MINUTES Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 2001

Monday, July 23, 8:15 a.m.

- 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened its 109th annual sessions on Monday, July 23, 2001, on the campus of George Fox University under the theme "For Such a Time as This."
- 2. Bruce Bishop, field secretary for Leadership Development, opened the morning session with remarks on the purpose of our meeting: for worship and for the conducting of business. The worship time was opened with a time of singing, led by Nathan (Nate) Macy and Alivia Biko, followed by a time of quiet waiting on the Lord.
- 3. The representatives who were not present on Saturday were seated.
- 4. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny introduced visitors Gloria Kershner from Friends World Conference for Consultation and Bob Barns of Right Sharing of World Resources. Both are from the Grass Valley Friends Meeting in California. Each brought greetings. Also introduced was Dwight Collins, superintendent of Greenleaf Friends Academy, Idaho. He especially thanked some groups that had helped them in remodeling projects at the academy this past year.
- 5. Mark Ankeny affirmed Saturday's Family Fun Day including "The Hoot!" sponsored by the Commission on Fine Arts and the Silent Auction put on by the Commission on Family Life. Proceeds from the Silent Auction are used for funding of counseling services for those in ministry in our yearly meeting. Mark reminded people that contributions to this Richard Beebe Memorial Fund can be made at any time. He further affirmed the Missions Rally report on Sunday afternoon and expressed thanks to all those who worked behind the scenes to make Saturday and Sunday events meaningful.
- 6. Lynn Clouser Holt read the first NWYM Core Value statement "Jesus Christ is present," and encouraged those present to be seeking the mind of Christ in both the worship times and business, and to listen to the comments of others, allowing time for reflection between speakers.
- 7. Ken Comfort, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.
- 8. Ron Stansell, clerk of the Mission Board, presented the report for that board. (The written report is included in the Addendum.) He referred to page two of the report that concerns the changes in Bolivia and Peru, and especially to the paragraph in bold print written by Hal Thomas about the reorganization of the national church in Bolivia. He also referred to the report from Norval Hadley, executive director of the Evangelical Friends Mission. Norval retired as of June 30 and has been replaced by Chuck Mylander. Vicki Hinshaw, assistant to the executive director of EFM, spoke briefly regarding some new missionaries and new mission opportunities. Kathi Perry is going to Ireland to aid in the work there; a new couple is going to Rough Rock Friends Mission in Arizona; Jaime Tabingo of the Philippines

is opening some new work in Hong Kong; and the believers from Nepal are planning to go into Bhutan.

■ 9. Bruce Bishop read the Great Commission statement from *The Message*, and selected scripture from Isaiah. Nate Macy and Alivia Biko led in singing "Shine, Jesus, Shine" and "O For a Thousand Tongues" with scripture readings interspersed between the verses. Lynn Clouser Holt read the NWYM Core Value, "We are called to be and to make followers of Christ."

■ 10. Ron Stansell continued with the Mission Board report, reminding us how God has spoken and guided in the past. Christina Muhr, Paul Thornburg, and Muriel Ostrin read from past NWYM Minutes regarding God's leadership in 1930 to begin mission work in Bolivia; in 1947 about the purchase of the farm in Bolivia and the opening of the Bible School; in 1964 in the mission/national church tension resolution; in 1974 the establishment of the national church as a yearly meeting and of the establishment of Peru Yearly Meeting in 1997; and now in 2001 the phase-over and withdrawal of missionaries in Bolivia and Peru.

Geraldine Willcuts paid tribute to the leadership of Walter Lee in our mission work, especially in the early years, and others concurred with this. Walter is unable to attend Yearly Meeting this year. Dorwin Smith brought greetings from him.

The following written recommendation from the Board of Missions was presented:

The Board of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends requests approval and endorsement of the Yearly Meeting for the beginning of cross-cultural service, witness, and evangelism in Russia and in North Africa. It is the intent of the Board of Missions to pursue both short-term and long-term candidates for service – persons who are equipped to render genuine human and Christian service to the cultures and people mentioned, and to obediently follow openings for witness to Christ as Lord and Savior in public and private settings as the Lord directs. In some cases this may mean the founding of Friends meetings for worship; in other cases it may mean witness in the spirit and truth of Friends without the same institutional titles and organization that we have known elsewhere, but in either case, seeking the glory of God, the welfare of people, and the establishment of indigenous followers of Christ.

This request and recommendation comes as the best interests of Bolivia and Peru yearly meetings seem to converge with God's ongoing call to Northwest Yearly Meeting to Great Commission witness and service among those less reached by the Gospel. We have completed over 70 years of ministry in Bolivia and Peru and have established two new yearly meetings. We have worked at a phase-over period over the past several years, allowing those two yearly meetings to develop independence and interdependence within the greater family of Friends and the Body of Christ.

After seasons of prayer and waiting upon the Lord, mingled with discussion and investigation, we have felt clear to recommend that we unite in these new efforts, based on the following statements:

1) The Great Commission to share the Gospel to the whole world is still a mandate upon Christians everywhere. We in the West have been joined by Christians in Africa, Asia and Latin America in sharing the Gospel in many places extending the message of Christ to unreached places of the world and to limited access nations. We believe life with Christ makes a positive difference both in this life and for eternity.

2) Investigation, study and surveys report a significant lack of witness of Christ in these two countries, open doors for meaningful human service, and relational networks, which indicate feasibility. We have invitations from concerned Russians and external and internal concerns expressed on behalf of North Africa.

3) The opportunities, which have appeared, tend to be openings for bi-vocational, educational and humanitarian service combined with sincere witness of salvation in Christ. We feel this particularly matches who Friends are and God's call upon our lives. Service in these two locations will require care, cultural sensitivity, humility, and persistence. It will also require integrity and courage.

4) Phase-over in ministry in Bolivia and Peru will allow some funding to be redirected to new locations, beginning in one year.

5) Initial volunteers and those interested in being a part of a Friends ministry in these two nations have contacted us. While the candidating process for the naming of Christian workers has not begun formally, we have names and prospects, which we feel should be pursued.

6) While a year ago we proposed investigations in East Timor, those attempts have not succeeded in establishing contacts or open doors. Thus the recommendation is limited to the two locations of North Africa and Russia.

7) We propose our work begin in cooperation with fellow Christians in both locations, learning from them as we go. We will not be the first Christians to enter these two fields, so there is much to be gained from others. There will be opportunity for sharing with believers in Christ from other backgrounds. We propose, however, that to the best of our ability, we minister in the name of Christ after the manner of Friends, believing we have a distinctive contribution to the larger Body of Christ, which needs to be faithfully shared.

Discussion followed regarding this proposal. Clerk Mark Ankeny restated the first sentence of the proposal: "The Board of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends requests approval and endorsement of the Yearly Meeting for the beginning of cross-cultural service, witness, and evangelism in Russia and in North Africa." Concerns were raised around the wording in the proposal. The Mission Board explained that North Africa better represented the intent of the Board to minister in the region. Another concern was raised regarding a Friends distinctive to the ministry. Clerk Mark Ankeny directed people's attention to the final sentence of the proposal: "...that to the best of our ability, we minister in the name of Christ after the manner of Friends, believing we have a distinctive contribution to the larger Body of Christ, which needs to be faithfully shared."

■ 11. Mark Ankeny closed the session with prayer. Following a break, the business meeting continued.

Monday, July 23, 10:45 a.m.

■ 12. Discussion on the proposal regarding opening a mission work in Russia followed the break time. Several spoke in favor of a mission work in Russia, and Ron Stansell answered some questions regarding this work. After a time of silent waiting and discerning of God's will, the proposal to begin a mission work in Russia

was approved.

■ 13. The subject of beginning a work in North Africa was introduced and considerable discussion followed. Ron Stansell answered several questions regarding entering North African nations as "tentmakers," going as service people to work among the people there, and the legitimacy of going in this way and witnessing by lifestyle evangelism. The safety of Christians in some of these countries was questioned, but they were assured that it is changing and although there is some risk involved, it is not a real issue. New wording to the original proposal was suggested by Assistant Clerk Don Staples, as follows: "That we support and encourage those of us who are called by God to be followers of Christ as they live and work in North Africa." Discussion on this proposal was postponed until the next session on Tuesday.

■ 14. Dan Banham, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 15. The meeting closed with prayer by Mark Ankeny.

Tuesday, July 24, 8:15 a.m.

■ 16. The session opened with the singing of gospel and prayer choruses led by Nate Macy and Alivia Biko, followed by a time of quiet waiting. Bruce Bishop led in prayer. He also spoke briefly on discernment – listening to God and to one another. He gave some instructions on discerning how God speaks to each of us.

■ 17. Harold Behr, director of New Works Development, introduced the New Works leaders who were present: Alan and Lori Franks, John Macy, Bruce and Jewell Martin, Craig and Karla Morton, Vern and Carol Landt, Ned Landt, and Lynn Kuchanbach. (See Addendum – Board of Evangelism Report for complete list of New Works leaders.)

■ 18. ■ 19. Scott Nilsen, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 20. Mark Ankeny, presiding clerk, reopened consideration of a possible ministry in North Africa that had been introduced on Monday. After a time of quiet waiting to discern God's will, the proposal from the Board of Missions was approved with some minor changes in the wording. It will now read: "The Northwest Yearly Meeting Board of Missions proposes that we support and encourage those of us who are called by God to be followers of Christ as they live and work after the manner of Friends in North Africa."

■ 21. Nate Macy and Alivia Biko led in the singing of "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing" interspersed with the reading of scripture passages in Russian by Johan Maurer, and in Arabic by Meredith Morse.

■ 22. Dea Cox, clerk, presented the report for the Council of Elders. He stated that he has a feeling of great expectation regarding our church. (The full printed report is in the Addendum.) Clerk Mark Ankeny expressed appreciation to Dea Cox for his years of service as clerk of the Council of Elders. He is stepping down this year.

■ 23. The report of the Board of Peace and Social Concerns was given by Rachel Hampton, co-clerk. (The written report appears in the Addendum.) She also read a proposal from that board regarding the development of a prison/jail ministry:

That NWYM, through the Board of Peace and Social Concerns, form a committee charged with developing prison/jail ministry, the work in the federal and state prisons and in the county jails throughout our jurisdiction.

The coordination would involve training in approach and understanding of jail regulations.

The meeting was opened for discussion. Several spoke affirming this proposal. The proposal was approved.

Rachel asked for volunteers to serve on this committee, which will be under the jurisdiction of the Board of Peace and Social Concerns.

■ 24. Stan Muhr, clerk, reported for the Board of Stewardship. (Printed report is in the Addendum.) He introduced David Hampton, director of Finance and Development, who referred to the printed report, which includes the Friends Fund financial report and the Pension Fund. He announced that the auditors report and a detailed financial report are available at the caretakers desk for those who want to peruse these.

■ 25. David Hampton, Yearly Meeting treasurer, presented the financial report for the year 2000. (See Appendix.) He then presented the proposed budget for the year 2002. The budget was approved.

- 26. The session closed with the singing of "We Are the Family of God." Following a break, the second session opened with singing led by Nate and Alivia.

Tuesday, July 24, 10:45 a.m.

- 27. Lynn Clouser Holt spoke briefly about listening and trusting both God and others. She read Proverbs 3:5 and 6, and Jeremiah 29:11-13. Our basis in all things is trust in God.
- 28. David Thomas, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.
- 29. Assistant Clerk Don Staples read a recommendation from the Executive Council that Joe Gerick's appointment as General Superintendent be extended through June 30, 2003. Approved.
- 30. Upon recommendation from Joe Gerick, the Executive Council recommends that Paul Bock's appointment as Youth Superintendent be extended through June 30, 2003. Approved.
- 31. The Executive Council thanks Harold Antrim for his contribution to the Yearly Meeting and recognized that his duties as Associate Superintendent ended on June 30, 2001.
- 32. Eric Smith, clerk, reported for the Board of Evangelism (included in the Addendum). He referred to the book *The Prayer of Jabez*, which includes the statement "enlarge my boundaries," as the prayer for his personal life and the Board of Evangelism.

Harold Behr reported on "New Works" and read a passage from 1 Corinthians 9 from *The Message*. The apostle Paul set a pattern for the establishment of new churches. The desire of New Works is to reach new people groups in the culture of today. Those working in New Works are not our usual pastors, but are able to reach out to people in the culture of today. Seven or eight new churches have been planted in the last year.

- 33. Assistant Clerk Don Staples read the following change to the *Faith and Practice* that was presented for a first reading last year (see minute 60): "Committees of the Local Church" (page 22 of the *Faith and Practice*).

Committees are appointed by the church to oversee departmental interests and activities. [~~These committees are Elders, Education, Missions, Peace and Social Concerns, Nominating, and Stewardship (which includes the trustees). Fine Arts and Administrative committees are optional.~~] **Every church will appoint Elders, Nominating, and Stewardship committees. Churches will appoint Education, Missions, and Peace and Social Concerns committees or address these concerns in other ways. Additional committees such as Fine Arts or Administrative may be appointed as needed.**

Except as otherwise provided, each committee organizes itself by appointing a presiding clerk, an assistant clerk, and a recording clerk (or secretary). Other officers [~~and committees~~] may be appointed as needed. Clerks of committees should determine that the various areas of interest and concern are responsibly represented.

Concern was expressed regarding the viability of these changes for very small local churches.

This was approved as second reading and change to the *Faith and Practice*.

- 34. The session closed with the singing of "Grace to You."

Wednesday, July 25, 8:15 a.m.

- 35. Nate Macy and Alivia Biko opened the session with the singing of "This Is the Day" and "Blest Be the Tie." Bruce Bishop read a scripture reading from Ephesians 4 from both the NIV and *The Message*. Nate and Alivia led in a responsive reading and the singing of "I Will Magnify the Lord." Bruce Bishop led in prayer, and spoke briefly on Christ-led decision making – finding consensus. He urged us to listen to one another.

- 36. David Brandt, president of George Fox University, gave the report from the university. He welcomed us to the Newberg campus. He pointed out the connections between the Yearly Meeting and the university—the students, faculty and staff, and board members that are members of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Ten percent of the resident students at both GFU and the George Fox Evangelical Seminary are Quakers. He said the establishment of a Friends Center at the seminary is being discussed. The Serve Day that was begun three years ago is following the Friends doctrine of service to others. He paid tribute to Don Millage for his years of service to the university. In all aspects of the school, the aim is for Christ-centeredness.

- 37. Lynn Clouser Holt, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave her testimony.

- 38. Alivia Biko, clerk of the Commission on Fine Arts, reported on the activities of that commission, including "The Hoot!" as part of the Family Fun Day. She had a flyer distributed for the second Artists Retreat to be held in La Grande, Oregon. The members of the commission desire responses regarding the arts programs. Appreciation was expressed for the work of this commission on the Family Fun Day. (A printed report is included in the Addendum.)

- 39. Ron Mulkey, clerk, presented the report for the Board of Education. Departments of this board are Youth, General Education and Church Education. He spoke especially of the value of working with our children. (Printed report is included in the Addendum.)

- 40. Assistant Clerk Don Staples read a letter from Joe Gerick to the Council of Representatives about his desire to spend six months in Russia in the fall of 2002. He wrote:

These are exciting times in Northwest Yearly Meeting. God is going ahead of us to bear new fruit for His Kingdom in a variety of ways. Nowhere is this more exciting than in missions. The Bolivian and Peruvian yearly meetings have matured to the point that we can begin looking for new fields to enter. Last year we sent nine people overseas to teach English and to share their faith as the

opportunity arose. Reports from the teachers are thrilling. God went ahead of us. They had a wonderful experience and some students found Christ. We plan to continue and hopefully expand this program in the future.

Also last year we sent a team consisting of Roscoe Knight, Shawn McConaughy, Duane Comfort and myself to "spy out the lands" of Russia and North Africa. We came back very encouraged by the mission opportunities found in both these countries. During the last few months a video of our trip was shown around the Yearly Meeting to help us discern the Lord's will regarding these new fields. I look forward to seeing what we discern is God's will regarding them.

