MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1990

Monday, July 23, 10:45 a.m.

■ 1. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convenes its 98th sessions on July 23, 1990, on the campus of George Fox College under the theme "Daring Discipleship." Hebrews 12:1 and 2 reads: "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God." Mark Ankeny led in prayer.

■ 2. Gil George introduced Curt Blasiman, a missionary candidate under Evangelical Friends Mission to Rwanda. He brought personal greetings.

■ 3. Jay Thatcher, a member of Corvallis Friends Meeting, North Pacific Yearly Meeting, and representing Friends World Committee for Consultation, brought greetings and encouraged us to participate in meetings of FWCC.

■ 4. Howard Harmon introduced Chad Gates of Barclay College (formerly Friends Bible College) who brought greetings.

■ 5. Howard Harmon also introduced new pastors in the Yearly Meeting: Glenn and Verla Mae Armstrong—Whitney; David and Denise Robinson, Vancouver; Ken and Rachel VandenHoek, Sherwood; and Mark and Patsy Burton, Medford. Toby Schroeder, Scotts Mills, and Paul Almquist, associate pastor at Silverton, were recently married. Janine Schroeder and Nancy Almquist were recognized. David and Colleen Russell, pastors at Roseburg were also mentioned.

■ 6. Katharine Clark representing New England Yearly Meeting and the International Young Friends Conference brought greetings.

■ 7. The Board of Missions report presented Sunday afternoon was approved.

■ 8. The Children's Art Display sponsored by the Commission on Fine Arts was approved.

■ 9. The keynote message given by Howard Harmon Sunday evening was approved as follows:

What a beautiful group of people you are! It always amazes me as we travel throughout the Yearly Meeting to see and feel the dedication of so many, the great love you have for the Lord and His church. We thank God for you.

A few weeks ago while on vacation I had the privilege, along with our two daughters, to fly over the Grand Canyon. Beth opted to keep her feet on terra firma. Seeing those cliffs of varying red, yellow and gray shades with the canyon river so far below gave us a unique new perspective, magnifying the immensity of the great canyon. The next day, Judy and I hiked four and one-half miles down into the canyon for a very different view. We seemed so small as we looked up at those immense canyon walls stretching some 3000 feet above us. This is definitely not a hike for the undetermined soul. It is vigorous, demanding and exhausting. Because of the extremely steep climb back up, the intense heat (well over 100 degrees F.) and the lack of available water, some hikers have died. As I looked at the switchbacks zigzagging up the canyon walls I began to wonder if we would ever make it out, but we did. Just one step at a time, drinking lots of water, stopping to rest along the way and we made it out feeling fine approximately seven hours later. I'll have to admit it was a daring climb for people of any age, let alone for me, a novice at hiking. But, it was exciting to try; it was exciting to dare.

This year our theme is "Daring Discipleship," daring to commit ourselves totally to the Lord, daring to step out and become involved with new people in our communities, and daring to take the steps that will lead to new growth. A new church year lies ahead of us, one with fresh opportunities and challenges. Perhaps the way will be a steep climb for some, even exhausting, but my challenge this evening is that we might face it with courage, enthusiasm and expectancy. It will demand your complete dedication to the task to be able to enjoy the blessings of the Lord.

It will take specific preparation to be a fruit-bearing disciple. John 15:4-5 reads: "Remain in Me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in Me. I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in Me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from Me you can do nothing." This Scripture warns us that our abiding in the Lord is a major key to being an effective disciple. As we walked the trail down into the Grand Canyon, it wasn't long before we came to a sign which read: "Warning. Do not go beyond this point without an adequate supply of water." The recommended amount was two quarts per hiker. To go on without carrying water would be absolutely foolish. We were told that a young man of 28 years of age had died just the day before from dehydration. He was not carrying the life-giving water. We asked why people aren't warned and told of all the people who have perished. They replied, we do warn and urge people to adequately prepare, but they disregard our cautions and insist on trying to do it in their own way. I thought how like our discipleship endeavors for Christ. We are tempted to try living the Christian life in our own strength without the continual filling of the Spirit.

After the four and one-half mile canyon hike is completed, the beautiful Indian Gardens is reached. A spring gurgles out cool, clear delicious water in this refreshing area. There is plenty of water to drink, to splash on your sweaty face and head, plenty to fill your water containers for drinking on the way back up the hard climb. We knew we must drink continually as we climbed even if we didn't feel like it. I think of our Yearly Meeting sessions as a beautiful Indian Gardens. The times of rejoicing, praising, and fellowshiping are great spiritual thirst quenchers. We laugh and sing, pray and worship in God's presence. But out on the trail, back where we meet those we work with day by day, sometimes

we feel exhausted and strained. Drink! Drink continually from God's Spirit and His Word. Take time to commune with Him. Dehydration is deadly.

By daring discipleship I'm not thinking of the Evel Knievel variety. In looking at the place where he tried to jump his flying motorcycle over the Snake River, a distance of a mile, it was easy to see there was no way he was going to make it. A crash was inevitable. Jesus resisted the Devil's temptation to hurl himself off the pinnacle to prove He was the son of God and to prove that His Heavenly Father would save Him. No, daring discipleship is not being presumptive, being arrogant in our daring. We must align our will with His will, daring to do those things He directs in His strength.

OMSI, the science museum in Portland, has a fascinating machine that rolls little balls over and around an extensive track system. These balls, by some given energy, maneuver and turn, racing along only to go back to the top and do the whole thing over again. Perhaps you have felt that way some days, getting up in the morning, going through the day's motions, going to bed, and then only to begin the same routine over again. A treadmill-type life. This can happen when the keen edge of our discipleship living becomes dull. Our churches can experience this too. We can become so caught up with the chores of just keeping the machinery running that we do not take the time to pull aside to look at our priorities and see if we are being effective disciples of the Lord. Surely God would have us live with a sense of His great purpose for our lives, influencing others toward Him, lifting someone else's load or just extending a helping hand.

John 10:10 reads: "I have come that they might have life, and have it to the full." The King James version says "more abundantly." If Christ is Lord, we have the most exciting message to share in 1990. Many around us are walking in darkness needing the light and life of Jesus. A newspaper account told of an incident where a young man stood eleven hours on the outside ledge of the seventeenth floor building while relatives, a policeman, a psychiatrist, and a priest all took turns trying to convince him to come into the building. He said, "I wish someone would convince me that life is worth living," and with that he jumped to his death. Sometime ago I was called to a home where a person was threatening to commit suicide. Thankfully he did not, but in later conversation the police officer said that these incidents are becoming so common they don't make the news anymore. Many people have lost their sense of meaning in life; they walk in darkness as the Scripture says. As disciples of Christ, who is the Light, what a privilege and responsibility we have to take this good news to our communities.

Abraham is a good example of a daring disciple. Called to leave his home place where love and security were abundant and to move to another strange land, he obeyed. Because he responded in obedience to God, we honor him this evening. Perhaps to be a daring disciple, some here this evening are sensing the Lord calling you to leave what you are doing to go and prepare for pastoral or missionary service.

The early Christians were also daring disciples of the Lord. It is said of them in Acts 17:6 "... they dragged some of the brethren before the city authorities, crying, 'These men who have turned the world upside down have come here also.'" These men were not a secret band of followers who lived quietly, blending unnoticed into the society around them. They spoke out forcefully with the truth even though it meant they were hung or torn apart by lions in the Roman coliseum. They lived in a sin-darkened land and were called to be light.

Historically, Quakers have been on the cutting edge as disciples of Christ. The very name Quaker signified honesty and trustworthiness. I was reminded of this again when we were in Peru. As I was browsing in a tiny store, my eyes suddenly saw a familiar face. Here in this faraway land a box sitting on the shelf had a picture of a Quaker on it, and the label Quaker Chocolate Drink, in Spanish, of course. I was amazed. The Quaker name has been used far and wide to connote integrity. Being a Quaker should imply following out the principles

and Christian character that was taught and seen in the One we follow. Within our Yearly Meeting churches we have many who are beautiful examples of Christian discipleship for they live His lifestyle.

Nine individuals recently stepped out to become the first work team Northwest Yearly Meeting has ever sent to the mission field. They put in electrical wiring which was desperately needed, repaired plumbing, put in doors, cleaned the building to make it usable for the training of pastors in Peru. Thank you for the great job you did. This Bible School, we pray, will strengthen and establish many. On our mission field we easily see the difference Christ has made in the lives of the believers. The Lord removes the load of sin, for He alone has the power to forgive, and a new direction is taken that leads to peace within and a changed life without.

One of my personal goals in accepting the position as General Superintendent three years ago was to be a part with you in seeing the Yearly Meeting gain a greater evangelistic spirit and to see our churches increase numerically. Let me share with you some good news from this last year's statistics. Morning worship attendance increased by 539 worshipers to reach a total of 6,173 in worship attendance throughout the Yearly Meeting. The downward trend of the past years dramatically turned around. Numerically the churches that have led the way are: Newberg, Hillsboro, Boise, Greenleaf, Sherwood, West Chehalis, Peninsula, McKinley Hill, Rose Valley, Rosemere, North Valley, Tigard, West Hills and, of course, our newest congregation Discovery. The heavens rejoice with the new believers who have come into the Kingdom and our hearts are filled with praise. Pastors and people ministering together under the Lord's direction attract others to His church.

It takes time for church membership to respond to attendance and this year church membership decreased by 14.

Sixty years ago the people of the Yearly Meeting responded to an appeal for support to begin mission work in Bolivia. With this overwhelming response a great ministry took place.

Now is the time for another daring step to be taken allowing the church to move forward in a fresh way. In the keynote message last year, I proposed that Northwest Yearly Meeting take a daring bold step to enable a more effective ministry in spreading the Gospel. During this past year I have shared the plan of the "Centennial Challenge" with each board and commission of the Yearly Meeting, in representatives' meetings across the Yearly Meeting and to the pastors in their annual conference. This plan provides a personal challenge to each church member with unified support for local church ministries, Yearly Meeting ministries, and the George Fox College Friends students scholarship program.

This is not the time to pull back or retreat but to be disciples who dare to venture for the Lord.

As the Yearly Meeting reaches our 100th anniversary in 1992, may we be in the midst of an outreach ministry that will spread a new wave of evangelism throughout the Northwest.

The local church is the key to growth in our Yearly Meeting as they reach people for Christ, see them discipled and become soul winners themselves. An article by Edward Perry includes the following reasons for a growing church:

1. People feel loved, cared for and wanted.
2. People receive sound, biblically-oriented preaching and educational content.
3. People have a pastor who loves them and cares for them enthusiastically.
4. The worship service is a positive, uplifting and moving experience.

Walgrath, in interviewing dropouts from congregations of the Reformed Church in America, discovered two of the major causes were a feeling that the pastor was not really concerned about them as persons, and no one in the congregation provided them with spiritual and psychological support. A survey among Lutherans revealed that most families who dropped out of church

expressed feeling a lack of intimacy and relationship with members of the congregation and they found this relationship (though on a very human level) in Little League, the fire department, PTA, and similar civic groups.

Daring discipleship may mean to step out of our comfort zone with our few intimate friends and include a new church attendee into our circle, allowing them to become a real part of our lives. Our churches will welcome and encourage new families to become active in the life of the church and give them key decision-making roles. It is risky to trust the life and program of the church to new believers, but it is the only way for them to feel a part and be able to use their God-given gifts for the Lord. Does an individual or family come to your mind whom the Lord would have you reach out to when you go back home?

During the coming year the Executive Council has asked me to spend the bulk of my energies encouraging the pastors of the Yearly Meeting and working with the churches. I hope to be involved with many of you as together we seek ways to keep Christ the center of our church and discover effective means of carrying out the Great Commission.

This past year many pastors joined me in committing daily time with the Lord in communion, giving quality time in planning and creative dreaming with the Lord for His direction for the future. We desire open hearts for the Lord to stretch in new ways, to make us bold, daring disciples in ways which we have not been before.

I have heard that the most important thing a father can do for his children is to love their mother. By acts of love the children become thankful they are a part of that family. So it is with the church. The most important thing a pastor can do is to love the people of the congregation. The most important thing the members of the church can do is to love their pastor and the other members of the congregation.

