## MINUTES

# Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1991

Monday, July 22, 10:45 a.m.

■ 1. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convenes its 99th sessions on July 22, 1991, on the campus of George Fox College under the theme "... for the Love of God."

■ 2. Arthur Roberts and Joel Schmeltzer reported on one of the three World Gatherings of Friends. They, along with Fern Roberts, Emma June Kenworthy, and Gregg Lamm attended the gathering held in The Netherlands, representing NWYM. Cilde Grover and Virginia Helm plan to represent our Yearly Meeting at a similar gathering to be held in Kenya.

■ 3. Nancy Nye, representing the Friends Committee on National Legislation, brought greetings.

■ 4. Bob Farris from Southwest Yearly Meeting and Friends Center brought greetings.

■ 5. Retha McCutchen introduced new pastors and pastors in new locations: Butch and Sheila Hart—Caldwell; Rob and Betty King—Melba; Paul and Charlene Meier—East Hill (Kent); Paul and Nancy Almquist—Rosedale; Ron and Marlene Watson—South Salem; Bruce and Margie Bibby—Marion; Bob and Faith Marsalli—Klamath Falls; Gaylen and Esther Kinser—associate pastors at Clackamas Park; Kelley and Nancy Swarat—youth pastors at West Chehalem; Steve and Diane Fawver—youth pastors at Newberg; Eileen Beatty—children's ministries at Boise; Vern and Wanda Barnett—associate pastors at Boise; Rob and Bev Armstrong—Rose Valley; Paul and Peggy Baker—associate pastors at Sherwood.

■ 6. Louise George introduced James Morris, Executive Director of Evangelical Friends Mission; Jaet Johnston, president of EFM; Robin Johnston,



president of Barclay College; Dan and Tami Cammack, furloughing missionaries to Peru; Bruce and Jan Allen, who will be returning to the CALA literature work in La Paz under World Concern; Barbara Morse, missionary with Wycliffe; Gordon and Suzanne Martin, missionaries under appointment with Wycliffe to Chad, West Africa; and Carl and Peggy Hunerwadel, missionaries under appointment with EFM to go to India.

■ 7. The Board of Missions presentation given Sunday afternoon was approved.

■ 8. The Board of Evangelism presentation given Sunday evening was approved.

■ 9. The Representatives submitted the following appointments for approval which were not completed by the 1990 Representatives. Memorial Committee: Kenneth Williams. Clerk of Memorial Committee for 1991: Kenneth Williams. Approved.

■ 10. The Representatives submitted the following the appointments to the Council of Elders, made after the close of the 1990 Yearly Meeting sessions. Inland: Conard Petersen; Puget Sound: Grant Thompson; At-large: David Fendall. Approved.

■ 11. Harold Ankeny presented the treasurer's report. (See Appendix) The report was approved.

■ 12. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny reported the actions of Executive Council during the past year: (a) Decided not to launch the Centennial Campaign this year. (b) Approved the Superintendent Search Committee recommendation that Joseph A. Gerick be nominated for the position of general superintendent.

■ 13. Mark Ankeny reviewed the process of the Superintendent Search Committee and reported on their work through the past year. He introduced Joe Gerick, the Executive Council's nominee for superintendent, who shared his testimony and concern. The clerk reviewed from the *Faith and Practice* the qualifications for a general superintendent. The recommendation of the Executive Council is that Joe Gerick be involved in conferences and if possible travel to Bolivia and Peru during the remainder of 1991 and that his full-time appointment begin in January, 1992.

■ 14. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Deane Roberts of Newberg Friends.

## Tuesday, July 23, 10:45 a.m.

■ 15. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny opened the meeting with prayer.

■ 16. Visitors Marie Parker and Meta Ruth Ferguson from Pacific Yearly Meeting brought greetings.

■ 17. Mark Burton, a candidate for recording as a minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting, gave his testimony.

■ 18. Cilde Grover, clerk of the Board of Social Concerns, reported.

## BOARD OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

*What good is it, my brothers and sisters if you say that you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your*

*fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works is dead. James 2:14-17 NRSV*

Friends in the Northwest have been led into many ministries to the community around them. Churches around our Yearly Meeting continue to be involved in ministry to the homeless, food and clothing distribution, senior citizen programs, and programs relating to the environment.

The Board has concentrated on areas of education, feeling this is the best way to use our limited funds. Following is a list of some of the areas of focus this past year:

1. Publication of the newsletter, *Concern*, has been our major emphasis and production has been expanded so that enough copies for bulletin inserts are being mailed to the churches. We continue to solicit people who are interested in writing articles for the newsletter and ask for your input on the current publications.

2. The Board thanks you for your generous response to the Thanksgiving Offering which went to the medical clinic in LaPaz, Bolivia. A total of \$12,059 was raised for the project.

3. As a Board, we continue to support Bruce Bishop in his weekend peace retreats for youth by providing some materials for the retreats.

4. The Department of Peace and the Board provided funding and support for the mailing of a peace packet to youth of our Yearly Meeting in January. As our youth are forced to make difficult decisions, we plan to continue this mailing to help give balance to the increasing pressure from recruiters in our schools.

5. New Call to Peacemaking, a joint effort of Friends, Mennonites, and Brethren, has been reactivated and Ralph Beebe attended the meeting as a representative of NWYM.

6. During the year the Board has also continued the discussion on capital punishment, begun work on a statement on racism and prejudice, and talked about ways to help our churches with social concerns and issues of peace and justice.

7. During this week of Yearly Meeting, the Board is sponsoring workshops on the Quaker peace testimony, consistent life ethic, and an informational meeting on Friends Committee on National Legislation. We hope you will take advantage of these opportunities.

We pray that each of you who are involved with Northwest Yearly Meeting will continue to respond to God's call on your lives so that those who come in contact with us will continue to see the Light of Christ shining through in all we say and do.

The report was approved.

■ 19. Members of the Commission on Ethnic Ministries reported.

Aaron Hamlin introduced Piedmont associate pastor Joshua Phillips, who reported on the work there. John Cochran introduced Gerardo Ibarra, pastor of the Newberg Hispanic Friends Church. Gerardo spoke of his work, accompanied by slides. Naomi Brown shared about the work Eugene Friends has done in cross-cultural ministry, accompanied by slides.

The report was approved.

■ 20. Aaron Hamlin reported on the work of the National Black Evangelical Association. The NBEA convention was held in Portland this year and included a Reconciliation Sunday.

The report was approved.

■ 21. The George Fox College Board of Trustees recommended the following persons to serve three-year terms on the Board of Trustees. For continuing service: Hal Adrian, C. W. Field, Jr., Jack Meadows, and Robert Monroe. For new appointments: Peggy Fowler, and Steve Harmon.

Approved.



■ 22. The Council of Representatives, unable to discern a clear leading of the Lord, recommend that Northwest Yearly Meeting not become a member of the Friends Committee on National Legislation at this time. After discussion, this was approved with the understanding that the Council of Elders will be considering all aspects of our involvement in the larger family of Friends.

■ 23. Roy Clark of West Chehalem Friends Church closed the meeting in prayer.

## Tuesday, July 23, 2:15 p.m.

■ 24. Assistant Clerk Phil Fendall opened the meeting in prayer.

■ 25. The minutes of the Monday morning and Tuesday morning sessions were read, corrected, and approved.

■ 26. The Executive Council's nomination of Joseph A. Gerick as general superintendent for a two-year term expiring June 30, 1994 was presented. Following many expressions of affirmation, this was approved. Joe was called into the meeting and several led in prayer for Joe, his family, and his ministry.

■ 27. Alice Maurer, president of Friends Women Missionary Fellowship, and others, reported.

## FRIENDS WOMEN MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP

In this day and age when there are so many options for activity, and so many demands upon time for women, why have a Friends Women Missionary Fellowship (FWMF) organization in Northwest Yearly Meeting? Or a local FWMF group in your local church? We trust that the following report of the involvement of our women will help everyone see the real benefits to the body of Christ because of the service, fellowship, education, and prayer of the FWMF women of NWYM.

There were 39 groups whose reports arrived in time to be included in this summary, representing 475 active members who met at least once a month. At those meetings, women were *learners* as they learned about "By All Means Building the Church" around the world through use of the Program and Devotion book prepared by EFI-NA WMF (Women's Missionary Fellowship of the Evangelical Friends International—North America). Or they were educated and challenged by speakers (54 different speakers were reported representing a wide variety of mission, ministry and service experiences). Prayer for missions, for local concerns, and for one another was an important part of most Fellowships. Our women are *pray-ers*.

Another area of learning is the emphasis on good reading. Although not all groups reported the number of books read, and many indicated that more were read than reported, 3,752 books were reported as having been read, covering many areas—the Scripture itself, home and foreign missions, Christian life, devotional, and family improvement to name a few.

