MINUTES

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1999

Monday, July 26, 8:00 a.m.

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting convened its 107th annual sessions on Monday, July 26, 1999 on the campus of George Fox University under the theme, "Keeping the Faith: Communicating the Friends Message in a New Millennium." Bill Hidden, clerk of the representatives, read a verse from "Servant Song" about sharing the load together on our pilgrim journey. Mark Ankeny, presiding clerk, opened with a time of quiet prayer for the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting (NWYM).

■ 2. The representatives were seated on Saturday, July 24, with the remaining representatives seated this morning.

■ 3. Mark Ankeny introduced the following guests to NWYM: Ryan Haas, representing Barclay College; Jay Marshall, representing Earlham School of Religion; Johan Maurer, General Secretary of Friends United Meeting; Aidan McCartney, of Ireland Yearly Meeting; and Marge Abbott, of North Pacific Yearly Meeting.

■ 4. Harold Antrim, associate superintendent, introduced the new pastors, associate pastors and youth pastors for 1999-2000. ■ 5. Assistant Clerk Don Staples read the Executive Council's recommendation that Joe Gerick's appointment as General Superintendent be extended through June 30, 2001. This was approved. Rachel Hampton and Conard Petersen stand aside of the approval.

■ 6. Don Staples read the recommendation of the Executive Council that Harold Antrim's appointment as Associate Superintendent be extended through June 30, 2001. This was approved.

■ 7. Don Staples read the Executive Council's recommendation that Paul Bock be appointed as Youth Superintendent for a two-year term through June 30, 2001. This was approved.

■ 8. Mark Ankeny asked for affirmation and approval for the Sunday evening messages given by Harold Behr and Bruce Bishop. This was approved.

■ 9. Mark Ankeny asked for approval for the Saturday Ministry Fair and Silent Auction sponsored by the Commission on Family Life. The purpose of the Auction is to raise continued support for the Richard Beebe Memorial Pastoral Counseling Fund. The Commission was affirmed by the meeting.

■ 10. The business meeting approved the presentation by the Mission Board on Sunday, July 25.

[Formal board reports as distributed to Yearly Meeting attendees appear in the Addendum of the Minutes.]

■ 11. Lorraine Watson, candidate for pastoral recording, shared her personal testimony.

■ 12. David Hampton, director of Finance and Development, gave the Great Commission Program Budget (GCPB) report. He spent time explaining the restricted and unrestricted funds, mentioning that some groups receive many contributions outside the GCPB (e.g. missions) and others (e.g. administrative) receive no funds outside the GCPB. However, many members of the administrative team spend a large percentage of their time in ministry activities (e.g. youth superintendent). This report was approved. (See Appendix.)

■ 13. David Hampton gave a report about the Friends Fund. After many years of dealing with the accumulated operating debt, the projection for the year 2000 should hopefully see a balanced budget. The large increase in projected management fees was partially due to a large new endowment fund in 1999 for the Board of Evangelism. This report was approved.

■ 14. David Hampton gave a report on the Friends Church Extension Foundation. This organization was founded over forty years ago. It has three purposes: it makes loans to churches, it accepts deposits, it provides funding for special projects. This report was approved.

■ 15. An expression of appreciation and gratitude for his work was given by the meeting to David Hampton.

■ 16. Kenneth Redford, candidate for pastoral recording, gave his personal testimony.

■ 17. Mark Ankeny presented the following as second readings of changes to Faith and Practice: [Note: new wording in bold, deleted wording lined out].

On page 73, Committees on Yearly Meeting Details: "1. A Program Committee to plan the sessions of Yearly Meeting ~~[may be appointed by the Council of Elders in consultation with the Yearly Meeting officers]~~ **will be appointed and convened by the general superintendent under the guidance of the Council of Elders.**" Approved as second reading.

■ 18. On page 43, Form of government. Committees of the local church. Stewardship Committee: The last sentence in the first paragraph is changed to read: "using subcommittees or individuals for special duties, the Committee **with advice and assistance from the pastor** carries the following responsibilities:" Approved as second reading.

■ 19. On page 43, Form of government. Committees of the local church. Nominating Committee: "The Nominating Committee is appointed by the church upon nomination by the elders. It is composed of three or more active members of the church, the terms of one-third expiring each year. The Committee retains its identity throughout the year in order to act when there is a vacancy in any office under its jurisdiction. By the last business session of the church year, ~~[it]~~ **the committee with advice and assistance from the pastor** presents nominations to the church for all offices and committee memberships, having endeavored to secure the best information possible regarding capabilities appropriate to the different offices. If so instructed, it designates by name the clerks of the main committees." Approved as second reading.

■ 20. On pages 39, 49, 62, 67, 68, 99 regarding area appointments to boards. These changes permit Yearly Meeting boards to propose their own nominations for positions the areas fail to fill, keeping geographic representation in mind.

Page 39, Organization of the Local Church. Structure and function. Representation in the Area. "Each church appoints annually one of its members to serve on the Area Nominating Committee. **If an area fails to appoint a Nominating Committee, appointments to Yearly Meeting boards will be made by the boards themselves. Geographic representation will be considered to the degree possible.**"

Page 40. Organization of Areas. Officers. At the end of this paragraph, add the following sentence: "**If for any reason an Area fails to make appointments to Yearly Meeting boards, those appointments will be made by the boards themselves.**"

Pages 62, 67-99. These changes affect the following boards: Education, Evangelism, Ministerial Service, Missions, Peace and Social Concerns, and Stewardship. At the end of the paragraph titled "The Area Secretary." Add the following sentence: "**If an Area fails to appoint an area secretary, the board will fill this position as it sees fit, maintaining geographic representation to the degree possible.**" Approved as second reading.

■ 21. Walter Lee, attending his 77th Yearly Meeting sessions, dismissed with prayer.

Tuesday, July 27, 8:00 a.m.

■ 22. Assistant Clerk Don Staples opened the meeting with prayer.

■ 23. The minutes of the Monday meeting were read, corrected, and approved.

■ 24. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny introduced visitors Lane Snyder, representing the Friends World Committee for Consultation, and Mary Lord, representing the Friends Committee on National Legislation. Mary is a member of Baltimore Yearly Meeting. She invited members of NWYM to attend the 326th session on August 4, 1999. Baltimore is the oldest yearly meeting in the USA.

■ 25. Mark Ankeny presented the proposed Faith and Practice revision of the Organization of the Yearly Meeting [51; 29] concerning its composition and powers. [Note: new wording in bold; deleted wording lined out.]

General Organization

Composition and Powers

The Yearly Meeting consists of the members of the local churches and Areas. **In its meetings for business it consists of the Council of Representatives and any other members in attendance.** It possesses complete legislative, judicial, and administrative authority. It has the authority to counsel, admonish, and discipline its constituent churches; to institute measures and provide means for the promotion of truth and righteousness; to inaugurate and maintain departments of evangelistic outreach and philanthropic work. It may review the proceedings of any church and give advice and instruction to the churches when requested or when considered necessary by the Yearly Meeting. Its officers and all persons serving its internal organizations are resident active members of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Any exceptions must be approved by the Yearly Meeting Executive Council.

Time and Purpose of the Annual Sessions

The annual sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting are held at Newberg, Oregon, at times determined by the Yearly Meeting or its Executive Council. (See Yearly Meeting Minutes for current schedule.) Sessions may be held elsewhere by adjournment or action of the Meeting. The sessions are opened by the presiding clerk, who directs the representatives from the churches to make nominations at once to fill vacancies, on a pro tem or regular basis, as the case may require. If the presiding clerk is absent, the sessions are opened in turn by the assistant clerk or the recording clerk. These annual sessions are held in order for Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends to determine policies and procedures appropriate to its mission, to communicate them to members of the churches, and to find fellowship and unity through worship and instruction.

Business Procedures

1. Business presented as an expression of concern is forwarded from the churches, from Areas, from councils, from constituent bodies of the Yearly Meeting, or from other yearly meetings through official correspondence. Also, with the consent of the presiding clerk, business may be laid before the Yearly Meeting by any of its members. **Information regarding anticipated items of business will be sent to local churches at least ninety days prior to annual Yearly Meeting sessions. The Council of Representatives approves the agenda and order of business prior to the first business meeting, normally on the previous Saturday.** [The Business Committee (see p. 44) facilitates the flow of business to the clerk in proper form and sequence.]
2. **The Meeting may take action in one of the following ways.** a. The clerk may call for action by the Meeting. b. ~~[or, i]~~ If the matter requires discussion or investigation beyond what can be handled in [52] open session, **the clerk** may refer it to the Council of Representatives or to a special committee for consideration and recommendation before the Meeting takes formal action. c.

The clerk may, with the approval of the Meeting, refer some matters to a separate meeting of the Council of Representatives for final decision, which will be reported back to the Meeting.

3. Proposals from the churches or Areas are to be submitted in writing as excerpts from their minutes and are to be held over at least one day subsequent to their introduction in order to allow deliberation. All proposals for amendment to this Faith and Practice must be submitted in writing and referred after preliminary approval to the Revision Committee before final action (see p. 44).
4. The Council of Elders reports to the Yearly Meeting in plenary session its summary of the state of the church, allowing time for prayerful consideration of issues raised by the report and by any attached judgments or interpretations offered by the Council of Elders.
5. The Yearly Meeting receives and decides all cases of appeal from the decisions of local churches which may be brought before it (see p. 52 for procedures).

Presiding Clerk

The presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting is the presiding officer at the annual sessions. The clerk also presides over **the Council of Representatives and the Executive Council**, makes all needful preparations for presenting the business of the Meeting at the next annual sessions, and oversees the scheduling of board presentations at these sessions. The clerk's interpretations of Faith and Practice are final unless overruled by Yearly Meeting action.

The presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting serves as correspondent receiving and answering official communications, signing epistles and other documents issued to yearly meetings or associations, endorsing official certificates for members liberated for service in foreign lands, and signing certain documents and transcripts of record that require official certification.

At an early business session, **the Nominating Committee of the Council of Representatives** nominates to the Yearly Meeting a person to serve as presiding clerk for the following year. If the nomination is approved, the newly appointed clerk assumes office immediately upon the close of the Yearly Meeting sessions.

Other Clerks

The Yearly Meeting also appoints on nomination by the Council of Representatives the following officers: an assistant clerk, who reads official communications to the Meeting and keeps sufficiently informed about the business agenda to take the place of an absent presiding clerk; a recording clerk, who records and reads the minutes of the sessions; an assistant recording clerk, who compiles the Yearly Meeting directory for inclusion in the annual Minutes; an [53] announcing clerk, who organizes and presents pertinent announcements; and a statistician, who annually gathers and publishes useful statistics about church membership and activities.

[54; 31] [Clerks of the Representatives

~~On nomination by the Representatives, the Yearly Meeting appoints annually a person to preside over the deliberations of the Council of Representatives and a recording clerk to keep records and assist the presiding clerk with agenda for the following year. Clerks are appointed soon after the opening of the annual sessions so that if they lack previous experience they may sit in the remaining sessions of the Representatives to observe the procedure and be instructed by the current clerks. They may be reappointed on expiration of their terms.~~

~~The presiding clerk should be well qualified to preside without prejudice or partiality, to expedite the handling of business without neglect of proper hearing and deliberation, and to gather the sense of the meeting with discernment. The clerk~~

should become thoroughly knowledgeable about the functions of the Representatives and understand what procedures and materials (such as lists of church and Area appointments) are needed for the sessions. The clerk instructs and aids the recording clerk in the preparation of reports, minuted actions, and authorized nominations that are forwarded to the Yearly Meeting (see pp. 27, 75).

[56; 32] Executive Council of the Yearly Meeting

Composition

The Executive Council is composed of the Yearly Meeting clerk and assistant clerk; the general superintendent, associate superintendent, youth superintendent, and treasurer of the Yearly Meeting; ~~[the clerk of the Representatives,]~~ the clerk of the Council of Elders[,] and the clerk of the Trustees; one person chosen by each of the Yearly Meeting boards and commissions, one by each of the Areas, and not more than three additional persons designated by the Yearly Meeting. The Yearly Meeting representative to the Evangelical Friends International-North America Region may be asked to serve on the Council ex officio. The presiding officer is the Yearly Meeting Clerk.

[58; 34]

Composition

The Council of Representatives is composed of members of local and extension churches who have been chosen, prayerfully, on the basis of spiritual maturity, respected judgment, and acceptance of Friends beliefs and procedures as set forth in this book of Faith and Practice. At their first meeting, roll call is taken and representatives are seated. Alternates may be seated in place of representatives to fill allowable quotas (see p. 21). No late seating may take place except as authorized by the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting. Those approved and seated are the official Representatives. ~~[Officers consist of a]~~ **The presiding clerk and [a] recording clerk [-who are selected annually by recommendation of the Nominating Committee of the Representatives and approved by the Council of the Representatives and the Yearly Meeting (see below). Both are constituted officers of the Yearly Meeting. The Yearly Meeting presiding clerk and]** **of the Yearly Meeting also serve as presiding clerk and recording clerk of the Council of Representatives.** The general superintendent ~~[are]~~ **is an** ex officio member[s]. The Representatives meet in open sessions to encourage wider understanding of church business. If a matter of seriously sensitive nature should arise, however, the presiding clerk with the concurrence of the Representatives may request **other members** and visitors to absent themselves.

