MINUTES Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 2000

Monday, July 24, 8:15 a.m.

- 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened its 108th annual sessions on Monday, July 24, 2000, on the campus of George Fox University under the theme "Practicing the Presence: The Kingdom of God is Now." Bruce Bishop spoke to the congregation regarding some new things this year—the combining of worship and business. The hope is that these two can flow together smoothly.
- 2. A time of worship led by Bryan Boyd and Heather Taggart followed, with the central theme of "Jesus Christ is Present." After a time of singing, Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny led in prayer.
- 3. The representatives were seated on Saturday, July 22, with the remaining representatives seated this morning.
- 4. Mark Ankeny asked that those who are visiting introduce themselves. These included Doug Logan, New England Yearly Meeting; four persons from North Pacific Yearly Meeting: Bob Barnes, Dorene Cornwell, Betsy Kenworthy, and Gloria Kershner. Dwaine Williams is present from Jamaica Yearly Meeting, and Ron Stansell brought greetings from Alaska Yearly Meeting which he recently attended. Also present is Bridget Fitzwater from Earlham School of Religion, Richmond, Indiana.
- 5. Harold Antrim, associate superintendent, introduced the new pastors, associate pastors, and youth pastors for 2000-2001. Pastors: Friends Memorial (Seattle)—Lorraine Watson; Reedwood (Portland)—Johan/Judy Maurer (pastor of worship, adult education and administration) {August}; Silverton—Roger/Cathy Knox; Spokane—Rick/Kelly Bralley; Talent—David/Tricia Howell (interim, September 99 to June 2000—Marvin/Roberta Kistler). Interim Pastors: Deschutes (Bend)—John and Karen Macy; Quincy—Bryan/Barb Christenson. New Works: LaGrande—Dave/Carla Arnold; New Life Friends (Vancouver)—Dave/Renee White; NW Portland—Trey/Stephanie Doty. Associates: Hayden Lake—Maurice/Peggy Roberts (administrative pastor); Newberg—Irene Rice (pastor of children's ministries); North Valley—Meg/George Byrtek (administrative coordinator); Jean/Bruce Schuchardt (visitation and pastoral care coordinator); Reedwood—Lynn Clouser Holt/Jon (from clerk of pastoral team to pastor of community life). - 6. At the request of the Clerk, Sharon Cole, a representative from Reedwood Friends Church, Portland, gave a brief testimony of the ways God is working in their church.
- 7. Robert Hays, pastor at Post Falls, Idaho, and a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 8. Dea Cox, clerk of the Council of Elders, gave the "State of the Church" report. The theme of "Christ is Present" has been the theme of the Friends Church since its beginnings. The Council of Elders has been in contact with the pastors and has encouraged them in this way as well as by prayer. The reports from the churches are encouraging. There have been no major problems to deal with this past year. An increase in converts has been reported. The Elders are interested in developing a systematic way to promote and deal with conflict resolution within the individual churches. They are also dealing with how to help minimize moral failures of leaders in the churches. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 9. The change in the *Faith and Practice* regarding the change of the name of Media Commission to Communications Commission which was presented as a first reading at the 1999 Yearly Meeting sessions, was presented for a second reading.

Purposes and Functions:

The Communications Commission facilitates communication both within the Yearly Meeting and as an outreach. Nine persons appointed by the Yearly Meeting upon nomination by the Representatives serve on the Commission, the terms of one-third expiring each year. Also serving, by virtue of their offices, are the Yearly Meeting archivist and the manager of Barclay Press.

The Commission is responsible to:

1. Develop and maintain a set of resources to aid other boards and commissions in using various media to promote Yearly Meeting programs, ministries, and events.
2. Facilitate, develop, and update all forms of communication delegated to it by Yearly Meeting organizations and at its own initiative, including, but not limited to, printed materials, videos, and the Internet. To this end it is authorized to build and administer a capital fund.
3. Cooperate with other yearly meetings in Evangelical Friends International-North America. For this purpose it appoints two of its number to the EFI-NA Communications Commission.

This was approved as second reading.

■ 10. The reorganization proposal concerning the Council of Representatives that was presented to the 1999 Yearly Meeting sessions as a change in *Faith and Practice* was presented for a second reading.

General Organization

Composition and Powers

The Yearly Meeting consists of the members of the local churches and Areas. **In its meetings for business it consists of the Council of Representatives and any other members in attendance.** It possesses complete legislative, judicial, and administrative authority. It has the authority to counsel, admonish, and discipline its constituent churches; to institute measures and provide means for the promotion of truth and righteousness; to inaugurate and maintain departments of evangelistic outreach and philanthropic work. It may review the proceedings of any church and give advice and instruction to the churches when requested or when considered necessary by the Yearly Meeting. Its officers and all persons serving its internal organizations are resident active members of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Any exceptions must be approved by the Yearly Meeting Executive Council.

Time and Purpose of the Annual Sessions

The annual sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting are held at Newberg, Oregon, at times determined by the Yearly Meeting or its Executive Council. (See Yearly Meeting Minutes, page 1, for current schedule.) Sessions may be held elsewhere by adjournment or action of the Meeting. The sessions are opened by the presiding clerk, who directs the representatives from the churches to make nominations at once to fill vacancies, on a pro tem or regular basis, as the case may require. If the presiding clerk is absent, the sessions are opened in turn by the assistant clerk or the recording clerk. These annual sessions are held in order for Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends to determine policies and procedures appropriate to its mission, to communicate them to members of the churches, and to find fellowship and unity through worship and instruction.

Business Procedures

1. Business presented as an expression of concern is forwarded from the churches, from Areas, from councils, from constituent bodies of the Yearly Meeting, or from other yearly meetings through official correspondence. Also, with the consent of the presiding clerk, business may be laid before the Yearly Meeting by any of its members. **Information regarding anticipated items of business will be sent to local churches at least ninety days prior to annual Yearly Meeting sessions. The Council of Representatives approves the agenda and order of business prior to the first business meeting, normally on the previous Saturday.** [The Business Committee (see p. 44) facilitates the flow of business to the clerk in proper form and sequence.]
2. **The Meeting may take action in one of the following ways.** a. The clerk may call for action by the Meeting. b. [or, i] If the matter requires discussion or investigation beyond what can be handled in [52] open session, **the clerk may refer it to the Council of Representatives or to a special committee for consideration and recommendation before the Meeting takes formal action.** c. **The clerk may, with the approval of the Meeting, refer some matters to a separate meeting of the Council of Representatives for final decision, which will be reported back to the Meeting.**
3. Proposals from the churches or Areas are to be submitted in writing as excerpts from their minutes and are to be held over at least one day subsequent to their introduction in order to allow deliberation. All proposals for amendment to this *Faith and Practice* must be submitted in writing and referred after preliminary approval to the Revision Committee before final action (see p. 44).
4. The Council of Elders reports to the Yearly Meeting in plenary session its summary of the state of the church, allowing time for prayerful consideration of issues raised by the report and by any attached judgments or interpretations offered by the Council of Elders.
5. The Yearly Meeting receives and decides all cases of appeal from the decisions of local churches which may be brought before it (see p. 52 for procedures).

Presiding Clerk

The presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting is the presiding officer at the annual sessions. The clerk also presides over **the Council of Representatives and the Executive Council**, makes all needful preparations for presenting the business of the Meeting at the next annual sessions, and oversees the scheduling of board

presentations at these sessions. The clerk's interpretations of *Faith and Practice* are final unless overruled by Yearly Meeting action.

The presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting serves as correspondent receiving and answering official communications, signing epistles and other documents issued to yearly meetings or associations, endorsing official certificates for members liberated for service in foreign lands, and signing certain documents and transcripts of record that require official certification.

At an early business session, **the Nominating Committee** of the Council of Representatives nominates to the Yearly Meeting a person to serve as presiding clerk for the following year. If the nomination is approved, the newly appointed clerk assumes office immediately upon the close of the Yearly Meeting sessions.

Other Clerks

The Yearly Meeting also appoints on nomination by the Council of Representatives the following officers: an assistant clerk, who reads official communications to the Meeting and keeps sufficiently informed about the business agenda to take the place of an absent presiding clerk; a recording clerk, who records and reads the minutes of the sessions; an assistant recording clerk, who compiles the Yearly Meeting directory for inclusion in the annual Minutes; an [53] announcing clerk, who organizes and presents pertinent announcements; and a statistician, who annually gathers and publishes useful statistics about church membership and activities.

~~On nomination by the Representatives, the Yearly Meeting appoints annually a person to preside over the deliberations of the Council of Representatives and a recording clerk to keep records and assist the presiding clerk with agenda for the following year. Clerks are appointed soon after the opening of the annual sessions so that if they lack previous experience they may sit in the remaining sessions of the Representatives to observe the procedure and be instructed by the current clerks. They may be reappointed on expiration of their terms.~~

~~The presiding clerk should be well qualified to preside without prejudice or partiality, to expedite the handling of business without neglect of proper hearing and deliberation, and to gather the sense of the meeting with discernment. The clerk should become thoroughly knowledgeable about the functions of the Representatives and understand what procedures and materials (such as lists of church and Area appointments) are needed for the sessions. The clerk instructs and aids the recording clerk in the preparation of reports, minuted actions, and authorized nominations that are forwarded to the Yearly Meeting (see pp.27, 75).~~

[56; 32] Executive Council of the Yearly Meeting

Composition

The Executive Council is composed of the Yearly Meeting clerk and assistant clerk; the general superintendent, associate superintendent, youth superintendent, and treasurer of the Yearly Meeting; ~~[the clerk of the Representatives;]~~ **the delegate from the Council of Representatives**, the clerk of the Council of Elders[;] and the clerk of the Trustees; one person chosen by each of the Yearly Meeting boards and commissions, one by each of the Areas, and not more than three additional persons designated by the Yearly Meeting. The Yearly Meeting representative to the Evan-

gelical Friends International-North America Region may be asked to serve on the Council ex officio. The presiding officer is the Yearly Meeting Clerk.

Composition

The Council of Representatives is composed of members of local and extension churches who have been chosen, prayerfully, on the basis of spiritual maturity, respected judgment, and acceptance of Friends beliefs and procedures as set forth in this book of *Faith and Practice*. At their first meeting, roll call is taken and representatives are seated. Alternates may be seated in place of representatives to fill allowable quotas (see p. 21). No late seating may take place except as authorized by the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting. Those approved and seated are the official Representatives. ~~[Officers consist of a]~~ **The presiding clerk and [a] recording clerk [; who are selected annually by recommendation of the Nominating Committee of the Representatives and approved by the Council of the Representatives and the Yearly Meeting (see below). Both are constituted officers of the Yearly Meeting. The Yearly Meeting presiding clerk and]** **of the Yearly Meeting also serve as presiding clerk and recording clerk of the Council of Representatives.** ~~The general superintendent [are] is an ex officio member[s].~~ The Representatives meet in open sessions to encourage wider understanding of church business. If a matter of seriously sensitive nature should arise, however, the presiding clerk with the concurrence of the Representatives may request **other members and visitors** to absent themselves.

[59] Meetings

The Council of Representatives meets in conjunction with the annual sessions of the Yearly Meeting but may be called to meet at times between the annual sessions with the concurrence of ~~[at least two of the following: the clerk of the Representatives;]~~ the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting[;] and the general superintendent of the Yearly Meeting. **The Council of Representatives meet prior to the first business meeting, normally on the previous Saturday, for the purposes of seating Representatives and approving the agenda for the business meeting. All other scheduled Representatives meetings are held during Yearly Meeting business sessions.**

Term of Office

Representatives are appointed by their local church for a term of not less than two years commencing with the start of the calendar year. Terms should last either two or three years, a proportionate number being replaced each year.

Duties

The Council of Representatives attends to any business that it initiates or that the Yearly Meeting **organizations**, Areas, or local churches refer to it. ~~[It is authorized to present any such business for consideration to the Yearly Meeting in session.]~~ It is also specifically responsible to:

1. Submit to the Yearly Meeting annual nominations for the following offices: the presiding clerk, assistant presiding clerk, recording clerk, assistant recording clerk, and announcing clerk of the Yearly Meeting; ~~[and the clerk and recording clerk of the Council of Representatives]~~ **and a delegate from the Council of Representatives to the Executive Council.**

2. Submit to the Yearly Meeting annual nominations for members of Yearly Meeting boards, councils, and commissions, except for those nominations specifically reserved to the Areas or other bodies, seeking to fill these positions with a broad view of the work of the Yearly Meeting and a knowledge of qualified persons. The Council of Representatives may receive from the boards the names of persons they wish considered for appointment, together with appropriate information and commentary.
3. **Appoint a Nominating Committee, which meets throughout the year as necessary, in order to identify suitable and willing nominees for the positions for which the Representatives are charged to nominate.**
4. [3] Approve nominations by organizations for their presiding clerks and report them to the Yearly Meeting.
5. [4] Approve on nomination from the Executive Council and report to the Yearly Meeting the persons to serve on the Council of Elders, making sure the appointments represent the Areas (see p. 33).
6. **Convey concerns, actions, and other information between the Yearly Meeting and their local churches.**

A discussion followed. Eighteen people shared concerns. A summary of those concerns follows: Quakers do not use the democratic process. We are a theocracy and God is our leader. We can hear God's voice through many sources. Business is another form of worship. What God says in any gathered meeting depends on who is there, and yet we believe that God can lead us into decisions despite many different points of view. In summary, God speaks through many special people and sometimes we have to wait and trust God to lead us to an answer. On the other hand, many representatives feel that they are a glorified nominating committee where decisions are never made, or are sometimes overturned. Representatives should be empowered to make decisions. Local churches appoint representatives to speak their mind. Representatives should listen to everyone, but represent the people that sent them. We don't need representatives if we're not going to use them. Our churches send representatives to represent them. God used Jethro to speak to Moses suggesting that representatives be used to represent smaller groups. It is valuable when issues can be discussed ahead of time and local meetings can have input through their representatives. Sometimes the Executive Council can have too much power in decision making; representatives would help balance that. In the past, representatives have done important work in decision making. By combining the representatives session with the business session, everyone can hear the same reports and discussions of issues, making it more efficient. Trust seems to be a key issue. Do we trust local meetings to make decisions? Can we trust each other? One or two oppositions can often bring additional insights. Time, even two years, can lead to a decision. It is important to remember that the clerk may, with the approval of the meeting, refer some matters to a separate meeting of the Council of Representatives. Mark Ankeny said he heard in the discussion that representatives take seriously the responsibility of Yearly Meeting business, and that we trust others, non-representatives, to be speaking for others also. In the final decision-making process the entire spectrum of the Yearly Meeting should be involved. It is the clerk's responsibility to listen carefully to the people and try to discern how the Spirit of Christ is leading.