If the Lord leads us to embrace these fields the Mission Board believes it will take two to three years to get long-term missionaries on site due to the need for recruitment, assessment, and language training. Rather than letting the fields languish during this time, the board will send over short-term workers to get the ball rolling. This is particularly needed in Russia. In North Africa we will probably be working with an established group (Frontiers Missions) that already has infrastructure in place. In Russia, we will be essentially starting from scratch.

Fortunately, the situation in Russia lends itself to short-term effort. We will enter the country as teachers working with two institutes in Elektrostal. The owners of these schools are quite willing to "hire" us, help us find an apartment, and work with the bureaucracy to handle the legal requirements. All teaching will be done in English so that language fluency is not required for a short-term stay.

In February, the Executive Council approved me redirecting my time for six months in order to support this new effort in Russia. Ann and I will travel to Russia after Yearly Meeting 2002, teach and minister for a semester in Elektrostal, and return before Midyear Boards in January, 2003. This opportunity exists because, over the years we have structured the Yearly Meeting office so as to move from being strictly reactive to proactive. Restructuring and the addition of wonderfully capable staff now allow me to focus more of my time on new ministries that can help the Yearly Meeting grow and prosper. For example, in the last couple of years I have spent considerable time working with Harold Behr in launching our new works. More recently I worked with a cadre of leaders to develop the Journey to Wholeness ministry that was launched this Spring and will continue in the future. Now I am excited about assisting the Board of Missions in laying the foundations for ministry in Russia.

During this time my supervisory responsibilities will be doled out as appropriate. Dave Hampton will handle the office and our financial affairs in conjunction with the Board of Stewardship Administrative Committee. The youth and young adult ministries will continue to be handled with excellence by Paul Bock and Sheila Hoyer. Harold Behr will continue to direct New Works. Duane Comfort will administrate the overall missions efforts and, as usual, Terri Bowen will take care of virtually everything else. Pastoral care and crisis intervention will be handled as needed by a team of folks from the Council of Elders. Team members include: Dave Davenport (Boise/Greenleaf); Bob Schneider (Inland/Puget Sound); Paul Almquist (Southwest Washington/Portland/Newberg); Jim Leonard (Salem/Southern Oregon).

I believe that a good administrator creates an organization that can function in his or her absence without faltering. Northwest Yearly Meeting is such an organization. This plan should meet the Yearly Meeting's needs in my absence.

There was considerable discussion concerning this plan, with both questions and voices of approval. The Executive Council will consider some of these concerns at their midyear meeting in February 2002.

■ 41. Phil McLain, co-clerk for the Commission on Family Life, introduced the couples from our yearly meeting who are celebrating 50 years of marriage this year. They are Bill and Joann Bales, Clarence and Ivy Birch, Don and Delores Burg, Bill and Irene Cathers, Allen and Wilma Cole, Dean and Ruth Griffith, Rolly and Mary Ola Haines, Howard and Bethlin Harmon, Gene and Betty Hockett, Alonso and Mary Howard, Clair and Dorothy Lund, Gene and Nadine Mulkey, Dick and Doree Votaw, and Mark and Wilma Roberts.

■ 42. Mark Ankeny closed the session with prayer.

Wednesday, July 25, 10:45 a.m.

■ 43. The Youth Yearly Meeting joined us for this session. It opened with the singing of gospel choruses.

■ 44. Paul Bock, youth superintendent, presented the report for the Friends Youth. (Printed report in the Addendum.) He further reported that the youthworkers of our local churches had met during the year to evaluate the different youth programs of the Yearly Meeting. The Friends Youth officers for the present and the new year were introduced. The new officers for the Junior High Yearly Meeting are: Presiding Clerk—Ashley Rochholz, Assistant Presiding Clerk—Daniel Fleming, Recording Clerk—Taylor Townsend, and Conference Coordinator—Matthew Madjecki. The Senior High officers are: Megan Weaver—Presiding Clerk, Assistant Presiding Clerk—Coby Bixby, Recording Clerk—Holly Dobbeck, Conference Coordinator—Jeremy Goecks, and Youth Representative—Elizabeth (Liz) Ankeny. The youth reported on their service projects they had done during Yearly Meeting—some in the community, and some at Friendsview Manor and the university. The following Epistles from the youth were read:

This year's Northwest Yearly Meeting met at George Fox University beginning Saturday, July 21. - 45. Steve Fawver, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

- 46. Nate Macy led in the singing of "Let Me Be Your Servant" and "We Are the Family of God." Bruce Bishop spoke on "How do we experience how NWYM has been like family to me?" He asked us to share with one another the answer to this question. Nate led in the singing of the prayer song "Speak to Us O Lord" and Lynn Clouser Holt read John 17:20-26.

- 47. Clerk Mark Ankeny introduced the subject of the naming of Friends churches and the use of the name Friends in the street title. According to our *Faith and Practice* the name Friends should be included in the title. The Council of Representatives discussed this at some length on Saturday, and suggested that the *Faith and Practice* Revision Committee consider if changes need to be made.

- 48. The session closed with the singing of "Grace to You."

Thursday, July 26, 8:15 a.m.

- 49. The session opened with the singing of "Clap Your Hands" led by Nate Macy and Alivia Biko. Lynn Clouser Holt read Psalm 92 followed by the singing of "God Is Good." A time of sharing with one another regarding "God Sightings" and the singing of "Giants in the Land" followed. What are "giants" in our lives? We were asked to consider this question for a few moments, then sang "Be Thou My Vision."

- 50. Alannah Morton was introduced from Ireland Yearly Meeting. She brought greetings.

- 51. The Council of Elders, upon recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Kenneth Comfort be recorded as a minister of the gospel. Approved.

- 52. The Council of Elders, upon recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Daniel Banham be recorded as a minister of the gospel. Approved.

- 53. The Council of Elders, upon recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Scott Nilsen be recorded as a minister of the gospel. Approved.

- 54. The Council of Elders, upon recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that David Thomas be recorded as a minister of the gospel. Approved.

- 55. The Council of Elders, upon recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Services, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Lynn Clouser Holt be recorded as a minister of the gospel. Approved.

- 56. The Council of Elders, upon recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Stephen Fawver be recorded as a minister of the gospel. Approved.

- 57. Armond Kalesse, executive director of Friendsview Manor, reported that the Manor is celebrating this year its 40th year of existence, and continues to serve not only our Friends Church, but also the community. Plans, as announced last year, are for an addition to the present facility to include an intermediate care facility for those needing assisted living, and the enlargement of the health care center. Additional funds are needed to implement these plans. Also included is the need for a bus to transport people that can no longer drive their own vehicles, and funds for retired ministers and missionaries that may not have enough funds of their own

to enter Friendsview Manor. The legal name has been changed to Friendsview Retirement Facility, but it will continue to be known as Friendsview Manor. The work of replanting trees and bushes in the Hess Creek area has begun with the help of the Kids Club of Newberg Friends Church.

Steve Gulley, chairman of the board, also spoke briefly, emphasizing that Friendsview Manor is a faith-based facility, as it has been from the start.

■ 58. Phil McLain, co-clerk of the Family Life Commission, reported that \$2,400 for the Richard Beebe Memorial Counseling Fund had been raised through the auction on Saturday. This commission provides funds for ministers needing assistance, as well as supplying a counselor at Pastors Conference and Family Camp. He emphasized that there are videos on family life issues available from the Yearly Meeting office. (A printed report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 59. Clerk of the Communications Commission, Margaret Lemmons, reported that their goal is just that—to communicate. The *NWYM Connection* is no longer being mailed but has been reduced to a bulletin size and is sent in bulk to churches to be included with the Sunday bulletin. It is also now on the NWYM web page and can be accessed by many more people. She praised the use of electronic communication to get information regarding our Yearly Meeting out. Her husband, Gerald, is responsible for producing the web page. (A printed report is included in the Addendum.)

Margaret introduced LeRoy Benham who reported for the Barclay Press Board.

The printing operation of Barclay Press is in the process of being sold, but the publishing end of the business will be carried on by the Yearly Meeting. He displayed several books that have recently been published by Barclay Press. He also announced the merger of George Fox Press and Barclay Press for the continued printing of *Adult Friend* and *Teacher's Friend*, our Friends' Sunday school materials. These are distributed through the Christian bookstores throughout Evangelical Friends International—North America Region. We also cooperate with Word Publications on the Sunday school materials for all other age groups, supplying people to work on the editorial staff to oversee that the materials fulfill our Quaker doctrines.

■ 60. Ron Stansell, Evangelical Friends International Council Director, reported on the EFI, working with native directors in four areas of the world. (A printed report is in the Addendum.)

■ 61. Dea Cox, clerk of the Council of Elders, spoke in regard to the naming of Friends churches. He emphasized the need for connectedness, with an effort to pull to the center. Our churches may be diverse in some ways, but we need to stay connected. There is some sense of “we and they,” especially in regard to the New Works meetings. The issue is not so much a name as the need to stay connected. We need to grow together. Who we are and what we are becoming is more important than the names used. He invited people to attend the Council of Elders meeting at 3 p.m. today to dialogue with them regarding this issue.

■ 62. The session closed with the singing of the Doxology.

Thursday, July 26, 10:45 a.m.

■ 63. The worship team led in the singing of “Great Is Thy Faithfulness” and “I Know That My Redeemer Lives.”

■ 64. The Memorial Service for those ministers and members who have passed away during the past church year was led by Earl Tycksen. (The list is included in the Directory section.) Opportunity was given for those present to speak in tribute to these deceased persons. The service closed with the singing of “Grace to You” as the benediction.

Friday, July 27, 8:15 a.m.

■ 65. The worship team opened the session with the singing of “There Is Joy in the Lord” and “May the Mind of Christ” interspersed with pauses for contemplation.

■ 66. Mark Kelley, clerk of the Board of Ministerial Service, gave the report for that board. (The printed report is included in the Addendum.) This board's main job is working with prospective ministers and guiding them through the recording process. They are working on a new organizational plan to divide the board into divisions to work both with those who are to be recorded and to provide mentors for others.

Randall Emry paid tribute to Marvin Kistler who has served as interim pastor at Talent Friends Church.

Mark encouraged church members to be aware of those who are gifted in ministry and to encourage them in their ministry.

■ 67. Dea Cox reported on the vision for a Friends Center at George Fox Evangelical Seminary. A task force has been working. Paul Anderson also spoke of the advantage of coordinating the university and the seminary especially for Quaker students through the Friends Center. The following proposal was presented:

For nearly two years a task force has prayed, met, and deliberated together over the shared concern to develop a Friends Center at George Fox University. For some time there has been the desire to build an institution that would prepare and equip our church leadership. This was one of the reasons Northwest Yearly Meeting joined hands with others in the formation of Western Evangelical Seminary (WES) over 50 years ago, and it certainly was at the root of the foundation of George Fox University. Now that WES has merged and become George Fox Evangelical Seminary, however, the time seems right for taking the next step: creating a Center that would serve Northwest Yearly Meeting in the targeted goal of training its emerging leaders in their preparation for the ministries to which they are called. A call to serve is a call to prepare for that service, and in stewardship of the Everlasting Gospel of Christ, we can do no less.

Following are some of the needs we have identified and some of the steps we may be led to take in addressing those needs:

Needs Identified:

- to make it more feasible to provide seminary education for our emerging leaders, including providing a sense of community and personal support
- to find ever-increasing ways to promote Friends concerns and perspectives within the community and beyond, creating a “think tank” that would consolidate resources and produce fresh approaches to achieving our God-given callings
- to coordinate various University and Yearly Meeting leadership-preparation endeavors, maximizing assets from several sources

- enhance the leadership development for Northwest Yearly Meeting and evangelical Friends, nationally and otherwise, equipping men and women for the ministries to which they are called.

Particular Steps to Be Taken:

- establish a Friends Center supported by the Yearly Meeting and the University that would draw students committed to vital Friends ministries; host promotional events in the interests of Friends; and coordinate leadership development endeavors for Friends
- develop and promote particular educational offerings designed to equip first-rate pastoral, missionary, and ministerial leaders among Friends, leading to effective service after the manner of Friends
- design particular programs for candidates in the recording process and continuing education for those already in pastoral, missionary, and other forms of Christian service
- augment leadership-development opportunities with for-credit options for enhancing the rigor and applicability of Yearly Meeting seminars and programs
- coordinate George Fox University seminary and undergraduate Quaker concerns, along with various leadership-development ventures of Northwest Yearly Meeting, in ways complementary
- establish internships for seminary students and those preparing for ministry, also facilitating matching internship scholarships between churches desiring to grow and the Yearly Meeting
- appoint a board of directors to oversee the Friends Center's development and support
- appoint a director who will begin to organize and develop such a Center.

The question before us is whether God is leading us at this time to establish a Friends Center at George Fox University and its Seminary. Would such a venture further the Kingdom of God and glorify Christ? Are there ways of building support for such a venture among the existing boards and committees of our yearly meeting? The most important question for us to address, however, is whether establishing such a Center represents the leading of Christ among us at this time? Thank you for considering prayerfully such a vision.

Dea asked for affirmation of what they propose. This was approved both by spoken word and applause.

- 68. Assistant Clerk Don Staples gave the highlights of the Statistical Report, reporting a membership of 7,017. Of these there are 4,640 active members, a gain of 84. From the pastors' reports, the average Sunday morning attendance has been 6,157. Fourteen churches did not report. (The full Statistical Report is in the Appendix.)

- 69. Ken Redford reported for a task force that was appointed last year to look into possible affiliation with other Friends organizations. (Minute 68, 2000). This task force was made up of Louise Sargent, Phil Smith, Bruce Bishop, and Ken Redford. They presented a sheet of investigative guidelines to assist our discernment regarding alignment with other Friends groups.

Shall Northwest Yearly Meeting align itself with _____? Investigative Guidelines to assist our discernment

For any organization NWYM is to consider joining, a report on the following questions would be created by a subcommittee prior to presentation to the floor. It is assumed that no organization will be 100% identical to NWYM, so we need to evaluate "to what extent" we share common values and concerns.

To what extent. . .

- . . . does this ministry fit our YM Core Values?
- . . . does this ministry meet a need we are aware of and have a desire to meet?
- . . . are we doing what we're doing for similar reasons?
- . . . is this the best organization (within our options) working towards this same goal?
- . . . could affiliating with this group be seen as compromising our witness? By whom, and are those perceptions reality?
- . . . will we retain our autonomy?

Organizational Questions:

- Do they have a reputation of integrity?
- Do they have a history of stability as an organization?
- What is their decision-making process?
- Will we have a role? In what way? Do we want a role?
- What will it cost to join/maintain? (money, time, effort, people)
- Do we have the personnel, the "ministers" to do the "ministry"?
- How "loud" will the connection be?
- Do we have to/get to display or advertise the connection?
- How flexible will the connection be?
- Can we work together on some projects and not others?

Questions Regarding Decision:

- How will we know that the affiliation is beneficial?
- What process/criteria shall we use to evaluate success?
- What is the length of our commitment?
- How often, with what regularity, and with what process shall we review and reaffirm our connection/affiliation?
- Is God calling our YM to join this organization?

Several spoke concerning this. Would the affiliation compromise or enhance our witness? How might we contribute to the organization was asked by Howard Macy. It was suggested that this be added to the guidelines suggested by the Task Force. These guidelines were approved. After considerable discussion regarding what organizations we might affiliate with, it was approved that a task force investigate further a possible affiliation with Friends World Committee for Consultation (or other Friends groups) and report back next year. The clerk will put together a task force made up of members of various boards.

■ 72. Jackie Hausinger, clerk of the Epistle Committee, distributed their report—a compilation of the epistles received from other yearly meetings. She read the following epistle to be sent to other yearly meetings.

To Friends Everywhere:

Greetings from the 109th Sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting gathered on the George Fox University campus in Newberg, OR, USA held July 21-27, 2001. Our attendance on Sunday evening was 841 with an average of approximately 725 attenders at the evening sessions during the week.

