Colin reported the following pastoral openings:

Colin noted the passing of Carl Bennett, pastor at Homedale Friends, and led the meeting in silent prayer for Carl's family and the Homedale congregation.

Colin reported that Sarah Klatt has joined the Yearly Meeting staff this summer as a media specialist intern. He also noted Carole Spencer's move from George Fox Evangelical Seminar to Earlham School of Religion, which left the Friends Center Director position open; and Gar Mickelson's move to northern Idaho. Gar will continue as Yearly Meeting Associate Superintendent of Local Outreach for the time being as the staff discerns whether or not Gar can carry out his duties from North Idaho.

8. Colin read an extended passage from a letter he sent on July 16 to Yearly Meeting representatives and pastors regarding Bruce Bishop's termination from his position as Yearly Meeting Communications Director after information came to light regarding an improper relationship between Bruce and a minor in 1991 (when Bruce was Yearly Meeting Youth Superintendent). Bruce immediately confirmed the allegations when confronted. Colin and Yearly Meeting staff have investigated whether there might be other incidents, and have tried to open channels by which any other concerns regarding Bruce could be brought to light, but so far indications are that the 1991 relationship was an isolated incident. Colin indicated that the Yearly Meeting would be taking steps to update its policies protecting young people from abuse. A care team has been formed to work with Bruce while he undertakes the hard work of addressing the difficult spiritual issues in his life. Colin and Lana Thurston (from the Board of Elders) will be available in Lemmons 2 during today's morning break, and Tuesday at 1:15, to talk to any who have unanswered concerns.
9. Lorraine read James 5:15-16, 19-20. She, Tom Stave, and Colin led the meeting in prayer. The meeting waited in prayerful silence. Nate Macy led the meeting in song.

10. Jeanne Hazel, clerk of the Faith and Practice Revision Committee, shared proposed revisions in the Yearly Meeting *Faith and Practice*. Major revisions are proposed in the Historical Statement, but first Jeanne directed the meeting's attention to the first reading of some proposed minor revisions governing criteria for appointments to boards (Section 6.01.02), and inclusion of up to one non-member of the Yearly Meeting on subcommittees (Section 6.02.02). The meeting articulated questions regarding inclusion of non-members on subcommittees, including how to ensure that these non-members are in harmony with Yearly Meeting values and vision, and whether or not these subcommittee members can serve for more than one year. The committee will consider these concerns and bring the proposal concerning non-members on subcommittees back to the floor later this week.

Monday, July 26, 10:33 a.m.

11. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song. Attendance was an estimated 231.
12. Dennis Russell, executive director, brought a report from Friendsview Retirement Community. Frank Engle has been on leave from his duties while he cares for his wife Patsy as she battles cancer. Friendsview continues its pastoral assistance program, currently benefiting 18 Friends pastors and spouses. Of 503 people on Friendsview's waiting list, 45% are Friends (42% from evangelical yearly meetings). Of the current residents, 53% are Friends. The Manor is preparing to celebrate its 50th anniversary during 2011. Friendsview would appreciate invitations to meet with Friends outside the Newberg area. The Friendsview Board has made an effort to include members from the Yearly Meeting outside the local area.
13. Trey Doty, clerk of the Board of Leadership Development and Enrichment, presented its report. The last twelve months have brought a sharp increase in the number of applicants for recording as pastors in the Yearly Meeting. The board is developing a new mentoring process, with the help of faculty at George Fox Evangelical Seminary. The second annual mentors training session will be held September 24 at George Fox. This year's Focus Conference will be held at Hood River, featuring veteran church leader Todd Hunter. The board's ministry plan for 2011 was approved.
14. Jeanne Hazel returned to continue discussion of minor changes to the *Faith and Practice*. The meeting approved the following changes as a first reading:

NWYM Boards – General Regulations

6.01.02 Criteria for Appointment (to boards), two sentences added:

Each candidate for nomination will be given education about the work of the board, and opportunity to indicate their response and commitment by signing a nomination response form that will be forwarded to the Nominating Committee. As well as nomination by others, an interested person may self-nominate. Forms may be obtained from a local church Yearly Meeting representative, or the Yearly Meeting office or website.

6.02.02 [Subcommittee] Members, paragraph 2:

Each candidate for appointment will be given education about the work of the subcommittee, and opportunity to indicate their response and commitment by signing an appointment response form. Forms may be obtained from a local church Yearly Meeting representative, or the Yearly Meeting office or website.

Communication with the Yearly Meeting

A local church or ministry point will send carefully discerned concerns and proposals as a minute from their business meeting to their Area meeting for wider discernment and clarification. The Area will take action on the concern as specified by *Faith and Practice* (see Organization of Areas section 4.03, Area Minutes to the Yearly Meeting). When time and/or function of the Area does not allow a local church's minute to be brought, concerns and proposals may be sent directly to the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting. When a minute is sent directly to the presiding clerk, the clerk will help discern where it can best be addressed, whether by one of the boards or by the Yearly Meeting as a whole.

A title changed on page 27:

Changed "Opening and Closing Churches" to "Institutional Transitions"

Moved from page 32 to page 30:

New Areas

Local churches may petition the Yearly Meeting to establish, discontinue, divide, or redefine an Area, or to unite two or more Areas (see below). They may also request transfer of their affiliation from one Area to another.

New Yearly Meetings

Areas whose members wish to be set off and established as a new yearly meeting should inform the Yearly Meeting of that desire and of the concurrence of the constituent churches in the proposal. The Yearly Meeting then considers the proposal and makes a decision. If action is favorable and a new yearly meeting is to be established, the Yearly Meeting appoints a committee, not to exceed ten in number, to attend the opening of the new yearly meeting and to present the authorizing minute and inaugurate sessions in accordance with Friends form of government (see pp. 21, 66).

15. Tom Stave reported on the annual evaluation of Yearly Meeting Superintendent Colin Saxton by a subcommittee of the Administrative Council (Tom, Brad Holton, Ken Beebe). The subcommittee sought feedback from around the Yearly Meeting. The responses and evaluation were overwhelmingly positive, especially in his care for pastors, effective communication, unifying influence in the Yearly Meeting, help with church transitions, representation of NWYM to other Friends groups, and visits to local meetings. The Administrative Council plans to work with Colin on better sharing his workload, finding release time for writing, development and expansion of Hispanic congregations, and promoting the Sowers Fund. The Administrative Council will work with these issues this year in preparation for next year's consideration of extending Colin's call as superintendent.
16. Earl Tycksen, clerk of the Nominating Committee, introduced the members of the committee, and the following nominations, all to terms expiring in 2013:

17. Judy Woolsey, clerk of the Board of Communication, brought its report. Registering for Yearly Meeting online seemed to work well this year. The board is sponsoring workshops this week on developing three dimensional characters in fiction writing and setting up church websites. Eric Muhr has been maintaining the Yearly Meeting's presence on Facebook, and helps Brendon Connelly with the Yearly Meeting website. The board plans to produce six printed editions of the *Connection*, along with two digital issues. The board will begin soon a search for a new Communication Director. The meeting approved the ministry plan for the Board of Communication.

Tuesday, July 27, 8:20 a.m.

18. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer. Attendance was estimated at 215.
19. Bill Moormann, clerk of the Board of Local Outreach, brought its report. He highlighted the availability of outreach grants and church development teams to support local congregations who are ready to pursue a vision for outreach in their communities. The board is enthusiastic about the growing potential for Hispanic congregations, although financial support is limited by Yearly Meeting budget constraints. The meeting approved the board's ministry plan for 2011.
20. Visiting Friend Rae Lawrence (North Pacific Yearly Meeting) brought greetings.
21. Shawn Leonard, co-clerk, brought the report of the Board of Christian Education and Discipleship. The board supports Christian education through the annual Christian Education day on Tuesdays at Yearly Meeting, including the Christian Education Dinner; workshops sponsored at Yearly Meeting and during the year; compiling and circulating educational materials covering distinctives of the Yearly Meeting's Christian Quaker heritage; translating many of these materials into Spanish; and providing Friends Sunday school curricula for children and adults. In addition, board member Jim Teeters has published a book entitled *Going Intergenerational*. The meeting approved the ministry plan for the board for 2011.
22. Jeanne Hazel brought two *Faith and Practice* revisions for first reading.

6.02.02 [Subcommittee] Members, paragraph 2:

NWYM boards may appoint to any of their subcommittees not more than one non-member of a NWYM Friends church to serve for a one-

year term renewable at the discretion of the board. Such an individual will be added by the board because his/her call, expertise, passion, and/or experience enhances the overall effectiveness and impact of the subcommittee, and that expertise has not been found among NWYM members. The appointee will understand and affirm the *Faith and Practice* of NWYM, as it applies to the work of the subcommittee. This appointee may not clerk the subcommittee, but will be a full participant in the work of the subcommittee, and agree to serve within the same expectations and responsibilities as other members.

The meeting discussed this proposed language, revised in light of yesterday's discussion, focusing on how much the non-member appointee must be in agreement with our *Faith and Practice*, or even be a follower of Jesus. The committee will consider the language again during the break this morning and return with possible further revisions.

Title change on page 27: Change title to "Organizational Transitions" (rather than "Institutional Transitions").

The meeting approved this title change for its first reading.

23. Vicki Stave, clerk of the Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry, expressed her gratitude to her board and Yearly Meeting staff for producing a "beautiful" report with her name attached. The board is planning to reduce its average age, which is a little too high. It is supporting Rachelle Staley in her broad range of work, noted in the board's written report, and her efforts to improve Yearly Meeting policies and practices to protect youth from abuse (including making background checks easier and more widely used). The meeting approved the ministry plan for the board for 2011.
24. Becky Ankeny, clerk of the Board of Elders, started the board's report with an expression of special thanks to Vivian Thornburg, who is completing 24 years of continuous service as a Board of Elders member. Becky described the Elders' work as mysterious and dark, something like turkey vultures who clean up the environment after a mess. The board oversees restoration teams for ministers in personal moral crisis, supports the superintendent in person and in prayer as he works with local elders across the Yearly Meeting, and prays over issues the board perceives as being challenging or contentious within the Yearly Meeting.
25. Colin Saxton, Yearly Meeting superintendent, brought his report. He is encouraged by vibrancy of ministry in local churches, growth in numbers of those sensing calls to ministry, and increase in Friends students at George Fox Evangelical Seminary. The Yearly Meeting office is currently challenged by being understaffed, and by limitations

imposed by the current economic downturn and its effects on the Yearly Meeting budget. Colin highlighted the Sowers Fund as a vehicle for supporting projects directed at spreading the gospel in our region. Last year the Sowers Fund drew \$50,000 in donations; the goal this year is \$75,000.

26. Robin Baker, president of George Fox University, brought a report about the university. The university is prospering – budgets have been growing and balanced, accrediting reviews by a variety of bodies have made glowing reports, Friends (and other) scholars advance knowledge in their fields, and the University has maintained its Christ-centered focus. Enrollment for the coming fall is at record levels, exceeding the university's capacity for housing students by about 50 students, with a waiting list for admission for the first time.
27. Jamie Johnson, director of the Friends Leadership Program at George Fox University, reported on his work to support Friends students at the university. Seven Friends students earned scholarships, and joined two others as participants in the on-campus Friends center program. Each of these students entered into mentor relationships with an older Friend, and with Jamie. Eight of these students will continue in the program, doing internships on campus and in the Yearly Meeting. Jamie visited six states this last year, presenting to over 800 students (predominantly Friends), including camps around the Yearly Meeting. Seventeen new full-time students enrolled at George Fox last year. This year the university anticipates at least 20 new Friends students, nine of whom will be in the Friends Leadership Program.
28. The Yearly Meeting approved the reappointment of the following people to the George Fox University Board for another three-year term: Carrie Lamm Bishop, Steven Fellows, Keith Galitz, Dale Hadley, Steve Jabusch, Jim LeShana, Stan Morse, Vic Peterson.

The meeting also approved the appointment of two new members to the George Fox University Board:

Brent Peterson, from Newberg Friends Church
Gloria Schwindt, from Grace Point Community Church

These appointees would keep the GFU Board in compliance with requirements that 4/7 of the board be members of the Friends Church, and that 2/3 of those Friends be members of Northwest Yearly Meeting: there will be 19 Friends out of the 31 total members of the board; 16 of those members will be from Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Tuesday, July 27, 10:37 a.m.

29. The meeting worshipped in song. Attendance was estimated at 199.
30. Dan Cammack, clerk of the Board of Global Outreach, brought its report. The board is working to improve its connection to all the local congregations, both to communicate its vision and to hear from churches what they are doing and their ideas for the Yearly Meeting's global outreach. The board is considering how to connect local congregations with good short-term missions opportunities, including organizing in 2011 at least two short-term missions trips. The board is looking for options in peacemaking ministry in addition to Christian Peacemaking Teams, with the goal of providing at least five scholarships to support Friends called to peacemaking. The board is asking Friends serving abroad to reflect on how we can support peace and justice concerns in their fields. In 2011 the board plans to publish 12 flyers on Friends perspectives on global issues. The board is working on developing ways to provide better timely information on how Friends can respond to crises or tragedies in various parts of the world. The board wants to make more regular visits to Friends serving abroad in isolated areas. The board is planning an annual retreat for those in NWYM who are supporting global outreach.
31. Chuck Mylander, director of Evangelical Friends Mission, noted the contributions of many Northwest Yearly Meeting members in the work of the EFCI in various regions of the world. EFCI has a new website at www.evangelicalfriends.org. A video is available which portrays the stories of many of the people touched by EFCI ministries. Several missionaries are scheduled for home furlough this year, and will need to raise funds for supporting their ministry.
32. The meeting approved the ministry plan for 2011 for the Board of Global Outreach.
33. Jeanne Hazel presented the latest draft of the following proposed modification of *Faith and Practice*:

6.02.02 [Subcommittee] Members, paragraph 2:

NWYM boards may appoint to any of their subcommittees not more than one non-member of a NWYM Friends church to serve for a one-year term renewable at the discretion of the board. Such an individual will be added by the board because his/her call, expertise, passion, and/or experience enhances the overall effectiveness and impact of the subcommittee, and that expertise has not been found among NWYM members. The appointee will understand and affirm the *Faith and*

Practice of NWYM, as it applies to the Christian faith and the work of the subcommittee. This appointee may not clerk the subcommittee, but will be a full participant in the work of the subcommittee, and agree to serve within the same expectations and responsibilities as other members.