Following a time of discussion, this was approved as second reading.

- 11. The worship team closed the business session with the singing of gospel choruses. Following a 45-minute break, the team led in several choruses to open the next business session.

Monday, July 24, 11:00 a.m.

- 12. The Board of Stewardship report was given by Clerk Stan Muhr. He encouraged the promotion of tithing in our churches. Many blessings have come to us through the faithfulness of our people. He suggested allowing the Holy Spirit to audit our lives just as we audit our financial reporting. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)
- Dave Hampton, Yearly Meeting treasurer, presented the financial report. (The written report appears in the Appendix.) He also reported on the Pension Fund and Friends Fund, which appear in the Addendum. These reports were approved.
- 13. A recommendation from the Executive Council that Joe Gerick's appointment as general superintendent be extended through June 30, 2002, was presented. This was approved.
- 14. A recommendation from the Executive Council that Paul Bock's appointment as youth superintendent be extended through June 30, 2002, was read and approved.
- 15. The Executive Council presented the statement from Harold Antrim that he is not accepting another assignment as associate superintendent when his current term ends on June 30, 2001. This was approved.
- Jon Fodge, pastor at Peninsula Friends Church, expressed gratitude for Harold's influence and work.
- 16. The worship team led in the singing of "Great is Thy Faithfulness" as the business session closed.

Tuesday, July 25, 8:15 a.m.

- 17. Lynn Clouser Holt opened the session with the reading of the Second Core Value: "Scripture calls us to account and helps us know God's will." Bryan Boyd and Heather Taggart led in singing and scripture, with periods of silence between. Opportunity was given for response from the congregation. Mark Ankeny, clerk, closed the time of worship with prayer.
- 18. Mark announced that copies of the Core Values, which were adopted by the Yearly Meeting in 1998, are available through Barclay Press. Mark also stated that the minutes of the Monday sessions would not be read, but would be available for perusal at the Caretakers table during the break time at 10:00 a.m.
- 19. Ron Mulkey, clerk of the Board of Education, presented his report. He paid special tribute to Lois Tish who has served on the Board of Education for 37 years in various capacities.

This board works in the fleshing out of the Core Values in its various phases including the camping programs, Youth Yearly Meeting, Sunday school, and youth and children's programs in the local church. He emphasized that leadership in these various phases is available through the Yearly Meeting. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 20. Margaret Lemmons, clerk of the Communications Commission spoke on behalf of that commission. We need to have an authentic message and we need to market it. Our message of Christ needs to be marketed through (1) an authentic lifestyle, (2) print, and (3) electronic media. The Yearly Meeting now has a website. In July alone, 4000 requests for information were received. This is an incredible source for spreading the message of Christ and the church.

LeRoy Benham spoke on behalf of Barclay Press as clerk of the Barclay Press Board and interim manager of the Press. He announced that Dan McCracken resigned as manager of Barclay Press in March. He expressed appreciation for Dan's 30 years of service to Barclay Press in various capacities. A search is being conducted by the Barclay Press Board for a replacement for Dan. It is hoped that the ministry of publishing can be expanded. LeRoy showed the new book *The Wit and Wisdom of Jack Willcuts* by Arthur Roberts that is just off the press. Also a reprint of *What Friends Believe* that is now available. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 21. Ron Lowry, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony. Ron is pastor of the Melba, Idaho, Friends Church.

■ 22. The second reading of a proposed revision to the *Faith and Practice* section on "What Friends Believe" presented as first reading in the 1999 Yearly Meeting sessions was read and approved as second reading.

1. What Friends Believe: Faith Expressed through Witness (p. 6, 1998 version):

12. Christian Witness to Peace. We believe the precepts of Christ our Lord and the whole spirit of His Gospel call us to live at peace with all people. Therefore we consider war and violence incompatible with the holiness we profess. We ask our leaders to choose nonviolent alternatives for sustaining economic and civil order. We respect government as an instrument of God to restrain evil and promote justice, and we submit to it in matters that do not interfere with obedience to Christ our Lord. **When conflicts arise among persons, we will resolve them in a spirit of humility, with love for those who oppose us, and in accordance with biblical methods of peacemaking. (See Matthew 18 and George Fox's "Gospel Order.")**

■ 23. An addition to the section Duties and Privileges of Pastors in the *Faith and Practice* presented as first reading in the 1999 Yearly Meeting sessions was read and approved as second reading.

2. Duties and Privileges of Pastors. Pastoral Relationship with a Church (p. 49, 1998 version):

The church formulates a written understanding with the pastor regarding length of service, whether it is one year, a specified term of years, or an indefinite time. This arrangement may be renewed at the discretion of the church, with notice given not less than three months prior to the close of the pastoral year. When a pastor or church discerns that this particular pastoral service has been fulfilled or that the ministerial service is no longer required, the relationship can be terminated by either party. Written notice should be given at least three months in advance. When possible, termination should coincide with the close of the pastoral year. When the church initiates termination procedure, the pastor may request, and is entitled to, a hearing before the elders or before the church in business session. **Any conflicts arising between a pastor and a church should be submitted to resolution by biblical methods. (See "Chris-**

tian Witness to Peace" in the section "What Friends Believe," and Query 6 in this *Faith and Practice*.)

■ 24. Isabelle Shanks of Vancouver Friends Church and a representative from that church spoke about God's blessing and leadership in their church, especially the leadership of their new pastor, Mark Kelley, who came in July 1999.

■ 25. Clerk Mark Ankeny presented the statement regarding the use of the name Friends in the title of churches, which was considered three years ago. Don Staples, assistant clerk, read the draft revision proposals from page 46 in the 1987 edition of *Faith and Practice* and page 26 of the 1997 update: Nomenclature: The word "Friends" is to be included in the name of a Friends group in any state of its development; for example Pennville Friends Mission Point, Pennville Friends Extension Church, or Pennville Friends Church.

He then read a Proposal B: Add the following sentence to the paragraph quoted above: **A mission point or extension church may apply to the authorizing body (see page 44 [1987 edition] Opening a New Work) to be exempted from this expectation providing a clear verbal identification with Friends is still maintained; for example, Pennville Community Church: A Ministry of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. However, when it becomes established as a new local church, the word "Friends" is to be included in its name.**

A third, Proposal C, was also read: **Every Friends ministry is to have its affiliation with Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church clearly identified in its legal name, for example: Pennville Friends Mission Point, Pennville Friends Extension Church, Pennville Friends Church, or Pennville Community Church: A Ministry of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends.**

Several spoke to the matter with varying opinions. No decision was reached. This will be considered later in the week, after changes the Trustees will present.

■ 26. The worship team closed the session with singing.

Tuesday, July 25, 11:00 a.m.

■ 27. The session opened with the singing of "The Solid Rock" and the reading of the third Core Value: "We are called to be and to make followers of Christ." A prayer chorus was also sung.

■ 28. Patricia Howe spoke regarding the New Works at New Life Friends in Vancouver, Washington. She told of her conversion to Christ through that new work and her involvement in that church.

■ 29. Eric Smith, clerk of the Board of Evangelism, presented the board report. Their purpose is to follow the Core Value stated above. He stated "Never underestimate the power of a seed." We reap what we sow. He praised the work of Bruce Bishop with the Quaker Leaders Program at George Fox University, and Harold Behr's leadership in the New Works. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 30. The Board of Ministerial Service report was presented by Clerk Ron Woodward. He encouraged discernment within the local church of persons who are called to ministry. He also encouraged adequate training for ministry. New and revised copies of the Handbook of Recording are available to Elders of the local church to assist in the recording process of prospective pastors. Ron introduced

Mark Kelley as the new clerk of the Board of Ministerial Service who spoke briefly. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 31. Ralph Beebe introduced J. E. O'Neil, executive director of the National Inter-religious Service Board for Conscientious Objectors located in Washington D.C., who is visiting our yearly meeting sessions. She said that the name is being changed to Center for Conscience and War.

■ 32. Irene Rice, director of Children's Yearly Meeting, urged early registration of children who wish to attend Tilikum next year. They had more children than they could accommodate this year.

■ 33. The clerk asked each one to reflect on the three Core Values we've considered today as the business session ended. Ron Woodward paid tribute to Dave Fitch, who was a member of the Board of Ministerial Service, for his dedication to these core values. Dave recently passed away. The meeting adjourned with the singing of "There is Joy in the Lord."

Wednesday, July 26, 8:15 a.m.

■ 34. Bruce Bishop opened the session with the reading of the fourth Core Value statement "God is the source of life, and all human life is sacred." Bruce led in prayer. Bryan Boyd and Heather Taggart led in a time of worship with singing and a responsive reading.

■ 35. Phil McLain, co-clerk of the Commission on Family Life, reported. This commission strives to carry out the Core Value statement that has just been read and that is displayed before us. This commission works to provide materials for churches to use to minister to families. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 36. Trey Doty, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 37. Armond Kalesse, executive director of Friendsview Manor, was introduced. He expressed appreciation for those who had the vision for Friendsview Manor, especially Charles Beals. Friendsview Manor will be 40 years old in April. Future plans include an intermediate care facility for those needing assisted living. The legal name is to be changed to Friendsview Retirement Facility, but will still be known as Friendsview Manor. He emphasized the interest the residents take in their home, asking us to especially notice the flower boxes on the second floor balcony.

Frank Engle, executive assistant at Friendsview Manor, further reported that there are 230 residents of the Manor, and about 120 people are on a waiting list to get in. By 2005 Oregon will rank fourth in the nation in the number of seniors. People are drawn by the Quaker principles that are exemplified in Friendsview Manor.

■ 38. Dave Hampton, treasurer, presented the Budget for 2001. Because receipts so far this year are falling behind, the Board of Stewardship recommends that the Budget remain the same as it has been for 2000. The budget was approved.

■ 39. Floyd Watson, clerk of the Trustees, and Tom Stave, clerk of the Faith and Practice Revision Committee, presented some changes in the section "Organization of the Local Church Structure and Function" (page 21). Adds a new paragraph at the end:

Authority of the Yearly Meeting

By its affiliation with Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, each local church agrees to submit to the authority of the Council of Elders of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends in the settling of irreconcilable conflicts within the local church or between the local church and the Yearly Meeting. (For a description of the procedures for the settlement of such disputes, see the section "Duties and Functions" under "Yearly Meeting Council of Elders, and the section "Appeals.")

Floyd pointed out that the changes are to protect the local church and not give more power to the Yearly Meeting. He cited Boise Friends Church as an example and the problems that arose there.

Other proposed revisions include some additions to the section "Opening and Closing Churches" (page 25). Under Merger of Churches, in the first paragraph an addition to the sentence "They consult the Yearly Meeting Trustees about proper handling of real estate and other assets and meeting state corporation department requirements."

Under Discontinuance of Churches: The sentence "If the Council of Elders judges the church to be ineffective or out of unity with Friends *Faith and Practice*, the [Board of Evangelism] Council of Elders, acting for the Yearly Meeting, may discontinue the church, or it may effect a union with another Friends church. It will then transfer the membership en masse.] may take whatever action it deems necessary including, but not limited to, discontinuing the church, effecting a union with another Friends Church, or changing its status to an extension church or mission point. In the event of discontinuance or union with another church, it will transfer the membership en masse. Whenever a local church is discontinued or its status is changed to an extension church or mission point, any real property owned will be transferred to Northwest Yearly Meeting. (Also see page 26.)

Return to Extension Church or Mission Point Status. Addition following the sentence: If by common agreement and official action of the local church the change appears to be in order, the Board of Evangelism then assumes supervision of the church as outlined above. Alternatively, the Yearly Meeting Council of Elders may give a church the status of extension church or mission point, as provided in the preceding section, and ask the Board of Evangelism to assume supervision of the church.

Proposed revision to the section "Yearly Meeting Council of Elders" (page 35). Adds to list of Duties and Functions: 4. Whenever necessary, investigate problems in a local church, extension church, or mission point, endeavoring to help the church maintain its active relationship with the Yearly Meeting and with the community. If the Council judges that this cannot be achieved, it may take whatever action it deems necessary including but not limited to, discontinuing the church, effecting a union with another Friends Church, or changing its status to an extension church or mission point (see page 26). 5. Consider proposals for the merger of churches as provided in the section of this *Faith and Practice* under "Opening and Closing Churches" and "Merger of Churches (see page 26). [Change current numbering 4-9 to 6-11.]

Proposed revision to the section "Appeals" (page 52) modifies several paragraphs and adds two new paragraphs. Makes this a major section, and no longer a subsection under "Dealing with Offenders." New paragraph: A local church may also appeal decisions made by the Council of Elders pursuant to the section of the *Faith and Practice* under Opening and Closing Churches. (See pages 25 and 26.) In such an event, a written appeal shall be mailed or delivered to the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting within 30 days of the church having received notice of the decision of the Council of Elders. A copy of the appeal shall also be mailed or delivered to the clerk of the Council of Elders and the general superintendent of the Yearly Meeting. The appeal shall state the reasons why the decision of the Council of Elders should not be implemented. Upon receipt of the appeal by the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting, any action approved by the Council of Elders will be deferred pending further determination, except action that the Council of Elders may deem necessary to protect persons or assets. While such an appeal is pending, the church will not make any transfer of assets, amend its article of incorporation, or take any other action, which would interfere with the decision of the Council of Elders. The taking of any such action by the church will be considered a cancellation of the appeal and permit the immediate implementation of the decision of the Council of Elders.

There was a time of questions and comments, with much discussion.

- 40. Mark Ankeny closed the business session with prayer.

Wednesday, July 26, 11:00 a.m.

- 41. Following a brief break, Bryan Boyd read the fifth Core Value statement: "We are called to be agents of God's peace and love to everyone." The worship team led in singing, followed by a period of silence.

- 42. Rich Miller, for the Family Life Commission, introduced couples who are celebrating 50 years of marriage in 2000. Those honored were Harold and Marilyn Antrim (Newberg), Randall and Norma Emry (Talent), Charles and Jean Hanson (Newberg), Allen and Eudora Hester (Vancouver), Marvin and Roberta Kistler (Talent), Ray and Miriam Muhr (Hillsboro), Ralph and LaRue Kruger (Talent), Paul and

Patsy Miller (Talent), Marvin and Olive Mardock (Newberg), Lyle and Janet Wheeler (Newberg), and LeRoy and Josephine Gesner (South Salem).

- 43. Those attending the Youth Yearly Meeting were present in the service. Paul Bock, youth superintendent, led in singing "Instruments of Peace," carrying out the theme of this session. The YCCM team reported on the Bible schools they held in three churches this summer. Over 40 children made decisions for Christ at the Bible schools.