[59] Meetings

The Council of Representatives meets in conjunction with the annual sessions of the Yearly Meeting but may be called to meet at times between the annual sessions with the concurrence of ~~[at least two of the following: the clerk of the Representatives,]~~ the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting[,] and the general superintendent of the Yearly Meeting. **The Council of Representatives meet prior to the first business meeting, normally on the previous Saturday, for the purposes of seating Representatives and approving the agenda for the business meeting. All other scheduled Representatives meetings are held during Yearly Meeting business sessions.**

Term of Office

Representatives are appointed by their local church for a term of not less than two years commencing with the start of the calendar year. Terms should last either two or three years, a proportionate number being replaced each year.

Duties

The Council of Representatives attends to any business that it initiates or that the Yearly Meeting **organizations**, Areas, or local churches refer to it. ~~[It is authorized to present any such business for consideration to the Yearly Meeting in session.]~~ It is also specifically responsible to:

1. Submit to the Yearly Meeting annual nominations for the following offices: the presiding clerk, assistant presiding clerk, recording clerk, assistant recording clerk, and announcing clerk of the Yearly Meeting; and the clerk and recording clerk of the Council of Representatives.
2. Submit to the Yearly Meeting annual nominations for members of Yearly Meeting boards, councils, and commissions, except for those nominations specifically reserved to the Areas or other bodies, seeking to fill these positions with a broad view of the work of the Yearly Meeting and a knowledge of qualified persons. The Council of Representatives may receive from the boards the names of persons they wish considered for appointment, together with appropriate information and commentary.
3. **Appoint a Nominating Committee, which meets throughout the year as necessary, in order to identify suitable and willing nominees for the positions for which the Representatives are charged to nominate.**
4. [3] Approve nominations by organizations for their presiding clerks and report them to the Yearly Meeting.
5. [4] Approve on nomination from the Executive Council and report to the Yearly Meeting the persons to serve on the Council of Elders, making sure the appointments represent the Areas (see p. 33).
6. **Convey concerns, actions, and other information between the Yearly Meeting and their local churches.**

A discussion followed. Eighteen people shared concerns. A summary of those concerns follows: Quakers do not use the democratic process. We are a theocracy and God is our leader. We can hear God's voice through many sources. Business is another form of worship. What God says in any gathered meeting depends on who is there, and yet we believe that God can lead us into decisions despite many different points of view. In summary, God speaks through many special people and sometimes we have to wait and trust God to lead us to an answer. On the other hand, many representatives feel that they are a glorified nominating committee where decisions are never made, or are sometimes overturned. Representatives should be empowered to make decisions. Local churches appoint representatives to speak their mind. Representatives should listen to everyone, but represent the people that sent them. We don't need representatives if we're not going to use them. Our churches send representatives to represent them. God used Jethro to speak to Moses suggesting that representatives be used to represent smaller groups. It is valuable when issues can be discussed ahead of time and local meetings can have input through their representatives. Sometimes the Executive Council can have too much power in decision making; representatives would help balance that. In the past, representatives have done important work in decision making. By combining the representatives session with the business session, everyone can hear the same reports and discussions of issues, making it more efficient. Trust seems to be a key issue. Do we trust local meetings to make decisions? Can we trust each other? One or two oppositions can often bring additional insights. Time, even two years, can lead to a decision. It is important to remember that the clerk may, with the approval of the meeting, refer some matters to a separate meeting of the Council of Representatives. Mark Ankeny said he heard in the discussion that representatives take seriously the responsibility of Yearly Meeting business, and that we trust others, non-representatives, to be speaking for others also. In the final

decision-making process the entire spectrum of the Yearly Meeting should be involved. It is the clerk's responsibility to listen carefully to the people and try to discern how the Spirit of Christ is leading.

Approved as first reading.

■ 26. Harold Behr, candidate for pastoral recording, gave his personal testimony.

■ 27. Dea Cox, clerk of the Council of Elders, gave a report. He explained that the responsibility of the council is to foster relationships between the Yearly Meeting, pastors, and churches. They deal with problems, and are striving to be more proactive and less reactive. They are using peacekeeping methods such as being Christ-like in our relationships with other people. The Elders have dealt with some difficult problems including a division in the Boise Friends Church. However, the Elders are encouraged by reports from the Northwest Yearly Meeting churches reporting conversions, a new spirit in the churches, outstanding young people, and a love for one another rooted in their love for Christ. Dea Cox anticipates great things to come. The Elders are excited about Harold Behr's work. He reminded the meeting that each area has a representative elder available to work with individual churches. The report was approved.

■ 28. Carole Spencer, candidate for recording as a minister, was not present to give her testimony. She is in England working on her Ph.D. Her sponsor, Anna Nixon, gave a summary of Carole's testimony, and described her ministries.

■ 29. Ron Stansell, clerk of the Board of Missions, presented the board report. Duane Comfort has been called as the Missions Administrator. This past year there has been a variety of work in the missions including the teachers to the Ramallah Friends School, the addition of Hal and Nancy Thomas to a ministry of missions education at the Bolivian Evangelical University in Santa Cruz, the work team and the medical team going to Peru. The Board is committed to reducing the staff in Bolivia and Peru while continuing to be encouragers and educators. The Board of Missions is prayerfully searching for a new challenge. Their goal is to bring a recommendation of the new work in the year 2000. The work in India, Mexico, Burundi, and Rwanda is very encouraging. In Rwanda the churches have increased from 24 to 62. There are between 2000 and 3000 students attending the Friends schools there. Also the work in Jordan and Rough Rock has expanded.

■ 30. Ron Stansell also reported briefly on his work with Evangelical Friends International Council. His job is to relate and encourage leadership of regional operations in Asia, Africa, North America and Latin America. He had the opportunity this year to teach at the Great Lakes School of Theology in Africa. The school is led and directed by Africans. Also Guatemala is hosting a conference for 500 Spanish-speaking Friends pastors from eight or nine countries including Cuba. EFM and FUM are working together with EFI Latin America on this project. Both mission reports were approved.

■ 31. Cheri Hampton, Newberg Friends, dismissed with prayer.

Wednesday, July 28, 8:00 a.m.

■ 32. The meeting began with a time of quiet worship and prayer.

■ 33. The minutes of the Tuesday meeting were read, corrected, and approved

■ 34. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny introduced guest, Bob Barns, representing Right Sharing of World Resources. He lives in Grass Valley, CA and is a member of Pacific Yearly Meeting.

■ 35. There was an additional representative seated.

■ 36. Paul Bock, newly appointed Youth Superintendent, expressed appreciation to Bruce Bishop and Missy Bullock for their work. He named many new programs, which began under their leadership and are flourishing today. He mentioned that many of the former youth are now taking active adult leadership roles in the Yearly Meeting. Paul introduced Sheila Hoyer, new Youth Program Coordinator. The junior high and high school groups introduced their current and newly appointed officers and clerks. Each group told of their Yearly Meeting activities, workshops, service projects and business meeting. Each group read their epistles and minutes. The reports were approved.

The high school epistle was read as follows:

Greetings Friends!

Listening, seeking, sharing, encouraging, praising, stretching, laughing, upholding. . . this was Northwest Youth Yearly Meeting 1999.

Imagine that you, a senior high youth on the campus of George Fox University in Newberg, Oregon, were present among the over 90 other senior high youth from July 24-30, 1999. You would have been excited to see what God had in store.

Small groups attended the kick-off barbecue at Tilikum and then clustered in the shade of trees to get to know one another. We practiced "praying through the scriptures" using Luke 8:22-25 through "lectio divina" and spent a hot afternoon helping with Habitat for Humanity housing projects. It was hot, it was sweaty, but it felt good to put our faith into action.

■ 37. Eric Anglin, candidate for recording as a minister, gave his personal testimony.

■ 38. Mark Ankeny introduced a *Faith and Practice* revision proposal, making a change in Council of Representatives and Yearly Meeting business structure. Tom Stave, clerk of the *Faith and Practice* Revision Committee, recommended that an additional sentence be added which states that the items of business would be sent to the local meetings at least ninety days ahead of Yearly Meeting to give local churches an opportunity to discuss the first reading, with the addition. The recommendation was approved by the meeting. Other concerns expressed were the possibility of seating representatives on Monday morning rather than on Saturday. Also it was suggested that the *Faith and Practice* Revision Committee eliminate the jobs currently listed under representatives, such as clerk of representatives, assistant clerk of representatives and recording clerk of representatives.

■ 39. Armond Kalesse, executive director of Friendsview Manor, gave a report about the retirement center. Plans are being made to utilize a portion of their eighteen acres for an expansion into assisted living. The slogan of the staff is "Together We Care." The Manor is a Christ-centered institution. With George Fox University nearby, opportunity for athletics, music and drama are available. The Mennonite

Health Services have offered their expertise in helping the Manor establish goals. The computer accounting system needs to be updated. Also, it is the hope that tapping other resources can reduce the financial load on current residents. Steve Gulley, president of the Manor Board, reported that the twenty-one members meet quarterly and the executive committee meets on the other months. There are three representatives from the Yearly Meeting serving on the board. Two goals of the board are to 1) expand toward another income source, and 2) remodel the current building. A duplex on Cherry Street was completed in July. The Manor is now on the World Wide Web. Roscoe Knight is the Manor Ambassador. The report was approved.

■ 40. Irv Brendlinger, candidate for ministerial recording, gave his personal testimony.

■ 41. Vicki Stave, clerk of Peace and Social Concerns, presented the board report. As she and the board members read the reports from the churches, they were very impressed with the many social concerns projects being done by the local churches. The goal of the board is to encourage more peacemaking projects. The board senses that NWYM would like to have our own member on a Christian Peacemaker team. The Thanksgiving Offering was used for the Medical Team's work in Peru, and for Grace Kuto from Tigard Friends, for the Kenya clinic, which is completed and paid for. Thirty thousand dollars was collected in the last two Thanksgiving offerings. The new Thanksgiving projects will be given to Laura's House of Peace in Scotts Mills, a refuge for victims of domestic violence, and a Peace Project with Burundi. The board has prepared a letter calling us to a Decade (2000-2010) for a Culture of Peace and Non-Violence for the children of the World. It has been signed by every living Nobel laureate. The plan is to send this letter to the following leaders in America.

■ 45. The meeting opened with quiet worship and prayer led by Michael Huber.

■ 46. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny introduced visitors Norval and Mary Hadley from Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting. Norval is Executive Director of Evangelical Friends Mission.

■ 47. Cathy Knox, clerk of the Board of Education, presented the board report. The board has written a Child Abuse Protection Policy specifically for Yearly Meeting children and youth events. They have materials for the local churches and urge them to put a local church policy in place. Screening and background checks will now be in place for all workers with children and youth at Yearly Meeting. A workshop on the topic was offered during these Yearly Meeting sessions. Evangelical Friends International-North America Christian Education Consultant Phil

Baisley has resigned and will be teaching at Earlham. The board and members of the business meeting gave expression of appreciation for his excellent consulting work throughout the Yearly Meeting. Cathy read the following minute prepared by the board:

This is a minute of appreciation of Phil Baisley's diligent fulfillment of his position. It is also an expression of our strong desire to have another person fill this role. We have appreciated Phil's organizational and administrative skills. His articles in *AWARE* speak to the needs in our church ministries. The teacher training workshops that he has held have been valuable to our community. The position Phil has held fills a void of leadership for children's education that we would otherwise have in the Northwest Yearly Meeting. He has been responsible through the 1-800 number and other means of connecting resources and needs of the churches. The sharing of resources between yearly meetings has been possible because of the existence of this role.

The business meeting asked that a minute from the entire Yearly Meeting be made and sent to EFI-NA, and a letter be sent to Phil expressing appreciation for his work throughout NWYM.

Minute from NWYM, 1999: The Northwest Yearly Meeting appreciates the work of Phil Baisley as the EFI-NA Christian Education Consultant. We thank him for his work among our churches. We wish him well in his teaching at Earlham.

The Department of General Education continues to provide scholarships for the Quaker students attending George Fox University. Also nine seminary students are being supported with 50% of their tuition costs. The seminarians are asked to pay back these loans with service within five years of the completion of their education.

Irene Rice was the overseer of Children's Yearly Meeting this year. She was a leadership student sponsored by the Board of Evangelism. The following report about Children's Yearly Meeting was sent to the business session from Irene, and read by Cathy Knox:

Knowing Christ is the most precious experience of my life. As I planned the children's sessions for Yearly Meeting, I prayed that through the programming children would meet Christ—that they would recognize Christ as the present teacher and discover more of His wondrous qualities and promises.

