Maurice Friedman is Professor of Religion at Temple University, Philadelphia, and advisor to the Ph.D. emphasis on religion and psychology in the department. He is also a member of the regular teaching staff of Pendle Hill and was a member of the Working Party for the Future of the Quaker Movement for the five years of its existence. He is the author of *Martin Buber: The Life of Dialogue* and *To Deny Our Nothingness: Contemporary Images of Man*, among other books, and has had close association with psychiatrists and psychologists of many schools for fifteen years through teaching, lecturing, leading small groups, and membership in the Council of the Association for Existential Psychology and Psychiatry.

Elined Prys Kotschnig is a Jungian analyst, practising in Washington, D. C., and a member of the Friends Meeting there. Born in Wales, she did Student Christian work in Rumania after World War I, married Walter Kotschnig and lived eleven years in Switzerland where their three children were born and where she received her training under C. G. Jung. She came to the U. S. in 1936. Elined Kotschnig was the first chairman of the Friends Conference on Religion and Psychology and has edited its journal, *Inward Light*, since 1950.

Joseph Havens is a Quaker clinical psychologist, working in the Health Service of the University of Massachusetts and in community mental health in the city of Holyoke. He has published a number of articles, reviews and one book in the area of psychology and religion, and a Pendle Hill Pamphlet, *Journal of a College Student*. He is now writing and publishing in the field of small group process and leadership as this relates to pastoral counseling and religious experience.

J. Calvin Keene is currently Professor of Religion and department chairman at St. Lawrence University. He taught for 15 years in the Howard University School of Religion and before that at Colgate University, the American University of Beirut, and the International College, Izmir, Turkey. He has a bachelor's degree from Lebanon Valley College and a doctorate in philosophy of religion from Yale University. Calvin Keene is author of *Meditations on the Gospels*, and editor and reviser of *Western Heritage of Faith and Reason*. He is a member of Florida Avenue Meeting in Washington, D. C., and was the editor of *Quaker Religious Thought* during its first five years.
