## MINUTES Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 2005

*Monday, July 25, 8:17 a.m.*

- 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened its 113th annual sessions on Saturday, July 23, on the campus of George Fox University with the meeting of the Council of Representatives. The theme for this year's sessions is "Being Incarnational Christians: Where Do I Fit In?" Attendance was estimated at 215.
- 2. Presiding Clerk Lon Fendall greeted those in attendance and reviewed the schedule for the day and the principles of Quaker decision-making.
- 3. Lon Fendall noted the passing of Dorwin Smith. Arthur Roberts shared remembrances of Dorwin's life and service to the Yearly Meeting, including his long service as presiding clerk.
- 4. Representatives who were not present on Saturday were recognized and seated. (See page 2 for Representatives.)

■ 9. Assistant Clerk Don Staples read the following minute from the Executive Council:

*The Executive Council recommends extending the call of Paul Bock as youth superintendent for Northwest Yearly Meeting through June 30, 2007.*

The minute was approved by the meeting.

■ 10. Colin Saxton presented an overview of the Organization and Strategy Group and its work, which flows from the Yearly Meeting's visioning process begun last year. In the last year, queries were distributed to local meetings and representatives, boards and commissions, young adult Friends, retired ministers, missionaries in the field, and others, totaling nearly 700 people. Colin shared several points of clearness this process produced about the YM and its mission. To recommend next steps based on this feedback, the Organization and Strategy Group (OSG) was formed. Group members include Carla Anderson, Mark Ankeny, Ken Beebe, Tonya Comfort, Frank Engle, Eric Muhr, Maurice Roberts, and Colin Saxton.

The OSG has developed draft statements of mission and vision to supplement the statements of core values (adopted by the NWYM in 1997), identity (approved by the Executive Council in 2004) and staff purpose (adopted by YM staff in 2004). The two new statements will be considered by the YM on Thursday. If they are approved, the superintendent and YM staff will use them as a guide for action in the coming months and years.

The **Draft Mission Statement** attempts to define the YM's unique ministry aims and purposes:

*NWYM is a covenantal community of Friends churches who make Jesus Christ known by teaching and obeying the whole gospel, through loving fellowship and mutual support, and by equipping and releasing people*

*to continue His mission in the world.*

The **Draft Vision Statement** attempts to describe the ideal the YM hopes to move toward in the future:

*NWYM is made up of a growing number of vibrant and healthy Friends churches reaching out to the greater Northwest and beyond in creative mission that reflects the whole gospel of Jesus Christ. Joined together in covenantal fellowship, a sense of shared identity and common vision for ministry, we encourage all others to know and follow Christ.*

*NWYM churches are well connected, mutually supportive, and nurtured by Yearly Meeting staff. Together, we share a common commitment to be outreach oriented, radically committed to Christ, and providers of hospitality and authentic fellowship. Our individual churches take different forms – traditional and informal, small and large. Pastoral care and leadership come from men and women in full-time service, bi-vocational ministry or through a core group of volunteers. Meetings for worship are held in homes, church buildings and other creative spaces.*

*As a whole, we work together to create a culture of service for people of all ages. We are encouraged and equipped to spend our lives continuing the ministry of Jesus through evangelism and missions, peacemaking and social justice, care for the poor and oppressed and other concerns arising from lives devoted to seeking the Kingdom of God. To do this, we focus on spiritual formation and discipleship that prepares us to be the people God intends – a people faithful to Scripture and the ongoing leadership of Christ's Spirit among us. In addition, we encourage the development and use of gifts, the discernment of call, and opportunities for service. The NWYM staff and office serves as a connectional center to keep us informed of resources, opportunities, and information for local, regional and cross-cultural ministry as Friends churches.*

*To help equip and encourage our people in ministry, we work diligently to identify and nurture leadership for local churches – both pastoral and non-pastoral. Clerks, elders and representatives find joy and purpose in their ministry because they understand their roles and are trained to serve well. Those released for pastoral ministry have a clear sense of call, are strongly rooted in the values and vision of NWYM, and receive ongoing training and resources to help our churches remain healthy, faithful and outreach minded. As a larger community, we seek to nurture those experiencing a call to pastoral ministry and offer adequate support for those who are serving.*

*With humility and courage, we share the message and life God has given us through Jesus Christ, believing it is the only hope for the world. We happily work alongside others in the Body of Christ and believe our unique expression of Christian faith is an important contribution to the overall mission of God. Therefore, we work to be clear around our Friends values, identity, sense of mission and the*



*functional structures that support our work, so that we will find the greatest freedom to serve God together as a part of the body of Christ known as NWYM.*

- 11. Lon Fendall asked first-time YM attenders to stand and go out first for break, and encouraged veteran YM attenders to take special care to welcome the newcomers.

**Monday, July 25, 10:30 a.m.**

- 12. The meeting worshipped in song and a brief silence. Attendance was estimated at 250.

■ 13. David Brandt, president of George Fox University, presented his annual report to the NWYM. He introduced the chair of the university's Board of Trustees, Barbara Palmer, a member of Second Street meeting in Newberg, along with four board members and six employees in attendance. Barbara described three new nominees to the board for approval by the Yearly Meeting: Steve Tatone, president of a financial consulting firm, and a member of First Baptist Church in Salem; Brenda Dizer, a GF graduate and project manager for Intel, and a member of Genesis Church in Portland; Deborah Martin, also a GF graduate, and a manager in the Department of Human Services for the State of Oregon, and a member of Mt. Olive Baptist in Portland. David Brandt reported that the university has been careful to maintain its Christ-centered mission while working to improve its program. Recent expansions into degree completion and graduate programs were designed to include strong elements of that mission, and the programs were designed to include strong elements of that mission. The university has university focuses on hiring people who share that mission. The university has begun a new addition to Hoover Hall, will soon start a new residence hall, and will buy the Newberg Providence Hospital and add athletic fields a half-mile north of campus. The new nursing program is about to get under way. The social work program will soon be nationally accredited. To fund this work, the university has begun a \$4.5 million fundraising campaign. One foundation refused to continue funding the university any more because it only hires Christians. The board has been modestly restructured to improve its operation. The board is required to have 4/7 of its members be Friends; at the moment 26 out of 38 are Friends, with six vacancies.

In response to a question from the meeting about how George Fox nurtures its employees' Christian development, Dr. Brandt described the university's three-year faculty orientation program which requires new faculty to deepen their understanding of Christian theology, the Friends heritage, and how they integrate their faith with their teaching. Non-teaching staff have two days of spiritual retreats each year. Several informal groups have devotional times together. Chapel is required for students and all employees are encouraged to attend.

A member of the meeting expressed concern about how big the university might grow. Dr. Brandt explained that it is hard to know how large a campus can get, and still have a "small campus" feel. Of approximately 3,100 students next year, about 1,500 will be traditional undergraduates. The university is reluctant to turn

away students when it offers an opportunity not available elsewhere in the Pacific Northwest. In addition, as a tuition-funded institution, the primary way for the university to enhance its program and keep up with changing technology is through enrollment growth.

- 14. Nominating Committee Clerk Leann Williams informed the meeting that the committee is still looking to fill some slots and is going to be considering some reforms in how it operates.
- 15. The meeting adjourned until Tuesday morning.

**Tuesday, July 26, 8:15 a.m.**

- 16. Lon Fendall opened the meeting by inviting members present to share any blessings they had experienced since the opening of the Yearly Meeting. Attendance was estimated at 210.

■ 17. Dave Hampton, Yearly Meeting treasurer, presented the annual Board of Stewardship report. He explained that the decision to reduce Yearly Meeting registration fees and the food service to the lowest level in many years was a conscious decision to make Yearly Meeting more affordable and thus more attractive. Attendance is up substantially, but this means funds to support the Yearly Meeting sessions need to come from donations and the Great Commission Budget.

Great Commission Budget receipts from churches were \$14,000 above the budget in 2004, and total Great Commission receipts ran \$25,608 above expenses. This surplus was used to retire debt and subsidize the Yearly Meeting sessions. This year church support is coming in at about budgeted levels so far. Dave highlighted some points:

- \* Investment income supplemented designated funds by a total of \$86,016 last year.
- \* The Friends Center at George Fox Evangelical Seminary had a significant increase in its fund balance, thanks to several gifts during the year.
- \* Restricted gifts are now about equal to unrestricted Great Commission giving.
- \* On a Yearly Meeting-wide basis, a declining percentage of church budgets has come to the Great Commission Budget. In 1996, about 12% of church budgets came to the Great Commission Budget, but in 2004 this had dropped to approximately 10.4%. The Organization and Strategy Group will be looking at this development to see what the trend means and its implications for the Yearly Meeting.

The meeting approved the Board of Stewardship report.

- 18. The meeting worshipped in song and a brief silence.
- 19. Ron Stansell, clerk of the Board of Missions, brought its report. He noted that about 100 years ago, evangelical Friends began major missionary efforts in



Africa and Latin America that has helped multiply Friends' presence many times over. Today the Yearly Meeting continues six major emphases in missions:

- \* Evangelism, church planting, and discipleship in Russia.
- \* Education and hospitality ministries in North Africa.
- \* Supporting graduate studies at Bolivian Evangelical University.
- \* Oversight of Christian teachers in Asia and Hungary.
- \* Full cooperation with Evangelical Friends Mission and its work in 12 locations, and its cooperation with various yearly meetings in 26 other nations.
- \* Expanding missions' awareness in the Yearly Meeting.

New workers taking up ministry work include Patrick and Christy Neifert and Liz Sugden in Russia, and Bill and Betty Kelley and Paul and Meredith Morse in North Africa, all of whom are finishing language study. These projects are about to advance their work to much more direct ministry with people's lives and need special prayer support. The Mission Board supported 15 teachers in Asia and Hungary last year and expects to support 13 in the coming year. The board has prayed about a new work in the Cook Islands in the South Pacific Ocean and sent a team to explore the possibility, but has not felt led to take up the project at this time. The Board of Missions budget is holding steady at about \$440,000 in 2005 and 2006. Ron answered questions from the floor of the meeting about how Yearly Meeting support interacts with the support that missionaries raise for themselves. A concern was expressed for returning to a system where all missions funding is raised centrally and all missionaries are paid from the central fund, rather than having to raise their own support.

Ron will be leaving the clerk's position, to be replaced by Dan Cammack.

The Board of Missions report was approved, with special appreciation to Ron.

■ 20. Ron Stansell then brought a report from the Evangelical Friends International Council, of which he is the director. The EFI supported the first EFI Pastors Conference in Africa, hosting 120 delegates from Kenya, Congo, Rwanda, and Burundi. The Great Lakes School of Theology graduated its third class, but has suspended classes for the present and is working on a more comprehensive model of leadership development. An EFI-Latin America pastors conference is in the planning stages for 2008. There is movement toward a possible EFI-Europe regional program.

■ 21. Chuck Mylander brought a report from the Evangelical Friends Mission, which he directs. He expressed appreciation for Ron Stansell, who is recording clerk of EFM; Lon Fendall, who heads the Great Lakes School of Theology advisory board; Colin Saxton, Dan Cammack, Janelle Nordyke and Duane Comfort who serve on the EFM board; and for their support of EFM work. David and Debby Thomas hosted Laura Bush recently on a visit to their work in Rwanda. EFM has a number of new missionaries ready to go to the field. Chuck encouraged members of the Yearly Meeting to be part of a delegation preparing to visit Friends mission fields in India, Bangladesh and Nepal this fall.

■ 22. Yearly Meeting representatives to the Friends World Committee for Consultation came forward to report on their experiences with FWCC: Patty Federighi, Anna Baker, Kayla Walker Edin, Dorinda Taylor, Sharon Hayden, and Julie Peyton. FWCC had a regional conference in Seattle keyed by David Niyonzima from Burundi. At the FWCC annual meeting in Phoenix, Loida Fernandez from Mexico gave the keynote message. Several NWYM members are exercising leadership in various FWCC committees. One delegate reported that her contacts with FWCC have reinforced her commitment to evangelical faith. A Friend expressed from the floor his concern that formal membership with FWCC puts the Yearly Meeting in organizational affiliation with Friends who reject the divinity of Christ, and prefers that our affiliation with Friends worldwide be channeled through Evangelical Friends International. One of the NWYM FWCC delegates clarified that only yearly meetings can be members of FWCC, which itself takes no position on the theological differences among its member yearly meetings. Other Friends suggested that connecting to non-Christian Friends could be a way of following Christ's example of reaching out to non-believers.

*Tuesday, July 26, 10:40 a.m.*

■ 23. The meeting returned from break to hear the testimony of Carol Twichel, a candidate for recording. Attendance was estimated at 250.

■ 24. The meeting worshipped in song.

■ 25. Lon Fendall called a meeting for discussion and listening regarding affiliation with FWCC at 3:00 this afternoon. He encouraged those who have strong feelings or questions on this topic to attend the meeting to work together toward uniting later this week around a minute on the issue.

■ 26. Dave Woolsey, clerk of the Council of Elders, brought its report. The council has established a response team to help congregations in crisis. He invited Vickie Wolk-Laniewski, Harold Hagglund, MaryKate Morse, Karen McConaughy, and Vivian Thornburg to describe the response team's work: to respond to congregations in turmoil on an emergency basis, and to teach congregations and their various groups to function better. (Craig Morton is also a member of the group, and will be doing a workshop tomorrow.) Dave's written report also highlighted the four new district superintendents, and an increase in community ministries by our churches.

■ 27. Young Adult Friends Cherice Bock, Carrie Hutchinson, and Delonna Halliday reported on the upcoming World Gathering of Young Friends in Lancaster, England. NWYM will be represented by Colin Saxton, who will be a plenary speaker, and ten young adult Friends, several of whom are filling leadership roles in the conference. Seventy-two yearly meetings are expected to send representatives. This will be a chance to strengthen ties between NWYM and Friends from other yearly meetings around the world. Additional funds are needed to help pay for travel costs for Friends from Third World yearly meetings.



The meeting approved the following minute to accompany this delegation:

Blessings from Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends. We trust that your time together will be rich and exciting. We introduce to you ten young adults from our body. These individuals are happy for the opportunity to fellowship with other Friends at the world gathering. We pray our Lord's protection, love, and blessings over this time you share. We look forward to hearing back from our representatives as well as communication from the wider Friends community. May God be among you.

- 28. The meeting adjourned until 8:15 Wednesday morning.

### ***Wednesday, July 27, 8:15 a.m.***

- 29. The meeting opened with worship in song and prayer. Attendance was estimated at 135.

- 30. Lon Fendall introduced Sharon Jones Hayden, who gave instructions for joining the worship sharing groups. Groups reflected on two queries: How have you seen the incarnation of Christ manifested in your life? Are you experiencing a call on your life to manifest the incarnation in a new way?