On Saturday, NWYM started off with a family fun day, featuring various ministries and the introduction of "The Hoot," designed along the lines of an old-fashioned "Hootenanny." This outdoor stage and program of performers provided music and drama to enhance our enjoyment throughout the week. This was a foretaste of the work of the newly reactivated Fine Arts Commission as they seek to encourage music, art and drama as expression of God's call on the artists' and support crews' lives. The Men's Rally and Women's Missionary Banquet in the evening were well attended and generous offerings received to fund new works in NWYM and short-term visits to encourage national church leaders and teachers in Bolivia and Peru.

On Sunday opportunities for worship were varied and included Newberg Hispanic meeting. The Missions Rally was marked by great anticipation. The maturing of the yearly meetings in Bolivia and Peru has freed us to redirect our mission efforts elsewhere. During the week, we approved the recommendation from the Board of Missions to "support and encourage those of us who are called by God to be followers of Christ as they live and work after the manner of Friends" in Russia and North Africa. We are excited to join what the Lord is doing in these areas.

NWYM Superintendent Joe Gerick gave the keynote address. He admonished us to grow like the disciples of Jesus who went from little faith before the resurrection, to great faith afterward. This included a personal challenge to begin tithing and experience the abundance that is a result (Malachi 3:10).

Business was streamlined and combined again with worship in our morning sessions; many feel this to be a great blessing. This year Dan Banham, Lynn Clouser Holt, Ken Comfort, Steve Fawver, Scott Nilsen, and David Thomas were recorded as ministers of the Gospel. Reports were encouraging as we heard from boards and commissions. There was something for everyone at the 43 workshops held during the week on many interesting and pertinent topics. We acknowledged and celebrated a number of couples who have been married for 50 years during a worship session. The Memorial Service included 63 names and provided time to speak of the value of these Friends' lives.

We labored at length this year again about the necessity for new meetings to use the word "Friends" in their name. This subject among others, including truthfulness and integrity, has brought much lively discussion bringing up considerations that are deeper than the surface issue. We have heard each other, and have yet to arrive at a clear leading. With some fear and trembling we are exploring our diverse positions revealed through the dialog and asking ourselves what our "Quakerliness" really means.

New Works introduced a number of people who will be involved in various ways in church planting and nurture. They have become a recognizable presence in NWYM, infecting us with fresh excitement. A concern was brought from the Board of Peace and Social Concern for prison ministries. We will begin recognizing and encouraging workers who are already doing this as individuals, plus supporting them in prayer and fellowship.

Our theme for these days was "For Such a Time as This" with Chuck Orwiler bringing our evening messages. Chuck is pastor of Denver Friends Church and a graduate of George Fox College (now University). His messages of simple yet deep content drawn from the Gospel of John opened to us the truth that Jesus is already at work. We need to be open to discern where He is working and cooperate in it, for when we try to fix people and manage organizations we become weary and ineffective. "Christ is building His Church and has gracefully enlisted our participation. We are partners in ministry with Him when we do faithfully what He calls us to do: obey His commands, love as He loved, and pray as He prayed, then He produces the fruit. Ministry like this is an easy yoke, and rest for our souls." Then we can walk lightly on this earth, answering "that of God in everyone."

The young people attending Youth Yearly Meeting led the Wednesday evening worship session. The worship was a profound blessing as they challenged us with their passion, gifts and insight. We felt so very blessed in fellowship with them.

Visitors to our sessions this year included Gloria Kershner, Friends World Committee for Consultation representative, who told us about the opportunity for those age 18 - 35 to be involved in planning and attending a projected FWCC World Gathering of Young Friends in 2003. Bob Barns from Right Sharing of World Resources is a good Friend to all of us here and we welcomed him back again this year. Vicki Hinshaw from EFM was also with us. Youth Yearly Meeting was attended by Alannah Morton and Aiden McCartney from Ireland Yearly Meeting. Alannah spoke and brought greetings and word of the construction of a building to house a youth center in Northern Ireland.

At the final meeting for worship for business, the Yearly Meeting approved the

vision for establishing a Friends Center at George Fox Evangelical Seminary. The task force that brought the opportunity to our awareness will continue to work with the Seminary and the appropriate Yearly Meeting entities to bring the vision to fruition.

Our annual sessions have been a time of abundance and rest for us amid all of the opportunities for activity as we heard of a balanced budget and things running smoothly throughout the Yearly Meeting. We leave here aware that we can look to Jesus to lead us in unforced rhythms of grace (Matthew 11:28).

HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH YEARLY MEETING MINUTES

Sunday July 22, 11:30 a.m.

The Youth Yearly Meeting convened their sessions on the campus of George Fox University, Newberg, Oregon, with a joint session of junior high (JH) and senior high (SH) youth. Present were: 137 youth including Stephanie Steinhorst (SH Presiding Clerk), Stephen Nagell (JH Presiding Clerk), Laurie Wing (SH Assistant Clerk), Anthony Sargent (JH Assistant Clerk), Kat Wilson (SH Recording Clerk), Ellie Saxton (JH Recording Clerk), Douglas Nagell (SH Conference Coordinator), Mark Schuchardt (JH Conference Coordinator), and Steven Beardsley (Youth Representative).

01-01 Stephanie Steinhorst shared with us out of her prayer journal, encouraging us to see God in our small, normal things and to keep worshipful in our times for business together.

01-02 Douglas Nagell and Mark Schuchardt exhorted us to respect one another, our living spaces, the organizers of our stay here, one another's need for sleep, and the folks who are working to keep us safe. Doug and Mark enthuse about our opportunity to listen to God and one another in community.

01-03 Laurie Wing, Mark and Ellie Saxton guide us in worship etiquette. They reminded us to go to the bathroom before the long evening worship session; invited us to go up and be prayed for at the altar if we are so led, and some tips on when to go back to your seat if you do go up. They also reminded us of the seating arrangement, which is sitting with two or three youth and then mingle with the older people of NWYM; and encouraged us to be respectful in our garb and particularly to be mindful of modesty.

01-04 Each of the officers shared what their role is in our meetings for worship for business. Presiding Clerk—facilitates the meeting and keeps us on time as well as articulating the sense of the meeting and discerning the way Christ is moving amongst us. Assistant Clerk—assists in discernment and writes the epistle we send to other youth yearly meetings. Recording Clerk—listens to what people are saying and how God is moving amongst us and minutes this for publication in the NWYM session minutes. Conference Coordinator—knows the answers about the conference: who, what, where, and when questions.

01-05 Stephanie introduced us to the nomination process we will begin tomorrow. We will begin in a time of quiet worship and prayerfully consider the gifts that each position requires and listen for Christ to give us names of people He wants to lead us in the next year. After we have a list of names, the current officers will spend significant time in worship listening for one of these names to stick out at them for each position and bring their recommendations to the gathered body. 01-06 The Youth Worship Committee (YWC) asked us to take a few minutes to rest in God and consider how we are led to go about our turn at leading worship on Youth Night. We sat in prayer together; and as we were led, we jotted down what we heard in the silence and gave these papers to the YWC to consider and sculpt into an evening of worship.

01-07 Doug encouraged us to get out of our comfort zone at this evening's Ice Cream Social and get to know folks not of our own generation. Friends speak to the richness of the Yearly Meeting beyond us youth, and there is quiet excitement at

our small "anti-agist" revolution.

01-08 The basic guideline of staying close enough to the clock tower to hear "It's time to go to bed!" in a moderately loud voice was laid out by Doug.

01-09 Mark asked us to refrain from using wheeled devices (roller blades, skateboards, bikes) in the dorms.

01-10 Paul Bock asked us to be thinking about how we individually and corporately can be involved in NWYM. What is God laying on our hearts as a concern or a need for the community? What is God calling you to be part of? We will prayerfully consider this throughout the week and come together on Friday to share what we have heard in our listening to Christ on this matter.

01-11 The Junior Highers head off to free time before lunch.

01-12 Kat Wilson, recording clerk, read the YYM 2000 minutes.

01-13 Steven Beardsley shared about his role as youth representative and his trip to Oklahoma and Mid-America Yearly Meeting, and brought greetings to us from the youth there. Steven added to his experience as being the first youth representative who has also been actively involved as an officer. Next year's youth representative will attend the Friends Evangelical Eastern Region sessions.

01-14 Doug shared about our opportunity to attend workshops on the 23rd and the 25th. He urged us to go with an open mind and ask any questions we have. (And assured us that the adults won't bite us!)

01-15 The meeting adjourned, to meet again on Monday.

Monday, July 23, 10:00 a. m.

01-16 Kat offered a reading from Parker Palmer emphasizing worship and action through our business as a process holy and filled with Spirit.

01-17 Stephanie introduced the Quaker business process.

01-18 Kat read the minutes of the 22nd. A concern is raised that they are rather long, and Kat agreed that she will try to be more concise. Friends offer other changes and they are incorporated into the minutes. The minutes were approved.

01-19 Laurie invited us to consider the following questions: What gives you energy when you think about being involved in NWYM? What concerns you? What is God showing you?

01-20 We enter a deeply worshipful time. Out of our silence together, we shared the names Christ prompted us for each of the officer positions and for youth representative.

01-21 Cherice Eichenberger brought greetings from the Friends Youth Executive Committee, describing what they do, and read their annual report.

01-22 The meeting closed in quiet prayer.

Tuesday July 24, 10:00 a.m.

01-23 Steven offered the wisdom of Proverbs 3:5-6 for its relevance to our process in business and for our lives outside of this Christ-high time. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct your paths." Steven invited us to take time in

silence, reflecting on things we need to give to God, and ways we need to trust more.

01-24 Kat read the minutes of the 23rd and they were approved.

01-25 Doug introduced Bruce Bishop, field secretary for leadership development for the Board of Evangelism. He shared the exciting news about the minutes passed regarding Russia and North Africa, and the new committee for prison ministry (see adult session minutes). He told about his job of helping educate in the areas of corporate discernment and individual discernment, and invited us to speak with him and to keep considering how we are being called to minister.

01-26 Laurie read the 2000 epistle from Pacific Yearly Meeting's high school and preschool sessions. She also shared the NWYM YYM high school epistle from 2000 with us.

01-27 Stephanie brought before us the recommendations for 2002 officers that this year's officers nominated after several hours of prayerful consideration. We considered these in stillness one by one. As we were led by Christ, we spoke affirmation or concern towards each recommendation. The following were approved as officers for 2002: Jeremy Goecks—Conference Coordinator, Holly Dobbeck—Recording Clerk, Coby Bixby—Assistant Presiding Clerk, Megan Weaver—Presiding Clerk, and Elizabeth (Liz) Ankeny—Youth Representative.

Friends spoke to the power of the process we followed and to the deepness of the presence of Christ among us.

01-28 We closed in stillness, prayer and sang "Amen." This was a meeting of joy.

Wednesday, July 25, 9:50 a.m.

01-29 Doug opened with a devotional, using the beginning of Psalm 8 as a focus for centering down.

01-30 A concern is raised about the absence of Kat due to injury and 2002 Recording Clerk Holly Dobbeck agreed to take minutes. Stephanie prays for Kat to recover.

01-31 Laurie read the epistle for approval. A few concerns came up; we discussed them, and changed the epistle to reflect our understanding of these new points. The epistle was approved.

01-32 Stephanie told about the adult business meeting we will attend, and urged us to be open and responsive to their time of worship and business. Sheila Hoyer and Joe Millard affirmed this and also reminded us to be respectful.

01-33 Steven closed in prayer and we headed to the adult business meeting.

Wednesday, July 25, 3:00 p.m.

01-34 We opened in a prayer for the Council of Elders as they have a time of discerning around the issue of requiring the word "Friends" in the name of NWYM churches. Stephanie closed the prayer.

01-35 Stephanie asked questions concerning our experience at the adult business meeting, including: "What did you like or dislike?" Youth shared a variety of perspectives and we discussed them. The overall sense of our conversation was

that it was a good experience and another good opportunity to help break down the walls between generations. God was present throughout the meeting in testimonies, in the music, and in the way business was conducted.

01-36 Sheila informed the meeting about the details of our much-anticipated beach trip, asking that we bring only the minimum of luggage and encouraging us to remember such things as deodorant and toothbrushes.

01-37 The meeting ended and we went to load the buses for the beach trip.

Friday, July 27, 9:40 a.m.

01-38 Laurie invited us into a time of centering. Out of our quiet together, she shared some wisdom from *A Testament of Devotion*, by Thomas Kelly, and challenged us to leave this place God-blinded.

01-39 Kat read Wednesday's minutes. They were approved, and the meeting affirmed Holly for her pinchhitting.

01-40 Stephanie led us in a time of debriefing our YYM experience and encouraged us to ponder these questions: What was good about this week? Where do you think you have grown or are stronger because of this week? Where do you think you heard or encountered God this week?

We saw God in times where things didn't go according to plan yet remained full of God; in leadership among officers and counselors and their continual challenge to us all to focus on God and live in a worshipful state; in our willingness to try new things in worship; in answered prayers; in the faces and smiles of our community; in the mindfulness and joy in all of our listening, speaking and worshipping together.

We are thankful for the people who have given us the gift of letting us see the Christ that is in us; for a place to anchor; a family to belong to for a week; for the listening and faithfulness each of us has pursued during our time together; the insight that it is not the having but the loving that leads to happiness; and for a place to be healed with the help of that of God in each of us.

God gives us this encouragement throughout the body, sentence fragment by sentence fragment. Spending an entire week practicing the presence of God is a beginning and a blessing, but this isn't it. We have a lifetime to live this joy, this peace and this challenge. Whenever we leave a place, Christ, who is a part of our deepest selves, goes with us.

A few scheduling concerns and affirmations are raised: 1) We need more sleep. 2) We would like more family group time. 3) We would like one group time where we have mandatory quiet processing time, such as solo time or unprogrammed worship. Half an hour would be a good amount for this. 4) We liked having Youth Night brought to us as a gathered body for listening to what God wanted us to do with it, and would like that practice to continue. 5) We felt on Youth Night that we were treated more as a performance than as a worship time, and would like to work in the future to clarify that we would prefer people not clap unless it's for God, not for us.

01-41 This discussion flowed smoothly into consideration of what God is leading us to be and do in NWYM. What are we feeling called to corporately? What are we feeling called to individually? The major theme of our worshipful conversation was that we desire to be a more integral part of the NWYM family but also want to retain what is unique about us as youth, and want the adults to retain what is

unique about them as adults. Specifically, we desire to have youth representatives be a part of the Council of Representatives and attend the regular adult sessions and we would like to have high school age person(s) on the Yearly Meeting worship team. We believe that our current degree of separation is keeping us from doing some of what God would like us to be doing as a Yearly Meeting. We believe that the adult Yearly Meeting has a lot to give and teach us and that the Youth Yearly Meeting can likewise enrich the adults. Together we can not only deepen our understanding of God by sharing our diverse experiences; we believe that we can also powerfully transform the world by working and playing together. The best way to achieve a closer tie between us is to begin to dialogue. We would like to see opportunities for that in 2002.

01-42 We gave thanks and closed the 2001 session of Youth Yearly Meeting.

ADDENDUM ANNUAL REPORTS

July 2001

Council of Elders

The Northwest Yearly Meeting Council of Elders continued praying for our pastors and Yearly Meeting personnel, and the work of the church throughout the Northwest with particular emphasis on our new works effort. We have reviewed the state of the church and feel that even though some of our churches are struggling, the Yearly Meeting as a whole is enjoying a level of success that we haven't seen in a number of years. Attendance and membership is up, and many churches are reporting a growing commitment to Christ. There have been a few problems of conflict within our churches, but no issues of moral failure among our leadership in the past year. Because we have had a few moral failure problems in the past, we have continued to explore ways the Yearly Meeting could proactively help our leadership avoid problems in these areas. To this end, in cooperation with the Board of Ministerial Service, we developed a set of queries for personal and professional ethics. These are designed to be used by church leaders for personal inventorying. We also developed a series of ethical issues to be discussed with ministers during the recording process. Our efforts were met with affirmation by most, but by concern on the part of a few, so we are continuing our efforts to arrive at a more acceptable approach to these areas.

