CONTRIBUTORS

MICHAEL P. GRAVES, a professor at Regent University, Virginia Beach, Virginia, taught previously at George Fox College, Newberg, Oregon. His article in this issue of *QRT* was presented at the Religious Research Association Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C., November 1992. He is a leading researcher of Quaker sermons and is active in professional speech associations.

EDWARD F. HIGGINS is a professor of writing and literature at George Fox College, Newberg, Oregon. His article in this issue of *QRT* is based upon a recent doctoral dissertation, "Narrative and Values in the Quaker Journals of Thomas Chalkley, Elizabeth Ashbridge and John Woolman" (Union Inst., 1992). He is a published poet and an active member of the Friends Association of Higher Education.

THOMAS D. HAMM is archivist and associate professor of history at Earlham College, Richmond, Indiana. An earlier version of this article was presented at the Religious Research Association Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C., November 1992. His book, *The Transformation of American Quakerism* (Indiana Univ. Press, 1988), was the winner of the 1986 American Society for Church History *Brewer Prize*.

J. WILLIAM FROST is curator of America's most extensive Quaker collection, the Friends Historical Library, Swarthmore College, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. A frequent contributor of journal articles, he is also the author of *The Quaker Family in Colonial America* (New York: St. Martins, 1973) and (with Hugh Barbour) *The Quakers* (Greenwood, 1988).

DAVID LLOYD JOHNS is reference librarian and adjunct professor of religion at Malone College, Canton, Ohio. He is active in Quaker theological discussion and is a writer of articles on Quaker subjects, including a *QRT* article (#78) on Everett L. Cattell. A graduate of Earlham School of Religion in 1989, Johns anticipates doctoral studies in theology at Duquesne University. He participated this summer in the Parliament of World Religions in Chicago.

PAUL ANDERSON is assistant professor of biblical and Quaker studies at George Fox College, Newberg, Oregon, and assistant editor of *QRT*. He serves as editor of the *Evangelical Friend*, and gives leadership to other concerns of Evangelical Friends International. His biblical specialty is the Gospel of John, on which he has lectured extensively following the completion of his doctoral studies from Glasgow University. Paul has a forthcoming book, *The Christology of the Fourth Gospel* (Tübingen: J. C. B. Mohr).

NANCY THOMAS is a research assistant at Fuller Seminary, Pasadena, California. She holds degrees from George Fox College and the University of Oregon and is in a predoctoral program at Fuller. She and her husband, Harold, served as missionaries in Bolivia for 18 years, during which time Nancy was involved in curriculum development. Friends who know Nancy Thomas best through her poetry will be pleased to learn of a third collection, *A Dream in My Pocket* (Barclay Press, publication pending).