Our women are *givers* as well as learners. Almost \$9,000 was given as part of the per-member contribution/dues which helped towards the monthly support of Roscoe and Tina Knight in Bolivia and Peru, and the ministry of the Deschutes Extension Church in Bend. Operating expenses and support of EFI-NA WMF also came out of those funds. In addition to that amount, \$13,153 was given towards other missions projects for our own ministry in Bolivia and Peru and for ministries of EFI-NA (cost of Christmas missionary retreat, missionary prayer cards, furlough support, deputation travel expenses, missionary children's education, evangelistic films for Mexico, teaching materials for the Philippines, science equipment for Rwanda), and for other ministries such as YCEW, extension churches, Samuel School, pastors' prayer

retreat, Southwest Indian School, Slavic Gospel Association, Wycliffe Bible Translators, Campus Crusade, World Vision, Missionary Aviation Fellowship, Get-Away Give-Away, Piedmont, and Greenleaf Academy. Beyond that, another \$12,011 was contributed towards local church and community projects, including such things as kitchen finishings and furnishings, parsonage improvements, building funds, and library additions for the local church, and ministries like Crisis Pregnancy Centers, food banks, shelter homes, Salvation Army, Gospel Missions, and specific needy families. Sometimes volunteer service accompanied monetary contributions. Our women CARE!

And we are *doers*. Several of the Fellowships have active quilters who meet regularly, making quilts to sell to raise project funds, quilts to give to missionaries and needy families, quilts to donate to the Greenleaf Academy Auction. Women sewed dresses for our missionary ladies. They served wedding receptions, cooked for Men's Prayer Breakfast, prepared meals for sick people in the church, hosted Mother-Daughter teas or luncheons, and the list goes on.

Last year at Yearly Meeting time, 259 women from across the Yearly Meeting gathered for our women's banquet, with Tonya Comfort speaking. An offering of \$2,020 was given towards furnishings for the Arequipa Center in Peru.

October 4-7, 174 women met together in Pendleton, Oregon for Women's Retreat. Faye Pruitt and her dummy "Willie" shared each day on the theme "Christ our Hope." Louise George led daily Bible studies. Missionary challenges, times of sharing, fun and crazy times all mixed together to form an enjoyable weekend. During retreat, over \$1,400 was raised to allow Colleen St. George to accompany Gordon to the Missionary Christmas Retreat, and field visit to Peru and Bolivia in December. Special guest was EFI-NA WMF President Iris Murphy from Ohio.

Springtime was another gathering time for women as six Spring Rallies were held across the Yearly Meeting. We learned about missionary furlough life with the theme "Back to the U.S., Back to Us," and \$2,352 was given to enable Dan and Tami Cammack to attend a special program for missionaries and pastors at the Narramore Institute when they arrived in the Northwest for furlough this June.

So why FWMF? Because we feel that this gives one option for women in Northwest Yearly Meeting Friends churches to become more knowledgeable about the work of Christ's Kingdom, to serve the cause of reaching the lost for Jesus Christ by giving and by doing, to encourage one another, to develop friendships in the body of Christ—in short, to be better enabled to be Christ's women in today's world.

The report was approved.

■ 28. Louise George, clerk of the Board of Missions, giving their formal report, alluded to the written report below and introduced James Morris, Executive Director of Evangelical Friends Mission, who gave an overview of our EFM work. He interviewed Carl Hunerwadel who, with his wife Peggy, is under appointment to serve in India, teaching in Woodstock School and endeavoring to minister to an unreached people group.

## EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION—NORTHWEST

*EFM Update:*

RWANDA—Warring factions within this African country have disrupted evangelistic efforts, church building projects, and mission and national personnel.



Ruth and Alfred Miller were returned to the States during one period of danger. Gary and Connie Young and Paul and Leona Thornburg remained in Rwanda. Curt Blasiman was appointed to serve in Rwanda as a teacher, and arrived on the field in January. Willard and Doris Ferguson and son Sam were on deputation in the States during this past year and will return to Rwanda this summer.

**ROUGH ROCK**—Mark and Wilma Roberts continue to serve among the Navajo people, assisted by short-termers during the summer months. Continued prayer is needed that God's Spirit will penetrate the hearts of these people.

**MEXICO CITY**—David and Joyce Byrne and daughters, along with Manuel and Brenda Chavarria and two children, serve together in this teeming city. Prayer is needed asking God to break through the barriers of resistance to the Gospel.

**PHILIPPINES**—This country is suffering greatly from continual economic and political upheaval as well as cataclysmic natural events. Pray for these believers who are preaching the message of salvation.

**NEW MISSIONARY APPOINTEES**—Carl and Peggy Hunerwadel and five children were placed under appointment with EFM in May. They will be going to India this fall in preparation for identifying and making plans for taking the Gospel to an unreached people group.

**EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RESIGNS**—James Morris, Executive Director of EFM, announced his resignation effective the summer of 1992. A search committee has been formed to consider candidates for this position. Duane Comfort continues his responsibilities as Executive Assistant, and Reta Stuart as Executive Secretary.

#### *Northwest Yearly Meeting Fields:*

**BOLIVIA YEARLY MEETING**—Patricio Medrano is still the official president of the INELA (Bolivia Yearly Meeting) but serious health problems have prevented his serving in this capacity for a number of months. Remigio Condoni, the vice-president, is capably leading the work at present. The following statistics were provided by the Bolivian Yearly Meeting Executive Council:

11 Districts (quarterly meetings)

72 Monthly Meetings

209 Active Churches

7000 Members (estimated)

8 New churches have been planted this past year

Thanks to the cooperation of NWYM in providing funds, five urban churches purchased land this year and are in the process of building or soon will be. The Clinic continues to serve the church community and others of the La Paz area. Doctor Luisa Lopez, a young Friends woman from the Yungas, is serving very well as one of the clinic's doctors. This program continues to be entirely under the direction of the Bolivian Yearly Meeting.

**Personnel:** PASCUAL AND NIEVES QUISPE, from the Yungas area of Bolivia, are pastors who have responded to God's call to go to the developing colonies of the San Julian area. They are national missionaries sent out by Bolivia Yearly Meeting, and supported by Northwest Yearly Meeting. They are beginning their fifth year, ministering cross-culturally to the Quechua people.

**ED AND MARIE CAMMACK** were stationed in the Caranavi District of Bolivia Yearly Meeting. The activities have been highly commendable and reports from the Caranavi brethren indicate that the work has advanced rapidly becoming stable once more.

**ROSCOE AND TINA KNIGHT** have served both Bolivia and Peru, where Roscoe has functioned as Field Administrator, as well as doing much teaching and preaching. Both Roscoe and Tina have taught two terms in the Bible Institute in Arequipa, Peru. They are returning to the States this summer, leaving a legacy of work for the Kingdom. They are deeply appreciated.

**BRUCE AND JAN ALLEN**, together with their children, Elsa and Eben, have served as associate Friends missionaries. Bruce is director of CALA (Committee For Aymara Literature and Literacy), doing a work that is so vital to all evangelical churches in Bolivia and Peru.

**BERNARDO FLORES** and his wife and six children have recently moved to the San Julian area to join the Quispes. They, too, are sponsored by the Bolivia Yearly Meeting, and jointly supported by NWYM.

**Summary:** There will only be one American missionary family working with Bolivia Yearly Meeting this year. This is not considered ideal, as there is much work to be done yet by missionaries, such as church and district visitation to encourage and train pastors and leaders, teaching in Patmos Bible Institute and San Pablo Seminary and encouraging greater participation by church leaders in the extension Bible school programs. Missionary work in Bolivia is not finished yet.

**NATIONAL FRIENDS CHURCH IN PERU**—Though not yet an official Yearly Meeting, this group of Friends churches under the direction of Northwest Yearly Meeting, is about to celebrate its 30th birthday. From the beginnings in 1961 when Friends missionaries moved across Lake Titicaca into Peru, the church has grown and spread throughout the high Andean hills down to the coast of southern Peru.

The Peruvian Friends Church Executive Council provided the following information in their effort to determine how many churches are functioning and what their status is. That is, how healthy/strong the churches are. Here is their summary:

7 Quarterly meetings

52 Active churches, three of which are new, and four are getting ready to rebuild their meeting houses after the flood

7 churches that don't meet regularly but are making plans to rebuild

8 churches that were closed, consolidated, or lost to the INELA

12 IBLA (Bible school) graduates

22 Active pastors

2000 Members (estimate)

It is noteworthy that even without a missionary presence on the sierra this past year (the first time in its thirty-year history) the Executive Council functioned well. IBLA, the extension Bible School program, ran this past year totally under Peruvian Friends' leadership. After six years with no teacher training for the extension program, Eduardo Mamani came from Bolivia to assist in the training. One of the churches lost during a 1989 church split returned to Friends this year.

**AREQUIPA CENTER**—Gifts and offerings from mission supporters in Northwest Yearly Meeting finalized the purchase of the property acquired three years ago for a Bible School center in the city of Arequipa, Peru. Young men and women study there twice a year to complete course work to prepare them for church leadership.

**Personnel:** BENITO AND VICTORIA APAZA, together with their four daughters, are from La Paz, Bolivia. They heard God's call on their lives to move to Peru to serve as missionaries there. This last year they took out Peruvian resident visas to make their ministry in Peru easier. They are sponsored by Bolivia Yearly Meeting, and financially supported by NWYM. The Apazas' presence this past year on the sierra has added much needed stability and strength to the work of the church.

**EDUARDO MAMANI AND ZACARIAS MAMANI:** These men have volunteered to come to Peru for short-term assignments in the Arequipa Bible School and on the sierra. Both are educators and committed Friends leaders. They are also supported by NWYM as a part of a cooperative program with Bolivia Yearly Meeting.



DAN AND TAMI CAMMACK, together with their children Forrest and Rebekah, lived in Arequipa this past year. Dan was actively involved in the grassroots organization of the Bible School in the Arequipa Center, and carried a heavy teaching load as well. It has been an important contribution to the mission goals. They returned to the States in June for a year's furlough.

