### NWYM Council of Representatives Meeting

**APPROVED:** Representatives were seated and Brad Holton, presiding clerk, asked for approval of the presented draft agenda; which was approved by the representatives.

Meeting adjourned with prayer at 3:39 PM

*Monday July 24, 2017, 8:15 AM*

*Approximate attendance: 190*

1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened its 125th annual sessions on Monday, July 24, 2017, on the campus of George Fox University. We come together in worship to make decisions and to think about the issues that affect our community. Some Quakers call this a "meeting for worship with attention to business" to remind us that we listen to the Spirit as well as each other. The theme for this year's session is When Grace Happens...

2. Roger Watson led us in worshipful singing. Ephesians 4:32

3. Brad Holton, presiding clerk, welcomed all, reminded representatives to sign-in, forecast of agenda, highlighting visioning groups for the future of NWYM, and invited visitors to make introductions:

Phil Baisley, Earlham School of Religion, Richmond, Indiana

Keith Barton, Western Association of Friends and Berkeley Friends Church, Berkeley, California, presented a traveling minute.

Anna Baker noted that representatives Dorothy Day and Jay Thatcher, from North Pacific Yearly Meeting were unable to attend.

Jim LeShana, Barclay College, Haviland, Kansas

A letter of introduction for Kate Gould, FCNL, was given to the clerk.

4. **APPROVED:** Ellen Morse, clerk of the Nominating Committee, brought the name of Joy Lujan, Caldwell Friends Church, for recording clerk, for one year. It was approved.

5. Retha McCutchen presented the Superintendent's Report, see addendum (page 23).

Shawn McConaughy voiced appreciation for Angela Kantz's ministry as office manager. Several from the floor expressed appreciation for Angela as well.

6. Newly appointed Teachers Abroad to China, Daisy Gallegos and Tiffany Graham, were introduced by Shawn.

7. George Fox University – Robin Baker, president, stated the mission of George Fox is to seek to be a faithful Christian presence in the northwest. The university appointed a subcommittee comprised of board members to assess whether any response is needed from them regarding NWYM's transition. George Fox is intentionally partnering with local churches in Newberg, and will continue their relationship with NWYM.

Robin Baker gave tribute to the influence of Arthur Roberts, long-time professor, who passed away earlier this year.

David Green, member of Tigard Friends and chairman of George Fox Board of Trustees, spoke of the university's commitment to embody grace to deal with difficult issues, respect different perspectives, and worship God together.

Ken Beebe offered a prayer of blessing for George Fox University.

8. Friendsview – Lisa McMinn, chairman of the board presented her report.

Third-generation of residents! ~ 500 community members; financially strong, lobby remodel, health center updates, kitchen remodel, garden deer fence, security system, and sound system. Value relationship with NWYM

9. Worship through singing, led by Roger Watson.

10. Administrative Council Report – Debbie Harrison, assistant presiding clerk, presented the report. The Administrative Council (AC) generally meets twice each month on conference calls, in fall and spring retreats, and during yearly meeting sessions. Each committee member is assigned

to a yearly meeting board as a liaison with the intent to serve each board and provide support as needed. Each spring retreat, board clerks are invited to meet with the AC and share their ministry plans and budget requests for the upcoming year.

Eight individuals were approved to the George Fox University Board of Trustees, five of whom are members of NWYM of Friends Church. Those appointed were: David Andersen, Dan Cammack (F), Don Carter, Raymond Cheung, Estle Harlan (F), Barbara Palmer (F), Ken Redford (F), and Kent Thornburg (F).

Anthem Friends Church in Hayden, Idaho, withdrew from the yearly meeting. A subcommittee of AC members, elders, and trustees was formed to recommend a property settlement. A settlement was offered to Anthem, which was declined. Anthem retained the church property as well as property at Twin Lakes Friends Camp. The Administrative Council did not pursue this matter further.

Two share calls were approved for 2017. A share call for Greenleaf Friends Academy was sent out to the YM this spring and a share call to support Vancouver First Friends will go out in the fall of this year.

After 2016 yearly meeting sessions, the elder's decision to release West Hills Friends Church (WHFC) was sent to the representatives, who met in called session on December 6, 2017. The representatives were unable to reach consensus and the issue was returned to the Administrative Council. On January 27, 2017, during midyear boards in Newberg, the AC announced the decision that they would assist in the creation of a new yearly meeting. Churches separating from NWYM during the restructuring process may retain ownership of their church property, along with any indebtedness. A transition team consisting of members of the AC, trustees, finance committee and others, has been meeting together and will be making recommendations to the AC in the near future. The AC is committed to completing the transition with dignity and respect for all NWYM churches. The goal is to complete the transition process by June 30, 2018. Churches still in an active discernment process must notify the clerk by June 1, 2018, requesting an extension. Extensions will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Due to uncertainty of finances, the AC approved laying down the two full time Associate Superintendent positions for the time being. The task force will help create vision and direction for the future NWYM and its staffing needs.

The AC has set aside time during morning business sessions for visioning groups to meet and share together dreams, hopes, and visions for the future of NWYM. Leaders and questions have been prepared for these

groups meeting Tuesday and Wednesday morning. Notes from these discussions will be provided to a task force, which will be formed this fall. This Wednesday during business, the clerk will provide more information on the membership and functioning of this task force.

The AC's decision from midyear board can be found in the addendum on page 48-49.

Following the reading of the AC report, Hillsboro Friends and North Valley Friends each read a minute expressing their concern over how the decision to release churches from NWYM was handled by the AC. Minutes from Rosedale Friends, Scotts Mills Friends, and Greenleaf Friends expressing support for the AC decision were received by the clerk prior to yearly meeting but were not read during business sessions.

Several people asked questions regarding the Anthem decision and the matter was referred back to the AC for further consideration.

Brad closed our time of worship through business at 12:01 PM.

## 2017 Northwest Yearly Meeting Epistle

*"Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." Isaiah 43:18-19*

To All Friends Everywhere:

We send you our love in Christ from the campus of George Fox University in Newberg, Oregon, USA, where we gathered from our local meetings in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, for our 125th annual sessions. We received greetings from Jim LeShana, Barclay College, Kansas; Phil Baisley, Earlham School of Religion, Indiana; Keith Barton, Berkeley Friends and Western Association of the Religious Society of Friends; and Nikki Nahmens Gage, Berkeley Friends, California.