Another one of our major concerns has been increasing the level of connectedness in our churches so we have increased communication between the Yearly Meeting elders and the local church through a program of phone calls and visitations. We have also appointed Don Lamm as District Superintendent in the Southern Idaho area to provide increased contact with churches in the Treasure Valley. The program has only been in operation a few months but it seems to be a success. We are exploring ways to extend the program to other areas.

We are very supportive of the efforts of the Board of Evangelism in starting new works and the Board of Missions in their exploration of new mission fields. We encourage the churches to be much in prayer for these efforts and to begin planning to provide financial support for them.

The spirit of renewal in our churches that we noted a couple of years ago continues to grow. These are great times for Northwest Yearly Meeting. God is moving among us and we appear to be willing to follow Him. We believe He's leading us into a magnificent future.

Board of Education DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH EDUCATION

The Department of Church Education would like to thank the many fine Christian education people in our local churches. Your effort on behalf of the children of NWYM in recruiting, teaching, leading youth groups, Bible quizzing, camp leader-

ship, VBS, and other innovative activities is very much appreciated. Suggestions of how this department can be of service to you will be gratefully received.

The Department has met twice since Yearly Meeting 2001. Follow-up of these sessions has been carried on by phone, mail, and e-mail. We have discussed suggestions brought to our attention at Yearly Meeting. Some problems have been noted and worked on. Some of these have no easy or cheap solution and are ongoing concerns for which we are seeking answers. Others seem to have been satisfactorily dealt with.

We are still very concerned that a Christian education director be in place, at the Yearly Meeting level, to give direction to all phases of Christian education and, especially, with children of grade school age and below. We are expecting to have a qualified person in place on a half-time basis by September 2001.

Irene Rice, again, did a very fine job of coordinating Children's Yearly Meeting last year. Thank you, Irene! Several board members either volunteered to help out for an evening or provided someone to help. This proved to be very interesting! She will not be serving in that capacity in 2001 so she can attend Yearly Meeting with the adults for a year. A concern we have is to devise a method of locating parents if the need to contact them arises, while their child is in our care. This is an ongoing concern.

We trust that all of you will efficiently use the Yearly Meeting system for registration so that the facilities at Camp Tilikum will be available to all who wish to attend. Your cooperation in registering your child as quickly as possible for this program will be much appreciated.

(G.O. is an acronym for "God and Others.") We are excited about this joint venture of the Mission Board and the Department of Church Education. We appreciate our editor, Betty Comfort, very much. This department and the Mission Board have named coordinators, Elaine Koskela and Verne Martin, to help Betty in any way possible. We would like to thank the Mission Board for bringing this idea to our attention. It has been fun! We also wish to thank the children of missionary families (Kid Missionaries) for the input they have had. They, and their parents, have provided us with very good, creative material to use in this publication. We feature the children of a specific missionary family in each issue. This publication will also feature stories by our talented NWYM writers. We are publishing every two months and will have sent out the fifth issue by Yearly Meeting 2001. The plan is to feature different Friends missionary families on a rotating basis. We would very much like to hear reports on how *G.O.* is being used in the local churches. We hear from some that the adults like it as well as the children!

The Department of Church Education feels that our efforts support the Core Values of NWYM very well. All seven of them are evident at various times during the year. Jesus Christ's presence is very real as His Holy Spirit empowers us to carry out tasks that He reveals as His will for our department. Every bit of encouragement and knowledge of God that we can provide for our young people helps them to know and witness His love. The Child Protection Policy was suggested because we feel children are valuable and worthy of Christ's love. The *G.O.* newsletter seemed from the very beginning to be led of God and within His will to help educate our children about mission life. The entire Christian Education program in NWYM is designed to make followers of Christ. We feel that having a C.E. Director at the Yearly Meeting level will help local churches teach the Bible to children

more effectively. In facilitating the C.E. program in local churches, we desire to demonstrate to our young people the same concern and Holy Spirit empowerment that was shown by the adults that dealt with us as children and youth.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

The Department has over the last two years restructured the educational assistance program we superintend for Northwest Yearly Meeting. This is expressed through the work we do to assist people in exploring their leadings from God educationally. Beginning this year, we also provide experiential mentoring and training for those in ministry. This is a new program that as a Department we are very excited about. We are now offering additional study options besides the traditional Master of Divinity or the Masters of Arts.

DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH

This year was the second full year with Paul Bock and Sheila Hoyer in their respective roles at the Yearly Meeting offices. While the first year was somewhat of a whirlwind tour and required a steep learning curve, this past year has provided more of an opportunity for Paul and Sheila to expand their ministry and make it fit their skills and abilities more appropriately. On two separate occasions, the Department of Youth was able to affirm Paul and Sheila's work, once at the Youthworkers Training Conference in the fall and again at the Youth Department Retreat in the spring.

The topic for the annual Youthworkers Training Conference in Bend was sexuality. Stan Thornburg led the training sessions, and spoke openly and honestly during the three-day retreat. Stan tackled difficult issues that youthworkers have been encountering with youth, such as pornography, and masturbation, all the while maintaining the importance of Christ. This year, the retreat moved from nearby Inn of the Seventh Mountain to Bachelor Village, and will probably remain there as Sheila pursues a longer contract with them.

Perhaps the main theme for the Youth Department Retreat this spring was evaluation. Much time was given towards beginning an honest, open examination of the existing youth and young adult programs supported by the Yearly Meeting. While there are currently no plans to change or put-down individual youth programming events, it was the sense of the meeting that it was time to evaluate the purposes and implementations that have been in place for a long time.

The meeting again affirmed the work that Paul and Sheila have been doing, but asked them to consider changes to their individual job descriptions. They were asked to bring their proposals to this year's Youthworkers Training Conference in the fall. Other issues discussed were Youth Yearly Meeting, Samuel School I and II, YouthQuake, Bible Quizzing, the Spiritual Formation Project, and Young Adult Friends programming. Time was given during all of these reports to consider the

individual effectiveness of each. Where appropriate, plans were made to continue longer dialogs regarding certain programs.

FRIENDS YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Friends Youth Executive Committee (FYE) this year was composed of: Cherice Eichenberger, clerk; Janelle Hampton, assistant clerk and recording clerk; Angela Clouser, YCAM director; Dan White, YCEW director; Matt Burg, YCEW assistant; Wendee Selby, YCCM and YCAM assistant; Aimee Buchholz, youth calendar; Nick Chapman, Midwinter; Joel Bock, volleyball; Sarah Lawson, treasurer; Mark Johnson, member-at-large; Amanda Keaton, member-at-large; and Roxy Lowry, member-at-large. Weekly meetings were held at the home of Paul and Miriam Bock, with Paul serving as the FYE advisor.

The annual *Calendar* was sent out in December 2000. The calendar's theme was Quaker young people from history who made an impact on the world through following God. It was sent to more than 1,000 youth and youthworkers throughout the Yearly Meeting.

Midwinter occurred at Greenleaf Friends Church December 27-31, 2000. Twenty-six youth and 19 adult staff attended. The numbers were low due to YouthQuake and other events happening around the same time for Yearly Meeting youth. The small size of the camp helped to foster a sense of closeness not often achieved at camps with larger numbers. Joe Thouvenel taught classes on the mystery of God.

The *Volleyball Tournament* was held at George Fox University April 19-20, 2001. A new computer program was used as an experiment, which does bracketing so the director doesn't have to do it by hand. It was a useful tool, which will be used in subsequent years. Another experiment was having participants vote on which team they thought deserved the sportsmanship award. This worked well and helped participants to look for the good in their opponents. Newberg won the Quaker division, Tigard was the victorious team of Friends Division A, and Vancouver was the champion of Friends B. The Sportsmanship Award went to 2nd Street Community.

YCAM (Youth Challenged through Arts in Ministry) was led by Kasey Lawson and Angela Dierickx. Team members included Erin Eichenberger (Newberg), Katie Hadden (Cherry Grove), Jeremy Goecks (Camas), and Kate Gerrick (Newberg). They traveled to churches around the Yearly Meeting in June and July, sharing their gifts in the arts as well as doing service projects with youth groups and churches they visited. They will complete their tour with a performance on Wednesday night of Yearly Meeting.

YCEW (Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview) boldly went where no Northwest Yearly Meeting youth have gone before: to China. This was an exciting adventure made possible with the help of Dennis and Janet Hagen and their contacts in China. The group had the chance to tour historical sights, see major cities, and even teach about American culture in some high schools and colleges. The tour has been dubbed a cultural trip since missionaries are, as yet, not allowed in China. Three leaders were chosen to ensure the trip's safety and gender balance: Keri Kimberly, Scott Cornwall, and Dwight Burton. The youth included Jennifer Shelton (Newberg), Catie Stokes (Greenleaf), Jennifer Davis (Post Falls), Miriam Voth (Newberg), and Robyn Smith (Boise).

YCCM (Youth Challenged through Children's Ministries) was on its year of not having a team due to the rotation system implemented recently. This year was used

to prepare for next summer's trip. The rotation gives FYE extra time to prepare, as well as serving to give adult leaders ample time to get a summer off to lead a YC (Youth Challenge) trip. However, it has still been increasingly difficult to find leaders for these teams. We need leaders who are willing and able to listen to this call and plan for a fun-filled summer of ministry and leadership on one of these exciting tours. The FYE requests your prayers for leadership for this ministry.

FYE has also been working on a method of prayer support and encouragement between youth groups in the Yearly Meeting. The Calendar included the name of a church each week, and suggested that each youth group could pray for that church. An attempt has been made to begin Sibling Youth Groups who would pray for one another, encourage each other, as well as getting together to play and minister. Last year a few churches joined in this new opportunity, but this year only one pair was involved, although considerable interest had been shown by youthworkers. FYE will decide next year what direction to go with Sibling Youth Groups.

FYE also began posting minutes from meetings onto the youthworkers' listserve in order to remind them of upcoming events; to foster their prayer support; and to let them know the style in which we do business. This was put into practice at the end of the year, and will continue when meetings resume in the fall.

Along with planning and implementing all of these youth events, FYE is a place of growth and greater understanding of Quaker business practices for those on the committee. It is a good reminder of listening for God in all aspects of life. Thank you for the opportunity to be on such a committee, and for the trust you, as the rest of the Yearly Meeting, place in us as we attempt to follow God's lead in planning these events. Lives are changed through this ministry – lives of youth as well as those on FYE.

Board of Evangelism

This past year I have been amazed at the way in which a good story can "grow wings" and just "take off." But what is more important than a sports-oriented story I'm recalling is the mighty way in which God's salvation story continues to grow wings and soar to new places we've never explored and to vistas we have never before attained. This year was no exception.

Every new "telling" and expression of the gospel story in the NWYM is the result of much hard work of our Yearly Meeting staff and its cooperative leadership with our Board of Evangelism.

In this report I will include thoughts and descriptions as described by two of our leaders, Bruce Bishop and Harold Behr, which adequately describe where the wind of God's Spirit has been leading us.

Bruce considers his work for the Yearly Meeting, under the Board of Evangelism to have been very fulfilling. Bruce feels he has had the opportunity to meet and minister with:

- individuals as they listen to God and try to name the call to ministry that is stirring within them;
- pastors and spouses, through his hosting of the three Sabbath Series retreats at Twin Rocks and Quaker Hill, creating space for us to deepen our spiritual experience through formational exercises and spiritual disciplines;
- twenty-three young Quaker students at George Fox University involved in the Quaker Leaders Program;

- pastors and local churches via the Natural Church Development program that Arden Kinser and Don Lamm are supervising;
- local church elders in retreats or seminars to discuss their role and the mechanics of spiritually discerning God's voice in their meetings;
- local church clerks and representatives through a Boise-centered and a Portland-centered day-long seminar to build personal and corporate skills of discernment as well as getting the sense of a meeting for business. We also held a weekend seminar for Representatives during Midyear Boards.
- junior and senior high school leaders and those experiencing God through the arts at Samuel Schools I and II and the Artists Retreat;
- worship discernment and leadership at Focus Conference, Pastors Conference, Youthworkers Training Conference, and Yearly Meeting Sessions.

Bruce says, *"In general, I am experiencing my call being directed toward the deepening of our ability to discern the movement of God in our lives as individuals and as a gathered People. My ministries this year have revolved around: one-on-one discernment; worship retreats and exercises; and teaching the skills of spiritual discernment and clerking. It is God who calls us into leadership and ministry, and directs us into appropriate levels of preparation and education. Therefore, as we deepen our ability to hear God, corporately and individually, we'll become the leaders God desires."*

"I tend to 'bookend' the work that Harold Behr is doing, working with people as they struggle to discern the initial direction of their call, and then with the leadership in established meetings as they struggle to hear and respond to God's continuing call."

In the words of Harold Behr, *"A fresh wind of the Spirit is blowing across Friends in the Northwest."* He gives us the following update:

Harold is pleased with the growing amount of feedback he is receiving from the *New Works Interchange*. People are reading the newsletter, completing prayer and support cards, and writing notes of appreciation. Our "Lunch-and-Learn" series on church planting/training and core values will continue through the year; held the fourth Saturday of the month, three have been completed thus far with good attendance.

Harold is working on developing material for a new church web link off the Northwest Yearly Meeting site (www.nwfriends.org). It will include pre-assessment information, relevant articles, and news/updates of current activity. The target for completion date of this is in the fall.

Harold also hopes that during Yearly Meeting many will take advantage of what the Board of Evangelism has to offer, including attending some of the many board-sponsored workshops and stopping by the coffee kiosk in the atrium (Quaker communion juice) to chat or to get answers to some of your questions. There will also be a worship gathering for new works leaders.

Harold is also putting much effort into leadership development. He has conducted two new works leadership development workshops this year, and has participated in the "Journey to Wholeness" seminar. Harold plans additional workshops in August and October to train leadership in new church themes, and to spend time in ministry through prayer and counseling.

The assessment process has been fruitful. Twenty-five leaders have gone through the pre-assessment process in the past 12 months and many have moved on to the

next phase in front of a team of assessors (24 or so) for a full assessment, before continuing on to start a new work. Perhaps nine or more who "pass" the full assessment will go on to start a new work.

In addition to this, we currently have several leadership/new church development possibilities that are entering the assessment process whose fruit may result in producing an additional six new works. Harold says,

"Our 'spiritual bandwidth' is reflected in the wide variety of visions and callings. Everything from Art House Friends in Cottage Grove to conventional evangelism centers such as New Life Friends in Vancouver is being used by God as the nets for the harvest. But common to all the new works are the commitments to honoring Christ as the Teacher in our midst, and to the core values reflected in the Faith and Practice. Like the churches the apostle Paul planted in the biblical era, the appearances and customs vary greatly according to the culture to which the Word is preached. We share Paul's perspective in Romans 15:20, 'My ambition has always been to preach the good news where the name of Christ has never been heard, rather than where a church has already been started by someone else.'"

Those words come from someone with a true heart for church planting and I implore you to support Harold and our Yearly Meeting's traditional and contemporary approaches to church planting. Some of these new works include:

- **Dan and Mindy Burns** who are moving ahead with development of the Wheeler Church.
- The official opening of "The River" church/ministries in Redmond, Oregon (**John and Karen Macy**). Forty were in attendance at their first meeting on May 13.
- "Lively Stones" (**David and Karen Gilmore**) in the Forest Grove-Gaston area.
- **Alan and Lori Franks** feel God's confirmation and calling to the area of Cave Junction and eventually Brookings. They are shepherding and growing the work that Bob Rodriguez has been caring for, but as a result of health issues is now on leave.
- **Paul and RuthAnn Harding** are preparing to be part of the leadership in forming a new core group in Nampa.
- **Trey and Stephanie Doty** are working with families in The Northwest Portland Project.
- "Ye Olde Meeting House" in La Grande, Oregon (**Dave and Carla Arnold**) continues to expand its ministries.
- New Life Friends in Vancouver (**Dave and Renee White, Mike and Carmen Slothower, and Mike and Evelyn Mikaele**) is experiencing rapid conversion growth, and is emphasizing discipleship training these days and is planning on a major expansion of meeting facilities this next year.
- Art House Friends (**Dan and Lynn Gilliam**) is coming together as the Gilliam's are enroute due to land in mid-August in Cottage Grove. The core group is coming together in commitment via an e-mail group Dan oversees.