EARL AND JANICE PERISHO finished a year's language study in Costa Rica and arrived in Arequipa in January where they will live throughout this year. They will be assuming responsibilities in directing the Bible School at the Arequipa Center, as well as visiting churches on the coast and making occasional trips to the sierra.

KEN AND TONYA COMFORT have been on stateside assignment this year. Their schedule was filled with deputation and speaking assignments. They have been well received as they have capably shared the vision for the work of missions in Peru. They returned to Peru the end of June.

After a term off, Ramon Mamani was again elected president of the Peruvian Friends Church. His capable leadership, great vision, and commitment to Christ make him a valuable contributor to the church's future. Ramon and his wife, Lucila, and family need continued prayers for their heavy responsibilities.

The Board of Missions focused this year on laying groundwork for a developing relationship with the national church leadership of both Bolivia and Peru. Our concern is that we seek ways to work in tandem on projects of evangelism and church planting. For several years we have been jointly sponsoring Bolivian missionaries to Peru and San Julian in Bolivia, because of a jointly felt need to give Peru the boost of stronger, mature leadership. Our goal is to continue to develop that working relationship and joining efforts so that the unevangelized people in both of those countries will be given a chance to hear the Gospel.

A second goal this year was to become actively involved in praying for workers for the harvest field. The number of our staff on both fields is the lowest yet, and there is still so much to accomplish. We have challenged the Yearly Meeting to join us in praying for more missionaries, which may include both North American and third world missionaries.

## BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

This report complements the Treasurer's report concerning our financial status as of June, 1991. (See Appendix for Treasurer's report)

Our first, main activity for the year and one that helped direct our efforts was the Executive Council Retreat August 10-11, 1990. At that time our Yearly Meeting Presiding Clerk requested several groups to chart directions for the future. Several members of the Board of Stewardship participated in stewardship planning. Our efforts during the year were mainly in the following directions:

*Budget.* To plan for a balanced budget, keep current records, and keep all clerks informed of the budget process. We wanted to bring the clerks into the budget process well before each budget year starts.

*Debt and workers compensation retroactive payments.* Get rid of the debt and complete the retroactive payments. In 1990, the amount paid on debts was almost \$82,000 and one of three workers compensation loans was paid off. We plan to eliminate all debts before 1995. The Executive Council has approved a budget item of \$7,500 toward debt reduction in 1991, and also that any excess of income over expenditures at the end of this year be applied to the debt reduction.

*Great Commission Program.* In 1990 our churches, through their pledges, contributed 93 percent of our income. Our goal is 100 percent. October was our annual Great Commission Program emphasis month. We planned and distributed materials to our churches. We emphasized the Yearly Meeting budget process, activities of the boards and commissions and how we as churches, areas, and the Yearly Meeting together can accomplish many ministries.

*Financial Policies.* In the past we have made policies which have been incorporated in various minutes. Sometimes these are forgotten. We researched past minutes and consolidated these policies. We sent them to each clerk for review and will again affirm or change them during subsequent board meetings.

*Insurance.* We could not determine that any board was responsible for monitoring our insurance needs. Pending further review, the Executive Council placed this responsibility with the Board of Stewardship.

*Job Description and Procedures.* We are developing job descriptions and operating procedures for the Board of Stewardship.

*Stewardship Education.* Generally only 10-15 percent of our churches have ongoing stewardship education programs and/or use any materials which we have. Our workshops this year are direct and practical, and designed to help encourage churches to use more of our materials.

*Audit.* In 1990 the spring auditing class of George Fox College completed a "financial review" of our financial procedures. We have already incorporated some of their recommendations and are working on others. We plan an outside audit every five years and an internal audit each year.

*Communications.* We have made a special effort to involve all of our Board members in our activities and to keep clerks of other boards and commissions involved in stewardship matters.

## COUNCIL OF ELDERS

The Council of Elders has had a busy year taking care of situations which are under their responsibility primarily in the areas of discipline, counseling, and encouragement in churches facing difficulties among themselves or in church/pastor relationships. We especially want to commend two individuals from the Council who have given unselfishly in devoting themselves to serve as counselors along with our superintendents. Vivian Thornburg and Gene Mulkey have spent many hours representing the Council in meetings with



churches and/or pastors to assist in working through difficulties and resolving differences. Not only was much time given, but their donation of travel expense in these matters has been significant.

The Council would like to have the luxury to spend time dealing with ways and means to develop some positive and constructive programs and ideas to encourage and build up our churches. However, we are not primarily a policy-making body. Our responsibilities lie in the area of dealing with doctrinal issues and clarification of these matters among the churches.

During the year, the Council sponsored five area Elders' Workshops throughout the Yearly Meeting. These meetings were held in Post Falls, Meridian, Clackamas Park, Eugene, and Olympic View churches. They were held on Saturdays and attendance was gratifying. The workshops were open to anyone in the church interested in the work of elders but were primarily geared to those currently serving as elders. The topics presented were "How to be More Effective in Conducting Membership Classes," and "Clarifications and Responsibilities of Church Membership." Howard Harmon and Dave Fendall conducted the discussion-oriented sessions. These could not have been successful except for the generosity and service provided by a group of women in each of the host churches in preparation of lunches at noon in each of the workshops.

The Council of Elders had a fall retreat for the conducting of business and also met during Midyear Board meetings. Our primary frustration is the lack of time to work through the entire agenda that needs our attention.

We have committed ourselves to working more closely with the Board of Ministerial Service in defining the matter of who should be recorded for ministry. At present this includes those in active pastoral ministry, missionary service, and chaplaincy. The question under consideration deals with whether other ministries should be included. Careful study and prayer is required for the consideration of these matters.

The report was approved.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION

### *Department of Christian Testimonies*

This year the Department of Christian Testimonies completed work on two tracts: "The Drink That Deceives" and "When NO is Not Enough." Future projects include a bulletin insert series on Famous Friends and a tract on "Business as Worship." We have continued to contribute books to the Western Evangelical Seminary Library and update the bibliography of books by and about Quakers at WES. We also are working on an annotated bibliography of Quaker books for local church libraries.

### *Department of Church Education*

FRANK ENGLE, JR., CLERK

The Department of Church Education has been following a four-year plan to strengthen the Christian education ministries in the local church. Year One consisted of area seminars for the purpose of equipping the local Christian education clerk. Year Two also consisted of area seminars, but this time the clerk brought Sunday school leaders for an in-depth study of Sunday school leadership.

#### YEAR THREE: "THE YEAR OF THE CHILD"

With the EFI-NA Christian Education Commission also declaring this year as "The Year of the Child," we were able to capitalize on their children's reading program and "Kids Count!" week promotion. We began the year with Yearly Meeting workshops that focused on ministry to children. A well-attended Christian Education luncheon featured our own Dorothy Barratt, EFI Christian Education Consultant.

This spring we held two regional Children's Ministry Conferences. Over 100 children's workers and parents attended our conferences at Boise and Reedwood. Our speakers were very informative: Beth LaForce, GFC; Steve Wood, pastor, Mountain View Friends; Ruby Friesen, Beaverton Family Counseling Center; Dale Babcock, Meridian School District counselor; Anne Sandoval, Western Baptist Seminary; and Dorothy Barratt and Marge Landwert, EFI Christian Education Commission.

Our goal this year was to help the local church effectively minister to children in the midst of our changing society.

#### YEAR FOUR: ADULT MINISTRIES

Our Yearly Meeting workshops will begin our year-long emphasis on adult ministries. Dorothy Barratt and Gene Mulkey will lead a workshop on "Coordinating Adult Education in the Church for the 90s." Ron Mulkey will lead a workshop on family devotions. Our annual Christian Education luncheon will consist of a panel from our Yearly Meeting discussing small group ministry. Our Department meetings will include planning for the rest of our year's work with adult ministries.

### *Department of General Education*

RAWLEN SMITH, CLERK

As in the past, the majority of the students in the Ministerial Aid Scholarship program were attenders at Western Evangelical Seminary. Ten students were assisted with aid totaling more than \$12,000, up over 33 percent from the previous year. At this point, we have two new applicants for the coming year, and two students will be completing their seminary education this year. With



increasing tuition costs and a commitment to being of substantial assistance to the student, we can expect to continue increasing the budget for scholarship aid.

At George Fox College, 87 students received church/college/NWYM matching scholarships during the 1990-91 school year. The college distributed \$21,175 in the name of the Yearly Meeting. The Yearly Meeting gave the college only \$15,000 for that, leaving the college \$6,175 to make up. In addition, many of these students received the \$1,000 Friends Student Award for Friends students coming in with a minimum GPA. This is completely covered by the college.

We have now compiled a list of prospective board members for the George Fox College Board of Trustees. We have acquired resumes from these people and keep their names in a file for future use as vacancies arise on the Board. If you would like to nominate someone for the Board, please contact Duane Roberts.

## FRIENDS YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

AMANDA MILAM, SECRETARY

The Friends Youth Executive Committee started the year off a little different than we have in the past. This year we sent out an all new publication, the NWYM Youth Poster. The poster featured pictures from various youth activities as well as a calendar of NWYM events for most of the 1991 year. The back of the poster contained pictures and statements from the youth officers as well as short descriptions of the activities planned by the Executive. An estimated 1,380 posters were distributed among the churches, youth leaders, and junior high and high school youth. This publication, which has replaced the traditional *Quaker Noats* newsletter has received much support from the youth. Many have been seen on bulletin boards at the churches. The Friends Publication Committee is looking into the possibility of a calendar for next year's publication.