One of the main reasons for providing childcare is so adults can more easily attend the Yearly Meeting sessions. Yet my motivation is different. I believe children experience Christ, hear His voice and grow in the wonder of knowing Him as do adults. Children need to be encouraged, taught and validated in their walk with God as well. I desire that the time we spend together would provide a setting for them to share, learn, and grow in recognition of God's active work in their lives and knowledge of His will.

We began this week by getting acquainted and making friends from all over Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and as far away as Illinois.

Each day approximately 65 grade schoolers gathered at 8 a.m. to head to Tilikum where we were "Discovering Wonderwood." Along with swimming, hiking and rafting, we are learning about God's love for us displayed through creation, His Word, and the precious sacrifice of Jesus Christ. During our evening sessions we learn about God's promises to us: the promise of His love, the promise He will never leave us, the promise He will make us clean, and the promise of joy and life in Him.

Our infants, toddlers, and preschoolers are being cared for by the ladies of the Open Bible Church who use the money they make for missionary projects. There are 18 infants and 43 preschoolers. The preschool theme this year is "I am God's special child." They are learning about God as Creator, Father, and Friend.

Marcie Eastwood, Kim Boyd and Michael Hampton led singing for evening session. We have been truly blessed with nine adults who have volunteered to help with the grade school evening program. God has equipped them as leaders, teachers, and friends to the children.

It has been difficult finding volunteers. The majority of high school youth are involved in Youth Yearly Meeting. This is fantastic but makes finding help challenging. I encourage those who help to view this as a special ministry. Here we have an opportunity to influence the next generation of leaders and disciples. As a child, those who took time to care and participate in my life were the ones I wanted to model my life after. I was blessed with many Christians who took time to pour into my life and would like to aid others in finding the joy of sharing with young Christians.

I have been greatly blessed to participate in Yearly Meeting as the children's coordinator and welcome any observations or suggestions that would benefit this special ministry.

■ 62. The 1999 NWYM Epistle was read by Mark Ankeny and approved as follows:

Dear Friends Everywhere:

The Friends of Northwest Yearly Meeting greet you in the name of Jesus. We met for our 107th annual gathering on the campus of George Fox University in Newberg, Oregon, USA. Johan Maurer, General Secretary of Friends United Meeting and editor of Quaker Life, spoke to us in evening worship sessions on the theme of "Keeping the Faith: Communicating the Friends Message in a New Millennium." His messages called us to repentance, healing, balance between inspiration and accountability, and a vision of radical hospitality to newcomers to faith combined with radical intimacy with Jesus Christ. Northwest Friends received his message warmly.

Youth Yearly Meeting addressed the theme of "Keeping the Faith" among the high schoolers and "End Times" among the junior high schoolers. One hundred fifty young people attended, sharing with adults in worship and workshops.

Northwest Yearly Meeting recorded six persons as ministers of the Gospel: Eric Anglin, Harold Behr, Irv Brendlinger, Ken Redford, Carole Spencer, and Lorraine Watson. We thank God for their gifts in ministry to Friends.

Yearly Meeting workshops included sessions on church planting and evangelism, missions, divorce recovery for children, dealing with the hidden addiction of pornography, family life, right sharing of world resources, clerking, and the Queries.

In business sessions, Friends approved a first reading of the Faith and Practice that modifies our procedures for doing business as a Yearly Meeting. We also heartily approved a letter from the Board of Peace and Social Concerns urging President Clinton to support the "International Decade for a Culture of Peace and Non-Violence for the Children of the World." Our Thanksgiving offerings for the next two years will go to Laura's House of Peace, a shelter to protect victims of family violence and to Friends in Burundi who are working for peace there. Plans were approved to seek new mission fields in which to take the Gospel of Christ, to develop new leaders among our Yearly Meeting, and to plant new fellowships and churches throughout the northwest.

May God's peace rule in the hearts of Friends everywhere.

■ 63. Louise Sargent, member of the Faith and Practice Revision Committee, read a proposed revision of the Faith and Practice section on the Commission on Media which would have the effect of changing the commission's name to "Communications Commission," recognize the arrival of new forms of media, and recognize changing realities with Barclay Press:

Purposes and Functions:

The Communications Commission facilitates communication both within the Yearly Meeting and as an outreach. Nine persons appointed by the Yearly Meeting upon nomination by the Representatives serve on the Commission, the terms of one-third expiring each year. Also serving, by virtue of their offices, are the Yearly Meeting archivist and the manager of Barclay Press.

The Commission is responsible to:

1. Develop and maintain a set of resources to aid other boards and commissions in using various media to promote Yearly Meeting programs, ministries, and events.
2. Facilitate, develop, and update all forms of communication delegated to it by Yearly Meeting organizations and at its own initiative, including, but not limited to, printed materials, videos, and the Internet. To this end it is authorized to build and administer a capital fund.
3. Cooperate with other yearly meetings in Evangelical Friends International-North America. For this purpose it appoints two of its number to the EFI-NA Communications Commission.

This was approved as first reading.

■ 64. Louise Sargent read a proposed revision of the Faith and Practice section on "What Friends Believe" offered by the Council of Elders:

1. What Friends Believe: Faith Expressed through Witness (p. 6, 1998 version):
 12. Christian Witness to Peace. We believe the precepts of Christ our Lord and the whole spirit of His Gospel call us to live at peace with all people. Therefore we consider war and violence incompatible with the holiness we profess. We ask our leaders to choose nonviolent alternatives for sustaining economic and civil order. We respect government as an instrument of God to restrain evil and promote justice, and we submit to it in matters that do not interfere with obedience to Christ our Lord. **When conflicts arise among persons, we will resolve them in a spirit of humility, with love for those who oppose us, and in accordance with biblical methods of peacemaking. (See Matthew 18 and George Fox's "Gospel Order.")**

This was approved for first reading.

2. Duties and Privileges of Pastors. Pastoral Relationship with a Church (p. 49, 1998 version):

The church formulates a written understanding with the pastor regarding length of service, whether it is one year, a specified term of years, or an indefinite time. This arrangement may be renewed at the discretion of the church, with notice given not less than three months prior to the close of the pastoral year. When a pastor or church discerns that this particular pastoral service has been fulfilled or that the ministerial service is no longer required, the relationship can be terminated by either party. Written notice should be given at least three months in advance. When possible, termination should coincide with the close of the pastoral year. When the church initiates termination procedure, the pastor may request, and is entitled to, a hearing before the elders or before the church in business session. **Any conflicts arising between a pastor and a church should be submitted to resolution by biblical methods. (See "Christian Witness to Peace" in the section "What Friends Believe," and Query 6 in this Faith and Practice.)**

This was approved for first reading.

■ 65. Louise Sargent read a proposed addition to the Faith and Practice revision that was approved Tuesday for first reading concerning the position of the Clerk of Representatives (see minute # 25):

[56; 32] Executive Council of the Yearly Meeting

The Executive Council is composed of the Yearly Meeting clerk and assistant clerk; the general superintendent, associate superintendent, youth superintendent, and treasurer of the Yearly Meeting; ~~[the clerk of Representatives]~~ **the delegate from the Council of Representatives**, the clerk of the Council of Elders, and the clerk of the Trustees; one person chosen by each of the yearly Meeting boards and commissions, one by each of the Areas, and not more than three additional persons designated by the Yearly Meeting.

[59; 34] Duties.

1. Submit to the Yearly Meeting annual nominations for the following offices: the presiding clerk, assistant presiding clerk, recording clerk, assistant recording clerk, and announcing clerk of the Yearly Meeting; ~~[and the clerk and recording clerk of the Council of Representatives]~~ **and a delegate from the Council of Representatives to the Executive Council.**

This was approved to be added to the first reading.

■ 66. Louise Sargent brought a draft document for discussion this year in the local churches. It concerns committee structure in the local church. Its purpose is to give flexibility to the smaller churches. It was mentioned that extension churches have specific instructions from the Board of Evangelism in this area.

Committees of the Local Church (p. 22, 1998 version)

Committees are appointed by the church to oversee departmental interests and activities. These committees ~~[are]~~ may include Elders, Education, Missions, Peace and Social Concerns, Nominating, ~~[and]~~ Fine Arts and Administrative committees ~~[are optional]~~. Every church will appoint Elders, Nominating, and Stewardship Committees. **Churches may, if local circumstances require it, adopt a different committee structure for Education, Missions, and Peace and Social Concerns, so long as the concerns ordinarily assigned to those committees are adequately addressed.** Fine Arts and Administrative committees are optional. Except as otherwise provided, each committee organizes itself by appointing a presiding clerk, an assistant clerk, and a recording clerk (or secretary). Other officers and committees may be appointed as needed. Clerks of committees should determine that the various areas of interest and concern are responsibly represented.

ANNUAL REPORTS

July 1999

Council of Elders

During the 1998-99 church year the Council of Elders continued in a pastor-counselor relationship to the Yearly Meeting. We have met and prayed with many of our pastors and have continued to support our clerks and superintendents with advice and prayer. We have spent considerable time reviewing the state of the church reports from local church elders, and are pleased to report that several of our churches are experiencing revival and that most are quite optimistic about the immediate future.

A major portion of our work continues to be helping in conflict resolution, community restoration, and in helping churches work through the very difficult problems that arise out of moral failure of pastoral leadership. Since these are difficult problems we are often not as successful as we would like. We continue to believe that God is able, in even very difficult situations, to work things together for good. The Council continues to be concerned about these problems in our pastoral leadership. Our usual response has been to get involved after the fact. In an effort to be proactive we are working with the Commission on Family Life and the Board of Ministerial Service to develop some pastoral training and expectation regarding these issues.

The Council continues to be concerned about the long-term supply of pastors for our churches. Relatively few of our people are feeling a call to pastoral leadership. It is crucial that we constantly challenge our people to seek and understand God's call for their lives. It is also important that local churches recognize that fulltime service requires a living wage. The Elders encourage our churches to be liberal in setting the salary for their pastors. Although we continue to have relationship problems within our churches we believe that our concentrated efforts over the previous years to increase peacemaking skills among our people is being helpful and we hope to see larger dividends in the future. We remain persuaded that Christ is the answer not only to our personal problems but also to Yearly Meeting concerns and pray that we shall be faithful to His leadership.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

Northwest Yearly Meeting seminary scholarships, George Fox University scholarships for Quaker students, and support for Quaker primary/secondary schools have continued to be the roles of the Department of General Education.

The Department supported nine seminary students preparing for pastoral roles within the Yearly Meeting. The students are attending five seminary/graduate programs that offer programs compatible with their spiritual gifts and call. The current support is 50% of the tuition costs.

The Board of Education met in September at the McKenzie River Conference Center (near Eugene, OR) during the annual Board of Education fall retreat.

Midyear Board meetings were held in Newberg on January 30, 1999. A review of the Yearly Meeting workshops sponsored by our department was completed. The current status of our seminary students was reviewed. The Quaker collection and bibliography were discussed. Budget considerations for these books were reviewed. Appreciation for Lois Tish's work with this effort was expressed, and recognition at the 1999 Yearly Meeting sessions is planned.

The Department of Christian Testimonies continues to meet with this Department until it can gain the support needed to maintain its objectives.

The GFU/Church/NWYM partnership continues to provide scholarships for NWYM youth attending GFU. The University will match (up to \$600) any church contribution and the Yearly Meeting contribution is \$200.

DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH

The Department of Youth met on two occasions for business, worship, and enlightenment. The Search Committee met on several occasions to read applications, interview applicants, and prayerfully select a new youth superintendent and youth program coordinator.

The department met on September 25-27, 1998 with the Board of Education at McKenzie Conference Center in conjunction with our annual Youthworkers Training Conference. Steve Fawver brought knowledge from the Adolescent Spirituality Project that he's been involved with, and led in experiential worship. The Youth Department met for business along with the Education Board on the evening of the 26th. We discussed in detail the Child Abuse Protection Policy and requested several changes. The Search Committee updated the youthworkers on the development of the search.

The Search Committee recommended to the Executive Council that Paul Bock be given a call to serve as youth superintendent. The Executive Council approved this decision and Paul began his position on July 1, 1999. Leslie Hodgdon withdrew her name from the search as she and her husband learned they were expecting a baby and decided that she become a fulltime mom. The Search Committee then approved Sheila Hoyer as the new youth program coordinator. She begins her position August 1, 1999. There is overlap between Paul and Bruce so adequate training may be completed. Missy Bullock has agreed to stay as the intern until November 15 to give adequate overlap to train Sheila. Tiffany Hays is serving as the intern for the months of June and July.

The Youth Department met for business on June 4-5 at Melody Mountain. Reports were given on Beach Bash, Youth Challenge (YC) teams, Midwinter, and Quaker Leadership Program (QLP).

The Friends Youth Exec brought the idea of a prayer network between youth groups and it was approved that they ask churches for groups that would like to be involved and if they had a preference for who they would like to be matched with. The idea is that we could have "sister" youth groups that meet together occasionally.

