PAUL ANDERSON is Professor of Biblical and Quaker Studies at George Fox University, where he has served since 1989. Author of over 200 published essays and a dozen books, Paul is a founding member of the John, Jesus, and History Project (national SBL) and former editor of *Evangelical Friend* and *Quaker Religious Thought*. His recent book, *Following Jesus: The Heart of Faith and Practice*, explores the dynamic character of Christian discipleship from a Quaker perspective, and his "Meet the Friends" series is one of the most widely read set of Quaker pamphlets worldwide.

STEPHEN W. ANGELL teaches Quaker Studies at the Earlham School of Religion. He lives in Richmond, Indiana, with his wife Sandra and two cats, and he is a member of Oxford Friends Meeting in Oxford, Ohio.

"BEN" PINK DANDELION directs the work of the Centre for Research in Quaker Studies at Woodbrooke Quaker Study Centre in Birmingham, England. He is Professor of Quaker Studies at the University of Birmingham and has written numerous books on Quakerism and more recently one on the spirituality of travel. JON R. KERSHNER, Ph.D., teaches in theology and church history at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, WA. He has published on John Woolman, Quaker theology, and global Quakerism. He is a member at North Seattle Friends Church and ministers at McKinley Hill Friends Church.

LEAH PAYNE (Ph.D., Vanderbilt University) is Assistant Professor of Christian Studies at George Fox University and Portland Seminary. She is also a Senior Fellow at the Louisville Institute and a Faculty Fellow at the William Penn Honors Program at George Fox University. Her first book, *Gender and Pentecostal Revivalism: Making a Female Ministry in the Early Twentieth Century* (Palgrave, 2015) won the 2016 Pneuma: The Journal of the Society for Pentecostal Studies Book Award and her second book explores the development of political theology within American Pentecostalism. In 2015, she and three other colleagues received a Lilly Endowment, Inc. High School Youth Theology Initiative grant to co-found Theologia: The George Fox University Summer Theology Institute beginning in 2017. CAROLE DALE SPENCER, PhD. is Adjunct Professor of Spiritual Formation at Portland Seminary at George Fox University. From 2010-2016 she was Associate Professor of Christian Spirituality at Earlham School of Religion. She is the author of *Holiness: The Soul of Quakerism*, and many articles on Quaker history, theology, and spirituality. She is a member of Reedwood Friends Church in Portland Oregon, and a recorded minister in Northwest Yearly Meeting. She has four sons and nine grandchildren. MADELEINE WARD is a doctoral candidate at the University of Oxford, researching the impact of the wider intellectual milieu on the development of Quaker theology (1656-1700).