Our flexibility was tested in December when Midwinter at Quaker Hill was snowed out. Midwinter, its theme, "Over the Edge" and its speaker, David Bridges, were all relocated to Reedwood Friends Church. Approximately 45 youth attended the retreat at Reedwood along with class teachers and counselors. Even though we didn't make it to Quaker Hill, there was a ski day at Mt. Hood, as well as swimming at a community pool. Midwinter '91 will be held at Twin Rocks Friends Camp where we expect a smaller group, due to Youthquake '91. Emphasis will be on community building.

Friends Youth Exec. again sponsored its annual Northwest Yearly Meeting Volleyball Tournament held on the George Fox College campus, April 11-12. Over 450 young people gathered as 50 youth group teams from all corners of the Yearly Meeting competed in three divisions for nine trophies plus the honored Sportsmanship award, this year earned by Sherwood Friends. Top finishers in each division were: Quaker: Star (1), Rose Valley I (2), Vancouver (3); Friends "A": South Salem/Rosedale (1), Spokane I (2), Newberg (3); and Friends "B": Greenleaf (1), Camas (2), West Chehalis (3).

YCEW (Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview) traveled to Mexico City, June 20-July 11. The YCEW Committee chose the team of eight high school youth: Julie Dickover, Eugene; Daniel Hidden, Cherry Grove; Robin Hunt, Camas; Delonna Livingston, McKinley Hill; Jeremy Smuck, Talent; Tiffany Tomlinson, Clackamas Park; Kevin Tuning, Woodland; and Josh Wedin, Valley. Leaders were Jennifer Martell, Boise, and Brent Heaton, Star.

Our newest program YCAM (Youth Challenged through Arts in Ministry) made its debut in churches in northern Oregon and southern Washington, July 14-18, performing a musical and dramatic package in services and here at Youth Yearly Meeting. Leaders Jeff and Deana VandenHoek worked closely with the YCAM Committee in choosing team members, materials, and coordinating the tour. Team members were: Tera Bloodgood, Post Falls; Nicole Larzaller, Homedale; and Cris Orcutt, Metolius.

This year the Friends Youth Exec. decided that the position of Advisor was being fulfilled by the Superintendent of Youth and, therefore, needed to be revised. We approved the suggestion of having a Youth Challenge Coordinator who would work together with YCEW and YCAM and any future programs to provide administrative advice and continuity throughout the year. We are currently searching for someone to fill this position.

The Youth Exec. appreciates the support of Northwest Yearly Meeting and the opportunity given us to serve Christ through the youth of the Yearly Meeting. I pray that anything we do will be only to the glory of Christ Jesus.

## GREENLEAF FRIENDS ACADEMY

I bring greetings from the Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region and Gilead Friends Church in Mt. Gilead, Ohio.

Last summer, we definitely felt God's direction in our lives as we followed the call to Greenleaf after being in the same school system in Ohio for the past 22 years as a Guidance Counselor. Judy and I had been actively involved in the Friends Church in Mt. Gilead, Ohio and had helped start Gilead Christian School 11 years ago where I was Board president the first year, Finance Committee chairman for several years, and Building Committee chairman during the time of remodeling a car dealership and garage into a beautiful elementary school. Judy served three years as teacher/administrator of the school and taught six more years before we moved. We attended ACSI Conventions in Columbus together during this period, and I gained new understanding of Christian school finances through a Development Seminar during this time over a three-year period. We at G.F.A. have a lot in common with a new Christian school struggling with finances.

Our theme for this year was "To God be the Glory." We want to praise God for all things. Psalm 48:1 says "Great is the Lord, and most worthy of praise." This is how I view this past year at G.F.A. with much gratitude to God.

Our enrollment for grades kindergarten through 12 was 215 plus 150 in two preschools. This included a high school enrollment of 88 (55 girls and 33 boys).

Finances seem to be utmost on people's minds when asking about Greenleaf Friends Academy. Yes, we still have many bills and a capital improvement loan at the bank with other outstanding bonds, but we are getting them down to a reasonable figure. It is our goal to eliminate the capital loan and previous debts in the next two years. We praise God for your help in the past year for these accomplishments:

- (1) We are keeping up with current expenses.
- (2) Payroll is being met monthly until this summer.
- (3) Payments on the loan and bonds are being made.
- (4) We are whittling away at previous bills.

In addition, we purchased two 1977 International busses from Oregon for a total of \$5,000 and put a new engine in another to replace our badly run-down transportation, paid off a \$10,000 bond and paid a \$4,400 bill for textbooks accumulated from previous years. Staff is being reduced and supplies limited to necessities. Through these measures and your generous contributions, our credibility is returning among the business and financial community.

Some of the outstanding programs this year included choir, drama, academic bowl, math team, volleyball and baseball teams. The 44-member high school choir (remember I said the high school had an enrollment of 88!) gave 28 performances throughout the valley in churches and on tour in the Northwest before the ACSI Musicales in Tacoma, Washington in March.

Instrumental music is also on the rise with Mrs. Ellen Morse sparking new interest. All 6th graders participate in band at Greenleaf Elementary. Drama class gave three performances and attended the Shakespearean Festival in Ashland, Oregon for their field trip in early May. In academics, our Academic Bowl teams in both junior and senior high did well in competition in various meets and the high school group participated in the first statewide INEL Scholastic Tournament in Boise. Our math team won the state with their high score on the American High School Math Examination. The elementary school conducted a Language Arts Study and will be using a Christian phonetic approach to language next year in grades K-2 from ABEKA Publishers.

In athletics, two new programs were added: softball for girls and baseball in a cooperative program with Wilder High School. Several of our boys helped Wilder earn third place in the State Baseball Tournament. The girls volleyball team was district champ and fourth in the state tournament.

Next year we will be adding another pre-school, this time in Parma, a community that has invited us to operate a school for them. It promises to be a new outreach in this western Idaho community.

Some organizational changes in administration are taking place also. The positions of superintendent and development director are being combined and a new position of junior-senior high school principal is added. I'm glad to announce that David Smitherman will be assuming this role as principal starting in August. I will be available to meet with business and other groups more now with this arrangement.

We would like to invite you to some special events on campus this coming year: The 4th Annual Antique Tractor Pull—August 23 and 24, 1991; Homecoming for all alumni—October 11, 1991; the 41st Annual Auction—February 22, 1992; and the 2nd Biennial Quilt Auction at the Bishops' House in Boise—June 12 and 13, 1992.

I look forward to new cooperation with the Friends churches and colleges. Coming from this background, I feel we should continue leadership development at G.F.A. for the future of the Friends churches in the Northwest.

How can you help?

- (1) We need Friends students from all over the Northwest Yearly Meeting. Perhaps families might consider moving to Southwest Idaho during their children's educational years. (This used to be done and is still done.)
- (2) Your prayers for the daily needs of the academy. (Cards are available.)
- (3) Your financial support—for student assistance, general operating expenses, and capital loan elimination.

It has been a privilege to share with you today. Thanks again for your wonderful support of Greenleaf Friends Academy.

## WESTERN EVANGELICAL SEMINARY

JAMES A. FIELD, INTERIM PRESIDENT

Greetings from the campus of Western Evangelical Seminary and in the precious Name which is above all other names.

There is much to encourage us at WES these days, and I would like to share some of the good news with you.

- Progress on the 25 Weeks to a Miracle program is encouraging with over \$66,000.00 received as of last week, yet so much more is needed to be done to reach our goal of operating debt free. This represents new money which WES would never have received otherwise. Praise the Lord for the progress!

- We have much to praise the Lord for in the leadership our students have been giving. They have sponsored a special chapel where they have ministered



to the faculty and staff, a campus-wide day of prayer, and now are working with us on ways to improve and enhance the spiritual development of each student while here at WES.

- Enrollment for spring 1991 was 181 and fall 1991 looks good at this time as applications are coming in daily. Please pray that the Lord will continue to direct new students to WES.

- Commencement recognized the successful work of a near record 39 students. These graduates will literally span the globe with their witness to the saving, keeping grace of God.

- At the last Oregon State Legislature licensing of counseling psychologists was established. So far only two of the smaller state schools have qualified, and WES has been assured that our program will meet the standards. What a tremendous competitive edge that will give us in ministry and recruiting of students.

- At Commencement Dr. Robert Crandall was introduced as the new Professor of Pastoral Ministry to begin this fall. The search process has already begun for persons in the areas of Old Testament and Theology. In addition, we plan to hire an additional counseling professor for either fall of 1992 or 1993. Competent adjunct professors from neighboring schools are being enlisted in order to maintain the highest levels of instruction possible.

- A Presidential Search Committee has been constituted and has already developed a profile and a list of potential candidates. The encouraging thing is that there are many qualified persons who would count it an honor to serve at WES.

- Soon we shall be announcing the appointment of a Director of Spiritual Formation who will be tasked with surveying our needs in this area, developing a more adequate Spiritual Life curriculum, and coordinating all related activities including chapel and Spiritual Life Committee.

So you can see some of the reasons why we are both encouraged and excited about WES, both now and into the future. God has given WES a very special opportunity to reshape itself to fit the needs of the church during the 1990's. The changes in faculty, staff, and administration need to be looked at positively. Let us find ways to work together to make the most of this open door of opportunity.

In closing this letter I would like to suggest this checklist of trusteeship for your prayerful consideration.