These are just some of the stirrings of the Spirit of God.

As clerk I would also like to extend our board's appreciation to Harold Antrim and his years of faithful service to our board. Harold and Marilyn have been the "brains" behind much of the operation and we will miss them greatly as they move on to local church ministry again at Sherwood Friends. Harold has been warning us that this

time would come, but now it is here, and we wish him the best as he pursues his next dream.

As the wind of God's Spirit blows "wherever it wills" I covet your prayers and support for the Board as we discern where the wind of the Spirit is blowing – for God's Spirit is truly the "wind beneath our wings."

With the obvious workings of God's Spirit this year, in addition to the Friends value of "...being and making followers of Christ" we also include the value: "The Holy Spirit transforms and empowers us." We are convinced of God's desire to unleash His power in the NWYM in some mighty ways.

Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and His understanding no one can fathom. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.

During these 2001 sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting, the Board of Ministerial Service is pleased to recommend the following persons for recording as Friends ministers in Northwest Yearly Meeting:

Dan Banham is a founding pastor at City's Edge in Beaverton, Oregon. A graduate of Multnomah School of the Bible, he first joined Friends in the early nineties as a youth pastor at Vancouver Friends. Dan is passionate about reaching out to the lost with God's grace and equipping the members of the church for ministry. His music has been a blessing to many, both in his church and at camps and retreats.

Ken Comfort has just returned from fourteen years of missionary service to Peru. Ken grew up on the mission field, but didn't feel called personally to the mission field until he had spent several years in Oregon. While he was attending the Oregon Institute of Technology, Ken worked with youth at Klamath Falls. Later, he served as youth pastor at Newberg Friends. His gifts in nurturing believers and leaders have been deeply appreciated by the church in Peru.

Steve Fawver is pastor of youth ministries at Newberg Friends Church. He earned both a bachelor's degree and master's degree at George Fox University. Steve grew up at Tilikum, and always knew that God would use him in pastoral ministry. He consistently guides the youth at Newberg to listen to God and respond creatively.

Lynn Clouser Holt serves on the pastoral team of Reedwood Friends Church in Portland, Oregon. Lynn holds a Master of Divinity degree from George Fox University. She has accepted a wide range of responsibilities at Reedwood including preaching, teaching, clerking the pastoral team, and spiritual and leadership development. To each of these she has brought enthusiasm, a healing touch, and a deep sense of Christ's presence.

Scott Nilsen is pastor of adult ministries at Newberg Friends Church. Scott comes to us from the Evangelical Friends Church-Southwest. Scott reaches out to unbelievers, offering them the hope of salvation. His even-keeled leadership keeps a

clear focus on Christ. Scott recently finished his Master of Divinity degree at the Friends Center in Azusa, California.

David Thomas will return shortly to Rwanda, Africa, beginning his second term as a missionary for Evangelical Friends Mission. Before leaving for the mission field, he was youth pastor at West Chehalem Friends Church for three years. David felt called into the ministry when he was ten. While on furlough, David has studied how to help the Rwandan church develop into a mature, reproducing church.

Helping these six people finish all the requirements for recording has occupied the largest section of our time. In addition, five people continue under the care of the Board and we anticipate beginning the recording process for three people.

The Board continues to wrestle with ways to respond to two pressures we feel. First, we are very committed to the Quaker proposition that ministry belongs to all members and that we *record* God's ministry through selected individuals, rather than creating it. Second, many of our churches and most of our pastors expect something more from our financially-released ministers (especially pastors). Whether it is formal education, informal mentoring, peer-to-peer accountability or continuing education, there is a strong sense that our pastors should be continually developing their ministries. The Board may recommend in the near future that it be divided into at least two divisions: one to record ministers; the other to provide ongoing nurture and training of those in released ministry.

The Board is investigating ways to prevent moral failure by our spiritual leaders. We are strengthening our attention to personal morals and ethics in our dialogue with recording candidates. Other pro-active ways of providing safeguards may be considered as well.

The Board partners with mentors, local elders and our educational institutions in gift recognition and ministry development. We are excited about the future of Northwest Yearly Meeting as we work with men and women who minister in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Board of Missions

The "new thing" that the Board of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting has pursued for the past two years has taken on a much clearer picture in the past year as a result of further investigation and a survey team commissioned to visit ministry opportunities in parts of North Africa and Russia. As further steps play out to "phase-over" into a new relationship with Bolivia and Peru yearly meetings, it increasingly seems right to find new doors of ministry elsewhere to continue fulfilling Jesus' Great Commission. The Board has formed preliminary task forces to guide policy and personnel for these new works.

New Fields: The Board of Missions specifically requests approval and endorsement of the Yearly Meeting for the beginning of cross-cultural service, witness and evangelism in these two parts of the world, both for short-term and long-term service. This comes as a result of our sense of obedience to God's will, as a result of the survey report from October 2000, the possibility of bi-vocational ministry, and the initial interest of concerned persons yet to be candidated and approved. Phase-over in ministry in Bolivia and Peru will allow some funding to be redirected to new locations beginning in one year.

English Teachers: We have successfully completed the first full year of candidating, training and supervising teachers of English overseas. Nine well-qualified teachers from seven different Northwest Friends churches were assigned to strategic cities and schools and performed admirably, according to the directors of the program. The stories of personal Christian witness and even conversions to Christ have been powerful, plus our teachers have delivered a genuine cultural service of language instruction. In every school where teachers were placed and in many others our teachers have been eagerly sought after. Four will continue a second year; four new teachers will be trained and commissioned in late August to accept assignments beginning in September and October.

It is no exaggeration to say we have had invitations for an unlimited number of such teachers armed with a college degree, with some teaching ability and experience (formally or informally), the ability of speaking English as their first language, and an eagerness to make new friends. We had hoped for as many as 20 teachers for the coming year. We have been disappointed and saddened not to see many more volunteers appear. We are committed, however, to see the program grow. We are overwhelmed with the sense of strategic opportunity to share personal Christian witness. Further information can be secured in the Yearly Meeting office from Chuck Scott and Missions Administrator Duane Comfort.

Evangelical Friends Mission: The Board of Missions stresses that the work of Evangelical Friends Mission is a work of Northwest Yearly Meeting, giving us additional church planting ministries in Africa and Asia. Several of our EFM missionaries are members of NWYM. For example, David and Debby Thomas (West Chehalem Friends) serve in Rwanda and Dawn Todd (Clackamas Park Friends) is serving short term at the Great Lakes School of Theology in Burundi. Ron Stansell and Duane Comfort are members of the EFM Board. The new EFM Executive Director, Charles Mylander, is a former pastor and member of our Yearly Meeting. Mylander brings to the position a life of concern for missions, superb administrative skills, and leadership qualities well matched for the position as a successor to Norval Hadley, the retiring executive director.

We regularly schedule EFM missionaries in our churches. While we have special missions administrative responsibilities apart from EFM (as reported below), we heartily endorse the broader vision and the more diverse opportunities Friends have through EFM. EFM is struggling financially right now, perhaps due to the current economic downturn in the United States. We encourage Friends of the Northwest to support EFM through prayer and giving. The EFM report follows this one.

South American Ministries: The Bolivian and Peruvian field reports also follow. Ed and Marie Cammack just completed a year of deputation and have retired from missionary service. Their significant and faithful ministry began in 1968 and is highly appreciated. They have offered their services for short-term visits to South America. Jerry and Kerri Clarkson live in La Paz and minister in pastoral and leadership training. Ken, Tonya and Katie Comfort are beginning a year of church visits in the United States, retiring from their post in Puno, Peru. As a part of the phase-over process for Friends in Peru, they will not return to South America at this time. They are seeking the Lord's direction for their next step of ministry. Dan and Tami Cammack continue in Puno in education and church planting. Both the Dan Cammack and the Jerry Clarkson families will leave their posts in June 2002 as a part of the phaseout of expatriate missionary staff.

One year from now, Hal and Nancy Thomas will remain as the only Northwest Friends family in South America, and their assignment is primarily with the Bolivian Evangelical University in the training of Latin American missionaries for cross-cultural ministry within and beyond Latin America. They have successfully launched a highly strategic program for the broader benefit of the evangelical Christian community of Latin America.

A carefully planned change of project funding has also been mapped out with the two national churches. While the phase-over process has not been easy, and the sense of changing relationships has sometimes felt sad or painful, the field councils and the Board of Missions have been united that this is the Lord's direction. There are rewarding signs of spiritual health. We affirm the strength and maturity of leadership in Bolivia and Peru and trust God for His blessing upon our brothers and sisters in the Lord. Our full intent is to maintain significant fraternal relationships with Bolivia and Peru yearly meetings into the foreseeable future, with regular exchange of communications and visitors, and with prayerful encouragement. We are interested in placing short-term Spanish-speaking educators in key positions as invited and planned by the two South American yearly meetings. There will undoubtedly be short-term medical and other kinds of helps from Northwest Yearly Meeting. (As this report is written, for example, we are investigating what response we might make to the recent earthquakes centered in Arequipa and Tacna, Peru, that left as many as 200,000 people homeless.) This means an ongoing interest in the ministry of Friends in those two nations, but without full-time resident missionaries.

BOLIVIA FRIENDS MISSION

The overall purpose of the Bolivia Friends Mission is the fulfillment of the Great Commission, applying it specifically to the Aymara peoples of Bolivia: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20). From 1930 when Oregon Yearly Meeting first responded to the request to come alongside the eight-year-old church in Bolivia up until the present time, the carrying out of this purpose has always implied working alongside Bolivian Friends, helping to form and encourage leaders as together we evangelized, disciplined, taught, and carried on the ministries of the church. Now we find ourselves in the phase-over stage of the mission-national church relationship, looking at ending most missionary presence by 2002 and financial assistance by the year 2004.

Specific goals for the 2000-2001 year aimed to assist the Bolivia Friends Church or INELA (Iglesia Nacional Evangélica de Los Amigos) during the phase-over were:

1. Assist the INELA to work through its current administrative difficulties and develop a functional structure and constitution.
2. Encourage the development of greater means of internal economic and prayer support for national programs of mission and theological education.
3. Continue to cooperate in the denominational and interdenominational training and discipleship programs we participate in.
4. While not listed as a specific goal, the Mission also participated in supporting the training of Latin American missionaries through the Center for

Intercultural Studies (CENESI, Centro de Estudios Interculturales), a program of the Bolivian Evangelical University.

NWYM Missionary Staff

Jerry, Kerri, Melissa (12), and Rachel (9) Clarkson lived in La Paz and *Hal and Nancy Thomas* in Santa Cruz. Jerry served in an advisory role to INELA leadership and taught in a variety of theological education programs, including San Pablo Theological Seminary and the Friends Theological Center (CETI) in La Paz, with some trips to rural centers. He also represented the Friends Mission on the Board of Directors of the Bolivian Evangelical University. Kerri homeschooled daughters Melissa and Rachel. Hal and Nancy directed and taught in CENESI, regularly met with pastors and other leaders in Santa Cruz, kept contact with Friends Center students in the university, and made periodic trips to La Paz for Joint Mission Council and INELA meetings. Hal also represented the university and the CENESI program in meetings with Overseas Council and CLADE IV in Quito, Ecuador, in September.

Bolivian Friends missionaries participated with their Peruvian counterparts, Ken and Tonya Comfort, and Dan and Tami Cammack, on the Joint Mission Council which met several times during the year. Ken Comfort was council clerk, Jerry, secretary, and Kerri, treasurer for the Bolivian Mission. Hal served as legal representative for the Bolivian Mission.

THE NATIONAL EVANGELICAL FRIENDS CHURCH OF BOLIVIA (INELA-Bolivia Yearly Meeting)

Statistics: Accurate statistical reporting continues to be a problem, mostly due to congregations who fail to send in reports, and partly due to misunderstandings of the report forms themselves. But an overview from 1930 when Oregon Yearly Meeting accepted the responsibility and sent out its first missionaries to the present is helpful. In 1930 Bolivian Friends numbered fewer than 100 believers in two congregations. In 1956, when the Bolivian Friends Church (INELA) began to function under its own legal organization, the community exceeded 1,000 faithful believers. By 1974 when Northwest Yearly Meeting recognized the Bolivian INELA as a Yearly Meeting, it exceeded 5,000 faithful believers, and was at the midpoint of its greatest period of expansion from the mid-60's through the 1970's. In 1988 it registered 6,600 in about 167 congregations, representing some large and many small churches. We estimated the Friends community then to be at least 10,000 persons. We have no firm study for 2000, or for previous years in this last decade, to be able to give numbers of members, faithful attending believers, community or congregations. Reports identify a range from 170 to over 200 congregations at the present time.

Reorganization: A major administrative reorganization of the INELA (with an intended hierarchy of a national executive council, two regional executive councils, district councils, and local churches) has proved awkward and possibly unworkable. Much of the INELA's time and energy for the past three years has gone into the struggle of trying to make it work. In April of 2000 this finally resulted in a mid-year change of all officers and naming of a central transitional Board of Directors. A special council was appointed to explore new solutions. This is a major item of concern and prayer. Jerry Clarkson was named to represent the Mission on the restructuring council.

Theological Education: Several significant developments marked this year.

1. This was the first year the Theological Education by Extension program func-

tioned entirely under Bolivian direction, administered by a board representing cooperating Bolivian denominations, including the INELA. This program of textbook writing, production, and teacher training was previously administered by a board formed by five cooperating missions. It was turned over to the Bolivian churches last year.

2. Another major achievement was the Bolivian Ministry of Education's recognition of the Friends theological education program in La Paz, which can now grant a three-year college degree ("Técnico Superior") to its students. There were nineteen students in these programs, and forty-two in the basic distance learning program (TEE).

3. Finally, eighteen Friends students participated in the Friends Center program at the Bolivian Evangelical University in Santa Cruz. This program leads to a five-year legally recognized professional college degree (Licenciate) in theology. This government recognition opens the possibility for our pastors to teach the classes on religion and ethics required in all Bolivian grade and high schools.

Bolivian Missionaries: The Bolivian national missionary program was administered this year by the La Paz Regional Council of the INELA. The program continues to be a point of expansion and vision for the INELA. Bolivian missionaries are in the cities of Cochabamba, Sucre, and Oruro, and in one tribal area in the Department (State) of Beni, with plans for expansion into other areas. An investigative trip was made into an unreached portion of the La Paz River canyon and preliminary new work is being established there. These outreach efforts represent the crossing of cultural barriers into new ethnic groups, the Quechua, and the tiny Mosetén and Chimani groups. This is especially significant for an ethnically Aymara church, and requires that Bolivian missions leaders plan creatively about how these Bolivian families can continue to receive the cross-cultural training, encouragement, and support that the Friends Mission has supplied to this point.

Challenges Facing the INELA:

1. The INELA faces continuing adjustment as Northwest Yearly Meeting phases out of its mission role in Bolivia over the next three years. Actually these are the final steps of a process that has, in some sense, been going on since the beginning of NWYM involvement in Bolivia. The most difficult points will be to establish closer relations between national level programs, the Quarterly Meeting Districts, and the local churches as Bolivian leaders plan for ways to replace funds and personnel for education and church extension that are currently supplied by the Mission Board. This calls for visionary planning. The danger is discouragement. The opportunity is a renewed vision of Bolivian Friends to work together at all levels of leadership, from the local church to Yearly Meeting administration.

2. Administrative reorganization in the INELA is a major challenge to the church. The leaders participating in the administrative reorganization need to work together with vision, understanding, wisdom, and discernment of how the Spirit is leading His church. The danger is partisan politics and division. The opportunity is to restructure the church to overcome its internal tensions and facilitate its vision of reaching to all of Bolivia and beyond.

3. There is the need for closer contact between local congregations and INELA leadership on the district and national levels, in the sense of servant leadership, and participation in establishing vision, planning, and implementing programs. This means local participation in ownership and funding of programs, a link that is weak at the present. The danger is that if the leadership does not do this, the local churches will become increasingly isolated from the Yearly Meeting administrative

structure and programs. The opportunity is to create means of communication to more effectively build the community and identity of INELA Friends in Bolivia. Actually, the present crisis of administration at the national level of the INELA is increasing this level of communication and participation with district and local leadership.

