## MINUTES

# Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1992

Monday, July 20, 10:45 a.m.

- 1. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny read the opening minute: Northwest Yearly Meeting convenes its 100th sessions on July 20, 1992, on the campus of George Fox College under the theme "A New People to Be Gathered." He read an excerpt from the minutes of the first Yearly Meeting Sessions of 1893.
- 2. A traveling minute for Margaret Fraser from London Yearly Meeting was read. Margaret represents the Quaker World Relations Committee. She was introduced and brought greetings.
- 3. Meta Ruth Ferguson and Marie Parker from Pacific Yearly Meeting were introduced and brought greetings.
- 4. Heather Moir, clerk of Friends World Committee for Consultation and a member of New England Yearly Meeting, was introduced and brought greetings.
- 5. Retha McCutchen, Associate Superintendent, introduced new pastors and pastors in new locations: Eric and Mari Kay Smith—Cherry Grove; Ron Woodward—Silverton; Cathy Kruger—Entiat; Shawn and Katrina McConaughy, copastors—North Valley; Rich and Nadine Miller—Olympic View.
- 6. Chad Gates brought greetings from Barclay College.
- 7. The keynote address given by General Superintendent Joseph Gerick Sunday evening was approved.

Friends, I want to welcome you to this 1992 Yearly Meeting. I am particularly happy to share this time with you, for this is the year of our centennial celebration. One hundred years ago Oregon Yearly Meeting, which grew into



Northwest Yearly Meeting, was founded by Quakers with a vision for expanding the Kingdom of God into the Northwest. For one hundred years Friends have evangelized the lost, disciplined new Christians to maturity, met social needs, and reached out to foreign lands with the good news of the Gospel. In that time untold numbers of lives have been touched directly or indirectly as Friends faithfully "walked their talk" in integrity, honesty, and love.

The results of those who preceded us are evident for all to see:

- Vigorous national churches have been established in Bolivia and Peru
- Through Evangelical Friends International we participate in wider mission fields including Taiwan, India, Rwanda, Mexico City, and the Philippines
- Five camps for adult and youth retreats were built across the Yearly Meeting
- Primary schools and high schools were founded
- One of the top liberal arts colleges in the nation was established
- Christian leaders with names like Willcuts, Beebe, and Cammack are synonymous with Quakers in the Northwest.

Without question, over the last one hundred years the effect that Friends have had in the Northwest and around the world for the Kingdom of God has been inspirational.

As through much of Quaker history, God has blessed this work out of all proportion to our numbers. There are few examples in history that equal Friend's experience where so much has been accomplished in the Kingdom of God by so few. And so we gather this year to celebrate one hundred years of history as a Yearly Meeting.

During this Yearly Meeting, many events are planned to allow us to look back at our history. Let us enjoy our look at the past, for past success builds faith for future efforts.

As we look back at the last century, we will surely notice that life was much simpler then. The world was a much larger place. Travel and communication took a lot longer. The pace of life was slower. The values that Christians cherish such as family unity, morality, integrity, and love were more commonly held. Common decency was the norm rather than the exception.

Such is not the case today. The world has grown very small. Travel is fast and communication instantaneous. Traditional Christian values are in decline. The moral fabric of society is unraveling before our eyes resulting in family disunity, divorce, drug abuse, and sexual perversions of all kinds. Paul wrote to Timothy saying, "But mark this: There will be terrible times in the last days. People will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boastful, proud, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, without love, unforgiving, slanderous, without self-control, brutal, not lovers of the good, treacherous, rash, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God" (II Timothy 3:1-4). Based upon Paul's description, we must conclude that we are in the "last days."

But even though we find ourselves in the "last days," we still don't know how long the Lord will tarry. His return may be imminent or He may allow us to see the celebration of our second centennial. Therefore, like faithful servants we must prepare ourselves to continue laboring in the fields. Having one hundred years of service to the King in our past, it is now appropriate to look forward and see what He would have us do in the coming century. As we evaluate the condition of the Church in North America of which we are a part, I believe we can identify three areas that must be addressed if the church is to be faithful to its calling in the Kingdom of God. These areas include restoring the call to radical commitment required for being true disciples of Jesus Christ, living lives of holiness and purity in our daily walk, and experiencing the manifestation of God's power to bring healing and light to a hurting and ever-darkening world.

I believe the church must again hold high the standard of commitment that Jesus established for those who would be His disciples. Jesus clearly taught that to be His disciple requires total commitment to Him; nothing less will do. In Matthew we read Jesus' words, "He who loves father or mother more than Me

is not worthy of Me; and he who loves son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me. And he who does not take his cross and follow after Me is not worthy of Me" (Matt 10:37-38). To be true disciples of Jesus Christ, there must be nothing more important to us than Him. And even though He loves us as only God can, He will not lower this standard of discipleship.

Chapter 10 in the book of Mark tells the story of the rich young ruler. As Jesus and His disciples prepared for a trip, this young man ran up to Jesus and asked what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus quoted some of the Ten Commandments to which the young man replied that he had kept these commandments from his youth. Then the Scripture tells us, "And looking at him, Jesus felt a love for him, and said to him, 'One thing you lack: go and sell all you possess, and give to the poor, and you shall have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me.' But at these words his face fell, and he went away grieved, for he was one who owned much property."

This unfortunate young man allowed his possessions to stand between him and his total commitment to Jesus. The striking point of this story is that even though He loved him, Jesus allowed the young man to walk away rather than lower the level of commitment required to be His disciple. To those who are willing to make this total commitment, Jesus offers His Spirit in abundance resulting in fruitfulness in His Kingdom. But those of half-hearted commitment are like the seed in the Parable of the Sower that fell among the thorns. Its fruitfulness was choked out by the worry of the world and the deceitfulness of riches.

Tragically, the church in this country has softened Jesus' message of commitment. We have become a "Let's make a deal" church. When the standard of Jesus is lifted up and the rich young ruler turns to walk away, we cry out, "Wait a minute, let's make a deal! You don't have to be totally committed. Just commit as much as you can, and maybe you will grow into deeper commitment." The result of this compromise upon the people who comprise the Church is devastating. In this environment of compromise those who would be totally committed become less committed, and those who are less committed seldom grow into deeper commitment. As a result, the commitment level of the entire body is lowered to that of mediocrity where fruitfulness cannot flourish. In questioning why the church in North America has so little effect on society, we need not look much further than this for the cause. The spiritual vitality of the church has been sapped by our compromise to Jesus' message of commitment.

The philosophy of being all things to all people is not reflective of Jesus' ministry. In His ministry the Shepherd directed the sheep; the sheep did not direct the Shepherd. Jesus established the standard required to be His disciple and allowed people to choose whether or not they would accept it. We must do the same thing if we are to regain spiritual vitality. If we allow nominal Christians to sit comfortably in the pews year after year and feel no conviction at their lack of commitment, then we are not doing our jobs. If we dilute our message for fear that the uncommitted will get uncomfortable and walk away, then we are not preaching rightly the word of God. If we allow the uncommitted in our meetings to stifle growth by opposing change needed for spiritual renewal, then we are not doing the work of the Kingdom.

As we enter the beginning of our second century, we must regain this message of total commitment if we are to become fruitful disciples of Jesus Christ.

Another area the Yearly Meeting must address as we move into our second century is our concept of holiness and holy living. Historically, Friends have taught that upon confessing Christ and receiving the Holy Spirit into our hearts, we are empowered to live a profoundly different life upon this earth. We are called to grow up into Christ going from glory to glory. We are called by God to be conformed into the image of the Son. Adjectives used to describe this life are "holy," "pure," "without spot or blemish." Indeed, we are called to be "perfect" in love even as the Heavenly Father is perfect.



Holiness is a growth process that can be compared to a grape plant as it brings on its fruit. In the early summer the plant sets the fruit, but it is just tiny, hard green balls; certainly not good to eat. In the middle of the summer the grape is larger but still hard and green. It isn't until the end of the summer at harvest time that the grape becomes large, soft, and sweet to eat. To understand this example of holiness, of being perfect in Christ, we must recognize that the grape is perfect in each stage of its life. As a small, hard, green ball, it is perfect because that is what it is supposed to be in the early summer. As a larger hard green ball, it is perfect because that is what it is supposed to be in the middle of the summer. But at the end of the summer, when it changes into a large, soft sweet fruit, it is not only perfect, it is perfected.

So it is that holiness is a crisis of surrender leading to a growth process of ever-increasing surrender. It is a moving from glory to glory—from being perfect as a baby Christian to being perfect as an adolescent, as a teenager, as a young adult, as an adult. And upon our death, we are perfected as God glorifies us.

The complete Gospel message has two parts. The first part is that Jesus Christ died to save us from our sins. If we repent of our sins and accept His sacrifice, He will deliver us out of the kingdom of darkness and into the kingdom of light. We will receive His Spirit and with it salvation and eternal life. The second part of the Gospel message is that there is power in the Spirit of God to allow us to live on a spiritual plane that is unfathomable to the world. It is a power that will save us from the sins that God has shown us and will allow us to end each day with a clear conscience. The Scripture tells us that as we received Christ Jesus, so we must walk in Him. Of course, we receive Jesus through faith. So the door to the holy life is surrender and the key to the door is faith.

Unfortunately, in the past the doctrine of holiness has sometimes been misunderstood. It was confused with the doctrine of sinless perfection, which insists that a sanctified person never sins. Indeed, some say cannot sin. Such a doctrine denies the growth aspect of the Christian life. It requires the believer to move from the valley to the mountain top in one step. It applies to the new Christian the same standards for righteous living as that of the saint. And in doing so it relegates the wonderful truth of growth in holiness to legalistic rules and regulations.

Of course, those who try to live this life of sinless perfection struggle and fail, or live in denial. As a result, the doctrine of holiness has been rejected altogether by many in the church so that we now negate the second part of the Gospel and fail to call new Christians to a life of holiness and power over sin. The Gospel message has become, "accept Jesus Christ to receive salvation, and then live the best that you can." Based on this message most people go from being poor miserable sinners who are lost to being miserable carnal Christians who are saved. As a result, the righteousness that has typified the Church in the past has been lost.