1. Have you been praying for WES on a regular basis?
2. Have you taken part in the 25 Weeks to a Miracle?
3. How many new friends for WES have you made?
4. Have you commended WES to a prospective student?
5. Have you presented WES in a positive, supportive, optimistic manner?
6. Do you really believe WES is going to come through this time of transition better than it has ever been?

May the Lord bless your conference sessions and the work of your churches richly in the coming year. WES counts it a privilege to work together with you in the Gospel ministry.

## VOLUNTEERS ON WHEELS

VOW is a non-profit, authorized agency of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, registered as a tax-exempt corporation in Oregon, Idaho, and Washington. Members are provided with a means through which they can assist Friends churches, schools, and camps with construction, ministry and service skills. Members are in complete accord with the statement of faith given in the *Faith*

and Practice of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church. No monetary compensation is received for work on VOW projects.

Since the beginning of VOW in 1984, thirty-three projects have been completed; eleven in churches, twelve in camps, eight in schools, two on the Selby House in Tillamook. A total of sixty-eight members have contributed a total of 10,789 hours which has been estimated to have saved applicants approximately \$90,000. Six of the thirty-three projects have been done at George Fox College, saving them about \$30,000. Homer Wright, a charter member of VOW, has worked on fourteen of the thirty-three projects. He was recently awarded a beautiful plaque by George Fox College in recognition for participating and coordinating all six projects. VOW is not a large volunteer work force with a current membership of forty. Our objectives include intensive recruiting of new members and communicating with all of our churches, schools, and camps concerning availability of VOW assistance.

Our Bible text found in Ephesians 2:10 is "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." Pray that VOW might continue to have the commitment and energy to serve God in the years to come.

## BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The last year was a busy one for the Board of Evangelism. It has numerous responsibilities including supervising new church plants; assisting existing churches with programs for expanded outreach and growth; administering activities in extension churches; and leadership development. The Board was active in all of these areas during the last twelve months.

### *Planting New Churches*

The Lord works in wonderful ways. Just when you think you are about to run out of resources, God opens up His storehouse to allow His work to continue. So it was that after planting five churches in two years, the Board had depleted its supply of church-planting pastors. While the will to continue planting churches remained, the Board struggled with how to bring together the necessary resources which includes the right person, the right place, and the finances to accomplish the task. That is when God laid it upon the hearts of Roy and Karen McConaughy to plant a church in Idaho.

Roy and Karen felt led to move to Boise and reopen the old East Boise facility under a new banner—**ParkCenter Friends Church**. With the dynamic leadership of Roy and Karen, the hard work of a faithful core group unselfishly provided by other Friends churches in the area, and the able administrative assistance of Retha McCutchen, ParkCenter Friends Church opened on October 14, 1990, with 127 in attendance. The church continues to reach out into the community with the light of God's love drawing in new visitors (many previously unchurched) on a continuing basis. Since its opening attendance has averaged 70.



### *Assisting Existing Churches*

The Board of Evangelism is responsible for assisting churches with plateaued and declining attendance in developing ideas to encourage growth. To this end, the Board has developed the "Healthy Church Program." This program is designed to evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of existing church programs. Based upon the findings, the church can add, restructure old, or implement new programs to more effectively reach out into its community.

This program is in its infancy much as our church planting efforts were four years ago. This year the Board hopes to apply it to three churches in order to refine its implementation. Once developed, the Board plans to formulate teams that can provide churches with assistance in a variety of areas such as teaching the use of spiritual gifts and formulating small groups for discipleship.

As with the church planting program, the Healthy Church Program will take time to refine and implement. However, there is considerable interest for this program throughout the Yearly Meeting. It has the potential to greatly assist our existing churches in evangelism, outreach, and growth.

### *Administering Other Evangelism Activities*

Last fall the Board of Evangelism sponsored a Focus Conference on "Opening the Front Door and Closing the Back Door" with Win Arn of Church Growth International. This conference was well attended by pastors and key laypeople. The Board also helped other pastors attend the Meta Church Conference and Breaking the 200 Barrier Conference, both put on by the Fuller Theological Seminary, and several attended the Billy Graham School of Evangelism. The Board also made possible the Call to Ministry Conference for those sensing a call to pastoral or missionary service with Northwest Yearly Meeting.

This past year the Board supervised the work of nine extension churches. We continue to work with Nampa Friends Church in their transition to an extension church. We also supported those attending the Twin Lakes Friends and McCall Friends gatherings as they decided to discontinue meeting. Share Calls were issued this year for Camas and Rosemere Friends churches.

### *Identifying Future Needs*

In the last three years, the Board of Evangelism has planted six new churches. Most of the financial resources for these efforts was provided from the sale of properties of closed churches. We believe that this money was well spent as these new churches are letting the light of Christ shine into the lives of many hurting people.

But, praise the Lord, we are not closing churches as fast as we used to. And we expect to see even fewer closed in the future. However, this means that we will have fewer resources with which to plant new churches. The Board of Evangelism only receives \$16,000 in the Great Commission Program budget for planting churches which is inadequate for even one church plant. It is absolutely vital that we develop an alternate source of funding in order to continue the work God wants us to do.

Therefore, the Board developed a program called "Join the Harvest" which is designed to provide the continuing funds needed for church planting in the future. The concept of the program is simple. If everyone in the Yearly Meeting will give just a little, it will add up to a lot of work that can be accomplished in the Kingdom. The program asks that every adult commit to give \$5.00 per month to support church planting/renewal. This small sum, when multiplied by all the adults in the Yearly Meeting will provide the funds necessary to plant churches for years into the future.

If you haven't signed up for this program yet—then now is the time. See any Board member or call the Yearly Meeting Office for details.

The Lord has blessed us greatly in this past year. And He is true to His word. He will continue to bless us as we are faithful to carry out His work.

The report was approved.

## COMMISSION ON MEDIA

The Commission on Media remains dedicated to excellence in communication as a ministry of the church, whether by printed or visual means. To facilitate this goal, we offer workshops during Yearly Meeting sessions as well as sponsoring a Writers' Dinner to give focus each year to some facet of writing or publishing. Our goal is to be a resource agency for starting writers' groups and for encouraging and developing prospective and established authors. We also hope to serve as a clearing house for questions on either written or visual communication skills. This year's Writers' Dinner will feature Howard Macy, author and professor of religion at George Fox College. Howard has titled his address "Whispering Down the Clatter."

Barclay Press has now become an incorporated business but continues with its ties to the Commission on Media through the Commission's oversight of the Publishing Fund and its approval of primary manuscripts to be published. The incorporation will free the Press to conduct a certain amount of "for profit" business under the previously approved by-laws. Dan McCracken, Press manager, continues to maintain high-quality printing with an ever-increasing ministry in publishing. The dedicated staff of the Press and the Barclay Press Board of Directors have given invaluable assistance in the growth and vision of Barclay Press. Staff members include, in addition to Dan McCracken, Dick Eichenberger, production manager; Alice Maurer, bookkeeper; Dennis Headrick, prepress supervisor; Sharon Holdahl, secretary/receptionist; Les Peterson, pressman; Katy Matchette and Jean Clark, typesetters, and Sue Dorshimer, prepress assistant. Current part-time employees include Susan Fawver, Rachel Hinshaw, Jennifer Kinard, George Thomas, Nancy Thomas, and Janelle Townsend. Board of Directors members are LeRoy Benham, Chairman, Harlow Ankeny, Ken Beebe, Dea Cox, Phil Harmon, and Retha McCutchen. Additional information about the activities of Barclay Press are included in their report below.

Yearly Meeting Archivist Frank Cole encourages churches, boards, and committees to be diligent in keeping records of all events and to send this information to him for the Archives. If there is doubt as to the historical value of any items, he stresses the need to let the archivist make this decision.

Finally, the Commission on Media cooperates with the Evangelical Friends International-North America Region in the publication of the *Evangelical Friend*. We deeply appreciate the work of Paul Anderson, editor, in this regard.

## BARCLAY PRESS REPORT

DAN MCCracken, MANAGER

Your church press continues to have a growing ministry through printing and publishing. In 1990, 623 printing jobs were done for sixty-six customers and made up two-thirds of the Barclay Press income. The other third of the total income came from the printing and sale of Barclay Press projects and the sale of other books and Sunday school material. Seventy-three percent of the work



done for printing customers was for the Friends Church and related organizations. Income showed a 19 percent increase over 1989. Comparison of current year to date to the same period last year shows an increase of 12 percent.

Publishing and marketing took a major step forward as *Christians in the Crossfire* was sold to more than 350 Christian bookstores across the country. The first printing of 2,000 sold out in February and more than 1,300 copies of the second printing had sold by June 30, 1991. The authors, Mark McMinn and James Foster, have done radio interviews about the book on stations in Los Angeles and New York and 20 cities between. The opportunity for us to minister across denominational lines is exciting.

A new book scheduled for release at Yearly Meeting is *The Way You Believe*, Thoughts on the Nature of Faith, by Lauren King. Barclay Press is producing this book in cooperation with Evangelical Friends Church-Eastern Region and Malone College.

Books scheduled for reprinting are *The Rich Heritage of Quakerism*, Barclay's *Apology*, and *Rhythms of the Inner Life*. *Rhythms*, by Howard Macy, was first published by Revell and will be reissued by Barclay Press.