### ***Wednesday, July 27, 10:30 a.m.***

- 31. Lon announced that Walter Lee is having surgery this morning for a broken hip suffered earlier this week in a fall. He led the meeting in prayer for Walter. Attendance was estimated at 330.

- 32. The meeting heard the testimony of Rebecca Ankeny, a candidate for recording as a minister.

- 33. The meeting worshipped in song. Lon shared a poem by Nancy Thomas, "On Skipping Rocks" concerning business meetings.

- 34. Friends Youth shared its annual report. We were introduced to the following officers:

We heard epistles from each of the groups, summarizing activities during Yearly

Meeting including worship, service, recreation, and extended praise of the fondue fountains at the ice cream social.

- 35. Aletha McKennon, clerk, brought the report of the Fine Arts Commission. She highlighted the many musical groups comprising members of the Yearly Meeting who have graced the sessions this year, and the visual artists on display at the art fair this week. A joint Fine Arts/Peace Retreat was held in March 2005. A Quaker Arts Connection (QuAC), the second held at North Valley Friends in February, involved 41 artists. The commission plans an arts loan project to circulate art works among churches. The commission presented an award to Arthur Roberts for his lifetime contributions to the arts through poetry, writing, and woodworking.

- 36. Ken Redford, clerk, brought the report of the Board of Evangelism. He reported that the board had found excellent people to serve as district superintendents:

Ken highlighted new works with the example of New Life Friends in Vancouver, which has remodeled its building into The Lord's Gym, and built its ministry around sports and other activities. Thirteen new works have carried forward from last year, with four more taking shape. He described the impending expansion of the Yearly Meeting's Hispanic ministry from three congregations (Newberg, Greenleaf, and McMinnville) to five (Vancouver and Reedwood). He also described various forms of support the board offers to existing churches.

- 37. Lon distributed a handout summarizing the results from yesterday afternoon's meeting discussing our affiliation with Friends World Committee for Consultation. He referred to a report from the Alignment Task Force in 2002 that included some ways we would know FWCC affiliation is beneficial if:

- \* There was greater understanding of NWYM concerns on the part of other Friends and greater understanding of other Friends among NWYM members.
- \* There was a more effective witness regarding genuinely shared concerns among Friends.
- \* There had been opportunities for NWYM members to witness to others about Jesus Christ.
- \* There had been no abandonment of NWYM core values for the sake of Quaker unity.

Lon asked Friends to reflect on the handout and converse with those who may have different views, and plan for further discussion on the floor on Thursday morning and, if necessary, Friday morning.



**Thursday, July 28, 8:15 a.m.**

■ 38. Lon opened the meeting by rereading Nancy Thomas' poem "On Skipping Rocks," this time including the last two pages he unknowingly omitted yesterday. Attendance was estimated at 190.

■ 39. Rachel Hampton, clerk of the Board of Peace and Social Concerns, brought its report. She introduced the two coclerks who have been nominated to take her place, Peggy Hansen and Dorinda Taylor. Rachel also introduced outgoing Peace Education Coordinator Cherice Bock, and her replacement Kayla Walker Edin. Cherice reported on her work for the past year to bring peace issues to the attention of young people all over the Yearly Meeting. Kayla explained the hunger packets project encouraging local meetings to conduct anti-hunger activities during hunger awareness month in October. Rachel and Dorinda recognized Cherice for her work over the past year. Last year over \$10,000 was received in the Thanksgiving Offering to support Christian Peacemaker Teams' work in Iraq, including Newberg Friends' attender Matt Chandler. Rachel read a letter Matt wrote from Baghdad in April, describing the dangers CPT workers face there and asking for continual prayer. This year's Thanksgiving Offering will support the peace education coordinator's work. The meeting thanked Rachel for her work as clerk.

■ 40. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer.

■ 41. Lon explained the order the meeting would follow in its second discussion of the Yearly Meeting's affiliation with Friends World Committee for Consultation. Up to 45 minutes was set aside for discussion this morning, with possible additional time tomorrow at which point the clerks would offer a draft minute. The meeting spent some time clarifying points in Lon's summary of the meeting held Tuesday afternoon. Then the meeting heard from several members who shared their sense of the Spirit's leadings regarding this matter.

■ 42. Frank Engle, director of marketing at Friendsview Retirement Community, Dennis Russell, executive director, and Steve Gulley, chair of the Board of Directors, brought a report on the Friendsview ministry. Friendsview continues to provide a place for Friends pastors and missionaries to retire. Forty-eight percent of the residents in the community are Friends. About 190 people are on a waiting list for entry into the community. Recent expansions cost about \$20,000,000. The community is committed to being a Christ-centered community with ministry both within and outside its membership, and would like to improve its connections to the Yearly Meeting. Friendsview has joined a Peace Church Risk Retention group for insurance purposes, which allows them to save money by being pooled with other facilities run on the highest ethical standards.

■ 43. The Council of Elders, upon recommendation from the Board of Ministerial Service, recommended to the Yearly Meeting that Carol Twichel and Rebecca Ankeny be recorded as ministers of the gospel. Both were approved. Attendance was estimated at 215.

- 46. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer.

■ 47. Yearly Meeting Treasurer Dave Hampton brought the proposed 2006 Yearly Meeting Great Commission Budget. The budget proposes a 2% increase in spending. A significant drop in the Ethnic Ministries budget relates to the change in our relationship with Peace Place in Portland. The cut in EFM and EFI line items reflects the fact that a large travel budget has not been spent in past years, and the budget being adjusted closer to real spending. Council of Elders and Family Life Commission show increases in 2005 reflecting carry over of unspent funds from 2004.

■ 48. Phil McLain, clerk, brought the report of the Commission on Family Life. The commission's auction, while lightly attended, raised \$1,400 for the Richard Beebe Memorial Counseling Fund. The commission is providing a video resource on Painless Parenting in the Preschool Years which can be borrowed at no cost through the Yearly Meeting office. Three workshops on parenting were offered during the sessions this year. Phil recognized the following couples who celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversaries this year: Conard and Sarah Petersen, Gerald and Margaret Lemmons; Marvin and Corrine Hasson, Cliff and Joanne Cannon, Don and Nancy Lamm, Carl and Isabelle Shanks. Phil also recognized (in absentia) Edward and Violet Baker who celebrated their 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year.

■ 49. Lon reported that the former parsonage for Piedmont Friends was sold by the Yearly Meeting with proceeds of about \$172,000. He reported that the Executive Council has approved the following allocation of these funds:

The balance of \$33,800 will be held as a reserve for possible expenses related to the Organization and Strategy process or other needs.

■ 50. Ron Woodward, clerk, presented the report of the Friends Center, which has now been operating for two years to help in the training of Friends pastoral ministers. Ron recognized Friends Center Director Dick Sartwell for his work. A scholarship was initiated for Friends seminary students, which paid part of the tuition of four students this year, and will help six students next year thanks to an increase in resources through the Department of General Education and Friends Center fundraising. Dick Sartwell and Phil Smith offered short courses, plus a regular course on History and Polity of Friends. Two more short courses will be offered in the coming year. A dozen Friends students are involved in degree programs at George Fox Evangelical Seminary. Ron challenged the meeting to generously support the Walter Lee Scholarship Fund to support Friends pastoral students. Ron introduced Jules Glanzer, dean of the GF Evangelical Seminary, who reported that 30 different denominations are represented in the student body, 9% of whom are Friends. Jules described the seminary's intensive efforts, woven through the curriculum, to encourage spiritual formation toward Christ-likeness among seminary students.

■ 51. Yearly Meeting Superintendent Colin Saxton introduced the four district superintendents: Ken and Marcia Royal (Inland/Puget Sound); Dick Sartwell

(Portland/Southwest Washington); Don and Nancy Lamm (Salem and Southern Oregon); and Roy and Karen McConaughy (Southern Idaho and Woodland). Colin recognized the challenges of serving large areas on one-quarter-time appointments.

**Friday, July 20, 8:15 a.m.**

■ 52. The meeting opened with worship in song and a brief silence. Lon thanked Jeanne Leonard and Aimee Jury for leading our worship times this week. Attendance was estimated at 145.

■ 53. Colin Saxton, on behalf of the Organization and Strategy Group (OSG), invited members of the meeting to reflect and comment on whether the mission statement and the vision statement for the Yearly Meeting adequately and accurately reflect who Northwest Yearly Meeting is and who we intend to become. One member thought the vision statement was too focused on leadership and should be broadened to include all the spiritual gifts useful to the body. Another thought the abbreviated version of the core values presented with the OSG report lost some of the meaning present in the version originally approved in 1997.

■ 54. A draft of a minute on the Yearly Meeting's affiliation with the Friends World Committee for Consultation was distributed to the members present. It reads as follows:

#### **Proposed Minute on FWCC Affiliation:**

At the NWYM sessions in July, 2002, it was approved to affiliate with the Friends Committee on Consultation (FWCC) and to review this affiliation during our annual sessions in July, 2005.

We have given substantial amounts of time to this review and those who have participated in the discussions have respectfully listened to those with differing views. We believe the discussions have deepened our understanding of the issues involved with affiliations with FWCC and with other Friends groups.

We have agreed that, as a matter of policy, NWYM should only affiliate with organizations that do not require it to soften, amend, or abandon its *Faith and Practice* and core values. We have also agreed that we should not remain in affiliation with organizations that persist in taking stands on behalf of its affiliates that are contrary to the NWYM *Faith and Practice* and core values.

We have heard and read the reports of those who have represented NWYM in FWCC meetings. According to their testimonies, our affiliation has been consistent with the above general policy statement. We also note the warmth with which they have been welcomed, the respect they have received for their Christ-centered faith, the many opportunities they have had to witness to Christ, and the leadership they have taken in various FWCC committees. We further note the



numerous other evangelical yearly meetings from around the world that are affiliated with FWCC and the opportunity our affiliation gives us to extend support and fellowship to the representatives of these yearly meetings.

We, therefore, conclude that the way is clear for the Yearly Meeting to continue its affiliation with FWCC. In taking this action, we will continue to investigate these issues:

- We ask the Executive Council in cooperation with the Communications Commission to review the process by which NWYM representatives to FWCC are selected. We hope that a wide range of NWYM members will be considered as representatives, including some with theological training and some who are not fully persuaded that the NWYM - FWCC affiliation is beneficial.
- We also ask the Executive Council to consider the issue of funding for the travel of the NWYM representatives to the FWCC meetings. We hope that a way might be found to assist those who would not have the resources to fully pay for their travel to FWCC meetings.

We direct our FWCC representatives to actively monitor the consistency of our affiliation with our general policy on affiliation with other organizations. If at any time our FWCC representatives believe that our affiliation may violate that policy, we direct them to consult with the Executive Council, which may then bring a recommendation to the Yearly Meeting regarding future affiliation.

The meeting heard several different points of view, including regret that this issue has caused such harsh feelings between brothers and sisters in Christ. Some members expressed their unwillingness to believe our representatives' assurances that FWCC affiliation was consistent with the policy stated in the draft minute. Others suggested we take the representatives' reports of good experiences as our indication that the experiment embarked upon three years ago has been successful. Some felt that any affiliation with non-Christian Friends compromises our witness. Others felt that being connected to other Friends opens the way for us to bring Christ back to the attention of Friends who have dismissed Him. We also heard from a Christ-centered Friend attending a Friends General Conference monthly meeting who recounted her sense of being called to be with non-Christian Friends in good part to share Christ with them. Some felt that sharing Christ could be done by those individuals called to that ministry without formal affiliation on the part of the entire Yearly Meeting.

■ 55. After a break, Lon reminded the meeting that the question of affiliation with FWCC needs some sort of resolution, since we cannot be both affiliated and not affiliated; and that we are not a "veto" decision-making body which means we cannot move forward until we are unanimous. He asked those who are uncomfortable with the draft minute to describe the depth of their opposition. Several said they were deeply opposed. Others responded with their feeling of

grievance if the affiliation is dropped. The clerks offered the following minute:

We have completed the review of our affiliation with Friends World Committee for Consultation and have concluded that we should gather further information and insights on the points discussed in these sessions. We commit ourselves to prayerful reflection on the issues that divide us. The clerks will appoint a group of no more than 10 persons, representing the Executive Council, the FWCC representatives, and those stating their deep opposition to the earlier proposed draft minute. This group will gather information and reflect together, and will report to the Yearly Meeting next year. We will allow opportunity for further discussion of this issue in next year's session.

This minute was approved by the meeting.

■ 56. Mark Kelley, clerk of the Board of Ministerial Service, brought its report. He highlighted the improved sense of community on the board as a result of its work this year. Otherwise he referred Friends to the board's written report.

■ 57. Commission on Communications Clerk Cathy Knox presented its report. She asked Friends to give feedback on the NWYM Connection to Sherry Macy. The commission is searching for someone to replace Archivist Dick Votaw when he retires next year.

■ 58. Commission on Ethnic Ministries Clerk Ed Cammack noted the growing multi-cultural nature of the population in the Pacific Northwest. Some discussion arose of whether Peace Place "doesn't need the financial support of the commission" as stated in the report.

■ 59. Ron Mulkey, clerk of the Board of Education, brought its report. He highlighted the children's missions' newsletter "G.O." and Children's Yearly Meeting as programs that are making a difference this year.

■ 60. Lon read a recommendation from the Executive Council asking for authority "to exercise its interim authority on behalf of the Yearly Meeting when there are recommended additions to the GFU Board of Trustees. The Executive Council will be attentive to the guidelines for GFU board membership in the NWYM *Faith and Practice* and the GFU By-Laws. Those interim actions will be taken only at the midyear meeting of the Executive Council and will be reported at Yearly Meeting sessions." This recommendation was approved.

■ 61. Julie Peyton reported that the Epistle Committee worked hard, but she felt she needed another year as clerk to get the job done right. She submitted on behalf of the committee the following epistle:

To Friends everywhere:

Greetings from the 113<sup>th</sup> sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting gathered on the George Fox University campus in Newberg, Oregon, USA, July 23-29, 2005. Our theme this year, "Being Incarnational Christians," continues our work and discussions based on last year's theme, "Becoming Incarnational Christians," from 1 John 4:17: "As He is, so are we in the world." Quoting from the session's information booklet, "As individual Christians and as the body of Christ, we



continue Jesus' ministry in the world. By our words and actions, and through the content and the character of our life together, we make Jesus visible to a watching world that is seeking after God. This year we want to continue to explore the theme of Being Incarnational Christians by looking at some of the ways God is using Friends in NWYM to live out the whole gospel of Jesus Christ. Through evangelism, social concern, community and other creative ministries, something of God's grace and glory is being revealed through our lives."

We are 61 churches, ranging from very small mission points to congregations over 500, from Washington, Idaho, and Oregon. We are urban and rural, young and old, mostly white and English speaking (although we are thrilled to see growth in the number of our Hispanic meetings this year).