Our churches will continue to grow and attract new people as we love one another and work cooperatively together. This past year we saw a 9.5% increase; will you believe with me that this coming year will be 10%? As new people visit our churches and the Word of God is boldly proclaimed, as love and enthusiasm are shown to them as they are welcomed and accepted, they will more likely become a part of the church family and be open to receive Christ.

The Lord used those early Christians to turn the world right side up for Him. Look at that group: Peter, a fisherman; James and John engaged in the same trade and a little headstrong; Matthew, a civil employee; just a loose knit group of men who put the Lord first in their lives. They were the ones to carry the message of Good News that started a chain reaction reaching down to each of us here this evening. The Lord desires to involve us today—a school teacher, a truck driver, a housewife, a carpet layer, a pastor, a student, a janitor, a sales person. He wants to involve you. What would He have you do this year to truly be His disciple, yes, even a more daring one than you have ever been in the past?

■ 10. The Board of Evangelism report presented Sunday evening was approved.

■ 11. Harold Ankeny presented the treasurer's report, which consisted of the balance sheet and budget figures for the first six months of 1990, and the report of the Great Commission Program for 1989. (See Appendix)

Harold expressed appreciation to Gerald Lemmons who has volunteered many hours to the financial work of the Yearly Meeting.

Harold further reported that an anonymous donor has offered a \$10,000 challenge gift to any church unable to meet their "fair share" amount of the budget.

The treasurer's report was approved.

■ 12. Harold Ankeny reported on the annual meeting of Evangelical Friends International, formerly Evangelical Friends Alliance, that met in January, 1990

in Canton, Ohio. There are four commissions that carry on the work of EFI: Missions, Christian Education, Publication, and Youth. Our portion of the budget is \$60,000. Publication of the *Evangelical Friend* magazine has been reduced to six issues per year. Paul Anderson is the new editor. Nine attended the EFI meetings from Northwest Yearly Meeting. The report was approved.

■ 13. Clerk Mark Ankeny read the following report of Executive Council actions during the past year:

(a) Approved Mark Ankeny and Bill Rourke as representatives along with Superintendent Howard Harmon to the Western Gathering of Friends, November 17-18, 1989.

(b) Approved Barclay Press be allowed to establish a line of credit of up to \$20,000 at the U.S. National Bank.

(c) Approved Roy Clark, Bertie Roberts, Claude Lewis as additional appointments to Board of Ministerial Service.

Approved Philip Thornburg to serve on Council of Elders filling the unexpired term of Jack Willcuts.

Approved Philip Fendall to serve as Assistant Presiding Clerk filling the unexpired term of Richard Beebe.

Approved Louise Sargent to fill the unexpired term of Jack Willcuts on the Commission on Media.

(d) Approved John Lemmons and William Sims to serve on the GFC Board of Trustees (two-year terms), and Norman Winters to fill the unexpired term of Richard Beebe (three-year term).

(e) Approved the request of the Portland Korean Church to be an independent church not listed under NWYM.

(f) Approved recognizing as representatives those from NWYM who would like to attend (at their own expense) one of the three FWCC World Conference of Friends in Kenya, The Netherlands, or Honduras.

(g) Approved a final operating budget of \$580,000 for 1990.

(h) Approved the recommendation of the Post Falls Church and the five pastors from the Post Falls and Hayden Lake churches that the Silver Valley church be closed.

A home Bible study will continue. The church facilities will be sold.

(i) We recognize Howard Harmon has unique gifts of ministry. His gift of encouragement and loving pastoral ministry is commended. He has a deep concern for people and for reaching out to those who are outside the church. We believe the work of the Lord in the Yearly Meeting would be enhanced if he were released to minister in an area best suited to his gifts.

We, therefore, are united in reassigning him to a one-year position as Superintendent of Pastoral Ministries beginning August 1, 1990. The 1990 salary and housing allowance is \$32,820; benefits—\$7,515, for a total of \$40,335.

This position will be evaluated after six months following the beginning of service. The job description will be developed in consultation with the Administrative Committee of the Executive Council and appropriate boards.

We are united in extending a call to Retha McCutchen to serve as Superintendent of Evangelism and Prayer Ministries through June 30, 1992. The 1990 salary and housing allowance is \$25,236; benefits—\$6,497, for a total of \$31,733.

We are united in extending a call to Bruce Bishop to serve as Superintendent of Youth through June 30, 1992. The 1990 salary is \$16,176, benefits—\$5,024, for a total of \$21,200.

Mark Ankeny and Bill Rourke were appointed to share the action of the Council with Howard.

(j) Accepted the resignation of Howard Harmon effective June 30, 1991.

The report of the Executive Council was approved.

■ 14. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Vivian Thornburg.

■ 15. Assistant Clerk Philip Fendall opened the session with prayer.

■ 17. Howard Harmon introduced guests Gabriel and Suzanna Massey from India. Gabriel brought personal greetings. Gabriel is General Secretary of the Evangelical Fellowship of India, and Suzanna has been a teacher in the Union Biblical Seminary of India.

■ 18. A traveling minute for Virginia Helm to Friends United Meeting was read, and a response from FUM.

■ 19. Phil Smith, Clerk of the Board of Social Concerns reported.

BOARD OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

PHIL SMITH, CLERK

As co-clerk of the Board of Social Concerns, I am blessed to receive copies of each church's annual report. Thank you, each one of you, pastors and Social Concerns Committee clerks, for making these reports. They help direct the Board to the areas of concern laid on us by the Lord. They also encourage me by the scope and diversity of ministries undertaken by Friends.

Pro-life concerns, ministries to the homeless, prison and jail ministries, and hunger relief continue to head the list of local Social Concerns Committee work. Recently, and especially this year, the reports reflect growing involvement in environmental protection issues.

The Board, itself, has concentrated this year on publishing the newsletter, *Concern*, which has been well received by the churches. For financial reasons we only mail a few copies to each meeting; please make more copies as you need them for your church.

In response to a request from the Council of Elders, the Social Concerns Board spent much time this year considering a concern raised by a Friend that the anti-capital punishment position expressed in *Faith and Practice* did not square with Scripture. The process led us into a great deal of study, not only about the death penalty, but many related topics. Christians have long been deeply divided about such issues, and the Board has struggled to really hear the beliefs of both sides. We have been slow to reach agreement, but hope to finish our consideration of this concern during these Yearly Meeting sessions.

At the request of the Friendsview Manor Board, the Social Concerns Board appointed a committee to study possible future plans for the Manor and Friends ministry to the aged. This committee has reported to the Manor Board and the Social Concerns Board.

The Social Concerns Board wished to show its appreciation and approval of the weekend peace retreats organized by Bruce Bishop for high school youth. Accordingly, we have assumed the expense of providing some materials for these retreats. We hope to allocate money for a scholarship fund so more young people can attend these retreats.

The Thanksgiving offering this year will support the purchase of a mobile health clinic for La Paz, Bolivia. The clinic is a project of the Friends World Committee for Consultation. They hope to enlarge this service to the nationals of La Paz and surrounding area. More information will come to you about this project during these sessions and in the fall. Let us encourage one another to give generously!

We have found ourselves, in the gatherings of our board, praying that God would give our Yearly Meeting a new vision for His work among Friends during this time in the Northwest. Surely evangelism and social testimonies go

together. We invite you to pray with us for revival, a revival in which we come to see our society as God sees it.

The report was approved.

■ 20. The minutes of the Monday morning session were read and approved with minor additions.

■ 21. The following is the written report prepared by Howard Harmon from the Commission on Ethnic Ministries:

COMMISSION ON ETHNIC MINISTRIES

The Lord is bringing opportunity for Friends to minister within various cultures and ethnic groups to the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting. The Ethnic Ministries Commission encourages each congregation to look about their community for unreached people of differing ethnic background and minority groups to introduce them to the Lord. This year the Commission has been involved with three special groups.

A. The **Piedmont Church**, under the leadership of Aaron and Sharon Hamlin and Joshua and Virginia Phillips, continues to minister in the inner city of Portland. Besides Sunday school, worship services, and Bible studies, the church is heavily involved in ministries to the area. The Friends for Kids summer program this year is being held in three locations with 135 children and 15 staff members participating. The church building is a center for many community meetings and ministries. Both "One Church One Child," a program placing black children in black adoptive homes, and "Give Us This Day," a ministry placing black children in black homes on a temporary basis, meet in the church annex. These ministries are led by Virginia and Joshua Phillips, co-pastors of the church. All past attendees of Piedmont Friends are invited to return for a Piedmont Celebration Day for a time of remembrance. Pastor Hamlin will be sending the information about this special day in September.

B. The **Hispanic Ministries** are growing within NWYM:

(1) The **Newberg Hispanic** church continues to offer many services under the leadership of Gerardo and Lolita Ibarra, pastors. Worship services are held each Sunday at 11:15 a.m. in the Newberg Friends Center. Sunday school, counseling, Bible studies, youth meetings, help in securing a G.E.D. are all provided using the Spanish language. They have held revival services and sponsored special gatherings for the Hispanics in the area.

(2) **Hillsboro Friends** has a Spanish congregation meeting in the Hillsboro church under the leadership of Tony and Elizabeth Jeffrey. Often the Youth Chapel where they meet has standing room only with 50 or more attending. During the summer months, ministry is carried out in the migrant camps around Hillsboro. Individuals from the congregation bring messages each week. There is a need for a regular pastor able to minister to the congregation throughout the year.

(3) The **Eugene Friends Church**, under the leadership of Naomi Brown and Dorcas Mixer, has started a bi-lingual ministry for Spanish-speaking people. Vacation Bible school this year had a class for Spanish-speaking children. A bi-lingual baby shower provided an opportunity for the women to share baby care experiences from both cultures. Each Sunday on Eugene station KOR-AM, the church sponsors a bi-lingual radio program which features Spanish Christian music and Scripture. Leaders from the Eugene group have also assisted the Hillsboro church in providing children's ministries in the migrant camps.

The Spanish-speaking Friends met July 21 at the GFC tennis court for games and a devotional, with 120 in attendance. The workshop on Wednesday, July 25, at 1:00 p.m. on Ministering to Hispanics, led by Gerardo Ibarra and Dorcas Mixer, will be bi-lingual. Wednesday during the evening service there will be a Spanish interpreter.

C. The **Korean Church** continues to minister to the Korean community of the Portland area. This congregation, which began under the pastoral leadership of pastor Kwan Kyu and Jung Hun Kim, is now an independent church associated with NWYM. After months of illness, Pastor Kim passed away in May. The Lord blessed his life during the years in Portland and a strong spiritual church has been established. The prayers and encouragement of NWYM remain with pastors Eric and Linda Bach and the entire church.

Howard Harmon, representing the Commission on Ethnic Ministries, introduced Aaron Hamlin and Gerardo Ibarra.

Aaron spoke of the continuing work of Piedmont Friends Church, and especially their Friends for Kids Program. This program is recognized as one of the best programs for children in the city of Portland. Because of financial difficulties, the program will run for only six weeks rather than nine. Aaron encouraged continued prayer for their many needs.

Gerardo Ibarra, pastor of the Newberg Hispanic Friends Church, spoke of the encouraging ministry of his church, and that they are reaching many of their goals. "Knowing, obeying and serving Jesus" is their theme and goal. They have ministered to more than 300 people in the eight years of existence. Gerardo has a concern for more leadership and for programs for the alcoholic and drug abusers.

The report was approved.

■ 22. Aaron Hamlin reported on the National Black Evangelical Association. Their national convention will be held in Portland this year.

One of the most significant developments has been the consultations on the executive level between the National Association of Evangelicals and the NBEA on the issue of racism. A committee representing both organizations has met and formulated a statement on racism that both groups have accepted and are implementing.

The report was approved.

■ 23. Ron Stansell closed the morning session with prayer.

