## MINUTES

### Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

2011

*Monday, July 25, 8:15 a.m.*

1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened its 119th annual sessions on Monday, July 25, 2011 on the campus of George Fox University. The theme for this year's sessions is "In Christ – One People Growing Together." Attendance was estimated at 202.
2. Clerk Tom Stave greeted those in attendance, and introduced Assistant Clerk Lorraine Watson and Recording Clerk Ron Mock.
3. Tom led the meeting in prayer for the sessions this week.
4. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song, after which the meeting worshipped in silence and prayer.
5. Tom welcomed newcomers to yearly meeting, and reviewed the spirit and practicalities of our meeting for business.
6. The following visiting Friends brought greetings: Joe and Jane Snyder, North Pacific Yearly Meeting, Jane also representing Friends World Committee for Consultation.

There are four churches looking for pastors:

Sherwood and Homedale Friends are searching for full-time Pastors, and McKinley Hill is searching for a part-time Pastor. Hayden Friends will be formally opening its search soon.

Colin thanked Assistant Superintendent Gar Mickelson and Kim Felton for their service on the YM staff, which is coming to an end. Kim's replacement as administrative assistant is Krista Maroni. Dick Sartwell is returning to the position of Friends Center Director at George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

8. Colin gave his superintendent's report. His goals for the remainder of his tenure through December include:
  - Preparing to smooth the way for the new superintendent who is slated to begin in January.
  - Helping the Board of Local Outreach gear up for its work without a designated assistant superintendent.
  - Managing the possible return of the Tilikum Retreat Center from George Fox University back to the yearly meeting.
  - Setting up a new financial software system.
  - Continuing to assist congregations and pastors experiencing crises or transitions.
  - Building the Sowers' Fund.
9. Tom expressed appreciation for the Nominating Committee which will bring its full report later in the week.
10. Tom brought a report from the Superintendent's Search Committee, describing the work of that committee formed last November by the Administrative Council to search for a replacement for Colin Saxton. The committee comprised nine members from almost every area in the yearly meeting. The committee met long and often during the first half of 2011, which undertook the task in four stages:
  - Listening to people from a variety of perspectives throughout the yearly meeting,
  - Building relationships within the committee to form a prayerful

community,

- Prayerfully seeking God's direction as it approached its final decision, and
- Following good Quaker process, treating the work as worship, frequently stopping to listen to God's voice until they were confident that God had led them to their decision.

The committee has recommended that Becky Ankeny be named the next yearly meeting superintendent, to take up the position in January 2012. Becky will be available to meet with interested Friends during this week, before the recommendation is formally brought to the floor of the meeting on Wednesday.

11. Anna Baker, member of the Faith and Practice Revision Committee, brought for first reading two proposed amendments to the Faith and Practice. The first proposal is to Section 8.07.01, which currently limits the Trustees to two consecutive terms on the Trustees. The Trustees propose to delete the following sentence:

"Trustees shall not serve more than two consecutive five-year terms; a short term to fill a mid-term vacancy shall not count as a term for this purpose."

This would allow for unlimited terms on the Trustees, as was the case under earlier versions of the Faith and Practice. If the proposal is not approved, four of the five current Trustees will be forced to leave their posts. A message was read from Spokane Friends concerned that the Trustees need to have a way to draw on views and talents from a broad range of the yearly meeting. The proposal was approved for a first reading.

12. The second proposal from the Faith and Practice Revision Committee deals with Section 6.01.01 limiting the membership of any board from one yearly meeting area to five people. The proposal would add to the third sentence of the section the words "or 40% of the total number of members, whichever is larger," which would allow up to seven members from any one area for the larger boards. A message from Spokane Friends encouraged keeping the cap on board membership at five members to encourage geographical diversity in board membership, but encouraged additional area members to serve on subcommittees and mission teams. Ron Stansell does not see the five-member limit as hindering the board of Global Outreach, although that board got a waiver from AC to add a sixth member from an area last year. Julie reported that it is hard to fill boards with members from every Area when the Nominating Committee doesn't have active members from every area. A proposal was made to amend the section's third sentence to read "Area representation will not be required, but no more than 40% of the total number of members may be named to



a board from any one Area.” However, some boards, such as the Board of Communication, have had trouble finding a complete complement of members, and would find it even harder if the cap on membership from a single area is limited to 40%. The meeting discussed making the limit a “recommended” limit rather than a hard limit. The Meeting approved “Area representation will not be required, but it is recommended that no more than 40% of the total number of members will be on a board from any one area.”

13. Paul Almquist, member of the Board of Leadership Development, brought the board’s report. Paul highlighted the Board’s work in mentor training, Focus Conference, spring Pastors’ Conference, small group retreats (which may not be possible under future budget constraints), and revisions in the recording process. Paul urged local meetings to be sure to do something to appropriately recognize newly-recorded ministers from their congregations. In response to a concern about how the recording process relates to the broader concern for leadership development, which can continue after recording is completed, Paul affirmed that the board is concerned for lifelong leadership development, and has programs that address the ongoing development of ministers. The report and ministry plan was approved.

*Monday, July 25, 10:37 a.m.*

14. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song. Attendance was an estimated 230.
15. Frank Engle, director of marketing, and Dennis Russell, executive director, brought a report from Friendsview Retirement Community. Currently 76 recorded Friends ministers and spouses reside at Friendsview, forming about 17% of the community, 19 of whom are getting assistance to pay their costs. At the moment Friendsview cannot add more people to this program unless funds can be raised to support the program. Dennis Russell reported that he will be leaving his post as executive director. He shared his appreciation for Friends decision processes, which tried his patience when he first encountered it in his work with Friendsview, but which he now believes lead to better and more effective decisions. He described how Friends ethos still pervades Friendsview’s work as the residential population has diversified in recent years.
16. Tom read a minute of greeting from Moscow (Russia) Friends Meeting, brought to us by Johan Maurer.
17. Shawn Leonard, co-clerk of the Board of Christian Education and Discipleship brought that board’s report. The board has started a webpage

(to be completed by the Board of Communication) to help communicate its mission and programs. Shawn has visited several congregations around the yearly meeting, and has noted a range of diversity among the various meetings. The board’s appreciation dinner will be held Tuesday evening. The board will continue its relationship with Barclay Press, whose materials are recommended for congregations in the yearly meeting. Arthur Roberts’ pamphlet “The People Called Quakers” has been translated into Spanish by Hernan Diaz, and will be published by Barclay Press. Cherice Bock, clerk of the BCED subcommittee on peace education, will be promoting a peace education month in January on the theme of SPICE (Simplicity, Peace, Integrity, Community Equality) and will make materials available to support local meetings’ programs during peace education month. The subcommittee will be holding a session this week on the peace education month project. These reports and ministry plans were approved by the meeting.

18. Arden Kinser, clerk of the Board of Congregational Care, brought its report. The board offers marriage support seminars, discernment process resources for local congregations and discernment training, “Love and Logic” parenting trainings, and two Share Calls to support local congregations. Arden highlighted the board’s efforts to improve its communication with local congregations so it can tailor its work most effectively to meet their needs. The report and ministry plan was approved by the meeting.
19. Becky Ankeny, clerk of the Board of Elders, brought its report. She thanked the members of the board for their service over the last year. She reported on the Elders’ support for Colin’s work with local churches, and on the ongoing disciplining and care process for Bruce Bishop, whose recording as a minister was suspended last year. The report was approved by the meeting.
20. Several Friends involved with traveling ministries reported. Ken Comfort reported on a traveling ministry to Kenya, Africa, to take part in the celebration of the life of the late John Wanjala. Ron Stansell reported on his ministry in Congo, Rwanda and Burundi over the last year. Congo, as a remote yearly meeting with 4000 – 5000 members in eastern Congo, was mentioned as worthy of special prayer support. Paul Anderson ministered in Manila, Philippines, with Friends from Philippines, Indonesia, and India. Colin Saxton spoke at a pastors conference with 800 attenders from Uganda and the Kenyan Yearly Meetings, and visited schools and hospitals in Kenya. Colin will be speaking at Rocky Mountain yearly meeting, where several NWYM members are helping strengthen that small yearly meeting. Dan Cammack will be visiting Peru Yearly Meeting to celebrate its 50th anniversary. Vern Barnett reported on his visit two



years ago at Katmandu Friends Church, and his ministry with refugees in Boise. Gar Mickelson reported on his work, with others, ministering to skateboarders. Tom and Vicki Stave brought greeting from Copenhagen Friends Meeting in Sweden.

21. Tom reported that the Administrative Council has undertaken a special effort to encourage prayer for one another within the yearly meeting, including publishing prayer needs and pairing congregations as prayer partners.

*Tuesday, July 26, 8:17 a.m.*

22. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song and silence. Tom led in vocal prayer. Attendance was estimated at 220.
23. Tom expressed the meeting's gratitude for the unprecedentedly mild weather so far this week.
24. Rae Lawrence from North Pacific Yearly Meeting brought greetings from NPYM and from Honduran Friends.
25. Tom reported that Lorraine Watson would be leaving her role as assistant clerk at the end of the week, and Ron Mock's term as recording clerk also expires then. He and the meeting expressed their gratitude for these clerks' service.
26. Judy Woolsey, clerk of the Board of Communication, brought the board's report. She directed Friends' attention to excerpts from 36 epistles from Friends around the world printed in the yearly meeting reports pamphlet. In addition to its website, NWYM has a Facebook account maintained by Eric Muhr. Print versions of the Connection are still being produced for those without internet access, but next year some issues will be published only on-line to reduce costs. Yearly Meeting Communications Coordinator Joel Bock invited Friends needing communications help to contact him at the YM office. The Epistle Committee this year will be Gil George (the younger), Delonna Halliday and Elizabeth Price. The board's report and ministry plan was approved.
27. Bill Moormann, clerk of the Board of Local Outreach, brought the board's report. Bill explained how rowing is a beautiful sport, but how it's possible for a rower to be launched out of the boat if something goes wrong. The loss of Gar Mickelson as assistant superintendent for local outreach due to budget issues has thrown the Board of Local Outreach off its rhythm and some of its momentum. The board hasn't lost its calling, commitment or passion, but will need the next few months to adjust how it operates. The

Board of Local Outreach report and ministry plan was approved by the meeting.

28. Hernan Diaz, a candidate for recording as a Friends minister, shared his testimony. He had been active as a Baptist when opportunities opened for him to minister with Northwest Yearly Meeting. He told how relationships with Colin Saxton, Bill Moormann, Ken Comfort and Mark Kelley drew him toward the Friends and mentored him in ministry and the ways of Friends. Hernan reported that his father became an evangelical Christian in Venezuela in the 1960's. Hernan grew up in the church there, studying the Bible with his older sister every evening. He came to the US to attend seminary, graduating from Fuller Seminary 1994. He pastored a Baptist Church in East Los Angeles for two years before moving with his brother Angel to Florida to start a church there. When Angel was called to Newberg, Hernan moved in 1998 to New York to help start a Baptist congregation there, including ministering in the aftermath of 9/11. During this time he began supporting himself through working as a math teacher, which he continued after moving to Washington state in 2005. Hernan expressed his commitment to Quaker doctrines of peace, equality and simplicity, along with a special concern for prayer and meditation as spiritual disciplines. He shared his dream of having Hispanic churches linked to every Anglo church in the yearly meeting, with community centers for the local Hispanic communities, and a program at George Fox Evangelical Seminary preparing people for Hispanic ministry. Tom led the meeting in a prayer of blessing for Hernan. Tom announced that the meeting will be asked to consider approving Hernan's recording later in the week after the Board of Elders has completed its consideration of all the candidates for recording.
29. Vicki Stave, clerk of the Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry, brought the board's report. She shared a video titled "Bible Quizzing: High Adventure in the Pacific Northwest." The board's goal is to make every NWYM church a quizzing church, requiring at least three middle school or high school team members and an adult coach. Bible Quizzing, Samuel School, Yearly Meeting, Midwinter Retreat, and the summer camps all have had growing numbers – Tween Camp even had a waiting list. Vicki shared anecdotal evidence that the youth have developed a strong sense of identification with the yearly meeting. The meeting approved the board's report and ministry plan.
30. Julie Peyton, clerk of the Nominating Committee, brought the committee's initial report. She reported that the committee needs representatives from the Inland, Southern Idaho, and Newberg areas. At Midyear Boards the following Friends were approved in these posts:

Julie will submit a final version of the Nominating Committee's report for approval later in the week.

31. Robin Baker, president of George Fox University, brought its report. He quoted from the original college catalog a statement of commitment to being a "distinctly Christian" institution, which still describes the university's commitment. The university is exploring new connections in India, with President Baker just returning yesterday from a trip there.

Chuck Conniry, vice president and dean of George Fox Evangelical Seminary, reported that the Seminary's Doctor of Ministry has begun a Global Leadership track, with students meeting all over the world, never meeting in North America until they come for graduation. Program innovations include Leadership and Spiritual Formation, Christian Earth Keeping, Indigenous Theological Studies for Native North Americans, and the Ministry in Contemporary Culture speaker series. Enrollments at the seminary have been growing steadily, and currently total 379 students, which has resulted in the seminary generating revenues in excess of direct and indirect costs over the last three years for the first time since the seminary merged with George Fox College in 1996.

Clint Baldwin, director of the Center for Peace and Justice, described the center's efforts to show undergraduate students from a wide variety of denominational backgrounds how peacemaking fits into the Christian gospel. He highlighted this year's Steinfeldt Peace Scholars Mikaela Alexander, Emily-Grace Cropper, Daniel Golden, Anna Johnson, Jeannette Edel, and Evan Dahl. The center conducted about 30 events over the last year to help students and others see how peacemaking can be defused throughout believers' lives. Clint has just returned from Burundi where he helped lead a peacemaking conference there. The university is opening new overseas programs in Romania and Lithuania.

Jamie Johnson, director of the Friends Leadership Program, reported that 22 new Friends students are expected this fall, which will increase the total Friends population to 80, up from 65 two years ago. The Friends Scholarship is being increased from \$2500 to \$3000 annually, starting in the fall of 2012. Friends students travelled to Haverford College to meet other Friends students from around the country. Friends students are serving at Twin Rocks, in local churches and on campus. Friends students come from Oregon, Idaho, Washington, California and Colorado.

GFU Board member Gordon Crisman reported from the Board perspective its deep appreciation for the connection to Northwest Yearly Meeting. He praised Robin Baker and the university administration for representing the university well locally, around the country, and internationally.



Ralph Beebe, 1954 alum of the university, noted that the Friends student population now is almost exactly what it was when he graduated (when the total enrollment was 98 students).

32. Tom Stave reported the following members of the George Fox University Board of Trustees have been nominated to another three-year term: David Anderson, Don Carter, Chuck Mylander, Barbara Palmer, and Kent Thornburg. Raymond Cheung and Adam Puckett were nominated as new members of the board. Mylander, Palmer, Thornburg and Puckett are Friends. Tom reported that, with these nominees, the Board will comply with requirements that 4/7 of the board be members of Friends churches, and that 2/3 of the Friends be members of NWYM. These nominees were approved by the meeting.

