Director of the Center for Peace Learning at George Fox College, **Lon W. Fendall** is also Editor of *The Evangelical Friend*. For ten years he was associated with Senator Mark O. Hatfield in various capacities, beginning as Legislative Assistant and concluding as Staff Director, Committee to Reelect Senator Hatfield.

Lon Fendall's academic career began with a George Fox College B.A. in history and religion/philosophy and led next to graduate work in African Studies at the University of Ghana on a Rotary International Fellowship then to an M.A. and Ph.D., both in history, at the University of Oregon. He has written a number of scholarly papers and publications on conflict resolution and alternatives to violence.

T. Vail Palmer, Jr. is a member of Reedwood Friends Church in Portland, Oreg., of Northwest Yearly Meeting (EFA). Originally a birthright member of Philadelphia Yearly Meeting (FGC), he has also been a member of FUM meetings. Vail holds a doctorate in Christian social ethics from the University of Chicago.

A longtime participant in the QTDG, Vail has served as its treasurer and as editor of *QRT*. Concerned for peace, he worked as a staff member of the AFSC and the Central Committee for Conscientious Objectors, and was twice convicted of draft resistance (one of these led to a term in prison). Vail has taught philosophy and religion at Rio Grande College (Ohio) and Kentucky Wesleyan College. He now operates a computer for a paper bag manufacturing company and teaches occasionally in Reedwood's Center for Christian Studies.

John Punshon is a tutor in Quaker Studies at Woodbrooke (the study center maintained by British Friends in Birmingham, England). In 1957 he graduated in politics, philosophy and economics from Oxford, and subsequently studied education and law at London University. John Punshon has served as political research assistant with the Labour Party, a journalist with the British trade union federation (the TUC), a councilman for a London borough, a parliamentary candidate twice, failing narrowly to secure election at the second attempt. He has taught school, and worked in a law office, but is now occupied solely by commitments to Friends.

John Punshon's wife is Head of English in a multiracial inner-city school, his daughter a dressmaker, his son an options executive on the London stock exchange. John Punshon's publications include *Alternative Christianity* (1982), *Portrait in Grey* (1984), and *Encounter with Silence* (1987). He is an elder of Cotteridge Meeting in Birmingham.

Academic teaching of religion, and peace and war are special interests of **Lonnie Valentine**. Currently he is Teaching Associate in Emory University's Department of Religion for courses in World Religions, Jewish Ethics, The Holocaust, and Contemporary Religious Thought. As he works on his dissertation concerning nonviolent action and process theology, he also works with the Atlanta Friends' Sanctuary project.

Between a B.A. in Liberal Arts at the University of the Pacific (1970), and a B.A. in Philosophy at the University of California (Irvine, 1975), Lonnie Valentine did alternative service as a conscientious objector. He is an honors graduate of the Earlham School of Religion (M.A. 1983) and a Ph.D. candidate at Emory. Concurrently with his ESR studies he held several positions with the Peace Tax Fund Campaign in Washington, D.C. His "Zen Buddhism and the Psychology of Education" appeared in the *Journal of Psychology*, 79(1971):103-110. He is a member of the American Academy of Religion and of the Atlanta Friends Meeting.