■ 25. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

■ 26. Paul Almquist, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 27. The Board of Education presented its report by the use of a parade representing the "Grand Festival of Christian Education" with participants illustrating the Sunday school, the Easter offering, new curriculum, the missionary books by Betty Hockett, the "Year of the Child," college and seminary scholarships. They reported there are 114 attending Youth Yearly Meeting and honored several Sunday schools that had experienced growth during the past year. The written report follows:

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

FRANK ENGLE, JR., CLERK

The Department of Church Education has been involved in providing services to equip Christian education programs in the local church. This has been done in a variety of ways:

Area Sunday School Brunches

Growth: A New Vision for the Sunday School authored by Charles Arn, Win Arn, and Donald McGavran, was the basis for area brunches for Christian

education clerks and Sunday school coordinators. Department members traveled to Salem, Friends Memorial, Talent, Meridian, Clackamas Park, and Spokane. Thirty-six churches were represented. Participants were challenged with ways of developing a Sunday school program that incorporates newer people into the church. Resources were also shared.

This year completes our second year in a four-year cycle of training throughout the Yearly Meeting. Year one was a review of the Christian Education Committee's responsibilities within the local church. Year three will include training for children's workers. Year four will focus on ministry to adults through Sunday school and small groups. We appreciate the Youthworker's Training Conference planned by our Superintendent of Youth each fall. We feel that his four-year rotational cycle creates a balanced training fellowship opportunity for the local church.

Let's Keep in Touch is a short questionnaire that has been sent to church education clerks twice this year to review their involvement progress in Christian education ministries within their local church. A newsletter has also been enclosed, sharing good ideas from other churches and listing NWYM Christian education progress and resources.

Yearly Meeting: Kick-off for "The Year of the Child." Each yearly meeting in EFI has been challenged to provide awareness education for relevant ministry to the needs of children in the 1990s. EFI will have several programs and resources available for local churches. This information and more will be shared at our Christian Education Luncheon/Workshop Wednesday, July 25. Dorothy Barratt, EFI Church Education Consultant, will be our guest speaker. In addition, other workshops are available throughout the week including, "Teaching Pre-Schoolers: Kid Tested Ideas," "Teaching Missions to Children," and "Children's Club's: An Overview."

Youth. We continue to appreciate the diligent work of Bruce Bishop, Superintendent of Youth and the Friends Youth Executive in the growing youth ministry within NWYM. Our department continues to desire to support and encourage their work.

Evangelical Friends International. Forty-three NWYM churches contributed a total of \$16,392.64 for EFI Easter offering. A total of \$102,184.38 across EFI exceeded the goal of \$90,000. These funds were directed towards training programs in Rwanda and for transportation needs in Mexico.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

RAWLEN SMITH, CLERK

The Educators directory was completed from information given to us by the churches. This was distributed at the Educators dinner at Yearly Meeting last year. We will be updating this with the reports from the churches in subsequent years.

During the 1989-1990 school year, 82 students at George Fox College received the three-way (Church/College/Yearly Meeting) matching funds of up to \$300 from each. The Yearly Meeting portion of this totaled \$18,657. Our budget for this was \$15,000 which left the college to cover the balance of the Yearly Meeting portion.

The majority of our ministerial scholarships this year was sent to students at Western Evangelical Seminary. Eight students received aid for seminary training totaling nearly \$9,000. Two others paid no tuition because of a tuition-remission agreement with George Fox College. During the coming year, five students will be completing seminary. As of Yearly Meeting time, we have seven inquiries for scholarships for Fall 1990. We have been working to compile a list of names and resumes of candidates for George Fox College Board of Trustees that the Executive Council can have at their disposal at all times. This should improve the knowledge of candidates and the selection process. Names of

potential candidates should be submitted to the clerk of the Department of General Education.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES

AARON O'NEILL, CLERK

This year the Department of Christian Testimonies has worked on a series of 13 bulletin inserts entitled "Famous Friends." We have also prepared a tract on alcoholism for teenagers. This tract was prepared from a message given by Richard Sartwell of Newberg Friends. Unfortunately, printing of these two publications was not possible due to a cut in our budget.

We continue to give library books to Western Evangelical Seminary and bind Quaker publications. We also completed the bibliography of Quaker materials at the WES library.

■ 28. Dr. Duane Beals, president of Western Evangelical Seminary gave his report. A written copy follows:

WESTERN EVANGELICAL SEMINARY

Western Evangelical Seminary opened for classes for the 43rd consecutive year on September 14, 1989, with 152 students in attendance. At the Fall convocation the following Monday, James A. Field, Ed.D., was installed as Academic Dean. The growth of the Seminary in the past several years has filled all available space.

A large classroom was utilized last year for the periodical section of the growing library, which now contains about 60,000 volumes. Some classes are being conducted off campus at the neighboring Evangelical Conference Center. One hundred ninety students enrolled for Winter Quarter. Morale on campus is high, and the spiritual climate is infectious.

The annual Board of Trustees meeting was held February 5 and 6, 1990. They received special reports about the financial affairs of the Seminary. The Capital Fund Campaign, which was authorized by the Trustees at its meeting last year, has been progressing well. The administration, faculty, and staff have completed their portion with 100 percent participation and almost \$80,000 pledged. Even the students are involved. In just two weeks they reached over 30 percent of their \$20,000 goal. Alumni and Trustees are just beginning their campaigns, and groundwork was laid at the Trustees meeting for the Campaign among local churches of the constituent denominations. You are encouraged to respond joyfully and generously when one of your peers solicits your participation in the Capital Fund Campaign.

The Trustees also approved a \$1,500,000.00 certificate indenture. Ten-year certificates bearing 9 percent interest will be offered to seminary constituency in the states of Oregon, Washington and Montana. The offerings will be properly registered with the Securities Division in each state. The money will be used to consolidate and refinance current debt at a lower interest rate, and to improve cash flow while the Capital Fund Campaign is being completed.

At the annual Corporation Dinner on February 5, 1990, the Rev. Clyde J. Zehr, General Superintendent of the Evangelical Methodist Church, was honored as Alumnus of the Year. Special Memorial Citations were presented to representatives of the families of William A. Bauman and V.A. Ballantyne, two long-time trustees who have entered into their heavenly reward.

The Trustees are still considering options for an enlarged campus to meet both present and future needs. The new property purchased within this past year is a viable option, but other possibilities are coming to the fore. The Administration and Board are moving ahead with careful and deliberate consideration. Once the first new building, most probably a library, is constructed, WES could be in the place for a long, long time. We pray with John the

Beloved, "Even so, come, Lord Jesus" (Revelation 22:20); but we build for the future in case He tarries.

Western Evangelical Seminary has not changed its commitment to the historic ethos and theology of the constituency. WES continues to prepare graduates—armed with the Word and empowered by the Spirit—to serve Christ through His Church. We solicit your good will and positive spokespersonship. WES is your seminary.

The report was approved.

■ 29. The Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship report was given by president Virginia Helm. Their written report follows:

FRIENDS WOMEN MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP

VIRGINIA HELM, PRESIDENT

Concern: In these times of economic and family crisis, it is difficult for many women to be active in the missionary fellowships. Still their attendance is badly needed. Our missionaries, nationals, and Mission Board need the support of all the women, the back-bone of service, prayer, and communication in the meeting. The older women need the encouragement of the younger ones and the men as well.

Data of Interest: Of the 29 fellowships turning in reports in time for this summary, there are 343 members with an average attendance of 337. Fifty-two speakers were listed, some from within the Christian community as well as those who expressed the concerns of our own Yearly Meeting and E.F.I. Twenty-two groups used the program books. These are excellent materials that both men and women, young and old, will find enlightening if placed in church libraries. Anna Nixon is the editor. The membership increased its understanding by reading 3,175 books in nine categories. Those who read the most will be honored at Yearly Meeting or at retreat.

Finances: Only a small percentage of the dues are used for administration in the FWMF or EFI-WMF. The salary of the pastors at Deschutes Friends Church in Bend, Oregon has been supplemented these past three years as a Home Mission project. The Chapmans' salary was partially paid until they came home from Bolivia on furlough and then we supported the Knights partially while they serve in Bolivia and Peru. The Spring Rally offerings purchased curtains and pillows for the guest apartment at the Arequipa Center in Peru. The banquet offering will buy some needed furnishings.

More Foreign Projects: The women have chosen to sponsor other projects in our fields such as outfitting new missionaries and those coming home. There have been contributions for the support of the Cammacks, the Knights, and the Perishos. Gifts were given for the missionary Christmas retreat, for the extension and resident Bible schools, the work in San Julian, pastoral training and emergency medical assistance. Support was given for the work team to Peru. Some fellowships gave the youth financial support for their trips to the Philippines and Mexico. Clothing was sorted for the Mexico Get Away Give Away trip. Offerings for Rwanda were taken. Some women gave through WGM, OMS, World Vision, for the Cadds in the Philippines, and other organizations doing excellent work in areas of our concern.

Home Missions: Native Americans were remembered with gifts to Indian Missions, S.W. Indian School, and Rough Rock. Service at home was not neglected. Fourteen fellowships reported quilting activities for fundraising or to give to the needy. There were also pillow slips and sheets given. Many plates and baskets of food were given to food banks, homes for rehabilitation, and retirement centers. Some supported Lambert House Day Care for the Elderly in Portland. Help was given for the restoration of a care center. Crisis Pregnancy Centers were supported financially and with clothing. A shower was given to a

Russian refugee. Scholarships were presented to youth for Greenleaf Academy. City missions received financial and practical support. Piedmont Friends Church and Grace Collins Community Center in the inner city of Portland received gifts. Some gave to the Police Chaplaincy Fund and for San Francisco Earthquake Relief.

Church Property and Parsonages: These were not overlooked. Sometimes women gave rooms thorough cleaning. Sunday school rooms were painted, rest-rooms and kitchens refurbished. Purchases included a screen door, a refrigerator, siding for a church and parsonage, a church sign, chairs, sofas, and blinds for lounges or fellowship halls. Churches received dishes and tablecloths. Some meetings reported ordering "Keeping Current." Others took inventory and made a pocket-sized list of members and attenders. Monetary gifts were given to camps and hours of labor as well. Concerned Friends gave to extension churches. While many contributions were freewill offerings, some used coupons, labels, and receipts as fundraisers. Dinners were cooked for groups and many kinds of sales and bazaars staged. Some saved stamps, recycled, sold cookbooks and coupon books. New ideas expressed this year are making pizza, baked potato parties, Eat for Retreat and collecting pennies.

Prayer, Communication and Fellowship: Of course, the women are busy providing activities for fellowship such as holiday meals, showers, receptions, and meals for bereaved. They cooperated with missionary committees for Mission Conferences and Fairs. Some have secret sisters and prayer partners as well as prayer chains. We cannot place too much emphasis or importance on the value of women's prayer, the greeting cards, letters sent, and gifts for birthdays and anniversaries of missionaries. We appreciate those who planned the retreats at Twin Rocks and Quaker Hill. This year our combined retreat will be in Pendleton, October 4-7.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

The Board of Stewardship has continued in its effort to provide materials for churches to use in promoting stewardship in the local church. Local stewardship clerks and pastors had the following resources available:

(a) A Stewardship Manual, produced July, 1989.

(b) A resource of recommended books on stewardship, available at Barclay Press, and other materials in the Yearly Meeting office.

(c) Materials available in October during promotion of the Great Commission Program budget.

(d) A survey of stewardship education and promotion efforts in the local church.

Stewardship Education

At the time of this report, 60 percent of the churches returned the stewardship survey. There appears to be a concerted effort to budget and manage funds responsibly. All but two churches use budgets. All churches reported careful monitoring of income to avoid over expenditure. Record keeping and accurate reporting is an encouraging pattern in practicing good stewardship.

Very few of the churches have used available resources purchased by the Board and made available through the Yearly Meeting office. A few of the churches report a year-round stewardship emphasis with positive results. A number of churches emphasize stewardship through the use of testimonies on tithing or witnessing to God's provision during times of financial distress. There is also an emphasis on recognizing volunteers and other "in-kind" gifts.