Jesus said, "Remember the word that I said to you, 'A slave is not greater than his master. If they persecuted Me, they will also persecute you,'" (John 15:20). Yet the church is not persecuted in this country. Do you wonder why? The answer is simple. The church is not persecuted in this country because the world cannot distinguish enough difference between itself and those who call themselves Christians to become concerned about them. The sins that are pervasive in the world are also pervasive in the church. By abdicating the correct teaching on the holy life we have lost the privilege of living that life.

Historically, Quakers have been called a "peculiar people." They were peculiar because they surrendered to the leading of the Holy Spirit resulting in a life of holiness that made them substantially different from the people of the world in their day. They set the standard for honesty in business. They insisted on the dignity all people—even prisoners. They decried the brutality of slavery over a

hundred years before it was abolished in this country. Would Quakers be called a "peculiar people" in this day and age? Are we seen as agents of change for improving our society today? Are we unyielding examples of integrity in conducting our daily business dealings, paying taxes, keeping accurate expense accounts? Are the terms "Quaker" and "quality" still inextricably linked? Unfortunately, I doubt that Quakers today are the examples to the world that they were in the past. But we could regain this distinction if we begin once more to live out our call to a holy life. Such a life is "peculiar" when compared to the life of those in the world.

The final area that the Northwest Yearly Meeting must address as it moves into its second century concerns the manifestation of God's power in this world. Jesus validated His ministry with signs, wonders, and miracles. And He told His disciples that they would do even greater things than He had done. The book of Acts describes how the disciples healed the sick, cast out demons, and raised the dead. Such accounts have continued throughout church history. George Fox reportedly participated in so many miracles that he wrote an entire book of their accounts. And today accounts of God's miraculous working in the lives of people continue to flow out of third world countries. However, the church in North America is typified not by God's power, but by powerlessness.

Today we feel more confident in praying for the spiritual health of an individual than for his or her physical or psychological health. I believe this is because our experience, or lack of experience in the manifestation of God's power in the physical realm has caused us to lose faith in what the Scriptures say about it. My friends, we dare not let our experience set the measure of our belief in the testimony of the Scripture.

Does the experience of a non-Christian invalidate the Scriptures that say Jesus saves us from our sins and offers us eternal life? Does the experience of a carnal Christian who is saved but living an uncommitted, inconsistent lifestyle invalidate those Scriptures that promise the empowerment to live a holy and perfect life? If the answer to these questions is "No," then does our experience of powerlessness regarding God's manifestation in this world invalidate the Scriptures that say our God is a God who loves, who heals, and who provides for us in miraculous ways?

My friends, don't misunderstand me. I am not proposing a health and wealth gospel. I am not claiming that it is God's will to heal everyone of all their physical and psychological diseases in this life. And I am not claiming to have all the answers regarding how God manifests His power in this world. Like others, I am on a journey seeking to understand how God would use me as His instrument to let His blessings flow into the world. Though my experience is limited, I still believe that God offers us much more in this life than we are currently receiving. In third world nations, where people have child-like faith, God is working in miraculous ways to heal physical and psychological suffering. Missionaries tell us that these manifestations are foundational to spreading His Kingdom in these areas. God is using His miraculous power to break down the gates of Hell in areas that are resistant to merely presenting the logic of the Gospel. This reflects the truth of Paul's words written to the Corinthians, "And my message and my preaching were not in persuasive words of wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power that your faith should not rest on the wisdom of men, but on the power of God" (1 Corinthians 2:4-5).

As the darkness in this world grows, we must also seek a child-like faith. We must not let our experience measure the validity of the Scripture. Rather, we must let faith in the Scripture lead our experience. We must humble ourselves before God, surrender our Western mind set that demands logical explanations for all actions in this world, and allow God to lead us into an understanding of how He wishes to bless us in miraculous ways and to bless the world through us.

We have had a marvelous past, but we live in perilous times. If Northwest Yearly Meeting is to be what God wants us to be as we enter our second century



we must be totally committed as disciples of Jesus Christ. We dare not continue down the path of compromise that accepts marginal commitment as the norm. We must pay any price, even to allowing the rich young ruler to walk away, to regain the spiritual vitality that comes from total commitment to our Savior.

If Northwest Yearly Meeting is to be what God wants us to be as we enter our second century we must again call committed Christians to live a holy and righteous life. We must preach the entire Gospel: That Jesus died to save us from our sins and that He arose that we might have power over sin in this life. We must regain the correct understanding of holiness. We must turn away from the legalism of the past and allow the Holy Spirit with His gentle touch to lead young Christians into increasing levels of maturity.

If Northwest Yearly Meeting is to be what God wants us to be as we enter our second century we must humble ourselves and with child-like faith allow God to work in powerful ways in us and through us as He sees fit. We dare not put God in a box and require Him to work in the world only according to our preconceived notions. God has a storehouse of blessings waiting to comfort and heal the bruised, battered, and bleeding of the world. Let us humbly submit ourselves to be His instruments of power.

Commitment, holiness, and power—these must be the foundation stones upon which we will build Northwest Yearly Meeting in the twenty-first century if we are to be the church that God calls us to be. It doesn't take a prophet to perceive that the world is in a downward spiral. Shortly before His death and resurrection, Jesus pondered with His disciples if He would find faith on the earth upon His return. Let us say, "I don't know about the rest of the world, Lord, but you will find a faithful church in Northwest Yearly Meeting."

Derric Watson, Pauline Ziemann, and Heidi Schneider told of their growth and the great and continuing need at Sprague River.

## BOARD OF SOCIAL CONCERNS

Friends in the Northwest have been led into many ministries to the communities around them. Churches around our Yearly Meeting continue to be involved in ministry to the homeless, food and clothing distribution, senior citizen programs, and programs relating to the environment. In addition, more churches are offering twelve-step programs.

The Board has concentrated on areas of education, feeling this is the best way to use our limited funds. Following is a list of some of the areas of focus this past year.

1. Publication of the newsletter, *Concern*, has been our major emphasis. We continue to solicit articles from people who are interested in writing for the newsletter and ask for your input on the current publications.

2. During the year the Board continued the discussion on capital punishment and approved the following minute at our meeting in January.

"The Board of Social Concerns has prayerfully and thoughtfully considered the question of capital punishment presented by a concerned Friend and has solicited and discussed the opinions of other respected Friends. Although we recognize individual differences of opinion within the Yearly Meeting as well as on the Board of Social Concerns, we believe the statement on capital punishment in *Faith and Practice* reflects the teaching of the Spirit among Friends. We are grateful for the opportunity to explore and reaffirm this testimony."

3. The Board thanks you for your generous response to the Thanksgiving Offering which went to provide a summer program and funds for three Summer Ambassadors at the church in Sprague River. A total of \$10,247.60 was raised for the project.

4. The Department of Peace and the Board provided funding and support for the mailing of a peace packet to youth of our Yearly Meeting. As our youth are forced to make difficult decisions, we plan to continue this mailing to help give balance to the increasing pressure from recruiters in our schools.

5. During this week of Yearly Meeting, the Board is sponsoring workshops on the Quaker peace testimony, Christians in recovery, peace in the Middle East, community mediation, and military recruitment in the high schools. We hope you will take advantage of these opportunities.

We pray that all who are involved with Northwest Yearly Meeting will continue to respond to God's call on our lives so that those who come in contact with us will continue to see the Light of Christ shining through in all we say and do.



## DEPARTMENT OF PEACE

Deep racial and economic divisions in our society heighten the potential for violence (witness the recent rioting in Los Angeles). Christ calls us to be peace-makers, not just violence-condemners. Therefore, it seems inadequate to simply condemn the violence after it occurs. Rather, we should help create an atmosphere which leads to peace (Luke 19:42). This realization leads us to our first query: "How can Friends serve as agents of reconciliation in our own local communities? How can we overcome the invisible barriers which separate people into hostile camps?"

When the war in the Persian Gulf was front-page news, we were bombarded with stories of Saddam Hussein's cruelty and the technological superiority of America's warcraft. Now the information about the war has slipped into our newspapers' more obscure pages, and the topics of consideration have to do with the U.S. support for Iraq (even days before the invasion of Kuwait); the suffering of Iraqi civilians both during and after the war; and the apparently unfounded early optimism regarding U.S. technology. The relative media obscurity of war's downside leads to the second query: "How can Friends hold our society accountable for the aftermath of war?"

### PEACE ACTIVITIES IN 1991-1992

What has the Peace Department done with the churches this year to promote peace? Not enough. We again sent peace packets to high school juniors and seniors; we sponsored some workshops at Yearly Meeting; we sent two bulletin inserts to the congregations; we sent each church some resource catalogs listing videos and printed materials available for checkout from the Mennonite Central Committee; and we wrote a few articles for Concern.

### THE PROBLEM WE CONFRONT

The Department of Peace reports that we are David facing Goliath without a slingshot.

Whether or not we approve, we are participants in a society that frequently kills in the name of freedom, democracy, and national security. Through numerous acts of complicity, each of us throws food and weapons to the hungry giant of war until there is little left for the hopeless and hungry and oppressed people that God has commanded us to feed and clothe and love.

Most American families contribute up to fifty percent of their income taxes for military defense. Our taxes support millions of scientists and production workers who invent and produce the technology of mass destruction, from anti-personnel cluster bombs to the weapons of nuclear nightmare. Christian preachers and military chaplains permeate all of these institutions, lending the appearance of blessing from Jesus Christ to the ideology of war.

The influences and assumptions which predispose Americans to believe in the redemptive power of violence are all-pervading. Television, movies, comics, books, and toys teach children that life is cheap and violence is the way to solve problems. Many of us have been taught that wars purchase the benefits of democracy. Colleges promote military scholarships and ROTC programs. Television, newspapers, and magazines give their tacit assent to the necessity for war and portray as enemies nations who pose a threat to American political and economic power.

