by this time, but why don't you tell
me your new address, in the Dekum
Building or anywhere but the Failing.

Dear Friend:--

You will be glad to know from somebody besides
your man that he was there on the job at the annual convention
of the Oregon Council of Churches, and that he was given a wee
bit of time to tell those "shepherds of the flock" about the
herds of heifers, which he did in a good way.

You will be glad to know that we got into the resolu-
tions a statement of the dire need across the seas, and an urge
that the churches increase their giving.

You will be glad to know that ~~4~~ ^{copies} of these resolu-
tions were ordered to be sent to every church in Oregon.

Unless a certain insurance man in Tacoma is a great
liar, and there is no indication in that direction except his
business, he and his wife are both warm friends of yours and
real admirers. They went on to California, and hope to see
Norcross while down there, though they are not sure of it.

Sorry I could not be in two places at once, to go with
Daniels to buy heifers. I've written to tell him that I'll be
glad to help later if I can. Tomorrow I hope to talk to the
Civic Club (the woman's organization) in an effort to get them
to give a heifer.