*Tuesday, July 26, 10:31 a.m.*

33. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song. Attendance was estimated at 215.
34. Lorraine Watson, Leann Williams, and Sharon Hayden shared a message they felt God had laid on their hearts. They reported that the Administrative Council, charged by the yearly meeting in 2009 with dealing with concerns about whether consumption of alcohol was consistent with Friends faith and practice, received reports that last year's discussion of the issue was painful for people on both sides of the issue. It seemed to the AC that the yearly meeting needs to lay a better foundation for discussing difficult issues, by building stronger relationships among Friends, and by practicing gentle, tenderhearted, and forbearing habits of speaking and listening. The AC has set aside time this week for small groups to get to know each other better and practice the kind of communication that will allow us to deal with difficult issues. The meeting was dismissed so Friends could go to their small groups.

*Wednesday, July 27, 8:17 a.m.*

35. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song and prayer, followed by a time of silence and a vocal prayer by Tom Stave. Attendance was estimated at 247.
36. The meeting approved recording Hernan Diaz as a Friends minister.
37. Ron Stansell, interim clerk of the Board of Global Outreach, brought the board's report. He announced that Linda Grimms has been named as the board's clerk. The board has thirty subcommittee members beyond the eighteen board members, serving on eight subcommittees. Ron

highlighted the board's work to implement a business-as-mission model in northern Africa; and challenges the board faces in discerning how best to do short-term missions and improve its understanding of peace and justice issues faced by Friends serving abroad. He also mentioned the budgetary challenges that leave the board about \$50,000 short from being able to accomplish all its priorities. With the end of the Neiferts' work in Israel, the board is considering what our next calling is in that region. The board's report and ministry plan was approved.

38. Dan Cammack brought a report from Evangelical Friends Missions. Chuck Mylander is finishing his tenure as director of EFM after 10 years. Lon Fendall is a member of the search committee looking for his replacement. He reported that EFM has nine mission fields: Aguascalientes, Mexico; Philippines, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Nepal, Rwanda, West Bengal (India), Ireland, and the Navajo nation. Nineteen of the 54 EFM missionaries are from Northwest Yearly Meeting. Dan discussed some of the challenges for the yearly meeting of supporting Friends serving abroad both directly, and through EFM. These include how to keep EFM missionaries from feeling like second-class missionaries when they visit the yearly meeting, and the ways that EFM allows the yearly meeting to extend its work to more areas in cooperation with other yearly meetings.
39. Ron Stansell is director of the Evangelical Friends Church International Council. This is the second-largest international Friends organization, with over 170,000 regular attendees of member churches, plus another 30,000 - 50,000 others who regularly participate in EFC-Latin America events. EFCI has regional conferences in Africa, Europe, Asia, Latin America and North America. We will be sending Angel Diaz to the EFCI youth conference in Bolivia in November. EFC Europe will have a conference in Hungary in 2012, to which Ron will go as our representative.
40. Brendon Connelly, NWYM Director of Finance and Development, reported that the 2010 yearly meeting budget saw a 6% decline in local church support, while expenses grew 6%. Brendon reported that an error, involving double counting Sower's Fund income in 2011 and 2012 initial budgets, was caught by the Administrative Council this spring, which required budgets to be revised downward. So far 2011 income and expenses are compatible with the revised budget.

Local church support was budgeted at \$678,000 in 2007, but came in at \$612,715. The 2008 projection was for \$682,500, but came in at \$617,091. Since then the AC has been more conservative in projecting local church support, so gaps have been smaller, although each year local church support has not met budget targets. In 2011 local church support is budgeted at \$585,000, compared to \$563,355 received in 2010. For the



proposed 2012 budget local church support is set at \$579,252.

The 2011 budget calls for a draw on the Ministry Fund of 8% of its assets, a rate that is higher than sustainable and will, over time, exhaust the Fund. When income falls short, the yearly meeting can either draw even more on the Ministry Fund or it can spend less. The Administrative Council has established a policy that will stair-step the draw from the Ministry Fund back down to 5%, a level generally deemed sustainable, by 2015.

The meeting approved the report, and the proposed 2012 budget.

41. Don Walters, a candidate for recording as a Friends minister, shared his testimony. His grandfather was a missionary to Taiwan, where his mother grew up. As a childhood victim of abuse by a person he had trusted, Don went through a period of alienation from God. When he was 14 he met Mary, who was 12, and whose deep faith touched him. At age 16, Don met God at a prayer meeting. This led to reconciliation with his parents, and after he finished university, marriage to Mary. Don was led to return to school at George Fox Evangelical Seminary, where he encountered Friends and began attending Tigard Community Friends Church. Soon he began working with the youth ministry there, at first as a volunteer, which he has done for 15 years now. He finished his graduate degree in Pastoral Counseling, has two teenage children, and has been a foster parent. The meeting approved recording Don's call as a Friends minister.
42. Leslie Murray, a candidate for recording as a Friends minister, shared her testimony. When her family moved to Eugene when she was 13, they visited Eugene Friends, where the family was made welcome and was drawn to "Pastor Clyde." Nancy Almquist became her mentor during 8th grade, Tom and Vicki Stave fed her suppers and demonstrated the wonders of a good compost pile. At age 15 she counseled at girls camp at Clyde Parker's urging, and discovered what ministry meant. When Leslie was an undergraduate at George Fox, Retha McCutchen worked with her to help her see the possibility of her own call to ministry, and Shawn McConaughy encouraged her to continue working with youth at North Valley Friends. She began seminary training at the encouragement of Bruce Bishop, and connected there with Carole Spencer, confirming her sense of calling to the ministry. The meeting approved recording Leslie's call as a Friends minister.
43. Colin Saxton brought a report of his work as interim director of the Friends Center at George Fox Evangelical Seminary. When the Friends Center was founded ten years ago there was a shortage of people interested in Friends ministry. Now 40 Friends students are part of the center, about 10% of the Seminary's enrollment. New scholarships support Friends

seminary students. In the last year the center sponsored special courses or programs on social justice ministry and discernment. In the coming year the center will have courses on Christian peacemaking, Friends history and doctrine, what it means to be a Friends pastor, and intentional interim ministry in times of transition. Dick Sartwell, the original director of the center, will be returning to that role this year.

The meeting heard and approved the 2011 Youth Yearly Meeting Epistles, reproduced in Appendix B to these minutes.

47. Clerk Tom Stave reported on the process of discernment that led to the nomination of Becky Ankeny to be the next superintendent of the yearly meeting. He highlighted the findings of the Superintendent Search Committee that Becky brings a wealth of experience to the position from her background as a teacher; an experienced oral and written minister of the Word, including as pulpit supply at many congregations around the yearly meeting, and an interim pastor; chair of the board for Friendsview Retirement Community; clerk of the Board of Elders; skilled in conflict resolution and interpersonal counseling; and deep familiarity with and commitment to the yearly meeting. The meeting heard from many who testified to their sense of affirmation of Becky's calling, and appreciation for her ministry. There was an expression of unease about whether Becky would bring to her work an appropriately strong view of Scripture. Many testified to her reliance on Scripture as an authoritative teacher of faith and practice, and source of guidance from the Holy Spirit, and her lifelong pattern of submission to its correction. The discussion was long and tender. After a time of silence, the meeting approved Becky's appointment as yearly meeting superintendent.
48. While we waited for Becky to join us, Tom shared his recipe for good compost: equal parts soil, dry organic matter, and fresh green nitrogen-rich material, wetted to the consistency of a wrung-out sponge.
49. Becky joined the meeting. She spoke briefly, affirming Christ as the head of the Church, the Church as a priesthood of all believers, and that all are both children and ministers of God. She thanked the yearly meeting for expressing confidence in her and asked for its prayers.

*Thursday, July 28, 8:16 a.m.*

50. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song, followed by silent worship. Attendance was estimated at 165.
51. Tom Stave shared that the home of the Looper family (Talent Friends) was destroyed in a fire and led the meeting in prayer for them.
52. Jim Fields, a candidate for recording as a Friends minister, shared his testimony. He shared from Scripture verses of hope amid suffering. Jim was born into a non-Christian family in West Virginia. His parents divorced when he was four. His stepfather was abusive and a criminal.

When his father died, Jim was made a ward of the state and sent to an orphanage. There he was introduced to God. He joined the Navy and saw action in Vietnam. He married Judy, and years later moved to the Rogue River Valley, where the Fields began attending Talent Friends. As they drew closer to God there, Jim grew into several ministry roles, including pastor at Talent Friends, and police chaplain in Medford. Jim testified to God's provision, keeping him safe and putting various ministers in his life at crucial times, including his current Pastor Mark Burton at Medford Friends. The meeting approved recording Jim's call as a Friends minister.

53. Clerk Tom Stave directed the meeting's attention to the proposed changes in Faith and Practice that were approved as first reading on Monday. The first proposal, to Section 8.07.01, eliminates the requirement that the Trustees not serve more than two consecutive terms by deleting the sentence:
- "Trustees shall not serve more than two consecutive five-year terms; a short term to fill a mid-term vacancy shall not count as a term for this purpose."

This proposal was approved by the meeting without further discussion.

54. The second proposal approved as first reading on Monday, to Section 6.01.01, would transform the current requirement that membership of a board from a single area be limited to five members into a recommendation that "no more than 40% of the total number of members" of each board would be from any one area. After some discussion of whether the limitations are needed, and whether there are other methods available to achieve greater diversity in board membership, Tom asked the meeting to approve delaying second reading of this minute until next year, asking the Faith and Practice Revision Committee to prayerfully discern how to treat this requirement. This was approved by the meeting.
55. Assistant Clerk Lorraine Watson reminded the meeting that the purpose of this year's emphasis on community building is intended to help strengthen relationships in the yearly meeting to build our capacity to best manage conflict for God's purposes. Friends were excused to join their birth-month small groups.

*Thursday, July 28, 10:31 a.m.*

56. Nate Macy led the meeting in worship in song, followed by silent worship. Attendance was estimated at 175.
57. Roger Button, a candidate for recording as a Friends minister, shared his testimony. He met God for the first time as an eight-year-old who needed



rescuing from a swimming pool. After a time of wandering in college, the redemptive Christ redeemed him. He was called into ministry, first with the Church of Christ. After meeting Friends, especially during his studies at George Fox Evangelical Seminary, he was drawn to the Friends. The meeting approved recording Roger's call as a Friends minister.

58. Julie, clerk of the Nominating Committee, described how it turns the compost heap every year to find the people God is leading to serve on yearly meeting boards and committees. The committee brought forward the following nominations:

59. Paul Anderson, member of the Faith and Practice Revision Committee, described the proposed changes to the Historical Statement. Others were intended to clarify meanings. The meeting approved as a second reading the changes reproduced in Appendix C.
60. Gil George, clerk of the Epistle Subcommittee, working with Delonna Halliday and Elizabeth Price, presented the 2011 Yearly Meeting epistle. The Epistle was approved with some editing recommendations, resulting in the version reproduced in Appendix C.
61. Clerk Tom Stave thanked the many volunteers and staff that make our yearly meeting sessions possible.
62. The 2011 Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends adjourned to meet in midyear sessions, January 27-28, 2012, and July 22-26, 2012, in its annual session.

## APPENDIX A HISTORICAL STATEMENT NWYM Faith and Practice

### HISTORICAL STATEMENT

#### The Early Movement

The Friends Church (Quaker) arose from a movement of Christian renewal that began in England during the seventeenth century. The major leader of this renewal was George Fox, who as a sensitive youth experienced cold formalism and power politics in the church and was repulsed by empty pleasure seeking outside the church. Young Fox studied the Bible and longed for an authentic faith to match its Christian message. This longing remained unfulfilled, even frustrated, by human counselors until he looked beyond them. Then he discovered One who could (as phrased in Fox's Journal) "speak to thy condition," and he reported that his heart "did leap for joy."

George Fox found this experience with the living Christ so compelling that he quickly told others about it. He shared the good news that Christ could free persons from the guilt and power of sin. To this message people responded eagerly. They were seekers, disillusioned by dry and formal religion, and they were attracted to the warm, evangelical message preached by this earnest young messenger. Scores of young men and women were "raised up of the Lord" for a ministry across England and beyond. Known as the "valiant sixty," they proclaimed that Christ could be experienced in the present, not just read about in the Bible or remembered through ritual observance. This is how George Fox perceived his ministry:

Now I was sent to turn people from darkness to the light that they might receive Christ Jesus, for to as many as should receive him in his light, I saw that he would give power to become the sons of God, which I had obtained by receiving Christ. And I was to direct people to the Spirit that gave forth the Scriptures, by which they might be led into all Truth. . . I was to turn them to the grace of God, and to the Truth in the heart, which came by Jesus, that by this grace they might be taught, which would bring them into salvation. . .

—Journal, Nickalls edition, Cambridge, 1952, p. 34

George Fox explained grace in terms of the Light of Christ, using the terms found in the Gospel of John. By this inward light, said Fox, people can understand Jesus Christ as "their Saviour and Redeemer, who shed his blood and died for them, who is the way to God, the truth and life." (Journal, pp. 225-6)



The Quaker Awakening constitutes one of the great revivals within Christianity. Particularly significant was its challenge to official religion. The first Friends believed that religious monopolies, whether Protestant or Catholic, weakened the Christian faith and fostered unspiritual, time-serving ministry. Therefore they urged freedom of religion, trusting the power of the Lord, rather than civil coercion, to advance the Gospel. Friends were a people gathered to Christ, communing with God in vital worship and fellowship, witnessing the good news of Christ's Kingdom in a world shattered by civil and religious conflict. Their message met resistance. Thousands suffered imprisonment, and hundreds died for religious freedom.

These Christians first referred to themselves as "publishers of Truth," "children of the Light," or "the camp of the Lord." Gradually they came to prefer the term "Friends" in accordance with Jesus' words: "You are my friends if you do whatever I command" (John 15:12-15). Their critics dubbed these enthusiastic Christians "Quakers," a nickname that has become a symbol of integrity rather than a term of derision.

Friends used the word "church" to describe the people of God, not the building in which the people met. "Meetinghouse" became their word for the building in which the church gathered to worship. About a century after the movement began, the term "Society of Friends" came into general use. At that time the word "society" conveniently distinguished Friends and other legal but dissenting groups from the established Church of England. In the twentieth century, however, because of confusion about the term "society" and a desire to recover the biblical term for the gathered people of God, "Friends Church" became the preferred term in some yearly meetings, including Northwest Yearly Meeting.

The Quaker Awakening constituted a fast-growing missionary movement during its earliest decades. People in England joined by the thousands. Within a few years Friends became a major force in Colonial North America. People welcomed a Christianity freed from state authority and priestly ritual. They were drawn to an emphasis upon Christ's inward baptism with the Holy Spirit and the Quaker concern for practical holiness.