Any church looking for an alternative to war must honestly acknowledge the dimensions of the task. It will be at least as difficult as a new building program or doubling the church's attendance in two years. It will amount to converting people from the Security of the Bomb to the Way of the Cross.

### OUR FEEBLE RESPONSE

What does the peace church offer its members to counter this colossus of indoctrination? Against this country's towering enterprise of education and preparation for war, the church brings a pamphlet or two, maybe a book, and

a one-hour Sunday School class. Perhaps a sermon once in awhile, though pastors sometimes debate whether they should devote a whole sermon to peace. Sunday school teachers consider using one class period to discuss nonviolence. Youth advisors occasionally take an hour to let their youth discuss their feelings about war.

If we are David facing the Goliath of the military-industrial complex, how would God have us disarm this giant?

Christian nonviolence does not become a viable option after two group discussions. Just as military action cannot hope to succeed without armies, guns, money, and equipment, nonviolence cannot possibly succeed when the basic conditions necessary to its success are absent. These may well include a willingness to sacrifice and a degree of discipline and training on the part of tens of thousands comparable to that required in the military; and it will require extensive background research into techniques of nonviolence against various forms of aggression.

Jesus' command to "Love your enemies" is a call to unpopularity, sacrifice, and persecution, and people do not make these commitments lightly. They require the kind of struggle, commitment, agony and testing Jesus experienced in a forty-day fast, painful confrontation with respected religious leaders, and Gethsemane prayer. We will not follow Jesus to the place of self-sacrificing confrontation with oppressive dictators if we have not invested our time, energy, and money in costly preparation. Without that effort, we are merely playing games, trying, in the words of Jeremiah, to "dress the wound of my people as though it were not serious, say 'Peace, peace' when there is not peace." (Jeremiah 6)

### WHAT CAN WE DO?

We can pray. Prayer is the only action powerful enough to free us from our spiritual bondage to property, money, power, ideas, and causes which have made us willing to destroy everything in the desperate and futile attempt to protect them. Prayer can make us aware of our own complicity in evil; it can humble us. It starts in confession and repentance and recalls our identity as God's people. To pray is to recognize that before the evil can be overcome, we must be transformed. Prayer is central to conversion. Prayer, in recognizing God's authority over the evil powers, moves us beyond opposition to affirmation, beyond resistance to celebration. Thus prayer and the results of prayer are the most revolutionary of acts. Prayer makes enemies into friends. Fervent prayer for our enemies is a great obstacle to war and the feelings that lead to it.

We can teach that God's way is the way of the suffering servant. People who rejected Christ as the Messiah often did so because they believed the Messiah would be a warrior who would trample the Romans, and Jesus did not live up to their expectations. Are there not many voices today that teach the same distortion about the identity of the Messiah?

We can expect transformed lives and be prepared to support members whose newfound convictions lead them away from their vocational and institutional ties to the world. When our members say they don't believe in what they are doing, we give them sympathy but do not offer them an alternative. What was the church's responsibility in the Third Reich for members who were building the ovens? What is the church's responsibility today toward those who are building weapons capable of creating infernos many times more destructive than Auschwitz?

We can encourage our young people to refuse to join the military. The making of peace, as Jesus showed in His own life, can result in great conflict. Such a ministry of reconciliation will cost something, and it will often make us misunderstood in a world that knows violence better than peace. Rather than saying what the government ought to do, we can say: "Regardless of what others may do, we will not cooperate with the arms buildup, we will not participate in war. We will withdraw our support, our energy, our resources, our money, our obedience, ourselves. We will place ourselves and our faith as road-



blocks to war and as signposts to peace."

Anyone can love peace but Jesus didn't say, "Blessed are the peacelovers." He said peacemakers. In every situation of violence, the church can ask, "What does it mean, in this situation, to put ourselves in the midst of the conflict, to stand between the contending forces?"

The report and queries were approved.

## FRIENDS WOMENS MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP

In this twentieth anniversary year of the beginning of EFI—WMF, the women of Northwest Yearly Meeting joined with Friends women across EFI (Women's Missionary Fellowship of the Evangelical Friends International—North America Region) with the theme, "A Big World Takes a Big Heart." Through the various activities of Friends Women, we trust that many gained an increased awareness of the big world for which Christ died.

We learned about that world through education. An average of 350 women met each month. Lessons from the EFI—WMF program book, and over 109 speakers challenged and informed women about such things as the work of EFM, ministry in Bolivia, Peru, Mexico, Rwanda, Rough Rock, the Philippines, Romania, Papua New Guinea, Chad, Russia, and the Holy Land. Other ministries such as Get-Away Give-Away, Gospel Missions, Child Evangelism Fellowship, FWCC gatherings, shelter homes, etc., were also represented. Not only did we learn about this world, much time was spent in prayer for the various concerns.

Reading is another way to let God expand our hearts. Over 3,120 books were reported having been read, covering many areas—the Scripture itself, home and foreign missions, Christian life, devotional, and family improvement to name a few. At least seventy-two women read a minimum of nine books from five different categories to become honorees in the reading program.

As we learn, our response is to become involved. It is impossible to list all the types of involvement of our women, but the arms of our women reached around the world with support by dollars and projects for our mission programs and other ministries like rescue missions, CALA (Aymara Literature and Liter-

acy program), Piedmont Friends for Kids, crisis pregnancy centers, Greenleaf Academy, local church building funds, church kitchens, supplies to Rwanda, Southwest Indian School, Slavic Gospel Association, Wycliffe Bible Translators, Campus Crusade, World Vision, Missionary Aviation Fellowship, support of missionaries under various mission agencies, encouragement of young people in their short-term mission trips, food baskets for the needy, showers for missionaries, scholarships to help women attend our annual retreat, and the lists go on. In addition to the regular monthly support of Friends Women for Ken and Tonya Comfort in Peru and the ParkCenter extension church in Boise, Idaho, over \$25,000.00 was given for these various ministries.

This spring the women across the Yearly Meeting were challenged to make possible a new tool for evangelism for our churches in Bolivia and Peru by raising money to purchase the Campus Crusade film "Jesus" in the Aymara language. Over \$2,900 was given which purchased two reel-to-reel films, two videos in Aymara, and two videos in Spanish.

Two retreats were held in the fall—at Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks—for the purpose of bringing women together from across the Yearly Meeting to be encouraged, strengthened, and challenged. Marcille Leach Crandall, Sandy Wild, and special missionary speakers shared in the leadership.

How big is your heart? Big enough to embrace the world? Become involved in your local FWMF and find opportunity to reach around the world. ## EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSIONS—NORTHWEST

### EFM UPDATE:

*New Executive Director* Norval Hadley has been appointed to serve as Executive Director of Evangelical Friends Mission, replacing James Morris who retired in June.

*India* Carl and Peggy Hunerwadel and their five children are settling into their responsibilities at Woodstock School. God opened doors for them to enter India in this way, with plans to prepare to serve among unreached people.

*Mexico City* David and Joyce Byrne and three daughters, along with Manuel and Brenda Chavarria and two children serve as EFM missionaries in this teaming city. The new mission home built for the Chavarrias was recently completed. There is evidence of the moving of God's Spirit among the churches.

*Philippines* This country continues to be ravaged by unemployment and political strife. But God is faithful to build His Church.

*Rough Rock* Prayer is needed for the Navajo people as EFM works with Navajo leadership in this transition time. Mark and Wilma Roberts who have been providing missionary leadership at Rough Rock, were recently joined by interim missionaries Myers and Norma Johnson.

*Rwanda* Although political unrest still rocks this country in Africa, God continues to draw people to Himself. Willard and Doris Ferguson and son Sam, along with Gary and Connie Young, and Curt Blasiman are missionaries. Paul



and Leona Thornburg recently returned to the United States, completing many years of missionary service.

#### NORTHWEST YEARLY MEETING FIELDS:

**Bolivia Yearly Meeting** Regigio Condori, Bolivian Yearly Meeting president, is a strong administrator with a vision for the future of the Yearly Meeting. A goal of the Yearly Meeting Executive Council is to teach courses in each Quarterly Meeting on the faith and practices of Friends. Another is to help pastors grow deeper spiritually.

The Extension Bible School program is carried on by Bolivian Friends leadership, although lacking a director. The Patmos Bible School in La Paz has not been open.

Twenty-one Friends students studied in the San Pablo Theological Seminary or the extension in Caranavi, the highest number in several years. Northwest Yearly Meeting Board of Missions provides some scholarship money for these students.

One Friends student studies at Bolivian Evangelical University in Santa Cruz and receives scholarship aid from the Mission. David Tintaya, member of the Santa Cruz Friends Church, is board chairman of the University.

The Clinic in La Paz is administered by Bolivia Yearly Meeting, offering medical services to the general public as well as believers in the INELA churches.

The Agricultural Services Committee of the Yearly Meeting teaches classes in better agricultural methods and veterinary care. It is seeking export markets for coffee growers. Until recently this committee was funded by World Concern.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Board of Mission continues to work in a partner relationship with Bolivia Yearly Meeting in evangelism and theological education. In a commitment to combine our resources to reach the unreached in Bolivia, we jointly sponsor three national missionary families.

**Personnel** Ed and Marie Cammack have been working in the semi-tropical Caranavi area. Their one-year furlough began June 1992.

Pascual and Nivesa Quispe, long-time pastors, now serve as missionaries to Quechua people in the San Julian colonies in the Santa Cruz district.

Bernardo and Eugenia Flores and six children are living in the San Julian colonies serving along with Quispes.

Antonio and Julia Mamani, the newest national missionaries, are assigned to the Yungas area on the eastern slopes of the Andes mountains.

**National Friends Church in Peru** President Ramon Mamani gives strong leadership to the Friends churches in Peru. The Friends church headquarters is in Ilave, on the high plains, where more than fifty churches are located. The remaining eleven churches in the coastal area are supervised by their own executive committee.