Our week together was filled with activity. The opening Saturday was Family Celebration Day, which included a picnic lunch, the annual Young Adult Friends Volleyball Tournament, the youth barbecue, the grade school picnic, a silent auction to raise funds for the Richard Beebe Memorial Pastoral Counseling Fund, performances at our well-loved stage "The Hoot" (featuring our talented musical Friends interspersed with reports from our children who had attended camp that week). Our first business meetings began with the seating of the Council of Representatives and presentation of the business agenda for the week. Because this is the year set for reviewing our affiliation with FWCC, the council heard a report from our FWCC representatives about their experiences over the past three years since our first formal affiliation. The day ended with the men's and women's missions-oriented banquets. And that was just Saturday.

On Sunday, after attending any of the various worship services throughout the area and after more picnicking and more music at The Hoot, we had our annual Missions Rally. The evening service featured Yearly Meeting Superintendent Colin Saxton as keynote speaker, with his first in a series of five lessons on our theme. This night's message explored the sub-theme: that while we are unified in Christ, we are diverse in ministry; that the work of being Christ in the world is most clearly done in community; that individualism cripples our work.

The rest of the week flew by, with meetings for business in the mornings, workshops (more than 40) and boards and commissions in the afternoons, evening services from 7:00 – 8:30, winding down with fellowship and The Hoot stage with yet more music and events. Yes, we did break for meals, but the conversations and reunions never ceased. For more details on the evening services, please read the enclosed Young Friends epistles.

Business Highlights: much of the time was spent hearing reports from our boards, commissions, and committees, as well as from our affiliates George Fox

University, Greenleaf Friends Academy, Barclay Press, George Fox Evangelical Seminary, Friendsview Retirement Community, and Friends Center. It is clear from the reports that God has been working through our Friends who have concerns for evangelism, missions, social justice, peace, pastoring, financial stewardship, fine arts, youth, strong families, and care for our elderly. We gave thanks to God as we heard about new missions and missionaries, of a growing budget, of a flourishing and creative arts ministry, of ten (!) young Friends bound for the World Gathering of Young Friends. We joyfully recorded Carol Twichel and Rebecca Ankeny as ministers, recognizing how God has gifted them and we acknowledged their faithfulness to their calling. Yes, this was the easy work.

Our difficult decisions concerning FWCC affiliation took much time and prayerful listening over several days. While our FWCC representatives clearly articulated the richness and value of their experiences, sharing stories of how their lives were changed and their connections to us were deepened even as they reached out, the meeting had to weigh risks to our core identity, values, and mission as an evangelical, Christ-centered meeting. We strove to listen deeply as each Friend spoke his or her heart. Sometimes we spoke too quickly, too impatiently, and caused offense. But we mostly worked towards each other, remembering that incarnating Christ requires a community speaking with honesty and love.

We ask you who read this to hold us in the Light of God as we do the work of our faith: forgiving as we have been forgiven, seeing – really seeing – our neighbors, speaking boldly the good news, treating with tenderness those who leave our sessions with genuine concern for our decisions. We want to illustrate the love of Jesus to the world by our love for each other. We depart having received a vision of being the hands, feet, and eyes of Jesus, and we commit ourselves to making this vision real.

May the grace of God, the fellowship of the Spirit, and the riches of Christ be with you.

This epistle was approved with the intended addition of a sentence summarizing the minute on FWCC affiliation.

■ 62. Don Staples highlighted some key points from the statistical report, a complete copy of which will be printed in the Appendix. Total Yearly Meeting membership stands at 6390. Median church size is 70 in attendance on a Sunday morning. Don noted that this was his shortest statistical report ever.

5. This year's officers shared their roles so that the youth could be thinking about who they might like to nominate.
6. Forrest Cammack announced that nominations would be taken on Monday, current officers will meet with Joyce White and Lauralea Kinser to bring recommendations on Tuesday, and, if recommendations are not accepted, we'll meet again. Forrest reminded everyone to seriously consider who might be best for the officer roles.
7. Paul Bock then shared about Youth Night on Wednesday and suggestions were written down and handed out for the worship service that evening. Paul also explained how the youth would be participating in the adult business meeting on Wednesday.

Paul Bock explained this year's new business; that our focus will be on where we think the Yearly Meeting will or should be in five to ten years through discussing within our family groups with the hopes that a Youth Vision Statement, or a statement of what we've heard around the topic, may be shared with the adults.



17. Forrest Cammack shared that the youth will be going to the adult workshops on Monday and workshop descriptions were handed out.

22. Liz Petersen introduced Lois Miller, a representative from Alaska Meeting, and read a traveling minute.
23. Cherice Bock shared about peace education that would be happening this day called Conscientious Objector Training.
24. Bethany Muhr read the earlier meeting's minutes. They were approved.
25. Forrest Cammack brought up the next item of business—nominating officers for next year.
26. Presiding Clerk nominees are: Rebecca Roberts, Joel Pruitt, and Elizabeth Woods.
27. Assistant Clerk nominees are: Amanda Selby, Gabriella Rivis, Hannah Morse, Tessa Capell, and Kara Kluver.
28. Recording Clerk nominees are: Joel Pruitt, Rebekah Cammack, Annie Brannon, and Shelby Stipeck.
29. Conference Coordinator nominees are: Mark Beebe, Tim Fodge, Ian Lamm, Kyle Hannus, Holly Walters, and Daniel Fleming
30. Youth Representative nominees are: Daniel Fleming, Ben Ragsdale, Rebecca Roberts, Ian Lamm, Tim Fodge, Kara Kluver, and Matt Hopkins.
31. Liz Petersen explained that epistles are letters written between yearly meetings and read two: one from Iowa and the other from Indiana.
32. Liz Petersen read the Friends Youth Exec report.
33. Forrest introduced the beginning of new business.
34. Bethany Muhr closed with prayer.

*Tuesday, July 26, 2005*

35. Forrest Cammack opened with a devotional thought and reminded the youth that we can worship through our business.
36. Bethany Muhr read Monday's minutes. They were approved.
37. The process of approval of next year's officers began.
38. Presiding Clerk nominees were dismissed. Forrest Cammack announced that Elizabeth Woods was being recommended. We approved this recommendation and then the nominees re-entered the meeting.

39. Assistant Clerk nominees were dismissed. Liz Petersen announced that Tessa Capell was being recommended. We approved this recommendation.
40. Recording Clerk nominees were dismissed. Bethany Muhr announced that Shelby Stipeck was being recommended. We approved this recommendation.
41. Conference Coordinator nominees were dismissed. Mark Roberts announced that Mark Beebe was being recommended. We approved this nomination.
42. Youth Representative Nominees were dismissed. Tony Warfield announced that Rebecca Roberts was being recommended. The recommendation was approved
43. During the discussion, we were reminded that the correct person for the job is not necessarily more qualified, but more of a leading by God is felt toward that person.
44. Angela Clouser explained the afternoon's service project and how groups would go around Newberg and do different jobs for people through the company Love INC (In the Name of Christ). She reminded us to check what kind of attitude we went into the project with.
45. Forrest Cammack reminded us that we need to be thinking within our groups about what we would like to share regarding the Mission and Vision Statements at the next meeting.
46. Tony Warfield closed us in prayer.

*Tuesday Afternoon, July 26, 2005*

47. Mark Roberts opened with an explanation of what would now be done: group representatives would be called up to share what their group wanted to include in the 'youth report.'
48. Liz Petersen and Forrest Cammack explained more detailed procedure, that ideas would be summed up and written on the white board.
49. Joe Millard's Family Group:
  - The statement is too wordy and hard to read.
  - There needs to be a differentiation between Yearly Meeting and Yearly Meeting churches.
  - Definition terms should be put at the beginning to give the document context.
50. Matt Burg's Family Group:
  - Yearly Meeting churches being connected and supported is very important.
  - There should be an emphasis of everyone's ability to hear Christ's spirit as well as faithfulness to scripture, led by the Holy Spirit.
51. Paul Lewis' Family Group:
  - We're all open to God's working in any way He sees fit.
  - The training and equipping of youth should be mentioned.
  - The document is too wordy which contradicts the Quaker statement of simplicity.



52. Eric Muhr's Family Group:

- The phrase "radically committed to Christ" in the second paragraph should instead say "Unconditionally committed to Christ's leadership."
- Integrity and consistency need to be kept in the Mission Statement.
- It is too wordy.

53. Tami Burton's Family Group:

- They're concerned that there is no mention of listening to God in the Mission Statement.
- The Vision Statement is too wordy.
- The Vision Statement should be condensed.
- It should connect by not being so profound.

54. Rachel Fulton's Family Group:

- It should be made clear that the Vision Statement is what we're striving to do and made known that we're not yet there.
- Rather than "hope for the world," there should be "hope for the people."

55. Christina Muhr's Family Group:

- There are some unnecessary words such as mission whose true implications are unknown.
- Why should only the Gospel be emphasized?
- Capitalization is confusing making some terms needing to be dealt with, such as discrepancies in 'scripture' when it's not capitalized, therefore, having the sense of perhaps being any random scripture that's not necessarily from the Bible.
- Leadership should be expanded beyond local capacities.
- There needs to be a greater emphasis on unity.
- Quaker identity is important.
- Leadership development and spiritual growth should be added.

56. Wendy Lewis' Family Group:

- There should be something about knowing and having an intimate relationship about Christ.
- In the last paragraph talking about how one in a leadership position needs to serve, the word 'happily' to joyfully.
- There should be mention of NWYM as a community.
- We had a questioning session with Eric Muhr who is on the committee that is drafting these statements.
- There was question of how much faith and practice should be in the document; the reply was that the intent of the Vision Statement is more to see what we want to have done in the future that's different from now.

- There's the feeling that we can't be disconnected from other churches outside of the Friends Church.
- The concern of what would be done with the input of the youth then came up. Input will be taken to the committee; these concerns are affirmations to what some of the adults have already voiced.

57. Forrest Cammack thanked Eric, then wrapped up the discussion.

58. There was positive feedback to the success of this discernment process.

59. Bethany Muhr closed in prayer.

*Tuesday Evening, July 26, 2005*

*Informal discussion in the Student Union Building*

60. The youth discussed the Mission and Vision Statements with Northwest Yearly Meeting Superintendent Colin Saxton.

61. Colin opened the floor for questions and comments about the statements. Suggestions given:

- The document needs to be simplified.
- There should be an emphasis on community and seeking God's leadership.

62. Colin Saxton stated that it's important that youth be ready to take leadership positions.

63. The question was raised of how our input might be used.

- Colin answered: The Organization and Strategy Group (OSG) will be looking at all feedback and discussing draft changes within the committee meeting.
- The OSG will shape the statement and come back next year with specifics as far as how we as a yearly meeting should act upon our vision

64. Colin Saxton reminded us of ways we could be looking to be leaders at home. Then he said goodbye.

65. Paul Bock shared new opportunities for youth to minister in the future. A new Youth Challenge team is possible, ideas for which include an inner-city ministry or a sports (soccer) camp put on for children free of charge.

76. Joyce White explained the beach trip and what to take as well as bus loading instructions.

79. Forrest Cammack opened with announcements.
80. Bethany Muhr shared a devotional thought from Psalm 16.
81. Liz Petersen read the Mission input statement that would be presented to the committee. It was approved.
82. Evaluation:
- It's nice to have purposeful work during Family Group time.
  - Worship should be microphoned; sharers at the Bruin Den should be, too.
  - Workshops were good, being able to hear others share.
  - It's nice to have the option of Family Groups instead of workshops.
  - People encountered God through others, small groups, and in blessing the adults then them blessing us as youth.
  - Sitting by the water made it hard to hear those sharing.
  - Breakfast time changes caused troubles.
  - Memorial Service should be earlier in the week or earlier in the day when people aren't so tired so that those attending may be present and not ready to fall asleep.
  - Fans would be helpful in cooling the dorms to make sleep easier.
  - Family Groups should meet before evening service and right after on Wednesday night to make loading buses for the beach trip go more quickly.
  - Something should be set up so that youth without money for food on Saturday and Sunday can eat.
83. New business for next year could include: Discern how to apply or move

toward the Mission Statement, discern what we can start doing at our home churches, do something around committees or just learn about them, make high school committees, have information for those in their last year in the youth program to make the transition into adult yearly meeting easier so that they can be more involved, organize young adult workshop for those who are graduating, and have a youth yearly meeting directory (phone numbers/addresses).

**Council of Elders**

The work of the Council of Elders has continued this past year in a pastor-counselor relationship to the Yearly Meeting. Working in that role with the new superintendent, Colin Saxton, and four district superintendents has brought a new sense of vision as we have journeyed together. Also, there have been continued reports that pastors and local leaders have been greatly encouraged by personal contact from these superintendents.

The arrival of the new superintendent coupled with last year's Yearly Meeting sessions theme "Becoming Incarnational Christians" has prompted us to have a fresh look at our role. A year ago at our annual sessions we spent the majority of our time discussing how we do church, centered on the question "Are we being Christ in the world?" This was at times a painful discussion because the idea of change came up often. It has been reassuring throughout this past year to see God move in local congregations in new ways that often *did* involve change. Also, it has been a real joy to read about some of these efforts in the State of the Church annual report forms recently compiled by local church elders. Outreach that is church centered has involved a variety of approaches including The Alpha program, MOPS (Mothers of Pre-Schoolers), "free" garage sales, Hispanic ministry, hosting community meetings including alternative type worship, sponsoring original music concerts, and a number of other efforts. Changes in church structure and other programs were also noted.

Perhaps the most notable observation drawn from the recently completed annual reports is the obvious increase in the number of ministries that are happening out in communities (*being incarnational!*). While the majority of churches mentioned these types of activities, the report from Cherry Grove stated it succinctly by saying "We're now focused outward, not inward." Some of the activities in the reports include feeding the homeless, work with Habitat for Humanity, programs designed to bless local schools, college campus ministry, sponsoring community holiday potlucks, community youth centers, and drug and alcohol recovery programs. Some also pointed out that day-to-day jobs and careers are viewed as ministries in the world. A number of churches also reported involvement in short-term and other foreign mission activity.

We rejoice in the changed lives that are a result of God's touching people through ministry in our yearly meeting this past year.

There are some areas of concern that need your prayer support:

- For the on-going "visioning process" for our yearly meeting. We want

to see clearly God's plan for our ministry

- For churches in decline
- For Colin Saxton and Paul Bock's time commitments
- For spiritual protection and encouragement for our pastors and others as we reach out in ministry

We thank the Lord and all the laborers for the great efforts. I Corinthians 15:58 seems appropriate: "Therefore, brothers, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain."