### The Developing Church

The Friends teaching about the real and sanctifying presence of Christ with His people resulted in strong ethical testimonies. These included support for religious and political freedom, opposition to slavery and civil bondage, just relationships with aboriginal and minority persons, honesty in business, humane and remedial treatment of offenders, compassionate care of the mentally ill, and aid to war victims and others in distress.

Friends opposed war and practiced peacemaking. They took their

standards from the New Testament and from the example of Christian pacifism during the early Christian centuries. Quakers urged Christians to use the weapons of the Holy Spirit rather than the weapons of violence, believing such a choice to be both right and practical. They emphasized a single standard for truth, rejecting legal oaths out of faithfulness to the express command of Christ (Matt. 5:33-36).

These ethical testimonies produced significant results. Religious freedom is now widely acknowledged as basic to the social good. Oppression by courts has diminished. The right to conscientious objection to war has been widely supported by religious bodies and honored in many nations. Over the years the Quakers have often served as the conscience of the Church. Such moral leadership has sometimes been a heavy burden. Friends have not always lived up to their reputation. Sometimes they became preoccupied with ethical concerns to the neglect of evangelistic proclamation. At other times, in reaction to this burden, or to their own legalism, they became preoccupied with evangelism to the neglect of social testimonies.

It is sometimes forgotten that early Friends had a vision to evangelize the world at a time when most Protestants had not awakened to missionary responsibility. The first Quaker efforts may have lacked organization, but they did display a global vision. This missionary vision waned during the decades of colonizing in the New World, although there was some outreach to Native Americans. In the late nineteenth century the missionary expansion resumed, and Friends missionary endeavors have been the most significant factor in the growth of the Quaker movement over the last century.

Quakers first organized their local gatherings for worship into regional clusters called "yearly meetings." In Europe the first yearly meetings were in England (London) and Ireland (Dublin). In the colonies, the yearly meetings of New England, North Carolina, Philadelphia, New York (1695), and Baltimore came into being. With the westward migrations of the nineteenth century, new groups became established across North America.

William Penn's colony in the New World is the most widely known example of colonial Christian outreach. For seventy years the Quakers sought to make Pennsylvania a society embodying Christian values. The colony became a haven for oppressed persons and an example of respectful relationships with the Indian nations. But the French and Indian War brought such pressures to compromise their convictions that in 1755 the Quakers relinquished control of the colony.

A retreat from worldly affairs followed. This era in Friends history was marked by plain dress, silent worship, moral scrupulosity, and rigorous church discipline. Although their evangelistic outreach diminished, their social concerns did not. In their persistent and Spirit-led opposition to slavery, John Woolman of America and William Allen of England illustrate the quietist period at its best.



In the westward migrations the colonizing tendency persisted until twentieth century urbanization changed the pattern. Quaker centers were reinforced by the establishment of schools, the preservation of a distinctive lifestyle, and a strong sense of community. These communities sustained ethical standards but tended to isolate members from spiritual renewals around them.

During the nineteenth century two major separations took place. The first caused serious divisions. The orthodox party emphasized biblical authority and the historical aspects of salvation, and the liberal party (Hicksite Friends) emphasized individual conscience and the inward aspects of religion. Later in the century differences arose within the orthodox party concerning the appropriateness of planned worship and ministry. The Wilburites (Conservative Friends) wanted to preserve the quietist tradition of immediate spiritual guidance; the Gurneyites (Orthodox Friends) wanted to acknowledge biblical and rational preparation for ministry under the Spirit's guidance. The latter position proved to be more successful in accommodating Quakerism to a westward moving, pioneering North America.

After the Civil War, touched by revivals that swept North America, Friends rekindled their banked fires of evangelism and joined other Christians in new evangelistic forms. Revival meetings with singing and altar calls characterized the new mode of outreach. Traveling ministers became settled ministers; and thus arose the pastoral system, which would become prevalent among American Quakers. Rapid growth occurred during the latter decades of the nineteenth century. To coordinate growth and to articulate Quaker faith and practice, several uniting conferences were held. Widely representative, these conferences led to programs of missionary outreach to Mexico, Africa, Alaska, the Caribbean, India, China, and Japan. Twelve North American yearly meetings established a delegate organization, the Five Years Meeting, in 1902, each affirming their bonds of spiritual unity by approving a significant document, the 1887 Richmond Declaration of Faith.

This unity was broken by a modernist-fundamentalist rift in American Protestantism between World Wars I and II. Polarization developed between those who stressed evangelism and doctrinal essentials and those who stressed humanitarian concerns and doctrinal liberty. This rift affected Friends also. In 1926 Northwest Yearly Meeting (then called Oregon Yearly Meeting) withdrew from the Five Years Meeting (now called Friends United Meeting). In several other yearly meetings withdrawals occurred, or disaffected evangelicals formed association with fragmented Protestants (particularly Wesleyan). Loyalty to Quaker connections and testimonies became weakened as a result of these schisms. During these decades Protestant liberalism dominated the churches of Europe and North America, and Evangelical Friends found themselves at odds with these tendencies along with other conservative Christians. At the same time, Evangelical Friends have opposed the more militaristic and fundamentalist tendencies of conservative Christians, calling for closer adherence to the teachings and example of Jesus.

## Friends in the World Today

The evangelical-modernist polarities have continued in various forms, with liberal theology remaining the characteristic stance in Europe, Britain, and some parts of the Americas. But in the latter decades of the twentieth century, the pendulum swung the other way for much of North America and the world. Evangelicalism became more definitive, offering strong leadership in the United States and beyond. Various theological movements following World War II helped Quakers also recover a more historic and traditional theology, with evangelistic fervor and social concern becoming more often paired than polarized. Several movements for spiritual renewal bore fruit in membership gains, in the enrichment of spiritual life, and in doctrinal clarity. Scholarly research and writing reaffirmed for contemporary application the Christ-centered, prophetic character of the early Quaker Awakening. Since 1959 the journal *Quaker Religious Thought* has provided a useful scholarly forum for such concerns.

The middle 20th century saw a reunion of five yearly meetings divided in the 1820s during the Hicksite-Orthodox separations. As yearly meetings in New England, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Canada reunited, four of the five new yearly meetings came to share joint membership in Friends United Meeting and Friends General Conference. While the reunion of Friends within these yearly meetings was welcomed, it also created a new set of tensions within the larger bodies, as more conservative Friends felt FGC was too liberal, and more liberal Friends felt FUM was too conservative. This led to a realignment effort in the 1990s, causing FUM to reaffirm its commitments to biblical authority and the centrality of Christ, although Southwest Yearly Meeting withdrew from FUM and joined EFI during the process. Most FUM meetings are pastoral, and most FGC meetings are unprogrammed.

Over the last century or more, the emergence of Evangelical Friends has been one of the most significant developments within the history of Quakerism since its inception. From the revivalist movement after the Civil War emerged a vital form of pastoral Quakerism. In the sending out of missionaries to the majority world, the size of the movement has more than doubled. In joining together with like-minded Evangelical Friends, new vitality has emerged in terms of identity and outreach. As a result, the Association of Evangelical Friends, meeting triennially from 1947 until 1970, restated the evangelical character of Quaker beginnings. This movement gave rise to the Evangelical Friends Alliance (EFA), formed in 1965 by four independent yearly meetings, including Northwest Yearly Meeting, Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region, Mid-America Yearly Meeting, and Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting. In 1989 EFA was instrumental in the formation of Evangelical Friends International (EFI) within five global regions: Asia, Africa, Latin America, Europe, and North America. It is now called Evangelical Friends Church International (EFCI). EFCI-Southwest and Alaska Yearly Meeting



joined EFCI-North America in the 1990s. Regionalism has been reduced for these Friends, as they have cooperated in missions, publications, education, social concerns, youth work, and evangelism.

National pastors' conferences have brought together American ministers from both Friends United Meeting and Evangelical Friends Church International. Various regional and world youth gatherings have strengthened Quaker identity. The All Friends Conference at St. Louis in 1970 became a catalyst for renewal for a generation. The subsequent Faith and Life movement, with its various conferences and study materials, had similar results, and the 1985 World Gathering of Young Friends held in Greensboro, North Carolina, created new sets of dialogues across divisions among the worldwide Friends movement. The publications and visiting ministry of the New Foundation movement have also brought spiritual renewal, especially to non-pastoral Friends. The Friends Educational Council and the Friends Association of Higher Education have facilitated spiritual concern for Friends schools. The Friends World Committee for Consultation, begun in 1937, has been used by the various yearly meetings for exchanging information and effecting dialogue. Its regional and periodic world conferences have enhanced mutual understanding, clarified differences, reduced provincialism, deepened spirituality, and opened the way for a more global Friends witness. Northwest Yearly Meeting became an affiliate member of FWCC in 2002.

Tension points remain within the larger Quaker movement, however, as doctrinal differences range along the full theological spectrum. Some Friends consider themselves fundamentalist Christians of various sorts, while others assert that one need not become a Christian, or even a believer in God, to be a Quaker. Obviously, these differences pose real obstacles to affiliation and cooperation between different groups of Friends. Worldwide, most Friends are Christ-centered and evangelical, but some meetings and yearly meetings seek to embrace divergent beliefs and practices. Differences along lines of political, moral, and social stands also make spiritual unity difficult. In some ways the older churches find renewal from younger Quaker groups in Latin America, Africa, and Asia, which have encountered less polarity between doctrinal beliefs and social witness than do Friends in North America.

As of 2010, more than three quarters of the more than 500,000 Friends in the world are persons of non European origin. Counting Friends of all persuasions, the largest grouping of Friends is found in Africa (over 350,000 in Kenya and East Africa; over 60,000 in Burundi and Rwanda), followed by North America (over 95,000) and Latin America (over 30,000 in Bolivia and Peru, 30,000 in Guatemala and Honduras, and 10,000 elsewhere) and Asia (about 20,000). Latin American yearly meetings have begun to engage in their own missionary outreach, as have Friends in Burundi, Taiwan, and elsewhere. Kenyan Friends continue to develop new organizational structures to accommodate their growth, now numbering 15 yearly meetings. Friends in Burundi and Rwanda have experienced terrible hardship during recent civil

wars, but this and other forms of testing have also strengthened the churches.

Evangelical Friends Mission is a mission agency of EFCI/North America, and some Friends outside North America have developed their own mission agencies. Parallel to early Friends in Christian Britain and America, Friends in Taiwan, the Philippines, Indonesia, Cambodia, India, Bangladesh, Bhutan, and Nepal face challenges as sometimes-persecuted minorities within Muslim, Roman Catholic, Hindu and Buddhist majority populations.

In the United States most yearly meetings or associations belong to one of the following organizational structures.

- Friends United Meeting now includes thirteen yearly meetings in the Americas and sixteen Friends groups in Africa. In North America FUM membership numbers around 45,000, encompassing a broadly orthodox range of theology.
- Friends General Conference, generally liberal in theology, represents around 35,000 members, mostly in the United States (five FGC yearly meetings share joint membership with FUM).
- Conservative Friends, represent around 1500 adherents, mostly North American, following a Christ-centered, non-pastoral, and plain tradition.
- Evangelical Friends Church International/North America, pervasively evangelical and biblically based, has around 40,000 members.
- Still other yearly meetings in North America remain unaffiliated, and most of these are unprogrammed and liberal.

The 20,000 Friends in Europe are organized within eleven yearly meetings, the largest of which are Britain and Ireland.

Such statistics and characterizations are always changing and are bound to be somewhat incomplete; they cannot fully measure the life of the Spirit within these groups. They cannot measure obedience to the Light. But they do map some ways Friends perceive themselves and act upon their Christian heritage.

### **Friends in the Northwest**

Among the earliest Quakers to reach Oregon was the Lewelling family, who brought nursery stock to Milwaukie by oxen over the Oregon Trail in 1847. Other families settled in Ashland and the Willamette Valley. Robert and Sarah Lindsay, ministers from London, traveled to the Willamette Valley in 1859 to support the growing but scattered communities of Friends. Organizational direction, however, came in the 1870s through William Hobson, an Iowa Friend of Irish descent. His vision stimulated a major migration to the Chehalem Valley. Most families came from Iowa, which became the parent yearly meeting, although some, such as Jesse Edwards, came from Indiana. In



1893 the Quaker settlements in the Newberg and Salem, Oregon, area formed Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends.

Irrigation projects brought Friends families to Idaho's Boise Valley during the first decade of the twentieth century, with early settlements at Star, Riverside, and Greenleaf. Oregon Yearly Meeting soon included churches in Washington, as well as Idaho. Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting arose following Quaker migrations from Indiana. An anticipated yearly meeting in Washington never developed, and in 1945 Friends from this area united with Oregon Friends. In 1971 the Yearly Meeting changed its name to Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

As a result of evangelical resurgence following World War II, the National Association of Evangelicals was formed. Oregon Yearly Meeting joined this organization in 1945. At the present time membership is through the Evangelical Friends Church International. Also in the Northwest is North Pacific Yearly Meeting (Independent), which is unprogrammed and more theologically and socially liberal. Just as Northwest Yearly Meeting Friends at times feel the need to clarify that the positions of some evangelicals do not speak for our Christ-centered commitments, we also find ourselves at times needing to clarify that our Quaker convictions on matters of faith and practice are not identical to those of other groups of Friends. Ultimately, our allegiance is to Christ and his Lordship, and we welcome the partnership of all who would aspire to follow his leadership and adhere to his example as revealed in Scripture.

Evangelism and outreach have become major emphases in the Yearly Meeting because of opportunities afforded by a developing region and because of deep spiritual convictions. These concerns were often expressed through various modes, including revival meetings, but they also find new means of expression, ranging from spiritual retreats to service projects. Believing that followers of Jesus are called to reach the lost individually, and also to touch society collectively, we believe that evangelism and social concern go hand in hand. In the year 2010 the membership of Northwest Yearly Meeting numbered approximately 7,000.

Missionary work among the Aymara people of South America began in 1930 and has been strongly sustained since that time. Bolivia Yearly Meeting was established in 1975, and Peru Yearly Meeting was established in 1997. Northwest Yearly Meeting supplies limited assistance, particularly in education and national missionary training. These Friends' churches are now self-supporting and self-governing. The Yearly Meeting, through Evangelical Friends Mission and the EFCI Council, networks with ministry to Latinos in the United States, and ministries in Mexico, Central America, the Philippines, Rwanda, Taiwan, Burundi, Congo, Indonesia, Cambodia, Nepal, Russia, Hungary, Romania, Bhutan, Croatia, Serbia, Tanzania, Russia, North Africa, Israel, and India. It also maintains interests in the Bolivian Evangelical

University in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, and the Navajo people of the Southwestern United States.

Northwest Yearly Meeting outreach also includes social programs. In faithfulness to the peace testimony many young persons have engaged in relief work as an alternative to military service. Members often serve with agencies devoted to the alleviation of economic and cultural disparity in America or abroad. Inner-city ministries, peacemaking activities, and economic assistance to the needy receive local and Yearly Meeting direction. Yearly Meeting concern fostered construction of Friendsview Retirement Community.