The new officers for Youth Yearly Meeting (YYM) were introduced. For high school YYM they are: Presiding Clerk - Stephanie Steinhorst, Assistant Clerk - Laurie Wing, Recording Clerk - Kat Wilson, Conference Coordinator - Doug Nagell, and Youth Representative - Steven Beardsley. For junior high YYM they are: Presiding Clerk - Steven Nagell, Assistant Clerk - Anthony Sargent, Recording Clerk - Ellie Saxton, and Conference Coordinator - Mark Schuchardt.

The epistles of High School and Junior High Youth Yearly Meeting were read:

Both groups also reported on their service projects during the week, going around the community doing random acts of kindness for people, and helping to clean up Memorial Park in Newberg.

Eric Anglin and Virginia Helm spoke in appreciation of the youth.

■ 44. The Board of Missions report was given by Clerk Ron Stansell. He highlighted the following mission actions, visions, and concerns: (1) A new fields task force, (2) Teaching Abroad – China, (3) Missionary retirement – Ed and Marie Cammack from Bolivia, and Allyn and Holly Dhynes leaving the work in Ramallah, (4) Extension to new fields in Bolivia and Peru, (5) Growth in number of congregations on both fields, (6) Peru Yearly Meeting difficulties. The Board would request prayer for them. (7) Furloughing missionaries – David and Debby Thomas from Rwanda, (8) Norval Hadley's resigning as director of Evangelical Friends Mission in 2001, and the need for new leadership for EFM with his retirement.

The Board is looking for new fields of service. They anticipate that by 2005 there will no longer be a need for full-time resident missionaries in Bolivia and Peru. We will have an ongoing relationship with them in the form of teachers, preachers, and medical workers, but they will be completely independent of Northwest Yearly Meeting supervision. Ethnic tensions around the world will affect future work of the Mission Board, and how we send missionaries. They will go as tent-making ministers in other countries, not as missionaries. Personal witness will be the mode as they work among the people. Some possible areas that the Board is considering are Morocco, Russia, and East Timor. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 45. Paul Bock led in the singing of "Instruments of Peace" in closing.

■ 46. Lynn Clouser Holt read the sixth Core Value statement: "We are called to live out God's love." She led in prayer. Bryan Boyd and Heather Taggart led in singing choruses and the hymn "My Jesus I Love Thee." The verses were interspersed with readings from John 14 and 15. A time of silent waiting followed with some verbal expressions.

■ 47. Vicki Stave, clerk of the Board of Peace and Social Concerns, gave the report. The 1999 Thanksgiving Offering amounted to \$12,000 and was divided between Laura's House of Peace (Scotts Mills, Oregon) and the translation of a book for Burundi Yearly Meeting. Carleta Baker Schroeder is an active participant with Christian Peacemaker Teams. The Board continues to seek others who might feel called to serve with this organization. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 48. Kent Thornburg, chairman of the Board of Trustees of George Fox University, reminded us that as a Yearly Meeting we own GFU, and we approve the nomination of persons to serve on the Board of Trustees, who carry out the wishes of the Yearly Meeting.

President David Brandt is traveling in Europe. He is now beginning his third year as president of the university. Kent praised his work and the creativity in his leadership. A special "Serve Day" was held September 1999 in which all students, faculty, and staff went out into the community and performed services for organizations and individuals. This was publicized not only in the local *Newberg Graphic*, but also in the *Portland Oregonian*.

New doctoral programs including Doctor of Ministry are being offered.

The Legacy Campaign, the largest fund-raising campaign that the university has ever had, was launched last spring. The goal is \$22,000,000. The desire of the Board of Trustees is to increase the endowment of GFU. Kent asked for prayer for the university that some of these goals can be reached, as well as maintaining the Christian witness and academic excellence. He led in prayer for the university. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 49. Julie Downs, clerk of the Ethnic Ministries Commission, reported. She emphasized that we need to have action not just words. This commission has provided scholarships to camp for children and youth from different ethnic backgrounds. They are sent in pairs, so they can learn to love each other. Other cross-cultural ministries are being planned, including a teaching situation where each one will teach one such as English/Spanish. (The written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 50. The Council of Elders, upon the recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Robert Hays be recorded as a minister of the gospel. This was approved.

■ 51. The Council of Elders, upon the recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Ron Lowry be recorded as a minister of the gospel. This was approved.

■ 52. The Council of Elders, upon the recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Trey Doty be recorded as a minister of the gospel. This was approved.

■ 53. The Council of Elders, upon the recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Doug Moore be recorded as a minister of the gospel. This was approved.

"Yearly Meeting Council of Elders" will be postponed until the 2001 Yearly Meeting sessions for a decision.

■ 56. The worship team led in the singing of "Blessed Be the Name of the Lord" in closing.

Thursday, July 27, 10:45 a.m.

■ 57. The session opened with the reading of the seventh Core Value statement: "The Holy Spirit transforms and empowers us." This was followed with the singing of "Be Thou My Vision" and "Holy Spirit, Come with Power."

■ 58. Thea Cowley led the Memorial Service, reading the names of those who have passed away during this past year. (This list is included in the Directories section.) Opportunity was given for persons to speak in tribute to these deceased members. The service closed with the singing of a chorus and prayer by Clerk Mark Ankeny.

Friday, July 28, 8:30 a.m.

■ 59. The meeting opened with a period of quiet worship and prayer. Mark Ankeny closed the time with prayer.

■ 60. Assistant Clerk Don Staples read the proposed revision to the *Faith and Practice* regarding "Committees of the Local Church" (page 22 of the *Faith and Practice*) as a first reading.

Committees are appointed by the church to oversee departmental interests and activities. [~~These committees are Elders, Education, Missions, Peace and Social Concerns, Nominating, and Stewardship (which includes the trustees). Fine Arts and Administrative committees are optional.~~] **Every church will appoint Elders, Nominating, and Stewardship committees. Churches will appoint Education, Missions, and Peace and Social Concerns committees or address these concerns in other ways. Additional committees such as Fine Arts or Administrative may be appointed as needed.**

Except as otherwise provided, each committee organizes itself by appointing a presiding clerk, an assistant clerk, and a recording clerk (or secretary). Other officers [~~and committees~~] may be appointed as needed. Clerks of committees should determine that the various areas of interest and concern are responsibly represented.

This was approved as a first reading.

■ 61. Tom Stave, clerk of the Revision Committee, spoke of some of the work of this committee. There are updated versions on the Internet on the Yearly Meeting web page; also Barclay Press can do an updated printed form.

■ 62. Jackie Hausinger read the report of the Epistle Committee, with excerpts from the epistles of many other yearly meetings, both in the United States and from other countries. She also read the Epistle from the Children's Yearly Meeting. This was approved.

To Quakers around the World:

We had lots of fun this year at Northwest Yearly Meeting. We spent our days hiking, canoeing, and swimming at Camp Tilikum.

At camp we learned how to use maps. We went on the big swing and zip line. We had lots of fun shooting arrows, and one of us even saw a water snake.

Jackie read the proposed Epistle from our yearly meeting to be sent to other yearly meetings. There were some suggested corrections and additions. The Epistle was approved with the suggested changes. Appreciation was expressed to Jackie for her work. She would like to have a workshop at next Yearly Meeting during which the epistle could be worked on together.

To Friends Everywhere:

Greetings from the 108th Sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting gathered on the George Fox University Campus in Newberg, Oregon, USA, held July 22 – 28, 2000. Our theme for these days has been, "Practicing the Presence: The Kingdom of God is Now." We were blessed with an attendance on Sunday evening of 918 adults and youth, and an average of 750 at the evening sessions during the week.

A generous offering was received at the Missions Rally for the purpose of sending a team to survey possible new missionary fields in Russia, Morocco, and East Timor. Although Northwest Yearly Meeting will maintain a ministry relationship with Friends in Bolivia and Peru in the form of teachers, preachers and medical workers, we do not plan to send full-time missionaries after the year 2005. Ethnic tensions around the world will affect future work of the Mission Board, and how we send missionaries. Future NWYM missionaries will likely go to other countries as tent-making ministers, using their professional skills to enhance conditions in the country and making personal witness as they work among the people.

Our speakers for three evenings and various workshops were Tom and Christine Sine, who work together assisting organizations both church and secular to evaluate how their world, nation and communities are changing so they can adapt more adequately to face the challenges of the 21st century. Emphasis was placed on formulating personal and family mission statements, and also on issues relating to changing our timestyle and lifestyle to develop a more Christ-centered spiritual rhythm for our lives as a contrast to the mindset of the media driven culture around us. We were admonished to consider ways of including Young Friends in leadership and planning creative ways of ministering to a world that is increasingly consumed with acquisition and brainwashed by advertising. This is the only way to prevent the decline in our churches and Yearly Meeting's viability and relevance, as we become an increasingly older population. We were blessed by the feelings of unity and warmth shared with the youth of our yearly meeting and found there was no dividing line between us during fellowship and worship.

This year our business and worship times were combined in order to arrive at a sense of the flow of the Holy Spirit as we moved from active to more quiet

times of community. This was a great success as many felt it was much easier to concentrate and center on Christ's leading among us. Values held by the Friends of NWYM were projected on overheads during our daytime sessions so that we might meditate on them in our meetings. As Friends listened to one another about concerns, they affirmed NWYM members who feel called to fellowship with Friends in other traditions. A task force was created to investigate what other Friends ministries that NWYM should affiliate with in the future.

God is giving much favor in the raising up of leaders and leadership teams of ministries for the planting of Friends meetings throughout the Northwest, which embody the values held by early Friends. There is a multitude of expressions, not unlike what is recorded in George Fox's journal, with openings as to effective ways to fulfill the ministry of reconciliation. One of the church plants, New Life Friends, has grown using the facilities of Rosemere Friends Church in Vancouver, WA, a long-time meeting, which was recently laid down. They now have a thriving ministry including a Christian biker group, and work together with a Christian drug and alcohol rehabilitation program. They count among their blessings 50 converts since their beginning just a little over a year ago.

It was with great joy that we recorded Trey Doty, Robert Hayes, Ron Lowry and Doug Moore as ministers of the Gospel during our sessions.

We left the times of fellowship and growth experienced during this Yearly Meeting aware that even though we might not always agree, we are all members of the same family of faith and that is a truth to be cherished.

■ 63. Ron Stansell, director of Evangelical Friends Church International, reported:

(1) The EFI Council has received a recommendation from the EFI-NA Region to form an EFI-Europe Region,

(2) Continued development of Great Lakes School of Theology (GLST) in Africa. Three inquiries have been received from NWYM members interested in teaching English at GLST.

(3) The EFI-Latin America Pastors Conference was held in Guatemala in December 1999, with total participation of about 280.

(4) The next EFI Council meeting will be held in March 2001 in Kathmandu, Nepal. This is the first time for the Council to meet outside the United States.

ADDENDUM ANNUAL REPORTS

July 2000

Council of Elders

During the 1999-2000 church year the Elders continued praying for the Yearly Meeting with special emphasis on our pastors and Yearly Meeting personnel. We have reviewed the state of the church reports and are pleased with the good results in many of our churches and are delighted with the success of the Yearly Meeting church planting work.

In the past, a major portion of our work has been in helping local churches in conflict resolution and helping congregations work through problems with moral failure of church leaders. This year we have had very few of these problems and have been able to be more proactive in praying for our pastors and churches.

At our annual retreat we gathered to pray for the Yearly Meeting, to discuss church leadership, God's call to Northwest Yearly Meeting, and the Elders role in responding to His call. We decided that our role in helping the Yearly Meeting realize its call would be best served next year if we would:

- Use the "State of the Church" reports more effectively, provocatively responding to any list of problem or discouragement.
- Area Elders would become acquainted with the local Elders clerks and pastors calling them occasionally to try and be an encouragement, and asking how we may be praying for them.
- We will continue discussing the issue of Church leadership to better understand how we ought to train and treat leaders.
- We will occasionally write "advises and commentaries" on issues that we have visited and discussed.
- We will continue to work on a code of ethics for pastors.
- We will trust the Holy Spirit and each other.

We are encouraged by God's work among the various elements of the Yearly Meeting and feel a spirit of renewal in our people. We remain persuaded that Christ is the answer and that if we faithfully follow Him, He will lead us into a magnificent future.

Board of Education DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

The Department of Church Education has worked on several concerns this past year. The Department has felt the need for a person to work, at least part time, in coordinating the efforts to get information and aid to local churches. This need became much more acute when Phil Baisley (former Christian Education Consultant for Evangelical Friends International/North America Region) took another position and moved out of the Northwest. A job description for such a person has

been completed and applications have been solicited. No person has been hired due, in part, to a lack of funds. This concern will continue to be pursued.

The Department was very pleased with the Children's Yearly Meeting in 1999. Irene Rice gave great leadership to the program. We met with Irene during Mid-year Board meetings to discuss some ideas she had for improving the program. We are happy to report that she will be able to continue this year as the coordinator for Children's Yearly Meeting. Obtaining proper help for the evening program for the children was a problem for Irene. She has suggested that each member of the Department solicit people to serve in this capacity for a night or two during Yearly Meeting. This and other changes discussed at Midyear will be evaluated after Yearly Meeting 2000.

The Department appreciates the churches returning their annual report forms to us promptly. These are analyzed in detail. The information gained is used to decide what the Department could do to assist the local churches in the very fine work they are doing in church education.

The Department invited Harold Behr, director of New Church Development, to help brainstorm ways the Department could be effectively involved in the church plants. He suggested several ideas that we will try to implement over the next year. One of these – saving useable education material – has been passed on to some of the churches. The Department has been able to give Harold some material that will be useful in church planting. This idea will continue to be explored.

The Child Protection Policy has been approved and is being implemented in several churches that had not used one before. A workshop was held during Yearly Meeting sessions last year to answer questions about the suggested policy for local churches. One church has reported that having a policy in place and following it saved them from becoming involved in a bad situation. The policy is in place and used for Yearly Meeting youth activities. A workshop will be held on Thursday, July 27, on implementing the policy in the local church.

A web page is being designed for the Department.

The Mission Board has requested that the Department cooperate with them in publishing a child's version of "Keeping Current." This was accepted favorably by the Department and will continue to be pursued.

The Department would like to keep adding material to the Power Pack as funds permit. A "Power Pouch" will be provided for each meeting during Yearly Meeting 2000. This is designed to add to the Power Pack at each church. Funds may limit what can be provided.