Effective March 1, 1991, Barclay Press began operating as an Oregon corporation instead of doing business as an assumed business name under Northwest Yearly Meeting. Yearly Meeting approval last year of a recommendation to reorganize in this way was followed by midyear Executive Council approval of articles of incorporation, by-laws, and the stock subscription agreement stipulating Northwest Yearly Meeting as sole owner of all common stock. This form of organization better insulates the Yearly Meeting from tax, insurance, or any other form of financial liability. It also allows Barclay Press to retain its position as a ministry of NWYM and at the same time more aggressively expand its market and effectiveness. Revenue from commercial printing helps support the high cost of printing technology and helps support the publishing ministry of our church.

The report was approved.

1. We call upon the young people of junior high, high school, and college age to study carefully the Friends statements on war and peace so that they will be prepared to make a decision long before the question of military service arises.

2. We urge pastors, Sunday school teachers, and youth workers to teach those in their care the beliefs of Friends on war and peace, as taught in the Bible and stated in *Faith and Practice*, and to emphasize their validity. We remind parents that an attitude of nonviolence begins at home.

3. We encourage all adults in the Yearly Meeting to keep informed about issues of justice and peace arising in our society and to address their lawmakers or otherwise speak out about their concerns.

This statement was approved.

- 62. J.D. Baker, executive director, presented the report of Friends Fund.

### FRIENDS FUND

The Friends Fund organization is the extension of NWYM to arrange for deferred gifts through avenues of estate planning. This work has been in process for 19 years. Through these years it has experienced a struggle in obtaining sufficient funds for administration. We wish to present some of the background information leading to this struggle and inform you that a process is a place to project correction and recovery. A plan for the promotion of estate planning and deferred giving was considered by the NWYM Board of Stewardship in 1971. A program of deferred giving is a long-range commitment. Agreements would



be entered into between NWYM and donors which require records and protection for all involved entities. A plan to finance the administration of the program would be needed.

The Board of Stewardship presented the plan to the NWYM Executive Council in 1972 and requested that funding be included for this work. The plan was accepted but funding for the work was not approved.

Friends Fund was organized by the Executive Council and incorporated in 1972 and is a ministry of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church. It was charged with the responsibility of giving assistance and information on estate planning and to develop deferred gift arrangements for ministry. Friends Fund manages a significant number of Charitable Trust arrangements which have been arranged by donors. All trust assets are segregated from Friends Fund assets. These funds are invested by professional investment managers who strive for maximum return with minimum risk. Investments are made in companies which reflect the ethical investment policies as established by the NWYM Pension Fund, George Fox College, and Friends Fund. Income is paid to donors for their lifetime. The gift to ministry is made at death of the donor.

A considerable amount of gifts to ministries has been generated by this effort. As of December 31, 1990 Friends Fund has distributed \$1,770,348.42 in gifts to ministries since its beginning. Of this amount, \$1,660,184.30 was distributed to Northwest Yearly Meeting, George Fox College, Friendsview Manor, and other related ministries.

Future planned distributions including all wills, revocable and irrevocable trusts total \$6,184,946.19, of which five and a half million would directly benefit our Northwest Yearly Meeting ministries. This amount is calculated from the signed documents which are on file with Friends Fund. We appreciate each person who has made this commitment from their estate.

The operation and administration of Friends Fund is carried out by a Board of Directors, of which twelve are elected by NWYM and three by the Board itself. All board members must be members of the Friends Church. They meet quarterly to direct this work. They pay their own expenses for travel, meals, etc. The Board employs a full-time director to administer the work and make contacts with those who are interested in estate planning. They employ a part-time secretary for correspondence, file processing, documentation, and preparation of all business meeting minutes. They employ a full time accounting person to maintain financial records on all managed trust arrangements.

The administration expense of Friends Fund is not paid through the NWYM budget, but is funded only by individual gifts directed to them through estate distributions. When the Fund was originated in 1972 provisions were not made for funding its operation other than through these direct gifts. A concept was approved by the board members to borrow funds at average or below average rates to cover operating expense until wills and trusts would mature and the loans could then be repaid.

At this time the matured gift arrangements coming to Friends Fund have not produced sufficient amounts to repay the borrowed funds for a number of reasons: (1) in the early years not many gifts were designated to Friends Fund but were designated to other ministries; (2) longevity of maturity for these planned gift arrangements has increased; (3) interest rates on the borrowed funds increased tremendously through the 80's.

For these reasons Friends Fund has not been able to repay the borrowed amounts and has had to continue borrowing to pay administration costs and the interest to lenders. However, Friends Fund has continued to honor all gift arrangements to other ministries.

The number of gift arrangements for this work has improved. The future planned distributions presently designated for Friends Fund is \$2,525,624.21. These gifts will mature over a number of years and will apply to the administration and loan reduction costs. All income beyond administration cost is for

ministries. The accumulated indebtedness as of December 31, 1990 was \$855,373.00.

The Friends Fund Board presented a plan to the Board of Stewardship during the 1990 sessions asking for help in funding their administration costs. The request was based on the fact that Friends Fund has raised a large number of gifts for other Yearly Meeting ministries. The Board of Stewardship felt that because of the Workers Compensation debt and the many requests of other boards and commissions they could not give support to this request at the present time. The Friends Fund Board then commissioned a special study committee made up of board members and non-board members to develop a program for eliminating this operating deficit. This committee made several recommendations to NWYM. The Executive Council then named a Friends Fund task force to review these recommendations. This task force was chaired by Harold Ankeny and was commissioned by the Executive Council to not only study the deficit problem and requests from Friends Fund, but to also review the overall operation of estate planning and deferred giving program for NWYM.

The Friends Fund Board through a special Marketing Committee has worked diligently on marketing plans and goals which will be more effective in accomplishing the deficit reduction and increasing gifts to other ministries. This plan asks each board member to become involved in making an annual commitment to the Friends Fund program. It also outlines goals for a ten-year period and a marketing strategy to obtain these goals. Friends Fund has reduced the interest rates being paid to its noteholders. This will mean an immediate reduction in operating costs. The Fund is also searching for office space which would be less expensive or could be donated rather than paying monthly rent. Avenues will be examined for more effective management of trust arrangements.

We ask for an interest in your prayers and your continued support of our Friends Fund board and staff as we work to implement this ministry.

Mark Ankeny, presiding clerk, read a statement from the Executive Council: The Executive Council reviewed these findings along with the ten-year goals and Marketing Strategy prepared by the Friends Fund Board. It is the opinion that the Friends Fund Board will initiate the plans to keep the deficit at a minimum, work diligently toward deficit reduction, and fulfill all obligations and plans which you now have in place with Friends Fund and that all trust funds and notes will be protected. The progress of this effort will be closely monitored by the Friends Fund Board and the Executive Council and supervised by a joint committee of the Executive Council and Friends Fund Board. We encourage you to continue your support of this program and ask that you pray for guidance for the Friends Fund Board and staff and the Executive Council as they strive toward success of this Northwest Yearly Meeting planned giving program.

Concerns for the accumulated indebtedness were voiced. The report was approved, followed by a time of affirmation and prayer.

## COMMISSION ON FAMILY LIFE

Our focus continues to be strengthening Christian testimonies in our home and family relationships. We have excellent video and cassette tapes available through the Yearly Meeting Office which vary from topics on parent/teen communication, sexuality, husbands and wives, single parenting, etc. This information is available in the catalog the Yearly Meeting Office sends out to churches annually for Christian education clerks and pastors. These are very effective tools which can be used in the home, for Bible study groups, evening church, youth and neighborhood outreach.

All members of the Commission on Family Life receive *The Citizen* magazine from Focus on the Family. This increases our awareness of family issues to which we can respond individually or corporately.



Again, we feature a display table with various published helps available, realizing we can only show a limited representation of resources. We continue to add to the Richard H. Beebe Memorial Fund which provides counseling for pastors and families.

Our workshops this year address Christian attitudes relating to sexuality, sex education at home, school and church, and sexual abuse. The panel members reflect a wide variety of experience: nursing, teaching, school counselors, family therapists, pastors, parents and foster parents, and a survivor of sexual abuse. There is hope for America and for family life in our culture to be the heart and strength of our nation as we continue to seek Christ and place Him first in our relationship.

The report was approved.

We received 33 epistles from various yearly meetings this year, 19 from the United States, and 14 from countries around the world. Greetings written by young Friends around the world totaled 19. Among the epistles were communications from the Friends World Committee for Consultation, the European Quaker Network on the Peace Tax Concern, and an epistle from the First International Theological Conference of Quaker Women.

From London Yearly Meeting we read, "In conflict there are rich openings for growth, if we hold together, seeking through the Holy Spirit for ways forward. We should not avoid confronting and working through issues within our meetings. Conflict resolution and mediation are part of our witness."

Swedish Friends write, "As Quakers, we entreat people in the wealthy world to consider the connection between the high level of consumption there and the misery of the poor countries."

Friends from the two yearly meetings in the newly reunified Germany write (interestingly both epistles came on the same sheet of paper), "We all feel burdened by the constantly changing situation and are thankful for the opportunity to gain strength in a community experienced anew."

The Yearly Meeting of Friends in Guatemala and El Salvador sends the news that the monthly meetings in El Salvador have been recognized as an independent yearly meeting.

In their epistle, the Friends in New Zealand admit their failure to eradicate the racist structure in their country. They pledge themselves to work toward genuine partnership with the Maori people. They are also deeply concerned that so many worthy movements are increasingly politicized. It is vital for Friends to bear witness to the spiritual basis of our work for peace.

