

## ABOUT THIS ISSUE

In this issue we are fortunate to have another delightful lineup of authors. The papers authored by James Krippner and David H. Watt, Christy Randazzo, and Cherice Bock were presented at the November 2018 Quaker Theological Discussion Group session on the theme of "Early 20th Century Quaker Theologies of Service."

We start off with James Krippner's and David Harrington Watt's new research into Henry Cadbury (1884-1973). Cadbury was one of the most widely known Quakers of his day, but his anti-war views put him in conflict with many of his peers. "Henry Cadbury, the Peace Testimony, and the First World War" is a fascinating look into the challenges faced by some Quakers in war time. Christy Randazzo then examines the theology of Cadbury's peer, Rufus Jones. Randazzo relates Jones' idea of "Affirmation Mysticism" to Jones' view of human-divine interrelatedness. Next up, Cherice Bock chronicles the way Oregon Yearly Meeting (now Northwest Yearly Meeting and Sierra Cascade Yearly Meeting) members thought about war and service.

Our final article addresses power relationships in Quaker churches. Oscar Lugusa Malande reminds us of the importance of leadership and examines the current practices in Kenya. He contends that the relationship between the Presiding Clerk and the Pastor in Friends churches needs careful communication and humility.

Following these four articles we have three book reviews. Jon Kershner reviews Andrew Murphy's William Penn, A Life (Oxford University Press, 2019). Jay Miller reviews the twentieth anniversary edition of Heaven on Earth: Quakers and the Second Coming by Ben Pink Dandelion, Douglas Gwyn, and Timothy Peat. Cherice Bock then reviews R. Scot Miller's Gospel of the Absurd: Assemblies of Interpretation, Embodiment, and Faithfulness.

I want to express my gratitude to each of our authors for their generous and insightful contributions.

In these final lines I want to announce that *Quaker Religious Thought* will be adding an international rate to our subscription pricing structure beginning in 2020. Our desire is to keep the cost of *QRT* as low as possible. However, mailing costs have increased to the point that at our current subscription rates the journal loses about \$15 on every issue shipped internationally. Beginning 2020, *QRT*  prices on individual international subscriptions will be the actual cost to the journal (\$35 annually, no two-year discount; \$60 international institutional rate). We treasure the international reach of *QRT* and hope to include even more contributions from international authors.

The editorial committee of QRT has been doing a lot of thinking and discerning on what direction QRT should go over the next few years. We are resolved to publicize the good work of QRT through word of mouth and on digital platforms. We will also help the work presented in QRT reach wider audiences. All of these changes will help QRT thrive and continue to be a forum for conversations amongst the branches of Friends.