An event that is normally a joyful reunion took on a more sobering aspect this year. Several churches were not in unity with a decision of the Administrative Council in January 2017 concerning adherence to the Yearly Meeting's Faith and Practice. We spent much of Monday morning's business session addressing the various ways the decision impacts our yearly meeting. These sessions are the last that will be attended by churches who have discerned they are unable to align their practices with NWYM Faith and Practice. Space was given for them to meet for business throughout the week.

Roger Watson led the morning worship music while Nate Macy led music during the evening services.

In her keynote address on Sunday evening, Retha McCutchen, interim yearly meeting superintendent, set a challenge before us to take this year's Yearly Meeting theme seriously: "When Grace Happens..." It happens in a concrete time and place among obedient people who may be diverse, but are united in discipleship.

During business sessions, some Friends felt that we were being asked to move too quickly through the necessary division and healing process. For this reason, Presiding Clerk Brad Holton asked the whole Yearly Meeting to pray through A.C.T.S. - Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication. One Friend after another approached the microphone and prayed for one of these points.

This year was marked by several transitions. Shawn McConaughey, who will be leaving his position as associate superintendent of Global Outreach, was honored for his many years of service. We acknowledged the retirement of Marilyn Harmon from her long-term teaching ministry in China. Johan and Judy Maurers' residential service in Russia came to a close. Retha McCutchen will continue to serve as interim general superintendent. Several board members have had their terms extended for a year during the transition process.

A portion of our business time for two days was devoted to visioning groups discussing hopes, visions, and dreams for Northwest Yearly Meeting's future. Notes from these groups went to the Administrative Council for use in strategic planning for the future.

The youth met together this week in business and worship. Together, they wrote a letter, read to the yearly meeting on Wednesday, as a response to the restructure expressing their desire for continued fellowship among the youth.

Our evening worship services moved us through the themes of "Relinquish", "Remember", and "Saying our Goodbyes". In this and many other ways, we sought to bless each other even as we determined that we could not bridge our differences.

## BOARD OF LOCAL OUTREACH

This year has been an exciting year for BoLO as we sought to define and live out our essential purpose. We began at Yearly Meeting 2016 by discussing the question, "Why does BoLO exist?" We were encouraged by how much unity we had around why we exist and what we needed to do to live into our call as a board supporting local churches in their call to seek the Kingdom in a particular place.

We implemented monthly video meetings where BoLO members, candidates for board membership and those leading ministry points overseen by BoLO, could share, pray and support one another. On these monthly video meetings we were able to regularly review our finances and hear directly from ministers around the yearly meeting about their efforts to be Jesus to their communities.

Along with praying for and providing support to existing ministry points, we worked with Hillsboro Friends Church to realize a vision for deepening their presence in their neighborhood. By helping them to use their assets of property to fund new ministry in downtown Hillsboro, they were able to make great strides toward this vision. We are greatly encouraged by the networks they are building with other faith-based and local government agencies to serve the most vulnerable in their midst. Reimagining a new way of funding ministry has been fun and exciting for all of us.

We also supported a group of churches in Southern Idaho as they reimagined Latino ministries from a model of hiring a Spanish-speaking pastor to lead Casa del Alfarero congregation at Greenleaf Friends to exploring what it would look like to launch a regional, truly bi-cultural expression of church that recognizes that the needs of first generation immigrants are different than the needs of second and third generation Latino Friends. The development of this ministry is exciting and a testimony to what Christ can do when we let go of preconceived ideas of how "we have always done it" to listening to God, people and our locale for direction.

Most importantly, we stayed focused on what we discerned in our first meeting to be our purpose amidst turmoil in the yearly meeting. Rooting our board in the need to focus outward toward Kingdom work on behalf of our neighbors and neighborhoods has been a great unifier among our board of diverse perspectives.

## BOARD OF GLOBAL OUTREACH

**We send Friends to find ways to bless the people and nations where they live. It's one of our answers to Jesus' call to love God and love our neighbors, at home and throughout the world.**

**The Friends we send are rooted in relationship with Jesus Christ and aligned to NWYM Faith and Practice. We seek to express God's love in thought, word, and deed. We pray that this love-as-service extends the Kingdom of God.**

The Board of Global Outreach carries out this mission by sending, caring for and supporting our Friends Serving Abroad (FSA), our teachers in the Teaching Abroad programs (TA), through our short-term service program called Friends Traveling in Service (FTS), and in the ongoing relationship with our sister Bolivia and Peru yearly meetings. Highlights from this year include:

- Johan and Judy Maurer continued their teaching English at a private college in Elektrostal; Natasha Zhuravenkova's visit to our 2016 Yearly Meeting sessions brought great blessings to our Northwest Friends and our growing relationship with Russia Friends (we appreciate all who made this visit possible and all who took time to interact with Natasha); Johan's continuing work within the larger Christian community in Russia is evidence of the Maurers' unique gifting in building valuable and transforming relationships with the broader Christian community of Russia; the tea/hospitality events hosted by the Maurers continue to be a special time of listening and sharing. During our 2017 midyear board meetings, Johan and Judy announced their intentions to retire from full time service in Russia by June 2018. In the next year, the Maurers will be visiting our local churches to share about Russia, express their deep appreciation for prayer and financial support, and host a short-term "Learning Tour" to Russia this coming fall (contact Shawn McConaughy or the Maurers if you have interest in participating in this special tour); continue short-term teaching assignments in Elektrostal; and the translation in Russian of classic Friends books (joint work with Natasha). I encourage each of our churches to create space and opportunity for the Maurers to share their appreciation and hope for our future efforts in Russia. Please keep Johan and Judy in your prayers during this time of transition and for our Russia friends as they say good-bye to the Maurers. On a personal note: I feel so blessed to call Maurers my friends and our FSAs to Russia.