To the many volunteers that work as Sunday school teachers, VBS leaders and teachers, church youth leaders, clerks and members of Education committees and ministry teams, pastors that care about Church education, the people who support with prayer and finances, we give you our thanks for the wonderful job you are doing. Your efforts are effective and appreciated. The Department wishes to do anything that will aid you, encourage you, and make your work easier and more pleasant.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

The traditional roles of the Department of General Education have been oversight of the Northwest Yearly Meeting seminary scholarships, George Fox University scholarships for Quaker students, and support for Quaker primary/secondary schools. The Department of Christian Testimonies continues to meet with the General Education Department till a future date.

The Department has continued to support ten seminary students preparing for pastoral roles within the Yearly Meeting. The students are attending five seminary/graduate programs that offer programs compatible with their spiritual gifts and call. The current support is 50% of the tuition costs.

The Board of Education met for the fall retreat at Reedwood Friends (Portland) on October 14 and 15.

Midyear Board meetings were held in Newberg on January 28-29, 2000. A review of the yearly meeting workshops sponsored by our department was completed. The current status of our seminary students was reviewed. Joe Gerick was invited to discuss current pastoral leadership needs and how this department could modify our programs to meet these needs. The clerk introduced a new seminary loan/grant policy for discussion. The policy will be "polished" by John Beck for further discussion during July. Agenda items for Yearly Meeting July 2000 were discussed.

The GFU/Church/NWYM partnership continues to provide scholarships for NWYM youth attending GFU. The University will match (up to \$600) any church contribution and the Yearly Meeting contribution is \$200.

DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH

The Department released Paul and Sheila to work on their own vision for youth programming at the Yearly Meeting level. There was a concern that the amount of programming that they do does not allow them ample time to develop their own vision and goals. The Department asked them to come next year with ideas to lessen the programming stressors and with their own goals to work on. The Depart-

ment as a whole felt encouraged as youthworkers by Paul and Sheila. The Department also is trying to find ways to encourage youthworkers who are not involved at the Yearly Meeting level. Other business topics included Youthworkers Training Conference, Friends Youth Exec., and clerking of the Department. The clerk of this department will be asked to agree to a three-year commitment so there is consistency.

Friends Youth Exec's purpose is to be a community focused on ministering to the Youth of Northwest Yearly Meeting. The primary activities we organize are the Youth Calendar, Midwinter camp, the Volleyball tournament, and the summer Youth-Challenge programs.

This year Friends Youth Exec (FYE) struggled to learn what it means to be a living community, learning and growing together in worship and in fun. We didn't exactly set out to work so hard at learning what it means to have a "meeting for worship to conduct business," but that's precisely what we ended up doing. Over the course of the year, we went through a process of discovering our group's personality and realizing our need to seek Christ's living presence in our business. Through trial and error, we began to understand how to support and respect one another as we listened for God, laughing and sweating over the year's work. The thirteen of us met for a two-hour meeting once a week to snack and to pursue God's presence, and in the course of all that, get some planning done too. Beginning meetings with a member-led spiritual practice and ending with a time to share our openings and blocks in hearing God's voice were methods that helped us to develop a listening center and gave us opportunity both for affirmation and for learning from our mistakes. From the gatheredness of our business meetings, our ministry to the youth of NWYM developed in concrete and exciting ways.

Calendar

FYE's purpose in creating this picture and fun-fact-filled calendar is to foster a sense of community within the youth of the yearly meeting. We make no profit on this venture, but send about 1500 out each year to every youth in the yearly meeting's database. That's a lot of calendars. Our hope is that the proceeds from the V-ball tournament will cover the costs of this ministry.

Midwinter

In the planning of this year's Midwinter camp, FYE felt a particularly strong sense of the movement of Christ in our body. Previously, this high-school ski retreat over Christmas break has been 5-days long, but we planned for 3 days this year to minimize Y2K concerns. Members of FYE, trying to collect ideas for speakers and teachers for this brief retreat, felt clear direction to lead the camp entirely from

within our community. That is, FYE members led worship, FYE members counseled, FYE members spoke, and FYE members taught the classes. We established a system of accountability within the group to assure appropriate and careful leadership, and God was surely present. Midwinter was held at Rose Valley Friends Church December 26 – 29, with a ski/tubing trip to Mt. Hood. The proceeds from this year's camp will go to pay for campground facilities next year, keeping camp costs low.

Volleyball

George Fox University welcomed 44 high school youth groups from NWYM, April 17-19, this spring for the annual youth Volleyball tournament. The teams competed in three divisions: Quaker (competitive), and Friends A & B (just here to have fun). Youth groups from out of town stayed at local churches for Friday and Saturday nights, and games were played Friday afternoon and all day Saturday. Champions were: Quaker Division – Newberg I, Friends A – East Hill/McKinley Hill, Friends B – Silverton, and Sportsmanship – North Valley. Some ideas FYE is considering for next year include: having teams vote on a sportsmanship award, and cutting the Saturday evening pizza feed in favor of double-elimination for all teams and a longer tournament. FYE is especially grateful for the many people who volunteered in various capacities throughout the tournament.

YCAM

Due primarily to a lack of adult team-leadership, this year the Youth Challenged through Arts in Ministry team was not developed. We hoped to spend this year cultivating interest in the program and focusing more intently on the other two teams. It is the first year we have implemented this three-year rotation: next year YCEW and YCAM will be sent, the following year YCAM and YCCM, and then YCEW and YCCM will be sent again in 2003.

YCCM

This year's Youth Challenged through Children's Ministry team will visit three NWYM churches, running summer VBS programs with churches that have difficulty developing and supporting such programming. This team emphasizes children's ministry and community service, and is an opportunity for high-schoolers interested in ministry to learn principles of leadership, community development, service, and spiritual challenge. The leaders for this year's team are Liz Sugden and Janelle Davis.

YCEW

The most popular Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview trip has consistently been the Bolivia and Peru trip, and this year was certainly no exception. A trip designed to be a cross-cultural experience with an emphasis on missions and spiritual development, YCEW rotates between in-country and overseas trips. The 8-member team will work with missionaries in South America during their four-week expedition this summer, beginning with a week of orientation and ending with a week of debriefing. The leaders for this year's YCEW team are Wayne and Bev Chapman.

YC teams will report on their experiences during Yearly Meeting sessions in July.

Board of Evangelism

"In the beginning God created..." and today God is still in the business of creating, renewing and restoring His people. This year we have seen God's creative energy in some powerful ways as new works have been established and supported and as new leaders are identified, trained and unleashed for ministry. One day when I sit my grandchildren on my lap I'm going to tell them stories about what God is doing right now in our Yearly Meeting.

Last year's decision to hire two full-time staff members is already bearing much fruit. Bruce Bishop, our field secretary of Leadership Development, has been actively working with young adults and others within our Yearly Meeting to respond to God's call on their life, to take on positions of leadership within the Yearly Meeting, and to use their gifts for God's glory. Bruce has furthered our board's goals through his one-on-one contacts and through his leadership of various programs, including:

- The "Quaker Leaders Program." This program at George Fox University offers a two-year scholarship for qualifying applicants to develop leadership within our young adults through hands-on experience, forums, mentors, and special speakers. Twenty-three NWYM young adults will benefit from this program this year. It is funded by the Friends Church Extension Foundation.
- The "Call To Ministry Conference" brought together over 90 adults of all ages. Each attendee was examining a potential Call to ministries of outreach. Extensive follow-up is being orchestrated by Bruce.
- A Lay Leadership retreat in October, led by members of Washington D.C.'s Church of the Savior, challenged 60 local church leaders to consider how they might recognize and pursue individual concerns and ministries.
- Support resources for our pastors' pursuit of their own spiritual journey have been provided through a worship planning team for Pastors' Conference, and a new series of retreats for pastors called "The Sabbath Series." The Sabbath Series will occur three times a year and provide spiritual refreshment and resources for the inward journey.
- Clerk training and resources for strengthening our existing churches will be an emphasis of Bruce's ministry this coming year.

Harold Behr, director of New Works Development, is unrelenting in his zeal for creating new opportunities for the birth and growth of new ministries.

- For some time Harold Behr has been developing an Assessment Center I. This is an assessment process in which potential candidates for leadership of our new works are interviewed and assessed as to their readiness. This is a front end "gate" for the birthing of New Church Development within NWYM, is tailor-made for our own Yearly Meeting, and is a requirement through which all of our future leaders must pass. Upon completion each candidate receives a personal profile derived from careful discernment and a skills assessment that helps them know the "next steps" as each candidate learns their strengths as well as the areas where they can improve.
- VisionQuest workshops have been successful in helping create a forum for the cultivation, development, and sharing of God's vision for ministry. There were 35 in attendance who have felt led to plant a new work, four couples received clear vision as to where and when to begin with NWYM. Several other couples are well on their way to envisioning the kind of church and the location they are to plant as well. Harold reports that to date we have approximately 25 leadership couples — about half from within and the other half being led to join Friends, all of whom are called to plant churches within our Yearly Meeting, sometime over the next two years.
- This fall Harold Behr will host a series of monthly seminars using the results from the Assessment Process profiles as a blueprint for determining subject or dimensional emphasis, based on certain skills and knowledge requirements necessary for new works leaders to have. These are monthly Saturday Seminars in Newberg and will be the last Saturday of each month.
- The "New Works Interchange" has been a communications media established for sharing reports, needs, nets, etc., with the Yearly Meeting and beyond in written form with the newsletter (two so far this year) and with the E-Group new-worksxchange@e-groups.com. Another component of the Interchange has been the series of developmental workshops with and for anyone sensing the call to be involved. These have been well attended with marvelous encounters with the presence of God!
- One suggestion the board has for our churches to reach out to our neighbors is through the Lighthouse Movement (www.lighthousemovement.com) (our group number is 81884), a national interdenominational ministry that seeks to have a "lighthouse on every corner." This is a well-organized ministry started by the Navigators and many of our Friends churches are signing up and are becoming involved in a practical and powerful way to minister to and reach their neighbors for Christ.
- LaGrande is one of our recent new works in which David and Carla Arnold have started a new church that seeks to engage the culture in LaGrande with Friends truth.
- Trey Doty, formerly teamed with Dan Banham at City's Edge, is engaged in planting a work in Northwest Portland. He is well into the process of building and organizing a core group, and at last count had eight meeting to explore this ministry point.
- There is much encouraging news we are receiving from new works already under way. At New Life Friends in Vancouver, Dave White reports many fruits of God's working including: average worship attendance of over 85, extensive remodeling and over 50 fresh commitments to Christ. New Life has also hired Mike and Carmen Slothower as associate pastors.

Four Summits and City's Edge have been experiencing significant growth. Both of these new churches are contributing much to the NW Project with Trey Doty. Cave Junction has been blessed by the addition of two "worker couple" families, healthy, mature and enjoying the ministry.

There are several other new works taking shape on the horizon including a new work in Forest Grove involving West Chehalis Friends and David and Karen Gilmore, as well as possible new works that could develop in the Klamath Basin, Ashland, Grants Pass, Redmond, Culver, Bend, Wheeler, Seattle, and possibly a Native American church here in the Northwest. Harold Behr believes next year could easily see the emergence of six to twelve new Friends Meetings!

In many places God is granting a series of beautiful and fresh visions for new Friends churches that will reach the unchurched in brand new ways. The Board during Yearly Meeting will get to hear a number of couples share who sense a call to start a new work. There are a few spiritual hotbeds where the Spirit of God is calling monthly meetings and numbers of mature leaders to enter the fields through church multiplication. Central Oregon, the coast, and southern Oregon, as well as the Portland area are examples of this.

One Board of Evangelism policy that was changed at Midyear Boards was a condition and limit of funds that will be available for future qualifying new works. The maximum amount of funds available for a new work is \$24,000 (\$1,000 a month for two years) and will match the funds raised by the leadership of the new work. Experience has shown that leadership that can effectively launch a ministry with a healthy financial base also has the visioning capacity and skills to grow a healthy ministry.

At Midyear Boards Kevin Gilbert offered his resignation as clerk of the Board because of health and personal issues. Kevin felt clear that God wanted him to lay down some responsibilities in order to refocus on God's direction for the future.

Core Values

One Core Value our Board is upholding is that because "God is the source of all life, all human life is sacred" and all people are to be treated with respect and dignity, regardless of human measures of merit or value. This is obvious in that many of our new works and dreams of new works includes ministries that cross cultural and economic lines, ministering to people who are like us as well as people who are different from us. Each life is unique and sacred.

We also pursue the Core Value that "We are called to be and to make followers of Christ." In our efforts to support the ongoing ministry of our established churches, and encourage the planting of new works that will reach new people, our goal is to introduce people to a transforming relationship with the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

Board of Ministerial Service

During these year 2000 sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting, the Board of Ministerial Service is pleased to recommend the following persons for recording as Friends ministers in Northwest Yearly Meeting:

Trey Doty, a member at Sherwood Friends Church, currently engaged in church planting in northwest Portland. Trey and his wife, Stephanie, have one daughter, Haley Nicole, age 3 1/2. As many will recall, Trey served in youth ministry at

Vancouver and Lynwood Friends prior to sensing a call to begin "City's Edge," a ministry to the unchurched, based first at Lynwood and then in the Beaverton area. During the past year, Trey felt directed to leave that ministry in order to begin a work in northwest Portland (NW 23rd Street off Burnside). He is building a core group which now meets weekly, making contacts, and casting his vision for reaching people in that area for Christ.

Robert Hays, pastor at Post Falls Friends Church. Robert and Sue (Ferguson) Hays have three children, ages nine to four – Cameron, Brianna and Cedric. Prior to coming to Post Falls in 1994, Robert served seven years in Iowa Yearly Meeting. Robert is a graduate of Barclay College, Haviland, KS, where he sensed God's call to ministry during his junior year. After completing his work at Barclay, Robert completed some work at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School.

Ron Lowry, pastor at Melba Friends Church. Ron grew up in the Nazarene church in Idaho but did not respond to God's call to ministry until he was 32 years old. Following God's call, he and Roberta moved to Kansas where Ron worked part-time as a youth pastor while finishing his degree at Barclay College. After serving full time for two years at Camp Quaker Haven, he and Roberta responded to a call to come to Melba Friends as pastor in 1992. Ron and Roberta have two children, R.J. and Roxy.

Doug Moore, staff member at Rose Valley Friends Church. Doug was dramatically converted as an adult from deep involvement in drugs and alcohol through the faithful prayers of his wife, Teri, and others at Rose Valley Friends. About six years ago he began to sense a call to ministry after he attended his first Promise Keepers rally. In the years to follow, that call intensified until, in obedience to Christ, he quit his secular job and made himself available to the church for ministry. (He now serves on staff with a small stipend.) Doug and Teri have three children, ages 17 to 8 – Stephanie, Dustin and McKenzie.