The leadership of the national church has done well this year, planning and carrying out responsibilities maturely. Each Sunday several members of the executive committee travel together to visit churches in a Quarterly Meeting.

The Extension Bible School program has been active both on the high plains and in the coastal area. Teacher training courses were taught by missionaries, and educators from Bolivia. The resident Bible Institute in Arequipa was held from January to March which included some students from the high plains as well as the coast. United States missionaries served as teachers along with a Bolivian Friend who came to teach.

Eight people from NWYM participated in a second work team to Arequipa in June through early July. The team continued remodeling projects on the Arequipa Center which houses the resident Bible school for Friends in Peru.

**Personnel** U.S. missionaries: Ken and Tonya Comfort live in Puno, working with Aymaras in the high plains area. Earl and Janice Perisho live and work in Arequipa, assisting churches on the coast. Dan and Tami Cammack, returned to Peru in June to live in Arequipa and begin their second term.

Bolivian missionaries: Benito and Victoria Apaza and their four daughters are from La Paz, Bolivia, having lived and served in Peru for four years under joint sponsorship of NWYM and Bolivia Yearly Meeting. They will be returning to Bolivia at the end of the year.

**Missions Board** We are committed to carrying out the Great Commission, seeking guidance from the Holy Spirit for the task He entrusted to us in Bolivia and Peru.

Our continued work in partnership with Bolivia Yearly Meeting includes sending a third family to evangelize in a remote area. A five-year plan is being developed which will give direction to our involvement with NWYM churches as well as Bolivia and Peru. This includes plans for additional personnel.

A Missionary-In-Residence program was begun that allows furloughing missionaries some time in a local congregation where they will be given support and nurture. It will also give missionaries an opportunity to reacquire themselves with needs and concerns of U.S. churches. Dan and Tami Cammack were the first to participate in this program at Sherwood Friends. Ed and Marie Cammack will be involved at Clackamas Park.

The report was approved.

#### BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

This report complements the Treasurer's report concerning our financial status as of the end of December, 1991 and a current update for 1992.

"For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29:11 (NIV)

What a glorious promise we have from our Lord! No wonder so many of our people are excited about the mission which the Lord has entrusted to Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. The Board of Stewardship honors those who have caught this vision and have responded with their time, talents, and resources. Without these people we would indeed labor in vain. It is a distinct pleasure for us to be the stewards of your trust and stewardship.

We also express our appreciation for the officers and staff who have carried the load of the daily work of the Board of Stewardship: Harold Ankeny, treasurer; Gerald Lemmons, assistant treasurer; and Goldie Cline, bookkeeper. A special thanks to Harold who for the past several years has guided the Board of Stewardship and held the position of treasurer. We honor him for his dedication and commitment to the Lord's work among Friends. We will miss having him as treasurer and ask the Lord's blessing on him.

**Balanced Budget and Debt Reduction** We continued our emphasis on having a balanced budget and reducing our debt. Thanks to early budget planning and priorities set by the Executive Council, we approach this Yearly Meeting with a



1993 budget which the boards/commissions have seen and the Administrative Committee of Executive Council has recommended to the Executive Council. During this Yearly Meeting we will already be looking at our budget requirements for 1994.

In 1988 we had a budget deficit of \$233,528 which included the operating deficit and workers' compensation payment. At the end of 1991 our debt is only \$50,983. We estimate that as of June 30, 1992 the overall debt to be about \$44,629. Thanks to budgeting for debt reduction and the faithful giving of several to reduce the debt, along with the special appeals, we will soon not have an operating deficit.

**Insurance Matters** Last year the Executive Council charged the Board of Stewardship with the responsibility of monitoring Yearly Meeting insurance matters. We have met with our insurance carriers and/or written to them regarding our insurance plans. We have reviewed coverage by other carriers and selected the best coverage with the best price for us. Our review determined that we have overpaid about \$900 for 1990 to our workers' compensation carrier. They credited us for this amount in 1992. We are working with our property and liability carrier to see if our churches around the Yearly Meeting have proper coverage.

**Allocation of Gifts** There has been some concern that individual and corporate gifts be specifically directed to the board/commission requested by the giver. We met several times with interested parties and the superintendents. As a result, we developed a new distribution form. The church treasurers indicate on the form how their gifts should be distributed and we honor their requests. As a part of this process, we now handle the Board of Missions budget the same way as we have handled the Board of Evangelism budget in the past. That is, the Great Commission Budget comprises only a portion of the total income to these boards. Other income is developed from outside sources and programs.

**Yearly Meeting Financial Policies** During the past year we have reviewed with the board/commission clerks and superintendents suggested financial policies which were previously recorded in minutes. Our desire is to place all such policies in one manual. We hope to finalize these policies during these Yearly Meeting sessions.

**Ministers Aid** In 1992 we have five couples and nine single individuals in this program. We recommended an eight percent increase in support for 1993.

**Consolidating Financial Accounting** The Executive Council appointed an ad hoc committee to study the desirability of consolidating the financial accounting of Yearly Meeting entities—not consolidating responsibility/control.

**Stewardship Education** In October we assisted churches in their planning for Stewardship Emphasis Month. We provided a "Prospectus of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church." This prospectus included information about our ministries; how decisions are made concerning financial support and how the funds are allocated. We provided "briefers" to those churches requesting assistance. To the best of our knowledge, only twenty-six churches indicated that they would participate in the stewardship program in October. We annually survey the churches and ask them about their stewardship programs and how we might assist them. We also provide a stewardship display table during Yearly Meeting and have workshops.

**Administrative Committee** We meet monthly with the treasurer, bookkeeper, and one of the superintendents to keep current on stewardship matters. We minute our actions and send copies to all our members so they will be informed of current matters.

## COUNCIL OF ELDERS

The Council of Elders has been made very aware that the Church has entered an era of rapid change. These many changes have put a great deal of pressure upon pastors, local elders, and other leaders of our churches. We are acutely aware that we have not done a good job of preparation either at the local or the Yearly Meeting level. Workshops sponsored by the Council of Elders have pointed out that much more needs to be done to help our churches deal with the many stresses our people face. The Council will be working on these issues in months and years to come.

Last year during the Yearly Meeting sessions a charge was given to the Council to study the matter of affiliation with the Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL). It was further broadened to include consideration of affiliation with other Friends groups. We have not had sufficient time to study this matter in depth and would ask the Yearly Meeting for more time in this matter.

The Council did not sponsor area workshops for elders as was done the past two years. It was felt that with limited budget provision we would lay plans to conduct these workshops on alternate years. There are a number of topics which have been suggested for future workshops.



The concern has come from several local elders groups that there needs to be some well-developed instruction to assist elders in several areas of responsibility. What seems to have happened in recent years is that new elders have been appointed by monthly meetings and the only information available is the outline in *Faith and Practice* as to the responsibilities of the local elders committee. The Council of Elders has recognized this matter and serious consideration is being given to the best methodology for providing this kind of help. While area workshops are helpful, these have been very limited and the need involves a much more intensive training program of some kind.

The Council of Elders has recognized an underlying enthusiasm being expressed by a number of churches throughout the Yearly Meeting. In the midst of a few problems, we have great hope that we will see growth in several areas. The Council has been in existence only a very few years and we believe that given further time a serious effort can be made to provide encouragement, instruction, and counseling for those churches who need help in difficulties. We are seeking to clarify and move ahead in the role set before us in the years ahead until Jesus comes for His Church.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION

### DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

The Department of Church Education focused on leadership development among adults during the fourth year of our four-year training cycle. Much of our focus was on the book *User Friendly Churches* by George Barna. This book explains key attitudes and characteristics of a cross-section of growing churches, and pinpoints important issues that church leadership must deal with. The department purchased one book for every church in the Yearly Meeting and encouraged Christian Education Committees and other leaders within the church to read it. Education Board Area Secretaries hosted discussion meetings throughout the Yearly Meeting with over one hundred leaders from thirty-one churches participating. Evaluations from the meetings reveal that the book and interaction among Friends proved to give guidance and clarity to the leaders. Many participants were pleased with the positive attitude found in our local churches. But much discussion and concern was expressed regarding the lack of vision within the local churches. It is our hope that this emphasis equipped leaders and pinpointed issues that can be dealt with as our churches reach out to their communities.

The *Seven Laws of the Learner*, a video series by Dr. Bruce Wilkinson, was purchased and placed in the Yearly Meeting video library. This will be an excellent follow-up for churches that have used *Seven Laws of the Teacher*, which is available for loan by several Friends churches.

We continue to recognize how important Christian camping is to the Christian education focus of the church. We have increased our contact with camp administrators, and have received yearly reports that list concerns our department can assist with, as well as the number of Friends campers in their programs.

NWYM churches contributed \$12,743.58 to the EFI Easter Offering this year which was designated for several EFM fields. Our Department continues to enjoy working with Dorothy Barratt, EFI-NA Christian Education Consultant. We will be working with her this year as she consults with churches in our Yearly Meeting.

This next year we will be working with Christian education clerks as they oversee their local committees and ministries. It is our desire to provide as much assistance as possible to the local church as they nurture one another in Christ's love.

### DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN TESTIMONIES

The Department of Christian Testimonies was severely hampered this year by a shortage of people who were available and willing to help. As a result, no pamphlets were published. We did publish and distribute a list of Friends-related publications that are available in the Western Evangelical Seminary Library. This has been augmented and will be reprinted soon. Work has continued on a tract "Business as Worship," and we have begun work on another project. We continue to seek our role in the Yearly Meeting for the coming years.



## DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

This year the Department of General Education spent most of its energies overseeing the Ministerial Aid Scholarship program. Eleven students received assistance through this program, with one student completing coursework and accepting a pastorate in a NWYM church. We currently have five applicants to fill three budgeted full-time positions for the fall of 1992. Interest continues to be high in the scholarships for future pastors.

Some time has been spent in consultation with the superintendents and Board of Ministerial Service to see what additional support may be given to these scholars as they prepare to serve our NWYM churches as pastors. We are attempting to fill a position in a chain of support that hopefully begins with the Samuel Schools and ends with recording as a minister in NWYM.