4. A strong vision for pastoral and leadership training needs to focus, not on the prestige of being professional, but on forming servant leaders able to listen to God, to each other, and to their people. The opportunity is for theological education programs to become centers for critical thinking, theologizing, directed ministry experience, reflection on ministry, continuing pastoral education, and personal formation. This requires directors and teachers with vision and ministry experience. This is a point where the Bolivian Friends Church will probably request periodic help from NWYM for teachers.

5. There is a need for a continuing and expanding vision as Bolivian Friends find the pockets of unreached social groups in Bolivia and beyond where God is asking them to minister.

Center for Intercultural Studies (Centro de Estudios Interculturales, CENESI):

While not directly related to the INELA, the Mission has been actively involved, through the "loan" of Hal and Nancy Thomas to the Bolivian Evangelical University, in this master's-level program to train Latin American missionaries. Highlights of the past year included official recognition of the program by the Bolivian government, successful functioning of the program with six classes each semester, and some 35 students taking classes. CENESI is the first master's-level program officially recognized by the Bolivian Ministry of Education to function at the BEU.

Mission-INELA Phase-Over Process:

In December of 2000, the Mission completed its financial participation in the Pastors' Medical Fund and the Property Purchase Fund. The Medical Fund has supplied a percentage contribution to Bolivian pastors and their families since the 1960's. The Property Purchase Fund has supplied a percentage contribution to qualifying congregations to buy urban property for building. The needs which these programs addressed still exist. The challenge now is for Bolivian leaders and local congregations to use their own initiative and resources to care for their pastors and purchase church properties.

Theological Education:

Through the end of 2001, the Mission will continue to support the INELA's theological education programs with approximately \$10,800, with the INELA determining how to use the funds. For the year 2000, 80% of this amount went to the Friends Center in Santa Cruz for scholarships and administration, and 20% to programs based in La Paz. For 2001 this percentage was redistributed to 60% for the Friends Center in Santa Cruz and 40% for the two major programs in La Paz. Plans are that Mission support for these programs will reduce to \$7,200 in 2002, to \$3,600 in 2003, and will phase out in 2004. It is crucial that the INELA pick up the vision and the responsibility for planning and funding these programs. It is critical that local Bolivian churches begin to take their responsibility for pastoral education. Future cooperation on the part of the NWYM in this area will depend on the initiative and planning of Bolivian leaders.

National Missionary Program:

In the years 2000 and 2001 the Mission contributed \$10,500 toward the support of the national missionary program. In 2002 the amount of Mission support will be

reduced to \$7,000, and in 2003 to \$3,500, phasing out in 2004. Actually there are reports that the giving of the local sending churches is increasing, though the offerings and gifts do not usually pass through the INELA treasurer, but are sent directly to the missionaries. It is crucial to the program that the withdrawal of NWYM funds not become a focus for discouragement, but that Bolivian pastors and leaders firmly establish the vital connection with local sending churches.

Conclusions:

We have partnered with Bolivian Friends in INELA for 71 years. Beginning that cooperation was a step of vision and faith. In many ways our cooperation represented the stability and future for the developing church. And now, in the process of withdrawing our last support as a mission organization from a church that continues to face immense challenges, we consider that we are doing the right thing even while we are acutely aware of how the church system and its leaders are going to have to readjust to withdrawal of the last regular finances and personnel which they have been able to count on from Northwest Yearly Meeting.

We are now entering a fourth generation of INELA leadership. Our consistent vision has been that the church grow in its own Andean context. We did not propose to reproduce Friends in the Northwest. We aimed to see local and national leaders forming worshipping communities, making their own decisions, visioning and supporting their own programs, discipling their own people, reaching out to new communities in mission, theologizing from Scripture and their unique experience and formation, establishing their own identity. In the 1950's the Mission first stated these goals in terms of indigenization. In today's context of mission we would restate those goals in terms of contextualization—that it reflect the good news and mission of God in this world incarnated in thoughtful Bolivian Aymara experience and perspectives. Because of our own formation as Friends missionaries, Bolivian Friends are part of the evangelical Quaker tradition, and have joined Northwest Yearly Meeting in this calling within the wider Christian movement. They also face their own unique challenges as a distinct church in a distinct culture, and increasingly bring fresh perspective and vision to us all.

PERU FRIENDS MISSION

Introduction: We praise the Lord for His love and faithfulness. At the time of the writing of this report the southern coast of Peru is trembling from the effects of the June 23 earthquake. Friends in Arequipa, Ilo, Tacna and Tarata are finding God to be faithful and loving even in the midst of tragedy. And as the Comfort family concludes four terms of missionary service in Peru and the national church nears its 40th birthday in October we have occasion to remember once again the Lord's love and faithfulness. Praise the Lord!

Personnel

A. Northwest Yearly Meeting Staff

1. **Dan, Tami, Forrest (13), Rebekah (11), and William (7) Cammack:** The Cammack family is completing their fourteenth year as missionaries to Peru under NWYM. They live and work in the city of Puno.

During this year Dan served as advisor to both of Peru Yearly Meeting's (PYM) leadership development programs, IBLA and IBEC. He taught two courses in the latter. Midway through the year Dan inherited three responsibilities from Ken and Tonya: legal representative for the Mission, the Mission's representative to PYM's

executive council, and the Mission contact for the Medical Team Ministry in cooperation with David Christopher of Folkways Institute. Dan and his family assisted the Medical Team during their August visit. They also did quite a bit of travel visiting and encouraging Friends throughout southern Peru and participating in various PYM-related events.

In addition to the above, Tami taught seventh, fifth and first grades to Forrest, Rebekah and William. She also hosted visitors.

2. **Ken, Tonya, and Katie (7) Comfort:** The Comfort family is also completing their fourteenth year as missionaries to Peru under NWYM. They lived and worked in the city of Puno until their return to Newberg, Oregon, in June. They plan to do a year of deputation in the Pacific Northwest while they discern the Lord's will for their next step in ministry.

During the first part of this year Ken served as the Mission's legal representative and the Mission's representative to PYM's executive council. Even after turning these responsibilities over to Dan he continued to work closely with both Dan and the national church leadership. Ken chaired the Joint Council of Bolivia and Peru up until he and his family departed for the U.S. He also translated parts of *Barclay's Apology*, along with Dan, and taught them to pastors and yearly meeting leaders. Ken and his family visited churches throughout southern Peru and had many opportunities to preach, teach, counsel and encourage national church leaders and pastors. They also participated in many PYM-related events.

In addition to her ministry alongside Ken, Tonya handled official correspondence for the Mission and served as treasurer for the Peru field. She also hosted visitors and taught Katie first grade.

During the first part of the year Ken and Tonya were the Mission's contact for the Medical Team Ministry (the whole family was involved in the August visit) and also advisors for the ALPACA Project sponsored by World Concern/Christian Veterinary Mission and administered on site by Dr. Janice Fuquay. Dr. Fuquay and her husband returned to the United States in December and the ALPACA project is now under the auspices of Heifer Project International with some continued assistance from World Concern.

B. National Missionaries

During this year there were neither Friends from Bolivia nor Friends from Peru Yearly Meeting (PYM) itself working in Peru as missionaries. The whole national missionary program has been put on hold while the PYM leadership considers its future and how to increase support for it among the local churches.

PHASE-OVER

In 1998 the Joint Council and the Board of Missions began to take a serious look at phasing over into a different kind of relationship between NWYM and the yearly meetings in Bolivia and Peru. The Joint Council's proposal to "phase over" was approved the following year by the Board of Missions. Much of 1999 and 2000 was spent further defining "phase-over" and this year a detailed phase-over plan for Peru was worked out and is now being implemented.

"Phase-over" basically means that NWYM feels the time is right to withdraw full-time missionary staff from Bolivia and Peru and to end all financial subsidies in order to further decrease dependencies on foreign funds and personnel and to apply resources towards the opening of new works. The last two missionary families will return to the U.S. in June of 2002 leaving only Hal and Nancy Thomas to carry on the training of Latin American missionaries at the Bolivian Evangelical

University in Santa Cruz, Bolivia. All financial subsidies will end by December of 2003.

"Phase-over," however, does not mean cutting off relations with Friends in Bolivia and Peru. NWYM will continue to partner with both yearly meetings in equipping the saints to carry out the Great Commission that Jesus Christ left us. This will probably include periodic visits and short-term ministries by and to Friends on both sides of the equator.

During this year the Peru staff developed a detailed phase-over plan for Peru and also prepared a phase-over document in Spanish to present to PYM. The presentation was made at PYM's annual representatives' meeting in January. Duane Comfort was present for the occasion. As far as implementation of the phase-over plan is concerned, the Peru staff accomplished the following before the Comfort family left: closed the Mission's literature service, moved out of an apartment that the Mission occupied in the Arequipa Center, turned over TEE materials to the IBLA committee, disposed of one household's worth of Mission appliances and furniture, went through nearly 40 years worth of files to take out what needs to be preserved and destroy the rest, and much more.

PYM's reaction to phase-over has been mixed. There has been no open opposition to the plan, but several Friends have questioned it. Others understand the reasons for phase-over and have expressed support for it. All of them seem to be accepting the fact that it is going to happen. The Peru staff will continue to do its best to prepare PYM for the transition that lies ahead.

NATIONAL CHURCH ORGANIZATION (INELA)

Peru Yearly Meeting chooses its leadership from within its membership at an annual representatives' meeting held in January. Current leaders named to PYM's executive council include: President—Anastacio Challos; Secretary—Félix Carrillo; Treasurer—José Aguilar; Secretary of Evangelism—Juan Layme; Secretary of Education—Felipe Quispe; IBLA Director—Bernardo Paredes; plus a representative from each quarterly meeting. The IBEC Director, Constantino Garcia, is not officially a part of the council but he often participates in the meetings. This body meets the first Saturday of each month to coordinate the work of PYM.

Education

A. Theological Education by Extension (TEE/IBLA): During the last half of the year 2000 there were three IBLA centers functioning on the altiplano and none on the coast. Dan teamed up with two of the more experienced teachers to provide some teacher training. Five graduates were recognized at the annual Easter Conference in April.

In January the Mission turned over all its TEE stock to the IBLA committee and ended its subsidies for these materials and teachers' fees. Students now must pay the full price of the TEE book as well as the teacher's fee. This represents quite a jump in the cost to students and will take some time to get used to. There are presently no centers functioning.

B. Residential Program (IBEC): A total of 17 students took classes in IBEC during the months of January, February and March. Four students finished their studies in IBEC and are now doing a one-year practicum in the local churches in order to graduate. Of the 11 courses offered this year, only three were taught by missionaries from NWYM. The rest were taught by teachers from PYM as well as students from Peru studying theology at the Bolivian Evangelical University in Santa Cruz, Bolivia. A pastor from a Baptist church in Puno taught one course.

The Mission discontinued its subsidy for the meal program and only matched the fees received from the students. This may have been a factor contributing to the lower number of students. IBEC finished the year with debts.

C. Seminary Plans: Peru Yearly Meeting still desires to establish a seminary in southern Peru but no progress was made this year towards that end.

D. Jorge Fox Christian Technical High School (JFCTHS): This high school operates in two locations: Ilave and Juli. Eight students graduated from the Ilave campus in December. A new director was named at the beginning of the new school year in April. The Ilave campus continues to struggle along with a low student enrollment (currently fewer than 40 students). PYM's executive council is seeking ways to turn this situation around.

Nineteen students graduated from the Juli campus in December. Juli currently has a student enrollment of approximately 80 students. Ramon Mamani continues as director of that campus.

Church Growth

There are no new churches to report this year. A few attempts were made to start new congregations, but they either did not last long or are still trying to get on their feet.

The church in Ilo is showing more signs of stability following the death of one of its younger members. The new church at Ticona Cusullaca is completing a meeting-house to hold their growing congregation. The Juli church reports new growth after a difficult year 2000. The Alto Andino Quarterly Meeting continues to demonstrate a great deal of maturity.

No trips were made to the jungle town of San Gaban and beyond due to lack of support from PYM. The current executive council, however, is talking about making a trip to that area in August.

The church that was started two years ago in Tarucachi (Alto Andino Quarterly Meeting) is practically non-existent at the present time. The children's work in Ciudad de Dios (Arequipa) was given to a Baptist congregation to take care of. There are several churches that are just barely hanging on.

Notable Events

1. In August 2000, a 15-member medical team provided a four-day clinic in the isolated town of Kelluyo close to the Bolivian/Peruvian border. The team was able to treat over 500 patients. Peruvian Friends were able to make contacts with people from unchurched areas.
2. Approximately 400 Friends participated in the first international conference sponsored by Bolivia and Peru yearly meetings. It was held in September near Kelluyo.
3. The Mission presented its phase-over plan to PYM at its annual representatives' meeting in January.
4. Workshops were held in early February to examine Barclay's propositions on baptism and communion. These workshops were held in Ilave, Tacna and Arequipa. Diego Chuyma, director of the Friends Center at the Bolivian Evangelical University, participated in all three. Elizabeth Duke, secretary general of FWCC, participated in the first two. Dan helped out with the one in Ilave. Prior to these workshops and in preparation for them, Ken and Dan translated the first nine propositions of *Barclay's Apology* and taught them to pastors and yearly meeting leaders in Ilave.

5. On February 20 the Ilave River overflowed its banks destroying homes and crops on the Ilave Peninsula and farther upriver. Excessive rains affected crops in other areas as well. Snow fell in the higher altitudes killing thousands of animals. The quarterly meetings most affected by all of this were Peninsula, Lago, Esperanza and Alto Andino.

6. On June 23 an earthquake shook the southern coast of Peru affecting Friends churches in Arequipa, Ilo, Tacna and Tarata.

7. The Ken Comfort family completed four terms of missionary service to Peru and was the first family from the Peru staff to move back to the United States in accordance with the phase-over plan.

Objectives for the Coming Year

1. Continue to work with PYM leadership to develop a type of theological education that is suitable to PYM's needs yet more economical and sustainable over the long haul.

2. Continue to encourage a vision for outreach among the leadership.

3. Continue to help prepare PYM for being without full-time missionaries and financial subsidies.

4. Try to lay a foundation for future partnering between NWYM and PYM.

5. Wrap up Mission business in Peru, sell the two remaining vehicles and dispose of one more household's worth of furniture and appliances.

6. Dissolve the Mission.

Summary

NWYM's mission effort in Peru is now 40 years old. This ministry began among the Aymara people living on the altiplano and then spread to the cities of Tacna, Ilo, and Arequipa as Friends migrated to the coast. In Arequipa the ministry began reaching Quechua people as well.

From the beginning of this work NWYM has been committed to raising up a strong, indigenous church in Peru. Our relationship with Friends in Peru is about to change. We are nearing completion of the goals that we started out with. Peru Yearly Meeting will now need to take on an even greater responsibility for its own development and growth.

The upcoming transition is a bit scary, and not just for PYM! And yet we sense the Lord's leading in all of this. It is time to move into a more mature relationship with Bolivia and Peru. It is also time to reach out into new areas of the world where the gospel of Jesus Christ is still unknown. God is faithful and He will guide us all into the future if we allow Him to. We can continue to count on His love and faithfulness.

EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION

There continues to be new things in EFM:

- We have a new missionary going to Ireland—Kathi Perry.

- A new couple, Jeremiah and Elisha Kutz from Salem, Ohio, have been approved and are seeking support so they can give two years to youth ministry in Rough Rock, Arizona.
- A couple from Richmond, Virginia is exploring whether God is leading them to Mexico.
- We have a new church plant project in Myanmar, sponsored financially by EFI/Asia Region. A student from there, Pastor Pau, went to Manila to study. While in the Philippines, he attended the Pasig Friends Church and decided he wanted to plant Friends churches in Myanmar. He has completed translating a Bible dictionary, the first for his language.
- We have a new church in a new country, Bhutan, sponsored by The Evangelical Friends Church of Nepal. There are at least nine adults in that underground church, two of whom came to the EFI/Asia Region meetings in Kathmandu.
- We have two new office workers—La Donna Holmes and Gina Sturgeon.
- And we will soon have a new Executive Director, Chuck Mylander.