During this past year, the Board of Ministerial Service has continued to struggle with two vital, but very different concerns: 1) exercising discernment on the recording of men and women who are genuinely called of God and gifted in proclamational ministry; and 2) encouraging adequate training, accountability and excellence in ministry among those who are pastoring in Northwest Yearly Meeting, as well as those planning to do so. In seeking to deal with these issues in practical ways, considerable time was devoted to these issues at our Fall Retreat in October 1999. In addition, several members of the board led a discussion on some of these issues at Pastors Conference at Twin Rocks in May of this year.

In addition, the board has sought to improve our communication with local monthly meetings by assigning more specific responsibilities to individual board members who serve as "candidate clerks" for persons currently in the recording process. Further, we are pleased to announce that the "Handbook for Recording" (distributed originally by our board to all monthly meetings in 1991) has been updated and sent to local meetings to be included in their Elders Handbooks. We are also happy to announce that Mark Kelley, pastor at Vancouver Friends, has now assumed a new role as clerk of our board.

All of us continue to value our stewardship to the Yearly Meeting which involves providing counsel and direction over a span of many months to those whom local meetings recommend for recording.

Board of Missions

During the past year the Board of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting has continued to seek the Lord's leading concerning the "new thing" which we have felt called to pursue in response to the Great Commission and, as a result of the maturity of churches in Bolivia and Peru. A task force has been meeting and discussing various options and is bringing three suggestions of possible new fields to the Yearly Meeting, suggesting that further surveys be undertaken. We have been reminded of Christ's words in John 4:35b where He said, "...open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest." As we began to look at the world with inquiring eyes, we have been surprised at how narrow our focus had become. We continue to look for ways to broaden our vision and pray that churches across the Yearly Meeting will be challenged to greater vision in all forms of outreach.

One "new thing" was brought to our attention in November of last year as we were challenged by Dennis Hagen to send teachers into China to teach English in high schools and universities. While they live and teach in China, of course they will have opportunity to live out their Christian faith before students and faculty. At its fall retreat the Board approved moving ahead with that project and set a goal of sending six to ten teachers by the fall of 2000. God has blessed that vision and has called seven well-qualified teachers to accompany *Dennis and Janet Hagen* (Tigard). Participants this year include *Jim and Rebecca Teeters* (Kent), *Roxie Quick* (Rose Valley), *Dorothy Sherman* (Camas), *Cheryl Engel* (Star), *Marilyn Harmon* (Netarts) and *Erin McKinney* (Newberg). They will leave for China on August 26, 2000 for a 10-month assignment. Pray for these as they go and pray that next year we might be able to send 20 to 25 teachers into this wide-open field.

As Allyn and Holly Dhyne finish their third year of teaching in Ramallah, Palestine, they have decided not to return next year. They have been tentmakers under Friends United Meeting, teaching, working with children, and helping to build a Christ-centered worship experience in Ramallah. NWYM provided only partial support to encourage ministry opportunities outside the school. As they return to the Northwest, they plan to live in the Portland area and get more education, in preparation for future ministry. While the Ramallah experience has been a worthwhile effort in ministering to Muslims, we have had no candidates apply to teach in Ramallah in the year 2000-2001.

Our relationship with and support of Evangelical Friends Mission in Arvada, Colorado continues to be strong and rewarding. The Lord is blessing the work of Evangelical Friends around the world on at least 22 fields. It is noteworthy to report that Norval Hadley, Executive Director of EFM, has submitted his resignation effective June 2001. A search committee has been named to coordinate the search for a replacement. Please be in prayer that the right person will be found for that position.

The Bolivian and Peruvian field reports follow. These include information about the work of Hal and Nancy Thomas and their assignment to found and co-direct a graduate program in missiology at the Bolivian Evangelical University. They will continue to work with BEU 3/4 time and will work with the Friends churches 1/4 time. They are now the only Friends missionaries in Santa Cruz. The following reports also include information about the formation of the Friends Center on the campus of BEU, led by Diego Chuyma. God is blessing that ministry! There are 18 Friends students participating in that program.

BOLIVIA FRIENDS MISSION LA PAZ REGION

NWYM Missionary Staff

Jerry, Kerri, Melissa (11), and Rachel (9) Clarkson: The Clarkson family began their second term of missionary service, their fourth year of work in Bolivia. They live and work in the city of La Paz while occasionally visiting the Yungas, Alto Beni, and Beni jungle valleys, and Cochabamba, as well as areas of the Altiplano and North Bolivian Andes.

Jerry's primary duties include pastoral training, administrative counsel to the national church leaders, and leadership development. Other responsibilities include church visitation and preaching, training and participating with national missionaries, teaching in the Christian Education Bible Institute of INELA – Perú, Mission Joint Council secretary, and treasurer for the Interdenominational Committee for Theological Education by Extension.

Kerri's primary responsibility is homeschooling of Melissa and Rachel. She leads a monthly meeting of young Bolivian Friends women. Kerri has been a gracious host for several visiting groups as well as to national pastors and leaders. Beginning in May, duties as Bolivia Field treasurer were passed to Kerri.

THE NATIONAL EVANGELICAL FRIENDS CHURCH OF BOLIVIA (INELA – Bolivia)

Bolivia Yearly Meeting has been in a state of organizational transition for three years as they adapt to and work with their new constitution.

The current national directors of INELA are Miguel Cirilo Aruquipa – President; Johnny Santalla – Secretary; Celso Cutipa – Treasurer; David Tintaya – Secretary of Education and Social Concerns; Diego Chuyma – Secretary of Missions, Evangelism, and Ministries. La Paz Regional directors are Tomas Rodriguez – Executive Secretary; Elias Mamani – Recording Secretary; Jesus Torrez – Treasurer; Victor Quispe – Secretary of Missions; Nicolas Condori – Secretary of Education; Bernabé Yujra – Secretary of Social Concerns; Gregorio Vargas – Secretary of Pastoral Ministries.

INELA MISSIONS

The National Missions Program of INELA continues to grow even though NWYM support has remained at a constant level for several years. Local congregations are beginning to develop a vision for evangelism of remote departments and cultures within Bolivia.

Missionary **Dionisio Lucasi** is in his seventh year of missionary service, his fourth year of work in the Alto Beni, and the Beni. Ten active congregations are now thriving in the Alto Beni valley. These congregations are now locally led and pastored, receiving only continuing training and occasional visits from Dionisio. The Alto Beni should soon become a separate Quarterly Meeting District.

Contacts with the Chimani tribal people, near Yucumo in the Beni Department, led to their requesting evangelism meetings, biblical teaching, and leadership training. Along with the INELA Missions Committee, Dionisio has developed a three-phase evangelism and social welfare plan for use among the Chimani. Current work is centering in further evangelism, initial discipleship, and literacy training. Phase two should begin in the year 2001 and focus on discipleship and agricultural training (the Chimani are a nomadic people that have settled into farming village only in recent years). Phase three will develop ecclesiastical and community leadership

among the Chimani. This three-phase plan may soon be primarily supported by New Hebron Friends Church, El Alto, La Paz. One Chimani village is constructing their first worship building on tribal property, by tribal decision, and with tribal methods. Pray for Dionisio as he works among the Chimani, Mosetain, and other people and as he continues to be away from his wife and daughter for long periods of time.

Missionaries **Antonio and Julia Mamani** with their three children, **Shalom, Abigail, and David**, have lived three years in the city of Cochabamba, evangelizing and establishing new congregations. One congregation is now well established and two others are growing into discipleship and leadership training centers. New Jerusalem Friends Church primarily supports this effort. Recently NWYM donated \$5,000 toward the purchase of property in Cochabamba, part of a \$15,000 to \$20,000 project.

Missionaries **Crispin and Narcisa Cruz** and daughter **Lidia**, moved in early October from La Paz to Sucre as missionaries. Sucre is one of the oldest cities in Bolivia and the people of Sucre are very traditional. Aymará immigrants from La Paz established a Friends congregation in Sucre in 1995. This congregation is now more than half Quechua people native to Sucre, and they have a vision to reach out to neighborhoods surrounding Sucre to establish several more congregations. This mission project is supported by Villa Tunari Friends Church, El Alto, La Paz.

Sixto and Susan Mamani completed four years of service in the far South Yungas area. The seven congregations established in that area formed the new La Asunta District. The Mamani family remains in the area as self-supported pastors of the Cotipata Friends Church.

Valerio Corani and his new wife have recently begun work in the city of Oruro and the outlying region of the Oruro Department bordering the Potosi Department. This work is partially supported by the New Hope Friends Church, La Paz. Pray especially for the development of this new work. The Corani family face opposition between feuding Aymará and Quechua villages.

Due mostly to the National Missions Program INELA reports 220 congregations under the supervision of the La Paz Region. Many of these congregations are growing and in the process of new building or expanding existing buildings. New Jerusalem Friends Church has begun a program of two worship services in order to accommodate over 400 attendees.

Education:

The INELA – La Paz Region has a desire and vision to develop an accredited Bible institute and seminary available to La Paz and El Alto pastors, leaders, and youth and possibly available to Yungas and Altiplano residents without travel to the city. Due to the continuing educational reforms by the government of Bolivia developing an accredited training center has become very difficult. Current theological education offered by INELA – La Paz or associated with INELA now occurs at three levels.

1. Theological Education by Extension: Many years ago the Mission began developing a series of self-study textbooks for pastoral training. Other missions joined in this effort and formed the Interdenominational Committee for Theological Education by Extension (ICTEE). Each mission maintained its own administrative center, i.e., Patmos Extension Bible Institute of Bolivia Friends Mission. The Mission completely turned over the administration of Patmos to INELA during recent years and has only acted in an advisory capacity and participated in teacher train-

ing workshops during the past year. INELA renamed the extension program EBAD – Biblical Education at a Distance. EBAD now has 13 study centers in El Alto, the Altiplano, and the Yungas with over 150 students training to enter pastoral or supportive ministerial fields.

During this year ICTEE has been turned over to national administration. The national organization is named SIETE – Society for Theological Education by Extension – and is composed of representatives of various holiness denominations. The Mission continues to act as counsel to the treasurer and editorial counsel.

2. Integral Theological Education: In order to begin to realize the goal of an accredited Bible institute INELA – La Paz has developed a system of theological education integrated into the lifestyle of university students studying professional or semi-professional fields. CETI – R, Center for Integral Residential Theological Education, offers five weekly night classes to 28 students. Jerry Clarkson teaches Theology and Friends Doctrine, Theology, and History courses in this program. The program has been self-supported and only recently needed Mission funding in order to support a director who can complete the government requirements for accreditation.

INELA offers an intensive training program for rural pastors and youth in the Caranavi – Alto Beni District; CETI – Mobile. Four times annually well-trained pastors from La Paz and El Alto travel to the Yungas for one week to direct four intensive short classes. Jerry Clarkson has taught Hermeneutics and an Introduction to Biblical Languages in this program.

3. San Pablo Theological Seminary (SPST): INELA and the Mission both cooperate with other holiness denominations in the administration and promotion of this Seminary. SPST has asked to become a recognized extension of Bolivian Evangelical University in order to remain an accredited program. One hundred students from eight denominations attend SPST, eight students from INELA. During the Year at SPST Jerry Clarkson has taught Introduction to Missiology, Christian Ethics, and a workshop Introduction to Biblical Studies by Computer.

Other INELA Programs: INELA maintains several programs apart from Mission assistance. Among these programs are a medical clinic in La Paz rented out to a local doctor and dentist, a medical clinic on the Tiquina Peninsula attended by a visiting physician, two urban academies and six rural schools, and several children's care centers supported by Compassion International. Some of these programs have been partially funded by Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC) and/or Quaker Bolivian Link (London).

Mission Goals for the Next Year:

1. To assist INELA – Bolivia to work through its administrative difficulties and develop a functional structure and constitution.
2. To encourage development of means of internal spiritual and economic support for national missions and evangelism programs.
3. To continue to cooperate in training and discipleship programs as invited to do so by INELA, SPST, SIETE, or other like institutions.

SANTA CRUZ REGION

Ed and Marie Cammack and Hal and Nancy Thomas lived and ministered in Santa Cruz throughout the year.

Hal and Nancy Thomas: Hal and Nancy are serving in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, working with the Bolivian Evangelical University. They are busily founding and co-directing a graduate school of missiology there. This past year they offered the first courses and have had around 25 students. They both teach and work together to administer the program. As an extension of the missiology program at the university, they have cooperated with other organizations in sponsoring camps and retreats for possible missionary candidates and for local pastors.

They divide their time giving approximately one-fourth of their time to Friends work. This has given them opportunity to meet with the Santa Cruz Regional Mesa Directiva, preaching and teaching in various churches, and developing lots of one-on-one relationships. Nancy also tries to give regular time to writing for publication. Hal continues to work on his Ph.D. dissertation.

Ed and Marie Cammack: Ed and Marie Cammack ministered among the Santa Cruz, Sucre and Cochabamba Friends churches. This ministry consisted of preaching, teaching, counseling, encouraging, praying and being a friend.

Ed worked closely with the Friends Theological Center Board in its administration and development. The student body increased from seven students in 1999 to 17 students in 2000. Diego Chuyma continues to be the director. He teaches Friends Theological Center courses and in the Theology Department of BEU. The students are responding well to applying what they learn in their lives and ministries in the churches. The Friends Theological Center is in need of a room for an office, library, study and computer area. The Friends Theological Center is fulfilling a critical need in the INELA for students to get a BA in Theological Education. These men and women will be excellent leaders in the future.

The Cammacks enjoyed being pastors to the pastors and wives. Monthly Pastors Fellowships took place in their home. These were rich times in fellowship, sharing and prayer. They encourage pastors individually during the year, pray for them regularly and visit in their churches.

The churches in the Santa Cruz Region are doing well. They experienced numerical growth as well as spiritual growth. Quarterly the churches meet together for a worship service. This helps them to be more united in a common vision and mission.

Ed was the Mission representative on the Bolivian Evangelical University Board. He served as Vice-President last year. David Tintaya was the secretary. The Bolivian Ministry of Education rated BEU as one of the best private universities in Bolivia. The highlight of the year for Marie was her discipleship and quilting classes. These classes taught the women to work together in community. The lives of many ladies experienced spiritual transformation. It's amazing how God used quilting to draw women into a closer relationship with Him and one another.

The Cammacks' ministries among the Sucre and Cochabamba Friends were fruitful. They are maturing and becoming better established. Bolivian National Missionaries are working with these congregations in evangelism, discipleship, and theological education classes.

All in all there is a very positive feeling about the work here in Santa Cruz. The Lord is definitely working and using these churches to reach out to those around them.

PERU FRIENDS MISSION

Introduction: Once again it is time to report to Northwest Yearly Meeting what God has been able to accomplish through its mission staff in the country of Peru during the past church year.