In working on the Youth Department budget, we approved to add \$150 to create a new line item to cover background checks in accordance with the new Child Abuse Protection Policy. We also agreed to split out funds for the Youth Department Spring Retreat from the Area Focus Retreat line item. It was agreed that we would like to have the retreat be cost free, but are unable to do so because of budget limitations. We approved to have \$900 in the Youth Department line item to cover half of the retreat cost and leave \$300 in the area focus line item. We moved \$450 from the Young Adult Friends (YAF) line item to help with the Youth Department line item.

We approved that this coming year's area focus would be that Paul and Sheila visit each area once for a retreat, meal, or evening gathering with the youthworkers in that area. It was also approved that the members of the Youth Department would help facilitate these events.

The Youth Department approved the Child Abuse Protection Policy and agreed that we would start implementing the policy this summer for Yearly Meeting.

FRIENDS YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Youth Calendar, filled with dates of events, pictures and fun facts, was mailed out to over one thousand Quaker youth and youthworkers on November 30, 1998.

Midwinter was held December 27-December 31 at Twin Lakes Friends Camp. Fifty-three youth attended, and the event was staffed by 15 people. Eric Muhr, youth pastor at Meridian, was the main speaker. The campers also enjoyed a slushy snow day on Mt. Schweitzer. Friends Youth Exec is currently considering how to address the Y2K issue next December; one possibility is a shorter camp, sending the kids home on December 30.

YCEW (Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview) made plans to go to Inner City, Los Angeles, CA this year, but was cancelled due to lack of leaders. Some amount of planning has already gone into next year's trip to Bolivia and Peru. FYE (Friends Youth Exec) has also mulled over the idea of sending a team to the East Coast. Both plans are currently still in process.

YCCM (Youth Challenged through Children's Ministries) was led by Erik Edmundson (Silverton) and Julie Kingery (Newberg) this year. The team provided VBS support at Post Falls (Idaho) Friends Church and Olympic View (Tacoma, Washington) Friends Church, and Friends Church of the Valley (Cave Junction, Oregon) this summer and ended the trip as a team at Yearly Meeting sessions in Newberg. Team members include: Michael Chapman (Newberg), Janelle Goeres (Medford), Esther Powers (Walla Walla), Heather España (Newberg), Cassie Smith (North Valley), Holly Dobbeck (North Valley), Leslie Harkema (North Valley), and Dava Zeiger (McKinley Hill).

YCAM (Youth Challenged through Arts in Ministry) was led by Kasey Lawsen (Newberg) and Jennye Williams (Newberg) this year. The team traveled to churches throughout the Yearly Meeting and will end with a performance on youth night on Tuesday of Yearly Meeting sessions. The team is comprised of Hannah Penna (McKinley Hill), Bethany Sargent (East Hill), Sheldon Lesire (Silverton), Laurie Wing (Eugene), Chad Parker (Eugene), Anna Crecelius (Post Falls), and Evan Emerson (Hayden Lake).

Due to a lack of both student applicants and leaders for Youth Challenge (YC) trips, FYE has decided to switch to a rotation basis for the program. Only two teams will go each year, allowing one year in every three that a particular program will not be in action. In 2000, we will send YCEW and YCCM, in 2001 YCAM and YCEW, then YCCM and YCAM in 2002. This will allow time to cultivate interest in the program and will require only four leaders per year instead of six.

The annual Volleyball Tournament was held at George Fox University April 17-18, 1999. The tournament was attended by over 40 teams and was a smashing success. Spokane Friends won the Friends Division A; Reedwood won Friends Division B;

Newberg won the Quaker Division; and Metolius won the overall Sportsmanship Award. Plans are to hold the tournament April 14-15 next year.

Friends Youth Exec felt a specific call to deal with the concern of prayer support for the youth of NWYM. Several ideas have been considered, but one seemed to spark particular interest among the group. The idea was presented to begin a prayer network among the youth groups of the Yearly Meeting, asking them to be responsible to pray for one another. This could be done in several formats; a computer list service, a weekly pray-for-this-youth-group plan tied to the calendar, or a voluntary youth group partnership program. The partnership program seems a very feasible and possibly very effective program. The possibility of matching up interested groups in order to establish bonds of community and especially prayer has been well received by the youthworkers with whom FYE has been in communication. This plan is still in process and FYE hopes to see it in place by next school year.

This year's Friends Youth Exec was Joe Thouvenal and Chrissy Muhr (clerks), Adrienne Gerick (recording clerk), Joyce White (YCEW), Amy Chapman (Midwinter), Kevin Frazier (Volleyball), Tami Burton and Stacy Brown (YCCM), Ben Macy and Elaine James (YCAM), and Wendee Selby, Dan White, and Glen Geurin (members-at-large). They meet weekly during the school year on the campus of GFU. Bruce Bishop served as their advisor.

Board of Evangelism

This has been a busy year of transitions. Each change is exciting because of the doors of possibilities that open with each decision. I am grateful for a board that prays for our Yearly Meeting and is committed to seeing the Gospel shared around the Northwest. The challenge is to know that the message never changes and cannot be compromised, while understanding that the mode of delivery is as changing as the surrounding culture in which we strive to continually preach "there is One who can speak to your condition, even Christ Jesus."

Two changes that will have the most long-term impact on the work of the board and even the Yearly Meeting was the hiring of two people to work full-time for the board. Harold Behr was chosen to fill the position of "Director of New Works Development." Harold will be visiting churches and individuals to help them develop and implement the vision that God is calling them to fulfill. Harold began working full-time for the board January 1, 1999. Already there are several new ministries on the planning boards of local churches and individuals. Harold's energy and zeal for the things of God will be of great benefit to the Yearly Meeting as a whole. Bruce Bishop is the second person the board has hired to be a "Field Secretary of Leadership Development." He will begin working in this capacity July 1, 1999. This will be a natural transition for Bruce to continue working with young adults and others within the Yearly Meeting to respond to God's call on their life to take on positions of leadership within our churches and use their gifts for God's glory. Some of his time will be spent in helping existing leaders hone their skills and gifts and the rest will be spent helping churches and individuals with discerning who and how God might call someone into various ministry positions. Working together, these two men will have opportunity to influence many people in their walk with God. We are excited to have them on board.

Another transition was the closing of Nampa and ParkCenter Friends churches in Idaho. We want to extend a heartfelt thank you to Earl Tycksen and Ron Whittaker

for their ministry in these two bodies. After many years of struggle it was determined to lay down the existing works and look forward to re-opening both in the near future. We are even now speaking with and looking for leadership to come and do a "new thing" in both cities. Please pray with us for the harvest-workers for these two cities. The church property at Piedmont was sold this year and the proceeds were given to the Pension Board to help with needs that they had. The Board of Peace and Social Concerns continues to have a presence in the community through ministry based in the house that still belongs to the Yearly Meeting. At Midyear Board meetings in January of this year we met with representatives from McKinley Hill to discuss becoming an extension church. This was approved and we are looking forward to a good relationship with McKinley Hill and returning them as quickly as possible to a local church status. Please pray for leadership and wisdom for McKinley Hill as we work together to see what God will do through them this year.

On the other side of changes was the opening of Four Summits in Vancouver, WA with Rich and Nadine Miller. After much prayer, building of a core group, and setting the stage, Four Summits opened on September 20, 1998. They have seen a number of conversions and re-commitments to Christ since their opening. They have a committed group of people who work well together. A little later in the spring of this year on April 4, 1999 City's Edge under the leadership of Dan and Beth Banham and Trey and Stephanie Doty held celebration services. They are meeting in Beaverton and have a solid group of people involved who are excited about ministry and the chance to impact Beaverton. Please continue to pray for these two works.

There are several exciting new things waiting to happen perhaps as early as this summer. We are meeting with several possible candidates for a new ministry in the Rosemere area of Vancouver. It will be based on meeting physical needs of people in the area with meetings for worship on Friday evenings. Another possible outreach will be to the Grants Pass area. Please pray for wisdom and discernment for the board as they meet with potential candidates about these new works.

This last year was the beginning of a new program on the campus of George Fox University called the "Quaker Leaders Program." This is a two-year program that comes with a scholarship to qualifying applicants. This program is designed to give exposure to developing leadership within our college-age people through hands-on experience, forums, and special speakers. Seventeen people participated this past year and an equal number are expected this coming year. We are grateful to the Friends Church Extension Foundation for underwriting this program and to Bruce Bishop for working closely in the development and implementation of this program.

Another exciting aspect of hiring Harold Behr was the first semi-annual "New Works Interchange." This Interchange was held for anyone with passion for reaching people. The Interchange was held at Twin Rocks the end of May. The event was well attended by pastors, new church planters, and several new candidates interested in serving the Yearly Meeting in ministry. Some of the results from this meeting can be seen in the atrium of the Science Building daily during Yearly Meeting and in the workshops on millennial evangelism being conducted by Harold and Wendy Behr. Another workshop we invite you to be a part of is the Clerking Forum workshop by Bruce Bishop.

Board of Ministerial Service

At these 1999 Yearly Meeting Sessions the Board of Ministerial Service is happy to be recommending six candidates for recording as Friends ministers in Northwest Yearly Meeting:

Eric Anglin, bi-vocational pastor at Scotts Mills (OR) and a graduate of George Fox, has come to Friends from a background of twenty years of pastoral service in the Free Methodist Church. Eric lives in Woodburn with his wife, Marilee, and their four children — Lorinda, a sophomore at University of Portland; Joy, a sophomore at Whitman College; Eric Jr. and Cameron.

Harold Behr, director of new church development for NWYM, has most recently planted churches in Cave Junction and Cottage Grove. He and his wife, Wendy, were strongly drawn to the Friends Church through the study of Quaker writings — specifically an emphasis on Christ as our Inward Teacher. Prior to that, they had been active in the Jesus Movement and had worked with various cell groups which later grew into large contemporary churches. Harold and Wendy have one daughter and three sons.

Irv Brendlinger, professor of church history and theology at George Fox University, has been active on the pastoral team and with the Center for Christian Studies at Reedwood for the past ten years. Board of Missions

During the past year, the Board of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting has prayerfully sought "a new thing" in obedience to the Great Commission. We ask the Yearly Meeting to join us in that search. Is there a major new challenge we should undertake as a Yearly Meeting, now that we see a greater level of maturity within the Peruvian and Bolivian national churches?

In response to that question, we have called Duane Comfort as missions administrator to help us search and prepare for that "new thing." We have also commissioned him to encourage a greater awareness of the work of Evangelical Friends Mission within Northwest Yearly Meeting and to facilitate and encourage more effectively the work of our mission staffs in Bolivia, Peru and Ramallah, Palestine. As a part of that call, Duane and Sherrill visited the Bolivian and Peruvian fields in June of this year. The board greatly appreciates Duane's willing spirit and excellent work.

First a look at Ramallah, Palestine. Carleta Baker completed a second year of teaching at the Ramallah Friends School and has returned to the United States to consider what the Lord's next direction is for her. Allyn and Holly Dhynes will return to Ramallah for a third year to teach, minister to children, and work toward a Christ-centered Friends worship group in Ramallah. Their appointment is through Friends United Meeting. As tentmaking missionaries, they are primarily self-supporting through the school, but partial support comes from Northwest Yearly Meeting.

The purpose of Northwest Yearly Meeting staff in Bolivia and Peru can best be summarized by the two "E"s of Education and Encouragement. On the education front, we note the new seminary in Peru moves ahead, and a new "Friends Center" in La Paz hopes to follow the successful Santa Cruz Friends Center model associated with the Bolivian Evangelical University and directed by Diego Chuyma. On both fields, mission staff works in a support role to encourage evangelism and church planting, church administration, and social action. A work team and a medical team from the Northwest contributed significantly to that encouragement in the past year.

The board has also pursued its "new thing" by commissioning Hal and Nancy Thomas to a ministry of missions education at the Bolivian Evangelical University in Santa Cruz. They arrived on the field in January and have begun what they feel to be an arduous but significant ministry. Classes will begin in the fall for the new Masters in Missions academic program, designed to prepare Latin American missionaries for other cultures and nations. Our Peruvian staff has also pursued "new things" with conversations and explorations into new areas. These explorations will continue.

The board is committed to reduce missionary staff in Bolivia and Peru. This reduction will not be rapid, but our intention is to restructure job assignments for remaining personnel to a more itinerate ministry of education and encouragement, allowing for some Northwest Yearly Meeting resources to be focused elsewhere. We commend to Friends the work of Evangelical Friends Mission in its many ministries around the world: Nepal, India, Mexico, Rwanda, Jordan, Rough Rock, Philippines, Hispanic Ministries, Muslim Ministries and elsewhere. We also sense the Lord is calling us as a Yearly Meeting to unite behind some kind of new commitment soon.

The Bolivian and Peruvian field reports are summarized below. As they are read, look for points of change and maturation within the national churches. Also remember that while the board intends to reduce staff further, it will maintain some level of contact indefinitely with the Bolivian and Peruvian national churches.