GREAT COMMISSION PROGRAM AND FINANCIAL ACCOUNTING

Financial Accounting

Although income is up slightly, we have not decreased the deficit accumulated over several years. Refer to the Treasurer's report for further information. In December, Goldie Cline (Newberg Friends) became the Yearly Meeting bookkeeper, with Retha McCutchen acting as the "on site" advisor. In February of this year, Gerald Lemmons (Rose Valley Friends) volunteered to install a new computerized accounting system, making it retroactive to January 1, 1990. His many, many hours of work are deeply appreciated and the new reports are being used by boards for the first time during Yearly Meeting. He has agreed to serve as assistant treasurer.

Great Commission Program

October was designated Stewardship Emphasis Month. Almost every church took advantage of the Great Commission Program "presenters" made available by the Board. Similar to a jigsaw puzzle, the picture is incomplete unless every program God has called us to fulfill is funded adequately. Twenty-seven churches accepted the challenge to increase their 1990 GCP pledge by six percent over their 1989 pledge. The 1990 income expectation approved at Yearly Meeting a year ago was \$604,000. In February, the income goal was reduced to \$580,000 with the budget adjusted downward accordingly. Churches pledged \$540,000 with the balance coming from individuals and organizations. An anonymous donor pledged another \$10,000 as an incentive for certain churches. The challenge is:

"Any church which did not pledge sufficient funds to meet or exceed the amount computed to be its 1990 Great Commission 'Fair Share' will be eligible for a 1990 \$10,000 GCP challenge grant."

Twenty-six churches are eligible to participate. Grant funds are released when an eligible church pays an amount equal to its 1989 pledge plus six percent.

Through the generosity of many individuals, churches, and funds from the Great Commission Program, the 1988 worker's compensation debt has been reduced from \$135,000 to about \$80,000. Thanks be to God for gently reminding people about this need.

The success of the Board of Stewardship in educating and promoting stewardship is dependent on the ministry of local stewards, pastors, and area

secretaries. Let us work together to see that the great work God has called us to fulfill does not suffer for lack of resources.

The report was approved.

Howard Harmon expressed appreciation for the work of Harold Ankeny as clerk of the Board of Stewardship, and his service to the Yearly Meeting.

■ 37. Clerk of the Commission on Media, Margaret Lemmons, presented their report.

COMMISSION ON MEDIA

MARGARET LEMMONS, CLERK

The focus of the Commission on Media remains on the importance of improving communication skills through written and visual tools. We encourage writers' groups and are available to help start any additional groups or to meet with existing ones. We are also offering professional critiquing of manuscripts during Yearly Meeting sessions, as well as sponsoring workshops and the traditional Writers' Dinner, this year featuring Kin Millen, Acquisitions Editor for Baker Books.

The Commission is also very concerned that the churches be aware of and make use of increasing video material and technology. We are compiling a list of fax numbers through which the Yearly Meeting headquarters can easily communicate with individual churches. If a church does not have its own fax machine, it is suggested that a local fax service number be provided.

Publishing is the major thrust of the Commission through its association with Barclay Press. Dan McCracken, Press manager, continues to maintain high-quality printing with an ever-increasing ministry in publishing. The dedicated staff of the Press and the Barclay Press Board of Directors have given invaluable assistance in the growth and vision of Barclay Press. Additional information about the active mission of Barclay Press is included in the report that follows.

Yearly Meeting Archivist Frank Cole encourages churches, boards, and committees to be diligent in keeping records of all events and to send this information to the Archives. If there is a doubt as to the historical value of any items, he stresses the need to let the archivist make this decision.

Finally, The Media Commission cooperates with the Evangelical Friends International—North America Region in the publication of the *Evangelical Friend*. We deeply appreciate the work of Lon Fendall, retiring editor, and look forward to the leadership of new editor Paul Anderson who assumes this responsibility with the July-August issue.

BARCLAY PRESS REPORT

DAN MCCrackEN, MANAGER

The Thirtieth Anniversary Celebration Dinner on October 7, 1989, attracted 136 supporters of the ministry of Barclay Press. The evening included the recounting of God's blessing on Barclay Press and a look at the new frontiers of expanding ministry. Gifts and pledges to the NWYM Publishing Fund were made that totaled nearly \$15,000. This fund is used to provide capital that serves as a revolving fund for book publishing and marketing.

Just off the press in time for Yearly Meeting is the book *Christians in the Crossfire* by Mark McMinn and James Foster. This book is already receiving interest beyond our normal constituency and is expected to be a great opportunity to reach a broader audience. Back to Square One is another new publication. This is a booklet about turning losses into spiritual gain from messages of Arthur O. Roberts given at Adult Fellowship Camp last year. Barclay Press continues to serve the printing needs of the Yearly Meeting and associated organiza-

tions. At the same time, the Press is available to serve other churches and non-profit organizations as well as doing some commercial printing. Current full-time staff members are Dick Eichenberger, Dennis Headrick, Sharon Holdahl, Katy Matchette, Alice Maurer, Dan McCracken, and Les Petersen. Part-time people who serve on a regular basis include Jean Clark, Susan Fawver, Rachel Hinshaw, Nancy Thomas, and Janelle Townsend. The dedication of the staff is a prime ingredient in the effectiveness of Barclay Press.

The Barclay Press Board of Directors has provided leadership in the business and financial matters of the Press, while the Media Commission provides counsel and direction for the publishing ministry. The prayers and support of NWYM are much appreciated as we respond to the opportunities for outreach through the printed page.

A clever skit promoting the *Evangelical Friend* magazine was presented by members of the Commission. Margaret Lemmons introduced Paul Anderson, new editor of the *Evangelical Friend*. He emphasized the importance of the magazine with three words:

- (a) Quality—we have one of the best Quaker publications in America.
- (b) Value—great value as a resource in our churches and Sunday schools, and,
- (c) Interest—ideas and visions can be passed from one yearly meeting to another.

There are some changes in the magazine. It has gone from a monthly publication to a bi-monthly; some of the local church news has been eliminated, as have the vital statistics—births, deaths, and marriages. Input was requested on this last item.

The report was approved.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

LOUISE GEORGE, CLERK

Sixty years ago in annual sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting, Friends in the Northwest assumed responsibility for the fledgling mission program already begun in La Paz, Bolivia. Seventy-five believers were counted among the work begun by the Friends Mission in Guatemala.

Today, Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends can look back down those years and see how far the Gospel has spread. From the streets of La Paz, pushing out into high plains communities the Word of God has been proclaimed. Friends churches dot the shores of Lake Titicaca and are scattered up and down the valleys that spill down into the Amazon basin from the Andes mountains. Missionaries have taken the Gospel to migrating Aymaras in Santa Cruz, to the jungle colonies of San Julian, and back again to plant new churches among those flocking to the city of La Paz.

In 1961, missionaries crossed the border into Peru and preached God's Word there. What began along Lake Titicaca's Peruvian shores has spread into the hills, down to the coast to Tacna and Ilo, and up to the teeming city of Arequipa.

Now, though statistics are hard to gather, more than 7,000 believers make up Friends churches in Bolivia and Peru Yearly Meetings.

Bible schools have been established to train leaders. A seminary was begun in La Paz, in conjunction with other evangelical mission groups. Second and third generation believers are now leading churches in both Bolivia and Peru. Friends were involved in establishing the first Evangelical University in Bolivia.

During all of these years, the mission has determined to keep reaching into unreached pockets of people while continuing to train and nurture believers. One major challenge is reaching the thousands of immigrants moving into major cities in Bolivia and Peru. Another is pushing down into the Amazon basin in Bolivia where new settlements are opening up. And still there are countless communities in the hills and valleys surrounding Lake Titicaca and down in the basin areas that have never yet heard the Gospel message.

Northwest Yearly Meeting is facing the great challenge of the 90s: reaching the still-unreached people in Bolivia and Peru. Together with Christians in those countries, we must find ways of evangelizing together. We must rely on each other to accomplish the task of reaching all of Bolivia and Peru for Christ.

But our responsibilities don't stop with the borders of Bolivia and Peru. As a member of EFI-NA, we share in the support of mission work in Rwanda, Mexico City, the Philippines, Bolivian University, and Rough Rock Mission in Arizona. We join with Mid-America Yearly Meeting in their work in Burundi, and Eastern Region's work in Hong Kong, India, and Taiwan. As Friends, we are learning to join hands around the globe in an effort to encompass the world for Jesus Christ.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION

James Morris, executive director of EFM, along with Duane Comfort, executive assistant, have provided valuable leadership to the joint mission projects of member yearly meetings. Duane began a prayer program this year with the goal of signing up 1,000 prayer partners to pray specifically for field requests. More than 600 pray-ers have now committed to supporting EFM prayer concerns.

Alfred and Ruth Miller were placed under appointment in May to serve in Rwanda for one year, replacing furloughing missionaries. Churches continue to grow, and the need for missionary personnel continues to grow as well. Yearly meeting churches across EFI-NA generously gave again for this year's Easter Offering with receipts from 43 NWYM churches totaling \$16,392.64; with a total of \$102,184.38 from across EFI.

Manuel and Brenda Chavarria are finishing their language school work in Costa Rica this summer before beginning ministry in Mexico City. Tim and Kathy Fox submitted their resignation from mission work in Mexico City. David and Joyce Byrne continue to serve there.

The Friends churches in the Philippines face some difficult times as their country is experiencing political and economic upheaval. Prayer is needed for the leaders in these meetings, as well as for the country.

Mark and Wilma Roberts served this past year at Rough Rock in Arizona. Much directed prayer is needed to break the power of darkness over this place. Friends across America are encouraged to accept the challenge to pray daily for God's Spirit to bring victory among the Navajo people.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Fields:

Two couples on each of the fields of Bolivia and Peru represent our missions staff. Though we continue to operate with fewer missionaries than we need to carry on our work load, we have seen the wonderful way the Lord has provided help and strength for their needs in difficult situations. We are grateful for their commitment to Christ Jesus and the Great Commission.

Bolivia

Ed and Marie Cammack returned from furlough a year ago to Peru where they moved their household belongings to Caranavi, Bolivia. The Mesa Directiva (executive council) of Bolivia Yearly Meeting requested a missionary to live in Caranavi to give some help in combating a serious influx of false doctrines among Friends churches. It was also the desire of the leadership to get some help in planting new churches in new settlements of the Alto Beni area. Ed and Marie have been providing excellent leadership. The Mesa Directiva and those in the Caranavi District express high appreciation for the work being done by the Cammacks.

Roscoe and Tina Knight also returned to La Paz last summer, having been appointed by the Board as Field Administrators for both Bolivia and Peru. Their responsibilities included traveling to Peru to meet with the Peruvian Mission Council as well as the Peruvian Yearly Meeting Executive Council. They have served on the Bolivian Mission Council also, and met with the Bolivian Mesa Directiva as requested. Their return to the field has provided support and encouragement for the new mission staff on both fields. They have also offered counsel and encouragement to the Bolivian Mesa Directiva when asked.

Bruce and Jan Allen, with children Elsa and Eben, continue to serve with CALA in the production of Aymara Christian Literature. As associate missionaries with Northwest Yearly Meeting, they have participated in Bolivian Mission Council meetings. We appreciate the valuable ministry Allens have assumed in their role with CALA.

Due in part to an emphasis on church growth this past year under Francisco Mamani's leadership, twenty-one new churches were begun. Their motto has been, "Each church start a new one."

A highlight of the year was the Triennial Conference. Since each District has its own yearly conference, there has been no gathering for many years of the entire Yearly Meeting, except for Representatives' Meetings. The triennial was a time of spiritual emphasis for a congregation representing the entire Yearly Meeting. Some 1,400 attended this first gathering.

The Yearly Meeting is making adjustment to the leadership of new national church president, Patricio Medrano, who replaced Francisco Mamani at the end of his three-year term. Francisco's leadership was marked by progressive and visionary thinking that led the church into renewed evangelistic efforts. The newly elected Mesa Directiva is continuing to stress evangelism and the necessity of starting new churches. 1990 is to be the year for "Preparing Leaders."

