### Contributors

D. Elton Trueblood is widely known for his many books (20 as of this writing), for his clear and forceful speeches, and for his contributions to ecumenical Christianity. A birthright Friend, he is currently professor of philosophy in Earlham College, having taught previously in various colleges and universities. For more than a year he was Chief of Religious Information of the United States Information Agency. He took his earned degrees from Iowa College, and Harvard and Johns Hopkins Universities. He is a member of the Board of William Penn College and of the Church Peace Union, and president of Yokefellow Associates.

Herbert M. Hadley, after serving for eight years as meeting secretary of the Friends Meetings of Washington, D. C. and for six years as general secretary of the Friends World Committee for Consultation with his office in Birmingham, England, was recently appointed executive secretary of the Friends World Committee, American Section and Fellowship Council. He was formerly a member of the Kansas Yearly Meeting and was educated at Northbranch Academy and Friends University.

George A. Selleck, a birthright member of the Friends Meeting of Emporia, Kansas, took his A. B. degree from Friends University, his A. M. from Harvard University, and his B. D. from Hartford Theological Seminary. After serving for four years as meeting secretary in Lincoln, Virginia, he became secretary of the Meeting in Cambridge, Mass., a position he has held (with the exception of two years in Finnish relief work) since 1934.

James R. Stein has been pastor of the Friends Meeting in Poughkeepsie, N. Y. for the past 11 years and before that served 12 years as pastoral secretary in the Virginia Quarterly Meeting of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, Homewood. At present he is a member of the executive committee of the Friends General Conference and of the board of advisors of the Earlham School of Religion.

John H. Curtis was born and reared in Chicago where he attended the University and then the Walton School of Commerce, passing the examination as a Certified Public Accountant in Illinois. Originally a member of the Episcopal Church, he joined the Evanston Friends Meeting in 1936 and since then has been active in the work of Friends. He is currently clerk of the Germantown Monthly Meeting in Philadelphia and a member of the Continuing Committee on Worship and Ministry of the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting.