Interest in education is evidenced by the establishment at Newberg, Oregon, of Pacific Academy in 1885 and Pacific College in 1891 (renamed George Fox College in 1949). In 1996 with the merger of George Fox College and Western Evangelical Seminary, the college became George Fox University. In 2000 the seminary was renamed George Fox Evangelical Seminary. Northwest Yearly Meeting established a Friends Center at the seminary in 2003, and a Friends Leadership Center was established at the University in 2009. Greenleaf Friends Academy in Idaho has been maintained by area Friends since 1908, maintaining an excellent Christian education experience from preschool through the twelfth grade. These schools have contributed significantly to Quaker and Christian leadership in the Northwest and throughout the world. Recently several local churches have included schools and day care centers in their ministry.

The Yearly Meeting since 1918 has supported programs of camping and now has several conference centers. These presently include Twin Rocks on the Oregon coast, Quaker Hill and Twin Lakes in central and north Idaho, and Quaker Cove on the Puget Sound. Tilikum, a retreat center and day camp near Newberg, was established in 1970 as the result of a gift of property. It is an agency of George Fox University. These programs are widely used by the churches, and Northwest Yearly Meeting has been a leader in youth work, educational, and camping ministries.

In its various missionary, educational, and outreach ministries, Northwest Yearly Meeting continues dynamically in the Christian tradition of Friends. Its interests and strengths vary from time to time. Despite occasional misplacing of priorities, restoration to wholeness has also occurred, accompanied by unity and joy in the Lord. Currently the Yearly Meeting is engaged in new forms of outreach and evangelism, aimed at gathering into the Church persons whom the Holy Spirit is reaching through Christian proclamation and deeds of love. We invite you to join us in seeking to follow Christ together; in doing so, we not only celebrate what God has done in the past, but we look forward to being a part of what God is doing now and in the future.



## APPENDIX B

### 2011 Northwest Yearly Meeting Epistle

(Approved by the Administrative Council August 15, 2011)

Ephesians 4:13 [This will continue] until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.

Greetings to Friends everywhere from the 119th session of the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church (NWYM). Jan reminded us that a society marked by immaturity perpetuates destructive political and economic systems. Jan's gentle yet insistent call to stay in the light and remain connected to God in order to mature was a reminder that we cannot hear too often. The youth of NWYM led us in a blessed time of worship on Wednesday evening including music, readings and a participatory art project in which all were invited to place paint covered hands on a "palm" tree. The creativity evidenced in the lives and ministry of our youth are sources of joy as we contemplate the future of NWYM. ### Superintendent's Report

For the last seven years, it has been my joy and privilege to serve as superintendent of NWYM. I want to thank each and every one of you for the support, encouragement and kindness you have shown me. I am going to miss you and this ministry.

Two years into an economic downturn has caused many of our local churches to cut budgets and refocus on ministry priorities. The same has been true on the Yearly Meeting level. The upside of all of this is in how it challenges us to prioritize and do our best work. A downside, however, is important work that can be done winds up being delayed or set aside altogether.

As most of you know, we have recently reduced the NWYM staff. Cutting the associate superintendent for local outreach puts added stress on a board with large and important responsibilities. We need to continue to be open to planting new churches and looking at creative ways to revitalize some of our existing, struggling churches. Please pray for the board and the remaining NWYM staff as they work hard to envision a new strategy to do this work. Moving into the future, we will need to reassess staff needs in this area.

Despite these challenges, many good things are going on among us and through us. Some of our churches are growing. Several of our boards are putting new ministry initiatives in place to better support you and to broaden our collective ministry. Generous Friends continue to make sacrificial gifts that sustain current ministries and lay a foundation for future ones. This year, we are launching a new Friends Center scholarship in order to better support our growing number of students seeking seminary preparation for ministry. The work of the NWYM Foundation continues to provide a helpful, free service to you by offering estate planning. Many of you are including your local churches, camps, George Fox University, Friendsview and NWYM in your estates as an act of faithful stewardship. Thank you for this!

Over the next six months, I have a few loose ends I hope to tie up in order to hand this position off to the new superintendent. I am excited about the work of the search committee who has been working on bringing a candidate to recommend to you. I trust the next superintendent will be just what we need for the future growth and vitality of NWYM.

One project I am working on is the possible transfer of the Tilikum property



and program to NWYM. George Fox University has initiated this discussion with us and we hope to bring a report to you during Yearly Meeting week. As you have also heard, I am working diligently to raise next year's Sower's Fund money so that our new superintendent does not need to spend time on this her first year. We have had several very generous one-time gifts over the past three years. We also have many Friends who contribute to the Sower's Fund on a monthly basis. This year, I am asking each of us to consider a \$50 gift this year. If every family on our mailing list would make this small, one-time gift, we would raise three year's worth of Sower's Fund money right away. This fund is an important part of our overall budget, allowing us to use monies for ministries aimed at helping us broaden and deepen our impact. Please consider a contribution this year.

Gar Mickelson will be leaving the NWYM staff at the close of July. Gar has served us with creative energy and passion in his role as associate superintendent of local outreach. Please take time to thank him this week. Also, Kimberly Felton will be leaving the staff at the end of August. She and husband Rob have recently adopted, and Kimberly is electing to stay home with their new little one and work on her freelance writing. She has been a wonderful member of the staff and so please extend your thanks to her as well.

A familiar face is returning to the NWYM staff, too. Dick Sartwell resumes his role as the Friends Center Director later this summer. His experience and presence will add a great deal of stability in a time of many transitions.

These are challenging and exciting days to be the Church. I've been drawn frequently to a passage from Ephesians 5:15-16 which reads, "Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity..."

When Paul calls us to live wisely, he is asking us to walk with a purpose—but not just any purpose. Rather, it is with God's purpose seared into our heart and first on our minds. For Paul, the spiritually wise person is one who strategically applies God's perspective and will in their circumstances. More than just knowing what is right—the one who lives wisely—does what is right and true and good. In word and deed, they connect God's heart and the mind of Christ to the world in which they live—for the benefit of others and to the glory of God.

- Barclay Press created a C.E. resource booklet that shares the entire C.E. curriculum and is available through Barclay Press.
- We were able to provide eight churches with a financial resource of

## Board of Local Outreach

Your Local Outreach Board has a wide area of responsibility that includes oversight of Church Planting Subcommittee, Latino Ministries, Immigration Task Force (yes, separate from Latino Ministries), The Church Development Team, and a small Outreach Grant. This has been a tough year for local outreach on the yearly meeting level. First let me offer some caveats:

Local outreach is not measured by what we as a board do, but by what our churches do. This is difficult to measure both in terms of attempts and effectiveness. However, informal conversations help us conclude that outreach is indeed happening throughout our yearly meeting.

Another side to our inability to measure outreach in some numerical sense also makes it difficult to tell how our board has been of direct help to our congregations in either encouraging or enabling our individual congregations to engage in outreach.

With those in mind, let me report on the status of our plans through 2011 so far:

The **CHURCH PLANTING SUBCOMMITTEE** appears to have a policy handbook to submit this Yearly meeting. They also continue to oversee our ministry points as they move to full church status. This year we have no new church plants, traditional or otherwise, to report to you. We have largely been trying to discern among those who feel called, and as of yet nothing has arisen.

**LATINO MINISTRIES** oversees our Latino churches, most of which are ministry points. Like the Church Planting Subcommittee we have no new Latino works to report to you. Furthermore, our Latino brothers and sisters are struggling deeply this year. Most of our outreach in the Latino community is among poor to middle class, demographically speaking. With the difficulties in the economy it hits them particularly hard. While attendance has declined due to emigration, monetary support has doubly declined from the lack of givers and the lower wages for those who stay.

The **IMMIGRATION TASK FORCE** has done great work in finding resources for our churches, providing help for getting U.S. passports, and gathering

information. They are currently seeking to ascertain if they have passion and energy to continue.

The **CHURCH DEVELOPMENT TEAM** has been particularly busy in helping churches (at their request) to ascertain possible next steps to which God is calling them. Under the leadership of Gene Mulkey and supported by prayer warriors, this team continues to be available for churches that long for help in figuring out how to increase or target their outreach into their surrounding community.

We have only had one request for the **OUTREACH GRANT** as of this date. If you are interested please see [www.nwfriends.org/resources](http://www.nwfriends.org/resources) on how to apply for a matching grant for a new outreach opportunity.

These things are coupled with the loss of staff that we are going to have starting this year. Most of our connection work has been done by Gar Mickelson. His constant vigilance and tireless efforts went far in helping us be a yearly meeting and has carried the burden of the board in very significant areas. Frankly, we don't know what the work looks like without him, and much of our time this year will be revisiting how the board works with this significant change.

### ***A DISCERNMENT PROCESS AID: NATURAL CHURCH DEVELOPMENT***

When a church group pauses to reflect about the next steps they might take in improving their common life, Natural Church Development (NCD) is an invaluable aid. It gives a 360-degree perspective on congregational life and ministry. It also helps a group focus on a few high leverage issues that have high potential for a group's progress and health. NCD provides a foundation for a church's discernment process as they prayerfully consider how God is at work among them and what next steps God would have them take. We have people available to help you and your church go through this process. While many church programs come and go, we see an enduring quality about Natural Church Development. It isn't just an evaluative tool, it is also a dynamic process which supports our practice of discernment—particularly about a congregation's sense of vision, passion, health and mission. Three NWYM churches are actively using NCD.

### ***SUPPORTING PARENTS AND FAMILIES LOVE AND LOGIC***

We encourage Love and Logic training as a way of encouraging healthy parent/child relationships in our local churches. Love and Logic (loveandlogic.com) provides simple and practical techniques to help teachers and parents experience less stress and more fun while raising responsible children. ### ***SUPPORTING THE PROGRESS OF CHURCHES: SHARE CALLS***

We will be considering two applications for the Share Call this year. We want you all to know about this opportunity to help and be helped. Below are the guidelines for the Share Call Program. The Share Call is a means of enabling the entire Yearly Meeting to be a part of financially assisting a local congregation to complete a building project. The ground rules of a Share Call are as follows: The Share Call is given to assist in finishing a building project. The receipts from a Share Call are to be used to purchase items that are needed to make the building usable. First priority will be given to those needs crucial to the use of facilities – that is: roofs, furnaces, floors, plumbing, etc. The Share Call will not be used generally for updating, or beautification projects. A proposal documenting the nature of the building project and how the Share Call will enable the congregation to make the facility usable must be approved

by the Board of Congregational Care before a Share Call is to be given. Calls will be issued two times a year, generally during the months of October and May. First priority will be given to churches working on their initial capital investments. Applications are reviewed twice a year; once at Midyear Board Meeting and once at Yearly Meeting. All applications need to be submitted one month prior to these events. You can download an application at: [nwfriends.org/share-call](http://nwfriends.org/share-call).

### ***DISCERNMENT TRAINING***

We support the process of deepening the discernment skills of local congregations. The Board of Congregational Care recommends the annual Discernment Training Seminar offered by Good News Associates as an excellent resource for NWYM churches. Two board members attended the annual Discernment Training Workshop offered by GoodNews Associates. We are presently forming a sub-committee to address the training needs of NWYM in this vital area.

### ***Board of Global Outreach***

The 2010 Ministry Plan for the Board of Global Outreach committed us to pursue a cross-cultural testimony of faith and practice, to equip Friends Serving Abroad (FSAs), to encourage churches to be involved in holistic outreach beyond the Northwest, and to strengthen our board by drawing in additional helpers on several sub-committees. Most of those goals carried over into 2011. We will highlight several of the steps forward.

Hal and Nancy Thomas (Friends Serving Abroad from North Valley, seconded to PRODOLA) prepare Latin American students for doctoral degrees in ministry. Both Hal and Nancy hold key positions to teach, advise students, and prepare curricular aids and materials. Over 80 students coming from most Latin American nations are enrolled. This year, the board consulted directly with PRODOLA Director Chuck VanEngen to express our support and delight in being a part of their continent-wide program through the Thomases. In return we received affirmation for our Yearly Meeting vision to invest in leadership for the entire evangelical movement of Latin America. Our willingness to “give away” the Thomases to another evangelical agency is appreciated.

Johan and Judy Maurer (Friends Serving Abroad in Russia from Reedwood) teach ethics, sociology, English and other subjects in educational institutions in Elektrostal, Russia, as well as maintain ties with Moscow Friends Meeting and Moscow Friends House. Their primary focus is relationship-building around food, study and worship in Elektrostal. In the past year they have also pursued ties with Russian historians, sociologists and journalists in the Samara/



Buzaluk region, some distance away. They have achieved a far more stable visa situation. We continue to pray for breakthroughs leading to vibrant Christian faith and fellowship in a truly Russian context.

Patrick, Christy, Ethan and Megan Neifert (FSAs in Haifa, Israel) have had an excellent year of ministry, finishing this term of service. Patrick worked with Cross Media Productions' Internet evangelism in Arabic and in the design and production of other evangelical media products. Christy was employed as an administrative officer at Nazareth Evangelical Theological Seminary in nearby Nazareth. Both have had unique ministry opportunities in the Muslim and Christian Arab worlds. Ethan and Megan have completed ninth and sixth grade respectively. As this report is being prepared, they are making plans to remain in the United States, seeking the Lord's direction for their future as a family and the next step in ministry. They continue to feel drawn to international ministry, however, so ask your prayer support as they make this transition for the present.

Teaching Abroad workers this year have included Karen Swenson (Newberg) teaching the children of Christian workers in Hungary; Miriam Voth (Newberg), Dorothy Sherman (Camas), Marilyn Harmon (Clackamas Park and Newberg), Joanna Cox (Parma, Idaho), and Ann Brantingham (Ohio) in China. Shawn McConaughy and a Teaching Abroad Subcommittee have actively recruited several new teachers and expect a total team of six in China for the coming school year. This is strategic and fruitful work.

Much effort was expended in the past year by a North Africa Leadership Team (NALT), with the goal of restoring a witness presence once again to North Africa. Given the tumultuous events throughout the Middle East and North Africa in the last 12 months, the possibilities are both huge and daunting. We do not feel released from this calling. The leadership team has contact with excellent worker prospects and sympathetic on site persons. The team has formulated an extensive and detailed plan built around both long-term and short-term workers and business-as-mission enterprises. We plan to promote the plan in 2011 and begin to implement the plan in 2012. It will include a careful process of prayer, candidate discernment and stepping out in faith into a part of the world with great need. We are asking God to call out laborers.

Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM) is crucial in the global outreach of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Seven NWYM Friends adults, plus their children, have responded to the many opportunities and challenges opened by EFM. Chrissy Muhr (North Valley), Matt and Gayle Denham (Second Street), David and Debby Thomas and children Breanna, Aren, Gwen and Alandra (West Chehalem) are part of the EFM team in Rwanda. David and Tricia Howell and children Jonathan and Moriah (Talent) lead a worship group and other ministry gatherings in Wicklow, Ireland. NWYM Friends help support other EFM workers in India, Nepal, Bhutan, the Philippines, Bangladesh and Mexico. Dan Cammack serves as "coach" for the EFM team in Aguascalientes,

Mexico. Ed and Marie Cammack have been asked to serve as interim workers in Aguascalientes beginning later this year. Lon Fendall is the EFM coordinator for the Great Lakes Leadership Training program that services pastoral training in Burundi, Congo and Rwanda.