Peru

Dan and Tami Cammack, along with son Forrest and baby daughter Rebekah, served in Arequipa this past year. Dan assumed responsibility for helping develop and implement the curriculum for the new Bible school in the recently purchased Center in Arequipa. Appreciation is expressed to Dan and Tami for carrying on faithfully, overseeing the coastal and Arequipa work.

Ken and Tonya Comfort worked on the Sierra in Juli, living somewhat isolated much of the year. They have carried the responsibility of working with more than fifty congregations scattered throughout the high plains around Lake Titicaca on the Peruvian side. Even in the midst of unsettling political problems within the country, and some health problems, Ken and Tonya have served very well. We are grateful for them and their dedication.

Bolivian national missionary, Benito Apaza and his family, continue to live in Ilave and work closely with Peruvian Friends leaders. Leonardo Tola terminated his service with the mission in Arequipa and returned to Bolivia. The importance of these men's ministries is difficult to measure. Eduardo Mamani from Bolivia spent two months in Arequipa ably teaching in the first Bible School sessions.

In June, a work team made up of Randy Morse, Carl Sandoz, Eric Palmer, Conrad Schmeltzer, Geraldine Willcuts, and William and Esther May Thomas went to Arequipa to do extensive plumbing and electrical renovations on the building purchased for use as a Center. Their fine work and spirit of servanthood are appreciated deeply by the Peruvian church, as well as the Board.

Francisco Maquera continues as president of the executive council of the national church in Peru. His leadership, which places heavy demands on the mission, makes for stressful working relationships. The positive side is that many members of the Mesa Directiva seem to be accepting and following through with their responsibilities.

In 1989 there were seven extension Bible school centers functioning with seventy-one students. Three national teachers, plus Bolivian missionary Benito Apaza, taught courses. This is one program that is successfully moving forward with national church leadership.

Pastors' retreats were held by the Mission for both Coastal and Sierra pastors. There was good response to these leadership seminars. Fifty-five active congregations are accounted for on the Sierra, after five groups left because of a divisive doctrinal dispute that resulted in disciplinary action by the Mesa Directiva. Ten groups are included in the Coastal supervision.

The factors that have affected the churches most this past year are the overwhelming economic problems within the country of Peru. Leadership problems among the churches and Mesa Directiva have caused some disunity. Late planting rains caused a severe drought on the Sierra which greatly increased the heavy economic burden already carried by the Aymara farmers.

For the first time since missionaries began work in Peru in 1961, we will have no resident missionaries living on the Sierra because of a shortage of mission staff. Bolivian missionary Benito Apaza and family will continue there this year, and will be visited by Dan Cammacks and later by Perishos, as well as Knights. Prayer is needed for the president of the Peruvian national church, as well as other leaders.

Future

We enter the decade of the 1990's with a keen sense of urgency to continue to add to the church, to train leaders, to make disciples, and to encourage our brethren in Bolivia and Peru as well as other EFM fields to become Great Commission Christians themselves and find ways to reach those communities and tribes not yet reached with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We must find ways to join hands to reach the world for Christ.

A short video of Ron Woodward interviewing an African pastor in Nairobi was shown.

Warren announced that the Board of Missions, working with the Board of Stewards, is considering a plan to have people pledge shares to help finance the salaries of missionary couples. This may be done on a trial basis.

The report was approved.

- 42. The written report of the Friends Youth Executive Committee follows:

Friends Youth Executive Committee

MELANIE WEIDNER, SECRETARY

The 1989-90 Friends Youth Executive Committee met weekly for business on the George Fox College campus. The 20 members of FYE elected as their purpose a desire to be instruments used by God to encourage leadership, spiritual growth, and unity among the youth of the Yearly Meeting. The goal of the 89-90 year was to establish greater contact with Yearly Meeting youth, becoming more aware of their needs in order to provide ministry and prayer support for them. At Fall and Spring Advance planning retreats, the group especially strategized to meet these intents. Many FYE members visited several local congrega-

tions and youth groups in order to better identify with NWYM young people and to promote Yearly Meeting-level involvement. Yearly Meeting Youth Superintendent intern, who this last year was Erik Edmondson, meets weekly with the group during fall semester and serves as another direct tie to the youth themselves. The Exec as a whole worked throughout the year to update and write a new FYE Policy Handbook published and approved at Spring Advance. This ambitious project helped to clarify all procedures and organize future operation of the FYE.

Five committees carry out most of the organizational and planning efforts for each of FYE's services to NWYM youth. Matthew Zoller served as clerk for the *Quaker Noats* newsletter, published three times during the year. An average of 1,000 NWYM youth and youthworkers receive the reports on YM youth events, upcoming attractions, faces and places in NWYM, and cover stories focusing on relevant issues from Scripture. Looking toward next year and reviewing survey results, this committee may change *Quaker Noats* format, possibly working to create a single yearbook/mini magazine-type publication.

Don Hodgdon and the MidWinter committee once again planned the high-caliber retreat which our youth have come to expect. MidWinter '89, "The Next Step," held at Twin Rocks Friends Camp on the Oregon coast, focused on serious commitment and answers to "What comes now?" following the salvation prayer. Fifty-one campers and about sixteen staff quickly became a close-knit group ready to learn under the leadership of seminar directors Bruce Bishop, Jeff Blodgett and Ron Mulkey, and main camp speaker Paul Bock who unashamedly opened his experience and seriously challenged the entire group. Each session offered an outstanding message and convicting theme. Successful variations on camp tradition included an extra-long cabin/counselor morning activity time and an all-camp talent night boasting extraordinary silliness along with some genuine talent, held New Year's Eve. Next year's retreat will, no doubt, include these and more as the location rotates to Quaker Hill Camp in Idaho.

On April 20-21, 1990, over 450 Friends high school students gathered at George Fox College for the Annual NWYM Volleyball Tournament. Newberg, Sherwood, North Valley, and West Chehalem Friends churches helped to house these students and their leaders Friday and Saturday nights. The 43 teams, including 7 entered in the competitive "Quaker" division, played for fun, fellowship, and sport on three courts in the GFC gym Friday night and all day Saturday, ending with a worship and awards assembly at Closing Ceremonies in Bauman Auditorium. Svensen Friends and Twin Lakes were recognized for first-time attendance. Many teams then invaded local pizza establishments for even more fellowship! The junior high Bible quizzers joined this group as well.

This year's tournament opened a second consolation bracket for the bottom-half finishers in the less competitive "Friends" division, allowing every team to play at least one play-off game. This positive change improved the students' attitudes and made for a much more enjoyable tournament. Many, many teams exhibited marvelous characteristics of enthusiasm, team spirit, encouraging ways and positive attitudes, but Talent Friends "B" team edged out the rest for the highly-prized Sportsmanship Award. Top finishers in each division were: Friends "A": Marion (1), Boise (2), South Salem (3); Friends "B": Hayden Lake (1), North Valley (2), West Chehalem (3); and Quaker: Talent (1), Vancouver (2), Greenleaf (3).

While exploring other areas for growth, FYE decided this year to take on another project responsibility. In the process of designing the committee structure for a new music/drama venture, FYE created an umbrella title under which to incorporate it as well as the YCEW program and any future outgrowths. This umbrella, entitled "Youth Challenge," serves as a unifier of purpose and publicity. The Friends Youth Exec's aim through these "YC" programs is to provide

ministry opportunities for NWYM high school students, enabling them to learn and grow during the process of ministry.

The music/drama experience took on the name YCAM, "Youth Challenged through Arts in Ministry," and a new committee began work to implement plans for a 15-member team that would present a program while touring Friends churches in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho for the three weeks concurrent to YCEW's trip. They would conclude at Yearly Meeting for evaluation and a final performance. However, due to short notice and an insufficient amount of applications, the first tour was postponed until the summer of 1991. Work done this year to organize the program should ease next year's process.

"Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview," (YCEW) travelled to the Philippines June 18-July 10. For the first time, the YCEW committee received more applications than it could accept, both a difficult and exciting situation. Leaders Louise Powell and Erik Edmundson aided in the struggle to choose a team of eight outstanding NWYM high school students responsible to raise \$1,500 and prayer support for their venture. Team members this year were: Catherine Fisher, Hayden Lake; Ian Goetting, Silverton; Nathan Hanson and Tiffany Hayes, East Hill; Kyle Holveck, North Valley; Angie Milam and Greg Woolsey, Medford; and Susanna Morse, Reedwood. The group worked in two Friends churches there, pouring cement and laying tile among other tasks. Members also were able to meet one-on-one with nationals and were given the chance to speak at a non-Christian university, a real witness opportunity. A visit to Smokey Mountain, local long-standing garbage dump where the poor live who can afford no land elsewhere, profoundly affected many in the team as they faced poverty firsthand. Each one came home tired but rewarded by the experience. (The YCEW team reports several times during Yearly Meeting sessions.)

The Friends Youth Exec. looks forward to success serving the NWYM youth during the '90-91 year with new organization and zeal for its programs. This next year's officers are: Matthew Zoller and Keri Kimberly-*Quaker Noats*; Don Hodgdon—MidWinter; Paulie Ziemann—Volleyball; Mike McConaughy and Erik Edmundson—YCAM; Carleta Baker—YCEW; Mandie Milam—Secretary; Heidi Longstroth—Publicity; Ron Hampton—Treasurer; Chris Davis—Assistant Clerk, and Melanie Weidner—Clerk. Meetings begin at the start of September, and Fall Advance planning retreat is scheduled for September 14-15, 1990.

The Youth Exec. appreciates the support of the Education Board and the opportunity to be officially connected with the Yearly Meeting in this way. Each year \$400 comes from the Ed Board to fund mainly the *Quaker Noats* publications, though all else is self-supportive with the Volleyball Tournament bringing in most of the operating funds. Just like all NWYM committees, FYE members volunteer their time and energies and work creatively to meet costs.

Our ties to NWYM are important as we seek to serve and learn in the experience of working with the Exec. Please do not hesitate to contact us with encouragement, concern, ideas, etc. We wholeheartedly welcome your involvement as fellow workers in Christ! I appreciate a new effort to foster "connectedness" between FYE and NWYM and especially want to express gratitude for your interest in our work and your prayers for us.

Junior High Minutes, Youth Yearly Meeting

July 22, 1990—The first business meeting was held in Sutton basement with Abbie Cohen presiding.

The business items on the agenda were nominations of next year's officers, and pairing up with adults to exchange letters and prayers throughout the year. We decided to go ahead with the matchup.

Our assistant clerk, Dan Livingston, read several epistles from other yearly meetings around the world. Chanda Walker, recording clerk, read last year's NWYM epistle.

Several people explained the concept of consensus to us and others shared about Bible quizzing. We divided into three commissions: Elders, Family Life Survey, and Grief/Magazine Review. After separating into the three groups, the meeting was adjourned in prayer by Abbie Cohen.

July 23—Abbie Cohen presided over the second business meeting. She explained once again the commissions for any newcomers, and we divided into our three commissions for the remainder of the meeting.

July 24—Abbie Cohen presided again, and we divided into our three commissions.

July 25—The highlights of Wednesday's business meeting were as follows: Abbie Cohen opened with prayer.

Business: New officers were recommended by the officer's committee and approved by the general assembly with some discussion over the choice of the presiding clerk. Next year's officers will be: Presiding Clerk—Dan Livingston, McKinley Hill; Assistant Clerk—Brennan Koch, McCall; Recording Clerk—Jesse Morse, Reedwood; Conference Coordinator—Jed Penna, Clackamas Park.

Chanda Walker read this year's epistle and minutes which were both approved. The recording clerk of each commission read their minutes. The Family Life Survey Commission passed out a survey on music. The results of the music survey found that while most kids approved of censorship of music that depicted violence, crude language, drug and alcohol abuse, sex, and satanism, more than half listened to styles of music generally associated with such depictions. It did not appear that kids were more attracted by beat and rhythm than lyrical content of music. About one-third of the kids stated they would listen to the music even if asked not to by parents. A huge majority expressed interest in listening to a Christian radio station that played more popular styles of contemporary Christian music.