This past year Children's Yearly Meeting expanded its program. One of the new features enjoyed by our children was participation in the "Hoot" during the Family Celebration Day. Several kids shared their gifts and talents as well as reports on the fruits of our summer children's camping program. Following the exciting days at Tilikum, our children relaxed in Edwards Lobby at "Wit's End." This was a gathering place for the kids as they waited to be picked up by their parents and a new socializing opportunity for families. A soda shop, snacks and low-key activities were available for the kids and their parents. We appreciate our volunteers who make Children's Yearly Meeting a reality. We especially appreciate Carla Anderson's continued vision and leadership.

We again invited our local churches to participate in our Christian Education Program Enhancement Grants by applying for matching grants, sponsored by the Department of Church Education, for their local Christian education ministries. Six churches responded and were awarded matching grants. These churches simply needed to evaluate their education needs (i.e. - teacher training, new



equipment, education materials) and present a proposal to the department outlining the need and how funds will be used. Deadline for matching grant proposals for the 2005-2006 church year is January 15, 2006. Please contact Ronald Mulkey for the Christian Education Program Enhancement Grant application form.

Finally, we continue to urge each of our local churches to develop and implement a "Child Protection Policy." Please contact the Board of Education and Youth for information.

We continue to discuss ways that we might encourage and enable education ministry at our local churches. We invite your thoughtful input.

## DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATION

During the past year the Department of General Education has continued to discuss how we can most effectively use scholarship funds to develop promising young leaders and provide continuing education for current pastors within the NWYM. This is not a trivial matter since an increasing number of individuals are matriculating into church leadership through non-traditional paths. This has resulted in a dramatic reduction over the past few years in the number of requests to our department for traditional seminary support. To address this, the department has explored ways to more aggressively identify individuals for support and to diversify the types of support we can provide while remaining true to our mission. To this end we took two major steps during midyear boards:

We met with Dick Sartwell to gain a better understanding of the Friends Center (FC). The department's hope is that the FC might become a formal avenue for us to provide support to individuals training for pastoral positions in NWYM and for current pastors seeking continuing education. To this end, our department's idea of continuing education courses offered at Yearly Meeting will commence at this 2005 session. Carole Spencer (GFES faculty) will offer a credit-based course ("Quakerism as Holiness") Saturday, July 23, 9 a.m.-5 p.m. and during the workshop sessions (Monday-Thursday, 1-3 p.m.). The department believes that a partnership with the FC can be productive, and to that end we have supported its development the past few years. We are hopeful that the mission and vision of the FC can be focused in the near future so that we can move forward in joint projects.

The department agreed to support Debby Thomas in her pursuit of a master's degree from Fuller Theological Seminary. The course of study is cohort-based and involves distance learning making it different from programs the department has supported in the past. The department views this as a new way of supporting current leaders who are in remote locations or are unable to relocate for their training. In this particular case it also represents a partnership between the department and Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM) who is providing the balance of Debby's support.

The department's second major task this past year has been a continued effort to implement the Lancaster Scholarship. Currently a student must be mentored for several years before they qualify for the scholarship. To the best of our knowledge only one student is currently in process. The department drafted a simplification of the procedure in 2003 and is currently working to see if the procedural change meets the intent of the original donors.

The department is engaged in discussion regarding the future of the GFU/Church/NWYM "matching" scholarship. This scholarship is given to students from NWYM whose church contributes towards their student's tuition. The university matches up to \$600 of the church's contribution and NWYM contributes an additional \$200. Department discussions have centered around the value of the scholarship in light of the current GFU financial aid policy. The number of Quaker students attending GFU appears to be in decline. According to the Financial Aid office, the total number of students participating in this program as of November 2004 was 51.

## DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH

The Department of Youth is made up of all of the youthworkers in the Yearly Meeting who wish to participate. We meet two times a year, once in the fall for a brief meeting during the Youthworkers Training Conference, and once in the spring for a two-day business meeting in Meacham, OR.

The topic for our yearly Youthworkers Training Conference in Bend was "Postmodern Youth Ministry." As youthworkers we are recognizing that shifts and changes in culture are affecting the way that youth think and interact with the world and with God. We felt a need to think specifically about how our approach to ministry might be rethought in light of these cultural shifts. Sessions included: an overview of Postmodernism, Discipleship, Worship, and Evangelism. Presenters included: Bruce Bishop (North Valley Friends), Eric Muhr (Meridian Friends), Luke Ankeny (Medford Friends), Josh Kaiser (Reedwood Friends), and Josh Reid (Newberg Friends). At the business meeting, we decided to move our next gathering (November, 2005) to Hood River (primarily for financial reasons—the cost was creeping and attendance seemed to be affected by that).

This past June, sixteen of us from around the Yearly Meeting met for worship, community, and business in Meacham, OR. Our clerk, Jon Hays, was unable to be there for the gathering, and I was asked to fill in for him. Before we jumped into our agenda we spent around six hours in a process of listening to God and to one another. In short, the process was intended to bring us to a point of knowing what we are being called to BE and DO (in generalities), both corporately and personally, as it relates to our ministry to youth. This process was rich and tiring and extremely helpful as we moved into our agenda because we were able to move forward with decisions that were informed by how we sensed God directing us in our listening. We heard reports regarding YouthQuake, Bible Quizzing, Friends Youth Exec., Youthworkers Training Conference, the Youth



Department budget, and the Youth Superintendent (Paul Bock). In addition, I was nominated and approved to serve a three-year term as Youth Department clerk.

Midwinter this year was held at Camp Koinonia, near Sweet Home, Oregon. We spent the time learning, reflecting, and playing. ## NEW WORKS REPORT

### Art House Friends: Cottage Grove, OR - Trevor and Betsy Smith

This group has solidified under the leadership of the Smiths. Their core group consists of 11 adults meeting weekly, with their primary outreach into their community through a weekly pre-school play group. In this way they are impacting numerous families while meeting a recognized community need. Their biggest challenge for this next year is being prompted by the potential loss of their downtown Cottage Grove facility that they have been renting, due to a large increase in rent. They are viewing this as a challenge to hear and accept from the Lord any new direction in which He might lead.

### Cheney Friends: Cheney, WA - Ed and Lois Marston

The Marstons have felt led of God to move to Quincy to minister at Quincy Friends. This is an exciting development for Quincy, but has left huge shoes to fill regarding ongoing leadership for the Cheney group. The Springs group is assisting in the transition, and we have also asked Ken Royal, district superintendent, to be involved. We desire to be certain that none are left disconnected during this transition. If trustworthy leadership is not identified, the goal may be to connect the remaining individuals with healthy fellowships so they may continue to grow and thrive in the Lord. The final outcome remains in question. There are 10-12 people remaining in the Cheney group.

### Destiny Friends: Wheeler, OR - Dan and Mindy Burns

Dan and Mindy Burns are currently in transition. For more than two years Dan's work has taken him north across the Astoria bridge to the Ilwaco. Mindy has also traveled frequently to work at her RN profession. They have, therefore, been attempting to grow a ministry in the small community of Wheeler from which they are absent much of the work week, in addition to the time and expense of long commutes. This has greatly hindered their effectiveness. After prayerful consideration and Godly counsel, they have felt clear to move their residence to the Ilwaco, WA, area and transition their planting efforts where they will now both live and work. They sold their house in Rockaway Beach, OR, and have now moved to the Long Beach Peninsula. They have discontinued their weekly meetings in Wheeler and plan to launch a new group on the south Washington coast. Mindy is also pursuing business opportunities that will allow her to work and minister in the same community. We look forward to their fruitfulness in this location in the months and years to come.

### Dundee Community Fellowship: Dundee, OR - Tom and Jaymi Fieldhouse

Tom and Jaymi continue to minister to a community of people that in general have no significant attachments to organized religion. Their methods include

living out their faith in daily life, creating interactions through use of drama and theatre, and youth programs in their home. They interact and attend services at West Hills Friends, where they maintain connectedness and are encouraged. They have one other couple as part of their core team who, unfortunately, lives some distance apart in SW Portland.

### Friends House: Meridian, ID - Karla and Craig Morton

Continuing weekly meetings in their home (led primarily by Karla) this group is focusing on deepening relationships and community. The ebb and flow of daily life and living, actually **being** the church is their focus. It is a great pleasure to visit and share a communion meal together with this group. Change of location and work for some key members of their core group has been a challenging issue for this gathering. We look forward to how God will use this in the days and years to come. Of interest is their connection to a group using motion pictures as a format for outreach and engaging those outside of church circles. Networking with a number of other fellowships provides a rich environment of cooperation between the people of God's Kingdom.

### Friends Church of the Valley: Cave Junction, OR

It has been a little over a year now that Alan and Lori Franks moved from Cave Junction to Brookings. A small group of 6-8 individuals continue to meet in homes on a weekly basis for fellowship and encouragement. Karen and I have joined them on a couple of occasions this year, enjoying each visit and leaving uplifted and encouraged that God has a future and plan for Friends Church of the Valley. Harold and Wendy Behr are now within fairly short driving distance of Cave Junction (note: Harold was original planter of this group). He is initiating contact with the group and together we desire to discern the direction God might lead.

### Household of Faith: LaConnor, WA - Jay and Lori Haines

Jay is desirous to combine his planting efforts in NW Washington with continued missionary endeavors in the Cook Islands. Careful review of mission opportunities for NWYM in the Cooks by our Board of Missions resulted in the board's decision not to proceed along that basis. This leaves us with the dilemma of how to encourage the work already planted there (Alfred Morris is currently licensed by NWYM) as well as discerning with Jay and Lori their own future ministry direction. Their current work involves a weekly meeting at Quaker Cove campground chapel of 12-20 attendees, also other smaller weekly or semi-weekly house groups throughout their local region. The Haines have a more regional perspective, with numerous networking opportunities to fellowship and encourage other planters and shepherds of simple church/house church groups. Lori's primary focus continues as hostess and activities coordinator of the Quaker Cove camp facility.

### New Life Friends: Vancouver, WA - Dave and Renee White

New Life continues to be a beehive of activity under the leadership of Dave and Renee White. Nearing completion of the renovation of their facility, they are hosting a community activity and fitness center. Converting their sanctuary into



a multi-function gymnasium allows them to host sports, fitness, and a computer-learning and tutoring center all week, with a full slate of regular services, Sunday school and youth activities in the same facility during their regular meeting times. This facility is now used seven days a week, almost 16 hours a day! They are mentoring and assisting in transition of men (two houses) and women (one house) from incarceration or drug/alcohol rehab. Their gatherings are a celebration of a people set free from bondage to sin! While this rapid transition presents incredible challenges, we continue to see God's hand leading this ministry team and core group to capture the heart and set free the people of Rosemere! We appreciate Harold Antrim's continued interest and involvement in oversight of the work at New Life. The Friends Church Extension Foundation (with excellent counsel from Dave Hampton) has also been instrumental in procurement of necessary facilities for this work.

#### **Quincy Friends: Quincy, WA - Ed and Lois Marston**

Ed and Lois just completed their move to Quincy Friends this last month. Quincy is providing partial support with Ed continuing to take some outside construction jobs as they come available and are sufficiently close to commute and be available for weekend ministry. We are already hearing excellent reports from Quincy and anticipate God's hand upon this group. As mentioned under the Cheney heading, Ed continues to assist with the transition of the Cheney fellowship. The Springs (Landts) and Salinda Andersen (now of Wilbur, WA, see below) continue to commute periodically to share, encourage and fellowship with the Quincy group. We are greatly encouraged by all that God is doing in this Central Washington region.

#### **River of Life Friends: Post Falls, ID - Mike and Carmen Slothower**

Mike and Carmen have completed their third year in Post Falls. There has been steady growth in numbers and commitment in this group under their shepherding. God has answered a visible need by providing several new committed workers for the Sunday school and adult fellowship programs. A gathering momentum and enthusiasm is apparent when you visit this body. The private school that has been renting their facility during the week is considering finding another location. This will provide both challenges and opportunity to discover how God might have them begin to utilize their wonderful facility during the weekdays should it be vacated. The Slothowers have immersed themselves in the Post Falls community and love living in North Idaho.

#### **The River: Central Oregon - Kurt and Neysa Farris**

This has been a year of transition for the groups meeting in homes in Central Oregon. There are currently three weekly house groups meeting, involving 20-30 individuals. The smaller groups come together for a larger day-long gathering for fellowship approximately once a quarter. Troy and Ruth Longstroth have been part of the NWYM Teaching Abroad in China this past year. As international workers called from within this fellowship, The River provided partial monthly support to help them maintain their residence and monthly commitments during their absence. This group is committed to the work of incarnational ministry. One group in the Culver/Metolius area is hosting a

community garden to bless and encourage their neighbors. The Macys are pleased to see the seed planted continue to grow to fruition in Central Oregon.

#### **The Springs: Davenport, WA - Carol and Vern Landt**

This fellowship consists of a tightly-knit but loosely organized group of neighbors in a rural farming community about 30 miles west of Spokane, WA. This represents a sum of smaller cell groups meeting for prayer, or collectively joining to provide financial, physical, emotional or spiritual needs. Seldom meeting in the larger group (totaling 25-30 when all gather together), these folks live and work together as a functional body of Christ, right in the world where they live.

#### **The Olde Meeting House: LaGrande, OR - Dave and Carla Arnold**

The Arnolds continue to minister in LaGrande through music and the arts. Their core group of believers (a group of about 12) meets weekly. They have recently been joined by the remnants of a Salvation Army group that has sold their own meeting facility. When the two groups meet together, it is a wonderful time of fellowship and encouragement. They also are involved in numerous community enrichment activities involving instrumental music and folk dancing. These activities draw together individuals from Baker City, Pendleton, and further north to Joseph. This work is progressing as they slowly forge solid relationships through common interests. We rejoice with them as God allows them to incarnationally be Christ in their community.

#### **New Listings:**

##### **The Cleft: Wilbur, WA - Salinda Andersen**

I outlined this new work that is coming together. Salinda's involvement with Carol and Vern Landt has provided ample opportunity for us to become acquainted. She is a solid, knowledgeable leader with years of experience in shared ministry with her now deceased husband. God has led her to Wilbur, WA, and provided her housing. Being her childhood hometown, she has numerous contacts within the community. We continue to marvel as God is bringing together a core group of believers around her leadership. Watching God orchestrate His plan is much more fun than trying to "make something happen." We expect He will continue to lead in this new endeavor in an area of Central Washington where there has not been an evangelical Friends presence. We will keep you posted on this developing new work.

##### **Medford Friends: Medford, OR - Harold and Wendy Behr**

Harold and Wendy have bought and moved into a house in Central Point, OR. They are teaming up with Medford Friends in planting simple churches in the Rogue Valley. They will also be able to provide some help and oversight with other New Works in Southern Oregon. We are specifically hoping they can assist in assessing the direction and needs of the Cave Junction group. Harold and Wendy are currently involved in our matching funds program over the next two years. Medford Friends is expecting to add them to their ministerial staff on a part-time basis (providing partial support) with the remainder of their needs



being met through the matching fund and outside giving. Please pray with us as we move ahead on this exciting opportunity for evangelistic outreach in Southern Oregon. Harold will also be an excellent resource throughout the YM for other individuals or fellowships desiring to explore simple church planting and replication.