While the meeting is still not quite comfortable with how the third sentence is worded, it approved the change as a first reading with the understanding that the Faith and Practice Revision Committee will consider further refinement of that sentence.

34. Arden Kinser, clerk of the Board of Congregational Care, brought its report. The board has added the PREPARE/ENRICH program to help members build stronger relationships as couples and in families. The board supports The Hoot concert at Yearly Meeting, and other arts programs, as part of its support for individuals. The board supports churches with the Share Call program to help them finish projects that are beyond their means; the Natural Church Development program to help congregations discern the next steps in their development; training in discernment for groups; a resource lending library; and reflecting on how membership is understood to emphasize its relational dimension. The meeting approved the ministry plan for 2011 for the Board of Congregational Care.

Wednesday, July 28, 8:15 a.m.

35. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer. Attendance was estimated at 178.
36. Brendon Connelly, Yearly Meeting director of finance and development, brought the financial report, complete with kittens for the math-phobic. He emphasized that every number in the budget represents a story of someone's hopes and dreams. Total income from all sources in 2009 reached \$1,282,333, with expenses totaling \$1,348,685, resulting in a draw on the Ministry Fund of \$66,352. So far in 2010, things are unfolding normally. Local church support, budgeted for \$601,348, received pledges for \$583,734, and so far has produced \$286,665. If historical patterns persist of church support mostly coming in late in the year, and slightly exceeding pledges, the local church support budget should be met this year. For 2011, the budget calls for a 1.947% decrease in total spending from the 2010 budget, dropping from \$1,449,420 to \$1,421,202. In 2011, \$108,000 is projected to come from the Ministry Fund, which is 9% of the Fund, 4% higher than what is considered sustainable by the Finance Committee. The budget calls for \$608,000 in local church support. The meeting approved the 2011 budget as presented.

37. Jeanne Hazel presented the Faith and Practice Revision Committee's draft of the proposed Historical Statement section. Concern was expressed that some of the statements critical of the general church in the 17th Century were too sweeping, and possibly unfair to devout believers in the churches that already existed in George Fox' day. Jeanne will take these comments back to the committee and bring the proposed revisions for the Historical Statement before the yearly meeting business session later in the week.
38. Tom Stave brought a minute initiated about two years ago by an individual at Silverton Friends Church, where it was eventually adopted, then considered by Salem Area before being adopted there and sent on to the Yearly Meeting. The minute is in response to a 2007 change in the George Fox University lifestyle statement which ended the prohibition on the use of alcohol by employees and students in non-traditional programs. The minute as expressed by the Salem Area reads:

We commend George Fox University in their handling of issues of conscience. After prayerful consideration, Salem Area wishes to express a concern. We believe the Community Lifestyle policy language should contain a prophetic element that strongly discourages the use of alcohol and promotes abstinence. This would be consistent with our *Faith and Practice* and our understanding of alcohol use exemplified in Romans 14:18-21.

Tom noted that when the university changed the alcohol use policy, the committee drafting the new policy met with the Yearly Meeting Administrative Council to discuss the issues involved, in a process which impressed members of the council as being honest and sincere.

The relevant section of the university's lifestyle statement now reads:

While we recognize that committed Christians differ in how they view the consumption of alcoholic beverages, it is clear that the improper use of alcohol by students, faculty or staff could bring much harm to the communities of George Fox University. This is especially true of the traditional undergraduate community which consists largely of students who are under the legal drinking age. Nationally, it is well documented that underage and binge drinking as well as driving with significant blood alcohol levels are major problems on college campuses. In addition, there is growing evidence that some individuals are predisposed to alcoholism. For these reasons, the use of alcohol by traditional undergraduate students is not allowed at any time they are enrolled at the university.

Within committed Christian communities there are diverse views regarding the use of alcohol. Some choose a testimony of abstinence for a variety of legitimate and honorable reasons while others believe they can use alcohol occasionally and moderately without harm to their body, spirit or relationships with others. As a community that honors Spirit-led diversity among Christians, George Fox University employees and students in non-traditional programs (degree-completion and graduate programs) are given the freedom of Spirit-led conscience in deciding whether to consume alcoholic beverages in moderation when not in the presence of students from traditional undergraduate programs.

The use of alcohol at university-sponsored events or activities is not allowed. Further, the presence or use of illegal drugs or alcoholic beverages is not tolerated on any George Fox University campus, nor is the illegitimate use of prescription drugs. The use of tobacco is not permitted in any George Fox University building or by employees or traditional undergraduate students.

The meeting considered its response to Salem Area's request that its minute be transmitted by the meeting to the university trustees. Diverse views were expressed on whether alcohol is constructive in a believer's life, and whether the Yearly Meeting's own *Faith and Practice* is prophetic in the way Salem Area is envisioning.

39. The meeting worshipped in song.

The meeting heard and approved the 2010 Youth Yearly Meeting Epistles, reproduced as Appendix C to these minutes.

43. Cherice Bock presented a report from the Peace Subcommittee of the Board of Christian Education and Discipleship. The first Peace Month was observed this last January. The subcommittee will be coordinating next year's Peace Month, and offer speakers and other resources for churches wanting to highlight the peace testimony.
44. Lorraine read six queries about how Friends connect with people from other Friends churches, and invited the meeting into prayerful discussion of how Friends connect with each other around the Yearly Meeting. Friends expressed their appreciation for:
- support received in joint projects, including the practical help and spiritual refreshment that comes from finding mentors from outside the local congregation.
 - the variety of experiences worshipping together with those outside one's home congregation.
 - revived quarterly meetings that offer encouragement for small congregations.
 - relationships built in joint youth events with other churches.

- kids' programs at area rallies.
- joint missions trips, including the distinctive aspects of different missions trips.
- connections with Friends from outside the Yearly Meeting.
- individual relationships that engage a variety of viewpoints on issues that might divide us.
- Bible quizzing, and the relationships built at them.
- the sense at Yearly Meeting of a large family reunion, safe and accepting even for newcomers.
- support for youth programs especially in the churches who can't support a paid youth pastor.
- working with others in Volunteers on Wheels (VOW) to benefit local congregations.
- family camps that put people of all ages together from various churches.

Thursday, July 29, 8:18 a.m.

45. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer. Attendance was an estimated 173.
46. Darla Samuelson (RiversWay), a candidate for recording as a Friends minister, shared her testimony, from accepting Christ as a child to listening carefully in the last two years for clarity from God about her calling to ministry. She recounted previous ventures in ministry – women's ministry in churches, Campus Crusade for Christ at Western Washington University and the University of Utah, studies at George Fox Evangelical Seminary, and her participation in developing (and co-pastoring) the RiversWay meeting – which eventually led her to realize that God had called her into pastoral ministry. The meeting approved recording her call.
47. Royce Frazier, president of Barclay College in Kansas, greeted the meeting. He shared briefly how Barclay College sees its ministry as preparing leaders for the church, and offered a vocal prayer for the Yearly Meeting.

by signing a nomination response form that will be forwarded to the Nominating Committee. As well as nomination by others, an interested person may self-nominate. Forms may be obtained from a local church Yearly Meeting representative, or the Yearly Meeting office or website.

6.02.02 [Subcommittee] Members, *two paragraphs added*:

NWYM boards may appoint to any of their subcommittees not more than one non-member of a NWYM Friends church to serve for a one-year term renewable at the discretion of the board. Such an individual will be added by the board because his/her call, expertise, passion, and/or experience enhances the overall effectiveness and impact of the subcommittee, and that expertise has not been found among NWYM members. The appointee will be a follower of Jesus Christ and will understand and affirm the *Faith and Practice* of NWYM, as it applies to the work of the subcommittee. This appointee may not clerk the subcommittee, but will be a full participant in the work of the subcommittee, and agree to serve within the same expectations and responsibilities as other members.

Each candidate for appointment will be given education about the work of the subcommittee, and opportunity to indicate their response and commitment by signing an appointment response form. Forms may be obtained from a local church Yearly Meeting representative, or the Yearly Meeting office or website.

Organization of the Local Church: Under the Care of the NWYM Board of Elders (BoE). *One sentence added (in bold)*:

While the decision to come under the care of the Elders is usually initiated by the local church, there are times when the BoE may choose to propose such an arrangement first. Exceptional cases where the church is in severe decline, is experiencing unresolved conflict, or is out of compliance with *Faith and Practice* in a way that is shattering to the local church or Yearly Meeting community, may prompt the BoE to intervene and place the local church under their care. **In these instances, as in cases where the local church invites help from the BoE, the LCCC (Local Church Care Committee) that is established will seek to work closely with leaders from the local church to establish a mutually agreed upon plan of action.**

Communication with the Yearly Meeting

A local church or ministry point will send carefully discerned concerns and proposals as a minute from their business meeting to their Area meeting for wider discernment and clarification. The Area will take action on the concern as specified by *Faith and Practice* (see Organization of Areas section 4.03, Area Minutes to the Yearly Meeting). When time and/or function of the Area does not allow a local church's minute to be brought, concerns and proposals may be sent directly to the presiding clerk of the Yearly Meeting. When a minute is sent directly to the presiding clerk, the clerk will help discern where it can best be addressed, whether by one of the boards or by the Yearly Meeting as a whole.

A title changed on page 27:

Opening and Closing Churches *Organizational Transitions*
Moved from page 32 to page 30:

New Areas

Local churches may petition the Yearly Meeting to establish, discontinue, divide, or redefine an Area, or to unite two or more Areas (see below). They may also request transfer of their affiliation from one Area to another.

New Yearly Meetings

Areas whose members wish to be set off and established as a new yearly meeting should inform the Yearly Meeting of that desire and of the concurrence of the constituent churches in the proposal. The Yearly Meeting then considers the proposal and makes a decision. If action is favorable and a new yearly meeting is to be established, the Yearly Meeting appoints a committee, not to exceed ten in number, to attend the opening of the new yearly meeting and to present the authorizing minute and inaugurate sessions in accordance with Friends form of government (see pp. 21, 66).

These proposals were all approved by the meeting for incorporation into the *Faith and Practice*.

49. Colin Saxton brought a report on George Fox Evangelical Seminary. He reported a growing sense that the seminary is the seminary of choice among Friends. The seminary is experimenting with forming student cohorts at sites away from the Portland area, a Korean DMin degree, using social networking to help re-brand and reconfigure the seminary's offering, increasing fundraising and making the seminary a revenue source for the university, and developing as a center for theological scholarship and leadership for Native American Christians. The seminary hosts a number of public events each year.

50. Colin reported on the Friends Center at the seminary, which is a partnership between the seminary and the Yearly Meeting. The Friends Center exists to support Friends students at the seminary, build relationships among Friends churches locally and nationally, and develop and support church leadership in the Friends church. Last year there were about 30 Friends students in the masters programs, plus two in the doctoral program. Ten Friends students were supported with scholarships last year; 14 will receive scholarships this year. Some of these scholarships are endowed, and another (the Hubert and Vivian Thornburgh Scholarship) is close to having the \$25,000 minimum required to become an endowed scholarship. Friends Center has sponsored several events and programs that serve as resources to the Yearly Meeting. Carole Spencer left the position as Friends Center director this year to go to Earlham School of Religion. Colin will be serving as interim director until Carole can be replaced permanently, a commitment that he expects to require about half of a day per week.
51. The meeting considered a proposed minute from the clerks regarding the Salem Area minute concerning the University's lifestyle statement.

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends, gathered for worship and business on July 26-29, 2010, received a minute from our Salem Area related to the George Fox University Lifestyle Statement as revised in 2007. We have commended the Salem Area Friends for carefully following our *Faith and Practice* in processing their concern. We appreciate the GFU Board of Trustees' work on this policy, which was done carefully and with input from some constituent groups of NWYM.

We have agreed to forward the concern to the GFU Board of Trustees, since their adoption of the Lifestyle Statement was done within their governance authority. In forwarding the concern, we as Northwest Yearly Meeting acknowledge that we have listening and discernment work to do relating to alcohol use and abuse. We commit ourselves to do that work. We ask the trustees to note the central point of the Salem Area minute, which does not ask that the Lifestyle Agreement changes be set aside, but that the GFU Trustees seek ways to "strongly discourage" the use of alcohol by its employees and non-traditional students.

The minute, as received from the Salem Area, June 2010, and forwarded to Northwest Yearly Meeting:

We commend George Fox University in their handling of issues of conscience. After prayerful consideration, Salem Area wishes to express a concern. We believe the Community Lifestyle policy language should contain a prophetic element that strongly discourages the use of alcohol and promotes abstinence. This

would be consistent with our *Faith and Practice* and our understanding of alcohol use exemplified in Romans 14:18-21.

The meeting prayerfully considered whether the proposed minute expressed the sense of the meeting, in particular whether it communicates more endorsement of the Salem Area minute than the meeting can unite with. Lorraine explained that, if this minute is approved, the Administrative Council would undertake to discern how the Yearly Meeting would approach the work of listening and discernment relating to alcohol use. The clerks committed to reconsider the minute and return with modifications after the mid-morning break.

Thursday, July 29, 10:35 a.m.

53. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer. Attendance was an estimated 165.

54. The meeting considered a revised proposed minute from the clerks

regarding the Salem Area minute concerning the university's lifestyle statement.