BOLIVIAN FRIENDS MISSION

Introduction: The Bolivian Friends Mission is in its 68th year of making disciples and teaching God's Word among the Bolivian people. Northwest Yearly Meeting (NWYM) has been faithful in sending missionaries to Bolivia, praying for them, financially supporting them, encouraging them, and ministering to their spiritual formation. Down through the years the missionaries have gone forth to produce abundant fruit that remains. *That fruit remains in the Bolivian Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.* First, second, third and fourth generations of Friends with a firm commitment to God and a vision for their church are leading it into the future under God's direction and power.

The Bolivian Yearly Meeting of Friends is led by people full of faith, the Holy Spirit and wisdom. They exercise their gifts and talents in serving God unselfishly. They willingly learn by their mistakes. They strive to do their work with excellence. They realize that God has confidence in them as His beloved servants. As in any denomination, they have to work their way through spiritual battles that threaten the purity of biblical doctrine it believes in and practices. Pastors and leaders who are committed, obey God's Word and abide in Jesus, meet these challenges unflinchingly and with full confidence in God's power and guidance. Yes, there are pastors and leaders who do not meet the above qualities. They are cause for heartache for the disunity they stir up; but through much prayer, love and encouragement they, too, can become healthy fruit-bearers.

It's a good experience working with the Bolivian Yearly Meeting of Friends. With it's ever-increasing maturity we, as a mission staff, have a role as participants in their vision, plans, strategy and goals. They take the lead. They are very appreciative of the missionaries' ministries among them. They are very appreciative of NWYM's commitment to missions in Bolivia. The relationship between the mission staff and the people of the Bolivian Yearly Meeting is excellent.

Personnel

NWYM Missionary Staff

Edwin and Marie Cammack live in Santa Cruz, Bolivia. Their missionary service in Bolivia began in 1989. They have lived and worked in the cities of Caranavi, La Paz and Santa Cruz. In the city of Santa Cruz, the Cammacks minister in the La Florida, Nueva Esperanza, Salmon, and Missionary Friends churches. Outside the city, they minister to the El Torno, Cruce, and Nucleo 23 Friends churches in the San Julian area. They also minister to the Friends church in the city of Sucre. Their primary ministries are teaching, preaching, counseling, encouraging, and friendship. Their primary goal is to help people form spiritual lives that are committed to God, obey God, abide in Jesus and walk in His footsteps. These qualities not only build a firm Christian life but also a strong base for growing churches.

The highlight for Marie during the year has been discipleship and quilting classes among the women at the La Florida and Nueva Esperanza Friends churches. God has used these classes to form good community among the women and lead them in their spiritual walk with Jesus. It has been a discipleship-making ministry.

With the Clarkson family in NWYM on furlough year this year, one or both of the Cammacks traveled to La Paz nearly every month to maintain good communication with the Friends leaders and to tend to mission business.

The Cammacks spent the month of February in Puno and Ilave, Peru. Ed taught in IBEC. Marie helped Dan a lot with correcting tests, etc. It was a good month of ministry.

Harold and Nancy Thomas have been seconded by the Mission to the Bolivian Evangelical University (BEU) to found and co-direct a graduate program in missiology. They arrived in Santa Cruz on January 22. A good part of their first few months involved finding a place to live and setting up housekeeping.

The Thomases dedicated January to July to planning, and hope to actually begin offering the first classes in August. The planning process included working with a team of leaders at the university to build community, get to know the university culture, identify needs, understand the prospective students, define the vision and goals, plan curriculum and procedures, and contact potential faculty members. Simultaneously, they worked with a Christian foundation, Overseas Council, in writing a grant proposal for startup funds.

Part of the planning has involved visits to other missionary training centers in Bolivia, as well as programs in Guatemala, Costa Rica, and Colombia. The Thomases interviewed trainers in 14 other centers. This proved very helpful, both in terms of ideas for the BEU program and in networking for sharing resources. It's becoming clearer all the time how necessary cooperation is in meeting the need to prepare the missionaries God is raising up in the continent. There are very few programs at the masters level (Thomases visited one other in Costa Rica). Most are at the level of initial training for missionary candidates. The BEU program will complement these introductory training centers. It will focus on the training of missiologists, both candidates and missionaries, with experience who want to have a more profound understanding of the mission task, as well as pastors, administrators, and mission support people who will promote missions on the homefront. We anticipate that the program will serve the whole southern cone of Latin America.

National Missionaries

Ed Cammack taught an intensive class on "spiritual leadership" on three different occasions to the national missionaries. In order to observe the national missionaries' ministries, he traveled with Victor Quispe, Friends mission secretary, to the Cotapata district where Sixto Mamani is a national missionary and to the Alto Beni where Denicio Lucasi is a national missionary. When Ed visited Sucre Friends, Emilio Vilca, the national missionary was in La Paz. When the Cammacks were in Cochabamba for an ICTEE meeting they were not successful in making contact with Antonio Mamani, the national missionary living in Cochabamba. These men are having a fruitful ministry. Their hearts are in their ministries. They are very much appreciated by the people with whom they work.

Theological Education

Ed enjoyed working with Friends Center Director Diego Chuyma, and board. Friends Center is having a fruitful ministry. The classes it offers have definitely contributed to the spiritual growth and leadership skills of the students. The students are ministering in the Santa Cruz and San Julian churches. The students are from Santa

Cruz, La Paz and Peru. This year an official document was signed between the Bolivian Evangelical University and Friends Center recognizing Friends Center as a part of BEU.

Theological Education by Extension in the La Paz region has done well the last year. There were 13 graduates in January. They are serving as pastors, teachers and leaders among the Friends churches. Salustio Aspi is the director. He has a heart and burden for theological education.

There are currently nine Friends students in the San Pablo Evangelical Seminary.

Presently the La Paz Regional Executive Council is putting together a theological training program that they feel will meet their needs for pastors, teachers, and leaders. They are aiming at the high school graduates in particular in the city and country. Their purpose is to help the students learn how to live out biblical teachings in everyday life and relate them to others. Nicolas Condori, secretary of education, also a good public school educator, and Salustio Aspi are taking the lead in this effort. Diego Chuyma is promoting the idea of establishing Friends Center in La Paz. Nicolas favors the idea and urges others to cooperate. Diego will continue to talk to Nicolas and others.

The Nueva Jerusalem Church at Max Parades has formed their own Theological Training Center. This first semester there are 40 students registered. Jesus Torres is the director. Students are from the church itself and from other Friends churches in the city. The professors have BA and doctorate degrees. The church has the blessing of the Regional Executive Council. There's a sense of pride in their ownership of this program.

CONCLUSION

Jim Reapsome, editor-at-large for Evangelical Missions Quarterly and World Pulse, in the April 1999 issue of EMQ states the mission of the church so well. "The Apostle Paul turned things over to local managers right away. He and his team devoted themselves to training and to what might be called a biblical pyramid scheme: 'Teach these truths to trustworthy people who are able to pass them on to others' (II Timothy 2:2)." Reapsome continues:

"We find it hard to do the same. We have become severely addicted to the opposite principle: Foreigners know best and can run things better. Therefore, expatriate missionaries are as hard to dislodge as a glob of bubble gum from your shoe.

"Our incentive is to prepare a people fit for the Lord. The local church will grow, and the believers will find the resources they need in Jesus Christ, when we acknowledge and practice that the church is theirs, not ours."

Reapsome states what has basically become the policy of Northwest Friends Mission in Bolivia, to gradually continue to reduce missionary presence there: "The best way to arrive at parity is attrition (do not replace people leaving old fields) and by making sure that when we enter new fields we resist our strong inclination to control. Instead, from the start we must yield control to local managers, invest in them, and train them."

NWYM Mission's primary goal is stated well in what Jim Reapsome has to say: 1) Prepare people fit for the Lord. 2) Invest in them and train them. 3) Yield control to local managers. Bolivian Friends Mission yielded control to local managers years ago. They are running well.

A prayer for the Bolivian Yearly Meeting of Friends is that of Paul to the Ephesians. It speaks to their core need of an ever-continuing spiritual formation and discipline.

"I pray that out of His glorious riches He may strengthen you with power through His Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the saints, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God" Ephesians 3:16-19.

PERU FRIENDS MISSION

Introduction: It is a privilege to report to Northwest Yearly Meeting (NWYM) what God has been doing through its missionary staff in the country of Peru during this past church year. We will not be reporting on the ministry being done by Peru Yearly Meeting (PYM) apart from areas where we work in partnership. Since PYM is now recognized worldwide as an autonomous yearly meeting, we think that if there is interest in that information, a report should be requested from them.

We know that many of you pray and give faithfully for the work in Peru. As you read this report, our prayer is that you will find much cause for rejoicing. We also trust that any concerns mentioned here would become prayer requests for the weeks and months to come.

Personnel:

A. Northwest Yearly Meeting Staff:

1. **Dan, Tami, Forrest (11), Rebekah (9), and William (5) Cammack:** The Cammack family will soon complete their twelfth year as missionaries to Peru under NWYM. This was their third year of living in the city of Puno.

As a family, the Cammacks have visited churches on the Altiplano and the Coast and participated in special events in both places. Dan taught classes in the residential Bible school programs (IBEC) and both Dan and Tami served as advisors to some of the students in their ministry assignments and provided premarital counseling. Dan has been assisting the directors of both IBEC and the extension Bible school program (IBLA) as well as working with them and the PYM's Secretary of Education to develop plans for seminary-level training. Dan's responsibilities also include teacher training, ordering and transferring literature and Bible school materials from Bolivia to Peru, as well as seeing to their distribution within Peru, and handling the Mission's commitments in regard to the Arequipa Center. Tami is responsible for homeschooling the children and providing hospitality for guests. The Cammack family returned to the states for a year of furlough in late June 1999.

2. **Ken, Tonya, and Katie (5) Comfort:** The Comfort family is also completing their twelfth year as missionaries to Peru under NWYM. They were in the states for furlough December 1997 through September 1998, returning to live in the city of Puno in October. Early in the month of September Ken returned to Peru for two weeks with a medical team that provided a week-long clinic in the town of Juli.

While in Peru, Ken is responsible for evangelism and church expansion, encouragement of Peru national missionaries, and serves as the Mission representative to PYM's Executive Council and as an advisor to the National Youth Organization (UJELAP). Other responsibilities include church visitation, counseling, training and encouragement of national church leaders and pastors, and teaching in IBEC.

For the Mission he is legal representative for Peru and chairman of the Joint Council of Bolivia and Peru. Tonya is treasurer for the Peru Council, cares for official correspondence, and hosts visitors. She also teaches Katie at home. Comforts serve as the Mission's main contact for the medical team ministry in cooperation with David Christopher of Folkways Travel; the artesanía project promoted by Celia Mueller and NWYM's Board of Peace and Social Concerns; and the ALPACA project sponsored by World Concern/Christian Veterinary Mission and administered on site by Dr. Janice Fuquay. They also are the main contact for other visiting teams from NWYM.

B. National Missionaries

1. National Missionaries from Bolivia: Eleven years ago the first national missionaries from Bolivia came to work in Peru (although Bolivian Friends played a missionary role when the work in Peru started 38 years ago). They came to help train leaders, strengthen local churches, and support church-planting efforts. Now with Peruvian leaders capable of fulfilling those ministries, there is a decreasing need for personnel from Bolivia. Bolivia national missionaries are under the direction of PYM's Executive Council.

a. Esteban, Gaby, and Jonatan (5) Ajnota: Arriving in Peru from Santa Cruz, Bolivia, in January 1997, the Ajnotas have been responsible for ministry in Arequipa, including the training of Friends leaders in that city. One successful church planting effort has been started in the past two years with another soon to begin. Esteban has also been helping PYM develop its plans for seminary-level training. He and Gaby both have taught in IBEC. The family plans to return to Bolivia in December 1999.

2. National Missionaries from Peru: In January of 1998 PYM's Group of Representatives approved the names of two mature pastors to serve as PYM's first national missionaries. In 1999 both men were reappointed for a second year of service. Peru national missionaries are under the direction of PYM's Executive Council.

a. Teodoro Alanguia: Teodoro comes from the Andes Quarterly Meeting on the Altiplano of Peru. During the last six months of 1998 he worked with the churches in the Andes and Esperanza quarterly meetings. During the first six months of 1999 he has been working with the Alto Andino Quarterly Meeting. He works mostly in training and encouragement of leaders and in discipleship of new believers.

b. Fernando Choque: Fernando comes from the city of Tacna, which is part of the Coast Quarterly Meeting. During the last six months of 1998 he worked with the churches in the Alto Andino Quarterly Meeting. During the first six months of 1999 he has been working with the churches in Tacna in the Coast Quarterly Meeting. He also works in training and encouragement of leaders and in discipleship of new believers.