Family Life Commission read their minutes on the review of *Brio* and *Breakaway* magazines which they found to be interesting but lacking in depth. The Elders Commission read their minutes and told about church membership. They NWYM young Friends have been talking about membership. Membership is neither good nor bad. Some good points are that the church would fall apart without it, but let's say a person's job is bad and he/she can't find time to become a member. We think membership should not have so many requirements so people like that can be on the committees. We also think people who believe in other things, like physical baptism for instance, can still become members if they acknowledge our ways. Then people say that the church isn't growing when we're not letting people become members. The truth is it's not growing, period. If you become a member, you should really want to love the Lord, not because it's the Christian thing to do. To wrap up, there are changes that can be made in membership requirements. Thank you, David Fendall, for coming and sharing with us.

We had an open question/answer session with the presiding clerk of each commission about what they discussed.

High School Minutes, Youth Yearly Meeting

July 23, 1990—Presiding Clerk Trey Doty opened in prayer, thanking God for the car wash service project, and asking for help during our business meetings.

Assistant Clerk Debbie Sartwell led devotions on the subject of worry, and referred to Matthew 6:25-27 and Philippians 4:4-9.

A description of consensus was given by Trey. Each officer described the position he/she held, and nominations for next year's officers were taken. The procedure for finding next year's officers was explained. Nominations were taken for next year's representative to Mid-America Yearly Meeting.

Debbie read several epistles from other yearly meetings, including the Quaker Youth Pilgrimage, Australian Young Friends, Eastern Region, New England, and the Netherlands.

Trey explained the subjects discussed at Midyear Boards. Bruce Bishop talked about Midwinter and Youthquake. The report on Youth Yearly Meeting was approved.

■ 45. Don Lamm presented the report for Greenleaf Friends Academy. The school has been in operation for 80 years. Donald Stump has resigned as superintendent and has returned to Alaska. Don Harvey from Mt. Gilead, Ohio, has been secured to replace Donald Stump. He will be arriving by August 6.

Don Lamm reported all the faculty has been hired for the coming year. Staff morale has improved. Enrollment has increased. The indebtedness of the Academy has been reduced from over \$500,000 to \$150,000. He announced the fundraising project of an antique tractor pull August 25.

Arthur Roberts expressed appreciation for the work of Donald Stump.

The report was approved.

■ 46. LeRoy Benham, clerk of the Barclay Press Board of Directors presented the following proposal. This has been approved by the Commission on Media and the Executive Council:

"It is the recommendation of the Barclay Press Board of Directors that the organizational form of Barclay Press be changed from its current status as an assumed business name under NWYM to a separate corporation under the laws of the state of Oregon. We recommend that Northwest Yearly Meeting be the exclusive holder of voting stock.

"This corporation, owned by the Yearly Meeting, would be taxed on any profits earned and would pay property taxes for the facility it would occupy. This form of organization would better insulate the Yearly Meeting from tax, insurance, or any other form of financial liability. At the present there are no liability limits.

"The recommended form of organization would allow Barclay Press to retain its position as a ministry of NWYM and at the same time more aggressively expand its market and effectiveness. Revenue from commercial printing would help support the high costs of printing technology, and profits would further assist Gospel proclamation through the printed page.

"We anticipate that Barclay Press would be accountable to NWYM through the Board of Directors named by the Yearly Meeting. We would expect the Commission on Media to work directly with Barclay Press in developing and promoting printed material on behalf of the Yearly Meeting. The Media Commission will continue to be responsible for the NWYM Publishing Fund as a capital fund for publishing and will be the body that authorizes the use of funds.

Gifts to the fund would continue to be received by the Yearly Meeting and would be tax deductible. The Barclay Press Board of Directors would report to the Commission on Media annually. The Commission on Media would continue to be responsible to insure that the printing and publishing needs of the church are served, and set forth editorial and publication policies for Barclay Press.

"This organization form would allow for the addition of capital by means of the sale of preferred stock to friendly investors. Investors with an interest in the ministry of Barclay Press could buy non-voting preferred stock that would provide growth capital. This stock would not have any control on Barclay Press and would earn a set rate of interest for the investor. Ordinarily, preferred stock is repaid before any distribution to common stock.

"It is our belief that the present and future opportunities of our Friends publishing ministry will be best served through the establishment of Barclay Press as a corporation. It will more accurately and efficiently represent the status of the business and help to facilitate the growth that is important to its future vitality."

The by-laws and charter will be developed this fall and will be subject to approval at Midyear Board Meetings.

The recommendation was approved.

■ 47. Earl Geil, pastor at Cherry Grove Friends Church, closed the session with prayer.

■ 48. The minutes of the Wednesday afternoon session were read and approved as corrected.

■ 49. Marvin Kistler, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting gave his testimony.

■ 50. Gil George, Clerk of the Board of Evangelism, presented their written report:

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

It was just six years ago this fall that the Holy Spirit fell on the fall retreat of the Board of Evangelism. The agenda was laid aside as they spent those three days in prayer before the Lord. It was a time of brokenness and tears; of deep concern for declining attendance; of great hunger to know what God wanted us to be and to do. Out of those days came a deep burden for the lost and a powerful vision of "a people to be gathered" by planting new churches. The dream was a large one; to plant a new church in each area each year. Yet it took a large dream for us to see our total dependence upon God to do it and to see the need for new procedures, policies, and operations that would be necessary to make the dream a reality. A prayer movement known as Prayer Warrior began to undergird the effort with prayer. A consultant, Rick Hunt, was secured to create the operations that would be needed. Then Retha McCutchen came to serve as "project manager" giving supervision to church planting efforts. Her expertise and administrative ability has been instrumental in refining and implementing the new policies and operations. God has blessed this effort and five healthy churches are the result so far. This is miraculous in that many denominations consider a 50 percent success rate as praiseworthy.

These projects have been funded in large measure by funds received from the sale of closed churches. Those funds are now depleted. Therefore, we stand at a very important point of decision as a Yearly Meeting. Is our faith in God and our commitment to the Great Commission strong enough to compel us to support church planting/renewal financially? As a Board, we urge the entire Yearly Meeting to join us in the following commitments:

We are committed to the mission of God to save the lost.

"God is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." He invites us to be co-laborers with Him in this work. We believe that the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus as held by Friends is needed today and that Friends must proclaim Truth boldly and without apology. We urge each local church to make this a matter of highest priority. We urge each church to have a plan of outreach and to provide training and encouragement in evangelism.

We are committed to prayer.

The winning of the lost can only be accomplished with much prayer. We praise God for those who have dedicated themselves to prayer for the salvation of the lost, the success of church planting/renewal efforts, and for the workers needed for the harvest. Planting churches will require many workers and pastoral leadership. Join us in praying "the Lord of the harvest to send workers into His harvest field."

We are committed to planting new churches and to helping revive declining churches where possible.

We praise God for the successful launching of Discovery Friends Church this year in Eugene. Gene and Norma McDonald pastor this thriving baby church and have received wonderful support from their mother church, Eugene Friends. Approximately 100 people from the Eugene church helped with the initial phone campaign during September, with 15-20 continuing for several months to help establish this new congregation by teaching Sunday school, ushering, and music ministries. Our deep appreciation is expressed to Eugene Friends Church for their vision and commitment. Discovery averaged 68 in attendance this beginning year. We also give thanks for a good year in our other recent church plant/renewal projects. Mountain View in east Vancouver is attempting to sell four acres to allow them to build a first unit on their property on Fisher Road. This is the 9.2 acre tract purchased by the Southwest Washington Area in 1957. The permanent facility will greatly enhance ministry opportunities. East Hill in Kent is considering the addition of a Friday night worship service to reach an unchurched segment of the community. Deschutes Friends in Bend has moved into the building formerly used for the church, with plans to add on, making it fit their needs. West Hills (formerly Maplewood) has seen continued spiritual growth. This congregation continues to speak to needs in a variety of ways: Parents' Night Out, a booth at the Neighborhood Fair, and monthly speakers focused on a current social issue. Each of these churches is receiving support on a declining scale. And each is already sending support to the Yearly Meeting Great Commission Program budget. Some work has been done in the area of evaluation and planning for plateaued and declining churches who request assistance from the Board. This need is currently a high priority of next year's work of the Board.

We are committed to helping pastors be effective in leading their churches to growth.

The Board of Evangelism cannot plant or revitalize churches. We can only release and help pastors who can do it with God's help and direction. We are committed to providing these leaders need to succeed. This past year we sponsored a FOCUS Conference on Conflict Resolution in the church. This fall we are doing another on "Opening the Front Door and Closing the Back Door" with Win Arn of Church Growth International. We urge each church to send a key layperson with your pastor. We have helped other pastors attend the Billy Graham School of Evangelism and several will go this year well. Scholarships are available to assist monthly meeting pastors attend leadership development seminars.

This past year our Board supervised the work of thirteen extension churches and mission points. We praise God for growth and good ministry in

spite of many trials. Post Falls Friends took action recently to discontinue services at Silver Valley. A Bible study will continue.

No Share Calls were received this year. A Share Call for Camas Friends is currently in process. We continue to ask Friends to give financial support to "Join the Harvest" which is the name we have given to all our efforts to raise funds for church planting beyond the \$16,000.00 extension church support provided in the Great Commission Program budget.

The Lord has blessed us and our work. We are constantly thrilled and amazed at how He answers prayer and meets needs in these extension churches. May all the glory be to Christ our Lord, the Head of the Church.

Gil announced the Focus Conference to be held again in Umatilla. This conference will not only be for pastors, but one or two key leaders in each church are also invited to attend.

He also announced the Call to Ministry Conference that will be held in January 1991.

The Youth Ambassador program is to be revived whereby college students serve in a local church during the summer. Not only does the church provide ministry opportunities, but also helps secure work for the Ambassador to earn money for college tuition. They hope to have ten or twelve youth for the summer of 1991. A volunteer coordinator of this program is needed.

The report was approved.

■ 51. The report of the Council of Elders was presented by David Fendall, clerk:

COUNCIL OF ELDERS

The Council of Elders met in a fall retreat and at midyear to consider a number of issues and concerns within our responsibility. At each of our sessions, including the sessions at Yearly Meeting last year, considerable time was devoted to prayer on behalf of all the churches and their pastors. An important project sponsored by the Council this year was the Area Workshops held in four locations throughout the Yearly Meeting. These workshops were designed to have special appeal for local elders although others were encouraged to attend. Topics presented were as follows:

- (1) New Testament Teaching on Elders—Paul Anderson
- (2) Elders Ministry to the Pastor and Congregation—Howard Harmon
- (3) Elders Caring for the Business of the Committee—Ron Stansell
- (4) Elders Involvement in a Prayer Ministry—Retha McCutchen.

The workshops were enthusiastically received and about 200 attended in the four locations.

An allocation from our annual budget was designated to purchase a videotape series on Friends History written and presented by Dr. Arthur Roberts. The videos were placed in the Yearly Meeting film library for use by the local churches.

A considerable portion of our time has been spent on the continuing work of two restoration teams. One of these concluded its work while another is continuing to meet periodically with a pastor seeking restoration to ministry. These sessions have also involved some refining of the restoration policy. The restoration teams have discovered areas which were not spelled out in the policy earlier written. This is a new area of concern within the Yearly Meeting, and problems of moral failure among pastors have become more prevalent in all denominations. The policy now includes involvement with a local Elders Committee in the church where moral failure was experienced.

Consideration was given for concerns from two local churches dealing with membership criteria and interpretation of the practice of outward ordinances. In both instances there seemed to be the need for support from the Council of Elders on already-established policy outlined in the *Faith and Practice*. Because

of these and similar concerns which have come from individuals and local churches, the Council will give further consideration on the subject of "orthodoxy versus liberty" and seek ways to clarify interpretation, if possible.

A concern for revitalization of Area Meetings (Rallies) has been discussed and at least one proposal for change considered. This matter was referred along with the proposed idea to the Board of Evangelism for their consideration.

The Council of Elders encourages local churches to conduct classes in Friends beliefs and doctrine towards membership for both adults and youth.

The report was approved.