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends, gathered for worship and business on July 26-29, 2010, received a minute from our Salem Area related to the George Fox University Community Lifestyle Statement as revised in 2007. We have commended the Salem Area Friends for carefully following our *Faith and Practice* in processing their concern. We appreciate the GFU Board of Trustees' work on this policy, which was done carefully and with input from some constituent groups of NWYM.

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The meeting struggled with this statement, and with the issue of whether it is appropriate to use alcohol. Lorraine assured the meeting that the Administrative Council will report to the midyear meeting on its reflections over how the Yearly Meeting might address these issues. The proposed minute was approved.

55. Jeanne Hazel brought the Faith and Practice Revision Committee's proposed revision to the Historical Statement of the *Faith and Practice* (reproduced as Appendix A to these minutes). The meeting approved the Historical Statement for first reading.

56. Lorraine reported that the Administrative Committee has nominated Julie Peyton as the clerk of the Nominating Committee. The meeting approved Julie's appointment.

57. Lorraine thanked those who have served as clerks, board members,

caretakers, and the Yearly Meeting staff for all the work they have done to support the Yearly Meeting sessions.

58. Tom Stave specially recognized Floyd Watson for 20 years' service to the Yearly Meeting on the Board of Trustees, 19 as clerk.
59. Julie Peyton brought the 2010 Yearly Meeting Epistle, reproduced as Appendix B to these minutes. She reported a common theme found in 2009 epistles received from around the world was spiritual vitality among young Friends. The recording clerk wondered why it was acceptable for Julie to be funny in the Epistle but not for him to be funny in the minutes. A few suggestions for revision were offered. The meeting approved the epistle, leaving to the Epistle Subcommittee the task of considering the suggestions.
60. The 2010 Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends adjourned to meet January 28-29, 2011, in its midyear session, and July 24-28, 2011, in its annual session.

APPENDIX A

HISTORICAL STATEMENT NWYM Faith and Practice

The early movement

The Friends Church (Quaker) arose from a movement of Christian renewal that began in England during the seventeenth century. The major leader of this renewal was George Fox, who as a sensitive youth experienced cold formalism and power politics in the church and was repulsed by empty pleasure seeking outside the church. Young Fox studied the Bible and longed for an authentic faith to match its Christian message. This longing remained unfulfilled, even frustrated, by human counselors until he looked beyond them. Then he discovered One who could (as phrased in Fox's *Journal*) "speak to thy condition," and he reported that his heart "did leap for joy."

George Fox found this experience with the living Christ so compelling that he quickly told others about it. He shared the good news that Christ could free persons from the guilt and power of sin. To this message people responded eagerly. They were seekers, disillusioned by dry and formal religion, and they were attracted to the warm, evangelical message preached by this earnest young messenger. Scores of young men and women were "raised up of the Lord" for a ministry across England and beyond. Known as the "valiant sixty," they proclaimed that Christ could be experienced in the present, not just read about in the Bible or remembered through ritual observance. This is how George Fox perceived his ministry:

Now I was sent to turn people from darkness to the light that they might receive Christ Jesus, for to as many as should receive him in his light, I saw that he would give power to become the sons of God, which I had obtained by receiving Christ. And I was to direct people to the Spirit that gave forth the Scriptures, by which they might be led into all Truth. . . I was to turn them to the grace of God, and to the Truth in the heart, which came by Jesus, that by this grace they might be taught, which would bring them into salvation...

—*Journal*, Nickalls edition, Cambridge, 1952, p. 34

George Fox explained grace in terms of the Light of Christ, using the terms found in the Gospel of John. By this inward light, said Fox, people can understand Jesus Christ as "their Saviour and Redeemer, who shed his blood and died for them, who is the way to God, the truth and life." (*Journal*, pp. 225-6)

The Quaker Awakening constitutes one of the great revivals within Christianity. Particularly significant was its challenge to official religion. The first Friends believed that religious monopolies, whether Protestant or Catholic, weakened the Christian faith and fostered unspiritual, time-serving

ministry. Therefore they urged freedom of religion, trusting the power of the Lord, rather than civil coercion, to advance the Gospel. Friends were a people gathered to Christ, communing with God in vital worship and fellowship, witnessing the good news of Christ's Kingdom in a world shattered by civil and religious conflict. Their message met resistance. Thousands suffered imprisonment, and hundreds died for religious freedom.

These Christians first referred to themselves as "publishers of Truth," "children of the Light," or "the camp of the Lord." Gradually they came to prefer the term "Friends" in accordance with Jesus' words: "You are my friends if you do whatever I command" (John 15:12-15). Their critics dubbed these enthusiastic Christians "Quakers," a nickname that has become a symbol of integrity rather than a term of derision.

Friends used the word "church" to describe the people of God, not the building in which the people met. "Meetinghouse" became their word for the building in which the church gathered to worship. About a century after the movement began, the term "Society of Friends" came into general use. At that time the word "society" conveniently distinguished Friends and other legal but dissenting groups from the established Church of England. In the twentieth century, however, because of confusion about the term "society" and a desire to recover the biblical term for the gathered people of God, "Friends Church" became the preferred term in some yearly meetings, including Northwest Yearly Meeting.

The Quaker Awakening constituted a fast-growing missionary movement during its earliest decades. People in England joined by the thousands. Within a few years Friends became a major force in Colonial America. People welcomed a Christianity freed from state authority and priestly ritual. They were drawn to an emphasis upon Christ's inward baptism with the Holy Spirit and the Quaker concern for practical holiness.

The developing church

The Friends teaching about the real and sanctifying presence of Christ with His people resulted in strong ethical testimonies. These included support for religious and political freedom, opposition to slavery and civil bondage, just relationships with aboriginal and minority persons, honesty in business, humane and remedial treatment of offenders, compassionate care of the mentally ill, and aid to war victims and others in distress.

Friends opposed war and practiced peacemaking. They took their standards from the New Testament and from the example of Christian pacifism during the early Christian centuries. Quakers urged Christians to use the weapons of the Holy Spirit rather than the weapons of violence, believing such a choice to be both right and practical. They emphasized a single standard for truth, rejecting legal oaths out of faithfulness to the express command of Christ (Matthew 5:33-36).

These ethical testimonies produced significant results. Religious freedom is now widely acknowledged as basic to the social good. Oppression by courts has diminished. The right to conscientious objection to war has been widely supported by religious bodies and honored in many nations. Over the years the Quakers have often served as the conscience of the Church. Such moral leadership has sometimes been a heavy burden. Friends have not always lived up to their reputation. Sometimes they became preoccupied with ethical concerns to the neglect of evangelistic proclamation. At other times, in reaction to this burden, or to their own legalism, they became preoccupied with evangelism to the neglect of social testimonies.

It is sometimes forgotten that early Friends had a vision to evangelize the world at a time when most Protestants had not awakened to missionary responsibility. The first Quaker efforts may have lacked organization, but they did display a global vision. This missionary vision waned during the decades of colonizing in the New World, although there was some outreach to Native Americans. In the late nineteenth century the missionary expansion resumed, and Friends missionary endeavors have been the most significant factor in the growth of the Quaker movement over the last century.

Quakers first organized their local gatherings for worship into regional clusters called "yearly meetings." In Europe the first yearly meetings were in England (London) and Ireland (Dublin). In the colonies, the yearly meetings of New England, North Carolina, Philadelphia, New York (1695), and Baltimore came into being. With the westward migrations of the nineteenth century, new groups became established across America.

William Penn's colony in the New World is the most widely known example of colonial Christian outreach. For seventy years the Quakers sought to make Pennsylvania a society embodying Christian values. The colony became a haven for oppressed persons and an example of respectful relationships with the Indian nations. But the French and Indian War brought such pressures to compromise their convictions that in 1755 the Quakers relinquished control of the colony.

A retreat from worldly affairs followed. This era in Friends history was marked by plain dress, silent worship, moral scrupulosity, and rigorous church discipline. Although their evangelistic outreach diminished, their social concerns did not. In their persistent and Spirit-led opposition to slavery, John Woolman of America and William Allen of England illustrate the quietist period at its best.

In the westward migrations the colonizing tendency persisted until twentieth century urbanization changed the pattern. Quaker centers were reinforced by the establishment of schools, the preservation of a distinctive lifestyle, and a strong sense of community. These communities sustained ethical standards but tended to isolate members from spiritual renewals around them.

During the nineteenth century two major separations took place. The first caused serious divisions. The orthodox party emphasized biblical authority and the historical aspects of salvation, and the liberal party (Hicksite Friends) emphasized individual conscience and the inward aspects of religion. Later in the century differences arose within the orthodox party concerning the appropriateness of planned worship and ministry. The Wilburites (Conservative Friends) wanted to preserve the quietist tradition of immediate spiritual guidance; the Gurneyites (Orthodox Friends) wanted to acknowledge biblical and rational preparation for ministry under the Spirit's guidance. The latter position proved to be more successful in accommodating Quakerism to a westward moving, pioneering America.

After the Civil War, touched by revivals that swept America, Friends rekindled their banked fires of evangelism and joined other Christians in new evangelistic forms. Revival meetings with singing and altar calls characterized the new mode of outreach. Traveling ministers became settled ministers; and thus arose the pastoral system, which would become prevalent among American Quakers. Rapid growth occurred during the latter decades of the nineteenth century. To coordinate growth and to articulate Quaker faith and practice, several uniting conferences were held. Widely representative, these conferences led to programs of missionary outreach to Mexico, Africa, Alaska, the Caribbean, India, China, and Japan. Eleven American yearly meetings established a delegate organization, the Five Years Meeting, and affirmed their bonds of spiritual unity in a significant document, the 1887 Richmond Declaration of Faith.

This unity was broken by a modernist-fundamentalist rift in American Protestantism between World Wars I and II. Polarization developed between those who stressed evangelism and doctrinal essentials and those who stressed humanitarian concerns and doctrinal liberty. This rift affected Friends, also. In 1926 Northwest Yearly Meeting (then called Oregon Yearly Meeting) withdrew from the Five Years Meeting (now called Friends United Meeting). In several other yearly meetings withdrawals occurred, or disaffected evangelicals formed association with fragmented Protestants (particularly Wesleyan). Loyalty to Quaker connections and testimonies became weakened as a result of these schisms. During these decades Protestant liberalism dominated the churches of Europe and America, and Evangelical Friends found themselves at odds with these tendencies along with other conservative Christians. At the same time, Evangelical Friends have opposed the more militaristic and fundamentalist tendencies of conservative Christians, calling for closer adherence to the teachings and example of Jesus.

Friends in the world today

The evangelical-modernist polarities have continued in various forms,

with liberal theology remaining the characteristic stance in Europe, Britain, and some parts of the Americas. But in the latter decades of the twentieth century, the pendulum swung the other way for much of America and the world. Evangelicalism became more definitive, offering strong leadership in America and beyond. Various theological movements following World War II helped Quakers also recover a more historic and traditional theology, with evangelistic fervor and social concern becoming more often paired than polarized. Several movements for spiritual renewal bore fruit in membership gains, in the enrichment of spiritual life, and in doctrinal clarity. Scholarly research and writing reaffirmed for contemporary application the Christ-centered, prophetic character of the early Quaker Awakening. Since 1959 the journal *Quaker Religious Thought* has provided a useful scholarly forum for such concerns.

The middle 20th century saw a reunion of five yearly meetings divided in the 1820s during the Hicksite-Orthodox separations. As yearly meetings in New England, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Canada reunited, four of the five new yearly meetings came to share joint membership in Friends United Meeting and Friends General Conference. While the reunion of Friends within these yearly meetings was welcomed, it also created a new set of tensions within the larger bodies, as more conservative Friends felt FGC was too liberal, and more liberal Friends felt FUM was too conservative. This led to a realignment effort in the 1990s, causing FUM to reaffirm its commitments to biblical authority and the centrality of Christ, although Southwest Yearly Meeting withdrew from FUM and joined EFI during the process. Most FUM meetings are pastoral, and most FGC meetings are unprogrammed.

Over the last century or more, the emergence of Evangelical Friends has been one of the most significant developments within the history of Quakerism since its inception. From the revivalist movement after the Civil War emerged a vital form of pastoral Quakerism. In the sending out of missionaries to the majority world, the size of the movement has more than doubled. In joining together with like-minded Evangelical Friends, new vitality has emerged in terms of identity and outreach. As a result, the Association of Evangelical Friends, meeting triennially from 1947 until 1970, restated the evangelical character of Quaker beginnings. This movement gave rise to the Evangelical Friends Alliance (EFA), formed in 1965 by four independent yearly meetings, including Northwest Yearly Meeting, Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region, Mid-America Yearly Meeting, and Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting. Southwest and Alaska yearly meetings joined EFI-North America in the 1990s. In 2007, EFI-North America became EFC-North America. Regionalism has been reduced for these Friends, as they have cooperated in missions, publications, education, social concerns, youth work, and evangelism. In 1989 EFA was instrumental in the formation of Evangelical Friends International (EFI) within five global regions: Asia, Africa, Latin America, Europe, and North America. In 2007 it

became Evangelical Friends Church International (EFCI).

National pastors' conferences have brought together American ministers from both Friends United Meeting and Evangelical Friends Church International. Various regional and world youth gatherings have strengthened Quaker identity. The All-Friends Conference at St. Louis in 1970 became a catalyst for renewal for a generation. The subsequent Faith and Life movement, with its various conferences and study materials, had similar results, and the 1985 World Gathering of Young Friends held in Greensboro, North Carolina, created new sets of dialogues across divisions among the worldwide Friends movement. The publications and visiting ministry of the New Foundation movement have also brought spiritual renewal, especially to non-pastoral Friends. The Friends Educational Council and the Friends Association of Higher Education have facilitated spiritual concern for Friends schools. The Friends World Committee for Consultation, begun in 1937, has been used by the various yearly meetings for exchanging information and effecting dialogue. Its regional and periodic world conferences have enhanced mutual understanding, clarified differences, reduced provincialism, deepened spirituality, and opened the way for a more global Friends witness. Northwest Yearly Meeting became an affiliate member of FWCC in 2002.