- This past year, Elizabeth Todd was granted valuable time to remain stateside for rest and renewal. (Also Elizabeth was required to be out of country for six months in order to apply for a new visa.) She has been working in a "red-zone" where daily occurrences of violence and ongoing injustice takes its toll on the spirit of our FSAs. Elizabeth

has worked hard these past three years to serve our vision for Middle East ministry and has experienced wonderful results as we seek to “find and make friends of Jesus” both in the Ramallah Friends School and in the larger Palestinian community through the “Friends English Experience” (FEE) classes as well as the IAU, a Palestinian social service organization with a mission to empower women and girls. But this investment has also resulted in a heavy cost to her heart. So this past year has been a valuable time of renewal and rest. This has also been an important time for our board to better understand how to support our FSAs and FTSS in “red-zone” fields. Elizabeth has resumed deputation work to our yearly meeting churches as she prepares to return to the Middle East this fall. Please pray for the visa process – that this will be completed in a timely matter. On a personal note: Matt Macy (EFM assistant director) shared that Elizabeth was one of his hero’s of the faith. I share that same sentiment for Elizabeth.

- This past year we did not have any FTS folk working in Ramallah. This was primarily due to some raised political tensions and Elizabeth’s visa situation. Lynn Holt and Cheryl Engel both plan to return to Ramallah this coming fall. Please pray for them as they prepare to return – that they will have strong prayer and financial support. On a personal note: I hold great respect for these women of faith. Thank you for your passion and service.

- Teachers in China continue to impact the lives of the university students. This past year Will Allen and Marilyn Harmon were our two TAs. We are so fortunate to have two blessed and gifted individuals teaching English at the university in Wuhan. William will continue to work with TA as he does language school and supervises our new teachers. Highlights of this past year: Shawn McConaughy attended a special event honoring Marilyn’s years of faithful service and retirement from English teaching in China. A second highlight was Shawn’s attendance at Will’s wedding in North Carolina this past May. We have two TAs who will be teaching in Wuhan this next fall: Daisy Gallegos and Tiffany Graham. Pray for our new team of TAs as they prepare to serve in China. On a personal note: A tremendous thank you to Marilyn and her faithful steady service in China. Pray for her as she transitions back to the United States and her next season of service in the U.S.

- During the first part of the year (July - December 2016), Karen Swenson enjoyed a sabbatical in the United States. It was a beneficial time to rest and be refreshed, to research issues related to retirement, to meet and share about her work with supporters and others, and to visit past students and their families. In January 2017, Karen returned to her ministry in Hungary. Activities in the past six months have included:

- o Teaching Algebra 2 to a grade 8 homeschool student

- o Tutoring 21 students, including six middle school students (in grades 6, 7, and 8), and 15 high school students (in AP Physics, AP Statistics, Algebra 2, and Algebra 1)

o Test preparation for SAT and ACT for 22 students, mostly juniors

Karen is continually reminded by parents and students that her assistance to them enables God's work to be done more effectively in Eastern Europe and beyond. On a personal note: Karen is an amazing gifted teacher who God is using to challenge young minds in God's Kingdom. Pray for Karen as she continues this incredibly important service to missionary families in Eastern Europe.

- Bolivia/Peru INELA Relations Subcommittee continues the valuable work of strengthening our "sister" relationship to the Bolivian and Peruvian INELAs. They continue to oversee the work of Hal and Nancy Thomas on the Bolivian History Project (2018 completion goal). Bolivia and the subcommittee continue to work on a renewed plan for grant funding for the Bolivian Missions project. This is the final year of funding (five years of funding through the Men's Missions Banquet offering) for the Bolivian Missions. We are seeing blessed fruit from Ken Comfort's timely visit to Peru Yearly Meeting in 2016. God is doing a great work of renewal, reconciliation and growth of Peruvian leadership. God is at work through the faithful efforts of our Bolivia/Peru INELA Relations Subcommittee. Pray for our friends in Bolivia and Peru that God will continue to plant within their hearts a passion for finding and making friends of Jesus. On a personal note: We are blessed to have an active committee of veteran missionaries serving on this subcommittee. Pray for young adults to come alongside to continue this valuable ministry to and with our Bolivian and Peruvian Friends.

## ENRICHMENT

Our board's ministry is focused on developing leaders at many different phases of life.

### **Coordinator of Friends Leadership Training:**

Leslie Murray began transitioning out of her role as Friends Recruiter at NWYM in May. Around the same time I began to take on the role as Coordinator of Friends Leadership Training. Leslie and Retha McCutchen improved the job description and title to better reflect the scope of work Leslie had been doing by the end of her term. The position focuses on recruitment, retention and training of Friends students at both George Fox University and Portland Seminary. During my first month on the job, I met with Financial Aid and Admissions staff at George Fox as well as coordinator of the Friends Leadership Program, Jamie Johnson. We are exploring two new ideas: Fridays At Fox with Friends -- a coordinated visit for Friends prospective students to visit Fox at the same date, where they will be able to meet with current Friends students and Friends professors. Another idea is to have an event where all Quaker students are invited to a meet and greet social to kick off their semester. I was introduced to the pastors at Pastors Conference. This year I taught at our Friends leadership retreat (Samuel School II) for high school students around the northwest. There were 11 students and I spoke on the topic of vocation and how that translates to ministry in our faith community, professional community, etc. I continue to consult with Leslie from time to time. She has been very encouraging and generous in sharing her time to train me.

### **Friends Leadership Program:**

Senior Presentations - two FLP seniors graduated this spring.

1. Breanna Thomas Becker has a concern for the lack of educational programs for middle school students on addiction and pornography. For her senior project, she developed a six-week program for female middle school students on addiction and pornography. She will be presenting her project at a YM workshop in July.

2. Melanie Schroeder's presentation provided a lot of insight on the lack of Quaker literature in the non-fiction arena, and how Quaker authors might provide a way forward.

#### **Pastoral Care:**

## TRUSTEES

I would like to thank my fellow trustees, Lloyd Pruitt, Barry White, Steve Gulley and Dave Green for their work on the committee over the past year. Dave Green joined the Trustees this year after Bruce Longstroth stepped down at the end of last year.

Once again this year we provided counsel to the Yearly Meeting staff as well as several churches on legal and property matters.

- We have consulted on the “laying down” of the ministry at Sprague River in southern Oregon. The property will be evaluated in the coming weeks and decisions made with a course of action relative to the property.
- We provided counsel to Olympic View Friends Church in the matter of allowing the pastors to construct a 378 square foot “tiny home” on the Olympic View property, ensuring that foreseeable issues would be addressed.
- The trustees, along with two members of the Administrative Council and two members of the Elders, spent considerable time on the Anthem Friends Church request to leave Northwest Yearly Meeting. The committee sent a recommendation to the AC in August 2016.
- We also consulted with Lynwood Friends Church as they are considering selling a portion of their property. Lloyd Pruitt was especially involved in this counsel.