Environmental issues, prison system reform, the connection between our taxes and the funding of the military, education of our children, abortion, racism, shocking poverty and wanton waste, the Gulf war, and the homeless are problems we as Friends have in common. In the words of the Friends World Committee for Consultation, "Pray that we may be filled with outrage at the injustices of this world and filled with urgency to put our faith into action for its healing."

The Epistle Committee recommends that we continue sending our epistle to all the yearly meetings of Friends around the world, as listed in the current Calendar of Yearly Meetings published by the Friends World Committee for Consultation.

The recommendation was approved.



The report was approved.

■ 73. The epistle from Northwest Yearly Meeting to other yearly meetings was read and suggested changes were incorporated into the following epistle:

To Friends everywhere: Greetings from the 99th sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends gathered on the George Fox College campus July 20-26, 1991 in Newberg, Oregon, USA. We were enriched by the messages of Brennan Manning, former Franciscan priest, author, and evangelist, dealing with God's unconditional love toward us and our responsibility to share that same love with all others. We held open worship during the morning inspirational hour followed by our business sessions.

Following approval of Joseph Gerick, our new general superintendent, pastors and elders laid hands on him, asking God's guidance in his leadership of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

We were pleased to record Mark Burton and Curtis Hastings as ministers of the Gospel during these sessions. Dan and Tami Cammack, missionaries on furlough from Peru, were the speakers at the men's and women's banquets. They stressed their appreciation of encouragement and prayer support.

After much discussion, no consensus was reached on the question of joining the Friends Committee on National Legislation, a lobbying group based in Washington, D. C. The Yearly Meeting Council of Elders will be considering our various affiliations during the coming year and making suggestions of needed changes.

A statement from the Department of Peace Testimony was approved calling for young people to prepare to make a decision about military service by studying Friends beliefs as taught in the Bible and stated in our *Faith and Practice*. All adults were encouraged to stay informed about issues of justice and peace and to speak out about our concerns.

In the spirit of Brennan's messages, we close with the Scripture found in 1 John 4:21, "And He has given us this command: Whoever loves God must also love his brother."

The epistle was approved with suggested changes.

## GEORGE FOX COLLEGE REPORT 1990-1991

In the study of management and marketing is found a common mistake of successful organizations: "T.F.W.M.T.S." or "They Forgot What Made Them Successful."

George Fox College has had four years of rapid growth. We have added programs and they have become successful. We have changed strategies and they have been successful. But what has really made us successful?

The reason we are successful is "human resources": new persons who have joined us and faithful persons who have stayed. So, allow me to write broadly about our good people.

Every college and university has an abundance of Ph.D.'s on the faculty. Most have CPAs managing their finances, and student development professionals in student life, etc. What makes George Fox College different? We have persons who are **competent, committed, and called**.

They are **committed** to the lordship of Christ and **committed** to excellence in teaching, learning, living, and leading. "Don't work as if you were working for men but . . . do all that you do as unto Christ." (Col. 3:23)

Gordon MacDonald in the book *Ordering Your Private World* asks the question, "Are you **called** or driven?" I've often said that at George Fox College, we have the highest percentage of "**called** persons" of any place I've been or known about. That is the secret of our success!! Men and women who feel **called** of God to act out the **commitment** to Christ—Here! Now!

We also have a **commitment** to students. If we stop putting the student first in our decision making, we are in danger of T.F.W.M.T.S. It is obvious that faculty and student life staff give students priority in their work and thinking. It is just as important that administration and support staff also do it.

Striving for excellence works only if we have persons who are **competent**. Our success comes from individuals who are doing a first-rate job at their tasks and relationships. We must also constantly evaluate performance and effort so incompetence does not cause us to fall victims to T.F.W.M.T.S.

George Fox College's 100th year has been a good one. So far, we have **not** forgotten what made us successful! I invite you to help us "stay the course." We also need a supporting constituency that is **competent, committed, and called!**

### PROGRAM

**NATIONAL RECOGNITION.** For the third time, George Fox College was named one of "America's Best Colleges" by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine. In perhaps the most important category—Academic Reputation—George Fox moved up to second among western region liberal arts colleges. The College was ranked eighth overall among 385 colleges in an area from Hawaii to Texas.

National recognition again came to George Fox as it was one of 108 colleges named to the Templeton Foundation's "Honor Roll for Character Building Colleges." The honor roll is compiled from a poll of presidents of all four-year, accredited institutions of higher education in the nation. GFC was selected for the third time, the only college in Oregon named.

The Templeton Foundation also honored the College by selecting GFC to the first Honor Roll for Free Enterprise Teaching. Just 87 colleges in the nation were chosen, GFC the only one in the Northwest. College presidents and academic deans were asked to select schools that best exemplify the teaching of the values of Western civilization and the free market economy.

**ENROLLMENT.** In its centennial year, George Fox College topped 1,000 students in enrollment for the first time. Enrollment rose 13.5 percent to 1,073. The fall term total included 73 in the first graduate degree program. The undergraduate total was a 5.8 percent increase over the previous year. There were 786 students on campus in the traditional program and another 214 in the degree-completion program in human resources management with classes in

Portland, Salem, and Eugene. The HRM program had 16 classes in the year. Beginning in September, the program will be known as Management of Human Resources.

**CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION.** George Fox College began its 100th year on September 9, 1990, dedicating a new 65-foot Centennial Tower, a gift to the College by longtime GFC supporter Esther Klages. Designed by world-renowned architect Pietro Belluschi, the tower will have a time capsule placed beside it as the concluding event of the yearlong celebration.

The celebration was more than just an on-campus event. Birthday parties were held throughout the West. Featured was the showing of the video "A Heritage to Honor, a Future to Fulfill," carrying out the Centennial theme. That also is the name for the centennial book about the College, written by Professor of History Ralph Beebe and scheduled for publication in July.

The Centennial observance will conclude September 8 and 9, 1991, with a Sunday afternoon Centennial Fair on campus (including a Four Flats Quartet reunion concert) and a Monday schedule that includes internationally known speakers as guest lecturers, a Centennial Convocation, and an invitational dinner.

**CAMPUS PASTOR.** Following a nationwide six-month search, Gregg Lamm was chosen new George Fox College campus pastor/chaplain. A 1980 GFC graduate, Lamm is the first to hold the new title, a change from the previous chaplain/director of Christian life designation.

The campus pastor directs the College's chapel program, provides pastoral counseling, speaks in worship services on and off campus, and represents the College to churches and pastors. For the last seven years Lamm has been pastor of the Klamath Falls, Oregon, Friends Church.

### ACADEMICS

**DOCTORAL PROGRAM.** George Fox College began its 100th year with its first graduate program students on campus. The College accepted the doctoral program in clinical psychology from Western Conservative Baptist Seminary. Students, faculty, library materials, and administrative records were transferred from the Portland seminary to the GFC campus. Seventy-three students were enrolled.

The psychology program is designed to develop practicing professional psychologists who are licensable and who have a Christian world view. The program culminates in a doctor of psychology degree and takes five years to complete, including four years of full-time academic study and one year of full-time internship. A master's degree in psychology is earned in the process. The program includes 27 semester hours in biblical/theological studies.

**COMMENCEMENT.** In its second year with two graduation ceremonies, the College graduated 266 students.

In the second Midyear Commencement ceremonies December 15, the College for the first time awarded graduate degrees. Seven received doctoral degrees in the new program in clinical psychology, and another two were awarded master's degrees. There were 85 graduates in all. Of the 76 students in undergraduate programs, 62 were in the degree-completion program in human resources management. Speaker was E. Arthur Self, president of Malone College.

In the April 27 commencement ceremonies, a record 181 students received diplomas, including four doctorates and six master's degrees in clinical psychology and 171 bachelor's degrees, with 64 of those through the degree-completion program. Guest speaker was author and lecturer Rebecca Manley Pippert.

**COMPUTERS ACROSS THE CURRICULUM.** During the academic year, George Fox College developed plans that will make the College one of the first in the nation to provide every undergraduate student with a personal computer.



Students will receive a Macintosh Classic computer that becomes theirs at graduation. Although a handful of other colleges in the nation have adopted a similar program, George Fox is the first in the West, the smallest liberal arts college, and the first Christian college in America with the program. Enhancement of the teaching/learning process is the goal. A spin-off benefit of the program, developed by the faculty, will be computer literacy for all graduates. It has the potential of making traditional term papers paperless. Instead, students can turn in their "papers" and work assignments on computer disk. Faculty, who also will receive computers, will be able to assign computer-based homework using software they have created or purchased. A computer store will be established on campus. The program will begin with freshman students in the fall of 1991, with returning and transfer students able to "buy in" to the program.

**INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS.** In May, 41 students participated in GFC's Juniors Abroad program. Students traveled to Australia, to Europe, and to England in three-week study tours. Juniors Abroad provides every eligible GFC student with a cross-cultural learning opportunity by subsidizing transportation costs.

Seven other students participated in national Christian College Coalition programs in Africa and in Costa Rica during fall semester.

**FACULTY AWARDS.** Rebecca Ankeny, associate professor of English and chairperson of the Division of Communication and Literature, was the recipient of GFC's 1990-91 Faculty Achievement Award, sponsored by the Burlington Northern Foundation. The \$2,000 unrestricted cash award program was created in 1984 to recognize teaching excellence. A 1977 GFC graduate, Ankeny has a doctoral degree in English and has been a faculty member since 1988.