Tension points remain within the larger Quaker movement, however, as doctrinal differences range along the full theological spectrum. Some Friends consider themselves fundamentalist Christians of various sorts, while others assert that one need not become a Christian, or even a believer in God, to be a Quaker. Obviously, these differences pose real obstacles to affiliation and cooperation between different groups of Friends. Worldwide, most Friends are Christ-centered and evangelical, but some meetings and yearly meetings seek to embrace divergent beliefs and practices. Differences along lines of political, moral, and social stands also make spiritual unity difficult. In some ways the older churches find renewal from younger Quaker groups in Latin America, Africa, and Asia, which have encountered less polarity between doctrinal beliefs and social witness than do Friends in North America.

As of 2010, more than three quarters of the more than 500,000 Friends in the world are persons of non-European origin. Counting Friends of all persuasions, the largest grouping of Friends is found in Africa (over 350,000 in Kenya and East Africa; over 60,000 in Burundi and Rwanda), followed by North America (over 95,000) and Latin America (over 30,000 in Bolivia and Peru, 30,000 in Guatemala and Honduras, and 10,000 elsewhere) and Asia (about 20,000). Latin American yearly meetings have begun to engage in their own missionary outreach, as have Friends in Burundi, Taiwan, and elsewhere. Kenyan Friends continue to develop new organizational structures to contain their growth, now numbering 15 yearly meetings. Friends in Burundi and Rwanda have experienced terrible hardship during recent civil wars, but this and other forms of testing have also strengthened the churches.

Evangelical Friends Mission is a mission agency of EFC-North America, and some Friends outside North America have developed their own mission agencies. Parallel to early Friends in Christian Britain and America, Friends in Taiwan, the Philippines, Indonesia, Cambodia, India, Bangladesh, Bhutan, and Nepal face challenges as sometimes-persecuted minorities within Muslim, Roman Catholic, Hindu and Buddhist majority populations.

In the United States most yearly meetings or associations belong to one of the following organizational structures. Friends United Meeting now includes thirteen yearly meetings in the Americas and sixteen Friends groups in Africa. In North America FUM membership numbers around 45,000, encompassing a broadly orthodox range of theology. Friends General Conference, generally liberal in theology, represents around 35,000 members, mostly in the United States (five FGC yearly meetings share joint membership with FUM). Conservative Friends, represent around 1500 adherents, mostly North American, following a Christ-centered, non-pastoral, and plain tradition. Still other yearly meetings in North America remain unaffiliated, and most of these are unprogrammed and liberal. Evangelical Friends Church-North America, pervasively evangelical and biblically based, has around 40,000 members. The 20,000 Friends in Europe are organized within eleven yearly meetings, the largest of which are Britain and Ireland.

Such statistics and characterizations are always changing and are bound to be somewhat incomplete; they cannot fully measure the life of the Spirit within these groups. They cannot measure obedience to the Light. But they do map some ways Friends perceive themselves and act upon their Christian heritage.

Friends in the northwest

Among the earliest Quakers to reach Oregon before the Civil War was the Lewelling family, who brought nursery stock to Milwaukie by oxen over the Oregon Trail in 1847. Other families settled in Ashland and the Willamette Valley. Robert and Sarah Lindsay, ministers from London, traveled to the Willamette Valley in 1859 to support the growing but scattered communities of Friends. Organizational direction, however, came in the 1870s through William Hobson, an Iowa Friend of Irish descent. His vision stimulated a major migration to the Chehalem Valley. Most families came from Iowa, which became the parent yearly meeting, although some, such as Jesse Edwards, came from Indiana. In 1893 the Quaker settlements in the Newberg and Salem, Oregon, area formed Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends.

Irrigation projects brought Friends families to Idaho's Boise Valley during the first decade of the twentieth century, with early settlements at Star, Riverside, and Greenleaf. Oregon Yearly Meeting soon included churches in Washington, as well as Idaho. Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting arose

following Quaker migrations from Indiana. An anticipated yearly meeting in Washington never developed, and in 1945 Friends from this area united with Oregon Friends. In 1971 the Yearly Meeting changed its name to Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

As a result of evangelical resurgence following World War II, the National Association of Evangelicals was formed. Oregon Yearly Meeting joined this organization in 1945. At the present time membership is through the Evangelical Friends Church-North America. Also in the Northwest is North Pacific Yearly Meeting (Independent), which is unprogrammed and more theologically and socially liberal. Just as Northwest Yearly Meeting Friends at times feel the need to clarify that the positions of some evangelicals do not speak for our Christ-centered commitments, we also find ourselves at times needing to clarify that our Quaker convictions on matters of faith and practice are not identical to those of other groups of Friends. Ultimately, our allegiance is to Christ and his Lordship, and we welcome the partnership of all who would aspire to follow his leadership and adhere to his example as revealed in Scripture.

Evangelism and outreach have become major emphases in the Yearly Meeting because of opportunities afforded by a developing region and because of deep spiritual convictions. These concerns were often expressed through various modes, including revival meetings, but they also find new means of expression, ranging from spiritual retreats to service projects. Believing that followers of Jesus are called to reach the lost individually, and also to touch society collectively, we believe that evangelism and social concern go hand in hand. In the year 2010 the membership of Northwest Yearly Meeting numbered approximately 7,000.

Missionary work among the Aymara people of South America began in 1930 and has been strongly sustained since that time. Bolivia Yearly Meeting was established in 1975, and Peru Yearly Meeting was established in 1997. Northwest Yearly Meeting supplies limited assistance, particularly in education and national missionary training. These Friends' churches are now self-supporting and self-governing. The Yearly Meeting, through Evangelical Friends Mission and the EFCI Council, networks with ministry to North American Latinos, Mexico, Central America, the Philippines, Rwanda, Taiwan, Burundi, Congo, Indonesia, Cambodia, Nepal, Russia, Hungary, Romania, Bhutan, Croatia, Serbia, Tanzania, Russia, North Africa, Israel, and India. It also maintains interests in the Bolivian Evangelical University in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, and the Navajo people of the Southwestern United States.

Northwest Yearly Meeting outreach also includes social programs. In faithfulness to the peace testimony many young persons have engaged in relief work as an alternative to military service. Members often serve with agencies devoted to the alleviation of economic and cultural disparity in America or abroad. Inner-city ministries, peacemaking activities, and

economic assistance to the needy receive local and Yearly Meeting direction. Yearly Meeting concern fostered construction of Friendsview Retirement Community.

Interest in education is evidenced by the establishment at Newberg, Oregon, of Pacific Academy in 1885 and Pacific College in 1891 (renamed George Fox College in 1949). In 1996 with the merger of George Fox College and Western Evangelical Seminary, the college became George Fox University. In 2000 the seminary was renamed George Fox Evangelical Seminary. Northwest Yearly Meeting established a Friends Center at the seminary in 2003, and a Friends Leadership Center was established at the University in 2009. Greenleaf Friends Academy in Idaho has been maintained by area Friends since 1908, maintaining an excellent Christian education experience from preschool through the twelfth grade. These schools have contributed significantly to Quaker and Christian leadership in the Northwest and throughout the world. Recently several local churches have included schools and daycare centers in their ministry.

The Yearly Meeting since 1918 has supported programs of camping and now has several conference centers. These presently include Twin Rocks on the Oregon coast, Quaker Hill and Twin Lakes in central and north Idaho, and Quaker Cove on the Puget Sound. Tilikum, a retreat center and day camp near Newberg, was established in 1970 as the result of a gift of property. It is an agency of George Fox University. These programs are widely used by the churches, and Northwest Yearly Meeting has been a leader in youth work, educational, and camping ministries.

In its various missionary, educational, and outreach ministries, Northwest Yearly Meeting continues dynamically in the Christian tradition of Friends. Its interests and strengths vary from time to time. Despite occasional misplacing of priorities, restoration to wholeness has also occurred, accompanied by unity and joy in the Lord. Currently the Yearly Meeting is engaged in new forms of outreach and evangelism, aimed at gathering into the Church persons whom the Holy Spirit is reaching through Christian proclamation and deeds of love. We invite you to join us in seeking to follow Christ together; in doing so, we not only celebrate what God has done in the past, but we look forward to being a part of what God is doing now and in the future.

APPENDIX B

2010 Northwest Yearly Meeting Epistle

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Hebrews 12:1-2, NRSV

To all Friends everywhere:

The Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church met for our 118th annual sessions on the campus of George Fox University in Newberg, Oregon, USA, July 25 – 29, 2010. Our theme was **Eyes Fixed, Running Free**, taken from the above passage. In plenary sessions, workshops, and in more casual conversations we considered how to live into this challenge, how to run our unique race. The keynote speaker on Sunday night, our very own beloved Superintendent Colin Saxton, ostrich egg in hand (you may have to find his talk on our website if you wish to understand that visual aid), led us through an examination of this metaphor. He reminded us that our course is not free of difficulties and hazards, that there are lessons to be learned along the way, that we run as a team. And we were faced with the question: What do we do when a runner stumbles?

The verses quoted from the book of Hebrews speak directly to our Quaker testimony of simplicity. Our experience this week reveals that many of us who have a desire to serve on boards may not have the time and energy available. We rejoice to hear the stories in our Monday evening Outreach Rally, thanks to the good work of our Local and Global Outreach boards. They are downright inspiring. But the streamlined budget we approved falls short of the *dreams* we have of supporting these people, projects, and plans for ministry. So, as Friends, we need individually and corporately to discern where we can “lay aside” things, material and otherwise, in order to “run the race” with more time, energy, and financial resources. One way, as the author of Hebrews encourages, is by “looking to Jesus,” who speaks to each heart inwardly. The importance of being obedient to our Inner Teacher as opposed to rules imposed from without was illustrated in the testimony of our newly recorded minister, Darla Samuelson.

While playing with this metaphor, a recurring theme developed during the week concerning language. In our corporate discernment around revisions to our *Faith and Practice* and in considering a minute brought from the Salem Area, we labored over the meanings of words, striving to put our core values in writing in ways that unite us in love. Two of our workshops explic-

itly addressed our use of language in creative writing (one on character development in fiction, the other an “open mic” poetry-reading session) and a third invited the participants to share the words that best describe their understanding of God and then the events of their life that made those words important. The English language is capable of great richness and full of humorous potential, illustrated when our guest speaker, Scott Daniels from Pasadena Church of the Nazarene, reminded us that God told Jonah to “get up,” but Jonah chose instead to “go down” to Joppa, down to the ship, down into the hold, and ultimately down into the belly of the big fish. His humor and ability to engage all ages was a blessing to us.

But sometimes English isn’t enough, and we feel this keenly as we labor to make our Latino Friends and churches fully a part of our Yearly Meeting. Many aspects of the Sunday evening program were bilingual or simultaneously translated. But we know this is a small step toward inclusion, and much more is required of us. Both of our evening speakers relied on words from older languages that carry rich significance: “coram deo” and “gadol.” We leave the translations to our readers, and we remind ourselves that one reason for our silent worship is to allow the Spirit to “intercede with sighs too deep for words.”

To live out our testimony of simplicity, our recently formed “green team” provided stainless steel water bottles to each registered Friend, organized vegetarian options for meals, and encouraged less waste. Some of us even cycled to Newberg from nearby cities. (Camas and Banks aren’t that far!)

Our tradition is to have the Wednesday evening session led by the youth who participate in the Junior High and High School Youth Yearly Meeting. Using physical, artistic, and interactive expressions such as cartwheels, juggling, mural painting, and music, they embodied the presence of the Holy Spirit, bringing to life the story of Pentecost in the second chapter of Acts. Out of the silence that followed, one young Friend shared her struggles around personal identity and calling. Following her words a weighty Friend was moved to pray tender words with her. Many of the epistles we received last year spoke of the vitality of young Friends around the world, and we delight to add our testimony to this phenomenon. During the week our youth enjoyed their own Yearly Meeting programs, and we encourage you to read their epistles to learn how they experienced our theme.

HIGH SCHOOL EPISTLE

Dear Friends of Christ,

We here at Northwest Yearly Meeting have the joyous opportunity to share with you a report on the happenings and anticipations of the Holy Spirit during our annual sessions in Newberg, Oregon, 2010. The week has, as always, been one of incredible excitement as the congregations reunite at George Fox University, and share a week of food, music and fellowship. We have enjoyed the time we have spent reconnecting with our brothers and sisters, and assembling to listen to God together. We are looking forward to seeing how God moves in the heart of our congregation in the days to come.

The youth met on Sunday and enjoyed getting acquainted with new friends, as well as reuniting with old ones. After gathering in small “family groups,” we celebrated the start of Yearly Meeting with a luau, fun and games, and supper on the lawn. With crafty cardboard games called “Lightning Roller Nine Million,” and “Awesome Toss” we worshipped God through our play and laughter. We closed our luau with some words from Doreen Dodgen-Magee on the nine intelligences. She said that these talents: music, manual, interpersonal, linguistics, and others, are some ways in which we are created to worship God. Pulling on the story of Pentecost, in which each person present heard the Lord in their own tongue, we were reminded that perhaps our artistic talent, athletic skills, or linguistic gifts are these same individual languages in which we hear God. We joined the adults of our meeting for the evening worship gathering, and an intergenerational “ice cream social.” Before heading to bed, we had the chance to hear from the Servant Leadership Program. We appreciated hearing about their unique experience, living at the Quaker Camp Twin Rocks, and their five weeks living as servants for the camp. The evening was a special start to our week here at Northwest Yearly Meeting.