The annual State of Washington property tax exemption filings were completed prior to the deadline of March 31, 2017. This will ensure that those churches will retain their tax exempt status for 2017/2018. It should be noted that some Washington Friends churches complete their own tax exempt filing.

After the Administrative Council decision to accommodate a restructure in the YM with some churches forming a new yearly meeting (or association of churches) and possibly some churches deciding to become independent two of the trustees (Gordon Crisman and David Green) were appointed to a transition team to work on the logistics of this restructure.

As trustees we feel it is an honor to serve the 60+ churches of the Yearly Meeting.

## VOLUNTEERS ON WHEELS

Volunteers On Wheels, VOW for short, currently has 30 members. While we have added one new member this year, the number of participants has been slowly declining in recent years. This has led us to consider whether we should continue this program in its current format. At this year's Rendezvous, we determined that while we had no shortage of opportunities to provide services we do not have enough volunteers to meet this need. A task force has been convened to explore the possibility of simplifying our structure and processes to improve our ability to serve.

We have had many applicants for service in the past year and work projects have been completed for:

Equipo, Friends Cemetery in Newberg, George Fox University, Greenleaf Friends Church, Love INC in Newberg, Newberg Friends Church, Quaker Cove Friends Camp, Quaker Hill Friends Camp, South Salem Friends Church, Tilikum Friends Camp, Twin Rocks Friends Camp.

Rolling doors have been installed, foundations poured, shrubs trimmed, flower beds weeded, equipment repaired, buildings painted and many more projects have been completed this year. This has resulted in 1,890 hours worked and 5,861 miles driven by volunteers and saving the ministries involved almost \$30,000.

In addition, we have current requests for help from Caldwell Friends Church (remodel a rental house), Vancouver Friends Church (remodel the parsonage), Scotts Mills Friends Church (paint the sanctuary) Entiat Friends Church (sealing the basement walls and building a fence) and additional work to be performed at Friends Cemetery, Quaker Cove, Quaker Hill, and Twin Rocks.

While we respond to work requests at any time, our planning for each year begins at our Annual Rendezvous which was held May 15 - 18, 2017, at the Polk County Fairgrounds in Rickreall, Oregon.

## **EVANGELICAL FRIENDS MISSION**

This is a big year for EFM. In 1967 (50 years ago!) the joint missions effort that has come to be known as Evangelical Friends Mission sent its first missionaries and planted its first church. The first missionaries were Roscoe and Tina Knight of what was then called Oregon Yearly Meeting (now Northwest Yearly Meeting). The first church was in Mexico City and is called La Familia Unida en Cristo (The Family United in Christ). Fifty years later this first church has been joined by approximately 250 more Evangelical Friends churches in Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal, Mexico, Philippines, Rwanda, and in Europe and the Southwest of the United States where Muslims from the Middle East have settled. We look forward to seeing Evangelical Friends churches planted in Ireland and Ecuador as well as in other parts of the world where the Lord may send us in the coming years.

### **A FEW HIGHLIGHTS FROM JULY 2016 TO JUNE 2017**

- In November a new committee of EFM began functioning under the leadership of Jennifer Buck (EFC-SW). This committee is called Global Ministry Training and is dedicated to partnering with Evangelical Friends around the world as they strive to create and/or strengthen their leadership development programs. As partnerships form, various subcommittees will be created to work with specific programs. Our model for this is the Great Lakes Leadership Training subcommittee which has been working for many years with ministry training programs in Burundi, Rwanda, and the Congo.
- In early January, John and Sangi Vanlal wrapped up more than 20 years of service with EFM in Nepal and returned to their homeland in Mizoram, India. They left behind a yearly meeting of about 40 churches called Evangelical Friends Church-Nepal (EFC-Nepal). The leadership of this yearly meeting is in the capable hands of Amen Thapa and the executive council.
- In February, Mexico Yearly Meeting formed a missions board and commissioned its first missionaries. The couple who was commissioned is Jaime and Lupita Leon from Aguascalientes. They are being sent to the state of Sinaloa to pastor a Friends church in the village of Siete Ejidos and to help prepare the way for a team of missionaries to plant other Evangelical Friends churches in that part of Mexico.
- In May, the Michael and Kathryn Linville family returned to Northern India after being in the U.S. for several months for the birth of their twins. They have been welcomed back to the same village in which they were living and are continuing with their language and culture learning.

• In June, the EFM Board approved sending the Russell and Sarah Badgley family to Ecuador for their first term of missionary service. They will locate in the city of Macas (where they did their field experience) for the first half of their term in order to make more progress on their language and culture learning as well as develop deeper bonds with the Christian community in that area. While this is going on they will identify a place outside of Macas that can become a base from which to reach the Shuar tribe with the Gospel. We are praying that the Lord will raise up Evangelical Friends missionaries to form a team with the Badgleys on that base.

## SOME BIG CHANGES

• In February of this year we closed down our office in Arvada, Colorado, and laid off dear people who have served EFM faithfully for many years. I'm referring especially to David Cordova (nearly 28 years), Vicki Hinshaw (22 years), and Laurie Mortimore (15 years). Vicki's husband, John, and Sue Jones were also laid off. As you can imagine, this change has been painful for everyone involved. However, the good fruit that the Lord has produced over the years through John, Vicki, David, Laurie, and Sue will remain.

• The closure of the office and laying off of staff were the first steps in a restructuring process that has the following goals:

- o To become more integrated with the yearly meetings/regions of Evangelical Friends Church-North America (EFC-NA)

- o To build our capacity as Evangelical Friends to sustain the mission work we already have as well as to plant new fields and partner with yearly meetings around the world that are or will be planting new fields

- o To enable EFM to be more efficient and effective in its work as well as a better steward of its resources

- o To engage the younger generations in Great Commission work

- o To see if we can finally put to rest the organizational confusion that has plagued EFM for most of its existence by developing closer working relationships with our yearly meetings/regions

• Since February we have been in an interim period with part-time interim staff. Debby McElroy and Brendan and Linda Steinacher are working from Wichita, Kansas, and Andrea Leach from Southern California.

