OPENING WEEK

Friday, September 12—Dormitories open for freshmen. Beginning of Freshmen Orientation.

Sunday, September 14 — Special church services for freshmen.

Monday, September 15—Continuation of Freshmen Orientation.

Tuesday, September 16—Registration for all classes. 8:00 p. m., Student Body Mixer.

Wednesday, September 17 — Classes convene. 6:45 p. m., first Student Christian Union prayer meeting.

Friday, September 19—8:00 p. m., Formal Reception in honor of new students, sponsored by the Student Christian Union.

TRADITIONAL EVENTS

Social—

Student Body Mixer—The A. S. B. entertains the entire student body with a social affair during the opening days of school.

Formal Reception—The S. C. U. gives a formal reception for freshmen and new students at the beginning of each semester, to which the entire student body is invited.

Big and Little Sister Party—This party for the girls is part of the work of the S.C.U., and is designed to cultivate good feeling among the girls on the campus and to help them get acquainted.

Christmas Party—The S. C. U. sponsors a formal Christmas party in December.

Gold Q Club Banquet—The Gold Q gives a formal banquet near St. Valentine's day.

Freshman-Sophomore Party—The freshman class entertains the sophomores with a party of some kind in the spring.

Junior-Senior Banquet—The juniors give a formal banquet in honor of the seniors, usually in April.

May Day Festival—This year we hold our annual May Day celebration.

The S. C. U. sponsors a May Breakfast on May Day morning. This is open to everyone, including the people of the town as well as on the campus.

G. F. Club Banquet—A banquet is given by the G. F. Club for its members in the spring.

Senior Sneak Day—The seniors observe a "sneak" day in the Spring.

Choir Banquet—A formal banquet is given for all choir members in the spring.

President's Reception—the President gives a reception to the seniors during Commencement week.

Athletic—

Homecoming — November 11 is Homecoming Day. A varied program is arranged for the day, with a football game in the afternoon, and a banquet and program in the evening.

Campus Day—Campus Day is observed in the fall and in the spring by a general clean up, and an athletic intramural meet.

Miscellaneous—

Initiations—The Letter clubs stage novel initiations for their new members each year, and the sophomores initiate the freshmen in the fall.

Student Election—An election to fill all student body positions is held under the supervision of the A. S. B. each spring.

Religious Emphasis Week — One week is set aside when all other activities are secondary to religious activities. Good speakers are secured. The event is sponsored by the S. C. U.

SOME G. F. C. POINTERS

1. All Freshmen except those living in their own homes are expected to live in the college dorms unless other arrangements are made with the Dean or Housing Committee.
2. Dormitory rules are to be observed as posted in the different halls.
3. No firearms of any kind are to be brought on the college campus.
4. All Freshmen are expected to take the English entrance test. Those who are deficient in English shall enroll in the Remedial English class. This course is also required of all students whose English in test papers is unsatisfactory.
5. Attendance at all regular chapel exercises is required.
6. Grades as given consist of two factors; the grade proper in letters and accompanying points as: A—4 points, B—3 points, C—2 points, D—1 point. No grade points are given in connection with failures and incompletes. These are indicated by F and Inc.

Any student must have a grade point average of 1.90 for lower division subjects in order to be classified as a Junior.

An average grade point of 2. is required for graduation.

An average grade point of 2.5 is required for recommendation as a teacher.

A lower division student is automatically placed on probation if his grade point average falls below 1.5. He is then to remain on probation until his average is raised to 1.75 in subsequent terms.

An upper division student is placed on probation when his average falls below 1.75 for any semester or below 2. for entire records. He will not be released from probation until average of 2. is attained.

7. Approval for social functions must be obtained from the Extra-curricular chairman of the faculty.

All college social affairs, all parties given by or for college organizations, and all parties given by or for a class, shall be chaperoned by faculty members (both a man and a woman wherever possible) or someone else approved by the Dean.

All delegations going to represent the school in intercollegiate activities, such as athletics, debate or oratory, shall be attended by someone representing the institution officially.

The dates and arrangements for social affairs or group meetings should be made with the Extra-Curricular chairman of the faculty at least two weeks in advance of the luncheon.

8. All classes and organizations should choose a faculty adviser early in the school year.
9. Student aid is available for needy and worthy students in the form of grants from the Stuart Fund for students above the Freshman rank, in scholarships for a limited number of Freshmen and others from loan funds as available, and in work assignments. Further information as to these various sources of aid may be secured from the Dean.

REGULATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

Every student is expected to be diligent in study and to deport himself in an orderly, courteous and moral manner, both in the college and off the campus.

The use of tobacco, social dancing, gambling, and card-playing are forbidden on the campus, and on any property controlled by the college or operated by students and for students. The use of alcoholic beverages is forbidden both on and off the campus.

The faculty represents a board of control in regard to matters of discipline, and is authorized to suspend or dismiss a student whenever, in its judgment, such action would be for the best interests of the college.

Regular church attendance is expected of all students, although the college assumes no responsibility in this matter for students who live in their own homes.