Monday we awoke and ate breakfast together and proceeded to our first business meeting of the week. The officers went over their positions and explained how the rest of the week would look. They relayed the concerns that the Board of Youth and Young Adults Ministry presented to the Youth Yearly Meeting for discernment. We were to discern how the adult Yearly Meeting could support the youth, how the youth could support the adults within the Yearly Meeting, and what does the collective youth’s place within the Yearly Meeting look like. Mindful of the decision making processes ahead in the week, it was encouraged to begin praying for the process at the present, and to be intentional about preparing for it ahead of time. Tuesday we opened up the business of discerning the officers for next year. It was a remarkable experience; sitting with friends who were faithful to be attentive and open to The Spirit’s moving. The recommendations for next year’s officers were peacefully approved.

In our evening gathering Tuesday and Wednesday, we had the chance to hear from Scott Daniels of Pasadena Nazarene Church, speak to this year’s theme, “Eyes Fixed, Running Free.” His words were encouraging and challenging, as they urged us to turn our focus to God, and to be faithful to his calling us to “rise up and go.” Northwest Youth Yearly Meeting has had several opportunities to hear from our “Youth Challenge” teams. The Youth Challenged through Local Service (YCLS) shared about working with Portland’s homeless and learning to love them as God’s people, rejecting the world’s marginalization. Another team that shared was the Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview (YCEW). They spoke about their trip to Aguascalientes, Mexico, working in children’s vacation Bible schools and learning to love and respect the Mexican culture.

Wednesday the youth led the evening worship and have felt moved to express a new interpretation of Pentecost; one applicable to where we are

now. With a multi-lingual presentation of the Pentecost story, and a visual presentation in art, poetry, gymnastics and music we expressed our love for God in our individual “tongues.” On Thursday we drove out to the coast and spent the day in fun and fellowship. After some attempted surfing, lunch, and time for family groups and play, we returned home to George Fox University where we joined the adults in a closing banquet. The youth finished Thursday evening with some theater games and laughter; and Friday morning, returning to our homes.

We hope all is well in your own meeting and that you would join us in listening for God’s will in the world, and to get up and go.

Board of Christian Education and Discipleship

Do you remember the word Colin spoke to us at last year's Yearly Meeting? It was the word "deeper," a call to go deeper in our relationship with Christ. This past year, the Board of Christian Education and Discipleship has been working to assist and support our churches' education and discipleship programs so that we can better work toward this goal. Here are some of the ways that we moved forward in this area:

We encouraged and raised awareness of the importance of knowing and following God's Word by launching a Bible literacy campaign:

- Hosting a dinner at YM for those involved in Christian education to highlight the importance of and encourage the teaching of the Bible. We were also able to provide several take-home resources for the attendees.
- Creating and sharing a Bible literacy PowerPoint presentation. This PowerPoint is also available in CD format and as a download at www.nwfriends.org/bible.
- Creating a video for churches to help them take home the message of the importance of Bible literacy.
- Providing self-test Bible quizzes, Bible study resources, and pamphlets on the whys and ways to be in God's Word.

We have researched and gathered resources for our teachers by:

- Inviting representatives from three different curriculum publishers to present their materials to our board in the hopes of finding quality curriculum that includes education about Friends for our children. Our board recommends Word Action, Godly Play, and Faith and Play curriculums to our YM churches.
- Inviting Dan McCracken, director of Barclay Press publishing, to share and educate us on what is currently available from Barclay Press for education materials.
- Updating the Yearly Meeting library with Christian Education curriculum and resources now available online at nwfriends.org/library.
- Continuing the C.E. Matching Grant program. This past year, eight churches received a \$250 matching grant to support their C.E. programs. Three of the grant recipients were smaller churches who received the grants due to the generosity of three larger churches who provided the matching funds needed.

- Providing teacher training workshops. Jim Teeters continues to present his "Teach the Way Jesus Taught" workshop at area churches. He also created a men's workshop titled "Finding Balance in our Lives." Jim Teeters and Dave Powell are ready to travel to bring these workshops to our YM churches. Brochures with more information on these workshops can be found at the Christian education table in Bauman.

We are publishing the *Connection* news magazine and sending it to your home, as well as sending a supply to local churches for those who may not yet be on our mailing list. You are encouraged to let us know if you would like to receive it as a pdf in your email box, rather than receiving a hard copy in the mail. This saves time, money, and trees. Contact us at info@nwfriends.org to change your subscription to email only. If you have suggestions for topics you would like to see addressed in *Connection*, we welcome your ideas.

We hope you are finding the monthly *Spotlight* bulletin insert interesting, inspiring, and informative. Each edition focuses on one of our local churches and tells a bit of their story. If your church does not use weekly bulletins, ask if the *Spotlight* is available as a handout.

We are also working at keeping the nwfriends.org web site up-to-date and informative for you. You can help us keep it accurate by letting us know of changes in your own church information. Each church is listed according to region at nwfriends.org/churches. We would like to be able to provide current news about area gatherings, camps, conferences, retreats, etc. that you would like to have widely publicized. You can subscribe to receive notice of announcements posted on the home page by visiting nwfriends.org/news-signup.

Last year we mentioned that NWYM had joined Facebook, and we are delighted to report that this has been very well received. In early January we exceeded 1,000 followers, and have continued to add roughly 75 new followers per month. Tracking shows about 35-50 interactions with NWYM each week. In addition to the majority of users in the U.S. we have fans in the United Kingdom (6), Germany (5), Kenya (5), Mexico (4), and 14 other countries. Posted materials include blogs from NWYM people, short essays from church newsletters and web sites, articles from *Connection*, photos from youth events, and a number of links. We are very appreciative of the work Eric Muhr (Newberg) does in keeping the Facebook presence fresh and current.

Several people from various boards have inquired about resource materials available through the yearly meeting office. We are happy to let you know that these materials have been inventoried and this library is now available at nwfriends.org/library. We extend a huge thank you to Aletha McKennon (North Valley) for her many hours of help in cataloging these books and DVDs.

This summer we hired a "media specialist," Sarah Klatt, a recent GFU graduate who attends North Valley. Sarah has put in many hours interview-

ing people across NWYM to create videos of ministries occurring in local churches and on the yearly meeting level. She has also created a "video wall" with short comments from a wide variety of people about why they like being a Friend. Supporting couples In NWYM - Prepare/Enrich

This year we have added another resource to support your church's role in helping people prepare for or enrich marriages. The Prepare/Enrich program is used for premarital counseling, marriage preparation, marriage counseling and marriage enrichment. Prepare/Enrich includes a comprehensive couples assessment along with feedback using skills-building exercises. These resources help couples identify their strengths and growth areas in categories such as communication, conflict resolution, spiritual beliefs and financial management.

We are making available to your pastors, churches and family ministries a **certification workshop** designed to help facilitators learn how to administer and provide feedback to couples using Prepare/Enrich. Our goal is to provide the training to every pastor or church that wishes to utilize this resource in their ministry. A discernment process aid - Natural Church Development

When a church group pauses to reflect about the next steps to take in improving their common life, Natural Church Development (NCD) is an invaluable aid. It gives a 360-degree perspective on congregational life and ministry. It also helps a group focus on a few high-leverage issues that have high potential for a group's progress and health. NCD provides a foundation for a church's discernment process as they prayerfully consider how God is at work among them and what next steps God would have them take. We have five people available to help you and your church go through this process. While many church programs come and go, we see an enduring quality about Natural Church Development. It isn't just an evaluative tool. It is also a dynamic process which supports our practice of discernment—particularly about a congregation's sense of vision, passion, health and mission.

Supporting parents and families - Love and Logic

We encourage Love and Logic training as a way of encouraging healthy parent/child relationships in our local churches. Love and Logic (loveandlogic.com) provides simple and practical techniques to help teachers and parents experience less stress and more fun while raising responsible children.

Supporting congregations as covenantal Christ-centered communities - Membership Project

The Board of Congregational Care invites you to take a fresh look with us at the idea of membership in the local church. The idea of membership appears to have a lot of baggage attached to it. It seems irrelevant and antiquated to some. It seems unnecessary and even restrictive to others. Whenever membership is viewed more as an impersonal structure, or as just hoops to jump through, its true nature will be blunted and misunderstood.

We are engaged now in a project to revisit the meaning of membership. This year we are collecting materials often used in membership classes as part of our review. We hope to do additional work that helps communicate the beauty of being a covenantal community along with its benefits and responsibilities. Supporting the progress of churches - Share Call

We will be considering two applications for the Share Call this year. We want you all to know about this opportunity to help and be helped. Below are the guidelines for the Share Call Program. This year's Share Calls will support Iglesia Amigos in McMinnville and City's Edge Friends Church in Beaverton.

The Share Call is a means of enabling the entire Yearly Meeting to be a part of financially assisting a local congregation to complete a building project. The ground rules of a Share Call are as follows:

- The Share Call is given to assist in finishing the end of a building project.
- The receipts from a Share Call are to be used to purchase items that are needed to make the building usable. First priority will be given to those needs crucial to the use of facilities – that is: roofs, furnaces, floors, plumbing, etc. The Share Call will not be used generally for updating, or beautification projects.

- A proposal documenting the nature of the building project and how the Share Call will enable the congregation to make the facility usable must be approved by the Board of Congregational Care before a Share Call is to be given.

Calls will be issued two times a year, generally during the months of October and May. First priority will be given to churches working on their initial capital investments. Applications are reviewed twice a year; once at Midyear Board Meeting and once at Yearly Meeting. All applications need to be submitted one month prior to these events. Board of Elders

The Board of Elders values the opportunity to serve Northwest Yearly Meeting. We meet to praise God for the joys, and to pray for the challenges and sorrows that are part of Christ's church. We believe our yearly meeting has significant opportunity to speak as no other to the culture that surrounds us because we teach of a personal, obedient relationship with Jesus, accountability to the community of believers, and faithfulness to a Holy Spirit-inspired reading of the Bible. We value the concerns of individuals and hold them tenderly as we also recognize and support the community of NWYM Friends and our shared beliefs.

Information about local meetings comes before us as we share what is happening in our own churches, hear regularly from our superintendent, and make annual calls to the clerks of elders and pastors. We also name and support restoration teams who work with those in personal moral crisis. Our priority in all our activities is to listen for God and obey God in what we hear.

As we have met this past year, we have considered the concern of individuals and meetings who believe our archival material in *Faith and Practice* with regard to homosexuality does not accurately represent NWYM's attitude toward homosexual persons. This concern has become more acute with the posting of earlier versions of *Faith and Practice* on the web as well as the current *Faith and Practice* (see nwfriends.org/fp). Elders affirm without reservation NWYM's commitment to listening carefully to what the Bible says in order to be faithful to God's priorities. At the same time, we recognize that there are different understandings derived from faithful reading of the Bible. We are praying for God's guidance for NWYM through this discussion.

Elders have supported the superintendent in person and in prayer as workshops have been conducted for groups of local elders across the yearly meeting. We continue to offer area workshops with groups of local elders. We are holding a workshop again this year during Yearly Meeting to gather information and discuss issues from those using the Elders Handbook to guide their work. It is always helpful to know that you pray for us. As Paul Almquist, 2009 elders clerk, wrote last year, "We live in a time when it is increasingly important to consider not only what we believe biblically, but how we communicate those beliefs in ways that build people up rather than tear them down. When people question the views of the church they expect thoughtful, sincere, and well-researched answers. We continue to be reminded that we have to earn the right to be heard."

Board of Global Outreach

The Board of Global Outreach continues to grow into the ministry description given by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends: *To encourage evangelism, church planting, peacemaking, social justice and compassionate service around the world.* This year the board pondered this challenge and sought the Lord's guidance for how to fulfill such a great big responsibility.

There are currently 12 of us on the board. We can't fulfill this responsibility alone, so we've enlisted help! We've formed four sub-committees, with two more on the way. They are: Latin America, Middle East/North Africa, Russia, Teaching Abroad, Bolivia/Peru, and Finance. There are 22 people on these subcommittees apart from board members. Add 12 and 22 and you get 34 people who are working to carry out our ministry description!

The bulk of our time, energy and resources goes to supporting our Friends Serving Abroad (FSA). During this year **Hal and Nancy Thomas** (North Valley) continued to work primarily with a program called PRODOLA that is helping church leaders throughout Latin America achieve doctoral degrees in their areas of ministry. **Johan and Judy Maurer** (Reedwood) continued to live and work in Elektrostal, Russia, laying the foundation for what we trust will one day become a yearly meeting. Right now they are forming relationships with the Russian people and pointing them to Jesus Christ whenever they can. **Patrick, Christy, Ethan and Megan Neifert** (Newberg) continued to live and work in Haifa, Israel. Their presence in Haifa gives NWYM a toehold in the Middle East. As the Lord provides we hope to see more people from our yearly meeting get involved in that area of the world through such ministries as teaching, peacemaking, social justice and church planting. In the meantime Patrick is involved in evangelism, helping to spread the good news of Jesus Christ to Muslims all over the world through the internet. **Bill, Betty and Faith Kelley** (Rosedale) returned to the United States after almost 6 ½ years of service in North Africa. They will remain stateside for the foreseeable future. **Karen Swenson** (Newberg) continued to teach in Hungary and there were six who taught English in China including **Marilyn Harmon** (Clackamas Park), **Dorothy Sherman** (Camas), and **Miriam Voth** (Newberg).

Although not under the supervision of our board, we are pleased to report that **Joy Ellison** (West Hills) has completed three years of service with Christian Peacemaker Teams in the Middle East. Congratulations, Joy!

The return of the Kelleys from North Africa means that our board currently has no FSAs in that area of the world. After the Kelleys were already home, many Christian expatriates were expelled from that area under the charge of proselytism. The board has been using this time to prayerfully seek God's guidance regarding our yearly meeting's involvement in North Africa. So far

we have discerned that there are many people in NWYM who are still drawn to North Africa. We sent a team of five people to that region in April to connect with North Africans we already know and to explore options for future ministry. The team returned with the impression that there is still an exciting future for our yearly meeting in that part of the world. Please pray for us as we try to discern what all this means and what our next step might be.