An increasing amount of the work of the Board of Global Outreach is being conducted by an extensive list of subcommittees. The Russia Subcommittee meets monthly with the Maurers by video/computer linkups. The Latin American Subcommittee meets once every three or four months to hear the concerns of Hal and Nancy Thomas and the work of PRODOLA. The Teaching Abroad Subcommittee aids in team recruitment and selection, orientation and other team concerns. The Bolivia/Peru Subcommittee has been increasingly active leading to a matching fund to help Bolivian missionaries enter new fields, overseeing plans for a visiting team to a 50-year anniversary celebration in Peru, speakers for an inter-yearly meeting youth conference in Bolivia, and archival work related to the work of NWYM in South America over the past 90 years. The ties with those two yearly meetings are being strengthened once again.

Newly-formed subcommittees are the Finance Subcommittee and the Peace with Justice Subcommittee. The Finance Subcommittee has brought excellent advice and planning to our work. Our concerns for global outreach far exceed our resources, so we are looking carefully not only on our spending but how to more clearly share the vision of the Kingdom of God on earth in our congregations. The mandate of the Peace with Justice Subcommittee is to build an awareness in the Yearly Meeting of global issues, especially issues in places where Friends minister. Also, the subcommittee collaborates, encourages and consults with FSAs in global issues related to their fields. Our goal is to be truly holistic in our message of love and reconciliation with God. Although not under the supervision of our board, retiree Esther Mae Hinshaw (Newberg) has completed two short stints with Christian Peacemaker Teams in Hebron, Palestine. The Peace with Justice Subcommittee partially funded a team of six presenters at a peace conference in Uvira, Democratic Republic of Congo, in early July, sponsored by Congo Yearly Meeting of Friends, an affiliate of EFCI-Africa. We have hopes that this model of peacemaking from a clearly Christ-centered perspective might increase.

We are still interested in creating a Middle East Subcommittee and a Short-Term Ministry subcommittee. The latter will be a service to local churches desiring guidance in best policy and to coordinate efforts among local congregations. Another goal is to foster the concept of "seasons of service" in the lives of all members of Northwest Yearly Meeting so that the concepts of global and cross-cultural ministry truly seep into the spiritual DNA of our expression of the Body of Christ.

## Board of Leadership Development and Enrichment

As we make progress in the development of key initiatives we are beginning to observe the benefit of working closely with the local church in order to share the opportunity to nurture leaders of all ages. Local church engagement and partnership increases our leadership capacity at all levels in the NWYM.

### RECORDING

Paul Almquist has been appointed as clerk of the Subcommittee on Recording. His guidance has solidified a process begun in Hood River last September that reflects an equally shared partnership between the subcommittee and local church as it pertains to recording candidates. As local church elders recommend potential recording candidates they will follow a seven-step process for preparing each one before presenting to the Recording Subcommittee. Upon recommendation and approval of applicant material, the potential candidate will meet with the subcommittee and work through a seven-step process facilitated by the subcommittee. The outline of the process and supporting material can be found by following the “Resources” link on the NWYM website. Our objective is that each candidate moves through the recording process and experiences a consistently high level of personal development as he/she works with the YM and local church.

We look forward to recommending multiple candidates for recording at NWYM sessions. Please join us on Thursday evening to celebrate this affirmation of their gifts and calling to public ministry.

Being recommended this year are the following: Leslie Murray (North Valley), Hernan Diaz (Vancouver), Don Walters (Tigard), James Fields (Talent), and Roger Button (Sherwood).

### MENTORING

Last September we had approximately fifteen leaders who meet at George Fox Evangelical Seminary (GFES) for our second annual mentoring workshop. Gary Kilburg (GFU) and Eloise Hockett (GFU/2nd Street) facilitated our training and provided practical tools for the variety of situations and individuals with whom our mentors work. Each of the participants, even with years of ministry experience, expressed how their new learning will add value to their mentoring relationships.

Additionally, we provided training to approximately fifty youthworkers at the NWYM Youthworkers Conference in Hood River on the first weekend of November 2010. Youthworkers of all skill and experience levels responded positively to being equipped for the challenges each face as they nurture youth in our churches.

## PASTORAL DEVELOPMENT

The 2010 Focus Conference, a training time for our yearly meeting pastors, provided time for them to consider ways to make room and understand our mission as positioned within the context of generational and philosophical shifts. Todd Hunter led our time together. He provided practical ideas, provoked deeper thinking, and allowed conversation to encourage pastors to understand the cultural movement taking place in our cities and churches.

Small regional retreats designed for the support and formation of pastors continue to be developed. Please look for the chance to participate in this opportunity.

## Board of Elders

The Bible identifies at least two significant functions of elders: admonitory and nurturing (Timothy 5:17, James 5:14-15). Elders are responsible both for carrying out the “rules” of their worship communities and for bringing healing and forgiveness into the community.

The biblical expectations for elders include discipleship—care for one’s own personal connection with God; humility—remember one’s own vulnerability to error and sin; obedience—commit oneself to obeying God’s word as revealed through the Spirit through conviction, through the community, through the Bible; love—caring about others enough to speak against destructive behavior and caring enough to encourage constructive behavior (in both cases speaking the truth in love); and commitment to the community—loving the worship community enough to care for bringing it along to truth as a community. If you have the gifts, qualifications, and commitment, you are an elder regardless of position on any committee.

NWYM elders are responsible for prayer; peacemaking and crisis intervention; accountability; discipline and restoration for moral failure in public ministers including pastors; and assistance and support for local elders. The recording of public ministers in NWYM begins with local elders who identify spiritual giftedness in public ministry, and ends with the yearly meeting elders, who finally recommend the candidate to the yearly meeting business meeting for approval.

In the past year, elders have been praying for local meetings, talking with clerks of local elders and with pastors, and meeting with groups of elders as invited. We have kept account of discipline and restoration processes. We have continued our prayerful conversation around the *Faith and Practice* statement on homosexuality. We are available to meet with local Churches and elders when our presence is helpful.



Galatians 6 says that if another person is caught in any trespass, those who are spiritual should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness, looking to themselves lest they are likewise tempted. The Greek word translated "restore" is also used in the gospels when the disciples are mending nets. Elders take care of the nets, mending each tear so that the "net" is functioning as it was made to function.

Last YM, the Board of Elders suspended Bruce Bishop's recording. Elders decided to delay a formal "restoration" process and instead assigned a care committee (Becky Ankeny, Lynn Clouser Holt, and Steve Fawver) to walk with Bruce during the year. This committee met every other week. Bruce also met weekly with a counselor. At Midyear Board Meeting, Bruce met with NWYM elders. He expressed his sorrow and repentance, and the elders forgave him. Bruce will meet again this week with the elders. Pray with us to discern appropriate next steps for this process of reconciliation and accountability.

When we look at others who are erring, straying, trespassing, sinning, destroying, we need to see nets that need mending. Then elders will be tenderhearted and joyful in their work, our meetings will be places where people encourage each other to live up to the light that is in them, and we will speak truth in love to our neighbors.

## Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry

Bible Quizzing came in first again this year as our most well-attended youth event. At four meets in two states we had over 200 people quizzing, asking questions, keeping score, feeding and providing housing. In all cases many from the local congregation were involved in facilitating this outstanding program. Our challenge for next year is to include the smaller churches, through a model of combining youth from nearby churches who might not have enough for their own program. This has been done unofficially in the past but will be a program goal in the future.

The Young Adult Friends Leadership Development Team (YAFLDT) program is well underway. Young adults and their mentors provided leadership at Mid-Winter, the Volleyball tournament, YCLS and YCEW. Midwinter was hosted at the newly renovated Eugene Friends Church last January. The church was filled with 50 plus high school and young adult leaders who used every corner of the church. Volleyball was held in April, 2011, at George Fox University with 16 teams from three states. These events will rotate locations in the next calendar year.

Samuel School I and II continue to be important programs for equipping our students. A strategic part of this program is pairing each participant, who is selected by their elders to attend Samuel School, with a mentor (Eli).

We recognize over the years the mentor training could be much stronger. Therefore, in response, we have formed a subcommittee that will be gathering this fall to help revamp this piece of our Samuel School program.

Although many preparations were made for our Youth Challenge through Local Service, the program was laid down for this summer due to applicants. Our hope is to continue to build this program and opportunities for local outreach teams for the summer of 2012. YCEW was our international youth team that left for Cambodia late June and returning July 20. This year's team included: Janna Fawver, Katie Comfort, Aaron Posey, Joe Canepa, Talli Koskela, Anna Jolliff, Jered McConaughy, Kelsey Hampton (leader) and Jesse Lamm (leader). Please seek out these students and ask them how God spoke to them.

Our youth programming continues to run at strong levels. Our passion is to provide an equally great program for young adults. This has been a challenge and we ask the community (that's you, the folks reading this report) to support us. This year the "Bring Your Own Tent" and Blazer game were good fun and helped with building relationships. Chris Hinderliter of Melba facilitated College Camp at Quaker Hill this past June for YAF's in Idaho. Grad camp at Twin Rocks has a program allowing recent high school graduates to process their future with experienced and caring leaders during their final year at Surfside. We are working on a similar program that will provide a time for the 19-25 year old crowd to ask their questions. A retreat is being planned for sometime next year currently called Samuel School III. We appreciate your prayers and support as we begin to reignite this program.

## Trustees

As I prepare this report for the NWYM I want to give special thanks to Floyd Watson, a long-time member and immediate past clerk of the Trustees for his help and assistance as I assumed the clerk role as of August, 2010. I also want to thank the other trustees, Lloyd Pruitt, Bruce Longstroth, Maribeth Hampton and Barry White for their great support during this year. The trustees dealt with the following business from

July 1, 2010–June 30, 2011:

Washington Property Tax Exemption Reports. Annual property tax exemption reports were prepared and submitted to the Washington Department of Revenue for five Washington church properties based on reports obtained from the churches involved.

Quincy, WA Church Sale. We sold the Quincy, WA church and parsonage to the Grant County Hospital for \$425,000. The transaction closed in December,



2010. The NWYM carried back a Note/Deed of Trust for \$325,000 payable at 4.00% per annum with monthly payments to the YM of \$5,985.37. The note carries a balloon payment (entire amount due) on December 10, 2015. After closing costs the YM received a check for \$73,753.11

LaGrande, OR Church Sale. We sold The Olde Meetinghouse church in LaGrande, Oregon, to Martin and Linda Marvel for \$78,000. The transaction closed in February 22, 2011. After paying off the Friends Church Extension Fund loan of \$36,402.15 the YM received a check for \$36,836.85.

Sprague River Lots. We sold two lots in Sprague River, OR, to a private party in April 2011 for \$1,500.00. The lots had been gifted to the NWYM for the benefit of Sprague River Friends Church in September 2009. The proceeds went to Sprague River Friends Church.

Rose Valley Friends Church. In Kelso, WA, the Rose Valley Friends Church (RVFC) property was owned partially by RVFC and partially by NWYM. We deeded the parcels owned by NWYM to RVFC, in order to allow the church to borrow money to construct a gymnasium.

Deed of Agnew Property. At the request of Peninsula Evangelical Friends Church, we completed the sale of a small strip of property to Clallam County, WA, for road improvement purposes. The church had negotiated a satisfactory settlement.

New Life Friends Church. At the time of this writing we are assisting the YM in evaluating a sale of a commercial building owned by Dave White (volunteer pastor of NLFC) to the church and a loan from FCEF. The building currently is rented to NLFC by Dave White and houses a ministry called The Rock for recovering addicts. Since NLFC is still a ministry point, the property is owned by NWYM. Final decisions have not been made but will be reported either prior to YM or in next year's report.

CrossRhythm Church. The trustees were involved in discussions and a meeting in July, 2010, regarding CrossRhythm Church in Annapolis, Maryland, becoming part of NWYM. Much of the discussion involving the trustees revolved around the mortgage bonds on their property. At the meeting it was decided to table a decision pending further resolution of the mortgage bond issue and any litigation that may result.

## Friends Women

At the beginning of this year, I felt anxious, and our wonderful Savior and friend reminded me of Philippians 4:6, "Be anxious for nothing but by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be known unto me." His blessings upon the work of NWYM Friends Women has been abundant this year.

It is with much joy I make this report. At the annual banquet, "His Eye Is On The Sparrow," with Lisby Rogers as speaker, Lisby told about her six-month service at Caring Hands Girls School in Dwarwad, India, a school for girls who are daughters of Temple prostitutes. The offering to that work came to \$ 2,200. We gave two \$1,000 scholarships this year for advanced education to Christy Neifert (Israel) and Miriam Voth (China). Also, one of our projects was \$1,000 to Joanna Cox as a first-year China teacher.

Fall retreats were held both at Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks with the theme, "Freedom in Jesus," with Nancy Almquist as speaker for both retreats. The auction proceeds from those retreats went to "Discipleship for Development" projects in Rwanda, Africa, and amounted to \$2,778.35.

Spring Rally theme was "God of All Comfort." Each area had their own speaker and the offering went to PRODOLA (Doctorate of Theology) for students from South American countries. The total offerings came to \$2,222. Our total projects were fulfilled which amounted to \$6,300. The funds went to Teaching Abroad China Teacher Retreat; first year China teacher; EFM-Aguacalientes ministry; Living Waters Ministry at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho; Johan and Judy Maurer Russian hospitality; and tuition for Neifert children in Haifa, Israel. We also sent two representatives to Youth Summit 2010: Joe Lynne Rader and Elizabeth (Lisby) Rogers.

During my term as president, I have been concerned to have a history written about NWYM Friends Women established in 1941. Over 29 women have gone alone or with their husbands to Bolivia and Peru to serve. Many of these are still living and have written accounts of what FW did for them and their families during their time of service. Geraldine Willcuts wrote an essay describing much about this service to our work in South America:

"[These women are] a support group like no other. Praying, giving, helping, advising with letters, cards, dollar bills stuck in those cards and letters. Hands on support. Banquets where cheerful smiling women gave their friendships to the women who had served in Bolivia and Peru. The welcomes the missionaries received with gifts of love. The encouragement given was with words of love. The constancy was always with love. The hugs and love was expressed in money, furnishings, homes, visits, listening and friendships. Thank you. God will reward you all richly."

## Friends Center (at George Fox Evangelical Seminary)

The NWYM Friends Center and George Fox Evangelical Seminary (GFES) continue to partner together to educate and equip current and future Friends ministers to serve the Church in a variety of ways. It is exciting to see the number of Friends' students and credit hours increase each of the past few years!