It has been a challenging year on almost every front. We know that many of you pray and give faithfully for the work in Peru. We want to encourage you to continue doing so fervently perhaps using this report as a guide. These are critical days for the future of Friends as an organized body in Peru. We desire with our whole heart that people would be obedient to God's Spirit so that His body could be healthy and whole, a living testimony to the love and power of God.

Personnel

A. Northwest Yearly Meeting Staff

1. **Dan, Tami, Forrest (13), Rebekah (10), and William (6) Cammack:** The Cammack family is completing their thirteenth year as missionaries to Peru under NWYM. This year they were on furlough in the states making their residence in Newberg, Oregon. Forrest, Rebekah, and William all had positive experiences attending public school in Newberg. The entire family traveled extensively throughout NWYM aptly sharing the mission vision wherever there was an interested audience. They did a missionary-in-residence assignment at West Chehalis Friends in Newberg, Oregon. The end of June they returned to live in Puno, Peru.

2. **Ken, Tonya, and Katie (6) Comfort:** The Comfort family is also completing their thirteenth year as missionaries to Peru under NWYM. They continue living in Puno, Peru.

Ken is responsible for evangelism and church expansion, encouragement of Peru national missionaries, and serves as the Mission representative to Peru Yearly Meeting's (PYM) executive council and as advisor to the national youth organization (UJELAP). Other responsibilities include church visitation, preaching, teaching, counseling, training and encouragement of national church leaders and pastors, and teaching in the resident Bible school (IBEC). Because of Dan's absence this year, he was also heavily involved in the administration of IBEC, more involved in other areas of the educational program in Peru, and responsible for the bookstore ministry. For the Mission he is legal representative in Peru and chairman of the Joint Council of Bolivia and Peru.

Tonya is treasurer for the Peru field, cares for official correspondence, and hosts visitors. She also taught Katie at home finishing kindergarten in mid-June.

This year the Comforts traveled extensively as a family to encourage the coastal churches in Arequipa, Tacna, and Ilo. They also serve as the Mission contact for the Medical Team ministry in cooperation with David Christopher of Folkways Institute and as advisors for the ALPACA Project sponsored by World Concern/Christian Veterinary Mission and administered on site by Dr. Janice Fuquay.

B. Bolivian National Missionaries (under direction of PYM)

1. **Esteban, Gaby, and Jonathan (6) Ajnota:** Arriving in Peru from Santa Cruz, Bolivia, in January 1997, the Ajnotas were responsible for ministry in the city of Arequipa primarily in the area of leadership training. Esteban also helped PYM develop its plans for seminary-level training and taught extensively in the IBEC program. In November 1999, the family retired from missionary service in Peru and returned to Bolivia. Esteban returned to Peru to teach in IBEC during the month of March 2000.

C. Peruvian National Missionaries (under direction of PYM)

1. **Teodoro Alanguia:** Teodoro comes from Andes Quarterly Meeting. In December 1999, he completed his second year as a national missionary in Peru. During that time he worked extensively encouraging churches in the Alto Andino Quarterly Meeting.

2. **Fernando Choque:** Fernando comes from the city of Tacna which is part of the Coast Quarterly Meeting. In December 1999, he completed his second year as a national missionary in Peru. During that time he worked extensively encouraging churches in the Coast Quarterly Meeting (specifically in the cities of Tarata, Tarucachi, and Ilo).

NATIONAL CHURCH ORGANIZATION (INELA)

Peru Yearly Meeting chooses its leadership from within its membership at an annual representatives' meeting held early each new calendar year. Current national church leadership (executive committee) includes: President - Constantino Garcia; Vice President - Lino Limaseca; Secretary - Ramon Mamani; Treasurer - Jorge Mamani; Secretary of Evangelism - Juan Layme; Secretary of Education - Felipe Quispe; IBLA Director - Bernardo Paredes; plus a representative from each quarterly meeting. This body meets the first Saturday of each month to carry out the work of Peru Yearly Meeting.

Education:

A. **Theological Education by Extension (TEE/IBLA):** Even though the IBLA program (Instituto Biblico Los Amigos) is in the hands of PYM, the Mission continues to support the program in many ways. Besides serving as advisors to the IBLA director and his committee, we also transport Theological Education by Extension materials (TEE) from LaPaz, Bolivia, to Peru and make those materials available to students at a very moderate cost. NWYM missionaries no longer teach in the program, but we offer encouragement to national teachers through teacher training workshops and other incentives.

Teodoro Chambi was director until the end of December 1999. At that time Bernardo Paredes was named director for a two-year period. This year there were two new graduates from the program: Eusebio Quispe (Catamuro) and Nestor Garcia (Garcia) both in the Brillante Quarterly Meeting. This year there have been 60 students studying in nine active teaching centers with eight different national teachers. In addition, four pastors are studying independently and being tested by the director.

B. **Residential Program (IBEC):** The IBEC program (Instituto Biblico Educacion Cristiana) currently is held at the PYM headquarters in Ilave. The program targets young adults. Most classes are offered during the summer months of January through March.

The IBEC director is Constantino Garcia. This year Elvira Ramos served as administrative assistant. Teachers were David Andrade, Esteban Ajnota, Magdalena Benito, Edwin Cammack, Jerry Clarkson, Ken Comfort, Constantino Garcia, Ruth Guevara, Marleny Mamani, and Elvira Ramos.

Attendance was down this year with 16 students studying. Because of decreased enrollment, drastic adjustments to both program and budget were necessary in order to continue to offer classes. Six students graduated from the program this year: Maribel Alanguia (Juli), Maruja Alanguia (Suancata), Peters Chambilla (Ancomarca), Samuel Quispe (Santiago), Rosa Vilca (Tacna), and Santria Vilca (Tacna). All are currently serving in a local church for a one year practicum.

C. Seminary Plans: One desire of mission personnel has been to help make possible the formation of a seminary program that could offer a formal degree in theology to graduates. Two options for formal recognition of a seminary program were: 1) an agreement with the Bolivian Evangelical University (BEU) in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, with all but the final year of studies being offered in Peru; and/or 2) formal recognition of the program by the Peruvian Ministry of Education.

The first option is no longer possible because of new policies set up by the BEU Board concerning degree completion agreements with other organizations. No progress has been made with the Peruvian Ministry of Education.

D. Jorge Fox Christian Technical High School (JFCTHS): The Jorge Fox Christian Technical High School holds classes in two locations in Peru. The school year in both sites begins in April and ends in December. The first, located in Ilave at the PYM headquarters, was started in 1994. The director is Elvira Ramos. There are 35 students enrolled this year. There were 4 graduates in 1999. The school is struggling to survive.

The second, located in Juli, was started in 1996. The director is Ramon Mamani. There are 70 students enrolled this year. They will have their first graduating class in December 2000.

Church Growth: Three new congregations were started during the past year. Each is the result of evangelism and outreach from established congregations in PYM. Cachi Pucara (Peninsula Quarterly Meeting) is actually a renewed work. The church closed after the flood of 1986. Encouragement from other churches in the Peninsula Quarterly Meeting resulted in the church opening again. Tarucachi (Coast Quarterly Meeting) was begun by the church at Tarata. Leadership and encouragement is provided by the Tacna area churches. Ticona Cusullaca (Esperanza Quarterly Meeting) is claimed by two different established churches—Pacco Cusullaca (Esperanza Quarterly Meeting) and Monte Sinai (Coast Quarterly Meeting). It received encouragement from both churches.

Several churches have built new buildings in the past year. Often lack of sufficient space was the reason for new construction. Churches with new buildings are: Chococoniri (Andes Quarterly Meeting), Sarapi (Esperanza Quarterly Meeting), Callasa (Juli Quarterly Meeting), and Accaso (Peninsula Quarterly Meeting).

Many congregations continue to struggle. In most cases the quarterly meetings are taking responsibility for encouragement of the local churches. The Tacna churches have taken responsibility for caring for small or struggling congregations in Tarata, Tarucachi, and Ilo (all Coast Quarterly Meeting). The church in Juliaca closed in January.

Survey trips were made to different isolated parts of the department of Puno. The survey trip to the jungle areas in the northern part of the department (San Gaban and beyond) revealed an area completely untouched by the gospel where people were eager to learn about Jesus. Because many made a decision to follow Christ during the survey trip, several more trips were made during the year for the purpose of discipleship. Even though it seems to be a prime area for expansion of PYM, leadership seems to have little interest in working beyond their current borders.

NOTABLE EVENTS

1. During the past year several graduated from the educational programs supported by PYM. Two men graduated from the Extension Bible School (IBLA). Two men and four women graduated from the Resident Bible School (IBEC). Four students graduated from the Jorge Fox Christian Technical High School in Ilave.

2. In August 1999, a 17-member medical team (with several members coming from NWYM churches) provided a five-day clinic in the Juli hospital. Working alongside Juli hospital staff, the visiting team attended to the needs of more than 900 people in five different speciality areas.

3. The eager response to the gospel by people living in the jungles in the northern part of the department of Puno (San Gaban and beyond) has been one of the most encouraging happenings of this year. It was definitely an experience of God preparing people beforehand to respond to what was shared.

Objectives for the Coming Year:

1. Continue to work with PYM leadership to develop an appropriate type of theological education that is challenging yet operable.

2. Continue to encourage an attitude of outreach among leadership.

3. August 19-24, 2000, a fourth medical team ministry will be held in Peru. This time the clinic will be held in the community of Kelluyo (located about 30 minutes west of the border town of Desaguadero). Kelluyo is reported to be one of the neediest areas in Peru.

4. Encourage increased autonomy by turning several programs over to the administration of PYM.

Summary: In October 2000, NWYM Friends Mission will complete 39 years of ministry in southern Peru. That ministry began among the Aymara people living on the Altiplano and spread to the coastal cities of Tacna, Ilo, and Arequipa as believers migrated to new areas. In Arequipa the ministry began touching the lives of Quechua people as well.

From the beginning we as a mission organization have committed ourselves to the task of raising up a strong, independent Friends church in Peru. In the not-too-distant future, we as a mission organization will no longer be involved in Peru in the same ways that we have been in the past. Peru Yearly Meeting will soon need to take an even stronger interest in its own survival and development.

This year has been especially challenging because it seemed that yearly meeting leaders were acting with self-interest rather than with vision. Local churches and pastors have chosen to work independently or within their quarterly meeting structure rather than within the yearly meeting structure. It seems that rather than moving forward, growth and maturity have taken several steps backwards.

Peru Yearly Meeting has set aside the days of July 28 and 29, 2000, as a special time of prayer for ministry in Peru. They specifically request prayer that the yearly meeting would move forward in its commitment to submit to God's will through evangelism, discipleship, preparation, service, and stewardship. We covet your prayers for the leaders of Peru Yearly Meeting, for the Friends churches in Peru, for the Mission Board of NWYM, and for us and our families that together we will be faithful to complete the task that God has laid before us.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION

When the Missions Commission met last November EFM was about \$100,000 in the hole, so this year I have given considerable focus and attention to improving the financial picture. Giving at the end of 1999 was outstanding. We were able to

pay all bills and restored part of the reserves, but were \$44,000 short of restoring all those reserve funds. I've felt that part of the reason was that \$145,000 of the 1999 giving was for personal gifts and projects outside the budget, so I'm placing more emphasis this year on giving for budgeted items. We sent the spring appeal letter earlier, the end of March, because we had urgent early year needs especially for school building in Rwanda. The response has been amazing, over \$73,000 by June first. I've made several appeals to foundations, but have yet to get a positive response. I hope that over a period of time EFM can build a relationship with some of those foundations that will be productive. We have had several large gifts, especially from and through people and churches in Friends Church Southwest.

Rwanda From my vantage point it appears that the work to which God has called EFM is progressing very well. I'm proud of the way the Thomases have handled the ministry in Rwanda in the absence of the senior missionary couple. This in spite of a computer breakdown and vehicle trouble. David has been able to oversee the beginning of the building of the secondary school in Cyanguu, assisted by a \$15,000 grant from the US Embassy, and we expect that building of a primary school can begin soon across the road from our Kigali property. We sent \$20,000 to complete the project at Cyanguu and \$30,000 toward the \$40,000 needed for the building in Kigali.

The Fergusons return to Rwanda in late June. They have committed for one to three years, depending on their family situation, and are saying this will be their last term. We need to keep praying to the Lord of the Harvest for another couple to serve in Rwanda.

Mexico Manny and Brenda have continued to struggle some with legal issues in Mexico, but have established some good relationships through displays at expositions and have received some gifts for our work from Mexicans. Churches are healthy and growing. Manny and his son, Mike, were driving to the border to pick up \$80,000 worth of donated dental equipment when he hit a section of road made very slick by rain on oil, bounced off some canyon walls, but no one was hurt. He was able to get the van fixed enough to complete his trip. We should be praying also for new workers to help Manny and Brenda in Mexico.

The Q People The Twaddell family has felt that they should move from Jordan to the United Kingdom. Their focus is to reach the Q people and they have discovered that there are about 500 from that people group in the UK. Roy wants to do doctoral research on the Q, try to be a pastor to them, get their help in translation work, and hopefully recruit some missionaries from among them who will go back to their own people. Roy has had a second successful trip to visit the Q people in their homeland. Before he gets settled in England, the board has asked the family to come home for a short time (they arrived June 20) to do some vision casting with their supporters, receive some training in church planting and raise his support level another \$6000 per year.

Nepal and India Vicki, Sandy Harrold and I made an administrative trip to Nepal and India during April. It was not an easy trip but a good one. As I've indicated in my trip report, which some of you may have read, the thing that impressed me most was the zeal with which our workers in each place we visited are reaching out to new people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ, this in spite of possible persecution both of the workers and their converts. Edwin Singh has written about a Catholic priest and a preacher who were killed recently and about several church bombings in India. Friends of Garhwal are now in four of the eight provinces of the Garhwal and Edwin can't wait to get into the other four. He wrote recently about 15 people who came to Christ through a healing ministry. The 14 churches under John Vanlal's

leadership in Nepal have 33 outreach points where workers minister about every week. Three of those are expected to become new Friends churches this year. Watch for some wonderful stories from that trip in the next *Friends Voice*.

Ireland Todd James in Ireland is doing well after his head injury last October. His wife, Celesta, has nearly finished her work for a doctor's degree. We have sent \$25,000 for a better car.

Philippines Jaime Tabingo has been able to conduct some useful training sessions for the leaders in the 48 churches he now supervises in the Philippines, since 32 independent churches came under the Friends umbrella there last year. He reports some prospects for a new church plant.