Since our task is so big, we're not above partnering with other organizations! The primary organization we partner with is Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM), a joint missions effort between six evangelical yearly meetings in the United States (*see www.friendsmission.com*). EFM provides opportunities for more people from NWYM to become involved in global outreach. Rwanda has received most of them recently! **Chrissy Muhr** (North Valley), **Drew Miller** (Newberg), **John Kaye** (Newberg), **Matt and Gayle Denham** (2nd Street) joined the **David and Debby Thomas family** (West Chehalem) this year. The Thomases have been in Rwanda for years. The **David Howell family** (Talent) is well into their first term of missionary service in Ireland. Not only does EFM open up more avenues of service for people from our yearly meeting, it also allows all of us to become involved in what God is doing in countries like Nepal, India, the Philippines, Bangladesh, Mexico and so on. This is a vital partnership for the board and NWYM.

In the midst of ministry descriptions, subcommittees, FSAs, ponderings about North Africa and our partnership with EFM, we have not lost sight of our sister yearly meetings in Bolivia and Peru. Last August the **Dan Cammack family** (Tigard) spent three weeks in Peru reconnecting with Friends there. In January, Dan traveled to Bolivia with Hal Thomas and also with **Quentin** (Newberg) and **Kevin Nordyke** to visit Bolivia Yearly Meeting's annual business sessions. The goals of this trip were to celebrate our history with Friends in Bolivia, encourage the people there and be encouraged by them, and also to explore together the future of our relationship. Both the August and January trips were a great blessing to the visitors and visited. We feel so strongly about our connections to Bolivia and Peru that we are pursuing the formation of the Bolivia/Peru subcommittee.

Finally, our mandate from the yearly meeting is so large we cannot fulfill it without **you**. We need your prayers. We need your counsel. We need your financial support. And we need more of you to go to Russia, North Africa, the Middle East, China and other areas of the world. After all, the mandate we've received is not just from NWYM. It is ultimately from our Lord Jesus Christ. He continues to say to us, "...go and make disciples of all nations..." Are we ready to obey? We look forward to the ways they will contribute to the leadership in each of our churches.

Recording

Over the last twelve months we have experienced a sharp increase in the number of recording applicants recommended by their churches to the Recording Subcommittee. This represents a growing awareness by local elders of God's call in the lives of those with public gifts of ministry. With this opportunity to walk with recording candidates through the process, we have enjoyed the challenge of increasing our board's capacity to meet the needs of this burgeoning group of leaders. Recording applicants have come from all areas of our Yearly Meeting and reflect a welcome diversity of age, gender, and ethnicity.

Darla Samuelson, pastor of RiversWay, has completed her process with the Recording Subcommittee and is recommended for recording during YM Sessions this week. She is a gifted, thoughtful, and compassionate leader who has already contributed significantly to our Yearly Meeting.

Mentoring

Last September we had approximately fifteen veteran pastors and leaders meet at George Fox Evangelical Seminary (GFES) for our first annual mentoring workshop. Gary Kilburg (GFU) and Eloise Hockett (2nd Street) facilitated our training and provided practical tools for the variety of situations and individuals with whom our mentors work. Each of the participants, even with years of ministry experience, expressed how their new learning will add value to their mentoring relationships. Currently, we have 22 individuals paired with a mentor.

We will be hosting our second annual mentoring workshop on September 24, at GFES. Additionally, Gary Kilburg, Eloise Hockett, and Trey Doty are the speakers for NWYM's Youthworkers Training Conference where they will be teaching mentoring skills to approximately 50 youth workers.

Pastoral development

The 2009 Focus Conference, a training time for our Yearly Meeting pastors, provided time for them to consider the ways we conceive and implement vision in our churches. Bob Schreiber (Hayden Lake) led our time together. He provided practical ideas and allowed conversation to help pastors specifically consider how to move their churches forward in their unique mission.

Small regional retreats designed for the support and formation of pastors continue to be developed. Gar Mickelson (Associate Superintendent of Local Outreach) and his wife, Vicki, will again facilitate two retreats, for groups no larger than eight, this fall in the Puget Sound and Salem areas.

Board of Local Outreach

In the past year the Board of Local Outreach (BoLO) has been involved in overseeing numerous facets of ministry including (but not limited to) the Latino Ministries Taskforce, the Human Rights Subcommittee (incorporating an immigration taskforce and an environment-care taskforce), the Church Planting Subcommittee (church and ministry point development), the Local Church Development Team, and the Local Outreach Grant Fund.

Church Planting Sub-committee (CPS)

CPS continues to develop a functional *Church Planting Handbook* for NWYM. Many strategies and ideas have been discussed over the last year, and the committee has continued to make steady progress towards the goal of producing this comprehensive handbook that describes the church planting and ministry point development program for NWYM. Also, during this time the CPS has been overseeing all the current ministry points operating around the Northwest.

Ministry Point news — Hayden Lake and Anthem: A big church/little church partnership

Hayden Lake Friends and Anthem (a ministry point of NWYM) are continuing to find creative ways to work with one another as ministry partners in the Coeur d'Alene area. Hayden Friends welcomes Anthem into their facilities each week for their Sunday evening meetings, and Anthem continues to grow and flourish as a result! What a way to start a church!

Pastor Chris Lauri and the ministry team for Anthem recognize that without the help of Hayden Friends, Anthem would still be struggling under the financial weight of a building that meets their needs. On the other hand, although Hayden already has a vibrant ministry to young adults, over 120 more young adults (including a significant population of single moms) is being touched through the Anthem ministry.

Chris Lauri and Bob Schneiter will conduct a workshop on the particulars of this partnership on July 27, 2:15 PM.

Ministry Point transitions to local church

RiversWay Community has applied and will be transitioning from ministry point status to local church status. RiversWay has journeyed with NWYM

for over three years, and has been meeting continuously for six years. During the last three years RiversWay has been a model ministry point in NWYM, with their leaders Darla Samuelson and Jason Minnix becoming more engaged within NWYM. We are excited about this transition and are excited for the positive influence that RiversWay will have in NWYM into the future.

CrossRhythm Church (CRC) in Annapolis

NWYM continues to build relationships with the good people in Annapolis, Maryland. This past May NWYM sent a delegation of four people to meet the folks of CrossRhythm. There were great discussions with the CRC leadership, and some spiritual discernment training conducted by the NWYM team. The BoLO continues to journey with this group who desire to be in covenant relationship with NWYM.

Local outreach grants

Grants were awarded this year to Marion Friends (Christmas family project), GreenPlow Coffeehouse (community meeting room development), Sprague River Friends (equipment for a community meal program), and Eugene Friends (Alpha program start up costs). These churches benefited greatly from the availability of matching grant funds from BoLO. To apply for a grant at your church, see nwfriends.org/resources/local-outreach-grant.

Immigration taskforce

The Immigration Taskforce has continued to meet monthly over the last year. Last fall members of the ITF were helpful in assisting Latino children with paperwork for their passports during the "Serve and Celebrate" community fair in Newberg.

Currently the ITF is partnering with George Fox University and Mennonite Central Committee to host a conference on immigration issues. This conference, "Christians and Immigration in a Land of Contradictions—A Call to Biblical Action," will be held October 1-2, on the GFU campus.

The ITF is also consider partnering with Lutheran Services and other faith-based groups to provide funds for the hiring of an immigration counselor for Yamhill County.

Local Church Development Team

New this year to BoLO is the Local Church Development Team. This team, headed up by Gene Mulkey (Silverton) exists for the purpose of assisting local churches in re-tooling their local outreach programs. At the request of any local church in NWYM, the LCDT will send a team to evaluate the local outreach potential of the church. In this process, many facets of ministry are evaluated including church resources, leadership capabilities, and environment. After an evaluation is complete, Gene and his team make recommen-

dations to the local church for the re-calibration of their local outreach ministry. Gene Mulkey and Eric Anglin (Scotts Mills) will discuss this ministry in their workshop on July 28, 2:15 p.m.

The Board of Local Outreach is continuing to look for new board members from around the Northwest. If you have a passion for local outreach, and have a desire to assist other individuals and churches to do the same, we want to talk to you. Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry

The Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry is thankful for the support we have received from NWYM as we encourage the ministries and activities of middle school, high school and young adults.

If one were to measure success based on numbers, the Bible Quiz program was our top event. At the last quiz meet in Metolius we suspect the population of the town may have doubled, well...maybe just a 30% increase in overall population. We average more than 200 at each of our four meets, with participation from all three states.

The most time-consuming and biggest change of direction was the remake of Friends Youth Exec. The whole process occurred over a two-year period. The new format, known as Young Adult Leadership Development Team (YAFLDT) is in place and six of the eight of the young adults have been recruited. They are: Anna Lee (Newberg), Chris Lee (Newberg), Alyssa Robert (Reedwood), JJ Engelfried (West Hills), Rachel Clarkson (MidAmerica YM), and Jessy Hampton (Newberg). We hope the changes have taken the best of FYE and improved upon it. One aspect of the new program is that it is not totally centered in Newberg and does a better job of including all areas of the YM.

Grad Camp, a camp-within-a camp, was a hit last summer! Thirty-seven recent high school grads stayed at Harbor Villa Retreat Center (owned by Twin

Rocks Friends Camp) while attending Surfside. This new model integrated Surfside into a camping experience which helps recent high school grads look ahead to college, work, or ministry.

Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview (YCEW) was a very strong team which has returned from Aguacalientes, Mexico, by the time you read this report. The team maintained a blog at: ycew.wordpress.com. Team members were: Alyssa Redford (Meridian Friends), Stephanie Andres (Newberg), David Reid (Sherwood), Mark Almquist (West Chehalem), Melynda Lujan (Caldwell), Jessica Ice (Sherwood), Lucas Startin (Sherwood), Shreela McFaddan (Meridian), and Tim Almquist (West Chehalem). Team leaders were Jon Maroni (2nd Street) and Colleen Young (Eugene). Try and find a team member and ask them about their experience.

Youth Challenged through Local Service (YCLS), led by Anna Knierim (Sherwood Friends) and Forrest Cammack (Tigard Friends), spent a week in inner-city Portland with BridgeCity Ministries. Team members were: Ashley Ownby, Jasmine Mirajkar and Haley Paz (all of Meridian), Kendall Poorman (Hayden Lake), and Kara Shephard (Sherwood). We are excited to have a new local option for youth wanting a hands-on ministry experience.

We continue to work on ways to connect Young Adult Friends (YAF) and find ways to include them in ministry in NWYM. Currently a "bring-you-own-tent" camping weekend in Oregon, a weekend College Camp at Quaker Hill, a Blazer game, and several informal gatherings have occurred.

The board's biggest new challenge is to encourage churches to learn about and implement our Abuse Prevention policy. This will be communicated with churches throughout this next year at as many venues as we can make work. We are excited about the future and ask to you to come along with us in Youth and YAF Ministries.

For the Missionary Track, about 40 young adults participated along with several EFM missionaries and other resource people. EFM missionaries included **Kathi Perry** from Ireland, **Albert and Metali Adhikary** from Bangladesh, **David and Debby Thomas**, **Brad and Chelsea Carpenter** and **Molly Black** from Rwanda.

Our thanks to **Rachelle Staley** who served so capably on the main planning committee. **Colin Saxton** gave a powerful evening address to the nearly 400 who gathered. Many others from Northwest Yearly Meeting also participated including **Dan Cammack**, **Doreen Dodgen-Magee**, **Jamie Johnson**, **Shawn McConaughy**, **Dan McCracken**, **Elizabeth (Lizby) Rogers**, and probably more that I have forgotten. The young men and women in attendance, and many others like them, give great hope for the future of Friends.

Short-term missionaries

In Rwanda, veteran short-termer **Chrissy Muhr** (NWYM) is coordinating the teaching of English to our Friends teachers. **Matt and Gayle Denham** (NWYM) just finished one year of teaching English to our Friends school teachers in Rwanda. They are serving a two-year short term. **Molly Black** (EFC-MAYM) is in her first year in this program.

Bud and Judy Van Meter (Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting) are serving as two-year missionaries in the **Navajo Nation** and living at **Rough Rock**.

Other returned short-termers in the last couple of years include **Drew Miller and Johnny Kaye** (NWYM), **Liz Wine** (EFC-MAYM) from Rwanda, **Cassie Phillips** (EFC-MAYM) from Bangladesh, **Michael and K.K. Linville** (EFC-MAYM) from Nepal, Bangladesh and Mussoorie, India, and **Mark and Julie Heaton** (EFC-MAYM) from Nepal.

Missions to missions

Although small now, one sign of the great hope of the future is the emergence of national missionary sending agencies.

Thanks to the ministry of **David Thomas** and several other Rwandan missionaries and national leaders, the first interdenominational missionary sending agency is being formed in Rwanda. David is giving significant leadership and service to the effort. Pray that Friends missionaries go out to unreached people groups and other countries, planting Friends churches with life-changing power and building whole-life disciples.

Rupak Tamang and the young Friends church in Bhutan sent their first missionary, **Nima Dawa**, to Sikkim state in India. Derby Friends Church in Derby, Kansas, is partnering with them in this venture.

Field-by-field updates

Bangladesh

Albert and Metali Adhikari and their committed volunteers are reaching people never before touched by the gospel. The number of churches and converts increases every year in our newest mission field. Evangelistic literacy classes, teaching English, computer skills and launching micro-businesses provide the holistic side of ministry. They are training disciples to plant churches and multiply groups of disciples. Their emphasis on whole families coming to Christ is quite powerful.