We continue to support the NWYM/Church/College scholarship matching program at George Fox College. Our \$15,000 budgeted for this still falls far short of the actual amount given in the name of NWYM, but it continues to be an important part of our NWYM students attending GFC.

We continue to add to our list of candidates for George Fox College and Western Evangelical Seminary Board of Trustees. If you know someone you believe would serve well in one of these positions, please contact us.

We are looking for new ways to support educators of all types within our Yearly Meeting. One way is to have a dinner/dessert at the YM sessions for all educators (or those who like to associate with educators). This time of fellowship and idea sharing seems to be well accepted by those who attend.

We have published and distributed a directory of all educators within NWYM. We believe that this is possibly the largest profession within the Yearly Meeting membership. Copies of this directory may be obtained through the YM office.

■ 50. David LeShana, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, reported he has never seen greater demonstration of the provision and faithfulness of the Lord to a ministry than has been witnessed at WES the first six months of 1992.

The report was approved.

■ 51. Don Harvey, superintendent of Greenleaf Friends Academy, reported. The major accomplishment this year was the paying off of the \$628,000 bank loan for capital improvements dating back to 1983. A Celebration Dinner held in December marked the occasion after more than 250 people responded to help complete the loan payment.

The report was approved.

■ 52. J. D. Baker, executive director of Friends Fund, reported. He introduced Ray Rotolo who explained the help that has come to George Fox College through Friends Fund. Jay Baker, executive director of Friendsview Manor told of the help that has come to the Manor through Friends Fund, most of it going into the assistance fund. A letter from Harlow Ankeny outlined assistance given to Twin Rocks Friends Conference Center through Friends Fund.

The report was approved.

■ 53. The written report of the Friends Youth Executive Committee follows:

### FRIENDS YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

AMANDA MILAM, SECRETARY

The Friends Youth Executive Committee expanded last year's poster publication to a full calendar that was published in December. The calendar included pictures of past events, "fun facts," verses, Yearly Meeting activity deadlines, and special holidays. We distributed 1,462 calendars to churches, youth leaders, junior high and senior high youth. We received financial support from Twin

Rocks Friends Conference Center, George Fox College, and local Newberg businesses. The Exec. was excited about how well the calendar was received by all.

Also in December, 37 campers and 13 staff and counselors experienced an enjoyable and challenging time at Midwinter '91. Midwinter was held at Twin Rocks, and speaker Clyde Parker focused on "Building Healthy Relationships." Our small size provided the opportunity for more community building and allowed for more flexibility. Next year we will travel to Quaker Hill Camp in McCall, Idaho for a snow and ski camp.

The annual Northwest Yearly Meeting Volleyball Tournament held on the George Fox College campus, April 10-11, was made up of 48 youth group teams from 53 churches. Team members worked together to compete in three divisions for nine trophies, plus the honored sportsmanship award. Star Friends Church was chosen for their exceptional acts of sportsmanship. The top finishers in each division were: Quaker—Spokane (1), Vancouver (2), Greenleaf I (3); Friends A—Netarts (1), South Salem/Rosedale (2), North Valley (3); Friends B—Marion (1), Boise (2), Greenleaf Friends I (3).

YCEW (Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview) traveled to Indonesia June 17 to July 12. Team members included: Jon Boehm, Cherry Grove; Brett McKee, Vancouver; Monte Wilbur, Eugene; Jeff Woolsey, Medford; Amy Buchanan, Medford; and Amanda Conner, Camas. Leaders were Toni and Paul Sloan, professors at George Fox College.

YCAM (Youth Challenged through Arts in Ministry) in its second year toured churches in Idaho, Oregon, and Southern Washington from July 4-24. We chose three leaders: Erik Edmundson, Camas; Melissa Bullock, Reedwood; and Spencer Jones, Hayden Lake. Team members included: Jessica Schmid, Maria Townsend, and Norman Sherman, Camas; Kristen White, Clackamas Park; Alex Walker, Newberg; Tera Bloodgood, Post Falls; Melissa Chandler, Rosedale; and Shawna Rodrigues, Talent.

The Friends Youth Exec. did not fill the position of Youth Challenge Coordinator this year but are still seeking an adult to work with the YCEW and YCAM committee members to provide administrative advice and continuity throughout the year.

Friends Youth Exec. appreciates the support of the Yearly Meeting that we may experience leadership roles as well as be involved with reaching out to the youth of the Yearly Meeting. We welcome your prayers, encouragement, ideas, and suggestions wholeheartedly.

■ 57. The minutes of the Wednesday afternoon session were read and approved.

■ 58. Jay Baker, executive director of Friendsview Manor, reported the state of the manor, improvements, and plans.

The report was approved.

■ 59. At Midyear Board meeting time, Executive Council was united in approving the sale of the present Northwest Yearly Meeting headquarters building to Newberg Friends Church for \$190,000. The Executive Council authorized the purchase of a building at the corner of Hancock and Meridian streets in Newberg for \$82,000. Approximately \$25,000 worth of repairs have been made to this building, along with 227 hours of work by Volunteers on Wheels. Newberg Friends Church will lease the Yearly Meeting office building for \$1,000 per month until they acquire funding for the purchase. The Executive Council negotiated with Newberg Friends to allow Barclay Press to remain in their current location until January 1, 1994.

The Barclay Press Board submitted to Executive Council a proposal to seek funding from the Friends Church Extension Foundation and the Friends Extension Corporation for buying property and building a facility in Newberg. Executive Council requests Yearly Meeting authorization to pursue these arrangements as co-signers with Barclay Press. It was approved. The authorization is limited to this proposal.

■ 60. Harold Antrim, clerk of the Board of Evangelism, alluded to their Sunday evening presentation and called attention to the following written report:

### BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Board of Evangelism has the stated purpose "to be and do whatever is necessary to bring about the evangelization of the Northwest and beyond."

At the present time we have defined our major responsibilities as:

- Planting of new churches
- Supervision of extension churches
- Developing pastoral leadership
- Encouraging growth and evangelism in existing churches

*Planting New Churches* The harmonizing of financial resources and leadership did not come together this year to facilitate the planting of a new church. In the previous three years the Board has planted six new churches. Our policy manual states "We want to see churches being planted smoothly and with the best chance of survival. Our goal is at least an eighty percent success rate."

Though we had eighty percent as our success goal and though we knew that new churches are often at great risk, it was extremely difficult to see the Discovery Friends Church in Eugene come to a close, and see our success rate drop to eighty-three percent. There were a number of factors involved, and we have learned some valuable lessons through this experience. Roseburg moved from extension church to mission point status and is not meeting regularly for Sunday worship service. The Newberg Unprogrammed Meeting has also discontinued meeting at this time.

We do look forward to the continued planting of new churches in the near future. In order to do this, we encourage support of the "Join the Harvest" program. This program asks that every adult in the Yearly Meeting commit to giving \$5.00 per month to support church planting/renewal. HARVEST TIME folders and commitment cards are available from any Board member and the Yearly Meeting office.

*Supervision of Extension Churches* It has been gratifying to see the development of some of our new churches. The change of leadership has been very positive for East Hill (Kent, Washington) and for Paul and Charlene Meier. Deschutes Friends Church (Bend, Oregon) has been taking large forward steps. Mountain View (Vancouver, Washington) has added Lorraine Watson as associate pastor. Retha McCutchen has done an excellent job keeping in contact with extension church pastors.

The Nampa church has made progress since Allen and Wilma Cole have come to pastor. They have been commuting from Ola, Idaho and have made plans to be in the church parsonage before July is over.

*Developing Pastoral Leadership* The second Call to Ministry Conference was held June 12-13 in Hood River. There were about thirty-five registered. A conclusion from an older participant in the conference is that with this potential leadership the Yearly Meeting will be in good hands.

The Focus Conference for pastors was held in September in Umatilla featuring Dan Nolte dealing with "crisis as an opportunity for ministry." The next Focus Conference will be October 5-7 in Hood River, with pastor/author Bob Logan. Two leaders from each church are encouraged to accompany their pastor to this conference, with financial support available from the Board.

A retreat for extension church pastors was sponsored by the Board in Hood River, featuring Orville Winters.

The Summer Ambassador program entered its second year, placing six young people in Northwest churches this summer.

An "Intern" program was approved by the Board. The goal is to provide seminary graduates the opportunity of working under local pastors for two



years before they begin to serve churches by themselves. The Board would underwrite one-half salary. This amount accounts for the requested increase from the Board of Evangelism in the 1993 proposed budget.

*Encouraging Growth and Evangelism in Existing Churches* "Share Calls" were issued for Spokane and Hillsboro, netting more than \$11,000 for their building improvements. Approval has been given to issue a Share Call for Piedmont. Funds from Share Calls are to be used exclusively for finishing building/remodeling projects.

*Looking Ahead* The Board of Evangelism is still committed to working on the responsibilities defined at the beginning of this report. Your help is needed to "Join the Harvest" and pray that the Lord of the harvest will "send out workers into His harvest field." (Matthew 9:38)

The report was approved.

■ 61. Louise Sargent, clerk, presented the report of the Commission on Media and introduced Richard Votaw who is now Yearly Meeting Archivist.

## COMMISSION ON MEDIA

The Commission on Media continues to cheerfully encourage the publication of quality Christian writing as a means by which our Yearly Meeting ministers to our membership and the greater Christian world.

In pursuit of this goal, we are happy to report the establishment of the Jack L. Willcuts Revolving Publishing Fund—a circulating fund for publishing Quaker books. Created by Jack Willcuts to support his concern and vision for Quaker publishing, the fund is administered by the Yearly Meeting Commission on Media with the guidance of the Willcuts family. The first publication benefiting from the fund is appropriately *The Sense of the Meeting*, a collection of Jack's editorials edited by Susan Willcuts Kendall and released this week by Barclay Press.