#### **Brookings, OR: Alan and Lori Franks**

Alan and Lori Franks were pastors in Cave Junction until about a year ago. Alan's source of income was construction, requiring him a daily 160 mile roundtrip to Brookings, his place of employment. He did this for 12 years. They now live and work in Brookings. We have continued to meet with them, for we sense a deep calling and gifting for ministry in this wonderful couple. Alan contacted me this past month, informing me that there is a new fire and sense of expectancy that they are now in a place where God is birthing a new ministry for them in Brookings. I concur with this sense and desire to explore it further with them in the coming months. We may well have the seeds of another New Work in this coastal city of SW Oregon. Pray with us that it may be so!

#### **Nampa, ID**

You asked us to explore the possibility of planting New Work(s) in the Nampa Idaho area. We are greatly encouraged by what we have found. In two separate vision-casting sessions, we listened as several different folks shared their heart-felt sense of God's moving among Friends in Nampa. Two different individuals seem to have taken this beyond the dreaming stage. Based on our time spent with the vision-casting group, I believe that God is indeed stirring hearts for planting one or more new ministries in Nampa. We shall continue to encourage and bring whatever resources are needed to assist these individuals God is preparing. As new developments arise, we shall keep you advised of the situation.

Thank you for allowing us to represent NWYM in the work of encouraging church planting activities throughout the northwest region. We see tremendous challenges as well as abundant opportunities ahead of us. We believe that God is in the business of planting and growing His Church, and want to join Him wherever He chooses to work. We desire to identify and join the work of His Spirit, but likewise avoid the strivings of the flesh. ### **HISPANIC MINISTRIES TASK FORCE**

Introduction: The purpose of this report is to give a brief overview of our current Hispanic churches that comprise Northwest Yearly Meeting Hispanic Friends Fellowship and also to share some of their aspirations and goals. The purpose is not to discuss all of the individual church programs, but, rather, to track the growth of Hispanic ministries, showing who we are, showing where we are and

why, and, finally, where we hope to go with the Yearly Meeting's assistance and God's blessing.

Although Northwest Friends have long been involved in modest efforts to reach the Hispanic population, formal beginnings of the NWYM Hispanic Friends Fellowship can be traced to concern on the part of Newberg Friends Church (NFC) and the efforts of Bob Gilmore and family. Because of NFC's generosity and the Gilmores' energy and dedication, Iglesia Evangelica Los Amigos Newberg was born in 1982, originally meeting in the church's sanctuary and later, when NFC purchased the Friends Center property, taking up permanent residency there. In 1987 Gerardo Ibarra was called to be pastor, first part-time and then full-time, being followed in 1998 by Angel Diaz, a Fuller Seminary graduate, and his wife Marbellys. La Iglesia Evangelica Los Amigos Newberg (IELAN) continues to operate under the umbrella of Newberg Friends, being subsidized by NFC, moving from 80% subsidization in 1997 to 40% in 2005 and, hopefully, to no subsidization by 2007. During Angel's tenure the attendance has increased from 50 to 80. The goals of IELAN are to reach 10% (200) of the 2,000 Hispanics in the Newberg area while helping to establish Hispanic churches in other cities, five by 2006 and 10 by 2010. Bible education has played a key role in the health and growth of the church with Evangelical Friends Mission's (EFM) David Byrne and his Coalition of Hispanic Ministries' Institute Alma providing courses out of Texas. Future dreams are for a Friends Bible School (IBLA) for people without a high school diploma and a Friends Evangelical Seminary (SELA) at McMinnville for people with a high school diploma.

In 2002 under the leadership of Greenleaf Friends Church's (GFC) pastor Steve Fine, Centro Cristiano Los Amigos, now renamed Casa del Alfarero (CdA), was born. Jorge Sileoni, from Argentina, was the first pastor. Now his daughter Jaqui and his bi-vocational son-in-law Mario Ortega have assumed that ministry. To trace the growth of the Hispanic Friends Fellowship is to repeat the story of generosity on the part of sister churches, who have realized that the harvest field is all around us. In GFC's case it has involved providing not only a place for CdA to worship but even a parsonage for the Ortega's family of five. Early in its beginning, the Centro was recognized as a "New Work," and it was largely because of that financial help that Jorge with Mario's help was able to build a congregation of approximately 30, a group that continues at about 25. Mario is a sharp bilingual Christian college graduate, who now has some on-the-job training, so CdA is in good hands.

Iglesia Evangelica Los Amigos McMinnville (IELAM) was born almost before NWYM decided to let us occupy the meetinghouse in McMinnville. This third church in the NWYM Hispanic Friends Fellowship, officially started in March of this year under the bi-vocational pastors Antonio Mandujano and Lorenzo and Gudelia Guzman, and under the oversight of Angel Diaz and the newly organized Hispanic Ministries Task Force from the Board of Evangelism, holds promise for significant ministry. Approached to lend a helping hand, Reedwood Friends Church agreed to be a "sister church" and has contributed both prayers and financial support. The Board of Evangelism agreed to pay the facility expenses for at least the first year, and with the Guzmans and Antonio living rent



free in the parsonage. The church was launched starting with 10 people from McMinnville. Already with the energy and vision of Antonio and Lorenzo, that number has grown to 14 from McMinnville with approximately 20 people in attendance each Sunday. A total of 24 from McMinnville have attended at one time or another, and there have been nine conversions. God is good, and these pastors, who hold full-time jobs besides their ministry, are working hard. The IELAM schedule includes weekly Saturday visitation, a Sunday service, Tuesday Bible studies in homes and a Thursday Bible study at church. The budget is currently over \$3,000 in the black. Plans are to release Reedwood's financial help at the end of this fiscal year, asking the Board of Evangelism to continue its support for one more year, and be self supporting by 2007. IELAM is on the move.

As this report is being written, churches four and five are in process—Iglesia Evangelica Los Amigos Vancouver (IELAV) opening at 6:00 p.m. on August 6 and Iglesia Evangelica Los Amigos Reedwood (IELAR) opening at 6:00 p.m. on August 7. Canvassing these communities has already started with an excited group from IELA Newberg involved in the outreach. Both sister churches, Vancouver First Friends Church and Reedwood Friends Church, are providing worship space for the new congregations, and Vancouver is also providing some financial assistance as well as a parsonage for the circuit-riding pastor, Hernan Diaz. Hernan, also a Fuller graduate and former minister/school teacher in New York, hopes to be able to devote his time to growing these two churches, but will go bi-vocational if the funds are not available.

How quickly Hispanic ministries will grow depends upon the willingness of other churches to assist as have Newberg, Greenleaf, Vancouver and Reedwood—either to provide space or to provide financial assistance if Hispanic populations do not exist in their areas. A budget line in the Yearly Meeting Great Commission budget, called "Hispanic Ministries Promotion," is waiting to grow. At this time the third largest Hispanic city in Oregon has no Iglesia Evangelica Los Amigos. The harvest continues to be great.

### ***Board of Ministerial Service***

The Department of Leadership Development (DLD) ensures the development of ministry gifts by pairing seasoned ministers with those new to ministry. This year, several churches have taken the initiative to ask the DLD to supply a mentor for their members who are exploring their giftedness. A total of nine persons are being mentored through the DLD's program.

The Department of Pastoral Care (DPC) continues the nurturing ministry to those who have completed the recording process. This year, they met with the pastors

at the Pastors Conference and asked, "What kind of structure would encourage pastors to continue their personal and professional growth without being too intrusive?"

The DPC partnered with the Board of Evangelism to provide a copy of Brian McClaren's *More Ready Than You Realize* to every pastor in the Yearly Meeting. This provided some lively discussion among the pastors at regional gatherings and during Pastors Conference.

The Department of Recording is finalizing a new workbook, detailing the recording process. One of the biggest changes is language making it easier to start the recording process for church planters and leaders in New Works. Previously, everyone had to be recommended by their elders, but this created an awkward situation for those working in situations that have no elders. The new language allows the Board of Ministerial Service and Board of Evangelism to create a task force committed to the nurturing of a new minister through the recording process.

Continuing in the recording process are Chris Hinderliter, pastor of Melba Friends Church, and Angel Diaz, pastor of La Iglesia Evangelica Los Amigos (Newberg). The Department of Recording is working with four other persons who may soon start the official recording process.

The Board of Ministerial Service recommends that Northwest Yearly Meeting record Rebecca Ankeny as a minister. Becky is associate vice president of Academic Affairs at George Fox University, having served at George Fox in various capacities since 1988. She is a member of Newberg Friends Church. The communication skills that she first demonstrated in the classroom have also been used by the Lord in her pulpit ministry. Her training in literature gives Becky fresh eyes for biblical narratives. God has also used Becky's sensitive listening and nurturing skills to empower others.

The Board of Ministerial Service recommends that Northwest Yearly Meeting record Carol Twichel as a minister. Carol began the recording process at Tigard Friends while completing the Master of Divinity at George Fox Seminary. She has recently finished the year of Clinical Pastoral Education involving hospital and hospice ministry. She is a member at North Seattle Friends. Carol integrates her Quaker convictions with her ministry as a chaplain. As a chaplain, she feels most called toward the hospice ministry. She radiates the presence of Christ through both her quiet awareness of the Spirit's presence and her confident sharing of God's love.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Board of Missions is committed to model and proclaim God's love cross-culturally in ways that will transform people and produce healthy Christ-centered fellowships. This means we don't undertake to do everything that is good, but what we do, we attempt to do well to the honor of God.

Our six primary activities are:

1. Russia ministries of evangelism, church planting and discipleship.
2. North Africa ministries of educational services and hospitality.
3. Support for a Masters of Intercultural Studies at the Bolivian Evangelical University.
4. Oversight of Christian teachers in Asia and Hungary.
5. Full cooperation with Evangelical Friends Mission.
6. Expand mission awareness and opportunities throughout Northwest Yearly Meeting.

**Russia:** *Patrick and Christy Neifert (children Ethan and Megan)* have completed almost a year of language study in Moscow, Russia, and will continue in language study for a few more months. *Liz Sugden* has completed a year of Russian language and cultural studies at Columbia International University in South Carolina and will be assigned a six-month internship in ministry in St. Petersburg beginning in August. Through the fall, Neiferts and Liz Sugden will be prayerfully establishing ministry goals and strategies to launch their work as a team in early 2006.

**North Africa:** *Paul and Meredith Morse* are currently home for a short furlough during the summer months. They will return soon to their work of guesthouse hospitality. They take delight in friendships formed, hospitality offered, and opportunities to counsel. The *Bill and Betty Kelley (children Joel, Mark and Faith)* family are establishing educational services through the teaching of English in the large city where they live.

It is time to move into concentrated prayer for our teams in Russia and North Africa. We have finished the preparation stage and now look to the Holy Spirit for ways to encourage our new friends in these two regions. The board and our workers continue to seek qualified persons to serve on these two teams in our commitment to bless people and to speak of Christ.

**South America:** *Hal and Nancy Thomas* have capably and faithfully developed their program of Intercultural Studies (Missions) for the past five years at the Bolivian Evangelical University in Santa Cruz, Bolivia. In the last two years their ministry has come to include a doctor of ministry degree offered at several sites around Latin America. In August 40 students in that program (known as PRODOLA), will gather in Santa Cruz itself for a doctoral seminar, leading to a Doctor of Ministry degree. This is the only known Doctor of Ministry degree offered within Latin America in Spanish and has attracted continent-wide enthusiasm. The D. Min program contains a strong missiological component. The Thomases' role in the program, especially their emphasis in missions, is greatly appreciated by leaders of the movement.

Bolivia suffered significant political turmoil during the past year but without major repercussions on Bolivia Yearly Meeting as far as we are aware. Peru Friends have suffered two costly major legal problems during the year, for which the board has offered some limited aid and assistance. Missions Administrator Duane Comfort and former missionary Dan Cammack made a profitable three-week administrative fraternal visit in January, attending the annual Representatives meetings of both Bolivia and Peru yearly meetings.

**Teaching Abroad** A record number of 15 teachers served in Asia and Europe during the past 12 months. We anticipate 13 teachers being commissioned for the coming year, with 12 of them in Asia. *Karen Swenson* serves at a missionary children's school in Budapest, Hungary. The teachers in Asia are assigned and reassigned to the same group of four schools in the same general region year after year. Especially in one of those locations, teachers are commenting on the positive cumulative effect of their work. More and more students are identifying themselves as followers of Christ and are accepting "referrals" to local Christians and churches. Chuck Scott and Ron Stansell visited the teachers in March. Chuck deserves recognition for his professional and consistent work as administrator of the program. He has given countless hours of volunteer time. Our teachers provide excellent service, build attractive friendships, and display consistent Christian lives.

**Evangelical Friends Mission** Evangelical Friends Mission is administratively involved in 12 ministries and networks with member yearly meetings that have ministries in at least 26 other nations. This is becoming a worldwide movement of significant strength. EFM is now launching a new ministry in the state of Aguascalientes in central Mexico. See the EFM report that follows.

**Mission Mobilizing in Northwest Yearly Meeting** The board and EFM jointly sponsored a highly successful "Missions Mobilizers' Conference" in Greenleaf, Idaho, in February. Speakers Larry Walker and Nancy Tichy were greatly appreciated. Nancy is present with us at these Yearly Meeting sessions. EFM Director Chuck Mylander has also promoted the concept of "owning" a mission ministry by local congregations, and has shared that vision several times among us.

One of our tasks is to prayerfully consider new fields. An exploratory team from the Yearly Meeting traveled to the Cook Islands in the South Pacific in February. The team included Superintendent Colin Saxton, North Seattle Friends Ernie and Muriel Ostrin, and New Works leader Jay Haines from La Conner, Washington. While for a number of reasons the board does not feel led to join with Jay and Lori Haines in this ministry, it has encouraged them to follow the Spirit as He may lead them in this fascinating and isolated region, where many seem open to Christ and others are eager to experience Christian renewal.

We want to extend special recognition to a dedicated core of Administrative Committee, Personnel Committee, and Finance Committee members who spend hours monthly in prayer and business, especially Janelle Nordyke, Chuck Scott and Terri Wenzig, but also including Maribeth Hampton, Roscoe Knight, Dick Lakin, and Connie Magee. Board member Reta Stuart has undertaken a major task of updating a policy manual for the board. This is time consuming and technical work!



The Board of Missions budget is holding steady at about \$440,000 for 2005 and into 2006. Our resources come from the Great Commission budget, from missionary shares, from faith promises and other individual undesignated giving during Yearly Meeting sessions and at other times. We appreciate the high level of responsiveness to the work of Evangelical Friends Mission and Northwest Yearly Meeting—we also call ourselves EFM-Northwest! We have cutting-edge opportunities with great appeal, potential, need and diversity. Our overarching purposes are to be culturally sensitive as we share in friendship evangelism and as we support a network of cross-cultural workers who in turn build self-multiplying Christian communities and independent national leadership.