Bhutan

Our second newest mission field (when we count the years since it began under Nepal Yearly Meeting) with the leadership of **Rupak and Pramila Tamang** continues to grow rapidly. Both churches and small groups are emerging. The Thimpu Friends Church in the capital city (Thimpu) has a strong prayer emphasis led by **Pramila**. Teaching women to weave, micro-loans, and bread and milk for hungry mothers and children provide part of their help to the poor.

Great Lakes Leadership Training (GLLT)

Lon Fendall travels to Africa at least twice per year, and coordinates GLLT's remarkable pastoral training program. It not only trains future pastors in **Burundi, Congo and Rwanda** but also unpaid leaders who become witnesses in their communities and influencers in their churches.

India (Kolkata)

D.K. and Choity Sarkar lead this ministry of winning Hindus to Christ. This year they are adding a Muslim ministry to their outreach. **Maurice Roberts** visits often as their coach and representing Hayden Lake Friends Church, offering encouragement, wise counsel and financial support. **Bob Adhikary** (Nepal) and his team visit this field once or twice per year with powerful preaching and teaching. During 2010 a typhoon destroyed many homes and our Emergency Fund (for natural disasters) brought needed aid.

Ireland

Todd and Celesta James serve in Ringsend, **David and Tricia Howell** in Wicklow Town and **Kathi Perry** in Greystones. **Kathi** is involved in community activities, discipleship groups and a Mums and Tots ministry. **David and Tricia** have started a Bible study and worship service and are active in school and community service. **Todd and Celesta** lead Cairde Christian Fellowship and **Todd** is active in Sports Ministry. (*Cairde* is Irish for Friends).

Mexico

Jeremy and Betty Smuck, Andrea Byrne, and Edwin and Maria Giron serve in **Aguascalientes**. Our missionaries are leading people to Christ, starting home fellowships and now have two every-month gatherings that combine home groups in a worship service.

Sinaloa, Mexico

We are praying for an applicant who feels called to serve as a career missionary in this ripe harvest field. Pray that God will raise up the right person or couple who will be effective for His glory.

Middle East ministries

Roy Twaddell and his wife **Jinky** are active in starting and nourishing Farsi speaking home groups in Germany, England, and the United States. Pray for more monthly support for them.

Navajos

The Call to Prayer for the Navajos in 2010 bore fruit. The Navajo people are taking ownership of their own ministries. **Bud and Judy Van Meter** are assisting in this transition in a wise and fruitful way. For one more year we are discouraging short-term teams as the Navajos make the transition from a Mission to a growing Friends Church.

Nepal

Under the direction of **Bob and Debbie Adhikary**, the ministry in southern Nepal continues to train evangelists and preachers for many new villages. Eighty people publicly proclaimed Christ at the fall Yearly Meeting, and 27 more at Christmas time. The last report at the time of this writing is that they are being disciplined and standing strong in spite of persecution. The Christmas gatherings were held in 13 different areas. God is giving dynamic growth with four new churches last year and many new preaching points. Road re-building, water buffalos producing milk to support evangelists, and a bridge now under construction are among their development projects.

Nepal

Dr. Samson Retnaraj and his wife **Priscilla** continue to expand Community Health Evangelism and start new churches in western and southern Nepal. God is blessing their ministry with transformed villages and growing churches. Their ministry of Community Health Evangelism (CHE) is both holistic and evangelistic.

Nepal

Poor people come to the city and find Christ, then return home with the gospel to share in their home villages, often isolated. New churches spring up and **John and Sangi Vanlal** find their ministry stretching from east to west across Nepal. Sangi's work in training women in sewing has brought hope and income to many women, and many have come to Christ. Her original students are now teaching the classes in a way that is sustainable.

Since our last report a remarkable miracle took place when two of our village workers prayed for a paralyzed woman. She got up and began to walk much to the amazement of the bystanders. As a result three new villages have Bible studies and show interest in the gospel of our Lord Jesus.

Philippines

Jaime and Lydia Tabingo lead our Friends ministry there. They are reaching out to new islands—Leyte, Samar and Palawan—and adding churches started by students of Jaime in his Bible School teaching years. A new Friends Bible School, called BEST, started in this past year.

Rwanda

David and Debby Thomas are home on furlough this year, living in Newberg, Oregon. **Brad and Chelsea Carpenter** continue to develop the Discipleship for Development emphasis that is producing changed lives. **Brad and Chelsea** are leading the team that includes **Chrissy Muhr, Molly Black** and **Matt and Gayle Denham**. (See above under short-term missionaries.)

Thanksgiving and praise

Our "Hope for the Future" is grounded in the fact that God is on mission and

promises in the Bible that the Great Commission will be fulfilled. We have the privilege of joining Him. Thanks to our crucified-risen-reigning-returning Lord for the momentum we are experiencing. He is carrying us! Our best days are just ahead!

Finance Committee Treasurer's Report

The following information summarizes our activity during 2009 and our proposed activity through 2011. These numbers, while important in their own right, are ultimately an incomplete reflection of the many hours of dedicated work of our Friends Serving Abroad, our board members, committee members, folks working on youth outreach, churches new and old, as well as our Newberg-based staff. As always, a more detailed report, and independent auditors review are available by contacting the Yearly Meeting office.

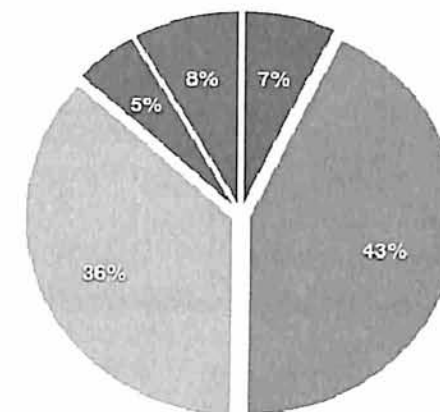
The pie chart labeled "2009 Ministry Income & Transfers" is an overview of all the financial resources used in 2009 to support ministry. This small graph can be correlated directly with the larger "Actual Results" chart. You'll note that we finished 2009 under budget in both income and expense. From an expense perspective, it is nice to finish under budget; from the income point of view, it's not as nice. Local Church Support was down about 2% from the year before, yet this category remains our largest source of income.

Next, the pie chart labeled "2009 Ministry Expense by Board" is an overview of the funds spent by each board in pursuit of their mandate. This graph is also derived from the larger "Actual Results" chart. Expenses in 2009 totaled \$1,348,685, which represents a \$113,562 decrease from 2008. Barring a remarkable turnaround in the economy, I expect to see our expenses remain roughly flat over the next few years, in order to meet reduced expectations in income.

You'll note the use of the terms "Restricted Funds" and "Designated Funds." These terms often get confused, but for our purposes we identify restricted funds as contributions from individual donors who limit the use of their donation to a specific ministry. We honor the donor's wishes and spend these funds only for that restricted purpose. We identify designated funds as those monies the Yearly Meeting has set aside for a particular purpose, but retains the flexibility to change the use of the funds. Endowments are similar to donor restricted funds with the added obligation to spend only a percentage (typically 5%) of the fund annually.

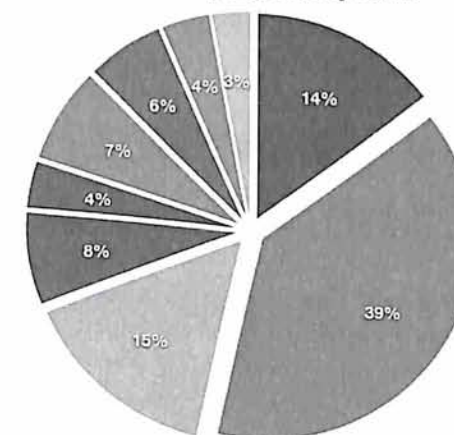

This other organization is now inactive and asked to give the property back to the church. This involved some specific legal procedures which were followed and the lots which are valued by Klamath County for \$13,060 are now back in NWYM ownership.
- c. Title to four parcels of property in Sprague River was held by the Trustees of NWYM or in other forms used in the past. Deeds were executed and recorded by the Trustees to get title to all church property in Sprague River into our correct corporate name which is "Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church."
3. **Olympic View Friends Church property agreement.** At the request of Olympic View Friends Church we negotiated and executed an agreement with Clearwire USA regarding Clearwire's use of a portion of the church property including the location of a wireless internet antenna in the cross on the front of the church. (This kind of transaction has implications regarding exemption from property taxes and potential income

taxes, so any church considering such a transaction should consult the NWYM Trustees before entering into any agreement.)

4. **Rose Valley Friends Church easement.** Title to some Rose Valley property is in the name of NWYM and some is in the name of Rose Valley Friends Church. At the request of Rose Valley Friends Church, we executed an easement regarding the location of a septic system serving the church building.
5. **Survey of Local Church Incorporation and Real Property Ownership.** We completed a survey using both church and public records that show which NWYM local churches are incorporated, the form of their articles of incorporation, and the extent that they comply with the *Faith and Practice* provisions for Incorporation of Local Churches. At the same time we determined whether title to individual church real properties is held by the local church or by NWYM.
6. **Amendment of Articles of Incorporation.** We assisted with the preparation of amendments of the articles of incorporation of one church which will bring the provisions into compliance with the *Faith and Practice*.

NWYM Superintendent's Report

Thank you again, dear Friends, for allowing me the privilege of serving NWYM as superintendent. You are a faithful, loving, and spiritually challenging community. It is a great grace and joy to belong to you and I appreciate you more than you will ever know.

During the 2009 Yearly Meeting sessions, I shared the one word I knew I was supposed to speak as both an admonition and an invitation for us—*deeper*. It was not my word as much as it was one given to me to share. Over the last 12 months, it has been interesting to see how clearly this idea of relocating ourselves and our mission into the heart of Jesus has resonated and, in turn, been reflected in our work and witness.

As you digest the annual board reports, you will notice how hard the boards continue to work for you. The individuals who volunteer their time and energy to NWYM really are committed to being a resource to our local churches and to help us carry out significant ministries, which can be done better together than through any one local fellowship.

Part of my concern, and I see it reflected in the ministry of the boards, is how we might continue to broaden the reach and deepen the impact of Friends. We have a message of great news worth sharing! We have been given a way of life in community—one that is peaceable, just, holy, gener-

ous, grace-filled, integrated—that the world hungers to see and experience! We have been given the Spirit, who makes us more creative, more strong, more wise, more compassionate, and more able than we can even begin to imagine were we left to our own devices. We have been gathered as a people into Jesus Christ, who compels us to continue his work in the world. How are we doing at sharing this message with others? How well are we reflecting that Life in our communities? Are there ways we are quenching the Spirit? Is God's mission truly *our* mission?

I am heartened by several things I see happening throughout NWYM. Our boards and the NWYM Administrative Council are focusing on essential concerns and they continue to improve the way we function together. In many of our local churches, I see you caring for the hurting, and continuing to work at ministering in your communities. New and young people are feeling called to different kinds of ministry. In the past year, we had the largest ever number of Friends students attending George Fox Evangelical Seminary (GFES)—many of whom were supported by Friends Center scholarships. This is exciting—and it means we need to think creatively about new pastoral opportunities and new ministry points where they can live out their call to serve. Over and over, I hear and see a passionate desire to be a people of active faith and real integrity.

Challenges face us, too. The effects of the economic downturn hinder ministry on a personal, local church and yearly meeting level. I see it especially with our boards—good and creative plans have had to be scaled back the last two years because of reduced funding. Despite the discouragement of this, they have adjusted with grace and skill.

I also sense we will be challenged to persevere. Even though most of us know better, some of us are tempted to hold onto the (false) hope that if some “thing” just happens...or we just get some “thing” right, then Friends in NWYM will really take off. Maybe that is true...but I am doubtful. It seems to me that learning to know and obey Jesus, genuinely love and support each other, and continue his ministry in the world is always, and always will be, a daily discipline. It is a discipline requiring our best effort, our fullest attention, and our greatest willingness to work together as Friends, as we rely on God to lead and empower us.

Personally, I see all of this as a great adventure—one that I am excited to be on with you.

Along with the boards, the NWYM staff also continues to serve you well. As most of you are aware, Carole Spencer (NWYM Friends Center director) recently resigned to take a teaching position in Indiana. We will miss her a great deal. I will assume her duties on an interim basis until we have the resources and sense of direction to call her replacement. Gar (and Vicki) Mickelson, our Associate Superintendent of Local Outreach, has elected to move back to North Idaho later this summer. We see this as an experiment and will assess how well this is working, as he continues in his role as an associate superintendent. I appreciate all of the NWYM staff. They are a joy to work with and they are committed to your well-being, growth

and vitality.

As we move into the future, the Sower's Fund becomes an important way we support the work of NWYM. I have a dream of 1000 Friends making an annual contribution of at least \$50 to the support of the Sower's Fund. For the cost of one family dinner out or one fancy latte a month for an individual, we can each become a partner in the future of NWYM through church planting, leadership development, and ministry that broadens and deepens the impact of Friends in the world.

Again, thank you! I am praying our week together will truly help us better "run the race marked out for us" as we come together to "fix our eyes on Jesus!"

A highlight this year has been the Area Spring Rallies. Evangelical Friends Church International Council Director's Report to Northwest Yearly Meeting 2010

Evangelical Friends Church International exists because of its regional directors around the world and the leaders with whom they work.

EFCI-Latin America Region. Sabino Chipana, a pastor and retired railway worker from La Paz, Bolivia, is the Latin American director. Samuel Vasquez from Coahuila state, Mexico, is a sub-director for Mexico and Central America. Sabino is busy planning a youth conference in Bolivia late in 2011 that will host selected youth leaders and workers from all of the various Friends yearly meetings in Bolivia. One of those yearly meetings is the

INELA, the denomination with which NWYM is connected. **The NWYM Board of Global Outreach has pledged a portion of the expenses.** There are hopes that FWCC may contribute also, but most costs will be covered by Bolivians. The primary purpose is to deepen youth commitment and loyalty to Friends.