In this, my last report, let me give a "State of the Mission" report.

EFM now supports ten American missionary units (a couple or a single is a unit) or 17 American missionaries: The Fergusons and Thomases in Rwanda, the Chavarrias in Mexico, the Hunerwadels in India, the Twaddells in the United Kingdom, the Harrolds in the Navajo Nation, the Jameses in Ireland and Kathi Perry, soon to go to Ireland, Debbie Adhikary in Nepal and Amie Sarker in Dallas, Texas.

In addition we support four non-American units or six non-American missionaries: The Tabingos in the Philippines, the Vanlals in Nepal, Abraham Sarker in Dallas, Texas, and Bob Adhikary in Nepal. Lines are not entirely clear because two non-Americans have married Americans.

In Rwanda we have 65 churches and five outreach points with over 4,400 attending. In Mexico, seven churches with seven outreach points and about 750 attending. In Nepal and Bhutan there are 28 churches and about 40 outreach points with over 1,150 attending. Sixteen of the churches are supervised by Vanlals and 12 by Adhikarys. In the Philippines there are 40 Friends churches and several outreach points with over 2,000 attending. In India there are four Friends of Garhwal churches and five outreach points with over 150 attending. In the Navajo Nation there are four Friends churches with 100 attending. In Ireland, a Friends fellowship is forming with about 20 attending. In the UK, a Friends fellowship is forming with about nine attending. In the international student ministry in Dallas, Texas, up to 20 attend a regular meeting.

Our income in the year 2000 was \$1,279,409; up from \$1,128,206 the year before. Only 14% goes for administration and fundraising. Our assets at the end of the year totaled \$306,349. We are mailing appeal letters twice a year to 22,000 households and have a growing donor list of over 1,600. The response to the last appeal letter has not been as generous as last year, partly because of national economic apprehension. I've learned that other ministries are suffering financially worse than we are. The Easter offering is also lagging.

The most significant event for me recently was my trip to the Philippines and Nepal in April. Board of Peace and Social Concerns

The work of peace and social concerns continues to be as varied and as extensive as our Yearly Meeting. Homelessness, third world debt forgiveness, meals for families in crisis, CROP Walk for world hunger, weekly prison ministry, efforts to end the death penalty, earth concerns, Christmas baskets and Thanksgiving meals for shut-ins, Christian Peacemaker Teams, Habitat for Humanity—these are only some of the activities that inspire Friends in Idaho, Oregon, and Washington to do the work Christ calls us to.

The Board is especially excited about Christian Peacemaker Teams (CPT). In January, a workshop was held on Christian Peacemaking at Tigard Friends Church: six area churches were represented by about 30 participants. Partly as a result, two Friends from our Yearly Meeting plan to begin training by going to Chiapas, Mexico. CPT Peacemakers, trained in peacemaking skills and nonviolent direct action, are available on a full-time basis to enter emergency situations of conflict and areas of militarization at the invitation of local peacemakers. Responding to Christ's call to confront injustice, its members attempt to bring the redemptive love of God to violent situations. The CPT experience has demonstrated that teams of four to six people trained in the skills of documentation, observation, nonviolent intervention, and various ministries of presence—including patience—can make a striking difference for peace in explosive situations. The Board hopes that more Friends will explore CPT as they are led to become agents of peace in our broken world. We encourage you to browse the web page at www.prairienet.org/cpt.

The Yearly Meeting churches responded well to the Thanksgiving Offering for Laura's House of Peace—a ministry for battered women in Oregon, and to David Niyonzima's work to translate *The Grieving Indian*, for Burundi Yearly Meeting.

Peace Place at Piedmont was transferred from the Board of Peace and Social Concerns to the Commission on Ethnic Ministries.

There will be no International Gift Shop at Yearly Meeting this year, in part because of problems last year with items disappearing from the store, for which the Board had to pay; and partly due to the lack of interest of Friends in running the store. While the Board continues to support the idea of a gift shop supporting local crafts from throughout the world, we need volunteers to help with this ministry.

We are planning a peace conference in the Fall. Stay tuned for more information.

Board of Stewardship

The Board of Stewardship meets during Yearly Meeting sessions and at Midyear Board meetings to accomplish its duties and responsibilities as outlined in the *Faith and Practice*. In addition the board's administrative committee (Stan Muhr, Roger Minthorne, Leo Crisman, Harold Ankeny, Lloyd Pruitt; Dave Hampton, director of Finance and Development; Joe Gerick, general superintendent; Harold Antrim, associate superintendent; Chuck Scott, bookkeeper) meets monthly to keep current on stewardship matters. This last year our health insurance was our large project. Much work at the Yearly Meeting has been needed just to keep coverage for our pastors and workers. We are very close to having an improved plan in place to cover all areas of our Yearly Meeting.

We have had several major accomplishments in the last year, but one stands out. That is the recovery of the funds spent when the NFIT went defunct. These recovered funds are now available to help us move to an improved insurance plan. Without David Hampton and our staff at the Yearly Meeting Office we may not have recovered these funds and our insurance problem would have been much worse. They have done an outstanding job.

Dave Hampton and Chuck Scott continue to improve and update reports. We now have an up-to-the-minute profile of all funds and accounts. We have had another very tight year with income but have again finished in the black. This was due in large part to careful spending (use it up, make it do, do without) and several churches that increased their giving over their pledge amount. Thank you for being faithful in your giving.

It has been a pleasure serving on the Board of Stewardship these last few years. The Lord has indeed blessed. I have seen miracles and have been in contact with so many wonderful people. In the last year I have had the opportunity to visit many of our churches. Thank you for the warm welcome. Many of our meetings are exploding, the presence of the Lord is real and the evidence of His presence is unquestionable. I pray that your meeting is one that God is using in a powerful way.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

Audits: An audit of the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church was completed by Nixon, Abby and Company, PC. Audits of Friends Church Extension Foundation and Friends Fund are also conducted on a regular basis. A complete copy of each audit report is available at the Yearly Meeting office.

Financial Consolidation: The Yearly Meeting's funds are classified as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted as required by the "Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116." Revenue for the Great Commission Program budget is considered unrestricted and is spent for administration and board and commission programs as budgeted each year by the Executive Council. Designated, or temporarily restricted revenues such as faith promise, missionaries' shares, or new works, are used by the board or commission having authority over them. A detailed accounting of all funds is kept by the Yearly Meeting office and reviewed by the Board of Stewardship Administrative Committee monthly.

Budget Process: The Yearly Meeting is committed to spending only what is provided by the local churches. The budget process in place for the past several years has been successful in keeping us in the black. The superintendents, boards, and commission clerks present their budget estimates for the next year during Midyear Board meetings. The Board of Stewardship, in turn, estimates the income based on the giving patterns of churches, organizations, and individuals. A budget for the

following year is then proposed to the Executive Council in February. Based on requests, priorities, and discussions, a final budget is prepared for submission at Yearly Meeting sessions. In looking at the projections for next year there are some hard choices for the Executive Council, but they are committed to sound financial management.

Giving: Many churches are giving a larger portion each year. If you are a part of that giving, THANK YOU. Your support is so important for this ministry we do together. We have also noted that some churches have reduced their giving as a percent of their total budget. If you are in this group please consider how important your part is in our ministry as a whole. Be a full partner in the ministry of the Yearly Meeting.

DEPARTMENT OF DEVELOPMENT (FRIENDS FUND)

The year 2000 was a turning point in the life of Friends Fund. For the first time, Friends Fund received sufficient operating income to cover all operating expenses and interest expense. We only have to look back three years when in 1997 the shortfall from operations was over \$22,000. The result is, the additional income from bequests and other sources we are unable to project, is now available to pay down the notes outstanding. We currently project 2001 notes outstanding at \$620,350, the lowest level in over a decade.

Last year was also a challenging year for our investment managers. After several years of double digit increases in the stock market, most investors experienced significant declines in value in 2000. The trust funds managed by Friends Fund are long-term investments and as such, they need to have a significant portion invested in stocks to achieve the best return over the long term. The professional money managers hired by Friends Fund have this long-term view as well as a conservative investment philosophy that reduces our exposure in a down market. This was particularly apparent last year when our average trust declined in value 2.1% before distributions. This compares to broader market indicators such as the S & P 500 that declined in value over 10% or the NASDAQ's 40% drop. We are particularly thankful for the skill and wisdom that our money managers bring to Friends Fund.

As we look to the future, we covet your prayers as we seek to be good stewards of that which has been entrusted to us.

DEPARTMENT OF BENEFITS (PENSION FUND)

Last year was the first full year of operation of the revised Northwest Yearly Meeting 401(k) pension plan. Standard Insurance has provided us with an excellent package of services and investment choices that has modernized the pension plan significantly. Pastors and other Yearly Meeting employees now have the ability to customize their individual pension portfolio. Benefit payout options are also expanded, giving employees maximum flexibility with their retirement savings.

The changes have been very well received based on the comments from employees. Participation levels are also up dramatically from the prior year. Total pension contributions increased 43% to over \$361,000 and the number of employees participating in the plan is up 24%.

It has long been the concern of the Board of Stewardship that adequate provision is made for our ministers in retirement. These changes to the pension plan appear to have helped significantly in this goal by creating a plan that is modern and attractive to Yearly Meeting pastors. The Stewards continue to encourage every local meeting to take care in establishing a compensation package that adequately provides for their pastor's needs, both in the present and in retirement.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Yearly Meeting finances fall into two broad categories. The general fund or "Great Commission Budget" represents the unrestricted funds, available to be spent according to the budget that is approved by the Yearly Meeting in general sessions. The other category is designated or restricted funds. These are funds that have been given for a specific board or project and can only be spent for that purpose. More than one half of the Yearly Meeting's finances come in this category of restricted funds.

The year 2000 marked the beginning of a new millennium and the Great Commission Budget operating in the black for the eighth consecutive year. This record reflects the Yearly Meeting's desire to be good stewards and to not spend beyond our available resources. Underlying this record, however, is the fact that in many years, it has been necessary to reduce budget requests and curtail spending in order to achieve these results.

Revenue for the Great Commission Budget comes almost exclusively from local meeting's Great Commission pledges. Last year, two thirds of local meetings (36 churches) met or exceeded their Great Commission pledge. These additional funds were a tremendous help in achieving a balanced budget but we still fell short of fully funding the 2000 Great Commission Budget. The balanced budget was accomplished through reductions in spending below amounts originally budgeted. Another result of last year's revenue shortfall is that the 2001 Great Commission Budget was set with no increases in spending over 2000.

Restricted fund expenditures exceeded restricted income by over \$127,000 last year. Both the Mission Board and Evangelism Board drew on reserve funds that had accumulated in prior years and on endowment funds that had been established for their boards. These actions were planned for in advance and leave both boards with more than adequate reserve funds for future years. The other large increase in restricted fund expenditures over the prior year shows up in the Communications Commission's fund. This reflects a significant increase in gifts for Barclay Press that were passed through this commission.

The financial condition of the Yearly Meeting remains strong. Total assets exceed \$3,000,000 with the majority of these assets representing restricted fund balances that belong to the various boards and commissions. The modest decline in assets last year is attributed primarily to the effects of a down stock market on our investment portfolios. These restricted fund balances take on an increased importance as boards attempt to expand their ministry. When funds from the Great Commission Budget remain relatively static from year to year, the reserve funds and increased individual contributions provide the additional resources for expanded ministries. Presently, reserves are adequate for current ministries, but in the future, limitations on reserves may become a limiting factor. Increasing church participation in the Great Commission Budget is an important key to the long-term growth of the Yearly Meeting. Continued prayer for the finances of Northwest Yearly Meeting is vital as we look to the future.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Trustees

Since the sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting in July 2000, the Trustees have dealt with the following things:

Washington Property Tax Exemption Reports: Washington property tax exemption reports were submitted for six Washington church properties where title is in

the name of Northwest Yearly Meeting. These reports are required annually by March 31.

Refinance of Bend Property: The Bend property formerly occupied by Deschutes Friends Church was refinanced with Friends Church Extension Foundation to increase the balance by \$6,000 to \$40,968.91. This was necessary to pay a short-term loan incurred to pay an architect for work previously done on the property. The property is now being used by The River- Bend Friends Church which is under the umbrella of "The River" ministry in Central Oregon led by John and Karen Macy. This is a "New Works" project of the Board of Evangelism.

East Hill Friends Church Easement: At the request of East Hill Friends Church, we executed a "Temporary Construction/Slope Easement" which assists with the development of an adjoining property and provides some benefit to the church. Title to this property is in the name of Northwest Yearly Meeting, but a request is pending to transfer title to East Hill.

Communications Commission

The Communications Commission continues to take very seriously the mandate to inform the Yearly Meeting of the work of the various boards and commissions through both print and electronic media. In addition, short- and long-range planning is in process for creating new and reprinted books and other material.

Directly impacting the work of the Commission is the decision of the Executive Council to allow the sale of the Barclay Press building and printing operation. Proceeds from this sale, when all debts have been cleared, will be put in restricted fund categories for the publishing of new material and the reprinting of previous manuscripts that need updating, revision or reissuing.

Due to a combination of budget restraints and the desire for more frequent communication, *NWYM Connection* is now printed monthly and sent in bulk quantities to the churches for distribution. The format is smaller and can be used for a bulletin insert or mailed with church newsletters. Sherry Macy continues as editor and is seeking to showcase church outreach and various individuals making unique contribution to the mission of NWYM.

The Yearly Meeting web presence is continuing to be expanded and is increasingly used. The month of May 2001 registered 6,065 requests. Added to the web page in the past year have been *Faith and Practice*, *2000 Minutes*, the Education Board's *Child Protection Policy*, on-line nominations form for officers and committee members, updated missionary news, events sponsored by various groups, camp schedules, etc. Hopefully both expansion and use will continue.

The Commission is offering two workshops, one on poetry led by Arthur Roberts and one on the constructive use of the Internet by Michael Fawver.

The Communications Commission of Evangelical Friends International-North America Region once again sponsored an essay contest for elementary and high school students, with the theme this year of, "Is that your final answer? How Jesus helps me make the right choices." First place winner in the secondary division is Elizabeth Muller, of Silverton Friends Church. Her winning essay appears below.

The Communications Commission strives to share the many ways the Yearly Meeting lives out its core values, perhaps most vividly evidencing the fact we are called to be and make followers of Christ and to live out Christ's love.

BARCLAY PRESS

During the last year Barclay Press has continued to operate in a manner similar to the last several years.

Printing operations have been improved and expanded through acquisition of more modern and productive equipment. Much of the funding for the improvements has been through contributions. Making a profit continues to be elusive.

Dan Crider was hired in August to serve as the general manager for the printing operations. Dan is an experienced printer and print sales person.

Staff changes have been numerous. Susan Fawver and Alice Maurer, both long-term staff members, resigned during the year. Susan and Alice have both continued to assist when needed. Their experience and institutional memory is greatly missed. They have also been missed for their spiritual influence. Sharon Holdahl took a leave of absence when her husband, Merle, was diagnosed with cancer.

Debbie Cash was hired to fill the role of bookkeeper upon Alice Maurer's resignation. She has since resigned to take a position at George Fox University. Gerald Lemmons has stepped in to cover the daily bookkeeping duties until the position is filled.

The press operator, who had become unreliable, was terminated last year and several press operators have been tested since then. Currently two very competent and reliable pressmen, Armond Strack and Bernie Nichols, have been hired. They fill various production requirements as well as operating the three presses.

Mike Comfort and Les Peterson have continued their valuable contributions to the daily operations this year. Les is a steady and reliable contributor to the bindery operations. Mike's design and pre-press skills have cemented relationships with numerous customers.

Sam Abbate, hired last Spring, serves as estimator and supplies purchaser. Liz Allen works part time in retail book sales, Sunday school materials distribution and *Fruit of the Vine* subscription maintenance.