Three workshops offered this year sequentially address the writing process. Laying the Groundwork for Writing, Research, and Recordkeeping; Storyboarding: Developing Your Ideas; and Saying It Well: Editing Your Work. Our fourth workshop, Discovering Values in Children's Literature helps parents thoughtfully use contemporary fiction with their children.

Laurel Lee, author-in-residence at George Fox College and author of several books, spoke at the sixth annual Writers Dinner. The dinner is designed to encourage writers in our Yearly Meeting and provide them with identity and fellowship.

Barclay Press continues to produce excellent printed and published materials. Although now incorporated, the Press is owned exclusively by Northwest Yearly Meeting and is guided by the Board of Directors appointed by the Executive Council and the Commission on Media. We would like to extend thanks in this report to those who have been serving faithfully on the Board: LeRoy Benham, clerk, Harlow Ankeny, Dealous Cox, Kenneth Beebe, and Philip Harmon.

The Commission worked this past year to formulate the following Publishing Focus for Barclay Press:

Recognizing the unique position that Friends hold within the Christian community and our need to be faithful to Friends understanding of Christian discipleship; and desiring to have a ministry beyond our denominational circles, Barclay Press will focus its publishing in the following two areas:

*Spirituality:* Our reputation as Friends puts us in a good position to address this subject from both historic and contemporary viewpoints. Books in this area might include Christian classics

and modern writings on prayer, spiritual growth, worship, discipleship, evangelism, and equipping the Christian for ministry. *Issues:* The relevance of Christianity to society-at-large is another area in which Friends hold a unique reputation. Publications from Barclay Press could address aging, ethics, marriage and family, justice, peace, psychology, religion and society, and other social issues.

We recognize that some pieces need to be published that are distinct to our Friends constituency; these, of course, would be allowed to supersede these categories.

The Commission is delighted to announce the appointment of Richard Votaw as Yearly Meeting Archivist. He has been working in the archives housed in the George Fox College Media Center since January, 1992.

*Evangelical Friend* magazine, published with our input and support through the Publication Commission of Evangelical Friends International-North America Region, continues to be a quality publication that presents current issues, opinions, and news of evangelical Friends across the United States.

## BARCLAY PRESS

DAN MCCracken, MANAGER

Through printing, publishing, and retail sales of books and Sunday school curriculum, Barclay Press is a unique part of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Our mission of serving Christ through the production of printed material included the completion of more than 600 printing jobs in 1991. Sixty-eight percent of this work was for the Friends Church and related agencies such as George Fox College, Evangelical Friends Mission, *Evangelical Friend* magazine, and *Adult Friend* and *Teacher's Friend* for George Fox Press. Fourteen percent was printing of Barclay Press books and *Fruit of the Vine*, three percent was for other churches, and fifteen percent was commercial printing.

During the past year Barclay Press has published *Barclay's Apology in Modern English* and an updated reprint of *The Rich Heritage of Quakerism*. Just off the press is a special collection of Jack L. Willcuts editorials—*The Sense of the Meeting*. Books scheduled for release later this year are *Rhythms of the Inner Life*, including a study guide, by Howard Macy; *Robert Barclay* by Elton Trueblood, and the spiritual autobiography of Arthur O. Roberts.

Barclay Press continues to expand its efforts in book marketing. During 1991 and the first six months of 1992, five hundred Christian bookstores have made purchases from us.

With the sale of the Yearly Meeting headquarters building to Newberg Friends Church, Barclay Press has been looking for a suitable facility. We have looked for a location that provides the greatest long-term value for the dollar, space for additional growth, and adequate public exposure. It has been determined that having a new building constructed is the best option. At this writing we are in the process of arranging financing for building at the corner of Second Street and Elliot (near the Newberg airport). It is exciting to be in the process of moving to facilities that allow for the continued expansion of our ministry. We are thankful for the opportunities for ministry that we have through printing and publishing. Your interest and prayers are much appreciated as we face a challenging year with the financial demands of relocating.

■ 62. Philip Fendall, executive director, presented the Volunteers on Wheels report.



## VOLUNTEERS ON WHEELS ANNUAL REPORT

Members of VOW participated in six projects this past year in Northwest Yearly Meeting. Greenleaf Friends Academy welcomed six couples on July 29 and put the men to work on construction of sidewalks, cabinets for the drama room, and other related tasks. The women painted the exterior of two classroom modules. When the project ended on August 16, a total of 478 hours worth about \$4,200 had been donated. VOW volunteers were Cecil and Lois Binford, coordinators, Bennie and Ember Roberts, Jim and Winona Selby, Art Latham, Homer and Margy Wright, and Leroy and Nila Ruddell.

A VOW team consisting of Homer Wright, coordinator, Tim Lewis, Ed Roberts, Chuck Hanson, and Phil Fendall responded to an SOS from West Chehalem Friends to construct an underground 4,000 gallon concrete water storage tank. Work began on August 23 and lasted until September 23. Three hundred eighty-six hours of labor resulted in a saving of \$4,640 — the bid figure submitted by a contractor.

Homer Wright and Tim Lewis put in 36 hours at Hillsboro Friends Church from October 15-25 constructing a wheelchair ramp. This saved the church about \$480.

A new tool shed was constructed at Friendsview Manor during October 28-November 1 by Leroy Ruddell, coordinator, Jim Meireis, Vern Bagley, and Phil Fendall. They worked a total of 95 hours saving the Manor \$2,000.

A record number of seventeen VOW members reported for work at George Fox College on June 8. This excellent turn-out enabled Homer Wright, coordinator, to divide the crew three ways and do three projects at the same time. One group of men constructed concrete sidewalks and wheelchair ramps. The women cleaned and painted walls and ceilings in the Lewis Apartments and Newlin fourplex. The total hours worked by men and women was 317 at a savings of about \$3,736.

A second crew worked at the Newberg Friends Church removing a stage in the Friends Center and constructing two rooms in its place. Additional hours were donated in repair of a water line and salvaging lumber from a demolished house north of Newberg Friends Church. A total of 347 hours were donated saving the church about \$4,100.

The third crew assisted in the remodel of the house purchased by Northwest Yearly Meeting for future headquarters. A number of women painted the walls and ceilings while the men worked on carpentry under the supervision of Leroy Powell, a local contractor. An estimated \$2,355 for 227 hours of work was realized by the Yearly Meeting.

Since there was an overlapping of individuals on the three projects, one list of workers included the following: Homer and Margy Wright, Coordinators, Tim and Mary Beth Lewis, Chuck and Jean Hanson, Ed Roberts, Herb and Betty Lou Sargent, Jim and Mary Meireis, Leroy and Nila Ruddell, Richard and Odessa Ayers, Jerry Dillon, and Phil Fendall. Non-VOW workers who were a great help were Ed Steiger, Leo Crisman and Shorty Wright.

The total number of hours worked in all six projects came to 1,886 at a total estimated value of \$21,511.

## COMMISSION ON FAMILY LIFE

Our responsibility is to inform the local church "about principles of Christian marriage and family life" as well as giving "guidance for the reconciliation of stressed families and the healing of broken ones."

We believe that Christian values are the only sure foundation for healthy families. Therefore, we continue to search for ways to encourage more frequent use of the excellent resources we have on hand. One step we have taken has been to attempt to establish a continuing personal contact with someone in each local church — a person who cares deeply about family issues and also has some time to pursue those issues. We intend to supply this person with our resource catalog as well as current issues information which can be shared with his/her church family.

The Family Life video library currently has seventeen different series and nine individual videos ranging from "McGee and Me" moral stories for children to "The Challenge of the Disciplined Life" which helps adults deal with our



culture's emphasis on money, sex, and power. Each year, every local church receives an updated copy of the Yearly Meeting's audio-visual catalog which lists Family Life resources.

New items which don't appear in the current catalog are: "Building Your Mate's Self-Esteem" (a series featuring mini-dramas); "Successful Single Parenting" (series); "Making Peace with Your Emotions" (series); "Will the Defense Please Rest" (how defensiveness harms communications—series); and "The Divorce Decision," a single forty-minute you-are-there counseling session which points out the hard truths about the effects of divorce.

## GEORGE FOX COLLEGE REPORT 1991-1992

"George Fox Turns 100" was the title of a November 4 feature article in *The Oregonian*. It was excellent publicity.

The reporter was very interested in the reasons for our rapid growth. I gave him two basic reasons, and others he interviewed supported my thinking or extended it a bit. I'll share some of those quotes with you:

"I really think the key is consistency in mission," said Edward F. Stevens, college president for the past eight years. "We are unashamedly Christ-centered. And I do think that's very significant, because in a world that's really searching for values, we've stayed with the traditional Christian value system for the last 100 years . . . ."

"I think there's almost a spiritual void in the world today, and young people are eager to find meaning and purpose and truth in their lives.

"[Secondly,] . . . we've promoted ourselves more effectively, more consistently and more aggressively," Stevens said.

Tom Englund, executive director of the Christian College Consortium, was quoted: "Schools that are well run, know what they are about, and get out and tell their story effectively tend to do well.

In my terms, consistency of mission is "knowing what we are about" and promotion is "telling the story." (For some, the word "promotion," may not be thought of as a good word, but remember that effective evangelists know how to "tell the story"!

Englund also cited good leadership and effective programs as key factors in attracting students. George Fox has been "well run" for many years, and I want to mention four names, which do not include presidents—current or former, because I often get too much credit. The foundation for our growth was built by Bill Green, Don Millage, and Maurice Chandler. Lee Nash is retiring this year after eight years of good academic leadership and effective program additions.

Most know of Don Millage's unsurpassed financial management that has brought us 21 years of balanced budgets. Also, Maurice Chandler's ability to develop trust and raise financial support has been a key factor for nearly 25 of the last 30 years. Perhaps the "unsung hero" is Bill Green, who was so very effective in faculty hiring and academic program development through 12 years as vice president for academic affairs, which included one year as interim president, before his retirement in 1984.