Rough Rock The Lord used a team of women from Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting to present for the Navajo at Rough Rock an outstanding ladies tea and a mission conference. Four Navajo took faith promise cards. A very supportive Navajo pastor from Chinle will conduct evangelistic services soon at Rough Rock in a red and white tent. Interestingly, my assistant, Vicki Hinshaw, had a vision five years ago on a prayer trip there of God using a red and white tent at Rough Rock.

I feel I have about the best job in the world. I love the people I work with, admire their commitment to Christ, and thoroughly enjoy watching God match need with supply, sometimes in miraculous ways. I announced to the Commission in early June that this will be my last year as Executive Director of EFM. I'll be 73 when I retire June 30, 2001, and surely by that time a leader with a fresh set of skills will make EFM stronger. It's been a wonderful experience to serve my church in this job. Thanks to all of you who have contributed your support to more than double the ministry of EFM these past eight years. Gregg Prickett, Personnel Committee chairman, is heading the search for my successor.

Board of Peace and Social Concerns

Reports from Yearly Meeting churches indicate again that folks in the Yearly Meeting care about their worship communities, their neighbors, and in many cases the world outside their neighborhood. Our Board is proud to represent Quakers who are seeking God's will as they love their neighbors.

Because the social concerns part of Yearly Meeting is functioning relatively well, we have chosen to emphasize the peace testimony. We were greatly thrilled as Carleta Baker Schroeder sought God's will as an active participant with Christian Peacemaker Teams. The result of her searching was a decision not to affiliate as a full-time Corps member. She will continue to be a part of the reserve Corps, which means one or two delegations per year. We continue to seek a member of NWYM who feels called to service with Christian Peacemaker Teams.

We did not have a Peace Retreat this year. We continue to have an interest and wish to encourage anyone interested to consider the Peace Retreat this fall at Twin Rocks. Contact Ken Beebe.

Our newest project is a program of prayer, encouragement and financial support to meetings who choose to send someone on a short-term social concerns or mission type project. We have not worked out the details, but hope to have funds available to meetings to help support members who feel God's call to service. Many meetings have experienced the benefits when individual members are called to ministry.

We are in the process of turning the Piedmont parsonage over to Ethnic Ministries Commission to continue with Peace Place Children's Program. That program has expanded and become much more financially stable with the energy and leadership of Julie Downs. The ministry has previously been part of Peace and Social Concerns.

The 1999 Thanksgiving Offering garnered more than \$12,000 and was divided between Laura's House of Peace and translation of a book for Burundi Yearly Meeting.

We continue to value your suggestions and comments.

Board of Stewardship

The Board of Stewardship meets during Yearly Meeting sessions and at Midyear Board meetings to accomplish its duties and responsibilities as outlined in the Faith and Practice. In addition the Board's administrative committee (Stan Muhr; Roger Minthorne; Leo Crisman; Lloyd Pruitt; Dave Hampton, director of Finance and Development; Joe Gerick, general superintendent; Harold Antrim, associate superintendent; Chuck Scott, bookkeeper) meets monthly to keep current on stewardship matters. This last year the pastors pension fund was incorporated into the Department of Development.

We have had several major accomplishments in the last year, but two stand out. The first was the dispersal of a cloud that has hung over us in the form of unfunded liability in our pension fund. I am happy to report that our pension fund is now 100 % funded. Much credit for this goes to Joe Gerick and the Pension Board for taking decisive action on this matter several years ago and to the Executive Council for a clear solution. David Hampton has done an excellent job of facilitating the changes that have made our pension fund debt free. The second is the level of reporting we now have each month. Dave Hampton and Chuck Scott continue to improve and update reports. I feel we now have an up-to-the-minute profile of all funds and accounts.

It has been a pleasure serving on the Board of Stewardship these last few years. The Lord has indeed blessed. I have seen miracles and have been in contact with so many wonderful people. In the last year I have had the opportunity to visit many of our churches. Thank you for the warm welcome. Many of our meetings are ready to explode; the presence of the Lord is real and the evidence of His presence is unquestionable. I pray that your meeting is one that God is using in a powerful way.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

Audits: An audit of the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church was completed by Nixon, Abby and Company, PC. Audits of Friends Church Extension Foundation and Friends Fund are also conducted on a regular basis. A complete copy of each audit report is available at the Yearly Meeting office.

Financial Consolidation: The Yearly Meeting's funds are classified as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted as required by the "Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116." Revenue for the Great Commission Program budget is considered unrestricted and is spent for administration and board and commission programs as budgeted each year by the Executive Council. Designated, or temporarily restricted revenues such as faith promise, missionaries'

shares, or new works, are used by the board or commission having authority over them. A detailed accounting of all funds is kept by the Yearly Meeting office and reviewed by the Board of Stewardship Administrative Committee monthly.

Budget Process: The Yearly Meeting is committed to spending only what is provided by the local churches. The budget process in place for the past several years has been successful in keeping us in the black. The superintendents, boards, and commission clerks present their budget estimates for the next year during Midyear Board meetings. The Board of Stewardship, in turn, estimates the income based on the giving patterns of churches, organizations, and individuals. A budget for the following year is then proposed to the Executive Council in February. Based on requests, priorities, and discussions, a final budget is prepared for submission at Yearly Meeting sessions. In looking at the projections for next year there are some hard choices for the Executive Council, but they are committed to sound financial management.

Giving: Many churches are giving a larger portion each year. If you are a part of that giving, THANK YOU. Your support is so important for this ministry we do together. We have also noted that some churches have reduced their giving as a percent of their total budget. If you are in this group please consider how important your part is in our ministry as a whole. Be a full partner in the ministry of the Yearly Meeting.

DEPARTMENT OF DEVELOPMENT (FRIENDS FUND)

The Department of Development-Friends Fund was founded in 1972 with the mission of promoting Christian stewardship through the mechanism of Estate Planning and Deferred Gifts. To that end, Friends Fund currently has over \$3.2 million under management that is designated for future distribution to various ministries plus an additional \$2.0 million in the form of endowment funds that provide a permanent funding source for Yearly Meeting ministries. In 1999, total assets under management increased 24% to \$6.1 million. Most of the increase is a result of the Board of Evangelism's \$1 million endowment. Other additions included one new irrevocable trust and eight new gift annuities. These results have been achieved through the faithful stewardship of a large number of Friends that have made Northwest Yearly Meeting ministry a part of their estate plan with the help of Friends Fund. To become a part of this exciting opportunity in Christian stewardship, just contact Friends Fund through the Yearly Meeting office.

Throughout its history, Friends Fund has struggled to cover its operating expenses out of operating income and bequests (estate gifts). When the bequests fell short, funds were borrowed on notes to individuals and trusts that have now accumulated to a little under \$700,000. The exciting news for the year 2000 is, we are projecting for the first time that operating income will cover all of our expenses including the loan interest. Again, this increase in operating income is due in large part to the addition of the Board of Evangelism's endowment fund. Summarized below are key financial indicators and a listing of future distributions of the funds currently under management. A copy of the complete independent auditors report is available by contacting the Yearly Meeting Office. Your continued concern and prayers for Friends Fund are deeply appreciated.

DEPARTMENT OF BENEFITS (PENSION FUND)

The pension fund has seen some of the most significant changes since its inception in 1979. It started with the integration of the Pension Board into the Board of Stewardship and is now functioning as the Department of Benefits. The Department of Benefits then took on the task of completely revising the pension plan, bringing it up to date and into compliance with the applicable regulations. These tasks have now all been completed and we have been receiving excellent comments from pastors and other participants in the plan.

Previously, the pension plan consisted of two funds, the Pension Fund and the Retirement Benefit Fund. Churches would make contributions to the Pension Fund for their pastors and employees. When an employee was ready to retire, their share of the Pension Fund was transferred to the Retirement Benefit Fund and a fixed annuity payment was calculated and paid out of this fund. Both these funds have been changed as follows:

Retirement Benefit Fund: Due to the extended life spans and relatively small number of participants in this fund, it was becoming obvious that the fund would run out before our obligation to make payments ended. Two years ago, we stopped adding new participants to this fund, instead purchasing annuity contracts for them from life insurance companies. This past year, we used the balance of this fund plus proceeds from the sale of the Piedmont Church building to purchase annuity contracts from life insurance companies for the majority of the retirees in this fund. The Yearly Meeting Board of Stewardship assumed responsibility of making payments to the remaining retirees. The Evangelism Board lent funds from the sale of the ParkCenter Church property to the Board of Stewardship. Earnings from this money will provide the funding for these payments until the obligation ends, then the ParkCenter funds will be returned to the Board of Evangelism.

Pension Fund: The Executive Council during last year's Yearly Meeting sessions approved the selection of Standard Insurance to assist the Department of Benefits in converting the existing pension fund into a church 401(k) plan. Standard has since drafted a new plan document that has been approved by the department, and in November 1999 the pension fund assets were transferred to Standard. Participants now have the ability to direct their own investments as well as make individual contributions to their account. Many other enhancements were made to the retirement plan that makes it more flexible and attractive to both the participant and the participating churches. Participation in the Pension Plan has increased significantly. During the first six months of last year, churches made contributions for 80 employees totaling \$115,378. During the first six months of this year church and employee contributions totaling \$186,814 were made for 101 employees.

It is the desire of the Department of Benefits that every Christian worker in the Yearly Meeting have an adequate retirement benefit available. By making the retirement plan more attractive, we trust that this will now become more of a reality.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This year marks the seventh consecutive year that the Great Commission Program Budget (GCPB) has operated in the black. This has been accomplished by carefully controlling expenses, cutting budgets when necessary, in order to only spend what has been received.

At the end of this report is a summary of the 1999 financial information. A copy of the detail information should be available at the caretaker's table as well as the complete 1999 auditor's report.

REVENUE: The majority of the GCPB revenue is from Church Great Commission payments. While the GCPB has been in the black this past seven years, this component has only increased an average of 2.2% per year during that time. This has caused the Boards and Commissions to increase their reliance on designated gifts and investment income in order to accomplish their mission. Of the desig-

nated contributions, 50% were designated for the Mission Board with the balance spread over the rest of the Boards and Commissions.

EXPENSE: GCPB expense budgets are approved by the Executive Council. Each board and commission then uses a combination of GCPB funds and designated revenue to operate their programs. At times, a board or commission will also spend a portion of their reserves as indicated by negative net designated funds.

OTHER TRANSACTIONS: Last year we experienced a number of large unique transactions. These have been moved out of the normal revenue and expenses sections of the summary report so those sections can reflect normal operations. The gain on sale of assets is the profit made on the sale of the Vancouver and ParkCenter properties that were sold last year. The unrestricted other income is from a contract received from the sale of the Nampa property and pension assets that were not transferred to Standard Insurance. The restricted other income is from a contract received from the sale of the Vancouver property and the funds received from the pension retirement benefit fund. Restricted other expense was the amount paid for the purchase of annuities for the pension retirement benefit fund as described in the Department of Benefits report. The transfers represent movement of funds between unrestricted and restricted, primarily cash that is received for the book value of real estate assets and contracts.

ASSETS: The significant increase in long term assets is primarily a result of investing the proceeds from the sale of the Vancouver and ParkCenter properties. Boards and Commissions use the earnings and growth from these and other investments to supplement other revenues.

LIABILITIES AND FUND BALANCES: The increase in long-term liabilities is from a loan that the Yearly Meeting took out from the Friends Church Extension Foundation to purchase the LaGrande property. Increases in temporarily restricted net assets (fund balances) represent the addition of funds from the increased assets mentioned above to the respective board or commission's restricted fund balance.

The finances of the Yearly Meeting are in excellent condition. We have significant assets and very limited liabilities. Sources of income have been identified to support the varied ministries of Northwest Yearly Meeting. The shift from reliance on Great Commission income to other sources of revenue is an area of concern that we need to be discussing. Your continued prayer and support for Yearly Meeting finances is greatly appreciated.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Trustees

Since the sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting in July 1999, the Trustees have dealt with the following things.

Rosemere Friends Church Property. At the request of the Board of Evangelism, we assisted with the transfer of Rosemere Friends Church property to Northwest Yearly Meeting (NWYM). All five Rosemere lots are now owned by NWYM. This was necessary because of the closing of Rosemere FC and the opening of a new work under the name "New Life Friends Church."

Sale of ParkCenter Friends Church Property. At the request of the Board of Evangelism and with the approval of the Executive Council in July 1999, we executed papers to complete the sale of the property in Boise formerly occupied by ParkCenter Friends Church. Part of the land was sold to an individual for \$200,000

with \$130,000 down and \$70,000 payable in installments over five years at 8%. The remaining land and the church building were sold to ParkCenter Community Church of the Assemblies of God for \$350,000 cash.

Purchase of La Grande Property. At the request of the Board of Evangelism and with the approval of the Administrative Committee of the Executive Council, we signed papers to acquire church property in La Grande, Oregon. We also signed a note and mortgage in favor of Friends Church Extension Foundation for \$73,000 to finance the purchase amount of \$72,000 plus costs.

Modification of Loan on Piedmont Parsonage. We signed a modification agreement with Friends Church Extension Foundation extending the maturity of the loan on the Piedmont parsonage from 9/15/99 to 9/15/01. The balance of this loan as of 6/30/00 was \$2,153. This property is being used by the Board of Peace and Social Concerns for an after school program under the name "Peace Place."

Washington Property Tax Exemption Reports. Washington property tax exemption reports have been submitted for six Washington church properties where title is in the name of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church (NWYM). These reports are required annually by March 31.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Headquarters Property. Under the direction of the Yearly Meeting staff, there has been considerable remodeling to the headquarters building. A new stairway has been added to allow inside access between the main floor and the basement and two additional offices and a handicap access rest room have been constructed in the basement. New furnace/air conditioning units have also been installed to serve all three floors.

A deed has been executed to the Oregon Department of Transportation for a 291 square foot strip on the south side of the headquarters building and a 6.6 foot wide easement adjacent thereto for utilities. This is to permit improvements to Highway 99W as it passes our property on Hancock Street. A total of \$10,750 is being received of which \$3,524 is to cover replacement of our sign and landscaping and \$1,800 for our cost of removal of a buried oil tank.

Olympic View Deed. At the request of Olympic View Friends Church, we executed a deed on a small piece of a vacated street which had attached to the church's property. This deed transfers title to a developer of some nearby land and is in exchange for some earth-moving work that the developer will do for the church. This parcel was of no significant value to the church.

Arrangements have been made to include the Board of Evangelism’s *New Works Interchange* in a joint mailing to allow the readership of NWYM maximum exposure to the outreach of the Yearly Meeting.

BARCLAY PRESS

Publishing the Truth. This catch-phrase, long a hallmark of Friends, simply means telling others about the saving grace of Jesus Christ. Friends have always had a calling to set down in print their vital message of new life in Christ. Some of the best of those writings were in response to the challenges of a status-quo religious establishment threatened by a bold declaration of God’s message to the heart of individuals. A direct channel to God was reopened for many who previously relied on the official church dispensation.

