SHANNON CRAIGO-SNELL is Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at Yale University, specializing in Modern Christian Thought. Shannon became a convinced Friend after attending Guilford College. Her Quaker commitments influence her teaching on feminist, political, and liberation theologies, and her writing on silence and performance in relation to theology. Her first book, *Silence, Love, and Death: Saying "Yes" to God in the Theology of Karl Rahner*, is forthcoming at Marquette University Press.

BRIAN DRAYTON is an ecologist working in science-education research. He is a member of Weare (NH) Monthly Meeting in New England Yearly Meeting, and he is a recorded minister. Brian is the author of *On Living with a Concern for Gospel Ministry* (QuakerPress 2006) and *Selections from the Writings of James Nayler* (New England YM, 2nd. edition, 1994).

NEWTON GARVER is the Distinguished Service Professor of Philosophy emeritus at SUNY Buffalo. His most recent books are *Wittgenstein & Approaches to Clarity* (Humanity Books 2006) and *Limits to Politics* (Center Working Papers 2006; 2nd edition, 2007). He is offering a workshop on "Wittgenstein for Quakers" at the 2007 FGC Gathering and is a member of Buffalo Meeting (NYYM). Having visited Bolivia seven times since 1999, he has served as a leader of the Quaker Study Tour (QST) and a board member of Quaker Bolivia Link (QBL), and is currently president of the Bolivian Quaker Education Fund (BQEF). In his recent article in *Friends Journal* (February 2007), all three of these activities are discussed.

BEN RICHMOND joined Friends in 1971 through the unprogrammed Multnomah Monthly Meeting in Portland, OR, and then followed his wife Jody to Richmond, IN to attend the Earlham School of Religion. After three years as a pastor in Iowa Yearly Meeting, Ben joined the Friends United Meeting staff from 1985-2005, where he was coordinator for Peace and Social Concerns, managing editor of *Quaker Life* magazine, and director of North American Ministries. He is the author of the elective adult curricu-

lum, *Testimonies*, and an abridgement of *The Reminiscences of Levi Coffin*. Ben is a recorded minister in Indiana Yearly Meeting.

JACCI WELLING is Associate Professor of History at Malone College. She co-directs the first-year new faculty program at Malone and attends Jackson Friends Church in Massillon, Ohio (EFC-ER). Her current research focuses on the evolving sense and practice of mission in Ohio Yearly Meeting (Gurneyite).

PAUL ANDERSON is Professor of Biblical and Quaker Studies at George Fox University. In response to the QTDG session on Truth and Power, he was asked to write a review of important books on the subject for *Vital Theology*, which appeared in December 2006. His new book, *The Fourth Gospel and the Quest for Jesus*, was published last year, and he is co-editing the first of three volumes of the John, Jesus, and History Group at the national SBL meetings for publication. He serves as Director of the George Fox University Congregational Discernment Project ([discernment.georgefox.edu](http://discernment.georgefox.edu)), and he represents Friends on the NCCC Faith and Order Consultation. Paul was recently elected President of the Pacific Northwest AAR/SBL/ASOR Region.