Susan Fawver, Paula Hampton, Sherry Macy, and Harlow Ankeny serve as the editorial team for *Fruit of the Vine*.

Gertrude Ankeny, Gene Hockett and Jean Clark work part time as needed.

At the midyear meeting the NWYM Executive Council authorized the sale of the Barclay Press printing operations. Negotiations have been underway to sell the operation to Dan Crider, general manager. Financing arrangements are being pursued at this time.

Since March of 2000 LeRoy Benham has served in a volunteer role, first as general manager and now as CEO/Publisher, to manage the publishing aspect of Barclay Press.

Fine Arts Commission

According to *Faith and Practice* the purpose of the Fine Arts Commission is to offer guidance in the creative activities of the local church, to foster creative activities for and encourage artists in the expression of their ministries in and through creative arts. Further, the commission is responsible for the recommendation of those individuals qualified for consideration for certification for ministers of music, and for Yearly Meeting workshops and activities related to the arts.

In December 2000 under the leadership of Bruce Bishop, an Artist's Retreat was offered at Twin Rocks. Thirty individuals participated, and Jan Wood was speaker. A number of individuals felt called to participate in a meeting to discuss possible rekindling of the Fine Arts Commission and the types of priorities the commission would have. Persons in attendance were Bruce Bishop, Alivia Biko, Karen Gilmore, Adina and Mike McConaughy, and Melanie Weidner Watson. Various persons were mentioned as possible candidates for the commission as well. It was agreed that the commission should be rekindled and Alivia Biko was named clerk, subject to approval of the Executive Council, and Bruce Bishop's meeting with Mark Ankeny, Yearly Meeting Presiding Clerk.

Many artists have felt deeply encouraged by this event and have gone back to local churches to kick off various arts ministries. Friends Memorial in Seattle has continued their quilting ministry in new and exciting ways, having children learn how to make quilts, and in August they are sponsoring a Puget Sound Area Festival

of the Arts. They will have music, quilts, outdoor lunch, poetry reading, and art displays of various forms. Other congregations have also found that the arts provide a powerful and less intimidating form of bridge to their local communities.

Currently the Fine Arts Commission consists of Alivia Biko, clerk, and Adina McConaughy. Other members who have participated on a consulting basis include: Carolann Palmer, Patty Federighi, Doug Daily, Melanie Weidner-Watson, Jan Wood, Derek Lamson, Jim Nail, Debbie Dingman, Ted and Jeanne Hazel, and others.

Efforts of the Fine Arts Commission during these Yearly Meeting sessions include "The Hoot," the open-air stage on the lawn and several workshops. An upcoming artist's retreat will be held in LaGrande, Oregon. We are compiling a directory of artists in Northwest Yearly Meeting to aid in networking efforts among the artists and local churches.

The commission hopes to continue these same activities and revive the newsletter for NWYM arts, sponsor a show of fine arts during Yearly Meeting sessions, and kick off regional fine-arts days and trainings. We hope to combine our efforts with leadership development as many artists who are doing ministry already have little or no leadership training. We hope to sponsor regional poetry and songwriter gatherings, possibly working with the Board of Evangelism and New Works to help facilitate their efforts.

Our current budget is \$200. Budget for 2002 has been approved at \$1,000. We also are receiving some financial support and personal assistance from the Yearly Meeting Planning Committee and boards of Peace and Social Concerns and Evangelism.

First, we affirm the NWYM Core Values. Especially realizing that Jesus Christ is present, Scripture informs and guides us, and the Holy Spirit transforms and empowers us. Our gifts as artists are God-created and God-given. We are ambassadors of God's truth. In our society where words are highly suspect because of misuse, overuse, and incongruence with our actions, reason and logic have less impact than ever. It is through the senses that contemporary society seeks truth. Evangelical Friends International Council

Evangelical Friends International Council continues to function as a liaison and communicative body among evangelical Friends worldwide. The four regional directors (from Asia, Africa, Latin America and North America) plus the International Director meet once every three years. That meeting took place in Newberg, Oregon in March of this year. Those present were John Williams, Jr. (North America), Jaime Tabingo (Asia), David Niyonzima (Africa) and Samuel Pinto (Latin America). Charles Mylander, the incoming Executive Director of Evangelical Friends Mission, attended the meetings as an observer. EFM has direct ties with several of the Friends bodies who compose Evangelical Friends International. Some of the American yearly meetings support missionary personnel in other locations. There are, however, several fully recognized yearly meetings with much looser international ties. EFI serves to maintain fellowship, identity, and shared ministries among all these groups.

Now that each regional fellowship has functioned for several years, the various regions have entered into a more mature stage of undertaking cooperative efforts among the various Friends yearly meetings within their respective continents. For example, the Asian Regional gathering took place in April of this year in Kathmandu, Nepal with representatives from nine clusters of churches in seven countries. Since the International Director was not able to be present, Russell Zinn of Taiwan was named to represent him and to submit a report. Russell reported one especially interesting new item: the affirmation of Philippines Yearly Meeting in starting a mission work in Myanmar. A Myanmar national named Pau Tual Khan who has been studying in Manila left April 29 with funding from the Philippines. Jaime Tabingo is planning an oversight visit there in November. Jaime asks for prayer from around the world. Taiwanese Friends also have contact with Myanmar. Funds from other Asian Friends have been promised to the project. There were Bhutanese Christians present at the Kathmandu gathering as a result of Nepalese Friends' witness into that nearby closed Buddhist enclave. These are satisfying developments, as world missions and global concerns have been a part of EFI regional gatherings during the past 10 years.

Latin American Friends have begun planning for their second International Friends Pastors' Conference, this one to be held in Bolivia now slated for the year 2003. Spanish-speaking pastors from North America, Central America and South America will be invited. Samuel Pinto, Latin American director, visited Bolivia in late June to

cooperate in plans. Central American Friends support missionaries in Nicaragua and continue plans to send and support missionaries to Cambodia. There are more Friends in Latin America than any other EFI region.

No new major developments have happened in the past year in central Africa. The focus of cooperation there is the Great Lakes School of Theology (GLST) in Bujumbura, Burundi. A regular rotation of volunteer teachers from the United States combined with local teachers have serviced that pastoral and leadership training program. African Friends would like to secure the services of English-speaking Latin Americans and Asians to help them at GLST also. This is being pursued. David Niyonzima is on a two-year leave from responsibilities with Burundi Yearly Meeting and EFI/Africa Region while he completes a master's degree in counseling at George Fox University. David has been a regular attendee at Sherwood Friends, spending Christmas vacation and summer vacations back in Burundi. While war has subsided in Congo, soldiers returning to Rwanda have created a more volatile situation and violence in Burundi is ongoing.

The report from John Williams, Jr. of North America Region reported briefly on the organization and philosophy of ministry in North America, but also cited new ministries in Haiti and among Haitians in the United States under Eastern Region, and in Hungary, and in Romania. Southwest Friends have ministries in Indonesia and Cambodia; Northwest is in the beginning steps for ministries in Russia and North Africa. There are some 25 Spanish-speaking Friends churches in North America, and new ones in formation. The Coalition for Hispanic Ministries based in Houston, Texas has been a major player in this development.

It was approved to form an EFI/Europe Region consisting of current Friends contacts in Ireland, Great Britain, Hungary, Romania and Russia. There are no fully recognized evangelical yearly meetings in Europe, but there is an emerging number of churches. Representatives from these groups and perhaps other Friends of an evangelical persuasion will be invited to attend a convening session sometime within the next year or two.

Statistics gathered would seem to indicate about 136,000 evangelical Friends in worship around the world. Broken down by regions, this means 52,000 in seven nations of Latin America, 37,000 in three nations of Africa, 35,000 to 37,000 average attendance in six yearly meetings in North America, and perhaps 10,000 in six nations of Asia. This leaves the most populous continent of the globe with the fewest Friends and clearly suggests that the next century should and will be the century of Asia. There are more than 30,000 evangelical Friends in Latin America not affiliated with the EFI.

EFI Council and Regional web pages have been developed in basic form. Guidelines for establishing new yearly meetings among Friends have been approved. Hopes are to hold the next EFI Council meeting outside the United States, either in Europe or in Asia.

For the past 92 years Greenleaf Friends Academy has been fulfilling its calling to equip people to be effective ambassadors for Christ. I am constantly encountering alumni of the Academy who are serving God in various exciting ways. Pastors,

missionaries, educators, and business and professional leaders who are graduates of GFA are continually dropping in to visit us and look for their picture in the hallway. I love to hear their stories of how God has worked in their lives.

The class of 1951 has had several meetings throughout the year as they have been celebrating their 50th anniversary. During the 50th Annual Quaker Village Auction in March, some of them were featured along with their grandchildren who were in the class of 2001. Their presence helped make the auction a great success this year.

Earlier in the year, the NWYM Volunteers on Wheels (VOW) group completed several significant improvement projects on the campus. They remodeled one area to create a new concession stand and athletic office. They also painted a number of our classrooms and performed other tasks to make the campus more beautiful.

The NWYM Friends Men provided funding for completion of our beautiful new entrance to the old wing. The new entrance not only enhances the appearance of the campus, but it also significantly improved our standing with the Fire Department by bringing that area up to code.

We were able to get a new floor for our cafeteria this year, only to have it ruined by a flooding accident. But even in that event, God went before us. With the assistance of our insurance carrier, the floor has been stripped clear down to the original plywood, and we are in the process of reinstalling new plywood and a new floor. When that is completed, we will be able to acquire new tables, thanks to money from the NWYM Share Call that was made for us.

The annual Fourth of July Buckaroo Breakfast served about 540 people, including many alumni who toured the campus while they were here. One group who arrived on motorcycles was especially interesting to watch.

This year 24 seniors graduated and are heading out to become ambassadors for Christ in various areas. One of the graduates was a commended scholar in the National Merit Scholars program. Others were awarded major scholarships by various colleges and universities. It will be interesting to know how God will work in their lives over the next 50 years as they become effective ambassadors for Christ.

Greenleaf Friends Academy is so thankful for the support given to it by Northwest Yearly Meeting. The Friends Men, VOW, and the Share Call provided many valuable improvements for our campus. George Fox University

George Fox University continues to be an exciting place for Melva and me to serve God and the Northwest Yearly Meeting. Thank you for your prayers, leadership, and gifts in support of the University.

The purpose of George Fox University is to serve the body of Christ, and to be a partner with the church. Our goal is to educate students to be effective servants of God in all walks of life in a needy world. George Fox University is continually committed to providing Christ-centered education for all students. This report shares some highlights from the past academic year.

Kimberly is Oregon Professor of the Year George Fox biology professor Dwight Kimberly was named Oregon's 2000 Professor of the Year. Announcement was made in Washington, D.C., by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education. The national award was established in 1981. Kimberly teaches undergraduate and gradu-

ate courses and conducts his own research projects. But one third of his workload is dedicated to working with elementary and secondary school science programs, for which he has become noted. Kimberly, at George Fox since 1994 and a 1967 George Fox graduate, is commended by his colleagues for selfless dedication to his students and innovative off-campus programs.

Serve Day Receives National Honors National recognition was given to George Fox University's annual Serve Day. The Washington D.C.-based Points of Light Foundation selected the fall volunteer service project for its daily Point of Light award. The University received a certificate and congratulatory letters from President Clinton and former President George H. Bush, under whose administration the program was started. The award is for organizations that make "a positive and lasting difference in the lives of others." More than 3,500 organizations and individuals are nominated for the awards. George Fox's Serve Day program was started in 1999 with the campus stopping all regular activity and sending more than 1,400 faculty, staff, and students into the community to devote a day to service projects. Tasks range from helping senior citizens and non-profit groups to cleaning churches, community beautification, and assistance with civic projects.

U.S. News Ranks George Fox at Top Academically George Fox University for the first time was ranked at the top in academic reputation among Western regional liberal arts colleges by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine in its annual list of "America's Best Colleges." The nation's most popular annual review of U.S. colleges maintained George Fox at its highest ever overall ranking – second among Western regional liberal arts colleges. George Fox moved up from third place in academic reputation and always has ranked at least third in its 13 years of listings. *U.S. News* also listed George Fox as one of the "Great Schools at Great Prices," naming it second for best value among Western regional liberal arts colleges.

Stevens Center Highlights Legacy Campaign George Fox University's Legacy Campaign goal of \$22.5 million has been reached, but the celebration has not yet started. While the campaign has raised the most money in the University's history, it has yet to reach goals in some specific areas. At the end of the fiscal year, about \$650,000 remained to be raised toward the \$7 million Edward F. Stevens Center and about \$500,000 was needed to complete renovation of Wood-Mar Hall. The University has until December 31 to complete the Stevens Center funding to receive a \$500,000 challenge grant from the Kresge Foundation. The 40,000-square-foot Stevens Center, the cornerstone project for the campaign, will be dedicated September 20 in a public ceremony. About 130 employees will move from current offices into the new building. Ground was broken in April 2000 for the three-story building located on the southwest corner of the campus quadrangle. The building is named for longtime George Fox President Edward F. Stevens, who died of cancer in 1998. The Stevens Center will house student service areas: admissions, registrar's office, financial aid, student accounts, student life, residence life, campus ministries, career services, and multicultural services. The center also will contain six "technology-rich" classrooms and a new institutional technology center.

End of an Era in Financial Leadership Don Millage, praised for guiding George Fox to nearly three decades of balanced budgets, retired as vice president for financial affairs at the end of the fiscal year 2001. He was honored with a farewell reception June 6 with more than 350 attending the program. Named to replace Millage is G. Michael Goins, who has 28 years of experience as a financial officer at three colleges in the United States. He was one of four finalists interviewed in a national search. Goins comes from the position of vice president for finance and treasurer at West Virginia Wesleyan College, where he has been for four years.

Previously he was at the University of the Pacific, and for 15 years at his alma mater, Whitworth College in Spokane, Washington. Goins' father, Paul, was a Friends pastor who served churches in Seattle, Washington and in Greenleaf, Idaho, and who served on George Fox's board of trustees.

Enrollment Sets Records George Fox University's fall semester enrollment of 2,636 set a record. The increase was 8.3 percent over the previous year, with enrollment almost five times the University's total of 549 in the fall of 1986. There were 1,410 traditional undergraduate students on the Newberg campus. The number of new undergrads was 505 – the highest ever, comparing to 404 the previous fall. Spring enrollment also set a record at 2,625, up 193 or 8 percent.

Graduation Is Largest Ever The largest graduating class in George Fox history received diplomas in late April. Of the 588 graduates, 288 received bachelor's degrees through traditional programs and 82 earned their degrees through the adult degree-completion program. Master's degrees were awarded to 194, 12 received seminary degrees, and 12 graduated from the doctor of psychology program. Another 187 graduates received diplomas at midyear ceremonies in December.

New Majors Announced Three new majors were announced during the year: political science, economics, and business administration. Joining the faculty as associate professor of political science to develop the major will be Mark Hall, formerly at East Central University in Oklahoma. The Department of Business and Economics will restructure its program to now offer accounting as well as the two new majors. The former major in business administration and economics focused primarily on business with a concentration in economics. Faculty believe they can provide greater breadth and depth of learning by splitting the major.

Seminary to Have New Dean The decision of Tom Johnson to leave administration and concentrate on teaching resulted in a search for a new dean for George Fox Evangelical Seminary. At the time of this report's preparation, the national search was not yet completed.

REPORT OF INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church as of December 31, 2000 and the related statements of activities, expenses and costs by function, and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as discussed in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As explained in Note 2 to the financial statements, we were not engaged to audit The Barclay Press, Inc. a wholly owned subsidiary of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church with unaudited net assets of \$112,561 as of December 31, 2000 and unaudited net loss of \$52,269 for the year then ended. Generally accepted accounting principles require consolidation of the financial statements of a wholly owned subsidiary.

In our opinion, except for the effects of not consolidating the financial statements of The Barclay Press, Inc. the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church as of December 31, 2000, and the results of its operations and the changes in its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The schedule of support and revenue, expenses and net assets by function on page 13 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