Those who represent George Fox College in intercollegiate affairs: athletic, public speaking contests, etc., are required to maintain an adequate standard both of scholarship and character. A minimum of ten semester hours carried with success with satisfactory character and conduct, is required of a representative of the college in all cases.

DORMITORY RULES

Study Hours—

1—In order that students may enjoy the best possible conditions for successful college life, specific hours for study are arranged as follows:

Mon., Tues., Wed., Thurs., 7:30 to 10:30 p. m. During these hours quiet shall be maintained.

2—No radios or typewriters shall be used after 11:00 p. m.

Signing Out and In—

1—To sign out means to record name, time of departure, destination, and expected time of return on book provided for this purpose.

2—To sign in means to cancel name immediately upon return. Any student wishing to leave town shall get permission from the House Mother and leave address on the sign out book.

3—Students are asked to sign out when leaving the building after dinner even if they return before 7:30.

Social Privileges—

1—Hours: Friday, 11:30; Saturday, 11:00; Sunday, 10:30.

2—Fellows are asked not to use the parlor during school hours and after 7:30 on school nights.

3—The privilege of leaving the building during study hours will be determined by the grade average of the student and the discretion of the Dean.

Rooms—

1—Beds made and rooms in order before leaving for class.

2—No furniture to be removed from rooms without permission from House Mother.

3—Rooms to be swept and dusted thoroughly at least once a week.

4—Rooms are inspected by the Dean.

Laundry—

1—The laundry room should not be used during study hours unless special reasons make it imperative.

REGULATIONS FOR PARKING CARS

1—Every car must be registered with the College Office.

2—Cars must be parked in designated places.

3—No parking in drive-ways.

4—No parking on lawns.

5—Violation of any of the above rules makes the violator subject to a minimum fine of 50c per violation. All fines are payable in the Office.

LIBRARY

The library is open each school day from 8 to 11:30 a. m., and from 1 to 5 p. m., except that on Tuesday instead of closing at 11:30 it is open until 12 noon. In the evening of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the library is open from 7:30 to 9:30.

In order to maintain a place quiet enough for undisturbed thinking and study, it is necessary that there be no talking above a whisper in the reading room, except when attending to matters in a quiet tone at the desk. The sound of even a subdued voice in the library carries across the room and is disturbing to persons attempting to concentrate—but whispered conversations disturb much less and are not objected to when conversing is necessary. Violators of this regulation may be denied the use of the library.

COMPULSORY CHAPEL

Varied and interesting chapel services are maintained each week. Students (except special students) are required to attend chapel each school day. No more than five chapel absences will be permitted each semester. More than five unexcused ab-

sences will be penalized by a reduction of grades or class hours. An absence due to illness is not counted against the attendance record if the fact of illness is reported to the chapel officer soon after the absence occurs. The same applies to absences made necessary by participation in some authorized college activity such as a choir trip or quartet engagement or chapel program—except that advance notice is requested for such absences.

A few days after the beginning of school a seating assignment list will be posted. Anyone failing to occupy his assigned seat in the auditorium at chapel time will be marked absent unless the chapel officer is notified as outlined above or some other special seating has been arranged.

TRADITION

Student and faculty members shall speak when they meet both on and off the campus.

Only seniors may pick flowers or foliage on the campus.

Students shall leave chapel in the order of their class ranking.

Sophomores shall entertain the freshmen at an initiation at the beginning of the year.

After the second week of school freshmen shall appear in green decoration of some sort, preferably caps, which will remain in evidence for one week.

Only seniors shall start applause in chapel.

April first shall be observed as loud sox day, or with a college affair of some sort.

A May Day festival shall be held annually on or near May 1.

At the last chapel of the school year, athletic and public speaking awards shall be made and move up day observed.

The senior class shall observe "sneak day" some time in the spring.

The juniors shall entertain the seniors with a banquet.

The juniors shall decorate for commencement affairs.

Bruin Jr. VIII, the object of friendly inter-class rivalry, shall appear on the college campus alternating Fridays between the hours of eight and ten.

Each class shall present the college with some beautiful or useful gift before its graduation.

Only faculty members and seniors shall park cars on the south side of the Administration building.

Regular chapel attendance is expected of all students.

George Fox Actorators is a speech and dramatics club set up in the spring of 1944. The club functions in connection with the dramatics department. Many fine plays and dramatic works are produced each year.

**FOREIGN MISSIONS
FELLOWSHIP**

The center of missionary interest . . . the springboard of missionary emphasis . . . the core of missionary activity . . . FMF.

Foreign Missions Fellowship on the GFC campus is a vital active association of missionaries-in-preparation. Organized to promote interest in missions on Christian campuses. Being part of a national organization, FMF at GFC enjoys the advantages of materials and counsel from Student Foreign Missions Fellowship (an affiliate of Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship) without losing the autonomy of a local organization.

Activities included a successful Missionary Conferette last year with 18 missionaries from all over the world meeting with GFC'ers and students from more than 10 Oregon colleges. This year will see another Missionary Conferette plus an All Friends Missionary Convention scheduled for this fall.

STUDENT CHRISTIAN

In addition to future missionaries, membership of FMF includes any student who has a real sense of the imperativeness of Christ's command, "Go Ye . . ."