• The address for ground mail has been moved temporarily to PO Box 771139, Wichita, KS 67277. EFM's phone number remains the same: (303) 421-8100. The email address also remains the same: [efm@friendsmission.com](mailto:efm@friendsmission.com).

- The board has met twice so far during this interim period to work on the new structures for EFM. Two consultants from the Genysys Group have helped facilitate this work. Conversations are well underway with the yearly meetings/regions of EFC-NA about how they and EFM can work more closely together.
- Once the new structures have been defined we will know much better what our staffing needs are and be able to hire long-term staff accordingly. It is likely we will not have a centrally-located office where most of the staff works.
- During these last few months we have been able to acquire a new database system and have been transferring our data to it. We are very hopeful that this new system, eventually paired with a new website, will help us better serve those who partner with us through prayer and giving as well as the missionaries themselves.
- We sure appreciate your prayers for EFM during this time of transition as well as your financial support. We look forward to seeing how God will use this restructuring process to make EFM even more effective in mobilizing Evangelical Friends to carry out the Great Commission around the world.

## **GREENLEAF FRIENDS ACADEMY**

Greenleaf Friends Academy is grateful for a God who hears and answers prayer continually! The 2016-2017 year was another big school year with many successes and challenges throughout. The school continues to be blessed through the amazing and dedicated work of those called into support of this 109 year old ministry. The following are only some of the highlights experienced at GFA, but these perhaps give a better insight into what takes place within the organization.

Facility Update: The academy was privileged to be a part of the NWYM spring/summer Share Call this year. This winter's "snowpocalypse" wreaked havoc across Southern Idaho. Greenleaf Friends Academy sustained significant damage to its facility; resulting in a tremendous burden of repairs and renovation of the school kitchen. Blueprints, demolition and cleanup have been completed and renovation has begun. NWYM presented the need in the 2017 Share Call that went out across our yearly meeting in May. The focus is to help the church and the school secure necessary funds to "raise up" the kitchen to usability by



the beginning of the fall semester. God has cast a new and exciting shared vision before the academy and Greenleaf Friends Church. This opportunity, disguised as “disaster” in human terms, is to provide a facility and space larger than our daily needs - to expand the mission and impact of both entities into the community and surrounding rural area. We are trusting God for His continued provision.

**Enrollment Growth:** The academy experienced growth from 150 to 170 students K-12 in 2016. The preschool-daycare program has continued to experience growth through the new infant care offering.

**Faculty:** Exceptionally qualified teaching staff and excellent retention of faculty is also an encouraging sign. The academy enjoys an excellent retention rate of faculty and continued professional growth.

**Classical Education Update:** With the addition of the Shurley English program and a growing emphasis in the “great books,” elementary students have shown excellent growth in language arts and reading skills. With the success this year of implementing some classical elements in the curriculum, strategies for the next phase are planned for fall of 2017.

**Practical Education:** The academy students continue to enjoy a program of “hands on” classes for junior high and senior high students with opportunity to learn some practical life skills such as: home economics (cooking and sewing), manual arts, woodworking, gardening, metal working and concepts in construction. These classes are growing and offer some excellent opportunity to learn practical life skills.

**Serve Days:** Students K-12 participated in at least two school-wide service days including cleanup work at the Greenleaf Cemetery, Historical Museum, community of Greenleaf, Friends Retirement Home, and the academy building and grounds. An elementary choir, The Great Day Singers, participated in a spring tour to various churches and retirement communities in the Treasure Valley.

### **Mission and Vision: Inspired by Romans 12:2**

“Do not be conformed to this world, but continuously be transformed by the renewing of your minds so that you may be able to determine what God’s will is—what is proper, pleasing, and perfect.”

The Academy Board of Trustees, with input from faculty and staff, updated the existing vision and mission statements for the school this year, to more clearly and accurately articulate elements of the ministry and programs at GFA.

**Vision Statement:** “Inspire and empower students to discover their identity and purpose in Christ and His creation in order to effect change in the world now and for eternity.”

## **Mission Statement: “Inspire students to think clearly, act responsibly and serve passionately”**

New Academy Principal: Rod Lowe is a native Idahoan, growing up in Meridian with a father who was not only an educator but also a long time coach for the Meridian School District. Mr. Lowe received his Bachelor's degree from Boise State University and a Master's degree in Educational Leadership from the University of Idaho. His first employment within the school environment was during summers of high school as a maintenance and grounds worker for the Meridian School District. The love of the education process ran strong through his family and seemed to be the career direction God called him to choose. After teaching elementary and middle school for many years, Rod continued his education and became principal and administrator for the Vallivue School District. He recently retired after seventeen years as principal for Vallivue Middle School. Rod has served as choir director and worship team bass player for many years. As if he is not busy enough, he also serves as a chaplain, supervises student teachers for College of Idaho and teaches driver's education. He has been married to his wife Diane (Tharrington) Lowe for many years and they have two daughters and one granddaughter. Diane's father, Charles Tharrington, graduated in 1944 from GFA. Rod counts it a privilege and honor to be the principal at GFA and is so impressed with the very exceptional teachers and staff dedicated to providing a rich education as well as deep spiritual development. Here are a few thoughts Rod shared with students and faculty as summer vacation was about to begin: “My devotion reading today is entitled: ‘Take a Stand Against Strife.’ It talked about guarding our heart and maintaining peace through every situation. Peace is important to your well-being and prevents your body from sickness and diseases associated with stress. Take a stand against those opportunities that cause strife. Rebuke strife in Jesus' name and resist it. You can live in peace every day. (Proverbs 12:20, Matthew 5:9, Romans 14:19) May your summer be full of peace and joy.”

God continues to prompt many individuals and organizations to support the school in many ways, including the challenge of meeting the ongoing financial needs. In the desire to keep tuition costs affordable, being sensitive to the demographics of the surrounding area and providing financial aid scholarships to families with extreme need, the academy is always working to bridge the resulting gap. God has continued to supply our need and affirms His interest and desire for the academy's ongoing mission. The school experienced tremendous outpouring during the 2017 annual auction from business donors and individuals who believe in the importance of the school's mission in young lives. Over \$216,000 was raised at the auction this year. GFA also continues to experience an outpouring of tremendous support from Greenleaf Friends Church and other compassionate Friends; an encouraging acknowledgement that the reinvestment of Quakers in the academy mission is crucial to meeting today's realities and overcoming obstacles. As we look to 2017-18,

we at GFA continue to invite Friends to unite with us in support of the academy’s goal to mature students in Christ through the integration of faith and learning.