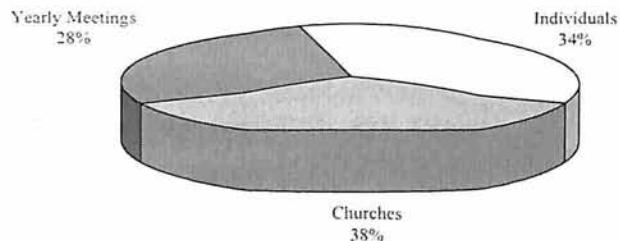

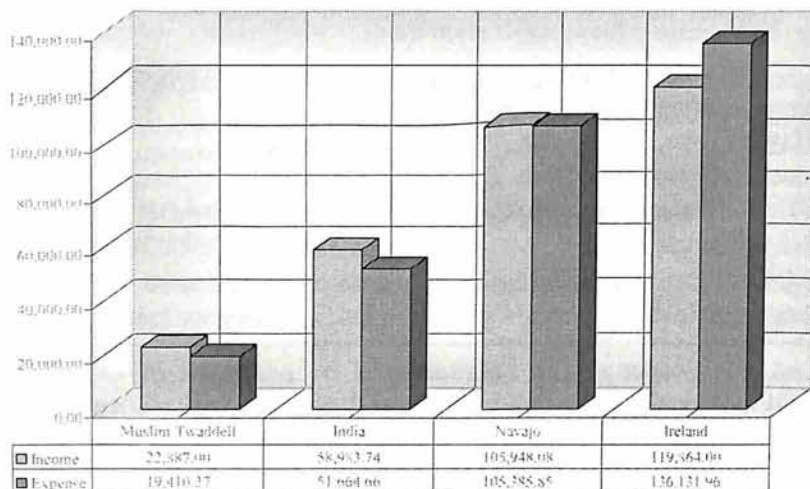

### 2004 EFM Income Sources



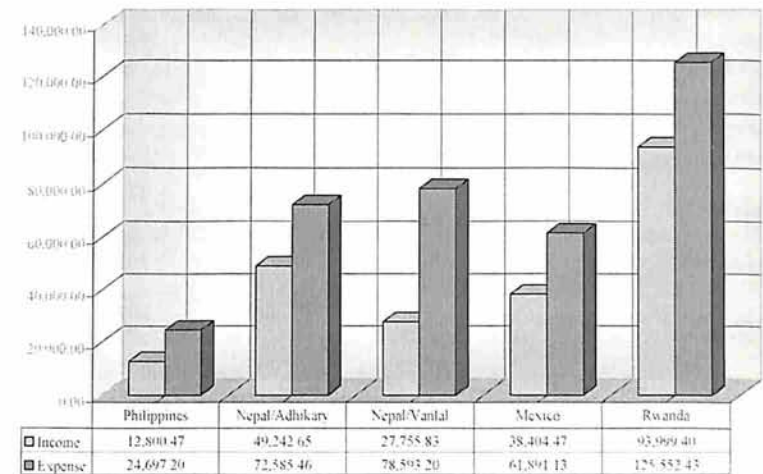
Some mission fields are fully supported through designated giving.

### Supported Fields



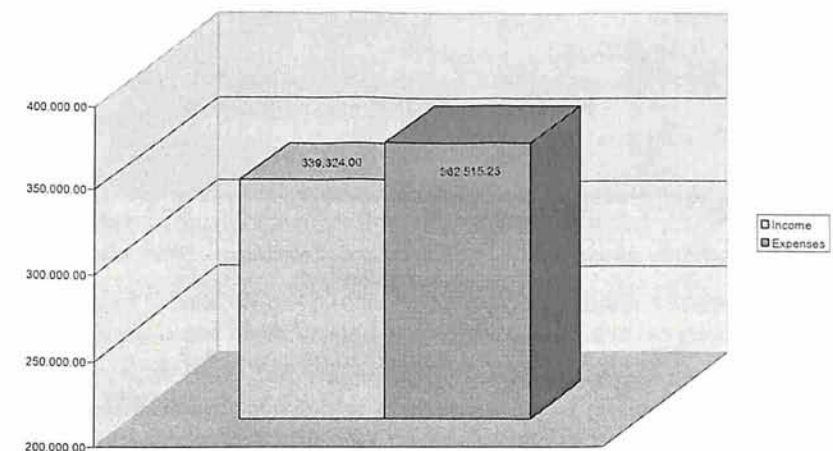
Other mission fields require undesignated giving to make up their deficits.

### 2004 Under-supported Fields



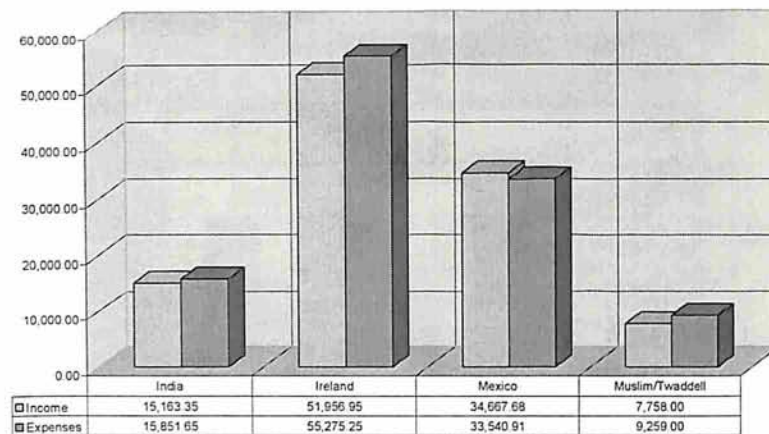

### Income and Expenses through May 2005

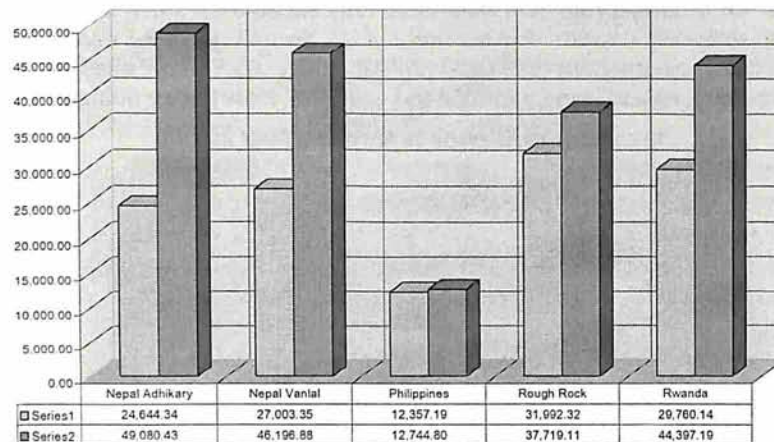




## Field Income and Expenses through May 2005

## Board of Peace and Social Concerns

The focus of the Board of Peace and Social Concerns this year continues to be on peace education in the Yearly Meeting. We have funded a part-time Peace Education Coordinator, Cherice Bock, who has been doing an excellent job. She will be leaving the area to go to graduate school; we will miss her. Taking her place is Kayla Walker Edin who attends West Hills Friends in Portland. Kayla has previous experience in peace education and has been involved with youth in the Yearly Meeting.

We continue to raise funds outside of the budget to support the release in ministry of the Peace Education Coordinator. That has taken a significant amount of board time. We are hoping that the position will be embraced by the Yearly Meeting and funded through the budget in the future.

In 2004 the Thanksgiving Offering supported Christian Peacemaker Teams work in Iraq. We raised over \$10,000 for that ministry.

The board has had booths at several rallies and marches on peace-related issues. We also had a joint retreat with the Commission on Fine Arts in the spring.

We are sponsoring four workshops during Yearly Meeting annual sessions this year. They are on Draft and Military Counseling, Simplicity and Quaker Distinctives, Intercultural Issues, and Need-Based Evangelism.

This coming October we will be sponsoring a Yearly Meeting-wide Hunger Month. Packets are available for each church.

## **Board of Stewardship**

We are praising God for His continued blessing poured out on Northwest Yearly Meeting. Giving to local churches increased more than 2% last year. Local church giving to the Great Commission Budget also increased last year although at a lower rate. This allowed the Yearly Meeting to meet all of its expenses and end the year with a surplus. The surplus allowed us to completely retire the accumulated general fund deficit from more than a decade ago as well as supply additional Great Commission money to subsidize the cost of individuals attending Yearly Meeting sessions. The Stewards place a high priority on insuring that Yearly Meeting Sessions are as affordable as possible. Significantly increased support from budget surpluses, the Great Commission Budget and estate gifts have substantially reduced the cost of attending Yearly Meeting in recent years.

The Stewards continue to be concerned by the continuing trend of local meetings reducing the percentage of their general fund budgets directed to the Great Commission Budget. During recent positive economic times, church income has risen enough so that even though a smaller percentage comes to the Great Commission Budget, the total dollars received by the Yearly Meeting still increases. But history has shown us that during more difficult economic times, giving to the local church drops off and it is even more difficult to increase the Great Commission commitment. The Stewards message to local churches is to seriously consider proportionately supporting the Great Commission Budget as the Lord blesses the local church finances.

### **DEPARTMENT OF BENEFITS**

The Department of Benefits is primarily concerned with the operations of the Yearly Meeting Pension Plan and with group insurance policies available for local churches. Last year's 7.6% average return on pension accounts was good news to participants on top of the prior year's 14.5% positive return. The plan features of employee-directed investments, on-line access to account information and the loan provision are proving to be popular with most church staff. The department continues to encourage all participants to take advantage of the financial planning tools that are built into the system so they can make wise decisions regarding their balances.

The Yearly Meeting continues to sponsor a Yearly Meeting-wide group insurance plan for life, long-term disability and dental. Group medical insurance is no longer available for the entire Yearly Meeting but we continue to administer smaller group plans for several geographic areas. One of the newer trends in health insurance is HealthCare Savings Accounts or HSA's. This past year two of the groups were changed to an HSA insurance plan and the department is carefully monitoring how these work to see if an HSA would be a good plan for the rest of the Yearly Meeting groups.

### **DEPARTMENT OF DEVELOPMENT (FRIENDS FUND)**

Friends Fund continues to make good progress toward financial strength while continuing its mission of supporting the work of the Yearly Meeting through estate giving. Friends Fund distributed over \$41,000 to ministry in 2004 while

reducing total liabilities by over \$12,000. Income exceeded expenses by over \$20,000, contribution further to the stability of the organization. The board is continuing to work on plans for expanding the effectiveness of the Friends Fund message and locating the right person or persons to help carry them out. Continue in prayer for the Friends Fund board as they seek God's wisdom for the future.

## **Northwest Yearly Meeting Trustees**

**1. La Grande Property Loan Modification** We executed a modification agreement with Friends Church Extension Foundation ("FCEF") which documents the extension of the maturity of the loan for NWYM's purchase of church property in La Grande. The maturity was extended from September 15, 2004 to December 31, 2014 which will be 15 years from the time the loan was made. This property is being used by "The Olde Meetinghouse," a NWYM mission point, and it is making the monthly payments. The original amount of the loan was \$73,000 and the balance at modification was \$63,538.

**2. Washington Property Tax Exemption Reports** Property tax exemption reports have been prepared for six Washington church properties where title is in the name of NWYM. These are required annually by March 31. We report any changes in the use of the properties, the use by anyone other than the church, and anything else that might affect the tax exemption.

**3. Sale of Piedmont House** At the request of the Executive Council we completed the sale of the house on North Albina Avenue in Portland which at one time was the parsonage for Piedmont Friends Church. The house was most recently used by Peace Place for an after school program for neighborhood children, but it has moved to another location. The net sales price was \$172,072.

**4. New Life Friends Church Property** The NWYM owned property in Vancouver, Washington, which was acquired as of December 31, 2002, for use by New Life Friends Church includes a land parcel and building which is occupied by a commercial business under an agreement which expired July 2, 2005. We have agreed to extend the expiration of this agreement by one year to July 2, 2006, to allow us additional time to resolve the long-term use of this property.

**5. Homedale Friends Community Church** Homedale is constructing a new church on property at a new location in Homedale and is selling the old church and a house in Homedale to help finance the new construction. At the request of Homedale, the Trustees have approved and will execute a mortgage on the old church and house to help secure a construction loan with Friends Church Extension Foundation ("FCEF") for the new church. Title to the old church and house is in the name of NWYM. The Trustees have also approved the execution of a deed and other sale documents whenever the old church and house sell. Upon application of the sales proceeds to the FCEF loan, FCEF will release the sold property from the construction loan.

"Peace Place" at Piedmont in Portland has been successful in its ministries to children in an after school study assistance program. It is independent enough now, so doesn't need the financial support of the commission.

The public schools in Oregon, Washington and Idaho have a lot of students from other cultures. This presents a challenging opportunity for people to volunteer in the schools. Presently there are Christian employees in these districts who are making a difference in children lives by helping them to realize they have value, are important and can make good choices and decisions.

Bob Gilmore is teaching Spanish on Monday evenings at the West Chehalem Friends Church. Friends churches make a difference in people's lives teaching English as a second language.

The commission continues to offer camp scholarships to students from other cultures represented in the Friend churches.

## **Superintendent's Report to Executive Council and Council of Representatives**

Recently, two other yearly meeting superintendents told me that it takes about five years to understand what this job is really all about. I am sometimes afraid that—in my case, anyway—five years may be a bit too optimistic...

Actually, I have very much enjoyed the last year and am grateful for the opportunity to serve in this role. I recognize I have a great deal to learn, many more people to get to know, and a lot of work left to be done. I also recognize that the future growth and health of NWYM is a concern we all carry...not me alone.

Last summer when I began serving as general superintendent, I outlined some strategic initiatives to pursue over the course of the year. These included:

1. Develop a greater sense of connectedness between the Yearly Meeting office and local churches and work to facilitate a sense of interconnectedness between the various NWYM congregations, ministries and boards.
2. Provide pastoral support and identify ways to further nurture and equip local pastors and meeting clerks, and individuals in NWYM.
3. Facilitate a process for clarifying our corporate sense of mission and strategic planning for future ministry/outreach.
4. Identify structural/organizational changes that allow the Yearly Meeting office to better serve NWYM churches and ministries.

And as it turned out, these were the activities and concerns where I spent most of my time and energy. More than anything, I have tried to focus on relationship, believing this is the avenue by which we will grow in unity, shared mission and common purpose as a Yearly Meeting. Toward that end, I have been out visiting as many churches as I can, encouraging the district superintendents and staff to do the same, speaking at various NWYM retreats and gatherings, and assisting churches in pastoral search processes and other concerns.