■ 60. Having concurred with the recommendation of the Board of Ministerial Service, it is with joy that the Council of Elders recommends Colin Saxton be recorded as a minister of the Gospel in Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

■ 61. Assistant Clerk Phil Fendall, highlighted some statistics from the Statistical Report submitted by Theresa Bowen, statistician. (The full report will appear in the Appendix of the *Minutes*.)

The report was approved.

■ 62. Mark Ankeny presented a proposal for a gathering of Friends of the Western United States sometime in the early 1990s. Phil Fendall read the following statement from the November 17 and 18 planning meeting. Mark Ankeny and Bill Rourke represented Northwest Yearly Meeting at the planning session:

"We propose there be a gathering of the seven yearly meetings of the western US and Canada in the early 1990s. This proposal springs from a desire of neighboring yearly meetings to meet, rather than from the suggestion of any existing Quaker umbrella organization.

"The purpose of this gathering will be to provide an opportunity for face-to-face meetings among Friends of diverse traditions, to arrive at a better understanding of each other and to dispel misconceptions and fears. "Since all these yearly meetings bear the name Friends and derive from common historical ancestors, we each grapple with the problem of what it means to be a Friend. We hope this gathering may enable us to come to a clearer sense of our identities as Friends. It is not hoped that this gathering will come to an agreement about this, but that by dialogue with those with different views, we will each make better progress than we would by speaking only to those of like mind.

"We believe we have much to offer each other in dealing with common problems, such as growth in our respective yearly meetings, mission, social concerns, structure and organization, and spiritual nurturing. We hope to come together to worship with each other, to celebrate our heritage, and to gain insight for our role in today's world."

The recommendation was approved.

■ 63. Howard Harmon presented a proposal from the Centennial Campaign Committee that has been approved by the Board of Stewardship, the Representatives, and the Executive Council regarding a Centennial Cooperative Funding Campaign. The following objectives have been worked out:

A. A primary objective during the Northwest Yearly Meeting Cooperative Funding Campaign is to improve the level of Yearly Meeting-wide every member giving through spiritual motivation and good stewardship habits developed by the Cooperative Funding Campaign.

B. Of equal concern is the objective to strengthen the local congregation. A management plan for the Cooperative Funding Campaign will be designed and implemented, and will, in all aspects, be acceptable to the local congregation.

C. The financial objective of the Northwest Yearly Meeting Cooperative Funding Campaign is listed in the following five basic parts.

(1) To focus the campaign on the strengthening and extension of the mission and ministry of the church through financial support for the local congregation, Northwest Yearly Meeting, and George Fox College.

(2) To educate and motivate the membership of Northwest Yearly Meeting to their responsibilities to the local and extended ministries of the local congregation, Northwest Yearly Meeting, and George Fox College.

(3) To educate and motivate the membership of each congregation, where appropriate, to the needs and opportunities of their local congregation, Northwest Yearly Meeting, and George Fox College.

(4) To strengthen the stewardship by an awareness and assistance program in each congregation aimed at helping them to not only meet their income budget, but to also increase it by 7 to 10 percent

(5) To directly ask and then receive from the Church's membership, cash and commitments above regular budget support, of not less than \$2,250,000 to meet the special needs of the local congregations, Northwest Yearly Meeting, and George Fox College.

The campaign would begin in January 1991, and would be conducted by a new organization formed by Maurice Chandler, called National Evangelistic Technology, Inc. After some discussion from the floor of the meeting, Harold Ankeny, suggested that we defer approval of this proposal to the Friday morning business session, giving time for more discussion. Questions can be asked of members of the Board of Stewardship, the Representatives, or the Executive Council.

This was approved.

■ 64. Nancy Lamm, pastor's wife at Greenleaf Friends Church, closed the session with prayer.

■ 69. Betty King, clerk of the Commission on Family Life, gave a report:

COMMISSION ON FAMILY LIFE

We are pleased to report the purchase of four new video series to add to those available in the Northwest Yearly Meeting film rental library. *Successful Single Parenting* is geared toward single parents and step-parents. It begins with the concept of positive self-esteem for the parent and child. It is recommended for small groups or private home viewing.

The Eye of a Needle is an informative, personal testimony of a young woman with a rare form of cancer. It discusses stages of grieving from her view as well as her parents, pastor, and friends. It is recommended for church groups, chaplains, hospital personnel, and families.

The Hurried Family with Tim Kimmel (author of *Little House on the Freeway*) is a delightful 10-session series on how to find rest and quiet in our hurried lifestyles. Tangible ways to do things for our families are given in a very easy to listen manner.

McGee and Me—Skate Expectations is a charming video for children 6-13 to learn with the hero a lesson on courage and integrity.

Our Commission has established a Richard Beebe Memorial Fund for pastoral counseling to be used at the discretion of the Yearly Meeting superintendents. We feel Christian counseling can be beneficial to all families but are beginning with this as a benefit to pastors.

This year our workshops include *Television and Your Family*, *Preparing for the Inevitable*, and *Growing Through Grief*, and feature a variety of participants.

We continue to encourage prayer for our families, provide pro-life resources, increase awareness of the information available already, and perhaps sponsor regional workshops.

A portion of the video series *The Hurried Family* was shown.

Jackie Hausinger read the epistle prepared by the committee this year:

To Friends everywhere: Greetings from the 98th sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends gathered on the George Fox Campus July 21-27, 1990, in Newberg, Oregon. Our theme was taken from Hebrews 12:1-2, "Daring Discipleship." Dr Allan Coppedge brought the evening messages with simplicity and clarity, challenging us as His disciples to a higher and more personal relationship with Jesus.

Each morning the inspirational hour was a time of open worship to corporately wait before God, pray, and share Spirit-led concerns. Workshops on 40 practical and enjoyable themes were offered. The offering from the women's banquet will go toward furnishings for the Arequipa Bible Institute and those from the men's banquet toward a vehicle for Bolivia.

Underlying our joy at being reunited with old Friends is our profound sense of loss at the passing of two dearly beloved men of our Yearly Meeting, Richard Beebe and Jack Willcuts. God grant their mantles might fall on other willing shoulders that the causes so dear to their hearts might continue to be a living reality. We sense them among the "great cloud of witnesses" that surrounds us as we meet.

During our sessions the following were recorded as ministers of the Gospel: Paul Almquist, Margaret Benefiel, Sunday Blackmon, Kevin Gilbert, Gerardo Ibarra, Marvin Kistler, Karen McConaughy, Candace Neville, and Colin Saxton.

God has richly blessed our Youth Yearly Meeting, with 120 junior and senior high attenders this year under the outstanding leadership of Bruce Bishop, our superintendent of youth. George Fox College will begin its centennial year this fall with a planned registration of 1,063, including 145 Friends, in the undergraduate program, and a new department of graduate studies offering a doctorate in psychology. For the 19th consecutive year GFC completed its fiscal year with a balanced budget.

We close our epistle this year with a verse that will always bring memories of Jack Willcuts, "For I know the plans that I have for you declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a future and a hope." (Jeremiah 29:11)

"We believe that a nation under God ought to be a peaceable people who would promote cooperation among nations. Therefore, we call upon President Bush and members of Congress to signal their commitment to peacemaking by making significant reductions in the military budget. And we of Northwest Yearly Meeting urge Friends everywhere to join us in making known their similar concern."

There was discussion as to where this minute is to go. The Board of Social Concerns intends that it only appear as an approved minute in our *Minutes*. Some expressed the desire that it go to other yearly meetings, and perhaps to President Bush and members of Congress for the Northwest. It was approved that it be sent with our epistle to other yearly meetings.

Principles for leadership: (1) God chooses the leader, not the other way around; (2) no one can keep you from serving the Lord and doing His will except yourself; (3) God promised to be with Joshua, but He required obedience and required time spent with Him; (4) people promised to obey God; (5) people want reality—someone who will obey and follow God completely. God wants this of us, too.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE REPORT 1989-1990

In this report you will read of national honors, enrollment growth, new buildings, balanced budgets, and a lot of other wonderful things! What you will not read about, but what makes all these things possible, are the people "behind the scenes," who do the work, day by day.

You will not read about the professor who attends the women's volleyball game (she has three of the players in class and they are delighted to see their professor at the game), then goes home to three and a half hours of reading papers and preparing for an 8:00 a.m. class—but it happens!

You will not read about the Admissions person who spends eight hours driving, makes three home visits, and then gets up at 5:30 a.m. to begin the second of nine 14-hour days on the road—but it happens!

You will not read about the Student Life staff person who meets every day with students who come from Christian/non-Christian homes; from backgrounds of sexual, verbal, psychological, and/or physical abuse. They pray. They cry. They hug. They always give unconditional love and hope in Christ—and, sometimes they even see the results! This also happens!

And there are more unsung heroes and heroines of the faith—maintenance workers and secretaries, long-time employees and new members of the "family," administrators who battle to balance the budget and to maintain balance in the curriculum. There are many contributors to the on-campus success we enjoy.

Thanks to those of you who support us with God's money, your prayers, and your encouraging words. Thank you also for trusting us with your young people. We will continue to try to be faithful.

PROGRAM

NATIONAL RECOGNITION. George Fox College continues to grow in national reputation. It was named for the second time one of "America's Best Colleges" by *U.S. News and World Report* magazine. In 1989, the magazine reported GFC the third ranked college by academic reputation, fifth overall among western regional liberal arts colleges.

The Templeton Foundation included George Fox in 1989 and again in 1990 on its national "Honor Roll for Character Building Colleges." The honor roll list was compiled from a poll of presidents of all four-year, accredited institutions of higher education in the nation.

ENROLLMENT. GFC enrollment set an all-time record fall semester, with 945 students. The figure tops the previous high of 820 set the year before.

With the increase came a scramble for student housing. Unused space in residence halls was converted to temporary bedrooms. Newlin Apartments, rented to the public, were converted to house 16 single students, including one residence assistant. Schaad House, recently designated to one married couple, was converted to house six students. By the third week of school attrition relaxed the housing squeeze enough to allow all students in temporary housing to move into permanent housing.

The Human Resources Management degree-completion program had a total of 181 enrolled in the 1989-1990 school year, with 13 classes in the year. A total of 104 completed the HRM program, with 53 receiving their diplomas in December and 51 more at commencement in April. In February, HRM classes were begun in Eugene for the first time.

CENTENNIAL PLANNING. George Fox College will begin its 100th year on September 9. Work crews in late June began digging a foundation for the College's new Centennial Tower, located in the central mall area. The 65-foot \$125,000 structure is a gift to the College by long-time GFC supporter Esther Klages. It was designed, also as a gift to the College, by world-renowned architect Pietro Belluschi.

A script for GFC's centennial pageant is near completion, with performance dates scheduled February 9, 10, and 14-16.

In June, photos were being selected and final revisions were being made for a centennial book about the College. The book, written by GFC Professor of History Ralph Beebe, is scheduled for publication in the fall.

GFC's new centennial logo began appearing on College stationery and publications this spring. The centennial slogan "A Heritage to Honor, A Future to Fulfill" will soon appear on GFC correspondence as well.

GFC's Development staff is organizing a multimedia slide show to present to College friends and alumni at "birthday celebrations" scheduled in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and California throughout the year.

Members of the Centennial Committee and GFC's Development staff throughout the spring collected nominations for a new GFC Centennial Award, to be given to 100 people, living or deceased, who have had a significant impact on the College. The awards will be presented to the award recipients, or someone who represents them, at the College's birthday celebrations throughout the year. Plans are underway to present GFC alumni with Centennial Alumni Awards.

ACADEMICS

ACCREDITATION. Accreditation of George Fox College by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges has been reaffirmed.

Approval for continuation of accreditation came with praise from the visiting evaluation committee of the Commission on Colleges. It said in its report, "The team found a rare degree of consistence throughout the institution in understanding and enthusiastic acceptance of the College's stated mission and objectives. The College's steadfast adherence to Quaker and evangelical Christian traditions throughout its varied liberal arts and professional programs clearly lends distinction to a George Fox education."

"Given the extraordinary spirit of common purpose and dedication evident among the George Fox faculty, staff and students, the team believes that the College can...move into its second century with a confident, clear sense of direction."