The accompanying table summarizes 2016 income and expenses by board. Total income to boards was below budget at \$1,005,582. Contrary to prior years this income did not include proceeds from payments received from the Quincy note which was paid off at the beginning of 2016. Included in income was planned allocation of the Ministry Fund to boards totaling \$94,645. This was approximately \$32,000 less than the previous year.

Local Church Support fell approximately \$30,000 from the prior year to \$433,256 and was approximately \$5,000 below the adjusted budget. Local Church Support payments represented approximately 44% of income in 2016.

Total 2016 income from individual giving was \$463,493, inclusive of restricted and unrestricted contributions. This was the largest source of income, approximately 47% of total income. Restricted giving, coming from individuals and churches, supports specific ministries, such as Friends Serving Abroad, Teachers Abroad, seminary scholarships, local outreach efforts, Youth Challenged programs and other vital ministries as directed. The use of restricted funds in 2016 was \$333,063. Unrestricted gifts of \$130,430 were used to fund general expenses where needed within those boards to which they were directed.

Total expenditures for boards during 2016 were \$1,005,582. This was \$11,936 less than board income which allowed for a return of this amount to the Ministry Fund. Total expenditures were approximately \$85,000 under budget. Included in total expenditures is approximately \$53,000 of unbudgeted expenditures which were paid for through restricted giving. These expenses included Friends Traveling in Service, short-term overseas trips, Youth Challenged programs, and church match scholarships.

The 2016 ending balance of the Ministry Fund (MF) was \$1,267,718, a \$9,626 drop from 2014. This was due to the planned decision to use additional MF resources to fund yearly meeting ministries, though less than in previous years. Investment gains, however, offset most of this additional use. Cash flow from other MF sources, such as notes receivable, enabled adequate cash flow without having to liquidate investments. Total designated and restricted fund balances for all boards, including the Ministry Fund, were \$2,119,771. This represents a gain of almost \$86,000. Several estate gifts were given to the Global Outreach Board and to the Board of Leadership Development for seminary scholarships.

## PUBLIC STATEMENT

To: Northwest Yearly Meeting

Date: January 28, 2017

From: Administrative Council, Brad Holton Clerk

Since the end of yearly meeting sessions, the clerks, along with the superintendent, and the administrative council have labored and wrestled together over the issues currently dividing NWYM. Following the called Representatives meeting on December 9 and 10, the clerks and superintendent separately and together discerned that the yearly meeting is so evenly divided that consensus around the Human Sexuality issue is not likely in the foreseeable future. These leaders also agreed that without some decisive action, the yearly meeting would fracture maybe one, two or four churches at a time, but it would fracture.

Three options were brought to the Administrative Council in retreat on January 12-14. The AC made a decision to present to the Representatives at Mid Year Boards.

At the representatives meeting held this January 27 and 28 in Newberg, the clerks and Administrative Council announced their decision to guide the yearly meeting through a restructuring process. The restructure is as follows:

Newly Formed Yearly Meeting	Northwest Yearly Meeting
This yearly meeting would embrace a revised <i>Faith and Practice</i> .	This yearly meeting would be composed of meetings who align with current Northwest Yearly Meeting <i>Faith and Practice</i> .
This group would be composed of meetings that lean toward or have decided to hold and/or recorded an affirming stance.	This may include churches who have internal disagreement but have agreed to align their practices with current NWYM <i>Faith and Practice</i> .

A Transition Team, formed of elders, AC members, trustees and other at large members will facilitate the creation of a newly formed yearly meeting. Churches who hold an affirming statement may be a part of the newly formed yearly meeting or may choose to be independent. It is the intent of the administrative council, that churches separating from NWYM during this restructuring process, may retain ownership of their church property, assuming any indebtedness. All other issues of property, assets, and related organization connection questions raised because of the restructuring process will be addressed by that Transition Team. The Transition Team will be appointed by the AC and report to them.

This process will be a lengthy one and the AC is committed to completing the transition with dignity and honor for all NWYM churches. Our goal is to complete this transition process on or before June 30, 2018.



## GEORGE FOX UNIVERSITY REPORT

We just completed the celebration of our 125th anniversary, and it was a great year. As you walk through Canyon Commons during the Yearly Meeting Sessions, I would encourage you to pause for a few minutes and read the displays that are on the wall detailing some of our history. When the early Friends founders of Newberg planned the community, they wanted to create an excellent learning space for their children. Their vision for education started with the development of an elementary and secondary system in the mid-1880s and led to the creation of Pacific College in 1891. The founders were adamant that the schools should provide an excellent education while deepening students' faith in Christ. There are many universities in the United States that began with such a vision, but George Fox is one of those places that has remained true to its original commitment. We love Jesus and learning.

As we reflected on our past we were always impressed with the sacrifice of those who came before to keep George Fox going during difficult times. It is hard to imagine what it was like in the 19th century. For us, distances are easy to traverse and the automobile makes it possible to get in your car and drive hundreds of miles a day. That was not true in 1890. You may know that the Friends established a church and a community along what is today Springbrook Road near the present-day Allison Inn. While it seems like just a short distance now, in the 1890s it was a difficult two-mile hike along muddy and sometimes dusty roads. Some of the children attending Friends Pacific Academy even had to take a daily walk that included traversing the railroad trestle to get to school. That is not a "walk" I would want to take today, but it shows how important it was for early Friends parents to make sure their children were getting a proper education. Whether through personal sacrifice, financial commitment or consistent prayer, those who came before us made sure that the mission of George Fox remained vibrant and committed to the original vision.

Today, more than 4,100 students come to George Fox to "be known" by God and by those who follow him. We have nearly 600 faculty and staff who are committed to helping students excel in their life calling and to know Jesus more personally. When former president Levi Pennington was imagining the future of the college he saw a place that drew students and supporters from every Christian denomination and one that was a bright light for the Christian community in the Northwest. We may not have completely arrived where Pennington imagined, but we have certainly advanced the vision of becoming the Christian university of choice in the Northwest.

Thank you for your partnership with and support of George Fox University. We are happy to be part of the Northwest Yearly Meeting.