Education:

A. Theological Education by Extension (TEE): Thirty years ago the Mission started a TEE program in Peru called "Instituto Biblico Los Amigos" (IBLA). This program was created to help develop adult leaders for the local churches. For more than a decade IBLA has been administered by what is now PYM. Even though IBLA is in the hands of PYM, the Mission continues to support the program in many ways. In addition to serving as advisors to the IBLA director and the IBLA

Committee, we also transport IBLA materials from LaPaz, Bolivia, to Peru and make those materials available to students at a very moderate cost. NWYM missionaries no longer teach in the program, but we offer encouragement to IBLA teachers by providing regular teacher training workshops and other incentives for active teachers, such as a program to help teachers develop a personal library of resource materials. The program now has 31 graduates. Most of these graduates are active in positions of leadership within PYM, including the two Peru national missionaries, Teodoro Alanguia and Fernando Choque. These two men are convinced of the value of IBLA and teach IBLA classes wherever they are assigned to help develop strong leaders.

B. Residential Program: The "Instituto Biblico Educacion Cristiana" (IBEC) program was founded ten years ago and currently operates in Ilave. The program targets young adults and helps prepare them for ministry. Most of the courses are offered during the summer months (January through March). This past summer there was a total of 37 students. NWYM missionaries and missionaries from Bolivia Yearly Meeting administrated this program for the first eight years. Constantino Garcia, an IBLA graduate with university studies, has been directing IBEC for the past two years.

Most of the teaching is still done by missionaries, but teachers from PYM are gradually being added as they advance in their own professional training and theological studies. Five missionaries taught this last summer (Esteban and Gaby Ajnota, Dan Cammack, Ed Cammack, and Ken Comfort) as well as three from PYM (Magdalena Benito, Constantino Garcia, and Elvira Ramos), one of whom was a teaching assistant (Magdalena Benito). Apart from teaching, Esteban Ajnota and Dan Cammack helped with administrative duties. Esteban oversaw the practical assignments that the students were required to carry out in the local churches. He also did counseling with students who sought help for personal problems. Dan lent his support in the area of academics. All of the IBEC teachers and administrators helped supervise and evaluate the practical assignments mentioned above. Almost every Sunday five student teams ministered in local churches. Each team's supervisor gave both verbal and written feedback so that each student could continue to improve in his or her ministry skills. This is a very important part of IBEC.

There are now 18 IBEC graduates. Almost all of the graduates are active in ministry among Friends in Bolivia and Peru. Three graduates are pursuing further studies in other countries. Marleny Mamani (Juli) is in her third year of theological studies at the Bolivian Evangelical University (BEU) in Santa Cruz, Bolivia. Ruth Guevara (Arequipa) is in her first year of theological studies at BEU. Daniel Calisaya (Juliaca) is about to finish the second year of his studies in communications and theology in a school sponsored by HCJB radio in Quito, Ecuador. Our hope and prayer is that they will return to Peru and help lead PYM forward in the areas of evangelism, discipleship, missions, theological education, etc.

C. Seminary Plans: PYM is in its third year of laying the groundwork for the creation of a seminary. A commission named by the Executive Council of PYM is in charge of this process. We missionaries meet with the commission as advisors. The commission plans to incorporate both IBLA and IBEC into the seminary. They hope to upgrade both programs and then add on other levels of study. Steps were taken this year to introduce new courses into the IBEC curriculum and to improve IBEC's academic standards. Steps were also taken to develop IBEC's administrative structure so that it is more in line with what the seminary will require.

Two key elements that will be important to the success of the seminary are a good library and infrastructure. Progress was made on the latter with the completion of the shell of the first floor of a building located on PYM's property in Ilave. About a third of the first floor was finished in time for IBEC's summer classes. We were able to use the library and the administrative offices. The classrooms and restrooms still need to be finished. Progress is being made on the library as well. Thanks to the Friends Women Missionary Fellowship of NWYM and other interested people, the library in Ilave now has nearly a thousand books, more than sixty videos, and some computer software. A high priority during the next few years will be adding additional resources to this library. The seminary now has two computer systems. These computers will be useful in all aspects of the seminary program. We hope to increase the number of computers in the next few years.

Church Growth: One new congregation was started during this church year. Chiluyo Grande is located in the Alto Andino Quarterly Meeting. The two Peruvian national missionaries, Fernando Choque and Teodoro Alanguia, have done extensive discipleship in this area. We've tried to encourage believers from the Alto Andino Quarterly Meeting to cross the border into Chile to investigate the possibility of expanding the church to Aymara people living in Chile. They have found that it is more difficult than originally thought. In order to avoid problems with border police, even people living in this area have to go to either Tacna or Puno to get permission to cross into Chile. We will need to do more investigation about the feasibility of such a project.

We have been talking with PYM leaders about the possibilities of working in partnership to expand the work into new areas. Even though there are a few pastors who plant new churches in their own general area, so far as a yearly meeting PYM's focus seems to be education. They do not have plans to send workers into new areas. There is strong interest among the youth to evangelize, but the young people don't have the time for follow-up or discipleship of new believers. We are realizing that PYM may not be as mission-minded as we thought, and we need to continue educating people on the importance of expanding beyond their current borders.

Objectives for the Coming Year:

1. Continue to encourage Peru national missionaries to look beyond established works and encourage church expansion on a local level.
2. Explore possibilities of starting new works in the cities of Puno and Juliaca and in other communities close to PYM yet outside of its current comfort zone.
3. Explore possibilities of church expansion in other more distant areas of Peru.
4. Continue with construction on the seminary building in Ilave.
5. Find ways to encourage the Jorge Fox Technical High Schools in Ilave and Juli.

Conclusion: In October 1999, NWYM Friends Mission will complete 38 years of ministry in southern Peru. That ministry began among the Aymara people living on the Altiplano and spread to the coastal cities of Tacna, Ilo, and Arequipa as believers migrated to new areas. In Arequipa and Juliaca the ministry began touching the lives of Quechua people as well. Today we stand at a point of decision: Should we concentrate our work in the areas where we currently have ministry? Or should we move forward into new areas seeking to expand the ministry of the Friends church in Peru? From the beginning we, as a mission organization, have committed ourselves to the task of raising up a strong, independent Friends church in Peru.

Sometimes that task seems attainable; other times it seems impossible. We covet your prayers for the leaders of Peru Yearly Meeting, for the Friends churches in Peru, for the Mission Board of NWYM, and for us and our families that together we will be faithful to complete the task that God has laid before us.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION

We have four missionary families home this summer. It gives us occasion to note what many are saying. God has given to EFM some wonderful missionaries. They are dedicated, spiritually mature and very good at what they do. It has taken some care and effort to arrange their itineraries this summer. We hope many are taking advantage of this opportunity to get better acquainted with the Fergusons, the Todd James family, the Adhikarys and the Hunerwadels.

God has given us a good team relationship in the office as well. We really miss Duane Comfort, who left to give leadership to the mission program for Northwest Yearly Meeting, but Vicki Hinshaw has stepped capably into the role of executive assistant and Maureen Cochran has quickly learned secretarial duties and does them well.

God blessed EFM with some special grants since we wrote to the yearly meetings last. Through my relationship with Venture Middle East (board member) we received \$20,000 for a food program in Africa. Friends in Southern California introduced us to Worldwide Christian Schools, which sponsored the "Pastor's Masters" golf tournament, the proceeds of which brought EFM \$18,000 for schools in Rwanda. They will play again this September to benefit the same project. The Mennonite Central Committee gave \$63,733 directly for Friends women in Rwanda to provide food aid for 750 families. The Barnabas Foundation in Australia gave us \$23,000 for school building in Rwanda and to help purchase a vehicle in Mexico, the second time they have made a major gift.

In addition the EFM donor list is growing, indicating that more and more Friends have chosen to include EFM in their missionary giving. Budget income for calendar year 1998 was up 7% and with special gifts income was \$1,129,253. I report this, not to say we don't need any more help, but to give glory to God for the way we have been able to grow.

It has been a difficult time particularly in **India and Nepal**. Authorities seem to be willing to look the other way when Christians are persecuted in those countries. Our people have been kept by God's grace, but have had to curtail some evangelistic activity. We now have 13 churches under **John and Sangi Vanlalhriata's** leadership in Nepal and four village churches started by **Bob and Debbie Adhikary**. In addition the message of the Gospel has been proclaimed in many other villages.

In India Friends of Garhwal (FOG) have ministering couples and regular meetings in three villages besides the meeting in Mussoorie. **Carl and Peggy Hunerwadel** have resigned their position at Woodstock School, left the work in the hands of **Edwin Singh** and other national leaders, hoping to return to India in a year to continue to encourage the FOG work but as tentmakers in another capacity.

In **Rwanda** we were not able to report new church plants at the end of 1998 because of rebel activity, but when **Willard and Doris Ferguson** came home in May they reported that the number of Friends churches there has grown from 50 to 61. The government has given us a choice piece of land across from our mother church

and school property in Kigali where the Rose Drive building team will help build a primary school this summer. This will allow the George Fox secondary school to expand into existing primary school buildings. We have three Friends secondary schools and seven primary schools now in Rwanda, with thousands of students. Pray for **David and Debby Thomas** as they support the work there without the presence of senior missionaries this year.

In **Mexico**, **Manny and Brenda Chavarria** have led the church to start two dental clinics, one at Jalatlaco and one at Mexico 86. The metal church building, built years ago at Mexico 86, had to be repaired to house the dental clinic (\$25,000). A children's program in a couple of the churches has helped to attract some parents to the Lord.

Several of **Jaime (Lydia) Tabingo's** former students in the **Philippines** have asked to bring their churches under the Friends umbrella. This increases the number of churches from 16 to 43. Jaime has stressed "Fishers of Men" evangelism and cell groups and the work has grown significantly.

Roy and Jinky Twaddell have been very well received in **Jordan**. Jinky has been granted permission to practice dentistry, has an office in the government Sports Federation building, and has won many friends with her skills. Roy is helping the Jordanian government plan its entry into the Sidney 2000 para-olympic games. He went thinking he would help establish a wheelchair factory, working with Venture Middle East, but funding by government for that factory didn't materialize, so VME is now planning to market chairs in the Middle East made in their factory in Kyrgyzstan. Roy has had a very encouraging five-day trip to visit the Q people, the unreached people group targeted by a coalition of agencies with whom he cooperates. He was able to test recordings of the gospel message he made with the help of the only known Q convert, and monitor radio receptivity in the area.

Abraham Sarker, head of EFM's **International Student** work has had effective ministry not only on campus, but also in many churches where he is called to speak. He is planning to marry Amie Hatton in December, a lady who has served short term in Turkey and will be a great asset in his ministry.

Todd and Celesta James are continuing to have a good ministry in **Ireland**, he through SportsLife and she by her work in her doctoral area of study. She has been placed in high positions of influence particularly in prison reform. We need to replace their vehicle this year.

Mel and Sandy Harrold are finding their most effective ministry is among the young people on the **Navajo** reservation. Mel has joined a pastors prayer group and recently the President of the Navajo Nation, a devout Christian, invited the group to his home.

All of us in EFM want to express our deep appreciation for the strong support of Friends for their mission program. God is working and it is a privilege to be a part of what He is doing.

Board of Peace and Social Concerns

During 1999 the Board of Peace and Social Concerns has made efforts to focus on the work of Christian Peacemaker Teams (CPT). Our annual Peace Retreat was held near Eugene in March with 30 participants. The speaker was Cole Hull of CPT. We continue to pray and dream of a CPT Corporation member from Northwest Yearly Meeting.

The Board continues to support ministry in northwest Portland in the form of Peace Place After School Program. The Piedmont Friends Church was sold to Lighthouse Church of God in Christ last fall. The children's ministry meets in the old parsonage adjacent to the church, which the Yearly Meeting still owns. A flicker of light still shines as we refuse to put away completely a northwest Portland ministry point.

The Thanksgiving Offering was successful in supporting Medical Missions to Peru and the Clinic Project in Kenya. It has been a number of years since we have done the same project two years in a row. The total amount was almost \$30,000. Hopefully many physical needs will be improved as we seek to heal hurting spirits.

The board is excited about the upcoming Peace Conference sponsored in part by the Center for Peace Learning at George Fox. We encourage you to drop by our board sessions this week and participate if you are called.

Board of Stewardship

The Board of Stewardship meets during Yearly Meeting sessions and at Midyear Board meetings to accomplish its duties and responsibilities as outlined in the *Faith and Practice*. In addition, the board's administrative committee (Stan Muhr, clerk; Roger Minthorne; Leo Crisman; Dave Hampton, director of Finance and Development; Joe Gerick, general superintendent; Harold Antrim, associate superintendent; Chuck Scott, bookkeeper) meets monthly to keep current on stewardship matters.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

Audits: An audit of the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church was completed by Nixon, Abbey and Company, PC. Audits of the Pension Fund, Friends Church Extension Foundation and Friends Fund are conducted on a regular basis.

Excerpts from the Yearly Meeting's 1998 audit appear in the Appendix. A detail of income and expense also appears in the Appendix. A complete copy of the audit report is available at the Yearly Meeting office.

