JENNIFER BING directs the Palestine-Israel program for the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) in Chicago. After attending an Earlham College study abroad program in Jerusalem in 1982, Jennifer worked as a teacher in the Ramallah Friends School during the first Palestinian uprising (1986-1989). Jennifer has worked with AFSC since 1989, organizing dozens of speaking tours, conferences, educational workshops, protests, delegations, advocacy campaigns, and public events. She has produced two documentary films about the Palestinian American community in Chicago and serves as a resource to people interested in activism and advocacy for human rights. She is on the steering committee of the Quaker Palestine Israel Network.

MAX L.CARTER is the William R. Rogers Director of Friends Center and Quaker Studies (Emeritus) at Guilford College and a member of New Garden Friends Meeting, NCYM (FUM). Following his alternative service at the Friends Boys School in Ramallah, he was on staff at Earlham College, Friends Select and Friends' Central Schools, and for 25 years at Guilford College. With his wife Jane, he leads annual service-learning trips to Palestine and Israel. He is a member of the Quaker Palestine/Israel Network.

GORDON DAVIES is a member and Trustee of the Richmond, Virginia, Friends Meeting. He worked in academic administration, coordinating the activities of colleges and universities to make state systems as efficient as possible. He also taught at several universities, including Birzeit University in the Palestinian West Bank. He and his wife, Betsy Brinson, wrote a history of the Ramallah Friends School, Sumoud: Voices and Images of the Ramallah Friends School (2014).

LUCY DUNCAN serves as Director of Friends Relations for AFSC. She has been a storyteller for 20 years and has worked with Quaker meetings on telling stories for racial justice and of spiritual experience. She regularly writes and edits for AFSC's Acting in Faith blog and has had a number of articles published in *Friends Journal*. She serves on the steering committee for the Quaker Palestine Israel Network. Before working for AFSC, she was Director of Communications at FGC, managed QuakerBooks of FGC, and owned and managed her own children's bookstore in Omaha, The Story Monkey. MAIA CARTER HALLWARD is an Associate Professor of Middle East Politics and International Conflict Management at Kennesaw State University.