## Remembering Arthur O. Roberts

I came under the influence of Arthur Roberts (Class of 1944) beginning in the fall of 1960. He was at the height of his academic teaching career, and I was an eager, if somewhat ill-equipped, college freshman. This only meant that I needed to study harder than most everyone else if I was to succeed in college. And Arthur was exceedingly kind to me and encouraged me in ways too numerous to count.

I majored in religion and philosophy and so, as God's providential care would have it, Arthur was the key figure in my training. How very fortunate! I took courses in biblical studies and logic and ethics and philosophy and much more. These courses opened up an expansive world of knowledge and wisdom and right reasoning. I do want to pause for just a moment on one course in particular. It was entitled *The History of Christianity*. Ron Stansell and I took it together, and every week we traveled by car with Arthur into Portland, where he taught this course at what was then Cascade College. He assigned us the magisterial text *A History of Christianity* by longtime Yale professor and Oregon native Kenneth Scott Latourette. To this day I still use this text and have worn it ragged.

Right here in this course began my furious love affair with the "devotional masters." I entered the world of Philo of Alexandria and Evagrius of Ponticus, of Augustine of Hippo and Francis of Assisi, of Bernard of Clairvaux and Hildegard of Bingen. I wrestled with the penetrating thought of John Calvin and John Wesley, of George Fox and George Herbert, of Toyohiko Kagawa and Madame Jean Guyon. And so many, many others.

What a dazzling array of people and ideas this opened to me. You see, somehow I had this notion that there was the early church (the book of Acts) and then there was . . . me. I guess I recognized a little blip at the Reformation, but that was about it. But here I was being invited into an exotic world dancing with engaging individuals and challenging ideas and wonderful living traditions. This course planted deep into my soul the foundational concepts for a book I would later write: *Streams of Living Water*.

Yes, I eventually did begin to write. In my very last meeting with Arthur he reminded me that in my college days I frequently – too frequently for him – used “big words.” (After so long how did he remember that detail?!) I was, of course, learning to work with language. And it was Arthur who taught me to love words: to love their sound, to love their meaning, to love their history, to love their rhythm.

You see, Arthur handled words in a way that was new for me – as treasure to be cherished rather than propaganda to be maneuvered. He had a special regard for the mystery and the power of words. In fact, words seemed to usher him into another world, a world that I could only look at from a distant shore. But what I saw tantalized and encouraged me to see more, even to visit this world if only as a foreigner. It was a strange world to me as an enthusiastic sophomore – a world in which zeal and insight met in friendship, a world in which truth and beauty kissed each other.

*Editor's Note: Roberts passed away December 15, 2016, at the age of 93. He graduated from Pacific College in 1944, and in 1949 famously wrote a letter that helped persuade Pacific College leaders to change the school's name to George Fox. He served the university as a professor from 1953 to 1987, as faculty dean from 1968 to 1972 and as professor, at large, from 1987 to 2016. He was named Alumnus of the Year in 1964, and in 2016 the university's Roberts Center was named in honor of Arthur and his wife Fern. ### **‘Theologia’ initiative encourages connecting faith to daily living**

A grant of \$462,000 from the Lilly Endowment Inc. is being used to fund “Theologia,” an initiative dedicated to helping rising high school juniors and seniors learn theology that connects to their personal lives. The annual week-long institute began this year, meeting June 25-30 on the Newberg campus.

In addition to learning from George Fox professors, the institute gathered local leaders in fields such as business, engineering, health care, law and social work. These professionals led workshops for the students on the theological foundations of their chosen careers.

In addition to classroom work, the program integrated lessons through daily experiential learning with outings to downtown Portland, the Nike campus, the Columbia River Gorge and Camp Tilikum, as well as a trip to a local movie theater to learn about the intersections of theology and film.

George Fox is one of 82 schools, located in 29 states and the District of Columbia, participating in the initiative. Although some schools are independent, many reflect the religious heritage of their founding traditions, which include Baptist, Brethren, Lutheran, Mennonite, Methodist, Presbyterian and Reformed churches, as well as Roman Catholic, non-denominational, Pentecostal and historic African-American Christian communities.

“These colleges and universities are well-positioned to reach out to high school students in this way,” said Dr. Christopher L. Coble, vice president for religion at the Endowment. “They have outstanding faculty in theology and religion who know how to help young people explore the wisdom of religious traditions and apply these insights to contemporary challenges.”

George Fox’s College of Christian Studies partnered with Portland Seminary to host Theologia. The four primary principals of the grant – Roger Nam, Leah Payne, Steve Sherwood and Trisha Welstad – partnered with local churches and denominations to create a unique experience for the campers, who were housed in dorms on the Newberg campus.

“George Fox has been very effective at integrating theology into undergraduate education, not just those called into vocational ministry, but also for business people, medical health professionals, lawyers and teachers,” said Nam, associate professor of biblical studies at the seminary. “We are pleased we have the opportunity to develop similar theological conversations with high school juniors and seniors.”

The Endowment is giving \$44.5 million in grants to help a select group of private four-year colleges and universities around the nation to create the institutes. The grants are part of the Endowment’s commitment to identify and cultivate a cadre of theologically minded youth who will become leaders in church and society.

## **Of Note: Highlights from 2016-17**

### **Record enrollment tops 4,000 for first time**

For the first time in its 125-year history, George Fox broke the 4,000-student mark with 4,140 enrolled last fall, including 2,707 undergraduates and 1,433 in graduate programs. The total eclipsed 2015-16's enrollment of 3,931. In all, it was the fourth year in a row and the 27th time in 30 years that an enrollment record was set.

The record-breaking year continues a trend of significant growth over the past three decades, with overall enrollment increasing more than seven-fold since 1986, when 549 students attended. To further put recent numbers in perspective, 2016's incoming class of 767 new or readmitted students is 40 percent higher than the total enrollment was 30 years ago.

### **A new name: Portland Seminary**

George Fox Evangelical Seminary changed its name in January to Portland Seminary – a move that helps strengthen its regional presence and expand its national outreach, according to seminary leadership. Located at the university's Portland Center campus, Portland Seminary continues to be a part of George Fox University. Along with the new name are some significant changes to both program offerings and marketing strategy, with a focus on the new shorter, more memorable name that projects a sense of place.