Last year, thirty-six Friends from a variety of places and backgrounds took courses at GFES. Not counting Doctor of Ministry students, over 400 credit hours were taken. More and more, men and women are finding seminary to be an excellent avenue for learning practical ministry skills, gaining new insight into scripture, as an avenue for spiritual formation, and to receive a transformed perspective for what God is doing in the world. I am really pleased by the partnership we have with GFES and how the Friends Center is able to offer scholarship assistance and Friends-specific courses.

### DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Last summer, we announced Carole Spencer's resignation as the Friends Center director to take a teaching position at Earlham School of Religion. For budget reasons, I stepped in as the interim director. Over the past year I have seen what a vital role the Friends Center director can play in supporting current students, attracting new ones and in making connections with prospective Friends ministers. Though only a one-quarter position, it is critical staff position.

My work was largely only as a placeholder until we were prepared to offer the role to a new director. I am extremely pleased that Dick Sartwell, the original Friends Center director, has agreed to return to this work. Dick will officially join the staff again sometime after Yearly Meeting sessions. He brings a wealth of pastoral experience, wonderful skills as a seminary instructor and just the kind of wisdom students will appreciate.

Over the course of the past year, the Friends Center offered courses in starting new ministry initiatives, discernment training and social justice ministry. Next year's course offerings include training for intentional interim ministry, Christian peacemaking, pastoral ministry from a Friends perspective, and leadership in group discernment. Non-seminary students may also take any of these courses for enrichment by paying only a very modest fee. Information will be available later this summer on fall course offerings.

### SCHOLARSHIPS

In 2010-11, the Friends Center provided scholarship assistance to eleven Friends students through a variety of endowed and non-endowed funds. In the coming year, we will be supporting at least fourteen seminary students. This fall we will be drawing funds from the now-fully-endowed Hubert and Vivian

Thornburg Scholarship. The Thornburg fund, along with the Walter Lee and Russell Stands scholarships were set up in honor of Friends ministers/leaders in order to encourage and support future Friends ministers. We continue to work on establishing other named funds to increase our scholarship aid.

Marianne Phillips (Clackamas Park) and Brandon Baker (Reedwood) each graduated with a Master of Arts degree in Spiritual Formation. Steve Fawver (Newberg) graduated with a Doctor of Ministry degree in Leadership and Spiritual Formation. Several other Friends students will graduate later this summer and fall.

## Volunteers on Wheels

Volunteers on Wheels, now in its 27th year of operation, continues to be a viable and effective organization. Some new members have joined and a few have deceased. Since VOW was established in 1984, 72,994 hours of labor have provided approximately \$895,573 in savings to church-related organizations.

During the 2010-11 year, 36 members have donated 3,850 hours of service to eight organizations accumulating approximately \$60,519 savings. Miles driven by members on work projects totaled 5,857. In the 2010-11 year, volunteer services were provided to: George Fox University, Camp Arrah Wana, Friendsview Retirement Community, Northwest Yearly Meeting, Quaker Hill Camp, Tilikum Retreat Center, Veritas School, and Twin Rocks Friends Camp.

New members are sought, and candidates in agreement with the NWYM Statement of Faith and who will contribute volunteer time when possible are encouraged to apply. Current membership is at 55.

We want to encourage local churches to apply for help with projects. Some of our best memories of fellowship and service have been during projects with local congregations.

## Evangelical Friends Church International

Evangelical Friends Church International (EFCI) is a worldwide network founded in 1989 and that now includes 43 evangelical Friends ministries on five continents and in 32 nations of the world. About 17 of these ministries function as independent yearly meetings. Other ministries work in partnership with Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM) or with one of the six member yearly meetings in North America. Membership (defined as regular attendees) totals 174,000 persons. There are an additional five yearly meetings in Bolivia with 30,000 to 50,000 attendees that have regularly participated in EFC-Latin America events. Counting these technically unaffiliated but evangelical Friends, we number well over 200,000. The largest number of Friends anywhere in the world is still in Kenya, affiliated with Friends United Meeting and largely evangelical in spirit and practice, but EFCI constitutes the most widely spread network of Friends.

The purposes of the organization are to promote church renewal, international fellowship and identity as Friends, evangelism and leadership training. The heart of the work of EFCI happens within each region. Latin Americans have sponsored three major pastoral conferences over the years. North America Region collaborates through Evangelical Friends Mission, youth conferences, pastoral conferences, publications and other concerns. African Friends have collaborated within their region in pastoral and leadership education programs and inter-visitation by evangelists and leaders. European Friends have sponsored inter-visitation and small leadership conferences. Asian Friends have promoted missions, inter-visitation and strong conferences for the encouragement of leaders. Asia is still a strong growing edge for EFCI with the largest number of individual ministries and, of course, the world's largest population.

The largest groups of Evangelical Friends Church International by nation are found in Burundi (50,000), the United States (38,000), Guatemala (25,000+), Bolivia (15,000), Honduras (8000), Taiwan (5000), Rwanda (4600), and Nepal (4150). Four out of five Evangelical Friends International church attendees live in Africa, Asia, Africa or Europe. The six EFCI yearly meetings in North America by order of size are Eastern Region, Southwest, Northwest, Mid-America, Rocky Mountain, and Alaska.

No major EFCI regional conferences were held since July 2010. Plans are in place for an EFC-Europe Region leadership gathering in Tolna, southern Hungary, in mid-October, 2011. EFC-Latin American Region Director Sabino Chipana has organized an inter-yearly meeting Friends Youth Conference, November 2-5, 2011, in Bolivia that will include about 400 young adults from about seven yearly meetings of Bolivia and Peru, once again drawing in a number of unaffiliated Friends for fellowship and spiritual encouragement. Sabino and his planning team have promoted this conference on behalf of

EFCI and Friends World Committee on Consultation (FWCC). The NWYM Board of Global Outreach is funding two Friends Spanish-speaking leaders for the program, Angel Diaz (Newberg Hispanic) and David Byrne (Instituto ALMA, Houston, Texas). Latin American Friends hope to have some kind of a leadership gathering again in 2012 and African Friends of Rwanda will host a major conference in Rwanda in October, 2012, that will include a meeting of the EFC International Council.

As director during the past year, I have represented Evangelical Friends with occasional informational articles for publication, have corresponded with regional directors and represented EFCI in a trip to central Africa in cooperation with Evangelical Friends Mission. I continue plans to pass the EFCI Council director's position to someone else at the meeting in Africa in 2012.

The goal is to announce a new director at the EFM Commission meetings, November 3-5, which will be hosted by Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting in Colorado. EFM is part of EFC-NA (Evangelical Friends Church-North America).

### ***TRAINING FOR BI-VOCATIONAL MINISTRY***

Most growing church movements in poor countries find that self-support builds their dignity and often their growth. Most of our Asia missionaries attended a three-day orientation seminar in Kathmandu, Nepal, in early July. The sponsoring group, Global Disciples, train church planters to become self-supporting. The next step will be for our missionaries who like the plan to sponsor the training for their evangelists and church planters. This is a huge shift for those who have been supported from the West.

### ***NEW MISSION FIELD PROGRESS***

Exploration is underway in Latin America for an unreached people group, preferably one who is responsive to the gospel and has dire health needs. The initial idea has broadened to include Latin American Friends in the effort. The good news is that we have young couples, already called to missions, who are interested. Keep praying!

### ***EFM ARVADA STAFF***

Few people understand the extraordinary care that our Arvada staff gives our missionaries. They pour their lives into each missionary who comes home on furlough, and guide them through deputation. Much of the work week revolves around two vital tasks. One is servicing our missionaries' prayer supporters through a variety of letters and emails. The other is building and maintaining our missionaries' financial base - receipting, bookkeeping, mailing donor letters and personal contact with givers. This does not count the daily phone calls, staff meetings, and constant interaction with missionaries on the field. Well done Vicki Hinshaw, David Cordova, Laurie Mortimore, Cairistiona Haley, 10-hour per week Bonnie Lopez, and 8-hour per week Gina Cummin. Thank you, thank you, thank you!

### ***FIELD BY FIELD UPDATES***

#### ***BANGLADESH***

Albert and Metali Adhikari and their committed volunteers are reaching people never before touched by the gospel. The number of churches and converts

increases every year on our newest mission field. Evangelistic literacy classes, teaching English, computer skills, and launching micro-businesses provide the holistic side of ministry. They are training disciples to plant churches and multiply groups of disciples. Their emphasis on whole families coming to Christ is quite powerful.

#### ***BHUTAN***

Our second newest mission field, with the leadership of Rupak and Pramila Tamang, continues to grow rapidly. Both churches and small groups are emerging. The Thimpu Friends Church in the capital city (Thimpu) has a strong prayer emphasis and is led by Pramila. Teaching women to weave, micro-loans, and bread and milk for hungry mothers and children provide part of their help to the poor.

#### ***GREAT LAKES LEADERSHIP TRAINING (GLLT)***

Lon Fendall travels to Africa at least twice per year, and coordinates GLLT's remarkable pastoral training program. It not only trains future pastors in Burundi, Congo, and Rwanda, but also many lay people who become witnesses in their communities and leaders in their churches. This year a significant list of visitors to central Africa are planning to visit these fields.

Kevin Hoppock (EFM board member) and daughter already visited Rwanda, Burundi, and Congo in June.

Lon Fendall and a George Fox University peace team will go to Congo in July.

Jeff and Mary Nagel (Booker, Texas) will visit Burundi in July.

Henry Sabatia of Kenya will go to Congo in September to teach.

Ron Stansell and Lon Fendall will visit Burundi and Congo in September.

Ben Staley and a vision team will go to all three countries in October.

Gene Pickard, EFM coach, will go to Rwanda in November.

#### ***INDIA (WEST BENGAL)***

D.K. and Choity Sarkar lead this ministry of winning Hindus to Christ. This past year they added a Muslim ministry to their outreach. Bob Adhikary and his team visit this field once or twice per year with powerful preaching and teaching. The Sarkars are encouraged by an intensive training program for 20 students that requires them to come for a month's training several times per year. The students put their Bible study and training into practice during the intervening months.



## *IRELAND*

Todd and Celesta James serve in Ringsend, David and Tricia Howell in Wicklow Town, and Kathi Perry in Greystones. Todd and Celesta lead Cairde Christian Fellowship and Todd is active in Sports Ministry. David and Tricia have started a Bible study and worship service and are active in school and community service. Kathi returned to Ireland in January and is pursuing relationships in several small groups and community service. Her goal is a new church.

## *MEXICO*

Andrea Byrne, and Edwin and Maria Giron serve in Aguascalientes. This August (2011) Girons will return for a ten-month furlough, including time for their daughter, Faviola, to attend her senior year in high school in the states. Experienced missionaries to Bolivia and Peru, Ed and Marie Cammack, will go as short-term missionaries during the time that the Girons are on furlough. Andrea Byrne, with the Cammacks' assistance, will continue leading people to Christ, starting home fellowships, and now have twice-per-month gatherings that combine home groups in a worship service. Currently the missionaries are implementing Keystone Discipleship training, which leads each disciple to make a disciple who will make a disciple.

For the past six years Dan Cammack has coordinated a teacher-training program in Mexico City. Five students received a certificate from a local seminary after taking over 50 courses, each ten weeks in length—once per week for three hours for seven years! Only occasionally did they take a month off.

Mexico Yearly Meeting Superintendent is Ernesto Ramirez.

## *SINALOA, MEXICO*

We are praying for an applicant who feels called to serve as a career missionary in this ripe harvest field. Pray that the Lord of the Harvest will send us the right person or couple.

In addition to the above mentioned Mexico ministries, Friends also have Churches in Coahuila state (Nueva Rosita), Ciudad Victoria, Juarez, and Mexicali.

## *MIDDLE EAST MINISTRIES (TWADDELL)*

Roy Twaddell and his wife, Jinky, are active in starting and nourishing Farsi-speaking home groups in Iran, Germany, England, and the United States. Pray for more monthly support for them. The Persian Christian Church of Las Vegas, a church plant of EFC-SW, is one fruit of their ministry. Roy would love to talk with you about starting a Persian church in your region or yearly meeting.

## *NAVAJO NATION*

The Call to Prayer for the Navajos in 2010 bore fruit. The Navajos are making progress in the transition from a mission to a growing Friends church. Bud and Judy Van Meter are beginning their second year in this transition. The Navajos are going to Native American Discipleship Training, operating their own Vacation Bible School, participating in Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting events, and implementing their own ideas for ministry. It's a joy to see their progress.

## *NEPAL (ADHIKARY)*

Bob and Debbie Adhikary lead an ever-growing ministry in southern Nepal. This year they have sent three church planters to new districts as well as having trained evangelists and preachers for many new villages in the districts where they now serve. God is giving dynamic growth. Road re-building, water buffalos to support evangelists, and a bridge almost completed are among their development projects.

## *NEPAL (RETNARAJ)*

Dr. Samson Retnaraj and his wife, Priscilla, continue to expand Community Health Evangelism and start new churches in western and southern Nepal. God is blessing their ministry with transformed villages and growing churches. Their ministry of Community Health Evangelism (CHE) is both holistic and evangelistic. This year Dr. Samson is exploring and making visits to the far western district of Nepal.

## *NEPAL (VANLAL)*

John and Sangi Vanlal find their ministry stretching from Kathmandu west, to a few churches in the east. Evangelism, growth, and discipleship are hallmarks of their ministry. Poor people come to the city and find Christ, then return home with the gospel to share in their home villages which are often isolated.

New churches spring up and dynamic growth is underway. Sangi's work in training women in sewing has brought hope and income to many women, and some have come to Christ. Her original students are now teaching the classes.

## *PHILIPPINES*

Jaime and Lydia Tabingo lead our Friends ministry in a remarkable combination of teaching and planting churches. They are reaching out to new islands—Leyte, Samar, and Palawan - and adding churches begun by students of Jaime in his years of teaching in interdenominational Bible schools. A new Friends Bible School called BEST (Berean Evangelical School of Theology) started in this past year.

## *RWANDA*

David and Debby Thomas will return to Rwanda in early August. Because of



Debby's health issues, she will continue on a modified sabbatical for the first six months. Brad and Chelsea Carpenter continue to develop the Discipleship for Development emphasis that is producing changed lives. Brad and Chelsea are leading well in the absence of the Thomases. Among our short-term team members, Chrissy Muhr and Matt and Gayle Denham will return to the States in November. Molly Black has been approved as a career missionary to Rwanda and returns to the states in July for deputation.

## 2010 Treasurer's Report

The following information summarizes our activity during 2010 and our proposed activity through 2012. These numbers, while important in their own right, are ultimately an incomplete reflection of the many hours of dedicated work of our Friends Serving Abroad, our board members, committee members, folks working on youth outreach, churches new and old, as well as our Newberg-based staff. As always, a more detailed report, and independent auditors review are available by contacting the yearly meeting office .

The pie chart labeled '2010 Ministry Income & Transfers' is an overview of all the financial resources used in 2010 to support ministry. This small graph can be correlated directly with the larger "Actual Results" chart. As with last year, you'll note that we finished 2010 under budget in both income and expense. From an expense perspective, it is nice to finish under budget; from the income point of view, it's not as nice. Local Church Support was down about 6% from 2009 (and down about 2% the year before that), yet this category remains our largest source of income. However, overall income actually increased by 4.5%, though this is largely attributable to draws from restricted or designated funds.

