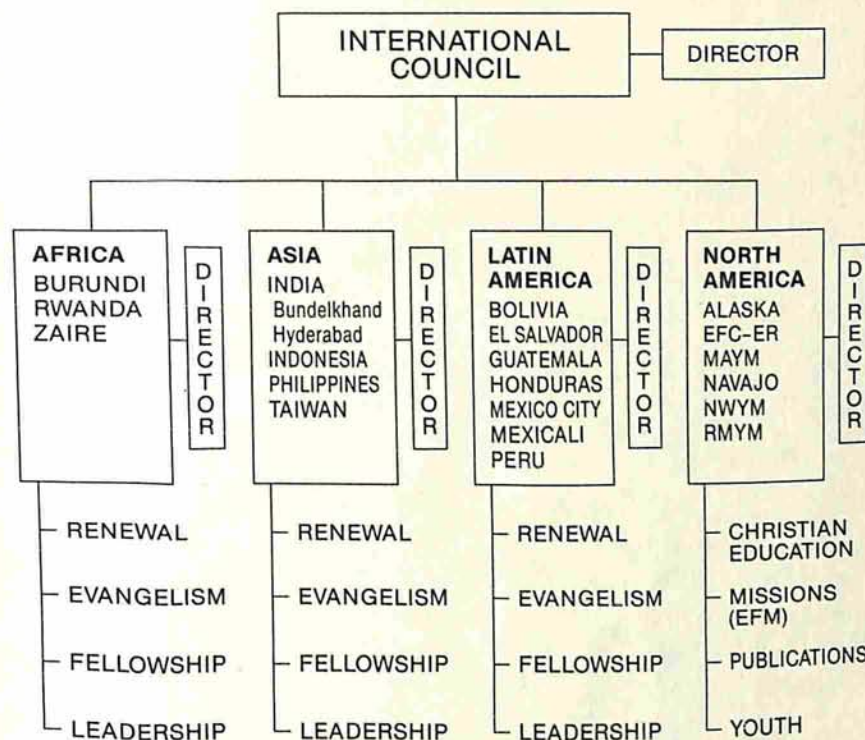
ARTICLE XIII—BYLAWS

The International Council is authorized to adopt bylaws and job descriptions.

ARTICLE XIV—DISSOLUTION

If it is found desirable to dissolve Evangelical Friends International, it shall be done by approval of the Regional Councils and the International Council. The International Council shall supervise the distribution of assets to member yearly meetings and groups of Friends churches on a proportionate basis.