The announcement comes a little more than 20 years after the seminary's last name change, when what was then Western Evangelical Seminary merged with George Fox in 1996. That merger led to more than one name change, as George Fox College became George Fox University.

### **University organizes first Health and Wellness Week**

In a tangible display of community building, the university hosted its inaugural Health and Wellness Week in mid-March, drawing more than 200 people to campus for 5K and 10K runs, free behavioral, exercise and nutrition classes, and a pool party for children with special needs.

Sponsored by the university's School of Physical Therapy and Office of the President, the event served a twofold purpose: raise awareness of the healthcare needs in Yamhill County communities and offer resources and activities to address those needs. The event was such a success that plans call to bring it back in 2018 and perhaps expand it.

The week culminated with a "Beat Baker" 5K run that drew nearly 50 runners. The 10 runners who crossed the finish line ahead of university president Robin Baker were rewarded with a bumper sticker to commemorate the accomplishment.

## **Construction underway on future home of swim team**

The Chehalem Aquatic and Fitness Center is undergoing a \$19.9 million renovation project, and that's good news for future George Fox athletes. The new facility will feature a 25,000-square-foot natatorium housing a 6,900-square-foot competition pool when completed in spring 2018.

That's perfect timing for the university to launch a swim team in the fall of 2018. Plans call for a coach to be hired by fall 2017 in order to begin recruiting about 45 male and female athletes who will compete over 16 dates at the NCAA Division III level. George Fox will be the only Christian college in Oregon to offer the sport.

Located on Haworth Avenue, the aquatic center is just a short walk from the university's Morse Athletic Fields. George Fox has pledged to contribute \$500,000 toward construction costs, to be made in \$100,000 installments over five years.

## **Students save big with eTextbook initiative**

More than 600 George Fox students reaped a very tangible benefit from the university's new Open Textbook Initiative: cash. A total of \$118,885, to be exact. That's what these students would have paid if they purchased new textbooks rather than the free eBooks now offered in their place.

Supported by the university's Innovation Fund, the initiative allowed George Fox to join the Open Textbook Network, which curates a collection of quality, peer-reviewed, open textbooks published under a Creative Commons license. Stipends offered by the university encourage faculty to incorporate the free textbooks into their syllabi, and also to review and author their own open textbooks.

A total of 13 courses adopted open textbooks during the 2016-17 academic year, benefiting 611 students, including a single General Chemistry course that saved 184 students a total of \$47,840. The initiative has already received funding for a second year, with plans to adopt even more open textbooks into current curriculums.

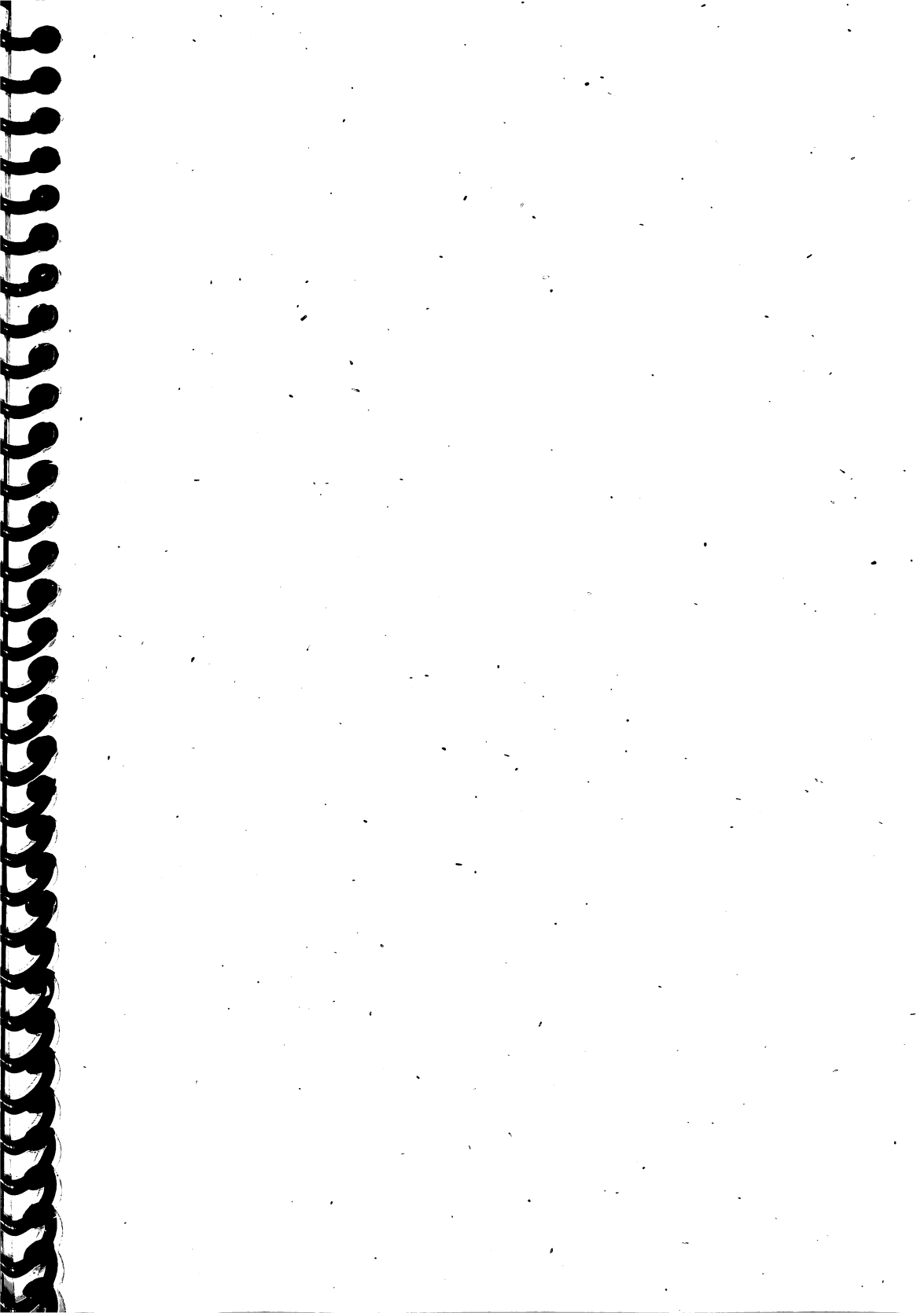