The evaluation committee visited the campus in early March. The final report was issued by the accrediting agency following a meeting in June.

DOCTORAL DEGREE. George Fox College this year took steps to begin its first graduate program. The College has accepted Western Conservative Baptist Seminary's doctoral program in psychology. Psychology students, faculty, library materials, and administrative records were transferred from the Portland seminary to the GFC campus. The arrangement will become effective August 15, with classes beginning this fall.

About 95 percent of WCBS's 70 students are expected to make the transfer. The College expects to limit the program to about 100 students. Four of the five WCBS psychology professors will join the GFC faculty. Arrangements for classroom and office space are being made.

The psychology program is designed to develop practicing professional psychologists who are licensable and who have a Christian world view. The program culminates in a doctor of psychology degree and takes five years to complete, including four years of full-time academic study and one year of full-time internship. A master's degree in psychology is earned in the process. The program includes 27 semester hours in biblical/theological studies, which will be taught primarily by the current GFC faculty.

NEW DEPARTMENT. Following the introduction of its new doctoral program, George Fox College established a new Department of Graduate and Continuing Studies. The department will oversee both the graduate program and the current "Human Resources Management" degree-completion program. The

development brought a fifth vice president to GFC's governance structure—Dirk Barram, formerly dean of continuing studies. In his new position he is responsible for both the current "Human Resources Management" adult degree-completion program and the new graduate program. Barram and his staff continue to work from HRM offices in Minthorn Hall.

MIDYEAR COMMENCEMENT. For the first time in its history, George Fox College held a "midyear graduation." The additional ceremony helps the College adjust to larger spring graduating classes that already draw capacity crowds of more than 2,500 in Wheeler Sports Center.

FACULTY AWARDS. Associate Professor of Psychology Mark McMinn was the 1989-1990 recipient of GFC's Faculty Achievement Award, sponsored by the Burlington Northern Foundation. The \$2,000 unrestricted cash award program was created in 1984 to recognize teaching excellence.

GFC Associate Professor of Home Economics Flora Allen received a \$1,000 teaching award from the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. The annual "Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership" award is given to 700 faculty members in the nation for "resourcefulness and leadership as a private-college educator."

PEACE CENTER. Changes were made in the structure of GFC's Center for Peace Learning. Beginning this fall the Center will be tied more closely with the regular academic program, its instructional work on campus becoming a part of the Social Science Division. And the Center will be located in Minthorn Hall. The changes follow direction of the GFC Board of Trustees after the formation of a Redesign Committee and a review of the Center's first five years that highlighted the Center's strengths, but two areas of concern. First, budget deficits were accumulating, and, second, the Center was thought to need less emphasis on off-campus/international projects.

Educator and peacemaker Landrum Bolling was GFC's 1990 John Woolman Forum speaker. The writer and lecturer on Middle East issues spoke on "Citizen Diplomacy: New Opportunities in a Rapidly Changing World" in March.

TILIKUM. GFC's Tilikum Retreat Center continues to offer year-round retreat programs and summer youth-oriented programs, in addition to College courses in biology, physical education, and camping. One of more than 1,000 institutions that participates in the Elderhostel program, Tilikum hosted "Elderhostels" throughout the year, focusing on a wide variety of topics, including fishing, peacemaking, and American history. After 19 years as director of Tilikum, Gary Fawver is moving from his administrative role to a full-time faculty position. This fall he will serve in GFC's Division of Religious Studies as Associate Professor of Outdoor Ministries. Named new executive director of Tilikum is Arnie Mitchell, who has worked a total of 14 years with the Center.

DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE

The College's new Jack L. Willcuts Residence Hall is scheduled for completion by the time students arrive in the fall. The new \$400,000 three-story "mini-dorm" will house 40 students in 20 rooms, 10 suites. The nearly 9,000-square-foot structure is located just south of Carey Hall, along the west side of the Hess Creek Canyon. It is the second of three buildings planned for the site. Construction of the third, to be named Richard H. Beebe Residence Hall, is planned for 1991.

Hobson Hall was extensively remodeled this summer for a cost of about \$50,000. Changes include newly painted walls, refurbished woodwork, new lighting fixtures and ventilation systems, new ceilings, and new carpet and tile throughout the building.

For the first time in GFC's history, private telephones were installed in student housing. Before the school year began, push-button telephones were

installed in each room of Edwards, Macy, Hobson, Pennington, Carey, and Sutton halls. In previous years students shared one "community" telephone on each floor of the buildings. The College's purchase of a new telephone system the previous year allowed the addition of the student lines.

GFC's James and Lila Miller Gymnasium floor has a new look. When Bruin indoor athletic teams begin play next fall they will be on a floor that will look like it did originally when Wheeler Sports Center was completed in 1977. The complete resurfacing of the hardwood maple floor is the first in 13 years. The project, costing nearly \$20,000, also includes improvements.

CAMPUS EXPANDS. George Fox College's campus has grown with the acquisition of a house at River and Sheridan streets, across from Pennington Hall.

Remodeling began in June to provide much-needed administrative office space. Scheduled for completion in October, the building will house offices for the president and Development Office staff. Two lots already owned by the College, adjacent to the new offices on Sheridan Street, will be converted to a parking area for staff and visitors.

BALANCED BUDGET. For the 19th consecutive year, George Fox College completed its fiscal year with a balanced budget. Support for the College's annual fund has continued to rise sharply—from \$275,000 in 1982-1983 to \$503,000 in 1989-1990.

EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

FALL CONVOCATION. "Futurist," consultant, and author Tom Sine opened GFC's 99th year September 4 at the annual convocation program. Sine urged students to think twice about the "American dream" and the value it places on material goods.

RELIGIOUS CONFERENCES. GFC's Christian Life Week in September featured Ron Mehl, pastor of Beaverton Foursquare Church. Mehl, who spoke on a variety of topics, has served as pastor at Beaverton Foursquare Church for the past 17 years.

"Recapturing the Vision" was the theme for GFC's 15th annual Quaker Heritage Week in October. Guest speaker was Tom Mullen, dean of the Earlham School of Religion in Richmond, Indiana. Mullen, who has written eight books including *Laughing Out Loud and Other Religious Experiences*, discussed concepts of humor and writing in several classes and evening lectures. Mullen met on an individual basis with aspiring writers from the College and Newberg community, reviewing their work and offering advice.

At GFC's 23rd annual Missions Conference in January, William Taylor focused on the topic, "Evangelism and Social Action." The executive secretary of The Missions Commission of the World Evangelical Fellowship is involved in helping Third World nations develop their missions programs. His most recent publication is a book he coauthored, *Crisis in Latin America*.

Dolphus Weary, president of The Mendenhall Ministries Inc. in Mississippi, was GFC's Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer. The lecture series was established in 1969 to bring to college and university campuses outstanding Christian scholars.

Quaker educators and leaders from around the nation met on the GFC campus in June for the 11th annual Friends Association of Higher Education conference. About 150 participants from throughout the United States, as far east as Washington, D.C., attended. Two other Quaker groups—Quaker Theological Discussion Group and Quaker Historians and Archivists met in conjunction with the FAHE conference.

ACADEMIC CONFERENCES AND EVENTS. "Alcohol and Chemical Dependency" was the topic of Christian Social Involvement Day, sponsored by the Sociology/Social Work Department in February. Students called on

professions in the legal, health, and social work fields to discuss the effects of substance abuse, its prevention and treatment.

Ron Stansell, assistant professor of religion at GFC, discussed "cross cultural" education at the fall Faculty Lecture program in November. He discussed three elements necessary for improving the educational climate for foreign students in America.

MUSIC AND DRAMA. GFC's newly revived "Dayspring" touring vocal ensemble reported a successful 27-day, 4,818-mile, 31-program tour. Two highlights of the April 29-May 25 trip throughout Oregon, Arizona, Idaho, and California were a service with the Spanish Friends Church in Brawley, California, and a concert at the Carnation Plaza in Disneyland. The eight-member group performed for eight years before being discontinued in 1985. Since then, a larger on-campus music ensemble has used the Dayspring name. The on-campus group will adopt a new name next year. Purpose of Dayspring, sponsored by the College's Development Office, is to minister through music and represent GFC throughout western United States.

Fall semester's comedy *Black Comedy* was followed by the drama *The Crucible* in February and the hit musical *Man of La Mancha* in April.

GFC Music Department's various singing and instrumental groups performed throughout the year on and off campus.

The 85-member Oregon Symphony Orchestra performed a "Pops" concert at GFC's Bauman Auditorium in May. The performance at the College was the third sponsored by Ken and Joan Austin of Newberg.

ATHLETICS. In athletics, 1989-90 was a remarkable year with every team but one finishing in the top four in NAIA District 2, including three championship squads. Fall semester the men's and women's cross country teams both finished in the nation's top 10 in the NAIA national championships in November in Wisconsin. Accomplishing what's been done only once before, GFC men and women pulled off a sweep of NAIA District 2 titles to get to the nationals. There the men finished ninth, the women tenth, with GFC one of just four colleges in the U.S. to have double finishes in the top 10.

In soccer, GFC junior Dan LaVeine is on his way to becoming the United States' top collegiate soccer scorer. He scored 85 goals in three years, an average of 28.3 a season. He needs just 24 to become the nation's top college scorer at any level. District coaches in November named him soccer player of the year. The Bruins finished the season 10-8-1.

The volleyball Bruins had a "rebuilding year," reaching all the way to second in the nation in the National Christian College Athletic Association. The young squad, with only one senior, lost the national title in the championship game in November in Indianapolis to an in-state team, Taylor University of Upland. The Lady Bruins won the national crown in 1984 and 1987. They finished their season at 26-18, finishing fourth in NAIA District 2.

In men's basketball, the Bruins produced the best season in the College's history with a 29-5 record that had GFC ranked as high as ninth in the nation going into the NAIA national championships. An estimated 1,600 people—the largest sports crowd in the history of GFC's Miller Gym—watched the March 7 game that captured the District 2 NAIA championship for the Bruins. Going in ninth seeded in the March 13-19 NAIA playoffs in Kansas City, the Bruins were upset in the opening round, losing to Pfeiffer College of North Carolina, but giving the Bruins experience for what they hope will be a return visit next year. The season was a record breaking one for GFC, which set or tied 30 individual and team records. Sophomore center Dave Wilson was named NAIA District 2 Player of the Year. The Lady Bruins produced a 16-8 season and reached the NAIA District 2 playoffs.

In spring sports, the baseball Bruins took the district's best record into the NAIA playoffs. But for the third year in a row the Bruins did not make it to the championship game. George Fox, with its best season ever (23-5), rode a

16-game winning string into the playoffs. But it ended there as the Bruins were shut out by Linfield. The Lady Bruin softball team is the only Bruin team that did not have a winning season. Coach Craig Taylor sees a bright side. The team's 8-17-1 record is an improvement over the 2-22 season the year before.

In track, two GFC athletes earned All-American honors. Seniors Tim Hagen and Nancy Katus received the recognition for their finishes in the NAIA national track and field championships in Stephenville, Texas. Hagen had the third best high jump at 6-11 and Katus produced a sixth-place 137-10 discus throw. GFC racewalker Vance Godfrey finished seventh nationally at 48:08. GFC men produced five champions to finish second in the NAIA District 2 track and field championships. The Lady Bruins also finished second, but did it the hard way—with just one first-place finish.

GFC AND NORTHWEST YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS. Since its founding by Quakers in 1891, George Fox College has been under the leadership of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. Below are some figures that illustrate Friends involvement in the College:

- During the 1989-1990 school year, 125 Friends students were enrolled at GFC.
- 23 Northwest Yearly Meeting Churches in 1989-1990 were helping 82 students through GFC's Church/College Fellowship program.
- 48 GFC students in the year received "Friends Students" scholarship awards of \$780-\$1,000 each.
- Of NWYM's 94-member pastoral staff, 51, or 54 percent, are GFC alumni.
- Of NWYM's 12 missionaries, 8, or 66 percent, are GFC alumni.
- Of NWYM's 13 officers, 9, or 69 percent, are GFC alumni.