Next, the pie chart labeled '2010 Ministry Expense by Board' is an overview of the funds spent by each board in pursuit of their mandate. This graph is also derived from the larger 'Actual Results' chart. Expenses in 2010 totaled \$1,440,786, which represents a 6% increase from 2009. As noted above, in order to fund the increased expense, while absorbing reduced income, some boards drew more heavily on their restricted and designated funds.

You'll note the use of the terms "Restricted Funds" and "Designated Funds." These terms often get confused, but for our purposes we identify restricted funds as contributions from individual donors who limit the use of their donation to a specific ministry. We honor the donor's wishes and spend these funds only for that restricted purpose. We identify designated funds as those monies the Yearly Meeting has set aside for a particular purpose, but retains the flexibility to change the use of the funds. Endowments are similar to donor-restricted funds with the added obligation to spend only a percentage (typically 5%) of the fund annually.

## 2012 Budget Summary

These comments are associated with the chart labeled 'Proposed 2012 Northwest Yearly Meeting Annual Budget.'

### INCOME ITEMS

**LOCAL CHURCH SUPPORT** is allocated directly to each board as needed, after considering all other sources of revenue and transfers, to cover that board's ministry expense. In recognition of reduced expectations from Local Church Support (LCS), the 2012 budget of \$579,252 is a 7% reduction from the 2011 LCS budget.

**MINISTRY FUND ALLOCATION TO BOARDS** is the amount drawn from the Ministry Fund reserves in order to fund each board's ministry expense budgets. In 2012 this amount of \$90,000 represents approximately 8% of the balance of the Ministry Fund. Each year the percentage drawn from the Ministry Fund will decrease by 1%, leveling off at 5% in 2015. At 5% this fund should be available indefinitely without being depleted.

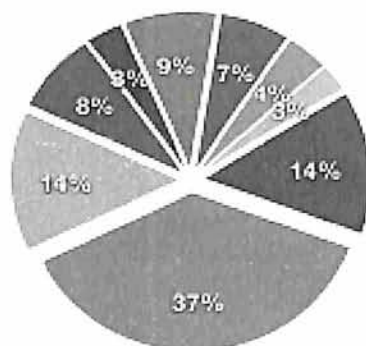
**TRANSFERS FROM RESTRICTED AND DESIGNATED FUNDS** represent the use of funds that individuals and churches have restricted for a specific purpose, or funds that boards have set aside as a designated fund. For example, many individuals contribute "shares" for our global outreach workers. Those contributions are placed in each worker's restricted fund. Then as expenses are paid out of the appropriate Ministry Expense line, funds are transferred out of the restricted fund and into the Transfers From Restricted Funds line.

### EXPENSE ITEMS

**MINISTRY EXPENSE** represents the total expense of the yearly meeting. Everything that is spent is summarized and represented on one of these lines. As mentioned above, some expenses are supported by restricted gifts while others are supported by Local Church Support and by transfers from the Ministry Fund.

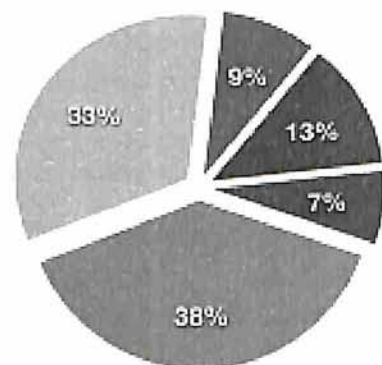


2010 Ministry Expense by Board

### ALLOCATION OF PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION EXPENSE

represents the portion of total administrative overhead that is allocated to each board. The Employee Wages and Employee Benefits expense for all Yearly Meeting staff are paid out of the Personnel and Administration budget. A portion of the wage and benefit expense is charged to each board in proportion to the approximate amount of staff time dedicated to that board's ministry. A portion of most other administrative expenses is also allocated between all the boards.

**BEGINNING FUND BALANCES** are the unspent balances held by each board and the Ministry Fund. These balances are as of January 1, 2011, and will change as funds flow in and out of them during the current year. They are shown here to give a general idea of the kinds of balances available to each board and the Ministry Fund for support of ministry activities.

## Epistles from Other Yearly Meetings

**ALASKA FRIENDS CONFERENCE** These Friends describe themselves as a “short once-yearly community of ‘whoever shows up’....We are challenged to pay attention to corporate needs when in some instances, those needs appear to contrast with our individual needs. Our challenge is to ‘stay in the arena’ instead of one party to a conflict simply going away.”

**BALTIMORE YM** Their epistle reads as a litany, with the recurring query, “Are you ready?” following a series of challenges to themselves to address racism, to encourage and nurture their young people, to reach “out beyond the geographical and theological borders of our yearly meeting throughout the United States and beyond—young, old, black, white, Christian, non-theist, American, Kenyan, Cuban, and Palestinian.”

**COSTA RICA: MONTEVERDE MONTHLY MEETING** “We strive to be an inclusive meeting. To that end we have sought to strengthen our translating of spoken messages in midweek and Sunday meetings for worship. We continue the eternal challenge of learning from each other, sharing ideas, and building community....Since we are a small Friends meeting, we especially value opportunities to draw energy and new thinking from our visitors and sojourners. We value their input and are blessed by the nourishment they bring.”

**CUBA YM** I think a poet must write their epistle (perhaps Jorge Luis Peña?), because it begins with, “Una vez más se abren la esmeralda y el azul, armoniosos colores de la localidad gibareña, para recibir a los 90 delegados de las diversas juntas y misiones. A través de nuestro saludo llegue a ustedes el amor, la gracia y la paz de nuestro Señor” which I translate to mean “Once again the emerald green and the blue, harmonious colors of the Gibara area, open up to receive the 90 delegates from the diverse meetings and mission points. May our greeting bring you the love, grace, and peace of our Lord.” Their theme was the text, “Lord of the harvest, send forth workers!” and they acknowledge their call to the work of preaching the good news of Christ despite their limited means, with the hope of transforming Cuban society.

**EVANGELICAL FRIENDS CHURCH – EASTERN REGION (EFC-ER)** 198th gathering with the theme “Daring to Change, embracing the Unchanging.” In the keynote address, their general superintendent, John Williams, presented “5 Great Reasons to Change which included to reach people (even ‘outsiders’), to meet real needs of people, to connect with generations, to incarnate (or ‘flesh out’) the Gospel, and to earn credibility in our world.” Approximately 200 of their Hispanic members attended their Saturday Hispanic worship time.

**FINLAND YM** chose the theme of Eldership. Fifteen Friends met to address the theme and also their YM’s concern to find a “spiritually Quaker-based ground for our economic issues.” They conclude with these words, “Members are needed in order to form a community, and eldership of an accompanying and patient nature makes it possible for a community to grow in a disciplined fashion. A seed has been sown and will hopefully grow into further thoughts about eldership with Finnish Yearly Meeting.”

**FRANCE YM** held their 86th annual session, and were very pleased to welcome new young families with small children, which “augers well for the future of the YM.” Their theme was discernment, which helped them with very difficult business sessions: “The business meeting of our assembly found itself in torment, exercised by currents of emotion and unspoken feelings, which finally arrived at two “minutes” calling for the creation of two commissions, one to discern a shared vision for our French Quaker Assembly, the other to propose the structures which will enable us to better incarnate that vision in the secular France of the 21st century.”

**GERMAN YM** had 206 Friends gather for their 79th YM. “In our final meeting, we unanimously agreed on the proposal from a group of Friends to ask the political policymakers of our future government to abolish the compulsory military service, not to create a professional army, and instead to make funds available for civilian conflict resolution.”

**GREAT PLAINS YM** 103rd annual sessions. GPYM “is entering into an exciting time of rediscovery and clarification of its purpose and ministry....An important area where we seek to grow is in allowing our actions to arise out of worship, rather than from our preconceived ideas of what should happen. In this way, we hope that we might learn from our Good Shepherd how best to demonstrate our love for God and neighbor.”

**ILLINOIS YM** 136th annual sessions under the theme “Seeking and Sharing Our Spiritual Home.” With a newly acquired house and six acres, they explored the metaphor of “homes” among each other, within the wider Quaker-world, in the natural environment, and the built environment. “The Peace Testimony, a context in which we also share our spiritual home, was a theme in various worships, presentations, and a business session in which we worked on our response to torture.”

**INDIANA YM** The theme was “Testimonies,” stories of individual experiences of divine leadings of the Lord’s mercy and protection, and most of all, salvation through Jesus Christ. “We were reminded that the fundamental basis of our fellowship is knowledge of the saving power and example of our Savior.”

**INTERMOUNTAIN YM** Their 36th annual gathering invited our own Kara Newell (Reedwood Friends, Portland) because of her extensive Quaker service. She asked them to consider several questions, such as, “Is service different in the 21st century?” And “Do we temper our leadings to do service by being responsive to the voices of those that we seek to serve?” Kara challenged her hearers to “pray daily for a person [you] find ‘difficult,’ in order to ‘live love’ as well as to speak it. As John Woolman reminds us, ‘Love is the first motion.’”

**IOWA YM (CONSERVATIVE)** 133rd annual session with the theme, “Tapping into God’s Love.” Their keynote speakers came from outside the Conservative Friends’ tradition, and much of their work during this time was preparing to welcome the 2012 Friends General Conference (FGC) Gathering. “We were challenged to reflect upon what it means to be Conservative Friends, and how we relate now to our historic practice of complete dependence on the Spirit in both worship and ministry. The spiritual practice of our meeting finds daily expression in the morning meetings where the business of the yearly meeting is considered in a prayerful search for unity.”



**IOWA YM ADULT YOUNG FRIENDS** wrote their first ever epistle, because this was their first year of existence as a separate group. "One of the goals of our groups was to become more involved with the adult meeting. Along this line, two of our members involved themselves with the youth programs (Junior YM), while we all enjoyed serving on various committees throughout the week and enjoyed attending worship and business meeting. This taste of adult meeting was unexpectedly rewarding and refreshing." They close with this plea: "Our group would greatly appreciate some contact with other AYF groups from around the country!"

**IOWA YM YOUNG FRIENDS** rejoiced in staying in a high school dorm with their friends instead of having to stay with parents or sponsors. "Our service project was pretty awesome. We helped re-shingle the small greenhouse behind our dorm with Adult Young Friends. The farm sheep watched us work. Danielle placed a red shingle on the roof among the black and green ones for Scattergood to remember her by. She will visit it in future years....[We] decided to make our own pizzas for movie night. There was a dispute over some pizza dough ingredients, but in the end, we came to consensus."

**JUNIOR YM OF IYMC** had a total of 12 children participating, five of them six years old. "A clerk visited our business meeting and showed us how Friends make decisions. We practiced making decisions in a way that makes everybody happy even though we don't always get everything we want....A guest came and taught us how to do yoga, and we taught her some 'yoga moves' that we made up."

**LAKE ERIE YM**, which is less than 50 years old, met with the theme "Where There Are Shadows, There Is Also Light." Lloyd Lee Wilson, a Conservative Friend from North Carolina, was their keynote speaker of a message title, An Epistle of Hope in a Discouraging Time. "He challenged us to examine our lives carefully to see where the seeds of damage to creation lie. He helped us recollect our heritage by pointing out that being faithful means living a life with God at the center, and following the leadings that result; that is, living as if the Kingdom of God is here now. As we proceed we have the tasks of being vigilant in the encouragement of spiritual growth everywhere, all the time, and inviting others to join us in this work."

**MEXICO, 38TH GENERAL MEETING OF FRIENDS** chose the theme of next year's World Gathering of Friends: Salt and Light: Living the Kingdom of Heaven in a Broken World. "In light of the reality that we are now living in Mexico, being salt and light...means that just as a little salt can season great things and the light guides us towards obedience to the will of God, we should look for and promote actions that help to counteract evil influences in Mexico and in the world."

**NEW YORK YM** wins the award for the briefest theme: Peace. "A highlight of each day has been the fifteen minutes at the conclusion of the morning session when all ages gathered to share open community worship....We have

laughed and shed tears of affection, listened deeply and been heard, shared our differences and affirmed one another in love. We are not as rancorous in our disagreements as in the past and are hearing more of our joy and affection for one another. God has truly been in this place."

**NORTH CAROLINA YM** developed a new vision statement which is: "North Carolina Yearly Meeting of Friends is a faithful, passionate, growing community of Christ-followers, drawn together by God's love and truth as continually revealed through the saving Grace and the Light of Jesus Christ and the Holy Scripture. As Quakers, we seek God's purpose, and go as God's people into the world to love, reconcile, and transform through the power of the Holy Spirit."

**NORTH CAROLINA YM (CONSERVATIVE)** gathered for their 313th annual sessions with the theme Spirituality and the Arts. Following a couple of panel discussions on the history of Friends' relationship to the arts, a "rich dialogue ensued...that opened us to the many positive ways the arts are capable of enriching our lives. We gained awareness as well of the negative potential of the arts as we learned a little more of earlier Friend's attitudes who considered engagement with the arts as an inappropriate use of time that could be perilous for one's spiritual life. Through our discussions we heard our peers speak of how their spiritual condition and, therefore, their lives in general had been affected positively by art and the way art connected them spiritually to others. We held an open-air art fair on Seventh Day evening where all were welcome to bring and display their artistic endeavors."

**NORTH PACIFIC YM** chose for their 38th annual session the theme Practicing Hope: Living and Witnessing Our Testimonies. "Our task of revising our Discipline [that is another name for Faith & Practice -ed] has become a living and lively process. Our goal is to provide a faithful, clear, complete description of the depth and breadth of faith and practice in this yearly meeting in this time. We leave here well aware that the ocean of darkness threatens to rise....We take strength and courage from Fox's vision of the 'Ocean of Light' as well as Bridget's [their keynote speaker, Bridget Moix] closing reminder that we are not alone. 'That's the power of community, to uplift and multiply each other's gifts,' she said. Considering the abundant gifts in our midst, there is much reason for hope."

**NORTHERN YM** Their 35th session in Rosholt, Wisconsin, had a theme from British YM Faith and Practice: "LET YOUR LIFE SPEAK". When decisions have to be made, are you ready to join with others in seeking clearness, asking for God's guidance and offering counsel to one another?" Out of their 353 in attendance, 108 were children with 62 of them teens. They hired their first YM employee to plan and facilitate nearly monthly youth retreats.

**OHIO VALLEY YM** 190th annual session with the theme of "Celebrating Friends as Family: Nurturing the Future." The children and youth were a large part of the YM, with the sessions provided free of charge for them. They are



very much a part of their present and future part of the YM. They brought their bikes and learned of bike safety and went on bike trips.