A pastors' conference for all of Latin American Evangelical Friends was scheduled for Mexico in 2011, but is now more likely to take place in El Salvador in 2012.

EFCI-Africa Region. Simparinka Augustin, superintendent of Rwanda Yearly Meeting, is Africa Director. The largest church groups are found in Burundi, Rwanda and Congo, but there are smaller groups in Uganda and Tanzania that have also affiliated with EFCI-Africa Region. Rwanda Yearly Meeting is beginning plans for a 25th Anniversary celebration in 2012 and the next Africa conference will be held at the same time. Augustin meets annually with representatives from this growing and expanding region. Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM) partners with the three larger groups through the Great Lakes Leadership Training program (GLLT). **NWYM member Lon Fendall is an educational consultant and encourager with GLLT for EFM.** Lon has traveled once or twice a year to Africa for several years and will go again in August of this year. NWYM has been a major supporter of GLLT.

EFCI-Europe Region. Tony Frei, a Hungarian pastor with ties to Evangelical Friends Church – Eastern Region, is the European Director. Small groups of Friends in Ireland, Russia, Serbia, Croatia and Romania are affiliated.

Pastor Frei is hoping for the next Europe Region conference to take place in 2011. In the last two years, Hungarian Friends have suffered a major setback with a large number of Hungarian churches from eastern Hungary withdrawing their affiliation with Friends. Tony Frei leads a vigorous group of churches in southwest Hungary. They continue to plant churches in Hungary and across international borders into Serbia and Croatia. **NWYM members David and Tricia Howell work in Ireland with EFM and Johan and Judy Maurer serve in Russia under NWYM.**

EFCI-Asia Region. Taiwanese Friends leader Derming Duh became the new Regional Director for Evangelical Friends Church—Asia Region in Taipei, Taiwan, April 14-17. Pastor Duh follows the work of John Vanlalhriata from Kathmandu, Nepal, and Jaime Tabingo of the Philippines. In a follow-up letter after the conference, Pastor Duh urged Asian Friends to give attention to their spiritual identity to lead to a greater sense of unity and loyalty to one another across Asia. Cooperative projects should follow naturally, he said. Pastor Duh hopes to visit a number of the Asian fields in the next three years.

Taiwan Yearly Meeting hosted the international gathering along with their own pastors' conference. Gary Colfax from EFC Southwest was complimentary of the Taiwanese hosts. Gary writes, "I was highly impressed with the organization and generosity of the Taiwan Yearly Meeting. Taiwan exemplified what all missionaries look forward to when their ministry is complete: a vibrant, generous national church filled with purpose and an understanding of God's call. Their enthusiasm was electric, and their support and encouragement to the international delegates was refreshing."

Representatives arrived in Taipei from 15 ministries scattered across Southeast Asia. This was the most diverse group of Asian Friends delegates ever to meet. They came from multiple ministries in Bhutan, Cambodia, India (six), Nepal (three), Indonesia, Nepal, Myanmar, Philippines, and Taiwan. Some delegates from Bangladesh, Cambodia, Nepal and Philippines were not able to attend due to either visa difficulties or illness.

The new Executive Committee for Asian Friends is Pastor Derming Duh (Taiwan), Director; Arbiter Geni Simorangkir (Indonesia), vice chairperson; Dr. Samson Retnaraj (Nepal), secretary; Pastor Edwin Daliya (India), treasurer; Rupak Tamang (Bhutan), member-at-large. The conference finished with local tours in the Taipei area and open fellowship time when some of the most significant relationships were built and strengthened.

From the Council Director. Beginning summer 2010, I am officially retired from teaching responsibilities at George Fox University. I am looking forward to the last two years of my tenure with the Evangelical Friends Church International Council, with time to give more attention to leaders and planning. EFCI is a patchwork and network of growth and change. Established yearly meetings in Latin America and Africa are showing healthy growth. EFM and several American yearly meetings pursue strong programs of outreach in a number of nations. **Of all the regions, Asia is worthy of special interest as it multiplies and changes dramatically.**

Thank you, Northwest Yearly Meeting, for your interest and commitment to the body of Christ among Friends around the world. **Being a part of a structured denomination opens a vast array of opportunities for our own spiritual learning plus prayer and giving.** We are immeasurably richer because of these ties.

Friends Center

Friends students

Thirty-five Friends were registered as students at GFES this year, making Friends 10% of the seminary student body. Seven of those were in the Doctor of Ministry Program. Four were from EFC-Eastern Region, the first students from that branch of Friends, taking courses through the new "virtual learning environment." The number of credit hours taken by Friends in master's programs at the seminary has more than doubled from last year—from 173 total credit hours to 386.5 total credit hours (and this does not include DMin courses). In addition seven Friends from area churches took a Friends Center course this year for personal growth and ministry enrichment.

Friends courses

Through the Friends Center, four Friends-specific seminary courses were offered this year: "New Ministry Initiatives" taught by Trey Doty (City's Edge), "Drama in Ministry" taught by Rich Swingle, "History and Polity of the Quaker Movement" taught by Carole Spencer (Reedwood), and "Seminar in Spirituality and Discernment" which could be taken as a seminary course through the Leadership Institute for Group Discernment led by Jan Wood of Good News Associates (North Seattle).

Friends graduates

This year seven Friends students graduated from GFES, the largest number to date. One student, Joe Thouvenal, graduated in December with a Master of Arts in Theological Studies. Joe is program director at Twin Rocks Friends Camp. The other six graduated in May. They are: Brent Bly (Master of Arts in Ministry Leadership; Brent is pastor of Star Friends in Idaho, and is the first Friend to graduate from the new online degree program in the virtual learning environment); Bruce Crawford and Cathy Crawford, husband and wife (Master of Arts in Spiritual Formation; they are currently doing volunteer ministry at Cherry Grove Friends Church and hope to find a position in NWYM as co-pastors); Deborah Powell (Master of Arts in Spiritual Formation; Deborah is the presiding clerk of Eugene Friends); Amy Rasmussen Fisch (Master of Divinity; Amy did her internship at RiversWay and will move to Spokane); and Donann Warren, a member of Reedwood Friends (Spiritual Formation Certificate; Donann teaches Greek as an adjunct instructor at the seminary).

Scholarships

Ten students received Friends Center scholarships for the 2009-2010 academic year. Brent Bly (Star Friends) received the Farmer Family Scholarship; Tim Wenzig (Rosedale) received the Russell and Frances Stands Scholarship; and Brad Tricola (Boise Friends) received the Walter Lee Scholarship. Other scholarship students, Dan Burns (Destiny), Leslie Murray (North Valley), Terry Butcher (Living Waters), Gar Mickelson (NWYM staff),

Cathy Crawford (Cherry Grove), and Marianne Phillips (Clackamas Park) received scholarships from the Pearl Fund.

Five new students will be receiving scholarships for the 2010-2011 academic year. The Friends Center is hoping to reach the \$25,000 endowment for the new Hubert and Vivian Thornburg scholarship by fall.

Other activities

The Friends Center was one of the sponsoring organizations of the Leadership Institute for Group Discernment held at the GFU campus May 17-20, 2010. A number of seminary students participated in the Leadership Institute which they could take for credit as a seminary class.

The Friends Center continued to offer a mid-day once-a-month Quaker Open Worship at the seminary for students and staff, and spiritual direction for students who requested it.

Carole Spencer, director of the Friends Center, for the past two years, has taken a new position as Associate Professor of Christian Spirituality at Earlham School of Religion in Richmond, IN. Colin Saxton will be the interim director for 2010-11.

George Fox University Report

Top Christian college ranking

In August of 2009, *Forbes* ranked George Fox University as one of the top 60 "America's best colleges" and first among Christian colleges in the United States in its 2009-10 college rankings.

George Fox ranked No. 58 overall and No. 12 in the West, and received the highest ranking among institutions in the 110-member Council for Christian Colleges & Universities.

Donations bring university closer to adding football, lacrosse

A combined \$1.2 million lead gift from Brad and Katharine Stoffer and their Boedecker Foundation allowed George Fox University to begin the first phase of construction on the Austin Sports Complex and moved the university closer to adding NCAA Div. III football and women's lacrosse teams.

The multi-use sports complex is to be shared by the university, the Chehalis Park and Recreation District, Newberg High School, local

club teams, and the community. An illustration of the five-field project is available at georgefox.edu/austin-complex/index.html.

In October, the university received confirmation of a \$250,000 matching grant designated for the complex. The grant, from an anonymous Newberg family, will match dollar for dollar raised – up to \$250,000 – toward the new sports complex. The match was successfully reached by the July 1 deadline.

The school also received a \$300,000 donation for the project from Pacific Fibre Products of Longview, Wash., in the spring of 2010. At the university's board meeting in March of 2010, the addition of intercollegiate football and women's lacrosse was made official. The university will begin competition in women's lacrosse in the fall of 2012; football will kick off in the fall of 2013.

National honors

- **Study Abroad:** With more than half of its undergraduates participating in study abroad programs, George Fox University is a national leader in providing international experiences to its students.

About 54 percent of the university's traditional undergraduates study abroad before graduation. According to data compiled by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine for its 2010 "America's Best Colleges" issue, George Fox ranked No. 49 out of approximately 1,400 accredited institutions in the nation in percentage of students studying outside the country.

- **Best in the West:** For the sixth consecutive year, *The Princeton Review* honored George Fox University as one of its "Best in the West" schools in 2009-10. This ranking considers academics, quality of life, admissions selectivity, and financial aid.
- **Washington Monthly:** George Fox was rated second among Christian universities in *Washington Monthly* magazine's annual college rankings in the September/October 2009 issue.
- **Best Religiously Affiliated Colleges:** In Forbes Media's 2010 ranking of "The Best Religiously Affiliated Colleges," George Fox earned a spot among the top 10. The list was comprised of "20 schools that offer quality education and connection to faith," according to Forbes.com.

Record number of applicants

A record number of undergraduate applicants put George Fox Univer-

sity in the unprecedented position of having to create a wait list of students who wish to enroll in the university in fall 2010. As of the first week of May, more than 570 incoming students had paid a deposit – in comparison to the fall of 2009, when George Fox enrolled 518 new students to its undergraduate population.

New programs

- **Servant engineering:** The university's engineering program began requiring students to enroll in a servant engineering course, giving students the opportunity to engage in a variety of service-oriented projects as part of their engineering major. It is the first engineering program in the country to require a servant engineering component in its curriculum, according to Bob Harder, professor of mechanical engineering and chair of George Fox's Department of Mathematics, Computer Science and Engineering.
- **Christian Earthkeeping:** George Fox Evangelical Seminary announced it will add a new concentration, Christian Earthkeeping, to its curriculum beginning in the fall of 2010. The 12-credit regimen of four courses taken over a two-year period is designed to develop evangelical leaders who cultivate the care of creation in their communities.
- **Intercultural Studies Program:** A partnership finalized in June between George Fox Evangelical Seminary and the North American Institute for Indigenous Theological Studies will result in a new theological education program designed for Native North Americans. The first offering will be a master of arts in intercultural studies program, tentatively scheduled to begin in January of 2011.
- **Journalism:** George Fox expanded its undergraduate academic offerings in the fall of 2010 with the addition of a bachelor's degree in journalism. The major will address the seismic changes in journalism and prepare students to be strong journalists in new and emerging media,

Service

- **MLK Day:** For the first time, students and employees at George Fox participated in a Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service, joining more than 1,200 students from 10 other colleges and universities to serve the Portland metropolitan area with acts of volunteerism on Monday, Jan. 18, 2010. The Portland event ties into a national day of service.

- George Fox's **Trauma Response Institute** offered resources to provide support for those who responded to the Jan. 12, 2010, earthquake in Haiti. The institute invited Haitian earthquake responders, including those who served through churches, government agencies, charities and non-government organizations, to engage in information meetings and debriefings free of charge.
- More than 60 students and employees spent their weeklong spring break as part of the university's 19th annual **Spring Serve**. March 21-28, students traveled to Los Angeles and Washington state locations to work on service projects in diverse cross-cultural settings. A team of 17 George Fox students visited Swaziland in May to conduct nearly four weeks of service as part of the university's **May Serve** Christian service program.

Empty Bowls for Haiti

A George Fox fundraising event, "Empty Bowls: A Night for Haiti," raised in excess of \$15,000 April 16 for victims still recovering from the January earthquake that devastated the island country. The event also included a silent auction of art pieces and eBay auctions featuring the ceramic bowls. Partnering in the event were the Associated Student Community and university food service provider Bon Appetit, which donated food for the occasion.

An additional \$3,000 was raised at the university's Mr. Bruin Pageant, a charity talent show that same evening, bringing the total raised for Haiti relief to more than \$18,000.

Special guests

- **John M. Perkins**, president and founder of the John M. Perkins Foundation for Reconciliation and Development and one of the leading evangelical voices to come out of the American civil rights movement, spoke at the university's annual Woolman Peacemaking Forum Feb. 10-11. The forum's theme was "Are We Achieving Racial Justice and Reconciliation?"
- Selah, a one-day Christian seminar for women featuring speakers **Linda Lucas**, **Sarah Thomas Baldwin** and **Bo Stern**, returned to campus for a sixth annual engagement on Saturday, Sept. 26.
- **Dr. Chap Clark**, author of *Hurt: Inside the World of Today's Teenagers* and **Dr. Steve Sherwood**, an assistant professor of youth evangelism and discipleship at George Fox University, were the keynote speakers at the sixth annual Kaleo conference Feb. 20.

- Speaker and author **Shane Claiborne** returned to George Fox University's Newberg campus to speak three times on Monday, March 8.

Murdock grant supports cancer research

George Fox University secured in spring 2010 a \$39,500 life sciences grant that will fund breast cancer research by biology professor John Schmitt and four of the university's undergraduate biology majors. The M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust approved the grant for the project "Vitamin D Regulation in Breast Cancer Cells."