If you read much in the area of organizational leadership, you will find many descriptions of what constitutes "good leadership." Several writers suggest that three key tasks are essential. One leadership task is to help define the vision of the organization. A second is to keep the organization on mission—that is focused on and faithful to its unique calling. Thirdly, one of the roles of leadership is to help others understand the reality of the present—by describing both the positives and the negatives with genuine honesty.

Regarding vision—that is the work we have been and will be about this year. It will be the primary focus of my time/energy over the next 12 months, as I work with the Organization and Strategy Group (OSG) that has been assembled. You should know that I subscribe to the philosophy that says the most authentic vision grows from within the heart of an organization. It is not the sole task of one person to define the vision as much as it is that person's job to mine, evoke and communicate the vision that already exists—and then help everyone to see it clearly. So, I am committed to being a listener, as well as a speaker. While I certainly have ideas and dreams about the future of NWYM, I know many of you do as well. Together, I would argue, we are most apt to move beyond our own hopes to understand God's hope for us.

With respect to mission, I like the perspective of one author who talks about "leading from the middle." This refers to living in the center of the mission—being an incarnational leader who lives and works alongside others engaged in the calling. This means more than simply lifting up the mission with words—it requires fleshing it out with you in the practice of ministry. So, I am committed to being out in our churches, want to work with commissions and boards, and will try to be available as much as possible to those of you who want to visit with me. And I will encourage the staff—and in particular our district superintendents—to do the same. Having said all of that, I am committed to being a champion for the mission of NWYM. I thoroughly believe we have a message and a way of life that the rest of world is eager to hear. One of my jobs is to consistently remind us of this mission and calling and encourage our faithfulness to it. I hope you won't find that surprising!

Finally—an honest look at reality. We need to be willing to critically examine our organizational structure and priorities. We need to have the courage to confront any lack of integrity that exists within our life together and do the painful work of being faithful to our calling. First, some very real positives about what is going on in NWYM:

1. Cooperative and obedient spirit—I sense a renewed willingness to work together and deep desire to be faithful to Christ. Through the visioning process, you have clearly communicated that NWYM has an important message and ministry to share with the world. I sense an eagerness to explore how we can do this better together. More than anything, I hear a desire to be faithful in all things.
2. A heart for outreach and service—I see and hear churches focusing on serving their communities and connecting with people in authentic ways. We seem more comfortable with being a church committed to evangelism, mission, peacemaking and social justice than we have at



times in the past. This sort of “whole gospel” approach is one of our unique strengths and our renewed “outward focus” is exciting!

3. Latino/Hispanic church planting possibilities—The Board of Evangelism has put together a Hispanic Ministries Task Force (HMTF) to look at establishing new Friends congregations in the Northwest. One ministry has already been started in McMinnville and two more are set to begin soon in the Portland and Vancouver area. The task force is also looking at several other likely possibilities.
4. Great people—We have some absolutely terrific folks in NWYM!

And now maybe a few “growing edges” that I perceive as issues we need to address:

1. Leadership development—My sense is that we need a renewed emphasis on identifying, nurturing and releasing leaders to serve among us. This is not only true for future pastoral ministers but those who will serve in other ministries, too. This will take a coordinated and intentional effort on our part if we are going to be serious about it.
2. Young Adults—We need to continue to look for ways to encourage our young adults to be involved in ministry and in helping us shape the present and future of NWYM.
3. Culture of Service—There has been a great deal of talk around how we might create an environment within NWYM that exposes people to all kinds of service opportunities. If we are serious about this, now is the time to move in this direction. I think it has potential to address needs/desires for people across the age spectrum and could lead to cooperative ministry with some of our partners—GFU, Quaker camps, Friendsview Retirement Community, etc. This will be much easier to talk about than act on, however.
4. Simplifying our structure—Part of the visioning process is designed to look at our organizational polity. The hope is to create a polity that encourages unity and a shared sense of mission, while also allowing for flexibility around some of the forms. At the same time, I think it is imperative that we look critically at our Yearly Meeting structure to guard against redundancy, unnecessary inefficiency and to insure a sense of cohesion in ministry. This is going to be a difficult task, too.
5. Resources/support for small churches—There is a long list of issues here that need some very real attention (staff support, insurance, help with ministry, etc).

One page isn’t sufficient to say “it all.” Therefore I will look forward to your questions, concerns and ongoing support. Thanks!

## ***Friends Women Missionary Fellowship***

Beverly Chapman planned and led both Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks fall retreats. Sandy Wild, as speaker, used the theme “It’s Not about Me.” The combined attendance for both retreats was 194 ladies. The auction brought in \$2,006.00 to go toward House of Ruth, a ministry of Whitney Friends Church in Boise and Peace House, ministering to at-risk kids in the Piedmont area of Portland.

Six spring rallies were held. Tricia Howell spoke at five of the rallies about her family’s call and preparation to go to Ireland as missionaries under Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM). The spring rally offerings amounted to \$2,640.00 which will be used to help in furnishing their home in Ireland.

Of the groups reporting, 1,462 books were read in the recommended categories.

The publication *Quaker Waggin’s* is sent to 230 ladies, and also is on the NWYM web site along with lists of projects and future event dates.

We are praying for God’s continued blessing on FWMF as the ladies strive to serve Him

Our annual RENDEZVOUS in May at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds in Madras was a highlight of the year. Times of worship, business, games, food and fellowship were enjoyed by all. There were 41 members present. Some members worked on a project for the fairgrounds building a decorative fence in front of the office. Colin Saxton was our guest speaker bringing devotions each morning. Ladies from Eugene Friends Church led the music. We prayed for absent



members experiencing health problems. Many enjoyed an outing to the Round Butte Dam and Fish Hatchery.

There was a total 66 members in VOW this year. The statistician's annual report shows 6,168.5 hours of donated labor, with an estimated \$73,489 dollars saved on the projects this year. Following is a list of this year's projects:

**Eugene Friends Church** – Much work done on a major addition to the church.

**Marion Friends Church** – Assisted in renovating the church parsonage. Work included major re-wiring, installing sheetrock, painting and other repair work.

**Greenleaf Academy** – Work included painting on the exterior of the building and the bleachers, electrical work and service in the library.

**George Fox University/Friendsview Retirement Community** – Landscape cleaning in Hess Creek Canyon.

**Mayger-Downing Community Church** – Assisted on their new addition.

**Twin Rocks Friends Camp** – Many projects including work on the cabins.

**Quaker Cove Camp** – Work done on remodeling the chapel and clearing blackberry vines and brush.

### **Evangelical Friends International Council**

Two years ago in this report, I cited the writings of Philip Jenkins in his book *The Next Christendom: The Coming of Global Christianity*, saying that the demographics of world Christianity point to large increases in the global south and east, and that the focus of strength has definitely shifted away from the north and the west. Two years ago, it was clear that there are far more Evangelical Friends in Latin America than in North America. Now we can say the same for

Africa. Only Asian Friends lag behind, but many world observers declare that the 21<sup>st</sup> Century is "the Century of Asia," and that we can expect Asian Christian numbers to grow dramatically.

**EFI-Africa Region** Late in the planning stage, the location for the first Evangelical Friends International Pastors' Conference of Africa was shifted from eastern Congo to Burundi due to security issues. It was held May 22-26, 2005, in historic Kibimba, Burundi, the site where Arthur, Edna and Rachel Chilson began ministry for evangelical Friends in 1934. During the conference, we observed many Africans pausing to read the headstones for Arthur and Edna in the tiny cemetery next to the large Kibimba Friends Church. From 1902 to 1928 the Chilsons pioneered in Kenya where today there are probably as many as 300,000 Friends. The Kenyan yearly meetings are mostly affiliated with Friends United Meeting. A new FUM office has been established in Kisumu, Kenya, directed by an aggressive and evangelistic young Kenyan named John Muhanji. John Muhanji was present at the Pastors' Conference in Kibimba. Many within both Kenya (FUM) and Central Africa (EFI churches in Burundi, Congo, and Rwanda) hope there can be positive relationships and collaborative efforts between these two major blocks of Friends that count the Chilsons and others as their founders.

The conference featured enthusiastic worship, inspirational and educational classes, and an important EFI-Africa Region business session conducted in an atmosphere of warm fellowship and spiritual intensity. Congo Friends Legal Representative Mkoko Boseka of Bukavu, Congo, was elected to replace David Niyonzima as regional director for a three-year term. Time was spent discussing a vision for theological and pastoral education, trying to identify values that might lead to a new strategy for theological training in the region.

EFI-Africa Region outgoing director David Niyonzima chaired the Pastors' Conference Committee that hosted a total of about 120 delegates, mostly from Burundi (52), Rwanda (30) and Congo (15). Several pastors came representing EFI contacts in Uganda and Tanzania. Invited guests also came from Friends United Meeting (FUM) fields in Kenya and Uganda, making a total of six African nations represented in some way. Americans present were Chuck and Nancy Mylander (Evangelical Friends Mission), Phil and Gayle Oram (Rose Drive Friends, California), Maurice and Ellouise Chandler (Newberg Friends), Ron and Carolyn Stansell (EFI Council).

**Great Lakes School of Theology** Africa's Great Lakes School of Theology, under the direction of an EFI-Africa Region Board, went through difficult times early in 2005. Conflict within the African Board has brought about a suspension of classes for the present and a re-evaluation of educational vision and core values. The U.S.-based Advisory Committee hopes this will lead to a new strategy that is more "owned" by Africans and that will better meet African needs. Evangelical Friends Mission has come to play an official part in the GLST process, representing Friends in the United States interested in promoting pastoral training in Africa. An amount of \$30,000 annually has been pledged from EFM, EFI-North America yearly meetings, churches and donors to encourage pastoral and theological training in central Africa.



In the meantime, a third graduating class of 13 men and women from GLST celebrated the completion of their studies on May 28. A major positive of the situation is that over 30 men and women have graduated from GLST, forming a pool of pastor/teachers that can multiply themselves educationally. The hope is these graduates may play a key role in new programs that will increase the number of pastors and workers for the region. About 30,000 now attend Friends churches in Burundi, about 10,000 in Rwanda and about 4,000 in Congo. The majority of these do not require pastors educated at the upper level done by GLST. A more diversified approach is needed to deliver theological education at more than one academic level.

**EFI-Latin America Region** EFI-Latin America Director Samuel Pinto (Guatemala) and sub-director Sabino Chipana (Bolivia) conferred early in the year with leaders in Peru and have postponed the next EFI-Latin America Pastors' Conference until January 2008. The plan is to hold it on the Peruvian coast in a location accessible by highway and by air.

**EFI Activities in 2006** As I complete this report, we do not anticipate a major EFI Council activity in 2006. Perhaps this will be the time for EFI-Europe Region to happen!

### **Barclay Press Report**

Writers and readers are essential elements in the ministry of Barclay Press. We are thankful for a growing number of both who take advantage of the opportunities to give and receive through:

- Books and pamphlets
- *Fruit of the Vine* daily devotional quarterly
- *Adult Friend* Bible study curriculum
- Articles, reviews, journals, and book discussions in the online Conversation Café

Nearly 200 writers from across the country have given their time to make these publications possible. But the growing ministry of Barclay Press calls for more young communicators, so we began a new initiative to nurture and encourage writers. Bruce Bishop gives leadership to this "Emerging Writers" effort. An Emerging Writers retreat was held January 21-23, 2005, at Twin Rocks with 59 participants. Similar retreats are now scheduled for the fall in Kansas (Evangelical Friends Church Mid-America) and in Southern California (Evangelical Friends Church Southwest). A new section of the Barclay Press web site is an Emerging Writers forum open to all who are interested in being part of a community that is exploring writing as ministry. This site now has more than 100 registered participants.

Interest and activity at [www.barclaypress.com](http://www.barclaypress.com) is encouraging. For certain types of communication, the internet has become an essential tool for some of the ministry that had previously been done with paper and ink. It also allows some

discussion that is not possible with printed publications. The Conversation Café is now into its third year and offers insights on topics such as obesity, materialism, end-of-life issues, racism, stereotypes, sex trade in Southeast Asia, divorce, the emergent church, and more.

Barclay Press has nearly 50 book titles in print that share our Christian message with believers and with seekers. Books published during the past 12 months are *Understand My Muslim People* by Abraham Sarker and *The Secret Colors of God*—poems by Nancy Thomas. *Understand My Muslim People* was released in December and continues to receive positive comment and extensive media coverage with more than 35 author interviews on radio and four on television. The book of poems by Nancy Thomas came out in July 2005. Books scheduled for publication this year include:

- *The Way Forward: Discerning God's Leading in Christian Groups* by Bruce Bishop, Lon Fendall, and Jan Wood
- *Leaving Our Legacy: Succession in Servant Leadership* by David L. McKenna
- *The Cost of Compassion* by Dan Nolte
- *Hijos de Dios* (Children of God) Spanish curriculum for use in Latin America and the United States. Stories of early Quakers written by Betty Hockett.

In October we added Sierra Neiman to our office staff. Her primary responsibility is the promotion and sale of our publications. Other office staff are Liz Barr (Sunday school curriculum, *Fruit of the Vine* subscriptions, book orders, and general office tasks); Kati Voth (financial accounting and assistance with general office tasks); and Dan McCracken, publisher (management of the overall operation of Barclay Press including editorial oversight, marketing, and finance). Bruce Bishop, Dan Cammack, Susan Fawver, Paula Hampton, Katharine Matchette, and Ron Woodward provide vital staff functions in the area of nurturing writers, communication with churches, editing, proofreading, and online communication. Sherry Macy, Phil Baisley, Donna Allison, and C.G. White do editorial and page layout services on a contract or freelance basis.

Barclay Press is located at 211 N. Meridian St., #101 in Newberg, Oregon—near the Northwest Yearly Meeting headquarters office and the campus of George Fox University. A board of directors with broad geographic representation from evangelical Friends governs the operation.

### **Greenleaf Friends Academy**

Greenleaf Friends Academy (GFA) has had a great year with 240 K - 12th graders enrolled and up to 40 pre-schoolers for a total of 280 students. Our theme this year was DIE (Do It Everyday) - live for Christ no matter the cost.

The girls' varsity basketball team made it to the State Playoffs and the junior high girls took first place in their league. We were equally proud of our boys' teams



who had great seasons in football and basketball. We had several students go to State in track with one of our students taking 1st place in the 300 meter hurdles. All of our athletic teams represented the school and Christ very well.

This year our choir went on a tour through the land of OZ (Kansas)! The students, under Ellen Morse's direction, were able to minister in Colorado, Wyoming, and Kansas. They had quite the experience while seeing God as their protector. The chartered bus lost a wheel while going down the freeway. The wheel went past the bus taking out a road sign, but the bus successfully came to a stop and no injuries occurred.

The GFA board and superintendent have been busy developing a business plan to take the school into the future. They have met on Saturdays and during board meetings to set goals and establish core values. It has been a tremendous time seeing how God can take a group of individuals and help them to form a consensus on what is best for GFA.