Financial Consolidation: The Yearly Meeting's funds are classified as unrestricted, temporarily restricted and permanently restricted as required by the "Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116." Revenue for the Great Commission Program budget is considered unrestricted and is spent for administration and board and commission programs as budgeted each year by the Executive Council. Designated, or temporarily restricted revenues such as faith promise, missionaries' shares, or new works, are used by the board or commission having authority over them. A detailed accounting of all funds is kept by the Yearly Meeting office and reviewed by the Board of Stewardship Administrative Committee monthly.

Budget Process: The Yearly Meeting is committed to spending only what is provided by the local churches. The budget process in place for the past several years has been successful in keeping us in the black. The superintendents, boards and commission clerks present their budget estimates for the next year during Midyear Board meetings. The Board of Stewardship, in turn, estimates the income based on the giving patterns of churches, organizations, and individuals. A budget for the following year is then proposed to the Executive Council in February. Based on requests, priorities, and discussions, a final budget is prepared for submission at Yearly Meeting sessions. In looking at the projections for next year there are some hard choices for the Executive Council, but they are committed to sound financial management.

Giving: Many churches are giving a larger portion each year. If you are a part of that giving, THANK YOU. Your support is so important for this ministry we do together. We have also noted that some churches have reduced their giving as a percent of their total budget. If you are in this group please consider how important your part is in our ministry as a whole. Be a full partner in the ministry of the Yearly Meeting.

DEPARTMENT OF DEVELOPMENT (FRIENDS FUND)

The Department of Development—Friends Fund was founded in 1972 with the mission of promoting Christian stewardship through the mechanism of Estate Planning and Deferred Gifts. To that end, Friends Fund currently has over \$2.9 million under management that is designated for distribution to various Yearly Meeting ministries. An additional \$2.0 million (as of 6/30/99) is being managed in the form of endowment funds that provide a permanent source of funding for a variety of Yearly Meeting ministries. In 1998, total assets under management increased 17% to \$4.9 million. The growth is the result of \$180,000 in new trusts and annuities plus the continued increase in market values as a result of the strong stock market. These results have been achieved through the faithful stewardship of a large number of Friends that have made Northwest Yearly Meeting ministry a part of their estate plan with the help of Friends Fund. To become a part of this exciting opportunity in Christian stewardship, just contact Friends Fund through the Yearly Meeting office.

Friends Fund continues to make good progress in dealing with the much discussed accumulated operating debt. Total notes outstanding at year end were \$659,428 compared to \$795,605 in 1994. From 1991 through 1998 the operating results have averaged a positive \$1,825 annually because the gift and bequest income has been sufficient to make up for the operating income shortfall. Projections for the year 2000 and beyond are that operating income (primarily management fees) will be sufficient to cover all operating expenses and the gift and bequest income will be available to reduce the outstanding debt and pass on to ministry. The large increase in projected management fees for 2000 is partially due to the addition of a large new endowment fund in 1999 for the Board of Evangelism. This is a significant turning point for Friends Fund. Throughout its entire history, Friends Fund has been dependent on gift and bequest income to help cover operating expenses,

so going forward, the availability of these funds for debt reduction and distribution to ministry will provide for the long-term stability of the organization. Your continued concern and prayers for Friends Fund are deeply appreciated.

TREASURER'S REPORT

1998 marked the sixth consecutive year with the Great Commission Program Budget (GCPB) operating in the black. This has been accomplished by carefully controlling expenses and a strong commitment to only spend what is received and no more.

Accompanying this report is a summary of the 1998 financial results. A complete copy of our 1998 auditor's report will be available at the caretakers' table, or any time by contacting the Yearly Meeting office.

The statement of financial position reflects a strong financial base for the Yearly Meeting. Total assets exceed \$2.3 million with only \$21,000 in liabilities. The assets consist of two primary categories. First is the surplus funds that are invested in the form of bank deposits, stock and bond portfolios, and notes to boards, commissions and related organizations. Second are the real estate assets consisting of the headquarters building and contents, church properties from discontinued meetings and real estate being held for future church locations. The decrease in fixed assets from 1997 to 1998 was caused primarily by the sale of the Piedmont church property. This also caused a shift in net assets from unrestricted to restricted because the proceeds of the sale were transferred to the Board of Stewardship restricted fund.

The statement of revenue and expense shows the activity of this past year broken into unrestricted and restricted funds. The GCPB comprises the majority of the unrestricted funds. The only remaining amounts are accounting entries that did not involve the receipt or expenditure of cash. The restricted or designated funds are those funds which the donor or a board or commission has placed a restriction on how those funds can be spent. It is interesting to note that of the over \$1.4

million in 1998 revenue, 39.4% came from church payments to the GCPB and an almost equal amount, 36.4% came in the form of designated gifts. This is a trend that is common to many non-profit organizations. The third major category of revenue is investment income. Of the almost \$283,000 of investment income, one-half came from the sale of the Piedmont church property. Another 24.3% came from growth of the Yearly Meeting endowment fund, with the balance coming from missions, evangelism, and general fund investments.

There has been some discussion about the level of administrative expense at the Yearly Meeting office. For 1998 there was \$267,000 in administrative expense (not including depreciation) which represented 22.6% of total Yearly Meeting expenses. In determining if this is too much or too little, there are a number of factors that need to be considered. First, compared to some other non-profit organizations, this ratio appears to be in line. For example, in 1997 the American Bible Society spent 26.3% of their total expenses in non-program areas. Secondly, the use of a "raw ratio" like this runs a significant risk of not comparing similar activities. In the Yearly Meeting's case, the administrative category includes the salary expense for the general superintendent, associate superintendent, youth superintendent, and youth program coordinator. It could easily be said that a significant portion of these individuals' time is spent in ministry (program services) even though all their salary is charged to administration. The process to allocate these salaries between program and administration is expensive, time consuming and not required by our auditors. If allocated, the ratio would be significantly lower. Finally, the Yearly Meeting office provides administrative support to the larger Northwest Yearly Meeting community. If the \$7.5 million in local church expenditures were consolidated into the Yearly Meeting finances, then the administrative ratio again would be significantly smaller. The bottom line is that the entire Yearly Meeting staff is highly committed to providing the most efficient operation possible to meet the mission that has been assigned us by the entire Yearly Meeting body. We welcome the opportunity to visit with anyone interested in discussing this issue.

Board of Trustees

Since the sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting ("NWYM") in July 1998 the Trustees have dealt with the following transactions:

Sale of Piedmont Church As requested by the Executive Council in February 1998, the Trustees on November 30, 1998 completed the sale of the former Piedmont Friends Church property to Lighthouse Church of God in Christ. This is the church, which had been renting the property from us. The sale price was \$142,000, less costs of \$837.50, with net proceeds of \$141,162.50. Many people preferred that this property continue as a church and we think it is an answer to prayer that Lighthouse Church of God in Christ was able to arrange financing with a local bank, that the property received a satisfactory environmental analysis, and that the church was able to pay the entire amount to us in cash.

Piedmont House Roof At the request of the Board of Peace and Social Concerns and because of leaks, which were causing serious damage, we arranged for a new roof on the Piedmont house. This house is the former Piedmont parsonage, which is now being used by the Board of Peace and Social Concerns to continue its after school program under the name "Peace Place." The net cost of the roof was \$7,236.

(The old roof had to be removed and new sheathing was required.) Money was not budgeted for this expense and it was paid from the proceeds of the sale of the Piedmont church.

Sale of Vancouver Property The sale of the 4.24 acres of property on SE 164th Ave near McGillivray Blvd in Vancouver to Touchmark Living Centers was closed as of February 8, 1999. After sales costs we received a total of \$748,534 in cash and a \$150,000 investment interest in Waterford at Fairway Village, LLC, a retirement complex operated by Touchmark Living Centers on adjoining property. Dave Hampton and Harold Antrim did a major part of the negotiating but Floyd Watson assisted and also signed all earnest money and extension agreements. Two other trustees signed closing documents.

Sale of Nampa Friends Church Property At the request of the Board of Evangelism, we provided minor assistance to Nampa Friends Church in the sale of its church and parsonage for \$160,000. Down payment was \$20,000 with the \$140,000 balance payable under a note and trust deed on or before April 1, 2001, with interest at 9% payable monthly. The \$140,000 and interest is payable to NWYM.

Washington Property Tax Exemption Reports Washington property tax exemption reports were submitted for six Washington church properties where title is in the name of NWYM. These reports are required annually by March 31.

Sale of ParkCenter Friends Church Property At the request of the Board of Evangelism, we have accepted the responsibility to sell the property formerly occupied by ParkCenter Friends Church in Boise. ParkCenter FC had already entered into an agreement to sell a portion of the land for \$200,000 with \$130,000 down and the balance of \$70,000 payable in installments over five years with interest at 8%. Closing of this sale is awaiting the City of Boise's approval for the dividing of the property. We also now have two prospects for the sale of the rest of the property, including the church building, with an Assembly of God church being the most active prospect. The property is now unoccupied and arrangements have been made for the physical care of it by a local Friend. Dave Hampton and Harold Antrim have handled most of the negotiations to this point with some assistance by Floyd Watson.

I realize that no matter what may happen to me and no matter what challenges and obstacles I face, Christ is always right beside me leading me down the path He wants me to follow. Even if I go astray, He is always ready to forgive me and welcome me back into His arms of love. No one of earth is exactly like Christ, but there are people like Josh who let His light shine through them.

BARCLAY PRESS

Forty years ago at our yearly meeting sessions, Arthur O. Roberts, president of the Board of Publication, reported that Oregon Yearly Meeting now operates a publishing house, The Barclay Press, named in honor of the early Quaker theologian, Robert Barclay.

While this year is the 40th anniversary of Barclay Press, it also marks 50 years of printing ministry. Oregon Yearly Meeting Press, owned and operated by Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher, had been operating for a decade in the Yearly Meeting head-

quarters building then located in Portland. On May 1, 1959, the Yearly Meeting assumed ownership and management of this printing operation and made the change in name.

"Response to our appeals for funds to purchase the printing plant and other equipment has been gratifying," the 1959 board report states. "Of a total need of \$7,100, some \$4,850 has come in since June 1."

During the past 40 years that initial investment has grown dramatically in terms of staff, annual revenue, equipment, facilities, and amount of literature produced. Arthur Roberts's report in 1959 stated: "We serve the Yearly Meeting by providing low-cost, quality printing to the boards and institutions of the church, and by giving direct spiritual ministry through the pages of the *Northwest Friend* and through the books and pamphlets published." Examples of this work from the past 40 years include publications such as "*Your Friend*" Sunday bulletins, *Northwest Friend*, *Missionary Voice*, *Friends Women Missionary Fellowship* (FWMF) program books, *Concern*, *Evangelical Friend*, *Adult Friend*, *Teacher's Friend*, *Fruit of the Vine*, Quaker pamphlets, and 29 book titles currently available plus several others that are no longer in print.

Personnel at the time of Barclay Press's beginning was Ralph Chapman as manager, Jack Willcuts as half-time editor, Beth Hockett doing composition, and Ralph Fletcher as pressman. Throughout our 40-year history people have been a key ingredient to this ministry. The current Barclay Press team is Donna Allison, Mike Comfort, Susan Fawver, Sharon Holdahl, Chris Holm, Cindy Lauinger, Alice Maurer, Dan McCracken, Les Peterson, and John Weinrich. Part-time members are Gertrude Ankeny, Jean Clark, Dick Eichenberger, Gene Hockett, and Sherry Macy.

This year we honor the foresight and obedience Ray Carter and the Board of Publication displayed in the late 1940s that led to the establishment of Oregon Yearly Meeting Press in 1949. We also express our gratitude for the vision and leadership shown in the late 1950s that established Barclay Press when Ray Carter's health began to fail. We praise God for the ministry that has taken place through the millions of pieces of literature distributed by Barclay Press.

We look forward to the new opportunities for Barclay Press to serve God through the communication of His truth. As technology continues to change rapidly, we strive to use the most effective and efficient tools available. We invite you to be a part of our communication ministry in the new millennium with your prayers, concerns, and ideas.

Friends Church Extension Foundation

The Friends Church Extension Foundation (FCEF) was formed in 1955 as an agency of Northwest Yearly Meeting under the direction of the Board of Evangelism. It was the vision of the founders and continues to today, that the Foundation be a tool for the spread of the Gospel throughout the Northwest by making funds available for the building and expansion needs of the Yearly Meeting. Churches and related organizations frequently find it difficult to secure financing for church building, development, and expansion programs because banks and other financial institutions are often unwilling to accept risks inherent in loans to churches. FCEF stands ready to fill this need.

Since its inception, the Foundation has made 149 loans totaling nearly \$5.1 million. This past year (ending June 30, 1999), FCEF made loans totaling \$279,000 to Boise

Friends, Deschutes Friends, Quaker Hill Conference, Twin Rocks Friends Conference, and Friends Fund. The Foundation has additional funds available for projects and is constantly watching for opportunities to make new loans.