Publishing the Truth goes on today as well. The message continues to be relevant and much needed. A personal relationship with the all-powerful creator is available to us all. A daily walk with the indwelling Jesus becomes the focus of our lives when we hear the call and respond to His voice. As this experience takes its place in our lives how can we not tell others?

Barclay Press is established and continues its work to publish the Truth. Technology and the media have changed but the message remains the same. Barclay Press' methods for preparing material for print are now virtually entirely digital. The computer in all its ubiquitous forms is used to speed the processing of text and graphics onto the printed page. The Barclay Press web site is of growing importance to publishing the Truth. Readers order books from distant parts of the globe. Isn't it interesting to think of Barclay's *Apology* (written in seventeenth-century England) being purchased over the internet by a curious person in twentieth-century Tokyo, Japan?

A task force is being assembled to continue the work of a group that met in January to map out a publishing strategy for the next decade. It has been determined that Friends have an important perspective on the Gospel that needs to be heard in the world today. This strategy is likely to include material for Friends, about Friends, and from Friends, to the evangelical Christian world.

This year Barclay Press is offering to supply a display of Barclay Press books for churches who want to encourage readers to explore the range of topics available. Church attenders may browse through the display and place orders directly, over the internet, by phone or by mailing off the order sheet provided in the display. We sense that too few Northwest Yearly Meeting members are fully aware of the offerings of Barclay Press. Check out our web site at www.barclaypress.com.

Effort is under way to make available, over the internet, many important written materials from the past. Barclay Press has the technology to convert printed pages to digital format for search and retrieval. The vast resources of 40 plus years of publishing thus becomes a current asset for Friends.

Dan McCracken, Barclay Press general manager for the past 11 years, resigned as of April this year. Dan had been involved at Barclay Press for 30 years in various capacities. Dan will be missed; he contributed significantly to the ministry of the press in all his capacities. A search is under way for a person to fill the role of CEO/Publisher. In the interim, Board of Directors Chairman LeRoy Benham is filling in. The staff members of Barclay Press continue to serve with their usual dedication and commitment. Susan Fawver has accepted more responsibility for production coordination on top of her editorial duties. Paula Hampton has signed on, part time, to coordinate *Fruit of the Vine* editorial work. Mike Comfort provides creative spark and mentors Jen Varner and Jenny Riddle. Sam Abatte joined us this spring to help with prepress operations and estimating. Alice Maurer keeps track of the accounting and book sales. Receptionist Sharon Holdahl manages the final production stages and mailing. Les Peterson runs the AB Dick press, folder and whatever else is required. John Weinrich runs the Heidelberg with real skill. Others are called in from time to time to help with production. Gertrude Ankeny and Gene Hockett work part time on a variety of tasks.

Friends Church Extension Foundation

The Friends Church Extension Foundation (FCEF) was formed in 1955 as an agency of Northwest Yearly Meeting under the direction of the Board of Evangelism. It was the vision of the founders and continues to today, that the Foundation be a tool for the spread of the Gospel throughout the Northwest by making funds available for the building and expansion needs of the Yearly Meeting. Churches and related organizations frequently find it difficult to secure financing for church building, development, and expansion programs because banks and other financial institutions are often unwilling to accept risks inherent in loans to churches. FCEF stands ready to fill this need.

Since its inception, the Foundation has made 156 loans totaling nearly \$5.5 million. This past year (ending June 30, 2000), FCEF made loans totaling \$423,231 to Spokane Friends, Camas Friends, Twin Rocks, Barclay Press, Friendsview Manor, Friends Fund, and Northwest Yearly Meeting for LaGrande. The Foundation has additional funds available for projects and is constantly watching for opportunities to make new loans.

FCEF receives its funding through the sale of investment certificates to Northwest Yearly Meeting members. The Foundation pays a competitive rate of interest for these deposits and strives to always have funds on hand to honor requests for redemption of the certificates. For more information and a current prospectus, contact Dave Hampton or Floyd Watson at the Yearly Meeting office.

A third feature of the FCEF program is a payment of a portion of the net income back to the Yearly Meeting. Last year this payment totaled \$61,000. The Yearly Meeting uses this money to fully fund the Quaker Leaders Program, a leadership development program under the Board of Evangelism, and to partially fund the Director of Finance position.

Friends Church Extension Foundation has a long history of sound fiscal management. The financial summary below highlights the past three years' activity for the Foundation. Anyone interested in any aspect of the FCEF program is encouraged to contact the Yearly Meeting office.

Through the year the ladies of our Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Fellowships have raised more than \$6,000 for mission projects. In addition to offerings, they have raised money by having sales of various kinds, recycling, and prepared meals for various groups. Our ladies have sponsored mother/daughter functions, participated in "shoe box" ministry, hosted memorial dinners, prepared care packages for college students and baskets for the Yearly Meeting auction, provided clothing to city missions, and assisted their local churches with landscaping and babysitting.

Spring rallies were held in the various areas of the Yearly Meeting, with the theme "Come Let Us Build," with the offerings which amounted to \$5,384.26 going to new school buildings for Rwanda. It was exciting to see the ladies rising to the challenge to assist Rwanda in their need for emergency funds for building. Southern

Oregon had a bonus at their rally with a presentation of Carl and Peggy Hunerwadel's work in India.

All of the money which is raised and the education which is provided regarding missions is only one part of what our ladies do. The most important thing our ladies do is to pray for our missionaries, which is done so faithfully all year. Our awareness of missions and the needs of our missionaries is vital but without prayer for them our work is like a dry well. The great need of our Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Fellowship is for more ladies to catch the challenge of being involved. Our missionaries depend on us for support and prayer and it is imperative that this support does not fail in the years to come for lack of leadership.

Volunteers on Wheels

Volunteers on Wheels (VOW), an agency of Northwest Yearly Meeting, completed its 17th year of ministry on April 30, 2000. The cumulative service record of VOW is quite impressive. VOW members experience great joy as they "go about doing good." We help Christian ministries with physical needs, enabling them to concentrate on their spiritual mission.

Our annual three-day RENDEZVOUS in May at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds in Madras was a highlight of the year. Several members arrived early and worked on a new brick walk in a garden area at the grounds. During our annual meeting, workers reported on the following eight projects completed during the year:

- 1) **Barclay College**, Haviland, Kansas: Painting, cleaning, repairing doors, building an interior wall and removing fixtures from the Music Hall prior to it being demolished.
- 2) **Twin Rocks**: New vinyl floor in Harbor House, repaired playground equipment and helped in kitchen.
- 3) **Barclay Press**: Repaired walls, painted a portion of the exterior and built a cabinet to house the power control panel.
- 4) **George Fox University**: Installed new sidewalks, and sanded and painted stair and balcony railings on a resident hall.
- 5) **Greenleaf Academy**: Installed sprinkler system and landscaped an area adjacent to school building, built a retaining wall, installed 100 feet of sidewalk, painted walls and ceilings.
- 6) **Second Street Community Church**: Assisted in constructing and raising exterior walls for new youth center.
- 7) **Northwest Community Friends Church**, Tucson, Arizona: Completed a 1999 project by sanding and finishing both sides of fourteen interior doors.
- 8) **Meridian Friends Church**: As part of the church's renovation project, removed walls, rebuilt foyer, enlarged one restroom, completed a new restroom and installed new landscaping.

In the past 17 years, labor contributed by VOW members has resulted in ministries saving nearly one quarter of a million dollars.

Jim and Doris Morris were not able to attend RENDEZVOUS, but were given special recognition for their seven years of service on the Board. Doris served as secretary/treasurer during that entire period.

It has been my joy to serve as president the past two years. Naomi Wilson serves as the new president and Randall Brown as the new secretary/treasurer.

Our athletics and music programs had an exceptional year in 1999-2000. Everywhere our teams played, their sportsmanship and Christian attitude were acknowledged. Several of our teams participated in playoffs and state tournaments. One of our students, Jenny Binford, was named the Idaho State Player of the Year for our division in basketball. The choir and ensemble ministered regularly to many of our supporting churches and capped their year with a successful tour to Southern California in the spring.

Our students continue to do well academically, performing significantly above national norms on standardized tests. One of our high school students was named a National Merit Scholar semifinalist, and another student was a national finalist in an essay contest. At the end of the year, we graduated twenty-eight seniors. Twenty-five of them are planning to enter college in the fall. At last count, five of them will be attending George Fox University.

God has blessed Greenleaf Friends Academy in many ways this year. We have a large army of staff and volunteers who work diligently to help GFA carry out its mission. Our Board, chaired by Stan Morse, has devoted countless hours of effort and prayer as they led us this year. God has worked through many people to guide us to success. We thank all of you for your prayers and support as we seek to train young ambassadors for Christ at Greenleaf Friends Academy.

George Fox University

Brandt Inaugurated as President Striking a balance between seriousness and humor, pomp and festiveness, George Fox University inaugurated its 11th president in a ceremony that added extra energy to the first day of classes for 1999-2000. While several of the featured guests and speakers drew laughter with lighthearted comments, President H. David Brandt accepted with measured seriousness the duties of the office that he had held for a year. Referring to a biblical passage from Hebrews 12, Brandt noted that the Christian liberal arts university has always had "a great cloud of witnesses watching us." "I trust you and the other witnesses to hold us accountable for the implementation of this charge," he said.

First 'Serve Day' Impresses Region An estimated 1,400 George Fox University students, faculty and staff abandoned their classes, offices and work areas September 8 to spend a day helping others — and the region took notice. Normal routine on the Newberg campus ceased in what University leaders considered one of the most important days of the 1999-2000 academic year — even though the classrooms were empty. The first-ever University-wide "Serve Day" sent 20-member teams to locations throughout Newberg and other parts of Yamhill County. They helped primarily non-profit agencies, churches and individuals needing assistance. Typical projects included painting, yard work for older residents, spending time with residents at senior care homes, or working on various church projects. Serve Day was acclaimed by the local community, and the event drew regional attention through a front-page feature story in *The Oregonian* newspaper. Serve Day will now be an annual event.

Parents Organize Prayer for University Parents of George Fox students in four states organized to host a Parents' Day of Prayer March 11 for their students and the University. Gatherings were held on the Newberg campus and at seven other sites in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California. Topics for prayer included student needs and well being, University leadership, faculty relationships and spiritual life, and blessings and guidance for George Fox administrators and alumni.

U.S. News Ranking is Highest Ever George Fox University moved to its highest ranking ever by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine in its listing of "America's Best Colleges." The nation's most popular annual review of United States colleges and universities ranked the University second overall among Western regional liberal arts colleges, up two positions from a year ago and from fifth the year before. It jumped the University from eighth to second in its "Great Schools at Great Prices" listing of "Best Values in Colleges." Never ranked lower than third in the academic reputation category in 12 years of listings, George Fox maintained its third place listing again this year.

Templeton Foundation Gives Double Honors George Fox University was one of 20 colleges and universities in the United States — and one of only two in Oregon — named to receive double honors by the John Templeton Foundation. The Uni-

versity was one of 100 institutions selected for the Templeton Honor Roll for character-building colleges, and George Fox President David Brandt was one of 50 presidents recognized in the outstanding presidential leadership section. Intended for high school students, parents and educators, the Templeton Guide recognizes programs chosen through a selective process that considered clarity of vision and statement of purpose; institutional resources; involvement of institutional leaders; impact on students, faculty, campus and community; integration into the core curriculum or academic study; longevity; external awards and recognition; and assessment. George Fox was cited in the honor roll listing for its emphasis in first-year programs, academic honesty, faculty and curriculum, volunteer service, substance-abuse prevention, student leadership, spiritual growth and civic education.

'Legacy Campaign' Launches Work on Stevens Center With a gala event at the Portland Hilton, George Fox University in February publicly launched a \$22 million Legacy Campaign for facilities, scholarships, faculty development and technology enhancement. The University already had raised nearly two-thirds of the total in a non-public "quiet phase." The campaign is the first since 1994. It is a comprehensive campaign, including all gifts to the University until December 31, 2001. Cornerstone project for the campaign is the \$7 million Edward F. Stevens Center, a student services and classroom building to be located on the southwest corner of the campus and named for the late George Fox president. Ground was broken for the Stevens Center on April 27. Other campaign goals include \$6 million for endowment, with \$2 million designated for student scholarships, \$1 million for faculty development and \$3 million for general support. The campaign includes another \$4 million for the University's annual fund; \$1 million for technology improvements; \$750,000 for the renovation of the lower floors of Wood-Mar Hall, the University's "Old Main"; and \$3.25 million set aside for special and designated projects.

Enrollment Record Set For the 12th consecutive year, George Fox University set an enrollment record. The official fall semester total was 2,432 students, a 3.7 percent increase over the previous fall. Enrollment was more than four times George Fox's fall 1986 enrollment of 549. Also for the 12th straight year, a spring semester enrollment mark was set with 2,416 students, up 104.

New Degree Programs Begin George Fox introduced several new degree programs, increasing its graduate programs to 12. The University's undergraduate programs now tally 42. The Association of Theological Schools, the national accrediting agency for seminaries, approved George Fox's new Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) degree in leadership and spiritual formation. The program enrolled its first cohort of 19 students in January. The University began a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) program, which also has an emphasis on leadership. At its Boise (Idaho) Center, George Fox introduced its first graduate program there, a Master of Arts in Organizational Leadership (MAOL).

Seminary Name Changes George Fox University's Western Evangelical Seminary began the new millennium with a new name: George Fox Evangelical Seminary. The name change was approved by the University's board of trustees following recommendation by the seminary's board of regents. The seminary was merged into George Fox College in 1996 to create the University. "The name George Fox Evangelical Seminary combines in a highly visible way the seminary's heritage and its new future," said President David Brandt.

Largest Graduating Class Receives Diplomas In May, the University awarded diplomas to its largest graduating class ever. The 549 graduates easily surpassed the 457 who received their diplomas at the previous spring's commencement. Of the total, 295 received bachelor's degrees through traditional programs, while 97

earned theirs through the University's adult degree-completion programs. Thirty-seven master's degrees were presented to graduates of the University's seminary programs, and 108 master's degrees were earned through other university programs. Twelve graduated from the University's Doctor of Psychology program. In December, an additional 223 graduates received diplomas at George Fox's midyear commencement.

Except as discussed in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Generally accepted accounting principles require consolidation of the financial statements of a wholly owned subsidiary.

In our opinion, except for the effects of not consolidating the financial statements of The Barclay Press, Inc, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church as of December 31, 1999, and the results of its operations and the changes in its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The schedule of support and revenue, expenses and net assets by function on page 13 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