Meetings are bi-weekly. Missionaries on furlough or home from the field alternate with study meetings.

You are dared to examine yourself in the light of missions. FMF is the place to do it.

FORENSICS ORATORY, AND DEBATE

Forensics activities of George Fox college saw a sharp increase during the past year, which points to a very active year in 1952-53.

Various tournaments and oratorical contests are held each year under the direction of the Inter-Collegiate Association of Oregon of which George Fox College is a member. College representatives for these contests are chosen by local contests.

Many inter-collegiate meets will be held this year. Contests of this type are of special value both to the student and to the college.

The Old Pulpit Extemporaneous Contest is held each year. The winner has his name engraved on a copper plate on the first pulpit ever used in Newberg. The old pulpit resides in the college museum.

TREFIAN LITERARY SOCIETY

Trefian Literary Society is made up of college women and holds its meetings every other Wednesday. It purposes to acquaint women students with parliamentary procedure and to provide stimulating cultural programs. Officers are elected each semester. The programs are carefully planned, varied, and interesting.

Music

G. F. C. BAND

The G. F. C. Band is organized each year on a voluntary basis and is open to all who play band instruments. Letters are awarded to all members who complete requirements as set up by the student council.

The band, officially organized during the 1951-52 college year, functions at rallies, athletic contests, and parades, as well as presenting a formal concert each year.

The music department will furnish any added information on request.

SINGING MEN

"The promotion of the singing of sacred music by the campus men of G. F. C.", is the purpose of the "Singing Men". Membership in the organization is open to all men who have an interest in the singing of sacred music.

The "Singing Men" have established a fine reputation throughout the Pacific Northwest by their Gospel Quartet Festival presented each year.

Quartets from all points in the Northwest appear in this afternoon of sacred inspiration.

All new male students, as well as old, are cordially invited to become members of this organization.

CHORUS

A mixed chorus of unlimited membership is organized for the study and rendition of selected oratorios and other great sacred music at the Christmas and Easter seasons. Handel's "Messiah" is usually given each year. The organization of the chorus is enlarged to include singers from the church choirs of the city for the oratorio presentations.

A CAPPELLA CHOIR

A select group of trained voices is organized for concert tours and home appearances upon formal occasions. Membership is open to anyone who can meet the rigid requirements. Emphasis is placed upon spiritual, meaningful, and artistic interpretation of fine sacred choral literature.

The purpose of the Crescent is to stimulate reader interest among the constituency of the school and student body, and maintain a high level of journalism. It is directed to show school activities in their true light on a Christian college campus.

Your subscription to the Crescent is free with the purchase of a Student Activity card. A part of the Crescent's budget comes from a percentage of the Associated Student Body fund. The remainder comes from advertising and subscriptions which are 75c per year.

The paper is carried on in conjunction with the journalism class, from which the majority of reporters come. The editor, assistant editor, and business manager are elected by the student body.

The paper is a member of the Associated Collegiate Press, and is rated as First Class.

Athletic

THE W. A. A.

The Women's Athletic Association is an organization open to all girls who are interested in sports. The association manages all girls' athletic activities and promotes interest in physical education and recreative sports.

During the school year various social events are sponsored by the W. A. A.

THE M. A. A.

The Men's Athletic Association supervises all men's athletic and inter-collegiate sports.

THE GOLD Q CLUB

Girls who have won letters in college sports are eligible for the Gold Q Club. The club stages a novel initiation in the fall and spring. It sponsors one of the social events of most interest during the year—its annual formal dinner held near St. Valentine's Day.

The club endeavors to further all athletic activities and furnish the pep and spirit needed in all school affairs.

THE G. F. CLUB

A George Fox College man, who through his athletic ability and scholarship has gained recognition by

winning a letter in any varsity sport, is eligible for membership in this club.

Initiation takes place each spring, when new members are properly brought into the club. G. F. Club members further interest in athletic activities, and push all school activities. The G. F. formal banquet given towards the end of the year, is one of the outstanding social events of the college. It sponsors the annual grade school basketball tournament.

Men's Athletics

Men's athletics at George Gox will be under the direction of George Bales for the fifth consecutive year. Coach Bales, a graduate of G. F. C., has not only demonstrated his ability in turning out winning teams, but has also put the athletic department far up the road toward financial stability.

Last year the Quaker football squad was victorious in four games while dropping three. Highlights of the season was a 51-0 trouncing of Reed college.

In basketball, the Balesmen took the Metropolitan Collegiate conference championship, with eight wins and only two losses. Throughout the entire season, G. F. C. won 14 and lost seven.

Bernard McGrath, a local businessman, coached the baseball team which finished second in the Metropolitan conference. The track squad

under student coach Woody Fletcher, won the M. C. C. championship. It was George Fox's first track competition in recent years.

In all sports, the Quakers defeated Reed teams nine times without suffering a setback.

GIRLS' SPORTS

Physical education for women includes a regular physical education course with emphasis on competitive volleyball, basketball and softball. Letters are awarded in the spring to those girls who have participated in competitive games.

Yell Leaders

Yell leaders are elected by the Student Body to serve at all football and basketball games in which our team participate.