FCEF receives its funding through the sale of investment certificates to Northwest Yearly Meeting members. The Foundation pays a competitive rate of interest for these deposits and strives to always have funds on hand to honor requests for redemption of the certificates. A new feature this year is the availability of IRA accounts for these investment certificates. For more information and a current prospectus, contact Dave Hampton or Floyd Watson at the Yearly Meeting office.

A third feature of the FCEF program is a payment of a portion of the net income back to the Yearly Meeting. Last year this payment totaled \$56,000. The Yearly Meeting uses this money to fully fund the Quaker Leaders Program, a leadership development program under the Board of Evangelism, and to partially fund the Director of Finance position.

Friends Church Extension Foundation has a long history of sound fiscal management. The financial summary below highlights the past two years' activity for the Foundation. Anyone interested in any aspect of the FCEF program is encouraged to contact the Yearly Meeting office.

Our banquet at Yearly Meeting (1998) was held at George Fox University, using the theme "A Lamp Unto My Feet," Psalm 119:105. Kerri Clarkson was our speaker, sharing the nature of her work and reactions to the first term of service in Bolivia. She homeschooled their girls; "freed up" time for Jerry so he could accomplish his work; she began classes in sewing and crafts, quickly discovering a need for fluent Spanish. A reception and get-acquainted time for missionaries and FWMF women was held on Tuesday. Carleta Baker, Holly Dhyne, Kerri Clarkson, Tonya Comfort, Verna Munn, and Nancy Thomas shared of their lives on the field, their wishes, their concerns, and the support we could give them.

Retreats were held at both camps in Oregon and Idaho, using the theme "Our Goodly Heritage." Rena Marvel, pastor's wife from Vancouver Church of God, was the guest speaker with music led by Beth Weber. Devotions were led by Sandy Wild and Paula Hampton. Carolann Palmer displayed many of her quilts in the chapel, dining hall and classrooms which helped us to realize a part of our heritage. A fun auction raised \$1,419.15 for homeschool supplies for the missionary children. At Retreat, Yearly Meeting women pledged support for home and foreign projects to the amount of \$7,200.00. Thirteen reporting groups raised funds just under \$12,750.00 for missions and \$5,584.00 was raised for local projects, such as: quilts made and sold, church remodeling, potlucks, shoebox ministry, etc.

Six Spring Rallies were held this year with the theme "Investing in the Future With God," Jeremiah 29:11. The total offering was \$2,823.41 to help Hal and Nancy Thomas in the developing of a master's program in missions (education of future national missionaries) at Bolivian Evangelical University. Portland Area had the largest attendance of 67 women and Southern Oregon had a quick substitute speaker when their guest had illness. These rallies are all different and well-planned!

There is a concern about the need for willing leaders to come forward. We must have women with vision and a willing heart to be a part of this challenging work. Continue to serve Jesus Christ with renewed vigor and faith, recognizing how great a field and message we have to proclaim. May we have the creativity, spiritual insight, and ability to move forward with the Lord.

Volunteers on Wheels

Jesus came to the planet earth as God Incarnate to redeem us from sin and to take away the "sting of death" through His resurrection. And during His brief life on earth He went about doing good, setting an example for each of us to do likewise.

Fifteen years ago, the charter members of Volunteers on Wheels (VOW) adopted as their biblical guide, the declaration Paul the Apostle made as recorded in Ephesians 2:10:

"For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." (NIV)

As a group of "volunteers" we desire to follow this guideline. VOW is comprised of individuals who reflect the love of Jesus by doing good deeds because of Jesus' love. This past year VOW has assisted in conducting Vacation Bible Schools in two churches, helped in construction and renovation at two churches, and at other ministries such as camps, the Newberg Cemetery, and Christian retreat facilities.

One of the larger projects was assisting in the construction of an addition to the Northwest Community Friends Church in Tucson, Arizona. Steve Main, pastor of the church wrote,

Our people sensed the connectedness with Friends from the Northwest Yearly Meeting in a very visible way. We value the Christian witness these volunteers gave to our congregation and to the contractor and sub-contractors as they had contact with them. The inspirational value to the congregation and pastor far surpasses the dollar value of service rendered. Personally, I deeply value the friendships developed through this work project. I thank God for your gracious labor of love among us. You certainly made possible a project that would have been much smaller had your group not participated. May God reward each of the volunteers and friends of VOW for their sacrifice of time and resources to help us get this work done.

Since its founding in 1984, VOW members have participated in 90 projects in five western states and Mexico. The volunteers traveled more than 158,000 miles, contributing 23,560 hours of labor worth \$255,473. Membership in VOW has increased by 38 percent to 73, up from 53 a year ago. These members bring an incredible variety of skills and gifts to the ministry.

I want to express appreciation to all of our members for their dedication to this ministry and for their devotion to our Lord. A special word of appreciation is warranted for the service of charter members, Homer and Margaret Wright (Clackamas Park). They have served on the Executive Board for the past 15 years. Although they are no longer serving on the Executive Board their dedicated and effective support as members of VOW will continue, for which we are all grateful. Margaret has served as statistician since the beginning and Homer has volunteered in numerous projects using his construction skills, especially in concrete construction. The ministry of VOW and the Yearly Meeting has been more effective because of their dedication. **Thank you.** Gary Fendall (West Chehalem) has served as Executive Director since 1995. He and his wife, Ellie, have freely offered their gifts in administration during the past four years. Under his leadership the By-Laws were revised in 1997 and 1999. One of the changes in the By-Laws this past year was to

change the leadership title from **Executive Director** to **President**. They are a vibrant couple, who not only coordinated the work projects, but at the annual retreat, which is called **THE RENDEZVOUS**, gave leadership in our worship and fellowship experiences. **Thank you.**

All of us are keenly aware of the changes taking place in society, much of it negative and harmful to our well being and happiness. The Light of Christ is bright. At our Rendezvous in May, Jerry Dillon, our devotional leader reminded all of us that "Little is much when God is in it." Volunteers on Wheels is a viable ministry of Northwest Yearly Meeting. If your church, camp, educational institution, or other ministry has a need for assistance, please contact me.

George Fox University

Although the University enters the next millennium with increased enrollment and an intense focus on academic excellence, "Our first priority is Christ-centeredness," says President H. David Brandt. ". . . within that context we seek high academic quality."

Leadership: Dr. H. David Brandt became the 11th president of George Fox University on August 1, 1998, beginning a new era in the life of the University following the death of former President Edward F. Stevens. President Brandt was selected by the board of trustees following a five-month nationwide search that considered more than 50 candidates. Dr. Brandt left the presidency of Tabor College in Kansas to assume his George Fox leadership, bringing to the University an extensive background in teaching, college administration and business. Upon his arrival, the search began for a new vice president for academic affairs, with that search ending in April with the appointment of Dr. Robin E. Baker, senior vice president at Grand Canyon University. Dr. Baker joined the University on July 15, 1999.

Satisfaction: University enrollment climbed to a record 2,336 students during the fall semester, the 11th consecutive year for an increase. In that span, enrollment has quadrupled from 549 in 1986. The fall increase of 3.6 percent was boosted dramatically by a freshman retention rate of 81 percent. On-campus traditional student enrollment rose to 1,389.

Recognition: George Fox climbed even higher in its overall ranking in the nation's most popular annual rating of colleges and universities. *U.S. News & World Report* magazine's listing of "America's Best Colleges" ranked George Fox fourth in overall quality, up one position from the year before. It was ranked even higher in academic standing, in third place among regional liberal arts colleges in the West. The University moved up to eighth on the list for the region's best values.

Academic Approval: In June, the Association of Theological Schools endorsed the establishment of a new Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) degree in leadership and spiritual formation. Offered at the Portland Center, the program is designed for the working pastor and other Christian leaders. Groups of students will study together in twice-yearly modules for two years, completing their doctoral projects in the third year. The first cohort is expected to start in January 2000. A nine-year goal was accomplished when the American Psychological Association granted full accredi-

tation to the Graduate School of Clinical Psychology. Another review will not be necessary until 2003. Approval followed a site visit in August. The program became the University's first graduate-level program in 1990, when it was acquired from Western Seminary. A new Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) degree was developed during the year, with the first students to enroll in 1999. The program, endorsed by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges, will emphasize leadership, with a focus on the qualities of cultural, moral and organizational leadership as the basis for leading complex educational organizations.

Faithful Support: A \$1 million gift announced in July was designated by the donors to help fund the new Edward F. and Linda Stevens Endowed Scholarship Fund. The gift, in memory of former President Ed Stevens, was from a husband and wife with a longstanding relationship with the University who asked not to be publicly identified. A \$500,000 grant, designated for technology improvements on campus, was received in April from the Meyer Memorial Trust, the fourth grant it has awarded since 1991.

Living Space: George Fox University's new 21,000-square-foot Plant Services Building was dedicated in September. The \$830,000 building extends the University campus farther to the north and accommodates more than 40 employees. The former Plant Services Building in the center of campus became the new Art Annex, containing a pottery room and art studio, a multi-purpose classroom, and storage space to accommodate the new art major. The most public transition was renovation of Newberg's historic Edwards House to become the new official residence for the University's president. The 115-year-old Jesse Edwards House, part of the city and University's heritage, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Purchase and renovation was made possible by a \$300,000 gift from Margaret Edwards, Portland.

Barclay College

Greetings from Barclay College! Almost a year has passed since I assumed office on July 1, 1998. Believe me, it has been a very humbling experience. I don't mind the responsibility that goes with the territory, but the title seems to demand perfection. However, the Lord is Perfect and He has promised us His abundant resources.

One of the things I have come to appreciate during my brief tenure is Barclay's rich Friends heritage and especially our strong ties with the yearly meetings. It is such an important two-way street. As the only Bible college in the Friends denomination, we are not only an important source of pastors and youth pastors for your Yearly Meeting, but also of teachers, business leaders and other professionals who have been grounded in Christian living while at Barclay College. The support through prayers, students, and finances — from churches and individuals in your yearly meeting — is vital to the College.

The past year has been an exciting one at Barclay. God is answering the prayers of His people and opening many doors for us. Let me share with you some of the recent developments:

- ❖ Our ADVANTAGE! Adult degree completion program now has four established sites in Kansas, one in Greenville, South Carolina, and another in Colorado Springs. We are currently working with the Houston Graduate School of Theology to start a program in that city. We have hired a coordinator to help

develop the Houston site.

- ❖ Thirty students — the most in many years — received degrees at our commencement exercises this spring.
- ❖ At the March 1999 meeting, the Board of Trustees gave the administration tentative approval for construction of a new Student Activity Complex and Women's Dormitory to adjoin the Broadhurst Student Center. Construction will probably begin this summer if final approval is given.
- ❖ The church music major has been reinstated.
- ❖ Last fall we hired a full-time professor (former Dean of Students Tom Hinderliter) for our new Christian school teacher education program. We have since hired a full-time missions professor; and a full-time psychology professor will be added before the next school year begins. We will then have a full-time faculty member for each major.
- ❖ Our men's soccer team went to the national Christian College Athletic Association national tournament for the second straight year. They finished fifth.
- ❖ We have received numerous large gifts during the past year including several exceeding \$200,000.
- ❖ As of April 30, the Barclay Campaign had raised more than \$3 million in donations and pledges towards the three-year campaign goal of \$3.75 million. The campaign ends June 30, 2000.
- ❖ An admissions consultant who was responsible for turning around the admissions program at other institutions, such as George Fox University, has helped Barclay develop a much more professional approach to the student recruiting process—including the production of full-color viewbooks and brochures. This should result in greater enrollment numbers on campus.
- ❖ Barclay has balanced its budget for the last three consecutive years and anticipates another balanced budget this year.
- ❖ The Barclay Administration is presently working with an architect to develop a long-range plan and master facilities plan, which will be presented to the Board in October. The plan includes several new facilities and the development and refinement of "The Great Commission" curriculum which we want to offer to our students.

I have a burning desire to see Barclay become the institution that will be known as "the place to attend" if you want to become part of "The Great Commission." If you are a potential student or know those who are looking for a school that is Christ-centered, we invite you to take a closer look at Barclay. And if the Lord is leading you to work at Barclay, either in a paid position or as a short-term volunteer to help us fulfill "The Great Commission," please contact us.

Please continue to pray for the college as we work to develop Christian leaders for the next century. May God bless you mightily.

REPORT OF INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church as of December 31, 1998 and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as discussed in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As explained in Note 2 to the financial statements, we were not engaged to audit The Barclay Press, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church with unaudited net assets of \$87,683 as of December 31, 1998 and an unaudited net loss of \$6,921 for the year then ended. Generally accepted accounting principles require consolidation of the financial statements of a wholly owned subsidiary.

In our opinion, except for the effects of not consolidating the financial statements of The Barclay Press, Inc., the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church as of December 31, 1998, and the results of its operations and the changes in its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The schedule of support and revenue, expenses and net assets by function on page 14 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