Assistant Professor of Religion Ron Stansell received a \$1,000 teaching award from the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. The annual "Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership" award is given to 700 faculty members in the nation for "resourcefulness and leadership as a private-college educator." A 1965 GFC graduate, he has a doctor of missiology degree and has taught at George Fox since 1985.

#### DEVELOPMENT/FINANCE

**CENTENNIAL CAMPAIGN.** George Fox College is seeking to raise \$16 million in a three-year fund raising campaign launched April 6. Nearly \$4 million already was raised at the time of the announcement of the College's largest-ever fund drive. About 500 persons attended a campaign kickoff dinner on campus.

The drive is designed to prepare the College for its next century. The Centennial Campaign will fund library holdings, endowment growth, and new buildings. The largest project is a \$5.3 million natural science building. Another \$3 million is projected for a new student services/administration building. The campaign also includes \$550,000 for a new maintenance building and storage building; \$500,000 for remodeling and expansion of Heacock Commons; and \$500,000 for resurfacing of the Colcord Field track, four new tennis courts, paving of the Wheeler Sports Center parking area, and paving and additional parking on the east campus. Included in the campaign goal is \$2.45 million for the College's annual fund, meeting unrestricted budget needs for the period to 1994. The campaign includes \$1.9 million for endowment and \$800,000 for purchasing library holdings and an automated catalog system. Another \$750,000 is for additional property acquisition and improvements, and \$120,000 is designated for long-range planning, already underway.

**CAMPUS EXPANSION.** One new residence hall was completed and another started during the 1990-91 school year. On February 9, the Jack L. Willcuts Residence Hall was dedicated while work already was underway on the Richard H. Beebe Residence Hall. Groundbreaking for Beebe Hall was held Sept. 29 with completion set for mid-July.

The 9,000-square-foot, three-story buildings complete a planned three-building complex on the west side of the Hess Creek Canyon greenway. Each houses 40 students in 10 two-room suites. Total cost for the two buildings is more than \$1 million. They are the 32nd and 33rd buildings on campus.

In May the College gained much-needed administrative office space with the opening of the President's/Development Office complex. The remodeled former residence across from Pennington Hall houses 15 employees. Creation of the new offices allowed 13 division and department office changes during the late spring and early summer, including the shift of the Student Life offices from the Hoover Academic Building to Wood-Mar Hall.

The College began purchasing residences in the two blocks adjacent to the existing campus, on the south. Three will be used for student/employee housing, and one was refurbished to become the new offices for the Division of Business and Economics.

**BALANCED BUDGET.** For the 20th consecutive year, George Fox College completed its fiscal year with a balanced budget. Support for the College's annual fund has continued to rise—from \$275,000 in 1982-83 to \$575,000 in 1990-91. The College's total budget for 1990-91 was \$11.9 million.

#### EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

**FALL CONVOCATION.** John Punshon, GFC's visiting professor of Quaker studies for fall semester, was the speaker for the annual Fall Honors Convocation opening GFC's 100th year. He also was speaker for the 16th annual Quaker Heritage Week in November. Punshon has been a Quaker studies tutor at Woodbrooke College, Birmingham, England.

**RELIGIOUS CONFERENCES.** GFC's Christian Life Week in September featured Mike Hilty, pastor of Calvary Bible Fellowship in Eugene for 12 years. Hilty, who spoke on the topic "Personal Relationships," is former campus pastor at the University of Oregon.

George Fox's 24th annual Missions Conference in January brought Mark Engel, a missionary to Taiwan, to campus for Chapel talks. He is in a second term as an Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region missionary, working with 34 churches in Taiwan.

"Reshaping the Church and Society, the Role of the Laity in the '90s" was the topic for George Fox's Spring Theological Conference in March. Robert Banks, first occupant of the Homer L. Goddard Chair of the Ministry of the Laity at Fuller Theological Seminary, Pasadena, was conference speaker.

Carolyn Koons, featured on "Hour Magazine" and "The Oprah Winfrey Show," spoke in April as the annual Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer. She is executive director of the Institute for Outreach ministries at Azusa Pacific University. The lecture series was established in 1969 to bring outstanding scholars to college and university campuses.

**ACADEMIC CONFERENCES AND EVENTS.** "Catalysts of the Reformation: A Life Wasted or a Life Worthwhile?" was the topic for the fall Faculty Lecture in November. The 44th lecturer in the series, started in 1955, was Julie Hobbs, who was named professor emeritus after retiring at the end of the semester following 15 years at George Fox. The College's drama team, The GFC Players, illustrated the lecture in brief vignettes.

The life of Mrs. Herbert Hoover as "The President's Partner" was the topic for the eighth biennial Herbert Hoover Symposium in March. Five professors and writers and a journalist/playwrite from across the nation were on campus.

David Augsburg was the speaker for the 1991 John Woolman Forum sponsored by the Center for Peace Learning. Augsburg is professor of pastoral care and counseling at Fuller Theological Seminary, Pasadena, and the author of 20 books. He spoke in February on the topic "Peacemaking as Healing."



**MUSIC AND DRAMA.** Nearly 100 actors, singers, and instrumentalists from the College and Newberg community presented *A Heritage to Honor, A Future to Fulfill*, a historical pageant depicting the sights, sounds, and scenes of a century of George Fox College history. Used were 100 stage lights and 2,000 individual lights in the Bauman Auditorium presentation that ran six times between February 8 and 16.

The drama department staged *Shake the Country!* in November, highlighting the life and times of George Fox, the College's namesake. In April it produced *Antigone*, a play based on the third of Sophocles' Oedipus trilogy.

"Dayspring," GFC's nine-member touring vocal ensemble, participated in a 28-day, 5,400-mile, 40-program tour. Highlighting the April and May trip through Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and California was a performance at the Carnation Plaza in Disneyland.

GFC's Concert Band, Jazz Band, Concert Choir, Chapel Choir, Handbell Ringers, and the Chehalem Valley Orchestra performed throughout the year on and off campus. The Concert Band spent four days touring southern Oregon, and the Concert Choir traveled to local churches for Sunday performances. Vocal performers also presented the popular "Ye Olde Royal Feast," a madrigal dinner complete with medieval costumes, sets, servants, beggars, and royal court.

The 85-member Oregon Symphony Orchestra performed in concert at GFC's Bauman Auditorium May 18. The performance at the College was the fourth sponsored by Ken and Joan Austin of Newberg.

**ATHLETICS.** In 1990-91, every George Fox athletic team made the NAIA District 2 playoffs for the first time in the College's history.

GFC's cross country teams ran into history during fall semester. In placing fifth and sixth in the nation, the Bruin and Lady Bruin runners earned the highest GFC finishes in national NAIA competition. Top men's runner was Jonathan Morse at 37th. Jill Jamison Beals placed 19th for the women. Another first came to George Fox when the College won not only both of the NAIA District 2 team titles but had both individual champions as well.

The No. 1 seed, a 10-game winning streak, and the home court advantage weren't enough for GFC's volleyball team to break into its first District 2 championship game. The 29-11 Lady Bruins came close. They finished one match away. Junior outside hitter Cindy Warner was named to the NAIA national honorable mention team, one of two Oregon players selected.

Dan LaVeine, the nation's all-time collegiate soccer scorer, finished his college career in appropriate fashion as a national champion. The soccer team won the National Christian College Athletic Association championship. LaVeine, who scored 43 of his 130 career goals his final season, was named NCCAA player of the year. George Fox, 19-5-1, finished as District 2 runner-up for the second time in three years.

After losing seven of the first nine games, the Lady Bruin basketball team finished strong to grab NAIA District 2's East Division's third spot in the playoffs. A late season 6-3 run produced a more respectable 10-15 record. The Lady Bruins then fell in the first round of the playoffs. Senior guard Jennifer Childress was named to the district's honorable mention team.

The district's winningest men's basketball team the last two years (53-11) ended the season in the district championship game. The 24-6 season came to a close with a loss in Idaho, keeping the 22nd ranked Bruins from the NAIA national playoffs. Two juniors were named to the district all-star team: forward Jeff Hoffman, who set a single-game scoring record with a 50-point show against Concordia, and Dave Wilson, the 6-11 center believed to hold the nation's career blocked shot record at 461.

The softball Lady Bruins probably surprised themselves in posting a 15-7 regular season record and earning the third seed in the district playoffs. After

three losing seasons, George Fox rode underclass talent and all-district freshman pitcher Becky Stewart's arm to their first playoff berth in four years.

GFC's track teams proved themselves the best in District 2 in national competition. After the men and women finished second in the district meet, they combined their 12th and 27th national championship places for the best men-women finish in the district. Jill Jamison Beals regained her 1989 national title with a 35:50.39 effort in the 10,000-meter run and placed third in the 5,000 meters at 17:19.42. Fifth places in the nation went to four-time District 2 racewalking champion Vance Godfrey and 800-meter GFC record holder Todd Bos.

Storming undefeated through the playoffs, the baseball Bruins won their first-ever District 2 championship. George Fox, 24-21 overall, advanced to the Area 1 playoffs, but the league-leading defense that keyed a 20-3 record against District 2 opponents turned up missing and the Bruins lost a pair. Named to district honors were Bruin Coach Pat Casey as coach of the year, and players Miguel Rivera, second base, and Gary Boyer, outfield, to the all-star team.

During the year, plans were made for the first women's soccer team, with a full schedule to start in September.
