ARTHUR BERK served on various committees of New York Yearly Meeting while a member of Morningside and Manasquan (New Jersey) meetings. BORIS SUDARUSHKIN lives in St. Petersburg, Russia. He is a translator of chemical documents. His interest in Quakerism came through the spiritual testing of his peace convictions during the Afghan war and has been nurtured by contacts with European and American Friends.
