John R. Yungblut received his theological training at Harvard Divinity School and the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Cambridge, Mass., after graduating from Harvard College in 1934. After some twenty years in the ministry of the Episcopal Church, he became a member of the Society of Friends in 1960. He served as Director of the Mission to Isolated Liberals in Mississippi and Louisiana for the American Friends Service Committee in 1959-60, Director of Quaker House in Atlanta, 1960-68, Director of the International Student House in Washington, 1968-72, and is currently on the teaching staff at Pendle Hill.

T. Canby Jones has taught religion and philosophy at Wilmington College since 1955. He currently serves as chairman of its Humanities Division. Author of many articles in *Quaker Life* and several in *Quaker Religious Thought*, he has published a book, *George Fox's Attitude toward War* (Annapolis, Academic Fellowship, 1972). He has been associated with the Quaker Theological Discussion Group since its founding at the Pan-American Friends Conference at Wilmington in 1957, serving as editor of *QRT* from 1964-1969 and as chairman of QTGD since that time. He is vice-chairman of the American Section of Friends World Committee, and edited the study booklet, *Quaker Understanding of Christ and of Authority*, in preparation for the National Faith and Life Conference to be held in October, 1974.

● *Friends Quarterly*, next to *QRT*, is the Quaker publication most involved in theological discussion, both in single-issue articles and ongoing interchanges. Theology isn't *FQ*'s sole topic, nor even its main topic. It is, however, a continuing and central topic.

● *Friends Quarterly* is the only English-language Quaker publication that specializes in middle-length articles. As such, it fills an important gap.

● *Friends Quarterly* is published in England. Many of its articles are wholly relevant to Quakerism anywhere. The specifically British articles (history, biography, comment on current matters) are long enough not to require reader background in London Yearly Meeting; they are therefore a first-rate introduction to British and European Quakerism.