The news article also listed other factors that I agree are "growth" elements. They were identified by Paul Chamberlain, chemistry professor and chair of natural science for the last 14 years. He is quoted:

" . . . the small classes foster effective exchanges between teachers and students and a 'better sense of community.'"

"We have been able to expand our mission with graduate programs, a degree-completion program and in the quality of faculty we've been able to hire."

These, too, are important parts of our growth. Students often mention the quality of faculty and the quality of relationships with faculty as a reason for coming to and staying at George Fox. We have been able to attract fine faculty who are committed to the Lordship of Christ.

All of the above are possible reasons for our enrollment growth. One fact remains: God has chosen to bless us—for some reason or for some set of reasons! I'm grateful and I'm humbled.

Will we be disappointed and blame God if enrollment goes down? No, I don't think so. I've been here for some of the difficult times, and some of you reading this have been involved a greater part of the 101 years than I have been.

As the young men stated as they were about to be thrown into the furnace: ". . . the God we serve is able to save us from (the furnace) . . . but even if He



does not . . . we will not serve your gods or worship the image of gold you have set up." (Daniel 3: 17-18)

Consistency of mission! We plan to stay with the King of Kings through good times and bad.

## THE COLLEGE

**NATIONAL REPUTATION.** George Fox College continues to receive national recognition. In October, U. S. News & World Report magazine ranked George Fox third in academic reputation among western region liberal arts colleges, a category including colleges in 15 states from Texas to Hawaii.

National recognition came again in April when George Fox was one of 112 colleges and universities in the nation named to the 1992 John Templeton Foundation Honor Roll for Character Building Colleges. It was the only Oregon college selected for the fourth annual listing of institutions that promote high integrity as well as education. GFC has been selected each year in the poll of presidents of all four-year, accredited institutions of higher education in the United States.

The Templeton Foundation also honored the College in May when it was selected for listing in the 1992 Honor Roll for Free Enterprise Teaching. Across the nation, 114 colleges were chosen by a vote of presidents and academic officers at more than 1,300 institutions. George Fox was the only Oregon college named. Schools chosen exemplify the teaching of the values of Western civilization and free market economy.

**ENROLLMENT.** George Fox College began its second century with a record-setting enrollment that grew by 14 percent to 1,222 students fall semester. The fifth consecutive year of enrollment growth doubled enrollment from the 549 students on campus in 1986. For the first time in its history, George Fox had more than 1,000 students attending classes on campus. There were 922 undergraduate students, including 264 first-time freshmen and 123 transfer students. The number of new students was up 34 percent. There were 85 students in the graduate school of clinical psychology, up 16 percent. Another 215 students enrolled in GFC's degree-completion program in management of human resources, which has classes in Portland, Salem and Eugene.

**CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION.** George Fox College turned 100 years old during a three-day celebration September 7-9 that drew accolades from the thousands who participated in the Centennial events.

The celebration featured something for everyone, from a Saturday evening birthday party for Newberg-area alumni and friends to lectures by nationally known visiting scholars on Monday to the fireworks that lit up the sky over the campus at the conclusion of the once-in-a-hundred-years celebration. The success went beyond the greatest dreams of the Centennial Planning Committee, which was hoping for 2,000 people for the Sunday afternoon Centennial Fair.

They were delighted when 3,500-4,000 turned out for the free picnic, a concert by the Four Flats Quartet, and the serving of a 3,000-piece birthday cake. In addition to the individual and personal memories, the Centennial observance left behind the College's centennial book, "A Heritage to Honor, A Future to Fulfill," and a 65-foot Centennial Tower that now is the campus centerpiece.

## ACADEMICS

**GRADUATE PROGRAMS.** In first year of its second century, George Fox College offered one graduate program and laid the plans for three others. The first graduate program, brought to campus in 1990, culminates in a doctor of psychology degree, with a master's degree in clinical psychology earned in the process. Announced during the year were new master's degree programs in teaching, business administration, and Christian studies.

The Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) program began in June with 31 enrolled. The non-thesis, 11-month program is for individuals who have completed an undergraduate degree in a field other than education. Graduates are eligible for Oregon basic teaching certificate approval and will have satisfied all academic conditions for the Standard Teaching Certificate. Classes are on campus, in the cohort plan with groups progressing through the program as a class unit.

Challenging some of the traditions of the nation's M.B.A. programs, George Fox has launched a Master of Business Administration program emphasizing human relationships and leadership. About 40 students are expected to be enrolled in the first year. The program is considered an alternative to many traditional M.B.A. programs, combining the best of a Christian liberal arts college with professional training in management. The program requires two years of classes one to two nights a week in Portland, with occasional Saturday seminars. Students follow a sequence of courses on the cohort plan. To be admitted, a student must have a baccalaureate degree and two years of professional work experience.

Beginning in September, the College will offer a Master of Arts degree in Christian Studies. The one-year, 36-semester-hour program combines a strong foundation in biblical and theological studies with opportunities for individual specialization and practical application. Designed to strengthen those already in full-or part-time ministry, it also is appropriate for individuals who want to explore ministry as a vocation, take the first steps in graduate study, or support their faith and service with thoughtful study. It may be used by professional ministers seeking continuing education or renewal, as well as by students who intend to transfer credits to more traditional ministerial-degree programs. About six students are expected in the initial year, building eventually to about 30 students annually. Classes will be on the Newberg campus, meeting weekly in three-hour blocks, with some classes offered during May Term and summer sessions. The new M.A. in Christian Studies builds on existing graduate courses in religion required as part of the doctoral program in clinical psychology.

**GOVERNANCE/LEADERSHIP.** After decades of operating with academic divisions—numbering eight in 1991-92—George Fox College now will have three schools and a total of 15 departments. The change in academic governance adapts to the College's addition of graduate programs.

Being established are a School of Humanities, School of Natural and Behavioral Sciences, and School of Professional Studies. Each will have a dean reporting to the vice president for academic affairs. Announced during the year was the retirement of Lee M. Nash, vice president for academic affairs, and the selection of Dirk E. Barram as his replacement. Barram, at George Fox since 1986, has been vice president for graduate and continuing studies. In the reorganization the two positions will be consolidated. The reorganization integrates graduate and undergraduate programs, allows for growth and expansion, eliminates confusion between divisions and departments, provides a more effective evaluation process for faculty, and allows for departmental autonomy. The change does not affect courses and classes but involves about 150 faculty, their lines of responsibility, and academic decision-making at the College.

Nash will become the College's first Herbert Hoover Professor of History, teaching part-time and directing the College's biennial Herbert Hoover Symposium. He joined the George Fox faculty in 1975 as professor of history and chairman of the Division of Social Science and was named vice president in 1984.

**COMPUTERS ACROSS THE CURRICULUM.** George Fox opened its academic year as one of the first colleges in the nation to provide every undergraduate student with a personal computer. Nearly 600 students received a Macintosh Classic computer that becomes theirs at graduation. Returning students can "buy in" to the program. Enhancement of the teaching/learning process is the



goal of the program, with the spin-off benefit of computer literacy for all graduates. Faculty also received computers in the program. Students now can turn in their "papers" and work assignments on computer disk. A computer store was established on campus for distribution, training and servicing.

**COMMENCEMENT.** In its third year with two graduation ceremonies, the College graduated 305 students. In Midyear Commencement ceremonies December 21 the College awarded degrees to 102, including 6 graduate students, 14 traditional students, and 82 through the Management of Human Resources degree-completion program. Recognized with honorary doctorates were world-renowned architect Pietro Belluschi and the College's longtime benefactor and volunteer Esther Klages. Belluschi designed GFC's Coleman Wheeler Sports Center and the Centennial Tower. Klages has given generously of her time, financial resources, and leadership to the College. Speaker was David Le Shana, former George Fox president and now the president of Western Evangelical Seminary, Portland.

In the May 2 commencement ceremonies the College awarded 203 degrees: 13 to graduate students, 141 to traditional students, and 49 to students in the degree-completion program. GFC turned to two of its own as speakers for the 100th graduation programs. Lee Nash, retiring vice president for academic affairs, gave the commencement address. Laurel Lee, the College's writer-in-residence, spoke for baccalaureate. Oregon educator Dea Cox was awarded an honorary doctorate, recognizing his leadership for 15 years as superintendent of the West Linn School District, to Oregon education committees and organizations, and to the GFC Board of Trustees, a member since 1983.

**CAMPUS EXPANSION.** George Fox's newest building, the 33rd on campus, was dedicated September 28. The Richard H. Beebe Residence Hall was dedicated one day less than a year from ground-breaking. The three-story building is located on the west side of Hess Creek Canyon greenway. It houses 40 students in 10 two-room suites. The 9,000-square-foot minidorm also contains a student post office to serve east campus residence halls. The College served as its own contractor for the \$700,000 project. The naming honors 1951 GFC graduate Richard Beebe, superintendent of the Crow-Applegate-Lorane School District near Eugene at his death in 1989. He was chairman of the Student Life Committee of the College's Board of Trustees, of which he had been a member for 15 years.

The first part of a \$650,000 renovation of Heacock Commons began in June. Changes in the first phase of a three-year project include installation of skylights, new lighting, new carpet, new ceiling tile, new interior finish, new curtain wall to create two smaller dining rooms, new furniture, and a new roof. Upcoming changes will be building expansion and remodeling to allow a new secondary dining room, relocation of the present dishroom, and renovation of the present Subway snack bar area. During the year, the College continued to purchase residences in the two blocks adjacent to the existing campus, on the south. They are being used for student housing.

A residence adjacent to the Video Communication Center was purchased to become the Humanities House, with eight offices for communication arts, history, and the Center for Peace Learning.

The center of campus took on a new look with the creation of a 200-bush formal rose garden just north of the Centennial Tower. It will be called the Virginia Millage Memorial Rose Garden, honoring the 1954 GFC alumna and wife of Vice President for Financial Affairs Don Millage. She died in March. The 70-foot-diameter garden in a wagon-wheel design includes four park benches and is designed to have a centerpiece sculpture fountain.