The financial giving to GFA has been above normal this year. Our annual harvest dinner fed over 1,000 people. The auction grossed over \$80,000 and the annual giving was over \$26,000. What a blessing everyone has been with both financial and prayer support.

There are still many needs to be met at the academy, both financially and physically. In the old wing of the school the air handlers need to be replaced at a cost of approximately \$30,000. The floor needs to be covered, but we don't have a cost estimate yet. Windows need replaced to make the building more efficient. These are just a few of our most pressing needs. We do know God is in the business of supplying all of our needs.

We would like to thank VOW (Volunteers on Wheels) for providing some much needed painting and electrical work. Without their continued support we would not be able to do what we do.

This year has seen young people come to a saving knowledge of Christ and others surrender to His calling on their lives.

Greenleaf Friends Academy has a great history and is continuing to make new history. We have a great past and a bright future.

## ***George Fox University***

George Fox University's 2004-05 academic year brought great accomplishments, great joy, and great sadness. This report reflects these strong emotions.

The university continues to grow in size and in the quality of its programs and facilities. For example, a grant from the Richter Foundations allows graduate and undergraduate students from a variety of academic areas to pursue research and scholarship. Such activity stimulates more scholarship, which results in the maturation of the institution.

George Fox students learn and achieve goals in many ways. Both the women's

and men's basketball teams performed at high levels. The men finished second in the Northwest Conference and the women won the conference title and a berth in the NCAA Division III post-season playoffs, reaching the national "Elite 8." I am proud of the way our student athletes represent the university.

George Fox also dealt with the death of three students during the year. In each case, members of the university provided strong support and sympathy to each other and the families of these students. The sadness is very real, but in each case our Lord was present.

The support that comes to George Fox University from many different areas is appreciated: recommendations of prospective students, prayer, volunteer contributions, and finances. Our mission is "to demonstrate the meaning of Jesus Christ by offering a caring educational community in which each individual may achieve the highest intellectual and personal growth, and by participating responsibly in our world's concerns."

### ***Ceremonies Add New Alumni***

Nearly 900 became George Fox University graduates during the year as four ceremonies conferred 460 undergraduate diplomas and 413 graduate degrees. Oregon Court of Appeals Judge Darleen Ortega, a 1984 George Fox graduate, spoke at the December 18 midyear commencement in which 115 undergraduate and 104 graduate degrees were awarded. Nearly 600 received diplomas on April 30 when Todd Hunter, national director of Alpha USA, spoke for two ceremonies. The afternoon ceremony awarded 257 diplomas to traditional students while the evening program presented 294 graduate program degrees and 35 diplomas to degree-completion program graduates through the professional studies program. In ceremonies June 11 in Boise, 68 received diplomas, 53 in undergraduate programs and 15 in master's programs. Speaker was Bill Roscoe, executive director of the Boise Rescue Mission.

### ***Continuing and New Recognition***

George Fox University climbed again in the 2005 ranking of "America's Best Colleges" by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine. The university moved to 15th in the top tier of the "Best Universities - Masters" west region category. It was ranked 18th the year prior. George Fox also is ranked in the magazine's listing of "Best Values: Great schools at great prices." George Fox was ranked 10th for value, based on a formula that relates a school's academic quality to the net cost of attendance.

In a new recognition, George Fox received "Best in the West" designation by *The Princeton Review*. George Fox was surveyed for the first time, and its closest constituents – its students – gave the university high marks. *The Princeton Review* rankings consider academics, quality of life, admissions selectivity, and financial aid.

### ***Enrollment Reaches 3,000***

Enrollment reached 3,000 for the first time when a record incoming freshman class pushed the fall semester student count to 3,034. The 4.2 percent increase over 2,913 the fall before marked the 18th consecutive year for enrollment growth.

The university had 1,762 undergraduate students (58 percent) and 1,272 in graduate programs – 230 of those in the seminary. With 274 enrolled in the adult professional studies (degree completion) program, the total number of non-traditional students was 1,546. The 1,488 traditional students included 396 first-time freshmen, a 15.1 percent increase over the previous year.

In graduate programs, the largest is the School of Education with 711 students. There were 216 MBA students enrolled.

### ***Serving by Day, Week, Month***

George Fox's sixth annual Serve Day spread nearly 1,400 participants to 66 locations throughout Newberg, its surrounding Yamhill County and into nearby Washington and Clackamas counties. The university closed the Newberg campus and Portland Center September 8 as students, faculty and staff assisted non-profit groups, public agencies, churches, retirement homes, cemeteries and individual senior citizens. According to Campus Compact, a national coalition promoting community service in higher education, George Fox apparently was the first institution to shut down an entire university for a day of such volunteer activity.

Serve Day is a statement of the university's mission, but service is not limited to just one day. Throughout the year student and employees gave time to help others. During Christmas break 75 students and employees traveled to five West Coast locations on Winter Serve, helping with service projects in diverse cross-cultural settings with a variety of organizations. During spring break, 104 students and employees performed service projects at five locations in Washington, Idaho, California, and Utah.

At the end of the school year, 35 students spent a month overseas in Christian outreach and work projects: 15 in Malawi in southeast Africa and 20 in Jamaica and Cuba. The May Serve program is in its 16th year.

### ***Creative Events Help Others***

George Fox students used some creative ways to help others when they raised funds by staging a "Mr. Bruin" pageant and organized an Empty Bowls Project.

The bowls project raised more than \$11,000 for tsunami relief in southern India. Students and others made more than 1,000 ceramic bowls purchased at an April 1 fundraising dinner. Guests received a simple meal served in a ceramic bowl they chose and then kept. Live music, pottery demonstrations, and a silent auction also were a part of the evening. Follow-up gifts were added to the \$12 per bowl donation, with all funds given to the Portland-based non-profit Village Outreach International.

Ten men competed in the "Mr. Bruin" program April 7. It raised \$4,650 as the men earned 50 percent of their total score based on their individual fund raising

prior to the pageant, which featured choreographed performances and a talent contest ranging from magic to songs, videos and comedy. Funds were given to the Newberg School District to allow students to visit the Portland Children's Museum.

### ***"A Defining Chapter"***

George Fox's three-year, six-goal plan to strengthen the university for the future, took large steps forward during the year with the planning and announcement of several significant projects. Work is underway on a \$4.1 million expansion and renovation of Hoover Academic Building to provide facilities for the new Bachelor of Science in nursing program and the growing undergraduate population. In the first phase, a 15,400-square foot, two-story addition on the west side will add two nursing labs, an observation room, study area, an 82-seat lecture hall, and 19 faculty offices. The project, scheduled to be completed in May 2006, also will include an atrium and a 900-square-foot art gallery. In the second phase, to begin in the summer of 2006, the current Hoover Building will be internally and externally renovated. The remodeled facility will include six classrooms, a 192-seat lecture hall, a computer lab, computer classroom, 27 faculty offices, conference room, study area, and the Hoover-Hatfield library.

The largest project is construction of a new \$7.4 million three-story residence hall for 120 students. The 40,150-square foot building will include 20 apartment-style units. Each floor will have a small hearth area for student gatherings, and the main floor will include a cafe, small computer lab, lounge, and an area coordinator apartment.

Also announced was the creation of an outdoor amphitheater in Hess Creek Canyon near Wheeler Sports Center. Grass-covered, six-foot-wide terraces will provide a semi-circular bowl with capacity for up to 500. The earthen stage will have a natural backdrop of trees and Hess Creek. Cost is anticipated to be \$130,000 with the George Fox student government funding the project after several years of fund raising and planning.

### ***New Construction to Strengthen Mission***

The university continues to raise \$3 million for the purchase of the eight-acre Newberg Providence Hospital adjacent to the Newberg campus on the east. The hospital is constructing a new facility and George Fox, with the signing of a letter of intent in 2004, is scheduled to take occupancy of the current hospital in August 2006. Long-term plans for the property include construction of a new entry to the campus and a second academic quadrangle for professional and graduate programs.

### ***George Fox's New Boise Center***

The new center opened in May, nearly doubling the space available to serve Idaho students. A new 13,300-square-foot, \$1.8 million building contains 9,500 square feet of leased space for George Fox classrooms, offices, conference room, reception area, work space, and kitchen. The new center at the Eagle Road interchange with Interstate 84, west of downtown, is the third location in Boise since George Fox started programs in Idaho more than eight years ago. More



than 220 students are enrolled in undergraduate and graduate degree programs at the Boise Center.

#### *Academic Achievements and Awards*

George Fox continues to participate with 11 nationally prominent universities in the prestigious Richter Scholars Program. Funding by the Paul K. and Evalyn E.C. Richter memorial funds puts George Fox in the company of Dartmouth, Yale, Northwestern, Wake Forest, and the University of Chicago. This significant and competitive research program expands opportunities for undergraduate and graduate students to learn and research topics outside the typical curriculum – rewarding independent thinking and individual achievement. Twenty-six projects were funded, with amounts ranging up to \$4,000.

Four undergraduate students received NASA Space Grant Consortium Scholarships designed to encourage pursuit of fields related to the NASA mission. George Fox recipients were juniors and seniors in engineering, mathematics, and chemistry. The National Space Grant College and Fellowship Program funds research, education and public service projects through a national network of 52 university-based consortia, including the Oregon Space Grant Consortium.

George Fox junior Lia LaBrant, a biology and history major from Vancouver, Washington, was one of 84 college students in the nation named to the USA Today All-USA College Academic Team. Approximately 600 nominees were considered. LaBrant, an honorable mention selection, is the second George Fox student to receive the honor.

#### *Communications Efforts Step Up With Honors*

A two-year marketing initiative, including a January launching of a redesigned, more efficient and faster Web site, is producing recognition – and results – for the university.

The website ([georgefox.edu](http://georgefox.edu)) changes enhance the usability and overall appearance. The change incorporates the new Centennial Tower logo (introduced last year), and several other concepts, elements and colors now being introduced in university publications.

The university's identity package and admission series received both regional and national recognition. In February, the university received 12 regional awards, including the Virginia Carter Smith Grand Crystal Award – the "Best of Show" recognition – from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) Region VIII. Competition included marketing and communications materials submitted from the 81 member institutions in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Alaska, and seven Canadian provinces. The materials received two silver and three bronze medals in the national CASE Circle of Excellence awards competition.

#### *University Celebrates Lives As It Mourns*

The university was saddened several times during the year with the deaths of students and friends. The lives of the following were mourned and also celebrated.

Esther Klages, an alumna, volunteer, friend and benefactor who gave the university \$2 million for scholarships and facility improvements and beautified the campus with Centennial Tower and campus light poles with hanging flower baskets, in Newberg, December 13 at 100.

Edgar McDowell, a friend of Herbert Hoover and George Fox University, who left nearly \$1 million that will be used to recognize the friendship, in Palo Alto, California, July 24 at 96.

Glenna Jansen, the secretary for four university presidents over two decades, in Newberg, December 7 at 73.

Arthur Climenhaga, dean of Western Evangelical Seminary (now George Fox Evangelical Seminary) in the 1970s who lived most recently in Pennsylvania, April 25 in West Virginia at 88.

James Field, vice president and dean of the seminary in the 1980s, May 28 in Calgary, Alberta, Canada.

Karissa Edwards, junior Christian ministries major from Newberg, drowned at Lincoln City, Oregon, November 13 while on a student retreat.

Patrick Kibler, junior business administration major from Lake Oswego, Oregon, killed in an automobile accident December 22 in Lake Oswego.

Brett Hooker, graduate student in the MBA program, at his home in McMinnville, Oregon, September 11 at 40.

### ***Friends Center***

We have made significant progress in two areas this year: funding scholarships, and expanding Friends-specific course offerings. This academic year we offered our first scholarships through Friends Center. Four seminary students received partial support of their tuition cost for attending seminary. For the coming academic year, we will be able to increase our support of existing recipients and to add two additional students for scholarship support. This is possible because of the cooperation of the Department of General Education in channeling their budget funds for seminary scholarships through Friends Center, and also because of new funds raised through Friends Center. The result is that we have more Friends seminary students receiving more financial help than has been true for several years. We praise the Lord for this! And so do the students!

Every other year George Fox Evangelical Seminary continues to offer a course in the History and Polity of the Friends Movement. This year 10 students took that course, including one by independent study. In addition, Friends Center in cooperation with the seminary offered two short courses. Phil Smith taught the course "Friends and Patriots in a Time of War," a study of the philosophical and theological bases of pacifism and the Just War. Dick Sartwell taught the course, "Quaker Pastoral Leadership," emphasizing the ways Friends pastoral ministry may be shaped by our particular expressions of Christian faith. Frequently non-Friends students enroll for these classes to learn more about Quakers.



Two additional courses are planned for the coming year. October 7-8, 2005, Ron Stansell will teach "Missions by the Spirit," a course covering the distinctive contribution of Friends missionaries of the 20<sup>th</sup> century in developing a mission strategy that emphasizes the leadership of the Spirit. February 24-25, 2006, Bruce Bishop will teach a class on "Making Spirit-led Decisions," helping students develop ways to discern the Lord's will personally and in groups.

As an experiment, Friends Center and George Fox Evangelical Seminary are jointly sponsoring this year a special class offered during Yearly Meeting sessions, utilizing Saturday and workshop slots throughout the week. "Quakerism as Holiness" presents Carole Spencer's new work exploring how the Quaker understanding of holiness is at the core of our faith and practice.

All courses offered through Friends Center are available for tuition credit through the seminary, but also available for enrichment only, at a greatly reduced cost.

We are especially interested in hearing from local congregations about what kinds of courses would be helpful to bring to your local church, or to your geographical area.

## Accountants' Review Report

To the Board of Trustees of  
Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

We have reviewed the accompanying statement of financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church (a not-for-profit organization) as of December 31, 2004, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended. In accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. All information included in these financial statements is the representation of the management of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

A review consists principally of inquiries of Organization personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Based on our review, with the exception of the matter described in the following paragraph, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

As disclosed in Note 6 to the financial statements, management has informed us that the Organization has not determined the cost of its defined benefit pension plan in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, which require the cost of employees' pensions to be recognized over the employees' respective service periods and a liability to be recognized when the accumulated benefit obligation exceeds the fair value of plan assets. The effects of this departure from generally accepted accounting principles on financial position, changes in net assets, and cash flows have not been determined.

The prior year summarized comparative information has been derived from the Organization's 2003 financial statements, which were reviewed by us. Our report on the 2003 financial statements dated May 27, 2004, stated that we were not aware of any material modifications that should be made to those statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our review was made for the purpose of expressing limited assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The supplemental information as listed in the table of contents is presented only for supplementary analysis purposes. Such information has been subjected to the inquiry and analytical procedures applied in the review of the basic financial statements and we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made thereto.