**OHIO YM (CONSERVATIVE)** Reflecting on their almost-concluded 198th annual session they write, "Yet it is not the work that we have done, but the work that Christ has been doing in us, as His body, that truly matters....During our work in His business, we have been reminded of a prophecy given in worship decades ago that great electric cords of communication would emanate from our meetinghouse to the farthest reaches of the globe, and that we now see that prophecy fulfilled through our website, Facebook page, emails, and a Twitter page created on the spot during our proceedings."

**PACIFIC YM** Theme of "Engaging One Another in Spirit." "Vanessa Julye's advice on racial exclusion and George Lakey's illustration of Friends' exclusiveness based on social class resonated as two notes of a chord. Our challenge is to find the right notes of resolution." They discussed moving much of their business to representative meetings and whether approving the final budget should be by the general gathering. Their budget is stretched by the cost of the annual session and the cost of the Youth Program Coordinator position. They are committed to the Youth Program Coordinator position. There were intergenerational "chat boxes" at dinner where they exchanged responses to queries such as "Are Quakers open to change and able to move with the times?"

**PHILADELPHIA YM** Their 330th Annual Session had the theme, "We Make the Road by Walking: How Are We Called to be Prophets in Our Witness?" Adults and children met together, inspired by images of planets, stars, and constellations, and learned the steps our children use to discern God's Big Idea for us. They set goals for right living in their environment, pastoral care, in their ways of doing things and in their finances.

**RAMALLAH FRIENDS MEETING** celebrated the 100th anniversary of their meeting house, with participation of Friends from around the world including our own Wilbur and Lorie Wood (West Hills Friends, Portland). "We heard from Palestinians and Israelis who are working together to end the occupation, lift the siege on Gaza and restore their human and civil rights by nonviolent means. We have heard in particular calls to international solidarity with these efforts through a nonviolent programme of boycott, divestment and sanctions. We are filled with gratitude and hope by the witness of these Palestinians and Israelis and...ask Friends to consider adopting boycott, divestment and sanctions as we may be led to do, individually or corporately.

**SOUTH CENTRAL YM** They met for their jubilee year and celebrated their history and growth. In a region where Friends sometimes find themselves hundreds of miles from the closest meeting, they were delighted to embrace Norman, Oklahoma, as a new monthly meeting. Friends from around the yearly meeting drove great distances to join them in their inaugural celebration.

**SOUTHERN APPALACHIAN YM AND ASSOCIATION** 40th annual session had the theme "Discerning the Way." Meeting for business proceeded with careful discernment and a noticeable reduction in nitpicking. "We approved two revised sections of our Faith and Practice, one on community and the other on marriage. There was a deep quiet experience of joy that after many years of wrestling with the issues around marriage the Spirit led to unity among us," They were delighted in the growth and activity of their Junior Friends and Young Adult Friends.

**SOUTH EASTERN YM** 48th Annual Session as belonging to both Friends General Conference and Friends United Meeting. After five years laboring they made a decision to lay down their membership with FUM. They still want to be in a loving relationship with FUM and some will continue to be involved in their programs. There was a delightful epistle from the young Friends read by a 10-year-old.

**WILMINGTON YM** 119th annual sessions with the theme of "Giving As Christ Gives." In 1927 a Wilmington Friends Sunday school class sent a doll named Ellen C to Nagasaki, Japan. This doll was hid and survived the war. She has been returned and is on display at the Heritage Center entitled "Bridges of Friendship" and shows how children can learn peace through toys.

**AUSTRALIA YM** Meeting on the lands of the Indigenous Darwal Nation, they were heartened by the affirmation of mutual involvement between the Aboriginal and Quaker communities. They were blessed by interconnection with Quakers in the FWCC Asia West Pacific Section and Friends from Aotearoa/New Zealand.

**AOTEAROA/NEW ZEALAND YM** They were blessed by visitors from Australia, South Korea and Britain along with reports from the FWCC Asia West Pacific Section. Patricia Macgregor from Aotearoa will be the new section clerk. They also brought concerns about the Aotearoa constitution and how it puts power in a political elite instead of equal power that was embodied in the 1840 Tiriti o Waitangi/Treaty of Waitangi. The suffering of members in the earthquakes in ChristChurch helped in identifying with those in Japan.

**IRELAND YM** Their theme was "Let Your Life Speak." The summary of the yearly meeting epistles from around the world encouraged them in this and gave them the feeling of being united with Friends from many different places. The use of the term 'Quaker' limits the potential for outreach since there is familiarity with the term that does not open them to questions and dialogue. The term 'Friends' requires explanation of who they are.

We just completed our 120th year providing excellent academic programs informed by a deep commitment to the truth we find in Jesus Christ. There is much to highlight at the university. We are in the second year of a partnership with the Northwest Yearly Meeting aimed at strengthening our Friends recruitment efforts and our leadership programs. Dr. Eloise Hockett and several members of the School of Education have continued their efforts to develop a reconciliation curriculum for the primary and secondary school system in Kenya. ### CONNECTIONS FLOURISH BETWEEN FRIENDS AND FOX

It's been two years since we launched the Friends Leadership Program at George Fox, and since then our Friends students have turned required activities into a living, breathing connection crucial to both institutions.

In particular, I think of two students - Alyssa Robert (Reedwood Friends) and Nolan Staples (Newberg Friends) - who, for different reasons, entered George Fox as freshmen with intentions of transferring after their first year. Through relationships they developed, questions they asked, and experiences they encountered, both decided to stay and have flourished.

I think of other students - Elizabeth Rogers (Newberg Friends), Chris Lee (Newberg Friends) and Jacinda Thomas (Netarts Friends) - who have or will

serve as resident assistants in our residence halls, doing the challenging work of serving their peers and getting the opportunity to share frequently with other students how Quaker beliefs and practices influence their work as RAs.

And I think of the whole group, who, during their first semester at George Fox, meet weekly to discuss issues related to the Friends church, wrestle with vocational goals, or support each other through the ups and downs of life as a college freshman.

These stories cannot qualitatively measure the impact these students are having on creating an embodied understanding of the relationship between George Fox and the Yearly Meeting. But I do know that if they continue to live into this calling as they have been for the past two years, it won't be long before the hopes of a small program will become an essential part of the lifeblood of both institutions.

### BRINGING A MESSAGE OF PEACE AND RECONCILIATION TO AFRICA

For the past three years, George Fox's School of Education has developed a collaborative educational relationship with Kenya - a connection sure to be strengthened this year through a Friends grant.

Eloise Hockett, director of the licensure and Master of Education programs at George Fox, was recently awarded a \$10,000 grant from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting to further the peace curriculum project in Kenyan Quaker high schools. She will travel to Kenya several times in 2011 to work with Kenyan secondary leadership to expand the curriculum to more schools and provide training in specific teaching strategies for implementing the curriculum.

George Fox's relationship with Kenya began in 2008, when the School of Education responded to a request from John Muhanji, director of Friends Ministries in Africa, to assist with writing a curriculum for peace and conflict management for ninth-grade students in Quaker high schools. This request was prompted by the 2007 post-election violence in Kenya, which disrupted the country and displaced many people from their homes and communities.

Out of this violence, the Quaker high school leaders recognized an urgent need to have a curriculum that would promote peace and conflict resolution in their schools. The members of the George Fox team working on this curriculum have included Lon Fendall, Scot Headley, Linda Samek, Kristin Dixon, Ken Badley, Suzanne Harrison, Marc Shelton and Eloise Hockett.



**"EVERYTHING IN LIFE IS A GIFT, AND IT'S OUR  
RESPONSIBILITY TO DO GOOD"**

Is it possible? Can a global, public company turn a profit while focusing on the biblical principles of caring for people and serving communities? If Matt McKenzie, 31, is the example, then the answer is an absolute "Yes."

McKenzie who earned a degree in Christian ministries in 2002, is the president of CUI, Inc., a Tualatin, Oregon.-based company his father founded in 1989. The company has mainly been a distributor of power supply products but is shifting into developing its own technology. CUI's revenue last year was \$40 million, up from \$25 million the year before.

All the while, McKenzie's business embraces the importance of giving back. "Every Christian should tithe and give as much as possible. The business is no different. Our core statement said everything in life is a gift, and it's our responsibility to do good. We've always had this principle of giving."

CUI had always given a lot of money to local charities, but McKenzie wanted to do something more. He wanted to get his employees involved in the process. Reaching back to his days at George Fox, McKenzie created a Serve Day for his company. Once a year, all 60 employees perform some act of service. In addition, each division within CUI takes another day each year for its own Serve Day.

"The principles of the Bible are great, but average, secular people might write that off," McKenzie said. "We took language from the Bible and translated it into good business practices. People are going to get the gospel whether they know it or not."

**"PASSING ON TO THE NEXT GENERATION THE SKILLS TO HEAL, THE  
PASSION TO TEACH, AND EYES TO SEE ..."**

Marcella Gowan, an assistant professor of nursing at George Fox, was working with World Concern on the Ethiopia/Somalia border in 1981 when a physician specializing in relief work suggested she and other nurses stop treating and start teaching.

She has applied the lesson ever since.

She has since taught traditional birth attendants and ran a clinic for children and pregnant women in a leprosy village in Somalia; delivered babies in wretched conditions in Djibouti, Africa; and taught lifesaving skills to nurse midwives and obstetricians in Tajikistan.

In 2010, Gowan's lesson of educating others came full circle when she led a group of George Fox nursing students to Ethiopia, where they both taught and learned. "I didn't want students to say we were coming to serve," she says. "I wanted an exchange between the Ethiopian nurses and our students."

George Fox students worked in a clinic side-by-side with national nurses. They learned from the nurses how to give immunizations and provided "kangaroo care" to newborn twins who were so cold their temperatures did not register. "The students turned the situation around," says Gowan. The twins survived.

Now working on her doctorate of education, Gowan continues to learn. And rather than just focusing on the person in front of her, she's multiplying her efforts, passing on to the next generation the skills to heal, the passion to teach, and eyes to see a world full of promise.

**"SERVING THE POOR AND ORPHANS IS AT THE  
HEART OF GOD ..."**

There are 150 million orphans in the world today, and that breaks Tom Davis's heart.

As the CEO of Children's Hope Chest, Davis partners orphanages around the world with Christian communities in the United States. Churches, universities or other communities of faith are paired with a site in one of nine different countries: Russia, Uganda, Ethiopia, Swaziland, South Africa, Moldova, India, Guatemala or Haiti.

Davis, in the inaugural cohort of the global missional leadership track in the Doctor of Ministry program at George Fox Evangelical Seminary, stresses that the communities think of the orphanage overseas as an additional campus to the church, filled with kids who are God's little boys and girls. For this reason, Children's Hope Chest requires a minimum three-year commitment, with the sponsoring organization making a detailed development plan and planning annual trips to the orphanage.

Children's Hope Chest began in Russia shortly after the fall of Communism, when the country was in crisis. Recently, the organization entered another country in crisis: Haiti.

So, what can we do? Davis stresses the importance of people giving their voice and impacting their circles of influence. "Biblically, for the church, serving the poor and orphans is at the heart of God and what every Christ follower is to do," he says.

**UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCHERS'  
QUEST FOR A CANCER CURE**

A grant by the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust Foundation is giving undergraduates at George Fox the opportunity to help fight breast cancer - a disease that will kill 40,000 women this year alone.

Biology Professor John Schmitt wrote his proposal for the \$39,500 grant in September 2009 and submitted it to Murdock. Scientists from around the world



anonymously reviewed the proposal and passed it along to another panel of experts that awarded the grant. Matching funds by George Fox pushed the total to more than \$47,000.

The grant helps the Biology Department and George Fox in multiple ways : It gives the university credibility with scientists involved in biomedical research, finances equipment purchases for future students, opens the door to additional grants, and creates paid jobs for undergraduate students.

Jessica Magill, Jessica Milligan, John Schmitt, Amanda Ankeny and Samantha Smith are spending two years working on breast cancer research.

“They are doing things as junior s and sophomores that I didn’t do until I was in graduate school,” Schmitt said. “It ‘s exciting to see a 20-year-old comprehend science I didn’t fully appreciate until I was well into my PhD.”

The project is called “Vitamin D Regulation in Breast Cancer Cells.” Schmitt and the students are testing whether or not the hormone Vitamin D can slow down or stop the growth of cancerous cells.

#### BE KNOWN

George Fox University introduced its new brand creative strategy last fall, which communicates the university’s promise in two powerful words –Be Known.

The promise unites the university’s programs and people under its most powerful brand asset - our desire to know our students personally, academically and spiritually.

As a Christ-centered university rooted in the Friends tradition, we believe George Fox is uniquely designed to foster authentic and meaningful relationships that lead to personal transformation. Making these types of connections, inside – and outside of the classroom, sets us apart.

In the last few years, the university has considered its future, particularly in light of the changing environment in higher education where online methods of education are on the rise. After deliberating on our core strengths and mission, the university concluded that a predominately online model is inconsistent with our goal of providing Christ-centered education for the whole person.

“Against the tide, we are strengthening our commitment to high-touch education that educates the whole person and provides the greatest potential for personal transformation. This can only be fostered by genuine relationships in the context of a Christ-centered community focused on loving God and people,” explains President Robin Baker.

#### OF NOTE

The first cadre of Act Six students graduated this spring, with seven of the original nine students receiving their degree and another student set to graduate in December. That marks a graduation rate of 89 percent. The leadership and scholarship program provides full scholarships to selected urban leaders in the Portland area.

George Fox will offer a three-year doctor of physical therapy degree beginning in the fall of 2012. The addition will make George Fox only the second school in Oregon - and the only Christian college in the Northwest - with a physical therapy program.

Oregon’s current and former poet laureates visited the Newberg campus for “A Celebration of the Life and Poetry of William Stafford” in January. Paulann Peterson joined Lawson Inacla, Oregon’s poet laureate from 2006 to 2010, for an all-day event in honor of Stafford, whose poetry was replete with themes of peace, nature, place, compassion and truth.

At this year’s Kaleo conference in February, more than 400 youth pastors and other attendees heard copresenters Kara Powell and Jon Furman discuss ways to make kids’ faith “stick”after high school.

After the massive 9.0 earthquake and following tsunami that struck Japan in March, the university’s Trauma Response Institute organized a “Notes of Encouragement” campaign to reach out to the Japanese people. “Some of the contributions we received include letters and artwork from local schoolchildren.”

Students, staff and faculty donned bright yellow shirts for a week last winter to bring awareness to a social justice issue. The shirts, which read “Free the 43” referred to 43 health care workers who had been unjustly detained in a Filipino military prison for 297 days.

Several hundred members of the George Fox community signed petitions sent to Oregon senators and Filipino President Benigno Aquino III.

The prior year summarized comparative information has been derived from the Organization's December 31, 2009 financial statements, which were reviewed by us, and in our report dated June 7, 2010 we stated that we were not aware of any material modifications that should be made to those statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our review was made for the purpose of expressing limited assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The supplemental information as listed in the table of contents is presented only for supplemental analysis purposes. Such information has been subjected to the inquiry and analytical procedures applied in the review of the basic financial statements and we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made thereto.