**CENTENNIAL CAMPAIGN.** At the end of the fiscal year June 30, nearly \$9.4 million had been given or pledged in the first 15 months of George Fox's \$16 million Centennial Campaign. The College's largest-ever fund drive, with a goal

of reaching the total by June of 1994, will fund library holdings, endowment growth and new buildings. The largest project is a \$5.3 million natural science building. Another \$3 million is projected for a new student services/administration building. The campaign includes \$2.45 million for the annual fund, \$1.9 million for endowment, and \$800,000 for purchase of library holdings and an automated catalog system. The campaign would provide \$750,000 for additional property acquisition; \$550,000 for a new maintenance building and storage building; \$500,000 for remodeling and expansion of Heacock Commons; \$500,000 for improvements to athletic facilities and parking; and \$120,000 for long-range planning, already underway.

**BALANCED BUDGET.** For the 21st consecutive year, George Fox College completed its fiscal year with a balanced budget. Support for the College's annual fund has continued to rise—from \$275,000 in 1982-83 to \$675,000 in 1991-92. The College's total budget for 1991-92 was \$14.9 million.

## EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

**FALL CONVOCATION.** In celebration of the College's 100th birthday on September 9, the traditional fall honors convocation was replaced with a Centennial Convocation featuring Warren Bryan Martin, senior fellow and scholar-in-residence at the Carnegie Foundation for Advancement of Teaching, Princeton, N.J. He is the author of "Colleges of Character."

A series of lectures also was given that day, featuring Kent Hill, historian and executive director of the Institute of Religion and Democracy; Robin Klay, economist from Hope College, specializing in business ethics; Gary Collins, clinical psychologist and president of People Helpers International; and James DePreist, conductor of the Oregon Symphony and author of two books of poetry.

**SPECIAL CHAPELS AND WEEKS.** GFC's annual Christian Life Week in September featured Mike Angel, who grew up in an Orthodox Jewish community in southern California and received rabbinical training before becoming a Christian during the height of the Jesus Movement in the early 1970s. Now he speaks full-time nationwide for camps, conferences and colleges.

Author and professor Alan Kolp was featured speaker for the annual Quaker Heritage Week in November. Under the theme "Sages of the Spirit," he discussed maturation and deepening in the Christian faith. Kolp is professor of historical and spiritual studies at Earlham School of Religion, Richmond, Indiana. He has a Ph.D. in church history from Harvard.

The 25th annual Missions Conference in January brought to campus as keynote speaker Miriam Adeney, an expert in cross-cultural communication and the author of "God's Foreign Policy." Now a professor at Seattle Pacific University and Regents College in Vancouver, B.C., Adeney was joined for the GFC conference by a dozen missionaries and representatives of missionary agencies who spoke in classes and to small student gatherings.

Guest speakers for the spring theological conference in February examined a Christian commitment to the environment in a series of four lectures. Speakers were three GFC professors in religion and business and Warner Pacific and biology professor Dwight Kimberly, a 1967 George Fox graduate.

The annual Staley Lecturer in late March was Stan Thornburg, head of the pastoral team at Reedwood Friends Church, Portland, and a 1968 GFC graduate. He spoke on the topic of "Love, Loneliness, and Sexual Ethics" in three addresses. He also visited classes and was available for counseling. He has directed seminars and spoken before groups nationwide for the last 12 years. The lecture series was established in 1969 to bring outstanding scholars to college and university campuses.

**ACADEMIC CONFERENCES AND EVENTS.** "Through a Glass Darkly: Dimly Glimpsing Psychology and Christian Faith" was the topic for the 45th



Faculty Lecture. Questions about the relationship between science and the Christian faith and the emergence of psychology and psychotherapy were discussed in the April address by Rodger K. Bufford, professor and chairman of the Graduate School of Clinical Psychology.

Ron Sider, author and executive director of Evangelicals for Social Action, was speaker for the annual John Woolman Peacemaking Forum in March. His topic was "Peacemaking: Living the Good News." Sider, who has a Ph.D. in history from Yale, is professor of theology and culture at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. The series is sponsored by George Fox's Center for Peace Learning, which gave its 1992 John Woolman Peacemaking Awards to Al Willett, a mediator and retired airline pilot, and Marilyn Dell, a real estate agent and city council member in McMinnville, Ore. They received their awards as representatives of the Yamhill County Mediators program.

**MUSIC AND DRAMA.** In May, George Fox College was the site for the debut by the Oregon Symphony Orchestra of its latest recording. When it performed in packed Bauman Auditorium for a George Fox/Newberg audience of more than 1,200, it performed selections it was to record the next day in the auditorium. The renowned 85-piece symphony recorded for the first time outside its own concert hall in Portland. GFC's auditorium was chosen months before because internationally-known symphony conductor James DePreist has noted the quality of the sound in the facility. The annual public concert in Newberg is a gift from Ken and Joan Austin of Newberg.

GFC's own music and drama groups performed numerous times on and off campus. The drama department staged "God's Favorite," a comedy by popular contemporary playwright Neil Simon, in November. In April it produced "Jayne Eyre," a play based on Charlotte Bronte's Gothic romance. The GFC Players performed periodically and Theater Games became a monthly and popular event.

"Oliver!" the Broadway musical by Lionel Bart based on the novel by Charles Dickens, was the annual music theater production in February.

George Fox's Concert Band, Jazz Band, Concert Choir, Handbell Ringers and the Chehalem Symphony Orchestra all performed throughout the year on and off campus. The Concert Choir sang in Oregon and Eastern Washington on a three-day tour in April, and the Concert Band was in Idaho, Montana and Oregon for performances on a nine-day March tour.

Playing again to sold-out performances, the annual "Ye Olde Royal Feaste" was held in early December. The madrigal dinner is complete with costumes, sets, servants, beggars and royal court—all in Heacock Commons, transformed to an English castle for the three nights.

"Dayspring," GFC's eight-member touring vocal ensemble, made 77 appearances during the year, 47 in churches, 17 in Christian schools, and 13 in other settings, including singing the national anthem prior to a Portland Trail Blazer game. The group traveled 7,000 miles, including a May tour of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

**ATHLETICS.** In 1991-92, all but two of the George Fox athletic teams reached the NAIA District 2 playoffs, with six advancing to national competition.

Both cross country teams raced to top-ten national finishes. The Lady Bruins finished fourth with three All-American performances. The fourth-ranked men, behind Jonathan Morse's 21st-place finish, earned eighth. Both teams repeated as district champions, the women making it four in a row and the men three straight. Academic All-American honors went to seniors Jill Jamison Beals and Melissa Wilson Conley, and to junior Matt Kirkpatrick.

Although they won seven of their final eight regular season matches, the volleyball team couldn't keep their winning streak running through the district playoffs. Three days before the tournament, the Lady Bruins beat the eventual district champion in three straight games but finished 1-2 in the playoffs and

24-17 overall. Senior outside hitter Cindy Warner and sophomore setter Jaime Suehiro earned spots on the all-district team.

"The greatest soccer game I've been associated with on the college level," said coach Manfred Tschan after the Bruins fell in the district championship game. After four and a half hours of double-overtime scoreless suspense, the GFC soccer men lost the District 2 title game in a shootout, ending the season at 10-9. Junior defender Dieter Muenstermann was named to the district first team. Three Bruins made the second team, including the district's leading scorer, freshman Greg Pfleger.

Not expected by some to win a game in its first year, the George Fox women's soccer team made it to the district playoffs in its inaugural season. The Lady Bruins fell to the eventual champion in the first round to finish their season at 3-8-1 overall, 2-6-1 in district. Junior Meghan Ross took all-district honors.

The Northwest's winningest college basketball program over the past three years (77-22-.777), the Bruins took their winning ways into national competition. From a second-place preseason ranking, the Bruins careened around some unexpected turns before arriving at the NAIA Division II national quarterfinals. Upset in the district playoffs, the Bruins used an at-large berth to reach higher than any GFC team had before. George Fox won two national tournament games before falling one game short of the NAIA final four, ending the season at 24-11. Senior center Dave Wilson rewrote 17 school records and ended on the All-American first-team. Forward Jeff Hoffman received national honorable mention.

The women's basketball team, in what was said to be a rebuilding year, jumped off to a 7-3 start, but injuries reduced the roster and the Lady Bruins finished at 11-15, missing the playoffs for the first time in six years. Freshman point guard Heidi Rueck led the district in assists, but in January went out for the season with a foot injury. Junior forward Cindy Winters was named a district player of the week.

With a team of ten freshmen and no seniors and just one pitcher, the GFC softball team might have overachieved to finish with a winning record. The Lady Bruins not only built a 11-10-1 record, but came within a game of their second-straight district playoff berth. Sophomore shortstop Traci Blair was given all-district honors.

In a repeat performance of 1991, the GFC baseball Bruins steamrolled over four playoff opponents to claim their second NAIA District 2 championship. Trailing only during the first inning of the first game, the Bruins were challenged only in the title game victory over Albertson College of Idaho. GFC's season ended in the Area 1 playoffs with a loss to five-time NAIA champion Lewis-Clark State. GFC finished 29-18 overall, 26-7 in NAIA, with first-ever wins over NCAA Division I opponents Oregon State and Portland State. Senior first baseman Fernando Pol set a school record with home runs (12) and was named to the all-district first team. Of the 26 available district honorable mention selections, GFC had 10.

Behind the record-shattering efforts of Jill Jamison Beals, the GFC women's track team claimed its first-ever top-ten national finish. Beals blew past previous national meet records in winning her third 10,000-meter title and finishing as runner-up in the 5,000-meter race. At the national meet, the women finished in a tie for 10th, one point from eighth, and the men tied for 26th. Junior David Thomas and senior Brian Hartenstein had All-American performances in the 10,000-meter racewalk and 400-meter hurdles, respectively. Beals and heptathlete Marlyss Stenberg led the women to their first-ever district title. Coach Wes Cook was named district Coach of the Year for women's track.
